GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Kevin Harlan (play-by-play), Trent Green (analyst) and Melanie Collins (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals return from their bye week seeking a crucial road win in an AFC North Division matchup against the Pittsburgh Steelers on Sunday.

Cincinnati enters the contest at 3-6 on the season and aims to snap a two-game losing skid. The Bengals' most recent defeat was a 47-42 result at home against Chicago, in a back-and-forth affair which featured a combined 1071 yards of net offense. After Cincinnati erased a 15-point deficit with less than two minutes remaining to take a one-point lead, the Bears moved quickly down the field and scored a 58-yard TD which proved to be the game-winner.

Coming off consecutive losses in which the team scored an average of 40 points and held a fourth-quarter lead in both games, head coach Zac Taylor acknowledged his group's frustration at the midpoint of the season. But as the Bengals enter the second half of their schedule, Taylor is preaching the importance of accountability and resilience while trying to overcome the current adverse stretch.

"I'm going to keep fighting," said Taylor. "The coaches are going to keep fighting. I know these players have shown that they're going to keep fighting. It's frustrating for everybody to put in the work that's being put in, and this is the result we've had. It's frustrating. Sometimes, you've got to take a deep breath and then come back to work and try to uplift others. I've faced a lot of adversity here, and the only thing I know how to do is keep trying to lift people up. That doesn't mean we run from corrections, that doesn't mean we don't give criticism, but at the same time, the easy thing to do is question everything, point fingers, be negative and be an energy vampire in a lot of ways. I think we've got enough guys that just want to continue to lift people up and find answers."

Offensively, a notable answer over the past month has been veteran QB Joe Flacco, who was acquired by the Bengals in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7. In his young Cincinnati tenure, Flacco has performed as one of the NFL's best passers and developed near-instant chemistry with the team's receiving corps. From his first Bengals start in Week 6 through his most recent appearance in Week 9, he led the league in passing attempts (173), completions (112), passing yards (1254) and TD passes (11), while being intercepted just twice in that span. After working through a shoulder injury which left his status questionable going into the Chicago game, he threw for 470 yards, marking the first time in his 18-year career that he crossed the 400-yard passing threshold.

While Flacco has formed a rapport on the field with several Bengals playmakers, his primary target remains All-Pro WR Ja'Marr Chase. The reigning "Triple Crown" winner has 44 receptions over his four games with Flacco under center, which tied former Detroit WR Calvin Johnson (2012) for the most catches in a four-game span in NFL history. Following the bye week, Chase still leads the league in receptions this season (76), while ranking second in receiving yards (831).

As Cincinnati turns the page to Pittsburgh, Taylor emphasized the significance that one win can hold as his team tries to fight its way back into the divisional race.

"We've talked about it — this can't be a lost season for us," said Taylor. "We have got to come out of this bye rejuvenated and find a way to win. Winning one game certainly propels you, and you've got to build some momentum off that. We had a chance after the (Week 7) Pittsburgh game and kind of wasted two opportunities there. How much different could things have been if we'd finished those two games out? We'd still have issues we would have to address, but we'd be in a better position. We've just got to find a way to kickstart that and build our own momentum."

This week's matchup begins a pivotal five-game stretch for the Bengals, with three of those coming against divisional opponents. After Cincinnati takes on Pittsburgh, it will host New England, travel to Baltimore on Thanksgiving night, face another road test at Buffalo, then return home to meet the Ravens for a second time in three weeks.

The Steelers remain the leader of the AFC North at 5-4 this season, but have dropped three of their past four games, including a Week 10 road loss at the L.A. Chargers. Cincinnati and Pittsburgh's first meeting this season was in Week 7 on Thursday Night Football, when the Bengals came away with a thrilling 33-31 home win on Evan McPherson's game-winning 36-yard field goal.

The Bengals picked up a win coming out of their bye week in three straight seasons from 2021-23, but last year dropped their first contest out of the bye in a Week 13 home loss to Pittsburgh.

The series: The Steelers lead 71-41 overall, including 2-0 in postseason. The two postseason games both were Steelers wins in Wild Card round contests at Paycor Stadium (formerly named Paul Brown Stadium), after the 2005 and '15 seasons.

The Bengals have played more games against the Steelers (112) than any other foe. Cleveland is second in that category at 104, and Tennessee (formerly Houston Oilers) is third at 80.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2025 season, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 471 career receptions, the sixth-most in team history and 36 shy of tying T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530) and Tyler Boyd (513) hold the top four spots on the team's career list. Chase in Week 4 at Denver

surpassed WR Isaac Curtis (416) for seventh place and WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for sixth.

- Chase has 6256 career receiving yards, the sixth-most in team history and 442 shy of fifth-most, which is held by Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets surpassed WR Eddie Brown (6134) for sixth.

- Chase has 51 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and two shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.

- Chase has 23 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, the third-most in team history and eight shy of Johnson (31) for second. Green (33) holds the team record. Chase in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed Curtis (20) for third.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history and 1.5 shy of LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. DE/DT Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5) and DT Geno Atkins (75.5) hold the top three spots. Hendrickson in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth.

- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 507 career points, the sixth-most in team history and 42 shy of fifth-most, which is held by K Horst Muhlmann (549).

- McPherson has 107 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and 13 shy of Muhlmann (120) for fifth.

- McPherson has 186 career made PATs, the sixth-most in team history and three shy of Muhlmann (189) for fifth.

- McPherson has a career FG percentage of 81.67 (107 made/131 att.), the fourth-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Kickers Shayne Graham (86.76 percent; 177/202), Randy Bullock (84.91; 90/106) and Mike Nugent (81.77; 157/192) hold the top three spots.

- P Ryan Rehkow has 37 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, tied with P Nick Harris for the fifth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976.

Records vs. Steelers: The following individual and team regular-season Bengals and Steelers entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book:

- On Oct. 28, 1973 at Pittsburgh, Steelers S Mike Wagner became the first opponent to record three INTs in a game against the Bengals. Four players since have tied.

- On Nov. 10, 1974 at Cincinnati, QB Ken Anderson set the Bengals' game record for completion percentage (90.91), hitting 20 of 22 against the Steelers.

- On Nov. 29, 1992 at Cincinnati, the Steelers tied the record for most sacks against the Bengals in a game with 10, then tied the mark again on Oct. 13, 1996 at Pittsburgh. The record originally was set by Denver on Oct. 19, 1969 at Cincinnati.

- On Oct. 16, 1994 at Cincinnati, the Bengals set a team record with eight sacks, all on QB Neil O'Donnell. That mark was tied on Dec. 9, 2001 vs. Jacksonville.

- On Oct. 15, 2000 at Pittsburgh, Steelers P Josh Miller tied for the most punts ever against the Bengals with 12.

- On Dec. 30, 2001 at Cincinnati, Jon Kitna had a Bengals-record 68 pass attempts in an overtime win over the Steelers. The 68 attempts also set a team record, which still stands.

- On Dec. 4, 2017 at Cincinnati, the Bengals set the dubious record of most penalty yardage incurred during a game at 173. That number shattered the previous mark of 134.

- On Sept. 26, 2021 at Pittsburgh, Steelers RB Najee Harris tied the mark for most receptions ever against the Bengals in a game with 14.

- On Sept. 11, 2022 at Cincinnati, Bengals K Evan McPherson kicked a 59-yard field goal vs. Pittsburgh, the longest field goal in team history. It has since been tied by Cade York, who converted his vs. Cleveland in 2024.

- Earlier this season on Oct. 16, WR Ja'Marr Chase recorded a team-record 16 receptions. Chase now owns the top four receptions games in team history (16 on Oct. 16, 15 on 10-8-23 at Arizona, and 14 on both 12-9-24 at Dallas and 9-14-25 vs. Jacksonville).

Individually vs. Steelers: Here are regular-season offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against Pittsburgh (ordered by total games played):

- TE Drew Sample: 11 games; 13 receptions for 86 yards (6.6-yard average) and a TD.

receptions for 112 yards (11.2) and three TDs.

- QB Joe Burrow (Reserve/Injured): Seven games; 177-of-258 passing (68.6 percent) for 1854 yards, 15 TDs and 10 INTs (92.4 rating); 19 rushes for 75 yards (3.9) and one TD.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Seven games; 53 receptions for 657 yards (12.4) and six TDs.

- WR Andrei Iosivas: Five games; 13 receptions for 148 yards (11.4) and one TD.

- HB Chase Brown: Four games; 27 rushes for 194 yards (7.2) and one TD; Seven receptions for 30 yards (4.3).

- TE Tanner Hudson: Four games; 10 receptions for 62 yards (6.2).

- WR Charlie Jones: Three games; One catch for minus-one yard (-1.0).

- QB Jake Browning: Two games; 47-of-68 passing for 562 yards, two TDs and four INTs (79.4 rating); Four rushes for nine yards (2.3).

- TE Mike Gesicki (Reserve/Injured): Two games; 13 receptions for 121 yards (9.3).

- TE Noah Fant: One game; Four receptions for 44 yards (11.0) and one TD.

- QB Joe Flacco: One game; 31 of 47 passing for 342 yards, three TDs and 0 INTs (108.6 passer rating); Five rushes for three yards (0.6).

Uniform watch: Cincinnati will wear white jerseys, orange pants (black stripes) and white socks this week at Pittsburgh. The Bengals have worn this combination three previous times since their uniform redesign in 2021, compiling a 1-2 record in those games. The last time the team sported this look was in Week 4 at Denver. This week also will be the seventh time Cincinnati wears its orange pants, which were introduced to the uniform rotation in 2024.

The Bengals' redesign in 2021 marked the team's first significant change in uniform since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet six times and collected a 5-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance came in Week 7 of this season, when Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh at home on Thursday Night Football.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their uniform lineup in 2024.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor's system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the

road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team's per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the '15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor's began coaching at Texas A&M University as an offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during his College Station tenure.

Taylor played in college at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3

record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Mike Tomlin was named the 16th head coach in Steelers history on Jan. 22, 2007. He became at the time the youngest coach (36 years, 323 days) in NFL history to win a Super Bowl when the Steelers defeated the Arizona Cardinals, 27-23, in Super Bowl XLIII on Feb. 1, 2009 (11 years later, Sean McVay established the current mark at 36 years, 10 days).

Tomlin reached the playoffs four times in his first five seasons and he is the only coach in Steelers history to win division titles each of his first two seasons. In his 18 years as head coach of the Steelers, Tomlin has led Pittsburgh to seven AFC North titles, most recently in 2020, and has guided the Steelers to the playoffs 12 times, including two trips to the Super Bowl (XLIII and XLV). From 2007-24, he led Pittsburgh to a 183-107-2 regular-season record — the best start for a head coach in franchise history.

Tomlin secured his 18th straight non-losing season with the Steelers in 2024, a streak dating back to his first season as the team's head coach in 2007. Tomlin is the only head coach in NFL history to begin a head-coaching tenure with at least 15 consecutive non-losing seasons.

Tomlin has led the Steelers to a .500-or-better record in each of his 18 seasons as head coach, the third-longest streak of .500-or-better seasons by a head coach in NFL history. He is one of two active NFL head coaches with over

180 wins and one of five active NFL head coaches to defeat at least 31 current NFL franchises.

In 2020, Tomlin's club won its seventh AFC North title. No other head coach has won the AFC North more than six times. In 2008, Tomlin directed the Steelers to a 12-4 record, winning his second-consecutive AFC North title. That season culminated with a Super Bowl triumph, making Tomlin one of only seven coaches in league history to win a Super Bowl within his first two seasons as an NFL head coach. In his first season, Tomlin guided the Steelers to a 10-6 record and their first AFC North title since 2004.

Tomlin was the Minnesota Vikings' defensive coordinator in 2006 after spending the previous five seasons ('01-05) as a defensive backs coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Tomlin coached one of the league's top defensive backfields for the Buccaneers, and his tenure in Tampa culminated with its performance in Super Bowl XXXVII. The secondary recorded four interceptions, returning two for touchdowns, to help Tampa Bay capture the franchise's first Super Bowl title.

Tomlin served two seasons as the defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati (1999-2000) before going to Tampa Bay. Prior to joining the Cincinnati staff, Tomlin had a short stint on the coaching staff at Tennessee-Martin and then spent two seasons at Arkansas State. Tomlin spent the 1996 season as a graduate assistant at Memphis. He began his coaching career in 1995 as wide receivers coach at Virginia Military Institute.

Tomlin was a three-year starter at wide receiver at William & Mary (1990-94) and finished his college career with 101 receptions for 2046 yards and a school-record 20 touchdown receptions. He was named a first-team All-Yankee Conference selection in 1994 after establishing a school record with a 20.2-yards-per catch average. He graduated in 1994 with a degree in sociology. He has no pro playing experience.

Tomlin was born in Hampton, Va., on March 15, 1972. He and his wife, Kiya, have two sons, Dino and Mason, and a daughter, Harlyn Quinn.

Taylor vs. Steelers: The Steelers lead, 7-6.

Taylor vs. Tomlin: Tomlin leads, 7-6.

Tomlin vs. Bengals: Tomlin leads 27-11 (that record includes a Wild Card Playoff victory after the 2015 season).

BENGALS NOTES

Flacco through four starts: QB Joe Flacco, who Cincinnati acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7, has started the past four games for the Bengals. He has completed 112 of 173 passes (64.7 percent) for 1254 yards and 11 TDs with two INTs, good for a passer rating of 102.6.

From his first Bengals start in Week 6 through his most recent outing in Week 9, Flacco led the NFL in passing attempts, completions, passing yards and TD passes. He became just the fourth QB in NFL history with at least 1200 passing yards, 10 TD passes and a rating of 100 in his first four games with a team. The only QBs to previously do so were Drew Bledsoe with Buffalo (2002), Kirk Cousins with Minnesota ('18) and Matthew Stafford with the L.A. Rams ('21).

Flacco's first start for Cincinnati came in Week 6 at Green Bay, just five days after joining the team. He finished the game with 219 passing yards, but the bulk of his production came in the second half, when he threw for 179 yards and two TDs. Both of his scoring passes came on fourth-down plays.

Flacco then faced a short week of preparation for the Week 7 contest against Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football. The 18th-year veteran shined under the Paycor Stadium lights, as he went 31 of 47 for 342 yards and three TDs with no turnovers. After the Steelers took the lead with 2:21 left in regulation, Flacco engineered an eight-play, 52-yard drive to set up the game-winning FG. He completed each of his three passing attempts on the drive for 61 yards, with the final pass being a 28-yard connection with WR Tee Higgins to get inside comfortable FG range.

With his effort against the Steelers, Flacco became the fourth QB in NFL history with at least 300 passing yards, three TD passes and zero INTs in a game after turning 40 years old. He joined Tom Brady (12 such games), Drew Brees (two) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre (two).

Flacco faced one of his former teams in the N.Y. Jets in Week 8, and tacked on 223 more passing yards with two TDs. His 44-yard scoring pass to Higgins in the second quarter marked his longest completion since Week 17 of last season, when he completed a 49-yarder while playing for Indianapolis.

Flacco is coming off a career-high 470 passing yards and four TD passes, along with his first two INTs as a Bengal, in Week 9 against Chicago. It marked the most passing yards by a QB over 40 years old in NFL history, and was the first time Flacco crossed the 400-yard passing threshold in his career.

The wrap on Flacco: Flacco, who enters Week 11 having started 199 regular-season games in his career, is set to become the 17th QB in NFL history to make 200 starts. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history.

Now in his 18th NFL season, Flacco ranks in the top 25 in league history in career passing yards (14th; 47,766) and TD passes (21st; 270). He moved into 14th place on the league's all-time passing yardage list in the Bengals' Week 7 win over Pittsburgh, surpassing QBs Russell Wilson (46,921) and Fran Tarkenton (47,003).

Flacco originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent 11 seasons ('08-18) as the Ravens' starting QB. He then had stints with Denver (2019), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24).

Flacco also has played and started 16 postseason games, highlighted by a four-game run to help the Ravens win Super Bowl XLVII in the 2012 campaign. He won Super Bowl MVP honors after throwing three TD passes and posting a 124.2 passer rating in Baltimore's win over San Francisco.

In his first stint with Cleveland in 2023, Flacco stepped in as the Browns' starting QB for five games late in the year and helped lead them to a 4-1 record, which propelled them to a playoff berth. He averaged 323.2 passing yards and over two TDs per game in that stretch, and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year.

Flacco had started the Browns' first four games of this season, including the Week 1 contest against Cincinnati, and passed for 815 yards and two TDs with six INTs. He then was Active/DNP in Cleveland's fifth game as rookie Dillon

Gabriel made his NFL debut. Flacco's TD pass to WR Andrei Iosivas in Week 9 marked the 71st player he has thrown at least one scoring pass to. That surpassed former QB Vinny Testaverde for the fourth-most such players in NFL history.

Burrow's early 2025 totals: Sixth-year QB Joe Burrow started the first two games of the 2025 season before sustaining a toe injury in the second quarter of Week 2 vs. Jacksonville. He was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 16, and underwent surgery on Sept. 19. In his five-plus quarters of action, Burrow completed 21 of 36 passes for 189 yards and two TDs with no INTs. Burrow played in his 70th career game in the season opener at Cleveland and went 14 of 23 for 113 yards, with a one-yard TD pass to TE Noah Fant to give Cincinnati the lead in the second quarter. Burrow's 1762 career completions at the end of the Browns game were the most by any QB in NFL history through their first 70 games, while his 141 TD passes ranked as the third-most and his 19,114 passing yards ranked fifth. Burrow had completed seven of his 13 passing attempts for 76 yards against the Jaguars prior to his injury. He connected with WR Ja'Marr Chase for a four-yard TD on third-and-goal late in the opening quarter. On Nov. 10, the Bengals advanced Burrow for a limited return to practice so he could begin progressing on-field activities.

No stopping Uno: WR Ja'Marr Chase has a combined 44 receptions over his last four games, with 10 in Week 6 at Green Bay, a Bengals-record 16 in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, 12 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and six in Week 9 against Chicago. That total is tied for the most catches in a span of four games in NFL history, matching former Detroit WR Calvin Johnson in Weeks 13-16 of the 2012 season. With his production in Weeks 6-8, Chase became the first player in Bengals history to register 10 or more receptions in three straight games. In the Week 7 win over the Steelers, he broke his own previous Bengals single-game record of 15 receptions, which he amassed in Week 5 of the 2023 campaign at Arizona. He now owns the four highest single-game reception totals in team history.

Chase has four career games with 14 or more receptions, tied with former Pittsburgh/New England/Tampa Bay WR Antonio Brown for the second-most such games in league history. Current L.A. Chargers WR Keenan Allen holds the league record with six such games in his career. After leading the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 receptions last season, Chase once again is pacing the league with 76 catches in 2025. The last player to finish as the league leader in receptions in consecutive seasons was former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas in 2018 and '19.

Ja'Marr climbs the ranks: WR Ja'Marr Chase's league-leading 76 receptions this season have boosted his career catch total to 471, which ranks sixth in Bengals history and is 36 shy of tying former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. Chase recently surpassed Bengals Ring of Honor member Isaac Curtis (416) and former WR Cris Collinsworth (417) on the team's all-time receptions list. In the Week 2 win over Jacksonville, he logged his 400th career reception in what was his 64th regular-season game. That tied former Atlanta WR Julio Jones and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry for the fifth-fewest games in NFL history to reach 400 career catches. Chase kicked off his career with 81 receptions in the 2021 season, which set a Bengals rookie record and still ranks in the top 20 among all rookies in NFL history. He followed that up with a team-leading 87 catches in just 12 games played in 2022, then hit triple digits for the first time when he had 100 receptions in '23 (12th in NFL). In his 2024 "Triple Crown" season, Chase led the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 catches. He became the first player in team history to lead the league in receptions, and surpassed Houshmandzadeh's previous team mark of 112 in the

Chase leads the pack: WR Ja'Marr Chase's highlight-reel TD catch in the fourth quarter of Week 6 at Green Bay was the 50th receiving TD of his career. Playing in his 68th regular-season game, he became the seventh-fastest player in NFL history and the fourth-fastest in the Super Bowl era (1966-present) to reach that milestone. He found the end zone again on an eight-yard scoring catch in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, moving his career tally to 51. The only players in the Super Bowl era to record 50 receiving TDs in fewer games than Chase are Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (59 games), former New England TE Rob Gronkowski (59) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (61). Chase's 51 TD catches are the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. In 2024, he led the league with 17 TDs, which tied the Bengals single-season record originally set by WR Carl Pickens in 1995. Chase became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in receiving TDs. He had a league-high five games with multiple TD catches last season, including a career-high-tying three scores in Week 10 at Baltimore on Thursday Night Football. Chase's five receiving TDs this season are tied for 14th in the NFL. He caught two scoring passes from Jake Browning in Week 5 vs. Detroit, which marked his 12th career game with multiple TDs. Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase surpassed 6000 career receiving yards during the Bengals' Week 7 win over Pittsburgh. Playing in his 69th career regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. The only players to hit the 6K yard mark in fewer games are Pro Football Hall of Famer Lance Alworth (62), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (62), former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (64) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (67). Chase is one of three players in NFL history with at least 6000 receiving yards and 50 receiving TDs in his first five seasons, alongside Hall of Famers Randy Moss and Jerry Rice. The win over the Steelers also marked Chase's seventh career game with at least 10 catches and 150 receiving yards, which surpassed Jefferson for the most such games in a player's first five seasons in league history. Chase's current career receiving yardage total is at 6256, which ranks sixth in team history and is 442 shy of tying former WR Cris Collinsworth (6698) for fifth. So far this season, Chase has surpassed former WRs T.J. Houshmandzadeh (5782), Darnay Scott (5975), Tyler Boyd (6000) and Eddie Brown (6134) on Cincinnati's all-time list. Chase wrapped up his fourth pro season in 2024, and among all players in NFL history through their first four years, he ranks third in receiving yards (5425), third in receiving TDs (46) and fourth in receptions (395). He is the only player in league history with at least 80 receptions, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first four career seasons. He also is one of six players to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons, and the second Bengals player to do so following WR A.J. Green (2011-14). The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 88.1 receiving yards per game (71 regular-season games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only Jefferson (94.4) and L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (90.3). The players behind Chase in that category include Hall of Famer Calvin Johnson (fourth; 86.1), WR Antonio Brown (fifth; 84.2) and WR Julio Jones (sixth; 82.5).

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 64-yard TD catch in Week 5 vs. Detroit was his 13th career receiving score from 60 or more yards. That is the most such TDs in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021, and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 26.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD receptions of 50/+ yards (14) and 40/+ yards (19) since 2021. In his 2021 rookie campaign, six of his 13 receiving TDs came from at least 40 yards out. He had three scoring catches of 60 or more yards in 2023, then followed up with a league-leading four of at least 60 yards in '24. Two of those occurred in the same game last year, as he scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards in Week 10 at Baltimore on Thursday Night Football.

Uno reigns as Triple Crown winner: WR Ja'Marr Chase finished the 2024 season as the NFL leader in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17), earning him the prestigious receiving "Triple Crown." He became just the sixth Triple Crown winner in the Super Bowl era (1966-present), and the first since L.A. Rams WR Cooper Kupp in 2021.

Chase's receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Bengals single-season record, while his 17 receiving TDs tied WR Carl Pickens' team record set in 1995. Chase had 100 or more receiving yards in five games in 2024, tying for the second-most such games in a season in team history behind WR A.J. Green's six games in '13.

Chase also became the fifth player in NFL history to log at least 100 catches, 1500 receiving yards and 15 receiving TDs in a season, joining Kupp ('21), former Minnesota WR Randy Moss ('03), former Indianapolis WR Marvin Harrison ('01) and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice (1995).

Following the regular season, Chase was voted a unanimous first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press. It marked his second career All-Pro selection, as he received second-team honors in his 2021 rookie campaign. He became the first Bengals offensive player to earn first-team accolades since OT/G Andrew Whitworth in 2015.

Chase signed a contract extension with the Bengals in March of this year that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

Higgins reaches 5K yards: WR Tee Higgins led the Bengals with 121 yards on seven receptions in Week 9 vs. Chicago, and in the process surpassed 5000 receiving yards in his career. Playing in his 79th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in Bengals history to reach that milestone.

Higgins this season leads the Bengals in receiving TDs (six; tied for fourth in NFL), while ranking second on the team in receiving yards (481) and third in receptions (32). After being limited to 220 receiving yards through the first six contests, he has totaled 261 over Cincinnati's past three games, the seventh-most in the NFL from Weeks 7-9.

After opening his career with a team-leading 908 receiving yards in his 2020 rookie campaign, Higgins surpassed the 1000-yard mark in consecutive seasons in '21 and '22. He had a career-high 1091 receiving yards in 2021, ranking 17th in the league that season, then followed up with 1029 in '22 (20th). He has played in just 12 games in each of the past two seasons, and registered 656 receiving yards in 2023 followed by 911 in '24. He hauled in a career-best 10 receiving TDs last year, which tied for sixth-most in the NFL.

Higgins re-signed with the Bengals in March on a four-year deal which keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2028 season.

Tee time: WR Tee Higgins has at least one receiving TD in each of his last nine games played at home, dating back to Week 5 of the 2024 season. He became the third player in NFL history to score a receiving TD in nine consecutive home games played, joining former Minnesota WR Cris Carter, who had a record 10-game streak spanning from the 2000-01 seasons, and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice, who compiled a nine-game streak during the 1989-90 campaigns.

Higgins has a TD catch of exactly 44 yards in each of the past two games, beginning in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets when he hauled in a deep ball from QB Joe Flacco in the second quarter. That marked his longest reception since an 80-yarder in Week 16 of 2023 at Pittsburgh. Higgins then followed up with another 44-yard TD on a highlight-reel catch late in the first half against Chicago. He finished the Bears game with season highs in receptions (seven) and receiving yards (121).

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks 12th in the league in receiving TDs (40) and 16th in receiving yards (5076). He recorded over 900 receiving yards in four of his first five seasons, including back-to-back 1000-yard campaigns in 2021 and '22. He also has played in seven postseason games for Cincinnati and has 457 receiving yards and three TDs.

Higgins battled through injuries for the first half of the 2024 campaign, but over the last nine weeks of the season, he tied for the league lead in receiving TDs (seven) and ranked 17th in receiving yards (570).

Brown does it all: HB Chase Brown has recorded 100 or more yards from scrimmage in each of the Bengals' past three games, as he logged 100 in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, 105 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and a season-high 112 in Week 9 vs. Chicago.

Brown's 317 scrimmage yards from Weeks 7-9 ranked fourth among all NFL running backs in that span. He eclipsed 100 rushing yards for the first time this season in the Week 7 win over the Steelers, going for 108 on just 11 attempts. His 9.8 yards per carry marked the seventh-highest average by any player in a game this season (minimum 10 rushes). He reeled off his two longest runs of the season in the second quarter of that game, with a 37-yarder and 27-yarder both coming on the first play of Cincinnati TD drives.

In addition to his 105 scrimmage yards against the Jets (73 rushing, 32 receiving), Brown scored both a rushing and receiving TD in the same game for the second time in his career. His first such performance was Week 15 of last season at Tennessee.

Brown's production against the Bears featured 75 receiving yards, his most in a game this season and second-most in his career behind an 80-yard output in Week 14 of the 2023 campaign vs. Indianapolis. Late in the fourth quarter of the Bears game, he had a season-long 21-yard reception to convert a fourth-and-10.

Brown took over the starting HB role for Cincinnati midway through his second pro season in 2024 and emerged as a key piece of the offense down the stretch. From Weeks 9-17 of last season, when he started each game, Brown ranked fifth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (930), fourth in scrimmage yards per game (116.3), seventh in rushing attempts (151) and ninth in rushing yards (631). He was one of just two NFL players in that span with at least 600 rushing yards and 250 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs. He also became the first Bengals player to record at least 90 scrimmage yards in eight straight games since former FB Boobie Clark in 1973.

Hendrickson cracks top five: With a team-leading four sacks through seven games played this season, DE Trey Hendrickson has improved his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 61.0. He surpassed former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth-most in Bengals history, and now is 1.5 shy of former LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. Hendrickson signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason.

Hendrickson, who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with the Bengals (2021-24), opened his Cincinnati tenure with 14.0 sacks in the '21 campaign, which led the team and ranked fifth in the NFL. He followed up with a team-high eight sacks in 2022.

Hendrickson posted 17.5 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 seasons, which are tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history behind former DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (the NFL began tracking sacks in '82, but the Bengals track the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder). He became the first Cincinnati player with double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81. Hendrickson also is just the fifth player in NFL history to post 17 or more sacks in back-to-back seasons.

Trey's torrid pace: Since the start of the 2023 season, DE Trey Hendrickson's 39.0 total sacks are tied with Cleveland DE Myles Garrett for the most in the NFL. Hendrickson was the only player with at least 15 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 campaign.

Hendrickson joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, and in his four-plus years in Cincinnati he has totaled 61.0 sacks. That ranks as the third-most in the NFL in that span, trailing only Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (70.0 sacks) and Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (62.5). He also has 13 games with multiple sacks (two or more) since the start of the 2021 season, the third-most leaguewide behind Watt and former Dallas/current Green Bay DE Micah Parsons (16 games each).

Hendrickson's most recent such performance came in Week 5 vs. Detroit, when he logged two sacks including a strip-sack which was recovered by Cincinnati in the first quarter.

Hendrickson's strip-sack against the Lions was his 12th forced fumble since 2021, which is tied for the third-most in the NFL in that span.

Originally a third-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017, Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons ('17-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and totaled 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL that season.

Turner shuts it down: CB DJ Turner II's 14 PDs this season lead the NFL and already mark a career high for the third-year pro. His previous high was eight PDs in the 2024 campaign.

Turner also has recorded his first two career INTs this season, with the first coming late in the fourth quarter of Week 1 at Cleveland to help the Bengals protect a one-point lead. His second pick occurred just before halftime of the Week 7 contest vs. Pittsburgh, when he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf along the sideline in Cincinnati territory.

In Week 6 at Green Bay, Turner notched a career-best five PDs. He became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph had five on Nov. 8, 2009, in a win over Baltimore. Turner also is one of three players in the NFL this season to record five PDs in a game, alongside Green Bay CB Keisean Nixon in Week 2 and Philadelphia CB Quinyon Mitchell in Week 4. No player in the league had that many PDs in a single game last season.

Turner has played in all nine games with eight starts this year, after missing the final six contests of the 2024 season due to a collarbone injury.

Charlie's 98-yard dash: WR Charlie Jones got the Bengals' Week 9 contest against Chicago underway with a 98-yard return for a TD on the game's opening kickoff. It marked his second career TD on a KOR, following a 100-yard return on the opening kickoff in Week 7 of the 2024 season at Cleveland. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the 14th TD on a KOR in Bengals history.
- It was the third time in team history (and first in a home game) that the Bengals returned the game's opening kickoff for a TD. The other instances were Jones' 2024 runback against the Browns, and former S Brandon Wilson's 92-yarder on Oct. 13, 2019 at Baltimore.
- It tied for the sixth-longest KOR in team history, alongside a 98-yard TD return by former HB Stanford Jennings on Nov. 13, 1988 at Kansas City.
- Jones became the third player in team history with multiple KORs for a TD in his Bengals career, joining Wilson and former S/CB Tremaine Mack, who both also had two.
- Jones became the first player in team history with multiple KORs of 98 or more yards.
- Jones also had an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 of the 2023 season vs. Baltimore. He joined former CB Lemar Parrish as the only players in Bengals history with three or more returns for TDs. Parrish had four TDs on PRs and one on a KOR.
- Jones' return against the Bears was the longest KOR in the NFL this season at the time, and now is the second-longest behind N.Y. Jets RB Kene Nwangwu's 99-yarder in Week 10.
- According to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players' speeds using GPS, Jones' top speed on the return was 21.78 mph, making him the eighth-fastest ball carrier in the league this season.

Team record for KOR yards: Cincinnati totaled 297 yards on eight kickoff returns in Week 9 vs. Chicago, marking the most KOR yards in a single game in team history. The previous record was 244 KOR yards on Nov. 10, 2002 against Baltimore.

The Bengals got things rolling with WR Charlie Jones' 98-yard return for a TD on the game's opening kickoff. On the next kickoff Cincinnati received later in the first quarter, HB Samaje Perine took it for 38 yards, the second-longest return of his career.

Late in the second quarter, rookie HB Tahj Brooks ran back his longest career return, a 31-yarder to set up a Bengals go-ahead TD drive. Jones then had a 30-yard KOR in the fourth quarter, giving Cincinnati its fourth return of 30 or more yards.

The Bengals' average of 37.1 yards per KOR was the fifth-highest in a game in which they had at least five returns. The last time the team averaged 35 or more yards (minimum five returns) was on Nov. 15, 2009, when it posted a 41.2-yard average (five KORs for 206 yards).

Money Mac from deep: Of K Evan McPherson's 107 career made FGs, 25 have been from a distance of 50 or more yards. That marks the most such FGs in a career in Bengals history, and is tied for the eighth-most in the NFL since McPherson entered the league as a fifth-round pick of Cincinnati in 2021.

McPherson has made one kick from at least 50 yards this season, on an exact 50-yarder in Week 5 vs. Detroit. The following week at Green Bay, he lined up to attempt a then-NFL record 67-yard FG as the first half clock was expiring. He initially made the kick, but the Packers negated the try by calling a timeout. His ensuing attempt flew short of the uprights.

McPherson did notch a career milestone in the Green Bay contest, as he made his 100th career FG on a 45-yarder in the fourth quarter. Playing in his 67th career regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest kicker in Bengals history to reach the century mark, behind only Doug Pelfrey (59 games), Shayne Graham (62), Mike Nugent (62) and Horst Muhlmann (65).

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 107 of 131 FG attempts, good for the fourth-highest percentage in team history (81.67). Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," he is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson owns five of the seven longest made kicks in Bengals history, led by a career-long 59-yarder that he booted in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh. His season long in 2024 was a 56-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, which at the time tied for the fifth-longest in team history (now tied for sixth).

Rehkwow's ranks: P Ryan Rehkwow has punted 38 times for 2006 yards this season, with 12 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line. He ranks first in the NFL in gross punting average (52.8 per punt) and tied for eighth in net average (42.7).

As a rookie in 2024, Rehkwow set Bengals single-season records for gross punting average (49.11 yards) and net average (42.92 yards). Both figures surpassed former P Kevin Huber's previous records set in the 2020 season. Rehkwow also had 25 inside-20 punts last year compared to five touchbacks.

After signing with the Bengals as a free agent on the third day of training camp in 2024, Rehkwow made his NFL debut in Week 1 of last season against New England. That day, he punted four times for 258 yards, setting an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per attempt (minimum four punts). The previous league record belonged to Las Vegas P AJ Cole, who had a 63.60-yard average in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. Rehkwow's performance in the 2024 opener also included the longest punt in Bengals history, an 80-yarder kicked from his own 20-yard line to the Patriots' end zone.

Rehkwow finished his 2024 rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average.

Rehkwow's lone punt in Week 9 vs. Chicago was fair caught at the Bears' 18-yard line. It improved Rehkwow's career total inside-20 punts to 37, which tied former P Nick Harris for the fifth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976.

Four Bengals listed on "Top 100": For the 15th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on social media and NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by four players on the 2025 list — WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 4), QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 14) and WR Tee Higgins (No. 77). It marked the first appearance on the list in Higgins' career, the fourth overall for Burrow and Chase, and the fifth for Hendrickson.

Chase's ranking at No. 4 is the highest by a Bengals player since the "Top 100" debuted in 2011. The previous highest ranking was No. 6, which was Burrow's position on the 2023 list. Hendrickson's spot at No. 14 is his personal highest, substantially ahead of his previous best ranking of No. 77 (2021 list).

This marks the third time in the history of the "Top 100" in which four or more Bengals players were featured. Cincinnati had a record seven players on the 2016 list, then landed four on the '22 edition.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have had announced attendance figures of 65,000 or more in 29 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That is the longest streak in team history, surpassing a previous span of 24 straight from 2005-07.

Each of the 15 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of this season was played in front of an announced crowd of 66,569, the fourth-largest figure on the list. Most of those fans were dressed in white apparel to accentuate the fourth annual

"White Bengal" game at Paycor Stadium on Thursday Night Football.

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history.

Lapham, Parrish enter Bengals Ring of Honor: A pair of Bengals legends in former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish were inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of Cincinnati's Week 8 game against the N.Y. Jets. They became the 11th and 12th members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who is in his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team's most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive lineman who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team's starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career, Lapham moved into the team's radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as "Mr. Bengal," he has been the team's radio analyst since 1986.

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

Ring of Honor inductees have been voted in each offseason since 2021 by Bengals Season Ticket Members. Lapham and Parrish joined previous inductees QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.8 years ... Cincinnati's win over Jacksonville in Week 2 of this season was the 250th home victory in team history (regular season and postseason) ... The Bengals have netted 22 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, the third-most weekly awards by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who is in his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is QB Joe Flacco, who is 40 (born Jan. 16, 1985) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who turns 22 this week (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the active roster is HB Tahj Brooks, who is listed at 5-9 ... Brown and Mims also are tied for the heaviest player on the active roster, both listed at 350 pounds ... There is a tie for lightest player on the active roster between K Evan McPherson and CB DJ Turner II, who both are listed at 185 pounds.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Eighteenth-year veteran **Joe Flacco** has started the past four games for the Bengals after being acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7. In his four Cincinnati starts, he has completed 64.7 percent of his passes (112 of 173) for 1254 yards and 11 TDs with two INTs. He led the NFL in several passing categories from Weeks 6-9, and is coming off a career-high 470 passing yards in Week 9 vs. Chicago. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. He began the season starting the Browns' first four games, and in that stretch he passed for 815 yards and a two-to-six TD-INT ratio. He originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent his first 11 seasons with the Ravens, before stints with Denver ('19), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24). He won Super Bowl MVP honors after helping lead Baltimore

to a title in the 2012 campaign, and in '23 he was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after helping steer the Browns to a playoff berth. Backup QB **Jake Browning** started three games for Cincinnati this season prior to Flacco's acquisition. He stepped into action following Joe Burrow's injury in Week 2 against Jacksonville, and in that game he passed for 241 yards and scored the game-winning TD on a QB sneak with 18 seconds remaining. Browning's totals on the season include 80 completions on 124 attempts (64.5 percent) for 757 yards and six TDs with eight INTs. He had a previous stint as the Bengals' starter in 2023, as he started the final seven games of that regular season and piloted the team to a 4-3 record. In that stretch, he ranked second in the NFL in passing yards (1868), while completing 71.5 percent of his attempts and throwing 11 TDs. He then spent the entire 2024 campaign as Cincinnati's

second-string QB. He spent his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Cincinnati native **Sean Clifford** was signed to the active roster in late October, after spending the previous six games on the Bengals' practice squad. A former standout at local St. Xavier High School, Clifford entered the NFL as a fifth-round pick of Green Bay in 2023 and saw action in two regular-season contests his rookie year. He then spent the 2024 campaign on the Packers' practice squad. He played six collegiate seasons at Penn State (2017-22), where he holds program records for career passing yards (10,661), passing TDs (86), completion percentage (61.4) and wins as a starting QB (32).

Running backs: HB **Chase Brown** is in his third pro season and first as Cincinnati's full-time primary running back. A dynamic all-around threat, he has 621 yards from scrimmage this season (420 rushing, 201 receiving), highlighted by three consecutive 100-yard outings from Weeks 7-9. He averaged a career-best 9.8 yards per carry in the Week 7 win over Pittsburgh, with 108 yards on just 11 attempts. He is coming off season highs in scrimmage yards (112) and receiving yards (75) in Week 9 vs. Chicago. Brown took over as the team's starting HB midway through the 2024 season, and in Weeks 9-17 of last year he ranked fifth in the NFL in scrimmage yards (930). He finished last season with 990 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs on 229 carries, along with 54 receptions for 360 yards and four TDs. His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at the University of Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB **Samaje Perine**. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. So far in 2025, Perine has 198 rushing yards and 30 receiving yards, and for his career is one of 14 active players with at least 2000 yards rushing and 1500 yards receiving. His season-high 94 rushing yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets were the fifth-most in any game of his career, and the most since Week 13 of the 2022 campaign. Some of his top moments with the Bengals came during the team's postseason runs following the 2021 and '22 campaigns, including a 41-yard receiving TD in the '21 AFC Championship win at Kansas City. Rookie HB **Tahj Brooks** was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of this year's draft, after compiling a record-setting career at Texas Tech University. Brooks finished his time in Lubbock with the most rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23) in program history. He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back). He has seen action primarily on special teams through his first nine NFL games, but has six carries for 18 yards offensively.

Wide Receivers: Cincinnati's 2021 first-round draft choice **Ja'Marr Chase** has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons and has broken several Bengals single-season records early in his pro career. In 2024, he became the youngest player (24 years old) in the Super Bowl era to claim the receiving "Triple Crown," as he led the league in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17). His receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Cincinnati single-season record, while his TDs tied the franchise mark held by WR Carl Pickens (1995). He currently leads all players with 76 receptions this season, highlighted by a Bengals-record 16 catches in the Week 7 win over Pittsburgh, and ranks second leaguewide with 831 receiving yards. He has reached a pair of career milestones so far this season, surpassing 6000 career receiving yards and 50 receiving TDs. Chase signed a four-year contract extension on March 18, the same day that his running mate **Tee Higgins** re-signed with Cincinnati on a four-year deal. Since entering the league as a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks 12th in the NFL in TD catches (40) and 16th in receiving yards (5076). He has scored a receiving TD in each of his last nine games played at Paycor Stadium, joining Hall of Famers Cris Carter and Jerry Rice as the only players in NFL history with a TD catch in nine straight home contests. In Week 9 vs. Chicago, Higgins registered season highs in catches (seven) and yards (121), and during the game he reached 5000 receiving yards in his career. He currently leads the Bengals and is tied for fourth in the NFL with six receiving TDs, while ranking second on the team with 431 receiving yards. Higgins recorded at least 900 yards in four of his first five pro seasons (2020-24), including consecutive 1000-yard campaigns in 2021 and '22. **Andre Iosivas** is in his third NFL season and continues to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He brought in 36 catches for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024, following 116 yards and four TDs as a rookie in '23. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as each of his 11 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. Iosivas has

16 catches for 236 yards and one TD this season, including a career-high 82 yards in Week 5 vs. Detroit. He hauled in his first TD of the year in Week 9 vs. Chicago, a nine-yarder from Flacco to complete a 15-point comeback late in the fourth quarter. Iosivas was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he earned All-America honors as a heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. Fellow third-year receiver **Charlie Jones** has served as the Bengals' primary punt returner since being selected in the fourth round of the 2023 draft, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. In 2022, his final collegiate season which he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Among the top offensive performers throughout this past training camp and preseason was WR **Mitch Tinsley**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster after signing a Reserve/Future contract with Cincinnati in February. Originally a college free agent signee of Washington in 2023, Tinsley played in two games as a rookie for the Commanders (no statistics), then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. He faced his former team in the Bengals' second preseason game at Washington and posted five catches for 73 yards and two highlight-reel TDs. He made the highlight tapes once again with his first career reception in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, a one-handed TD grab on a 13-yard pass from Browning. He has totaled three catches for 49 yards this season. He finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-21). Second-year WR **Jermaine Burton** possesses the ability to stretch defensive coverages, as two of his four catches as a rookie last season went for over 40 yards. He also contributed in the kickoff return game following Jones' injury last year. Burton began his collegiate career at the University of Georgia (2020-21), then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two seasons ('22-23) before being selected by the Bengals in the third round of the '24 NFL Draft. In 2023, his final year with the Crimson Tide, he led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally in yards per reception (20.5).

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 87 career regular-season games with 57 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season and has started in 30 of his last 35 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 105 career receptions for 754 yards and five TDs. He missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned at the start of the '23 season and has suited up for each of Cincinnati's last 41 games. Now in his seventh season, Sample is the Bengals' longest-tenured player. **Noah Fant** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late July of this year and quickly built a rapport with Cincinnati's quarterbacks. He has 25 catches for 220 yards and three TDs in eight games played, with his latest scoring grab coming on a 23-yard pass from Flacco in Week 9 vs. Chicago during the fourth-quarter comeback effort. A former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), Fant spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21) and three with Seattle ('22-24). He has played in 102 career games with 86 starts, and his career totals include 325 receptions for 3525 yards and 18 TDs. After being held off the stat sheet through the first five games of this season, sixth-year TE **Tanner Hudson** scored a TD on his first catch of the year, a two-yarder from Flacco in Week 6 at Green Bay. He now has seven receptions for 61 yards this season, including a season-high 42 yards in Week 9 vs. Chicago. He enjoyed his best statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with Cincinnati, as he posted career highs in catches (39) and yards (352) in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four postseason games. **Cam Grandy** began his 2024 rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, then signed to the active roster midway through the year and went on to play in eight games with six starts. He has six catches for 34 yards in his career. Grandy was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University.

Offensive linemen: Headlining the Bengals' offensive line room is four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started all 36 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three NFL seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore and then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 33 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 79 regular-season games played. He has played all 555 offensive snaps through Cincinnati's first nine games this season. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who is in his fourth season with the

Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his four years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 62 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.5 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span (4069 of 4088). Off the field, he was the team's 2023 nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award, honored for his charitable work with the Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. The starting ROT is second-year pro **Amarius Mims**, who was Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2024 (No. 18 overall). Mims began his rookie season in a reserve role but has started 22 of his last 23 games played. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Brown as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. Rookie **Jalen Rivers** has started the past six games at RG, lining up for all 379 Bengals offensive snaps in that stretch. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April, he boasted a proven ability to play at both tackle and guard spots during his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.). He was the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two seasons, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. He suited up for 38 total games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) at Miami. Fellow rookie **Dylan Fairchild** was taken in the third round of this year's draft and started at LG in each of the first five games of the season, before missing the Week 6 contest at Green Bay due to a knee injury. He then was active/DNP in Week 7, and returned to the starting lineup in Week 8. In 2024, his final season at the University of Georgia, he earned second-team All-America honors while blocking for a Bulldogs offense that ranked third in the Southeastern Conference in net passing yards per game (281.0). In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., Fairchild was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. **Lucas Patrick**, who started this year's opener at RG, was sidelined for six games due to a calf injury sustained at Cleveland. He was returned to the active roster from the Reserve/Injured list in Week 7, then made his return to game action in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. Patrick joined the Bengals in this year's free agency period, after spending previous seasons with Green Bay (2016-21), Chicago ('22-23) and New Orleans ('24). He has played in 110 career regular-season games, and his 65 total starts have included 28 at center, 19 at LG and 18 at RG. G **Dalton Risner** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late August, and quickly was thrust into action as he entered the season opener at Cleveland in the first half following Patrick's injury. Since then, he's been a versatile asset in the interior offensive line, appearing in six games with four starts and playing substantial snaps at both guard positions. Risner was a second-round draft pick of Denver in 2019 and spent his first four pro seasons ('19-22) with the Broncos, before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 93 career regular-season games with 85 starts — 75 at LG and 10 at RG. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT **Cody Ford**, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. He has played 19 offensive snaps and 39 special teams snaps through nine games this season. Ford was college teammates with Brown at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17. C **Matt Lee** is in his second pro season with the Bengals, after seeing action in all 17 games in 2024 as a reserve O-lineman and special teams contributor. He has played in five contests this season, lining up for 16 special teams snaps, but was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Oct. 28. Lee was a seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, following a five-year college career (2019-23) that saw him go from the University of Central Florida ('19-22) to Miami (Fla.) for his final season. He garnered second-team All-ACC honors in his lone season at Miami.

Defensive linemen: The Bengals' defensive line room is headlined by DE **Trey Hendrickson**, a ninth-year pass rusher who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with Cincinnati (2021-24). He recorded 17.5 sacks in each of the past two seasons, with last year's total leading the NFL. He was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press in 2024 and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year. Since joining the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason, he ranks third in the NFL in sacks (61.0) and tied for third in forced fumbles (12). He entered the NFL

as a third-round pick of New Orleans in 2017 and spent his first four seasons ('17-20) with the Saints. Hendrickson has a team-leading four sacks in seven games played this season. He has been inactive for two contests and left the Week 8 game early due to a hip injury. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 63 games played, including six postseason contests. A productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 18 sacks as a Bengal while also batting down/tipping 13 passes. He leads the team's defensive line with 36 tackles this season, including two sacks and three TFLs. He notched his second sack of the season in Week 9 vs. Chicago, bringing down QB Caleb Williams for a seven-yard loss. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.**, who joined the Bengals after spending his first four pro seasons (2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 77 regular-season games and totaled 165 tackles, seven TFLs, two sacks and four PDs. He made his first career start in the 2022 season finale and has started each of his last 44 games played. Slaton has logged 32 tackles through his first nine games with Cincinnati, including a season-high eight in Week 5 vs. Detroit, the second-most in a game in his career. The Bengals added noteworthy athleticism to the D-line room when they selected DE **Shemar Stewart** in the first round of this year's draft (No. 17 overall) out of Texas A&M University. Touted in the scouting process for his physical traits, Stewart was one of two players in the 2025 draft class to produce a perfect 10.0 on the Relative Athletic Score, which grades a player's measurements compared to their peer group. He played in 37 games with 19 starts across three seasons (2022-24) with the Aggies, and finished his career with third-team All-SEC honors last year. He has played in five games this season, making four starts, and has posted six tackles. Stewart missed four contests earlier in the year due to an ankle injury, then returned to action in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. He is coming off a season-best three tackles in Week 9 vs. Chicago. DE **Joseph Ossai** has three sacks through the first nine games of this season, including a nine-yard takedown of Lions QB Jared Goff in Week 5. He now has eight sacks over his last 16 games played dating back to Week 11 of the 2024 campaign. Originally a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, he missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just three games in the past three-plus seasons. He has 12.5 sacks and 12 TFLs in 56 career games (seven starts). Ossai was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has 1.5 sacks this season, including his first full sack of the year in Week 5 vs. Detroit. Murphy missed the early part of the 2024 season due to a knee injury, but returned to the lineup last October and has since played in 22 straight contests. In 39 career games, he has 61 tackles with five TFLs and 4.5 sacks. Murphy was a first-team All-ACC pick in his final season at Clemson University, where he amassed 17.5 career sacks in 38 games for the Tigers. Second-year DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** got in the sack column for the first time this season in Week 3 at Minnesota, notching 1.5 in the first half of that contest. A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, Jenkins played in 15 games with nine starts as a rookie last year. He logged 31 tackles with three sacks last season, and has recorded 24 stops (13 solos) and two TFLs through nine games this year. In his final season at the University of Michigan in 2023, he earned second-team All-America honors and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., was a four-time Pro Bowler during his 10-year playing career (2001-10) as a DT for Carolina and the N.Y. Jets. Fifth-year DE **Cam Sample** made his return to the field at the start of this season after missing the entire 2024 campaign due to an Achilles injury. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 55 career games as a rotational lineman and has 76 tackles with five sacks. He has played in eight games this season and has eight tackles with one TFL. He was inactive in Week 8 due to a knee injury. DT **McKinnley Jackson**, a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, played in 13 games as a rookie last season after beginning the year on Reserve/Injured due to a knee injury. He contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He was a two-time team captain at Texas A&M, where he played in 40 career games. He made his season debut in Week 5 vs. Detroit and has been inactive for six games and active/DNP in two others this season. The Bengals acquired DT **Jordan Jefferson** on waivers from San Francisco prior to Week 5. Originally a fourth-round draft pick of Jacksonville in 2024, Jefferson saw limited action for the Jaguars (2024) and 49ers ('25). He made his Bengals debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago. Jefferson finished his college career at Louisiana State in 2023, following four seasons ('19-22) at West Virginia University. DE **Cedric Johnson**, a sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, began this season on the Reserve/Injured list for the first eight games due to a calf injury. In his rookie

season, he appeared in nine games and logged six tackles with one sack. He saw his first action of this season in Week 9 vs. Chicago and logged one tackle.

Linebackers: Rookie LB **Demetrius Knight Jr.** was selected by the Bengals in the second round of this year's draft and has started eight of his first nine career games. His 68 tackles currently lead all NFL rookies this season and are tied for the team lead. He also has four PDs and an INT, with his first career pick coming on Monday Night Football in Week 4 at Denver. He has registered 10 or more tackles in three games this season, led a career-best 12 stops in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. Knight shot up draft boards following a breakout season at the University of South Carolina in 2024, in which he played in 13 games and ranked second on the Gamecocks with 82 tackles. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. He was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB early in his college career. Fellow rookie **Barrett Carter** is coming off his fourth career start in Week 9 vs. Chicago. Cincinnati's fourth-round draft pick this past April, Carter has played in all nine games and has 54 tackles, the fourth-most among all rookies. He led the Bengals with a career-high 12 tackles in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. In his final season at Clemson last year, he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC pick, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). Eighth-year LB **Oren Burks** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. He was a key performer for the Eagles during their postseason run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. He has played in all nine games with four starts for the Bengals this season and has 18 total tackles with one TFL, one PD and one FF. He is coming off a season-high five tackles in Week 9 vs. Chicago. LB **Joe Giles-Harris** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in April, after spending one week on the team's practice last season. In his NFL career, he has seen action in 24 games, totaling 20 tackles, one sack and 13 special teams stops. Giles-Harris was originally a college free agent signee of the Jaguars in 2019, and had stints with Jacksonville (2019-20, '24), Buffalo ('21-22) and New England ('23-24). He made his 2025 season debut in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and has seen action in two games this season, recording three special teams tackles. Fourth-year LB **Brian Asamoah II** was signed to the active roster on Monday, after joining the Bengals' practice squad on Oct. 30. He was elevated from the practice squad to the active roster for the Week 9 contest against Chicago and lined up for 19 special teams snaps. He spent his first three pro seasons (2022-24) with Minnesota, where he totaled 20 defensive tackles, two FFs and one FR in 46 games played, then was on Las Vegas' practice squad to begin this season.

Cornerbacks: Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2022, **Dax Hill** spent his first two seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. He started the first five games of last season at CB, then suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 5. He returned to full participation this past training camp and has started all nine games this season. He leads the team's CBs with 55 tackles (36 solos), including a TFL, while also recording two PDs and an INT. A natural athlete who lined up at several positions in the secondary during his career at the University of Michigan (2019-21), Hill primarily contributed on special teams throughout his 2022 rookie season before starting all 17 contests at safety in '23. CB **DJ Turner II** is enjoying a breakout campaign in his third pro season, as he currently leads the NFL with a career-high 14 PDs. Five of those were recorded in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph in 2009. After missing the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, Turner opened this year with his first career INT to help seal the Week 1 win at Cleveland late in the fourth quarter. He hauled in his second pick of the year in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, as he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf in the final minute of the first half. Turner originally was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2023 and has played in 37 career games with 26 starts. He was a teammate of Hill's at Michigan, and ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine (4.26 seconds). Cincinnati's second-round draft choice in 2022 was **Cam Taylor-Britt**, who has played in 46 regular-season games with 40 starts in his career. He had a career-high 16 PDs in 2024, which led the Bengals and tied for fifth-most in the NFL, along with three INTs. He broke out during the 2023 campaign with four picks (tied for seventh in NFL) and 11 PDs in just 12 games played. Taylor-Britt has posted 17 tackles, including a TFL, and five PDs in seven games played this season. CB **Josh Newton**, who the Bengals selected in the fifth round of the 2024 draft, earned a roster spot out of

his rookie training camp and has played in 26 consecutive games to begin his career. He was thrust into the starting lineup last season following Turner's shoulder injury and started the final six contests, and that stretch included his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee. He has started two contests this season and has 10 total tackles (eight solos). Newton spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. The Bengals acquired **Marco Wilson** on waivers from New England last November, adding depth and experience to the CB room. Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons (2021-23) with Arizona, before being waived by the Cardinals and signed by the Patriots in December of '23. He has played in 63 career regular-season games with 37 starts, and his career totals include 20 PDs and three INTs. He played in each of Cincinnati's final six games last season, and made his 2025 debut in Week 3 at Minnesota. He has recorded two tackles in three games played this season. **DJ Ivey** made his return midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals, he carved out a role on special teams and showed flashes on defense prior to the injury. He played in 11 games last season and has seen action in all nine contests this year. He has five special teams tackles this season, and sealed the Week 7 win over Pittsburgh when he knocked down a Hail Mary attempt as time expired.

Safeties: **Geno Stone** has started all 26 games he has played in for the Bengals since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason. He led Cincinnati with four INTs last year (tied for 10th in NFL), which included a stretch of three straight games with a pick from Weeks 14-16. He recorded his first pick of this season in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he ended the Packers' opening drive by intercepting QB Jordan Love inside the red zone. Stone spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the AFC. His 12 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the fourth-most in the NFL. He has 58 tackles with one sack through nine games this year. His fellow starting safety, **Jordan Battle**, leads the team with three INTs. His first two INTs came in the first two games of the season, as he became the first Bengals player to start a year with picks in back-to-back games since former CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. Battle also is tied for the team lead in tackles with 68 this season, highlighted by a career-best 12 stops in the opener at Cleveland. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, he has played in 43 career games (22 starts), and has 190 tackles along with five picks. He was a team captain and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). Fourth-year pro **Tycen Anderson** is a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two seasons, with eight in 2023 followed by 11 in '24, and his team-leading 13 ST stops this season are tied for fourth-most in the NFL. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. **PJ Jules** cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. Jules led the Bengals with 10 solo tackles this past preseason. He has nine special teams tackles and two defensive stops, including a TFL, through nine regular-season games.

Special Teams: A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, **K Evan McPherson** owns the fourth-highest career FG percentage in team history (81.67). He is 13-for-16 on FG attempts this season and recently tied his single-game career high with four FGs on four attempts in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. His final kick against the Steelers was a 36-yard game-winner with seven seconds left. He has 25 career made FGs from 50 or more yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for the eighth-most in the NFL since the start of his 2021 rookie season. McPherson has been operating at full health through the first eight games of 2025, after missing the final five contests of last season due to a groin injury. Second-year P **Ryan Rehkow** compiled a record-setting rookie season in 2024 that saw him set Bengals single-season marks for gross punting average (49.11 yards per punt) and net average (42.92). His net average ranked sixth among all NFL punters last year, while his gross ranked ninth (both led all rookies). He was named to the 2024 Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team. In his career debut in the 2024 opener against New England, he set an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per punt (four punts for 258 yards). This season, he leads the NFL in gross average (52.8 yards) and is tied for eighth in net average (42.7). Rookie **William Wagner** earned the role as the Bengals' long snapper coming out of this past training camp, and through his first

nine career games he has recorded 77 snaps without an unplayable delivery. He spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannelly Award (nation's top LS). WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. He is coming off a Week 9 performance against Chicago in which he ran back the opening kickoff 98 yards for a TD and finished the day with a career-best 179 yards on four KORs. It marked his third career TD on a return, as he previously found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of 2023 vs. Baltimore, and had a 100-yard KOR in

Week 7 of '24 at Cleveland. He is one of two players in Bengals history with a TD via both kickoff and punt return, alongside former CB Lemar Parrish. Jones has 32 KORs for 916 yards (28.6 average) in his career, while also contributing 45 PRs for 437 yards (9.7). Also in the mix to return kickoffs and punts is second-year WR **Jermaine Burton**, who took over KOR responsibilities late last season following an injury to Jones. Burton had 13 KORs for 378 yards in 2024 (29.1 average), including two 38-yarders. He logged four KORs for 84 yards this past preseason, as well as two PRs for 35 yards. HB **Samaje Perine** has returned 15 kickoffs this season for 381 yards (25.4), including a season-long 38-yarder in Week 9 vs. Chicago. While playing for Kansas City last season, he had five KORs for 163 yards (32.6).

Cincinnati Bengals 17, Cleveland Browns 16 Sunday, Sept. 7, 2025 at Huntington Bank Field

The Bengals' defense recorded two takeaways in the second half and held Cleveland scoreless on its final six possessions to lead the way in a season-opening victory. Cincinnati's offense was limited to 141 net yards, the second-fewest in a win in team history, but it scored a TD on two of its first three drives to build a 14-10 halftime lead. The Browns pulled ahead with a TD in the third quarter but missed the PAT attempt, and a 35-yard FG by Bengals K Evan McPherson later in the period regained the lead for Cincinnati. Cleveland drove inside the red zone with under five minutes remaining in regulation, but K Andre Szmyt's try for a 36-yard go-ahead FG sailed wide right. The Browns forced a quick Bengals punt and once again were driving for the win, before CB DJ Turner II came up with his first career INT on a ball that ricocheted off a Cleveland WR. P Ryan Rehkow then delivered a punt that was downed at the Browns' one-yard line, securing the win for Cincinnati.

In a high-scoring, nationally televised matchup which saw the two offenses combine for 866 net yards, the Bengals put together a late drive to set up K Evan McPherson's 36-yard game-winning FG on Thursday Night Football. It marked the third regular-season game in NFL history between two starting QBs over 40 years old, as Joe Flacco, 40, passed for 342 yards and three TDs for the Bengals while Aaron Rodgers, 41, had 249 yards and four passing TDs for the Steelers. Flacco leaned heavily on WR Ja'Marr Chase, who finished with a Bengals-record 16 receptions for 161 yards and a TD. The Steelers took the lead with 2:21 remaining when Rodgers found TE Pat Freiermuth for a 68-yard TD, but Flacco engineered a quick drive down the field and connected on a 28-yard pass to WR Tee Higgins to get inside McPherson's range. Cincinnati picked off Rodgers twice in the second quarter and scored 17 points late in the period to pull ahead at halftime. The Bengals' offense also was aided by a strong rushing attack, led by HB Chase Brown's 9.8 yards per carry. Cincinnati improved to 3-4, while Pittsburgh fell to 4-2.
