GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 4:25 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Kevin Harlan (play-by-play), Trent Green (analyst) and Melanie Collins (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst). In addition, the Bengals-Lions game will air nationally on Sports USA Radio. Broadcasters are Larry Kahn (play-by-play) and Marvin Lewis (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals travel to Green Bay looking to get back in the win column as they face the Packers at Lambeau Field on Sunday afternoon.

Cincinnati has dropped three straight contests, with the most recent result coming in a 37-24 setback against Detroit in Week 5. After the Lions built a 28-3 lead early in the second half, the Bengals scored TDs on three consecutive drives in the fourth quarter to cut their deficit to 11. But the early hole, which was spearheaded by three Detroit INTs off QB Jake Browning, proved too large to overcome.

As the Bengals turn the page to this week's matchup at Green Bay, head coach Zac Taylor acknowledged his team's disappointment in how the past three games have unfolded. However, with a second-place standing in the AFC North Division and 12 games remaining, he also pointed to the opportunity that exists if Cincinnati can get back in the win column.

"I don't like giving the message three weeks in a row," said Taylor. "While I appreciate the heart and that we're sticking together, I don't like that. That's not what the NFL is about. The NFL is about winning games and moving on to the next one, and creating some momentum for yourself. We're allowed to create momentum at different parts of the season. It hasn't been these last three weeks. We're allowed to start now. I do believe in these guys. If I'm betting, I'm betting on this team to find a way at 2-3, five games in, to be in contention for everything that we wanted to do. There's a lot of football left, and I believe we're going to get it done."

The Bengals' fourth-quarter surge against Detroit was highlighted by their top performers making splash plays. Browning threw three TD passes, with two going to All-Pro WR Ja'Marr Chase and the other to WR Tee Higgins. Chase, whose second score of the afternoon was a 64-yarder on third-and-long, finished with 110 yards on six catches. DE Trey Hendrickson, a fellow All-Pro selection alongside Chase last year, logged his second sack of the day early in the fourth quarter to help keep the Lions' high-powered offense in check as the comeback effort was mounted.

"The second half, we got into a rhythm," said Taylor. "We did a great job protecting the ball, did a great job protecting (Browning). We got some tough yards. There's not a lot of easy runs against that group, so I thought we found some tough runs over the course of that game. Just found some rhythm. That's the Bengals — when you get in a rhythm on offense, we score points. In the first half, you just look at the drive stats — there just wasn't a good enough rhythm there."

Cincinnati takes on a Green Bay team that is coming off a bye in Week 5. The Packers enter at 2-1-1 on the year, with their most recent outing at Dallas in Week 4 resulting in a 40-40 tie.

The series: The series is tied 7-7. The Packers have won the last two meetings — both in overtime, 27-24 in 2017 at Green Bay and 25-22 in '21 in Cincinnati. Prior to the Packers' two overtime wins, the Bengals had won three straight in 2005, '09 and '13 (all three of those games occurred in seasons in which the Bengals won the AFC North).

As the road team, the Bengals are 3-5 against Green Bay. Two of those road wins occurred at Milwaukee County Stadium, where the Packers played two to four games per season through 1994. The Bengals are 1-5 at Lambeau Field. As the home team, Cincinnati is 4-2 against Green Bay, including 2-1 at Paycor Stadium (previously Paul Brown Stadium) and 2-1 at Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field.

Bengals-Packers connections: Bengals DT Mike Pennel entered the NFL as a college free agent signee of the Packers in 2014 and spent his first three seasons ('14-16) with Green Bay ... Bengals LB Oren Burks was a third-round draft pick of the Packers in 2018 and spent his first four seasons ('18-21) with Green Bay ... Bengals DT T.J. Slaton Jr. was a fifth-round draft pick of the Packers in 2021 and spent his first four seasons ('21-24) with Green Bay ... Bengals defensive line coach/run game coordinator Jerry Montgomery spent nine seasons (2015-23) on the Packers' coaching staff, serving as defensive front assistant from '15-17 and defensive line coach from '18-23 ... Bengals head coach Zac Taylor served as assistant wide receivers coach for the L.A. Rams in 2017, when Packers head coach Matt LaFleur was the Rams' offensive coordinator ... Bengals DT B.J. Hill and Packers S Xavier McKinney were teammates on the N.Y. Giants in 2020 ... McKinney and Bengals S Jordan Battle were teammates at the University of Alabama in 2019 ... Bengals OT Orlando Brown Jr. and Packers G Darian Kinnard were teammates on the Kansas City Chiefs in 2022 ... Records vs. Packers: The following individual and team regular-season Bengals and Packers entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book:

- In a 28-7 home victory over Green Bay on Sept. 26, 1976, the Bengals defense set club marks for fewest total net yards allowed (36) and fewest net passing yards allowed (minus-35).
- The longest punt return in Bengals history, 95 yards for a touchdown by rookie WR Carl Pickens, came on Sept. 20, 1992 at Green Bay.
- On Oct. 30, 2005 at Paul Brown Stadium, Green Bay QB Brett Favre threw five interceptions, tied for most by an individual QB against the Bengals. Others picked five times by Cincinnati have been Chicago's Kyle Orton (2005), Minnesota's Daunte Culpepper ('05) and Oakland's Daryle Lamonica (1969). The Bengals' record for interceptions in a game against an opposing team is six, set twice but not involving any of the performances listed above.
- On Sept. 20, 2009 at Lambeau Field, Cincinnati DE Antwan Odom sacked Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers five times, tying the Bengals record. The only other instance of five sacks in a game by a Bengal was five by DE Eddie Edwards on Dec. 21, 1980 vs. Cleveland.

Uniform watch: Cincinnati will wear white jerseys, black pants (orange stripes) and white socks this week at Green Bay. The Bengals have worn this combination 12 previous times since their uniform redesign in 2021, and have collected a 7-5 record in those games. Cincinnati last featured this look in Week 10 of the 2024 season, in a Thursday Night Football contest at Baltimore.

The 2021 redesign marked the Bengals' first significant change in uniform since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes,

white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. Cincinnati announced that it will wear the white helmet in Week 7 of this season against Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2025 season, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 427 career receptions, the sixth-most in team history and 80 shy of T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530) and Tyler Boyd (513) hold the top four spots on the team's career list. Chase in Week 4 at Denver surpassed WR Isaac Curtis (416) for seventh place and WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for sixth.
- Chase has 5799 career receiving yards, the ninth-most in team history and 899 shy of fifth-most, which is held by WR Cris Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), WR Isaac Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed Houshmandzadeh (5782) for ninth.
- Chase has 49 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and four shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.
- Chase has 21 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, the third-most in team history and 10 shy of Johnson (31) for second. Green (33) holds

the team record. Chase in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed Curtis (20) for third.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history and 1.5 shy of LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. DE/DT Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5) and DT Geno Atkins (75.5) hold the top three spots. Hendrickson in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth.

- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 470 career points, the sixth-most in team history and 79 shy of fifth-most, which is held by K Horst Muhlmann (549).

- McPherson has 99 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and

21 shy of Muhlmann (120) for fifth.

- McPherson has 173 career made PATs, the sixth-most in team history and 16 shy of Muhlmann (189) for fifth.

- McPherson has a career FG percentage of 82.5 (99 made/120 att.), the third-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Kickers Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots. McPherson moved into third place ahead of Mike Nugent (81.8; 157/192) in Week 1 at Cleveland.

- P Ryan Rehkov has 32 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the sixth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976. He is five inside-20 punts shy of P Nick Harris (37) for fifth-most.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor's system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team's per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the '15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor's began coaching at Texas A&M University as an offensive graduate assistant and TE's coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during his College Station tenure.

Taylor played in college at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007,

but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Matt LaFleur was named the 15th head coach in team history on Jan. 8, 2019. He is in his seventh season as Green Bay's head coach and his 17th season in the NFL.

Going into the 2025 season he had led the Packers to 67 regular-season wins, the second most in NFL history by a coach in his first six seasons (George Seifert, 75 from 1989-94). He has guided the Packers to five playoff appearances in his first six years, tied for the most in the NFC since 2019, including back-to-back appearances in the NFC title game ('19-20) and the two youngest playoff teams in the NFL over the past 45 seasons (weighted age of 25.25 in '23 and 25.72 in '24).

Since taking over as head coach in 2019, LaFleur has helped guide the Packers to top-10 rankings in total offense, scoring offense, giveaways, total defense, scoring defense and takeaways — the only team in the NFL to finish in the top 10 in all six categories over that span. From 2019-21, he became the first coach in league history to win 13-plus games in three straight seasons. He led Green Bay to a 13-3 record in his first season in '19, the biggest one-year win improvement in team history (plus-seven).

LaFleur served as an offensive coordinator for two seasons (for the Los Angeles Rams in 2017, and the Tennessee Titans in '18) and coached quarterbacks for two seasons with Atlanta ('15-16) and four seasons with Washington ('10-13). He received his start in the NFL coaching ranks as an offensive assistant with the Houston Texans (2008-09) and has been a part of three staffs that have helped their teams lead the NFL in scoring ('16 Falcons, '17 Rams, '20 Packers).

LaFleur began his coaching career as an offensive assistant at Saginaw Valley State in 2003 before working as a graduate assistant at Central Michigan in '04-05. He also coached quarterbacks/wide receivers at Northern Michigan in 2006, served as the offensive coordinator at Ashland (Ohio) University in '07, and coached quarterbacks at Notre Dame in '14.

LaFleur played QB at Saginaw Valley State (2000-02), where he guided the Cardinals to three straight NCAA Division II playoff appearances and earned second-team All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honors in all three seasons. He ranks No. 3 in school history in passing yards (7699), completions (560) and passing TDs (67). He played in the National Indoor Football League for the Omaha Beef in 2003 and the Billings Outlaws in 2004.

LaFleur was born on Nov. 3, 1979, in Mount Pleasant, Mich. He and his wife, BreAnne, have two sons, Luke and Ty. His younger brother, Mike, is the offensive coordinator for the Los Angeles Rams. Their father, Dennis, coached 22 seasons (1976-97) on the staff at Central Michigan.

2025 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by seven captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of four offensive players and three defensive players.

The offensive captains are sixth-year QB Joe Burrow, eighth-year OT Orlando Brown Jr., 10th-year C Ted Karras and fifth-year WR Ja'Marr Chase. Burrow has been elected a captain in each of his six pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Brown carries the honor for the second straight year, after being voted a captain last season for the first time in his career. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the fourth straight season and fifth time overall, after also doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Chase, a four-time Pro Bowler, earned a captaincy role for the first time.

The three defensive captains are ninth-year DE Trey Hendrickson, eighth-year DT B.J. Hill and sixth-year LB Logan Wilson. Each player was voted a captain for the first time in their respective career.

The Browning rundown: QB Jake Browning has made 10 career starts for the Bengals, including each of the team's past three games. His first seven career starts came in Weeks 12-18 of the 2023 season, when he led Cincinnati to a 4-3 record to close out its schedule.

Browning has seen action in 16 total games in his career, and his stat line includes 251 completions on 367 passing attempts (68.4 percent) for 2693 yards and 18 TDs with 15 INTs, good for a passer rating of 89.0. He has thrown for over 300 yards three times, and recorded multiple TD passes in five contests.

Browning originally entered the league as a college free agent signee of Minnesota in 2019. He spent two seasons (2019-20) on the Vikings' practice squad, then was on the Bengals' practice squad for the entire '21 and '22 campaigns. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time in 2023, and spent the first 10 games of that season as Cincinnati's second-string QB before taking over the starting role. He saw limited action in three games last season, entering each contest late in the fourth quarter to take the final snaps.

In his previous stint as the Bengals' starter in 2023, Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passes (163 of 228) for 1868 yards and 11 TDs with seven INTs, good for a passer rating of 99.1. Over the final seven weeks of that regular season, he ranked second in the NFL in passing yards, second in completion percentage, third in total completions and third in yards per attempt (8.2).

Browning was a four-year starter (2015-18) at the University of Washington, where his 39 career wins were the most by a QB in the history of the Pac-12 Conference. He set program records for career passing attempts (1483), completions (958), passing yards (12,296) and TD passes (94). As a sophomore in 2016, he finished sixth in Heisman Trophy voting while leading Washington to a Pac-12 title and a berth in the College Football Playoff. Prior to his collegiate career, he set California prep records in several categories while at Folsom High School, including career passing yards (16,775) and TD passes (229).

Burrow's early 2025 totals: Sixth-year QB Joe Burrow started the first two games of the 2025 season before sustaining a toe injury in the second quarter of Week 2 vs. Jacksonville. He was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 16, and underwent surgery on Sept. 19. In his five-plus quarters of action, Burrow completed 21 of 36 passes for 189 yards and two TDs with no INTs.

Burrow played in his 70th career game in the season opener at Cleveland and went 14 of 23 for 113 yards, with a one-yard TD pass to TE Noah Fant to give Cincinnati the lead in the second quarter. Burrow's 1762 career completions at the end of the Browns game were the most by any QB in NFL history through their first 70 games, while his 141 TD passes ranked as the third-most and his 19,114 passing yards ranked fifth.

Burrow had completed seven of his 13 passing attempts for 76 yards against the Jaguars prior to his injury. He connected with WR Ja'Marr Chase for a four-yard TD on third-and-goal late in the opening quarter.

Chase climbs up the ranks: Fifth-year WR Ja'Marr Chase has recorded a team-leading 32 receptions this season, moving his career catch total to 427. He currently ranks sixth in receptions in Bengals history, recently surpassing Ring of Honor member Isaac Curtis (416) and former WR Cris Collinsworth (417) on the team's all-time chart.

Chase now is 80 receptions shy of tying former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for the fifth-most in Bengals history. He also has 5799 career receiving yards, and in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed Houshmandzadeh (5782) for the ninth-most in team history. Chase's 49 career receiving TDs rank fifth all-time by a Bengal and are four shy of tying Curtis (53) for fourth.

In Week 2 against Jacksonville, Chase logged his 400th career reception in

what was his 64th regular-season game. That tied former Atlanta WR Julio Jones and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry for the fifth-fewest games in NFL history to reach 400 career catches. The only players to ever hit that milestone in fewer games are former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (56 games), former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (61), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (62) and Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (63).

Chase kicked off his career with 81 receptions in the 2021 season, which set a Bengals rookie record and still ranks in the top 20 among all rookies in NFL history. He followed that up with a team-leading 87 catches in just 12 games played in 2022, then hit triple digits for the first time when he had 100 receptions in '23 (12th in NFL).

In his 2024 "Triple Crown" season, Chase led the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 catches. He became the first player in team history to lead the league in receptions, and surpassed Houshmandzadeh's previous team mark of 112 in the 2007 campaign.

Chase also holds the top three single-game receptions totals in Bengals history, led by a career-high 15 grabs in Week 5 of the 2023 season at Arizona. His 14 catches in Week 14 of last season at Dallas went in as the second-most in a game by a Cincinnati player, and he matched that mark with 14 in Week 2 of this season against the Jaguars.

Uno finds the end zone: WR Ja'Marr Chase enters this week with 49 career receiving TDs in 67 regular-season games played. Should he catch a scoring pass in what will be his 68th contest, he would be the seventh-fastest player in NFL history to reach 50 TD receptions.

Chase's 49 TD catches also are the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. In 2024, he led the league with 17 TDs, which tied the Bengals single-season record originally set by WR Carl Pickens in 1995. Chase became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in receiving TDs. He had a league-high five games with multiple TD catches last season, including a career-high-tying three scores in Week 10 at Baltimore.

Chase scored his 40th career receiving TD in Week 11 of last season against the L.A. Chargers, in what was his 56th game. He is the fastest player in Bengals history, and the eighth-fastest in NFL history, to reach that mark.

Chase is coming off a two-TD performance in Week 5 vs. Detroit, with both scoring grabs coming in the fourth quarter. It marked his 12th career game with multiple receiving TDs.

Chasing history: In the Bengals' Week 5 contest against Detroit, WR Ja'Marr Chase recorded his ninth career game with at least five receptions, 100 receiving yards and two receiving TDs. That tied Pro Football Hall of Famer Lance Alworth and former Green Bay WR Antonio Freeman for the most such games by a player in his first five seasons in NFL history.

Chase also ranks historically high in several other categories among players in their first five seasons, despite him being just five games into his fifth year. He has six games with at least 10 catches and 150 receiving yards, tied with his former Louisiana State teammate and current Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson for the most in any player's first five seasons. Among all players in league history within their first five years, he additionally ranks tied for second in games with at least 150 receiving yards and one receiving TD (eight), tied for second in games with at least 10 catches (12), and tied for second in games with at least 10 catches and 100 receiving yards (11).

By the end of the 2024 campaign, Chase's career numbers placed him alongside some of the top receivers in league history through their first four seasons. His 46 receiving TDs from 2021-24 are the third-most ever in a player's first four seasons, behind only Pro Football Hall of Famers Randy Moss (53) and Jerry Rice (49). He also ranks third in receiving yards in a player's first four seasons (5425), behind Jefferson (5899) and former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (5512). His 395 receptions over his first four years rank fourth all-time, trailing Thomas (470), Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (430) and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry (400).

Chase is the only player in NFL history with at least 80 receptions, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first four career seasons. He also is one of six players in league history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons, and the second Bengals player to do so following WR A.J. Green (2011-14).

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 86.6 receiving yards per game (67 regular-season games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only Jefferson (96.1) and L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (92.8). The players behind Chase in that category include Hall of Famer Calvin Johnson (fourth; 86.1 receiving yards per game), WR Antonio Brown (fifth; 84.2) and WR Julio Jones (sixth; 82.5).

Ja'Marr reigns as Triple Crown winner: WR Ja'Marr Chase finished the 2024 season as the NFL leader in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17), earning him the prestigious receiving "Triple Crown." He became just the sixth Triple Crown winner in the Super Bowl era (1966-present), and the first since L.A. Rams WR Cooper Kupp in 2021.

Chase's receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Bengals single-season record, while his 17 receiving TDs tied WR Carl Pickens' team record set in 1995. Chase had 100 or more receiving yards in five games in 2024, tying for the second-most such games in a season in team history behind WR A.J. Green's six games in '13.

Chase also became the fifth player in NFL history to log at least 100 catches, 1500 receiving yards and 15 receiving TDs in a season, joining Kupp ('21), former Minnesota WR Randy Moss ('03), former Indianapolis WR Marvin Harrison ('01) and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice (1995).

Following the regular season, Chase was voted a unanimous first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press. It marked his second career All-Pro selection, as he received second-team honors in his 2021 rookie campaign. He became the first Bengals offensive player to earn first-team accolades since OT/G Andrew Whitworth in 2015.

Chase signed a contract extension with the Bengals in March of this year that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 64-yard TD catch in Week 5 vs. Detroit was his 13th career receiving score from 60 or more yards. That is the most such TDs in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021, and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 26.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD receptions of 50/+ yards (14) and 40/+ yards (19) since 2021. In his 2021 rookie campaign, six of his 13 receiving TDs came from at least 40 yards out. He had three scoring catches of 60 or more yards in 2023, then followed up with a league-leading four of at least 60 yards in '24. Two of those occurred in the same game last year, as he scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards in Week 10 at Baltimore.

Chase breaks own yardage record: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 1708 receiving yards in 2024 led the NFL and were the most in a season in Bengals history. He eclipsed his own previous team record of 1455 receiving yards set in his 2021 rookie season.

Chase became the second player in team history to lead the league in receiving yards, joining former WR Chad Johnson, who topped the NFL with 1369 yards in 2006.

Chase totaled 100 or more receiving yards in five games in 2024, tied with several players for the most such games in the NFL. It also tied for the most 100-yard receiving games in a season in Chase's career, alongside 2021 and '23.

On his game-winning TD late in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas, Chase surpassed 5000 career receiving yards. Playing in his 58th regular-season game, he tied former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas for the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. The only players to get to 5000 receiving yards in fewer games are former San Diego Chargers WR Lance Alworth (52), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (52), former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (54), and former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (56).

Tee time: Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, WR Tee Higgins is tied for 14th in the league in receiving TDs (36) and ranks 18th in receiving yards (4753). He has two scoring catches this season, with a 42-yarder in Week 2 against Jacksonville and a two-yarder in Week 5 versus Detroit. He also ranks second on the team with 158 yards on 13 receptions (12.2 yards per catch).

A sixth-year pro this season, Higgins recorded over 900 receiving yards in four of his first five seasons. He had back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, and following those years he went on to total 457 yards and three TD catches in seven postseason games.

In 2024, Higgins finished second on the Bengals in receptions (73), receiving yards (911) and receiving TDs (10). His 10 TD catches were a career high and tied for sixth in the NFL. He was inactive for five games last year due to injuries, but over the last nine weeks of the regular season, he tied for the league lead in receiving TDs (seven) and ranked 17th in receiving yards (570). He also reached a pair of career milestones in 2024, eclipsing 300 receptions and 4000 receiving yards.

In his career, Higgins has 14 games with 100 or more receiving yards, and six games with multiple receiving TDs. His most recent such performance came in Week 17 of last year against Denver, when he caught 11 passes for 131 yards and a career-best three TDs, including the game-winning score in overtime.

Higgins re-signed with the Bengals in March on a four-year deal which keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2028 season.

Brown racks up scrimmage yards: Chase Brown took over the Bengals' starting HB role midway through his second pro season in 2024 and emerged as a key piece of the offense down the stretch. From Weeks 9-17 of last season, when he started at HB in each game, Brown ranked fifth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (930), fourth in scrimmage yards per game (116.3), seventh in rushing attempts (151) and ninth in rushing yards (631).

Brown also was one of just two players in that span with at least 600 rushing yards and 250 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs. He wrapped up his 2024 season by totaling at least 90 scrimmage yards in each of his final eight games played, making him the second player in team history to reach that total in eight straight contests. The only other Bengal to previously do so was FB Boobie Clark, who had an eight-game streak from Oct. 14-Dec. 2, 1973.

Brown finished the 2024 campaign ranking in the top 20 leaguewide in rushing attempts (229; 16th), rushing yards (990; 17th), rushing TDs (seven; T-19th), yards from scrimmage (1350; 17th) and TDs from scrimmage (11; T-17th). His top single-game statistical performance came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, when he posted his first career 100-yard rushing day (120), and added career highs in carries (27) and scrimmage yards (157).

Brown has kicked off his third pro season in 2025 with 255 scrimmage yards (160 rushing, 95 receiving) through five games. He scored the Bengals' first TD of the season on a five-yard run in Week 1 at Cleveland, and totaled a season-high 71 scrimmage yards in Week 4 at Denver.

Hendrickson cracks top five: With a team-leading four sacks through the first five games of this season, DE Trey Hendrickson has improved his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 61.0. That surpasses former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth-most in Bengals history, and is 1.5 shy of former LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. Hendrickson signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason.

Hendrickson, who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with the Bengals (2021-24), opened his Cincinnati tenure with 14.0 sacks in the '21 campaign, which led the team and ranked fifth in the NFL. He followed up with a team-high eight sacks in 2022.

Hendrickson posted 17.5 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 seasons, which are tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history behind former DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (the NFL began tracking sacks in '82, but the Bengals track the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder). He became the first Cincinnati player with double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81. Hendrickson also is just the fifth player in NFL history to post 17 or more sacks in back-to-back seasons.

Trey's torrid pace: Since the start of the 2023 season, DE Trey Hendrickson's league-leading 39.0 sacks are 5.5 more than any other player. He was the only NFL player with at least 15 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 campaign.

Hendrickson joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, and in his four-plus years in Cincinnati he has totaled 61.0 sacks. That ranks as the third-most in the NFL in that span, trailing only Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (64.0 sacks) and Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (61.5). He also has 13 games with multiple sacks (two or more) since the start of the 2021 season, the third-most leaguewide behind Watt (16 games) and former Dallas/current Green Bay DE Micah Parsons (15). Hendrickson's most recent such performance came in Week 5 vs. Detroit, when he logged two sacks including a strip-sack which was recovered by Cincinnati in the first quarter

Hendrickson's strip-sack last week against the Lions was his 12th forced fumble since 2021, which is tied for the third-most in the NFL in that span.

Originally a third-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017, Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons ('17-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and totaled 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL that season.

Trey reigns as sack champion: DE Trey Hendrickson in 2024 became the first Bengals player to lead the NFL in sacks since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982. His 17.5 sacks last season were 3.5 more than the second-highest total of 14.0 by Cleveland DE Myles Garrett.

Hendrickson compiled five games with multiple sacks in 2024, highlighted by a career-best four sacks in Week 9 against Las Vegas. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for that performance, then received the award again following Week 18 at Pittsburgh when he logged 3.5 sacks.

Hendrickson's performance in 2024 landed him his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl selection. He also was voted a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press, and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year.

On Aug. 25, the Bengals and Hendrickson agreed to a revised contract for the 2025 season.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: Sixth-year LB Logan Wilson has 11 career INTs (regular season), which are the most by any NFL linebacker since he came into the league as a third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020.

A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson opened his career with two picks in his 2020 rookie campaign, then followed up with four in '21. That 2021 total marked the most INTs in a season by a Bengals LB since Odell Thurman had five in '05. Wilson then followed up with one pick in 2022 and four more in '23.

Wilson's career INTs are the third-most ever by a Bengals LB, trailing only Reggie Williams (16) and Al Beauchamp (15). He also has posted 100 or more tackles in each of the past three seasons, including a career-high 135 stops in 2023 which ranked 15th in the NFL.

Wilson has 33 total tackles and three PDs through the first five games of the 2025 season. Since the start of the 2020 campaign, he is one of three NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith and Baltimore CB Marlon Humphrey.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson's 50-yard FG as the first half clock expired in Week 5 vs. Detroit marked his 25th career made FG from 50 or more yards. That extends his record for the most such FGs in a career in Bengals history, and is tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021.

McPherson kicked off his career with an NFL-best and Bengals-record nine FGs from at least 50 yards out in his 2021 rookie season. He followed up by going a perfect five-for-five on 50-yard attempts in 2022, then converted seven such kicks in '23. He drilled three FGs from 50-plus yards in 2024, before sustaining a groin injury in Week 13 that kept him out of the final five games.

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 99 of 120 FG attempts, good for the third-highest percentage in team history (82.5). Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," he is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson owns five of the seven longest made kicks in Bengals history, led by a career-long 59-yarder that he booted in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh. His season long in 2024 was a 56-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, which at the time tied for the fifth-longest in team history (now tied for sixth).

Rehkwow's ranks: P Ryan Rehkwow has punted 27 times for 1433 yards this season, with seven punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line. He ranks first in the NFL in gross yards per punt (53.1) and tied for 10th in inside-20 punts.

As a rookie in 2024, Rehkwow set Bengals single-season records for gross punting average (49.11 yards) and net average (42.92 yards). Both figures surpassed former P Kevin Huber's previous records set in the 2020 season. Rehkwow also has 25 inside-20 punts last year compared to five touchbacks.

After signing with the Bengals as a free agent on the third day of training camp in 2024, Rehkwow made his NFL debut in Week 1 of last season against New England. That day, he punted four times for 258 yards, setting an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per attempt (minimum four punts). The previous league record belonged to Las Vegas P AJ Cole, who had a 63.60-yard average in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. Rehkwow's performance in the 2024 opener also included the longest punt in Bengals history, an 80-yarder kicked

from his own 20-yard line to the Patriots' end zone.

Rehkwow finished his 2024 rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average.

Four Bengals listed on "Top 100": For the 15th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on social media and NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by four players on the 2025 list — WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 4), QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 14) and WR Tee Higgins (No. 77). It marked the first appearance on the list in Higgins' career, the fourth overall for Burrow and Chase, and the fifth for Hendrickson.

Chase's ranking at No. 4 is the highest by a Bengals player since the "Top 100" debuted in 2011. The previous highest ranking was No. 6, which was Burrow's position on the 2023 list. Hendrickson's spot at No. 14 is his personal highest, substantially ahead of his previous best ranking of No. 77 (2021 list).

This marks the third time in the history of the "Top 100" in which four or more Bengals players were featured. Cincinnati had a record seven players on the 2016 list, then landed four on the '22 edition.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of 65,000 or more in 26 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That marks the longest streak in team history, surpassing a previous span of 24 straight home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 14 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Two of those contests were played in the 2024 season, as Cincinnati welcomed an announced crowd of 67,239 for its "White Bengal" game in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia (second-largest in team history), then hosted an announced figure of 66,546 for the Week 17 overtime thriller against Denver (fourth-largest).

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history.

Lapham, Parrish to enter Bengals Ring of Honor:

The Bengals announced in July that former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish will be inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of the Week 8 game against the N.Y. Jets. They will become the 11th and 12th members of the Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who enters his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team's most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive linemen who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team's starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career,

Lapham moved into the team's radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as "Mr. Bengal," he has been the team's radio analyst since 1986.

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

Lapham and Parrish will join the 10 current Ring of Honor inductees, which include QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members, then are officially enshrined in the ring during halftime of a Bengals home game that year.

Bengals record 250th home win: The Bengals' 31-27 win over Jacksonville in Week 2 marked the 250th all-time victory at home in team history. Cincinnati has won 243 regular-season and seven postseason games played in the Queen City.

The Bengals' first home victory came in their first ever regular-season home game, which was played on Sept. 6, 1968 against Denver at Nippert Stadium on the University of Cincinnati's campus. The team's first postseason win at home occurred following the 1981 season, when Cincinnati defeated Buffalo 28-21 at Riverfront Stadium in an AFC Divisional Playoff. The Bengals followed that up with one of the team's most noteworthy wins in the Queen City, a 27-7 victory over the San Diego Chargers in an AFC Championship contest that was dubbed the "Freezer Bowl," in recognition of the minus-59 degree wind chill at kickoff.

That win over San Diego punched the Bengals' ticket to Super Bowl XVI, their first ever appearance in the league's title contest. Cincinnati captured the AFC crown for a second time with a 21-10 win over Buffalo at Riverfront Stadium on Jan. 8, 1989, to advance to Super Bowl XXIII.

Other milestone home wins in Bengals history include the team's 100th victory at home — a 41-10 decision over Pittsburgh on Sept. 17, 1989 — and the 200th victory at home — a 24-10 result against Atlanta on Sept. 14, 2014.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.6 years ... Cincinnati's win at Tennessee in Week 15 of the 2024 season was the 400th regular-season victory in team history ... The Bengals played five road games in prime time (7 p.m. ET or later) during the 2024 regular season, which were the most such games in a season in NFL history and tied with the 1963 Oakland Raiders (American Football League) for the most ever by any pro team ... The Bengals have netted 21 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, tied for the third-most weekly awards by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who is in his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is DT Mike Pennel, who is 34 (born May 9, 1991) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who is 21 (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the active roster is HB Tahj Brooks, who is listed at 5-9 ... Brown and Mims also are tied for the heaviest player on the active roster, listed at 350 pounds ... There is a tie for lightest player on the active roster between K Evan McPherson and CB DJ Turner II, who both are listed at 185 pounds.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Jake Browning took over starting duties following Joe Burrow's Week 2 injury against Jacksonville and has completed 80 of 124 passes (64.5 percent) for 757 yards and six TDs with eight INTs this season. He entered the Jaguars game in the second quarter and proceeded to throw for 241 yards and two TDs, before finishing off the afternoon with a game-winning TD on a one-yard sneak with 18 seconds remaining. He is coming off a fourth quarter in Week 5 against Detroit in which he posted a perfect 158.3 passer rating, as he completed eight of 10 passes in the period for 133 yards and three TDs with no turnovers. Browning's previous stint as the Bengals' starter came in 2023, when he started the final seven games and helped steer the team to a 4-3 record. In that stretch, he ranked second in the NFL in passing yards (1868) over the final seven weeks of the regular season, while completing 71.5 percent of his attempts and throwing 11 TDs. He spent the entire 2024 campaign as

Cincinnati's second-string QB, seeing limited action in three games. He spent his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Cincinnati signed QB Brett Rypien off the practice squad to the active roster prior to the Week 3 game at Minnesota, and he made his Bengals debut late in the fourth quarter of that contest. A sixth-year player out of Boise State University, Rypien originally was a college free agent signee of Denver in 2019. He has played in 11 career games with four starts (three for Denver from 2020-22, one for the L.A. Rams in '23), and has completed 98 of 168 passes for 950 yards and four TDs with nine INTs. He also spent time on Seattle's practice squad and the N.Y. Jets' active roster during the 2023 season, then spent the entire '24 campaign on Minnesota's practice squad.

Running backs: HB Chase Brown is in his third pro season and first as Cincinnati's full-time primary running back. Originally a fifth-round pick of the

Bengals in 2023, he took over the starting HB role midway through the '24 campaign. From Weeks 9-17 of last season, he ranked fifth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (930) and fourth in scrimmage yards per game (116.3). He finished last season with 990 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs on 229 carries, along with 54 receptions for 360 yards and four TDs. Through five games this season, Brown has 255 yards from scrimmage (160 rushing, 95 receiving), and he opened the scoring in Week 1 at Cleveland with a five-yard rushing TD. He posted a season-high 71 scrimmage yards (40 rushing, 31 receiving) in Week 4 at Denver. His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at the University of Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB **Samaje Perine**. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. In 115 career regular-season games, he has 483 rushing attempts for 1974 yards and nine TDs. Some of his top moments with the Bengals came during the team's postseason runs following the 2021 and '22 campaigns, including a 41-yard receiving TD in the '21 AFC Championship win at Kansas City. Perine has been utilized primarily as a kickoff returner and extra pass blocker this season, but he also has logged nine carries for 52 yards as he closes in on 2000 yards in his career. Rookie HB **Tahj Brooks** was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of this year's draft, after compiling a record-setting career at Texas Tech University. Brooks finished his time in Lubbock with the most rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23) in program history. He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back). He has seen action primarily on special teams through his first five NFL games, but recorded his first five career carries for 17 yards in the second half of Week 3 at Minnesota.

Wide Receivers: Cincinnati's 2021 first-round draft choice **Ja'Marr Chase** has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons and has broken several Bengals single-season records early in his pro career. In 2024, he became the youngest player (24 years old) in the Super Bowl era to claim the receiving "Triple Crown," as he led the league in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17). His receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Cincinnati single-season record, while his TDs tied the franchise mark held by WR Carl Pickens (1995). Through five games this season, Chase ranks 10th in the NFL with 374 receiving yards on a team-leading 32 receptions. He hauled in two TD catches in Week 5 vs. Detroit, including a 64-yarder in the fourth quarter. He signed a four-year contract extension on March 18, the same day that his running mate **Tee Higgins** re-signed with Cincinnati on a four-year deal. Since entering the league as a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins is tied for 14th in the NFL in TD catches (36) and ranks 18th in receiving yards (4753). He recorded at least 900 yards in four of his first five pro seasons, including consecutive 1000-yard campaigns in 2021 and '22. He had a career-best 10 receiving TDs last season (tied for sixth in NFL), and has found the end zone twice this year, with his most recent score coming in the fourth quarter of Week 5 vs. Jacksonville. Through five games, Higgins ranks second on the team in receiving yards (158) on 13 catches. **Andre Iosivas** is in his third NFL season and aims to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He brought in 36 catches for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024, following a rookie year in '23 that saw him net 116 yards and four TDs on 15 grabs. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as each of his 10 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. Iosivas is coming off a career-high 82 yards on a career-high-tying five receptions in Week 5 vs. Detroit. He was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he earned All-America honors as a heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. Fellow third-year receiver **Charlie Jones** has served as the Bengals' primary kickoff and punt returner since being selected in the fourth round of the 2023 draft, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. In 2022, his final collegiate season which he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Among the top offensive performers throughout this past training camp and preseason was WR **Mitch Tinsley**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster after signing a Reserve/Future contract with Cincinnati in February. Originally a college free agent signee of Washington in 2023, Tinsley played in two games as a rookie for the Commanders (no statistics), then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. He faced his former team in the Bengals' second preseason

game at Washington and posted five catches for 73 yards and two highlight-reel TDs. He made the highlight tapes once again with his first career reception in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, a one-handed TD grab on a 13-yard pass from Browning. He finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-21). Second-year WR **Jermaine Burton** possesses the ability to stretch defensive coverages, as two of his four catches as a rookie last season went for over 40 yards. He also contributed in the kickoff return game following Jones' injury last year. Burton began his collegiate career at the University of Georgia (2020-21), then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two seasons ('22-23) before being selected by the Bengals in the third round of the '24 NFL Draft. In 2023, his final year with the Crimson Tide, he led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally in yards per reception (20.5).

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 83 career regular-season games with 54 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season and has started in 27 of his last 31 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 104 career receptions for 756 yards and five TDs. Sample's most recent score came on a four-yard pass from Browning in Week 3 at Minnesota. He missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned at the start of the '23 season and has suited up for each of Cincinnati's last 37 games. Now in his seventh season, Sample is the Bengals' longest-tenured player. Eighth-year veteran **Mike Gesicki** joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2024 offseason and provides the offense with an athletic pass-catching TE. In his first season in Cincinnati, he ranked third on the team in receptions (65) and receiving yards (665). His catch total was the second-most in a season by a Bengals TE (Dan Ross, 71 in 1981), while his yardage was the most by a Cincinnati TE since 2012 (Jermaine Gresham, 737). Gesicki entered the NFL as a second-round pick of Miami in 2018, and spent his first five seasons ('18-22) with the Dolphins before playing for New England in '23. He has caught a pass in each of the first five games this season, totaling eight receptions for 61 yards. **Noah Fant** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late July this year, and already has built a rapport with Cincinnati's quarterbacks. He has 12 catches for 80 yards and a TD in three games played, with the scoring grab coming on a one-yard pass from Burrow in the opener at Cleveland. A former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), he spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21), before being traded to Seattle, where he played the past three years ('22-24). He has 99 career regular-season games of experience with 85 starts, and has 312 catches for 3385 yards and 16 TDs. Sixth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** is a reserve TE who has enjoyed his best career statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with the Bengals. After totaling 15 receptions for 199 yards over his first four seasons on an active roster (2019-22), he posted career highs in catches (39) and yards (352) for Cincinnati in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four games during that postseason. **Cam Grandy** began his 2024 rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, then signed to the active roster midway through the year and went on to play in eight games with six starts. He has six catches for 34 yards in his career, including a six-yard grab in his first appearance of the 2025 campaign in Week 3 at Minnesota. Grandy was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University, where in 2023 he led all Missouri Valley Conference tight ends with 612 receiving yards.

Offensive linemen: Headlining the Bengals' offensive line room is four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started all 33 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three NFL seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore and then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 32 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 75 regular-season games played. He has played all 287 offensive snaps through Cincinnati's first five games this season. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who is in his fourth season with the Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his four years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 58 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.5 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span (3801 of 3820). Off the field, he was the team's 2023 nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award, honored for his charitable work with the Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras

spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. The starting ROT is second-year pro **Amarius Mims**, who was Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2024 (No. 18 overall). Mims played in 15 games as a rookie with 13 starts at ROT, and impressed his teammates and coaches as the year progressed. He has started all five games this season and lined up for 281 of 287 offensive snaps. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Orlando Brown Jr. as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. A teammate of Mims' at Georgia was **Dylan Fairchild**, who was taken in the third round of this year's draft and has started at LG for the Bengals in each of the first five games of his rookie season. He started all 14 games for the Bulldogs in 2024 and earned both second-team All-America and second-team All-Southeastern Conference honors. In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., he was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. Rookie **Jalen Rivers** has played all 110 offensive snaps over the last two games since making his first career start at RG in Week 4 at Denver. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April, Rivers boasted a proven ability to line up at both tackle and guard spots during his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.). He was the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two seasons, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. He suited up for 38 total games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) at Miami. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT **Cody Ford**, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. He has played 10 offensive snaps and 15 special teams snaps through five games this season. Ford was college teammates with Orlando Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17. G **Dalton Risner** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late August and has played in four games with two starts at RG this season. He entered the Week 1 contest at Cleveland in the second quarter following starter Lucas Patrick's injury, and has since lined up for 139 offensive snaps. Risner spent his first four seasons ('19-22) with Denver before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 91 career regular-season games with 83 starts — 73 at LG and 10 at RG. Risner originally was a second-round draft pick of the Broncos in 2019. C **Matt Lee** is in his second pro season with the Bengals, after seeing action in all 17 games for Cincinnati in 2024. He played 27 total offensive snaps and 86 special teams snaps last year, and made his first career start in Week 16 vs. Cleveland as a tackle-eligible third TE. He was inactive for the Week 1 contest at Cleveland, but has lined up for 12 special teams snaps over the past four games. Lee was a seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, following a five-year college career (2019-23) that saw him go from the University of Central Florida ('19-22) to Miami (Fla.) for his final season. He garnered second-team All-ACC honors in his lone season at Miami.

Defensive linemen: The Bengals' defensive line room is headlined by **Trey Hendrickson**, a ninth-year defensive end who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with Cincinnati (2021-24). He posted 17.5 sacks in each of the past two seasons, with last year's total leading the NFL. He became the first Bengals player to lead the league in sacks since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982. Hendrickson was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press in 2024 and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year. Since joining the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason, he ranks third in the NFL in sacks (61.0) and tied for third in forced fumbles (12). He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of New Orleans in 2017 and spent his first four seasons ('17-20) with the Saints. Hendrickson has four sacks through the first five games this season (tied for ninth in NFL), including two in Week 5 vs. Detroit. His first sack against the Lions was a strip-sack in the opening quarter which was recovered by Cincinnati. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 59 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 17 sacks as a Bengal while also batting down/tipping 13 passes. He leads the team's defensive line with 22 tackles this season, including two TFLs and a sack. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.**, who joined the Bengals after spending his first four pro seasons

(2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 73 regular-season games and totaled 154 tackles, six TFLs, two sacks and four PDs. He made his first career start in the 2022 season finale and has started each of his last 41 games played. Slaton has logged 21 tackles through his first five games with Cincinnati, including a season-high eight in Week 5 vs. Detroit. DE **Joseph Ossai** has posted two sacks through the first five games of this season, including a nine-yard takedown of Lions QB Jared Goff in Week 5. He now has seven sacks over his last 11 games played dating back to Week 11 of the 2024 campaign. Originally a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, Ossai missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just three games in the past three-plus seasons. He has 11.5 sacks and nine TFLs in 52 career games (six starts). He was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has posted 1.5 sacks this season, including his first full sack of the year in the first quarter of Week 5 vs. Detroit. Murphy missed the early part of the 2024 season due to a knee injury, but returned to the lineup last October and has since played in 19 straight contests. In 35 career games, he has 50 tackles with five TFLs and 4.5 sacks. Murphy was a first-team All-ACC pick in his final season at Clemson University, where he amassed 17.5 career sacks in 38 games for the Tigers. Cincinnati added veteran depth when it signed free agent DT **Mike Pennel** off the practice squad to the active roster on Sept. 9. Pennel joined the practice squad the previous week, after serving as a key member of Kansas City's defense in 2023 and '24. An 11th-year player, he spent his first three pro seasons (2014-16) with Green Bay, before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('17-18), a first stint with the Chiefs ('19-20), Atlanta ('21) and Chicago ('22). He has suited up for 143 career regular-season games with 25 starts, and has 243 total tackles with 15 TFLs and five sacks. He has 12 tackles on 105 defensive snaps played through five games with the Bengals. Second-year DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** got in the sack column for the first time this season in Week 3 at Minnesota, notching 1.5 in the first half of that contest. A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, Jenkins played in 15 games with nine starts as a rookie last year, including starts in each of the final seven contests. He logged 31 tackles with three sacks last season, and has kicked off this year with 18 stops (nine solos) and two TFLs. In his final season at the University of Michigan in 2023, he earned second-team All-America honors and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., was a four-time Pro Bowler during his 10-year playing career (2001-10) as a DT for Carolina and the N.Y. Jets. The Bengals added impressive athleticism to the D-line room when they selected DE **Shemar Stewart** in the first round of this year's draft (No. 17 overall) out of Texas A&M University. Noted in the scouting process for his physical traits, Stewart was one of two players in the 2025 draft class to produce a perfect 10.0 on the Relative Athletic Score, which grades a player's measurements compared to their peer group. He played in 37 games with 19 starts across three seasons (2022-24) with the Aggies, and totaled 65 tackles with 11 TFLs and 4.5 sacks. He earned third-team All-SEC honors last season, when he led Texas A&M with 39 pressures and seven QB hurries. He posted two tackles through his first two NFL games, but has been inactive for each of the past three contests due to an ankle injury. Members of Cincinnati's defensive coaching staff expressed their excitement for the return of fifth-year DE **Cam Sample**, who missed the entire 2024 campaign due to an Achilles injury sustained during training camp. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 52 career games as a rotational lineman and has 75 tackles with five sacks. He made his return to game action in the preseason opener at Philadelphia, and saw his first regular-season action since the Achilles injury in Week 1 at Cleveland. He has played in all five games this season and has posted seven tackles. DT **McKinnley Jackson**, a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, played in 13 games as a rookie last season after beginning the year on Reserve/Injured due to a knee injury. He contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He played in 40 career games at Texas A&M University, where he was voted a team captain in each of his final two years (2022-23). He made his 2025 season debut in Week 5 vs. Detroit and recorded one tackle, after being inactive for the first four games. The Bengals acquired DT **Jordan Jefferson** on waivers from San Francisco prior to Week 5. Originally a fourth-round draft pick of Jacksonville in 2024, Jefferson has recorded 12 tackles with one sack in nine career games with the Jaguars (2024) and 49ers ('25). He finished his college career at Louisiana State in 2023, following four seasons ('19-22) at West Virginia University.

Linebackers: **Logan Wilson** leads the Bengals' linebackers room in his sixth pro season, after missing the final six games of the 2024 campaign due to a knee injury. A 2020 third-round pick by Cincinnati, Wilson has played in 73 career regular-season games with 63 starts. He has topped 100 tackles in each

of the past three seasons (2022-24), and his 11 career INTs are the most by any player at his position since he entered the league. He is one of three NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs since 2020, alongside Minnesota's Harrison Smith and Baltimore's Marlon Humphrey. Wilson's injury last season ended a streak of 39 straight starts. He has 33 tackles (15 solos), three PDs and a FR through five games this season. Starting alongside Wilson is rookie LB **Demetrius Knight Jr.**, who the Bengals took in the second round of April's draft. Knight leads team with 39 tackles (23 solos) through five games this season, while also charting two PDs. He recorded his first career INT in Week 4 at Denver, picking off Broncos QB Bo Nix in Cincinnati's end zone late in the first half. He shot up draft boards after a breakout season at the University of South Carolina in 2024, in which he played in 13 games and ranked second on the Gamecocks with 82 tackles. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. Knight was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB early in his college career. Eighth-year LB **Oren Burks** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. He was a key performer for the Eagles during their postseason run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. He has made two starts at LB and been rotated in frequently through his first five games with the Bengals, totaling 11 tackles, one TFL and one FF. Rookie **Barrett Carter** was noted for his versatility and all-around value when the Bengals drafted him in the fourth round this April. He played in 52 games with 40 starts during a four-year career (2021-24) at Clemson University, and amassed 233 tackles, 31.5 TFLs, 12.5 sacks, 21 pass breakups, three INTs and two FFs. Over the span of his four collegiate seasons, he was the nation's only player with at least 30 TFLs, 20 PBUs and three picks. Last season, he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). He has 14 tackles through his first five NFL games, including a career-high six stops in Week 5 vs. Detroit. **Shaka Heyward** spent the entire 2023 campaign and most of '24 on Cincinnati's practice squad, before playing in six games for the Bengals in the back half of last season. A 2023 college free agent signee out of Duke University, he has carved out a role on special teams and has a team-leading eight special teams tackles through five games this season. Heyward also ranked second on the team this past preseason with 14 total tackles.

Cornerbacks: A first-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2022, **Dax Hill** spent his first two pro seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. He started the first five games of last season at CB before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week 5. He underwent a full rehab and returned to full participation during training camp. Hill has started all five contests this season and leads the team's CBs with 33 tackles, while also recording two PDs and an INT. His pick came in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, when he came down with a pass in the Cincinnati end zone to help turn the momentum of the game. A natural athlete who lined up at several positions in the secondary during his career at the University of Michigan (2019-21), Hill primarily contributed on special teams throughout his 2022 rookie season before starting all 17 contests at S in '23. CB **DJ Turner II** made his regular-season return in Week 1 at Cleveland, after missing the final six games of the 2024 campaign due to a collarbone injury. He helped seal the win over the Browns with his first career INT, which came with under two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter and the Bengals protecting a one-point lead. His team-leading six PDs through the first five weeks of the regular season are tied for fifth in the NFL. Prior to last season's injury, Turner was emerging as a consistent starting outside cornerback midway through his sophomore campaign. He was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2023 and has played in 33 career games with 22 starts. He was a teammate of Hill's at Michigan, where he earned two All-Big Ten honors. Turner ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. CB **Josh Newton** looks to continue building his status as a core member of the defense in his second pro season. A fifth-round pick in 2024, he earned a roster spot coming out of his rookie training camp and went on to play in all 17 games. He was thrust into the starting lineup following Turner's shoulder injury and started the final six contests, and that stretch included his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee. He has started two games this season and has seven tackles (six solos). Newton spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. Cincinnati's second-round draft choice in 2022 was **Cam Taylor-Britt**, who has played in 43 regular-season games with 39 starts in his career. He had a career-high 16 PDs in 2024, which led the Bengals and tied for

fifth-most in the NFL, along with three INTs. He broke out during the 2023 campaign with four picks (tied for seventh in NFL) and 11 PDs in just 12 games played. Taylor-Britt has posted seven tackles and two PDs so far this season. The Bengals acquired CB **Marco Wilson** on waivers from New England last November, adding depth and experience following Turner's injury. Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons (2021-23) with Arizona, before being waived by the Cardinals and signed by the Patriots in December of '23. He has played in 62 career regular-season games with 37 starts, and his career totals include 20 PDs and three INTs. He played in each of Cincinnati's final six games last season, and made his 2025 debut in Week 3 at Minnesota. **DJ Ivey** made his return midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals, he carved out a role on special teams and showed flashes on defense prior to the injury. In 11 games played last season, he recorded three solo tackles and two PDs defensively, while also contributing one tackle on special teams. Ivey has lined up for 76 special teams snaps and 11 defensive snaps through the first five games of this season.

Safeties: **Geno Stone** has started all 22 games he has played in for the Bengals since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason. He led Cincinnati with four INTs last year (tied for 10th in NFL), which included a stretch of three straight games with a pick from Weeks 14-16. Stone spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the AFC. His 11 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the third-most leaguewide. Stone also ranked third on the Bengals last season with 81 tackles. He has 34 tackles (19 solos), including a TFL, through five games in 2025. He recorded a season-high 10 stops in Week 4 at Denver. His fellow starting safety, **Jordan Battle**, had an INT in each of the first two games this season, becoming the first Bengals player to start a year with picks in back-to-back games since former CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. He also leads Cincinnati's defensive backs with 38 tackles through five contests, highlighted by a career-best 12 stops in the opener at Cleveland. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle has played in 39 career games (18 starts) and recorded 160 tackles along with four picks. His starting roles in previous seasons came late in the year, as he started each of the final seven contests in his 2023 rookie campaign, then each of the final six in '24. He was a team captain and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). Fourth-year pro **Tylen Anderson** is a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two seasons, with eight in 2023 followed by 11 in '24, and he already has six ST stops through the first five games of '25. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. **PJ Jules** cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. Jules led the Bengals with 10 solo tackles this past preseason. He has seen action primarily on special teams through five games this season, recording three ST stops, but also contributed two tackles with a TFL in Week 3 at Minnesota.

Special Teams: A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, **K Evan McPherson** owns the third-highest career FG percentage in team history (82.5). He has converted 99 of 120 FG attempts in the regular season, and is a perfect 19 of 19 in postseason play. He knocked through 16 of 22 tries in the 2024 campaign, before sustaining a groin injury in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh that kept him out of the final five games. His 25 career made FGs from 50 or more yards already are the most in Bengals history, and are tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. He has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times, and has seven career "walk-off" game-winning FGs as time expired (including postseason). McPherson has converted all five of his FG attempts and all 10 of his PATs through the first five games of this season, with a long of 50 yards in Week 5 vs. Detroit. Second-year P **Ryan Rehkow** compiled a record-setting rookie season in 2024 that saw him set Bengals single-season marks for gross punting average (49.11 yards per punt) and net average (42.92). His net average ranked sixth among all NFL punters last year, while his gross ranked ninth (both led all rookies). Rehkow was named to the 2024 Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team. In his career debut in the 2024 opener against New England, he set an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per punt (four punts for 258 yards). Through five games this season, Rehkow leads the NFL in gross average (53.1) and has seven inside-20 punts. He originally joined the Bengals as a free agent early in training camp in

2024. Rookie **William Wagner** earned the role as the Bengals' long snapper coming out of this past training camp, after signing with the team as a college free agent in May. Wagner spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannely Award (nation's top LS). He has recorded 42 snaps without an unplayable delivery through his first five NFL games. WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. He is one of two players in team history to score a TD on both (CB Lemar Parrish), as he found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of the 2023 season vs. Baltimore, and also had a 100-yard KOR on the opening

kickoff of Week 7 at Cleveland last year. He took over KOR duties for the first time in 2024, and finished the year with five returns for 200 yards. He also has 41 career PRs for 396 yards (9.65 average). Jones has recorded 14 KORs for 333 yards and five PRs for 65 yards through five games this season. Also in the mix to return kickoffs and punts is second-year WR **Jermaine Burton**, who took over KOR responsibilities late last season following an injury to Jones. Burton had 13 KORs for 378 yards (29.1 average), including two 38-yarders. He logged four KORs for 84 yards this past preseason, as well as two PRs for 35 yards. HB **Samaje Perine** returned six kickoffs for 154 yards in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, and he followed up with four KORs for 88 yards in Week 3 at Minnesota. While playing for Kansas City last season, he had five KORs for 163 yards (32.6 average).

2017 SEASON WEEK 3, GAME 3

Green Bay Packers 27, Cincinnati Bengals 24 Sunday, Sept. 24, 2017 at Lambeau Field

The Bengals' offense, which had not scored a TD in either of the first two games, scored TDs on two of its first three possessions. Behind those scores and an INT returned for a TD by CB William Jackson, the Bengals jumped out to a 21-7 lead on the defending NFC North Champions and controlled that advantage for most of the game. In the first half, Cincinnati outgained Green Bay in net yards, 192-78, while winning on third downs on both sides of the line of scrimmage, converting four of seven while holding the Packers to two of seven. In the second half, however, the Packers flipped the third downs, converting five of eight and holding the Bengals to zero of five. Behind the direction of QB Aaron Rodgers, Green Bay rallied late with a 12-play, 71-yard TD drive with 17 seconds left to send the game into OT. Then, after the Bengals' offense stalled with a three-and-out on the opening drive of OT, Rodgers connected with WR Geronimo Allison on third-and-10 for a 72-yard pass to the Bengals' seven-yard line, and two plays later, the Packers converted on a 27-yard FG. QB Andy Dalton completed 21 of 27 passes for 212 yards, two TDs and no INTs (124.1 rating), and WR A.J. Green caught 10 passes for 111 yards and a TD. Rookie LB Carl Lawson had 2.5 sacks. The Bengals fell to 0-3, while the Packers improved to 2-1.

Green Bay Packers 25, Cincinnati Bengals 22 (OT) Sunday, Oct. 10, 2021 at Paul Brown Stadium

The host Bengals and visiting Packers combined to miss six placekicks, including five FGs, but Packers K Mason Crosby broke the run of misses and nailed a 49-yarder late in OT to secure a Green Bay win. The Packers racked up 466 total yards, including 206 receiving yards from WR Davante Adams, but the Bengals' defense held them to just two TDs on five total trips to the red zone. Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase had a big day of his own, posting the second-most receiving yards (159) ever by a Cincinnati rookie. The highlight of the day came just before halftime, when Bengals QB Joe Burrow connected with Chase on a 70-yard TD that drew the Bengals within two points. Cincinnati tied the game with 3:27 left in the fourth quarter, but McPherson missed a potential go-ahead 57-yard FG with 26 seconds left, and then Crosby Missed from 51 yards as time expired. In OT, Crosby missed from 40 yards and McPherson from 49, before Crosby finally converted with 1:55 remaining. Green Bay improved to 4-1, while Cincinnati fell to 3-2.

The Bengals' defense recorded two takeaways in the second half and held Cleveland scoreless on its final six possessions to lead the way in a season-opening victory. Cincinnati's offense was limited to 141 net yards, the second-fewest in a win in team history, but it scored a TD on two of its first three drives to build a 14-10 halftime lead. The Browns pulled ahead with a TD in the third quarter but missed the PAT attempt, and a 35-yard FG by Bengals K Evan McPherson later in the period regained the lead for Cincinnati. Cleveland drove inside the red zone with under five minutes remaining in regulation, but K Andre Szmyt's try for a 36-yard go-ahead FG sailed wide right. The Browns forced a quick Bengals punt and once again were driving for the win, before CB DJ Turner II came up with his first career INT on a ball that ricocheted off a Cleveland WR. P Ryan Rehkow then delivered a punt that was downed at the Browns' one-yard line, securing the win for Cincinnati.

Detroit Lions 37, Cincinnati Bengals 24
Sunday, Oct. 5, 2025 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals scored a TD on three straight possessions in the fourth quarter to cut into their deficit, but the comeback effort came up short in a home loss. Detroit built a 28-3 advantage thanks in large part to three INTs off Bengals QB Jake Browning, as each pick set up the Lions' offense inside Cincinnati territory. While the Bengals' defense sacked Lions QB Jared Goff four times and forced the high-powered Detroit attack to punt on five occasions, Goff battled through to complete 82.6 percent of his passes with three going for TDs. In the fourth quarter, Browning hit WR Ja'Marr Chase for two TDs, including a 64-yarder, and later found WR Tee Higgins in the end zone to make it an 11-point game. But a scramble for possession on the ensuing onside kick ultimately was won by the Lions, and a last gasp for the Bengals with under two minutes left was shut down with a safety. Cincinnati fell to 2-3, while Detroit improved to 4-1.
