GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Ian Eagle (play-by-play), Charles Davis (analyst) and Evan Washburn (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals return home seeking their third straight win when they host the Philadelphia Eagles at Paycor Stadium on Sunday.

Cincinnati is coming off a pair of road victories in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants and Week 7 at Cleveland. Leading the effort in those contests was the Bengals' defense, which held the Giants and Browns to 21 combined points while collecting three takeaways. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo's group also limited the Browns to just 77 rushing yards, helping Cincinnati earn its first win in Cleveland since 2017.

"I think there are a lot of good things that stand out," said head coach Zac Taylor on the recent defensive performances. "The coverage has been good. Guys are competing, guys are getting pressure on the quarterback. When they check the ball down, you see two or three guys there flying around, getting the ball carrier on the ground. If they do have a stretch where they have two or three positive plays, the guys are not getting discouraged and are kind of bowing up and keeping points off the board. I think there have been a lot of positives there, especially the last two weeks."

The defense's production has begun at the line of scrimmage, where DE Trey Hendrickson once again is putting together a Pro Bowl caliber season. The eighth-year edge rusher has logged two sacks in each of the past two games, and his seven sacks this season are tied for fourth in the NFL. At linebacker, Germaine Pratt and Logan Wilson lead the team with 71 tackles apiece, which also ranks tied for third leaguewide.

Cincinnati's two defensive free agent signees this past offseason also enjoyed their top statistical outing in Week 7, as DT Sheldon Rankins recorded his first sack as a member of the Bengals and S Geno Stone collected his first INT.

The defensive effort at Cleveland followed an emphatic start to the afternoon by the Bengals' special teams unit, as WR Charlie Jones returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a TD just 12 seconds in. The play marked the longest kickoff return in the NFL this season and the first KOR for a TD by a Bengals player since S Brandon Wilson in 2020. And while the Cincinnati offense was kept off the board going into halftime, the Bengals still held a one-point lead at the break thanks to Jones' runback.

"I thought that was a critical play in the game," Taylor said. "We didn't score in the first half on offense, so to have the 7-6 lead because of a big special teams play allowed us just to hang in and finally find our groove in the third quarter. It was really the play of the game, ultimately."

The offense was able to break the game open with two scoring drives in the third quarter, both ending in TD passes from QB Joe Burrow. Burrow, who finished the day with a passer rating of 108.9, found WR Ja'Marr Chase on a back-shoulder throw for his sixth TD reception of the year (tied for NFL lead),

then later in the period hit WR Tee Higgins on a slant that was taken in for a 25-yard score.

Burrow expressed an urgency for the offense to find consistent execution moving forward, but he acknowledged the primary importance of leaving Cleveland with a second straight win.

"That's what you have to do," Burrow said. "Great teams find ways to win. I think we have a chance to be a great team. We're not that yet, but there's a lot of season left to play."

The Bengals' opportunity to improve to .500 on Sunday comes against an Eagles team that also defeated the Browns and Giants in the past two weeks. The game additionally marks the return of the "White Bengal" helmet, which Cincinnati has worn four previous times and collected a 4-0 record since it was unveiled in 2022.

The series: The Bengals lead, 9-3-2. Cincinnati's .714 winning percentage against the Eagles is its second-highest against any NFL opponent. The only higher winning percentage has come against Detroit (10-3-0, .769).

The Bengals, who are 4-0-1 in games vs. the Eagles in Cincinnati, have won three and tied two against the Eagles in the team's past five meetings. Cincinnati has not lost to Philadelphia since 2000.

The Bengals won the first five games of the series, which spanned from 1971-88. The Eagles' longest winning streak in the series is two games, from games in 1997 and 2000.

Brown family reunion in Week 8: Sunday's game features the first NFL matchup between twin brothers Chase and Sydney Brown. Chase, a second-year HB for the Bengals, and Sydney, a second-year S for the Eagles, were born March 21, 2000, in London, Ontario (Canada).

The Brown brothers relocated from Canada to Florida for their junior and senior years of high school, which they spent at Saint Stephen's Episcopal School in Bradenton (south of Tampa). Chase then attended Western Michigan University for his true freshman season in 2018, before transferring to join Sydney at the University of Illinois. They were teammates at Illinois from 2019-22 and both compiled decorated careers for the Fighting Illini. Chase rushed for over 1000 yards in each of his final two seasons, and in 2022 was an AP second-team All-American while becoming the first player in program history to be named a finalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back). Sydney was a team captain who led the Big Ten Conference in INTs (six; third in nation) and earned first-team all-conference honors in 2022.

Sydney was selected by Philadelphia in the third round (66th overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft, 97 picks before Chase heard his name called by Cincinnati in the fifth round (163rd). Sydney played in 14 games as a rookie for the Eagles last season, and in Week 17 he returned his first career INT 99 yards for a pick-six against Arizona. He spent the first six weeks of this season on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury, then made his season debut in Philadelphia's Week 7 win at the N.Y. Giants.

Chase has played in 19 games for Cincinnati with starts in each of the past two contests. He leads the Bengals this season in rushing yards (327) and rushing TDs (three).

Eagles running backs coach/assistant head coach Jemal Singleton served as the Bengals' running backs coach from 2019-20 ... Bengals DE Joseph Ossai and Eagles DT Moro Ojomo both were born in Lagos, Nigeria, and then were teammates at the University of Texas from 2018-20 ... Bengals WR Jermaine Burton and Eagles WR Johnny Wilson were teammates at Calabasas High School in Calabasas, Calif., from 2018-19 ... Bengals S Vonn Bell, DE Trey Hendrickson and DT Sheldon Rankins played for the New Orleans Saints from 2019, alongside Eagles S C.J. Gardner-Johnson and LB Zack Baun ('20) ... Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 2121 career passing attempts, 100 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.

- Burrow has 15,842 passing yards, the fifth-most all-time. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top four spots. Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for fifth in team history.

- Burrow has 21 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the third-most all-time. Dalton (28) and Esiason (23) hold the top two spots for the team's most 300-yard passing games.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 35 career receiving TDs, six shy of WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth all-time. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.

- Chase has 16 games with 100 or more receiving yards, two shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 46.5 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 12.5 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

- K Evan McPherson has an 83.0 career FG percentage (88 made/106 attempts), the third-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

Records vs. Eagles: Two Bengals records have been set in the team's series with the Eagles:

- P Kyle Larson tied a Bengals record set by Lee Johnson for most punts in a game with 11 vs. Philadelphia on Nov. 16, 2008. The game ended in a 13-13 tie, thus Larson had a full fifth period to reach that mark. However, just two weeks later vs. Baltimore, Larson again totaled 11 punts in a non-overtime game. P Kevin Huber later matched the Bengals' high mark of 11 punts for a fourth time in 2014.

- HB Eric Bieniemy set the team record for most kickoff returns in a game with eight at Philadelphia in 1997. That mark was later tied by WR Tab Perry in 2005 vs. Indianapolis.

Individually vs. Eagles: Regular-season offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against the Eagles include (ordered by total games played):

- QB Joe Burrow: One game; 31-of-44 passing for 312 yards, two TDs and no INTs (105.5 rating); One rush for minus-one yard.

- WR Tee Higgins: One game; Five receptions for 40 yards (8.0-yard average) and two TDs.

- TE Drew Sample: One game; One reception for one yard.

A game in rare company: Though it's not noted in any official record book, a Bengals performance in the Eagles' 1994 visit to Cincinnati is one of just two games since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger in which a team has turned a loss into a win with three or fewer seconds left. In that December contest, the Bengals scored twice in the final three seconds to go from 30-27 losers to 33-30 winners.

Cincinnati tied the score at 30 with three seconds left on a 22-yard Doug Pelfrey FG. The Eagles then muffed a Bengals squib kickoff, and DB Adrian Hardy recovered for the Bengals at the Eagles' 37-yard line. The clock stopped with one second left. Then, as time ran out, Pelfrey kicked a career-long 54-yard FG to win the game.

In 2019, the Atlanta Falcons not only matched that feat, but beat it by scoring two TDs in the final two seconds for a 29-22 win at San Francisco.

Other than those two contests, there is only one other NFL game since 1970 with two scores by a team in the last three seconds. And in that case, the second of the two scores was not central to the outcome. On Nov. 15, 1998, Tennessee went up 17-14 on Pittsburgh with a field goal at :03. Then Tennessee padded its margin with a TD for a 23-14 win as Pittsburgh botched the ensuing kickoff.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 19 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 season, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home games from 2005-07.

Each of the five highest-announced home attendance figures in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 season, including three that were played during the '23 campaign. Cincinnati's Week 9 win over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football last season had an attendance figure of 66,965, which stands as the second-largest in team history behind a record 67,260 in Week 4 of the '22 season against Miami. The Bengals faced Houston in Week 10 of 2023 in front of an announced crowd of 66,526, the third-largest ever, and earlier in the season had an attendance figure of 66,385 in a Week 6 win over Seattle that ranks fifth. The fourth-highest attendance figure is 66,399 for the team's Wild Card Playoff victory against Baltimore in January of 2023.

"White Bengal" returns Sunday: Cincinnati this week will wear the fan-favorite "White Bengal" helmet, which features a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The helmet was introduced in 2022 with the NFL's approval for the use of alternate helmets, and made its debut in the Bengals' win over Miami in Week 4 of that season that was played in front of a Paycor Stadium record attendance figure of 67,260 on Thursday Night Football.

The Bengals have worn the helmet four times overall and collected a 4-0 record in those games. In addition to the Dolphins game, they donned the "White Bengal" look in a 2022 Week 11 road victory at Pittsburgh, a '23 Week 3 home win over the L.A. Rams on Monday Night Football, and a '23 Week 13 road overtime win at Jacksonville on MNF.

When alternate helmets were introduced across the league in 2022, teams were required to wear them with an alternate, throwback or color rush uniform. The Bengals matched their new white helmet with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since 2020, prior to the team's '21 uniform redesign. Last season, Cincinnati was permitted to pair its alternate white helmet with its primary white jersey. The Bengals will again wear their primary white jersey on Sunday against Philadelphia, along with their white pants (black stripes) and white socks.

Cincinnati will accentuate the "White Bengal" look this week by painting the end zones and midfield logo white, while encouraging fans to also wear white

apparel to create a stadium-wide "White Out" atmosphere.

The Bengals' uniform redesign in 2021 marked the team's first significant alteration since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and the recently unveiled orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason

games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his

season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the

University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Nick Sirianni was named head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles on Jan. 24, 2021, after having served as the Indianapolis Colts' offensive coordinator from '18-20.

Prior to joining the Colts, Sirianni spent five years (2013-17) as a member of the Los Angeles/San Diego Chargers' coaching staff, including two seasons as wide receivers coach ('16-17), two seasons as quarterbacks coach ('14-15), and one season as an offensive quality control coach ('13).

Sirianni broke into the NFL coaching ranks with the Kansas City Chiefs (2009-12), serving as wide receivers coach ('12) and offensive quality control coach ('09-11).

Sirianni was a three-year starter at wide receiver for Mount Union, winning three NCAA Division III national championships. He also played one year (2005) in the Atlantic Indoor Football League with the Canton Legends. He began coaching as defensive backs coach at Mount Union (2004-05) and wide receivers coach at Indiana University of Pennsylvania ('06-08).

Sirianni is a native of Jamestown, N.Y.. His brother, Mike, is currently the head coach at Washington & Jefferson College (Washington, Pa.) and his brother, Jay, and father, Fran, are former head coaches at Southwestern Central High School in Jamestown.

Sirianni and his wife, Brett, have two sons, Jacob and Miles, and one daughter, Taylor.

Taylor vs. Eagles: The series is tied, 0-0-1.

Taylor vs. Sirianni: No previous meetings.

Sirianni vs. Bengals: No previous meetings.

BENGALS NOTES

Bengals near 400th W: The Bengals enter Week 8 with 397 all-time wins in the regular season, just three shy of 400. The team has won 239 games at home and 158 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly known as Paul Brown Stadium). The team has reached the 10-win mark during the regular season 14 times, including in six of the past 12 years.

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt joins

Orlando Brown Jr. in serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

Charlie's 100-Yard Return: WR Charlie Jones took the opening kickoff of Week 7 at Cleveland from his own goal line and returned it 100 yards to the end zone for a Bengals TD just 12 seconds in. It was the first return of 100 or more yards in the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the 13th TD on a KOR in Bengals history, and the first since former S Brandon Wilson had a 103-yard return on Nov. 29, 2020 against the N.Y. Giants.
- It was the second time in team history that the Bengals returned the game's opening kickoff for a TD. The first time came on Oct. 13, 2019, when Wilson had a 92-yard return at Baltimore.
- It tied for the third-longest KOR in team history and the sixth-longest play overall. The previous KORs that went for 100 or more yards were Wilson's 103-yarder, HB Eric Bieniemy's 102-yarder on Oct. 26, 2007 vs. the N.Y. Giants, and WR Glenn Holt's 100-yarder on Nov. 4, 2007 at Buffalo.
- Jones also had an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 of the 2023 season against Baltimore. He and former CB Lemar Parrish are the only players in team history to score a TD via KOR and PR during their Bengals career.
- It marked the longest KOR in the NFL this season and the third KOR TD. The last time an NFL player had a KOR TD of 100 or more yards was Jan. 8, 2023, when Buffalo RB Nyheim Hines opened a game against New England with a 101-yard return.

Burrow hits the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.22, he is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, ahead of former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.69).

Burrow this season has completed 159 of 226 passes, good for a completion percentage of 70.4 that ranks fourth in the NFL (minimum 14 attempts per team game). He surpassed 2000 career attempts in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark were the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 throws behind Brees (1444).

In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, Burrow completed 30 of 39 passes (76.9 percent) for 392 yards and five TDs. It marked his 19th career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts — the second-most such games in league history within a player's first five seasons behind Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; min. 14 att./game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Joe masters the deep ball: Since entering the NFL in 2020, QB Joe Burrow leads the NFL in TD passes of 40 or more yards (23) and 50 or more yards (16), while tying for the league lead in TD throws of 60 or more yards (12).

Burrow already has four scoring passes of 40-plus yards this season, with each going to WR Ja'Marr Chase. He hit Chase on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington for a 41-yarder, then the following week at Carolina found Chase over the middle for what turned into a 63-yard catch-and-run to the end zone. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he connected with his Pro Bowl receiver on a 41-yard deep ball with nine seconds left in the first half, and on a quick screen in the fourth quarter that Chase took 70 yards for a TD.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22. Both of his 40-plus-yard TD throws last season were to Chase — a 63-yarder in Week 5 at Arizona and a 64-yarder in Week 10 against Houston.

Among all NFL QBs whose career began after 1990, Burrow's 23 TD passes of 40 or more yards are the third-most within his first five seasons. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning (28) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (26) had more in their first five years.

Burrow reaches 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that mark.

Burrow's current career total of 15,842 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least four fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Through seven games this season, Burrow ranks sixth in the NFL in passing yards (1759) and eighth in yards per attempt (7.78; minimum 14 attempts per team game).

Burrow throws 100th TD: QB Joe Burrow recorded his 100th career regular-season TD pass on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington, when he hit WR Ja'Marr Chase in stride for a 41-yard score. Playing in his 55th career game, Burrow tied for the seventh-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 100 TD passes.

The former No. 1 overall pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, before breaking out with a then-team-record 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By besting his record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

Burrow's 14 TD passes through seven games this season rank fourth in the NFL. He threw for a career-high five TDs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, eclipsing his previous high of four that he reached four times. His two TDs in Week 7 at Cleveland marked his 37th career game with multiple TD passes.

Burrow's New York dash: QB Joe Burrow scored his first rushing TD of the season on the opening drive of Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, when on a third-and-18 he scrambled out of the pocket and sprinted 47 yards to the end zone. It was his 11th career rushing score (regular season), and his first since Week 13 of the 2022 campaign. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the longest rushing TD by a QB in Bengals history, surpassing the previous long of 27 yards by Jeff Driskel on Nov. 11, 2018 vs. New Orleans.
- It was the second-longest run by a QB in Bengals history, behind a 73-yarder by Virgil Carter on Nov. 15, 1970 vs. Cleveland.
- According to the NFL's NextGen Stats service, Burrow's top speed on the play was 19.86 mph, the fastest he has run on any play of his career.
- Burrow's previous longest rushing attempt was 23 yards, which he hit twice — on a TD in his career debut on Sept. 13, 2020 vs. the L.A. Chargers, and on a scramble on Sept. 11, 2022 vs. Pittsburgh.
- Burrow finished the Giants game with a career-high 55 rushing yards on four attempts.

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is the only NFL QB with at least 1000 completions, 75 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.2; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking fourth in TD passes (98), sixth in yards per attempt (7.66), eighth in completions (1183) and eighth in passing yards (13,154).

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase leads the NFL this season in receiving yards (620), is tied for the lead in receiving TDs (six), and ranks tied for seventh in receptions (39). He also has six catches of 30 or more yards, the second most in the league.

Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He ranks fifth in NFL history in receiving yards (4210) and ninth in receptions (297) through any player's first 50 games, and he is one of five players in the Super Bowl era to record over 4000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs within his first 50 contests.

Chase holds a career average of 83.40 receiving yards per game, the fourth-highest mark in league history among all players with at least 3000 yards. In 2023, his career-high 100 receptions tied former WR Carl Pickens (1996) for the second-most in a season in Bengals history, and he became the eighth player in NFL history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns.

Chase in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants recorded his 300th career reception in his 51st game. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that milestone, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and tied for the eighth-fastest in league history. Chase also previously surpassed 4000 career receiving yards in Week 4 at Carolina, needing the fewest games ever by a Bengal to hit that mark (49).

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 70-yard catch-and-run to the end zone in Week 5 vs. Baltimore marked his 10th career receiving TD of 60 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. It also tied former Bengals WR Isaac Curtis for the most in a career in team history, and surpassed former N.Y. Giants Odell Beckham Jr. for the most in the Super Bowl era by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (11) and 40-plus yards (15) since 2021. With a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder against Baltimore, he became the first NFL player since WR Terrell Owens in 2007 to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games.

Higgins reaches 4K yards: WR Tee Higgins led the Bengals with 82 yards on four receptions in Week 7 at Cleveland, and in the process surpassed 4000 receiving yards in his career. Playing in his 63rd regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that mark.

Higgins has played in the past five games after missing the first two contests this season due to a hamstring injury. He ranks second on the team in receptions (29) and receiving yards (341), with his yardage total also ranking 10th in the NFL since his season debut in Week 3. Of his 29 catches, 21 have resulted in a first down for Cincinnati.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 20 leaguewide in receiving yards (20th; 4025) and receiving TDs (T-18th; 27). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 12 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (10), seventh in receiving yards (1228) and 13th in yards per reception (15.7) during the calendar's final month. He also ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing teammate Ja'Marr Chase in both categories.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 7 at Cleveland and celebrated the occasion by recording his sixth and seventh sacks of the season. He brought down QB Deshaun Watson for a loss of six yards in the first quarter, then got to QB Jameis Winston for a two-yard loss late in the fourth. It marked Hendrickson's 10th multi-

sack game since joining the Bengals as a free agent during the 2021 offseason, the fifth-most such games in the NFL in that span.

Hendrickson also had a pair of sacks in Week 2 at Kansas City and Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. He is the sixth player in Bengals history to record two or more sacks in consecutive games, and the first to do so since DE Antwan Odom in Weeks 1-2 of the 2009 season.

Hendrickson's seven sacks are tied for the fourth-most leaguewide. He boosted his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 46.5, which also are the fourth-most in the NFL since 2021. Combining his Cincinnati log with 13.5 sacks in 2020, his final season with New Orleans, Hendrickson's 60 sacks rank third in the league behind Pittsburgh LB T.J. Watt (66.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62).

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023, which tied for second-most leaguewide and ranked second in Bengals history for a single season. The team record is held by DE Coy Bacon, who had 22.0 sacks in the 1976 campaign (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then started 15 contests for New Orleans in 2020, and has started 52 of 54 regular-season games played for the Bengals.

Hendrickson's production was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension with the Bengals that keeps him in stripes through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard logged his second sack of the 2024 season in Week 7 at Cleveland, when he forced a QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson fumble in the Browns' backfield early in the fourth quarter. It improved Hubbard's career sack total to 38.5, the third-most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected that year — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. He has ranked second on the Bengals in sacks in each season since he became the team's starting left defensive end in 2019, and he has 55 career TFLs.

Hubbard had a pair of TFLs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, with the second stopping RB Derrick Henry in his own end zone to force a safety. It marked the first safety forced by the Bengals since Week 13 of the 2019 season against the N.Y. Jets. He then recorded his first career INT in the Week 7 win over Cleveland, as he dropped into coverage and came down with a tipped pass midway through the third quarter.

Hubbard additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in team history. A native of Cincinnati who attended Archbishop Moeller High School, Hubbard also is known for contributing one of the franchise's most iconic plays, a 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the game-winner in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore following the 2022 season.

LB duo stuffs the stat sheet: Cincinnati's starting LBs Germaine Pratt and Logan Wilson each have 71 total tackles this season, which are tied for third-most in the NFL through seven weeks of play. Pratt has 43 solo tackles, tied for the third-most leaguewide, while Wilson's 40 solo stops rank seventh.

In Week 2 at Kansas City, Pratt and Wilson combined for 28 tackles, the most by a pair of Bengals teammates since LB Vontaze Burfict (18 tackles) and LB Rey Mauluga (10) also totaled 28 on Dec. 30, 2012 against Baltimore. Pratt had a career-high 16 stops against the Chiefs, the fourth-most in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994. He went into double digits in tackles for the

second time this year in Week 7 at Cleveland, finishing with a game-high 13 (10 solos).

Pratt also has contributed to three takeaways this season, beginning with a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City that set up a Bengals FG drive. He recovered another fumble in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, when he scooped up a loose ball in overtime and returned it nine yards into Ravens territory. He then notched his first INT of the year the following week at the N.Y. Giants, coming down with a pick on a tipped pass to end a Giants drive that reached Cincinnati's 14-yard line.

Since the 2021 season, Pratt is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr.

Wilson has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons, highlighted by a career-high 135 stops in 2023 that marked the most by a Cincinnati defender since Burfict had 171 in '13. Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of two players leaguewide with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: LB Logan Wilson's 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2020. He had four picks last season, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh leaguewide.

A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson opened his career with two picks in his 2020 rookie campaign, then followed up with four in '21. That total marked the most in a season by a Bengals LB since Odell Thurman had five INTs in 2005.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the '27 season.

Rehkwow on a run: Through seven weeks of regular-season play, rookie P Ryan Rehkwow ranks second the NFL in net punting average (44.9 net yards per punt; minimum 10 attempts) and eighth in gross average (50.4; min. 10 att.). He has punted 28 times for 1411 yards, with 15 downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line compared to three touchbacks.

Rehkwow kicked off his career with a historic debut on Sept. 8 vs. New England, when he logged four punts for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four attempts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole on Nov. 5, 2023. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkwow's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers). Rehkwow's 80-yarder tied for the 15th-longest punt in league history and was the third-longest in an NFL debut.

In Weeks 5-7, Rehkwow became the first punter in Bengals history to have four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line in three consecutive games. He amassed season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkwow signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson knocked through a 56-yard FG in the third quarter of Week 4 at Carolina, extending his Bengals record to 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards. It also tied for the fifth-longest FG in team history, with McPherson owning five of the top six on that list.

McPherson's 24 such FGs are tied for the third-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021. He finished the 2023 campaign with 21 FGs from 50-plus yards, the most in NFL history in a player's first three seasons.

McPherson in Week 3 against Washington surpassed 100 career FG attempts, and he ranks third in Bengals history for most made FGs through his first 100 tries with 84. Only former kickers Shayne Graham and Randy Bullock (87 each) had a better conversion rate through their 100th attempt. McPherson's current career FG percentage of 83.0 (88 of 106) also is third in team history behind Graham (86.8) and Bullock (84.9; minimum 75 attempts).

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs, including two last season — in OT of Week 13 at Jacksonville, and again in OT of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. However, his two most notable such kicks came during the 2021 postseason, when he hit a 52-yarder in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and followed up a week later with a 31-yarder in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City that sent Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson is a perfect 19 of 19 in seven career postseason games and is the team's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points).

Cincinnati signed McPherson to a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18, securing its kicker through the 2027 season.

Pro Bowl three-peats: WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 which tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor with the induction of former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the Ring of Honor during a halftime ceremony in the team's Week 3 game against Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to

earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; '22), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). He also currently is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage, maintaining a mark of 68.22 percent (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Through seven weeks this season, Burrow ranks third in the NFL in passer rating (110.1), fourth in completions (159), fourth in TD passes (14), fourth in completion percentage (70.4) and sixth in passing yards (1759). He threw for 181 yards and two TDs in the Week 7 win at Cleveland, and his five games with multiple TD passes this year are tied for the most in the league. Burrow threw a career-high five TD passes in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and during that game he also surpassed former QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most career passing yards in team history. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, Burrow capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a quarterback in team history, a 47-yard run to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time last year, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals (2021-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20).

Running backs: Fifth-year veteran **Zack Moss** joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent this past offseason, and through seven games he has 231 rushing yards on a team-leading 69 carries. He also has 19 catches for 159 yards, and has scored three total TDs (two rushing, one receiving). His receiving TD came with one second remaining in the first half of Week 4 at Carolina, while he ran for TDs in Week 1 vs. New England and Week 3 vs. Washington. Moss entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2020, and after amassing 917 rushing yards and eight TDs in two-plus seasons with the Bills, he was traded to Indianapolis in November of '22. He had his best statistical season in 2023, when he set career highs in rushing attempts (183), rushing yards (794), rushing TDs (five) and receptions (27). Complementing Moss in the run game is second-year pro **Chase Brown**. Brown has scored a TD in three of the last four games, with the most recent being a game-sealing 30-yard run late in the fourth quarter of Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. He scored his first two career rushing TDs in Week 4 at Carolina, then in Week 5 vs. Baltimore caught a scoring pass from Burrow. Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, he is averaging 5.0 yards per carry (66 for 327) through seven games and has a team-best 12 runs of 10-plus yards. Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in the 2023 draft, Brown spent four games on the Reserve/Injured list midway through his rookie season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to post 322 yards from scrimmage over the final six contests. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in 2023, and now shares that responsibility with Brown as the Bengals approach the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, while also contributing 15 career receptions for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average).

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons. He is one of eight players in NFL history to begin his career with

three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns, and he posted a career-high 100 catches in 2023 that tied for the second-most in a season in team history. A constant downfield threat, Chase leads the league with 15 TD receptions of 40 or more yards, 11 TD receptions of 50 or more yards and 10 TD receptions of 60 or more yards since the start of his 2021 rookie campaign. He leads the league this season in receiving yards (620) and is tied for the lead in receiving TDs (six) on 39 catches. Chase caught his sixth TD on the Bengals' first possession of the second half in Week 7 at Cleveland, and finished with a team-high five grabs for 55 yards. In the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, he became the fastest player in team history to reach 300 career receptions (51 games). Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and his 4210 career receiving yards following that matchup went in as the fifth-most in NFL history through any player's first 50 appearances. He also is one of just five players in the Super Bowl era to amass 4000-plus receiving yards and 30-plus receiving TDs within his first 50 contests. Higgins missed the first two weeks of this season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to the lineup in Week 3 vs. Washington and has started the past five games. He caught four passes for a team-high 82 yards and a TD in Week 7 at Cleveland, with his score coming late in the third quarter on a slant that he took 25 yards to the end zone. Higgins had a pair of TD catches in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, marking his fifth career multi-TD game. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, he has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then finished with 656 yards in 12 games played last year. Higgins was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andrei Iosivas** has developed a connection with QB Joe Burrow, particularly in the low red zone. He has seven career TDs on just 29 total receptions, and five of those have come on Burrow passes from inside the opponents' five-yard line. He had two scoring grabs in Week 2 at Kansas City, then the following week had another on a fourth-and-goal play against Washington. Though he has just four catches over the last four games, he has contributed to crucial moments in those contests, beginning with a 29-yard grab in Week 4 at Carolina that helped set up a Bengals TD just before halftime. He hauled in a career-long 39-yard reception in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, leading to a TD three plays later. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, he worked free on a third-and-12 late in the fourth quarter and caught a 29-yard pass by Burrow, making way for the game-sealing TD. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. **Trenton Irwin** spent his first three seasons with the Bengals (2019-21) primarily as a practice squad player and game day inactive, but over the past two-plus years he has emerged as a dependable option for Cincinnati's quarterbacks. After totaling just three receptions in those first three seasons, he has 42 catches for 558 yards and five TDs since the start of the 2022 campaign, including a career-high 25 grabs for 316 yards in '23. Though listed as a backup on the depth chart last season, he started five games and showed an ability to line up at multiple WR positions. Irwin has two catches for 11 yards in three games played this season. Second-year pro **Charlie Jones** primarily contributes as a punt and kickoff returner, but he also has eight career catches for 69 yards as a reserve WR. He missed six games last season due to a thumb injury, but returned to play in each of the final eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals added another downfield threat in the third round of April's draft when they selected **Jermaine Burton**. Burton played in 26 games at the University of Alabama from 2022-23, after spending his first two collegiate seasons ('20-21) at the University of Georgia. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while his 20.5 yards per reception led the Southeastern Conference and ranked sixth nationally.

Burton led the Bengals and ranked third leaguewide in preseason receiving yards with 157 on eight catches (19.6 average), with two TDs. His first NFL reception came in Week 2 at Kansas City, when he hauled in a 47-yard deep ball from Burrow on Cincinnati's first offensive play of the second half.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 68 career games (41 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of last season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 84 career receptions for 649 yards and three TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample logged his first statistics of the 2024 campaign in Week 2 at Kansas City, catching three passes for 28 yards. The Bengals added a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last season. Through seven games this season, he leads Bengals TEs in receptions (18) and receiving yards (180). Gesicki played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted a game-high seven catches for 91 yards. He then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington, totaling four catches for 47 yards. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, he challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. Gesicki topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** began the 2023 season on the Bengals' practice squad, but was signed to the active roster in early November and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in catches (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals used their fourth-round draft choice this past April to select **Erick All Jr.**, a native of Fairfield, Ohio (approximately 25 miles north of Cincinnati). All began training camp on the Active/Non-Football Injury list due to a knee injury sustained in October of 2023, but he was cleared to practice in late July and played in all three preseason games. Through seven regular-season games (four starts), All has caught 16 of his 18 targets for 102 yards. He earned his first start in Week 2 at Kansas City and has a target in each of the last six games, while also contributing as a blocker in the run game. He spent his first four collegiate seasons (2019-22) at the University of Michigan, then transferred to the University of Iowa for the '23 campaign. In 40 career college games, he caught 75 passes for 864 yards and five TDs. The Bengals doubled-up on tight ends during the draft when they took **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He caught three passes for 42 yards in the preseason, and has been inactive for each of the first seven regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 43 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 2798 of a possible 2817 offensive snaps in that time (99.3 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started 24 straight games at LOT for the Bengals since signing with them in 2023. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with the Baltimore Ravens, then played two ('21-22) with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. He exited the Week 7 contest at Cleveland with a knee injury in the second quarter and did not return to action. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati

during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. Cappa is one of two Bengals linemen, along with Karras, who haven't been penalized this season. **Cordell Volson** has started each of the Bengals' 43 games (including postseason) at LG since they took him in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. He has lined up for every offensive snap in that time, the only player on the team to do so. Though he has found his role in Cincinnati as the team's LG, he played at guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. Last season, Mims started six games on an offensive line that led the SEC in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.93). He was inactive for the Bengals' first two games this season due to a pectoral injury sustained in the preseason opener. Mims made his NFL debut in Week 3 against Washington, taking over for OT **Trent Brown** following his first-quarter injury. He made his first career start in Week 4 at Carolina and lined up for all 67 offensive snaps. Mims briefly exited the Week 5 contest vs. Baltimore with an ankle injury, but returned in the fourth quarter. G/OT **Cody Ford**, a former college teammate of Orlando Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma, signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and served as a key depth piece in his first season with Cincinnati. He saw action in all 17 games, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He has played in 73 career games with 34 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG and two as a third TE. Ford was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The team's final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft, C **Matt Lee** was taken in the seventh round (237th overall) after playing in 51 games during his college career. He spent the first four years of his career (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16), while blocking for an offense that ranked second in the conference in total yards per game (431.2). Lee has appeared in all seven games for the Bengals this season primarily on special teams, but he lined up for three offensive snaps in Week 7 at Cleveland. The most recent addition to the O-Line is OT/G **Andrew Stueber**, who was signed off Atlanta's practice squad on Oct. 8 and has been inactive for Cincinnati's two games since then. A seventh-round pick of New England in 2022, Stueber spent his rookie season on the Reserve/Non-Football Injury list, then was on the Patriots' practice squad in '23. He played in 34 games with 22 starts (20 at ROT, two at RG) during a five-year career (2017-21) at the University of Michigan.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who has led the Bengals in sacks and been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his three seasons with the team. He signed with Cincinnati as a free agent in 2021, and in '23 posted a career-high 17.5 sacks which tied for second in the league and ranked second in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 60.0 sacks since the start of the 2020 season — his final year with the New Orleans Saints — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (66.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62.0). He has seven sacks through seven games this season, tied for the fourth-most leaguewide. Hendrickson recorded two sacks in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 7 at Cleveland, marking his 14th career multi-sack game, and third of the 2024 campaign. On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has recorded 38.5 career sacks, the third-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons, and his 58 total tackles in 2023 led all Bengals D-linemen. Hubbard has recorded 28 total tackles through the first seven games of this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, and then a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone in the second quarter. Hubbard grabbed his first career INT in Week 7 at Cleveland when he picked off a tipped pass by Browns QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson in the third quarter. He also posted his

second sack of the season in the fourth quarter, bringing down Thompson-Robinson and forcing him to fumble in Cleveland's backfield. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 44 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22 and all 17 regular-season games in '23. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 13 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 13 passes at the line of scrimmage. Hill opened the season with three tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, but he suffered a hamstring injury the following week at Kansas City that kept him out of the lineup for Weeks 3-4. He returned to action in Week 5 vs. Baltimore and totaled five tackles, a QB hit and a PD. Hill posted a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and he also deflected a pass by QB Daniel Jones that led to LB Germaine Pratt's INT in the first quarter. Ninth-year veteran **Sheldon Rankins** notched his first sack as a Bengal when he brought down Browns QB Deshaun Watson for a loss of seven yards in Week 7 at Cleveland. He returned to action in Week 6 after missing the previous three games due to a hamstring injury sustained in Week 2 at Kansas City. Rankins signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in March and has 112 games of NFL experience. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, he spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 30.5 career sacks and 44 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in any season of his career. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, he has played in 37 career regular-season games and totaled 45 tackles with 4.5 sacks. Ossai was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins missed the first two games of his rookie season due to a thumb injury, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. He made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' first drive of the game. He is coming off 32 defensive snaps played in Week 7 at Cleveland. Jenkins was a Michigan team captain and a second-team All-American last season, when he logged 37 tackles with 2.5 sacks and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has recorded seven tackles and a PD in Weeks 5-7 after spending the first four games on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last season, tallying 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinnley Jackson**, who also missed the first four contests with a knee injury, made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore and has seen action on 52 snaps over the past three games. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2024 out of Texas A&M, Jackson totaled 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks in 40 career games as an Aggie, and served as a captain for two seasons. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has been inactive for five games this season, but played a combined 34 defensive snaps in Weeks 3 and 4. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. DT **Lawrence Guy** added depth and a veteran presence to the D-line room when he signed with the Bengals as a free agent on Sept. 17. Guy is in his 14th NFL season and previously spent time with Indianapolis, the San Diego Chargers, Baltimore and New England. He played for the Patriots from 2017-23, logging 379 tackles and 10.5 sacks in that stint. He made his Bengals debut in Week 3 vs. Washington, and played a combined 76 defensive snaps in Weeks 3-5 (inactive for past two games).

Linebackers: A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Logan Wilson** has developed into one of the NFL's top linebackers and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most

by any NFL LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. Wilson through seven games this season ranks tied for third in the NFL with 71 tackles, alongside his fellow starter **Germaine Pratt**. A sixth-year pro, Pratt has set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons and has a knack for creating game-changing takeaways. Since the start of the 2021 season, he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 78 of 86 career regular-season games played, and boasts a streak of 68 consecutive starts (including postseason). Pratt was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career. He posted a career-high 16 stops in Week 2 at Kansas City, and forced and recovered a fumble to set up a Bengals FG drive. He had his second FR of the year in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, when he scooped up a loose ball in overtime and returned it into Ravens territory. Pratt picked off a deflected ball at Cincinnati's three-yard for his first INT of 2024 in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. He is coming off a team-best 13-tackle performance in Week 7 at Cleveland. Also wearing the captains patch for the first time this season is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 61 games with four starts for the Bengals. He serves as a rotational LB and core special teamer, and battled through a knee injury last season to play in 13 games. Davis-Gaither saw action on 16 defensive snaps in Week 2 at Kansas City, and picked off QB Patrick Mahomes late in the first quarter for his second career INT (first since 2020). He also has lined up for a team-high 152 special teams snaps through seven games this season. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 33 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 35 career tackles and one PD in 46 games played. Among the most notable stories in Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27), and added two PDs. He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for 151 special teams snaps through seven regular-season games.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzer with 11.5 career sacks. In 2023, he recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). He also had a pair of INTs and eight PDs last season. Hilton entered the league as a college free agent signee by Jacksonville in 2016 and was briefly on New England's practice squad before spending four-plus seasons with Pittsburgh. He has totaled 22 tackles in six games this season, missing Week 5 due to a knee injury. Hilton notched a season-best five stops in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and broke up a pass on a Giants' fourth-down play on the opening drive of the second half. He posted another five tackles with a TFL in Week 7 at Cleveland. Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 28 of 29 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. He missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. He opened this season with six tackles (four solos) in Week 1 against New England, then grabbed his first INT of the year with a highlight-reel one-handed pick on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City. He has combined for 20 tackles and four PDs over the past three games. **DJ Turner II** is in his second pro season, after a rookie campaign in which he played in all 17 games and started 12 of the final 13 contests. A second-round draft choice last year, he ran the fastest 40-yard dash time among all players at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. Turner has 19 tackles and four PDs this season, and has started each of the past two games. He helped secure the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants when he knocked down a fourth-down pass from the Bengals' 36-yard line late in the fourth quarter. Turner posted 50 stops and seven PDs as a rookie last season. The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice this year, **Josh Newton**, made the team out of training camp after posting nine tackles, two PDs and an INT in preseason. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of Newton after his name was called on the third day of the draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 68 tackles

with 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to Texas Christian from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups and helped lead the team to the College Football Playoff National Championship game. Newton has lined up for 33 defensive snaps and 97 special teams snaps through seven games this season. **DJ Ivey** made his season debut in Week 7 at Cleveland, after spending the first six games on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury. He sustained the injury in Week 15 of the 2023 campaign against Minnesota, ending a promising rookie campaign in which he carved out a role as a special teams contributor and reserve defensive back. A seventh-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, he earned a roster spot coming out of his rookie training camp and played in eight games last season. He played in 58 games during a five-year collegiate career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.), tallying six INTs and 17 PDs.

Safeties: Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 38 tackles through seven games this season and has lined up for 464 of the team's 500 defensive snaps. Bell grabbed his first INT of the season against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 32-yard return following the pick set up Cincinnati's first TD of the game. It marked his eighth career INT and his first since Week 2 of 2023. One of the headliners of Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who emerged as a ball-hawking safety in his final season with Baltimore. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 broke out with an AFC-leading seven INTs (second in NFL). His seven picks included a streak of four consecutive games with an INT. Stone originally was a seventh-round pick of the Ravens in 2020. He has 37 tackles through seven games in 2024, including seven in each of the last two games. Stone recorded his first INT as a Bengal in Week 7 at Cleveland, picking off QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson in the fourth quarter and returning it 49 yards. He sustained a lower leg injury later in the final minutes of the Browns game and did not return. **Jordan Battle** is in his second pro season, after starting seven straight games at safety to close out his rookie year in 2023. He ranked fifth on the team in tackles last season with 69, while also contributing an INT, five PDs and two sacks. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, he was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Battle had a pick-six in the preseason finale against Indianapolis, and has played 43 defensive snaps and 122 special teams snaps through seven regular-season contests. He posted four tackles in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading seven special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, he led the team with eight special teams stops last year despite missing the final 10 games. Anderson missed his entire rookie season due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had

two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Daijahn Anthony** made the Bengals' 53-man roster coming out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 11 defensive snaps and 105 special teams snaps through the first seven games of this season. In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

Special teams: Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** has quickly become one of the top kickers in the NFL and a fan-favorite in Cincinnati. He ranks third on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (83.0 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history and tied for the third-most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. McPherson's 28-yard FG midway through the second quarter in Week 3 vs. Washington marked his 100th career FG attempt, and his 84 made FGs to that point were the third-most in team history through a kicker's first 100 tries. McPherson inked a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 348 attempts in 42 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through seven games ranks second in the NFL in net punting average (44.9 net yards per punt; minimum 15 attempts) and eighth in gross average (50.4). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (min. four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. His 52.0 net yards per punt also was the second-highest average in a game in team history. He has downed four punts inside opponents' 20-yard lines in each of the past three games, becoming the first Bengals punter to do so in three straight contests. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** is coming off a 100-yard kickoff return for a TD to open the game in Week 7 at Cleveland. It marked the second time in team history that the Bengals scored a TD on the game's opening kick, and it was the longest KOR in the NFL this season. Jones earned the punt returner job early in his rookie season in 2023 and took command of that role in just his second game, when he returned a punt 81 yards for a TD against Baltimore. Jones has returned 14 punts this season for 99 yards, including a season-long 23-yarder last week against the Browns. Fifth-year WR Trenton Irwin had 10 of his 13 career punt returns last season. He averaged 9.8 yards per return in 2023, with two returns for over 20 yards in Week 5 at Arizona. HBs **Chase Brown** and **Trayveon Williams** also have returned kickoffs this season. Brown is averaging 26.6 yards per return on seven attempts, with a long of 29 yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Williams served as the team's primary KOR over the past two-plus years and holds a career regular-season average of 22.5 yards on 33 returns.

Cincinnati Bengals 32, Philadelphia Eagles 14
Sunday, Dec. 4, 2016 at Paul Brown Stadium

The Bengals scored on their first six possessions (three TDs and three FGs) for the first time since Game 7 of 2009, and with a defensive performance that was particularly strong early in the game, the Eagles were quickly dispatched. The Bengals mounted a 29-0 lead en route to the final result. QB Andy Dalton led the Cincinnati offense with a personal season-best 130.0 passer rating, while LB Vontaze Burfict and DE Carlos Dunlap led the defense. Burfict had two INTs with 54 yards in returns and 15 tackles, the team high for the season. Dunlap deflected four Eagles passes, one leading to one of Burfict's INTs, and Dunlap also had a shared sack. The Bengals limited the Eagles to 104 net yards offense in the first half. Cincinnati snapped a four-game winless streak and improved to 4-7-1, still mathematically alive for the AFC North championship. The Eagles fell to 5-7.

Cincinnati Bengals 23, Philadelphia Eagles 23
Sunday, Sept. 27, 2020 at Lincoln Financial Field

The Bengals and Eagles battled to the second tie in series history, inside a Lincoln Financial Field without fans due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Bengals QB Joe Burrow, who was making his third career start, threw for 312 yards and two TDs — both to fellow rookie Tee Higgins — and posted his first career 100-plus passer rating. But Cincinnati struggled to block Philadelphia's defensive front, as the Eagles sacked Burrow eight times and allowed only 48 yards rushing. Still, Cincinnati led the entire fourth quarter, until Eagles QB Carson Wentz scored on a seven-yard scramble with 21 seconds left to force overtime. Cincinnati's offense slowed in OT, producing just two first downs. The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.
