GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on FOX-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WXIX-TV (Ch. 19) in Cincinnati, WGRT-TV (Ch. 45) in Dayton and WDKY-TV (Ch. 56) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Adam Amin (play-by-play), Mark Schlereth (analyst) and Kristina Pink (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: Coming off their first victory of the season on Monday Night Football, the Bengals navigate a shortened week as they prepare for a road test at Tennessee. Cincinnati defeated the L.A. Rams 19-16 at Paycor Stadium in front of a national audience, and now looks to improve to 2-2.

The Bengals' defense led the way in the Week 3 win, recording six sacks and two interceptions while keeping the Rams out of the end zone until 1:03 remaining in the fourth quarter. Los Angeles converted just one third down on 11 attempts (nine percent), and was forced to settle for a FG on three of its four red zone opportunities. Though the Cincinnati offense was stagnant through parts of the first half, the defensive effort provided QB Joe Burrow and company enough time to find a rhythm. And when a 10-play, 75-yard drive in the third quarter was capped off by a 14-yard TD run by HB Joe Mixon, the Bengals gained their first lead of the season and never relinquished it.

"That's the whole key," said head coach Zac Taylor on playing with a lead. "Our defense kept us right in this thing. One of 11 on third downs, the two interceptions, six sacks. That was outstanding. I thought Lou (Anarumo) did a great job dialing up pressures at the right time that put these guys in good position. That was a great job by our defense today."

Cincinnati enjoyed contributions from all areas of its defense, starting with a four-man front of DE Trey Hendrickson, DE Sam Hubbard, DT B.J. Hill and DT DJ Reader. Each player tallied a sack, led by two from Hendrickson in the second half as the Bengals continuously pressured Rams QB Matthew Stafford. Both of Stafford's INTs were to LB Logan Wilson, with the second ending a Los Angeles drive that reached the Bengals' 30-yard line in the third quarter. On the back end, second-year S Dax Hill posted a team-high eight tackles, including his first career sack along with a TFL in the Rams' backfield.

On a night that additionally featured the Bengals' Ring of Honor induction ceremony as well as the return of the "White Bengal" helmet, Wilson and his defensive teammates put together a solid performance that helped keep Cincinnati from falling into an early 0-3 hole.

"You always want to get back in the win column," Wilson said. "You don't want to go 0-3 to start the season. Your chances of getting into the playoffs, obviously, are pretty slim. We understood that and we kind of viewed this as a game we needed to win anyway in front of our home crowd."

Burrow, meanwhile, gritted through a calf injury that kept his status questionable until game day. The fourth-year pro completed 26 of 49 passes — the fourth most attempts in any game of his career — for 259 yards. With limited mobility, Burrow relied on quick releases throughout the night and consistently turned to his fellow Pro Bowler, WR Ja'Marr Chase. Chase finished with a career-high 12 receptions for 141 yards, with 55 of those coming after the catch to give the offense a spark.

"Coming into this game, I was going to feed my guy," Burrow said. "He was due for one. I knew he was going to have a big game. Just the way he was

talking all week, he was excited to play this one. He showed up big for us. He showed why he's one of the best."

The Bengals now aim to even their record at 2-2, just as they did a season ago after dropping their first two games. The opportunity to claim a second win comes at a venue that has provided Cincinnati with fond memories over the past two seasons, beginning with a victory in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff against the top-seeded Titans. That 19-16 win at Nissan Stadium, sealed by a 52-yard FG by K Evan McPherson as time expired, marked the first road postseason victory in Bengals history and punched their ticket to the AFC Championship.

Cincinnati returned to Nissan Stadium in Week 12 last year and came away with a 20-16 win, which included a 27-yard go-ahead TD catch by WR Tee Higgins in the fourth quarter. It gave the Bengals their third consecutive victory in a row, in what became an eight-game win streak to close the regular season (tied team record).

The series: The Bengals and Titans (formerly Oilers) have met 78 times (including postseason), making the Titans the third-most played foe in Bengals history. Cincinnati has played more games against only Pittsburgh (107) and Cleveland (100). The Bengals and Titans/Oilers were rivals in the old AFC Central Division, playing twice per year in the regular season from 1970-2001.

The series is a relatively even affair, with Tennessee leading 40-37-1 overall (regular season and postseason). The Titans lead 23-15-1 as the home team, and they lead the series 6-5 in games played in Tennessee since their relocation there in 1997. However, the Bengals have won seven of the past nine meetings overall, and Cincinnati leads 4-2 in games played in Tennessee since parting ways as division opponents with NFL realignment in 2002.

The Bengals have won both postseason meetings between the two teams, 41-14 in a Wild Card Playoff at Cincinnati after the 1990 NFL season, and 19-16 in a Divisional Playoff at Tennessee after the 2021 season.

Team bests from the series (regular season):

Bengals — MOST POINTS: 61 (twice), in wins of 61-17 at the Astrodome in 1972 and 61-7 at Cincinnati in '89. The games are tied for the Bengals' all-time high score in any game. **LARGEST VICTORY MARGIN:** 54, in the 61-7 '89 game (Bengals' largest winning margin in any game). **FEWEST POINTS ALLOWED:** 3, in a 13-3 victory at Cincinnati in 1984.

Titans — MOST POINTS: 48, in a 48-17 victory at Houston in 1990. **LARGEST VICTORY MARGIN:** 35 (twice), in wins of 41-6 at Houston in 1988 and 38-3 at Cincinnati in '93. **FEWEST POINTS ALLOWED:** 3 (five times), most recently in a 35-3 win at Tennessee in 2000.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2023 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 1651 career passing attempts, 570 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth place all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.
- Burrow has 1111 completions, 129 shy of Blake (1240) for fifth place all-time. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654), Palmer (2024) and Esiason (2015) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.
- Burrow has 12,337 passing yards, 2797 shy of Blake (15,134) for fifth place all-time.
- Burrow has 84 TD passes, nine shy of Blake (93) for fifth place all-time.
- Burrow additionally has 16 career games of 300 or more passing yards, one shy of Palmer (17) for fourth place all-time. Dalton (28), Esiason (23) and Anderson (19) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.
- HB Joe Mixon in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams had 19 rushing attempts, moving his career total to 1359, surpassing HB James Brooks (1344) for fourth place all-time. Mixon is now 43 rushing attempts shy of FB Pete Johnson (1402) for third place.
- Mixon has 5558 career rushing yards, 184 shy of HB Rudi Johnson (5742) for third place all-time. Mixon in Week 1 at Cleveland surpassed Pete Johnson (5421).
- Mixon has 41 rushing TDs, four shy of HB Corey Dillon (45) for third place all-time and eight shy of Rudi Johnson (48) for second place all-time. Pete Johnson (64) is the team's career record holder.
- Mixon has 14 games with 100 or more rushing yards, one shy of HB Cedric Benson for fourth place all-time. Dillon (28), Rudi Johnson (19) and Brooks (17) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.
- WR Tyler Boyd has 459 career receptions, 48 shy of WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fourth place all-time. Boyd in 2022 surpassed WR Cris Collinsworth (417).
- K Evan McPherson needs five FG attempts to reach 75 in his career, which would qualify him for the Bengals' all-time FG percentage record. McPherson currently has an 82.9 career percentage (58 made/70 att.). There are two qualifying former Bengals with higher career FG percentages — Shayne Graham (86.76 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.91 percent; 90/106).

Records vs. Titans: In their long-standing series, both the Bengals and the Titans (formerly Oilers) have posted a number of record performances, including:

- The Bengals record for points in a game was set in a 61-17 win at Houston on Dec. 17, 1972, and Cincinnati tied that mark 17 years to the day later in a 61-7 win vs. Houston on Dec. 17, 1989. In the 1972 win, the Bengals also set the team record for most points in a half, posting 45 second-half points. In the 1989 win, the team also matched the team record for most touchdowns in a game with eight.
- The Bengals record for victory margin (54) was set in the 61-7 win over Houston in 1989.
- Cincinnati scored a team-record five rushing TDs vs. Houston on Oct. 6, 1983. The Bengals have tied that mark twice since, including vs. the Oilers on Oct. 23, 1988.
- The Bengals' team record for first downs (35) was set vs. Houston on Dec. 17, 1989. It was later matched in an overtime game vs. Washington (at London, England) on Oct. 30, 2016.
- The Bengals' individual record for rushing TDs (four) in a game has been set twice, with the first of those against the Titans. The mark was first established by HB Corey Dillon vs. Tennessee on Dec. 4, 1997. Then, last season, the mark was tied by HB Joe Mixon vs. Carolina on Nov. 6.
- On Dec. 17, 1972 in Houston, CB Lemar Parrish became the first Bengal to record three interceptions in a game. That mark has been matched seven times since, including by S David Fulcher, also against the Oilers, on Dec. 17,

1989. In the '72 contest, Parrish returned two of those INTs for TDs, which is the only instance in team history a Bengals defender has done so.

● On Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee, P Will Brice set a Bengals record for average yards per punt in a game (minimum three punts), with a 63.0-yard average (189 yards on three punts).

For the Titans/Oilers:

● On Oct. 14, 1990 at Houston, Oilers QB Warren Moon became the first passer to throw five TD passes against the Bengals. That record still stands, though it has been matched five times since, including again by Moon on Oct. 11, 1992 in Cincinnati.

● Twice against the Bengals, Oilers WR Haywood Jeffires matched an opponents' individual record for most receiving TDs against the Bengals with three. Opposing players have recorded three receiving TDs a total of eight times, and Jeffires is the only one who has done it twice — in consecutive seasons — on Oct. 11, 1992, and on Nov. 14, 1993. Both instances occurred in games played in Cincinnati.

Individually vs. Titans: Here is a look at the offensive stats for current Bengals players against Tennessee (ordered by total games played; includes Divisional Playoff after 2021 season):

- WR Tyler Boyd: Three games; 10 receptions for 100 yards (10.0) and one TD; Two rushes for nine yards (4.5).
- QB Joe Burrow: Three games; 76 of 111 passing for 867 yards, three TDs and one INT (96.9 rating); 14 rushes for 46 yards (3.3).
- WR Tee Higgins: Three games; 20 receptions for 288 yards (14.4) and one TD; Two rushes for six yards (3.0).
- HB Chris Evans: Two games; One rush for four yards.
- HB Joe Mixon: Two games; 23 carries for 91 yards (4.0) with two TDs; Seven receptions for 54 yards (7.7).
- HB Trayveon Williams: Two games; Two rushes for 18 yards (9.0); One reception for 24 yards.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: One game; Five receptions for 109 yards (21.8); One rush for two yards.
- WR Trenton Irwin: One game; One reception for 16 yards.

Call it the 'Breezer Bowl': Though the game is not as well-known in Bengals lore as the famous "Freezer Bowl" AFC Championship Game of the 1981 season, the Titans' 2008 regular-season visit to Cincinnati perhaps should be remembered — with all due seriousness — as the "Breezer Bowl."

The wind speed at kickoff of the Titans' 24-7 win at Paul Brown Stadium (now named Paycor Stadium) on Sept. 14, 2008 was a somewhat notable 21 mph. However, it drastically increased very soon after the game started. The remnants of Hurricane Ike combined with another strong weather system to produce a powerful windstorm by the end of the first quarter. The final three quarters were played in sustained winds of just over 70 mph, which nearly qualified as a Category 1 hurricane (defined as sustained winds of 74-95 mph). The Bengals and Titans managed only 127 and 118 passing yards, respectively, while food wrappers, paper cups and even pizza boxes swirled around the field.

Though the game was played without incident or other weather conditions such as rain, the windstorm was extremely dangerous and damaging outside the stadium. Five persons were killed by falling trees during the storm, which caused significant widespread damage to trees, homes and power utilities across southeast Missouri, southern Illinois, southern Indiana, western/northern Kentucky and southwestern Ohio. The storm left more than a million people in the Greater Cincinnati area without power, some for more than a month. It was the costliest natural disaster in the history of Ohio, with total damage estimates of nearly \$1.5 billion in the Buckeye State alone.

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks this week at Tennessee. It is Cincinnati's most frequent look since unveiling new uniforms prior to the 2021 season, and the Bengals are 8-3 overall when wearing this combination. That includes a 3-1

mark in each of the team's four road postseason games over the past two years. Cincinnati sported this look in its last two trips to Tennessee — the 2021 Divisional Playoff and '22 Week 12 — and came away with wins in both matchups. The Bengals last featured this combination in the 2023 season opener at Cleveland.

The 2021 redesign marked the Bengals' first significant uniform alterations since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants also feature three different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, and white with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate jerseys and/or color rush (CR) uniforms and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals wore the helmet twice last season, in a Week 4 home win over Miami and a Week 11 road victory at Pittsburgh. The "White Bengal" look made its return on Monday Night Football in Week 3, as Cincinnati defeated the L.A. Rams 19-16 in front of a "White Out" crowd at Paycor Stadium. The white helmets are slated to be featured again in the Bengals' Week 13 road contest at Jacksonville.

The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes an orange jersey with one of the team's primary pants. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

[^] — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023, the Bengals are permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2023 season is his fifth in the position.

In 2022, Taylor led Cincinnati to a second consecutive AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship. The Bengals tied a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), and with a pair of playoff victories in January, Taylor became one of just 13 head coaches in NFL history with five wins in their first six career postseason games. He once

again oversaw a dynamic offense that ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0).

The Bengals also boasted a versatile defense that held opposing passers to a league-low 58.9 completion percentage while also ranking sixth in points allowed (20.1 per game) and seventh in rushing yards allowed (106.6).

In 2021, Taylor guided the Bengals to their first division championship since

'15, before winning three postseason games to claim the AFC crown and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. QB Joe Burrow, playing in his first full season in Taylor's system, was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after leading the league in completion percentage (70.4), while first-round draft pick WR Ja'Marr Chase totaled the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455) en route to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped the Bengals navigate the league's COVID-19 pandemic protocols which included no in-person offseason program. Still, he guided a rookie Burrow to notable production that included the most ever completions by a QB through their first 10 games (264) and the fifth-most passing yards (2688).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both offense and defense. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped guide QB Jared Goff to career highs in every major passing category as the Rams won the NFC West and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Taylor had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant quarterbacks coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and tight ends coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous program records, totaling 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. He was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2006 after passing for 3197 yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Mike Vrabel was named the 19th head coach in Titans franchise history on Jan. 20, 2018. He is in his 10th year as an NFL coach, in addition to three years as a college coach. Vrabel led the Titans to a 50-37 record in his first five seasons, including playoff appearances from 2019-21. His 50 wins were the most in franchise history for a head coach's first five complete seasons, and the total moved Vrabel into third place in team annals for total wins, behind Jeff Fisher (147) and Bum Phillips (59).

In 2022, the Titans had the NFL's top-ranked rushing defense (76.9). In 2021, the Titans captured their second consecutive division title, marking the franchise's first back-to-back division crowns since 1960-62. It was the first time the team made the playoffs in three consecutive seasons since a seven-year postseason stretch from 1987-93. Vrabel was named the 2021 Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year.

In 2020, the Titans won their first AFC South title since '08 and tied for second in total offense (396.4 yards per game). In 2019, the Titans appeared in the AFC Championship Game for the first time since '02.

Vrabel spent four seasons coaching with the Houston Texans, as linebackers coach (2014-16) and defensive coordinator ('17). The Texans won two division titles (2015 and '16) during his tenure. Houston's 2016 defense ranked first overall in the NFL (301.3 yards allowed per game) for the first time in franchise history.

Vrabel played as a defensive lineman for the Ohio State Buckeyes (1993-96). He earned back-to-back All-America honors and was twice named Big Ten Conference Defensive Lineman of the Year (1995 and '96). He was a third-round 1997 draft pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers, where he played from 1997-2000. He also played for the New England Patriots (2001-08) and Kansas City Chiefs ('09-10). With the Patriots, he earned Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors in 2007 and was a member of three Super Bowl championship squads. Vrabel also coached collegiately at Ohio State (2011-13).

Vrabel was born Aug. 14, 1975, in Akron, Ohio. He and his wife, Jennifer, are the parents of two sons, Tyler and Carter.

Coaching continuity under Taylor: Head coach Zac Taylor returned virtually the entire coaching staff for the 2023 season, including defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo, offensive coordinator Brian Callahan and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons.

Anarumo, Callahan and Simmons have all been on staff since Taylor was hired in February 2019. The Bengals are the only team in the NFL with the same head and same coordinators in place for each season since 2021.

Simmons, now in his 21st season with the team in 2023, is the longest-tenured coach on the Bengals' staff. He has led Cincinnati's special teams units each year since 2003. Defensive quality control coach Sigismondo "Louie" Cioffi has returned for his 17th Bengals season, after serving as an assistant coach from 1997-2010 and then rejoining the staff in '21. Senior defensive assistant Mark Duffner, who previously was a Bengals assistant from 1997-2002 before returning in '19, now is in his 11th season in Cincinnati.

Brad Kragthorpe is in his first season in the role of assistant quarterbacks coach, after spending the previous two years (2021-22) as assistant wide receivers coach. Kragthorpe played QB collegiately at Louisiana State from 2013-15, then returned to LSU in '18 as an offensive analyst in QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase's first season with the Tigers. He joined the Cincinnati staff as an offensive assistant in 2019.

2023 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by six players wearing the captains' patch, which were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive and three defensive players.

Cincinnati's offensive captains remain unchanged from the 2022 season and include fourth-year QB Joe Burrow, seventh-year HB Joe Mixon and eighth-year C Ted Karras. This is Burrow's fourth consecutive season as a captain and the third straight for Mixon. Karras, who joined the Bengals as a free agent in March of 2022, serves as a team captain for the third time in his career, after previously doing so with the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

The defensive captains are seventh-year CB Mike Hilton, sixth-year DE Sam Hubbard and eighth-year DT DJ Reader. Hubbard is wearing the patch for a third consecutive season, while Reader dons it for a second straight year. Hilton is the lone Bengals captain this season who is carrying the honor for the first time.

Burrow's NFL journey: After being selected No. 1 overall by the Bengals in the 2020 NFL Draft, former Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow had one of the most productive starts to a career by a QB in league history, as his 264 completions still count as the most ever by an NFL passer through their first 10 career games, while his 404 pass attempts are the second-most in that same category and his 2588 passing yards are fifth.

In Week 11 of his rookie year at Washington, Burrow suffered a season-ending left knee injury, halting a campaign that was on pace to shatter several NFL rookie passing records. He embarked on a rehab process that lasted over eight months and received clearance to participate in training camp in 2021.

Shortly after his injury in 2020, Burrow vowed publicly that he would start Cincinnati's '21 season opener. On Sept. 12 vs. Minnesota, not only did he make good on that promise, but he posted then-career highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.67) in a Bengals OT win.

Burrow in 2021 completed a league-leading 70.4 percent of his passes (366 of 520) for 4611 yards and 34 TDs en route to being named the AP Comeback Player of the Year. His passing yardage and 108.3 passer rating stand as single-season team records. In the postseason, he threw for 1105 yards and five TDs in four games, becoming the first No. 1 overall draft pick in NFL history to lead his team to a conference championship game (let alone a Super Bowl berth) in either of their first two seasons.

On the day before the first official training camp practice of 2022, Burrow was forced to undergo surgery to remove his appendix. He remained involved in team meetings and attended practices on a golf cart during a three-week recovery process, before returning to the field in mid-August. He started the regular-season opener and went on to set Bengals single-season records for completions (414, fifth in NFL) and TD passes (35, tied for second). Burrow then completed 66.1 percent of his passes (72 of 109) for 721 yards and four TDs in three postseason games, guiding the Bengals to the AFC Championship once again. He became the first player drafted No. 1 overall to win five playoff games within his first three seasons.

The Athens, Ohio, native again faced adversity in training camp this season as he worked his way back from a calf strain. Burrow sustained the injury on July 27 — the second day of camp — and returned to practice on Aug. 30. On Sept. 9, he signed a five-year contract extension that makes him the highest-paid player in NFL history, based on average annual value. The extension keeps Burrow in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

Hitting the mark: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 1500 career passing attempts in the 2022 regular-season finale against Baltimore, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 67.3, Burrow ranks fourth in NFL history in the category. Former Saints QB Drew Brees (67.7), Las Vegas QB Jimmy Garoppolo (67.6) and L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (67.4) hold the top three spots.

After leading the league in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 pass attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

In Week 16 at New England, Burrow surpassed 1000 career completions in

what was just his 41st game. That tied him with former Detroit QB Matthew Stafford as the second-fastest player in NFL history to reach 1000 completions.

With numerous pass-catching options missing time due to injuries in 2022, Burrow found a way to spread the ball around the entire offense, as six Bengals (three WRs, two HBs and one TE) finished the year with 35 or more receptions. Burrow had 13 games in which he completed a pass to seven or more players.

Burrow surpasses 12K: QB Joe Burrow passed for 222 yards in Week 2 vs. Baltimore, eclipsing 12,000 career passing yards in what was just his 44th career game. That tied him with former Colts QB Andrew Luck as the fifth-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 12,000 passing yards. He is the fastest Bengal ever to 11,000 passing yards (40 games), 10,000 (36), 9000 (33), 8000 (29), 7000 (26), 6000 (23), 5000 (19) and 4000 (16).

Burrow's 9649 passing yards since the start of the 2021 regular season are fifth most in the NFL in that span. He has ranked in the top six leaguewide in passing yards in each of the past two seasons, with a Bengals-record 4611 in 2021 (sixth) and 4475 in '22 (fifth).

Joe throws 80th career TD: QB Joe Burrow threw his 80th TD pass in Week 16 last season at New England, in what was his 41st career game. That made him the fifth-fastest QB in NFL history to throw for 80 TDs.

The former No. 1 overall draft pick had 13 TD passes in 10 games as a rookie, before setting a then-team record with 34 TDs in his sophomore campaign. By eclipsing his own record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to throw for 30 or more TDs in multiple seasons. Burrow, Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino and Chargers QB Justin Herbert are the only players in NFL history with at least 30 TD passes and 4000 passing yards in two of their first three seasons.

Prior to Week 1 at Cleveland, Burrow held a streak of 23 consecutive regular-season games in which he threw at least one TD pass. That surpassed Jeff Blake (21 games in 1994-95) for the longest such streak in Bengals history. Burrow responded in Week 2 vs. Baltimore with two TD passes, marking his 27th career multi-TD game (regular season).

Burrow also is one of two players in NFL history (former Colts QB Andrew Luck) with at least 75 TD passes and 10 rushing TDs in their first three seasons. A career-high five of Burrow's 10 rushing TDs came in 2022.

Burrow masters the deep ball: A staple of Cincinnati's offense under head coach Zac Taylor has been a willingness to take shots down the field, and no QB has cashed in on more big plays than Joe Burrow. Burrow has 17 career TD passes of 40 or more yards, more than any NFL QB since he entered the league in 2020.

Six of Burrow's 40-plus yard TD passes came during Weeks 3-8 of the 2022 campaign. He also has a league-leading 12 TD passes of 50 or more yards since

2020, which tied with Pro Football Hall of Famers Dan Marino and Fran Tarkenton for the most by any player in NFL history in their first three seasons.

Three-headed monster at WR: The Bengals' offense has featured arguably the top receiving trio in the NFL over the past two-plus seasons consisting of WRs Tyler Boyd, Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins.

Each player has showcased their abilities through three games this season, beginning with Higgins in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. The fourth-year pro out of Clemson led Cincinnati with eight catches for 89 yards, including two TD grabs in the second half to help cut the Bengals' deficit. It marked Higgins' fourth career game (including postseason) with multiple TD catches, and his second against the Ravens. The following week, on Monday Night Football against the L.A. Rams, Chase erupted for 141 yards on a career-high 12 receptions. The 12 catches tied for the second most in a game in team history, and Chase reached the century mark in receiving yards for the 10th time in his young career.

Boyd has served as a consistent pass catching option since being drafted by Cincinnati in the second round in 2016. His 13 catches this season rank second on the team behind Chase (22), with 11 of those coming over the past two games. The longest-tenured Bengals player on the active roster, Boyd enters Week 4 with 459 career receptions, the fifth most in team history.

Though each player missed substantial action during the 2022 regular season due to injuries, Cincinnati was one of two teams (L.A. Chargers) with three WRs that recorded 700 or more receiving yards. The Bengals were also the only team with three players that each had a game with 130-plus receiving yards. Boyd, Chase and Higgins all averaged at least 12 yards per reception and had at least one TD catch of 50-plus yards.

Their 3374 combined receiving yards in the 2021 regular season led all trios, with Chase posting a Bengals-record 1455, Higgins going for 1091 and Boyd netting 828.

Chase (1046 yards) and Higgins (1029) both notched 1000 receiving yards for the second straight season in 2022, marking the fourth time the Bengals had multiple 1000-yard receivers — WRs Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh also did it twice, in 2006 and '07. In 2021, Chase (21 years old) and Higgins (22) became the first duo in league history to log 1000 receiving yards in the same season before the age of 23.

Chase, Boyd pose deep threats: QB Joe Burrow has the NFL's most TD passes of 50 or more yards since the start of the 2021 season, and much of that production can be attributed to WRs Ja'Marr Chase and Tyler Boyd.

Chase has a league-leading six TD receptions of 50-plus yards in that span, with the most recent coming in Week 6 of the 2022 season. Returning to his hometown of New Orleans to take on the Saints, Chase caught seven passes for 132 yards and two TDs, including a 60-yard catch and run to the end zone with just under two minutes remaining that proved to be the game-winner. It was a memorable encore for Chase at Caesars Superdome, as in his last appearance at the venue he had nine grabs for 221 yards and two TDs to help Louisiana State win the 2019 College Football Playoff National Championship.

Boyd, meanwhile, has four TD catches of 50 or more yards since 2021, tied for second most in the NFL behind Chase. Two of those scoring receptions occurred last season, beginning with a 56-yarder on the final play of the first quarter in a Week 3 win at the N.Y. Jets. In Week 7 vs. Atlanta, Burrow and Boyd connected for a 60-yard TD on just the fourth play from scrimmage to give the Bengals an early 7-0 lead.

Chasing history: After totaling 70 receiving yards on 10 catches through the opening two games this season, third-year WR Ja'Marr Chase broke out for 141 on 12 receptions in the Week 3 win over the L.A. Rams on Monday night. The 12 grabs marked a career high for Chase and tied for the second most in a game in team history. The Bengals single-game receptions record belongs to former WR Carl Pickens, who netted 13 catches on Oct. 11, 1998 against Pittsburgh.

Chase in the third quarter had a 43-yard catch on a bootleg pass from QB Joe Burrow, giving him his 12th reception of 40 or more yards since he entered the NFL in 2021 — tied for the second most leaguewide in that span. Consider that with four games missed in 2022 due to injury, along with a game canceled, Chase has played in just 32 games in that timeframe, compared to 37 for Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (leads category with 13 40-yard catches) and 37 for Kansas City/Miami WR Tyreek Hill (12).

Chase's previous career best for catches in a game was 11, which occurred in Week 17 of the 2021 season vs. Kansas City. That day, he amassed a Bengals-record 266 receiving yards that still stand as the most in a game by a rookie in NFL history.

The Week 3 victory over the Rams marked Chase's 10th career game with 100 or more receiving yards. A Pro Bowler each of his first two seasons, Chase is one of two players in Bengals history who have notched consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns to begin their career, joining A.J. Green (2011-12).

Chase during the 2022 season eclipsed two career milestones — 2000 receiving yards and 20 receiving TDs. His 2000th yard came in just his 24th career game (Week 7 vs. Atlanta), making Chase tied for the fourth fastest player in NFL history to hit the 2K mark. He recorded his 20th TD catch in Week 14 vs. Cleveland, in what was his 26th game — that tied him as the fourth fastest since 1970 to reach that number. Chase, who turned 23 on March 1 of this year, joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players under the age of 23 with 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches in league history.

Tee tops 1000 again: WR Tee Higgins was held without a catch in the season opener at Cleveland, but bounced back in Week 2 vs. Baltimore with eight grabs for 89 yards and two TDs. A majority of his production came in the second half, including a fourth-quarter scoring drive that saw him net three receptions for 40 yards capped off by a four-yard TD that cut Cincinnati's deficit to 27-24.

Higgins during the 2022 regular season ranked second on the Bengals in receptions (74), receiving yards (1029) and receiving TDs (seven). That followed a 2021 sophomore campaign in which he logged 1091 yards and six TDs on 74 catches. Higgins is one of five players in Bengals history with multiple 1000-yard receiving seasons within the first three years of his career, alongside WRs Cris Collinsworth (1981, '83), Chad Johnson (2002-03), A.J. Green ('11-13) and Ja'Marr Chase ('21-22). His career yardage total at the end of 2022 (3028) marked the second most ever by a Bengals player through their first three seasons, trailing only Green (3833).

With Chase out of the lineup due to injury in Weeks 11-12 last season, Higgins was relied on as the team's No. 1 receiver and delivered back-to-back 100-yard performances. He had a season-high nine catches for 148 yards in Week 11 at Pittsburgh, marking the second-most in a game in his career (194 on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore). He then followed that up with seven grabs for 114 yards and a TD in Week 12 at Tennessee, including a 27-yard TD that gave Cincinnati a fourth-quarter lead.

Higgins has continued to produce during his brief but impressive postseason career. He ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing Chase in both categories, while his three TD catches are tied with Chase and former TE Dan Ross for the team's postseason record. With two TDs in Super Bowl LVI vs. the L.A. Rams, he also joined Ross as the only players in team history with multiple TDs in a postseason game.

Facts from Jones' punt return: Rookie WR Charlie Jones scored the Bengals' first TD of the 2023 season via an 81-yard punt return in the second quarter of the Week 2 contest against Baltimore. Jones, who was named the Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year in 2021 while playing at the University of Iowa, had two special teams TDs during his collegiate career — one on a punt return in 2020 and one on a kickoff return in '21. His 81-yard return in Week 2 tied the score at 7-7 and was the first punt return TD allowed by the Ravens since Oct. 9, 2016 (Washington). Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It marked the first TD on a PR by a Bengals player since former CB Adam Jones' 81-yard return on Sept. 12, 2012 vs. Cleveland.
- It was the first TD on a PR by a Bengals rookie since WR Peter Warrick's 82-yarder on Dec. 17, 2000 vs. Jacksonville.
- It was the 10th TD on a PR by a Bengals rookie in team history.
- It tied Adam Jones' 2012 return as the seventh longest PR in team history. Former WR Carl Pickens holds the Bengals record with a 95-yard PR, which went for a TD, on Sept. 20, 1992 at Green Bay.
- According to NFL's Next Gen Stats service, Jones' top speed on the return was 20.97 mph. Through three weeks of the 2023 regular season, that is the third fastest speed on a PR and the 13th fastest by any ball carrier in the NFL (fastest by a Bengals player).

Mixon hits 5K: HB Joe Mixon surpassed 5000 career rushing yards in Week 9 of the 2022 season, becoming the fifth player in team history and the first since HB Rudi Johnson (2006) to reach the milestone. A 2017 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, Mixon has logged over 1000 rushing yards in three of his five full seasons (missed 10 games in '20 due to injury).

Mixon is currently one of 11 active NFL players with 5000 or more career rushing yards. Also a threat as a pass catcher out of the backfield, he posted career highs in receptions (60) and receiving yards (441) during the 2022 season and topped 100 scrimmage yards four times. In the Divisional Playoff win at Buffalo, Mixon had 105 rushing yards — the third-most in a postseason game in Bengals history — on 20 carries (5.3 average).

Mixon is coming off a 65-yard rushing performance in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams that saw him pick up five first downs with his legs. He gave Cincinnati its first lead of the night with a 14-yard rushing TD in the third quarter, marking his longest scoring run since Week 9 of the 2022 campaign. In that game vs. Carolina, Mixon scored a team-record five TDs (four rushing, one receiving) and posted a career-high 211 yards from scrimmage.

Now in his seventh pro season, Mixon has 5558 career rushing yards, the fourth most in team history and 184 behind Rudi Johnson (5742) for third on the Bengals' all-time chart. Mixon in Week 1 at Cleveland surpassed FB Pete Johnson (5421).

First-quarter defense among league's best: Though defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo is regarded as one of the best in the NFL when it comes to in-game adjustments, his Bengals defense has also been consistently prepared from the opening kickoff. Since the start of the 2022 season, Cincinnati has allowed just five TDs in the first quarter of play, tied for the third fewest in the league during that stretch, while its 62 total first-quarter points given up are the fourth fewest. The Bengals have yielded just 1296 total net yards in first quarters in that span (68.2 per game), the fifth fewest leaguewide.

Baltimore's TD on the opening drive of Week 2 marked the first TD allowed

by Cincinnati in a first quarter since Week 6 of the 2022 season at New Orleans. The Bengals' 14-game streak without giving up a first-quarter TD was the longest in the NFL since Buffalo went 16 straight from Week 14 of the 2020 season through Week 10 of the '21 campaign. Cincinnati during its streak allowed just 12 total points (never more than three in an opening quarter), while collecting three INTs and forcing 14 punts.

The L.A. Rams reached Cincinnati's two-yard line on their opening drive in Week 3, but the Bengals stood tall with a nine-yard sack by DT DJ Reader on first down, followed by incompletions on the next two plays to force a FG.

Defense tightens after the break: As referenced previously, Cincinnati's defense has proven itself among the league's elite units coming out of halftime. The Bengals have given up 36 total TDs in the second half/overtime since the start of the 2021 regular season, tied for the second fewest in the NFL behind Buffalo (32), while their 9.7 points allowed per second half/OT in that span ranks as the fifth best average leaguewide.

Cincinnati opened the 2022 season by going seven straight games without allowing a TD in the second half of play, becoming the first team to do so in each of its first seven contests since the 1934 Detroit Lions (eight games). The 2022 Bengals are also one of just six teams since 1930 to not give up a second-half TD in seven or more consecutive games at any point in a season. The 1973 Miami Dolphins (seven games) and '97 Kansas City Chiefs (10 games) are the only other teams to accomplish that feat since the '70 NFL/AFL merger.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson put forth his best performance of the young season in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, recording two sacks for a combined 15 yards. His first came early in the third quarter, when he took down QB Matthew Stafford for a seven-yard loss on third down to force a Rams FG attempt. In the fourth quarter, he dropped Stafford for a loss of eight yards, backing Los Angeles into a third-and-18.

A seventh-year veteran, Hendrickson has asserted himself among the NFL's elite pass rushers since joining the Bengals as a free agent in March of 2021. He has led Cincinnati in sacks while earning a Pro Bowl selection in each of the past two seasons.

Hendrickson's first season in stripes in 2021 saw him post a career-best 14 sacks, which ranked fifth in the league and second in Bengals single-season history behind DE Coy Bacon's 22 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder). He followed that up with a team-leading eight sacks in 2022, which included a 2.5-sack performance along with two FFs in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets. It marked the first time a Bengals player had two-plus sacks and two-plus FFs in a game since at least 2000, and garnered Hendrickson his first career AFC Defensive Player of the Week award.

Combined with a team-high 13.5 sacks in his final season with New Orleans (tied for second in NFL), Hendrickson has 38.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — the fourth-most in the league in that span. He is one of six players in the NFL with at least eight sacks in each of the past three seasons.

Hendrickson's production was rewarded on July 27, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard logged his first sack of the season in Week 3 when he got to Rams QB Matthew Stafford for an eight-yard loss late in the fourth quarter. It boosted Hubbard's career sack total to 31.5, the second most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

While Hubbard's 2022 campaign will be remembered primarily for his 98-yard fumble return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, he put together yet another complete season that further established him as a foundational piece on the Bengals defense. During the regular season, Hubbard tallied 60 total tackles — his fourth straight year with at least 60 — including a team-leading 11 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. He also recorded three PDs and a forced fumble.

Players' listed positions vary by media outlet (e.g. whether they're classified as a LB or DE), but according to NFL.com's draft record, Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected in 2018 — five DEs and seven DTs came off the

board before him. According to NFL.com, there were a total of 40 defensive linemen (20 DEs, 20 DTs) selected in the 2018 draft, along with 32 LBs and one player with his position listed as “edge.”

Hubbard has been the Bengals’ starting RDE since 2019, and during the ‘21 regular season his 7.5 sacks were second on the team. He has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in Bengals history.

Hubbard signed a contract extension with the Bengals in July 2021 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the ‘25 season.

Wilson, Pratt form elite LB duo: At the center of Cincinnati’s defense is one of the top LB tandems in the NFL in fifth-year pro Germaine Pratt and fourth-year pro Logan Wilson. The pair has combined for 44 tackles and contributed to three turnovers through three games this season.

Wilson is coming off a two-INT performance that helped lead the Bengals to a Monday Night Football win over the L.A. Rams in Week 3. His first pick occurred late in the second quarter, when he dropped into coverage and jumped a pass by QB Matthew Stafford to set Cincinnati up at the Rams’ 41-yard line. Then in the third quarter, when the Rams were driving at the Bengals’ 30 with a chance to take the lead, Wilson capitalized on a pass tipped by CB Mike Hilton to end the scoring threat. The fourth-year pro out of the University of Wyoming now has nine career INTs, the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020.

Pratt, meanwhile, filled the stat sheet with a sack and FF in the season opener at Cleveland, then followed up with nine tackles (seven solos) in Week 2 vs. Baltimore.

Both players set career highs in tackles during the 2022 regular season. Wilson’s team-leading 123 stops marked the most by a Bengal since Vontaze Burfict (171) in his 2013 Pro Bowl season, while Pratt’s 99 ranked second on the team. Pratt additionally set career bests in INTs (two) and PDs (10) in 2022.

Though they have served as consistent contributors for the Bengals in regular-season action, Pratt and Wilson save their most crucial plays for when it matters most. With 17 seconds remaining in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, Pratt intercepted a pass by QB Derek Carr on fourth down from the Cincinnati nine-yard line to secure the Bengals’ first playoff win in 31 years. The following week in a Divisional Playoff at Tennessee, Wilson picked off QB Ryan Tannehill in the final minute of the fourth quarter to set up a game-winning FG drive.

This past January in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, both Pratt and Wilson stopped QB Tyler Huntley as he attempted to reach the ball over a pile of linemen for a potential go-ahead Ravens TD in the fourth quarter. Wilson, who was credited with the FF, knocked the ball free, leading to DE Sam Hubbard’s 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the difference in a 24-17 victory.

Wilson has totaled a league-leading 62 combined tackles over the past two postseasons, while Pratt ranks second in the category with 49 stops. Both players inked contract extensions in 2023, with Pratt locked in with the Bengals through the ‘25 season and Wilson staying put in Cincinnati through ‘27.

Nothing easy in the air: Since the start of the 2022 season, the Bengals have held opposing passers to the third lowest completion percentage in the NFL (59.2) and the fourth lowest passer rating (80.5). Cincinnati has given up just 21 TD passes in that span of 19 regular-season games, tied for the fourth fewest leaguewide.

In 36 regular-season games since the start of the 2021 regular season, the Bengals have yielded 300 net passing yards on just four occasions. Only one

opponent reached 300 net passing yards last season (Tampa Bay in Week 15), and Cincinnati in 2022 limited seven teams to fewer than 20 completions.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson has quickly earned a reputation as one of the NFL’s top long-range kickers. Now in his third season, he is 16 of 20 on FG attempts of 50 or more yards, tying for the third most FGs from that distance since 2021. McPherson knocked through two 50-plus yarders in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, from 53 yards on the final play of the first half and 54 midway through the fourth quarter to extend Cincinnati’s lead.

McPherson is already the team’s career leader in 50-yard FGs. It took him just 14 games into his rookie season to reach the top of Cincinnati’s career chart in that category, breaking the previous record of eight. Referred to by fans as “Money Mac,” McPherson made an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards during the 2021 regular season and fell just one shy of tying the NFL record for most 50-yarders. His nine such FGs were more than double the previous team record for a single season (four, by K Horst Muhlmann in 1970). He followed that up by going a perfect five of five on attempts of 50-plus yards in 2022.

McPherson has notably wasted no time getting into midseason form in each of the past three years, as he is 22-for-23 on FG attempts and a perfect eight-for-eight on PATs in eight preseason contests. He has eight preseason FGs of 50 or more yards, including a 58- and 56-yarder in the second quarter alone on Aug. 12, 2022 vs. Arizona.

McPherson’s team record: K Evan McPherson kicked a Bengals-record 59-yard FG in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, breaking the previous record of 58 yards that he hit on Dec. 19, 2021 at Denver.

He grabbed another spot on the team’s all-time chart in Week 4 of 2022 against Miami, as his 57-yarder in the fourth quarter tied Randy Bullock for the third-longest FG in Bengals history.

2023 draft class overview: Cincinnati’s eight-player draft class in April featured four players on defense, three on offense and one on special teams. The group combined to total 356 collegiate games played.

Here’s a closer look at the Bengals’ 2023 draft class:

- DE Myles Murphy, Clemson (Round 1, Pick 28): A 6-5, 270-pound edge rusher with highly touted athleticism, Murphy recorded 17.5 sacks in 38 career games at Clemson. He was a second-team All-ACC pick as a junior last season, when he tied for the team lead with 6.5 sacks and posted 11 TFLs. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo noted Murphy’s ability to line up on the outside or interior of the defensive line. Murphy has seen action on 39 defensive snaps through three NFL games.

- CB DJ Turner II, Michigan (Round 2, Pick 60): Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year’s NFL Combine, clocking 4.26 seconds. He recorded 20 PDs and three INTs in a four-year career at Michigan (2019-22), earning a pair of All-Big Ten honors (honorable mention in ‘21, second team in ‘22). Turner began his Wolverine career seeing limited action, mostly on special teams, before stepping into a starting CB role as a junior in 2021. He recorded two solo tackles in his NFL debut at Cleveland and a PD in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams.

- S Jordan Battle, Alabama (Round 3, Pick 95): Battle was twice named a third-team All-American at Alabama, where he started at S from 2020-22. He showed off his versatility with 251 career tackles as well as six INTs, three of which were returned for a TD. Battle was a team captain for the Crimson Tide last season, and Bengals coaches have raved about his high character since arriving in Cincinnati. He saw extended action in Week 2 vs. Baltimore after starter Nick Scott was ruled out with a concussion, recording his first career assisted tackle on 25 defensive snaps played.

- WR Charlie Jones, Purdue (Round 4, Pick 131): Jones was a second-team All-American in his lone season at Purdue in 2022, as he led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). He lined up at all three receiver positions, displaying a flexibility that offensive coordinator Brian Callahan said the Bengals will look to utilize. Jones opened the season as the Bengals’ primary punt returner and solidified that role with an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 vs. Baltimore.

Through three games, he has the highest PR average (18.8 yards per return) in the AFC.

● HB Chase Brown, Illinois (Round 5, Pick 163): Brown put together an impressive career at Illinois, becoming the program's first Doak Walker Award finalist (nation's top running back) and third player to record 1000 rushing yards in consecutive seasons (2021-22). He was a second-team All-American last season, when he ranked fourth in the nation in rushing yards (1642) and eclipsed 100 rushing yards in an Illinois-record 10 straight games. Brown led the Bengals in rushing attempts (28) and yards (69) during the preseason, and made his regular-season debut in Week 2 vs. Baltimore.

● WR Andrei Iosivas, Princeton (Round 6, Pick 206): Iosivas is the Bengals' seventh all-time draft pick out of an Ivy League program, and the first since LB Reggie Williams (Dartmouth) and QB Bob Bateman (Brown) in 1976. He was perhaps the team's most consistent performer during the preseason, leading Cincinnati in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129). Iosivas is a former All-American as a member of the Princeton men's track and field team and carries an athletic frame (6-3, 205 pounds). He has been used primarily on special teams through two regular-season games, seeing action on 60 ST snaps.

● P Brad Robbins, Michigan (Round 6, Pick 217): Robbins earned the Bengals' punting job after recording eight punts for 371 yards (46.4 gross average) in three preseason games. He spent six seasons (2017-22) at Michigan, where he finished his career with the second highest punting average (43.0 yards) in program history and was a three-time All-Big Ten selection. Through three games, Robbins has punted 18 times with a 41.1 gross average and four downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line.

● CB DJ Ivey, Miami (Fla.) (Round 7, Pick 246): The Bengals' final draft pick logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason, showcasing an athleticism and tight coverage that has already impressed his coaches. Ivey started 32 of 58 games played over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.), netting six INTs and 17 PDs.

Back-to-back division champs: The Bengals captured the AFC North Division title in 2022 for the second consecutive season, marking the first time in franchise history that Cincinnati won a division in back-to-back years. The 2022 division title was the team's 11th all-time.

While some databases list the Bengals as repeat division winners in 1981 and '82, the '82 postseason featured a special 16-team format (dubbed the "Super Bowl Tournament") that was implemented by the NFL, as the regular season was reduced to nine games due to a players' strike. Eight teams from each conference were seeded 1-8 based on their regular-season records, so despite the Bengals boasting the top record in the AFC Central, they went in as the conference's No. 3 seed and were not recognized as division champions.

Bengals net three Pro Bowlers in '22: QB Joe Burrow, WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson were all voted to the AFC Team for the 2023 Pro Bowl Games. It was the first Pro Bowl nod of Burrow's career, while Chase and Hendrickson both received their second after being selected in the 2021 season.

Burrow became the sixth QB in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl, joining Ken Anderson (1975-76, '81-82), Boomer Esiason ('86, '88-89), Jeff Blake ('95), Carson Palmer (2005-06) and Andy Dalton ('11, '14, '16). The former No. 1 overall draft pick out of Louisiana State finished the 2022 regular season tied for second in the NFL in passing TDs (35), fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). He surpassed multiple career milestones, including 11,000 passing yards, 75 passing TDs and 1000 pass completions.

Chase in 2022 led Cincinnati in receptions (87), receiving yards (1046) and receiving TDs (nine), despite missing four games due to a hip injury. In Week 14, he joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players in NFL history with 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches under the age of 23. Chase became the seventh player in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons.

Hendrickson, who concluded his second Bengals season in 2022 after signing as an unrestricted free agent in '21, led Cincinnati in sacks (eight) and was tied for second in TFLs (six).

Chase and Hendrickson both participated in the 2023 Pro Bowl Games, which were held Sunday, Feb. 5 at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 13th consecutive season, current NFL players have voted to determine the top 100 players in the NFL, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players in 2023 — QB Joe Burrow (No.

6), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 39) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 75). It marked the second career appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the third for Hendrickson.

Burrow's ranking at No. 6 is the highest ever by a Bengal, surpassing A.J. Green, who was voted at No. 9 in 2014. This year's list was the fourth time that three or more Bengals players were featured.

The Jungle is jammin': The five highest-attended home games (and seven of the top eight) in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15. The 2022 Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore had an attendance figure of 66,399, which now stands as the second largest in team history.

The attendance figure for Cincinnati's Week 13 win against Kansas City last season was 66,243 (fourth largest), while other 2022 home contests against Cleveland (66,222), Carolina (66,160) and Atlanta (66,158) rank fifth, seventh and eighth all-time, respectively. Adding in figures of 65,841 for the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and 65,849 for the Week 18 matchup vs. Baltimore, the Bengals welcomed an attendance of over 65,000 in seven consecutive regular-season home games for the first time since 2007. That year, Cincinnati hosted over 65,000 in each of its eight regular-season home contests. The streak has continued into this season, as the Bengals' 2023 home opener vs. Baltimore in Week 2 had an attendance figure of 66,015 and was followed by a figure of 65,158 in the Week 3 Monday Night Football contest against the L.A. Rams.

The Paycor Stadium crowds have coincided with a recent string of home success for the Bengals, as they have won 11 of their last 13 played at the venue dating back to Week 16 of the 2021 regular season (includes postseason) — tied for the fourth most home wins in the NFL in that span. The last time Cincinnati matched that number was when it won 13 of 15 home contests from the 2012 regular-season finale through Week 9 of the '14 campaign.

Esiason, Johnson join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor with the induction of former QB Boomer Esiason and WR Chad Johnson. Remembered by fans for their on-field contributions as well as their charismatic personalities, Esiason and Johnson became the seventh and eighth members of the Ring of Honor during a ceremony at halftime of the team's Week 3 game against the L.A. Rams on Monday Night Football.

Esiason played for the Bengals from 1984-92 before returning for a final season in '97, and is regarded as one of the greatest locker-room leaders in team history. He earned three Pro Bowl nods (1986, '88-89), and ranks third in Bengals history in both career passing yards (27,149) and TD passes (187). Esiason in 1988 was named NFL MVP while leading the league with a 97.4 passer rating, before steering the Bengals to an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII.

Johnson, who was officially known as Chad Ochocinco from 2008-11, emerged as one of the NFL's elite receivers during his 10 seasons with the Bengals ('01-10). He was selected to six Pro Bowls (2003-07, '09), and remains the team's all-time leader in receptions (751), receiving yards (10,783) and receiving TDs (66).

Bengals president Mike Brown on the 2023 inductees: "Boomer and Chad were both exceptional players. If you look at the statistics, Boomer has a long list of quarterback firsts here. And Chad was a superb athlete who was probably the quickest receiver we have had here. They could have moments when they just carried the team by themselves. Both players are very deserving of this honor."

Esiason and Johnson joined QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Ruler in the Ring of Honor.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Ken Riley enters Hall of Fame: Bengals legend Ken Riley, the most productive CB in team history, was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5. He joined OT Anthony Munoz as former Bengals players immortalized in Canton, Ohio.

The honor came posthumously for Riley, who passed away in 2020 at the age of 72. Riley's wife, Barbara, received the gold jacket on his behalf and revealed the bust with his son, Ken Riley II, who spoke at the enshrinement.

"Dad is just getting inducted today, but his whole life he was a Hall of Famer on and off the field," Ken Riley II said.

Riley spent 15 seasons (1969-83) with the Bengals, playing in 207 games. His 65 career INTs constitute the most dominant lead in any major statistical category of the team's record book, nearly doubling the second-place total of 33. At the time of Riley's retirement, that total of 65 INTs was the fourth-most in NFL history, and it still stands tied for fifth-most. He was a member of five Bengals teams that reached the postseason, including the 1981 squad, which he helped lead to Super Bowl XVI.

Following his retirement, Riley spent two seasons as an assistant coach for the Green Bay Packers before taking over as head coach at his alma mater, Florida A&M University. He led the Rattlers' football program from 1986-93, then served as the school's athletic director from '94-2004. Riley was inducted into the FAMU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1982, the Black College Football Hall of Fame in 2015, and the Bengals Ring of Honor in '21.

Bengal bites: Since 2011, the Bengals own a 67-6-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points ... Entering Week 4, the average age of the Bengals' active roster is 25.9 years ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is WR Tyler Boyd, who is in his eighth season with the team after joining the Bengals as a second-round draft pick in 2016 ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 30 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is DE Myles Murphy, who is 21 (born Jan. 3, 2002) ... The lightest player on the roster is CB DJ Turner II, who is listed at 180 pounds ... The heaviest player on the roster is OT Orlando Brown Jr., who is listed at 345 pounds ... Brown is also the tallest player on the roster, listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Fourth-year pro **Joe Burrow** has put together one of the most promising starts to a career by a QB in NFL history. The No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 has already reached several career milestones including 1000 completions, 12,000 passing yards and 80 TD passes. He also has the fourth highest career completion percentage in league history at 67.3 (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Burrow holds Bengals single-season records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22), passer rating (108.3; '21) and 300-yard passing games (six; '21). He earned his first career Pro Bowl nod and was an MVP candidate in 2022, when he tied for second in the NFL in TD passes, ranked fifth in completions, fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). A team captain for the fourth consecutive year, Burrow returned to practice on Aug. 30 after missing the majority of training camp due to a calf strain. He signed a five-year contract extension on Sept. 9 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2029 season. Listed second on the QB depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster coming out of training camp for the first time in his career. Originally a college free agent signee of Minnesota in 2019, Browning spent the '19 and '20 seasons on the Vikings' practice squad, then joined the Bengals prior to the '21 campaign and spent the past two years on the Cincinnati practice squad. He saw action in all three preseason games in August, completing 32 of 45 passing attempts for 277 yards (71.1 completion percentage) and one TD. He made his NFL debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, entering late in the fourth quarter in relief of Burrow. Browning was a four-year starter (2015-18) at the University of Washington, where he led the Huskies to the College Football Playoff in '16 and finished his career with numerous school records.

Running backs: Leading the Bengals running back room is seventh-year pro **Joe Mixon**, who ranks fourth in team history in career rushing yards (5558) and rushing TDs (41). Mixon has surpassed the 1000-yard mark in three of his five full seasons (played just six games in 2020), and in 2022 he asserted himself as a reliable pass catching option with career highs in receptions (60) and receiving yards (441). Voted a team captain for the third straight year, Mixon has 180 rushing yards on 45 carries (4.0) through three games and is coming off a 65-yard performance in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. He scored his first TD of the year in the third quarter, finding the end zone on a 14-yard run to give Cincinnati its first lead. Mixon's 5558 yards are the seventh most among active NFL players. Next on the running backs depth chart is fifth-year veteran **Trayveon Williams**. Williams has served as a reserve HB with 36 games of experience, totaling 249 rushing yards on 50 carries along with 10 catches for 68 yards. He stepped in as the team's primary KOR midway through the 2022 season, returning 16 kicks for 356 yards (22.3 average), with a 42-yard long in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. Third-year pro **Chris Evans** had 17 carries for 77 yards his rookie season, but none in 2022. He opened the 2023 season with two carries for 12 yards in Week 1 at Cleveland. Evans also is the team's primary kickoff returner. Cincinnati used its fifth-round draft choice this past April to select **Chase Brown**, a compact runner out of the University of Illinois. Brown had an impressive career with the Illini, totaling 3206 rushing yards on 605 attempts (5.3 average) with 18 TDs. He was a second-team All-American, second-team All-Big Ten selection and the first Doak Walker Award finalist (nation's top running back) in program history in 2022. Brown led the Bengals in rushing attempts (28) and yards (69) during the preseason and added six catches for 32 yards. He made his NFL debut and had his first rushing attempt in Week 2 vs. Baltimore.

Wide receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is highlighted by one of the most explosive pass-catching trios in the NFL, with the senior member being eighth-year pro **Tyler Boyd**. Boyd is regarded as a premier slot receiver that poses a challenge for nickel CBs with his size (6-2, 203) and route-running ability. He ranks fifth in team history in career receptions (459) for 5434 yards and 29 TDs, and posted consecutive seasons of 1000 or more yards in 2018-19. In Week 2 vs. Baltimore, Boyd had 52 receiving yards on six catches, including on crucial third- and fourth-down conversions on Cincinnati's two TD drives. Boyd's four TD catches of 50-plus yards since the start of the 2021 season rank as the second most in the league behind teammate and third-year pro **Ja'Marr Chase**. Chase was the team's first-round draft pick in 2021 and has led the Bengals in receptions, receiving yards and receiving TDs in each of his first two seasons. He is a two-time Pro Bowler and last season joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players in NFL history with over 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches before turning 23 (turned 23 on March 1, 2023). Chase helped lead the Bengals to their first win in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, amassing 141 yards on a career-high 12 catches. His long was a 43-yarder in the third quarter that led to a Bengals FG, marking his 11th career grab of 40 or more yards (tied for second most in NFL since 2021). Chase missed four games in 2022 due to a hip injury, but still managed 87 grabs for 1046 yards and nine TDs. Another Cincinnati receiver with a proven history of big plays is fourth-year pro **Tee Higgins**. Higgins, a second-round pick in 2020, has quickly developed into one of the NFL's top young talents. He has posted over 1000 receiving yards in each of the past two seasons, becoming one of five players in team history to do so within his first three years. Higgins had four 100-yard receiving games in 2022, including two when Chase was out of the lineup in Weeks 11-12. At 6-4, he possesses elite athleticism and the ability to high-point the ball when contested by defensive backs. Higgins led Cincinnati with eight receptions for 89 yards, including two TD grabs in the second half, in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. Fellow fourth-year pro **Trenton Irwin** emerged as a dependable option in the WR room last season and is publicly lauded by his coaches and teammates for a strong work ethic. He spent parts of his first three seasons on Cincinnati's practice squad and saw limited game action, but then found a role in 2022 when he played in nine contests with two starts. Despite not making his season debut until Week 8 at Cleveland, Irwin managed to record 15 catches for 231 yards and four TDs. His best performance came on Christmas Eve at New England, when he caught three passes for 45 yards and two TDs in the first half alone to help the Bengals build a 22-0 lead. Two rookies comprise the rest of the WR room, including the team's fourth-round draft choice **Charlie Jones**. Jones is listed behind Boyd as the team's backup slot WR, and also serves as the team's primary punt returner. Jones grabbed his first career catch in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, a six-yarder that went for a first down. He was a second-team All-American last season at Purdue, when he led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Sixth-round pick **Andrei Iosivas** made perhaps the most substantial offensive contribution during the preseason, when he led Cincinnati in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129). His 12 receptions tied for fourth-most in the league in the 2023 preseason. Iosivas has seen action on 11 offensive snaps and 60 special teams snaps through three regular-season games.

Tight ends: Among Cincinnati's key free agent acquisitions this offseason was **Irv Smith Jr.**, who is in his fifth NFL season after spending his first four years with Minnesota. Originally a second-round draft pick of the Vikings

in 2019, Smith has played in 39 career games with 17 starts and totaled 96 catches for 885 yards and nine TDs. He missed the entire 2021 campaign due to a knee injury and was limited to eight regular-season games in '22 due to an ankle injury, but started the first two regular-season contests for the Bengals and recorded five grabs for 27 yards. Smith was inactive for the Week 3 contest vs. the L.A. Rams due to a hamstring injury. Next on the depth chart is fellow 2019 second-round pick **Drew Sample**, who since being drafted by the Bengals has established himself as a premier blocking TE in the NFL. Sample has returned to the lineup after missing most of the 2022 season with a knee injury sustained in the second game. He had a streak of 39 consecutive games played (including postseason) prior to the injury, and has also been a core contributor on special teams for Cincinnati. He made his return to the field in the second preseason game at Atlanta, and made his first catch of the season in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. The Bengals on July 24 re-signed **Mitchell Wilcox**, who spent his first three career seasons with Cincinnati. He had his first two receptions of the season for 10 yards in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. The University of South Florida product has 22 career catches for 165 yards and a TD in 34 games.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in revamping the offensive line over the past two offseasons, signing four marquee free agents to bolster that unit. The most recent such addition is OT **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who signed with Cincinnati in March after spending his first three seasons in Baltimore (2018-20) and the past two in Kansas City ('21-22). A Pro Bowl selection in each of the past four years, Brown takes over as the Bengals' starting LOT and is tasked with protecting QB Joe Burrow's blind side. He was a crucial piece of offensive lines that blocked for Ravens QB Lamar Jackson (2019) and Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. Brown made his first 32 career starts at ROT, then transitioned to LOT midway through the 2020 season and has started his past 46 games at that spot. The nucleus of Cincinnati's O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who signed as a free agent in 2022 and almost instantaneously became a vocal leader in the locker room. Currently serving as a team captain for the second straight season, Karras has experience at all three interior OL positions but quickly cemented himself as the Bengals' starting center and played 99.4 percent of offensive snaps in 2022. He spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, with the only outlier coming in 2020 with Miami. Karras was a member of Patriots Super Bowl winning teams in 2016 and '18, before earning the starting center role in '19. Joining Karras in the 2022 free agency class was RG **Alex Cappa**, who spent his first four seasons with Tampa Bay. Cappa was perhaps the Bengals' most consistent performer on the line through most of the 2022 season, starting the first 16 games before suffering a left ankle injury in the regular-season finale that kept him out of all three playoff contests. He was the Bucs' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three postseason games due to an injury sustained in the Wild Card Playoff. Second-year pro **Cordell Volson** is building off an impressive rookie season in which he played every single offensive snap for Cincinnati at LG (1311, including postseason). Volson was a fourth-round draft pick out of North Dakota State University, where he lined up at four different spots along the O-line during his career. He played in a school-record 65 games at NDSU, helping the Bison win four FCS national championships while earning three FCS All-America honors. **Jonah Williams**, the Bengals' first-round pick in 2019, is the team's starting ROT this year after lining up at LOT for his first three full seasons. He has started all 45 regular-season games and all five postseason games he has played in. Williams carried a streak of 37 consecutive starts before suffering a left knee injury in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore that ended his season. He spent the majority of the offseason rehabbing, including all of the team's mandatory minicamp, but was a full participant in training camp and has played 100 percent of offensive snaps so far this season. G **Max Scharping** is in his fifth pro season and serves as both a backup right guard and center for Cincinnati. Scharping was acquired by the Bengals on waivers prior to the start of the 2022 season and played in 14 regular-season contests, before being thrust into the starting RG spot for all three postseason games following Cappa's injury. He spent his first three pro seasons with Houston, splitting time between RG and LG in 48 games played (33 starts). Another notable free agent addition this offseason was G **Cody Ford**, a fifth-year veteran who originally was a second-round pick of Buffalo in 2019. Ford spent his first three pro seasons with the Bills before playing for Arizona in 2022. He has played in 52 career games with 32 starts — at ROT, nine at RG and eight at LG. Ford lined up alongside Brown for two seasons (2016-17) at the University of Oklahoma. OT **D'Ante Smith** was inactive for all but one game for Cincinnati during the 2022 regular season, but played in all three postseason contests as a reserve lineman. He was originally a fourth-round pick in 2021 and battled injuries as a rookie, seeing

action in just two regular-season games. Smith returned in time for the postseason run, playing in both the AFC Championship and Super Bowl LVI. Third-year pro **Jackson Carman** played in all 17 regular-season games as a rookie in 2021 but saw action in just three contests last season. With the O-line affected by injuries heading into the Divisional Playoff at Buffalo in January, Carman was called upon to start at LOT and played perhaps the best game of his young career, as he helped limit the Bills to one sack and paved the way for Cincinnati's 172 net rushing yards. A native of Fairfield, Ohio (Greater Cincinnati area), Carman played three collegiate seasons at Clemson before the Bengals drafted him in the second round in 2021. C **Trey Hill** has served primarily as a special teams contributor in his two Bengals seasons, but started three games (two at C, one at RG) in his 2021 rookie campaign. A sixth-round draft pick, Hill has played in all seven of Cincinnati's postseason games the past two years.

Defensive linemen: Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard** is in his sixth Bengals season (fifth as a full-time starter). A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard has 31.5 career sacks, the second most among all players from his rookie class. Hubbard recorded his first sack of the season late in the fourth quarter of the Week 3 contest vs. the L.A. Rams, taking down QB Matthew Stafford for an eight-yard loss. He is also considered among the best DEs in the NFL against the run and led the Bengals with 11 TFLs in 2022. Hubbard made one of the most memorable plays in recent team history during the fourth quarter of the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, returning a fumble 98 yards for what proved to be the game-winning TD. It was his second career fumble returned for a score (regular and postseason). On the other side of the line is DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who led Cincinnati with eight sacks in 2022 to earn his second straight Pro Bowl nod. Hendrickson joined the team as a free agent in 2021 and in his first year posted a career-high 14 sacks, the second most in a season in team history. He sacked Browns QB Deshaun Watson in Week 1 and took down Rams QB Matthew Stafford twice in Week 3, including a seven-yard sack on third down in the red zone that forced the Rams to settle for a FG. Hendrickson's 38.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 regular season are the fourth most in the NFL in that span. On July 27, Hendrickson signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. DT **DJ Reader**, a 6-3, 335-pound run stuffer, has anchored the defensive line since signing with the Bengals as a free agent in 2020. Reader is a key component of a unit that has ranked in the top seven leaguewide in rushing yards allowed per game in each of the past two seasons. His first sack of the 2023 campaign came in the first quarter of Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, when he brought down QB Matthew Stafford for a nine-yard loss on a goal-to-go situation to help force the Rams into a FG. Reader spent six games on the Reserve/Injured list in 2022 due to a knee injury, but returned in Week 11 and started each contest through the AFC Championship. DT **B.J. Hill** is in his third season with the Bengals and has become a major contributor on the D-line. Hill was acquired in a trade with the N.Y. Giants shortly before the 2021 regular season and has played in 35 games (21 starts) for Cincinnati. His second sack of the season came in the fourth quarter of Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams when he got to QB Matthew Stafford on third down to force a punt. Hill started all 16 contests in 2022, posting a career-high 68 tackles with three sacks, one FF, three FR and four PDs. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his third season as a pro, but 2022 was his first healthy year as he missed his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. The athletic edge rusher showcased his potential last season with 3.5 sacks as a reserve DE. He then posted six tackles in postseason play, including five with a TFL in the AFC Championship. Ossai saw action in all three preseason games and had an INT on the opening drive at Atlanta, but suffered an ankle injury the following week at Washington that caused him to miss the first two regular-season contests. He made his season debut in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, playing five defensive snaps. Second-year DT **Zach Carter** looks to build off a strong rookie season in which he played in all 16 regular-season games with nine starts. Carter, a 2022 third-round pick out of the University of Florida, contributed to the run defense while totaling 23 tackles, a half-sack and a PD. He played in all three postseason games, starting the Wild Card round and AFC Championship as a second DT. Third-year pro **Cam Sample** has played in 33 career regular-season games and serves as a rotational DE. The Tulane University product had 25 tackles with two sacks last season. Sample flashed in the AFC Championship, sacking Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes and bringing down RB Jerick McKinnon for a one-yard loss. Sixth-year DT **Josh Tupou** has been a reliable DT against the run since joining the Bengals as a college free agent in 2017. The 6-3, 340-pound veteran has started 15 games over the past two seasons and logged 31 tackles in that span, including a pair of sacks in 2022. The Bengals selected DE **Myles Murphy** out of Clemson University in the first round (28th overall) of this year's draft, looking to bolster their pass rushing production. Murphy totaled 17.5 sacks in 38 games at Clemson, earning second-team All-ACC honors last season. He brings premier

size and athleticism to the D-Line room at 6-5, 270 pounds. The Bengals acquired DT **Jay Tufele** on waivers from Jacksonville prior to the 2022 season opener and it proved to be a valuable move, as he started two games (Weeks 8-9) while Reader was recovering from a knee injury. Tufele finished with 16 total tackles in seven regular-season games for Cincinnati. He had nine tackles during the preseason, including five in the preseason opener vs. Green Bay.

Linebackers: Among Cincinnati's most promising young defenders is fourth-year pro **Logan Wilson**, who wears the "green dot" as the defense's communicator. Wilson led the Bengals in tackles the past two regular seasons, with his career-high 123 stops in 2022 marking the most by a Bengals player since Vontaze Burfict (171) in '13. Wilson also has shown a high proficiency when dropping into coverage, as his nine career INTs are the most by an NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020. That knack for the ball was highlighted in Week 3 when Wilson picked off Rams QB Matthew Stafford twice, including an INT at Cincinnati's 22-yard line that kept points off the board and led to a Bengals FG drive in the third quarter. Wilson was inked to a four-year contract extension on Aug. 5 that will keep him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Ranking second on the team in tackles last season with 99 was **Germaine Pratt**. Pratt, a fifth-round Bengals pick in 2019 who is in his fifth pro season, has started 57 of 65 regular-season games played. He tied for the team lead with 11 tackles (seven solos) in Week 1 at Cleveland, recording a seven-yard sack along with a FF in the first quarter that was recovered by the Bengals, and followed that up with nine stops in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. Pratt additionally has three career INTs and 14 PDs, with 10 of those coming in 2022. A 2020 seventh-round draft choice of the Bengals, **Markus Bailey** has grown into a key reserve role in the LB room as well as a valuable contributor on special teams. Bailey has played in 16 regular season games each of the past two seasons, with a combined 50 tackles in that span. He provided a crucial block during Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble recovery return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore. **Akeem Davis-Gaither** looks to step into an increased role this season after logging a career-best 37 tackles in 16 games (one start) in 2022. Thirteen of those stops came in a dominant Week 3 performance at the N.Y. Jets. Davis-Gaither also played in all three postseason games, recording his first career INT in the Wild Card Playoff against Baltimore. **Joe Bachie** spent the first six games of 2022 on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a left knee injury, but returned to the active roster and saw action in 10 regular-season games and all three postseason contests. He resumed his role as a core special teams player, totaling seven ST tackles in 168 snaps. Bachie has seen action mostly on special teams so far in 2023, along with two defensive snaps played.

Defensive backs: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, Hilton is a sure tackler and excellent blitz. He played in 14 games with four starts during the 2022 regular season, amassing 60 tackles, six PDs and an INT. He has also made several notable plays in the postseason over the past two years, including an INT in the 2021 Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and a sack in the fourth quarter of the '22 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore. Hilton was voted to serve as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. In Week 2 against Baltimore, Hilton tallied five tackles (four solos) along with a PD, and in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams he tipped a pass in the third quarter that resulted in a Logan Wilson INT. **Chidobe Awuzie** arrived in Cincinnati in 2021 alongside Hilton and quickly established himself as the team's No. 1 boundary corner. Awuzie has started all 29 games he's played in for the Bengals (including postseason). His 2022 season was cut short by a knee injury suffered in Week 8 at Cleveland, and he spent the following nine-plus months rehabbing before being cleared to practice on July 25 of this year. Awuzie's first game back came on the same field where he sustained the injury, as he played 43 defensive snaps in Week 1 at Cleveland and recorded a FR in the first quarter. Second-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** had a promising rookie season in 2022 that included 55 tackles — eighth-most on the team — along with six PDs and one FF. The Bengals' second-round pick in 2022, Taylor-Britt spent the first four games of last season on the Reserve/Injured list while recovering from an abdomen injury, but went on to play in the final 10 contests with nine starts at outside CB. He started all three postseason games and had his first career INT to close out the Divisional Playoff win at Buffalo. Cincinnati used its 2023 second-round selection on **DJ Turner II**, a speedy boundary corner out of the University of Michigan. Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year's NFL Combine, clocking a time of 4.26 seconds. He recorded three INTs and 20 PDs in four seasons (2019-22) at Michigan, and was named second-team All-Big Ten last season. He made his NFL debut in the regular-season opener at Cleveland, notching two solo tackles, and had his first PD in the fourth quarter of Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. **Jalen**

Davis serves as a reserve slot CB behind Hilton, but secondary/cornerbacks coach Charles Burks has expressed his opinion that Davis could start for many NFL teams. He has played in 44 career games (including postseason), carving out a role on special teams in addition to his CB duties. He notched his first PD of the season in Week 3 against the Rams. **DJ Ivey**, the Bengals' seventh-round pick in April, played in 58 games with 32 starts over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.). At 6-1, 192, he provides a rangy frame and displayed impressive ball skills in training camp. Ivey logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason. The Bengals this season are rolling out a new-look starting safety tandem consisting of fifth-year veteran **Nick Scott** and second-year pro **Dax Hill**. Scott was among Cincinnati's notable acquisitions during the 2023 free agency period and holds 67 games of NFL experience (20 starts). He spent his first four seasons with the L.A. Rams, starting out as a special teams contributor before gradually increasing his role defensively and eventually becoming the team's starting safety in 2022. Scott is known for his physical play and sure tackling abilities, but also has four INTs and nine PDs. He started each of the Rams four postseason contests on their run to a Super Bowl LVI title. Scott made his Bengals debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, playing 72 defensive snaps and tying for the team lead with 11 total tackles. He tallied nine tackles (four solos) in Week 2 against Baltimore, and followed up with three solo stops against his former team in Week 3. Hill was the Bengals' first-round draft choice in 2022 and played in 15 games with two starts as a rookie. Though he is touted for his versatility in the secondary, the Bengals are relying on Hill as their free safety in his second pro campaign. He saw action on 130 defensive snaps last season in a reserve role, while also being utilized as a gunner on special teams. Hill recorded his first career INT in the season opener at Cleveland, picking off a Deshaun Watson pass in the third quarter and returning it 20 yards. He logged a team-high 11 tackles (nine solos) and a PD in Week 2 against Baltimore, and followed that up with a team-high eight stops, including his first career sack, in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. Cincinnati took **Jordan Battle** in the third round of this April's draft, adding depth and championship pedigree to the safeties room. Battle was a third-team All-American in each of the past two seasons while at the University of Alabama, and helped the Crimson Tide win the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2020. A fundamentally sound rookie with noted leadership characteristics, Battle recorded 251 career tackles and six INTs — three of which were returned for a TD. He played 25 special teams snaps and one defensive snap in his NFL debut at Cleveland in Week 1 and saw an increased workload on defense in Week 2 vs. Baltimore, playing 25 snaps. **Tycen Anderson** looks to further carve out a role on the Bengals' defense and took a step toward doing so in the preseason opener vs. Green Bay, when he had two INTs in the second quarter including a 43-yard pick-six. He has seen action primarily on special teams thus far in the regular season. Anderson spent the 2022 regular season on the Reserve/Injured list with a hamstring injury, then was designated to return and cleared to practice but did not see postseason action. He was drafted by the Bengals in the fifth round in 2022 after a five-year career at the University of Toledo ('17-21).

Special teams: Rookie **Brad Robbins** earned the Bengals' punting role following a strong display in training camp and preseason games. A native of Westerville, Ohio (north of Columbus), Robbins was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of April's draft after a five-year playing career at the University of Michigan. He finished his Michigan career with the second highest punting average (43.0 yards per attempt) in program history. Robbins missed all of the 2018 season and part of '19 with an injury, but went on to play in 34 games from '19-22. In his NFL debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, Robbins punted 10 times for 409 total yards, including two downed inside the Browns' 20-yard line. He is averaging 41.1 gross yards per punt through three games this season. Robbins additionally handles holding duties on placekicks. Third-year K **Evan McPherson** has earned a reputation as one of the NFL's top kickers from long range, as his 16 FGs from 50 or more yards are tied for the third most in the league since his 2021 rookie campaign. The former fifth-round Bengals draft pick has kicked the two longest FGs in team history — a 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and a 58-yarder in Week 15 of the '21 season at Denver. McPherson is also 19 for 19 on FG attempts in the postseason, the second most consecutive FGs without a miss to begin a postseason career in NFL history. He drilled four of his five FG attempts, with hits from 53 and 54 yards, in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams. The Bengals' long-snapper is second-year pro **Cal Adomitis**, who took over the role in Week 2 of the 2022 season following a season-ending injury to veteran Clark Harris. In 21 career games (including postseason), Adomitis has delivered 176 snaps without an unplayable attempt. He originally joined the Bengals as a college free agent in 2022 after a five-year career ('17-21) at the University of Pittsburgh. Listed as the first-string punt returner and second-string kickoff returner is rookie WR **Charlie Jones**, who in 2021 was named the Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year while at the

University of Iowa. Jones returned 25 kickoffs for 635 yards (25.4) and one TD that season for the Hawkeyes, while also returning 37 punts for 285 yards. Jones scored his first career TD on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 against Baltimore, the Bengals' first punt return TD since 2012 (CB Adam Jones). He followed that up in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams with four PRs for 45 yards, including a 19-yard return in the fourth quarter that set up a Bengals FG drive. HB **Chris Evans** is

slotted as the first-string KOR, a role he held through the first nine games of the 2022 season. In that stretch, he had 10 KORs for 211 yards, with a 29-yard long in Week 5 at Baltimore. He logged two KORs for 45 yards in Week 1 at Cleveland, led off by a 27-yarder on the game's opening kick. WR **Trenton Irwin** is listed behind Jones on the PR depth chart and had limited experience during the 2021 season with three returns for 31 yards. HB **Trayveon Williams**, who last season returned 16 kickoffs for 356 yards over the final eight regular-season contests, is also listed at KOR.

AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF

Cincinnati Bengals 19, Tennessee Titans 16
Saturday afternoon, Jan. 22, 2022 at Nissan Stadium

Rookie K Evan McPherson booted a 52-yard FG as time expired to give Cincinnati its first-ever road playoff win and send the No. 4 seed Bengals to their first AFC Championship game in 33 years. The game began with an INT by S Jessie Bates on the first play from scrimmage — it was the first of three INTs thrown by Titans QB Ryan Tannehill. Cincinnati reached the end zone just once, but McPherson made all five of his placekicks (four FGs, one PAT) — including two 50-plus yard FGs — in below-freezing temperatures. The Bengals' offensive line struggled in pass protection, as Burrow was sacked nine times — the most takedowns of a winning QB in NFL postseason history. Titans star RB Derrick Henry, who was playing in his first game since Halloween (foot injury), averaged just 3.1 yards on 20 carries, and the Titans converted just one third down on the afternoon. With the game tied at 16 at the two-minute warning, Tennessee began a drive for a potential game-winning FG. But CB Eli Apple batted a Tannehill pass, and LB Logan Wilson intercepted it with 20 seconds remaining. Burrow quickly hit WR Ja'Marr Chase on a 19-yard pass to set up McPherson's game-winner.

QB Joe Burrow found WR Tee Higgins for a 27-yard TD in the fourth quarter to break a 13-13 tie, and the offense closed the game on a drive that started with 6:07 left to secure Cincinnati's third straight win. The Bengals' defense held Titans RB Derrick Henry, the NFL's leading rusher entering the game, to 38 yards on 17 carries, and in the second half Tennessee's offense was limited to 125 total yards and six points. The Titans went up 10-3 in the second quarter when Henry took a screen pass 69 yards and fumbled the ball into the end zone, where it was recovered by WR Treyton Burks. Later in the quarter, Cincinnati answered with a 92-yard drive, capped by a rushing TD from HB Samaje Perine, who started in place of an injured Joe Mixon. Both teams traded FGs before the Bengals went on a six-play, 75-yard march that included a back-shoulder catch from WR Trenton Irwin to convert a third-and-12. The following snap, Burrow lofted a jump ball for Higgins at the goal line, and the 6-4 receiver came down with what would be the game-winning TD. Cincinnati improved to 7-4, while Tennessee fell to 7-4.

WEEK 1, GAME 1

Cleveland Browns 24, Cincinnati Bengals 3 Sunday, Sept. 10, 2023 at Cleveland Browns Stadium

Hindered by wet and rainy conditions, the Bengals were limited to three points and 142 offensive net yards in a season-opening loss to their in-state rival. The Cincinnati defense kept the game within reach, forcing two turnovers and holding the Browns to 13 points through three quarters, but Cleveland's strong rushing attack eventually broke through and finished the day with 206 yards, led by 106 from RB Nick Chubb. Browns QB Deshaun Watson found the end zone on a 13-yard run just before halftime to give the Browns a 10-0 lead at the break, but the Bengals responded with a 42-yard FG from K Evan McPherson early in the third quarter to cut the deficit to seven. A promising drive on Cincinnati's next offensive possession resulted in a missed FG attempt, and the offense did not reach Browns territory the rest of the way as Cleveland held the upper hand in the battle of field position. The Bengals went for it on fourth-and-four from their own 31-yard line with just over 10 minutes remaining in an attempt to jumpstart the offense, but QB Joe Burrow was dropped for a 13-yard sack and the Browns scored three plays later to seal the final outcome. The game was the 100th "Battle of Ohio" between the two teams.

Cincinnati faced two 10-point deficits in the second half and each time was able to cut it to three, but ultimately the Bengals never took the lead in a home-opener loss. Baltimore was efficient offensively, totaling 415 net yards — including 178 rushing — and scoring a TD on three of its four red zone trips. Cincinnati's offense had just three possessions in the first half and was limited to a FG, but an 81-yard punt return for a TD by rookie WR Charlie Jones in the second quarter helped keep the team within striking distance. QB Joe Burrow connected with WR Tee Higgins for a TD late in the third quarter to reduce Baltimore's lead to three points at 20-17, but the Ravens answered with a 12-play, 85-yard TD drive to regain the two-score advantage. Another Burrow-to-Higgins TD with 3:28 left closed the gap again, but the Ravens converted a pair of third downs on the ensuing possession to end the game. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Baltimore improved to 2-0.

The Bengals' defense recorded six sacks and two INTs to steer Cincinnati to its first win of the season on Monday Night Football. Neither offense established a rhythm in the first half, combining for seven punts in the opening two quarters, but each side put together a pair of FG drives for a 6-6 tie at halftime. The Bengals then struck with a 10-play, 75-yard march on their first possession of the third quarter that ended with a 14-yard TD run by HB Joe Mixon. WR Ja'Marr Chase contributed 33 of his 141 receiving yards on that go-ahead scoring drive, and his team-leading 12 catches on the night helped spark the offense. Cincinnati's defense continued to pressure Rams QB Matthew Stafford, and LB Logan Wilson's second INT of the game not only ended a L.A. scoring threat, but it led to another Bengals FG which extended the lead to 16-9 late in the third quarter. Five different Bengals tallied a sack — DE Trey Hendrickson recorded two in the second half — and the Rams' offense converted just one of 11 third-down attempts.
