GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 7 p.m. Eastern.

Television: Live coverage on the Bengals Preseason TV Network with broadcasters Mike Watts (play-by-play) and Anthony Munoz (analyst). The network is led by flagship WXIX-TV (FOX Channel 19) in Cincinnati. Also on the network are WKEF-TV (Ch. 22) in Dayton, Ohio; WSYX-TV (Ch. 6) in Columbus, Ohio; WLIO-TV (Ch. 8.2) in Lima, Ohio; WLEX-TV (Ch. 18) in Lexington, Ky.; and WDRB-TV (Ch. 41) in Louisville, Ky.

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals get the preseason underway on Thursday night when they host the Detroit Lions at Paycor Stadium.

Cincinnati heads into the 2026 campaign with elevated expectations after an aggressive offseason which saw the front office infuse a blend of talent and experience into the roster. The team utilized every resource at its disposal for acquiring new pieces, including free agency, a headline trade and the NFL Draft. Each addition was crafted with the goal of cultivating a roster that can return the Bengals to contention for the franchise's first Super Bowl title.

"We had a lot of really good opportunities come to us this year," said Bengals director of player personnel Duke Tobin. "What the personnel department and ownership did is respond and make those opportunities realities.

"We've had a lot of rosters over the years I've been here. I feel really good about this roster. I think we've got a lot of pieces that have been proven, productive NFL players either here or elsewhere. The group has to come together... From what I've seen so far, this is a motivated group that is hungry to show what they can do."

The new additions look to complement a talented nucleus of existing players led by Pro Bowl QB Joe Burrow, who enters his seventh NFL season. Burrow is coming off a 2025 season in which he missed nine games due to an injury, but returned to action for the final six contests and once again performed among the league's top passers. The NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage (68.5) is flanked by explosive playmakers including WR Ja'Marr Chase, WR Tee Higgins and HB Chase Brown. Chase has established himself as arguably the best receiver in the NFL over the past two seasons, as he followed up a "Triple Crown" campaign in 2024 with 125 catches for 1412 yards in '25. Higgins, meanwhile, has netted a combined 21 receiving TDs in the last two years (fourth-most in NFL), and Brown looks to build off a breakout 2025 showing in which he posted 1456 yards from scrimmage.

The defensive side of the ball housed most of the Bengals' offseason additions, with the most notable coming in the form of three-time Pro Bowl DT Dexter Lawrence II. Lawrence, who spent his first seven seasons with the N.Y. Giants, was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade less than a week ahead of the draft in late April. The Bengals had already shored up several defensive positions during free agency, bringing in the likes of DT Jonathan Allen (spent 2025 with Minnesota), DE Boye Mafe (Seattle) and S Bryan Cook (Kansas City). With their second-round draft selection, the team took DE Cashius Howell, the 2025 Southeastern Conference Defensive Player of the Year out of Texas A&M University.

While head coach Zac Taylor remains cognizant of the work yet to be done, he echoed Tobin's assessment that the structure of the roster yields every opportunity to compete for an AFC North Division crown and more.

"We've got what we need," said Taylor. "With everybody upstairs and ownership and personnel doing an unbelievable job, trying to provide us with the resources to go in — it's on the players and the coaches to go get it done."

Taylor has indicated that the team's starters will see action in Thursday's preseason game. Following the contest against Detroit, Cincinnati will host Chicago in a joint practice on Aug. 20 and then play the Bears two days later at Paycor Stadium. The Bengals close out the preseason on the road against Philadelphia on Aug. 28, just over two weeks ahead of their regular-season opener against Tampa Bay on Sunday, Sept. 13.

The series: This week's game is the 38th edition of the Bengals' most-played preseason series. The Bengals lead the preseason series, but it's close — very close. Cincinnati is ahead by only one game overall 19-18, and the preseason series is also tied (9-9) with the Bengals as the home team.

The Bengals won the most recent preseason meeting 30-14 in 2016 at Detroit, and that game broke a three-game Lions winning streak.

Though the teams have played 37 times in preseason previously, this contest will mark the first Bengals-Lions preseason matchup of head coach Zac Taylor's Bengals career. The Bengals and Lions met every year in preseason from 1970-2001, but this week's game is just their sixth preseason meeting since '02.

The teams have met 14 times in the regular season, and Cincinnati's 10-4 record works out to the best winning percentage (.714) for the Bengals against any NFL foe. Cincinnati has won 10 of the most recent 12 meetings with Detroit when playing for keeps, after the Lions began the series 2-0.

The Bengals and Lions will not play in the 2026 regular season.

Bengals-Lions connections: Bengals head coach Zac Taylor spent the 2012-15 seasons on the Miami Dolphins' coaching staff as assistant quarterbacks coach ('12), QBs coach ('13-15) and interim offensive coordinator ('15), when Lions head coach Dan Campbell served as tight ends coach for the Dolphins ... Taylor later served as assistant wide receivers coach (2017) and QBs coach ('18) for the L.A. Rams, when Lions QB Jared Goff played for the Rams ... Bengals defensive coordinator Al Golden spent the 2016-19 seasons on the Lions' coaching staff, serving as TEs coach from '16-17 and linebackers coach from '18-19 ... Bengals WRs coach Troy Walters played WR for the Lions in 2007 ... Bengals assistant offensive line coach Michael McCarthy served as an offensive quality control coach and assistant O-line coach for the Lions from 2016-17 ... Lions assistant WRs coach Bruce Gradkowski played QB for the Bengals from 2011-13 ... Bengals OT Javon Foster is a native of Detroit and attended West Bloomfield High School in West Bloomfield, Mich. ... Lions LB Joe Bachie played for the Bengals from 2021-24 ... Uniform watch: The Bengals will wear white jerseys, black pants (orange stripes) and white socks this week against Detroit. Cincinnati has worn this combination 13 times in regular-season games since the team's uniform redesign in 2021, compiling a 7-6 record in those contests. The last time the Bengals featured this look was in Week 6 of last season at Green Bay.

Cincinnati wore nine different uniform combinations during the 2025 regular season, with three different jerseys, four pants and three socks featured at least once. The team's most frequent combination last season was white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks, which was worn four times (all road games).

The Bengals' redesign in 2021 marked the team's first significant change in

uniform since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet six times and collected a 5-1 record in those games. The Bengals announced they will don the white helmet twice this season, in Week 10 against Pittsburgh on Sunday Night Football and in Week 17 against Baltimore on Thursday Night Football (both home games).

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

Bengals career records watch: As the 2026 season approaches, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records list (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 2806 career passing attempts, which are the fifth-most in team history and 411 shy of QB Carson Palmer (3217) for fourth-most. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449) and Boomer Esiason (3564) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- Burrow has completed 1921 career passes, the fifth-most in team history and 94 shy of Esiason (2015) for fourth. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654) and Palmer (2024) hold the top three spots.

- Burrow has 20,810 career passing yards, the fifth-most in team history and 3693 shy of Palmer (22,694) for fourth. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594) and Esiason (27,149) hold the top three spots.

- Burrow has 157 career TD passes, fourth-most in team history and 30 shy of Esiason (187) for third. Dalton (204) and Anderson (197) are the top two spots.

- Burrow has 28 career games with 300 or more passing yards, which are tied with Dalton for the team's all-time record.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 520 career receptions, the fourth-most in team history and 10 shy of WR Carl Pickens (530) for third. WRs Chad Johnson (751) and A.J. Green (649) hold the top two spots.
- Chase has 6837 career receiving yards, the fifth-most in team history and 50 shy of Pickens (6887) for fourth. Johnson (10,783), Green (9430) and WR Isaac Curtis (7101) hold the top three spots.
- Chase has 54 career receiving TDs, the fourth-most in team history and nine shy of Pickens (63) for third. Johnson (66) and Green (65) hold the top two spots.
- Chase has 26 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, the third-most in team history and five shy of Johnson (31) for second. Green (33) has the team record for most such games.

- Chase has 6906 career yards from scrimmage (69 rushing, 6837 receiving), the seventh-most in team history. He is 271 scrimmage yards shy of Curtis (7177) for sixth-most and 1645 yards shy of HB Joe Mixon (8551) for fifth.
- WR Tee Higgins has 45 career receiving TDs, the sixth-most in team history and eight shy of Curtis (53) for fifth.
- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 561 career points, the fifth-most in team history and 99 shy of fourth-most, which is held by K Doug Pelfrey (660).
- McPherson has 119 career FGs, the sixth-most in team history and one shy of K Horst Muhlmann (120) for fifth. Pelfrey is in fourth place with 153 FGs.
- McPherson has 204 career made PATs, the fourth-most in team history and 43 shy of K Mike Nugent (247) for third. Kickers Jim Breech (476) and Shayne Graham (248) hold the top two spots.
- P Ryan Rehkow enters the 2026 season as the team's career leader in average yards per punt (49.90) and net yards per punt (42.91). Former P Kevin Huber is second in both categories, with a 45.27-yard career gross average and 40.19-yard net average.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2026 season is his eighth in the position.

In 2025, Taylor once again orchestrated an offense which ranked near the top of the NFL in several metrics, including sixth in net passing yards per game (235.6), fifth in third-down efficiency (43.4 percent) and second in red zone TD percentage (66.7). After QB Joe Burrow sustained a toe injury early in the year that ultimately caused him to miss nine games, the team acquired QB Joe Flacco in a trade with Cleveland, and Taylor helped the 18th-year veteran quickly assimilate in his system. Over his six starts for the Bengals, Flacco ranked second leaguewide in completions (154) and fifth in passing yards (1636). With Burrow behind center for the final six weeks of the regular season, Taylor guided Cincinnati to top-10 league rankings in scoring (sixth; 27.7 points) and total yards (fourth; 369.7). Taylor also again helped WR Ja'Marr Chase compile an All-Pro season in 2025, as the fifth-year standout finished third in the NFL in receptions (125) and fourth in receiving yards (1412). Chase's running mate, sixth-year WR Tee Higgins, tied for second in the league with a career-high 11 receiving TDs. Taylor additionally continued to expand third-year HB Chase Brown's role in the offense, as he posted his first career 1000-yard rushing season and had a career-high 69 catches for 437 yards. The 2025 campaign also saw Taylor work with first-year defensive coordinator Al Golden as Cincinnati improved in nearly every statistical metric in the second half of the season compared to the first. Following the team's Week 10 bye, the Bengals tied for fifth in the NFL in takeaways (12) and tied for seventh in sacks (22).

In 2024, Taylor guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season with a record of 9-8. After falling to 4-8 in early December, he led Cincinnati to five straight wins to vault back into the AFC playoff picture. He oversaw one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards (272.9) and ranked sixth in scoring (27.8). Burrow set numerous single-season Bengals records and led all NFL QBs in passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43), while Chase became the youngest player in the Super Bowl era to win the receiving "Triple Crown," as he paced the league in catches (127), receiving yards (1708) and TD catches (17). The individual performances earned Burrow his second career Pro Bowl nod and the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year award, while Chase was named a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press.

In 2023, Taylor led Cincinnati to a 9-8 mark despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. In 2021 and '22, he led the Bengals to back-to-back AFC North titles, marking the first time in team history Cincinnati won its division in consecutive years.

The 2021 division title was the Bengals' first in six years. The team went on to win three postseason games and claim the AFC Championship (Cincinnati's first since 1988) and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing in his first full season in Taylor's system, was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after leading the league in completion percentage (70.4), while Chase took home Offensive Rookie of the Year honors after posting the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed).

In 2022, the Bengals made a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship. After entering November with a 4-4 record, Taylor helped Cincinnati tie team regular-season records for consecutive wins (eight) and total wins (12) to earn the No. 3 seed in the AFC playoffs. Offensively, the Bengals ranked fifth in the NFL in passing (265.0) and seventh in scoring (26.1), while defensively Cincinnati held opposing passers to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage. After the 2022 postseason, Taylor's postseason record improved to 5-2.

In the postseason, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to

defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He broke into NFL coaching with Miami as assistant quarterbacks coach in 2012, then was elevated to quarterbacks coach for the Dolphins from 2013-15.

Taylor had two stints in the college coaching ranks, serving on staff at Texas A&M (2008-11) and Cincinnati (2016). At UC, he served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville.

Taylor played QB at Wake Forest (2002-03), Butler County (Kan.) C.C. (2004) and Nebraska (2005-06). In 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year and led the Cornhuskers to an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017. He joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp. He then spent the 2007 season with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League (did not play).

Taylor was born on May 10, 1983, in Norman, Okla. He graduated from Nebraska in 2006 with a degree in communication studies. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman. Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at Oklahoma (1976-79), then later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played QB at Marshall and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Dan Campbell was named the Lions' 28th head coach on Jan. 21, 2021. He is in his sixth season. Under him, the Lions have secured two NFC North division titles, an NFC Championship appearance and a 15-win season for the first time in franchise history.

In his first five seasons with Detroit, Campbell's team has ranked top 10 in almost every major offensive category while producing 13 Pro Bowlers and nine All-Pros. Heading into the 2026 season, the Lions rank first in total yards (31,962) under Campbell (since '21), as well as second in total touchdowns (274) and third in points scored (2284).

Campbell has 25 years of NFL experience, including 14 years as a coach and 11 as a player. He previously served as the assistant head coach/TEs coach for the New Orleans Saints, a position he held since 2016.

During his five years with New Orleans, the Saints captured four NFC South division titles and ranked first in the NFL in points scored (2361), TDs (277) and net yardage (31,147), and they posted the third-most wins (56) in the NFL.

In 2015, Campbell became the Miami Dolphins' interim head coach, where he took over a 1-3 team and guided them to a 5-7 finish. Under him, the Dolphins improved eight spots in the NFL's rushing yards per game rankings and saw five Dolphins selected to the Pro Bowl. Campbell initially went to Miami in 2010 as a coaching intern before overseeing the TE's unit for five seasons (2011-15).

Campbell was born on April 13, 1976 in Clifton, Texas. He and his wife, Holly, have a son, Cody, and a daughter, Piper. He earned a bachelor's degree in agricultural development from Texas A&M.

Taylor vs. Lions: The regular-season series is tied, 1-1. Taylor has not faced the Lions in preseason.

Taylor vs. Campbell: The regular-season series is tied, 1-1. The two coaches have not met in preseason.

Campbell vs. Bengals: The regular-season series is tied, 1-1. Campbell has not faced the Bengals in preseason.

2026 coaching staff: Head coach Zac Taylor retained nearly the entire coaching staff from the 2025 season, with several assistant coaches on both sides of the ball receiving title changes. The lone addition to the staff during the offseason was Davis Koetter, who was hired as assistant wide receivers coach in February. Koetter spent the 2025 campaign as assistant quarterbacks coach at the University of South Carolina, following two years ('23-24) on staff at the University of Texas.

Four coaches have updated titles entering 2026, including James Casey, who now has the additional title of run game coordinator in addition to his existing role as tight ends coach. Jordan Salkin, who served as assistant WRs coach in 2025, now moves to assistant QBs coach. Ronnie Regula was promoted to assistant linebackers coach after previously serving as defensive assistant, while Mike Moon was promoted to assistant defensive line coach after also previously serving as defensive assistant.

2026 schedule notes: In addition to their six games against teams in the AFC North Division, the Bengals will face all teams in the AFC South and NFC South in 2026.

Cincinnati also will play two games — on the road against Miami (Week 5) and at home against Kansas City (Week 14) — that were determined by divisional standings in the 2025 season. As third-place finishers in the AFC North, the Bengals are matched up against the third-place teams from the AFC East (Dolphins) and AFC West (Chiefs).

In 2021, the NFL added a 17th game to the regular-season schedule, and for Cincinnati in '26 that will be a road contest against Washington on Monday Night Football in Week 11. The additional game each year features an interconference matchup and is based on the prior season's standings on a rotating four-year cycle. These contests match a first-place team from one division with a first-place team in an opposite-conference division that the team is not scheduled to play that season. The second, third and fourth-place finishers in each division are matched the same way. The home conference for this game alternates each season, with the NFC hosting the game in 2026. The Bengals have won this matchup in each of the past three seasons.

For the second time in team history, Cincinnati will face all three Florida-based teams in the same season. The Bengals open the regular-season slate against Tampa Bay in Week 1, then welcome Jacksonville to Paycor Stadium in Week 4 and travel to Miami in Week 5. The only other instance in team history in which all three Florida teams were on the schedule was 1995 — the Jaguars' inaugural season.

The Bengals' bye week in 2026 falls in Week 6, which marks the team's earliest bye since 2017 (also Week 6).

Bengals travel to Madrid in Week 9: Cincinnati will go abroad for the third time in team history when it faces the Atlanta Falcons in Madrid, Spain as part of the NFL's 2026 International Games. The game, which officially counts as a road contest for the Bengals, will be played on Sunday, Nov. 8 (Week 9) at Bernabéu Stadium, the home of historic soccer club Real Madrid.

The Bengals' two previous international games were both played at Wembley Stadium in London, as they faced Washington in the 2016 season and the L.A. Rams in '19. Both of those contests counted as home games for Cincinnati.

Madrid hosted its first NFL game in Week 11 of last season, when Miami defeated Washington in overtime. This year's Madrid game is one of nine international games to be played in 2026 across four continents, seven countries and eight stadiums.

Season record book movement in '25: Here is a look at movement on the Bengals' single-season record charts that occurred during the 2025 campaign:

- WR Ja'Marr Chase had 125 receptions, the second-most in Bengals history behind his own team record of 127 catches in the 2024 season.
- Chase had seven games with 100 or more receiving yards, the most in team history. He surpassed WR A.J. Green's previous team record of six such games in 2013.
- K Evan McPherson converted 89.29 percent of his FG attempts (25 of 28), the third-highest percentage in team history (minimum one attempt per team's games in season). K Shayne Graham (91.18 in 2007) is the team's record holder, and K Randy Bullock (90.00 in '17) ranks second.
- P Ryan Rehkow averaged 50.54 yards per punt (65 for 3285 yards), surpassing his own team record of 49.11 in 2024.
- Rehkow averaged 42.89 net yards per punt, the second-highest mark in team history behind his own team record of 42.92 in 2024.
- Rehkow had 28 inside-20 punts, which tied P Kyle Larson in 2008 and P Kevin Huber in '10 for the fifth-most in team history.

Bengals send four to Pro Bowl: Bengals QB Joe Burrow, WR Ja'Marr Chase, QB Joe Flacco and WR Tee Higgins were selected to the AFC team for the 2026 Pro Bowl Games. It marked the 15th time in team history in which Cincinnati had four or more Pro Bowlers.

Chase earned his fifth career, and fifth consecutive, selection. He also was voted a starter at his position for the second straight season. He is the second player in Bengals history to receive a Pro Bowl nod in each of his first five seasons, joining WR A.J. Green, who started his career with seven straight selections from 2011-17.

Burrow collected his third career Pro Bowl recognition after previously receiving the honor in the 2022 and '24 seasons. He became the fourth QB in team history to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections, joining Ken Anderson (four selections), Andy Dalton (three) and Boomer Esiason (three).

Flacco and Higgins each received their first career Pro Bowl recognition. Chase and Higgins became the first Bengals WR duo to make the Pro Bowl in the same season since T.J. Houshmandzadeh and Chad Johnson in 2007.

The 2026 Pro Bowl Games took place on Tuesday, Feb. 3 at the Moscone Center in San Francisco, Calif.

Burrow on the mark: QB Joe Burrow, who enters his seventh pro season in 2026, holds the NFL record for career completion percentage (68.46; minimum 1500 passing attempts). He has connected on 1921 of 2806 total passes, and is coming off a 2025 campaign in which he went 173-for-259 (66.79 percent).

Burrow has 28 career games with a completion percentage of 70 or higher on at least 30 attempts. That marks the most such games in a player's first six seasons in NFL history, with the next closest being Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (25 games). Burrow met those statistical benchmarks in back-to-back contests late in the 2025 season, as he went 25-for-32 (78.1 percent) in Week 16 at Miami, then followed up by going 24-for-31 (77.4) in Week 17 vs. Arizona.

Coincidentally, prior to those two games, the last time an NFL QB had at least 30 passing attempts, a completion percentage of 70 or higher, and zero INTs in consecutive games was Burrow in Weeks 16 and 17 of 2024.

In Week 14 of the 2025 campaign at Buffalo, Burrow eclipsed 1800 career completions in what was his 73rd regular-season game. He tied Mahomes and L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert as the fastest players in NFL history to reach 1800 completions (in terms of games played).

Burrow has ranked in the top five in the NFL in completion percentage in three of his first six seasons, as he led the league in 2021 with a 70.4 percentage, ranked second in '22 (68.3) and fourth in '24 (70.6). His official clip of 70.552 percent in 2024 set a Bengals single-season record, narrowly edging out QB Ken Anderson's completion rate of 70.550 in 1982.

Joe hits career milestones in '25: QB Joe Burrow returned from a toe injury in late November of 2025 and started each of the Bengals' final six contests of the season. During that closing stretch, he led the NFL in completions (152), while ranking tied for second in TD passes (15), third in passing yards (1620), fifth in completion percentage (68.2) and fifth in passer rating (102.2). Perhaps the most memorable performance over that span came

in Week 16, when he played in his 75th career regular-season game and reached a pair of passing milestones.

Early in the first quarter of the Dolphins game, Burrow eclipsed 20,000 career passing yards when he connected on a 35-yard pass to WR Tee Higgins. His 75 games needed to reach that mark were the fifth-fewest in NFL history, trailing only Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (67 games), former Detroit QB Matthew Stafford (71), former Miami QB Dan Marino (74) and former Indianapolis QB Andrew Luck (74).

In the third quarter of the win over Miami, Burrow threw his 150th career TD pass when he hit HB Chase Brown for a nine-yard score. He became the third-fastest QB in league history to reach 150 passing TDs, trailing Marino (62 games) and Mahomes (63).

Burrow finished the Dolphins game with 25 completions on 32 attempts (78.1 percent) for 309 yards and four TDs with no INTs. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Week for the eighth time in his career, and his passer rating of 146.5 was the second-highest he has ever posted.

Burrow's career completions total following the Miami contest was 1868, the most completions in NFL history by a player through their first 75 games.

Flacco's starting stint: QB Joe Flacco, enters his 19th NFL season in 2026, started six games for Cincinnati in '25 after being acquired in a trade with Cleveland in early October. From his first Bengals start in Week 6 through his final start in Week 12, he ranked second in the NFL in completions (154), tied for third in TD passes (13) and fifth in passing yards (1636).

Flacco's first start came just five days after his acquisition, on Oct. 12 at Green Bay. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he became the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. Operating in a new offensive system and alongside new teammates, he threw for 219 yards and two TDs, with 179 of those yards coming in the second half.

Just four days later, Flacco helped lead the Bengals to a home victory over Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football. He passed for 342 yards and three TDs with no INTs, good for a 108.6 rating. After the Steelers took the lead with 2:21 left in regulation, he engineered an eight-play, 52-yard drive to set up the game-winning FG. He became the fourth QB in NFL history with at least 300 passing yards, three TD passes and zero INTs in a game after turning 40 years old, joining Tom Brady (12 such games), Drew Brees (two) and Brett Favre (two).

In Week 9 vs. Chicago, Flacco threw for a career-high 470 yards and four TDs. It marked the first time in his career that he crossed the 400-yard passing threshold, and it was the most passing yards in a game by a QB over 40 years old in league history. Two of his TD passes came in the final two minutes of regulation to help Cincinnati turn a 14-point deficit into a one-point lead. The following game, in Week 11 at Pittsburgh, Flacco became the 17th QB in NFL history to make 200 regular-season starts.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase wrapped up his fifth pro season in 2025, and his career totals to this point rival some of the NFL's all-time greats through their first five years in the league.

Among all players in NFL history through their first five seasons, Chase ranks second in receptions (520), trailing only Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown, who also wrapped up his fifth year in 2025 and has a league-record 547 catches. Chase's 6837 receiving yards also are the second-most in NFL history in a player's first five seasons, behind his former Louisiana State teammate and current Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson, who notched 7432 yards from 2020-24.

Chase additionally has 54 career receiving TDs, which are tied with Pro Football Hall of Famer Lance Alworth and former New England TE Rob

Gronkowski for the fourth-most in a player's first five seasons. Only Hall of Famers Jerry Rice (66) and Randy Moss (60), as well as former Dallas WR Dez Bryant (56), caught more TDs in their first five years.

Chase is the only player in NFL history with at least 500 receptions and 50 receiving TDs in his first five seasons. He also is the first player ever with at least 80 catches, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first five years.

Chase surpassed 1000 receiving yards in 2025 during the Bengals' Week 14 game at Buffalo. He became the fifth player in league history to reach the 1000-yard receiving mark in each of his first five career seasons, joining Jefferson, Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green and former Tampa Bay/current San Francisco WR Mike Evans.

In Cincinnati's Week 7 win over Pittsburgh last season, Chase surpassed 6000 career receiving yards in what was his 69th regular-season game. He became the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone, trailing Alworth (62 games), Jefferson (62), former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (64) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (67).

Chase holds a career average of 87.7 receiving yards per game (6837 in 78 games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (95.3) and Jefferson (90.2).

Since entering the NFL as a first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) of the Bengals in 2021, Chase ranks second among all players in catches, receiving yards and receiving TDs.

Chase was voted a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press for the second consecutive season in 2025. He became the fourth Bengals offensive player to receive multiple All-Pro accolades in his career, joining OT Anthony Munoz (nine selections), OT Willie Anderson (three) and WR Chad Johnson (two).

1+5=6: WR Ja'Marr Chase has an NFL-leading 25 receiving TDs over the past two seasons, with a Bengals-record 17 in the 2024 campaign (led NFL) followed by eight in '25 (tied for 11th). Not far behind him in that category is teammate Tee Higgins, whose 21 total TD catches in that span rank fourth leaguewide. Higgins caught 10 scoring passes in 2024 (tied for sixth in NFL), then set a career high with 11 last season (tied for second).

Chase and Higgins' 46 combined TD grabs are the most by any NFL duo over a span of two seasons since 2013-14, when Denver WR Demaryius Thomas and TE Julius Thomas teamed up for 49.

Chase's 54 career receiving TDs are the second-most in the league since the start of his 2021 rookie season, and already are the fourth-most ever by a Bengal. He enters 2026 needing 12 TDs to tie former WR Chad Johnson's team record of 66.

Higgins became the third player in Bengals history with double-digit receiving TDs in consecutive seasons, joining former WRs Carl Pickens (1994-96) and A.J. Green (2012-13). He heads into 2026 with 45 career TD catches, which are the sixth most in Bengals history and tied for the seventh most in the NFL since he entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2020.

Always open: After leading the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 receptions in 2024, Chase followed up with 125 catches in '25, which ranked third in the league and second in team history. He became the third player in NFL history with at least 125 receptions in consecutive seasons, joining former Pittsburgh WR Antonio Brown (2014-15) and former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas ('18-19).

Chase totaled 10 or more catches five times during the 2025 season, including a stretch of three straight contests from Weeks 6-8. He brought in 10 receptions in Week 6 at Green Bay, had a Bengals-record 16 in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh just four days later, then logged 12 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. He became the first player in team history to register double-digit catches in three consecutive games.

In the Week 7 win over the Steelers, Chase broke his own previous Bengals single-game record of 15 receptions, which he amassed in Week 5 of the 2023 season at Arizona. He now owns the four highest single-game reception totals in

team history.

Chase's four career games with 14 or more catches are tied with Brown for the second-most in NFL history. Former L.A. Chargers/Chicago WR Keenan Allen holds the league record with six such games in his career.

Brown does it all: In his third pro season in 2025, HB Chase Brown recorded career highs in rushing attempts (232), rushing yards (1019), receptions (69), receiving yards (437) and receiving TDs (five). His 1456 yards from scrimmage led the Bengals and ranked ninth among all NFL running backs.

Brown was one of five players in the 2025 season with at least 1000 rushing yards and 400 receiving yards, alongside Miami RB De'Von Achane, Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs, San Francisco RB Christian McCaffrey and Atlanta RB Bijan Robinson. His 69 catches were the most ever in a season by a Bengals player listed as an RB/HB/FB, surpassing HB Joe Mixon's 60 grabs in 2022.

Brown totaled 100 or more yards from scrimmage in eight games in 2025, highlighted by a streak of six consecutive games from Weeks 7-13. That marked the longest such streak in Bengals history, and tied for the second-longest in the NFL in 2025 behind a seven-game stretch by McCaffrey (Weeks 1-7).

Brown additionally tied his career high with 11 total TDs in 2025 (six rushing, five receiving), matching his total from the '24 campaign. He became the first Bengals running back with double-digit TDs in consecutive seasons since HB Rudi Johnson (2004-06). He had a career-best three TDs (one rushing, two receiving) in Week 16 at Miami, with all three scores occurring in a span of seven minutes and 18 seconds of game time in the third quarter.

Brown's 1456 scrimmage yards also marked the most in a season by a Canadian-born player in NFL history. A native of London, Ontario, he was a fifth-round draft choice of the Bengals out of the University of Illinois in 2023.

Continuity along the O-line: The Bengals' offensive line featured three players — LOT Orlando Brown Jr., C Ted Karras and ROT Amarius Mims — who started all 17 games in the 2025 regular season, with Brown and Karras both lining up for all of the team's 1110 offensive snaps.

The O-line additionally featured LG Dylan Fairchild starting 15 contests in his rookie campaign, and Dalton Risner, who signed with Cincinnati late in training camp, starting 11 (nine at RG, two at LG). Jalen Rivers, the Bengals' fifth-round draft pick in 2025, also entered the starting lineup at RG for seven straight games early in the year.

The line pass protected for three starting QBs during the season, on an offense which ranked sixth in the NFL in net passing yards per game (235.6). The most sacks allowed by the Bengals in any game in 2025 was four, which occurred just once in Week 3 at Minnesota. Cincinnati gave up a sack on 5.63 percent of the team's total passing attempts, the 10th-best rate in the NFL.

Over a stretch of eight games from Weeks 6-14, Cincinnati allowed just 11 total sacks, which tied for the third-fewest in the NFL during that span. It also marked the fewest sacks given up by the Bengals in an eight-game stretch since they also allowed 11 over the first eight contests of the 2015 season.

Key defensive additions: The Bengals added six veteran players to their defense during the 2026 offseason, with five joining the team as unrestricted free agents and one — DT Dexter Lawrence II — acquired via trade. Here is a closer look at those additions, ordered by the date of their signing:

- S Bryan Cook: A Cincinnati native who played his final two collegiate seasons (2020-21) at the University of Cincinnati, Cook signed with his hometown Bengals on March 12, the first full day of free agency. He played in 62 regular-season games (47 starts) over his first four pro seasons with Kansas City, and was a member of two Super Bowl-winning Chiefs teams in 2022 and '23. He is coming off career highs in total tackles (82) and passes defended (six) in the 2025 campaign.

- DE Boye Mafe: Mafe won a Super Bowl title with Seattle in February, then signed with Cincinnati just over a month later on March 12. A second-round draft pick of the Seahawks in 2022, he racked up 20 sacks over his first four NFL seasons. In 2023, he recorded a sack in seven straight games, the longest streak in Seahawks history.

- **DT Jonathan Allen:** Allen signed with the Bengals for his 10th NFL season on March 13, providing Cincinnati with a proven interior defensive lineman who has 130 games of pro experience (including postseason). He spent his first eight years (2017-24) with Washington, before playing for Minnesota in '25. A two-time Pro Bowler (2021-22 seasons), he has 469 career tackles with 67 TFLs and 45.5 sacks — the eighth-most by any NFL defensive tackle since he entered the league.
- **S Kyle Dugger:** After spending the final nine games of the 2025 season with Pittsburgh, Dugger moved across the division by signing with Cincinnati on April 2. He played for New England from 2020 through October '25, spending most of that time as a starting safety for the Patriots, before being acquired by the Steelers in a trade. He has 29 career PDs and 11 INTs, including a pick-six against the Bengals while playing for Pittsburgh in Week 11 of last season.
- **CB Ja'Sir Taylor:** Taylor also signed with the Bengals on April 2, and similarly to Dugger was traded in the middle of the 2025 campaign. He spent his first three-plus seasons with the L.A. Chargers, then was dealt to the N.Y. Jets last November. In 65 career regular-season outings, he has 76 defensive tackles and 15 PDs, highlighted by a career-best eight PDs in 2023.
- **DT Dexter Lawrence II:** Perhaps one of the most notable transactions of the offseason occurred on April 19, when less than a week ahead of the NFL Draft the Bengals sent the 10th overall selection to the N.Y. Giants in exchange for Lawrence. A three-time Pro Bowler and two-time second-team All-Pro (Associated Press), Lawrence established himself as one of the game's top interior defensive linemen over his seven seasons with New York. He has started 102 of 109 regular-season games played, logging 341 total tackles with 40 TFLs and 30.5 sacks while consistently drawing double-teams from opposing O-lines.

Defense improves following '25 bye: The Bengals' defense improved in nearly every statistical metric over the final eight weeks of the 2025 regular season (Weeks 11-18) compared to the first nine. Following the team's bye in Week 10, Cincinnati allowed an average of 9.3 fewer points per game, 97.1 fewer total yards, 41.1 fewer rushing yards and 85.7 fewer passing yards.

The Bengals also recorded 12 takeaways over their final eight games, tied for the fifth-most in the NFL in that span. The surge included a streak of five consecutive games (Weeks 12-16) in which Cincinnati forced at least one turnover. Highlighting that run was a season-high five takeaways in the team's Thanksgiving Night victory at Baltimore, which marked the seventh-most by the Bengals in a game since 2000.

Cincinnati additionally tied for seventh in the NFL in team sacks (22) over the final eight weeks. Leading the charge was DE Myles Murphy, who notched four of his career-best 5.5 sacks during the back-half of the year.

Of the final eight opposing offenses faced by the Bengals, six were held to 20 or fewer points. That included two contests against Baltimore in which a potent Ravens attack was limited to 14 offensive points (Week 13) and 17 offensive points (Week 15).

Turner shuts it down: CB DJ Turner II broke out in the 2025 season with 18 PDs, which marked a career high and tied for third-most in the NFL. It also was the most PDs by a Bengals player since the 2009 campaign, when CB Leon Hall had 24 and CB Johnathan Joseph had 20.

Turner's top statistical performance came in Week 6 at Green Bay, when he logged a career-best five PDs. He became the first Cincinnati player with at least five PDs in a game since Joseph also had five on Nov. 8, 2009 against Baltimore.

Turner also registered his first two career INTs in 2025, with the first coming late in the fourth quarter of the season opener at Cleveland to help the Bengals protect a one-point lead. His second pick occurred late in the first half of Week 7 against Pittsburgh, when he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf in Cincinnati territory to set up a Bengals FG drive.

Turner was the only NFL player in 2025 with at least 15 PDs, two INTs and two FFs. A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, he started a combined 18 games over his first two seasons, then worked his way into the starting lineup for 16 contests in '25.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson, who enters his sixth NFL season in 2026, already has established himself as the best long-distance kicker to ever wear the Bengals' stripes. His 29 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in team history, more than tripling the next highest total of eight (recorded by several players). It also is the seventh-most such FGs among all NFL kickers since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2021.

McPherson owns seven of the nine longest made kicks in Bengals history, highlighted by a team-record 63-yard FG which he booted in Week 12 of the 2025 season against New England. Just four days following that kick, he went a perfect six-for-six in Cincinnati's victory at Baltimore on Thanksgiving, which marked a career high for made FGs in a game, tied for the second-most in a game in team history and tied for the most by any kicker in a game during the 2025 campaign. That performance netted McPherson his fourth career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week award.

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 119 of 143 FG attempts, good for the third-highest percentage in Bengals history (83.2). He enters 2026 having made 21 consecutive attempts from inside of 50 yards, a streak that dates back to Week 13 of the '24 season.

Rehkw's ranks: Through two pro seasons, P Ryan Rehkw already holds the Bengals' career records for gross punting average (49.89 yards; minimum 100 punts) and net punting average (42.91; min. 100). Both marks also rank near the top of the NFL, with his gross average leading all punters and his net average ranking sixth since the start of the 2024 campaign.

Rehkw's gross average of 50.5 yards per punt in 2025 ranked second leaguewide and set a Bengals single-season record, surpassing his own team mark of 49.1 in his '24 rookie season. He averaged 50 or more yards per punt in 11 games last season, including a season-high 58.0 (three punts for 174 yards) in Week 8 against the N.Y. Jets.

Rehkw opened his career with a historic debut in Week 1 of the 2024 season, as his 64.5 yards per punt against New England set an NFL single-game record which still stands. Highlighting his performance that day was a team-record 80-yard punt. He finished his rookie campaign with a net punting average of 42.9 yards, good for a Bengals single-season record and sixth in the NFL that year. Following that season, he was recognized on the Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team.

Rehkw also has 53 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the fifth-most by a Bengal since the statistic began being tracked in 1976 and the fifth-most in the NFL since his 2024 debut.

Trumpy, Brooks to enter ROH: The Bengals announced in July that former TE Bob Trumpy and HB James Brooks will be inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of the Week 8 game against Tennessee. They will become the 13th and 14th members of the Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 to recognize former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Trumpy, who entered the NFL as a 12th-round pick of the Bengals in their inaugural 1968 season, spent his entire 10-year playing career ('68-77) with Cincinnati. He scored the team's first-ever receiving TD on Sept. 15, 1968, and went on to play in 128 games with 120 starts. Among all tight ends in team history, he has the most receiving yards (4600), receiving TDs (35), yards per reception (15.4) and Pro Bowl selections (four).

Brooks played eight seasons (1984-91) in Cincinnati and was one of the most versatile and complete running backs to don the Bengals jersey. He remains the franchise's career record holder for average yards per carry (4.8), while ranking second in team history in rushing yards (6447) and tied for fifth in rushing TDs (37). He also had 3012 receiving yards which contributed to a total of 9459 yards from scrimmage, the fourth-most ever by a Bengal. He holds three of the team's top 10 scrimmage yardage totals in a season, highlighted by a franchise-record 1773 yards in 1986.

Trumpy and Brooks will join the 12 current Ring of Honor inductees, which

include QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Dave Lapham, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz, CB Lemar Parrish and CB Ken Riley. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members, then are officially enshrined in the ring during halftime of a Bengals home game that year.

The Jungle can jam: The Bengals had an announced attendance figure of 65,000 or more in 30 consecutive regular-season home games from Week 1 of the 2022 campaign through Week 12 of the '25 campaign. It marked the longest such streak in team history, surpassing a span of 24 straight games from 2005-07.

Each of the 15 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of the 2025 season was played in front of an announced crowd of 66,569, the fourth-largest figure on the list. Most of those fans were dressed in white apparel to accentuate the fourth annual "White Bengal" game at Paycor Stadium on Thursday Night Football.

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in

Cincinnati history.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' roster entering the preseason opener is 26.6 years ... The Bengals have netted 24 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, tied for the third-most by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals' roster is TE Drew Sample, who enters his eighth season with the team in 2026 ... The oldest player on the roster is QB Joe Flacco, who is 41 (born Jan. 16, 1985) ... The youngest player on the roster is C Connor Lew, who is 20 (born Aug. 30, 2005) ... The tallest player on the roster is OT Christian Jones, who is listed at 6-9 ... POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Starting QB **Joe Burrow** enters his seventh NFL season in 2026 and already has placed himself among the top QBs both in Bengals history and the modern NFL era. He holds the highest career completion percentage in league history (68.5; minimum 1500 passing attempts), and late last season he became the third-fastest player ever to reach 150 TD passes as well as the fifth-fastest to 20,000 passing yards (both accomplished in his 75th regular-season game played). He missed nine games in the 2025 campaign due to a toe injury, but returned in late November and started each of the final six contests. A three-time Pro Bowler and two-time NFL Comeback Player of the Year, he ranks in the top five in Bengals history in passing attempts (fifth), completions (fifth), passing yards (fifth), TD passes (fourth), passer rating (first) and 300-yard games (T-first). 19th-year veteran **Joe Flacco** re-signed with Cincinnati in March after starting six games during Burrow's injury absence. He was acquired by the Bengals in a trade with Cleveland last October, and made his first Bengals start just five days later. Over the span of his six starts, he ranked second in the NFL in completions, tied for third in TD passes and ranked fifth in passing yards. Now at 41 years old (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest player on the Bengals' roster and the oldest QB to start a game in team history. Flacco spent his first 11 seasons with Baltimore, highlighted by a Super Bowl victory following the 2012 season, and has also seen game action for Denver (2019), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25), and Indianapolis ('24). He ranks in the top 25 in NFL history in career passing yards (14th; 48,176) and TD passes (21st; 272). The Bengals added another veteran to the QB room during the offseason when they signed **Josh Johnson**, who has accrued 13 years of accredited NFL experience and played for 13 different organizations. He has seen action in 50 career regular-season games with 11 starts, appearing in contests for Tampa Bay, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Washington, the N.Y. Jets, Baltimore and San Francisco. He also had stints in the United Football League in 2012 and the XFL in '20. His career passing totals include 242 completions on 412 attempts for 2669 yards and 14 TDs with 18 INTs. Johnson had a previous Bengals stint in 2013, when he played in two games for Cincinnati. Rounding out the QB room is Cincinnati native **Sean Clifford**, who spent 12 games on the Bengals' practice squad in 2025. He entered the league as a college free agent signee of Green Bay in 2023 and was on the Packers' active roster as a rookie, seeing action in two regular-season games and one playoff contest (all for final snaps late in fourth quarter). He was a three-time All-Big Ten Honorable Mention pick during his career at Penn State, and led local St. Xavier High School to an Ohio Division I State Championship as a senior in 2016.

Running backs: Fourth-year HB **Chase Brown** is coming off a breakout season in 2025 in which he set career highs in rushing attempts (232), rushing yards (1019), receptions (69) and receiving yards (437). He was one of five players in the NFL last season with at least 1000 rushing yards and 400 receiving yards, and his catch total marked the most ever in a season by a Bengals running back. A native of London, Ontario, his 1456 yards from scrimmage were the most in a season by a Canadian-born player in NFL history, and were highlighted by a Bengals-record streak of six straight games with 100 or more scrimmage yards from Weeks 7-13. He started all 17 contests in 2025, after making 10 starts in '24 and zero as a rookie in '23. Listed second on the

depth chart is 10th-year veteran **Samaje Perine**, who is in his second Bengals stint. Perine played for the team from 2019-22, then spent '23 with Denver and '24 with Kansas City before returning to Cincinnati in '25. A physical and versatile back, he has 558 career rushing attempts, 196 receptions and 25 kickoff returns for a total of 4558 all-purpose yards. He contributed 382 rushing yards last season, his most since the 2022 campaign. **Tahj Brooks**, a sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2025, enters his second pro season after appearing in 16 contests in his rookie year. He had 16 carries for 45 yards and one catch for nine yards offensively, while also returning 10 kickoffs for 258 yards. Brooks compiled a record-setting collegiate career at Texas Tech University, where he set school career marks for rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23). He was a first-team All-Big 12 Conference choice in 2023 then followed up with second-team honors in '24, and in both of those seasons was named a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back). **Gary Brightwell** has been a Bengals practice squad member since November 2024, but was elevated to the active roster for two games last season and had four KORs for 83 yards. Originally a sixth-round pick of the N.Y. Giants in 2021, he spent his first three seasons with New York and then played in two games for Cleveland early in the '24 campaign. In 41 career regular-season games, he has 41 carries for 164 yards and a TD along with 11 catches for 92 yards. Of his 32 career KORs, 26 came during the 2022 season with the Giants. Next on the depth chart is **Kendall Milton**, who spent the majority of his first two NFL seasons on Cincinnati's practice squad. He has seen action in three games (two in 2024 and one in '25), logging two carries. He had a noteworthy career at the University of Georgia, helping the Bulldogs win back-to-back national championships in 2021 and '22. His career-high 14 rushing TDs in 2023 tied for second in the Southeastern Conference. Milton's uncle, Kevin Hardy, played nine NFL seasons, including two with the Bengals (2003-04). A pair of rookies who signed with the Bengals as college free agents this offseason round out the running backs room in **Jamal Haynes** and **Kentrel Bullock**. Haynes spent five seasons at Georgia Tech, but saw his most substantial playing time after converting from WR to RB ahead of the '23 campaign. He finished his career ranking eighth in school history in rushing yards (2534) and 10th in yards per carry (4.27). He was named third-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference in 2023, when he rushed for a career-best 1059 yards. Bullock had a six-year collegiate playing career that included time at the University of Mississippi (2020-22) and the University of South Alabama ('23-25). He was named first-team All-Sunbelt Conference last season, when he set a South Alabama single-season record with 1085 rushing yards and ranked third in the conference with 14 rushing TDs.

Wide receivers: Sixth-year WR **Ja'Marr Chase** has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first five seasons and already ranks in the top five in most of the Bengals' all-time receiving categories. Cincinnati's first-round draft choice (No. 5 overall) in 2021, he is the only player in NFL history with at least 500 receptions and 50 receiving TDs within his first five years in the league. He also is one of just three players in league history to record at least 125 catches in consecutive seasons, doing so in 2024 and '25, and in both years he was recognized as a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press. In 2024, he became the sixth player in the Super Bowl era to claim the receiving "Triple Crown,"

leading the NFL in catches, receiving yards and receiving TDs, and he then followed up in '25 by ranking third leaguewide in receptions (125) and fourth in yards (1412). He also set a Bengals single-season record with seven 100-yard receiving games last year. Chase is one-half of arguably the top receiving duo in the NFL, alongside seventh-year pro **Tee Higgins**. Since entering the NFL as a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins is tied for seventh in the league in TD catches (45) and ranks 16th in receiving yards (5441). He brought in a career-high 11 receiving TDs in 2025 (tied for second in NFL) after scoring 10 in '24, and in doing so became the third player in Bengals history with double-digit TD catches in consecutive seasons. His other totals in 2025 were 59 receptions for 846 yards, helping him earn his first career Pro Bowl nod. **Andre Iosivas**, a 2023 sixth-round draft selection out of Princeton, has earned the role of the team's third option at WR over the past two seasons. He logged career highs in catches (36), receiving yards (479) and TDs (six) in 2024, then followed up with 33 grabs for 435 yards and two scores in '25. He has shown a knack for getting open in the low red zone, as 11 of his 12 career receiving TDs have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. He was an All-American heptathlete for the Princeton men's track and field team, in addition to achieving All-American status in football at the FCS level. **Mitch Tinsley** earned a spot on Cincinnati's active roster coming out of training camp last year, and went on to contribute eight catches for 116 yards and two TDs in the 2025 campaign. He joined the team on a Reserve/Future contract in February 2025, after spending his first two pro seasons with the Washington Commanders. He was perhaps the Bengals' most notable performer during the 2025 preseason, as he posted six receptions for 88 yards and two TDs, with both scoring catches being highlight-reel grabs at Washington on a Monday Night Football national broadcast. **Charlie Jones**, the Bengals' fourth-round pick in 2023, has served as the team's primary punt returner through three seasons, and last year took on the added role of primary kickoff returner. He has seen action sparingly on offense, recording eight career catches for 69 yards. He spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in catches (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Cincinnati used one of its two fourth-round draft choices this past April to select **Colbie Young** out of the University of Georgia. Young, a 6-4, 218-pound athlete, looks to make an impact in his rookie season after a five-year college career that saw him go from Lackawanna College (junior college; 2021), to the University of Miami (Fla.; '22-23) to Georgia ('24-25). In four seasons at the Division I level, he had 116 catches for 1437 yards and 13 TDs. He missed time last season due to a leg injury, mid in eight games played he caught 26 passes for 358 yards and one score. **Kendric Pryor** has had three separate stints with the Bengals, with most of that time spent on the team's practice squad. He played in two games for Cincinnati in 2024 as a practice squad elevation, registering one catch for nine yards while also contributing on special teams. He also was on Jacksonville's active roster for the entire 2022 regular season but did not see game action. He entered the league as a college free agent signee of the Bengals in 2022, following a five-year career at the University of Wisconsin. **Ke'Shawn Williams** enters his second NFL season in 2026 after being acquired by the Bengals on waivers from Pittsburgh in December of last year. He played in Cincinnati's final three games, contributing nine punt returns, eight kickoff returns and one reception. He originally was a college free agent signee of the Steelers last offseason and saw action in eight games prior to being waived. Williams finished his college career at the University of Indiana in 2024, following four years at Wake Forest University. **Jordan Moore** signed with the Bengals as a college free agent in 2025 and spent his rookie season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He played four seasons (2021-24) at Duke University, where he began his career as a QB before switching to WR ahead of his sophomore campaign. In just three years as a WR, he recorded the fifth-most receiving TDs (21) in Duke program history, along with the seventh-most receptions (177) and 10th-most receiving yards (2352). He was a second-team All-ACC pick in 2023, then received third-team recognition in '24. As a high school QB at Loyola Blakefield (Towson, Md.), he passed for 3410 yards and 36 TDs. **Dohnt Meyers** joined the Bengals on a Reserve/Future contract this past January, after spending the previous two seasons with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Canadian Football League. In 19 CFL games played, he totaled 89 receptions for 1405 yards and nine TDs, while also logging 11 KORs and nine PRs. He enjoyed a breakout 2025 season in which he averaged 16.2 yards per catch (65 for 1056 yards) and helped the Roughriders win the Grey Cup. Meyers began his college career in 2018-19 at Presbyterian College (FCS) in Clinton, S.C., then spent the '21-22 seasons at Delta State University (NCAA Division II) in Cleveland, Miss. **Xavier Johnson**, a Cincinnati native who attended nearby Summit Country Day School, joined the Bengals' practice squad in December 2025. He spent his

entire 2024 rookie season on Houston's practice squad, then was not with a team for the first 14 weeks of the '25 regular season. Over a six-year career (2018-23) at Ohio State, he appeared in 56 games with had 26 catches for 329 yards and two TDs, along with 44 rushing attempts for 358 yards and a score. A multi-sport athlete at Summit, he completed in football, basketball, lacrosse and track. **Noah Thomas** signed with Cincinnati as a college free agent in May, coming off a four-year collegiate career that included three seasons (2022-24) at Texas A&M and one ('25) at Georgia. Listed at 6-5, he is the tallest member of the Bengals' receiving corps. In 48 games played at the college level, he totaled 89 receptions for 1238 yards and 19 TDs. His top season came in 2024 at Texas A&M, when he notched career highs in catches (39), yards (574) and TDs (eight). Thomas' great uncle is Pro Football Hall of Famer Mike Singletary, who played 12 NFL seasons as a linebacker for the Chicago Bears.

Tight ends: A second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2019, **Drew Sample** has played in 95 career games with 62 starts and serves as a key blocking TE in Cincinnati's offense. After missing most of the 2022 season with a knee injury, he has played in all 51 games over the past three seasons, starting 37. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has contributed 115 career catches for 836 yards and five TDs. **Mike Gesicki** signed with Cincinnati as a free agent in 2024 and has played in 30 contests through his first two Bengals seasons. In 2024, he logged the second-most receptions in a season by a TE in team history (65) for 665 yards, then followed with 28 grabs for 307 yards and two TDs last year. At 6-6, 245 pounds, he is an athletic pass catcher who often lines up as a slot receiver. Originally a second-round pick of Miami in 2022, he spent his first five seasons with the Dolphins, then played for New England in '24 before arriving in Cincinnati. **Tanner Hudson** has played in 38 games for Cincinnati since moving to the active roster in November 2023, and has served as a dependable pass catching option. He has 77 catches for 674 yards and four TDs in his Bengals tenure, including 19 for 168 and two scores in the 2025 campaign. He initially joined the Bengals' practice squad in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('19-20), San Francisco ('21) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). Bengals coaches and players have expressed their excitement for the return of **Erick All Jr.**, who showed promise as a versatile TE in his 2024 rookie season before suffering a knee injury that kept him out for the second half of that year and all of the '25 campaign. A native of Fairfield, Ohio (north of Cincinnati), he had 20 catches for 158 yards and was utilized heavily in run-blocking schemes prior to the injury. All spent four college seasons (2019-22) at the University of Michigan and one ('23) at the University of Iowa, before being selected by the Bengals in the fourth round of the '24 draft. **Cam Grandy** has seen action in 13 games over two pro seasons with the Bengals, after originally joining the team as a college free agent in 2024. He primarily contributes as a blocking TE in the run game, but also has caught seven passes for 35 yards. He came to the NFL after an All-American season at the FCS level with Illinois State University, where in 2023 he led all Missouri Valley Conference tight ends with 612 receiving yards on 63 catches. Cincinnati selected **Jack Endries** in the seventh round of this year's draft, adding a productive pass-catching TE who played and started 39 games in his college career. He spent his first two collegiate seasons (2023-24) at the University of California, then transferred to the University of Texas for '25. His college totals included 124 receptions for 1376 yards and seven TDs, with 33 for 346 and three scores coming with the Longhorns last season. He was named honorable mention All-ACC in 2024, when he led California in catches (65) and receiving yards (623) as the primary pass-catcher for former Golden Bears QB and the No. 1 overall pick in the '26 draft, Fernando Mendoza. **Josh Kattus**, a rookie who signed with Cincinnati as a college free agent in May, was cleared for practice on Aug. 6 after beginning training camp on the Active/Non-Football Injury list. A local prospect who was a first-team all-state performer at Archbishop Moeller High School, he spent the past four seasons at the University of Kentucky, where he totaled 38 career catches for 505 yards and six TDs in 44 games. His father, Eric Kattus, played TE for the Bengals for six seasons (1986-91).

Offensive line: Four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.** has started at LOT in all 45 games he has played in for the Bengals since signing with the team as a free agent in the 2023 offseason. He spent his first three NFL seasons (2018-20) with Baltimore, then played for Kansas City for two seasons and helped the Chiefs win Super Bowl LVII in the '22 campaign. He lined up for all 1110 offensive snaps for Cincinnati last season, anchoring a pass protection unit that contributed to the Bengals ranking sixth in the NFL in net passing yards per game (235.6). His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. **Ted Karras** has been voted a team captain and lined up as the Bengals' starting center in each of the past four seasons. A 2022 free agent acquisition, he has started 70 straight games for Cincinnati (including postseason), playing over 99 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span. Off the field, he is involved in numerous

charitable efforts in the Cincinnati area and has twice been named the team's Club Winner for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award (2023 and '25). He spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, helping the Patriots win the Super Bowl in the 2016 and '18 campaigns, and had a one-year stint with Miami in '20. **Dalton Risner** signed with the Bengals as a free agent following training camp in 2025 and played in 14 games with 11 starts (nine at RG and two at LG) last season. An eighth-year veteran in 2026, he also has played for Denver ('19-22) and Minnesota ('23-24), logging 101 games of regular-season experience. **Amarius Mims**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2024, has started at ROT in 30 of 32 games played through two seasons. A physically imposing tackle listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he has been called for just one holding penalty in his career thus far, with zero committed on 1051 offensive snaps played last season. The Bengals selected Mims out of the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 games over three seasons (2021-23) and was part of two national championship squads. A teammate of Mims' at Georgia was **Dylan Fairchild**, who the Bengals selected in the third round of the 2025 draft. Fairchild stepped into the starting LG role early in his rookie season, lining up in that spot for 15 games and playing 961 offensive snaps (fifth-most on team). He started 24 career games at Georgia, and in 2024 was named a second-team AP All-American. He also has an impressive background in wrestling, as he compiled a 67-0 career record at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., and won two Georgia state titles in the Class 7A heavyweight division. **Cody Ford** has been a versatile contributor on the Bengals' offensive line since joining the team as a free agent in the 2023 offseason. He has seen action in 50 of a possible 51 games for Cincinnati and made 10 starts — five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and two as a tackle-eligible third TE. Originally a second-round draft choice of Buffalo in 2019, he spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for Arizona in '22. In the Bengals' Week 17 win over the Cardinals this past December, he caught a pass from QB Joe Burrow and fought off several defensive backs for a 21-yard gain, becoming the heaviest player in NFL history with a gain from scrimmage of 20 or more yards (per Elias Sports Bureau). **Jalen Rivers**, a fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2025, played in 16 games with seven starts at RG in his rookie season. He started at LOT in each of his final 21 games played at the University of Miami (Fla.), where he collected second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 and honorable mention in '24. He was the Bengals' nominee for the Salute to Service Award last season, as his father, mother and stepfather all served in the U.S. Navy. OT **Andrew Coker** has been a Bengals practice squad member since signing with Cincinnati in October 2024. He originally was a college free agent signee of Las Vegas in 2024, then was waived by the Raiders on final cuts ahead of his rookie season. He started 46 of 50 games played during a five-year collegiate career (2019-23) at Texas Christian University, where he was twice named honorable mention All-Big 12 Conference. G **Brian Parker II**, a Cincinnati native who won a state championship at St. Xavier High School, was drafted by his hometown team in the sixth round this past April. He played four seasons (2022-25) at Duke, where he earned second-team All-ACC honors in each of the past two years. He also garnered third-team All-America recognition in 2025, when he helped the Blue Devils win their first outright ACC title since 1962. He started 33 of 40 career games played at Duke, lining up for 27 starts at ROT and six at LOT. Fourth-round draft pick **Connor Lew** is the youngest player on the Bengals' roster (turns 21 on Aug. 30). He started 25 out of his 31 appearances over a three-year career (2023-25) at Auburn University, including a streak of 19 consecutive starts that was halted by a knee injury midway through last season. He was a Southeastern Conference All-Freshman Team pick in 2023, when he was credited with zero sacks allowed on 228 pass block snaps, according to Pro Football Focus. Lew lettered in wrestling in addition to football at Kennesaw Mountain High School (Ga.), where he also maintained a 4.0 grade point average through all four years. OT **Javon Foster** spent the 2025 season on Cincinnati's practice squad, after seeing action in four games as a rookie for Jacksonville in '24. He entered the league as a fourth-round pick of the Jaguars, following a five-year career (2019-23) at the University of Missouri. He played in 49 contests with 38 starts for the Tigers, highlighted by a 2023 season in which he earned first-team All-SEC and third-team All-America honors. C **Jacob Bayer** spent the final eight games of last season on Cincinnati's practice squad, after going through the offseason and training camp with Buffalo. He signed with the Bills as a college free agent in May 2025, following a collegiate career that included two seasons at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas, and two at Arkansas State University. He was a first-team All-Sun Belt Conference performer in 2023, then followed up with second-team status in '24. The O-line room is rounded out by three college free agent signees, including G **Corey Robinson II**, who spent his final collegiate season in 2025 at the University of

Arkansas following three years ('22-24) at Georgia Tech. He played in 48 career games, with each of his 36 starts coming at LOT. In his lone season with the Razorbacks, he blocked for an offense that ranked second in the SEC in rushing yards per game (191.9) and fourth in total yards (454.8). OT **Christian Jones** is the tallest player on the Bengals' roster, listed at 6-9 and 345 pounds. He played in 50 games with 31 starts across four seasons at San Diego State University, where he finished his tenure with second-team All-Mountain West Conference honors in 2025. He started 25 consecutive games to close out his career, with 24 of those coming at LOT (one at LG). G **Liam Brown** saw action in 52 games with 43 starts over a four-year career at the University of Montana (FCS). Last season, he was named second-team All-Big Sky Conference, started all 15 games and helped the Grizzlies to a 13-2 record and an appearance in the FCS semifinals.

Defensive line: Perhaps the headline addition of the offseason for Cincinnati was DT **Dexter Lawrence II**, who the Bengals acquired in a trade with the N.Y. Giants less than a week before the NFL Draft. An eighth-year veteran, Lawrence has played in 109 career regular-season contests with 102 starts, been voted to the Pro Bowl three times and been named to the AP All-Pro Second Team on two occasions (2022 and '23). He has 30.5 career sacks, the 14th-most by any DT since he entered the league as a first-round pick of the Giants in 2019. His other career statistics include 341 total tackles, 40 TFLs, 15 PDs, one INT and five FFs. Slated to line up next to Lawrence is his former Giants teammate **B.J. Hill**, who also came over to Cincinnati via trade shortly before the 2021 season. Hill has played in 81 regular-season games and seven postseason contests for the Bengals, including starts in each of his last 71 appearances. He was voted a team captain for the first time in 2025 and logged 66 tackles, five TFLs and four sacks. Another key offseason acquisition for the Bengals was fifth-year DE **Boye Mafe**, who signed with Cincinnati in March after helping Seattle win Super Bowl LX a month prior. A second-round pick of the Seahawks in 2022, he played in 65 games with 34 starts over his four seasons in Seattle and registered 161 tackles with 24 TFLs and 20 sacks. He had a career-best nine sacks in the 2023 campaign, which led the Seahawks that year and included a franchise-record seven consecutive games with at least one sack. Mafe totaled five tackles in three postseason games during Seattle's postseason run earlier this year. DE **Myles Murphy** enters his fourth NFL season looking to build on his top statistical campaign in 2025. The Bengals' first-round pick in 2023 emerged last season with career highs in total tackles (52), TFLs (six), sacks (team-leading 5.5) and PDs (three). His productivity increased particularly in the second half of the year, as over the final nine games he recorded 37 tackles, four sacks and his first career fumble recovery. Murphy started 10 contests in 2025, after not starting in 30 games played during his first two seasons. DT **Jonathan Allen** joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent this offseason, providing Cincinnati an accomplished interior lineman with 130 games of NFL experience (including postseason). A former first-round pick of Washington in 2017, he spent his first eight seasons with the Commanders before playing for Minnesota in '25. His career stats include 469 tackles, 67 TFLs and 45.5 sacks, with his sack total marking the eighth-most by a DT since he entered the league. He posted 68 tackles last season with the Vikings, his most since the 2019 campaign. DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.** started all 17 games in his first Bengals season in 2025, after signing with the team as a free agent last spring. He netted 52 tackles, four TFLs and three sacks, with each of his sacks coming in the final five games of the season. Originally a fifth-round draft choice of Green Bay in 2021, he spent his first four seasons with the Packers. Head coach Zac Taylor confirmed that DE **Shemar Stewart** will miss time in training camp after sustaining a lower-body injury during the team's first practice. Cincinnati's first-round pick in 2025 (No. 17 overall), Stewart played in eight games with five starts as a rookie. He spent five contests on the Reserve/Injured list late in the year, but returned for the team's final three games and in that stretch recorded five tackles, his first career sack and first PD. A product of Texas A&M, he was noted during his draft process for standout physical traits, and was one of two players in the 2025 class to produce a perfect 10.0 on the Relative Athletic Score (grades players' measurements compared to peer group). Stewart's former teammate at Texas A&M, DE **Cashius Howell**, gears up for his rookie season after being taken by the Bengals in the second round of the 2026 draft. He is coming off a breakout year with the Aggies in 2025, as he racked up 11.5 sacks, was named the SEC Defensive Player of the Year and earned first-team All-America along with first-team All-SEC honors. Howell spent his final two collegiate seasons at Texas A&M, after playing his first three years at Bowling Green State University in northwest Ohio. Noted for his athleticism and quickness off the edge, he clocked a 40-yard dash time of 4.59 seconds and recorded a vertical jump of 32.5 inches at this year's NFL Combine. DE **Cedric Johnson** enters his third season after playing nine games in each of his first two years with the Bengals. A sixth-round draft pick in 2024, he has record 17

tackles, three sacks, two TFLs and two FRs. He began the 2025 campaign on the Reserve/Injured list due to a calf injury, before returning to the active roster in October. DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.**, the Bengals' second-round draft choice in 2024, has played in 29 games with 13 starts through two pro seasons. He has contributed 67 tackles, five TFLs, 4.5 sacks and a PD. Jenkins capped off his collegiate career at the University of Michigan with second-team All-America honors while helping the Wolverines win the national championship in 2023. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 NFL seasons (2001-10) as a DT with Carolina and the N.Y. Jets, earning four Pro Bowl selections. Cincinnati's selection following Jenkins in 2024 was DT **McKinnley Jackson**, a third-round pick who is listed at 6-2, 330 pounds. In 22 games played over two seasons, Jackson has 22 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF. He was a team captain in each of his final two seasons at Texas A&M, where he totaled 15.5 TFLs in 40 career games played. DE **Isaiah Foskey** played in eight games in his first season with the Bengals in 2025, after spending the previous two years with New Orleans. Originally a second-round pick of the Saints in 2023, he has seen action in 35 career regular-season games and recorded 19 tackles with a half-sack and a PD. He also has 11 career stops on special teams. DT **Jordan Jefferson** was acquired by the Bengals on waivers from San Francisco in October 2025 and saw action in one game for Cincinnati. Originally a fourth-round pick of Jacksonville in 2024, he played in eight contests for the Jaguars as a rookie, then played in one game for the 49ers early in '25 before being waived. His career stats include 12 tackles, one sack and one PD. Jefferson was a state champion wrestler at Navarre High School in Navarre, Fla. DE **Antwaun Powell-Ryland** spent the final eight games of his 2025 rookie season on Cincinnati's practice squad, after beginning the year on Philadelphia's practice squad. A sixth-round draft pick of the Eagles last May, he had a five-year college career that included three seasons at the University of Florida ('20-22) and two at Virginia Tech ('23-24). He earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors in both seasons with the Hokies. DT **Howard Cross III** played in four games as a rookie for the Bengals last season, after joining the team as a college free agent in May 2025. He logged four tackles, and recovered a fumble in the season finale against Cleveland to set up a Bengals TD drive. Cross played six seasons (2019-24) at Notre Dame, including his final three under former Fighting Irish and current Bengals defensive coordinator Al Golden. His father, Howard Cross Jr., played 13 NFL seasons as a TE with the N.Y. Giants (1989-2001). DT **Landon Robinson** looks to crack the 53-man roster in his rookie season, after being taken by Cincinnati in the seventh round of April's draft. He had a decorated career at the United States Naval Academy, highlighted by first-team All-America (AP) honors last season. He also was named first-team All-American Athletic Conference in each of the past two years, and in '25 was the AAC Defensive Player of the Year. Appearing in 38 games over three seasons, he logged 153 tackles, 18.5 TFLs, 14.5 sacks, two FFs, one FR and one blocked kick. He grew up in Fairlawn, Ohio, and attended Copley High School in Copley, Ohio.

Linebackers: Cincinnati's second-round draft choice in 2025, **Demetrius Knight Jr.** played in all 17 games with 14 starts in his rookie season. His 106 total tackles ranked second on the team and second among all NFL rookies. He also contributed three sacks, seven PDs and two INTs, with both picks coming inside the Bengals' red zone. Knight spent his first four college seasons at Georgia Tech, then played one year at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and finished off his career at the University of South Carolina in '24. Knight's fellow starting LB for most of last season was **Barrett Carter**, who registered 102 tackles in his own rookie campaign (third among NFL rookies). Carter was picked by the Bengals in the fourth round of the 2025 draft after a four-year career at Clemson University that saw him earn two All-ACC honors. Over the course of his four collegiate seasons (2021-24), he was the nation's only player with at least 30 TFLs, 20 pass breakups and three INTs. **Oren Burks** enters his ninth NFL season and his second with the Bengals. A 2025 free agency acquisition, he played in all 17 games with nine starts last year, collecting 34 tackles, one PD, one FF and one FR defensively while also posting 14 special teams tackles. He previously spent the 2024 campaign with Philadelphia, emerging as one of the Eagles' top performers during their postseason run to a Super Bowl LIX title. He entered the league with Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four seasons with the Packers, before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. **Shaka Heyward** has played in 18 games for Cincinnati over the past two seasons, after spending his entire 2023 rookie campaign and the first half of '24 on the team's practice squad. His career totals include eight defensive tackles and 14 special teams tackles, with a career-high 12 ST stops in 2025. Heyward signed with the Bengals as a college free agent in 2023, following a five-year collegiate career at Duke. Fellow former Blue Devil **Joe Giles-Harris** led Cincinnati with 20 special teams tackles in just 10 games

played in 2025, after joining the team as a free agent last offseason. He previously had spent a week on the Bengals' practice squad in December 2024, then closed out that season with Jacksonville. Originally a college free agent signee of the Jaguars in 2019, he played his first two pro seasons ('19-20) with Jacksonville, then spent time with Buffalo from '21-22 and New England from '23-24. In 32 career regular-season games (three starts), he has recorded 27 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and two PDs. **Liam Anderson** spent the final nine games of the 2025 season on the Bengals' practice squad, after spending most of his first two pro seasons ('23-24) on Indianapolis' practice squad. He played in four total games for the Colts, contributing primarily on special teams. He tallied 37.5 TFLs and 14.5 sacks over a five-year career (2018-22) at the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Mass., before signing with Indianapolis as a college free agent. Cincinnati acquired **Swayze Bozeman** on waivers from the N.Y. Giants in May, adding an LB with 12 games of NFL experience (regular and postseason). He entered the league as a college free agent signee of Kansas City in 2024 and saw action in six total contests as a rookie for the Chiefs, including three postseason games. He then played in six games for the N.Y. Giants in 2025. In regular-season play, he has recorded five defensive tackles and four special teams stops. **Eric Gentry**, a hybrid-LB with a 6-7 frame, signed with the Bengals as a college free agent in May. He spent the past four seasons at the University of Southern California, after beginning his college career at Arizona State University in 2021. In 52 total collegiate games (39 starts), he recorded 270 tackles, 26.5 TFLs, nine sacks, 12 PBUs, two INTs, nine FFs, one FR and one blocked kick. He was an honorable mention All-Big Ten pick in 2025, when his five FFs tied for third in the FBS. Fellow college free agent signee **Jack Dingle** comes to the Bengals after a four-year playing career at the University of Cincinnati. He saw action in 48 games with 33 starts for the Bearcats, amassing 164 tackles, 9.5 TFLs and four sacks. He tallied a career-high 60 tackles last season. His father, **Nate Dingle**, played LB for several NFL teams, including Philadelphia ('95), Jacksonville ('96) and the St. Louis Rams ('97).

Cornerbacks: Fourth-year pro **DJ Turner II** is coming off a breakout season in 2025 in which he tied for third in the NFL with a career-high 18 PDs. He also had his first two career INTs, forced two fumbles and started a career-high 16 games. A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, he played in all 17 games with 12 starts as a rookie and then saw action in 11 contests in '24, but missed the final six games of that season due to a collarbone injury. A two-time All-Big Ten honoree at the University of Michigan, he clocked the fastest time in the 40-yard dash of any player at the 2023 NFL Combine (4.26 seconds). Turner's former teammate at Michigan, **Dax Hill**, has lined up at CB for his last 22 games played after transitioning from safety in the 2024 offseason. He missed most of the 2024 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned to start all 17 contests last season and tied his career high with 11 PDs. The Bengals' first-round draft choice in 2022, he lined up at safety for his first 32 career games, and in the '23 season recorded 110 tackles. His brother, Justice Hill, currently plays RB for the Baltimore Ravens. **Jalen Davis** is a nickel CB who played in the final seven games of the 2025 season with three starts. In that stretch, he had a career-high 19 tackles with two TFLs and a sack, along with one FF and his first career INT. Prior to the back-half of last season, he bounced between Cincinnati's active roster and practice squad after initially joining the team midway through the 2020 campaign. He entered the NFL with Miami in 2018 and spent his rookie year with the Dolphins, then was with Arizona for the entire '19 season and early part of '20. In 64 career regular-season games, he has 42 defensive stops and three PDs. **Ja'Sir Taylor** signed with the Bengals this offseason, after collecting 65 games of NFL experience over his first four years in the league (2022-25). He spent his first three-plus seasons with the L.A. Chargers, then was traded in November of last year to the N.Y. Jets, where he played in the final eight games. His career totals include 76 tackles, 15 PDs, one INT and one FR. In 2023 with the Chargers, he had career highs in starts (six), tackles (29) and PDs (eight). **Josh Newton**, a fifth-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, has played in 31 games with eight starts over his first two pro seasons. He logged 29 tackles, seven PDs and an INT as a rookie, then followed up with 11 stops and three PDs in 2025. He finished his collegiate career at Texas Christian University (2022-23), after three seasons ('19-21) at the University of Louisiana-Monroe. **Tacario Davis** enters his rookie season after being selected by Cincinnati in the third round of the 2026 draft. A rangy CB with a 6-4 frame, he spent his final college season in 2025 at the University of Washington, where he started seven games but missed time throughout the year due to injuries. He played the previous three years at Arizona State University, where in 2023 he led the Pac-12 Conference with 15 PBUs. He was recognized as an all-league performer in three different conferences during his college career, as he was named honorable mention All-Pac-12 in 2023, second-team All-Big 12 in '24 and honorable mention All-Big Ten in '25. **DJ Ivey** has contributed as a core special teamer and reserve defensive back over his three seasons with the Bengals. A

seventh-round pick in 2023, he has seen action in 36 games and logged 13 defensive tackles along with 11 tackles and a fumble recovery on special teams. He played in 58 contests during his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.), then earned a roster spot coming out of his rookie training camp with Cincinnati. **Brayn Lux** spent most of his rookie season in 2025 on the Bengals' practice squad, but was elevated to the active roster for the final three games and saw action in two contests. He had a five-year college playing career that included three seasons (2020-22) at Fresno State and two ('23-24) at Texas Tech University. In 21 games played with the Red Raiders, he logged 67 tackles, 13 PDs and two INTs. **Jalen Kimber** spent the final five games of last season on Cincinnati's practice squad, after a stint on Buffalo's practice squad earlier in the year. He originally signed with Tennessee as a college free agent last offseason and was with the Titans through training camp, before being waived on final cuts. He played in 44 games in college, with stops at Georgia (2020-21), the University of Florida ('22-23) and Penn State ('24). He was named honorable mention All-Big Ten in his lone season with the Nittany Lions. Rookie **Ceyair Wright** signed with Cincinnati as a college free agent in May, following a five-year collegiate career that saw him play in 49 games with 32 starts. He spent his first three seasons (2021-23) at Southern California, then transferred to the University of Nebraska for the '24-25 campaigns. He totaled 109 career tackles, three TFLs, 1.5 sacks, 16 PBUs, three INTs and one FF. He was tabbed honorable mention All-Big Ten last season, when he led the Cornhuskers with five PBUs. He was a child actor who appeared in several movies and TV programs, perhaps most notable as LeBron James' son in "Space Jam: A New Legacy."

Safeties: A Cincinnati native who spent his final two collegiate seasons (2020-21) at the University of Cincinnati, **Bryan Cook** returned to the Queen City as an unrestricted free agent signee of the Bengals in March. He spent his first four NFL seasons with Kansas City, where he was a member of the Chiefs' back-to-back Super Bowl winning teams in the 2022 and '23 campaigns. He earned a starting safety role for the Chiefs entering the 2023 season and has started each of his last 49 games played, including postseason. In 62 regular-season contests, he has 228 tackles, four TFLs, one sack, 15 PDs, three INTs and two FRs. Cook attended nearby Mount Healthy High School, then began his college career at Howard University before transferring to Cincinnati. **Jordan Battle** took over as a full-time starting safety for the Bengals in his third pro season in 2025. He led Cincinnati with 112 tackles and four INTs last season, both of which marked a career high. A Bengals third-round pick in 2023, he started seven contests in his rookie campaign and then six in '24. He has six career picks to go along with 234 tackles. The Bengals added another veteran presence to the safeties room this offseason when they signed seventh-year pro **Kyle Dugger** during free agency. Originally a second-round draft choice of New England in 2020, Dugger spent his first five-plus seasons with the Patriots, then was traded to Pittsburgh last October and started nine games for the Steelers. He has appeared in 90 regular-season contests with 78 starts, registering 454 tackles, 27 TFLs, 4.5 sacks, 29 PDs, 11 INTs, three FFs and two FRs. He also has 29 career tackles on special teams. He has three career pick-sixes, with his most recent coming against the Bengals in Week 11 of last season. **Daijahn Anthony**, a seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, has seen action in 18 games through two pro seasons. He has contributed primarily on special teams, but also has three defensive tackles, all of which were recorded last year. He spent most of the 2025 campaign on Reserve/Injured due to a hamstring injury, before returning to the lineup in late November and seeing action in five

games. **PJ Jules** played in 14 games for the Bengals in 2025 and tied for second on the team with 16 special teams tackles, after spending his entire '24 rookie season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He joined the team as a college free agent signee following a five-year college career at Southern Illinois University. He capped off his time with the Salukis by recording 111 tackles and earning consensus first-team FCS All-America honors in 2023. **Russ Yeast** spent the 2025 season on Cincinnati's practice squad, after being waived by Houston on final cuts last August. Originally a seventh-round pick of the L.A. Rams in 2022, he played in 32 games with nine starts over his first two seasons, then saw action in four contests in '24 for the Rams (one game), Carolina (two) and the Texans (one). His father, Craig Yeast, was a fourth-round pick of the Bengals in 1999 and played for Cincinnati from '99-2000.

Special Teams: **K Evan McPherson** has climbed the Bengals' all-time kicking records lists through his first six seasons. A fifth-round pick in 2021, he ranks sixth in team history in made FGs (119), third in FG percentage (83.2), fourth in PATs (204) and fifth in points scored (561). Renowned for his long-distance accuracy, he owns seven of the franchise's nine longest made kicks, including a team-record 63-yarder in Week 12 of last season against New England. His 29 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are more than triple the next closest total by any kicker in Bengals history, and are the seventh-most in the NFL since he entered the league. He also currently maintains a streak of 21 consecutive made FGs on attempts from inside of 50 yards. **Ryan Rehkow** has been Cincinnati's punter and holder on placekicks since joining the team as a free agent in the 2024 offseason. Through two seasons with the team, he already owns Bengals records for career gross punting average (49.89; minimum 100 punts) and net punting average (42.91; min. 100). He has 53 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the fifth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976 and the fifth-most in the NFL since the start of the 2024 campaign. Last season, he ranked second in the NFL and broke his own Bengals single-season record with 50.5 yards per punt. **William Wagner** recorded 137 long snaps without an unplayable delivery in his 2025 rookie season with Cincinnati. He earned the long-snapping job coming out of training camp a year ago, after signing with the Bengals as a college free agent. In 2024 at the University of Michigan, he was a finalist for the Patrick Mannelly Award, given to the top long snapper in college football. WR **Charlie Jones** has served as Cincinnati's primary punt returner for the past three seasons, and last year took on the role of primary kickoff returner. He has 50 career PRs for 462 yards (9.2 average), along with 47 KORs for 1284 yards (27.3). He has scored two TDs on KORs and one on a PR, joining Ring of Honor CB Lemar Parrish as the only players in Bengals history with at least three returns for a TD. Jones missed the final three games of the 2025 season due to an ankle injury, and in that time WR **Ke'Shawn Williams** stepped into the primary returning role. Williams, who was acquired on waivers from Pittsburgh in December, contributed nine PRs for 95 yards and eight KORs for 203 yards. He had a career-long 43-yard PR in Week 17 vs. Arizona which set up a Bengals TD drive. He played in eight games for the Steelers in the first half of his 2025 rookie campaign, logging 11 PRs for 112 yards (10.2) and 18 KORs for 425 yards (23.6). Also in the mix to return punts is WR **Mitch Tinsley**, who fielded three punts last season and had one return for 10 yards in Week 13 at Baltimore. Veteran HB **Samaje Perine** has 25 career KORs for 654 yards (26.2), including a career-high 17 for 430 last season with Cincinnati. His 38-yard return in Week 9 vs. Chicago was the second-longest of his career, behind a 56-yarder in 2024 while playing for Kansas City. HB **Tahj Brooks** also gained experience on kickoff returns as a rookie last season, contributing 10 KORs for 258 yards. His longest return was a 41-yarder in Week 16 at Miami, which set up a Bengals TD drive in the second quarter.
