GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Ian Eagle (play-by-play), Charles Davis (analyst) and Evan Washburn (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals open the regular season with the 100th installment of the "Battle of Ohio," as Cincinnati heads to Cleveland to take on the Browns on Sunday at Cleveland Browns Stadium.

After five weeks of training camp and preseason preparation, the Bengals now turn their attention to a 2023 campaign in which they look to secure a third consecutive AFC North Division title and third straight appearance in the AFC Championship Game.



Cincinnati had a busy offseason which included the additions of several notable unrestricted free agents and an eight-player draft class, as well as the re-signing of multiple core pieces — all with the goal of bolstering what already is considered by many to be a

championship-caliber roster. Head coach Zac Taylor, who retained virtually the entire coaching staff from a season ago, looks to further establish a culture centered on a solid work ethic and a team-first approach, and for Bengals players to carry those high standards into this week's matchup.

"I feel like they're in the place they need to be right now," Taylor said. "Now we just have to go show it on Sunday. I really like what our guys are about. I really like the effort and attention to detail they've put forth in these last couple weeks, so I feel very confident that we're going to get in a good week of work and be ready to go on Sunday."

Cincinnati's success over the past two seasons can largely be attributed to complementary football. Offensively, the Bengals boast a young nucleus fueled by an air attack that ranked fifth in the NFL in passing yards per game (265.0) in 2022. The offense once again is led by QB Joe Burrow, who enters his fourth pro season as the league's all-time leader in career completion percentage (68.2; minimum 1500 passing attempts). Burrow holds Bengals single-season records in nearly every major passing category, including completions (414) and TD passes (35), which he set last season. He is flanked by arguably the top receiving trio in the NFL, composed of eighth-year slot WR Tyler Boyd, fourth-year veteran Tee Higgins and third-year pro Ja'Marr Chase. Higgins and Chase both have eclipsed 1000 receiving yards in each of the past two seasons, while Chase and Boyd have the most individual TD catches of 50-plus yards leaguewide since 2021 with six and four, respectively.

As he heads into his third season with his current array of weapons as well as his second with a revamped offensive line, Burrow acknowledged a reliance on chemistry as much as talent.

"It's critical as a quarterback — you have to have guys that you trust to make those plays," Burrow said. "Sometimes it's not going to be pretty. There's not

always going to be 10 yards of separation, and the pocket is not always going to be perfect. But when you have guys that you trust and guys that you love to make those plays, it makes you feel good as a quarterback."

The Bengals' defense features a crop of contributors which has consistently stepped up in key moments over the past two seasons. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo's unit ranked sixth in the NFL during the 2022 regular season in points allowed per game (20.1), while holding opponents to the seventh-fewest rushing yards per contest (106.6). Cincinnati's front office secured multiple core members of the defense this offseason with contract extensions for DE Trey Hendrickson, LB Germaine Pratt and LB Logan Wilson. They join fellow veterans DT DJ Reader, DE Sam Hubbard and CB Mike Hilton — among others — in forming an experienced, battle-tested group, but the defense this year also will lean on several young players. Dax Hill, the team's first-round draft choice in 2022, along with free agent acquisition Nick Scott make up a new-look safety duo, while second-year CB Cam Taylor-Britt looks to build on an impressive rookie campaign.

According to Wilson, the contributions from all three levels of the defense — combined with a shared commitment to winning — is what has allowed it to improve over the past three seasons into one of the league's strongest units.

"That's what makes football so unique in general, is you've got guys coming from all sorts of different backgrounds," Wilson said. "It doesn't matter where they came from, but you're all coming together with one goal in mind and that is to win a Super Bowl. When guys have that same goal in mind, you can help each other get better and push each other."

Sunday marks the Bengals' first road season opener since 2019. Cincinnati snapped a five-game losing skid to its in-state rival in Week 14 of the 2022 campaign, claiming a 23-10 home win over the Browns that was highlighted by the defense holding Cleveland's strong rushing attack (ranked No. 4 in the NFL at the time) to just 71 yards on the ground — its second-lowest output of the season. The Browns finished 2022 averaging 146.5 rushing yards per game (sixth in NFL), and Pro Bowl RB Nick Chubb's production against the Cincinnati defensive front is expected to be one of several key matchups on Sunday.

The series: The Bengals lead 52-47 in the "Battle of Ohio" series, but the Browns have won five of the past six meetings, and eight of the last 10. Home field has been a factor over the series, as the Bengals lead 32-18 at home, but trail 20-29 as the road club.

Cincinnati has played more games against Cleveland (99) than any foe except Pittsburgh. The Bengals have 105 all-time regular-season games against the Steelers (107 including postseason).

With regard to season sweeps, the series recently has been a relatively streaky affair. In the past five seasons, the Browns have swept Cincinnati three times (in 2018, '20 and '21) and split twice (in '19 and '22). Prior to that stretch, the Bengals' had swept the Browns in three consecutive seasons (in 2015, '16 and '17).

More series notes:

- When Cleveland swept Cincinnati in 2018, it was the Browns' first season sweep over the Bengals since 2002.
- Cleveland's win in the first matchup of 2018 snapped a seven-game Bengals winning streak against the Browns. That streak, the Bengals' longest in the series, began with the second meeting of 2014.
- The Browns' longest win streak over Cincinnati also has been seven games, extending from the second matchup of the 1992 season through the second matchup of '95.

• Since the Browns' rebirth in 1999, the Bengals lead 28-20, including 16-8 as the home team and 12-12 as the visiting team.

Bengals seek to regain biggest 'Battle' margin: With its eight victories in the last 10 meetings with Cincinnati, Cleveland has whittled the Bengals' largest lead of 11 games in the team's all-time series down to five games. The Bengals' 11-game lead after the 2017 season set the benchmark for the biggest lead held by either side in the "Battle of Ohio" series.

The series began in 1970 with the Browns winning six of the first seven, and their five-game margin at 6-1, after the first meeting of 1973, stands as their largest lead. The Bengals lead 51-41 since that Cleveland high-water mark. The Browns have not led the series since the end of 2005, when they were 33-32.

Since surrendering that 33-32 lead by giving up a sweep in the 2006 meetings, the Browns have twice pulled into ties — at 34-34 after the first meeting of '07 and at 35-35 after the first meeting of '08. But the Browns have now endured a 16-year stretch without a lead in the series. Barring possible additions to the series in postseason play, the Bengals cannot surrender their series lead until after the first game of 2025, at the earliest. The Browns could not lead again until after the second game of '25.

More Bengals-Browns facts: The first-ever Bengals-Browns meeting of any kind was Aug. 29, 1970. On that Saturday, the Browns were visitors for the second preseason game of Riverfront Stadium's debut year. The Bengals won 31-24, moving to 2-0 in preseason in their new home.

Also:

- The Bengals were 17-10 against the Browns at Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field.
- The Browns were 17-8 against the Bengals at the old Cleveland Stadium, but the teams are tied 12-12 at Cleveland Browns Stadium (named FirstEnergy Stadium from 2013-23).
- The Bengals and Browns never played at Nippert Stadium, as Nippert was the Bengals' American Football League home from 1968-69.
- The Bengals have posted 13 season sweeps, and the Browns have posted 11. The teams have split 25 times. In 1982, they played only once, with the scheduled contest at Cleveland cancelled due to a players' strike.
- The first Bengals-Browns regular-season game at Cincinnati on Nov. 15, 1970 drew the first home crowd of 60,000 in Bengals history (60,007 at Riverfront Stadium). The Bengals won 14-10 behind a 110-yard rushing effort from QB Virgil Carter, the only 100-yarder by a QB in Bengals history.
- The largest Bengals home crowd for a Browns game has been 66,222, on Dec. 11 last season at Paycor Stadium. That ranks as the fifth-largest home crowd in Bengals history. The previous high vs. Cleveland at home had stood for 17 years — a mark of 66,072 attended a Sept. 17, 2006 game at Paycor, which then was known as Paul Brown Stadium.
- The Browns drew the largest Bengals crowd in the Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field era — 60,284 for a 27-24 Browns win on Oct. 17, 1971.
- The Bengals and Browns met three times in preseason at Ohio Stadium in Columbus, from 1972-74. All were Sunday afternoon games, and the Browns won two of the three.

‘Battle’ Coaches: Here are some notes about head coaches in the “Battle of Ohio” series:

• When Cincinnati’s Zac Taylor and Cleveland’s Freddie Kitchens met in the first “Battle of Ohio” of 2019, it was just the second time in series history that a Bengals-Browns meeting featured two rookie head coaches who faced both each other and their Ohio rival for the first time in the same game. The Browns won that contest at FirstEnergy Stadium, 27-19. The first such instance occurred on Oct. 21, 1984, when Bengals first-year head coach Sam Wyche met Browns first-year head coach Marty Schottenheimer in Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium, with the Bengals winning, 12-9. The Bengals’ Homer Rice and the Browns’ Sam Rutigliano also were rookie head coaches when they met for the first time on Dec. 17, 1978 at Riverfront. However, that was Rutigliano’s second “Battle of Ohio” as Cleveland’s head coach. The two teams met in Game 2 that year, before Rice, who was named head coach after Game 5, took the reins.

• Former Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis, who was 22-10 overall against Cleveland, has the most total wins and best winning percentage (.688) of any Bengals head coach in the series. Lewis also has coached the most games (32) against Cleveland. Sam Wyche is second in all three categories, with 10 wins, a .625 winning percentage (10-6) and 16 games.

• Bill Belichick has been the top Browns coach in the series, having posted an 8-2 mark against the Bengals during his 1991-95 tenure.

• Lewis is the only Bengals head coach whose first Cincinnati victory came against Cleveland. Lewis took over as head coach in 2003, and his first win was a 21-14 decision at Cleveland on Sept. 28 of that year. The Bengals entered that game at 0-3, but went on to finish 8-8. The six-game improvement, after a 2-14 season in 2002, was the largest in the NFL for ‘03.

• Forrest Gregg is the only head coach to pilot both teams in the “Battle of Ohio.” Gregg was 1-5 as Browns coach against the Bengals from 1975-77, and he was 3-4 as Bengals coach against the Browns from ‘80-83.

• Here are Bengals head coaches, in chronological order, and their records in the “Battle of Ohio:” Paul Brown (5-7), Bill “Tiger” Johnson (3-2), Homer Rice (2-1), Forrest Gregg (3-4), Sam Wyche (10-6), Dave Shula (1-7), Bruce Coslet (2-1), Dick LeBeau (2-3), Marvin Lewis (22-10) and Zac Taylor (2-6).

• The Bengals are 11-8 against Browns head coaches directing their first game in the series. Browns head coaches who won their first game have been Blanton Collier (1970), Nick Skorich (‘71), Sam Rutigliano (‘78), Bill Belichick (‘91), Rob Chudzinski (2013), Mike Pettine (‘14), Freddie Kitchens (‘19) and Kevin Stefanski (‘20). On the losing end for Cleveland have been Forrest Gregg (1975), Marty Schottenheimer (‘84), Bud Carson (‘89), Jim Shofner (‘90), Chris Palmer (‘99), Butch Davis (2001), Romeo Crennel (‘05), Eric Mangini (‘09), Pat Shurmur (‘11), Hue Jackson (‘16) and Gregg Williams (‘18).

• Bengals coaches show a 7-3 record the first time out against Cleveland. The seven winners have been Bill Johnson (1976), Homer Rice (‘78), Sam Wyche (‘84), Dave Shula (‘92), Bruce Coslet (‘99), Dick LeBeau (2000) and Marvin Lewis (‘03). Losing in the first try vs. Cleveland were Paul Brown (1970), Forrest Gregg (‘80) and Zac Taylor (2019).

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks this week at Cleveland. It is Cincinnati’s most frequent look over the past two seasons and has yielded consistent success, as the Bengals are 8-2 overall when wearing this combination. The team first donned this combination in the 2021 regular-season opener, a 27-24 overtime win at home against Minnesota. Cincinnati also sported this look in each of its last four road postseason contests, collecting a 3-1 record.

The Bengals wore nine different uniform combinations last season, with four different jerseys, three different pants and three different socks featured at least once. Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms prior to the 2021 campaign, marking the team’s first significant redesign since ‘04.

NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate jerseys and/or color rush (CR) uniforms and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. In 2022, with the league’s approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the “White Bengal,” featuring a white base coat and the team’s iconic black stripes. The Bengals wore the helmet twice last season, in a Week 4 home win over Miami and a Week 11 road victory at Pittsburgh. The team announced the “White Bengal” look will return for two games in 2023, both on Monday Night Football — Week 3 against the L.A. Rams and Week 13 at Jacksonville.

[^] — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since ‘20, prior to the ‘21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023, the Bengals are permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

Bengals career records watch: As the 2023 campaign gets underway, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals’ career records list (regular season):

• QB Joe Burrow has 1530 career passing attempts, 691 shy of QB Jeff Blake for fifth place all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team’s career list.

• Burrow has 1044 completions, 196 shy of Blake for fifth place all-time. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654), Palmer (2024) and Esiason (2015) hold the top four spots on the team’s career list.

• Burrow has 11,774 passing yards, 3360 shy of Blake for fifth place all-time. He also has 82 TD passes, 11 shy of Blake for fifth place all-time.

• Burrow additionally has 16 career games of 300 or more passing yards, one shy of Palmer (17) for fourth place all-time. Dalton (28), Esiason (23) and Anderson (19) hold the top three spots on the team’s career list.

• HB Joe Mixon has 1314 career rushing attempts, 30 shy of HB James Brooks (1344) for fourth place all-time. Mixon in 2022 surpassed HB Cedric Benson (1109).

• Mixon has 5378 rushing yards, 43 shy of FB Pete Johnson (5421) for fourth place all-time and 364 shy of HB Rudi Johnson (5742) for third place all-time. HB Corey Dillon (8061) and Brooks (6447) hold the top two spots on the team’s career list.

• Mixon has 40 rushing TDs, five shy of Dillon (45) for third place all-time and eight shy of Rudi Johnson (48) for second place all-time. Pete Johnson (64) is the team’s career record holder.

• Mixon has 14 games with 100 or more rushing yards, one shy of Benson for fourth place all-time. Dillon (28), Rudi Johnson (19) and Brooks (17) hold the top three spots on the team’s career list.

- WR Tyler Boyd has 446 career receptions, 61 shy of WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fourth place all-time. Boyd in 2022 surpassed WR Cris Collinsworth (417).

- K Evan McPherson needs 13 FG attempts to reach 75 in his career, which would qualify him for the Bengals' all-time FG percentage record. McPherson enters his third pro season with an 83.9 career percentage (52 made/62 att.). There are two qualifying former Bengals with higher career FG percentages — Shayne Graham (86.76 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.91 percent; 90/106).

Records vs. Browns: The two highest-scoring games in Bengals history have each been against the Browns. On Nov. 28, 2004 at Paycor Stadium (then known as Paul Brown Stadium), the Bengals won 58-48, and the 106 total points is not only a Bengals record, it is the second-most in NFL history, behind only 113 from Washington's 72-41 win over the N.Y. Giants in 1966. And on Sept. 16, 2007, the Bengals and Browns combined for 96 points at Cleveland in a 51-45 Browns win.

More on Bengals records against the Browns:

- On Dec. 21, 1980 vs. Cleveland, DE Eddie Edwards set the Bengals record for sacks in a game with five. The mark stood unchallenged for 19 years, until DE Antwan Odom tied it on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay.

- In the final Bengals game at Cinergy Field, on Dec. 12, 1999, Cincinnati limited the Browns to the fewest rushing yards ever by an opponent. Cleveland had only 11 net yards on 11 attempts.

- On Sept. 10, 2000, WR Craig Yeast tied a Bengals record for most punt returns in a game with seven. The record was set by RB Tony Davis in 1977, and in addition to Yeast, has since been tied by WR Brandon Tate in 2011.

- On Nov. 25, 2001 at Cleveland, T.J. Houshmandzadeh set the Bengals record for punt return yards in a game with 126. His 86-yarder in that game ranks tied for third-longest in club history, and it still ranks as the longest punt return in team history which did not result in a touchdown.

- The 58-48 Bengals win on Nov. 28, 2004 is the only game in club history in which Cincinnati scored double figures in all four quarters (14-13-14-17 — 58).

- In the Sept. 16, 2007 shootout with the Browns noted above, QB Carson Palmer threw six TD passes, the most ever by a Bengals QB in a single game. That mark also stands tied for the team record for most TD passes in a game.

- On Dec. 21, 2008, at Cleveland, Bengals CB Leon Hall tied the team record for most interceptions in a game with three. He was the seventh Bengal to reach that mark in a contest, though no one has done it since.

- On Nov. 17, 2013, the Bengals scored 31 points in the second quarter, a team record for most points in a quarter, en route to a 41-20 Cincinnati victory.

- In their 30-0 win at Cleveland on Dec. 14, 2014, the Bengals allowed only five first downs, fewest by an opponent in Bengals history.

- On Oct 23, 2016 against Cleveland, HB Jeremy Hill had the most rushing yards in club history without hitting double digits in carries, breaking a mark that had stood for 45 years. Hill went nine-for-168, averaging 18.7 yards per carry.

- The Bengals' 23-20 overtime victory at Cleveland on Oct. 4, 2009 stands as the longest Bengals game not to end in a tie, and it will remain so for the foreseeable future. Only four seconds remained in the overtime period when K Shayne Graham booted a 31-yard field goal to break a 20-all deadlock. Elapsed scoreboard clock time for the game was 74:56. Only three games lasted longer in Bengals history, and all three were 75-minute ties — in 2008 vs. Philadelphia, in '14 vs. Carolina and '16 vs. Washington in London. The NFL shortened overtime from a 15-minute period to a 10-minute period in 2017, so the longest a game can last nowadays since that rule change is 70 total minutes.

Individually vs. Browns: Here is a look at the collective offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against Cleveland (ordered by total games played):

- WR Tyler Boyd: 12 games; 50 receptions for 525 yards (10.5) and five TDs; Three rushes for 47 yards (15.7).

- HB Joe Mixon: 10 games; 171 rushes for 841 yards (4.9) and six TDs; 38 receptions for 328 yards (8.6).

- QB Joe Burrow: Five games; (1-4 W-L record); 216 attempts and 143 completions (66.2 percent) for 1475 yards, 10 TDs and five INTs (91.5 passer rating); 22 rushes for 66 yards (3.0) and one TD.

- WR Tee Higgins: Five games; 17 receptions for 233 yards (13.7) and two TDs; one rush for seven yards.

- HB Trayveon Williams: Five games; 10 rushes for 40 yards (4.0); Two receptions for 10 yards (5.0).

- WR Trenton Irwin: Four games; Five receptions for 94 yards (18.8) and one TD.

- WR Stanley Morgan (Practice Squad): Four games; One reception for eight yards; One rush for three yards.

- TE Drew Sample: Four games; 16 receptions for 141 yards (8.8).

- TE Mitchell Wilcox: Four games; Five receptions for 29 yards (5.8).

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Three games; 18 receptions for 194 yards (10.8) and one TD; Three rushes for six yards (2.0).

- HB Chris Evans: Three games; Seven rushes for 35 yards (5.0); Six receptions for 61 yards (10.2) and one TD.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2023 season is his fifth in the position.

In 2022, Taylor led Cincinnati to a second consecutive AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship. The Bengals tied a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), and with a pair of playoff victories in January, Taylor became one of just 13 head coaches in NFL history with five wins in their first six career postseason games. He once again oversaw a dynamic offense that ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0).

The Bengals also boasted a versatile defense that held opposing passers to a league-low 58.9 completion percentage while also ranking sixth in points allowed (20.1 per game) and seventh in rushing yards allowed (106.6).

In 2021, Taylor guided the Bengals to their first division championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim the AFC crown and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. QB Joe Burrow, playing in his first full season in Taylor's system, was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after leading the league in completion percentage (70.4), while first-round draft pick WR Ja'Marr Chase totaled the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455) en route to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped the Bengals navigate the league's COVID-19 pandemic protocols which included no in-person offseason program. Still, he guided a rookie Burrow to notable production that included the most ever completions by a QB through their first 10 games (264) and the fifth-most passing yards (2688).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both offense and defense. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game

rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped guide QB Jared Goff to career highs in every major passing category as the Rams won the NFC West and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Taylor had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant quarterbacks coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and tight ends coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous program records, totaling 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. He was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2006 after passing for 3197 yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action.

Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

The 2020 NFL Coach of the Year, **Kevin Stefanski** is in his fourth season as the Cleveland Browns head coach after being named the 18th full-time head coach in franchise history on Jan. 13, 2020.

Prior to joining the Browns, Stefanski spent 14 seasons (2006-19) with the Minnesota Vikings and moved up the coaching ladder from assistant to the head coach to offensive coordinator.

In his first season at Cleveland, Stefanski led the team to its first playoff

appearance since 2002 and first playoff victory in 26 years. He notched the most wins (11) by a first-year Browns head coach since Hall of Famer Paul Brown had 12 in the team's inaugural season in 1946. Stefanski's 11 regular-season wins were the most by any first-year head coach in 2020 and marked just the 11th time since 1970 a first-year coach had won 11 or more games.

Stefanski gained his first league experience with the Vikings in 2006 as an assistant to the head coach before transitioning to assistant quarterbacks coach from '09-13. He also spent two seasons tutoring the tight ends (2014-15), one season as running backs coach ('16), two seasons guiding the quarterbacks ('17-18) and added the role of interim offensive coordinator for the remaining three games of the '18 season. The Vikings promoted him to offensive coordinator in 2019.

Stefanski played defensive back at Pennsylvania (2000-04) and earned a bachelor's degree in communications. He has no pro playing experience.

Stefanski was born on April 8, 1982. A native of Philadelphia, Pa., he and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Will and Gabe, and one daughter, Juliet.

Coaching continuity under Taylor: Head coach Zac Taylor returns virtually the entire coaching staff for the 2023 season, including defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo, offensive coordinator Brian Callahan and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons.

Anarumo, Callahan and Simmons have all been on staff since Taylor was hired in February 2019. The Bengals are the only team in the NFL with the same head and same coordinators in place for each season since 2021.

Simmons is the longest-tenured coach on the Bengals' staff and enters his 21st season with the team in 2023. He has led Cincinnati's special teams units each year since 2003. Defensive quality control coach Sigismondo "Louie" Cioffi returns for his 17th Bengals season, after serving as an assistant coach from 1997-2010 and then rejoining the staff in '21. Senior defensive assistant Mark Duffner, who previously was a Bengals assistant from 1997-2002 before returning in '19, now heads into his 11th season in Cincinnati.

Brad Kragthorpe enters his first season in the role of assistant quarterbacks coach, after spending the previous two years (2021-22) as assistant wide receivers coach. Kragthorpe played QB collegiately at Louisiana State from

2013-15, then returned to LSU in '18 as an offensive analyst in QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase's first season with the Tigers. He joined the Cincinnati staff as an offensive assistant in 2019.

Recapping memorable 2022 season: Off a postseason run to Super Bowl LVI the previous season, the Bengals entered the 2022 campaign with high aspirations. Cincinnati, fueled by a balanced and talented rosters, put together another historic season that included a second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship.

Cincinnati finished the regular season 12-4, tying for the most wins in a season in team history. After a Week 8 loss at Cleveland left the team 4-4 heading into November, it proceeded to tie another franchise record with eight consecutive victories, five of which came against teams that qualified for the playoffs the previous year. The Bengals claimed the AFC North crown prior to the regular-season finale, then went on to defeat Baltimore in the Wild Card Playoff and Buffalo in the Divisional Playoff. Cincinnati once again traveled to Kansas City to face the Chiefs in the AFC Championship, but this time came up short in a 23-20 loss to end the season.

The Bengals' offense was once again headlined by Joe Burrow, who in his third season further established himself among the league's elite QBs. Burrow passed for 35 TDs, eclipsing his own team record set in 2021, while also ranking

fifth in the NFL in both completions (414, team record) and passing yards (4475). He was selected to the Pro Bowl alongside his top target, second-year WR Ja'Marr Chase. Chase led the Bengals in receptions (87), receiving yards (1046) and receiving TDs (nine) during the regular season, despite missing four games due to a hip injury. The 2021 AP Offensive Rookie of the Year joined former WR A.J. Green as the only players in team history with consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons to begin their career. With Chase out of the lineup for Weeks 8-12, fellow WR Tee Higgins was relied on as the team's No. 1 receiving option and finished the year with 74 catches for 1029 yards and seven TDs.

Defensively, Cincinnati allowed just 20.1 points per game, the sixth-lowest average in the NFL, while it held opposing QBs to a league-low 58.9 completion percentage. The Bengals' defense boasted playmakers on all three levels, led by a line that spearheaded the NFL's seventh-ranked run defense (106.6). DE Trey Hendrickson had a team-leading eight sacks and three FFs to earn his second straight Pro Bowl nod. At LB, Logan Wilson and Germaine Pratt each set a career high in total tackles with 123 and 99, respectively, while also combining for 3.5 sacks and three INTs.

Cincinnati's postseason began with a 24-17 home win over Baltimore that notably produced one of the most iconic plays in Bengals history. With the score tied 17-17 early in the fourth quarter and Baltimore possessing the ball at the Cincinnati one-yard line, Ravens QB Tyler Huntley attempted to reach it over a pile of linemen, but was met at the summit by Logan Wilson, who knocked it out of his hands and into the waiting arms of DE Sam Hubbard. Hubbard ran 98 yards to the opposite end zone, evading Ravens TE Mark Andrews in the process, to score what ended up being the game-deciding TD. It was the longest fumble return for a TD in NFL postseason history, and the longest score of any kind in Bengals postseason history.

The following week in a snowy setting at Buffalo's Highmark Stadium, the Bengals jumped out to a 14-0 lead and never looked back, dominating both lines of scrimmage to cruise to a 27-10 victory. Burrow completed each of his first nine pass attempts to lead two straight TD drives, and Cincinnati finished with 412 offensive net yards (172 rushing). Defensively, it held Buffalo to just 64 rushing yards and 10 points, the second-fewest allowed in a game in Bengals postseason history. Cincinnati became the fourth team in NFL history to win both a home and road playoff game in back-to-back seasons.

Several single-season and single-game Bengals records fell during the 2022 regular season. Full details on team individual records entering the 2023 season can be found on page 174 of the '23 Bengals Media Guide. Some of the notable individual records that were set last season include:

QB JOE BURROW

- Completed 414 passes. The previous record was 373, by QB Carson Palmer in 2007.
- Had 606 pass attempts. The previous record was 586, by Palmer in 2010 and QB Andy Dalton in '13.
- Had 35 TD passes. The previous record was 34, by Burrow in 2021.
- Completed 40 passes (Dec. 24 at New England), tying a single-game record set by QB Ken Anderson in 1982.

HB JOE MIXON

- Scored five total TDs (Nov. 6 vs. Carolina). The previous single-game record was four, by FB Larry Kinnebrew (1984), HB Corey Dillon ('97) and WR Marvin Jones (2013).
- Scored four rushing TDs (Nov. 6 vs. Carolina), tying a single-game record set by Dillon in 1997.

K EVAN MCPHERSON

- Kicked a 59-yard FG (Sept. 11 vs. Pittsburgh). The previous record was 58 yards, by McPherson in 2021.

Bengals announce 2023 captains: The Bengals this season will be led by six players wearing the captains' patch, which were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive and three defensive players.

Cincinnati's offensive captains remain unchanged from the 2022 season and include fourth-year QB Joe Burrow, seventh-year HB Joe Mixon and eighth-year C Ted Karras. This is Burrow's fourth consecutive season as a captain and the third straight for Mixon. Karras, who joined the Bengals as a free agent in March of 2022, serves as a team captain for the third time in his career, after previously doing so with the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

The defensive captains are seventh-year CB Mike Hilton, sixth-year DE Sam Hubbard and eighth-year DT DJ Reader. Hubbard will wear the patch for a third straight season, while Reader dons it for a second straight year. Hilton is the lone Bengals captain this season who will be carrying the honor for the first time.

2023 schedule notes: In addition to their six games against fellow AFC North Division teams, the Bengals and the rest of the AFC North will play against all teams in the AFC South and NFC West divisions.

Cincinnati will also play two games — at home against Buffalo and on the road against Kansas City — that were determined by 2022 standings. As first-place finishers in the AFC North, the Bengals are matched up against the first-place teams from the AFC East (Buffalo) and AFC West (Kansas City).

The NFL in 2021 added a 17th game to the schedule, and in '23 that will be a Week 15 home contest against Minnesota. The additional game each year features an interconference matchup, and is based on the prior year's standings on a rotating four-year cycle. These contests match a first-place team from one division with a first-place team in an opposite-conference division that the team is not scheduled to play that season. The second, third and fourth-place teams in each division are matched in the same way. The home conference for this game rotates each season, with the AFC teams hosting the game in 2023.

Here is the list of Cincinnati's opponents for 2023, ordered by the date of the game:

- **HOME:** Baltimore, L.A. Rams, Seattle, Buffalo, Houston, Pittsburgh, Indianapolis, Minnesota and Cleveland.
- **AWAY:** Cleveland, Tennessee, Arizona, San Francisco, Baltimore, Jacksonville, Pittsburgh and Kansas City.

Back-to-back division champs: The Bengals captured the AFC North Division title in 2022 for the second consecutive season, marking the first time in franchise history that Cincinnati won a division in back-to-back years. The 2022 division title was the team's 11th all-time.

While some databases list the Bengals as repeat division winners in 1981 and '82, the '82 postseason featured a special 16-team format (dubbed the "Super Bowl Tournament") that was implemented by the NFL, as the regular season was reduced to nine games due to a players' strike. Eight teams from each conference were seeded 1-8 based on their regular-season records, so despite the Bengals boasting the top record in the AFC Central, they went in as the conference's No. 3 seed and were not recognized as division champions.

Bengals net three Pro Bowlers: QB Joe Burrow, WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson were all voted to the AFC Team for the 2023 Pro Bowl Games. It was the first Pro Bowl nod of Burrow's career, while Chase and Hendrickson both received their second after being selected in the 2021 season.

Burrow became the sixth QB in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl, joining Ken Anderson (1975-76, '81-82), Boomer Esiason ('86, '88-89), Jeff Blake ('95), Carson Palmer (2005-06) and Andy Dalton ('11, '14, '16). The former No. 1 overall draft pick out of Louisiana State finished the 2022 regular season tied for second in the NFL in passing TDs (35), fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). He surpassed multiple career milestones, including 11,000 passing yards, 75 passing TDs and 1000 pass completions. Burrow has also thrown at least one TD pass in each of his last 23 regular-season games (dating back to Week 9 of 2021 season), the longest active streak in the NFL and longest streak in Bengals history.

Chase in 2022 led Cincinnati in receptions (87), receiving yards (1046) and receiving TDs (nine), despite missing four games due to a hip injury. In Week 14, he joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players in NFL history with 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches under the age of 23. Chase became the seventh player in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons.

Hendrickson, who concluded his second Bengals season in 2022 after signing as an unrestricted free agent in '21, led Cincinnati in sacks (eight) and was tied for second in TFLs (six). He has 35.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 season, the fourth-most in the NFL in that span.

Chase and Hendrickson both participated in the 2023 Pro Bowl Games, which were held Sunday, Feb. 5 at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas.

Three Bengals listed on "Top 100": For the 13th consecutive season, current NFL players have voted to determine the top 100 players in the NFL, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by three players in 2023 — QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 39) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 75). It marked the second career appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the third for Hendrickson.

Burrow's ranking at No. 6 is the highest ever by a Bengal, surpassing A.J. Green, who was listed at No. 9 in 2014. This year's list was the fourth time that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Burrow's NFL journey: After being selected No. 1 overall by the Bengals in the 2020 NFL Draft, former Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow had one of the most productive starts to a career by a QB in league history, as his 264 completions still count as the most ever by an NFL passer through their first 10 career games, while his 404 pass attempts are the second-most in that same category and his 2588 passing yards are fifth.

In Week 11 of his rookie year at Washington, Burrow suffered a season-ending left knee injury, halting a campaign that was on pace to shatter several NFL rookie passing records. He embarked on a rehab process that lasted over eight months and received clearance to participate in training camp in 2021.

Shortly after his injury in 2020, Burrow vowed publicly that he would start Cincinnati's '21 season opener. On Sept. 12 vs. Minnesota, not only did he make good on that promise, but he posted then-career highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.67) in a Bengals OT win.

Burrow in 2021 completed a league-leading 70.4 percent of his passes (366 of 520) for 4611 yards and 34 TDs en route to being named the AP Comeback Player of the Year. His passing yardage and passer rating stand as single-season team records. In the postseason, he threw for 1105 yards and five TDs in four games, becoming the first No. 1 overall draft pick in NFL history to lead his team to a conference championship game (let alone a Super Bowl berth) in either of their first two seasons.

On the day before the first official training camp practice of 2022, Burrow was forced to undergo surgery to remove his appendix. He remained involved in team meetings and attended practices on a golf cart during a three-week recovery process, before returning to the field in mid-August. He started the regular-season opener and went on to set Bengals single-season records for completions (414, fifth in NFL) and TD passes (35, tied for second). Burrow then completed 66.1 percent of his passes (72 of 109) for 721 yards and four TDs in three postseason games, guiding the Bengals to the AFC Championship once again. He became the first player drafted No. 1 overall to win five playoff games within his first three seasons.

The Athens, Ohio, native again faced adversity in training camp this season as he worked his way back from a calf strain. Burrow sustained the injury on July 27 — the second day of camp — and returned to practice on Aug. 30.

Burrow surpasses 11K: QB Joe Burrow surpassed 11,000 career passing yards in Week 15 of the 2022 season at Tampa Bay, in what was just his 40th career game. That tied him with Matthew Stafford as the fourth-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 11,000 passing yards. He is the fastest Bengal ever to 10,000 passing yards (36 games), 9000 (33), 8000 (29), 7000 (26), 6000 (23), 5000 (19) and 4000 (16).

Over the last 18 regular-season games in which Burrow has been active (dating back to Week 16 of 2021), he has passed for 5446 yards (302.6 average) and 43 TDs. Burrow's 4475 passing yards in 2022 ranked fifth in the NFL.

Joe throws 75th career TD: QB Joe Burrow threw his 75th career TD pass in Week 15 of the 2022 season at Tampa Bay, when he found WR Tee Higgins in the back of the end zone for a five-yard score. It came in Burrow's 40th career game, making him the fifth-fastest QB in NFL history to throw for 75 TDs.

The former No. 1 overall draft pick had 13 TD passes in 10 games as a rookie, before setting a then-team record with 34 TDs in his sophomore campaign. By eclipsing his own record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to throw for 30 or more TDs in multiple seasons. Burrow, Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino and Chargers QB Justin Herbert are the only players in NFL history with at least 30 TD passes and 4000 passing yards in two of their first three seasons.

Week 16 of the 2022 season at New England marked the 22nd consecutive regular-season game in which Burrow threw at least one TD pass, surpassing Jeff Blake (21 games in 1994-95) for the longest streak in Bengals history. Now at 23 games entering the 2023 season, it is the longest active streak in the NFL — the second-longest belongs to Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes (22 games).

Burrow also joined former Colts QB Andrew Luck as the only players in NFL history with at least 75 TD passes and 10 rushing TDs in their first three seasons. A career-high five of Burrow's 10 rushing TDs came in 2022.

Burrow racks up yardage: QB Joe Burrow's 481 passing yards in Week 7 of the 2022 season against Atlanta were the second-most by an NFL QB since the start of the 2021 season, trailing only ... Joe Burrow. The former No. 1 overall pick threw for a Bengals-record 525 yards on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore, which also marked the fourth-highest single-game total in league history. Only Norm Van Brocklin (554 yards in 1951), Warren Moon (527 in '90) and Matt Schaub (527 in 2012) have put up more yards in a single contest.

In fact, three of the five highest single-game passing yardage totals since the start of the 2021 season belong to Burrow. His 446 yards against Kansas City on Jan. 2, 2022 are tied for fifth in that category. That game, he completed five passes of 30 or more yards, including TD throws of 72 and 69 yards to WR Ja'Marr Chase as Cincinnati clinched the AFC North Division title for the first time since 2015.

Burrow has five career games with 400 or more passing yards, which surpassed Dan Marino (four) for the most such games by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history. He also has seven career games with at least 350 passing yards and three TD passes, which tied with former Colts QB Andrew Luck for the second-most in a player's first three seasons in league history. Burrow's 16 career games with 300 or more passing yards are the fifth-most such games in Bengals history — QB Carson Palmer (17) ranks fourth on that list.

Hitting the mark: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 1500 career passing attempts in the 2022 regular-season finale against Baltimore, which qualified him for the career completion percentage record in the NFL Record & Fact Book. With a 68.2 completion percentage, Burrow enters his fourth season as the NFL's all-time leader in the category. Former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees ranks second on the list with a 67.7 career completion percentage.

After leading the league in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 pass attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

In Week 16 at New England, Burrow surpassed 1000 career completions in what was just his 41st game. That tied him with former Detroit QB Matthew Stafford as the second-fastest player in NFL history to reach 1000 completions.

With numerous pass-catching options missing time due to injury during the 2022 campaign, Burrow found a way to spread the ball around the entire offense, as six Bengals (three WRs, two HBs and one TE) finished the year with 35 or more receptions. Burrow had 13 games in which he completed a pass to seven or more players.

Burrow masters the deep ball: A staple of Cincinnati's offense under head coach Zac Taylor has been a willingness to take shots down the field, and no QB has cashed in on more big plays than Joe Burrow. Burrow has 17 career TD passes of 40 or more yards, three more than any NFL QB since he entered the league in 2020.

Burrow also has a league-leading 12 TD passes of 50 or more yards since 2020, which tied with Pro Football Hall of Famers Dan Marino and Fran Tarkenton for the most by any player in NFL history in their first three seasons.

Six of Burrow's 40-plus yard TD passes came during Weeks 3-8 of the 2022 campaign. In Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, he hit WR Tyler Boyd for a 56-yard TD on the final play of the first quarter. The following game against Miami, Burrow launched a pinpoint pass down the left sideline that was grabbed by WR Tee Higgins and taken in for a 59-yard score. He threw the game-winning TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 6 at New Orleans, a 60-yard catch and run that gave the Bengals their first lead with 1:57 left. In Week 7 vs. Atlanta, Burrow aired out a 60-yard TD to Boyd just two minutes into the first quarter, and in the second quarter found Chase for a 41-yard score. He connected with Higgins again for a 41-yard TD in the fourth quarter of Week 8 at Cleveland.

Burrow additionally has an NFL-best 23 TD passes of 30 or more yards since the start of the 2021 regular season. The next closest player in that category is former Las Vegas QB Derek Carr (16).

Three-headed monster at WR: The Bengals' offense has featured arguably the top receiving trio in the NFL over the past two seasons, consisting of WRs Tyler Boyd, Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins.

Though each player missed substantial action during the 2022 regular season due to injuries, Cincinnati was one of two teams (L.A. Chargers) with three WRs that recorded 700 or more receiving yards. The Bengals were also the only team with three players that each had a game with 130-plus receiving yards. Boyd, Chase and Higgins all averaged at least 12 yards per reception and had at least one TD catch of 50-plus yards.

In the Week 7 win over Atlanta, they became the first Bengals trio to each log 90 or more receiving yards since Dec. 30, 2001 (T.J. Houshmandzadeh, Darnay Scott and Peter Warrick vs. Pittsburgh). The Week 15 victory at Tampa Bay marked the first time all three players had a TD catch in the same game, with each coming in the second half to help Cincinnati erase a 17-point deficit.

Even with missed time due to injuries, along with the team playing just 16 games, they combined for 2837 receiving yards during the regular season. That total was the fifth-most among any trio of pass catchers in the NFL. Their 3374 combined receiving yards in the 2021 regular season led all trios, with Chase posting a Bengals-record 1455, Higgins going for 1091 and Boyd netting 828.

Chase (1046 yards) and Higgins (1029) both notched 1000 receiving yards for the second straight season, marking the fourth time the Bengals had multiple 1000-yard receivers — WRs Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh also did it twice, in 2006 and '07. In 2021, Chase (21 years old) and Higgins (22) became the first duo in league history to log 1000 receiving yards in the same season before the age of 23.

Boyd, Chase and Higgins have combined for 20 games of 100 or more receiving yards since the start of the 2021 regular season, tied with Minnesota for the most such games by any trio in the NFL.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase led the Bengals in receptions (87), receiving yards (1046) and receiving TDs (nine) during the 2022 regular season, despite missing four games from Weeks 8-12 due to a hip injury. The 2021 AP Offensive Rookie of the Year joined A.J. Green (2011-12) as the only players in team history with consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons to begin their career.

Chase finished the 2022 campaign tied for ninth in the NFL in receiving TDs, 14th in receptions and 17th in receiving yards. He earned his second straight Pro Bowl honor and eclipsed two career milestones — 2000 receiving yards and 20

receiving TDs. His 2000th yard came in just his 24th career game (Week 7 vs. Atlanta), making Chase tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to hit the 2K mark. He recorded his 20th TD catch in Week 14 vs. Cleveland, in what was his 26th game — that tied him as the fourth-fastest since 1970 to reach that number. Chase (22 years old) joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players under the age of 23 with 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD receptions in league history.

Uno heats up in postseason: WR Ja'Marr Chase has a league-leading 588 receiving yards over the past two postseasons, while his 45 receptions are second-most behind Kansas City TE Travis Kelce (50).

Chase in the 2022 postseason caught 20 passes for 220 yards and two TDs, leading the Bengals in each category. He opened with nine catches for 84 yards in the Wild Card Playoff against Baltimore, including a seven-yard TD in the second quarter. It marked his ninth straight game played with at least seven receptions, dating back to Week 5. That tied for the fourth-longest such streak by an NFL player within a single season (including postseason) since 1970. Chase followed that up with five grabs for 61 yards in the Divisional Playoff win at Buffalo, highlighted by a 28-yard catch and run to the end zone that capped off a dominant opening drive.

In the AFC Championship at Kansas City, Chase caught six passes for 75 yards — none more crucial than a 35-yarder on fourth-and-six from the Kansas City 41 on the opening play of the fourth quarter.

Through seven career postseason games, Chase has 45 catches for 588 yards, both the most in Bengals history, while his three receiving TDs are tied with teammate Tee Higgins and former TE Dan Ross for the team's all-time postseason record. He ranked second in the NFL in receptions (25) and receiving yards (368) during the 2021 postseason.

In the win over the Bills, Chase surpassed Randy Moss for the second-most postseason receiving yards by a player in his first two seasons. Former Washington WR Charlie Brown holds the record with 643 yards.

Combining the regular season and postseason, Chase has 3089 career receiving yards, joining him with Moss (3189) and former Louisiana State teammate Justin Jefferson (3016) as the only players in NFL history with at least 3000 receiving yards in their first two years.

Chase, Boyd pose deep threats: QB Joe Burrow has the NFL's most TD passes of 50 or more yards over the past two seasons, and much of that production can be attributed to WRs Ja'Marr Chase and Tyler Boyd.

Chase has a league-leading six TD receptions of 50-plus yards since 2021, with the most recent coming in Week 6 of the 2022 season. Returning to his hometown of New Orleans to take on the Saints, Chase caught seven passes for 132 yards and two TDs, including a 60-yard catch and run to the end zone with just under two minutes remaining that proved to be the game-winner. It was a memorable encore for Chase at Caesars Superdome, as in his last appearance at the venue he had nine grabs for 221 yards and two TDs to help Louisiana State win the 2019 College Football Playoff National Championship.

Boyd, meanwhile, has four TD catches of 50 or more yards since 2021, the second-most in the NFL behind Chase. Two of those scoring receptions occurred last season, beginning with a 56-yarder on the final play of the first quarter in a Week 3 win at the N.Y. Jets. In Week 7 vs. Atlanta, Burrow and Boyd connected for a 60-yard TD on just the fourth play from scrimmage to give the Bengals an early 7-0 lead.

Tee tops 1000 again: WR Tee Higgins ranked second on the Bengals in receptions (74), receiving yards (1029) and receiving TDs (seven) during the 2022 regular season. He is one of five players in Bengals history with multiple 1000-yard receiving seasons within the first three years of his career, alongside WRs Cris Collinsworth (1981, '83), Chad Johnson (2002-03), A.J. Green ('11-13) and Ja'Marr Chase ('21-22). Higgins' 3028 career receiving yards are the second-most ever by a Bengals player through their first three seasons, trailing only Green (3833).

With Chase out of the lineup due to injury in Weeks 11-12, Higgins was relied on as the team's No. 1 receiver and delivered back-to-back 100-yard performances. He had a season-high nine catches for 148 yards in Week 11 at Pittsburgh, including four for 55 yards during a Bengals TD drive in the second quarter. The 148 yards were the second-most in a game in his career (194 on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore). Higgins followed that up with seven grabs for 114 yards and a TD in Week 12 at Tennessee. Three of his receptions went for over 20 yards, highlighted by a contested 27-yard TD that gave Cincinnati a fourth-quarter lead.

Higgins has continued to produce during his brief but impressive postseason career. He ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing Chase in both categories, while his three TD catches are tied with Chase and former TE Dan Ross for the team's postseason record. With two TDs in Super Bowl LVI, he also joined Ross as the only players in team history with multiple TDs in a postseason game.

Yoshi flashes in preseason: Rookie WR Andrei Iosivas was perhaps the most productive player offensively for the Bengals during the preseason, as the sixth-round draft pick out of Princeton led the team in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129) over three games. Iosivas' 12 catches tied for fourth-most leaguewide in preseason, while his receiving yardage total ranked 11th among all NFL players.

Nicknamed 'Yoshi' by his teammates, Iosivas had at least three grabs in each game and averaged 10.8 yards per reception. He paced Cincinnati with 50 yards on four catches in the preseason opener vs. Green Bay, including a 24-yarder on third down in the third quarter that led to a Bengals FG. He posted a team-high five catches for 44 yards the following week at Atlanta, none bigger than an 18-yard reception to set up a first-and-goal with under two minutes remaining in regulation. He found the end zone for the first time in the third contest at Washington, leaping to come down with a seven-yard pass from QB Jake Browning to cap off the Bengals' opening offensive drive. Earlier in the drive, he had a 25-yard catch on third down that landed Cincinnati at the Commanders' 14-yard line.

Iosivas, a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, played in 29 career games at Princeton and graduated with the third-most receiving TDs (16) and sixth-most receiving yards (1909) in program history. He additionally was an All-American in the indoor heptathlon as a member of the Princeton men's track and field team.

Mixon's historic day: HB Joe Mixon had perhaps his best career performance in Week 9 of the 2022 season against Carolina, as he rushed for 153 yards on 22 carries (7.0 average) with four TDs, while catching four passes for 58 yards and a TD. His five total TDs and 30 points accounted for each set a Bengals single-game record, while his four rushing scores tied HB Corey Dillon (Dec. 4, 1997) for the team's single-game mark. Mixon's 211 yards from scrimmage were also a career high.

Mixon became the sixth player in the Super Bowl era with at least 200 scrimmage yards and five total TDs in a game. He also joined Shaun Alexander (Sept. 29, 2002) and Jonathan Taylor (Nov. 21, 2021) as one of three players in the Super Bowl era with at least four rushing TDs and one receiving TD in a game. Mixon's five total TDs and four rushing TDs were both the most by any player in a game during the 2022 regular season.

In just the first half alone, Mixon had 15 rushing attempts for 113 yards and three TDs, becoming the second player in Bengals history with three rushing scores in a single half (Dillon on Dec. 4, 1997). It also marked Mixon's 14th

career game with 100 or more rushing yards, which tied FB Pete Johnson for the fifth-most such games in team history. His efforts in Week 9 were rewarded with his third career AFC Offensive Player of the Week recognition.

Mixon hits 5K: HB Joe Mixon surpassed 5000 career rushing yards early in his historic performance against Carolina in Week 9 of the 2022 season. He became the fifth player in team history to reach the 5000-yard milestone, and the first since HB Rudi Johnson in 2006. A 2017 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, Mixon has logged over 1000 rushing yards in three of his five full seasons (missed 10 games in '20 due to injury).

Mixon enters 2023 as one of 10 active NFL players with 5000 or more career rushing yards. Also a threat as a pass catcher out of the backfield, he topped 100 scrimmage yards four times last season, including in three of his final six games played. In the AFC Divisional Playoff win at Buffalo, he had 20 carries for 105 yards (5.3 average), the third-most in a postseason game in Bengals history.

Defense ready at the start ... : The Bengals enter 2023 carrying a streak of 13 consecutive games (including postseason) without allowing a TD in the first quarter of play. Cincinnati closed the 2022 regular season with zero first-quarter TDs given up in each of its final 10 contests, then continued to hold opponents out of the end zone in all three first quarters during the postseason. The 13 consecutive games without yielding a first-quarter TD are the most by an NFL team since New England went 14 straight in 2016.

During the streak, the Bengals have allowed just 12 total points (never more than three in an opening quarter), while collecting three INTs and forcing 13 punts. Cincinnati gave up only four first-quarter TDs in the entire 2022 regular season, tied for the second-fewest leaguewide, while its 52 first-quarter points allowed were the fourth-fewest.

... And tightens after the break: The Bengals' defense, which has proven itself among the best in the league at in-game adjustments under coordinator Lou Anarumo, opened the 2022 season by going seven straight games without allowing a TD in the second half of play. Cincinnati became the first team to not give up a second-half TD in each of its first seven contests since the 1934 Detroit Lions, who carried their streak to eight games.

The 2022 Bengals were also one of just six teams since 1930 to not allow a second-half TD in seven or more consecutive games at any point in a season. The 1973 Miami Dolphins (seven games) and '97 Kansas City Chiefs (10 games) are the only other teams to accomplish that feat since the '70 NFL/AFL merger.

Despite the Bengals' streak being snapped in Week 8 at Cleveland, they remained one of the top defensive teams after halftime. Cincinnati's 142 points allowed in the second half/OT during the regular season ranked as the fifth-fewest in the NFL, while its 8.9 average points given up were the seventh-fewest.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: While DE Sam Hubbard's 2022 campaign will be remembered primarily for his 98-yard fumble return in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, he put together yet another complete season that further established him as a foundational piece on the Bengals defense.

During the regular season, Hubbard tallied 60 total tackles — his fourth straight year with at least 60 — including a team-leading 11 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. He also recorded three PDs and a forced fumble. A third-round pick (77th overall) of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard ranks second in sacks (30.5) among all players from the '18 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Players' listed positions vary by media outlet (e.g. whether they're classified as a LB or DE), but according to NFL.com's draft record, Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected in 2018 — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. According to NFL.com, there were a total of 40 defensive

linemen (20 DEs, 20 DTs) selected in the 2018 draft, along with 32 LBs and one player with his position listed as "edge."

Hubbard has been the Bengals' starting RDE since 2019, and during the '21 regular season, his 7.5 sacks were second on the team. He has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in Bengals history.

Hubbard signed a contract extension with the Bengals in July 2021 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the end of the '25 season.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson has led the Bengals in sacks each of the past two seasons since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2021. His elite production was rewarded on July 27, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

Hendrickson totaled eight sacks during the 2022 regular season, earning his second straight Pro Bowl selection. That came on the heels of a career-high 14 sacks in 2021, Hendrickson's first season in stripes, that ranked fifth in the NFL and second in Bengals single-season history behind DE Coy Bacon's 22 in 1976 (Sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder). Combined with a team-leading 13.5 as a member of the New Orleans Saints in 2020, Hendrickson has 35.5 sacks over the past three seasons — the fourth-most in the league in that span.

Hendrickson's top performance last season came in a Week 3 win at the N.Y. Jets, when he erupted for 2.5 sacks and two FFs to claim AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors. He became the first Bengals player since at least 2000 with two-plus sacks and two-plus FFs in a game.

Wilson, Pratt form elite LB duo: At the center of Cincinnati's defense is one of the top LB tandems in the NFL consisting of fifth-year pro Germaine Pratt and fourth-year pro Logan Wilson. Both players set career highs in tackles during the 2022 regular season, with Wilson's team-high 123 stops marking the most by a Bengal since Vontaze Burfict (171) in '13, and Pratt's 99 ranking second on the team.

As crucial as the duo has been in helping the Bengals rank in the top-seven leaguewide in run defense each of the past two seasons, Pratt and Wilson have been equally as effective when dropping into coverage. Pratt last season set career highs in INTs (two) and PDs (10), while Wilson's seven career INTs are the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020. They also combined for 3.5 sacks and two FFs in 2022.

Though both players have served as consistent contributors for the Bengals in regular-season play, they save their most crucial plays for when it matters most. With 17 seconds remaining in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, Pratt intercepted a pass by QB Derek Carr on fourth down from the Cincinnati nine-yard line to secure the Bengals' first playoff win in 31 years. The next week in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee, Wilson picked off QB Ryan Tannehill in the final minute of the fourth quarter to set up a game-winning FG drive.

This past January in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, both Pratt and Wilson stopped QB Tyler Huntley as he attempted to reach the ball over a pile of linemen for a potential go-ahead Ravens TD in the fourth quarter. Wilson, who was credited with the FF, knocked the ball free, leading to DE Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the difference in a 24-17 victory.

Wilson has totaled a league-leading 62 combined tackles over the past two postseasons, while Pratt ranks second in the category with 49 stops. Both

players inked contract extensions in 2023, with Pratt locked in with the Bengals through the '25 season and Wilson staying put in Cincinnati through '27.

Nothing easy in the air: Cincinnati's defense held opposing passers to a 58.9 completion percentage during the 2022 regular season, the lowest rate in the NFL, while its 17 passing TDs allowed were tied for the third-fewest leaguewide. The Bengals also allowed just one opponent (Tampa Bay in Week 15) to record 300 net passing yards.

Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo's unit also allowed just three QBs to post a passer rating of 100 or higher in 2022 (minimum 20 attempts). Prior to Browns QB Jacoby Brissett finishing with a 133.7 rating in Week 8, Cincinnati had gone 11 consecutive games (including postseason) holding opposing QBs below triple digits. The streak dated back to the 2021 Wild Card Playoff against Las Vegas, and also featured six starting QBs being limited to fewer than 20 completions.

Over the past 23 games (2021 postseason, '22 regular season and '22 postseason), the Bengals have held passers to a 59.8 completion percentage (496 of 830), while collecting 23 INTs to 29 passing TDs allowed.

Two picks for Tycen: Second-year S Tycen Anderson earned a spot on Cincinnati's 53-man roster coming out of training camp, thanks in large part to his performance in the preseason opener on Aug. 11 against Green Bay. The Toledo, Ohio native logged two tackles and two INTs, with both picks coming in the second quarter. His first was a 43-yard pick-six off QB Sean Clifford that cut the Bengals' deficit to 14-13, and marked the team's first TD of the preseason. A little over two minutes later, Anderson stepped in front of another Clifford pass to give Cincinnati the ball back at the Green Bay 36-yard line.

It marked Anderson's first INTs in any game he's played since his sophomore season at the University of Toledo in 2018. The Green Bay contest was also the first time Anderson suited up for the Bengals since the third week of the 2022 preseason against the L.A. Rams. A hamstring injury put him on the Reserve/Injured list prior to the start of the regular season, and he remained there through the Week 18 finale. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in 2022, Anderson was designated for return from R/I and cleared to practice during the postseason, but was not added to the active roster.

"A lot of hard work went to get to this moment here," said Anderson after the preseason opener. "A lot of things that you guys didn't see that I was going through last year — I'm just blessed to be part of this with the group of guys that we're here with. I'm happy to be able to make those plays when the ball comes my way."

Mac is money from deep: K Evan McPherson has quickly earned a reputation as one of the NFL's top long-range kickers. In two pro seasons, he is 14 of 16 on FG attempts of 50 or more yards, good for the fifth-most FGs from that distance since 2021. It is also the most such FGs within a player's first 30 games in NFL history. What makes it even more impressive is that McPherson's 14th FG of 50 or more yards, kicked in Week 11 of the 2022 season at Pittsburgh, came in just his 26th career game. McPherson finished the 2022 regular season a perfect five of five on FG attempts of 50-plus yards.

McPherson is already the team's career leader in 50-yard FGs. It took him just 14 games into his rookie season to reach the top of Cincinnati's career chart in that category, breaking the previous record of eight. Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson made an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards during the 2021 regular season and fell just one shy of tying the NFL record for most 50-yarders. His nine such FGs were more than double the previous team record for a single season (four, by K Horst Muhlmann in 1970).

Preseason kicks: K Evan McPherson has wasted no time getting into midseason form in each of the past three years. In eight preseason games, he is 22-for-23 on FG attempts and a perfect eight-for-eight on PATs. McPherson accounted for 27 points in the 2023 preseason, the third-most in the NFL, while his eight made FGs tied for the league lead and his 58-yarder on Aug. 26 at Washington stood as the fifth-longest kick during preseason.

Head coach Zac Taylor has not been hesitant to let McPherson show off his long-range abilities in preseason play. The former fifth-round draft pick has eight preseason FGs of 50 or more yards, including a 58-yarder and 56-yarder in the second quarter alone on Aug. 12, 2022 vs. Arizona. He also kicked a 57-yarder as a rookie in the third preseason game of 2021.

McPherson's team record: K Evan McPherson kicked a Bengals-record 59-yard FG in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, breaking the previous record of 58 yards that he hit on Dec. 19, 2021 at Denver.

He grabbed another spot on the team's all-time chart in Week 4 against Miami, as his 57-yarder in the fourth quarter tied Randy Bullock for the third-longest FG in Bengals history.

McPherson in the postseason: While K Evan McPherson is off to a historically strong start to his regular-season career, he has found a way to increase that production in the postseason. In 2021, he went a perfect 20-for-20 on placekicks during the team's four-game run to Super Bowl LVI, making all 14 of his FG attempts and all six of his PATs. No kicker in NFL history had previously been perfect on as many as 11 FGs in a single postseason.

Two of those kicks were game-winners, as he drilled a 52-yard FG as regulation time expired in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee, then punched Cincinnati's ticket to the Super Bowl with a 31-yarder in the AFC Championship at Kansas City. McPherson's 14 FGs tied former Colts K Adam Vinatieri (2006) for the most in a single postseason in NFL history.

He followed up by making all five of his FG attempts in the 2022 postseason, including two in the Divisional Playoff at Buffalo while dealing with snowy conditions. McPherson's 19 postseason FGs are the most by a player in his first two seasons in NFL history. He is also the second player in league history to begin his postseason career with 19 consecutive FGs without a miss. Former San Francisco K Robbie Gould, who previously played for Chicago and the N.Y. Giants, holds the NFL record with an active streak of 29 straight postseason FGs.

Through just seven games, McPherson is the Bengals' postseason career leader in points scored (69) and made FGs (19). His 12 made PATs are the second-most in team postseason history, trailing former K Jim Breech (25).

2023 draft class overview: Cincinnati's eight-player draft class in April featured four defensive players, three offensive players and a special teams player. The group played in a combined 356 games during their collegiate careers.

Here's a closer look at the Bengals' 2023 draft class:

• DE Myles Murphy, Clemson (Round 1, Pick 28): A 6-5, 270-pound edge rusher with highly touted athleticism, Murphy recorded 17.5 sacks in 38 career games at Clemson. He was a second-team All-ACC pick as a junior last season, when he tied for the team lead with 6.5 sacks and posted 11 TFLs. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo noted Murphy's ability to line up on the outside or interior of the defensive line.

• CB DJ Turner II, Michigan (Round 2, Pick 60): Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year's NFL Combine, clocking a time of 4.26 seconds. He recorded 20 PDs and three INTs in a four-year career at Michigan (2019-22), earning a pair of All-Big Ten honors (honorable mention in '21, second team in '22). Turner began his Wolverine career seeing limited action, mostly on special teams, before stepping into a starting CB role as a junior in 2021. He recorded eight tackles (all solos) for the Bengals during the preseason.

• S Jordan Battle, Alabama (Round 3, Pick 95): Battle was twice named a third-team All-American at Alabama, where he started at S from 2020-22. He showed off his versatility with 251 career tackles as well as six INTs, three of which were returned for a TD. Battle was a team captain for the Crimson Tide last season, and Bengals coaches have raved about his high character since arriving in Cincinnati. He posted nine tackles in the preseason.

• WR Charlie Jones, Purdue (Round 4, Pick 131): Jones in his lone season at Purdue led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving

yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12), picking up second-team All-America honors. He lined up at all three receiver positions, displaying a flexibility that offensive coordinator Brian Callahan said the Bengals will look to utilize. Jones will also be in the mix for the Bengals' punt return role, as he was named the Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year in 2021 while at the University of Iowa.

• HB Chase Brown, Illinois (Round 5, Pick 163): Brown put together an impressive career at Illinois, becoming the program's first Doak Walker Award finalist (nation's top running back) and third player to record 1000 rushing yards in consecutive seasons (2021-22). He was a second-team All-American last season, when he ranked fourth in the nation in rushing yards (1642) and eclipsed 100 rushing yards in an Illinois-record 10 straight games. Brown led the Bengals in rushing attempts (28) and yards (69) during the preseason.

• WR Andrei Iosivas, Princeton (Round 6, Pick 206): Iosivas is the seventh player all-time drafted by the Bengals out of an Ivy League program, and the first since LB Reggie Williams (Dartmouth) and QB Bob Bateman (Brown) in 1976. He was perhaps the team's most consistent performer in the preseason, leading Cincinnati in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129). At 6-3, 205 pounds, Iosivas brings athleticism and big-play ability to the Bengals' WR room. He also was an All-American in the indoor heptathlon as a member of the Princeton men's track and field team in 2022.

• P Brad Robbins, Michigan (Round 6, Pick 217): Robbins earned the Bengals' punting job after recording eight punts for 371 yards (46.4 gross average) in three preseason games. He spent six seasons (2017-22) at Michigan, where he was a three-time All-Big Ten selection. Robbins finished his career with the second-highest punting average (43.0 yards) in program history, and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons said his hang time was a key factor in his draft selection.

• CB DJ Ivey, Miami (Fla.) (Round 7, Pick 246): The Bengals' final draft pick logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason, showcasing an athleticism and tight coverage that has already impressed his coaches. Ivey started 32 of 58 games played over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.), netting six INTs and 17 PDs.

The Jungle is jammin': The five highest-attended home games (and seven of the top eight) in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat the Miami Dolphins in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous record of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff victory over the Las Vegas Raiders on Jan. 15. The 2022 Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore had an attendance of 66,399, which now stands as the second largest in team history.

The attendance figure for Cincinnati's Week 13 win against Kansas City was 66,243 (fourth largest), while other 2022 home contests against Cleveland (66,222), Carolina (66,160) and Atlanta (66,158) rank fifth, seventh and eighth all-time, respectively. Adding in figures of 65,841 for the season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and 65,849 for the Week 18 matchup vs. Baltimore, the Bengals welcomed an attendance of over 65,000 in seven consecutive regular-season home games for the first time since 2007. That year, Cincinnati hosted over 65,000 in each of its eight regular-season home contests.

Ken Riley enters Hall of Fame: Bengals legend Ken Riley, the most productive CB in team history, was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5. He joined OT Anthony Munoz as former Bengals players immortalized in Canton, Ohio.

The honor came posthumously for Riley, who passed away in 2020 at the age of 72. Riley's wife, Barbara, received the gold jacket on his behalf and revealed the bust alongside his son, Ken Riley II, who spoke at the enshrinement ceremony.

"Dad is just getting inducted today, but his whole life he was a Hall of Famer on and off the field," Ken Riley II said.

Riley spent 15 seasons (1969-83) with the Bengals, playing in 207 games. His 65 career INTs constitute the most dominant lead in any major statistical category of the team's record book, nearly doubling the second-place total of 33.

At the time of Riley's retirement, that total of 65 INTs was the fourth-most in NFL history, and it still stands tied for fifth-most. He was a member of five Bengals teams that reached the postseason, including the 1981 squad, which he helped lead to Super Bowl XVI.

Following his retirement, Riley spent two seasons as an assistant coach for the Green Bay Packers before taking over as head coach at his alma mater, Florida A&M University. He led the Rattlers' football program from 1986-93, then served as the school's athletic director from '94-2004. Riley was inducted into the FAMU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1982, the Black College Football Hall of Fame in 2015, and the Bengals Ring of Honor in '21.

Esiason, Johnson to join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals announced that former QB Boomer Esiason and WR Chad Johnson will be inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of the Week 3 Monday Night Football game against the L.A. Rams on Sept. 25. They will become the seventh and eighth members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, joining QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

Regarded as one of the greatest locker-room leaders in team history, Esiason played for the Bengals from 1984-92 before returning for a final season in 1997. He earned three Pro Bowl nods (1986, '88-89), and ranks third in Bengals history in both career passing yards (27,149) and TD passes (187). Esiason in 1988 was named NFL MVP while leading the league with a 97.4 passer rating, before steering the Bengals to an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII.

Johnson, who was officially known as Chad Ochocinco from 2008-11, earned a reputation as one of the league's most charismatic personalities while

also producing at an elite level during his 10 seasons with the Bengals ('01-10). He was selected to six Pro Bowls (2003-07, '09), and remains the team's all-time leader in receptions (751), receiving yards (10,783) and receiving TDs (66).

Bengals president Mike Brown on the 2023 inductees: "Boomer and Chad were both exceptional players. If you look at the statistics, Boomer has a long list of quarterback firsts here. And Chad was a superb athlete who was probably the quickest receiver we have had here. They could have moments when they just carried the team by themselves. Both players are very deserving of this honor."

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Bengal bites: Since 2011, the Bengals own a 67-6-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points ... Cincinnati's game against the Dallas Cowboys at AT&T Stadium in Week 2 of the 2022 season had an attendance figure of 92,944, marking the largest crowd the Bengals have played in front of in team history ... According to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players' speed by using GPS, the fastest speed by a Bengals ball-carrier in 2022 came from HB Joe Mixon, who reached 21.11 MPH on a 31-yard run in Week 1 vs. Pittsburgh ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is WR Tyler Boyd, who enters his eighth season with the team after joining the Bengals as a second-round draft pick in 2016 ... The oldest player on the roster is S Michael J. Thomas, who is 33 (born March 17, 1990) ... The youngest player on the roster is DE Myles Murphy, who is 21 (born Jan. 3, 2002) ... The lightest player on the roster is WR Mac Hippenhammer, who is listed at 177 pounds ... The heaviest player on the roster is OT Orlando Brown Jr., who is listed at 345 pounds ... Brown is also the tallest player on the roster, listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

Quarterbacks: Fourth-year pro **Joe Burrow** has put together one of the most promising starts to a career by a QB in NFL history. The No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 has already reached several career milestones including 1000 completions, 11,000 passing yards and 75 TD passes. He also enters this season with the highest career completion percentage in league history at 68.2 (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Burrow holds Bengals single-season records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22), passer rating (108.3; '21) and 300-yard passing games (six; '21). He earned his first career Pro Bowl nod and was an MVP candidate in 2022, when he tied for second in the NFL in TD passes, ranked fifth in completions, fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). A team captain for the fourth consecutive year, Burrow returned to practice on Aug. 30 after missing the majority of training camp due to a calf strain. Listed second on the QB depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster coming out of training camp for the first time in his career. Originally a college free agent signee of Minnesota in 2019, Browning spent the '19 and '20 seasons on the Vikings' practice squad, then joined the Bengals prior to the '21 campaign and spent the past two years on the Cincinnati practice squad. He saw action in all three preseason games in August, completing 32 of 45 passing attempts for 277 yards (71.1 completion percentage) and one TD. Browning was a four-year starter (2015-18) at the University of Washington, where he led the Huskies to the College Football Playoff in '16 and finished his career with numerous school records.

Running backs: Leading the Bengals running back room is seventh-year pro **Joe Mixon**, who ranks fifth in team history in career rushing yards (1314) and fourth in rushing TDs (40). Mixon has surpassed the 1000-yard mark in three of his six seasons, and last year he asserted himself as a reliable pass catching option with career highs in receptions (60) and receiving yards (441). Voted a team captain for the third straight season, Mixon is looking to get back to his Pro Bowl level of production from 2021, when his 1205 rushing yards were good for third in the NFL while his 13 rushing TDs ranked fourth. He enters this season as one of 10 active players who have reached the 5000-rushing yard milestone. Next on the running backs depth chart is fifth-year veteran **Trayveon Williams**. Williams has served as a reserve HB with 34 games of experience, totaling 238 rushing yards on 47 carries along with eight catches for 64 yards. He stepped in as the team's primary KOR midway through the 2022 season, returning 16 kicks for 356 yards (22.3 average), with a 42-yard long in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. Third-year pro **Chris Evans** had 17 carries for 77 yards his rookie season, but none last year, and looks to earn a more prominent role in the running back room. He was the primary KOR for the first nine games of the 2022 season, a job he overtook late in '21 and maintained through Cincinnati's run to Super Bowl LVI. Evans rushed for 64 yards on 14 carries in the preseason.

Cincinnati used its fifth-round draft choice this past April to select **Chase Brown**, a compact runner out of the University of Illinois. Brown had an impressive career with the Illini, totaling 3206 rushing yards on 605 attempts (5.3 average) with 18 TDs. He was a second-team All-American, second-team All-Big Ten selection and the first Doak Walker Award finalist (nation's top running back) in program history in 2022. Brown led the Bengals in rushing attempts (28) and yards (69) during the preseason, and added six catches for 32 yards.

Wide receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is highlighted by one of the most explosive pass-catching trios in the NFL, with the senior member being eighth-year pro **Tyler Boyd**. Boyd is regarded as a premier slot receiver that poses a challenge for nickel CBs with his size (6-2, 203) and route-running ability. He ranks fifth in team history in career receptions (446) for 5333 yards and 29 TDs, and posted consecutive seasons of 1000 or more yards in 2018-19. Boyd's four TD catches of 50-plus yards since the start of the 2021 season rank as the second-most in the league behind teammate and third-year pro **Ja'Marr Chase**. Chase was the team's first-round draft pick in 2021 and has led the Bengals in receptions, receiving yards and receiving TDs in each of his two seasons. He is a two-time Pro Bowler and last season joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players in NFL history with over 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches before turning 23. Chase missed four games in 2022 due to a hip injury, but still managed 87 grabs for 1046 yards and nine TDs. Another Cincinnati receiver with a proven history of big plays is fourth-year pro **Tee Higgins**. Higgins, a second-round pick in 2020, has quickly developed into one of the NFL's top young talents. He has posted over 1000 receiving yards in each of the past two seasons, becoming one of five players in team history to do so within his first three years. Higgins had four 100-yard receiving games in 2022, including two when Chase was out of the lineup in Weeks 11-12. At 6-4, he possesses elite athleticism and the ability to high-point the ball when contested by defensive backs. Fellow fourth-year pro **Trenton Irwin** emerged as a dependable option in the WR room last season and is publicly lauded by his coaches and teammates for a strong work ethic. He spent parts of his first three seasons on Cincinnati's practice squad and saw limited game action, but then found a role in 2022 when he played in nine contests with two starts. Despite not making his season debut until Week 8 at Cleveland, he managed to record 15 catches for 231 yards and four TDs. His best performance was on Christmas Eve at New England, when he caught three passes for 45 yards and two TDs, all in the first half to help the Bengals build a 22-0 lead. Three rookies comprise the rest of the WR room, including the team's fourth-round draft choice **Charlie Jones**. Jones is listed behind Boyd as the team's backup slot WR, and is also in the mix to return punts and kickoffs. He was a second-team All-American last season at Purdue, when he led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Jones also was

the Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year in 2021 while at the University of Iowa, where he returned 37 punts for 285 yards and had 25 KORs for 635 yards (25.4 average) with a TD. He caught nine passes for 79 yards in the preseason. Making perhaps the most substantial offensive contribution during the preseason was sixth-round pick **Andrei Iosivas**, who looks to carry over a big-play potential he showed at Princeton. Iosivas led Cincinnati in the preseason in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129). He earned FCS All-America second team status in 2022, when he had 66 catches for 943 yards and seven TDs. Iosivas additionally was an All-American in the indoor heptathlon as a member of the Princeton men's track and field team.

Tight ends: Among Cincinnati's key free agent acquisitions this offseason was **Irv Smith Jr.**, who enters his fifth NFL season after four years with Minnesota. Originally a second-round draft pick of the Vikings in 2019, Smith has played in 37 career games with 15 starts and totaled 91 catches for 858 yards and nine TDs. He missed the entire 2021 campaign due to a knee injury and was limited to eight regular-season games in '22 due to an ankle injury, but Bengals head coach Zac Taylor praised his attention to detail and focus throughout training camp. Next on the depth chart is fellow 2019 second-round pick **Drew Sample**, who since being drafted by the Bengals has established himself as a premier blocking TE in the NFL. Sample looks to get back into the lineup after suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week 2 of the 2022 season. He had a streak of 39 consecutive games played (including postseason) prior to the injury, and has also been a core contributor on special teams for Cincinnati. He made his return to the field in the second preseason game at Atlanta and played eight offensive snaps along with four special teams snaps. The Bengals on July 24 re-signed **Mitchell Wilcox**, who spent his first three career seasons with Cincinnati (31 games played). Wilcox was removed from the Active/Physically Unable to Perform list on Aug. 21, which he had been on since re-signing, and returned to practice.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in revamping the offensive line over the past two offseasons, signing four marquee free agents to bolster that unit. The most recent such addition is OT **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who signed with Cincinnati in March after spending his first three seasons in Baltimore (2018-20) and the past two in Kansas City ('21-22). A Pro Bowl selection in each of the past four years, Brown takes over as the Bengals' starting LOT and is tasked with protecting QB Joe Burrow's blind side. He was a crucial piece of offensive lines that blocked for Ravens QB Lamar Jackson (2019) and Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. Brown made his first 32 career starts at ROT, then transitioned to LOT midway through the 2020 season and has started his past 43 games at that spot. The nucleus of Cincinnati's O-line is team captain C **Ted Karras**, who signed as a free agent in 2022 and almost instantaneously became a vocal leader in the locker room. Recently voted a team captain for the second straight season, Karras has experience at all three interior OL positions but quickly cemented himself as the Bengals' starting center and played 99.4 percent of offensive snaps in 2022. He spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, with the only outlier coming in 2020 with Miami. Karras was a member of Patriots Super Bowl winning teams in 2016 and '18, before earning the starting center role in '19. Joining Karras in the 2021 free agency class was RG **Alex Cappa**, who spent his first four seasons with Tampa Bay. Cappa was perhaps the Bengals' most consistent performer on the line through most of the 2022 season, starting the first 16 games before suffering a left ankle injury in the regular-season finale that kept him out of all three playoff contests. He was the Bucs' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three postseason games due to an injury sustained in the Wild Card Playoff. Second-year pro **Cordell Volson** looks to build off an impressive rookie season in which he played every single offensive snap for Cincinnati at LG (1311, including postseason). Volson was a fourth-round draft pick out of North Dakota State University, where he lined up at four different spots along the O-line during his career. He played in a school-record 65 games at NDSU, helping the Bison win four FCS national championships while earning three FCS All-America honors. **Jonah Williams**, the Bengals' first-round pick in 2019, is making the switch to ROT this year after spending his first three full seasons as the team's LOT. He has started all 42 regular-season games and all five postseason games he has played in. Williams carried a streak of 37 consecutive starts before suffering a left knee injury in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore that ended his season. He spent the majority of the offseason rehabbing, including all of the team's mandatory minicamp, but was a full participant in training camp and started the second preseason game at Atlanta. Listed behind Williams on the depth chart is third-year pro **Jackson Carman**, who played in all 17 regular-season games as a rookie in 2021 but saw

action in just three contests last season. With the O-line affected by injuries heading into the Divisional Playoff at Buffalo in January, Carman was called upon to start at LOT and played perhaps the best game of his young career, as he helped limit the Bills to one sack and paved the way for Cincinnati's 172 net rushing yards. A native of Fairfield, Ohio (Greater Cincinnati area), Carman played three collegiate seasons at Clemson before the Bengals drafted him in the second round of the 2021 draft. Also contributing to that Divisional Playoff win at Buffalo was G **Max Scharping**. Scharping was acquired by the Bengals on waivers prior to the start of the 2022 season and played in 14 regular-season contests, before being thrust into the starting RG spot for all three postseason games following Cappa's injury. He spent his first three pro seasons with Houston, splitting time between RG and LG in 48 games played (33 starts). Scharping started the preseason opener vs. Green Bay at LG, then lined up at C to start the game at Atlanta. C **Trey Hill** has served primarily as a special teams contributor in his two Bengals seasons, but started three games (two at C, one at RG) in his 2021 rookie campaign. A 2021 sixth-round pick, Hill has seen action in each of Cincinnati's seven postseason games the past two years. Another notable free agent addition this offseason was G **Cody Ford**, a fifth-year veteran who originally was a second-round pick of Buffalo in 2019. Ford spent his first three pro seasons with the Bills before playing for Arizona in 2022. He has played in 49 career games with 32 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG and eight at LG. Ford lined up alongside Orlando Brown Jr. for two seasons (2016-17) at the University of Oklahoma. OT **D'Ante Smith** was inactive for all but one game for Cincinnati during the 2022 regular season, but played in all three postseason contests as a reserve lineman. He was originally a fourth-round pick in 2021 and battled injuries as a rookie, seeing action in just two regular-season games. Smith returned in time for the postseason run, playing in both the AFC Championship and Super Bowl LVI.

Defensive linemen: Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard** is in his sixth Bengals season (fifth as a full-time starter). A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard has 30.5 career sacks, the second-most among all players in the '18 draft class. He is also considered among the best DEs in the NFL against the run and led the Bengals last season with 11 TFLs. Hubbard made one of the most memorable plays in recent team history during the fourth quarter of the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, returning a fumble 98 yards for what proved to be the game-winning TD. It was his second career fumble returned for a score (regular and postseason). On the other side of the line is DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who led Cincinnati with eight sacks in 2022 to earn his second straight Pro Bowl nod. Hendrickson joined the team as a free agent in 2021 and in his first year posted a career-high 14 sacks, the second-most in a season in team history. He has 35.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 season, the fourth-most in the NFL in that span. On July 27, Hendrickson signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. DT **DJ Reader**, a 6-3, 335-pound run stuffer, has anchored the defensive line since signing with the Bengals as a free agent in 2020. Reader is a key component of a unit that has ranked in the top-seven leaguewide in rushing yards allowed per game in each of the past two seasons. He spent six games on the Reserve/Injured list in 2022 due to a knee injury, but returned in Week 11 and started each contest through the AFC Championship. Reader had a stretch from Weeks 12-14 in which he batted down four passes at the line of scrimmage in three games. DT **B.J. Hill** enters his third season with the Bengals and has become a major contributor on the D-line. Hill was acquired in a trade with the N.Y. Giants shortly before the 2021 regular season, and showed high production with 5.5 sacks (fourth-most on the team) in a reserve role. He started all 16 games in 2022 and posted a career-high 68 tackles with three sacks, one FF, three FRs and four PDs. DE **Joseph Ossai** heads into his third season as a pro, but 2022 was his first healthy year as he missed his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. The athletic edge rusher showcased his potential last season with 3.5 sacks as a reserve DE. He then posted six tackles in postseason play, including five with a TFL in the AFC Championship. Ossai saw action in all three preseason games and had an INT on the opening drive at Atlanta, but suffered an ankle injury in the finale at Washington. Second-year DT **Zach Carter** looks to build off a strong rookie season in which he played in all 16 regular-season games with nine starts. Carter, a 2022 third-round pick out of the University of Florida, contributed to the run defense while totaling 23 tackles, a half-sack and a PD. He played in all three postseason games, starting the Wild Card round and AFC Championship as a second DT. Third-year pro **Cam Sample** has played in 30 career regular-season games and serves as a rotational DE. The Tulane University product had 25 tackles with two sacks last season. Sample flashed in the AFC Championship, sacking Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes and bringing down RB Jerick McKinnon for a one-yard loss. Sixth-year DT **Josh Tupou** has been a reliable DT against the run since joining the Bengals as a college free agent in

2017. The 6-3, 340-pound veteran has started 15 games over the past two seasons and logged 31 tackles in that span, including a pair of sacks in 2022. The Bengals selected DE **Myles Murphy** out of Clemson University in the first round (28th overall) of this year's draft, looking to bolster their pass rushing production. Murphy totaled 17.5 sacks in 38 games at Clemson, earning second-team All-ACC honors last season. He brings premier size and athleticism to the D-Line room at 6-5, 270 pounds. The Bengals acquired DT **Jay Tufele** on waivers from Jacksonville prior to the 2022 season opener and it proved to be a valuable move, as he started two games (Weeks 8-9) while Reader was recovering from a knee injury. Tufele finished with 16 total tackles in seven regular-season games for Cincinnati. He had nine tackles during the preseason, including five that tied for the team lead in the preseason opener vs. Green Bay.

Linebackers: Among Cincinnati's most promising young defenders is third-year pro **Logan Wilson**, who wears the "green dot" as the defense's communicator. Wilson led the Bengals in tackles the past two regular seasons, with his career-high 123 stops in 2022 marking the most by a Bengals player since Vontaze Burfict (171) in '13. Wilson also has shown a high proficiency when dropping into coverage, as his seven career INTs are the most by an NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020. Wilson was inked to a four-year contract extension on Aug. 5 that will keep him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Ranking second on the team in tackles last season with 99 was **Germaine Pratt**. Pratt, a fifth-round Bengals pick in 2019 who now enters his fifth pro season, has started 54 of 62 regular-season games played. He has proven to be a clutch performer in big stages, as his 49 combined tackles over the past two postseasons rank as the second-most in the NFL behind Wilson (62). Pratt also has three career INTs and 14 PDs. A 2020 seventh-round draft choice of the Bengals, **Markus Bailey** has grown into a key reserve role in the LB room as well as a valuable contributor on special teams. Bailey has played in 16 regular season games each of the past two seasons, with a combined 50 tackles in that span. He provided a crucial block during Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble recovery return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore. **Akeem Davis-Gaither** looks to step into an increased role this season after logging a career-best 37 tackles in 16 games (one start) in 2022. Thirteen of those stops came in a dominant Week 3 performance at the N.Y. Jets. Davis-Gaither also played in all three postseason games, recording his first career INT in the Wild Card Playoff against Baltimore. He enters this season with 748 defensive snaps and 736 special teams snaps played in his career. **Joe Bachie** spent the first six games of 2022 on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a left knee injury, but returned to the active roster and saw action in 10 regular-season games and all three postseason contests. He resumed his role as a core special teams player, totaling seven ST tackles in 168 snaps.

Defensive backs: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, Hilton is a sure tackler and excellent blitzing. He played in 14 games with four starts during the 2022 regular season, amassing 60 tackles, six PDs and an INT. He has also made several notable plays in the postseason over the past two years, including an INT in the 2021 Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and a sack in the fourth quarter of the '22 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore. Hilton was voted to serve as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. **Chidobe Awuzie** arrived in Cincinnati in 2021 alongside Hilton and quickly established himself as the team's No. 1 boundary corner. Awuzie had started all 26 games he played in for the Bengals (including postseason) before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week 8 of the 2022 season at Cleveland. He has spent the past nine-plus months rehabbing and was removed from the Active/Physically Unable to Perform list and cleared to practice on July 25. Second-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** looks to build off a promising start to his career, as his rookie season in 2022 included 55 tackles — eighth-most on the team — with six PDs and one FF. Taylor-Britt spent the first four games of last season on the Reserve/Injured list while recovering from an abdomen injury, but went on to play in the final 10 contests with nine starts at outside CB. He started all three postseason games and had his first career INT to close out the Divisional Playoff win at Buffalo. Cincinnati used its 2023 second-round selection on **DJ Turner II**, a speedy boundary corner out of the University of Michigan. Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year's NFL Combine, clocking a time of 4.26 seconds. He recorded three INTs and 20 PDs in four seasons (2019-22) at Michigan, and was named second-team All-Big Ten last season. **Jalen Davis** serves as a reserve slot CB

behind Hilton, but secondary/cornerbacks coach Charles Burks has expressed his opinion that Davis could start for many NFL teams. He has played in 36 career games (including postseason), carving out a role on special teams in addition to his CB duties. **DJ Ivey**, the Bengals' seventh-round pick in April, enters his rookie season after playing in 58 games with 32 starts over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.). At 6-1, 192, he provides a rangy frame and displayed impressive ball skills in training camp. Ivey logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason. The Bengals will roll out a new-look starting safety tandem consisting of fifth-year veteran **Nick Scott** and second-year pro **Dax Hill**. Scott was among Cincinnati's notable acquisitions during the 2023 free agency period and brings 64 games of NFL experience (17 starts). He spent his first four seasons with the L.A. Rams, starting out as a special teams contributor before gradually increasing his role defensively and eventually becoming the team's starting safety in 2022. Scott is known for his physical play and sure tackling abilities, but also has four INTs and nine PDs. He started each of the Rams four postseason contests on their run to a Super Bowl LVI title. Hill was the Bengals' first-round draft choice in 2022 and played in 15 games as a rookie. Though he is touted for his versatility in the secondary, the Bengals will rely on Hill as their free safety in his second pro campaign. He saw action on 130 defensive snaps last season in a reserve role, while also being utilized as a gunner on special teams. Cincinnati took **Jordan Battle** in the third round of the NFL Draft in April, adding depth and championship pedigree to the safeties room. Battle was a third-team All-American in each of the past two seasons while at the University of Alabama, and helped the Crimson Tide win the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2020. A fundamentally sound rookie with noted leadership characteristics, Battle recorded 251 career tackles and six INTs — three of which were returned for a TD. **Tycen Anderson** looks to further carve out a role on the Bengals' defense and took a major step toward doing so in the preseason opener vs. Green Bay, when he had two INTs in the second quarter including a 43-yard pick-six. Anderson spent the 2022 regular season on the Reserve/Injured list with a hamstring injury, then was designated to return and cleared to practice but did not see postseason action. He was drafted by the Bengals in the fifth round in 2022 after a five-year career at the University of Toledo ('17-21).

Special teams: Rookie **Brad Robbins** earned the Bengals' punting role following a strong display in training camp and preseason games. A native of Westerville, Ohio native (north of Columbus), Robbins was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of April's draft after a five-year playing career at the University of Michigan. He finished his Michigan career with the second-highest punting average (43.0 yards per attempt) in program history. Robbins missed all of the 2018 season and part of '19 with an injury, but went on to play in 34 games from '19-22. He punted eight times for 371 yards (46.4) with one touchback and three downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line in the preseason. Robbins additionally will handle holding duties on placekicks. Third-year K **Evan McPherson** has quickly become a fan favorite since being drafted in the fifth round in 2021. He has earned a reputation as one of the NFL's top kickers from long range, as his 14 FGs from 50 or more yards are the most within a player's first 30 career games in league history. He has kicked the two longest FGs in team history — a 59-yarder in the 2022 regular-season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and a 58-yarder in Week 15 of the '21 season at Denver. McPherson is also 19 for 19 on FG attempts in the postseason, the second-most consecutive FGs without a miss to begin a postseason career in NFL history. The Bengals' long-snapper is second-year pro **Cal Adomitis**, who took over the role in Week 2 of the 2022 season following a season-ending injury to veteran Clark Harris. Adomitis went on to deliver 146 snaps without an unplayable attempt, including postseason. He originally joined the Bengals as a college free agent in 2022 after a five-year career ('17-21) at the University of Pittsburgh. Listed as the first-string punt returner and second-string kickoff returner is rookie WR **Charlie Jones**, who in 2021 was named the Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year while at the University of Iowa. Jones returned 25 kickoffs for 635 yards (25.4) and one TD that season for the Hawkeyes, while also returning 37 punts for 285 yards. HB **Chris Evans** is slotted as the first-string KOR, a role he held through the first nine games of the 2022 season. In that stretch, he had 10 KORs for 211 yards, with a 29-yard long in Week 5 at Baltimore. Evans posted a 28-yard return in the preseason opener vs. Green Bay, and followed up with a 35-yarder the next week at Atlanta. WR **Trenton Irwin** is listed behind Jones on the PR depth chart and had limited experience during the 2021 season with three returns for 31 yards. HB **Trayveon Williams**, who last season returned 16 kickoffs for 356 yards over the final eight regular-season contests, is also listed at KOR.

The Browns recorded 440 net yards offensively, including 172 rushing, to earn their fifth straight win in the "Battle of Ohio." Cincinnati was held scoreless in the first half for the first time in 24 games, with two early possessions ended by turnovers in Cleveland territory. A six-point swing off a missed Bengals FG followed by a 55-yarder by Cade York in the final minute of the half gave the Browns an 11-0 lead going into the break. Cleveland finished off two extended third-quarter drives with TDs to grow its lead to 25-0, while Cincinnati was held to just 148 total yards through the first three frames. QB Joe Burrow threw a pair of fourth-quarter TD passes to WRs Tyler Boyd and Tee Higgins, but a 53-yard completion on third-and-nine from QB Jacoby Brissett to WR Amari Cooper helped set up a game-sealing rushing TD by RB Nick Chubb. Cleveland improved to 3-5, while Cincinnati fell to 4-4.

Cincinnati held Cleveland, which entered as the fourth-ranked rushing offense in the NFL, to 71 yards on 25 carries (2.8 average), while QB Joe Burrow threw two TD passes to lead the Bengals to their fifth straight win. Both offenses failed to score points on their first three drives before a series of Browns penalties set up the Bengals at the Cleveland 30-yard line in the second quarter. Burrow cashed in with a pinpoint 15-yard TD throw to WR Ja'Marr Chase, who finished the game with 10 catches for 119 yards. HB Samaje Perine capped off a 75-yard scoring drive near the end of the first half to put the Bengals ahead by 10, and they increased their lead in the third quarter when Burrow hit WR Trenton Irwin for a 45-yard TD on a flea flicker. A TD by Browns TE David Njoku cut it to 20-10, but the Cincinnati defense stepped up in the fourth quarter, as S Jessie Bates intercepted a Deshaun Watson pass and each of Cleveland's final two possessions resulted in a turnover on downs. DT DJ Reader had five tackles and batted down a pass at the line of scrimmage, while LB Logan Wilson recorded 17 stops to help limit Browns RB Nick Chubb to just 34 rushing yards. Cincinnati improved to 9-4, while Cleveland fell to 5-8.
