GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on FOX-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WXIX-TV (Ch. 19) in Cincinnati, WKEF-TV (Ch. 22) in Dayton and WDKY-TV (Ch. 56) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Joe Davis (play-by-play), Greg Olsen (analyst) and Pam Oliver (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst). In addition, the Bengals-Bills game will air nationally on Sports USA.

Broadcasters are Bob Socci (play-by-play) and Brandon Noble (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals shoot for their second straight road win when they face the Buffalo Bills on Sunday at Highmark Stadium.

Cincinnati enters the matchup at 4-8 on the season and is coming off a 32-14 victory at Baltimore on Thanksgiving night. The top storyline from Cincinnati's divisional win over the Ravens was the return of starting QB Joe Burrow, who had missed the previous nine games due to a toe injury. After playing through some self-admitted rust in the first half, Burrow appeared sharp in the second half, as he threw two TD passes and led four scoring drives to help the Bengals separate. For the two-time Pro Bowler, Thursday night's result was the culmination of a grueling recovery process that presented challenges both physically and mentally.

"You certainly have those moments after the game," said Burrow when reflecting on the past two months. "It certainly hasn't been easy on me through six years from a lot of different angles, but I've worked really hard to put myself in position to be back out there, and a lot of people around me have done the same. There's been a lot of discussions, a lot of time in the training room and just a lot that has gone into this. I'm proud to be back."

Burrow finished the game 24 of 46 for 261 yards and the two passing scores with no turnovers. While the offense was able to move the ball efficiently throughout the night, it stalled in the red zone on several occasions, but K Evan McPherson kept knocking through field goals to reward the possessions with points. McPherson ultimately kicked six FGs, which marked a career high, the most in any NFL game this season and tied for the second-most in a game in Bengals history.

In the third quarter, Burrow finally broke through with a pass to the end zone that TE Tanner Hudson corralled with one hand for Cincinnati's first TD, which boosted its lead to 19-7. After a Ravens TD later in the quarter closed the gap, the Bengals' offense answered with another methodical drive which ended with a pinpoint scoring pass from Burrow down the seam to WR Andrei losivas.

On the other side of the ball, defensive coordinator Al Golden's unit enjoyed perhaps its best performance of the season in Week 13. Cincinnati forced five turnovers, including four fumbles, and allowed season-lows in points (14) and completion percentage (53.1). Among the top contributors were DE Joseph Ossai, whose first career multi-sack game included a strip-sack of QB Lamar Jackson in the opening quarter, and DE Cedric Johnson, who had his first two career fumble recoveries.

The Bengals' lone INT was a game-changer early in the fourth quarter, as Baltimore was driving inside the red zone with a chance to cut into a 12-point deficit. DE Myles Murphy reached his hand up to deflect Jackson's pass near the line of scrimmage, and rookie LB Demetrius Knight Jr. came down with the pick

before returning it 39 yards. The play set up a Cincinnati FG drive which extended its lead to 15.

"I think the coaches did a great job with the plan," said head coach Zac Taylor on the defensive effort. "I thought Al called a great game. The players bought into it, and now you start to see when you get confidence and are getting those turnovers, they start to come in bunches. We've got to continue to build off that. So now, there's real evidence of it paying off for us, and just continue to ride that momentum and keep finding ways to get the ball off people."

The Bengals now head into the final month of the season sitting two games behind Pittsburgh and Baltimore (both 6-6) in the AFC North Division standings. One cause for optimism in Cincinnati can be found in the team's record late in the season in recent years, as the Bengals have compiled a 14-3 mark in regular-season games played in December and January dating back to the 2022 campaign.

Cincinnati will take on a Bills team that ranks near the top of the NFL in several offensive metrics, including rushing yards per game (first, 155.7) and total yards per game (second, 381.0). Buffalo is 8-4 on the year and is coming off a 26-7 road win at Pittsburgh in Week 13.

The series: Buffalo has been a fairly consistent non-division opponent for Cincinnati over the years. Sunday's game will mark the 16th time since 2002 that the two teams have met. That stretch includes 15 regular-season meetings (though one was canceled), as well as one postseason contest.

The series is tied 17-17 overall (regular-season and postseason), and the Bengals and have won six of the last eight, including a 27-10 victory in a Divisional Playoff in the 2022 season at Buffalo. The Bills last won in 2019 in a game played at Buffalo, where they are 10-6 against the Bengals in the series. In postseason matchups between the two clubs, the Bengals lead 3-0.

Historically, the series has somewhat of a streaky nature. Prior to Cincinnati's current six-of-eight stretch, which began with a win over Buffalo in 2011, both teams had strung together fairly long streaks of victories against each other. From 1989 through 2010, the Bills won 10 straight against the Bengals, the second longest winning streak on record by any team against Cincinnati (Pittsburgh won 11 straight against the Bengals from 2015-20). The Bills amassed that long winning streak after suffering a loss in the biggest game in series to date, the 1988 AFC Championship at Riverfront Stadium. The Bengals won that contest 21-10, advancing to Super Bowl XXIII. The AFC Championship win gave Cincinnati a five-game winning streak over Buffalo at the time, the Bengals' longest in the series.

The last meetings: Summaries of the two most recent Bengals-Bills meetings — an AFC Divisional Playoff after the 2022 season, and a '23 regular-season game at Cincinnati — are on page 13 of this news release.

Last time in Buffalo: The Bengals' most recent trip to Buffalo came in an AFC Divisional Playoff following the 2022 season, when Cincinnati earned a dominant 27-10 road win over the No. 2-seeded Bills in a snowy setting at Highmark Stadium.

Cincinnati jumped out in front 14-0 in the first quarter and never looked back, as QB Joe Burrow opened the game by completing his first nine passes for 105 yards and two TDs. The Bengals controlled the line of scrimmage on both sides of the ball, as offensively they finished with 172 rushing yards — the fourth-most in a postseason game in team history — and totaled a postseason team-record 30 first downs.

Defensively, Cincinnati held a Buffalo rushing attack that had averaged 139.5 yards per game that season to just 63 on the ground. It marked the fourth-fewest rushing yards allowed in a postseason game in Bengals history. The 10 points given up tied for the second-fewest ever by a Cincinnati team in a postseason contest, and it was the Bills' lowest scoring total that season.

With the victory, the Bengals advanced to the AFC Championship Game for a second consecutive year, and it extended their win streak to a team-record 10 straight games. Zac Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games, while Joe Burrow became the first QB drafted No. 1 overall to win five postseason games within his first three seasons.

Bengals-Bills canceled in '22: The Bengals and Bills met in a highly anticipated Monday Night Football showdown in Week 17 of the 2022 season at Paycor Stadium, as Cincinnati (11-4) and Buffalo (12-3) both were in contention for the top seed in upcoming AFC playoffs. However, the game was initially postponed and later canceled after Bills S Damar Hamlin suffered cardiac arrest and collapsed on the field in the first quarter.

The incident occurred midway through the opening period of the Jan. 2 contest, when Cincinnati held a 7-3 lead and was driving with the ball. Hamlin received immediate emergency attention on the field, then was taken to the University of Cincinnati Medical Center, where he spent the next six days before being transferred to the Buffalo General Medical Center to continue his recovery. He was discharged from the Buffalo medical facility on Jan. 11 and cleared to continue his rehab at home. He made a full recovery and currently is on the Bills' Reserve/Injured with a pectoral injury.

After Hamlin had been taken off the field by an ambulance, both teams left the field and the contest was postponed shortly thereafter. The status of the game remained uncertain in the following days until the NFL announced later that week on Thursday that it officially would be canceled. The Bengals and Bills, who each hosted their regular-season finale the following Sunday, were the only two teams in the league to officially play just 16 games in 2022.

Bills DT Larry Ogunjobi played for the Bengals in 2021 ... Bills offensive coordinator Joe Brady served as passing game coordinator and wide receivers coach at Louisiana State University in 2019, when Bengals QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase played for the Tigers ... Bills offensive quality control coach Kyle Shurmur spent the 2020 season as a QB on the Bengals' practice squad ... Bills DE Michael Hoecht (Reserve/Injured list) is from Dayton, Ohio (north of Cincinnati) ... Bills cornerbacks coach Jahmile Addae served as running backs coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2010 ... Addae later was the secondary coach at the University of Miami (Fla.) in 2022, when Bengals CB DJ Ivey played for the Hurricanes ... Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2025 season, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has completed 1793 career passes, the fifth-most in team history and 222 shy of tying QB Boomer Esiason (2015) for fourth-most. QBs Andy Dalton (2757), Ken Anderson (2654) and Carson Palmer (2024) hold the top three spots.
- Burrow has 144 career TD passes, the fifth-most in team history and 10 shy of Palmer (154) for fourth. Dalton (204), Anderson (197) and Esiason (187) hold the top three spots.
- Burrow has 26 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the second-most in team history and two shy of Dalton (28) for the team record.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 481 career receptions, the sixth-most in team history and 26 shy of WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530) and Tyler Boyd (513) hold the top four spots on the team's career list. Chase in Week 4 at Denver surpassed WR Isaac Curtis (416) for seventh place and WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for sixth.
- Chase has 6396 career receiving yards, the sixth-most in team history and 302 shy of fifth-most, which is held by Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets surpassed WR Eddie Brown (6134) for sixth.
- Chase has 51 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and two shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.
- Chase has 24 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, the thirdmost in team history and seven shy of Johnson (31) for second. Green (33) holds the team record. Chase in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed Curtis (20) for third.
- DE Trey Hendrickson has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history and 1.5 shy of LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. DE/DT Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5) and DT Geno Atkins

(75.5) hold the top three spots. Hendrickson in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth.

- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 541 career points, the sixth-most in team history and eight shy of fifth-most, which is held by K Horst Muhlmann (549).
- McPherson has 117 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and three shy of Muhlmann (120) for fifth.
- McPherson in Week 13 at Baltimore kicked two extra points, moving his career total made PATs to 190. That surpassed Muhlmann (189) for the fifthmost in team history, and is 11 shy of tying K Doug Pelfrey (201) for fourth.
- McPherson has a career FG percentage of 83.0 (117 made/141 att.), the third-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Kickers Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.
- P Ryan Rehkow has 42 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20yard line, the fifth-most by a Bengals player since the stat began being tracked in 1976. Rehkow in Week 11 at Pittsburgh surpassed P Nick Harris (37) for fifth.

Records vs. Bills: The following individual and team regular-season Bengals and Bills entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book:

- On Sept. 9, 1979, Buffalo RB Roland Hooks became the first opponent to score four touchdowns in a game against the Bengals. He is now one of three players to share that record, and he also shares the record for total points in a game against Cincinnati (24). All four of his TDs were rushing TDs, which also is a Bengals' opponent record.
- On Oct. 21, 1991, Bills QB Jim Kelly became the second opponent to pass for five TDs against Cincinnati. Six players now share that record.
- On Nov. 21, 2010, Bills WR Stevie Johnson became the most recent Bengals opponent with three TD receptions in a game. Johnson is among eight players to do it.
- On Nov. 11, 2011, Bengals WR Brandon Tate tied a team record for most punt returns in a game with seven. The mark initially was established by RB Tony Davis on Nov. 27, 1977 vs. the N.Y. Giants, and then later was tied also by WR Craig Yeast on Sept. 10, 2000 vs. Cleveland.

Individually vs. Bills: Here are cumulative offensive statistics (regular-season and postseason) for current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Bills (ordered by total games played):

- QB Joe Burrow: Two games (2-0 record); 54-of-80 passing for 590 yards, four TDs and no INTs (105.7 passer rating); 11 rushes for 35 yards (3.2).
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Two games; Nine receptions for 102 yards (11.3) and one TD; One rush for three yards.
 - WR Tee Higgins: Two games; 11 receptions for 138 yards (12.5).
- TE Drew Sample: Two games; Three receptions for 30 yards (10.0) and one TD.
 - TE Tanner Hudson: One game; Four receptions for 45 yards (11.3)
 - WR Andrei Iosivas: One game; One reception for nine yards.

Uniform watch: Cincinnati will wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks this week at Buffalo. It is the Bengals' most frequently used combination since they redesigned their uniforms prior to the 2021 season, as they have worn it 19 times previously (regular season and postseason), and compiled a 12-7 record in those games. Most notably, this combination was featured in each of the team's four road playoff games following the 2021 and '22 campaigns. Cincinnati wore this combination in its most recent game, a road win at Baltimore on Thanksgiving night in Week 13.

The Bengals' redesign in 2021 marked the team's first significant change in uniform since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet six times and collected a 5-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance came in Week 7 of this season, when Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh at home on Thursday Night Football.

Here are the Bengals' records in every possible uniform combination (regular season and postseason only) since the team redesigned the uniform in 2021:

*— The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their uniform lineup in 2024.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his

first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor's system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card

victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team's per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the '15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor's began coaching at Texas A&M University as an offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during his College Station tenure.

Taylor played in college at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79.

Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Sean McDermott was named Buffalo's 19th head coach on Jan. 11, 2017. He is in his ninth season as Buffalo's head coach and his 27th in the NFL. McDermott joined the Bills after spending six seasons as the defensive coordinator of the Carolina Panthers.

In his first year in Buffalo in 2017, McDermott led the Bills to their first playoff berth since 1999 with a 9-7 record. He became the third coach in Bills history to earn a playoff berth in his first season at the helm, joining Joe Collier (1966) and Wade Phillips ('98). The 2017 Bills also won six home games for the first time since 1999. In his second year in Buffalo in 2018, McDermott led the Bills to the NFL's second-ranked defense. In 2019, he led the Bills back to the playoffs, as the team recorded its first 10-win season since 1999. Since 2020 under McDermott, the Bills have won five straight divisional titles for the first time in franchise history. Not including this season, McDermott has led the Bills' to a 61-22 regular-season record (.735) since 2020, as well as two AFC Championship games.

McDermott was an all-Atlantic 10 Conference choice at safety for William & Mary as a senior in 1997. He graduated with a degree in finance and began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater in 1998. He has no pro playing experience.

McDermott was born on March 21, 1974. He and his wife, Jamie, have three children.

Taylor vs. Bills: Taylor leads 2-1 overall (the teams are tied 1-1 in regular season, and the Bengals lead 1-0 in postseason).

BENGALS NOTES

Taylor nets 50th win: Cincinnati's Week 13 win at Baltimore marked the 50th regular-season victory in Zac Taylor's head coaching career. Taylor, who became head coach of the Bengals on Feb. 4, 2019, is the fourth head coach in team history to amass 50 regular-season wins, joining Paul Brown, Sam Wyche and Marvin Lewis.

Taylor's first victory as a head coach came in Week 13 of the 2019 season, when he led Cincinnati to a 22-6 result over the N.Y. Jets. He steered the Bengals to a combined 40 regular-season wins from 2021-24, the second-most over a four-year period in team history behind 43 wins from '12-15. With a winning record in each season from 2021-24, he joined Lewis ('11-15) as the only Bengals coaches to guide their team to a mark above .500 in at least four straight years.

Of Taylor's 50 regular-season wins, 27 were in games played at home and 23 were on the road. He additionally led the Bengals to five postseason wins following the 2021 and '22 seasons, with three of those coming on the road.

Winter means wins: The Bengals have compiled a 14-3 record in regular-season games played in December and January since the 2022 season. Their 14 wins in that span is tied with Buffalo for the most in the NFL.

In 2022, Cincinnati won each of its five regular-season contests in December and January, during what was ultimately a 10-game winning streak that propelled the team to its second straight AFC Championship Game. In 2023, the Bengals entered December with a 5-6 record, before backup QB Jake Browning helped steer them to a three straight wins to vault back into the AFC playoff picture. Cincinnati closed out its 2023 slate with a dominant home win over Cleveland, which took place in January '24.

After dropping its first December game in 2024, the Bengals rattled off five wins in a row to finish the season with a 9-8 record. QB Joe Burrow was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month for games played in December and January, as he completed 76.2 percent of his passes and threw for 16 TDs.

Turnover feast on Thanksgiving: The Bengals' defense forced five turnovers in the Week 13 win at Baltimore on Thanksgiving night. Cincinnati recovered three Ravens fumbles, had one INT and caused another fumble that rolled out of the back of the end zone for a touchback.

The five takeaways tied for the second-most by any NFL team in a game this season, trailing only Pittsburgh's six takeaways in Week 9. It also tied for the seventh-most by the Bengals in a game since 2000. The last time Cincinnati recorded five or more takeaways was in Week 15 of last season at Tennessee, when it had six (four INTs, two FRs). Prior to that, the Bengals last had at least five in a single contest in Week 10 of the 2007 campaign at Baltimore.

The first turnover last Thursday occurred late in the first quarter, when on a third-down play DE Joseph Ossai strip-sacked Ravens QB Lamar Jackson. Fellow DE Cedric Johnson recovered the ball at the Baltimore five-yard line, and was tackled at the two. In the second quarter, Ravens TE Isaiah Likely appeared to have a 44-yard TD catch, but S Jordan Battle forced the ball out of his hands before he broke the plane, and it went through the end zone for a touchback and change of possession.

Later in the second quarter, Johnson had his second FR of the game and his career when he fell on a Jackson fumble in Ravens territory. The recovery set up a Bengals FG drive to boost their lead to 12-7 just before halftime.

Cincinnati's lone INT proved to be crucial, as the Ravens were driving inside the red zone while trailing by 12 early in the fourth quarter. DE Myles Murphy rushed through the interior of the line and tipped up Jackson's pass, and it fell into the waiting arms of rookie LB Demetrius Knight Jr., who returned it 39 yards to set up another Bengals FG drive. A pair of cornerbacks then closed out the dominant showing late in the fourth, as Jalen Davis knocked the ball free from WR Zay Flowers and DJ Turner II recovered to essentially seal the win.

Burrow's 2025 journey: QB Joe Burrow made his return to game action in Week 13 at Baltimore, after spending the previous nine contests on the Reserve/Injured list due to a toe injury. He suffered the injury in the second quarter of Week 2 against Jacksonville, was placed on Reserve/Injured on Sept. 16 and underwent surgery on Sept. 19.

Burrow opened the season by playing in his 70th career regular-season game in Week 1 at Cleveland. He finished with 14 completions on 23 attempts for 113 yards, with a one-yard TD pass to TE Noah Fant. Burrow's 1762 career completions at the end of the Browns game were the most by any QB in NFL history through their first 70 games, while his 141 TD passes ranked as the third-most and his 19,114 passing yards ranked fifth.

Burrow had completed seven of his 13 passing attempts for 76 yards against the Jaguars prior to his injury, including a four-yard TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in the first quarter.

In his return on Thanksgiving, Burrow recorded season highs in passing attempts (46), completions (24), yards (261) and TDs (two). Both of his scoring passes came in the third quarter, as he connected on a 14-yarder to TE Tanner Hudson and a 29-yarder to WR Andrei Iosivas.

Through three starts in 2025, Burrow is 45 of 82 for 450 yards and four TDs with no INTs, good for a passer rating of 86.9.

Burrow on the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's completion percentage record. With a current career percentage of 68.20, he is the all-time leader in the category.

Burrow's 70.552 completion percentage in the 2024 season ranked fourth leaguewide (minimum 14 attempts per team's games in season). It also set a Bengals single-season record, narrowly edging out QB Ken Anderson's completion rate of 70.550 in 1982. Burrow completed at least 70 percent of his passes in 11 games in 2024, including each of the final six — the longest such streak in his career.

In Week 17 of last season against Denver, Burrow threw his 2500th career passing attempt. His 1710 completions at the time he reached that mark are the most in NFL history through a QB's first 2500 throws. By the end of the 2024 campaign, Burrow had 26 career games with a completion percentage of 70 or higher on at least 30 attempts. That marked the most such games in a player's first five seasons in NFL history, with the next closest being Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (21 games each).

In three of Burrow's five full seasons, he finished the year ranking in the top five leaguewide in completion percentage. After leading the NFL in 2021 with a 70.4 percentage, he followed up with the second-highest clip in '22 (68.3).

Burrow enters the Bengals' Week 14 contest at Buffalo with 1793 completions in 72 regular-season games played. Should he complete seven passes, he would tie Mahomes and L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (73 games each) for the fewest games to reach 1800 completions in NFL history.

Burrow hits yardage milestones: QB Joe Burrow led the NFL and set a Bengals single-season record with 4918 passing yards in 2024. He passed for at least 300 yards in seven games, the most by any QB during the 2024 campaign and most in a season in team history.

Burrow now owns the three highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, as in addition to his 2024 total, he had 4611 in '21 (sixth-most in NFL that year) and 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He is the first Cincinnati QB to pass

for 4000 or more yards in three different seasons during his Bengals career. Carson Palmer (2006-07) and Andy Dalton ('13, '16) each did it twice.

Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards during Week 4 of the 2024 season at Carolina. Playing in his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. He finished the 2024 campaign with 19,001 career passing yards, the sixth-most within a player's first five seasons in league history.

Burrow's 2024 highlights: QB Joe Burrow, who completed his fifth pro season in 2024, put together perhaps the best individual campaign by a QB in Bengals history.

Burrow in 2024 led the NFL in passing attempts (652), completions (460), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43), while ranking third in passer rating (108.5) and fourth in completion percentage (70.6; minimum 14 attempts per team's games). Each of those figures also set a Bengals single-season record.

Burrow became the first Cincinnati QB to lead the league in completions, passing yards and TD passes in the same season. Since 2000, there have been five instances of a QB finishing a season as the outright leader in all three categories — St. Louis Rams QB Kurt Warner in '01, New Orleans QB Drew Brees in '11, Denver QB Peyton Manning in '13, Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady in '21 and Burrow in '24.

Burrow also became the fourth QB in NFL history to pass for at least 4500 yards and 40 TDs while throwing 10 or fewer INTs, joining Manning (2004 and '13), Brady ('07) and Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers ('11).

Burrow's level of play last season was highlighted by a streak of eight consecutive games (Weeks 9-17) with at least 250 passing yards and three TD passes. That marked the longest such streak in NFL history, surpassing Brady's six straight games during his 2007 MVP campaign.

Ja'Marr is "Always open": After leading the NFL with a Bengalsrecord 127 receptions in 2024, WR Ja'Marr Chase is near the top of the league once again this year, as his team-leading 86 catches are tied for second among all players. The last player to finish as the league leader in receptions in consecutive seasons was former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas in 2018 and '19

Chase has totaled 10 or more catches in a game four times this season, including a stretch of three straight contests from Weeks 6-8. He brought in 10 receptions in Week 6 at Green Bay, followed up with a Bengals-record 16 in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, then logged 12 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. He became the first player in team history to register double-digit catches in three consecutive games.

In the Week 7 win over the Steelers, Chase broke his own previous Bengals single-game record of 15 receptions, which he amassed in Week 5 of the 2023 campaign at Arizona. He now owns the four highest single-game reception totals in team history, which also includes a 14-catch effort in Week 2 of this season against Jacksonville.

Chase's four career games with 14 or more receptions are tied with former Pittsburgh/New England/Tampa Bay WR Antonio Brown for the second-most such games in NFL history. Current L.A. Chargers WR Keenan Allen holds the league record with six such games in his career.

Climbing the ranks: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 86 receptions this season have boosted his career catch total to 481, which ranks sixth in Bengals history and is 26 shy of tying former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth.

Chase recently surpassed Bengals Ring of Honor member Isaac Curtis (416) and former WR Cris Collinsworth (417) on the team's all-time receptions list. In the Week 2 win over Jacksonville, he logged his 400th career reception in what was his 64th regular-season game. That tied former Atlanta WR Julio Jones and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry for the fifth-fewest games in NFL history to reach 400 career catches.

Chase kicked off his career with 81 receptions in the 2021 season, which set a Bengals rookie record and still ranks in the top 20 among all rookies in NFL history. He followed that up with a team-leading 87 catches in just 12 games played in 2022, then hit triple digits for the first time when he had 100 receptions in '23 (12th in NFL).

In his 2024 "Triple Crown" season, Chase led the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 catches. He became the first player in team history to lead the league in receptions, and surpassed Houshmandzadeh's previous team mark of 112 in the 2007 campaign.

Uno finds the end zone: WR Ja'Marr Chase's highlight-reel TD catch in the fourth quarter of Week 6 at Green Bay was the 50th receiving TD of his career. Playing in his 68th regular-season game, he became the seventh-fastest player in NFL history and the fourth-fastest in the Super Bowl era (1966-present) to reach that milestone. He improved his career tally to 51 with an eight-yard scoring catch in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh.

The only players in the Super Bowl era to record 50 receiving TDs in fewer games than Chase are Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (59 games), former New England TE Rob Gronkowski (59) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (61).

Chase's 51 TD catches are the second-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021, behind current L.A. Rams WR Davante Adams (55). In 2024, Chase led the league with 17 TDs, which tied the Bengals single-season record originally set by WR Carl Pickens in 1995. He became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in receiving TDs. He had a league-high five games with multiple TD catches last season, including a career-high-tying three scores in Week 10 at Baltimore on Thursday Night Football.

Chase's five receiving TDs this season are tied for 18th in the NFL. He caught two scoring passes from Jake Browning in Week 5 vs. Detroit, which marked his 12th career game with multiple TDs.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 971 receiving yards this season rank fourth in the NFL. With 29 more, he would become the fifth player in NFL history to reach the 1000-yard receiving mark in each of his first five career seasons, joining former Minnesota WR Randy Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green, current Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans and current Vikings WR Justin Jefferson.

In the Bengals' Week 7 win against Pittsburgh this season, Chase surpassed 6000 career receiving yards in what was his 69th regular-season game. He became the fifth-fastest player in league history to reach that milestone, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer Lance Alworth (62 games), Jefferson (62), former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (64) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (67).

With 110 receiving yards in Week 13 at Baltimore, Chase improved his career yardage total to 6396. He surpassed Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (6364) for the fourth-most receiving yards in a player's first five seasons in NFL history. The only players with more receiving yards in their first five years were Jefferson (7432), former St. Louis Rams WR Torry Holt (6784) and Moss (6743).

Chase is one of three players in NFL history with at least 6000 receiving yards and 50 receiving TDs in his first five seasons, alongside Moss and Rice. The Week 7 victory over the Steelers also marked Chase's seventh career game with at least 10 catches and 150 receiving yards, which surpassed Jefferson for the most such games in a player's first five seasons in league history.

Chase, who currently ranks sixth in Bengals history in receiving yards, is 302 shy of tying former WR Cris Collinsworth (6698) for fifth. So far this season, Chase has surpassed former WRs T.J. Houshmandzadeh (5782), Darnay Scott (5975), Tyler Boyd (6000) and Eddie Brown (6134) on Cincinnati's all-time list.

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 87.6 receiving yards per game (73 regular-season games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only Jefferson (92.5) and L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (89.6).

Tee time: WR Tee Higgins saw his streak of consecutive games with a receiving TD end at four contests in Week 12 vs. New England. The streak, which lasted from Weeks 7-11, was the longest of his career. He previously had a TD in three straight games played on two separate occasions last season, as he found the end zone in Weeks 7, 11 and 13, then again in Weeks 15-17.

Higgins also held a streak of nine straight games played at home with at

least one receiving score, which began in Week 5 of the 2024 campaign and went through Week 9 of this season. He became the third player since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger with a TD catch in nine consecutive home games played, joining former Minnesota WR Cris Carter, who had a record 10-game streak spanning from the 2000-01 seasons, and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice, who compiled a nine-game streak during the 1989-90 campaigns.

Higgins' seven receiving TDs this season lead the Bengals and are tied for fifth-most in the NFL. It is three shy of his career-high 10 TDs last season, which tied for sixth leaguewide. His 17 total TD catches since the start of the 2024 campaign rank fourth among all players in that span, trailing only his teammate Ja'Marr Chase (22), current L.A. Rams WR Davante Adams (22) and Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (21).

In addition to his scoring tally, Higgins ranks second on the Bengals this season in receiving yards (575) and third in receptions (40). He surpassed 5000 career receiving yards in Week 9 vs. Chicago, and playing in his 79th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that milestone.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins is tied for 12th in the league in receiving TDs (41) and ranks 16th in receiving yards (5170). He also has played in seven postseason games for Cincinnati and has 457 receiving yards and three TDs.

Brown does it all: HB Chase Brown has totaled 100 or more yards from scrimmage in each of the Bengals' last six games dating back to Week 7. It marks the longest streak in team history, surpassing a previous streak of five such games by three players — including Brown in Weeks 11-16 of last season. It also is the longest active streak in the NFL.

Since the streak began in Week 7, Brown ranks sixth in the NFL in scrimmage yards per game (114.5), seventh in total scrimmage yards (687) and eighth in rushing yards (502). He kicked it off with 100 yards from scrimmage in the Week 7 home win over Pittsburgh, which featured a season-high 108 rushing yards on just 11 carries. His 9.8 yards per carry marked a single-game career high and are the eighth-most by any NFL player in a game this season (minimum 10 rushing attempts). He reeled off his longest run of the season in the second quarter of that game, a 37-yarder to jumpstart a Bengals TD drive.

Brown followed up his performance against the Šteelers with 105 scrimmage yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets, 112 in Week 9 against Chicago and 127 in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. In addition to his yardage totals against the Jets, he scored both a rushing and receiving TD in the same game for the second time in his career. His stat line against the Bears was highlighted by a season-best 75 receiving yards, which also went in as the second-most in a game in his career.

Brown logged a season-best 130 scrimmage yards in Week 12 vs. New England, with 107 rushing yards on 19 carries and 23 receiving yards on two catches. A season-high seven of his runs went for a first down. He then notched 113 scrimmage yards in the Week 13 victory at Baltimore on Thanksgiving, with his 22 total touches (15 rushing attempts, seven receptions) going in as his third-most this season.

Prior to Brown's streak late last season, the last Bengals running back with at least 100 scrimmage yards in five straight contests was HB BenJarvus Green-Ellis in Weeks 11-15 of the 2012 campaign.

From Weeks 9-17 of last season, when Brown started each game and emerged as a prominent contributor in the Bengals' offense, he ranked fourth in the NFL in scrimmage yards per game (116.3). He was one of two players in that span with at least 600 rushing yards and 250 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs. He also became the first Bengals player to record at least 90 scrimmage yards in eight straight games since former FB Boobie Clark in 1973.

Brown enters Week 14 with 991 scrimmage yards this season, just nine shy of his second consecutive 1000-yard campaign. He totaled 1350 yards from scrimmage in 2024 (990 rushing, 360 receiving).

Hendrickson cracks top five: With a team-leading four sacks through seven games played this season, DE Trey Hendrickson has improved his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 61.0. He surpassed former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth-most in Bengals history, and now is 1.5 shy of former LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. Hendrickson signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason.

Hendrickson, who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with the Bengals (2021-24), opened his Cincinnati tenure with 14.0 sacks in the '21 campaign, which led the team and ranked fifth in the NFL. He followed up with a team-high eight sacks in 2022.

Hendrickson posted 17.5 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 seasons, which are tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history behind former DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (the NFL began tracking sacks in '82, but the Bengals track

the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder). He became the first Cincinnati player with double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81. Hendrickson also is just the fifth player in NFL history to post 17 or more sacks in back-to-back seasons.

In 2024, Hendrickson became the first Bengals player to lead the league in sacks since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982. He was named to the Associated Press All-Pro First Team for the first time in his career, and he finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year.

Hendrickson's 61.0 sacks since he joined the Bengals in 2021 are the fourthmost in the NFL behind Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (79.0), Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (65.5) and former Dallas/current Green Bay DE Micah Parsons (65.0). He also has 12 forced fumbles in that span, tied for the fourth-most leaguewide.

Turner shuts it down: CB DJ Turner II's 16 PDs this season lead the NFL and already mark a career high for the third-year pro. His previous high was eight PDs in the 2024 campaign.

Turner also has recorded his first two career INTs this season, with the first coming late in the fourth quarter of Week 1 at Cleveland to help the Bengals protect a one-point lead. His second pick occurred in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, when he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf in Cincinnati territory just before halftime.

In Week 6 at Green Bay, Turner notched a career-best five PDs. He became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph had five on Nov. 8, 2009, in a win over Baltimore. Turner also is one of four players in the NFL this season to record five PDs in a game, alongside Green Bay CB Keisean Nixon in Week 2, Philadelphia CB Quinyon Mitchell in Week 4 and L.A. Rams CB Emmanuel Forbes Jr. in Week 12. No player in the league had that many PDs in a single game last season.

Turner has played in all 12 games with 11 starts this year, after missing the final six contests of the 2024 season due to a collarbone injury.

Charlie's 98-yard dash: WR Charlie Jones got the Bengals' Week 9 contest against Chicago underway with a 98-yard return for a TD on the game's opening kickoff. It marked his second career TD on a KOR, following a 100-yard return on the opening kickoff in Week 7 of the 2024 season at Cleveland. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the 14th TD on a KOR in Bengals history.
- It was the third time in team history (and first in a home game) that the Bengals returned the game's opening kickoff for a TD. The other instances were Jones' 2024 runback against the Browns, and former S Brandon Wilson's 92yarder on Oct. 13, 2019 at Baltimore.
- It tied for the sixth-longest KOR in team history, alongside a 98-yard TD return by former HB Stanford Jennings on Nov. 13, 1988 at Kansas City.
- Jones became the third player in team history with multiple KORs for a TD in his Bengals career, joining Wilson and former S/CB Tremaine Mack, who both also had two.
- Jones became the first player in team history with multiple KORs of 98 or more yards.
- Jones also had an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 of the 2023 season vs. Baltimore. He joined former CB Lemar Parrish as the only players in Bengals history with three or more returns for TDs. Parrish had four TDs on PRs and one on a KOR.
- Jones' return against the Bears was the longest KOR in the NFL this season at the time, and now is tied for the second-longest behind N.Y. Jets RB

Kene Nwangwu's 99-yarder in Week 10.

• According to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players' speeds using GPS, Jones' top speed on the return was 21.78 mph, making him the 10th-fastest ball carrier in the league this season.

McPherson sets team record: K Evan McPherson became the first Bengals kicker to enter the 60-yard FG club when he booted a franchise-record 63-yarder as the first half ended in Week 12 vs. New England. He surpassed the previous team mark of 59 yards, which he originally set in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh, and which was later tied by K Cade York in Week 16 of last season against Cleveland.

McPherson opened the scoring against the Patriots with a 54-yard FG in the first quarter. He became the fourth kicker in NFL history with FGs from at least 50 yards and at least 60 yards in the same game. With a 52-yarder four days later in the Thanksgiving win at Baltimore, he now has 28 career FGs from a distance of 50 or more yards, which are the most in a career in Bengals history and tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2021.

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 117 of 141 FG attempts, good for the third-highest percentage in team history (83.0). He has made each of his last 20 attempts from inside of 50 yards, dating back to Week 13 of last season. That is the second-longest longest such streak of his career, behind a stretch of 24 consecutive made FGs inside of 50 from Week 18 of the 2022 season through Week 2 of '24.

McPherson logged his 100th career made FG in Week 6 of this season at Green Bay. Playing in his 67th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest kicker in Bengals history to reach that milestone.

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson now owns six of the eight longest made kicks in Bengals history. His 63-yarder in Week 12 against New England was the fourth-longest made FG in the NFL this season.

Money Mac goes 6-6 on Thanksgiving: K Evan McPherson went a perfect six-for-six on FG attempts in the Bengals' Week 13 win at Baltimore on Thanksgiving night. His six made FGs were a career high and tied for the second-most in a game in Bengals history, matching former K Doug Pelfrey's total on Nov. 6, 1994 at Seattle. Cincinnati's single-game record for made FGs is seven, by former K Shayne Graham on Nov. 11, 2007 at Baltimore.

Adding in his two PATs, McPherson accounted for 20 points on the night, the second-most in a game by a Bengals kicker behind Graham's 21 in that 2007 road win over the Ravens. McPherson knocked through FGs from 31, 42, 24, 33, 52 and 41 yards, with four of those coming in the first half to help give the Bengals a 12-7 lead at the break.

McPherson's previous career high for FGs in a game was four, which he recorded on four occasions, most recently in Week 7 of this season against Pittsburgh. His six made FGs in Week 13 were the most in a game by any NFL kicker this season.

Rehkow's ranks: P Ryan Rehkow has punted 48 times for 2509 yards this season, with 17 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. He leads the NFL in gross punting average (52.3 yards per punt) and ranks seventh

in net average (42.8).

In Week 12 against New England, Rehkow tied his season high with three inside-20 punts, and coincidentally, all three were downed right at the Patriots' 10. He also had a 60-yard punt that rolled into the New England end zone for a touchback, marking his 13th punt this season that traveled a gross distance of at least 60 yards.

Rehkow now has 42 inside-20 punts in his career. In Week 11 at Pittsburgh, he surpassed former P Nick Harris (37) for the fifth-most inside-20 punts by a Bengal since the statistic began being tracked in 1976.

As a rookie in 2024, Rehkow set Bengals single-season records for gross punting average (49.11 yards) and net average (42.92 yards). Both figures surpassed former P Kevin Huber's previous records set in the 2020 season. Rehkow also had 25 inside-20 punts last year compared to five touchbacks.

After signing with the Bengals as a free agent on the third day of training camp in 2024, Rehkow made his NFL debut in Week 1 of last season against New England. That day, he punted four times for 258 yards, setting an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per attempt (minimum four punts). The previous league record belonged to Las Vegas P AJ Cole, who had a 63.6-yard average in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. Rehkow's performance in the 2024 opener also included the longest punt in Bengals history, an 80-yarder kicked from his own 20-yard line to the Patriots' end zone.

Rehkow finished his 2024 rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average.

Four Bengals listed on "Top 100": For the 15th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on social media and NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by four players on the 2025 list — WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 4), QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 14) and WR Tee Higgins (No. 77). It marked the first appearance on the list in Higgins' career, the fourth overall for Burrow and Chase, and the fifth for Hendrickson.

Chase's ranking at No. 4 is the highest by a Bengals player since the "Top 100" debuted in 2011. The previous highest ranking was No. 6, which was Burrow's position on the 2023 list. Hendrickson's spot at No. 14 is his personal highest, substantially ahead of his previous best ranking of No. 77 (2021 list).

This marks the third time in the history of the "Top 100" in which four or more Bengals players were featured. Cincinnati had a record seven players on the 2016 list, then landed four on the '22 edition.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have had announced attendance figures of 65,000 or more in 30 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That is the longest streak in team history, surpassing a previous span of 24 straight from 2005-07.

Each of the 15 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of this season was played in front of an announced crowd of 66,569, the fourth-largest figure on the list. Most of those fans were dressed in white apparel to accentuate the fourth annual "White Bengal" game at Paycor Stadium on Thursday Night Football.

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in

Cincinnati history.

Lapham, Parrish enter Bengals Ring of Honor: A pair of Bengals legends in former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish were inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of Cincinnati's Week 8 game against the N.Y. Jets. They became the 11th and 12th members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who is in his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team's most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive linemen who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team's starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career, Lapham moved into the team's radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as "Mr. Bengal," he has been the team's radio analyst since 1986.

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

Ring of Honor inductees have been voted in each offseason since 2021 by Bengals Season Ticket Members. Lapham and Parrish joined previous inductees QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.9 years ... Cincinnati's win over Jacksonville in Week 2 of this season was the 250th home victory in team history (regular season and postseason combined) ... The Bengals have netted 22 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, tied for the third-most weekly awards by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who is in his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is QB Joe Flacco, who is 40 (born Jan. 16, 1985) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who is 22 (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Starting QB Joe Burrow made his return in Week 13 at Baltimore, after spending the previous nine games on the Reserve/Injured list due to a toe injury sustained in Week 2. He completed 24 of 46 passes for 261 yards and two TDs with no INTs in the Thanksgiving win over the Ravens, with both of his scoring passes coming in the third quarter. Burrow has yet to throw a pick this season on 82 attempts, and his totals in three starts include 45 completions for 450 yards and four TDs. Burrow completed his fifth pro season in 2024, and among all QBs in NFL history through their first five years, he ranks fourth in completions (1748), sixth in passing yards (19,001) and third in TD passes (140). The No. 1 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, he has earned two Pro Bowl selections ('22 and '24) and has twice been named the NFL Comeback Player of the Year ('21 and '24). Known primarily for his passing accuracy, he is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage (68.2; minimum 1500 attempts). In 2024, he led the league and set Bengals single-season records in passing attempts (652), completions (460), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43). Eighteenth-year veteran Joe Flacco started six games for Cincinnati this season (Weeks 6-12) after being acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7. In his six Bengals starts, Flacco completed 61.6 percent of his passes (154 of 250) for 1636 yards and 13 TDs with four INTs. From his first start with the team through his most recent outing in Week 12, he ranked second in the NFL in completions, tied for third in TD passes and fifth in passing yards. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. He began the season starting the Browns' first four games. He originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent his first 11 seasons with the Ravens, before stints with Denver ('19), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24). He won Super Bowl MVP honors after helping lead Baltimore to a title in the 2012 campaign, and in '23 he was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after helping steer the Browns to a playoff berth. QB Jake Browning started three games for Cincinnati this season prior to Flacco's acquisition. He stepped into action following Burrow's injury in Week 2 against Jacksonville, and in that game he passed for 241 yards and scored the game-winning TD on a QB sneak with 18 seconds remaining. Browning's totals

on the season include 81 completions on 125 attempts (64.8 percent) for 771 yards and six TDs with eight INTs. He had a previous stint as the Bengals' starter in 2023, as he started the final seven games of that regular season and piloted the team to a 4-3 record. He then spent the entire 2024 campaign as Cincinnati's second-string QB. He spent his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20).

Running backs: HB Chase Brown is in his third pro season and first as Cincinnati's full-time primary running back. A dynamic all-around threat, he has totaled 100 or more yards from scrimmage in each of the last six games, marking the longest streak in Bengals history and longest active streak in the NFL. Since the streak began in Week 7, he ranks sixth in scrimmage yards per game (114.5), seventh in total scrimmage yards (687) and eighth in rushing yards (502). Brown took over as the team's starting HB midway through the 2024 season, and in Weeks 9-17 of last year he ranked fourth in the NFL in scrimmage yards per game (116.3). He finished last season with 990 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs on 229 carries, along with 54 receptions for 360 yards and four TDs. His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at the University of Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB Samaje Perine. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. This season, Perine has 237 rushing yards and 45 receiving yards, and in Week 7 he surpassed 2000 career rushing yards. His season-high 94 rushing yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets were the fifth-most in any game of his career, and the most since Week 13 of the 2022 campaign. A sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals this year, HB Tahi Brooks played in the first 11 games before missing the Week 13 matchup at Baltimore due to a concussion. He has totaled nine rushing attempts for 28 yards along with five KORs for 127 yards. He had a record-setting collegiate career at Texas Tech, where he set school records for rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23). He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back).

Wide receivers: Cincinnati's 2021 first-round draft choice Ja'Marr Chase has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons and has broken several Bengals single-season records early in his pro career. Through 11 games played this season, he is tied for second in the NFL in receptions (86), while ranking fourth in receiving yards (971) and tied for 18th in receiving TDs (five). He also has reached a pair of career milestones this year, surpassing 6000 career receiving yards and 50 receiving TDs. In Week 13 at Baltimore, Chase improved his career receiving yardage to 6396 yards, surpassing Pro Football Hall of Famer Jerry Rice for the fourth-most in a player's first five seasons in NFL history. In 2024, he became the youngest player (24 years old) in the Super Bowl era to claim the receiving "Triple Crown," as he led the league in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17). His receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Cincinnati single-season record, while his TDs tied the franchise mark held by WR Carl Pickens (1995). Chase signed a four-year contract extension on March 18, the same day that his running mate **Tee Higgins** re-signed with Cincinnati on a four-year deal. Higgins leads the Bengals with seven receiving TDs this season while ranking second in receiving yards (575) and third in receptions (40). He recently became the third player since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger with a TD catch in nine consecutive home games, joining Rice and fellow Hall of Famer Cris Carter. In Week 9 vs. Chicago, Higgins eclipsed 5000 career receiving yards in his 79th career game, becoming the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that milestone. Since entering the league as a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, he is tied for 12th in the NFL in TD catches (41) and ranks 16th in receiving yards (5170). Andrei losivas is in his third NFL season and continues to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He ranks third on the team with 346 receiving yards on 24 catches this season, after posting 36 receptions for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as 11 of his 12 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. In Week 13 at Baltimore, he caught a career-long 29-yard TD pass from Burrow to extend Cincinnati's lead in the third quarter. He was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he earned All-America honors as a heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. Mitch Tinsley earned a roster spot coming out of this past training camp and preseason, and through 12 regular-season games played he has seven receptions for 100 yards and two TDs. His first career reception was a 13-yard

one-handed TD grab in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, and he found the end zone again on a 17-yard scoring pass from Flacco in Week 12 vs. New England. Tinsley joined the Bengals on a Reserve/Future contract in February, and turned heads in the team's second preseason game at Washington when he had two highlight-reel TDs. He originally was a college free agent signee of the Commanders in 2023 and played in two games as a rookie, then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. Tinsley finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-21). Third-year receiver Charlie Jones has served as the Bengals' primary punt returner since being selected in the fourth round of the 2023 draft, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. In 2022, his final collegiate season which he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Second-year WR Jermaine Burton possesses the ability to stretch defensive coverages, as two of his four catches as a rookie last season went for over 40 yards. He also contributed in the kickoff return game following Jones' injury last year. Burton began his collegiate career at the University of Georgia (2020-21), then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two seasons ('22-23) before being selected by the Bengals in the third round of the '24 NFL Draft. In 2023, his final year with the Crimson Tide, he led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally in yards per reception (20.5).

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, Drew Sample has played in 90 career regular-season games with 60 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season and has started in 33 of his last 38 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 107 career receptions for 768 yards and five TDs. He missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned at the start of the '23 season and has suited up for each of Cincinnati's last 43 games. Now in his seventh season, Sample is the Bengals' longest-tenured player. Eight-year veteran Mike Gesicki made his return in Week 12 vs. New England, after spending the previous four games on the Reserve/Injured list with a pectoral injury. He has 14 receptions for 115 yards in eight games played this year, after posting 65 catches for 665 yards and two TDs in his debut Bengals season in 2024. His catch total last year was the second-most in a season by a Bengals TE (Dan Ross, 71 in 1981), while his yardage was the most by a Cincinnati TE since 2012 (Jermaine Gresham, 737). Gesicki entered the NFL as a second-round pick of Miami in 2018, and spent his first five season ('18-22) with the Dolphins before playing for the Patriots in '23. Noah Fant signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late July of this year and quickly built a rapport with Cincinnati's quarterbacks. He has 32 catches for 268 yards and three TDs in 11 games played, with his latest scoring grab coming on a 23-yard pass from Flacco in Week 9 vs. Chicago. A former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), Fant spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21) and three with Seattle ('22-24). He has played in 106 career games with 88 starts, and his career totals include 332 receptions for 3573 yards and 18 TDs. After being held off the stat sheet through the first five games of this season, sixth-year TE Tanner Hudson scored a TD on his first catch of the year, a twoyarder from Flacco in Week 6 at Green Bay. He now has 12 receptions for 106 yards and two TDs over his last five games, including a one-handed 14-yard TD grab in Week 13 at Baltimore. He enjoyed his best statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with Cincinnati, as he posted career highs in catches (39) and vards (352) in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four postseason games. Cam Grandy began his 2024 rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, then signed to the active roster midway through the year and went on to play in eight games with six starts. He has six catches for 34 yards in his career, and this season has seen action in three contests with one start. Grandy was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University.

Offensive linemen: Headlining the Bengals' offensive line room is four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started all 39 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three NFL seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore and then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 33 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 82 regular-season games played. He has played all 769 offensive snaps through Cincinnati's first 12 games this season. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who is in his fourth season with the

Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his four years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 65 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.6 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span (4283 of 4302). Off the field, he was the team's 2023 nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award, honored for his charitable work with the Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. The starting ROT is second-year pro Amarius Mims, who was Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2024 (No. 18 overall). Mims began his rookie season in a reserve role, but has started 25 of his last 26 games played. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Brown as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. G Dalton Risner signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late August, and quickly was thrust into action as he entered the season opener at Cleveland in the first half following Patrick's injury. Since then, he's been a versatile asset in the interior offensive line, appearing in nine games with six starts and playing substantial snaps at both guard positions. Risner was a second-round draft pick of Denver in 2019 and spent his first four pro seasons ('19-22) with the Broncos, before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 96 career regularseason games with 87 starts — 75 at LG and 12 at RG. Fellow rookie Dylan Fairchild was taken in the third round of this year's draft and started at LG in each of the first five games of the season, before missing the Week 6 contest at Green Bay due to a knee injury. He then was active/DNP in Week 7, and returned to the starting lineup in Week 8. In 2024, his final season at the University of Georgia, he earned second-team All-America honors while blocking for a Bulldogs offense that ranked third in the Southeastern Conference in net passing yards per game (281.0). In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., Fairchild was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. Rookie Jalen Rivers has seen action in all 12 games with seven starts at RG this season, lining up for 457 offensive snaps so far. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April, he boasted a proven ability to play at both tackle and guard spots during his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.). He was the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two seasons, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. He suited up for 38 total games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) at Miami. C Lucas Patrick, who started this year's opener at RG, was sidelined for six games due to a calf injury sustained at Cleveland. He was returned to the active roster from the Reserve/Injured list in Week 7, then made his return to game action in Week 8. Patrick joined the Bengals in this year's free agency period, after spending previous seasons with Green Bay (2016-21), Chicago ('22-23) and New Orleans ('24). He has played in 110 career regular-season games, and his 65 total starts have included 28 at center, 19 at LG and 18 at RG. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT Cody Ford, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. He has played 20 offensive snaps and 54 special teams snaps through 12 games this season. Ford was college teammates with Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17.

Defensive linemen: Ninth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson** has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with Cincinnati (2021-24) since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in '21. He recorded 17.5 sacks in each of the past two seasons, with last year's total leading the NFL. He was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press in 2024 and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year. Since joining the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason, he ranks fourth in the NFL in sacks (61.0) and tied for fourth in forced fumbles (12). He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of New Orleans in 2017 and spent his first four seasons ('17-20) with the Saints. Hendrickson has four sacks in seven games played this season. He has been inactive for five contests and left the Week 8 game early due to a hip injury. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 66 games played, including six postseason contests. A

productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 18 sacks as a Bengal while also batting down/tipping 13 passes. He leads the team's defensive line with 46 tackles this season, including two sacks and three TFLs. He notched his second sack of the season in Week 9 vs. Chicago, bringing down QB Caleb Williams for a seven-yard loss. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT T.J. Slaton Jr., who joined the Bengals after spending his first four pro seasons (2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 80 regularseason games and totaled 168 tackles, seven TFLs, two sacks and four PDs. He made his first career start in the 2022 season finale and has started each of his last 47 games played. Slaton has 35 tackles through his first 12 games with Cincinnati, including a season-high eight in Week 5 vs. Detroit which also marked the second-most in a game in his career. DE Myles Murphy, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has strung together several strong performances over Cincinnati's past four games. He has totaled 19 tackles in that stretch, including a career-high seven stops with a sack in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. He now is up to 34 tackles and 2.5 sacks through 12 games played this season. Murphy missed the early part of the 2024 season due to a knee injury, but returned to the lineup last October and has since played in 25 straight contests. In 42 career games, he has 74 tackles with six TFLs and 5.5 sacks. Murphy was a first-team All-ACC pick in his final season at Clemson University, where he amassed 17.5 career sacks in 38 games for the Tigers. DE Joseph Ossai leads the team with five sacks this season, and is coming off his first career multi-sack game in Week 13 at Baltimore. His first sack in the Thanksgiving matchup resulted in a fumble recovered by Cincinnati deep in Ravens territory. He now has 10 sacks over his last 19 games played dating back to Week 11 of the 2024 campaign. Originally a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, he missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just three games in the past three-plus seasons. He has 14.5 sacks and 15 TFLs in 59 career games (10 starts). Ossai was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. Second-year DT Kris Jenkins Jr. got in the sack column for the first time this season in Week 3 at Minnesota, notching 1.5 in the first half of that contest. A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, Jenkins played in 15 games with nine starts as a rookie last year. He logged 31 tackles with three sacks last season, and has recorded 30 stops (15 solos) and two TFLs through 12 games played this year. In his final season at the University of Michigan in 2023, he earned second-team All-America honors and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., was a four-time Pro Bowler during his 10-year playing career (2001-10) as a DT for Carolina and the N.Y. Jets. Second-year DE Cedric Johnson, a sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, spent the first eight games of this season on the Reserve/Injured list due to a calf injury, then made his season debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago. He has logged six tackles through four games played this season, and is coming off his first two career FRs in the first half of Week 13 at Baltimore. As a rookie last season, he appeared in nine games and logged six tackles with one sack. Fifth-year DE Cam Sample made his return to the field at the start of this season after missing the entire 2024 campaign due to an Achilles injury. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 56 career games as a rotational lineman and has 77 tackles with five sacks. He has played in nine games this season and has nine tackles with one TFL. He has been inactive for three contests this season, including each of the past two games due to an oblique injury. DT McKinnley Jackson, a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, has seen action in four games this season and totaled three tackles. He played in 13 contests as a rookie last year and contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He was a two-time team captain at Texas A&M, where he played in 40 career games. The Bengals acquired DT Jordan Jefferson on waivers from San Francisco prior to Week 5. Originally a fourth-round draft pick of Jacksonville in 2024, he saw limited action for the Jaguars (2024) and 49ers ('25) before arriving in Cincinnati. Jefferson made his Bengals debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago, then was active/DNP for the last three contests. Jefferson finished his college career at Louisiana State in 2023, following four seasons ('19-22) at West Virginia University. Third-year DE Isaiah Foskey signed to the active roster off the practice squad in mid-November and played 12 special teams snaps in the Week 13 contest at Baltimore. Foskey joined the practice squad in early September, after spending his first two NFL seasons in 2023 and '24 with New Orleans. He originally was a second-round draft choice of the Saints in 2023 and played in 27 games in his first two years as a rotational pass rusher and special teams contributor. In his final season at Notre Dame (2022), he played under current Bengals defensive coordinator and then-Fighting Irish defensive coordinator Al

Linebackers: Rookie LB Demetrius Knight Jr. was selected by the

Bengals in the second round of this year's draft and has started nine of his first 12 career games. His 83 tackles rank second among all NFL rookies this season and lead Cincinnati's LBs. He also has six PDs and two INTs, with his first career pick coming on Monday Night Football in Week 4 at Denver. He notched his second INT in Week 13 at Baltimore, coming down with a deflected pass early in the fourth quarter and returning it 39 yards to set up a Bengals FG drive. Knight has registered 10 or more tackles in three games this season, led by a careerbest 12 stops in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. He shot up draft boards following a breakout season at the University of South Carolina in 2024, in which he played in 13 games and ranked second on the Gamecocks with 82 tackles. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. He was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB early in his college career. Fellow rookie Barrett Carter has seen action in all 12 games and started each of the last seven contests. He has 79 tackles on the year, the fourth-most among all rookies, and has reached double-digits in four games. He registered a careerhigh 16 tackles in Week 12 against New England, which tied for the fourth-most stops in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994. Cincinnati's fourthround draft pick this past April, Carter put together a decorated final season at Clemson University in 2024, as he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC pick, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). Eighth-year LB Oren Burks signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. He was a key performer for the Eagles during their postseason run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. He has played in all 12 games with six starts for the Bengals this season and has 29 total tackles with one TFL, one PD and one FF. He logged a season-high eight tackles in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. LB Joe Giles-Harris signed with the Bengals as a free agent in April, after spending one week on the team's practice last season. In his NFL career, he has seen action in 27 games, totaling 20 tackles, one sack, one PD and 17 special teams stops. Giles-Harris originally was a college free agent signee of the Jaguars in 2019, and had stints with Jacksonville (2019-20, '24), Buffalo ('21-22) and New England ('23-24). He made his 2025 season debut in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and has played in five games this season, recording seven special

Cornerbacks: Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2022, Dax Hill spent his first two seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. He started the first five games of last season at CB, then suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 5. He returned to full participation this past training camp and has started all 12 games this season. He leads the team's CBs with 71 tackles (45 solos), including two TFLs, while also recording six PDs and an INT. A natural athlete who lined up at several positions in the secondary during his career at the University of Michigan (2019-21), Hill primarily contributed on special teams throughout his 2022 rookie season before starting all 17 contests at safety in '23. CB **DJ Turner II** is enjoying a breakout campaign in his third pro season, as he currently leads the league with a career-high 16 PDs. Five of those were recorded in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph in 2009. After missing the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, Turner opened this year with his first career INT to help seal the Week 1 win at Cleveland late in the fourth quarter. He then collected his second pick of the year in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. Turner originally was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2023 and has played in 40 career games with 29 starts. He was a teammate of Hill's at Michigan, and ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine (4.26 seconds). Fifth-year CB Jalen Davis signed to the active roster on Monday, after spending the first 13 weeks of the season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He was elevated from the practice squad to the active roster for each of the past two games and already has six tackles, one sack and one FF. His forced fumble came late in the fourth quarter of Week 13 at Baltimore and was recovered by the Bengals, helping punctuate a dominant defensive effort. Davis spent time with Miami (2018) and Arizona ('19), before joining the Bengals midway through the '20 season. He has had stints on the team's practice squad and active roster over the past five years, but saw action in 43 regular-season contests from 2021-23. Overall in his career, he has played in 59 games and registered 29 tackles, two sacks, two PDs, two FFs and three FRs. CB Josh Newton, who the Bengals selected in the fifth round of the 2024 draft, earned a roster spot out of his rookie training camp and has played in 29 consecutive games to begin his career. He was thrust into the starting lineup last

season following Turner's shoulder injury and started the final six contests, and that stretch included his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee. He has started two contests this season and has 11 tackles (nine solos), along with two PDs. Newton spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. CB **DJ Ivey** made his return to action midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals, he carved out a role on special teams and showed flashes on defense prior to the injury. He played in 11 games last season and has seen action in all 12 contests this year. He has six special teams tackles along with two defensive stops on the season, and sealed the Week 7 win over Pittsburgh when he knocked down a Hail Mary attempt as time expired.

Safeties: Geno Stone has started all 29 games he has played in for the Bengals since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason. He led Cincinnati with four INTs last year (tied for 10th in NFL), which included a stretch of three straight games with a pick from Weeks 14-16. He recorded his first pick of this season in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he ended the Packers' opening drive by intercepting QB Jordan Love inside the red zone. He then notched his second career pick-six in Week 12 vs. New England, as he returned an INT 32 yards to the end zone in the second quarter. He also posted a career-high 13 tackles against the Patriots. Stone spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the AFC. His 13 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the second-most in the NFL. He has registered 84 tackles (50 solos), including one sack and two TFLs, along with three PDs through 12 games played. Stone's fellow starting safety, Jordan Battle, leads the team with three INTs. His first two INTs came in the first two games of the season, as he became the first Bengals player to start a year with picks in back-to-back games since former CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. Battle has posted a team-leading 86 tackles this season, highlighted by a career-best 12 stops in the opener at Cleveland. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, he has played in 46 career games (25 starts) and has 208 tackles along with five picks. He was a team captain and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). Fourth-year pro Tycen Anderson is a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two seasons, with eight in 2023 followed by 11 in '24, and his team-leading 16 ST stops this season are tied for fifth-most in the NFL. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. PJ Jules cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. He has 14 special teams tackles and two defensive tackles through 12 regular-season games played in 2025, after leading the Bengals with 10 solo tackles this past preseason. Second-year S Daijahn Anthony made his season debut in Week 13 at Baltimore, playing five special teams snaps, after spending the first 12 games on the Reserve/Injured list due to a hamstring injury. As a rookie last season, Anthony played in 13 games and contributed primarily on special teams. He was a seventh-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, after a five-year college career that saw him work his way from Division II Shepherd University ('19-20) to Liberty University ('21-22) to the University of Mississippi ('23).

Special teams: A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, K **Evan McPherson** owns the third-highest career FG percentage in team history (83.0). He is 23-for-26 on FG attempts and a perfect 27-for-27 on PATs this season. In Week 12 vs. New England, he kicked a franchise-record 63-yard FG as the first half ended, and became the fourth kicker in NFL history with FGs from distances of at least 50 yards and at least 60 yards in a single game. He now has 28 career FGs from 50 or more yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since the start of his 2021 rookie season. McPherson followed up his franchise record with a career-high six made FGs in Week 13 at Baltimore, which marked the most FGs by any NFL kicker in a game this season and tied Doug Pelfrey for the most in a game in Bengals history. McPherson has been operating at full health through the first 12 games of 2025, after missing the final five contests of last season due to a groin injury. Secondyear P Ryan Rehkow compiled a record-setting rookie season in 2024 that saw him set Bengals single-season marks for gross punting average (49.11 yards per punt) and net average (42.92). His net average ranked sixth among all NFL punters last year, while his gross ranked ninth (both led all rookies). He was named to the 2024 Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team. In his

career debut in the 2024 opener against New England, he set an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per punt (four punts for 258 yards). This season, he leads the NFL in gross average (52.3 yards) and ranks seventh in net average (42.8). Rookie **William Wagner** earned the role as the Bengals' long snapper coming out of this past training camp, and through his first 12 career games he has recorded 101 snaps without an unplayable delivery. He spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannelly Award (nation's top LS). WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. In Week 9 vs. Chicago, he ran back the opening kickoff 98 yards for a TD and finished the day with a career-

best 179 yards on four KORs. It marked his third career TD on a return, as he previously found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of 2023 vs. Baltimore, and had a 100-yard KOR in Week 7 of '24 at Cleveland. He is one of two players in Bengals history with a TD via both kickoff and punt return, alongside former CB Lemar Parrish. Jones has 41 KORs for 1126 yards (27.5 average) in his career, while also contributing 49 PRs for 464 yards (9.5). Also in the mix to return kickoffs and punts is second-year WR **Jermaine Burton**, who took over KORs late last season following an injury to Jones. Burton had 13 KORs for 378 yards in 2024 (29.1 average), including two 38-yarders. He logged four KORs for 84 yards this past preseason, as well as two PRs for 35 yards. HB **Samaje Perine** has returned 15 kickoffs this season for 381 yards (25.4), including a season-long 38-yarder in Week 9 vs. Chicago. While playing for Kansas City last season, he had five KORs for 163 yards (32.6).

AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF

Cincinnati Bengals 27, Buffalo Bills 10 Sunday, Jan. 22, 2023 at Highmark Stadium

Cincinnati scored on its opening two possessions to grab a 14-0 first-quarter lead, and never looked back in a snowy AFC Divisional Playoff. The Bengals' offense churned out 412 total yards, including 172 rushing. HB Joe Mixon finished with 123 yards from scrimmage, including 105 on the ground with a 5.1-yard rushing average. QB Joe Burrow threw two TD passes and connected with eight different receivers on the afternoon to lead Cincinnati in advancing to the AFC Championship for a second consecutive year. Defensively, the Bengals held Buffalo to season lows in points and net rushing yards (64), while an INT by rookie CB Cam Taylor-Britt on the Bills' final drive punctuated the dominant performance. Buffalo cut the lead to 17-10 midway through the third quarter, but Cincinnati answered with a 12-play, 75-yard drive capped by a Mixon TD run to regain its two-score advantage. The Bengals set a postseason team record with 30 first downs while committing no turnovers.

QB Joe Burrow passed for 348 yards and two first-half TDs to lead Cincinnati to a prime-time home victory over Buffalo. The Bengals found the end zone on their opening possession for a fourth straight game, with TE Irv Smith Jr.'s first TD of the season giving Cincinnati an early 7-0 advantage. After the Bills quickly answered with their own score to tie it up, the Bengals again marched down the field and HB Joe Mixon's TD regained a lead that they never gave up. Buffalo trailed 21-10 early in the fourth quarter and was driving at the Cincinnati 22-yard line with a chance to close its deficit, but LB Germaine Pratt forced a fumble that was recovered by S Nick Scott for the Bengals' second takeaway of the game. Cincinnati made use of the turnover with a FG drive that included two completions to WR Tee Higgins, who finished with eight catches for a game-high 110 yards. The Bills cut it to a one-possession game with a TD with 3:32 left, but the Bengals used the rest of the time on the clock as Mixon converted a third-and-three following Buffalo's final timeout. Cincinnati Bengals 33, Pittsburgh Steelers 31 Thursday night, Oct. 16, 2025 at Paycor Stadium

In a high-scoring, nationally televised matchup which saw the two offenses combine for 866 net yards, the Bengals put together a late drive to set up K Evan McPherson's 36-yard game-winning FG on Thursday Night Football. It marked the third regular-season game in NFL history between two starting QBs over 40 years old, as Joe Flacco, 40, passed for 342 yards and three TDs for the Bengals while Aaron Rodgers, 41, had 249 yards and four passing TDs for the Steelers. Flacco leaned heavily on WR Ja'Marr Chase, who finished with a Bengals-record 16 receptions for 161 yards and a TD. The Steelers took the lead with 2:21 remaining when Rodgers found TE Pat Freiermuth for a 68-yard TD, but Flacco engineered a quick drive down the field and connected on a 28-yard pass to WR Tee Higgins to get inside McPherson's range. Cincinnati picked off Rodgers twice in the second quarter and scored 17 points late in the period to pull ahead at halftime. The Bengals' offense also was aided by a strong rushing attack, led by HB Chase Brown's 9.8 yards per carry. Cincinnati improved to 3-4, while Pittsburgh fell to 4-2.

The Jets scored 23 points in the fourth quarter to storm back from a 15-point deficit and earn their first win of the season over the Bengals. Cincinnati built leads of at least 14 points on three separate occasions, including a 38-24 advantage with 10 minutes left following HB Chase Brown's second TD of the afternoon. New York's offense totaled 502 net yards, including 254 rushing, and held the Bengals' defense without a sack or takeaway. RB Breece Hall rushed for two TDs in the fourth quarter to pull New York back to within a score, and then he threw a TD pass to TE Mason Taylor to give the Jets their first lead in the final two minutes. The Bengals' rushing attack helped them race out in front over the first three quarters, as Brown logged 73 yards on the ground while HB Samaje Perine contributed a season-high 94. WR Ja'Marr Chase had double-digit receptions for a third straight game, finishing with 12 catches for 91 yards. Cincinnati fell to 3-5, while the Jets improved to 1-7.

Bengals K McPherson cut into the deficit as the first half ended by drilling a team-record 63-yard FG. Cincinnati's defense opened the second half with a goal line stand, holding the Patriots out of the end zone on four plays from the one-yard line, but New England put together three consecutive FG drives to stay in front. Bengals HB Chase Brown rushed for 107 yards and logged his fifth straight game with 100 or more yards from scrimmage. Cincinnati fell to 3-8, while New England improved to 10-2.

Cincinnati Bengals 32, Baltimore Ravens 14 Thursday night, Nov. 27, 2025 at M&T Bank Stadium

The Bengals' defense forced five turnovers in a nationally televised road win on Thanksgiving. QB Joe Burrow, who made his return after missing nine games due to a toe injury, had two TD passes in the second half and finished with 261 yards. Cincinnati's offense was held to just one TD on six red zone opportunities, but K Evan McPherson made a career-high six FGs to help keep the Bengals in front. Baltimore had a chance to cut into a 12-point deficit early in the fourth quarter, before rookie LB Demetrius Knight intercepted a deflected pass deep in Bengals territory and returned it 39 yards to set up another FG drive. DE Joseph Ossai sacked Ravens QB Lamar Jackson twice in the first half, and HB Chase Brown had over 100 yards from scrimmage for a Bengals-record sixth straight game. Cincinnati improved to 4-8, while Baltimore fell to 6-6.
