Kickoff: 8:15 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air nationally on ABC-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WCPO-TV (Ch. 9) in Cincinnati, WKEF-TV (Ch. 22) in Dayton and WTVQ-TV (Ch. 36) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Joe Buck (play-by-play), Troy Aikman (analyst) and Lisa Salters (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

In addition, the game will air nationally on Westwood One Radio. Broadcasters are Kevin Harlan (play-by-play) and Kurt Warner (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals look to snap a three-game losing skid when they face the Dallas Cowboys at AT&T Stadium on Monday Night Football.

Each of Cincinnati's past three losses have come by a margin of one possession, with the most recent being a 44-38 setback in Week 13 against Pittsburgh. The Bengals fell behind by 17 points early in the fourth quarter after the Steelers strip-sacked QB Joe Burrow and returned the fumble to the end zone, but Burrow and the offense engineered two late touchdown drives to pull within six. Cincinnati's onside kick following the second score was recovered by Pittsburgh, and a third-down conversion with under two minutes left sealed the result.

As the Bengals turn the page to the final five games of their season, head coach Zac Taylor acknowledged the frustrations that come with a 4-8 record. But the opportunity still remains for Cincinnati to string together wins down the stretch, beginning with Monday night's matchup at Dallas.

"I think it's normal for emotions to run high, but at the same time we've just got to take accountability for anything we can and stick together," Taylor said. "We've got to get ourselves some momentum. That's three games in a row now that have all been one-possession games. We haven't done enough to earn the win. It's as simple as that. It's nobody else's fault but our own. So now, there's still opportunity in front of us to get some momentum for ourselves."

A cause for optimism in the Bengals locker room heading into the final stretch comes from the team's offensive production. Cincinnati boasts the NFL's top-ranked passing offense (264.3 yards per game) and has scored 27 or more points in each of its last four outings. Burrow enters Week 14 leading the league in several passing categories, including yards (3337) and TDs (30), while WR Ja'Marr Chase is in the midst of another Pro Bowl caliber season with an NFL-best 1142 receiving yards and career-high-tying 13 TDs.

The offensive stars have maintained that their statistics do little to mitigate the current losing streak. But for Burrow, Chase and other core members of a Bengals franchise that has enjoyed deep playoff runs in recent years, the next five games will chart the course for what lies beyond the 2024 campaign.

"This is a tough season," Burrow said. "The cornerstones of this organization are going to be remembered by more than just this season. We will be remembered by how we handled this. It's still an exciting opportunity to go out and play for this city and this team every week. That's something that I don't take for granted."

Cincinnati takes on a Dallas team that has won its past two games, both against NFC East Division opponents. The Cowboys are coming off their first home victory of the season, a 27-20 result over the N.Y. Giants on Thanksgiving.

The series: Dallas leads 10-4, including 7-1 in games played in Dallas. The Cowboys have won the last five meetings. The Bengals' most recent victory was a 26-3 victory at Cincinnati in 2004.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at movement on the Bengals' individual career records lists (regular season) that has occurred this season, as well as potential upcoming movement:

• QB Joe Burrow in Week 10 at Baltimore surpassed QB Jeff Blake (2221) for the fifth-most passing attempts in Bengals history. Burrow's current attempts total of 2341 is 876 shy of QB Carson Palmer (3217) for the fourth-most. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449) and Boomer Esiason (3564) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

• Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history. Burrow's current passing yardage total of 17,420 is 5274 shy of Palmer (22,694) for the fourth-most. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594) and Esiason (27,149) hold the top three spots.

• Burrow in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh recorded his 24th career game with 300 or more passing yards, which surpassed Esiason (23) for the second-most in team history. Dalton (28) has the team's most 300-yard passing games.

• WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh caught his 42nd receiving TD, which surpassed WR Eddie Brown (41) for the fifth-most in team history. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.

• Chase has 17 games with 100 or more receiving yards, one shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.

• DE Trey Hendrickson has 51.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 8.0 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

• K Evan McPherson has an 81.7 career FG percentage (94 made/115 attempts), the fourth-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8; 177/202), Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106), and Mike Nugent (81.8; 157/192).

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear black jerseys, white pants (orange stripes) and orange socks this week at Dallas. Cincinnati is 5-4 overall when wearing that combination, which was last featured in the team's home win over Las Vegas in Week 9 of this season.

Monday night's contest will be the first time the Bengals wear this combination as the visiting team, but the second instance of them wearing it in a game played away from home. Cincinnati also featured this combo in Super Bowl LVI, and although that game was played at SoFi Stadium in Inglewood, Calif., the AFC Champion Bengals were the designated home team.

The last time Cincinnati wore its black jersey on the road was Week 4 of this season, when it was matched with black pants (orange stripes) and black socks in a win at Carolina.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and the recently introduced orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance was in Week 8 of this season against Philadelphia.

However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their uniform lineup in 2024.

Individually vs. Cowboys: Here are cumulative regular-season offensive statistics for current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Cowboys (ordered by total games played):

The Bengals on MNF: This week's game marks the first ever Bengals-Cowboys matchup on Monday Night Football. Cincinnati's all-time MNF record is 14-27.

More MNF: Here's a further look at some history and milestones of the Bengals' MNF experience:

- **Most recent appearance:** The Bengals' most recent appearance on MNF was a Week 3 matchup earlier this season vs. Washington at Paycor Stadium. The Commanders won that contest, 38-33.
- **First appearance:** During the inaugural season of MNF, on Nov. 2, 1970, the Bengals lost 21-10 to Pittsburgh at Three Rivers Stadium. The loss dropped the Bengals to 1-6, but the game was pivotal. The Bengals won their final seven games to finish 8-6 and win the first AFC Central Division championship. It was the Bengals' first season in the NFL after two years in the AFL. The 1970 Bengals still are one of only four teams in NFL history to start 1-5 or worse after six games and make the playoffs. The other teams were the 2015

Kansas City Chiefs (started 1-5; was 11-5 Wild Card), the '18 Indianapolis Colts (1-5; 10-6 Wild Card) and the '20 Washington Football Team (1-5; 7-9 NFC East Division champs).

- **First home appearance:** On Nov. 17, 1975, the Bengals defeated Buffalo 33-24 at Riverfront Stadium. The win lifted Cincinnati to an 8-1 record, en route to an 11-3 season which holds the mark for best regular-season winning percentage (.786) in franchise history.
- **Most MNF regular-season appearances in a season:** For the Bengals, it has been three, in both 1978 and '89. The Bengals also were on MNF three times in 2007, but one game was in preseason.
- **Widest Bengals victory margin:** 21 points, in a 34-13 win at Cleveland on Oct. 22, 1990.

Memorable MNF wins: A 37-28 home win over Denver in 2014 arguably ranks as the most memorable Bengals Monday night victory. The Bengals upended an 11-3 opponent in the game, with a fourth-quarter comeback, and clinched a playoff berth. The Broncos led 28-27 after three periods, but WR Brandon Tate's 49-yard punt return set up a 23-yard Mike Nugent FG for a 30-28 lead, and CB Dre Kirkpatrick sealed the win with a 30-yard return of an intercepted Peyton Manning pass for a TD with 2:41 to play.

Another memorable MNF win came Nov. 17, 1975 at Riverfront Stadium, when QB Ken Anderson and the Bengals outdueled RB O.J. Simpson and the Buffalo Bills in an offensive showcase. The final score was 33-24. Simpson rushed for 197 yards and two TDs, but Anderson bombarded the Bills with 30 completions in 46 attempts for 447 yards, two TDs and no INTs. Overall, the game produced 57 first downs and 888 total net yards between the teams.

The 1975 win lifted the Bengals to an 8-1 record as they stormed toward an 11-3 mark that still rates as their best ever campaign for regular-season winning percentage (.786).

In 2020, the 14-point underdog Cincinnati pulled off an upset on Monday Night Football against visiting Pittsburgh, which entered the contest having won their last 11 games over the Bengals. Led by third-string QB Ryan Finley, the 2-10-1 Bengals posted 27 points on an 11-2 Steelers team which entered the contest allowing an NFL-low 18.2 points per game. Cincinnati was helped by three takeaways in the first half, and jumped out to a 17-0 lead at the break while holding Pittsburgh QB Ben Roethlisberger to just 19 passing yards, his fewest ever before halftime in 230 career starts. The Steelers came alive after the break with 17 second-half points, but the Bengals' run-heavy offense (41 rushes, 13 passes), coupled with multiple key defensive stops, helped Cincinnati hold on for the win.

On Dec. 4, 2023, in a thriller which included five ties and six lead changes, the visiting Bengals kept their playoff hopes alive when K Evan McPherson converted a game-winning 48-yard FG with 3:17 left in overtime. In just his second career start in place of injured Joe Burrow, QB Jake Browning completed 32 of 37 passes (86.5 percent; fifth-highest in team history) for 354 yards and one TD (and he rushed for 22 yards and another TD), with the memorable performance being highlighted by four completions in the extra period to move Cincinnati into FG range. The Bengals answered a pair of Jaguars TDs in the first half with two rushing scores from HB Joe Mixon, then grabbed their first lead early in the third quarter when Browning found WR Ja'Marr Chase down the left sideline for a 76-yard TD. Chase had 11 catches for 149 yards, while Mixon had 117 scrimmage yards (68 rushing, 49 receiving). Browning later was recognized as AFC Offensive Player of the Week.

Most memorable MNF loss: The most-remembered Monday night loss in Bengals history is considered by many to be the 50-34 shootout won by the Chargers at San Diego on Dec. 20, 1982.

The two clubs combined for 1102 net yards, the second-most in NFL history at the time. The Chargers had 661 and the Bengals 441.

QB Ken Anderson's 40 pass completions in that game still stand as the Bengals' all-time record, and his total of 416 passing yards still stands as tied for ninth-most in Bengals history. San Diego's Wes Chandler had 260 receiving yards (on 10 catches), still the most yards ever by a receiver against Cincinnati.

Most crucial MNF loss: The only time the Bengals played a Monday night game to close a season was on Christmas night, Dec. 25, 1989 at Minnesota.

The defending AFC Champion Bengals needed a win to secure a playoff berth, but the Vikings prevailed, 29-21. Cincinnati QB Boomer Esiason passed for 367 yards and three TDs, but he also suffered three INTs.

A MNF cancellation: The Bengals' 2022 MNF appearance on Monday Night Football — vs. Buffalo in Week 17 — was initially postponed and later canceled after Bills S Damar Hamlin suffered cardiac arrest and collapsed on the field at Paycor Stadium.

The incident occurred midway through the first quarter of the Jan. 2 contest, with Cincinnati holding a 7-3 lead and driving with the ball. Hamlin received immediate emergency attention on the field, then was taken to the University of Cincinnati Medical Center, where he spent the next six days before being transferred to the Buffalo General Medical Center to continue his recovery. He was discharged from the Buffalo medical facility on Jan. 11 and cleared to

continue his rehab at home. He made a full recovery and currently is on the Bills' active roster.

After Hamlin had been taken off the field by an ambulance, both teams left the field and the contest was postponed shortly thereafter. The status of the game remained uncertain in the following days until the NFL announced later that week on Thursday that it officially would be canceled. The Bengals and Bills, who each hosted their regular-season finale the following Sunday, were the only two teams in the league to officially play just 16 games in 2022.

Overall at night: In regular season, the Bengals are 28-57 at night, including 4-17 on Sunday night, 14-27 playing on Monday night, 10-9 on Thursday night, 0-1 on Friday night and 0-3 on Saturday night.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12

Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Mike McCarthy was named the ninth head coach in Dallas Cowboys franchise history on Jan. 8, 2020, and he has led the franchise to three consecutive playoff appearances for the first time since 1991-96. He also has won 12 games in each of the last three seasons — the first time Dallas posted 12-plus wins in three straight seasons since 1992-95. Dallas' 36 regular-season victories since 2021 are the second most in the NFL in that span, trailing only Kansas City (37).

Entering the 2024 season, along with 17 years of head-coaching experience and 13 additional years as an assistant coach in the NFL, McCarthy boasted a 167-102-2 regular-season coaching record following 13 seasons with the Green Bay Packers ('06-18) and four in Dallas ('20-23). His 167 victories as a head coach were the fifth-most wins (18th all-time) among active NFL coaches. His teams have qualified for the postseason 12 times, won six NFC North division titles, two NFC East division crowns, made four NFC Championship Game appearances and took home a Super Bowl XLV championship.

During his fourth season with Dallas in 2023, McCarthy led the Cowboys to a 12-5 record and an NFC East title. McCarthy took over play-calling duties in the 2023 offseason, and in his first season as the Cowboys' offensive play caller, Dallas led the NFL in points per game (29.9).

During his time in Green Bay (2006-18), McCarthy was known as a prolific offensive mind — and the primary play-caller. McCarthy's Packers offense finished fourth in the NFL in total offense and third in points per game through his tenure with the club. Behind the arm of Aaron Rodgers, the Packers were third in passing offense in that same span. McCarthy's nine playoff appearances overall are the most by a Packers coach since the NFL postseason began in 1933. With the victory over Dallas in the 2016 playoffs, McCarthy surpassed Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren for the most playoff victories in team history (10).

McCarthy played tight end at Baker University (Kan.), where he earned a degree in business administration. He was all-conference and a senior captain in 1986. He coached collegiately at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and Pittsburgh (1989-92). He has no pro playing experience.

McCarthy was born in Pittsburgh, Pa. on Nov. 10, 1963. He and his wife, Jessica, have five children.

Taylor vs. Cowboys: The Cowboys lead the series, 2-0.

Taylor vs. McCarthy: McCarthy leads the series, 2-0.

McCarthy vs. Bengals: McCarthy leads the series, 4-1 (including 2-1 as head coach of Green Bay and 2-0 as head coach of Dallas).

BENGALS NOTES

Bengals near 400th W: The Bengals enter Week 14 with 398 all-time wins in the regular season, just two shy of 400. The team has won 240 games at home and 158 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly Paul Brown Stadium).

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt is serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

Red zone offense clicking: The Bengals have scored a touchdown or a field goal on 37 consecutive drives that reached their opponent's 20-yard line, dating back to the third quarter of Week 1 vs. New England. It is the longest active streak in the NFL, and the longest streak by a Bengals team since they scored on 40 straight red zone trips from Week 14 of the 2005 season through Week 10 of 2006.

Cincinnati has scored a TD on 71.1 percent of its red zone drives this season (27 of 38), the second-highest rate in the NFL behind Baltimore (75.0). With 37 total scores (27 TDs, 10 FGs) on 38 possessions, Cincinnati's 97.4 red zone scoring percentage leads the league. The Bengals are the only team this year to come away with zero points on one or fewer trips to the red zone.

Over the past five games, the Bengals have scored a TD on 16 out of 21 red zone drives. They found the end zone on four of their five trips inside the 20 in Week 13 against the Steelers.

Fifteen TDs in four games: QB Joe Burrow has thrown for 15 TDs over Cincinnati's last four games, marking the most TD passes in a four-game span in Bengals history. The last NFL QB to record that many TD passes in a four-game stretch was Tom Brady, who also had 15 scoring tosses from Weeks 5-8 of the 2021 season while playing for Tampa Bay.

Burrow tied his career high with five TD passes in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, then followed up with four in Week 10 at Baltimore. With three more both in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers and Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, Burrow reached 30 TD passes on the season. He became the fourth player in NFL history to record 30-plus TD passes in three of his first five career seasons, joining former Miami QB Dan Marino, Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and Buffalo QB Josh Allen.

Burrow also is the first QB in Bengals history to pass for three or more TDs in four consecutive games. Tampa Bay QB Baker Mayfield accomplished that feat earlier this season in Weeks 5-8, but prior to that, the last NFL QB to record at least three TD passes in four straight contests was Dallas QB Dak Prescott in Weeks 3-6 of the 2021 campaign.

Week 13 against Pittsburgh marked Burrow's 22nd career game with three or more TD passes, which surpassed former St. Louis Rams QB Kurt Warner for the third-most such games in NFL history in player's first five seasons. The only players with more three-TD games within their first five years are Marino (33) and Mahomes (28).

Burrow reaches 125: QB Joe Burrow threw his 125th career TD pass (regular season) in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, when he completed a jump-pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase to put Cincinnati ahead in the second quarter. Playing in his 64th game, Burrow became the third-fastest QB in NFL history to record 125 TD passes. The only players to reach that mark in fewer games are Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (50) and former Miami QB Dan Marino (54).

The former No. 1 overall pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, before breaking out with a then-team-record 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By besting his record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

Burrow's 30 TD passes this season lead the league, and include a career-high five passing scores in two games — Week 5 vs. Baltimore and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He is the first NFL QB to pass for five or more TDs in multiple games in a season since Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and former Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady each had two such games in 2021.

Joe masters the deep ball: QB Joe Burrow's 42-yard TD pass to WR Tee Higgins in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers marked his 27th career scoring pass of 40 or more yards — the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020. It also surpassed Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (26) for the second-most such TD passes in a player's first five seasons by any QB whose career began after 1990. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning had more 40-plus yard TD passes in his first five years (28).

Burrow additionally leads the NFL in TD passes of 50 or more yards (18) and 60 or more yards (14) since 2020. Of his league-high eight TD passes of 40-plus yards this season, six have gone to WR Ja'Marr Chase. The most recent two came in Week 10 at Baltimore — a 67-yarder early in the third quarter and a 70-yarder midway through the fourth. The 70-yard bomb tied for the third-longest TD pass of Burrow's career, behind an 82-yarder to Chase in Week 7 of the 2021 season and a 72-yarder to Chase in Week 17 of that year.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22 and two in '23.

No. 9 hits 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone.

Burrow's current career total of 17,420 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least five fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Burrow leads the NFL with 3337 passing yards through 13 weeks this season. He has six career games with 400 or more passing yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for second-most leaguewide since 2020.

Burrow makes history: In the Bengals' Week 10 and Week 11 contests, Joe Burrow became the first QB in NFL history to record at least 50 passing attempts, 350 passing yards and three TD passes with zero INTs in consecutive games.

In Week 10 at Baltimore, Burrow posted season highs in attempts (56), completions (34) and yards (428) while throwing four TDs. His 56 attempts were the second-most in a game in his career, trailing a career-high 61 in Week 2 of his 2020 rookie season at Cleveland. His 428 passing yards were the fourth-most he has ever thrown and marked his sixth career game with more than 400.

Burrow's performance against the Ravens also was just the eighth time in NFL history in which a QB had at least 50 attempts, 400 passing yards and four TD passes with no INTs.

Burrow followed up by going 28 of 50 for 356 yards and three TDs in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. Each of his three TD passes and 245 of his passing yards came in the second half as he helped Cincinnati climb back from a 21-point deficit to tie the game.

Burrow on the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 67.92, he ranks second in NFL history in the category, narrowly trailing Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (68.01).

Burrow leads the NFL this season in passing attempts (446) and completions (302). He surpassed 2000 career attempts in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark were the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 throws behind former San Diego Chargers QB Brees (1444).

In Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, Burrow went 28 of 38 (73.7 percent), marking his 21st career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts. That tied Kansas City Patrick Mahomes for the most such games within a player's first five seasons in NFL history.

In Week 9 against Las Vegas, Burrow recorded his 1500th career completion in what was his 61st regular-season game. That marked the second-fewest games in NFL history to reach 1500 completions, trailing only L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (57).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; min. 14 att./game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414).

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is the only NFL QB with at least 1000 completions, 100 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.5; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking third in TD passes (114), fifth in passing yards (14,732), fifth in completions (1326) and seventh in yards per attempt (7.61).

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase leads the NFL this season in receiving yards (1142) and receiving TDs (13), while also tying for second in receptions (79). He caught his 42nd career receiving TD (regular season) in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, which tied former New England Patriots TE Rob

Gronkowski for the fourth-most in league history in a player's first four years. It also moved Chase into sole possession of the fifth-most receiving TDs in a career in Bengals history, as he surpassed former WR Eddie Brown (41).

Chase eclipsed 1000 receiving yards this season in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. He became just the sixth player in NFL history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns, joining former Minnesota WR Randy Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green, Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans, former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas and Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson.

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 85.25 receiving yards per game (57 regular-season games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history among all players with at least 3000 yards, trailing only Jefferson (96.35) and former Detroit WR Calvin Johnson (86.07).

With one more reception, Chase would become the first player in NFL history to record at least 80 catches, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving touchdowns in each of his first four years. He also enters Week 14 at Dallas with 4859 career receiving yards, 141 shy of 5000. Should he reach that mark in what will be his 58th game, he would tie Thomas for the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to record 5000 receiving yards.

Chase milestones in '24: The 2024 season has produced several career milestones for WR Ja'Marr Chase, beginning in Week 4 at Carolina when he surpassed 4000 career receiving yards. Playing in his 49th regular-season game, he became the fastest player in Bengals history to reach that mark.

The Week 5 contest against Baltimore was Chase's 50th career game played. His 4210 receiving yards following that game went in as the fifth-most in NFL history through a player's first 50 games, while his 297 receptions in that span ranked as the ninth-most ever. He also became just the fifth player in the Super Bowl era (since 1966) to record at least 4000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs in his first 50 games.

In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, Chase recorded his 300th career reception in what was his 51st game. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that milestone, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and tied for the eighth-fastest in NFL history.

Chase's most recent milestone came in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, when he caught his 40th career receiving TD. Playing in his 56th game, he became the fastest player in Bengals history and eighth-fastest in league history to reach that total.

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase has 12 career receiving TDs of 60 or more yards, five more than any other player since he entered the league in 2021 (regular season). It also is the most in a career in Bengals history, ahead of former WR Isaac Curtis (10), and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (13) and 40-plus yards (17) since 2021. In Week 10 at Baltimore, he scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards, becoming the first NFL player this season with two scores of 65-plus yards in a game.

Earlier this season, Chase had a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yard score in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He became the first NFL player to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games since former Dallas WR Terrell Owens in 2007.

Ja'Marr shines against Baltimore: WR Ja'Marr Chase caught 10 passes for 193 yards and two TDs in the Bengals' first matchup against the Ravens this season in Week 5, then followed up with 11 grabs for 264 yards and three scores in the Week 10 Thursday Night Football contest at Baltimore. His combined 457 receiving yards are the most in NFL history for one player against a single opponent in a season, surpassing former Raiders WR Art Powell's 428 yards against the Houston Oilers in 1963.

Chase's Week 10 performance is the highest single-game receiving yardage total by any NFL player this season, while his Week 5 output ranks third. Cleveland WR Jerry Jeudy's 235 yards in Week 13 are the second-most.

Combining his Week 10 effort with a Bengals-record 266 yards and three scores in Week 17 of the 2021 season against Kansas City, Chase is the first player in NFL history to record 250 or more receiving yards and three or more receiving TDs in multiple games in his career. He also is the first player ever to notch 260 or more receiving yards more than once.

Chase's 264 receiving yards in Week 10 also are the second-most in an NFL game played on a Thursday, behind Cleveland Rams receiver Jim Benton's 303 yards on Thursday, Nov. 22, 1945.

Chase now has four career games with at least 10 catches, 150 yards and two TDs — the most in NFL history within a player's first four seasons.

Tee time: WR Tee Higgins has been inactive for five games this season due to injuries (Weeks 1-2, Weeks 8-10), but in his seven games played he has proven to be one of the NFL's most productive pass catchers.

From Weeks 3-7, Higgins tied for seventh leaguwide in receptions (29), tied for eighth in receiving TDs (three) and ranked 10th in receiving yards (341). He returned to action in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers following a three-game hiatus and caught nine passes for a season-high 148 yards and a TD. His scoring catch was a 42-yarder on a fourth-down play late in the third quarter, which marked his longest reception since he had an 80-yard TD at Pittsburgh in Week 16 of last season. The Chargers game also was Higgins' 13th career 100-yard receiving performance.

Higgins followed up his showing in L.A. with five grabs for 69 yards and a TD in Week 13 against the Steelers. Each of his four non-touchdown catches resulted in a first down for Cincinnati, highlighted by a 31-yarder to convert a third-and-21 during a FG drive in the third quarter.

Higgins finished the Steelers game with 300 career receptions. Playing in his 65th regular-season game, he tied former WR Tyler Boyd for the fourth-fastest player in team history to reach 300 catches. He previously surpassed 4000 career receiving yards in Week 7 of this season at Cleveland, becoming the fifth-fastest Bengal ever to do so (63 games).

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 25 leaguwide in receiving yards (21st; 4242) and receiving TDs (T-19th; 29). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Holiday Higgins: WR Tee Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 13 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (11), sixth in receiving

yards (1297), 14th in receptions (83) and 14th in yards per reception (15.6) during the calendar's final month.

Higgins' single-game career high both for receptions (12) and receiving yards (194) came on Dec. 26, 2021, in a home win over Baltimore. He had two TDs that day, the first of which was set up by a 52-yard Higgins catch earlier in the drive. Previously in that same month, he caught nine passes for 138 yards and a TD on Dec. 5, 2021 against the L.A. Chargers.

Higgins' top statistical performance of last season occurred in Week 16 at Pittsburgh on Dec. 23, when he hauled in five catches for 140 yards and a TD. His 28.0 yards per reception were the second-most in any game of his career, and included a career-long 80-yard TD in the third quarter.

Higgins' notable production late in the year also has carried beyond December, as he ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457). He has two 100-yard receiving performances in the postseason, with 103 in the AFC Championship at Kansas City following the 2021 season and 100 two weeks later in Super Bowl LVI.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson's 11.5 sacks this season lead the NFL through 13 weeks of regular-season play. With this year's tally following up his 17.5 sacks during the 2023 season, he is the first Bengals player to record double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980 and '81.

Since signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, Hendrickson has 51.0 sacks, the fourth-most in the NFL in that span behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (56.5), Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (56.0) and San Francisco DL Nick Bosa (51.5). He has 11 multi-sack games as a member of the Bengals, tied for the third-most leaguwide since 2021.

Hendrickson has led Cincinnati in sacks and been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his three full seasons with the team (2021-23). He logged 14.0 sacks in his debut Bengals season in 2021, which ranked fifth in the NFL, then followed up with eight more in '22. His career-high 17.5 sacks last year tied for second in the NFL and ranked second in Bengals single-season history, trailing only DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson recorded two sacks in back-to-back games earlier this season (Weeks 6-7), becoming the first Cincinnati player to do so since former DE Antwan Odom in Weeks 1-2 of the 2009 campaign.

The Florida Atlantic University product spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with New Orleans, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL.

Hendrickson's production for the Bengals was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

Hendrickson wrecks the Raiders: DE Trey Hendrickson earned his second career AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor in Week 9, when he recorded a career-high four sacks in the win over Las Vegas. It marked the second-most sacks in any NFL game this season behind Detroit DL Aidan Hutchinson's 4.5 in Week 2 against Tampa Bay.

Hendrickson became the fourth player in Bengals history to record four or more sacks in a game, and the first since former DE Antwan Odom had five on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay. Odom's total is tied for the team single-game record with former DE/DT Eddie Edwards, who notched five sacks on Dec. 21, 1980 against Cleveland.

Three of Hendrickson's four sacks against the Raiders came during the fourth quarter, including a strip-sack that led to a recovery by Bengals LB Logan Wilson. The play marked Hendrickson's 10th forced fumble since joining the Bengals during the 2021 offseason, which are tied for the second-most in the NFL in that span.

Hendrickson's previous single-game high for sacks was 2.5, which he recorded twice — in Week 3 of the 2022 season at the N.Y. Jets, and in Week 5 of '23 at Arizona.

LB duo stuffs the stat sheet: Sixth-year pro Germaine Pratt ranks eighth in the NFL with 110 tackles this season, while his fellow starting LB Logan Wilson is tied for 11th with 104 stops.

Each player also has contributed to three takeaways this season, with Wilson logging one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. His two FRs — the first two of his career — came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He then forced a fumble on the opening play of the fourth quarter in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, which was recovered by S Geno Stone and set up Cincinnati’s game-tying TD drive. Pratt had a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City, setting up a Bengals FG drive before halftime. He recovered another loose ball in overtime of Week 5 vs. Baltimore, then the following week at the N.Y. Giants he grabbed his first INT of the year deep in Cincinnati territory.

Wilson in Week 11 eclipsed the 100-tackle mark for the third straight season (third time in career). His career-high 135 stops during the 2023 campaign were the most by a Cincinnati defender since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in ’13. Since entering the NFL in 2020, Wilson is one of three players leaguewide with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith and Baltimore CB Marlon Humphrey.

Pratt also posted a career high in tackles last season with 118. He has 14 career games with 10 or more stops, including three this season — Week 2 at Kansas City (career-high 16), Week 7 at Cleveland (13) and Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh (13).

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since ’20: LB Logan Wilson’s 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2020. He had four picks last season, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh leaguewide.

A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson opened his career with two picks in his 2020 rookie campaign, then followed up with four in ’21. That 2021 total marked the most in a season by a Bengals LB since Odell Thurman had five INTs in 2005.

Wilson additionally wears the “green dot” as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the ’27 season.

Rehchow on a run: Through 13 weeks of regular-season play, rookie P Ryan Rehchow ranks sixth the NFL in net punting average (44.0 net yards per punt) and ninth in gross average (49.9). He has punted 41 times for 2047 yards, with 21 downed inside the opponents’ 20-yard line compared to four touchbacks.

Rehchow kicked off his career with a historic debut on Sept. 8 vs. New England, when he logged four punts for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four attempts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole on Nov. 5, 2023. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehchow’s second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers).

In Weeks 5-7, Rehchow became the first punter in Bengals history to have four punts downed inside the opponents’ 20-yard line in three consecutive games. He amassed season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in

Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehchow signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

McPherson from deep: K Evan McPherson knocked through a 56-yard FG in the third quarter of Week 4 at Carolina, extending his Bengals record to 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards. It also tied for the fifth-longest FG in team history, with McPherson owning five of the top six on that list.

McPherson’s 24 such FGs are the fourth-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021. He finished the 2023 campaign with 21 FGs from 50-plus yards, the most in NFL history in a player’s first three seasons.

McPherson’s overall career FG percentage of 81.7 (94 of 115) ranks fourth in Bengals history (minimum 75 attempts) behind former kickers Shayne Graham (86.8), Randy Bullock (84.9) and Mike Nugent (81.8). He surpassed 100 career attempts in Week 3 vs. Washington, and his 84 made FGs at the time he reached that mark were the third-most through a Bengals kicker’s first 100 tries.

McPherson also has seven career game-winning “walk-off” FGs, including two last season — in OT of Week 13 at Jacksonville, and again in OT of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. However, his two most notable such kicks came during the 2021 postseason, when he hit a 52-yarder in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and followed up a week later with a 31-yarder in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City that sent Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson is a perfect 19 of 19 in seven career postseason games and is the team’s all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points).

Cincinnati signed McPherson to a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18, securing its kicker through the 2027 season.

Pro Bowl three-peats: WR Ja’Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis (’73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth (’81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 which tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Three listed on “Top 100”: For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja’Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of “Top 100” that three or more Bengals players were featured.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 22 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 13 highest-attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest announced crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15.

Cincinnati's game against Philadelphia in Week 8 of this season had an announced attendance figure of 67,239, which now stands as the second-largest in team history. The Bengals' 2023 Week 9 victory over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football (66,965) ranks as the third-largest, and the following week's game vs. Houston (66,526) is the fourth-largest. The fifth-largest figure in team history is 66,399 for the Bengals' Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore in January of 2023.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor:

The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor this season in former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the ROH during a ceremony in the Week 3 game vs. Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; '22), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). Through 13 weeks this season, Burrow leads the league in passing attempts (446), completions (302), passing yards (3337) and TD passes (30), while ranking fourth in passer rating (107.4). He passed for 309 yards and three TDs with an INT in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, and in the process became the third-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 125 career TD passes (64 games). His 15 scoring passes since Week 9 are the most in a four-game span in Bengals history. Burrow has moved closer to several Bengals career records this season, as he has surpassed former QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most passing attempts and fifth-most passing yards in team history. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, he capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a quarterback in team history, a 47-yarder to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time in 2023, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Browning has seen action in two games this season, taking late snaps to close out Week 8 vs. Philadelphia and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas.

Running backs: Second-year HB **Chase Brown** leads Cincinnati this season in rushing attempts (152) and yards (677), and his eight total TDs since Week 4 (six rushing, two receiving) are tied for the fifth-most among all NFL running backs in that span. Used both as a high-volume runner and a viable pass catching option, Brown is coming off his third game this season with 100-plus yards from scrimmage in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He rushed for 70 yards on 12 carries and a TD against the Steelers, including a season-long 40-yard run that set up his first-quarter score, and added three catches for 30 yards. He enjoyed perhaps his best game as a pro in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, setting career highs in rushing attempts (27), rushing yards (120) and scrimmage yards (137), while also catching a Burrow TD pass. Brown scored his first two career rushing

TDs in Week 4 at Carolina, then two weeks later sealed the win over the N.Y. Giants with a 30-yard run to the end zone late in the fourth quarter. Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, Brown is averaging 4.5 yards per carry and has a team-best 17 runs of 10-plus yards. Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in the 2023 draft, Brown spent four games on the Reserve/Injured list midway through his rookie season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to post 322 yards from scrimmage over the final six contests. Cincinnati acquired HB **Khalil Herbert** in a trade with Chicago on Nov. 5. A fourth-year pro, Herbert played in 48 regular-season games (12 starts) for the Bears and rushed for 1791 yards on 372 carries with nine TDs. He showcased his versatility with 45 catches for 291 yards, along with a 25.0-yard kickoff return average on 33 attempts. He took his first carry as a Bengal for 14 yards in the first half of the Week 13 contest against Pittsburgh. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in 2023, and now shares that responsibility with Brown as the Bengals approach the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, and caught 15 passes for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average), and he played seven offensive snaps in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas as an extra pass protector.

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, leads the NFL this season in receiving yards (1142) and receiving TDs (13), while tying for second in receptions (79). He paced Cincinnati in all three of those categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons, and he is one of six players in league history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns. A constant downfield threat, Chase also has the NFL's most TD catches of 40 or more yards (17), 50 or more yards (13) and 60 or more yards (12) since he entered the league in 2021. He scored his 13th TD of the season in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, which matched his career high set in his 2021 rookie campaign and also tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history. He has three 100-yard receiving games on the year, highlighted by a 264-yard, three-TD performance in Week 10 at Baltimore. Higgins ranks second on the team this season in catches (43) and receiving yards (558) while tying for second in receiving TDs (five), despite missing six games due to injuries. He returned from a three-game absence in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers and posted a season-high 148 yards and a TD on nine receptions, then followed up with five catches for 69 yards and another score in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He recorded his 300th career reception in the Steelers game, tying for the fourth-fastest player in Bengals history to reach that mark. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds,

Higgins has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then posted 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andrei Iosivas** has contributed key plays in all areas of the field early in his career, but his most notable work comes in the low red zone. Each of his nine career receiving TDs have come on passes from inside the opponent's 10-yard line. He has five scoring grabs this season, with the most recent being a three-yarder from Burrow late in the fourth quarter of Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. Fellow 2023 draftee **Charlie Jones** has primarily contributed as a punt and kickoff returner, but he also has eight career receptions for 69 yards as a reserve WR. He has missed the past four games due to a groin injury, after suiting up in each of the first eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals selected **Jermaine Burton** in the third round of the 2024 draft, adding a proven downfield threat at the college level. Burton has played in 10 games as a rookie this season and made his first career start in Week 10 at Baltimore. His first two career receptions both went for over 40 yards — a 47-yarder in Week 2 at Kansas City and a 41-yarder in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia — and he also came through with a clutch grab to convert a third down against the Ravens. He spent the first two seasons of his collegiate career (2020-21) at the University of Georgia, then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two years. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while pacing the Southeastern Conference in yards per reception (20.5). Burton led the NFL this past preseason with 157 receiving yards. Cincinnati added depth to the receiver room when it acquired **Isaiah Williams** on waivers from Detroit on Nov. 8. A rookie out of the University of Illinois, Williams originally signed with the Lions as a college free agent in May and played in two games earlier this season, totaling two catches for six yards while returning one kickoff for 36 yards. He earned first-team All-Big 10 honors last season at Illinois, when he led the conference during the regular season with 82 receptions and ranked second with 1055 receiving yards. He made his Bengals debut in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, lining up for three offensive snaps and fair catching one punt.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 73 career games (45 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of the 2023 season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 91 career receptions for 680 yards and four TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample caught four passes for 14 yards in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, including a two-yard TD reception on a third-and-goal play in the second half. The Bengals brought in a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last year. He has played in all 12 games in his debut Bengals season (three starts), and leads the team's tight ends in catches (39), receiving yards (436) and receiving TDs (two). He enjoyed perhaps his best day in stripes during the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, as he caught five passes for 100 yards and his first two TDs of the year. His second TD, a 47-yarder to help seal the win in the fourth quarter, was the second-longest reception of his career. That performance also marked his first 100-yard receiving game since Week 6 of the 2021 season. He played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted seven catches for 91 yards, then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, Gesicki challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. He topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** scored his first TD of the season in Week 10 at Baltimore, bringing in a three-yard pass to give Cincinnati the lead just before halftime. He tied his career high with six receptions against the Ravens, and his 42 yards were the fifth-most in a game in his career. He played in his 50th career game in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and had two catches for 14 yards, including an 11-yarder to convert a fourth down on the Bengals' first possession. Hudson began the 2023 campaign on the Bengals' practice squad,

then was signed to the active roster in November of last year and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in receptions (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played in 2023, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals selected **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round of this year's draft. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He has been inactive for each of the first 12 regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown. Fellow rookie **Cam Grandy** spent the first 10 weeks of the regular season on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster on Nov. 15. He made his NFL debut as a practice squad elevation in Week 10 at Baltimore and recorded his first career reception (no gain), then made his first career start in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. A product of Illinois State University, Grandy led all Missouri Valley Football Conference TEs with 63 catches for 612 yards and three TDs in 2023. He spent his first five collegiate seasons at Missouri Western State University, but only played in three, and recorded 57 receptions for 601 yards and six TDs in 31 games.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 48 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 3153 of a possible 3172 offensive snaps in that time (99.4 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who signed in 2023 and started 25 straight games to begin his Bengals career. He missed three games this season (Weeks 9-11) due to a knee/fibula injury, but made his return in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh and lined up for every offensive play. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with Baltimore, then played two years ('21-22) with Kansas City. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. G **Cody Ford** has started each of the last four games, lining up at LOT in Weeks 9-11 and LG in Week 13. A sixth-year pro out of the University of Oklahoma, he has played in 78 career games with 38 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, nine at LG, two as a third TE and three at LOT. He signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and played in all 17 games last season, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He was inactive for Cincinnati's first two regular-season games due to a pectoral injury sustained during preseason, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 and has started each of the past nine contests. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. **Cordell Volson** started 47 straight games (including postseason) at LG to begin his Bengals career. A 2022 fourth-round pick of Cincinnati, he lined up for every offensive snap during that streak. He has settled in at LG as a pro, after lining up at guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals' final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft was seventh-round C **Matt Lee**. Lee played in 51

games during his college career, spending his first four years (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He earned second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16). Lee has contributed primarily on special teams through 12 games this season, but he also has lined up for 14 offensive snaps over the past six contests. The most recent addition to the O-Line is OT **Devin Cochran**, who was signed to the active roster on Nov. 29. Cochran spent the first 12 weeks of this season on Cincinnati's practice squad, jumping to the active roster as a standard elevation for Games 9-11. He joined the team's practice squad in 2022, then missed the entire '23 season with a knee injury. He started all 44 games of his college career at LOT, playing four years at Vanderbilt University before spending his final season at Georgia Tech.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who currently leads the NFL with 11.5 sacks through 13 weeks of regular-season play. He posted a career-high four sacks in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, which tied for the third-most in a game in team history and was the most since former DE Antwan Odom in 2009. A 2021 free agency acquisition of the Bengals, Hendrickson led the team in sacks and earned a Pro Bowl nod in each of his three full seasons in Cincinnati. He posted a career-high 17.5 sacks last year, which tied for second in the league and went in as the second-most in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 64.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — his final season with New Orleans — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (71.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (68.0). On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has 38.5 career sacks, the fourth-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons. He has 38 total tackles through 12 games this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, and then a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone. He grabbed his first career INT and logged his second sack of the season in Week 7 at Cleveland. Hubbard played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 10 at Baltimore. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 49 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 14 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 13 passes at the line of scrimmage. He sustained a hamstring injury in Week 2 at Kansas City that caused him to miss the next two games, but he returned to action in Week 5 and has started each of the past eight contests. Hill posted a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and he also deflected a pass by QB Daniel Jones that led to LB Germaine Pratt's INT in the first quarter. He is coming off his first sack of the season in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, as he took down QB Russell Wilson for a three-yard loss in the fourth quarter. Ninth-year veteran DT **Sheldon Rankins** has played in seven games (all starts) in his first Bengals season, after joining the team as an unrestricted free agent during the spring. He has been inactive for the past two contests with an illness and missed Weeks 3-5 due to a hamstring injury, but when healthy has contributed 18 tackles with one sack. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, Rankins spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 30.5 career sacks and 44 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in any season of his career. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. He recorded his first sack of this season in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, then followed it up with his second in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, Ossai has played in 42 career regular-season games and totaled 55 tackles with 6.5 sacks. He was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins recorded his first NFL sack in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, and most recently posted a season-high six tackles in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He missed the first two games of the season due to a thumb injury, then made his pro debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. He made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' game-

opening drive. Jenkins was a team captain at Michigan and earned second-team All-America honors last season, while helping lead the Wolverines to a national championship. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has recorded 15 tackles and a PD in eight games played this season, after spending the first four weeks on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last year, tallying 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons (2020-22) at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinnley Jackson**, who also missed the first four contests of this season with a knee injury, made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He has seen action on 140 defensive snaps over the past eight games, and recorded a season-best three tackles in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2024 out of Texas A&M, Jackson totaled 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks in 40 career games as an Aggie, and served as a captain in two seasons. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has seen action in five games as a rookie, with a season-high 13 defensive snaps played in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention.

Linebackers: A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Logan Wilson** has developed into one of the NFL's top linebackers and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengal player since LB Vontaze Burfitt had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. He ranks tied for 11th in the NFL this season with 104 tackles, and recorded his first two career fumble recoveries in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas. Wilson's first forced fumble of the season came early in the fourth quarter of Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers and set up a game-tying TD drive for the Bengals. He missed the Week 13 contest vs. Pittsburgh with a knee injury. The team's starting LB tandem features Wilson and sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt**, who has set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons and has a knack for creating game-changing takeaways. Since the start of the 2021 season, he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 83 of 91 career regular-season games played, with a current streak of 73 consecutive starts (including postseason). His 110 total tackles through 13 weeks this season rank eighth leaguewide, and he has contributed to three takeaways with a pair of fumble recoveries and an INT. Pratt was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career. Also wearing a captain's patch for the first time this year is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 66 games with six starts for the Bengals. He serves primarily as a core special teamer, but also has 32 tackles with two TFLs and two PDs this season as a rotational LB. He picked off Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City for his second career regular-season INT (first since 2020). Davis-Gaither made his sixth career start in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh and tied his career high with 13 tackles. He also has lined up for 276 special teams snaps through 12 games and has five ST tackles. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 37 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 37 career tackles and one PD in 50 games played. Bachie played 13 defensive snaps in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, after missing the Week 11 contest at the L.A. Chargers due to a hip injury. Among the most notable stories on Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27). He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for 276 special teams snaps through 12 regular-season games. He also has three defensive tackles, with two solo stops coming in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. The most recent addition to the active roster is LB **Shaka**

Heyward, who was signed off the team's practice squad on Monday. Heyward spent all of his 2023 rookie campaign and the first 13 weeks of this season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He was elevated to the active roster for the team's Week 11 game at the L.A. Chargers and lined up for 24 special teams snaps. Heyward signed with the Bengals as a college free agent during the 2023 offseason, following a five-year career ('18-22) at Duke University.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzing with 11.5 career sacks. He has 47 total tackles in 11 games played this season, missing Week 5 due to a knee injury. He notched five stops in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants and broke up a pass on a crucial fourth-down play early in the second half. He had seven tackles in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, and tied a career-high with three TFLs. In 2023, Hilton recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 33 of 34 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. His 12 PDs this season lead the team and are tied for fourth in the NFL, and he also has contributed 57 tackles and two INTs. His picks include a highlight-reel one-handed grab on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City, and a 51-yard pick-six to give Cincinnati a first-quarter lead in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Taylor-Britt missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice this year, **Josh Newton**, made the team out of training camp after recording nine tackles, two PDs and an INT in preseason. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of Newton after his name was called on the third day of the draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. He has played in all 12 games during his rookie campaign, and made his first career start in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. In addition to his 10 defensive tackles and three PDs, Newton has lined up for 181 special teams snaps and recorded two ST tackles. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to TCU from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups. Second-year pro **DJ Ivey** made his season debut in Week 7 at Cleveland, after spending the first six games on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury. He sustained the injury in Week 15 of the 2023 campaign against Minnesota, ending a promising rookie campaign in which he carved out a role as a special teams contributor and reserve defensive back. A 2023 seventh-round pick out of the University of Miami (Fla.), Ivey earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and played in eight games last season. The most recent addition to the secondary is fourth-year pro **Marco Wilson**, who the Bengals acquired on waivers from New England on Nov. 19. He made his Bengals debut in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh and played one defensive snap. A fourth-round draft pick of Arizona in 2021, Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons ('21-23) with the Cardinals before being waived and acquired by the Patriots last December. He suited up for 10 games with New England earlier this season, logging 15 tackles and a PD. In 55 total regular-season games (37 starts), he has recorded 174 tackles, 19 PDs, three INTs and three FFs.

Safeties: Among the notable additions in Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who recorded an AFC-leading seven INTs in his final season with Baltimore in '23. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 started 11 contests. He has already surpassed that total with 12 starts in his debut Bengals season, and his 65 tackles rank third on the team. He recorded a season-best nine stops in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, and contributed to a game-altering play early in the fourth quarter when he recovered a fumble deep in Bengals territory to set up a game-tying TD drive. Stone's first INT as a Bengal came in Week 7 at Cleveland, when he picked off QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson and returned it 49 yards in the fourth quarter. Second-year pro **Jordan Battle** made his first start of the

season in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He started seven contests as a rookie last season and ranked fifth on the team with 69 tackles. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Of his 35 tackles this season, 19 have come over the past four games, including a season-best 10 stops in Week 10 at Baltimore. Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 48 tackles through 12 games this season, and grabbed his first INT of the season (eighth of career) against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading 10 special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. He finished last season with a team-leading eight special teams stops, despite missing the final 10 contests. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, Anderson sat out his entire rookie year due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Dajahn Anthony** made the Bengals' roster out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 11 defensive snaps and 118 special teams snaps in 10 games played this season (inactive for Weeks 8 and 11). In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

Special teams: Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** ranks fourth on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (81.7 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times in his career. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history and the fourth-most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. McPherson's 28-yard FG midway through the second quarter in Week 3 vs. Washington marked his 100th career FG attempt, and his 84 made FGs to that point were the third-most in team history through a kicker's first 100 tries. He inked a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 389 attempts in 47 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through 12 games ranks sixth in the NFL in net punting average (44.0 net yards per punt) and ninth in gross average (49.9). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. He had four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard lines in three consecutive games (Weeks 5-7), becoming the first Bengals punter ever to do so in three straight contests. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for Week 7, after returning the opening kickoff at Cleveland 100 yards for a TD. It marked the second time in team history that the Bengals scored a TD on the game's opening kick, and it was the longest KOR in the NFL this season. Jones also had an 81-yard punt return for a TD in his 2023 rookie season. He has returned 14 punts this season for 99 yards, including a season-long 23-yarder against the Browns. Rookie WR **Jermaine Burton** has returned kicks for the Bengals over the past three games with Jones out of the lineup due to a groin injury. Burton has logged seven returns for 199 yards (28.4), including five for 146 in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Three of his KORs have gone for 30 or more yards.

Former Bengals QB Andy Dalton made his first return visit to Cincinnati and started for the Dallas Cowboys. The Bengals moved the ball early on offense, but each of their first three drives ended in fumbles recovered by the Cowboys. One of those fumbles was by HB Giovanni Bernard, which finished his streak of 829 consecutive rushing attempts without a fumble — the third-longest fumble-free streak in the NFL over the last 30 years. Dallas capitalized to score 17 points off Cincinnati's three early turnovers, including a 78-yard return for a TD. The Bengals began to dig out of the 17-0 hole with a five-yard TD pass from QB Brandon Allen to WR A.J. Green in the second quarter, but that turned out to be Cincinnati's lone score of the day. The Bengals' offense struggled in the second half as Dallas outscored Cincinnati, 13-0, over the final two periods. In his return to Paul Brown Stadium, Dalton posted a 122.6 rating while tossing two TDs in the Cowboys' win. Dallas improved to 4-9, while Cincinnati dropped to 2-10-1.

The Bengals faced an early 14-3 first-quarter deficit, as Dallas opened the game with back-to-back TD drives. Cincinnati later scored FGs on consecutive drives in the third quarter, while the Bengals' defense held the Cowboys to three punts and a lost fumble on their first four drives of the second half. The Bengals logged a 19-play, 83-yard drive which took 8:54 off the clock in the fourth quarter and ended with a five-yard TD pass from QB Joe Burrow to WR Tee Higgins. Burrow then connected with WR Tyler Boyd on a two-point conversion to tie the score at 17-17 with 3:45 left. A Cowboys three-and-out gave Burrow the ball back with 2:13 remaining, but the Dallas defense forced the Bengals into a three-and-out of their own on the following drive. With less than a minute left, Cowboys QB Cooper Rush, who started in place of an injured Dak Prescott, quickly led the team on a 33-yard drive to put K Brett Maher in range for a 50-yard game-winning FG as time expired. The Cowboys improved to 1-1, while the Bengals fell to 0-2.

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

The Bengals' defense had three takeaways, including a pair of INTs, and allowed just 137 net passing yards. Offensively, Cincinnati scored points on five of its first six true possessions. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 23 of 36 passes for 258 yards and a 103.7 passer rating, as well as two TD passes to WR Andrei Iosivas. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Kansas City improved to 2-0.

WEEK 3, GAME 3

Washington Commanders 38, Cincinnati Bengals 33 Monday night, Sept. 23, 2024 at Paycor Stadium

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. Commanders rookie QB Jayden Daniels completed 91.3 percent of his passes (21 of 23), which set both an NFL rookie record and a Bengals opponent record for a single game (minimum 20 attempts). Cincinnati's defense allowed 520 net yards and its offense committed three turnovers in its third straight loss by a margin of one possession. The Bengals cut a 17-point deficit early in the fourth quarter down to six late in the period, but Pittsburgh backup QB Justin Fields converted a third down with under two minutes left to ice the game. Steelers starter Russell Wilson threw a pick-six to Bengals CB Cam Taylor Britt that put Cincinnati ahead early in the first quarter, then responded by leading Pittsburgh on five straight scoring drives. Bengals QB Joe Burrow passed for 309 yards and three TDs, but he was strip-sacked twice, and the second was returned for a TD that put the Steelers ahead 41-24. Cincinnati fell to 4-8, while Pittsburgh improved to 9-3.
