## GAME INFORMATION

**Kickoff:** 1 p.m. Eastern.

**Television:** The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Spero Dedes (play-by-play), Adam Archuleta (analyst) and Aditi Kinkhabwala (sideline reporter).

**Radio:** The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

**Setting the scene:** The Bengals aim for their second win over Baltimore in a span of three weeks when they host the Ravens at Paycor Stadium on Sunday.

Cincinnati, which earned a road victory over its AFC North Division rival on Thanksgiving night, enters Sunday's contest at 4-9 on the season. The Bengals are coming off a 39-34 loss at Buffalo in Week 14, in a game which saw the Bills storm back with 21 points in the fourth quarter. QB Joe Burrow enjoyed perhaps his most efficient performance of the season while helping Cincinnati build a 10-point lead, but he was intercepted twice in the final period, including a 63-yard pick-six that put Buffalo in front for the first time.

Five of the Bengals' past six losses have been by a margin of one score (eight points or fewer). But while the defeat at Buffalo leaves Cincinnati on the brink of elimination from playoff contention, head coach Zac Taylor remains adamant that his team will keep its same focus and energy until its postseason fate is sealed.

"I don't know what the odds are. I know they're not zero," said Taylor. "I told our guys, 'The odds aren't zero, so we're going to keep fighting, keep scratching, keep clawing.' We'll keep approaching every week the way we've been doing it, and we've just got to win."

The game against the Bills was Burrow's second appearance since returning from a toe injury he sustained in September. His numbers at Buffalo included season highs in completions (25), passing yards (284), TD passes (four) and passer rating (106.7). He completed at least one pass to eight different receivers, and led Cincinnati on three straight scoring drives to open the game.

The Bengals' offense has performed among the league's best since its Pro Bowl QB re-entered the lineup. Over the past two weeks, Cincinnati is tied for third in the NFL in scoring average (33.0 points per game), fifth in passing offense (265.0 yards per game) and ninth in total offense (360.0 yards per game). Burrow's top weapons include All-Pro WR Ja'Marr Chase, who recently surpassed 1000 receiving yards on the season, and WR Tee Higgins, whose nine TD catches are tied for second-most leaguewide. Third-year HB Chase Brown has continued his ascension as one of the most versatile players at his position, as he compiled a Bengals-record six consecutive games with at least 100 yards from scrimmage from Weeks 7-13.

"We've got four games to go and show high-level execution, high-level play and playmaking," said Burrow, citing his outlook on the rest of the season. "I'm going to relish the opportunity to go out and play with these guys and continue to try to put on a show for everybody watching. I hope that comes across, and I know I'm going to continue to work hard to put myself in a good position to make plays."

Burrow has two career milestones in reach on Sunday against the Ravens. He is 265 passing yards shy of 20,000, with a chance to reach that mark in what

would be tied for the third-fewest games in NFL history (74). He also is two TD passes away from 150 in his career.

Cincinnati looks to sweep a Baltimore team that has dropped two in a row, as the Ravens followed their Thanksgiving defeat against the Bengals with a five-point home loss to Pittsburgh in Week 14.

**The series:** The Ravens currently hold a five-game advantage in regular season, 32-27, while the Bengals hold a 1-0 lead in postseason. Baltimore has won four of its last five games against Cincinnati, though the Bengals won the most recent meeting two weeks ago on Thanksgiving at Baltimore, 32-14.

Throughout the series, it has not been easy for the visiting team. The Bengals lead 18-12 in Cincinnati, and the Ravens lead 20-10 in Baltimore (including postseason).

Bengals S Geno Stone was a seventh-round pick of Baltimore in the 2020 NFL Draft and spent his first three seasons ('20-23) with the Ravens ... Bengals QB Joe Flacco was a first-round pick of Baltimore in the 2008 NFL Draft and spent his first 11 seasons (2008-18) with the Ravens ... Bengals CB Dax Hill is the younger brother of Ravens RB Justice Hill (Reserve/Injured) ... Ravens CB Chidobe Awuzie played for the Bengals from 2021-23 ... **The Jungle is jammin':** The Bengals have had announced attendance figures of 65,000 or more in 30 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That is the longest streak in team history, surpassing a previous span of 24 straight from 2005-07.

Each of the 15 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of this season was played in front of an announced crowd of 66,569, the fourth-largest figure on the list. Most of those fans were dressed in white apparel to accentuate the fourth annual "White Bengal" game at Paycor Stadium on Thursday Night Football.

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history.

**Bengals career records watch:** As Cincinnati continues the 2025 season, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has thrown 148 career TD passes, the fifth-most in team history and six shy of tying former QB Carson Palmer (154) for fourth-most. QBs Andy Dalton (204), Ken Anderson (197) and Boomer Esiason (187) hold the top three spots on the Bengals' all-time list.

- Burrow has 26 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the second-most in team history and two shy of Dalton (28) for the team record.

- Burrow has completed 1818 career passes, the fifth-most in team history and 197 shy of tying Esiason (2015) for fourth-most. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654) and Palmer (2024) hold the top three spots.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 486 career receptions, the sixth-most in team history and 21 shy of WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530) and Tyler Boyd (513) hold the top four spots on the team's career list. Chase in Week 4 at Denver surpassed WR Isaac Curtis (416) for seventh place and WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for sixth.

- Chase has 6440 career receiving yards, the sixth-most in team history and 258 shy of fifth-most, which is held by Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets surpassed WR Eddie Brown (6134) for sixth.

- Chase has 51 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and two shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history and 1.5 shy of LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. DE/DT Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5) and DT Geno Atkins (75.5) hold the top three spots. Hendrickson in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth.

- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 545 career points, the sixth-most in team history and four shy of fifth-most, which is held by K Horst Muhlmann (549). Kickers Jim Breech (1151), Shayne Graham (779), Mike Nugent (718) and Doug Pelfrey (660) hold the top four spots.

- McPherson has 117 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and three shy of Muhlmann (120) for fifth. Breech (225), Graham (177), Nugent (157) and Pelfrey (153) hold the top four spots.

- McPherson has 194 career made PATs, the fifth-most in team history and seven shy of Pelfrey (201) for fourth. McPherson in Week 13 at Baltimore surpassed Muhlmann (189) for fifth.

- McPherson has a career FG percentage of 83.0 (117 made/141 att.), the third-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and K Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

- P Ryan Rehkow has 42 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the fifth-most by a Bengals player since the stat began being tracked in 1976. Rehkow in Week 11 at Pittsburgh surpassed P Nick Harris (37) for fifth.

**Records vs. Ravens:** The following individual and team regular-season Bengals and Ravens entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book:

- In the first-ever Bengals-Ravens game on Nov. 3, 1996 at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium, head coach Bruce Coslet's Bengals overcame what still stands today as the largest deficit (18 points) to win a regular-season road game in franchise history. The Ravens led 21-3 at halftime in that contest, but Cincinnati rallied for a 24-21 win on a 34-yard Doug Pelfrey field goal at the final gun. Not until the 2021 season's AFC Championship did the Bengals finally match that road feat (overcoming a 21-3 deficit at Kansas City to earn a berth in Super Bowl LVI).

The Bengals' second-biggest regular-season comeback in a road win also was set at Baltimore. On Dec. 5, 2004 at M&T Bank Stadium, Cincinnati rallied from a 20-3 deficit to win 27-26. The Bengals matched that 17-point deficit road comeback on Dec. 18, 2022 when they came back from being down 17-0 to win 34-23 at Tampa Bay.

Also:

- On Nov. 22, 1998 in Cincinnati, Ravens RB Priest Holmes rushed for 227 yards, the most ever recorded against the Bengals in a game.

- On Sept. 23, 2001 in Cincinnati, Ravens QB Elvis Grbac attempted 63 passes, the most ever against the Bengals in a game.

- The Bengals record for kickoff return yardage in a game (228 yards) was set at Baltimore by HB Brandon Bennett on Nov. 10, 2002. Bennett had a 94-yarder for a TD.

- Also on Nov. 10, 2002, Ravens CB Lamont Brightful recorded the longest punt return ever against Cincinnati, a 95-yarder for a TD.

• K Shayne Graham kicked a Bengals individual record seven field goals — for all of Cincinnati's scoring — in a 21-7 win at Baltimore on Nov. 11, 2007. Graham did not have a missed attempt. The seven total field goals also stands as the team record. The NFL record for field goals in a game is eight, set by Rob Bironas of Tennessee in 2007, and Graham is one of nine players sharing second place with seven.

• On Nov. 30, 2008 against the Ravens in Cincinnati, P Kyle Larson punted 11 times, which is tied with three other instances for most in a game in team history. Larson's 480 yards punting that day also stand as the third-most for a single game in Bengals history.

• In the 2014 season opener at Baltimore, Bengals K Mike Nugent tied the NFL record for field goals in a half (five; still tied). His five in the first half gave the Bengals a 15-0 lead toward an eventual 23-16 win.

• On Jan. 3, 2021, the Ravens set an opponents' record for most net rushing yards against the Bengals in a single game with 404. That total shattered the previous mark of 313, which had stood since 1969.

• On Dec. 26, 2021, Bengals QB Joe Burrow set a team record for most passing yards in a game with 525, which still is the fourth-highest single-game total in NFL history (more info in following item). The team's 498 net passing yards in the game also still stands as a team record.

**Burrow's big day in '21 vs. Ravens:** QB Joe Burrow had one of the top individual performances by a QB in NFL history on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore, when he passed for a Bengals-record 525 yards and four TDs while completing 80.4 percent of his attempts (37 of 46). His passing yardage total still ranks as the fourth-highest in a single game in league history, and he became the first Cincinnati QB ever to post a completion percentage of 80 or higher while throwing at least 40 times.

Burrow's 525 yards and four TD passes came on the heels of a 416-yard, three-TD stat line in Week 7 of the 2021 season at Baltimore. That made him the only QB ever to pass for 400 yards and three TDs more than once in an entire career against the Ravens. He also became the first QB in NFL history to top 400 passing yards against the same opponent twice in one regular season, and his 941 combined passing yards vs. Baltimore set a record for the most-ever against one opponent in one regular season. The previous record was 874 passing yards, shared by former San Francisco QB Joe Montana against Atlanta in 1990 and former Miami QB Dan Marino against the N.Y. Jets in '88.

In the Dec. 26 matchup, Burrow became just the eighth QB since 2000 to have three completions of at least 52 yards in a game (there now have been nine QBs to hit that mark). On the receiving end of those passes were WR Tyler Boyd (68-yard TD), WR Tee Higgins (52) and HB Joe Mixon (52), who became the first trio of Bengals to catch passes of 50-plus yards in a single game since Nov. 17, 1968 at Miami.

**Chase shines against Ravens in '24:** In his two games versus Baltimore during the 2024 season, WR Ja'Marr Chase totaled 21 receptions for 457 yards and five TDs. His 457 combined receiving yards are the most in NFL history by one player against a single opponent in a season, surpassing former Raiders WR Art Powell's 428 yards vs. the Houston Oilers in 1963.

Chase's first matchup against the Ravens last season came in Week 5, when he caught 10 passes for 193 yards and two TDs. He hauled in a 41-yard TD on a deep pass from QB Joe Burrow late in the first half to give the Bengals their first lead of the game, then in the fourth quarter he took a screen pass 70 yards to the end zone for his second score.

Chase then managed to eclipse his Week 5 performance when he faced Baltimore in Week 10 on Thursday Night Football. He posted 11 receptions for 264 yards and three TDs, which included scoring catches of 67 and 70 yards in the second half. His 264 receiving yards were the most by any NFL player in a game last season, and were the second-most ever in a game played on a Thursday behind Cleveland Rams WR Jim Benton's 303 yards on Thursday, Nov. 22, 1945.

Combining his Week 10 effort last season with a Bengals-record 266 receiving yards and three TDs in Week 17 of the 2021 campaign against Kansas

City, Chase became the first player in NFL history with multiple games of at least 250 receiving yards and three TD catches in his career. He also became the first player ever with 260 or more receiving yards in multiple games.

**Uniform watch:** Cincinnati will wear white jerseys, orange pants (black stripes) and white socks this week against Baltimore. The Bengals have worn this combination four previous times since their uniform redesign in 2021, compiling a 1-3 record in those games (all played on the road). The last time the team sported this look was Week 11 of this season at Pittsburgh. This week also will be the eighth time Cincinnati wears its orange pants, which were introduced to the uniform rotation in 2024.

The Bengals' redesign in 2021 marked the team's first significant change in uniform since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet six times and collected a 5-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance came in Week 7 of this season, when Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh at home on Thursday Night Football.

\* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Zac Taylor** was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor's system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team's per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the '15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor's began coaching at Texas A&M University as an offensive graduate assistant and TE's coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during his College Station tenure.

Taylor played in college at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007,

but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

**John Harbaugh** is in his 18th season at the helm in Baltimore. He has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in 12 of his 17 full seasons, and in 2012 captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. Under Harbaugh, Baltimore is one of four teams with at least 12 playoff berths in the past 17 seasons. He has led the Ravens to the playoffs in six of the past seven seasons, tallying the league's second-most regular-season wins (78) in that span.

Entering 2025, Harbaugh was tied with Mike McCarthy for the 12th-most total victories (185, including playoffs) by a head coach in NFL history. Additionally, his 13 playoff wins tied Mike Holmgren for the seventh most all time, while his .623 regular season winning percentage stood eighth best.

Finishing 12-5 in 2024, the AFC North Champion Ravens produced the NFL's best offense (424.9 yards per game), becoming the first unit in NFL history to post at least 4000 passing yards and 3000 rushing yards in a single season. A league-high nine of Baltimore's regular season wins in 2024 came against teams that finished with a winning record. In 2019, Harbaugh became the first Ravens coach to win Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year, leading the team to the AFC's No. 1 playoff seed and a franchise-best 14-2 record. Baltimore also won a franchise-record 12 straight games to close out the regular season. In 2012, the Ravens seized the franchise's second league championship with a win in Super Bowl XLVII over the San Francisco 49ers. In his initial season with the team (2008), Harbaugh led Baltimore to an 11-5 record and a berth in the AFC Championship Game. Baltimore set an NFL record that season for most total wins (13) by a team with both a rookie head coach and a rookie starting quarterback (Joe Flacco).

Harbaugh spent his first 10 NFL seasons (1998-2007) with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was the team's secondary coach in 2007, after nine seasons as its special teams coordinator. In 2001, he was voted the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers.

Harbaugh played defensive back at Miami (Ohio) from 1980-83, earning a degree in political science. He has no pro playing experience. He coached collegiately at Western Michigan (1984-86), Pittsburgh ('87), Morehead State ('88), Cincinnati ('89-96), and Indiana ('97).

Harbaugh was born in Perrysburg, Ohio on Sept. 23, 1962. He and his wife Ingrid have a daughter, Alison. He is the son of longtime college coach Jack. His brother, Jim, is head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers and played for the Ravens in 1998. John's sister, Joani, is married to Tom Crean, a longtime college basketball coach, most recently for the University of Georgia (2018-22).

## BENGALS NOTES

**Winter means wins:** The Bengals have compiled a 14-4 record in regular-season games played in December and January since the 2022 season. Their 14 wins in that span are tied for the second-most in the NFL, with only Buffalo (15) totaling more.

In 2022, Cincinnati won each of its five regular-season contests in December and January, during what was ultimately a 10-game winning streak that propelled the team to its second straight AFC Championship Game. In 2023, the Bengals entered December with a 5-6 record, before backup QB Jake Browning helped steer them to three straight wins to vault back into the AFC playoff picture. Cincinnati closed out its 2023 slate with a dominant home win over Cleveland, which took place in January '24.

After dropping its first December game in 2024, the Bengals rattled off five wins in a row to finish the season with a 9-8 record. QB Joe Burrow was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month for games played in December and January, as he completed 76.2 percent of his passes and threw for 16 TDs.

**Fast starts fueling offense:** Cincinnati has scored points on its opening offensive possession in each of the past six games, dating back to Week 8 against the N.Y. Jets. It is the most consecutive opening-drive scores by any NFL team this season, surpassing a streak of five games by Detroit in Weeks 5-10.

The Bengals' current streak has consisted of three TDs and three FGs. Since the streak began in Week 8, Cincinnati has scored a total of 39 points in the first quarter, the fifth-most in the NFL in that span. The Bengals also followed up with points on their second possession in three of the past six contests.

Dating back to Week 7, Cincinnati has scored 113 total points in the first half of its games, the fourth-most leaguewide. The Bengals also have averaged 184.6 yards in the first half of play since Week 7, which ranks seventh among all teams in that stretch.

The last NFL team to score on its first possession in six straight games also was the Bengals, who put together a seven-game streak from Weeks 4-11 of the 2023 campaign.

**Burrow's 2025 journey:** QB Joe Burrow made his return to game action in Week 13 at Baltimore, after spending the previous nine contests on the Reserve/Injured list due to a toe injury. He suffered the injury in the second quarter of Week 2 against Jacksonville, was placed on Reserve/Injured on Sept. 16 and underwent surgery on Sept. 19.

Burrow opened the season by playing in his 70th career regular-season game in Week 1 at Cleveland. He finished with 14 completions on 23 attempts for 113 yards, with a one-yard TD pass to TE Noah Fant. Burrow's 1762 career completions at the end of the Browns game were the most by any QB in NFL history through their first 70 games, while his 141 TD passes ranked as the third-most and his 19,114 passing yards ranked fifth.

In his return on Thanksgiving, Burrow threw a season-high 46 passing attempts, with 24 completions that went for 261 yards and two TDs. Both of his scoring passes came in the third quarter, as he connected on a 14-yarder to TE Tanner Hudson and a 29-yarder to WR Andrei Iosivas.

Burrow followed up his performance at Baltimore with season highs in completions (25), passing yards (284) and TDs (four) in Week 14 vs. Buffalo. It marked his eighth career game with four or more TD passes, and his first since Week 10 of last season at Baltimore.

Through four starts in 2025, Burrow is 70 of 118 for 734 yards and eight TDs with two INTs, good for a passer rating of 86.9.

**No. 9 approaching 20K:** QB Joe Burrow enters the Bengals' Week 15 contest with 19,735 career passing yards in 73 regular-season games played. Should he pass for 265 yards against Baltimore, he would tie Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino and former Indianapolis QB Andrew Luck as the third-fastest player in NFL history to reach 20,000. Only Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (67) and former Detroit QB Matthew Stafford (71) achieved that feat in fewer games.

Burrow owns the three highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history. Last season, he led the NFL and set a team record with 4918 passing yards, which included seven 300-yard games (also the most in Cincinnati history). He previously had 4611 passing yards in 2021 (sixth-most in NFL that year) and 4475 in '22 (fifth-most). He is the first QB to pass for 4000 or more yards in three different seasons during his Bengals career, with Carson Palmer (2006-07) and Andy Dalton ('13, '16) both reaching that mark twice.

Burrow was the fourth-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 15,000 career passing yards (56 games), and tied for the third-fastest to reach 10,000 (36 games). His career yardage total at the end of the 2024 campaign was 19,001, the sixth-most in a player's first five seasons in league history.

**Joe's career TD tally:** QB Joe Burrow heads into Week 15 with 148 career TD passes in 73 regular-season games played. With two more on Sunday, he would be the third-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 150. The only QBs to pass for 150 TDs in fewer than 74 games are Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino (62 games) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (63).

Burrow is coming off a season-high four scoring passes in Week 14 at Buffalo. It marked his 27th career game with at least three TD passes, which surpassed Dallas QB Dak Prescott (26) for the third-most such games in a player's first six career seasons in NFL history. Marino (37 games) and Mahomes (36) are the only QBs with more three-TD games in their first six years in the league.

Burrow finished the 2024 campaign with 140 career TD passes, which are the third-most in a player's first five seasons in NFL history behind Marino (168) and Mahomes (151). Burrow has the three highest single-season passing TD totals in Bengals history, with an NFL-leading 43 in 2024, 35 in '22 and 34 in '21.

**Burrow on the mark:** QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's completion percentage record. With a current career percentage of 68.22, he is the league's all-time leader in the category.

Burrow's 70.552 completion percentage in the 2024 season ranked fourth in the NFL (minimum 14 attempts per team's games in season). It also set a Bengals single-season record, narrowly edging out QB Ken Anderson's completion rate of 70.550 in 1982. Burrow completed at least 70 percent of his passes in 11 games in 2024, including each of the final six — the longest such streak in his career.

In Week 14 of this season at Buffalo, Burrow surpassed 1800 career completions in what was his 73rd regular-season game. He tied Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert as the fastest players in NFL history to reach 1800 completions (in terms of games played).

Burrow recorded his 2500th career passing attempt in Week 17 of last season against Denver. His 1710 completions at the time he reached that mark are the most in NFL history through a QB's first 2500 throws. By the end of the 2024 campaign, he had 26 career games with a completion percentage of 70 or higher on at least 30 attempts. That is the most such games in a player's first five seasons in NFL history, with the next closest being Mahomes and Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (21 games each).

Burrow ranked in the top five leaguewide in completion percentage in three of his first five seasons. After leading the NFL in 2021 with a 70.4 percentage, he followed up with the second-highest clip in '22 (68.3).

**Burrow's 2024 highlights:** QB Joe Burrow, who completed his fifth pro season in 2024, put together perhaps the best individual campaign by a QB in Bengals history.

Burrow in 2024 led the NFL in passing attempts (652), completions (460), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43), while ranking third in passer rating (108.5) and fourth in completion percentage (70.6; minimum 14 attempts per team's games). Each of those figures also set a Bengals single-season record.

Burrow became the first Cincinnati QB to lead the league in completions,

passing yards and TD passes in the same season. Since 2000, there have been five instances of a QB finishing a season as the outright leader in all three categories — St. Louis Rams QB Kurt Warner in '01, New Orleans QB Drew Brees in '11, Denver QB Peyton Manning in '13, Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady in '21 and Burrow in '24.

Burrow also became the fourth QB in NFL history to pass for at least 4500 yards and 40 TDs while throwing 10 or fewer INTs, joining Manning (2004 and '13), Brady ('07) and Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers ('11).

Burrow's level of play last season was highlighted by a streak of eight consecutive games (Weeks 9-17) with at least 250 passing yards and three TD passes. That marked the longest such streak in NFL history, surpassing Brady's six straight games during his 2007 MVP campaign.

**Ja'Marr is "Always open":** After leading the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 receptions in 2024, WR Ja'Marr Chase finds himself near the top of the league once again this year, as his team-leading 91 catches rank third among all players. The last player to finish as the league leader in receptions in consecutive seasons was former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas in 2018 and '19.

There have been 15 previous instances in NFL history in which a player totaled 100 or more receptions in three consecutive seasons. Chase kicked off his career with 81 catches in the 2021 season, which set a Bengals rookie record and still ranks in the top 20 among all rookies in NFL history. He followed that up with a team-leading 87 catches in just 12 games played in 2022, then hit triple digits for the first time when he had 100 receptions in '23 (12th in NFL).

Chase has four games this season with at least 10 catches, including a stretch of three straight contests from Weeks 6-8. He brought in 10 receptions in Week 6 at Green Bay, followed up with a Bengals-record 16 in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, then logged 12 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. He became the first player in team history to register double-digit catches in three consecutive games.

In the Week 7 win over the Steelers, Chase broke his own previous Bengals single-game record of 15 receptions, which he amassed in Week 5 of the 2023 campaign at Arizona. He now owns the four highest single-game reception totals in team history, which also includes a 14-catch effort in Week 2 of this season against Jacksonville.

Chase's four career games with 14 or more receptions are tied with former Pittsburgh/New England/Tampa Bay WR Antonio Brown for the second-most such games in NFL history. Current L.A. Chargers WR Keenan Allen holds the league record with six such games in his career.

**Climbing the ranks:** WR Ja'Marr Chase's 91 receptions this season have boosted his career catch total to 486, which ranks sixth in Bengals history and is 21 shy of tying former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth.

Chase this season surpassed Bengals Ring of Honor member Isaac Curtis (416) and former WR Cris Collinsworth (417) on the team's all-time receptions list. In the Week 2 win over Jacksonville, he logged his 400th career reception in what was his 64th regular-season game. That tied former Atlanta WR Julio Jones and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry for the fifth-fewest games in NFL history to reach 400 career catches.

Chase enters Week 15 needing 14 catches to reach 500 in his career. If he hits that mark against the Ravens, in what will be his 75th regular-season game, he would be the second-fastest player in NFL history to record 500 receptions. The only player to do it in fewer than 75 games played is former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (69).

Chase's 486 career receptions are the fifth-most in a player's first five seasons in NFL history, and he is in striking distance to climb that list during Cincinnati's final four games. Only Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (511 — currently in fifth season), Thomas (510), Dallas WR CeeDee Lamb (496) and Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (495) had more in their first five years.

In his 2024 "Triple Crown" season, Chase led the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 catches. He became the first player in team history to lead the league in receptions, and surpassed Houshmandzadeh's previous team mark of 112 in the

2007 campaign.

**Uno finds the end zone:** WR Ja'Marr Chase's highlight-reel TD catch in the fourth quarter of Week 6 at Green Bay was the 50th receiving TD of his career. Playing in his 68th regular-season game, he became the seventh-fastest player in NFL history and the fourth-fastest in the Super Bowl era (1966-present) to reach that milestone. He improved his career tally to 51 with an eight-yard scoring catch in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh.

The only players in the Super Bowl era to record 50 receiving TDs in fewer games than Chase are Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (59 games), former New England TE Rob Gronkowski (59) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (61).

Chase's 51 TD catches are the second-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021, behind current L.A. Rams WR Davante Adams (55). In 2024, Chase led the league with 17 TDs, which tied the Bengals single-season record originally set by WR Carl Pickens in 1995. He became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in receiving TDs. He had a league-high five games with multiple TD catches last season.

Chase has five receiving TDs this season. With two more, he would become the first player in league history with at least 80 receptions, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first five seasons. He caught two scoring passes from QB Jake Browning in Week 5 vs. Detroit, which marked his 12th career game with multiple TDs.

**Chasing history:** WR Ja'Marr Chase surpassed 1000 receiving yards this season during the Bengals' Week 14 contest at Buffalo. He became the fifth player in NFL history to reach the 1000-yard receiving mark in each of his first five career seasons, joining former Minnesota WR Randy Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green, current Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans and current Vikings WR Justin Jefferson.

Chase's 1015 receiving yards rank fourth in the NFL this season. He has improved his career receiving yardage total to 6440, which ranks as the fourth-most in a player's first five seasons in league history. Only Jefferson (7432), former St. Louis Rams WR Torry Holt (6784) and Moss (6743) had more in their first five years. Chase in Week 13 surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (6364).

In the Bengals' Week 7 win against Pittsburgh this season, Chase surpassed 6000 career receiving yards in what was his 69th regular-season game. He became the fifth-fastest player in league history to reach that milestone, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer Lance Alworth (62 games), Jefferson (62), former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (64) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (67).

Chase is one of three players in NFL history with at least 6000 receiving yards and 50 receiving TDs in his first five seasons, alongside Moss and Rice. The Week 7 victory over the Steelers also marked Chase's seventh career game with at least 10 catches and 150 receiving yards, which surpassed Jefferson for the most such games in a player's first five seasons in league history.

Chase, who currently ranks sixth in Bengals history in receiving yards, is 258 shy of tying former WR Cris Collinsworth (6698) for fifth. So far this season, Chase has surpassed former WRs T.J. Houshmandzadeh (5782), Darnay Scott (5975), Tyler Boyd (6000) and Eddie Brown (6134) on Cincinnati's all-time list.

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 87.0 receiving yards per game (74 regular-season games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only Jefferson (91.6) and L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (91.6).

**Tee time:** WR Tee Higgins' nine receiving TDs this season are tied for the second-most in the NFL and are one shy of his career-high 10 in the 2024 campaign.

With his next scoring catch, Higgins would become the third player in Bengals history to have at least 10 receiving TDs in consecutive seasons, joining WRs Carl Pickens (1994-96) and A.J. Green (2012-13). His 19 combined TD catches since the start of the 2024 season rank fourth in the NFL, trailing his teammate Ja'Marr Chase (22), current L.A. Rams WR Davante Adams (22) and Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (22).



Higgins had a career-long streak of four consecutive games with a receiving TD from Weeks 7-11 of this season. He has two multi-TD performances over his last four games, as he found the end zone twice in Week 9 vs. Chicago and in Week 14 at Buffalo. Both of his scoring catches against the Bills were highlight-reel plays, as he acrobatically kept his feet in bounds for a 21-yard TD grab in the second quarter, then brought in a 25-yard pass to the end zone with one hand late in the fourth.

Higgins also compiled a streak of nine straight games played at Paycor Stadium with at least one receiving TD, which began in Week 5 of the 2024 campaign and went through Week 9 of this season. He became the third player since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger with a TD catch in nine consecutive home games played, joining former Minnesota WR Cris Carter, who had a record 10-game streak spanning from the 2000-01 seasons, and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice, who logged a nine-game streak during the '89-90 campaigns.

In addition to his scoring tally, Higgins ranks second on the Bengals this season in receiving yards (667) and third in receptions (46). He surpassed 5000 career receiving yards in Week 9 vs. Chicago, and playing in his 79th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that milestone.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins is tied for eighth in the league in receiving TDs (43) and ranks 16th in receiving yards (5262). He also has played in seven postseason games for Cincinnati and has 457 receiving yards and three TDs.

**Brown does it all:** HB Chase Brown's streak of consecutive games with 100 or more scrimmage yards came to an end at six contests in Week 14 at Buffalo. The streak, which began in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh and lasted through Week 13 at Baltimore, is the longest in Bengals history.

Brown kicked off the streak with 100 scrimmage yards in the Week 7 home victory over the Steelers, which was highlighted by a season-high 108 rushing yards on just 11 attempts. His 9.8 yards per carry in that contest were a career high and the ninth-most by any NFL player in a game this season (minimum 10 rushes). He followed that up with 105 scrimmage yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets, 112 in Week 9 vs. Chicago and 127 in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. His stat line against the Bears included a season-high 75 receiving yards on eight receptions, with both figures being the second-most in a game in his career.

Brown registered a season-high 130 scrimmage yards in Week 12 vs. New England to tie for the longest streak in team history, then pushed it to a record sixth straight game with 113 yards in the Week 13 victory at Baltimore. Though his streak ended in Cincinnati's most recent game at Buffalo, Brown still scored both a rushing and receiving TD in the same game for the third time in his career.

Brown's six consecutive games with at least 100 yards from scrimmage marked the second-longest streak in the NFL this season, trailing only a seven-game stretch by San Francisco RB Christian McCaffrey in Weeks 1-7. Brown totaled 687 scrimmage yards during his streak, the seventh-most among all NFL players from Weeks 7-13, while his 502 rushing yards in that span ranked eighth.

During the Week 14 contest at Buffalo, Brown surpassed 1000 scrimmage yards for the second straight season. He totaled 1350 yards from scrimmage in 2024 (990 rushing, 360 receiving), which included a previous career-best streak of five consecutive games with at least 100 yards from Weeks 11-16.

**Turnover feast on Thanksgiving:** The Bengals' defense forced five turnovers in the Week 13 win at Baltimore on Thanksgiving night. Cincinnati recovered three Ravens fumbles, had one INT and caused another fumble that rolled out of the back of the end zone for a touchback.

The five takeaways tied for the second-most by any NFL team in a game this season, trailing only Pittsburgh's six takeaways in Week 9 against Indianapolis. It also tied for the seventh-most by Cincinnati in a game since 2000. The last time the Bengals recorded five or more takeaways was in Week 15 of last season at Tennessee, when they had six (four INTs, two FRs). Prior to that, they last had five or more in a single contest in Week 10 of the 2007 campaign at Baltimore.

The first turnover in the Thanksgiving win occurred late in the first quarter, when on a third-down play DE Joseph Ossai strip-sacked Ravens QB Lamar Jackson. Fellow DE Cedric Johnson recovered the ball at the Baltimore five-yard line, and was tackled at the two. In the second quarter, Ravens TE Isaiah Likely appeared to have a 44-yard TD catch, but S Jordan Battle forced the ball out of his hands before he broke the plane, and it went through the end zone for a touchback and change of possession.

Later in the second quarter, Johnson had his second FR of the game and his career when he fell on a Jackson fumble in Ravens territory. The recovery set up a Bengals FG drive to boost their lead to 12-7 just before halftime.

Cincinnati's lone INT proved to be crucial, as the Ravens were driving inside the red zone while trailing by 12 early in the fourth quarter. DE Myles Murphy rushed through the interior of the line and tipped up Jackson's pass, and it fell into the waiting arms of rookie LB Demetrius Knight Jr., who returned it 39 yards to set up another Bengals FG drive. A pair of cornerbacks then closed out the dominant showing late in the fourth, as Jalen Davis knocked the ball free from WR Zay Flowers and DJ Turner II recovered to essentially seal the win.

**Hendrickson cracks top five:** With four sacks through seven games played this season, DE Trey Hendrickson has improved his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 61.0. He surpassed former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth-most in Bengals history, and now is 1.5 shy of former LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. Hendrickson signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason.

Hendrickson, who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with the Bengals (2021-24), opened his Cincinnati tenure with 14.0 sacks in the '21 campaign, which led the team and ranked fifth in the NFL. He followed up with a team-high eight sacks in 2022.

Hendrickson posted 17.5 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 seasons, which are tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history behind former DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (the NFL began tracking sacks in '82, but the Bengals track the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder). He became the first Cincinnati player with double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81. Hendrickson also is just the fifth player in NFL history to post 17 or more sacks in back-to-back seasons.

In 2024, Hendrickson became the first Bengals player to lead the league in sacks since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982. He was named to the Associated Press All-Pro First Team for the first time in his career, and he finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year.

Hendrickson's 61.0 sacks since he joined the Bengals in 2021 are the fourth-most in the NFL behind Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (80.0), Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (65.5) and former Dallas/current Green Bay DE Micah Parsons (65.0). He also has 12 forced fumbles in that span, tied for the fourth-most leaguewide.

**Turner shuts it down:** CB DJ Turner II has recorded a career-high 17 PDs this season, which lead the NFL and are the most by a Bengals player since CB Leon Hall (24) and CB Johnathan Joseph (20) in the 2009 campaign.

Turner also has recorded his first two career INTs this season, with the first coming late in the fourth quarter of Week 1 at Cleveland to help the Bengals protect a one-point lead. His second pick occurred in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, when he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf in Cincinnati territory just before halftime.

In Week 6 at Green Bay, Turner notched a career-best five PDs. He became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since Joseph had five on Nov. 8, 2009, in a win over Baltimore. Turner also is one of five players in the NFL this

season to record five PDs in game. No player in the league had that many PDs in any contest last season.

Turner additionally has contributed to two other takeaways for Cincinnati this season, as he recovered a fumble late in Week 13 at Baltimore to help seal a Bengals win, then the following week at Buffalo he logged his first career forced fumble which was recovered in the Bengals' end zone.

A 2023 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, Turner totaled 15 PDs through his first two seasons, with seven in his '23 rookie campaign followed by eight in '24. He missed the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, but has returned to play in all 13 contests with 12 starts this year.

**Charlie's 98-yard dash:** WR Charlie Jones got the Bengals' Week 9 contest against Chicago underway with a 98-yard return for a TD on the game's opening kickoff. It marked his second career TD on a KOR, following a 100-yard return on the opening kickoff in Week 7 of the 2024 season at Cleveland. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the 14th TD on a KOR in Bengals history.
- It was the third time in team history (and first in a home game) that the Bengals returned the game's opening kickoff for a TD. The other instances were Jones' 2024 runback against the Browns, and former S Brandon Wilson's 92-yarder on Oct. 13, 2019 at Baltimore.
- It tied for the sixth-longest KOR in team history, alongside a 98-yard TD return by former HB Stanford Jennings on Nov. 13, 1988 at Kansas City.
- Jones became the third player in team history with multiple KORs for a TD in his Bengals career, joining Wilson and former S/CB Tremaine Mack, who both also had two.
- Jones became the first player in team history with multiple KORs of 98 or more yards.
- Jones also had an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 of the 2023 season vs. Baltimore. He joined former CB Lemar Parrish as the only players in Bengals history with three or more returns for TDs. Parrish had four TDs on PRs and one on a KOR.
- Jones' return against the Bears was the longest KOR in the NFL this season at the time, and now is tied for the third-longest behind Seattle WR Rashid Shaheed's 100-yarder in Week 14 and N.Y. Jets RB Kene Nwangwu's 99-yarder in Week 10.
- According to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players' speeds using GPS, Jones' top speed on the return was 21.78 mph, making him the ninth-fastest ball carrier in the league this season.

**McPherson sets team record:** K Evan McPherson became the first Bengals kicker to enter the 60-yard FG club when he booted a franchise-record 63-yarder as the first half ended in Week 12 vs. New England. He surpassed the previous team mark of 59 yards, which he originally set in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh, and which was later tied by K Cade York in Week 16 of last season against Cleveland.

McPherson opened the scoring against the Patriots with a 54-yard FG in the first quarter. He became the fourth kicker in NFL history with FGs from at least 50 yards and at least 60 yards in the same game. With a 52-yarder four days later in the Thanksgiving win at Baltimore, he now has 28 career FGs from a distance of 50 or more yards, which are the most in a career in Bengals history and tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2021.

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 117 of 141 FG attempts, good for the third-highest percentage in team history (83.0). He has made each of his last 20 attempts from inside of 50 yards, dating back to Week 13 of last season. That is the second-longest such streak of his career, behind a stretch of 24 consecutive made FGs inside of 50 from Week 18 of the 2022 season through Week 2 of '24.

McPherson logged his 100th career made FG in Week 6 of this season at Green Bay. Playing in his 67th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest kicker in Bengals history to reach that milestone.

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also is a perfect 19-for-19

on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson now owns six of the eight longest made kicks in Bengals history. His 63-yarder in Week 12 against New England was the fourth-longest made FG in the NFL this season.

**Money Mac goes 6-6 on Thanksgiving:** K Evan McPherson went a perfect six-for-six on FG attempts in the Bengals' Week 13 win at Baltimore on Thanksgiving night. His six made FGs were a career high and tied for the second-most in a game in Bengals history, matching former K Doug Pelfrey's total on Nov. 6, 1994 at Seattle. Cincinnati's single-game record for made FGs is seven, by former K Shayne Graham on Nov. 11, 2007 at Baltimore.

Adding in his two PATs, McPherson accounted for 20 points on the night, the second-most in a game by a Bengals kicker behind Graham's 21 in that 2007 road win over the Ravens. McPherson knocked through FGs from 31, 42, 24, 33, 52 and 41 yards, with four of those coming in the first half to help give the Bengals a 12-7 lead at the break.

The effort earned McPherson his fourth career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week award. His six made FGs and 20 points scored both were the most by any NFL kicker in a game this season.

McPherson's previous career high for FGs in a game was four, which he recorded on four occasions, most recently in Week 7 of this season against Pittsburgh.

**Rehkwow's ranks:** P Ryan Rehkwow has punted 50 times for 2588 yards this season, with 17 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. He leads the NFL in gross punting average (51.8 yards per punt) and is tied for ninth in net average (42.4).

In Week 12 against New England, Rehkwow tied his season high with three inside-20 punts, and coincidentally, all three were downed right at the Patriots' 10. He also had a 60-yard punt that rolled into the New England end zone for a touchback, marking his 13th punt this season that traveled a gross distance of at least 60 yards.

Rehkwow now has 42 inside-20 punts in his career. In Week 11 at Pittsburgh, he surpassed former P Nick Harris (37) for the fifth-most inside-20 punts by a Bengal since the statistic began being tracked in 1976.

As a rookie in 2024, Rehkwow set Bengals single-season records for gross punting average (49.11 yards) and net average (42.92 yards). Both figures surpassed former P Kevin Huber's previous records set in the 2020 season. Rehkwow also had 25 inside-20 punts last year compared to five touchbacks.

After signing with the Bengals as a free agent on the third day of training camp in 2024, Rehkwow made his NFL debut in Week 1 of last season against New England. That day, he punted four times for 258 yards, setting an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per attempt (minimum four punts). The previous league record belonged to Las Vegas P AJ Cole, who had a 63.6-yard average in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. Rehkwow's performance in the 2024 opener also included the longest punt in Bengals history, an 80-yarder kicked from his own 20-yard line to the Patriots' end zone.

Rehkwow finished his 2024 rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average.

**Four Bengals listed on "Top 100":** For the 15th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the



league, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on social media and NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by four players on the 2025 list — WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 4), QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 14) and WR Tee Higgins (No. 77). It marked the first appearance on the list in Higgins' career, the fourth overall for Burrow and Chase, and the fifth for Hendrickson.

Chase's ranking at No. 4 is the highest by a Bengals player since the "Top 100" debuted in 2011. The previous highest ranking was No. 6, which was Burrow's position on the 2023 list. Hendrickson's spot at No. 14 is his personal highest, substantially ahead of his previous best ranking of No. 77 (2021 list).

This marks the third time in the history of the "Top 100" in which four or more Bengals players were featured. Cincinnati had a record seven players on the 2016 list, then landed four on the '22 edition.

**Taylor nets 50th win:** Cincinnati's Week 13 win at Baltimore marked the 50th regular-season victory in Zac Taylor's head coaching career. Taylor, who became head coach of the Bengals on Feb. 4, 2019, is the fourth head coach in team history to amass 50 regular-season wins, joining Paul Brown, Sam Wyche and Marvin Lewis.

Taylor's first victory as a head coach came in Week 13 of the 2019 season, when he led Cincinnati to a 22-6 result over the N.Y. Jets. He steered the Bengals to a combined 40 regular-season wins from 2021-24, the second-most over a four-year period in team history behind 43 wins from '12-15. With a winning record in each season from 2021-24, he joined Lewis ('11-15) as the only Bengals coaches to guide their team to a mark above .500 in at least four straight years.

Of Taylor's 50 regular-season wins, 27 were in games played at home and 23 were on the road. He additionally led the Bengals to five postseason wins following the 2021 and '22 seasons, with three of those coming on the road.

**Karras named Club Winner for WPMOY:** The Bengals last week announced C Ted Karras as the team's Club Winner for the 2025 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award. Considered the league's most prestigious honor, the award recognizes players who excel on the field and demonstrate a commitment to making a positive impact beyond the game.

Karras, who previously was the Bengals' nominee in 2023, has served as a consistent figure in the Cincinnati community during his four seasons with the team. In October 2024, he helped officially launch The Cincy Hat Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing education and infrastructure to adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) in the area. His long-lasting commitment to supporting adults with IDD first became widely publicized in 2022, when he began selling his fan-favorite Cincy Hat to benefit Village of Merici, a living community and service provider based in his hometown of Indianapolis.

To date, over 100,000 Cincy Hats have been sold, generating over \$3.3 million in revenue. This past year, The Cincy Hat Foundation collaborated with over 150 businesses, nonprofits and schools, which has helped turn a once viral fashion trend into an enduring fundraising mechanism for local initiatives. The momentum of the foundation has allowed Karras to explore opportunities for

affordable housing infrastructure in the Cincinnati region, with the first development scheduled to get underway in the spring of 2026 in nearby Madisonville, Ohio.

Three players in Bengals history have been named the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year — QB Ken Anderson in 1975, LB Reggie Williams in '86 and OT Anthony Munoz in '91.

**Lapham, Parrish enter Bengals Ring of Honor:** A pair of Bengals legends in former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish were inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of Cincinnati's Week 8 game against the N.Y. Jets. They became the 11th and 12th members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who is in his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team's most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive linemen who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team's starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career, Lapham moved into the team's radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as "Mr. Bengal," he has been the team's radio analyst since 1986.

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

Ring of Honor inductees have been voted in each offseason since 2021 by Bengals Season Ticket Members. Lapham and Parrish joined previous inductees QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

**Bengal bites:** The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 27.1 years ... Cincinnati's win over Jacksonville in Week 2 of this season was the 250th home victory in team history (regular season and postseason combined) ... The Bengals have netted 23 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, tied for the third-most weekly awards by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who is in his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is QB Joe Flacco, who is 40 (born Jan. 16, 1985) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who is 22 (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the active roster is HB Tahj Brooks, who is listed at 5-9 ... Brown and Mims also are tied for the heaviest player on the active roster, at 350 pounds each ... There is a tie for lightest player on the active roster between K Evan McPherson and CB DJ Turner II, who both are listed at 185 pounds.

**Quarterbacks:** Sixth-year QB **Joe Burrow** has started the past two games, after spending the previous nine contests on the Reserve/Injured list due to a toe injury sustained in Week 2. In his return to action in Week 13 at Baltimore, he completed 24 of 46 passes for 261 yards and two TDs with no INTs, then followed up with season highs in completions (25), passing yards (284) and TD passes (four) in Week 14 at Buffalo. His season totals through four starts include 70 completions on 118 attempts for 734 yards and eight TDs with two picks, good for a passer rating of 93.0. The No. 1 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, Burrow has earned two Pro Bowl selections ('22 and '24) and has twice been named the NFL Comeback Player of the Year ('21 and '24). Known primarily for his passing accuracy, he is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage (68.2; minimum 1500 attempts). In 2024, he led the league and set Bengals single-season records in passing attempts (652), completions (460), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43). Eighteenth-year veteran **Joe Flacco** started six games for Cincinnati this season (Weeks 6-12) after being acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7. In his six Bengals starts, Flacco completed 61.6 percent of his passes (154 of 250) for 1636 yards and 13 TDs with four INTs. From his first start with the team through his most recent outing in Week 12, he ranked second in the NFL in completions, tied for third in

TD passes and fifth in passing yards. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. He began the season starting the Browns' first four games. He originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent his first 11 seasons with the Ravens, before stints with Denver ('19), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24). He won Super Bowl MVP honors after helping lead Baltimore to a title in the 2012 campaign, and in '23 he was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after helping steer the Browns to a playoff berth. QB **JaKe Browning** started three games for Cincinnati this season prior to Flacco's acquisition. He stepped into action following Burrow's injury in Week 2 against Jacksonville, and in that game passed for 241 yards and scored the game-winning TD on a QB sneak with 18 seconds remaining. Browning's totals on the season include 81 completions on 125 attempts (64.8 percent) for 771 yards and six TDs with eight INTs. He had a previous stint as the Bengals' starter in 2023, as he started the final seven games of that regular season and piloted the team to a 4-3 record. He spent his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20).

**Running backs:** HB **Chase Brown** is in his third pro season and first as Cincinnati's full-time primary running back. A dynamic all-around threat, he

recently reached 1000 yards from scrimmage for a second straight year, as he has 727 rushing yards on 172 carries along with 299 receiving yards on 51 receptions. He recorded at least 100 scrimmage yards in six consecutive games from Weeks 7-13, which marked the longest such streak in Bengals history and is the second-longest streak by any NFL player this season. Brown took over as the team's starting HB midway through the 2024 season, and in Weeks 9-17 of last year he ranked fourth in the NFL in scrimmage yards per game (116.3). His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at the University of Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB **Samaje Perine**. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. This season, Perine has 268 rushing yards and 52 receiving yards, and in Week 7 he surpassed 2000 career rushing yards. His season-high 94 rushing yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets were the fifth-most in any game of his career, and the most since Week 13 of the 2022 campaign. A sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals this year, HB **Tahj Brooks** has played in 12 games as a rookie, missing the Week 13 matchup at Baltimore due to a concussion. He has totaled nine rushing attempts for 28 yards along with five KORs for 127 yards. He had a record-setting collegiate career at Texas Tech, where he set school records for rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23). He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back).

**Wide receivers:** Cincinnati's 2021 first-round draft choice **Ja'Marr Chase** has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons and has broken several Bengals single-season records early in his pro career. He surpassed 1000 receiving yards on the season during the Week 14 game at Buffalo, becoming the fifth player in NFL history to reach that mark in each of his first five career seasons. He currently ranks third in the league in catches (91) and fourth in receiving yards (1015). In 2024, he led all players in receptions, (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17), becoming the youngest winner of the "Triple Crown" in the Super Bowl era (24 years old). Chase's 6440 receiving yards already are the fourth-most in a player's first five seasons in NFL history. He signed a four-year contract extension with the Bengals on March 18 of this year, the same day that his running mate **Tee Higgins** re-signed on a four-year deal. Higgins this season is tied for second in the NFL with nine receiving TDs, while his 667 receiving yards rank second on the team behind Chase. He is coming off a two-TD effort with 92 yards in Week 14 at Buffalo. He previously had a career-long streak of four consecutive games with at least one scoring catch from Weeks 7-11. In Week 9, Higgins eclipsed 5000 career receiving yards in his 79th regular-season game, becoming the fifth-fastest player in Bengals history to reach that milestone. Since entering the NFL as a second-round pick of Cincinnati in 2020, he is tied for eighth in the league in receiving TDs (43) and ranks 16th in receiving yards (5262). **Andre Iosivas** is in his third NFL season and continues to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He ranks third on the team with 363 receiving yards on 26 catches, after posting 36 receptions for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as 11 of his 12 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. In Week 13 at Baltimore, he caught a career-long 29-yard TD pass from Burrow to extend Cincinnati's lead in the third quarter. He was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he earned All-America honors as a heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. **Mitch Tinsley** earned a roster spot coming out of this past training camp and preseason, and through 13 regular-season games played he has seven receptions for 100 yards and two TDs. His first career reception was a 13-yard one-handed TD grab in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, and he found the end zone again on a 17-yard scoring pass from Flacco in Week 12 vs. New England. Tinsley joined the Bengals on a Reserve/Future contract in February, and turned heads in the team's second preseason game at Washington when he had two highlight-reel TDs. He originally was a college free agent signee of the Commanders in 2023 and played in two games as a rookie, then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. Tinsley finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-21). Third-year receiver **Charlie Jones** has served as the Bengals' primary return specialist since being selected in the fourth round of the 2023 draft, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. In 2022, his final collegiate season which

he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12).

**Tight ends:** A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 91 career regular-season games with 60 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season and has started in 33 of his last 39 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 107 career receptions for 768 yards and five TDs. He missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned at the start of the '23 season and has suited up for each of Cincinnati's last 44 games. Now in his seventh season, Sample is the Bengals' longest-tenured player. Eight-year veteran **Mike Gesicki** made his return in Week 12 vs. New England, after spending the previous four games on the Reserve/Injured list with a pectoral injury. He enjoyed his top statistical performance of the season in Week 14 at Buffalo, when he caught six passes for 86 yards and his first TD of the year. His season totals include 20 receptions for 201 yards in nine games played. A 2024 free agent signee, Gesicki logged 65 catches for 665 yards and two TDs in his debut Bengals campaign, with his receptions total marking the second-most ever in a season by a Cincinnati TE (Dan Ross, 71 in 1981). He entered the NFL as a second-round pick of Miami in 2018, and spent his first five seasons ('18-22) with the Dolphins before playing for the Patriots in '23. **Noah Fant** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late July of this year and quickly built a rapport with Cincinnati's quarterbacks. He has 33 catches for 283 yards and three TDs in 12 games played, with his latest scoring grab coming on a 23-yard pass from Flacco in Week 9 vs. Chicago. A former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), Fant spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21) and three with Seattle ('22-24). He has played in 107 career games with 89 starts, and his career totals include 333 receptions for 3588 yards and 18 TDs. After being held off the stat sheet through the first five games of this season, sixth-year TE **Tanner Hudson** scored a TD on his first catch of the year, a two-yarder from Flacco in Week 6 at Green Bay. He now has 13 receptions for 117 yards and two TDs over his last six games, including a one-handed 14-yard TD grab in Week 13 at Baltimore. He enjoyed his best statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with Cincinnati, as he posted career highs in catches (39) and yards (352) in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four postseason games. **Cam Grandy** began his 2024 rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, then signed to the active roster midway through the year and went on to play in eight games with six starts. He has six catches for 34 yards in his career, and this season has seen action in three contests with one start. Grandy was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University.

**Offensive linemen:** Headlining the Bengals' offensive line room is four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started all 40 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three NFL seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore and then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 33 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 83 regular-season games played. He has played all 829 offensive snaps through Cincinnati's first 13 games this season. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who is in his fourth season with the Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his four years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 66 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.6 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span (4343 of 4362). Off the field, he has twice been named the team's Club Winner for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award (2023 and '25), in recognition of his charitable efforts through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. The starting ROT is second-year pro **Amarius Mims**, who was Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2024 (No. 18 overall). Mims began his rookie season in a reserve role, but has started 26 of his last 27 games played. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Brown as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. Fellow rookie **Dylan Fairchild** was taken in the third round of this year's draft and started at LG in each of the first five games of the season, before missing the Week 6 contest at Green Bay due to a knee injury. He then was active/DNP in

Week 7, and returned to the starting lineup in Week 8. In 2024, his final season at the University of Georgia, he earned second-team All-America honors while blocking for a Bulldogs offense that ranked third in the Southeastern Conference in net passing yards per game (281.0). In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., Fairchild was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. G **Dalton Risner** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late August and has served as a versatile asset on the interior of the O-line. He has played in 10 games with seven starts, lining up for substantial amounts of snaps at both guard positions. Risner was a second-round draft pick of Denver in 2019 and spent his first four pro seasons ('19-22) with the Broncos, before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 97 career regular-season games with 88 starts — 75 at LG and 13 at RG. Rookie **Jalen Rivers** has seen action in all 13 games with seven starts at RG this season, lining up for 457 offensive snaps so far. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April, he boasted a proven ability to play at both tackle and guard spots during his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.). He was the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two seasons, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. He suited up for 38 total games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) at Miami. C **Lucas Patrick**, who started this year's opener at RG, was sidelined for six games due to a calf injury sustained at Cleveland. He was returned to the active roster from the Reserve/Injured list in Week 7, then made his return to game action in Week 8. Patrick joined the Bengals in this year's free agency period, after spending previous seasons with Green Bay (2016-21), Chicago ('22-23) and New Orleans ('24). He has played in 111 career regular-season games, and his 65 total starts have included 28 at center, 19 at LG and 18 at RG. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT **Cody Ford**, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. He has played 20 offensive snaps and 55 special teams snaps through 13 games this season. Ford was college teammates with Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17.

**Defensive linemen:** Ninth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson** has four sacks in seven games played this season, and has been inactive for six contests. Since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason, he has been voted to four Pro Bowls and tallied the fourth-most sacks in the NFL (61.0). He led the league with 17.5 sacks last season. Hendrickson entered the NFL as a third-round pick of New Orleans in 2017 and spent his first four seasons ('17-20) with the Saints. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 67 games played, including six postseason contests. A productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 19 sacks as a Bengal, with his most recent coming in Week 14 at Buffalo. He leads the team's D-line with 49 tackles this season, which includes three sacks and three TFLs. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.**, who joined the Bengals after spending his first four pro seasons (2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 81 regular-season games with 49 starts, including a current streak of 48 starts which began late in '22. He got in the sack column for the first time as a Bengal in Week 14 at Buffalo, as he brought down QB Josh Allen for a two-yard loss in the third quarter. He has 40 total tackles on the year, highlighted by a season-best five stops in Week 5 vs. Detroit. Fifth-year DE **Joseph Ossai** leads the team with five sacks this season. He recorded his first career multi-sack game in Week 13 at Baltimore, including a strip-sack that was recovered by Cincinnati deep in Ravens territory. He now has 10 sacks over his last 20 games played, dating back to Week 11 of the 2024 campaign. Originally a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, Ossai missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just three games in the past three-plus seasons. He was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has strung together several strong performances over the past month. He totaled 19 tackles over a four-game stretch from Weeks 9-13, which included a career-high seven stops with a sack in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. He missed the early part of the 2024 season due to an injury, but has played in 25 consecutive games since returning to the lineup. In 43 career games, he has 74 tackles with six TFLs and 5.5 sacks. Murphy amassed 17.5 career sacks at Clemson University,

where he earned first-team All-ACC honors in his final season. DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.**, the Bengals' second-round pick in 2024, has played in 28 games with 13 starts to begin his career. He contributed three sacks as a rookie, then got in the sack column for the first time this season in Week 3 at Minnesota. He has 64 total tackles in his young career, with seven coming over the past three games. In his final season at the University of Michigan in 2023, Jenkins earned second-team All-America honors and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., was a four-time Pro Bowler during his 10-year playing career (2001-10) as a DT for Carolina and the N.Y. Jets. Fifth-year DE **Cam Sample** made his return to the field at the start of this season after missing the entire 2024 campaign due to an Achilles injury. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 57 career games as a rotational lineman and has 77 tackles with five sacks. He has suited up for 10 games this season and has nine tackles with one TFL. He has been inactive for three contests this year, two of which were due to an oblique injury. Second-year DE **Cedric Johnson**, a sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, spent the first eight games of this season on the Reserve/Injured list due to a calf injury, then made his season debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago and has played in the past five contests. In addition to his six tackles on the year, he recorded his first two FRs in the first half of the Week 13 win at Baltimore. He saw action in nine games as a rookie last season and logged six tackles with one sack. DT **McKinnley Jackson**, a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, has seen action in five games this season and totaled three tackles. He played in 13 contests as a rookie last year and contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He was a two-time team captain at Texas A&M, where he played in 40 career games. The Bengals acquired DT **Jordan Jefferson** on waivers from San Francisco prior to Week 5 of this season. Originally a fourth-round draft pick of Jacksonville in 2024, he saw limited action for the Jaguars (2024) and 49ers ('25) before arriving in Cincinnati. He made his Bengals debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago, then has been active/DNP for the last four contests. Jefferson finished his college career at Louisiana State in 2023, following four seasons ('19-22) at West Virginia University. Third-year DE **Isaiah Foskey** signed to the active roster off the practice squad in mid-November and played 13 special teams snaps in the Week 14 contest at Buffalo. Foskey joined the practice squad in early September, after spending his first two NFL seasons in 2023 and '24 with New Orleans. He originally was a second-round draft choice of the Saints in 2023 and played in 27 games in his first two years as a rotational pass rusher and special teams contributor. In his final season at Notre Dame (2022), he played under current Bengals defensive coordinator and then-Fighting Irish defensive coordinator Al Golden.

**Linebackers:** Rookie LB **Demetrius Knight Jr.** was selected by the Bengals in the second round of this year's draft and has started 10 of his first 13 career games. His 88 tackles this season lead Cincinnati's LBs and rank second among all NFL rookies. He also has six PDs and two INTs, with his picks coming in Week 4 at Denver and Week 13 at Baltimore. He has totaled 10 or more tackles in three games, led by a career-best 12 stops in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. Knight shot up draft boards following a breakout 2024 campaign at the University of South Carolina, where he ranked second on the team with 82 tackles in his lone season with the Gamecocks. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. He was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB early in his college career. Fellow rookie **Barrett Carter** has started the past eight games, and his 86 tackles on the season rank third among all NFL rookies. He posted a career-high 16 tackles in Week 12 vs. New England, which tied for the fourth-most in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994. Cincinnati's fourth-round draft pick this past April, Carter put together a decorated final season at Clemson in 2024, as he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC pick, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). Eighth-year LB **Oren Burks** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. He was a key performer for the Eagles during their playoff run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four postseason games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. He has played in all 13 games with six starts for Cincinnati this season and has 31 total tackles one PD, one FF and one FR. He had his first takeaway as a member of the Bengals in Week 14 at Buffalo, recovering a fumble in the Cincinnati end zone late in the third quarter. LB **Joe Giles-Harris** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in April, after spending one week on the team's practice squad last season. He has seen action in 28 games in his pro career, totaling 20 defensive tackles and 21 special teams stops. He originally was a college free agent signee of the Jaguars in 2019, and had previous stints with Jacksonville

(2019-20, '24), Buffalo ('21-22) and New England ('23-24). He made his 2025 season debut in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and has played in six games this season, recording 11 special teams tackles.

**Cornerbacks:** CB **DJ Turner II** is enjoying a breakout campaign in his third pro season, as he currently leads the league with a career-high 17 PDs. He recorded five of those in Week 6 at Green Bay, becoming the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph in 2009. After missing the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, Turner opened this year with his first career INT to help seal the Week 1 win at Cleveland late in the fourth quarter. He then collected his second pick of the year in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. He originally was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2023 and has played in 41 career games with 30 starts. He ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine (4.26 seconds). A teammate of Turner's at the University of Michigan was **Dax Hill**, who spent his first two Bengals seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. Hill missed the final 12 games of the 2024 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned to full participation this past training camp and has started all 13 contests in '25. He leads the team's CBs with 76 tackles this season, while also recording seven PDs and an INT. Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2022, he contributed primarily on special teams as a rookie before starting all 17 games at safety in '23. Fifth-year CB **Jalen Davis** signed to the active roster prior to Week 14, after spending the first 13 weeks of the season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He has played in three games this year, including two as a practice squad elevation, and has logged nine tackles, one sack and one FF. His forced fumble came late in the fourth quarter of Week 13 at Baltimore and was recovered by the Bengals, helping punctuate a dominant defensive effort. Davis spent time with Miami (2018) and Arizona ('19), before joining the Bengals midway through the '20 season. He has had stints on the team's practice squad and active roster over the past five years, but saw action in 43 regular-season contests from 2021-23. Overall in his career, he has played in 60 games and registered 32 defensive tackles along with four special teams stops. CB **Josh Newton**, who the Bengals selected in the fifth round of the 2024 draft, played in 29 consecutive games to begin his career, before he was active/DNP in Cincinnati's most recent game at Buffalo. Newton stepped into the starting lineup for the final six games last season following Turner's injury, and in that stretch he recorded five PDs and his first career INT. He has 11 tackles with two PDs through 12 games (two starts) in 2025. He spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. CB **DJ Ivey** made his return to action midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals out of the University of Miami (Fla.), he has carved out a role on special teams and has nine career ST tackles in addition to six defensive stops. Ivey sealed Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of this season, as he knocked down a Steelers Hail Mary attempt as time expired.

**Safeties:** **Geno Stone** has started all 30 games he has played in for the Bengals since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason. He led Cincinnati with four INTs last year (tied for 10th in NFL), and has two picks through 13 contests this season. He notched his second career pick-six in Week 12 vs. New England, when he intercepted QB Drake Maye's pass and returned it 32 yards for a score. He also posted a career-high 13 tackles against the Patriots. Stone spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the AFC. His 13 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the second-most in the NFL. In addition to his two INTs this season, he has a career-high 93 tackles, four TFLs, two sacks and three PDs. Stone's fellow starting safety, **Jordan Battle**, leads the team this season in tackles (94) and INTs (three). His first two picks came in the first two games of the season, as he became the first Bengals player to start a year with INTs in back-to-back games since former CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle has played in 47 career games (26 starts) and has 216 total tackles along with five picks. He was a team captain

and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). Fourth-year pro **Tyzen Anderson** is a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two years, and his team-high 16 ST stops this season are tied for seventh-most in the NFL. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. **PJ Jules** cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. He has 14 special teams tackles and two defensive tackles through 13 regular-season games in 2025, after leading Cincinnati with 10 solo stops this past preseason. Second-year S **Daijahn Anthony** made his season debut in Week 13 at Baltimore, after spending the first 12 games on the Reserve/Injured list due to a hamstring injury. He has lined up for 20 special teams snaps through his first two games back in the lineup. As a rookie last season, Anthony played in 13 games and contributed primarily on special teams. He was a 2024 seventh-round pick, after a five-year college career in which he worked his way from Division II Shepherd University ('19-20) to Liberty University ('21-22) to the University of Mississippi ('23).

**Special teams:** A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, K **Evan McPherson** owns the third-highest career FG percentage in team history (83.0). He is 23-for-26 on FG attempts and a perfect 31-for-31 on PATs this season. In Week 12 vs. New England, he kicked a franchise-record 63-yard FG as the first half ended, and became the fourth kicker in NFL history with FGs from distances of at least 50 yards and at least 60 yards in a single game. He now has 28 career FGs from 50 or more yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since the start of his 2021 rookie season. McPherson followed up his franchise record with a career-high six made FGs in Week 13 at Baltimore, which earned him his fourth career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week award. His six FGs were the most by any kicker in the NFL this season and tied for the second-most in a game in Bengals history. McPherson has been operating at full health this season, after missing the final five games of 2024 due to a groin injury. Second-year P **Ryan Rehkow** leads the NFL this season in gross punting average (51.8 yards per punt) and is tied for ninth leaguewide in net average (42.4). He has 17 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line compared to 10 touchbacks. As a rookie in 2024, he set Bengals single-season punting records for both gross (49.11) and net (42.92) average, helping him earn a spot on the Pro Football Writers of American All-Rookie Team. In his career debut on Sept. 8, 2024 against New England, Rehkow set an NFL single-game record with 64.5 yards per punt (minimum four punts). Rookie **William Wagner** earned the role as the Bengals' long snapper coming out of this past training camp, and through his first 13 career games he has recorded 107 snaps without an unplayable delivery. He spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannelly Award (nation's top LS). WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. In Week 9 vs. Chicago, he ran back the opening kickoff 98 yards for a TD and finished the day with a career-best 179 yards on four KORs. It marked his third career TD on a return, as he previously found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of 2023 vs. Baltimore, and had a 100-yard KOR in Week 7 of '24 at Cleveland. He is one of two players in Bengals history with a TD via both kickoff and punt return, alongside former CB Lemar Parrish. Jones has 46 KORs for 1264 yards (27.5 average) in his career, while also contributing 49 PRs for 464 yards (9.5). Also in the mix to return kickoffs is HB **Samaje Perine**, who has 17 KORs this season for 430 yards (25.3), including a season-long 38-yarder in Week 9 vs. Chicago. While playing for Kansas City last season, he had five KORs for 163 yards (32.6). Rookie HB **Tahj Brooks** has contributed five KORs for 127 yards this season, highlighted by a 31-yarder against the Bears that set up a Bengals TD drive. WR **Mitch Tinsley** had his first career punt return in Week 13 at Baltimore, a 10-yarder which led to a Cincinnati scoring drive.

### Cincinnati Bengals 17, Cleveland Browns 16 Sunday, Sept. 7, 2025 at Huntington Bank Field

The Bengals' defense recorded two takeaways in the second half and held Cleveland scoreless on its final six possessions to lead the way in a season-opening victory. Cincinnati's offense was limited to 141 net yards, the second-fewest in a win in team history, but it scored a TD on two of its first three drives to build a 14-10 halftime lead. The Browns pulled ahead with a TD in the third quarter but missed the PAT attempt, and a 35-yard FG by Bengals K Evan McPherson later in the period regained the lead for Cincinnati. Cleveland drove inside the red zone with under five minutes remaining in regulation, but K Andre Szmyt's try for a 36-yard go-ahead FG sailed wide right. The Browns forced a quick Bengals punt and once again were driving for the win, before CB DJ Turner II came up with his first career INT on a ball that ricocheted off a Cleveland WR. P Ryan Rehkow then delivered a punt that was downed at the Browns' one-yard line, securing the win for Cincinnati.

Backup QB Jake Browning scored the go-ahead TD on a one-yard sneak with 18 seconds left to lead the Bengals to a win in their home opener. Browning, who entered the game in the second quarter after starter Joe Burrow suffered a toe injury, rallied from throwing three INTs to lead Cincinnati on a game-winning drive that started at its own eight-yard line. Defensively, the Bengals intercepted Jaguars QB Trevor Lawrence twice, including a pick by CB Dax Hill in the end zone which kept points off the board in the first quarter. Browning threw a pair of TD passes in the second half, including a 13-yarder to WR Mitch Tinsley for his first career reception. WR Ja'Marr Chase carried the load offensively with 14 catches for 165 yards and a first-quarter TD. Cincinnati improved to 2-0, while Jacksonville fell to 1-1.

The Bengals were driving inside Minnesota territory with a chance to cut into a 14-point deficit ahead of halftime, but they committed three fumbles over the final two minutes which the Vikings converted into 17 points. Denver scored 28 unanswered points and totaled 512 yards of net offense to defeat the Bengals in a nationally televised contest. Cincinnati took an early lead on a short FG from K Evan McPherson which capped off a 12-play, 62-yard opening drive, but the offense was forced to punt on every remaining possession and recorded just 97 yards the rest of the way. Cincinnati came up with a stop on fourth down near its own goal line late in the second quarter, as rookie LB Demetrius Knight Jr. picked off Broncos QB Bo Nix in the end zone for his first career INT. But Denver regained possession shortly after and put together a quick scoring drive at the end of the half to build its lead. Though the Bengals' defense kept the Broncos off the board through most of the second half, Nix punctuated the night with his second TD pass late in the fourth quarter. Cincinnati fell to 2-2, while Denver improved to 2-2.

**WEEK 7, GAME 7****Cincinnati Bengals 33, Pittsburgh Steelers 31**

In a high-scoring, nationally televised matchup which saw the two offenses combine for 866 net yards, the Bengals put together a late drive to set up K Evan McPherson's 36-yard game-winning FG on Thursday Night Football. It marked the third regular-season game in NFL history between two starting QBs over 40 years old, as Joe Flacco, 40, passed for 342 yards and three TDs for the Bengals while Aaron Rodgers, 41, had 249 yards and four passing TDs for the Steelers. Flacco leaned heavily on WR Ja'Marr Chase, who finished with a Bengals-record 16 receptions for 161 yards and a TD. The Steelers took the lead with 2:21 remaining when Rodgers found TE Pat Freiermuth for a 68-yard TD, but Flacco engineered a quick drive down the field and connected on a 28-yard pass to WR Tee Higgins to get inside McPherson's range. Cincinnati picked off Rodgers twice in the second quarter and scored 17 points late in the period to pull ahead at halftime. The Bengals' offense also was aided by a strong rushing attack, led by HB Chase Brown's 9.8 yards per carry. Cincinnati improved to 3-4, while Pittsburgh fell to 4-2.

The Bengals led by three and had the ball in Bills territory midway through the fourth quarter, when CB Christian Benford picked off Burrow's pass and returned it for a TD to put Buffalo ahead for the first time. Cincinnati's defense had a final chance to get the ball back to Burrow late in the fourth, but Bills QB Josh Allen scrambled for a first down on third-and-15 to close it out. Cincinnati fell to 4-9, while Buffalo improved to 9-4.
