**GAME INFORMATION**

**Kickoff:** 1 p.m. Eastern.

**Television:** The game will air on FOX-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WXIX-TV (Ch. 19) in Cincinnati, WKEF-TV (Ch. 22) in Dayton and WDKY-TV (Ch. 56) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Kevin Kugler (play-by-play), Daryl Johnston (analyst) and Allison Williams (sideline reporter).

**Radio:** The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

**Setting the scene:** The Bengals will be looking for their second straight win when they take on the Arizona Cardinals on Sunday at Paycor Stadium.

Cincinnati is coming off a dominant 45-21 victory at Miami in Week 16, in what was perhaps the team's most complete performance of the season to this point. Defensively, the Bengals had three takeaways and forced a turnover on downs in the second half, continuing the unit's positive trajectory over the past month. Offensively, QB Joe Burrow and company turned each takeaway into a TD, scoring 28 straight points after halftime to break the game open. Cincinnati also benefited from a strong special teams showing, as P Ryan Rehkow saw each of his four punts downed inside the Dolphins' 20-yard line, and the Bengals averaged 29.3 yards per kickoff return.

"Proud, not surprised, by the response our guys had," said head coach Zac Taylor, as the Bengals' effort in Miami came on the heels of a home loss to Baltimore. "There were a lot of questions about how these guys were going to respond. We saw how they responded all week. We knew how they were going to respond. To come down here and put together the performance they did, especially settling down after halftime and coming out and getting three turnovers and a turnover on downs. The offense responded with four straight touchdowns. Special teams units did a great job controlling the field position the entire second half. Just really proud, but again not surprised by the response we had."

While Cincinnati is eliminated from playoff contention, Taylor has reiterated the importance of putting forth strong performances over the final two games of the season. His message appears to have resonated throughout the locker room, particularly on the defensive side of the ball, as the Bengals lead the NFL with 11 takeaways since Week 12. Several of the team's young defenders have emerged as key contributors in recent weeks, including a pair of third-year starters in DE Myles Murphy and S Jordan Battle. That duo teamed up for Cincinnati's first takeaway against Miami, as Battle forced a fumble which was recovered by Murphy in Dolphins territory to help flip the momentum of the game.

"We've played a lot of young guys, and these guys have just gotten better and better," said Taylor. "Our future is really bright that way. Every first, second, and third-year player, I really feel like has made huge strides this season as they've gotten more reps and more opportunity. We have a lot of confidence in those guys."

The win over the Dolphins also was highlighted by some individual career milestones on the offensive side. Most notably, QB Joe Burrow played in his 75th regular-season game, and during the contest he became both the fifth-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 20,000 passing yards and the third-fastest to reach 150 TD passes. His top target, WR Ja'Marr Chase, finished with nine catches for

109 yards and surpassed 500 career receptions in the second-fewest amount of games in league history (76). Fellow receiving standout Tee Higgins registered his 10th TD catch of the season, and HB Chase Brown scored a career-best three TDs (two receiving, one rushing) in a span of under eight minutes in the third quarter.

The Bengals now turn their attention to an Arizona team which has lost seven consecutive games. The Cardinals are coming off a 26-19 home defeat against Atlanta in Week 16.

**The series:** The Bengals lead the series 7-6 overall, and the home team historically has had the advantage. The Cardinals are 4-1 in games played in St. Louis and Arizona, while Cincinnati leads 6-2 in games played in Cincinnati.

The Bengals won the most recent meeting 34-20 at Arizona in 2023, though the Cardinals had won four of the previous five matchups dating back to 2003.

Games between the two clubs have been relatively even recently, with five of the past six meetings being one-score games (defined as being decided by eight points or less), as well as seven of the past 10.

The Bengals were 2-1 against the Cardinals when the franchise was based in St. Louis (prior to 1988), and the Cardinals are 5-5 against Cincinnati since their move to Arizona.

**Bengals-Cardinals connections:** Cardinals OL Paris Johnson Jr. is a Cincinnati native, attended nearby St. Xavier High School and Princeton High School, and played at Ohio State University from 2020-22 ... Bengals CB Jalen Davis spent the entire 2019 season and part of the '20 campaign with the Cardinals ... Bengals OT Cody Ford played for the Cardinals in 2022 ... Bengals wide receivers coach Troy Walters played WR for the Cardinals in 2006 ... Cardinals ILB Akeem Davis-Gaither was a fourth-round pick of the Bengals in 2020 and spent his first five seasons ('20-24) with Cincinnati ... Cardinals OL Jonah Williams (Reserve/Injured) was a first-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2019 and spent his first five seasons ('19-23) with Cincinnati ... **Records vs. Cardinals:** The Bengals' history book does not list any individual or team records set previously against the Cardinals.

The Cardinals, however, have had one individual performance which stands tied for a record against the Bengals. On Nov. 18, 2007, Arizona CB/S Antrel Rolle logged three INTs against Cincinnati, which is tied for the most against the Bengals in a game. The mark has been reached a total of five times, and Rolle's instance, despite occurring 16 years ago, still is the most recent.

**Individually vs. Cardinals:** Here are cumulative regular-season offensive statistics for current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Cardinals (ordered by total games played):

- QB Joe Burrow: One game; 36-of-46 passing for 317 yards, three TDs and one INT (108.1 rating); Four rushes for seven yards (1.8-yard average).
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: One game; 15 receptions for 192 yards (12.8) and three TDs.
- HB Chase Brown: One game; One reception for two yards.
- WR Andrei Iosivas: One game; One reception for nine yards.

**Uniform watch:** Cincinnati will wear black jerseys, black pants (orange stripes) and orange socks this week against Arizona. The Bengals have worn this combination six previous times since their uniform redesign in 2021,

compiling a 4-2 record in those games. Cincinnati last featured this look in Week 9 of this season against Chicago.

The Bengals' redesign in 2021 marked the team's first significant change in uniform since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet six times and collected a 5-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance came in Week 7 of this season, when Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh at home on Thursday Night Football.

Here are the Bengals' records in every possible uniform combination (regular season and postseason only) since the team redesigned the uniform in 2021:

\* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their uniform lineup in 2024.

**The Jungle can jam ... :** The Bengals had an announced attendance figure of 65,000 or more in 30 consecutive regular-season home games from Week 1 of the 2022 campaign through Week 12 of this season. It marked the longest such streak in team history, surpassing a span of 24 straight games from 2005-07.

Each of the 15 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of this season was played in front of an announced crowd of 66,569, the fourth-largest figure on the list. Most of those fans were dressed in white apparel to accentuate the fourth annual "White Bengal" game at Paycor Stadium on Thursday Night Football.

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in

Cincinnati history.

**Bengals career records watch:** As Cincinnati continues the 2025 season, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

• QB Joe Burrow has thrown 152 career TD passes, the fifth-most in team history and two shy of tying former QB Carson Palmer (154) for fourth-most. QBs Andy Dalton (204), Ken Anderson (197) and Boomer Esiason (187) hold the top

three spots on the Bengals' all-time list.

• Burrow has 27 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the second-most in team history and one shy of Dalton (28) for the team record.

• Burrow has completed 1868 career passes, the fifth-most in team history and 147 shy of tying Esiason (2015) for fourth-most. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654) and Palmer (2024) hold the top three spots.

• WR Ja'Marr Chase has 505 career receptions, the sixth-most in team history and two shy of WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530) and Tyler Boyd (513) hold the top four spots on the team's career list. Chase in Week 4 at Denver surpassed WR Isaac Curtis (416) for seventh place and WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for sixth.

• Chase has 6681 career receiving yards, the sixth-most in team history and 17 shy of fifth-most, which is held by Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets surpassed WR Eddie Brown (6134) for sixth.

• Chase has 51 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and two shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.

• K Evan McPherson has 118 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and two shy of K Horst Muhlmann (120) for fifth. Kickers Jim Breech (225), Shayne Graham (177), Mike Nugent (157) and Doug Pelfrey (153) hold the top four spots.

• McPherson has 200 career made PATs, the fifth-most in team history and one shy of Pelfrey (201) for fourth. McPherson in Week 13 at Baltimore surpassed Muhlmann (189) for fifth.

• McPherson in Week 16 at Miami accounted for nine points, moving his career scoring total to 554 points. That surpassed Muhlmann (549) for fifth place on the team's all-time scoring list. Breech (1151), Graham (779), Nugent (718) and Pelfrey (660) hold the top four spots.

• McPherson has a career FG percentage of 83.1 (118 made/142 att.), the third-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and K Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

• P Ryan Rehkow has 48 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the fifth-most by a Bengals player since the stat began being tracked in 1976. Rehkow in Week 11 at Pittsburgh surpassed P Nick Harris (37) for fifth.

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Zac Taylor** was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor's system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led

the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team's per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the '15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor's began coaching at Texas A&M University as an offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during his College Station tenure.

Taylor played in college at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman

High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

**Jonathan Gannon** became an NFL head coach for the first time when hired by Arizona on February 14, 2023. He joined Arizona following two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Gannon has 18 years of experience in the NFL with the Cardinals (2023-present), Eagles ('21-22), Colts ('18-20), Vikings ('14-17), Titans ('12-13), Rams ('09-11) and Falcons ('07). In his second season with the Cardinals in 2024, the team finished with eight wins, doubling their win total from '23, despite facing one of the NFL's toughest schedules (eight games vs. playoff teams). The Cardinals defense was one of the NFL's best in the second half of the 2024 season. Over the final 11 games, Arizona allowed an average of just 19.6 points per game (only three teams allowed fewer points per game between Weeks 7-18). The Cardinals' defense allowed the fewest total TDs (20) and passing TDs (10) in the NFL during that span.

Gannon led one of the NFL's best rushing attacks over the previous two seasons. Arizona finished the 2024 season with 2451 rushing yards, the third-most in franchise history and the most since the team ran for a franchise record 2582 yards in 1979. The Cardinals' 5.29 rushing yards per attempt in 2024 is easily the highest single-season rushing average in franchise history.

Under Gannon, the Cardinals have been one of the NFL's best in protecting the football (fifth in the NFL with 12 games of zero turnovers from 2023-24). Arizona also finished the 2024 season with just 92 penalties, the second-fewest in the NFL last season (the L.A. Rams had 91).

In his first season with Arizona in 2023, Gannon led the NFL's third-youngest team, which relied heavily on rookies. The Cardinals rookie class led the NFL in combined starts (64) and combined snaps on offense and defense (4654) in 2023. Arizona was the only team in the NFL to have rookies combine for 2000/+ snaps on offense and 2000/+ snaps on defense that season.

Philadelphia qualified for the postseason and boasted a top-10 defense in

each of their two seasons (2021-22) under Gannon as defensive coordinator, ranking second in total defense in '22 (301.5 yards per game) and 10th in the NFL in '21 (328.8). Between 2021-22, the Eagles defense led the NFL with 99 sacks, ranked third in total defense (315.1) and third in pass defense (200.4). In 2022, Philadelphia won the NFC East title and advanced to Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium. The Eagles led the NFL with a franchise single-season record 70 sacks during the 2022 regular season, the most by any team in a single season since the 1989 Minnesota Vikings (71).

Prior to working with the Eagles, Gannon was the defensive backs/cornerbacks coach with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-20) and the assistant defensive backs/quality control coach with the Minnesota Vikings ('14-17) after working as a defensive assistant with the Tennessee Titans ('12-13). He spent three seasons (2009-11) as a scout with the St. Louis Rams after beginning his NFL coaching career as a defensive assistant with the Atlanta Falcons in '07.

Gannon played collegiately as a safety at Louisville and appeared in nine games as a redshirt freshman in 2002 before suffering a career-ending hip injury in his first career start at Cincinnati. As a true freshman in 2001, he was named the Cardinals defensive scout team player of the year. Following the injury, he worked as a student assistant at Louisville for three seasons (2003-05) and one season as a graduate assistant ('06) under Bobby Petrino.

Gannon attended Saint Ignatius High School (Cleveland, Ohio), where he was an all-state defensive back and a standout in basketball and track & field. As a senior in 2001, he helped lead the basketball team to the school's first state championship and starred in the long jump and 110-meter hurdles, helping Saint Ignatius to its first track & field state championship that same year. Gannon was inducted into the Saint Ignatius Sports Hall of Fame in 2011.

Gannon was born on April 4, 1983, in Cleveland, Ohio. He and his wife, Gina, have three children — Rocco, Lola and Angelo.

## BENGALS NOTES

**Defense on takeaway spree:** The Bengals have forced 11 turnovers since Week 12, the most by any NFL team in that span. Cincinnati's 11 takeaways include five interceptions, five fumble recoveries and one forced fumble that went through the end zone for a touchback.

Cincinnati kicked off its current stretch with S Geno Stone's pick-six in Week 12 vs. New England, which marked the first INT returned for a TD by a Bengals player this season. The defense followed that up with five takeaways in the Thanksgiving victory at Baltimore, which tied for the second-most by any team in a game this season. It also marked the seventh-most forced turnovers by Cincinnati in a game since 2000. The performance was highlighted by three FRs, including the first two of DE Cedric Johnson's career.

The Bengals' lone takeaway of Week 14 at Buffalo came late in the third quarter, when the Bills were in position to take their first lead of the afternoon. CB DJ Turner II punched the ball out from Bills RB James Cook III near the goal line, and LB Oren Burks recovered it in the end zone to protect a three-point advantage. S Jordan Battle continued the streak in Week 15 against Baltimore with his team-leading fourth INT of the season in the second quarter.

Each of Cincinnati's three takeaways in Week 16 at Miami came in the third quarter, beginning with a fumble forced by Battle and recovered by DE Myles Murphy in Dolphins territory. A pair of defenders recorded their first career INT later in the period, as rookie LB Barrett Carter picked off a pass that was deflected by CB Josh Newton, and CB Jalen Davis came down with a deep pass along the right sideline. Adding in a fourth-down stop — which also occurred in the third quarter — the Bengals forced a change of possession on four consecutive drives, which their offense converted into 28 straight points.

The last time Cincinnati's defense forced at least 11 turnovers in a span of five games was Weeks 14-18 of last season, when it logged a combined 13 takeaways to help propel a five-game winning streak.

**Forty-five in Miami:** The Bengals' 45 points in Week 16 at Miami were their most in a game since Week 8 of the 2013 season, when they put up 49 in a home win over the N.Y. Jets. It tied for the 12th-most points in any game in team history, and matched the third-highest scoring output in a road contest.

Cincinnati broke the game open against the Dolphins with 28 straight points in the second half, which turned a 17-14 halftime lead into a 45-14 rout. Three of the Bengals' second-half TDs came off a turnover, while the other occurred following a fourth-down stop which forced another change of possession. HB Chase Brown capitalized on the strong defensive effort, as he scored three total TDs (two receiving, one rushing) in a game-time span of seven minutes and 18 seconds.

The Bengals' scoring production in Week 16 matched the team's third-highest points total in any game since 2000, trailing only a 58-point outburst in Week 12 of the '04 campaign against Cleveland, and 49 points in the '13 win against the Jets.

**Burrow's 2025 journey:** QB Joe Burrow has started the Bengals' past four games, after spending the previous nine contests on the Reserve/Injured list due to a toe injury. Since re-entering the lineup in Week 13 at Baltimore, he is tied for second in the NFL in TD passes (10), while ranking fourth in completions (99), sixth in passing yards (1079) and ninth in passer rating (96.3).

Burrow opened the season by playing in his 70th career regular-season game in Week 1 at Cleveland. He finished with 14 completions on 23 attempts for 113 yards, with a one-yard TD pass to TE Noah Fant. Burrow's 1762 career completions at the end of the Browns game were the most by any QB in NFL history through their first 70 games, while his 141 TD passes ranked as the third-

most and his 19,114 passing yards ranked fifth.

Burrow suffered the toe injury in the second quarter of Week 2 against Jacksonville, after opening the game with 76 passing yards and a TD. He was placed on Reserve/Injured on Sept. 16 and underwent surgery on Sept. 19.

In his return on Thanksgiving, Burrow threw a season-high 46 passing attempts, with 24 completions that went for 261 yards and two TDs. Both of his scoring passes came in the third quarter, as he connected on a 14-yarder to TE Tanner Hudson and a 29-yarder to WR Andrei Iosivas.

Through six starts in 2025, Burrow has completed 120 of 189 passes for 1268 yards and 12 TDs with four INTs for a passer rating of 95.3.

**No. 9 through 75:** QB Joe Burrow played in his 75th career regular-season game in Cincinnati's Week 16 win at Miami. He completed 25 of 32 passes for 309 yards and four TDs with no turnovers, connecting on at least one pass to nine different receivers. His 146.5 passer rating was the second-highest in any game of his career, trailing only a 148.0 rating in Week 17 of the 2021 campaign against Kansas City. It also marked the highest passer rating by a QB in a road game in Bengals history.

Among all QBs in NFL history through their first 75 career games, Burrow ranks first in completions (1868), third in TD passes (152) and fifth in passing yards (20,269). The only players with more scoring passes in their first 75 games are Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (181) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino (173).

**Burrow hits 20K:** With a 35-yard completion to WR Tee Higgins in the first quarter of Week 16 at Miami, QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 20,000 career passing yards. Playing in his 75th regular-season contest, he became the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone, trailing only Patrick Mahomes (67 games; Kansas City), Matthew Stafford (71; Detroit), Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino (74; Miami) and QB Andrew Luck (74; Indianapolis).

Burrow owns the three highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history. Last season, he led the NFL and set a team record with 4918 passing yards, which included seven 300-yard games (also the most in Cincinnati history). He previously had 4611 passing yards in 2021 (sixth-most in NFL that year) and 4475 in '22 (fifth-most). He is the first QB to pass for 4000 or more yards in three different seasons during his Bengals career, with Carson Palmer (2006-07) and Andy Dalton ('13, '16) both reaching that mark twice.

The Week 16 win at Miami was Burrow's 27th career game with at least 300 passing yards, which tied Stafford and former Tampa Bay QB Jameis Winston for the fifth-most such games in a player's first six seasons in NFL history. Only Mahomes (41 games), Pro Football Hall of Famers Dan Marino (32) and Kurt Warner (30), and L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (31, in sixth season) had more 300-yard games in their first six years. Burrow's 27 games with 300 or more passing yards also are the second-most in a career in Bengals history, just one shy of Andy Dalton's team record (28).

Burrow was the fourth-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 15,000 career passing yards (56 games), and tied for the third-fastest to reach 10,000 (36 games). His career yardage total at the end of the 2024 campaign was 19,001, the sixth-most in a player's first five seasons in league history.

**Joe throws 150th TD:** QB Joe Burrow's nine-yard TD pass to HB Chase Brown in Week 16 at Miami was the 150th scoring pass of his career. Playing in his 75th regular-season game, he became the third-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 150 TD passes, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino (62 games) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (63).

Burrow finished the win over the Dolphins with four scoring passes, marking his ninth career game in which he threw for at least four TDs. That is the fifth-most such games in a player's first six seasons in NFL history, with only Marino (16 games), Mahomes (16), former Atlanta/Green Bay QB Brett Favre (10) and Buffalo QB Josh Allen (10) compiling more.

Burrow also has 28 career games with at least three TD passes, which are the third-most in any player's first six seasons behind Marino (37) and

Mahomes (36).

Burrow owns the three highest single-season passing TD totals in Bengals history, with a league-leading 43 in 2024, 35 in '22 (tied for second in NFL) and 34 in '21 (eighth in NFL). He enters Week 17 with 152 career TD passes, which are two shy of tying former QB Carson Palmer (154) for the fourth-most in Bengals history.

**Burrow on the mark:** QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's completion percentage record. With a current career percentage of 68.27, he is the league's all-time leader in the category.

Burrow's 70.552 completion percentage in the 2024 season ranked fourth in the NFL (minimum 14 attempts per team's games in season). It also set a Bengals single-season record, narrowly edging out QB Ken Anderson's completion rate of 70.550 in 1982. Burrow completed at least 70 percent of his passes in 11 games in 2024, including each of the final six — the longest such streak in his career.

In Week 14 of this season at Buffalo, Burrow surpassed 1800 career completions in what was his 73rd regular-season game. He tied Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert as the fastest players in NFL history to reach 1800 completions (in terms of games played).

Burrow recorded his 2500th career passing attempt in Week 17 of last season against Denver. His 1710 completions at the time he reached that mark are the most in NFL history through a QB's first 2500 throws. By the end of the 2024 campaign, he had 26 career games with a completion percentage of 70 or higher on at least 30 attempts. That is the most such games in a player's first five seasons in NFL history, with the next closest being Mahomes and Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (21 games each).

Burrow ranked in the top five leaguewide in completion percentage in three of his first five seasons. After leading the NFL in 2021 with a 70.4 percentage, he followed up with the second-highest clip in '22 (68.3).

**Chase voted to Pro Bowl:** On Tuesday, the NFL announced that WR Ja'Marr Chase has been voted to the AFC team for the 2026 Pro Bowl Games. It marks his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl selection, and he was voted a starter for the second straight year.

Chase this season ranks second in the NFL in receptions (110) and fourth in receiving yards (1256), while also recording five receiving TDs. He has totaled 100 or more receiving yards in seven games, which surpasses former WR A.J. Green (2013) for the most in a single season in Bengals history.

Chase is the sixth player selected to the Pro Bowl at least five times during his Bengals career. He and Green (2011-15) are the only two Cincinnati players to earn Pro Bowl nods in each of their first five career seasons.

The 2026 Pro Bowl Games will take place on Tuesday, Feb. 3 at the Moscone Center in San Francisco, Calif., and will be televised live on ESPN.

**500 catches for Uno:** WR Ja'Marr Chase recorded his 500th career reception in the first quarter of Cincinnati's Week 16 win at Miami. Playing in his 76th regular-season game, he became the second-fastest player in NFL history to reach 500 catches, trailing only former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (69 games).

Chase finished the game against the Dolphins with nine catches, moving his current career receptions total to 505. That is the third-most in a player's first five seasons in NFL history, behind Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (528; currently in fifth season) and Thomas (510). Chase is the only player in league history with at least 500 receptions and 50 receiving TDs in his first five seasons.

In Week 2 of this season against Jacksonville, Chase tied for the fifth-fastest player in league history to reach 400 career catches (64 games).

**Climbing the ranks:** WR Ja'Marr Chase enters Week 17 with 505 career receptions, which are two shy of tying former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for the fifth-most in Bengals history. Earlier this season, Chase surpassed Ring of Honor member Isaac Curtis (416 receptions) and former WR Cris Collinsworth (417) on the team's all-time list.

After leading the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 receptions in 2024, Chase finds himself near the top of the league once again this year, as his team-leading 110 catches rank second behind L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (114). The last player to finish as the league leader in receptions in consecutive seasons was former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas in 2018 and '19.

Including Chase, there have been 16 instances in NFL history in which a player totaled 100 or more receptions in three consecutive seasons. Chase kicked off his career with 81 catches in the 2021 season, which set a Bengals rookie record and still ranks in the top 20 among all rookies in NFL history. He followed that up with a team-leading 87 catches in just 12 games played in 2022, then hit triple digits for the first time when he had 100 receptions in '23 (12th in NFL).

Chase has five games this season with at least 10 catches, including a stretch of three straight contests from Weeks 6-8. He brought in 10 receptions in Week 6 at Green Bay, followed up with a Bengals-record 16 in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, then logged 12 in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. He became the first player in team history to register double-digit catches in three consecutive games.

In the Week 7 win over the Steelers, Chase broke his own previous Bengals single-game record of 15 receptions, which he amassed in Week 5 of the 2023 campaign at Arizona. He now owns the four highest single-game reception totals in team history, which also includes a 14-catch effort in Week 2 of this season against Jacksonville.

Last season, Chase became the first player in Bengals history to lead the league in receptions. His 127 catches surpassed Houshmandzadeh's previous team record of 112 in the 2007 campaign.

**Chasing history:** WR Ja'Marr Chase played in his 75th career regular-season game in Week 15 vs. Baltimore. Among all players in NFL history through their first 75 games played, he ranks second in receptions (496), fourth in receiving yards (6572) and 10th in receiving TDs (51).

With 1256 receiving yards this season, which rank fourth in the NFL, Chase has improved his career yardage total to 6681. That is the fourth-most in a player's first five seasons in NFL history, trailing only Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (7432), former St. Louis Rams WR Torry Holt (6784) and Pro Football

Hall of Famer Randy Moss (6743). Chase and Moss also are the only two players in league history with at least 6500 receiving yards and 50 receiving TDs in their first five years.

Chase surpassed 1000 receiving yards this season during the Bengals' Week 14 contest at Buffalo. He became the fifth player in NFL history to reach the 1000-yard receiving mark in each of his first five career seasons, joining Jefferson, Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green and current Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans.

In the Bengals' Week 7 win against Pittsburgh this season, Chase surpassed 6000 career receiving yards in what was his 69th regular-season game. He became the fifth-fastest player in league history to reach that milestone, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer Lance Alworth (62 games), Jefferson (62), former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (64) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (67).

Chase, who currently ranks sixth in Bengals history in receiving yards, is 17 shy of tying former WR Cris Collinsworth (6698) for fifth. So far this season, Chase has surpassed former WRs T.J. Houshmandzadeh (5782), Darnay Scott (5975), Tyler Boyd (6000) and Eddie Brown (6134) on Cincinnati's all-time list.

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 87.9 receiving yards per game (76 regular-season games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (96.9) and Jefferson (90.8).

**Uno finds the end zone:** WR Ja'Marr Chase's highlight-reel TD catch in the fourth quarter of Week 6 at Green Bay was the 50th receiving TD of his career. Playing in his 68th regular-season game, he became the seventh-fastest player in NFL history and the fourth-fastest in the Super Bowl era (1966-present) to reach that milestone. He improved his career tally to 51 with an eight-yard scoring catch in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh.

The only players in the Super Bowl era to record 50 receiving TDs in fewer games than Chase are Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (59 games), former New England TE Rob Gronkowski (59) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (61).

Chase's 51 TD catches are the second-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021, behind current L.A. Rams WR Davante Adams (55). In 2024, Chase led the league with 17 TDs, which tied the Bengals single-season record originally set by WR Carl Pickens in 1995. He became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in receiving TDs. He had a league-high five games with multiple TD catches last season.

Chase has five receiving TDs this season. With two more, he would become the first player in league history with at least 80 receptions, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first five seasons.

**Ten for Tee:** WR Tee Higgins' nine-yard TD catch to open the scoring in Week 16 at Miami was his 10th receiving TD of the season, which matches his career high from the 2024 campaign. His 10 scoring receptions this year are tied for third in the NFL, despite him missing two of the past three games due to an injury.

Higgins is the third player in Bengals history to record at least 10 receiving TDs in consecutive seasons, joining former WRs Carl Pickens (1994-96) and A.J. Green (2012-13). His 20 combined TDs since the start of the 2024 season rank fourth in the NFL, trailing Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (23), current L.A. Rams WR Davante Adams (22) and his Bengals teammate Ja'Marr Chase (22).

Higgins had a career-long streak of four consecutive games with a receiving TD from Weeks 7-11 of this season. He also compiled a streak of nine straight games played at Paycor Stadium with at least one TD catch, which began in Week 5 of the 2024 campaign and lasted through Week 9 of this year. He became the third player since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger with a scoring reception in nine consecutive home games played, joining Minnesota WR Cris Carter, who had a record 10-game streak spanning from the 2000-01 seasons, and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice, who logged a nine-game streak during the '89-90 campaigns.

In addition to his scoring tally, Higgins ranks second on the Bengals this season in receiving yards (720) and third in receptions (49). He surpassed 5000 career receiving yards in Week 9 vs. Chicago, and playing in his 79th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that milestone.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins is tied for eighth in the league in receiving TDs (44) and ranks 16th in receiving yards (5315).

**Brown's third-quarter hat trick:** HB Chase Brown helped the Bengals break the game open in the third quarter of Week 16 at Miami, as he caught a nine-yard TD pass from QB Joe Burrow, scored a 12-yard rushing TD,

and then again was on the receiving end of a five-yard Burrow scoring pass. The three TDs expanded Cincinnati's lead from 17-14 to 38-14.

Brown became the first player in Bengals history with at least two TD catches and one TD run in a game. He also is just the second player in team history with three total TDs in a single quarter, joining former HB Joe Mixon, who had two rushing TDs and one receiving TD in the second quarter in Week 9 of the 2022 season against Carolina. Since Mixon's performance, no other player in the NFL had scored three TDs in a quarter prior to Brown against the Dolphins.

Brown's first TD occurred with 9:43 remaining in the third quarter, and his third was scored with 2:25 left in the period. The seven minutes and 18 seconds of elapsed game time marked the shortest span for an NFL player to score three TDs since Oct. 10, 2021, when former L.A. Chargers RB Austin Ekeler found the end zone three times in five minutes and 53 seconds against Cleveland.

Brown is the first Bengals player with three TDs in a game since WR Tee Higgins had three scoring catches in Week 17 of last season against Denver. Brown's previous career high for TDs in a game was two (both rushing) in Week 4 of last year at Carolina.

**Brown does it all:** HB Chase Brown leads the Bengals with 846 rushing yards on 197 carries this season while also contributing 379 receiving yards on 62 catches, good for 1225 yards from scrimmage. It is his second consecutive year with over 1000 scrimmage yards, following a career-high total of 1350 in the 2024 campaign. His 62 receptions are the most in a season by a Bengals player listed as an RB/HB/FB, surpassing HB Joe Mixon's 60 in 2022.

Brown's performance this season has been highlighted by a streak of six straight games with at least 100 yards from scrimmage, which began in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh and lasted through Week 13 at Baltimore. It marked the longest such streak in Bengals history, and was the second-longest in the NFL this season behind a seven-game stretch by San Francisco RB Christian McCaffrey (Weeks 1-7). Brown totaled 687 scrimmage yards during his streak, the seventh-most among all running backs from Weeks 7-13, while his 502 rushing yards in that span ranked eighth.

Brown kicked off the streak with 100 scrimmage yards in the Week 7 home victory over the Steelers, which was spearheaded by a season-high 108 rushing yards on just 11 attempts. His 9.8 yards per carry in that contest were a career high and the 10th-most by any NFL player in a game this season (minimum 10 rushes). He followed that up with 105 scrimmage yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets, 112 in Week 9 vs. Chicago and 127 in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. His stat line against the Bears included a season-high 75 receiving yards on eight receptions.

Brown registered a season-best 130 scrimmage yards in Week 12 vs. New England to tie for the longest streak in team history, then pushed it to a record sixth straight game with 113 yards in the Week 13 victory at Baltimore.

Brown posted his seventh 100-yard game this season in Week 16 at Miami, when he logged 109 (66 rushing, 43 receiving) along with three total TDs. He is one of five players in the NFL this season with at least 800 rushing yards and 350 receiving yards.

**Turner shuts it down:** CB DJ Turner II is tied for the NFL lead with a career-high 17 PDs this season. It is the most PDs by a Bengals player since the 2009 campaign, when CB Leon Hall had 24 and CB Johnathan Joseph had 20. Hall also is the last Cincinnati player to finish a season as the league leader in PDs, with 24 in 2008.

Turner additionally has recorded his first two career INTs this season, with the first coming late in the fourth quarter of Week 1 at Cleveland to help the Bengals protect a one-point lead. His second pick occurred in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, when he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf in Cincinnati territory just before halftime.

In Week 6 at Green Bay, Turner notched a career-best five PDs. He became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since Joseph had five on Nov. 8, 2009, in a win over Baltimore. Turner also is one of five players in the NFL this

season to record five PDs in a game. No player in the league had that many PDs in any contest last season.

Turner also has contributed to two other takeaways for Cincinnati this season, as he recovered a fumble late in Week 13 at Baltimore to help seal a Bengals win, then the following week at Buffalo he logged his first career forced fumble which was recovered in the Bengals' end zone.

A 2023 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, Turner totaled 15 PDs through his first two seasons, with seven in his '23 rookie campaign followed by eight in '24. He missed the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, but has returned to play in all 15 contests with 14 starts this year.

**McPherson sets team record:** K Evan McPherson became the first Bengals kicker to enter the 60-yard FG club when he booted a franchise-record 63-yarder as the first half ended in Week 12 vs. New England. He surpassed the previous team mark of 59 yards, which he originally set in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh, and which was later tied by K Cade York in Week 16 of last season against Cleveland.

McPherson opened the scoring against the Patriots with a 54-yard FG in the first quarter. He became the fourth kicker in NFL history with FGs from at least 50 yards and at least 60 yards in the same game. With a 52-yarder four days later in the Thanksgiving win at Baltimore, he now has 28 career FGs from a distance of 50 or more yards, which are the most in a career in Bengals history and tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2021.

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 118 of 142 FG attempts, good for the third-highest percentage in team history (83.0). He has made each of his last 21 attempts from inside of 50 yards, dating back to Week 13 of last season. That is the second-longest such streak of his career, behind a stretch of 24 consecutive made FGs inside of 50 from Week 18 of the 2022 season through Week 2 of '24.

McPherson logged his 100th career made FG in Week 6 of this season at Green Bay. Playing in his 67th regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest kicker in Bengals history to reach that milestone.

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson now owns six of the eight longest made kicks in Bengals history. His 63-yarder in Week 12 against New England was the fourth-longest made FG in the NFL this season.

**Money Mac goes 6-6 on Thanksgiving:** K Evan McPherson went a perfect six-for-six on FG attempts in the Bengals' Week 13 win at Baltimore on Thanksgiving night. His six made FGs were a career high and tied for the second-most in a game in Bengals history, matching former K Doug Pelfrey's total on Nov. 6, 1994 at Seattle. Cincinnati's single-game record is seven, by former K Shayne Graham on Nov. 11, 2007 at Baltimore.

Adding in his two PATs, McPherson accounted for 20 points on the night, the second-most in a game by a Bengals kicker behind Graham's 21 in that 2007 road win over the Ravens. McPherson knocked through FGs from 31, 42, 24, 33, 52 and 41 yards, with four of those coming in the first half to help give the Bengals a 12-7 lead at the break.

The effort earned McPherson his fourth career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week award. His 20 points scored are the most by any NFL kicker in a game

this season, while his six made FGs are tied with Seattle K Jason Myers (Week 15) for the most.

McPherson's previous career high for FGs in a game was four, which he recorded on four occasions, most recently in Week 7 of this season against Pittsburgh.

**Rehkw's ranks:** P Ryan Rehkw has punted 58 times for 2978 yards this season, with 23 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. He leads the NFL in gross punting average (51.34 yards per punt; minimum 40 punts), ranks sixth in net average (43.0) and ninth in inside-20 punts.

Rehkw is coming off perhaps his top performance of the season in Week 16 at Miami, as each of his four punts were downed inside the Dolphins' 20, including a pair in the fourth quarter which were downed at the three- and four-yard line, respectively. It marked his fourth career game with four inside-20 punts, and his first this season.

Rehkw's 48 career inside-20 punts are the fifth-most by a Bengal since the statistic began being tracked in 1976. It also is tied for the 10th-most in the NFL since the start of his 2024 rookie campaign.

As a rookie in 2024, Rehkw set Bengals single-season records for gross punting average (49.11 yards) and net average (42.92 yards). Both figures surpassed former P Kevin Huber's previous records set in the 2020 season. Rehkw also had 25 inside-20 punts last year compared to five touchbacks.

After signing with the Bengals as a free agent on the third day of training camp in 2024, Rehkw made his NFL debut in Week 1 of last season against New England. That day, he punted four times for 258 yards, setting an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per attempt (minimum four punts). The previous league record belonged to Las Vegas P AJ Cole, who had a 63.6-yard average in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. Rehkw's performance in the 2024 opener also included the longest punt in Bengals history, an 80-yarder kicked from his own 20-yard line to the Patriots' end zone.

Rehkw finished his 2024 rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average.

**Taylor nets 50th win:** Cincinnati's Week 13 win at Baltimore marked the 50th regular-season victory in Zac Taylor's head coaching career. Taylor, who became head coach of the Bengals on Feb. 4, 2019, is the fourth head coach in team history to amass 50 regular-season wins, joining Paul Brown, Sam Wyche and Marvin Lewis.

Taylor's first victory as a head coach came in Week 13 of the 2019 season, when he led Cincinnati to a 22-6 result over the N.Y. Jets. He steered the Bengals to a combined 40 regular-season wins from 2021-24, the second-most over a four-year period in team history behind 43 wins from '12-15. With a winning record in each season from 2021-24, he joined Lewis ('11-15) as the only Bengals coaches to guide their team to a mark above .500 in at least four straight years.

Taylor now has 51 regular-season wins, with 27 coming in games played at home and 24 on the road. He additionally led the Bengals to five postseason wins following the 2021 and '22 seasons, with three of those on the road.

**Karras named Club Winner for WPMOY:** Earlier this month, the Bengals announced C Ted Karras as the team's Club Winner for the 2025 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award. Considered the league's most prestigious honor, the award recognizes players who excel on the field and demonstrate a commitment to making a positive impact beyond the game.

Karras, who previously was the Bengals' nominee in 2023, has served as a consistent figure in the Cincinnati community during his four seasons with the

team. In October 2024, he helped officially launch The Cincy Hat Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to providing education and infrastructure to adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) in the area. His long-lasting commitment to supporting adults with IDD first became widely publicized in 2022, when he began selling his fan-favorite Cincy Hat to benefit Village of Merici, a living community and service provider based in his hometown of Indianapolis.

To date, over 100,000 Cincy Hats have been sold, generating over \$3.3 million in revenue. This past year, The Cincy Hat Foundation collaborated with over 150 businesses, nonprofits and schools, which has helped turn a once viral fashion trend into an enduring fundraising mechanism for local initiatives. The momentum of the foundation has allowed Karras to explore opportunities for affordable housing infrastructure in the Cincinnati region, with the first development scheduled to get underway in the spring of 2026 in nearby Madisonville, Ohio.

Three players in Bengals history have been named the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year — QB Ken Anderson in 1975, LB Reggie Williams in '86 and OT Anthony Munoz in '91.

**Lapham, Parrish enter Bengals Ring of Honor:** A pair of Bengals legends in former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish were inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of Cincinnati's Week 8 game against the N.Y. Jets. They became the 11th and 12th members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who is in his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team's most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive lineman who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team's starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career, Lapham moved into the team's radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as "Mr. Bengal," he has been the team's radio analyst since 1986.

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

Ring of Honor inductees have been voted in each offseason since 2021 by Bengals Season Ticket Members. Lapham and Parrish joined previous inductees QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

**Bengal bites:** The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 27.0 years ... Cincinnati's win over Jacksonville in Week 2 of this season was the 250th home victory in team history (regular season and postseason combined) ... The Bengals have netted 23 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, the fourth most weekly awards by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who is in his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is QB Joe Flacco, who is 40 (born Jan. 16, 1985) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who is 22 (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... Brown and Mims also are tied for the heaviest player on the active roster, at 350 pounds each ... There is a tie for shortest player on the active roster between HB Tahj Brooks and WR Ke'Shawn Williams, who both are listed at 5-9 ... ## POSITION BY POSITION

**Quarterbacks:** Sixth-year QB Joe Burrow has started the past four games after spending the previous nine contests on the Reserve/Injured list due to a toe injury sustained in Week 2. In his return to action in Week 13 at Baltimore, he completed 24 of 46 passes for 261 yards and two TDs with no INTs, then followed up with a 284-yard, four TD passing performance in Week 14 at Buffalo. He played in his 75th career regular-season game in Week 16 at

Miami, and during that contest he became the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach 20,000 passing yards and the third-fastest to reach 150 TD passes. He had perhaps his best performance of the season in the win over the Dolphins, finishing 25 of 32 for a season-high 309 yards and four TDs with no INTs, good for the second-highest passer rating of his career (146.5). Burrow's season totals in six games played include 120 of 189 passing (63.5-percent) for 1268 yards

and 12 TDs with four INTs. The No. 1 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, Burrow has earned two Pro Bowl selections ('22 and '24) and has twice been named the NFL Comeback Player of the Year ('21 and '24). Known primarily for his passing accuracy, he is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage (68.3; minimum 1500 attempts). In 2024, he led the league and set Bengals single-season records in passing attempts (652), completions (460), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43). Eighteenth-year veteran **Joe Flacco** started six games for Cincinnati earlier this season (Weeks 6-12) after being acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7. In his six Bengals starts, Flacco completed 61.6 percent of his passes (154 of 250) for 1636 yards and 13 TDs with four INTs. At 40 years of age (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. He began the season starting the Browns' first four games. He originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent his first 11 seasons with the Ravens, before stints with Denver ('19), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24). He won Super Bowl MVP honors after helping lead Baltimore to a title in the 2012 campaign, and in '23 he was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after helping steer the Browns to a playoff berth. QB **Jake Browning** started three games for Cincinnati this season prior to Flacco's acquisition. He stepped into action following Burrow's injury in Week 2 against Jacksonville, and in that game passed for 241 yards and scored the game-winning TD on a QB sneak with 18 seconds remaining. Browning's totals on the season include 81 completions on 125 attempts (64.8 percent) for 771 yards and six TDs with eight INTs. He had a previous stint as the Bengals' starter in 2023, as he started the final seven games of that regular season and piloted the team to a 4-3 record. He spent his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20).

**Running backs:** HB **Chase Brown** is in his third pro season and first as Cincinnati's primary running back. A dynamic all-around threat, he recently reached 1000 yards from scrimmage for a second straight year, as he has 846 rushing yards on 197 carries along with 379 receiving yards on 62 catches, which are the most receptions in a season by a HB in Bengals history. Brown recorded at least 100 scrimmage yards in six consecutive games from Weeks 7-13, which marked the longest such streak in Bengals history and is the second-longest streak by any NFL player this season. He is coming off a career-best three total TDs (two receiving, one rushing) in Week 16 at Miami, with each TD occurring in a span of under eight minutes in the third quarter. Brown took over as the team's starting HB midway through the 2024 season, and in Weeks 9-17 of last year he ranked fourth in the NFL in scrimmage yards per game (116.3). His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at the University of Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB **Samaje Perine**. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. This season, Perine has 335 rushing yards with two TDs, and in Week 7 he surpassed 2000 career rushing yards. His season-high 94 rushing yards in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets were the fifth-most in any game of his career, and the most since Week 13 of the 2022 campaign. He scored his second TD of the year in Week 16 at Miami to give Cincinnati the lead late in the first half. A sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals this year, HB **Tahj Brooks** has played in 14 games as a rookie, missing the Week 13 matchup at Baltimore due to a concussion. He has totaled 13 rushing attempts for 35 yards along with 10 KORs for 258 yards (25.8-average). He had a record-setting collegiate career at Texas Tech, where he set school records for rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23). He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back).

**Wide receivers:** Cincinnati's 2021 first-round draft choice **Ja'Marr Chase** has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first five seasons and broken several Bengals single-season records early in his pro career. He is coming off a Week 16 performance at Miami in which he caught nine passes for 109 yards, which marked a Bengals-record seventh game this season with 100 or more receiving yards. He also notched his 500th career reception during the win over the Dolphins, becoming the second-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone (76 games). He played in his 75th career regular-season game in Week 15 vs. Baltimore, and among all players in NFL history through their first 75 contests, he ranks second in receptions (496), fourth in receiving yards (6572) and 10th in receiving TDs (51). He is the only player in league history with at least 500 catches and 50 receiving TDs in his first five seasons. In 2024, was the youngest player in the Super Bowl era (24 years old) to win the

receiving "Triple Crown," as he led the league in catches (127), yards (1708) and TDs (17). He signed a four-year contract extension with the Bengals on March 18 of this year, the same day that his running mate **Tee Higgins** re-signed on a four-year deal. Higgins has missed two games recently due to injury, but still is tied for third in the NFL with 10 receiving TDs this season. His 10th TD grab came in the first quarter of Week 16 at Miami, and matches his career high from last season. He is the third player in team history with double-digit receiving TDs in consecutive years, joining WRs Carl Pickens (1994-96) and A.J. Green (2012-13). Higgins had a career-long streak of four consecutive games with at least one TD catch from Weeks 7-11 of this season. In Week 9, he eclipsed 5000 career receiving yards in his 79th regular-season game, becoming the fifth-fastest player in Bengals history to reach that milestone. Since entering the NFL as a second-round pick of Cincinnati in 2020, Higgins is tied for eighth in the league in receiving TDs (44) and ranks 16th in receiving yards (5315). **Andreï Iosivas** is in his third NFL season and continues to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He ranks third on the team with 384 receiving yards on 27 catches, after posting 36 receptions for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as 11 of his 12 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. In Week 13 at Baltimore, he caught a career-long 29-yard TD pass from Burrow to extend Cincinnati's lead in the third quarter. He was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he earned All-America honors as a heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. **Mitch Tinsley** earned a roster spot coming out of this past training camp and preseason, and through 15 games played he has eight receptions for 116 yards and two TDs. His first career reception was a 13-yard one-handed TD grab in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, and he found the end zone again on a 17-yard scoring pass from Flacco in Week 12 vs. New England. Tinsley joined the Bengals on a Reserve/Future contract in February, and turned heads in the team's second preseason game at Washington when he had two highlight-reel TDs. He originally was a college free agent signee of the Commanders in 2023 and played in two games as a rookie, then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. Tinsley finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-21). Third-year receiver **Charlie Jones** has served as the Bengals' primary return specialist since being selected in the fourth round of the 2023 draft, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. In 2022, his final collegiate season which he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals acquired rookie **Ke'Shawn Williams** on waivers from Pittsburgh last week. Williams played in eight games for the Steelers, contributing primarily as a returner on punts and kickoffs, and he made his Bengals debut in Week 16 at Miami. He caught 39 passes for 448 yards and five TDs in his lone season at Indiana University in 2024, following four years ('20-23) at Wake Forest University.

**Tight ends:** A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 93 career regular-season games with 62 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season and has started in 35 of his last 41 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 111 career receptions for 811 yards and five TDs. This season's receiving totals include 11 catches for 81 yards, including a season-high 31 yards on two receptions in Week 16 at Miami. He had a crucial 27-yard catch and run to convert a third down during a TD drive against the Dolphins. Sample missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned at the start of the '23 season and has suited up for each of Cincinnati's last 46 games. Now in his seventh season, he is the Bengals' longest-tenured player. Eight-year veteran **Mike Gesicki** made his return to action in Week 12 vs. New England, after spending the previous four games on the Reserve/Injured list with a pectoral injury. He enjoyed his top statistical performance of the season in Week 14 at Buffalo, when he caught six passes for 86 yards and his first TD of the year. He then scored his second TD in a span of three weeks when he caught a 17-yard scoring pass from Burrow in Week 16 at Miami. Gesicki's season totals include 24 receptions for 247 yards and two TDs in 11 games played. A 2024 free agent signee, he logged 65 catches for 665 yards and two TDs in his debut Bengals campaign, with his receptions total marking the second-most ever in a season by a Cincinnati TE (Dan Ross, 71 in 1981). He entered the NFL as a second-round pick of Miami in 2018, and spent his first five seasons ('18-22) with the Dolphins before playing for the Patriots in '23. **Noah Fant** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late July of this year and quickly built a rapport with Cincinnati's quarterbacks. He has 33 catches for 283 yards and three TDs in 13 games played, with his most recent scoring grab coming in Week 9 vs. Chicago. A

former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), Fant spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21) and three with Seattle ('22-24). He has played in 108 career games with 89 starts, and his career totals include 333 receptions for 3588 yards and 18 TDs. Fant was inactive for the Week 16 contest at Miami due to an ankle injury. After being held off the stat sheet through the first five games of this season, sixth-year TE **Tanner Hudson** scored a TD on his first catch of the year, a two-yarder from Flacco in Week 6 at Green Bay. He now has 17 receptions for 137 yards and two TDs over his last eight games, including a one-handed 14-yard TD grab in Week 13 at Baltimore. He enjoyed his best statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with Cincinnati, as he posted career highs in catches (39) and yards (352) in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four postseason games. **Cam Grandy** has seen action in five games with one start this season, totaling two catches for seven yards. He left the Week 16 contest at Miami with a collarbone injury. Grandy began his 2024 rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, then signed to the active roster midway through the year and went on to play in eight games with six starts. He was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University.

**Offensive linemen:** Four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.** has started all 42 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three NFL seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore and then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 33 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 85 regular-season games played. He has played all 966 offensive snaps through Cincinnati's first 15 games this season. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who is in his fourth season with the Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his four years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 68 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.6 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span (4480 of 4499). Off the field, he has twice been named the team's Club Winner for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award (2023 and '25), in recognition of his charitable efforts through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. The starting ROT is second-year pro **Amarius Mims**, who was Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2024 (No. 18 overall). Mims began his rookie season in a reserve role, but has started 28 of his last 29 games played. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Brown as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. Fellow rookie **Dylan Fairchild** was taken in the third round of this year's draft and started at LG in each of the first five games of the season, before missing the Week 6 contest at Green Bay due to a knee injury. He then was active/DNP in Week 7, and returned to the starting lineup in Week 8. He earned second-team All-America honors in his final season at the University of Georgia in 2024. In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., Fairchild was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. G **Dalton Risner** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late August and has served as a versatile asset on the interior of the O-line. He has played in 12 games with nine starts, lining up for substantial amounts of snaps at both guard positions. Risner originally was a second-round draft pick of Denver in 2019 and spent his first four pro seasons ('19-22) with the Broncos, before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 99 career regular-season games with 90 starts — 75 at LG and 15 at RG. Rookie **Jalen Rivers** has seen action in 14 games with seven starts at RG this season, lining up for 463 offensive snaps. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April, he boasted a proven ability to play at both tackle and guard spots during his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.). He was the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two seasons, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. He suited up for 38 total games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) at Miami. C **Lucas Patrick**, who started this year's opener at RG, was sidelined for six games due to a calf injury sustained at Cleveland. He was returned to the active roster from the Reserve/Injured list in Week 7, then made his return to game action in Week 8. Patrick joined the Bengals in this year's free agency period,

after spending previous seasons with Green Bay (2016-21), Chicago ('22-23) and New Orleans ('24). He has played in 111 career regular-season games, and his 65 total starts have included 28 at center, 19 at LG and 18 at RG. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT **Cody Ford**, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. He filled in for an injured Mims to play 20 offensive snaps in Week 15 vs. Baltimore, and has charted 41 offensive snaps along with 62 special teams snaps through 15 games this season. Ford was college teammates with Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17.

**Defensive linemen:** Fifth-year DE **Joseph Ossai** leads the team with five sacks this season. He recorded his first career multi-sack game in Week 13 at Baltimore, including a strip-sack that was recovered by Cincinnati deep in Ravens territory. He has 10 sacks over his last 21 games played, dating back to Week 11 of the 2024 campaign. Originally a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, Ossai missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just four games in the past three-plus seasons. He was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 69 games played, including six postseason contests. A productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 19 sacks as a Bengal, with his most recent coming in Week 14 at Buffalo. He leads the team's D-line with 56 tackles this season, which includes three sacks and four TFLs. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.**, who joined the Bengals after spending his first four pro seasons (2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 83 regular-season games with 51 starts, including a current streak of 50 starts which began late in '22. He got in the sack column for the first time as a Bengal in Week 14 at Buffalo, as he brought down QB Josh Allen for a two-yard loss in the third quarter. He has 44 total tackles on the year, highlighted by a season-best eight stops in Week 5 vs. Detroit. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has strung together several strong performances in the back half of the season, including his first career multi-sack game in Week 15 vs. Baltimore. He then logged his first career fumble recovery to set up a scoring drive in Week 16 at Miami. He has totaled 20 tackles with three sacks over the past six games, which included a career-high seven stops in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. Murphy missed the early part of the 2024 season due to an injury, but has played in 28 consecutive games since returning to the lineup. In 45 career games, he has 81 tackles with nine TFLs and 7.5 sacks. He amassed 17.5 career sacks at Clemson University, where he earned first-team All-ACC honors in his final season in 2022. The Bengals' first-round pick this past April, DE **Shemar Stewart**, made his return to game action in Week 16 at Miami after missing the previous five contests due to a knee injury. Touted in the scouting process for his physical traits, Stewart was one of two players in the 2025 draft class to produce a perfect 10.0 on the Relative Athletic Score, which grades a player's measurements compared to their peer group. He played in 37 games with 19 starts across three seasons (2022-24) with the Aggies, and finished his career with third-team All-SEC honors last year. He has played in six games this season and posted eight tackles, including a TFL. Stewart missed four contests earlier in the year due to an ankle injury, then returned to action in Weeks 7-9 before sustaining the knee injury. DT **McKinnley Jackson**, a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, has seen action in seven games this season and totaled seven tackles. He played in 13 contests as a rookie last year and contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He was a two-time team captain at Texas A&M, where he played in 40 career games. The Bengals acquired DT **Jordan Jefferson** on waivers from San Francisco prior to Week 5 of this season. Originally a fourth-round draft pick of Jacksonville in 2024, he saw limited action for the Jaguars (2024) and 49ers ('25) before arriving in Cincinnati. He made his Bengals debut in Week 9 vs. Chicago, then was active/DNP in Weeks 11-14 and inactive for the past two games. Jefferson finished his college career at Louisiana State in 2023, following four seasons ('19-22) at West Virginia University. Fifth-year DE **Cam Sample** made his return to the field at the start of this season after missing the entire 2024 campaign due to an Achilles injury. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 59 career games as a rotational lineman and has 79 tackles with five sacks. He has suited up for 12 games this season and has 11 tackles with one TFL. He has been inactive for three contests this year, two of

which were due to an oblique injury. Second-year DE **Cedric Johnson**, a sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, spent the first eight games of this season on the Reserve/Injured list due to a calf injury, then made his season debut in Week 9 and has played in the past seven contests. In addition to his eight tackles on the year, he recorded his first two career FRs in the first half of the Week 13 win at Baltimore. He saw action in nine games as a rookie last season and logged six tackles with one sack. Third-year DE **Isaiah Foskey** signed to the active roster off the practice squad in mid-November and has lined up for 18 defensive snaps and 48 special teams snaps through six games played, logging two tackles and one ST stop. Foskey joined the practice squad in early September, after spending his first two NFL seasons in 2023 and '24 with New Orleans. He originally was a second-round draft choice of the Saints in 2023 and played in 27 games in his first two years as a rotational pass rusher and special teams contributor. In his final season at Notre Dame (2022), he played under current Bengals defensive coordinator and then-Fighting Irish defensive coordinator Al Golden.

**Linebackers:** Rookie LB **Demetrius Knight Jr.** was selected by the Bengals in the second round of this year's draft and has started 12 of his first 15 career games. His 98 tackles this season lead Cincinnati's LBs and rank second among all NFL rookies. He also has two INTs, which came in Week 4 at Denver and Week 13 at Baltimore, and posted his first two career sacks in Week 15 against the Ravens. He has totaled 10 or more tackles in three games, led by a career-best 12 stops in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets. Knight shot up draft boards following a breakout 2024 campaign at the University of South Carolina, where he ranked second on the team with 82 tackles in his lone season with the Gamecocks. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. He was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB early in his college career. Fellow rookie **Barrett Carter** has started the past 10 games, and his 94 tackles on the season rank third among all rookies. He recorded his first career INT in Week 16 at Miami, bringing in a deflected pass to set up a TD drive in the third quarter. Carter posted a career-high 16 tackles in Week 12 vs. New England, which tied for the fourth-most in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994. Cincinnati's fourth-round draft pick this past April, Carter put together a decorated final season at Clemson in 2024, as he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC pick, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). Eighth-year LB **Oren Burks** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. He was a key performer for the Eagles during their playoff run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four postseason games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. He has played in all 15 games with seven starts for Cincinnati this season and has 33 total tackles, one PD, one FF and one FR. He had his first takeaway as a member of the Bengals in Week 14 at Buffalo, recovering a fumble in the Cincinnati end zone late in the third quarter. LB **Joe Giles-Harris** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in April, after spending one week on the team's practice squad last season. He has seen action in 30 games in his pro career, totaling 23 defensive tackles and 23 special teams stops. He originally was a college free agent signee of the Jaguars in 2019, and had previous stints with Jacksonville (2019-20, '24), Buffalo ('21-22) and New England ('23-24). He made his 2025 season debut in Week 8 vs. the N.Y. Jets and has played in eight games this season, recording three tackles and 13 special teams stops. LB **Shaka Heyward** returned to play in Week 15 vs. Baltimore, after spending the previous five games on Reserve/Injured due to a fibula injury. He has 12 special teams tackles in 10 games played this season. A 2023 college free agent signee out of Duke University, Heyward spent his entire rookie campaign and part of the '24 season on Cincinnati's practice squad, before moving to the active roster in the back-half of last year.

**Cornerbacks:** CB **DJ Turner II** is enjoying a breakout campaign in his third pro season, as he is currently tied for the league lead with a career-high 17 PDs. He recorded five of those in Week 6 at Green Bay, becoming the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph in 2009. After missing the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, Turner opened this year with his first career INT to help seal the Week 1 win at Cleveland late in the fourth quarter. He then collected his second pick of the year in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. He originally was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2023 and has played in 43 career games with 32 starts. He ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine (4.26 seconds). A teammate of Turner's at the University of Michigan was **Dax Hill**, who spent his

first two Bengals seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. Hill missed the final 12 games of the 2024 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned to full participation this past training camp and has started all 15 contests in '25. He leads the team's CBs with 80 tackles this season, including two TFLs, while also recording eight PDs and an INT. Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2022, he contributed primarily on special teams as a rookie before starting all 17 games at safety in '23. Fifth-year CB **Jalen Davis** signed to the active roster prior to Week 14, after spending the first 13 weeks of the season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He has played in five games this year, including two as a practice squad elevation, and has logged 13 tackles, one INT, one sack and one FF. He recorded his first career INT in Week 16 at Miami, picking off a deep pass thrown by QB Quinn Ewers in the third quarter to set up a Cincinnati TD drive. His forced fumble came late in the fourth quarter of Week 13 at Baltimore and was recovered by the Bengals, helping punctuate a dominant defensive effort. Davis spent time with Miami (2018) and Arizona ('19), before joining the Bengals midway through the '20 season. He has had stints on the team's practice squad and active roster over the past five years, but saw action in 44 regular-season contests from 2021-23. Overall in his career, he has played in 62 games and has registered 36 defensive tackles along with four special teams stops. CB **Josh Newton**, who the Bengals selected in the fifth round of the 2024 draft, played in 29 consecutive games to begin his career, before he was active/DNP in Cincinnati's Week 14 game at Buffalo. Newton stepped into the starting lineup for the final six games last season following Turner's injury, and in that stretch he recorded five PDs and his first career INT. He has 11 tackles, three PDs and four ST stops through 14 games (two starts) in 2025. He spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. CB **DJ Ivey** made his return to action midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals out of the University of Miami (Fla.), he has carved out a role on special teams and has 10 career ST tackles in addition to 10 defensive stops and five PDs. Ivey sealed Cincinnati's win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 of this season, as he knocked down a Steelers Hail Mary attempt as time expired.

**Safeties:** **Geno Stone** has started all 32 games he has played in for the Bengals since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason. He led Cincinnati with four INTs last year (tied for 10th in NFL), and has two picks through 15 contests this season. He notched his second career pick-six in Week 12 vs. New England, when he intercepted QB Drake Maye's pass and returned it 32 yards for a score. He also posted a career-high 13 tackles against the Patriots. Stone spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the AFC. His 13 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the third-most in the NFL. In addition to his two INTs this season, he has a career-high 97 tackles, four TFLs, two sacks and three PDs. Stone's fellow starting safety, **Jordan Battle**, leads the team this season in tackles (107) and INTs (four). His first two picks came in the first two games of the season, as he became the first Bengals player to start a year with INTs in back-to-back games since former CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. He also has two FFs this season (both led to Bengals takeaways), with the most recent coming in Week 16 at Miami. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle has played in 49 career games (28 starts) and has 229 total tackles along with six INTs. He was a team captain and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). Fourth-year pro **Tycen Anderson** is a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two years, and he is on pace to do so again with a team-high 16 ST stops this season. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. **PJ Jules** cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. He has 14 special teams tackles and two defensive tackles, including a TFL, through 13 regular-season games in 2025, after leading Cincinnati with 10 solo stops this past preseason. Second-year S **Dajahn Anthony** made his season debut in Week 13 at Baltimore, after spending the first 12 games on the Reserve/Injured list due to a hamstring injury. He has lined up for 16 defensive snaps and 52 special teams snaps through his first four games back in the lineup. As a rookie last season, Anthony played in 13 games and contributed primarily on special teams. He was a 2024 seventh-round pick, after a five-year college career in which he worked his way from Division II Shepherd University ('19-20) to Liberty University

('21-22) to the University of Mississippi ('23).

**Special teams:** A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, K **Evan McPherson** owns the third-highest career FG percentage in team history (83.1). He is 24-for-27 on FG attempts and a perfect 37-for-37 on PATs this season. In Week 12 vs. New England, he kicked a franchise-record 63-yard FG as the first half ended, and became the fourth kicker in NFL history with FGs from distances of at least 50 yards and at least 60 yards in a single game. He now has 28 career FGs from 50 or more yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for the sixth-most in the NFL since the start of his 2021 rookie season. McPherson followed up his franchise record with a career-high six made FGs in Week 13 at Baltimore, which earned him his fourth career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week award. He has been operating at full health this season, after missing the final five games of 2024 due to a groin injury. Second-year P **Ryan Rehkow** is ranked second in the NFL in gross punting average this season (51.3 yards per punt; minimum 40 punts) and ranks sixth leaguewide in net average (43.0). He has 23 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line compared to 11 touchbacks. As a rookie in 2024, he set Bengals single-season punting records for both gross (49.11) and net (42.92) average, helping him earn a spot on the Pro Football Writers of American All-Rookie Team. In his career debut on Sept. 8, 2024 against New England, Rehkow set an NFL single-game record with 64.5 yards per punt (minimum four punts). Rookie **William Wagner** earned

the role as the Bengals' long snapper coming out of this past training camp, and through his first 15 career games he has recorded 122 snaps without an unplayable delivery. He spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannelly Award (nation's top LS). WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. In Week 9 vs. Chicago, he ran back the opening kickoff 98 yards for a TD and finished the day with a career-best 179 yards on four KORs. It marked his third career TD on a return, as he previously found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of 2023 vs. Baltimore, and had a 100-yard KOR in Week 7 of '24 at Cleveland. He is one of two players in Bengals history with a TD via both kickoff and punt return, alongside former CB Lemar Parrish. Jones has 47 KORs for 1284 yards (27.3 average) in his career, while also contributing 50 PRs for 462 yards (9.2). Also in the mix to return kickoffs is HB **Samaje Perine**, who has 17 KORs this season for 430 yards (25.3), including a season-long 38-yarder in Week 9 vs. Chicago. While playing for Kansas City last season, he had five KORs for 163 yards (32.6). Rookie HB **Tahj Brooks** has contributed 10 KORs for 258 yards this season, highlighted by a 41-yarder against the Dolphins that set up a Bengals TD drive. WR **Mitch Tinsley** had his first career punt return in Week 13 at Baltimore, a 10-yarder which led to a Cincinnati scoring drive. WR **Ke'Shawn Williams**, who was acquired on waivers last week, made his Bengals debut in Week 16 at Miami and registered three KORs for 76 yards (25.3) along with a 26-yard PR.

Behind 23-9 midway through the fourth quarter, the Bengals rallied to tie the game on a 42-yard TD pass from QB Andy Dalton to WR Tyler Boyd with 1:41 remaining. But Cardinals rookie QB and No. 1 overall draft pick Kyle Murray led Arizona on a six-play, 62-yard drive that ended with a Zane Gonzalez FG as time expired, and Arizona escaped Paul Brown Stadium with a 26-23 win. Despite allowing 514 total yards, including 266 rushing yards and a 7.0-yard rushing average, the Bengals' defense was stout in the red zone, keeping the game close by allowing the Cardinals just one TD on six trips inside the 20. Despite not having two of his top three receivers — John Ross III and A.J. Green, both out due to injury — Dalton completed 71.1 percent of his passes (27 of 38) and leaned heavily on Boyd, who totaled 10 receptions for 123 yards and a TD. The Bengals fell to 0-5, while Arizona improved to 1-3-1.

Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase posted a team-record 15 receptions for 192 yards and three TDs, while the Cincinnati defense forced three turnovers in a road victory. Chase's first TD capped an 11-play opening drive to give the Bengals an early lead, but Arizona answered with two TDs in the second quarter to pull ahead 14-10. The Cardinals then stopped HB Joe Mixon at the one-yard line on fourth-and-goal late in the first half, but two plays later CB Cam Taylor-Britt intercepted a Joshua Dobbs pass and returned it 11 yards to the end zone, putting Cincinnati back in front. Less than two minutes into the second half, QB Joe Burrow launched a deep ball that hit Chase in stride for a 63-yard TD to extend the Bengals' lead. Arizona responded with a TD and had a chance to reclaim the lead later in the third quarter, but LB Germaine Pratt stopped Dobbs on a rush on fourth down at the Bengals' 16-yard line. Cincinnati's offense took over and drove 83 yards in 15 plays, punctuated by Chase's third TD, to take command midway through the fourth quarter. The Bengals improved to 2-3, while Arizona fell to 1-4.

The Bengals' defense recorded two takeaways in the second half and held Cleveland scoreless on its final six possessions to lead the way in a season-opening victory. The Browns forced a quick Bengals punt and once again were driving for the win, before CB DJ Turner II came up with his first career INT on a ball that ricocheted off a Cleveland WR. P Ryan Rehkow then delivered a punt that was downed at the Browns' one-yard line, securing the win for Cincinnati.

Denver scored 28 unanswered points and totaled 512 yards of net offense to defeat the Bengals in a nationally televised contest. Cincinnati took an early lead on a short FG from K Evan McPherson which capped off a 12-play, 62-yard opening drive, but the offense was forced to punt on every remaining possession and recorded just 97 yards the rest of the way. Cincinnati came up with a stop on fourth down near its own goal line late in the second quarter, as rookie LB Demetrius Knight Jr. picked off Broncos QB Bo Nix in the end zone for his first career INT. But Denver regained possession shortly after and put together a quick scoring drive at the end of the half to build its lead. It marked the third regular-season game in NFL history between two starting QBs over 40 years old, as Joe Flacco, 40, passed for 342 yards and three TDs for the Bengals while Aaron Rodgers, 41, had 249 yards and four passing TDs for the Steelers. Flacco leaned heavily on WR Ja'Marr Chase, who finished with a Bengals-record 16 receptions for 161 yards and a TD. The Steelers took the lead with 2:21 remaining when Rodgers found TE Pat Freiermuth for a 68-yard TD, but Flacco engineered a quick drive down the field and connected on a 28-yard pass to WR Tee Higgins to get inside McPherson's range. Cincinnati picked off Rodgers twice in the second quarter and scored 17 points late in the period to pull ahead at halftime. The Bengals' offense also was aided by a strong rushing attack, led by HB Chase Brown's 9.8 yards per carry. Cincinnati improved to 3-4, while Pittsburgh fell to 4-2.

The Bengals' defense forced five turnovers in a nationally televised road win on Thanksgiving. QB Joe Burrow, who made his return after missing nine games due to a toe injury, had two TD passes in the second half and finished with 261 yards. Cincinnati's offense was held to just one TD on six red zone opportunities, but K Evan McPherson made a career-high six FGs to help keep the Bengals in front. Baltimore had a chance to cut into a 12-point deficit early in the fourth quarter, before rookie LB Demetrius Knight intercepted a deflected pass deep in Bengals territory and returned it 39 yards to set up another FG drive. DE Joseph Ossai sacked Ravens QB Lamar Jackson twice in the first half, and HB Chase Brown had over 100 yards from scrimmage for a Bengals-record sixth straight game. Cincinnati improved to 4-8, while Baltimore fell to 6-6.
