GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Kevin Harlan (play-by-play), Trent Green (analyst) and Melanie Collins (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals aim to snap a three-game losing skid when they host the New England Patriots at Paycor Stadium on Sunday.

Cincinnati is coming off a road loss at Pittsburgh in Week 11 to move to 3-7 on the season. While much of the game played out as a familiar low-scoring battle between two AFC North Division rivals, the Steelers pulled away with two defensive TDs in the second half. The turning point of the contest occurred late in the third quarter, when the Bengals were driving inside Pittsburgh territory while trailing 13-9. On a third-down play, Cincinnati QB Joe Flacco was hit while attempting a pass, and his throw was intercepted by Steelers S Kyle Dugger and returned 73 yards for a pick-six.

While a Bengals FG on the ensuing possession trimmed their deficit back to one score, the Steelers separated again with a lengthy TD drive and later returned a fumble to the end zone to put the game out of reach.

"You feel all the losses," said head coach Zac Taylor following the game. "They all eat at you. We're working like crazy to make sure that this doesn't happen. It happened today — it's disappointing. Our option is to come back tomorrow and keep fighting and find a way to get a win. We've got a red-hot team coming in here (in New England), and so that's what we're going to do. We're going to do everything we can to clean this up, correct the mistakes, get back to work and fight another week, and find a way to get a win."

As the Bengals now try to get in the win column for the first time since Week 7, they will lean on an offensive attack that has performed among the league's best since Flacco's arrival in early October. The 18th-year veteran, who Cincinnati acquired in a trade with Cleveland, ranks in the top five in the NFL in completions (135; second), TD passes (12; third) and passing yards (1453; fourth) since his first Bengals start in Week 6.

Flacco has built chemistry with several of the Bengals' top playmakers, including sixth-year WR Tee Higgins, who has at least one receiving TD in each of the past four games. Higgins additionally has found the end zone in each of his last nine games played at Paycor Stadium, and by doing so again on Sunday he would join former Minnesota WR Cris Carter (2000-01) as the only players in NFL history with a receiving TD in 10 consecutive home contests. Another offensive contributor who has seen their production skyrocket since the Flacco trade is HB Chase Brown, who has registered at least 100 yards from scrimmage in four straight games.

Protecting Flacco is an offensive line that has allowed just eight sacks over the past five games, which are tied for the third-fewest in the NFL since Week 6.

New England enters Sunday's matchup riding an eight-game win streak. The Patriots, whose 9-2 record is tied with Denver for the best in the NFL through 11 weeks of play, last suffered a loss on Sept. 21 against Pittsburgh.

The series: The series began at baseball's storied Fenway Park. In an American Football League game in 1968, the Boston Patriots beat the expansion

Bengals, 33-14. The Patriots lead 18-10 overall, with the Patriots holding a slight 8-7 edge in games played in Cincinnati.

Cincinnati's first victory in the series was a memorable one, as the 1970 team won 45-7 over Boston at Riverfront Stadium to clinch the AFC Central Division title. The Paul Brown-coached Bengals, in their third season, became at the time the youngest franchise ever to reach the playoffs.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have had announced attendance figures of 65,000 or more in 29 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That is the longest streak in team history, surpassing a previous span of 24 straight from 2005-07.

Each of the 15 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of this season was played in front of an announced crowd of 66,569, the fourth-largest figure on the list. Most of those fans were dressed in white apparel to accentuate the fourth annual "White Bengal" game at Paycor Stadium on Thursday Night Football.

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history.

Uniform watch: Cincinnati will wear black jerseys, white pants (orange stripes) and orange socks this week against New England. The Bengals have worn this combination 12 times since their uniform redesign prior to the 2021 season, compiling a 7-5 record in those games. The last time this combination was featured was in Cincinnati's Week 5 home contest against Detroit.

The Bengals' redesign in 2021 marked the team's first significant change in uniform since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets,

Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet six times and collected a 5-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance came in Week 7 of this season, when Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh at home on Thursday Night Football.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2025 season, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 474 career receptions, the sixth-most in team history and 33 shy of tying T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530) and Tyler Boyd (513) hold the top four spots on the team's career list. Chase in Week 4 at Denver surpassed WR Isaac Curtis (416) for seventh place and WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for sixth.

- Chase has 6286 career receiving yards, the sixth-most in team history and 412 shy of fifth-most, which is held by Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets surpassed WR Eddie Brown (6134) for sixth.

- Chase has 51 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and two shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.

- Chase has 23 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, the third-most in team history and eight shy of Johnson (31) for second. Green (33) holds the team record. Chase in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed Curtis (20) for third.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history and 1.5 shy of LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth.

DE/DT Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5) and DT Geno Atkins (75.5) hold the top three spots. Hendrickson in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth.

- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 513 career points, the sixth-most in team history and 36 shy of fifth-most, which is held by K Horst Muhlmann (549).

- McPherson has 109 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and 11 shy of Muhlmann (120) for fifth.

- McPherson has 186 career made PATs, the sixth-most in team history and three shy of Muhlmann (189) for fifth.

- McPherson has a career FG percentage of 82.0 (109 made/133 att.), the third-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Kickers Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

- P Ryan Rehkow has 38 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the fifth-most by a Bengals player since the stat began being tracked in 1976. Rehkow in Week 11 at Pittsburgh surpassed P Nick Harris (37) for fifth.

Records vs. Patriots: No individual or team regular-season Bengals or Patriots entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book.

Individually vs. Patriots: Here is a look at the statistics for current offensive players for the Bengals in Cincinnati games against New England:

- QB Joe Burrow (Reserve/Injured list): Two games; 61-of-81 passing for 539 yards, three TDs and two INTs (94.6 rating); Eight rushes for 20 yards (2.5-yard average).

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Two games; 14 receptions for 141 yards (10.1).

- HB Chase Brown: One game; Three rushes for 11 yards (3.7); three receptions for 12 yards (4.0).

- TE Mike Gesicki (Reserve/Injured list): One game; Three receptions for 18 yards (6.0).

- WR Tee Higgins: One game; Eight catches for 128 yards (16.0) and one TD.

- TE Tanner Hudson: One game; Two receptions for 18 yards (9.0).

- WR Andrei Iosivas: One game; Three receptions for 26 yards (8.7).

- WR Charlie Jones: One game; One reception for five yards.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor's system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team's per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the '15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor began coaching at Texas A&M University as an offensive graduate assistant and TE's coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during his College Station tenure.

Taylor played in college at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Mike Vrabel was named the 16th head coach in franchise history on Jan. 13, 2025. He is a three-time Super Bowl champion with New England as a player and was voted into the Patriots Hall of Fame in 2023.

Vrabel is the seventh individual to become the head coach for a franchise he once helped win a Super Bowl as a player and the only one with three Super Bowl wins. He is the second head coach for the Patriots that was formerly a Patriots player, and the sixth Patriots head coach to have played professional football.

Vrabel has 14 years of coaching experience, including 11 years in the NFL. He was the Tennessee Titans' head coach from 2018-23 and he led the Titans to two division titles and three playoff appearances during his six seasons in Nashville. In 2019, the Titans upset the Patriots in Foxborough in the wild card round, then defeated the No. 1 seed Ravens in Baltimore the following week to advance to the AFC Championship Game, where they lost to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs. In 2021, the Titans claimed the top seed in the AFC with a 12-5 record, earning Vrabel NFL Coach of the Year honors. With playoff appearances in 2019, '20 and '21, Vrabel became the sixth head coach in Oilers/Titans history to coach at least three playoff teams. The Titans won back-to-back AFC South titles in 2020 and '21. After six seasons as the head coach of the Titans, he spent the 2024 season with the Cleveland Browns as a coaching and personnel consultant.

Vrabel started his coaching career as the linebackers coach at Ohio State in 2011 and then served as the defensive line coach for the Buckeyes for two seasons ('12-13). In 2014, he was hired by the Houston Texans as linebackers coach (2014-16) and was later promoted to defensive coordinator for the Texans in '17.

Vrabel played as a defensive lineman for the Ohio State Buckeyes (1993-96). He earned back-to-back All-American honors and was twice named Big Ten Conference Defensive Lineman of the Year (1995 and '96). He was a third-round

draft pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers, for whom he played from 1997-2000, and he also played for the Patriots ('01-08) and the Kansas City Chiefs ('09-10). With the Patriots, he earned Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors in 2007.

Vrabel was born in Akron, Ohio on Aug. 4, 1975. He and his wife, Jennifer, have two sons, Tyler and Carter.

Taylor vs. Patriots: The Patriots lead, 2-1.

Taylor vs. Vrabel: Taylor leads, 3-1 (the record includes a divisional playoff win over the Tennessee Titans after the 2021 season).

Vrabel vs. Bengals: The Bengals lead, 3-1 (includes the 2021 season divisional playoff win).

BENGALS NOTES

Flacco through five starts: QB Joe Flacco, who Cincinnati acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7, has started the past five games for the Bengals. He has completed 135 of 213 passes (63.4 percent) for 1453 yards and 12 TDs with three INTs, good for a passer rating of 96.2

From his first Bengals start in Week 6 through his most recent outing in Week 11, Flacco ranks second in the NFL in completions, third in TD passes and fourth in passing yards, even with Cincinnati having a bye in Week 10. He is one of two QBs in NFL history with at least 125 completions, 1400 passing yards and 12 TD passes in his first five games with a team, alongside Drew Bledsoe with Buffalo in 2002.

Flacco's first start for Cincinnati came in Week 6 at Green Bay, just five days after joining the team. He finished the game with 219 passing yards, but the bulk of his production came in the second half, when he threw for 179 yards and two TDs. Both of his scoring passes came on fourth-down plays.

Flacco then faced a short week of preparation for the Week 7 contest against Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football. The 18th-year veteran shined under the Paycor Stadium lights, as he went 31 of 47 for 342 yards and three TDs with no turnovers. After the Steelers took the lead with 2:21 left in regulation, Flacco engineered an eight-play, 52-yard drive to set up the game-winning FG. He completed each of his three passing attempts on the drive for 61 yards, with the final pass being a 28-yard connection with WR Tee Higgins to get inside comfortable FG range.

With his effort against the Steelers, Flacco became the fourth QB in NFL history with at least 300 passing yards, three TD passes and zero INTs in a game after turning 40 years old. He joined Tom Brady (12 such games), Drew Brees (two) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre (two).

Flacco faced one of his former teams in the N.Y. Jets in Week 8, and tacked on 223 more passing yards with two TDs. His 44-yard scoring pass to Higgins in the second quarter marked his longest completion since Week 17 of last season, when he completed a 49-yarder while playing for Indianapolis.

Flacco threw for a career-high 470 passing yards and four TDs, along with his first two INTs as a Bengal, in Week 9 against Chicago. It marked the most passing yards by a QB over 40 years old in NFL history, and was the first time Flacco crossed the 400-yard passing threshold in his career.

The wrap on Flacco: In Week 11, QB Joe Flacco became the 17th QB in NFL history to start 200 regular-season games in his career. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history.

Now in his 18th NFL season, Flacco ranks in the top 25 in league history in career passing yards (14th; 47,965) and TD passes (21st; 271). He moved into 14th place on the league's all-time passing yardage list in the Bengals' Week 7 win over Pittsburgh, surpassing QBs Russell Wilson (46,921) and Fran Tarkenton (47,003).

Flacco originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent 11 seasons ('08-18) as the Ravens' starting QB. He then had stints with Denver (2019), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24).

Flacco also has played and started 16 postseason games, highlighted by a four-game run to help the Ravens win Super Bowl XLVII in the 2012 campaign. He won Super Bowl MVP honors after throwing three TD passes and posting a 124.2 passer rating in Baltimore's win over San Francisco.

In his first stint with Cleveland in 2023, Flacco stepped in as the Browns' starting QB for five games late in the year and helped lead them to a 4-1 record, which propelled them to a playoff berth. He averaged 323.2 passing yards and over two TDs per game in that stretch, and was named the NFL's Comeback

Player of the Year.

Flacco had started the Browns' first four games of this season, including the Week 1 contest against Cincinnati, and passed for 815 yards and two TDs with six INTs. He then was Active/DNP in Cleveland's fifth game as rookie Dillon Gabriel made his NFL debut.

Flacco's TD pass to WR Andrei Iosivas in Week 9 vs. Chicago marked the 71st player he has thrown at least one scoring pass to. That moved him ahead of former QB Vinny Testaverde for the fourth-most such players in NFL history.

Burrow's early 2025 totals: Sixth-year QB Joe Burrow started the first two games of the 2025 season before sustaining a toe injury in the second quarter of Week 2 vs. Jacksonville. He was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 16, and underwent surgery on Sept. 19. In his five-plus quarters of action, Burrow completed 21 of 36 passes for 189 yards and two TDs with no INTs.

Burrow played in his 70th career game in the season opener at Cleveland and went 14 of 23 for 113 yards, with a one-yard TD pass to TE Noah Fant to give Cincinnati the lead in the second quarter. Burrow's 1762 career completions at the end of the Browns game were the most by any QB in NFL history through their first 70 games, while his 141 TD passes ranked as the third-most and his 19,114 passing yards ranked fifth.

Burrow had completed seven of his 13 passing attempts for 76 yards against the Jaguars prior to his injury. He connected with WR Ja'Marr Chase for a four-yard TD on third-and-goal late in the opening quarter.

On Nov. 10, the Bengals advanced Burrow for a limited return to practice so he could begin progressing on-field activities.

Touchdown Tee: WR Tee Higgins capped off Cincinnati's first drive of Week 11 at Pittsburgh with a 28-yard TD reception. He now has at least one receiving TD in each of the last four games, marking the longest such streak of his career. He previously had a TD in three straight games played on two separate occasions last season, as he found the end zone in Weeks 7, 11 and 13, then again in Weeks 15-17.

Higgins additionally has at least one TD catch in each of his last nine games played at home, dating back to Week 5 of the 2024 season. He is the third player in NFL history with a receiving TD in nine consecutive home games played, alongside former Minnesota WR Cris Carter, who had a record 10-game streak spanning from the 2000-01 seasons, and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice, who compiled a nine-game streak during the 1989-90 campaigns.

Higgins last season totaled a career-high 10 receiving TDs, which tied for sixth-most in the NFL. He currently leads the Bengals with seven TD catches this season, tied for the third-most leaguewide. His 17 combined scoring receptions over the past two seasons rank as the fourth-most by any player, behind teammate Ja'Marr Chase (22), Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (20) and current L.A. Rams WR Davante Adams (18).

In addition to his scoring tally, Higgins ranks second on the Bengals this season in receiving yards (544) and third in receptions (35). His 15.5 yards per reception rank sixth in the NFL among players with at least 30 catches. After being limited to 220 receiving yards through the first six contests, he has totaled 324 over Cincinnati's past four games, good for an average of 81.0 yards per game in that span.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks tied for 11th in the league in receiving TDs (41) and 16th in receiving yards (5139). He also has played in seven postseason games for Cincinnati and has 457 receiving yards and three TDs.

Higgins reaches 5K yards: WR Tee Higgins led the Bengals with 121 yards on seven receptions in Week 9 vs. Chicago, and in the process surpassed 5000 career receiving yards. Playing his 79th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in Bengals history to reach that milestone.

After opening his career with a team-leading 908 receiving yards in his 2020 rookie campaign, Higgins surpassed the 1000-yard mark in consecutive seasons in '21 and '22. He had a career-high 1091 receiving yards in 2021, ranking 17th in the league that season, then followed up with 1029 in '22 (20th). He has played in just 12 games in each of the past two seasons, and registered 656 receiving yards in 2023 followed by 911 in '24. He hauled in a career-best 10 receiving TDs last year, which tied for sixth-most in the NFL.

Higgins re-signed with the Bengals in March on a four-year deal which keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2028 season.

Chase leads league in catches: After leading the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 receptions last season, WR Ja'Marr Chase once again is pacing the league with 79 catches in 2025. The last player to finish as the league leader in receptions in consecutive seasons was former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas in 2018 and '19.

Chase has totaled 10 or more catches in a game four times this season, including a stretch of three straight contests from Weeks 6-8. He brought in 10 receptions in Week 6 at Green Bay, followed up with a Bengals-record 16 in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, then logged 12 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. He became the first player in team history to register double-digit catches in three consecutive games.

In the Week 7 win over the Steelers, Chase broke his own previous Bengals single-game record of 15 receptions, which he amassed in Week 5 of the 2023 campaign at Arizona. He now owns the four highest single-game reception totals in team history, which also includes a 14-catch effort in Week 2 of this season against Jacksonville.

Chase's four career games with 14 or more receptions are tied with former Pittsburgh/New England/Tampa Bay WR Antonio Brown for the second-most such games in NFL history. Current L.A. Chargers WR Keenan Allen holds the league record with six such games in his career.

Chase, who is in his fifth pro season in 2025, additionally ranks third in the NFL with 861 receiving yards and has five receiving TDs (tied for 14th). He is one of six players in league history to reach the 1000-yard receiving mark in each of his first four seasons.

Brown does it all: HB Chase Brown recorded a season-high 127 yards from scrimmage in Week 11 at Pittsburgh, with 99 rushing yards on 18 carries and 28 receiving yards on six receptions. It marked his fourth consecutive game with 100 or more scrimmage yards, dating to the Week 7 home contest against the Steelers.

Brown is averaging 111.0 scrimmage yards per game since Week 7, the sixth-most among all NFL running backs in that span. He logged 100 yards from scrimmage in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, then followed up with 105 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and 112 in Week 9 vs. Chicago.

Brown's effort in Week 7 included a season-high 108 rushing yards on just 11 carries. His 9.8 yards per carry in that contest were a career high and remains the seventh-highest rushing average by any player in a game this season (minimum 10 carries). He reeled off his longest run of the season in the second quarter, a 37-yarder to kickstart a Bengals TD drive.

In addition to his 105 scrimmage yards against the Jets (73 rushing, 32 receiving), Brown scored both a rushing and receiving TD in the same game for the second time in his career. His first such performance was Week 15 of last season at Tennessee. His production in Week 9 against the Bears featured 75 receiving yards, his most in a game this season and second-most in his career behind an 80-yard output in Week 14 of the 2023 campaign vs. Indianapolis.

Brown's 99 rushing yards in Week 11 included a 35-yard scamper on the opening play from scrimmage in the second half, helping lead to a Bengals FG. His 127 scrimmage yards were the third-most in a game in his career.

Brown's four consecutive games with at least 100 scrimmage yards marks the second-longest streak of his career, behind a five-game stretch in Weeks 11-16 of last season. In Weeks 9-17 of the 2024 campaign, when he started each game and emerged as a key of the Bengals' offense, Brown ranked fourth in the NFL in scrimmage yards per game (116.3). He was one of two players in that span with at least 600 rushing yards and 250 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs. He also became the first Bengals player to record at least 90 scrimmage yards in eight straight games since former FB Boobie Clark in 1973.

Hendrickson cracks top five: With a team-leading four sacks through seven games played this season, DE Trey Hendrickson has improved his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 61.0. He surpassed former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth-most in Bengals history, and now is 1.5 shy of former LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. Hendrickson signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason.

Hendrickson, who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with the Bengals (2021-24), opened his Cincinnati tenure with 14.0 sacks in the '21 campaign, which led the team and ranked fifth in the NFL. He followed up with a team-high eight sacks in 2022.

Hendrickson posted 17.5 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 seasons, which are tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history behind former DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (the NFL began tracking sacks in '82, but the Bengals track the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder). He became the first Cincinnati player with double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81. Hendrickson also is just the fifth player in NFL history to post 17 or more sacks in back-to-back seasons.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson's 61.0 total sacks since joining the Bengals in the 2021 offseason are the third-most in the NFL behind Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (75.0) and Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (64.5).

Hendrickson also ranks third leaguewide in multi-sack games (16) since 2021, and is tied for third in forced fumbles (12). He improved both of those totals in Week 5 of this season against Detroit, when he logged two sacks including a strip-sack which was recovered by Cincinnati.

In 2024, Hendrickson became the first Bengals player to lead the league in sacks (17.5) since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982. He was named to the Associated Press All-Pro First Team for the first time in his career, and he finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year. Adding in his 17.5 sacks in 2023 and his four sacks this season, Hendrickson's 39.0 sacks since the start of the '23 campaign are second-most in the NFL behind Garrett (43.0).

Originally a third-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017, Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons ('17-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and totaled 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL that season.

Turner shuts it down: CB DJ Turner II's 14 PDs this season are tied for the most in the NFL and already mark a career high for the third-year pro. His previous high was eight PDs in the 2024 campaign.

Turner also has recorded his first two career INTs this season, with the first coming late in the fourth quarter of Week 1 at Cleveland to help the Bengals protect a one-point lead. His second pick occurred in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, when he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf in Cincinnati territory just before halftime.

In Week 6 at Green Bay, Turner notched a career-best five PDs. He became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph had five on Nov. 8, 2009, in a win over Baltimore. Turner also is one of three players in the NFL this season to record five PDs in a game, alongside Green Bay CB

Keisean Nixon in Week 2 and Philadelphia CB Quinyon Mitchell in Week 4. No player in the league had that many PDs in a single game last season.

Turner has played in all 10 games with nine starts this year, after missing the final six contests of the 2024 season due to a collarbone injury.

Charlie’s 98-yard dash: WR Charlie Jones got the Bengals’ Week 9 contest against Chicago underway with a 98-yard return for a TD on the game’s opening kickoff. It marked his second career TD on a KOR, following a 100-yard return on the opening kickoff in Week 7 of the 2024 season at Cleveland. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the 14th TD on a KOR in Bengals history.
- It was the third time in team history (and first in a home game) that the Bengals returned the game’s opening kickoff for a TD. The other instances were Jones’ 2024 runback against the Browns, and former S Brandon Wilson’s 92-yarder on Oct. 13, 2019 at Baltimore.
- It tied for the sixth-longest KOR in team history, alongside a 98-yard TD return by former HB Stanford Jennings on Nov. 13, 1988 at Kansas City.
- Jones became the third player in team history with multiple KORs for a TD in his Bengals career, joining Wilson and former S/CB Tremaine Mack, who both also had two.
- Jones became the first player in team history with multiple KORs of 98 or more yards.
- Jones also had an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 of the 2023 season vs. Baltimore. He joined former CB Lemar Parrish as the only players in Bengals history with three or more returns for TDs. Parrish had four TDs on PRs and one on a KOR.
- Jones’ return against the Bears was the longest KOR in the NFL this season at the time, and now is tied for the second-longest behind N.Y. Jets RB Kene Nwangwu’s 99-yarder in Week 10.
- According to the NFL’s Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players’ speeds using GPS, Jones’ top speed on the return was 21.78 mph, making him the ninth-fastest ball carrier in the league this season.

Team record for KOR yards: Cincinnati totaled 297 yards on eight kickoff returns in Week 9 vs. Chicago, marking the most KOR yards in a single game in team history. The previous record was 244 KOR yards on Nov. 10, 2002 against Baltimore.

The Bengals got things rolling with WR Charlie Jones’ 98-yard return for a TD on the game’s opening kickoff. On the next kickoff Cincinnati received later in the first quarter, HB Samaje Perine took it for 38 yards, the second-longest return of his career.

Late in the second quarter, rookie HB Tahj Brooks ran back his longest career return, a 31-yarder to set up a Bengals go-ahead TD drive. Jones then had a 30-yard KOR in the fourth quarter, giving Cincinnati its fourth return of 30 or more yards.

The Bengals’ average of 37.1 yards per KOR was the fifth-highest in a game in team history (minimum five returns). The last time Cincinnati averaged 35 or more yards on at least five KORs was on Nov. 15, 2009, when it posted a 41.2-yard average (five KORs for 206 yards).

Money Mac from deep: Of K Evan McPherson’s 109 career made FGs, 25 have been from a distance of 50 or more yards. That marks the most such FGs in a career in Bengals history, and is tied for the eighth-most in the NFL since McPherson entered the league as a fifth-round pick of Cincinnati in 2021.

McPherson has made one kick from at least 50 yards this season, on an exact 50-yarder in Week 5 vs. Detroit. The following week at Green Bay, he made his 100th career FG on a 45-yarder in the fourth quarter. Playing in his 67th career regular-season game, McPherson became the fifth-fastest kicker in Bengals history to reach the century mark, behind only Doug Pelfrey (59 games), Shayne Graham (62), Mike Nugent (62) and Horst Muhlmann (65).

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 109 of 133 FG attempts, good for the third-highest percentage in team history (82.0). He has made each of his last 15 attempts from inside of 50 yards, including a 43- and 48-yarder in windy

conditions in Week 11 at Pittsburgh.

Referred to by fans as “Money Mac,” McPherson also is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati’s all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning “walk-off” FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson owns five of the seven longest made kicks in Bengals history, led by a career-long 59-yarder that he booted in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh. His season long in 2024 was a 56-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, which at the time tied for the fifth-longest in team history (now tied for sixth).

Rehkwow’s ranks: P Ryan Rehkwow has punted 41 times for 2177 yards this season, with 13 punts downed inside the opponent’s 20-yard line. He ranks first in the NFL in gross punting average (53.1 per punt) and tied for seventh in net average (42.9).

As a rookie in 2024, Rehkwow set Bengals single-season records for gross punting average (49.11 yards) and net average (42.92 yards). Both figures surpassed former P Kevin Huber’s previous records set in the 2020 season. Rehkwow also had 25 inside-20 punts last year compared to five touchbacks.

After signing with the Bengals as a free agent on the third day of training camp in 2024, Rehkwow made his NFL debut in Week 1 of last season against New England. That day, he punted four times for 258 yards, setting an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per attempt (minimum four punts). The previous league record belonged to Las Vegas P AJ Cole, who had a 63.60-yard average in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. Rehkwow’s performance in the 2024 opener also included the longest punt in Bengals history, an 80-yarder kicked from his own 20-yard line to the Patriots’ end zone.

Rehkwow finished his 2024 rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average.

In Week 11 of this season at Pittsburgh, Rehkwow delivered a 55-yard punt that was returned to the Steelers’ seven-yard line. It marked Rehkwow’s 38th career inside-20 punt, which surpassed former P Nick Harris (37) for the fifth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976.

Four Bengals listed on “Top 100”: For the 15th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on social media and NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by four players on the 2025 list — WR Ja’Marr Chase (No. 4), QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 14) and WR Tee Higgins (No. 77). It marked the first appearance on the list in Higgins’ career, the fourth overall for Burrow and Chase, and the fifth for Hendrickson.

Chase’s ranking at No. 4 is the highest by a Bengals player since the “Top 100” debuted in 2011. The previous highest ranking was No. 6, which was Burrow’s position on the 2023 list. Hendrickson’s spot at No. 14 is his personal highest, substantially ahead of his previous best ranking of No. 77 (2021 list).

This marks the third time in the history of the “Top 100” in which four or more Bengals players were featured. Cincinnati had a record seven players on the 2016 list, then landed four on the ’22 edition.

Lapham, Parrish enter Bengals Ring of Honor: A pair of Bengals legends in former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish were inducted into the team’s Ring of Honor at halftime of Cincinnati’s Week 8 game against the N.Y. Jets. They became the 11th and 12th members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise’s storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who is in his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team’s most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive lineman who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team’s starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career, Lapham moved into the team’s radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as “Mr. Bengal,” he has been the team’s radio analyst

since 1986.

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

Ring of Honor inductees have been voted in each offseason since 2021 by Bengals Season Ticket Members. Lapham and Parrish joined previous inductees QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.9 years ... Cincinnati's win over Jacksonville in Week 2 of this season was the 250th home victory in team history (regular season and postseason combined) ... The Bengals have netted 22 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, the third-most weekly awards by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who is in his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is QB Joe Flacco, who is 40 (born Jan. 16, 1985) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who is 22 (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the active roster is HB Tahj Brooks, who is listed at 5-9 ... Brown and Mims also are tied for the heaviest player on the active roster, both listed at 350 pounds ... There is a tie for lightest player on the active roster between K Evan McPherson and CB DJ Turner II, who both are listed at 185 pounds.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Eighteenth-year veteran **Joe Flacco** has started the past five games for the Bengals after being acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7. His totals for Cincinnati include 135 completions on 213 passing attempts (64.3 percent) for 1453 yards and 12 TDs with three INTs. Since his first Bengals start in Week 6, he ranks second in the NFL in completions, third in TD passes and fourth in passing yards. He has recorded over 300 passing yards twice, including a career-high 470 in Week 9 vs. Chicago. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. He began the season starting the Browns' first four games, and in that stretch he passed for 815 yards and a two-to-six TD-INT ratio. He originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent his first 11 seasons with the Ravens, before stints with Denver ('19), the N.Y. Jets ('20-'22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24). He won Super Bowl MVP honors after helping lead Baltimore to a title in the 2012 campaign, and in '23 he was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after helping steer the Browns to a playoff berth. Backup QB **Jake Browning** started three games for Cincinnati this season prior to Flacco's acquisition. He stepped into action following Joe Burrow's injury in Week 2 against Jacksonville, and in that game he passed for 241 yards and scored the game-winning TD on a QB sneak with 18 seconds remaining. Browning's totals on the season include 80 completions on 124 attempts (64.5 percent) for 757 yards and six TDs with eight INTs. He had a previous stint as the Bengals' starter in 2023, as he started the final seven games of that regular season and piloted the team to a 4-3 record. In that stretch, he ranked second in the NFL in passing yards (1868), while completing 71.5 percent of his attempts and throwing 11 TDs. He then spent the entire 2024 campaign as Cincinnati's second-string QB. He spent his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-'22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-'20). Cincinnati native **Sean Clifford** was signed to the active roster in late October, after spending the previous six games on the Bengals' practice squad. A former standout at local St. Xavier High School, Clifford entered the NFL as a fifth-round pick of Green Bay in 2023 and saw action in two regular-season contests his rookie year. He then spent the 2024 campaign on the Packers' practice squad. He played six collegiate seasons at Penn State (2017-'22), where he set program records for career passing yards (10,661), passing TDs (86), completion percentage (61.4) and wins as a starting QB (32).

Running backs: HB **Chase Brown** is in his third pro season and first as Cincinnati's full-time primary running back. A dynamic all-around threat, he has totaled 100 or more yards from scrimmage in each of the last four games, and his 111.0 scrimmage yards per contest since Week 7 are the sixth-most by any NFL running back. He is coming off a season-high 127 scrimmage yards in Week 11 at Pittsburgh (99 rushing, 28 receiving). Brown took over as the team's starting HB midway through the 2024 season, and in Weeks 9-17 of last year he ranked fourth in the NFL in scrimmage yards per game (116.3). He finished last season with 990 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs on 229 carries, along with 54 receptions for 360 yards and four TDs. His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at the University of Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB **Samaje Perine**. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-'22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. So far in 2025, Perine has 198 rushing yards and 30 receiving yards, and in Week 7 he surpassed 2000 career rushing yards. His season-high 94 rushing yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets were the fifth-most in any game of his career, and the most since Week 13 of the 2022 campaign.

Some of his top moments with the Bengals came during the team's postseason runs following the 2021 and '22 campaigns, including a 41-yard receiving TD in the '21 AFC Championship win at Kansas City. Rookie HB **Tahj Brooks** was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of this year's draft, after compiling a record-setting career at Texas Tech University. Brooks finished his time in Lubbock with the most rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23) in program history. He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back). He has seen action primarily on special teams through his first 10 NFL games, but has seven carries for 23 yards offensively.

Wide receivers: Sixth-year pro **Tee Higgins** leads the Bengals with seven receiving TDs this season while ranking second in receiving yards (544) and third in receptions (35). Since entering the league as a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, he ranks tied for 11th in the NFL in TD catches (41) and 16th in receiving yards (5139). He has scored a receiving TD in each of his last nine games played at Paycor Stadium, joining Hall of Famers Cris Carter and Jerry Rice as the only players in NFL history with a TD catch in nine straight home contests. In Week 9 vs. Chicago, Higgins registered season highs in catches (seven) and yards (121), and during that game he reached 5000 career receiving yards. His seven TD grabs this year currently are tied for third in the NFL, and are three shy of his career-high 10 recorded last season. **Andre Iosivas** is in his third NFL season and continues to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He brought in 36 catches for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024, following 116 yards and four TDs as a rookie in '23. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as each of his 11 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. Iosivas has 19 catches for 256 yards and one TD this season, including a career-high 82 yards in Week 5 vs. Detroit. He hauled in his first TD of the year in Week 9 vs. Chicago, a nine-yarder from Flacco to complete a 15-point comeback late in the fourth quarter. Iosivas was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he earned All-America honors as a heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. Fellow third-year receiver **Charlie Jones** has served as the Bengals' primary punt returner since being selected in the fourth round of the 2023 draft, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. In 2022, his final collegiate season which he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Among the top offensive performers throughout this past training camp and preseason was WR **Mitch Tinsley**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster after signing a Reserve/Future contract with Cincinnati in February. Originally a college free agent signee of Washington in 2023, Tinsley played in two games as a rookie for the Commanders (no statistics), then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. He faced his former team in the Bengals' second preseason game at Washington and posted five catches for 73 yards and two highlight-reel TDs. He made the highlight tapes once again with his first career reception in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, a one-handed TD grab on a 13-yard pass from Browning. He has totaled three catches for 49 yards this season. Tinsley finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-'19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-'21). Second-year WR **Jermaine Burton** possesses the ability to stretch defensive coverages, as two of his four catches as a rookie last season went for over 40 yards. He also contributed in the kickoff return game following Jones' injury last year. Burton began his collegiate career at the University of Georgia (2020-'21), then

transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two seasons ('22-23) before being selected by the Bengals in the third round of the '24 NFL Draft. In 2023, his final year with the Crimson Tide, he led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally in yards per reception (20.5). Fifth-year WR **Ja'Marr Chase** leads the NFL this season with 79 receptions while ranking third with 861 receiving yards. Chase additionally has five receiving TDs, the second-most on the team behind Higgins and tied for the 14th-most in the NFL.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 88 career regular-season games with 58 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season and has started in 31 of his last 36 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 105 career receptions for 754 yards and five TDs. He missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned at the start of the '23 season and has suited up for each of Cincinnati's last 41 games. Now in his seventh season, Sample is the Bengals' longest-tenured player. **Noah Fant** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late July of this year and quickly built a rapport with Cincinnati's quarterbacks. He has 30 catches for 256 yards and three TDs in nine games played, with his latest scoring grab coming on a 23-yard pass from Flacco in Week 9 vs. Chicago during the fourth-quarter comeback effort. A former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), Fant spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21) and three with Seattle ('22-24). He has played in 104 career games with 88 starts, and his career totals include 330 receptions for 3561 yards and 18 TDs. After being held off the stat sheet through the first five games of this season, sixth-year TE **Tanner Hudson** scored a TD on his first catch of the year, a two-yarder from Flacco in Week 6 at Green Bay. He now has 10 receptions for 83 yards over his last four games, including a season-high 42 yards in Week 9 vs. Chicago. He enjoyed his best statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with Cincinnati, as he posted career highs in catches (39) and yards (352) in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four postseason games. **Cam Grandy** began his 2024 rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, then signed to the active roster midway through the year and went on to play in eight games with six starts. He has six catches for 34 yards in his career, and this season has seen action in three contests with one start. Grandy was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University.

Offensive linemen: Headlining the Bengals' offensive line room is four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started all 37 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three NFL seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore and then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 33 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 80 regular-season games played. He has played all 621 offensive snaps through Cincinnati's first 10 games this season. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who is in his fourth season with the Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his four years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 63 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.5 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span (4135 of 4154). Off the field, he was the team's 2023 nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award, honored for his charitable work with the Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. The starting ROT is second-year pro **Amarius Mims**, who was Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2024 (No. 18 overall). Mims began his rookie season in a reserve role but has started 23 of his last 24 games played. Notably, Mims' primary assignment in both games against Pittsburgh was All-Pro OLB T.J. Watt, who Mims helped limit to just two total tackles and a half-sack. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Brown as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. Rookie **Jalen Rivers** has started the past seven games at RG, lining up for 434 of a possible 445 offensive snaps in that stretch. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April, he boasted a proven ability to play at both tackle and guard spots during his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.). He was

the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two seasons, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. He suited up for 38 total games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) at Miami. Fellow rookie **Dylan Fairchild** was taken in the third round of this year's draft and started at LG in each of the first five games of the season, before missing the Week 6 contest at Green Bay due to a knee injury. He then was active/DNP in Week 7, and returned to the starting lineup in Week 8. In 2024, his final season at the University of Georgia, he earned second-team All-America honors while blocking for a Bulldogs offense that ranked third in the Southeastern Conference in net passing yards per game (281.0). In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., Fairchild was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. G/C **Lucas Patrick**, who started this year's opener at RG, was sidelined for six games due to a calf injury sustained at Cleveland. He was returned to the active roster from the Reserve/Injured list in Week 7, then made his return to game action in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. Patrick joined the Bengals in this year's free agency period, after spending previous seasons with Green Bay (2016-21), Chicago ('22-23) and New Orleans ('24). He has played in 110 career regular-season games, and his 65 total starts have included 28 at center, 19 at LG and 18 at RG. G **Dalton Risner** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late August, and quickly was thrust into action as he entered the season opener at Cleveland in the first half following Patrick's injury. Since then, he's been a versatile asset in the interior offensive line, appearing in seven games with four starts and playing substantial snaps at both guard positions. Risner was a second-round draft pick of Denver in 2019 and spent his first four pro seasons ('19-22) with the Broncos, before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 94 career regular-season games with 85 starts — 75 at LG and 10 at RG. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT **Cody Ford**, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. He has played 19 offensive snaps and 42 special teams snaps through 10 games this season. Ford was college teammates with Brown at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17. C **Matt Lee** is in his second pro season with the Bengals, after seeing action in all 17 games in 2024 as a reserve O-lineman and special teams contributor. He has played in five contests this season, lining up for 16 special teams snaps, but was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Oct. 28. Lee was a seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, following a five-year college career (2019-23) that saw him go from the University of Central Florida ('19-22) to Miami (Fla.) for his final season. He garnered second-team All-ACC honors in his lone season at Miami.

Defensive linemen: Ninth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson** has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with Cincinnati (2021-24) since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in '21. He recorded 17.5 sacks in each of the past two seasons, with last year's total leading the NFL. He was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press in 2024 and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year. Since joining the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason, he ranks third in the NFL in sacks (61.0) and tied for third in forced fumbles (12). He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of New Orleans in 2017 and spent his first four seasons ('17-20) with the Saints. Hendrickson has a team-leading four sacks in seven games played this season. He has been inactive for three contests and left the Week 8 game early due to a hip injury. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 64 games played, including six postseason contests. A productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 18 sacks as a Bengal while also batting down/tipping 13 passes. He leads the team's defensive line with 38 tackles this season, including two sacks and three TFLs. He notched his second sack of the season in Week 9 vs. Chicago, bringing down QB Caleb Williams for a seven-yard loss. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.**, who joined the Bengals after spending his first four pro seasons (2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 78 regular-season games and totaled 166 tackles, seven TFLs, two sacks and four PDs. He made his first career start in the 2022 season finale and has started each of his last 45 games played. Slaton has logged 33 tackles through his first 10 games with Cincinnati, including a season-high eight in Week 5 vs. Detroit which also marked the second-most in a game in his career. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, is coming off perhaps the best performance of his young career in Week 11 at Pittsburgh, as he notched a

career-high seven tackles and sacked QB Aaron Rodgers for an 11-yard loss. He now is up to 28 tackles and 2.5 sacks through 10 games this season, with 13 stops coming over the past two contests. Murphy missed the early part of the 2024 season due to a knee injury, but returned to the lineup last October and has since played in 23 straight contests. In 40 career games, he has 68 tackles with six TFLs and 5.5 sacks. Murphy was a first-team All-ACC pick in his final season at Clemson University, where he amassed 17.5 career sacks in 38 games for the Tigers. DE **Joseph Ossai** has three sacks through the first 10 games of this season, including a nine-yard takedown of Lions QB Jared Goff in Week 5. He now has eight sacks over his last 17 games played dating back to Week 11 of the 2024 campaign. Originally a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, he missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just three games in the past three-plus seasons. He has 12.5 sacks and 12 TFLs in 57 career games (eight starts). Ossai was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. Second-year DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** got in the sack column for the first time this season in Week 3 at Minnesota, notching 1.5 in the first half of that contest. A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, Jenkins played in 15 games with nine starts as a rookie last year. He logged 31 tackles with three sacks last season, and has recorded 26 stops (13 solos) and two TFLs through 10 games played this year. In his final season at the University of Michigan in 2023, he earned second-team All-America honors and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., was a four-time Pro Bowler during his 10-year playing career (2001-10) as a DT for Carolina and the N.Y. Jets. Fifth-year DE **Cam Sample** made his return to the field at the start of this season after missing the entire 2024 campaign due to an Achilles injury. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 56 career games as a rotational lineman and has 77 tackles with five sacks. He has played in nine games this season and has nine tackles with one TFL. He was inactive in Week 8 due to a knee injury. DT **McKinnley Jackson**, a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, has seen action in two games this season after playing in 13 contests as a rookie last year. He contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF in his rookie campaign, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He was a two-time team captain at Texas A&M, where he played in 40 career games. DE **Cedric Johnson**, a sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, spent the first eight games of this season on the Reserve/Injured list due to a calf injury, then made his season debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago. He has logged four tackles through two games played. As a rookie last season, he appeared in nine games and logged six tackles with one sack. The Bengals acquired DT **Jordan Jefferson** on waivers from San Francisco prior to Week 5. Originally a fourth-round draft pick of Jacksonville in 2024, he saw limited action for the Jaguars (2024) and 49ers ('25) before arriving in Cincinnati. Jefferson made his Bengals debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago, then was active/DNP in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. Jefferson finished his college career at Louisiana State in 2023, following four seasons ('19-22) at West Virginia University.

Linebackers: Rookie LB **Demetrius Knight Jr.** was selected by the Bengals in the second round of this year's draft and has started eight of his first 10 career games. His 70 tackles rank second among all NFL rookies this season and leads Cincinnati's LBs. He also has five PDs and an INT, with his first career pick coming on Monday Night Football in Week 4 at Denver. He has registered 10 or more tackles in three games this season, led a career-best 12 stops in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. Knight shot up draft boards following a breakout season at the University of South Carolina in 2024, in which he played in 13 games and ranked second on the Gamecocks with 82 tackles. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. He was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB early in his college career. Fellow rookie **Barrett Carter** has seen action in all 10 games and started each of the last five contests. He has 58 tackles on the year, the fourth-most among all rookies, and has reached double-digits in three games. His top statistical performance came in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets, when he tallied career highs in total tackles (12) and solo stops (eight). Cincinnati's fourth-round draft pick this past April, Carter put together a decorated final season at Clemson University in 2024, as he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC pick, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). Eighth-year LB **Oren Burks** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. He was a key performer for the Eagles during their postseason run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23.

He has played in all 10 games with five starts for the Bengals this season and has 26 total tackles with one TFL, one PD and one FF. He is coming off a season-high eight tackles in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. LB **Joe Giles-Harris** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in April, after spending one week on the team's practice last season. In his NFL career, he has seen action in 25 games, totaling 20 tackles, one sack and 14 special teams stops. Giles-Harris was originally a college free agent signee of the Jaguars in 2019, and had stints with Jacksonville (2019-20, '24), Buffalo ('21-22) and New England ('23-24). He made his 2025 season debut in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and has seen action in three games this season, recording four special teams tackles. Fourth-year LB **Brian Asamoah II** was signed to the active roster on Nov. 10, after joining the Bengals' practice squad on Oct. 30. He has played in the last two games for Cincinnati, seeing action on 33 special teams snaps. He spent his first three pro seasons (2022-24) with Minnesota, where he totaled 20 defensive tackles, two FFs and one FR in 46 games played, then was on Las Vegas' practice squad to begin this season.

Cornerbacks: Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2022, **Dax Hill** spent his first two seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. He started the first five games of last season at CB, then suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 5. He returned to full participation this past training camp and has started all 10 games this season. He leads the team's CBs with 61 tackles (39 solos), including two TFLs, while also recording three PDs and an INT. A natural athlete who lined up at several positions in the secondary during his career at the University of Michigan (2019-21), Hill primarily contributed on special teams throughout his 2022 rookie season before starting all 17 contests at safety in '23. CB **DJ Turner II** is enjoying a breakout campaign in his third pro season, as he currently is tied for the league lead with a career-high 14 PDs. Five of those were recorded in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph in 2009. After missing the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, Turner opened this year with his first career INT to help seal the Week 1 win at Cleveland late in the fourth quarter. He then collected his second pick of the year in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. Turner originally was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2023 and has played in 38 career games with 27 starts. He was a teammate of Hill's at Michigan, and ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine (4.26 seconds). Cincinnati's second-round draft choice in 2022 was **Cam Taylor-Britt**, who has played in 47 regular-season games with 40 starts in his career. He had a career-high 16 PDs in 2024, which led the Bengals and tied for fifth-most in the NFL, along with three INTs. He broke out during the 2023 campaign with four picks (tied for seventh in NFL) and 11 PDs in just 12 games played. Taylor-Britt has played in eight games this season and posted 21 tackles along with five PDs, but left the Week 11 contest at Pittsburgh in the second quarter due to a foot injury. CB **Josh Newton**, who the Bengals selected in the fifth round of the 2024 draft, earned a roster spot out of his rookie training camp and has played in 27 consecutive games to begin his career. He was thrust into the starting lineup last season following Turner's shoulder injury and started the final six contests, and that stretch included his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee. He has started two contests this season and has 11 total tackles (nine solos) along with a PD. Newton spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. The Bengals acquired **Marco Wilson** on waivers from New England last November, adding depth and experience to the CB room. Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons (2021-23) with Arizona, before being waived by the Cardinals and signed by the Patriots in December of '23. He has played in 63 career regular-season games with 37 starts, and his career totals include 20 PDs and three INTs. He played in each of Cincinnati's final six games last season, and made his 2025 debut in Week 3 at Minnesota. He has recorded two tackles and a special teams stop in three games played this season. **DJ Ivey** made his return midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals, he carved out a role on special teams and showed flashes on defense prior to the injury. He played in 11 games last season and has seen action in all 10 contests this year. He has five special teams tackles this season, and sealed the Week 7 win over Pittsburgh when he knocked down a Hail Mary attempt as time expired.

Safeties: **Geno Stone** has started all 27 games he has played in for the Bengals since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason. He led Cincinnati with four INTs last year (tied for 10th in NFL), which included a stretch of three straight games with a pick from Weeks 14-16. He recorded his first pick of this season in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he ended the Packers' opening drive by intercepting QB Jordan Love inside the red zone. Stone spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the

AFC. His 12 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the fourth-most in the NFL. He has 66 tackles, including two TFLs and one sack, while also recording two PDs through 10 games this season. His fellow starting safety, **Jordan Battle**, leads the team with three INTs. His first two INTs came in the first two games of the season, as he became the first Bengals player to start a year with picks in back-to-back games since former CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. Battle leads the team in tackles with 75 this season, highlighted by a career-best 12 stops in the opener at Cleveland. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, he has played in 44 career games (23 starts) and has 197 tackles along with five picks. He was a team captain and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). Fourth-year pro **Tylen Anderson** is a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two seasons, with eight in 2023 followed by 11 in '24, and his team-leading 14 ST stops this season are tied for fifth-most in the NFL. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. **PJ Jules** cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. Jules led the Bengals with 10 solo tackles this past preseason. He has 11 special teams tackles and two defensive stops, including a TFL, through 10 regular-season games played.

Special teams: A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, **K Evan McPherson** owns the third-highest career FG percentage in team history (82.0). He is 15-for-18 on FG attempts and a perfect 23-for-23 on PATs this season. He matched his single-game career high with four FGs in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, which included a 36-yard game-winner with seven seconds left. He has 25 career made FGs from 50 or more yards, the most in Bengals history and

tied for the eighth-most in the NFL since the start of his 2021 rookie season. McPherson has been operating at full health through the first 10 games of 2025, after missing the final five contests of last season due to a groin injury. Second-year P **Ryan Rehkow** compiled a record-setting rookie season in 2024 that saw him set Bengals single-season marks for gross punting average (49.11 yards per punt) and net average (42.92). His net average ranked sixth among all NFL punters last year, while his gross ranked ninth (both led all rookies). He was named to the 2024 Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team. In his career debut in the 2024 opener against New England, he set an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per punt (four punts for 258 yards). This season, he leads the NFL in gross average (53.1 yards) and is tied for seventh in net average (42.9). Rookie **William Wagner** earned the role as the Bengals' long snapper coming out of this past training camp, and through his first 10 career games he has recorded 82 snaps without an unplayable delivery. He spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannelly Award (nation's top LS). WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. In Week 9 vs. Chicago, he ran back the opening kickoff 98 yards for a TD and finished the day with a career-best 179 yards on four KORs. It marked his third career TD on a return, as he previously found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of 2023 vs. Baltimore, and had a 100-yard KOR in Week 7 of '24 at Cleveland. He is one of two players in Bengals history with a TD via both kickoff and punt return, alongside former CB Lemar Parrish. Jones has 38 KORs for 1054 yards (27.7 average) in his career, while also contributing 46 PRs for 441 yards (9.58). Also in the mix to return kickoffs and punts is second-year WR **Jermaine Burton**, who took over KOR responsibilities late last season following an injury to Jones. Burton had 13 KORs for 378 yards in 2024 (29.1 average), including two 38-yarders. He logged four KORs for 84 yards this past preseason, as well as two PRs for 35 yards. HB **Samaje Perine** has returned 15 kickoffs this season for 381 yards (25.4), including a season-long 38-yarder in Week 9 vs. Chicago. While playing for Kansas City last season, he had five KORs for 163 yards (32.6).

Cincinnati Bengals 22, New England Patriots 18 Saturday, Dec. 24, 2022 at Gillette Stadium

The Patriots stormed back from a 22-0 halftime deficit and were driving to take the lead with one minute remaining, but S Vonn Bell forced a fumble that was recovered by DT B.J. Hill to help Cincinnati win its seventh straight. The Bengals recorded 303 offensive net yards in the first half to build their lead, with QB Joe Burrow throwing for 284 yards and three TDs. Burrow finished the day with a career-high 40 completions for 375 yards, and connected with eight different pass catchers. WR Tee Higgins contributed five catches for 128 yards and capped off the game's opening drive with a TD, while WR Trenton Irwin added a pair of TD receptions. New England's comeback began with a 69-yard pick-six by CB Marcus Jones in the third quarter, Burrow's second INT of the afternoon. Patriots QB Mac Jones threw two TD passes in the fourth, including a 48-yarder that was batted into the hands of WR Jakobi Meyers to make it a one-score game. New England had one last chance following the fumble, but could not advance past its own 39-yard line as the Bengals' defense stood tall. Cincinnati improved to 11-4, while New England fell to 7-8.

2024 SEASON WEEK 1, GAME 1

New England Patriots 16, Cincinnati Bengals 10 Sunday, Sept. 8, 2024 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

Cincinnati Bengals 17, Cleveland Browns 16 Sunday, Sept. 7, 2025 at Huntington Bank Field

The Bengals' defense recorded two takeaways in the second half and held Cleveland scoreless on its final six possessions to lead the way in a season-opening victory. Cincinnati's offense was limited to 141 net yards, the second-fewest in a win in team history, but it scored a TD on two of its first three drives to build a 14-10 halftime lead. The Browns pulled ahead with a TD in the third quarter but missed the PAT attempt, and a 35-yard FG by Bengals K Evan McPherson later in the period regained the lead for Cincinnati. Cleveland drove inside the red zone with under five minutes remaining in regulation, but K Andre Szmyt's try for a 36-yard go-ahead FG sailed wide right. The Browns forced a quick Bengals punt and once again were driving for the win, before CB DJ Turner II came up with his first career INT on a ball that ricocheted off a Cleveland WR. P Ryan Rehkow then delivered a punt that was downed at the Browns' one-yard line, securing the win for Cincinnati.

The Packers answered with two straight TD drives to make it 24-10, before the Chase score followed by a successful two-point conversion closed the gap. The Bengals had one final chance to get the ball back to their offense, but Green Bay converted on third-and-eight and drained more clock before kicking a FG to put the game out of reach. Cincinnati fell to 2-4, while Green Bay improved to 3-1-1.

In a high-scoring, nationally televised matchup which saw the two offenses combine for 866 net yards, the Bengals put together a late drive to set up K Evan McPherson's 36-yard game-winning FG on Thursday Night Football. It marked the third regular-season game in NFL history between two starting QBs over 40 years old, as Joe Flacco, 40, passed for 342 yards and three TDs for the Bengals while Aaron Rodgers, 41, had 249 yards and four passing TDs for the Steelers. Flacco leaned heavily on WR Ja'Marr Chase, who finished with a Bengals-record 16 receptions for 161 yards and a TD. The Steelers took the lead with 2:21 remaining when Rodgers found TE Pat Freiermuth for a 68-yard TD, but Flacco engineered a quick drive down the field and connected on a 28-yard pass to WR Tee Higgins to get inside McPherson's range. Cincinnati picked off Rodgers twice in the second quarter and scored 17 points late in the period to pull ahead at halftime. The Bengals' offense also was aided by a strong rushing attack, led by HB Chase Brown's 9.8 yards per carry. Cincinnati improved to 3-4, while Pittsburgh fell to 4-2.
