### GAME INFORMATION

**Kickoff:** 1 p.m. Eastern.

**Television:** The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Ian Eagle (play-by-play), Charles Davis (analyst) and Evan Washburn (sideline reporter).

**Radio:** The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

In addition, the game will air nationally on Sports USA Radio. Broadcasters are Larry Kahn (play-by-play) and Ron Rivera (analyst).

**Setting the scene:** The Bengals look to earn a win coming out of the bye week for a fourth straight year when they host the Pittsburgh Steelers at Paycor Stadium on Sunday.

Cincinnati enters the contest at 4-7 this season, with six of those losses coming by a margin of one possession. The team's two most recent games — road setbacks in Week 10 at Baltimore and Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers — have consisted of high offensive production and notable individual efforts, but the results offered little consolation for head coach Zac Taylor and his players.

"We've put in a lot of work, we have a good football team — we need to win," Taylor said. "That's this business, that's our expectation for ourselves and that's our standard for ourselves. It's frustrating when you don't get it done, but it doesn't change our mindset or our purpose moving forward. That's still the same to get on the right track."

The Bengals found themselves in a 21-point hole midway through the third quarter against the Chargers, before scoring three TDs in a span of less than nine minutes to tie it up early in the fourth. Cincinnati's first two scores in the comeback effort came on fourth-down plays, as QB Joe Burrow hit WR Ja'Marr Chase on a fourth-and-goal pass to cut the deficit to 27-13, then later connected with WR Tee Higgins on a 42-yard deep ball that made it a one-score game. Burrow finished the night with 28 completions on 50 attempts for 356 yards and three TD passes while committing zero turnovers.

Defensively, the Bengals had a second-half stretch in which they did not allow a point on five consecutive Chargers possessions. That stand included a crucial takeaway when LB Logan Wilson knocked the ball loose from QB Justin Herbert, and S Geno Stone recovered the fumble to set up Cincinnati's game-tying TD drive. But in the final minute of regulation, Herbert and the L.A. offense marched 84 yards in four plays culminating in a game-winning TD with 18 seconds left.

While the Bengals enter this week on the outside of the AFC playoff standings, they hope Sunday sparks another late-season run that propels them to a third postseason appearance in four years. Cincinnati has compiled a 9-4 record in games played in December since 2021, with its nine wins tying for the fifth-most in the NFL during the calendar's final month.

"This is December football," Taylor said. "This is where it means something. Regardless of what our record is right now, you need to play your best football in December. Now more than ever, we're going to need that from our guys. They understand that, they subscribe to it and we just keep moving forward from here."

Sunday marks the 110th installment of the Bengals-Steelers rivalry.

Cincinnati aims to enact revenge on a Pittsburgh team that swept the Bengals in 2023, with both matchups occurring after QB Joe Burrow's season-ending injury. The Steelers enter this week leading the AFC North Division with an 8-3 record, but they are coming off a loss at Cleveland that snapped a five-game winning streak.

**The series:** The Steelers lead 70-39 overall (including 2-0 in postseason). The two postseason games both were Steelers wins in Wild Card round contests at Paycor Stadium (formerly named Paul Brown Stadium), after the 2005 and '15 seasons.

The Bengals have played more games against the Steelers (109) than any other foe. Cleveland is second in that category at 102, and Tennessee (formerly Houston Oilers) is third at 79.

**The Jungle is jammin':** The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 21 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 13 highest-attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest announced crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15.

Cincinnati's game against Philadelphia in Week 8 of this season had an announced attendance figure of 67,239, which now stands as the second-largest in team history. The Bengals' 2023 Week 9 victory over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football (66,965) ranks as the third-largest, and the following week's game vs. Houston (66,526) is the fourth-largest. The fifth-largest figure in team history is 66,399 for the Bengals' Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore in January of 2023.

**Uniform watch:** The Bengals are slated to wear orange jerseys, black pants (orange stripes) and orange socks this week against Pittsburgh. Cincinnati is 3-1 overall when wearing that combination, which was last featured in the team's home contest against the Steelers in Week 12 of the 2023 season. The Bengals also wore their orange jerseys in this season's opener on Sept. 8 vs. New England, but that game featured the debut of their orange pants.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant

uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance was in Week 8 of this season against Philadelphia.

\* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their uniform lineup in 2024.

**Bengals career records watch:** As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at movement on the Bengals' individual career records lists (regular season) that has occurred this season, as well as potential upcoming movement:

- QB Joe Burrow in Week 10 at Baltimore surpassed QB Jeff Blake (2221) for the fifth-most passing attempts in Bengals history. Burrow's current attempts total of 2303 is 914 shy of QB Carson Palmer (3217) for the fourth-most. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449) and Boomer Esiason (3564) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history. Burrow's current passing yardage total of 17,111 is 5583 shy of Palmer (22,694) for the fourth-most. Anderson (32,838),

Dalton (31,594) and Esiason (27,149) hold the top three spots.

- Burrow in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers recorded his 23rd career game with 300 or more passing yards, which tied Esiason for the second-most in team history. Dalton (28) has the team's most 300-yard passing games.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers caught his 41st receiving TD, which tied WR Eddie Brown for the fifth-most in team history. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.

- Chase has 17 games with 100 or more receiving yards, one shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 51.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 8.0 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

- K Evan McPherson has an 81.6 career FG percentage (93 made/114 attempts), the fourth-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8; 177/202), Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106), and Mike Nugent (81.8; 157/192).

**Records vs. Steelers:** The following individual and team regular-season Bengals and Steelers entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book:

- On Oct. 28, 1973 at Pittsburgh, Steelers S Mike Wagner became the first opponent to record three INTs in a game against the Bengals. Four players since have tied.

- On Nov. 10, 1974 at Cincinnati, QB Ken Anderson set the Bengals' game record for completion percentage (90.91), hitting 20 of 22 against the Steelers.

- On Nov. 29, 1992 at Cincinnati, the Steelers tied the record for most sacks against the Bengals in a game with 10, then tied the mark again on Oct. 13, 1996 at Pittsburgh. The record originally was set by Denver on Oct. 19, 1969 at Cincinnati.

- On Oct. 16, 1994 at Cincinnati, the Bengals set a team record with eight sacks, all on QB Neil O'Donnell. That mark was tied on Dec. 9, 2001 vs. Jacksonville.

- On Oct. 15, 2000 at Pittsburgh, Steelers P Josh Miller tied for the most punts ever against the Bengals with 12.

- On Dec. 30, 2001 at Cincinnati, Jon Kitna had a Bengals-record 68 pass attempts in an overtime win over the Steelers. The 68 attempts also set a team record, which still stands.

- On Dec. 4, 2017 at Cincinnati, the Bengals set the dubious record of most penalty yardage incurred during a game at 173. That number shattered the previous mark of 134.

- On Sept. 26, 2021 at Pittsburgh, Steelers RB Najee Harris tied the mark for most receptions ever against the Bengals in a game with 14.

- On Sept. 11, 2022 at Cincinnati, Bengals K Evan McPherson kicked a 59-yard field goal vs. Pittsburgh, the longest field goal in team history.

**Individually vs. Steelers:** Here are cumulative regular-season offensive statistics for current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Steelers (ordered by total games played):

- TE Drew Sample: Eight games; Seven catches for 64 yards (9.1) and a TD.

- WR Tee Higgins: Six games; 32 catches for 575 yards (18.0) and three TDs.

- HB Trayveon Williams: Six games; Nine carries for 37 yards (4.1).

- QB Joe Burrow: Five games; 112-of-174 passing (64.4 percent) for 1268 yards, 11 TDs and eight INTs (88.0 rating); 16 rushes for 67 yards (4.2) and one TD.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Four games; 21 receptions for 314 yards (15.0) and three TDs.

- WR Trenton Irwin: Four games; Eight receptions for 104 yards (13.0) and one TD.

- HB Chris Evans (Reserve/Injured): Three games; Five rushes for 23 yards (4.6); Three receptions for 31 yards (10.3).

- HB Chase Brown: Two games; Four rushes for 16 yards (4.0); Two receptions for eight yards (4.0).

- QB Jake Browning: Two games; 47-of-68 passing for 562 yards, two TDs and four INTs (79.4 rating); Four rushes for nine yards (2.3).

- TE Tanner Hudson: Two games; Five receptions for 23 yards (4.6).

- WR Andrei Iosivas: Two games; Five receptions for 52 yards (10.4).

- WR Charlie Jones: Two games; One reception for minus-1 yard (-1.0).

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Zac Taylor** was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half

turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

**Mike Tomlin** was named the 16th head coach in Steelers history on Jan. 22, 2007. He became at the time the youngest coach (36 years, 323 days) in NFL history to win a Super Bowl when the Steelers defeated the Arizona Cardinals, 27-23, in Super Bowl XLIII on Feb. 1, 2009 (11 years later, Sean McVay established the current mark at 36 years, 10 days).

Tomlin reached the playoffs four times in his first five seasons and he is the only coach in Steelers history to win division titles each of his first two seasons. In his 17 years as head coach of the Steelers, Tomlin has led Pittsburgh to seven AFC North titles, most recently in 2020, and has guided the Steelers to the playoffs 11 times, including two trips to the Super Bowl (XLIII and XLV). From 2007-23, he led Pittsburgh to a 173-100-2 regular-season record — the best start for a head coach in franchise history.

Tomlin secured his 17th straight non-losing season with the Steelers in 2023, a streak dating back to his first season as the team's head coach in 2007. Tomlin is the only head coach in NFL history to begin a head-coaching tenure with at least 15 consecutive non-losing seasons.

Tomlin has led the Steelers to a .500-or-better record in each of his 17 seasons as head coach, the third-longest streak of .500-or-better seasons by a head coach in NFL history. He is one of two active NFL head coaches with over 170 wins and one of four active NFL head coaches to defeat at least 31 current NFL franchises.

In 2020, Tomlin's club won its seventh AFC North title. No other head coach has won the AFC North more than five times. In 2008, Tomlin directed the Steelers to a 12-4 record, winning his second-consecutive AFC North title. That

season culminated with a Super Bowl triumph, making Tomlin one of only seven coaches in league history to win a Super Bowl within his first two seasons as an NFL head coach. In his first season, Tomlin guided the Steelers to a 10-6 record and their first AFC North title since 2004.

Tomlin was the Minnesota Vikings defensive coordinator in 2006 after spending the previous five seasons ('01-05) as defensive backs coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Tomlin coached one of the top defensive backfields in the NFL for the Buccaneers, culminating with its performance in Super Bowl XXXVII. The secondary recorded four interceptions, returning two for touchdowns to help Tampa Bay capture the franchise's first Super Bowl title.

Tomlin served two seasons as the defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati (1999-2000) before going to Tampa Bay. Prior to joining the Cincinnati staff, Tomlin had a short stint on the coaching staff at Tennessee-Martin and then spent two seasons at Arkansas State. Tomlin spent the 1996 season as a graduate assistant at Memphis. Tomlin began his coaching career in 1995 as wide receivers coach at Virginia Military Institute.

Tomlin was a three-year starter at wide receiver at William & Mary (1990-94) and finished his college career with 101 receptions for 2046 yards and a school-record 20 touchdown receptions. He was named a first-team All-Yankee Conference selection in 1994 after establishing a school record with a 20.2-yards-per catch average. He graduated in 1994 with a degree in sociology. He has no pro playing experience.

Tomlin was born in Hampton, Va., on March 15, 1972. He and his wife, Kiya, have two sons, Dino and Mason, and a daughter, Harlyn Quinn.

**Taylor vs. Tomlin:** Tomlin leads, 6-4.

**Tomlin vs. Bengals:** Tomlin leads 26-9 (that record includes a Wild Card Playoff victory after the 2015 season).

## BENGALS NOTES

**Bengals near 400th W:** The Bengals enter Week 13 with 398 all-time wins in the regular season, just two shy of 400. The team has won 240 games at home and 158 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly known as Paul Brown Stadium). The team has reached the 10-win mark during the regular season 14 times, including in six of the past 12 years.

**2024 Bengals captains:** The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt is serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

**Red zone offense clicking:** The Bengals have scored a touchdown or a field goal on 32 consecutive drives that reached their opponents'

20-yard line, dating back to the third quarter of Week 1 vs. New England. It is the longest active streak in the NFL, and the longest streak by a Bengals team since Week 10 of the 2017 season through Week 4 of 2018, when Cincinnati scored on 34 straight red zone trips.

The Bengals have scored a TD on 69.7 percent of their red zone drives this season (23 of 33), the third-highest rate in the NFL behind Baltimore (78.7) and Tampa Bay (69.8). With 32 total scores (23 TDs, nine FGs) on 33 possessions, Cincinnati's 97.0 red zone scoring percentage leads the league. The Bengals are the only team this year to come away with zero points on one or fewer trips to the red zone.

Over the past four games, the Bengals have found the end zone on 12 out of 16 red zone drives. After kicking two FGs in the first half of Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, they scored a pair of red zone TDs in the second half on Joe Burrow passes to Ja'Marr Chase.

**Burrow makes history:** In the Bengals' two most recent contests, Joe Burrow became the first QB in NFL history to record at least 50 passing attempts, 350 passing yards and three TD passes with zero INTs in consecutive games.

In Week 10 at Baltimore, Burrow posted season highs in attempts (56), completions (34) and yards (428) while throwing four TDs. His 56 attempts were the second-most in a game in his career, trailing a career-high 61 in Week 2 of his 2020 rookie season at Cleveland. His 428 passing yards were the fourth-most he has ever thrown and marked his sixth career game with more than 400.

Burrow's performance against the Ravens also was just the eighth time in NFL history in which a QB had at least 50 attempts, 400 passing yards and four TD passes with no INTs.

Burrow followed up by going 28 of 50 for 356 yards and three TDs in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. Each of his three TD passes and 245 of his passing yards came in the second half as he helped Cincinnati climb back from a 21-point deficit to tie the game.

**Twelve TDs in three games:** QB Joe Burrow has thrown 12 TD passes over Cincinnati's last three games, as he tied his career high with five in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, had four in Week 10 at Baltimore and then tossed three more in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers.

Burrow is the first player in Bengals history to pass for 12 TDs in a span of three games. The last NFL player to accomplish that feat is Dallas QB Dak Prescott, who also had 12 passing scores from Weeks 16-18 of the 2021 season.

Of Burrow's five TD passes in Week 9 against the Raiders, four went to different receivers. It tied for the most players with a receiving TD in any game in Bengals history. There have been nine such instances in team history, with Burrow accounting for three of those.

Burrow's Week 10 performance at Baltimore marked the fifth time in team history that a QB had multiple TD passes of 65 or more yards. Burrow is responsible for two of those games, with the other coming in Week 17 of the 2021 season when he threw TDs of 72 and 69 yards — both to WR Ja'Marr Chase.

The Week 11 contest at Los Angeles marked Burrow's 21st career game with three or more TD passes, which tied Pro Football Hall of Famer Kurt Warner for the third-most such games in NFL history in a player's first five seasons. The only players with more three-TD games within their first five years are Hall of Famer Dan Marino (33) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (28).

**Joe hits the mark:** QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 67.82, he is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, narrowly ahead of Miami QB and fellow 2020 draftee Tua Tagovailoa (67.70).

Burrow leads the NFL this season in passing attempts (408) and ranks second in completions (274). He surpassed 2000 career attempts in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark were the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 throws behind Brees (1444).

In Week 8 vs. Philadelphia, Burrow went 26 of 37 (70.3 percent), marking his 20th career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts. That is the second-most such games within a player's first five seasons in NFL history behind Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21).

The following week against Las Vegas, Burrow recorded his 1500th career completion in what was his 61st regular-season game. That marked the second-fewest games in NFL history to reach 1500 completions, trailing only L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (57).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; min. 14 att./game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414).

**Burrow masters the deep ball:** QB Joe Burrow's 42-yard TD pass to WR Tee Higgins in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers marked his 27th career scoring pass of 40 or more yards — the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020. It also surpassed Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (26) for the second-most such TD passes in a player's first five seasons by any QB whose career began after 1990. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning had more 40-plus yard TD passes in his first five years (28).

Burrow additionally leads the NFL in TD passes of 50 or more yards (18) and 60 or more yards (14) since 2020. Of his league-high eight TD passes of 40-plus yards this season, six have gone to WR Ja'Marr Chase. The most recent two came in Week 10 at Baltimore — a 67-yarder early in the third quarter and a 70-yarder midway through the fourth. The 70-yard bomb tied for the third-longest TD pass of Burrow's career, behind an 82-yarder to Chase in Week 7 of the 2021 season and a 72-yarder to Chase in Week 17 of that year.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the

2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22 and two in '23.

**100 TDs for No. 9:** QB Joe Burrow threw his 100th career regular-season TD pass in Week 3 vs. Washington, when he connected with WR Ja'Marr Chase for a 41-yard score on the game's opening drive. Playing in his 55th game, Burrow tied for the seventh-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 100 TD passes.

The former No. 1 overall pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, before breaking out with a then-team-record 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By besting his record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

Burrow's 27 TD passes this season are tied for the league lead, and include a career-high five passing scores in two games — Week 5 vs. Baltimore and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He is the first NFL QB to pass for five or more TDs in multiple games in a season since Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and former Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady each had two such games in 2021.

Burrow enters Week 13 with 124 career TD passes. Should he throw for one TD against the Steelers in what will be his 64th regular-season game, he would become the third-fastest QB to reach 125 passing scores. Only Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (50) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino (54) hit that mark in fewer games.

**Burrow reaches 15K:** QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone.

Burrow's current career total of 17,111 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least four fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Burrow ranks third in the NFL with 3028 passing yards through 11 games this season. He has six career games with 400 or more passing yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for second-most leaguewide since 2020.

**More Burrow since '21:** Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is the only NFL QB with at least 1000 completions, 100 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.3; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking third in TD passes (111), fifth in passing yards (14,423), fifth in completions (1298) and seventh in yards per attempt (7.60).

**Chasing history:** WR Ja'Marr Chase leads the NFL this season in receiving yards (1056) and receiving TDs (12), while ranking third in receptions (73). The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021 is one of six players in league history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons.

With seven more receptions this season, Chase would become the first player in NFL history to record at least 80 catches, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving touchdowns in each of his first four years. He holds a career average of 85.23 receiving yards per game (56 regular-season games), the third-highest mark in league history among all players with at least 3000 yards.

Chase caught his 40th and 41st career TDs in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. Playing in his 56th contest, he became the eighth-fastest player in NFL history to reach 40 receiving TDs. He also tied former WR Eddie Brown (41) for the fifth-most receiving TDs in Bengals history.

In Week 10 at Baltimore, Chase caught 11 passes for 260 yards and three TDs. It marked the most receiving yards by any NFL player in a game this season. Combining that performance with his Bengals single-game record 266 yards in Week 17 of the 2021 campaign against Kansas City, Chase became the first player in league history to record two games with 260 or more receiving yards in his career.

A three-time Pro Bowler (2021-23), Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. His 4210 receiving yards following that matchup went in as the fifth-most ever through a player's first 50 games, while his 297 receptions ranked ninth. He also became one of just five players in the Super Bowl era to record over 4000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs within his first 50 games.

Chase in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants recorded his 300th career reception in his 51st game. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that milestone, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and tied for the eighth-fastest in league history. Chase also previously surpassed 4000 career receiving yards in Week 4 at Carolina, needing the fewest games ever by a Bengal to hit that mark (49). He enters Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh 227 receiving yards shy of 5000.

Last season, Chase logged a career-high 100 receptions that tied former WR Carl Pickens (1996) for the second-most in a season in Bengals history. The single-season team record belongs to former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh, who had 112 catches in 2007.

**On the Chase:** WR Ja'Marr Chase has 12 career receiving TDs of 60 or more yards, five more than any other player since he entered the league in 2021 (regular season). It also is the most in a career in Bengals history, ahead of former WR Isaac Curtis (10), and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (13) and 40-plus yards (17) since 2021. In Week 10 at Baltimore, he scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards, becoming the first NFL player this season with two scores of 65-plus yards in a game.

Earlier this season, Chase had a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yard score in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He became the first NFL player to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games since former Dallas WR Terrell Owens in 2007.

**Ja'Marr shines against Baltimore:** WR Ja'Marr Chase caught 10 passes for 193 yards and two TDs in the Bengals' first matchup against the Ravens this season in Week 5, then followed up with 11 grabs for

264 yards and three scores in the Week 10 Thursday Night Football contest at Baltimore. His combined 457 receiving yards are the most in NFL history for one player against a single opponent in a season, surpassing former Raiders WR Art Powell's 428 yards against the Houston Oilers in 1963.

Chase's performances against Baltimore are the two highest single-game receiving yardage totals in the NFL this season, with the next highest being Seattle WR Jaxon Smith-Njigba's 180 yards in Week 9.

With his Week 10 effort, Chase became the first player in NFL history to have multiple games with 250 or more receiving yards and three or more receiving TDs. His previous such stat line came in Week 17 of the 2021 season, when he went for a Bengals single-game record 266 yards and three scores against Kansas City. No NFL player had a game with 10-plus catches, 200-plus yards and three-plus TDs in between those two Chase performances.

Chase's 264 receiving yards in Week 10 also are the second-most in an NFL game played on a Thursday, behind Cleveland Rams receiver Jim Benton's 303 yards on Thursday, Nov. 22, 1945.

Chase now has four career games with at least 10 catches, 150 yards and two TDs — the most in NFL history within a player's first four seasons.

**Tee reaches 4K:** Fifth-year WR Tee Higgins led the Bengals with 82 yards on four receptions in Week 7 at Cleveland, and in the process surpassed 4000 receiving yards in his career. Playing in his 63rd regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that mark.

Higgins has been inactive for five games this season due to injuries (Weeks 1-2, Weeks 8-10), but in his six games played he has proven to be one of the NFL's most productive pass catchers. He returned to action in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers following a three-game hiatus and caught nine passes for a season-high 148 yards and a TD. His scoring catch was a 42-yarder on a fourth-down play late in the third quarter, which marked his longest reception since he had an 80-yard TD at Pittsburgh in Week 16 of last season. The Chargers game also was Higgins' 13th career 100-yard receiving performance.

From Weeks 3-7 of this season, Higgins tied for seventh in the NFL in receptions (29), tied for eighth in receiving TDs (three) and ranked 10th in receiving yards (341).

Since entering the league as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 20 among all players in receiving yards (20th; 4173) and receiving TDs (T-19th; 28). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

**Holiday Higgins:** WR Tee Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 13 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (10), seventh in receiving yards (1228) and 13th in yards per reception (15.7) during the calendar's final month. He also ranks second in Bengals post season history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing teammate Ja'Marr Chase in both categories.

Higgins' single-game career high for both receptions (12) and receiving yards (194) came on Dec. 26, 2021, in a home win over Baltimore. He had two TDs that day, the first of which was set up by a 52-yard Higgins catch earlier in the drive. Previously in that same month, he caught nine passes for 138 yards and a TD on Dec. 5, 2021 against the L.A. Chargers.

Higgins' top statistical performance of last season occurred in Week 16 at Pittsburgh on Dec. 23, when he hauled in five catches for 140 yards and a TD. His 28.0 yards per reception were the second-most in any game of his career, and included a career-long 80-yard TD in the third quarter.

Higgins also had a 99-yard receiving output on Dec. 27, 2020, in a win over Houston, which included a go-ahead TD in the second half.

**Trey's torrid pace:** DE Trey Hendrickson's 11.5 sacks this season lead the NFL through 12 weeks of regular-season play. With this year's tally following up his 17.5 sacks during the 2023 season, he is the first Bengals player



to record double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980 and '81.

Since signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, Hendrickson has 51.0 sacks, the fourth-most in the NFL in that span behind Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (56.0), Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (55.5) and San Francisco DL Nick Bosa (51.5). He has 11 multi-sack games as a member of the Bengals, tied for the third-most leaguewide since 2021.

Hendrickson has led Cincinnati in sacks and been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his three full seasons with the team (2021-23). He logged 14.0 sacks in his debut Bengals season in 2021, which ranked fifth in the NFL, then followed up with eight more in '22. His career-high 17.5 sacks last year tied for second in the NFL and ranked second in Bengals single-season history, trailing only DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson recorded two sacks in back-to-back games earlier this season (Weeks 6-7), becoming the first Cincinnati player to do so since former DE Antwan Odom in Weeks 1-2 of the 2009 campaign.

The Florida Atlantic University product spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with New Orleans, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL.

Hendrickson's production for the Bengals was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

**Hendrickson wrecks the Raiders:** DE Trey Hendrickson earned his second career AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor in Week 9, when he recorded a career-high four sacks in the win over Las Vegas. It marked the second-most sacks in any NFL game this season behind Detroit DL Aidan Hutchinson's 4.5 in Week 2 against Tampa Bay.

Hendrickson became the fourth player in Bengals history to record four or more sacks in a game, and the first since former DE Antwan Odom had five on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay. Odom's total is tied for the team single-game record with former DE/DT Eddie Edwards, who notched five sacks on Dec. 21, 1980 against Cleveland.

Three of Hendrickson's four sacks against the Raiders came during the fourth quarter, including a strip-sack that led to a recovery by Bengals LB Logan Wilson. The play marked Hendrickson's 10th forced fumble since joining the Bengals during the 2021 offseason, which are tied for the second-most in the NFL in that span.

Hendrickson's previous single-game high for sacks was 2.5, which he recorded twice — in Week 3 of the 2022 season at the N.Y. Jets, and in Week 5 of '23 at Arizona.

**Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal:** DE Sam Hubbard logged his second sack of the season in Week 7 at Cleveland, when he forced a fumble by QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson in the Browns' backfield. It improved Hubbard's career sack total to 38.5, the fourth-most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected that year — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. He has ranked second on the Bengals in sacks in each season since he became the team's starting left defensive end in 2019, and he has 55 career TFLs.

Hubbard had a pair of TFLs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, with the second stopping RB Derrick Henry in his own end zone to force a safety. It marked the

first safety forced by the Bengals since Week 13 of the 2019 season against the N.Y. Jets. Hubbard then recorded his first career INT in the Week 7 win over Cleveland, as he dropped into coverage and came down with a tipped pass thrown by Thompson-Robinson.

Hubbard additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in team history. A native of Cincinnati who attended Archbishop Moeller High School, Hubbard also is known for contributing one of the franchise's most iconic plays, a 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the game-winner in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore after the 2022 season.

Hubbard also played in his 100th career regular-season game earlier this season, reaching the milestone in Week 10 at Baltimore.

**LB duo stuffs the stat sheet:** Fifth-year pro Logan Wilson ranks tied for sixth in the NFL this season with 104 tackles, while his fellow starting LB Germaine Pratt is tied for 12th with 97.

Each player also has contributed to three takeaways this season, with Wilson logging one forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. His two FRs — the first two of his career — came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He then forced a fumble on the opening play of the fourth quarter in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, which was recovered by S Geno Stone and set up Cincinnati's game-tying TD drive. Pratt had a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City, setting up a Bengals FG drive before halftime. He recovered another loose ball in overtime of Week 5 vs. Baltimore, then the following week at the N.Y. Giants he grabbed his first INT of the year deep in Cincinnati territory.

Wilson in Week 11 eclipsed the 100-tackle mark for the third straight season (third time in career). His career-high 135 stops during the 2023 campaign were the most by a Cincinnati defender since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in '13. Since entering the NFL in 2020, Wilson is one of three players leaguewide with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith and Baltimore CB Marlon Humphrey.

Pratt also posted a career high in tackles last season with 118. He has 13 career games with 10 or more stops, including two this season — Week 2 at Kansas City (career-high 16) and Week 7 at Cleveland (13). Since the start of the 2021 season, Pratt is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs, along with Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr.

**Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20:** LB Logan Wilson's 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2020. He had four picks last season, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh leaguewide.

A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson opened his career with two picks in his 2020 rookie campaign, then followed up with four in '21. That total marked the most in a season by a Bengals LB since Odell Thurman had five INTs in 2005.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the '27 season.

**Rehkwow on a run:** Through 12 weeks of regular-season play, rookie P Ryan Rehkwow ranks sixth the NFL in net punting average (44.1 net yards per punt; minimum 10 attempts) and eighth in gross average (50.3; min. 10 att.). He has punted 39 times for 1960 yards, with 19 downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line compared to four touchbacks.

Rehkwow kicked off his career with a historic debut on Sept. 8 vs. New England, when he logged four punts for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four attempts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole on Nov. 5, 2023.

The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkov's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers).

In Weeks 5-7, Rehkov became the first punter in Bengals history to have four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line in three consecutive games. He amassed season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkov signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

**McPherson from deep:** K Evan McPherson knocked through a 56-yard FG in the third quarter of Week 4 at Carolina, extending his Bengals record to 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards. It also tied for the fifth-longest FG in team history, with McPherson owning five of the top six on that list.

McPherson's 24 such FGs are the fourth-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021. He finished the 2023 campaign with 21 FGs from 50-plus yards, the most in NFL history in a player's first three seasons.

McPherson's overall career FG percentage of 81.6 (93 of 114) ranks fourth in Bengals history (minimum 75 attempts) behind former kickers Shayne Graham (86.8), Randy Bullock (84.9) and Mike Nugent (81.8). He surpassed 100 career attempts in Week 3 vs. Washington, and his 84 made FGs at the time he reached that mark were the third-most through a Bengals kicker's first 100 tries.

McPherson also has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs, including two last season — in OT of Week 13 at Jacksonville, and again in OT of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. However, his two most notable such kicks came during the 2021 postseason, when he hit a 52-yarder in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and followed up a week later with a 31-yarder in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City that sent Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson is a perfect 19 of 19 in seven career postseason games and is the team's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points).

Cincinnati signed McPherson to a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18, securing its kicker through the 2027 season.

**Pro Bowl three-peats:** WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 which tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

**Three listed on "Top 100":** For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

**Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor:** The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor this season with the induction of former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the Ring of Honor during a halftime ceremony in the team's Week 3 game against Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

**Bengal bites:** The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.4 years ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals roster is DE Sam Hubbard, who is in his seventh season with the team ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 31 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is OT Amarius Mims, who is 22 (born Oct. 14, 2002) ... Mims and OT Orlando Brown Jr. are tied for both the heaviest player on the roster at 350 pounds and the tallest player on the roster at 6-8 ... ## POSITION BY POSITION

**Quarterbacks:** Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). He also currently is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage, maintaining a mark of 67.82 percent (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Through 12 weeks this season, Burrow leads the league in passing attempts (408), is tied for the lead in TD passes (27), ranks second in completions (274), third in passing yards (3028) and third in passer rating (106.9). He threw for 356 yards and three TDs in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, with each of his passing scores coming in the second half to help Cincinnati erase a 21-point deficit. His 42-yard TD throw to WR Tee Higgins in the third

quarter marked his 27th career TD pass of 40 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020. In the previous week's Thursday Night Football matchup at Baltimore, Burrow posted season highs in completions (34), attempts (56) and passing yards (428), and threw four TDs with no turnovers. He has moved closer to several Bengals career records this season, as he surpassed QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most passing attempts and yards in team history. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, he capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a quarterback in team history, a 47-yarder to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule,



highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time last year, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals (2021-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Browning has seen action in two games this season, taking late snaps to close out Week 8 vs. Philadelphia and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas.

**Running backs:** Second-year HB **Chase Brown** leads Cincinnati this season in rushing attempts (140) and yards (607), and his seven total TDs since Week 4 (five rushing, two receiving) are tied for the sixth-most among all NFL running backs in that span. Used both as a high-volume runner and a viable pass catching option, Brown ran for 86 yards on 22 carries while catching five passes for a season-best 57 yards in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. He brought in a career-high nine receptions in Week 10 at Baltimore, and his 94 yards from scrimmage against the Ravens (42 rushing, 52 receiving) were the third-most in a game in his career. He had perhaps had his best performance as a pro in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, setting career highs in carries (27), rushing yards (120) and scrimmage yards (137), while also catching a Joe Burrow TD pass on the Bengals' first offensive possession. Brown scored his first two career rushing TDs in Week 4 at Carolina, then the following week against Baltimore had his first scoring reception of the season. He sealed the Week 6 victory over the N.Y. Giants with a season-long 30-yard run to the end zone late in the fourth quarter. Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, Brown is averaging 4.3 yards per carry and has a team-best 15 runs of 10-plus yards. Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in the 2023 draft, Brown spent four games on the Reserve/Injured list midway through his rookie season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to post 322 yards from scrimmage over the final six contests. Cincinnati acquired HB **Khalil Herbert** in a trade with Chicago on Nov. 5. A fourth-year pro, Herbert played in 48 regular-season games (12 starts) for the Bears and rushed for 1791 yards on 372 carries with nine TDs. He showcased his versatility with 45 catches for 291 yards, along with a 25.0-yard kickoff return average on 33 attempts. Herbert has seen limited action in his first two games with the Bengals. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in 2023, and now shares that responsibility with Brown as the Bengals approach the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, and caught 15 passes for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average), and he played seven offensive snaps in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas as an extra pass protector.

**Wide Receivers:** The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, leads the NFL this season in receiving yards (1056) and receiving TDs (12), while ranking third in receptions (73). He paced Cincinnati in all three of those categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons, and he is one of six players in league history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns. A constant downfield threat, Chase also has the NFL's most TD catches of 40 or more yards (17), 50 or more yards (13) and 60 or more yards (12) since he entered the league in 2021. He had two scoring grabs in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, with his first marking his 40th career receiving TD. He had a dominant performance in Week 10 at Baltimore in which he caught 11 passes for 264 yards and three TDs. It marked his second career game with 260 or more receiving yards and second game with 250 or more yards and three TDs — both of which are the most such games in NFL history. Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and his 4210 career receiving yards following that matchup went in as the fifth-most in NFL history through any player's first 50 appearances. Higgins is coming off a season-high 148 yards on nine catches and a TD in Week 11 against the Chargers. He has missed five games this season due to injuries — Weeks 1-2 due to a hamstring and Weeks 8-10 with a quadricep — but when healthy has contributed 38 catches for 489 yards and four TDs. He had two scores in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, marking his fifth career multi-TD game, then in Week 7 at Cleveland he turned a slant pass from Burrow into a 25-yard TD. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, Higgins has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then posted 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andre**

**Iosivas** has developed a connection with QB Joe Burrow, particularly in the low red zone. He has eight career TDs on just 35 total receptions, and six of those have come on Burrow passes from inside the opponents' 10-yard line. He had two scoring grabs in Week 2 at Kansas City, then the following week had another on a fourth-and-goal play against Washington. He caught his fourth TD of the year in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, finding the end zone on a 10-yard pass from Burrow just before halftime. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. **Trenton Irwin** spent his first three seasons with the Bengals (2019-21) primarily as a practice squad player and game day inactive, but over the past two-plus years he has emerged as a dependable option for Cincinnati's quarterbacks. After totaling just three receptions in those first three seasons, he has 46 catches for 601 yards and five TDs since the start of the 2022 campaign, including a career-high 25 grabs for 316 yards in '23. Though listed as a backup on the depth chart last season, he started five games and showed an ability to line up at multiple WR positions. Irwin has three catches for 15 yards in seven games played this season (two starts). Second-year pro **Charlie Jones** primarily contributes as a punt and kickoff returner, but he also has eight career catches for 69 yards as a reserve WR. He played in each of the first eight games this season, then missed the past three contests due to a groin injury. He spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals added another downfield threat in the third round of April's draft when they selected **Jermaine Burton** out of the University of Alabama. Burton has played in nine games this season and made his first career start in Week 10 at Baltimore. His first two career receptions went for over 40 yards — a 47-yarder in Week 2 at Kansas City and a 41-yarder in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia. He came through with a clutch third-down grab against the Ravens that helped set up a Bengals TD just before halftime. Burton led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while his 20.5 yards per catch led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally. He spent his first two collegiate seasons (2020-21) at the University of Georgia, then transferred to Alabama for the '22-23 campaigns. He also led the NFL this past preseason with 157 receiving yards. The Bengals added depth to their receiver room when they acquired **Isaiah Williams** on waivers from Detroit on Nov. 8. A rookie out of the University of Illinois, Williams originally signed with the Lions as a college free agent in May and played in two games earlier this season, totaling two catches for six yards while returning one kickoff for 36 yards. He earned first-team All-Big 10 honors last season at Illinois, when he led the conference during the regular season with 82 receptions and ranked second with 1055 receiving yards.

**Tight ends:** A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 72 career games (44 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of last season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 89 career receptions for 672 yards and four TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample caught four passes for 14 yards in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, including a two-yard TD reception on a third-and-goal play to finish off the Bengals' opening drive of the second half. The Bengals brought in a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last year. He has played in all 11 games in his debut Bengals season (three starts), and leads the team's tight ends in catches (34), receiving yards (383) and receiving TDs (two). He enjoyed perhaps his best day in stripes during the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, when he caught five passes for 100 yards and his first two TDs of the year. His second TD, a 47-yarder to help seal the win in the fourth quarter, was the second-longest reception of his career. That performance also marked his first 100-yard receiving game since Week 6 of the 2021 season. He played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted seven catches for 91 yards, then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, Gesicki challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. He topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** scored his first TD of the season in Week 10 at Baltimore, bringing in a three-yard pass late in the second quarter to give Cincinnati a halftime lead. He tied his career high with six receptions against the Ravens, and his 42 yards went in as the fifth-most in a game in his career. He played in his 50th career game in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and had two catches for 14 yards,

including an 11-yarder to convert a fourth down on the Bengals' first possession. Hudson began the 2023 campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster in November of last year and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in receptions (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played in 2023, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals selected **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round of this year's draft. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He has been inactive for each of the first 11 regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown. Fellow rookie **Cam Grandy** was signed to the active roster on Nov. 15 and saw limited action on offense and special teams in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. He made his pro debut as a standard practice squad elevation in Week 10 at Baltimore and recorded his first career reception (no gain). A product of Illinois State University, Grandy led all Missouri Valley Football Conference TEs with 63 catches for 612 yards and three TDs in 2023. He spent his first five collegiate seasons at Missouri Western State University, but only played in three, and recorded 57 receptions for 601 yards and six TDs in 31 games.

**Offensive linemen:** The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 47 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 3091 of a possible 3110 offensive snaps in that time (99.4 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who signed in 2023 and started 25 straight games to begin his Bengals career before missing the past three contests due to a knee/fibula injury. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with Baltimore, then played two years ('21-22) with Kansas City. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. **Cordell Volson** has started each of the Bengals' 47 games (including postseason) at LG since they took him in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. He has lined up for every offensive snap in that time, the only player on the team to do so. Though he has found his role in Cincinnati as the team's LG, he played at guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He was inactive for Cincinnati's first two regular-season games due to a pectoral injury sustained during preseason, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 and has started each of the past eight contests. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. G/OT **Cody Ford** has filled in for the injured Brown in the last three contests, starting at LOT for the first time in his career. A former college teammate of Brown's at the University of Oklahoma, Ford is a sixth-year pro who has played in 77 career games with 37 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG, two as a third TE and three at LOT. He signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and played in all 17 games last season,

utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The team's final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft, C **Matt Lee** was taken in the seventh round (237th overall) after playing in 51 games during his college career. He spent the first four years of his career (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16). Lee has contributed primarily on special teams through 11 games this season, but he also has lined up for 11 offensive snaps over the past five contests. The most recent addition to the O-Line is OT/G **Andrew Stueber**, who was signed off Atlanta's practice squad on Oct. 8. Stueber made his Bengals debut in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia and has seen limited action on offense and special teams over the past four games. A seventh-round pick of New England in 2022, he spent his rookie season on the Reserve/Non-Football Injury list, then was on the Patriots' practice squad in '23. He played in 34 games with 22 starts (20 at ROT, two at RG) during a five-year career (2017-21) at the University of Michigan.

**Defensive linemen:** Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who currently leads the NFL with 11.5 sacks through 12 weeks of regular-season play. He posted a career-high four sacks in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, which tied for the third-most in a game in team history and was the most since former DE Antwan Odom in 2009. A 2021 free agency acquisition of the Bengals, Hendrickson has led the team in sacks and earned a Pro Bowl nod in each of his three full seasons in Cincinnati. He posted a career-high 17.5 sacks last year, which tied for second in the league and went in as the second-most in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 64.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — his final season with New Orleans — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (69.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (68.0). On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has 38.5 career sacks, the fourth-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons, and his 58 total tackles in 2023 led all Bengals D-linemen. He has 37 total tackles through 11 games this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, and then a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone. He grabbed his first career INT in Week 7 at Cleveland on a tipped pass thrown by QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson, then recorded his second sack of the year when he forced a Thompson-Robinson fumble in Cleveland's backfield. Hubbard played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 10 at Baltimore. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 48 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 13 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 13 passes at the line of scrimmage. He sustained a hamstring injury in Week 2 at Kansas City that caused him to miss the next two games, but he returned to action in Week 5 and has started each of the past seven contests. He posted a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and he also deflected a pass by QB Daniel Jones that led to LB Germaine Pratt's INT in the first quarter. Hill is coming off three tackles in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. Ninth-year veteran DT **Sheldon Rankins** has played in seven games (all starts) in his first Bengals season, after joining the team as an unrestricted free agent during the spring. He was inactive for the Week 11 contest at the L.A. Chargers with an illness and missed Weeks 3-5 due to a hamstring injury, but when healthy has contributed 18 tackles with one sack. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, Rankins spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 30.5 career sacks and 44 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in any season of his career. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. He recorded his first sack of the 2024 season in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, taking down QB Justin Herbert for a 12-yard loss in the third quarter. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, Ossai has played in 41 career regular-season games and totaled 52 tackles with 5.5 sacks. He was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to

select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins recorded his first NFL sack and posted a career-best five total tackles in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas. He missed the first two games of the season due to a thumb injury, then made his pro debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. He made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' game-opening drive. Jenkins was a team captain at Michigan and earned second-team All-America honors last season, while helping lead the Wolverines to a national championship. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has recorded 12 tackles and a PD over the last seven games, after spending the first four weeks of the season on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last season, tallying 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons (2020-22) at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinnley Jackson**, who also missed the first four contests of this year with a knee injury, made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He has seen action on 127 defensive snaps over the past seven games, and recorded a season-best three tackles in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2024 out of Texas A&M, Jackson totaled 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks in 40 career games as an Aggie, and served as a captain in two seasons. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has played in four games as a rookie, with a season-high 13 defensive snaps in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention.

**Linebackers:** A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Logan Wilson** has developed into one of the NFL's top linebackers and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. Wilson ranks tied for sixth in the NFL this season with 104 tackles, and he recorded his first two career fumble recoveries in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas. His first forced fumble of the season came early in the fourth quarter of Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers and set up a game-tying TD drive for the Bengals. The team's starting LB tandem features Wilson and sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt**, who has set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons and has a knack for creating game-changing takeaways. Since the start of the 2021 season, he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 82 of 90 career regular-season games played, with a current streak of 72 consecutive starts (including postseason). His 97 total tackles through 11 games this season rank tied for 12th leaguewide, and he has contributed to three takeaways with a pair of fumble recoveries and an INT. Pratt was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career. Also wearing a captain's patch for the first time this year is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 65 games with five starts for the Bengals. He serves primarily as a core special teamer, but also has 19 tackles with two TFLs and two PDs this season as a rotational LB. He picked off Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City for his second career regular-season INT (first since 2020). He has lined up for a team-high 250 special teams snaps through 11 contests and has five ST tackles. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 36 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 36 career tackles and one PD in 49 games played. Bachie missed the Week 11 contest at the L.A. Chargers due to a hip injury. Among the most notable stories on Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27). He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final

two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for 249 special teams snaps through 11 regular-season games. He also has three defensive tackles, with two solo stops coming in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas.

**Cornerbacks:** Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzer with 11.5 career sacks. He has 44 total tackles in 10 games played this season, missing Week 5 due to a knee injury. He notched five stops in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants and broke up a pass on a crucial fourth-down play early in the second half. He had seven tackles in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, and tied a career-high with three TFLs. In 2023, Hilton recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 32 of 33 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. His 11 PDs this season lead the team and rank tied for sixth in the NFL, and he also has contributed 50 tackles and an INT. His pick was a highlight-reel one-handed grab on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City. He posted a season-best nine stops in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia, and was credited with a half-sack in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. Taylor-Britt missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice this year, **Josh Newton**, made the team out of training camp after recording nine tackles, two PDs and an INT in preseason. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of Newton after his name was called on the third day of the draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 68 tackles with 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to Texas Christian from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups. Newton played a season-high 51 defensive snaps in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, recording three tackles and a pair of PDs. He has lined up for 122 defensive snaps and 172 special teams snaps through 11 games this season. Second-year pro **DJ Ivey** made his season debut in Week 7 at Cleveland, after spending the first six games on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury. He sustained the injury in Week 15 of the 2023 campaign against Minnesota, ending a promising rookie campaign in which he carved out a role as a special teams contributor and reserve defensive back. A 2023 seventh-round pick out of the University of Miami (Fla.), Ivey earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and played in eight games last season. The most recent addition to the active roster is fourth-year pro **Marco Wilson**, who the Bengals acquired on waivers from New England on Nov. 19. A fourth-round draft pick of Arizona in 2021, Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons ('21-23) with the Cardinals before being waived and acquired by the Patriots last December. He suited up for 10 games with New England earlier this season, logging 15 tackles and a PD. In 54 total regular-season games (37 starts), he has recorded 174 tackles, 19 PDs, three INTs and three FFs.

**Safeties:** Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 48 tackles through 11 games this season, and grabbed his first INT of the season against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina, while his 32-yard return following the pick set up Cincinnati's first TD of the game. It marked his eighth career INT and his first since Week 2 of 2023. One of the headliners of Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who emerged as a ball-hawking safety in his final season with Baltimore. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 broke out with an AFC-leading seven INTs (second in NFL). He has 58 tackles through 11 games in his debut Bengals season, and has lined up for 729 of the team's 752 defensive snaps. Stone recorded a season-best nine stops in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, and contributed to a game-altering play early in the fourth quarter when he recovered a fumble deep in Bengals territory which set up a game-tying TD drive. It marked his second career fumble recovery. Stone's first INT as a Bengal came in Week 7, when he picked off QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson and returned it 49 yards in the fourth quarter. **Jordan Battle** is in his second pro season, after starting seven straight games at safety to close out his rookie year in 2023. He ranked fifth on the team in tackles last season with 69, while also contributing an INT, five PDs and two sacks. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, he was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Battle had a pick-six in the preseason finale against

Indianapolis, and has played 134 defensive snaps and 204 special teams snaps through 11 regular-season contests. He has recorded 14 tackles over his last three games, and posted a season-best seven stops in Week 10 at Baltimore. Third-year pro **Tyzen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading 10 special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. He finished last season with a team-leading eight special teams stops, despite missing the final 10 contests. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, Anderson sat out his entire rookie year due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Dajahn Anthony** made the Bengals' roster out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 11 defensive snaps and 111 special teams snaps in nine games played this season (inactive for Week 8 and Week 11). In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

**Special teams:** Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** ranks fourth on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (81.6 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times in his career. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history and the fourth-most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. McPherson's 28-yard FG midway through the second quarter in Week 3 vs. Washington marked his 100th career FG attempt, and his 84 made FGs to that point were the third-most in team history through a kicker's first 100 tries. He inked a three-year contract extension on

Aug. 18 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 381 attempts in 46 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through 11 games ranks sixth in the NFL in net punting average (44.1 net yards per punt; minimum 35 attempts) and eighth in gross average (50.3). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (min. four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. He had four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard lines in three consecutive games (Weeks 5-7), becoming the first Bengals punter ever to do so in three straight contests. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for Week 7, after returning the opening kickoff at Cleveland 100 yards for a TD. It marked the second time in team history that the Bengals scored a TD on the game's opening kick, and it was the longest KOR in the NFL this season. Jones earned the punt returner job early in his rookie season in 2023 and took command of that role in just his second game, when he returned a punt 81 yards for a TD in Week 5 against Baltimore. He has returned 14 punts this season for 99 yards, including a season-long 23-yarder against the Browns. Fifth-year WR **Trenton Irwin** has 21 career PRs for 185 yards (8.8 average), with eight returns for 56 yards coming over the past three games when Jones was out of the lineup due to injury. HBs **Chase Brown** and **Trayveon Williams** also have returned kickoffs this season. Brown is averaging 26.6 yards per return on seven attempts, with a long of 29 yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Williams served as the team's primary KOR over the past two-plus years and holds a career regular-season average of 22.5 yards on 33 returns.

QB Jake Browning passed for 227 yards and a TD in his first career start, but the Bengals were held to three points in the second half of a 16-10 home loss. Pittsburgh's offense totaled 421 net yards and scored on each of its final three possessions to build a two-score lead, after being limited to a FG until the late stages of the third quarter. Cincinnati pulled ahead 7-3 in the second quarter when HB Trayveon Williams' 46-yard kickoff return set up strong field position for Browning, who finished off the ensuing drive with a TD pass to TE Drew Sample. The Bengals opened the second half by marching into the red zone, but an INT by Steelers S Trenton Thompson led to a 14-play, 79-yard TD drive that put Pittsburgh back in front. The Bengals were forced to punt twice in the fourth quarter while the Steelers expanded their lead, before Cincinnati kicked a FG ahead of the two-minute warning to close its gap to six. With no timeouts remaining, the Bengals attempted an onside kick, but a Steelers recovery allowed Pittsburgh to kneel out the remaining clock. Cincinnati fell to 5-6, while Pittsburgh improved to 7-4.

The Steelers jumped out to a 24-0 halftime lead and never looked back to snap Cincinnati's three-game winning streak in a nationally televised contest. The Bengals drove into the red zone twice in the first half but came away with zero points, as QB Jake Browning threw an ill-advised INT and the offense later was stopped on fourth-and-one at the Pittsburgh five-yard line. Browning finished with 335 passing yards, including an 80-yard TD to WR Tee Higgins early in the third quarter, but was picked off three times. The Steelers totaled 397 offensive net yards, led by a 195-yard receiving game by WR George Pickens, who caught TD passes of 86 and 66 yards from QB Mason Rudolph. Pittsburgh found the end zone on three of its four first drives for a 24-0 halftime lead, as the Pickens 86-yard score on the Steelers' second play from scrimmage was followed in the second quarter by a pair of rushing TDs and a FG. Cincinnati fell to 8-7, while Pittsburgh improved to 8-7.

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. The Bengals stormed back from a 21-point deficit in the second half to tie the game, but the Chargers scored a TD with 18 seconds remaining to pull out the win. QB Justin Herbert helped L.A. build its lead with a 153.3 passer rating and two TD passes in the first half, while the Chargers' defense sacked Bengals QB Joe Burrow three times. Burrow responded in the second half with three TD passes in a span of less than nine minutes to help Cincinnati knot the score early in the fourth quarter. Two of his scoring passes were fourth-down throws to WRs Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins. The Bengals' offense crossed midfield on back-to-back possessions in the final quarter with a chance to take the lead, but K Evan McPherson missed a pair of FG attempts and the Chargers engineered an 84-yard drive to go back in front. Cincinnati fell to 4-7, while L.A. improved to 7-3.
