## STEELERS ON MONDAY NIGHT

- Since Monday Night Football debuted in 1970, the Steelers have played in 73 contests and hold a 49-24 (.671) mark under the lights on Monday, including a 22-19 (.537) mark on the road.
- Pittsburgh's .671 winning percentage on Monday Night Football is second-best in the NFL.
- Pittsburgh and Cincinnati have played 11 times on Monday Night Football. The Steelers have captured eight of the 11 meetings.

## WHEN FACING STARTING QB DRAFTED NO. 1 OVERALL

- Washington's Alex Smith was the third opposing starting QB who was drafted No. 1 overall to face Pittsburgh at Heinz Field this season.
- With Washington's 23-17 victory over Pittsburgh in Week 13, Pittsburgh dropped to 63-33-3 (.652) in the regular season when facing a starting QB who was drafted No. 1 overall (since QB starts were first tracked beginning in 1950).
- The defeat snapped Pittsburgh's 14-game regular-season home winning streak when facing a starting QB drafted No. 1 overall was the longest streak in NFL history.
- With its 36-10 victory over Joe Burrow and the Bengals in Week 10, Pittsburgh extended its regular-season home winning streak to 14 games when facing a starting QB drafted No. 1 overall.
- The Steelers also knocked off the Cleveland Browns and Baker Mayfield in Week 6.
- Pittsburgh is 35-17-3 (.664) in the regular season at home when facing a starting QB who was drafted No. 1 overall.
- The Steelers are 28-16 (.636) in the regular-season on the road when facing a starting QB who was drafted No. 1 overall.
- Pittsburgh is 22-11 (.667) under head coach Mike Tomlin when facing a starting QB who was drafted No. 1 overall.

## FILM AT 11

- With the 19-14 victory in Week 12 over Baltimore, Pittsburgh improved to 11-0 on the season, which is the best start in franchise history. The previous mark was established by the 1978 club when it opened 7-0, finished 14-2 and won the Super Bowl.
- The Steelers were the League's first 11-0 team since Carolina in 2015.
- Only 12 NFL teams now started the season with an 11-0 record since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970.
- All 10 of the previous teams reached the playoffs, nine played in the Super Bowl and five brought home the Vince Lombardi Trophy (most recently was New Orleans in 2009).

#### STEELERS 2020 TEAM CAPTAINS

- The Steelers selected five players to serve as team captains for the 2020 season determined by a vote of their teammates.
- QB **Ben Roethlisberger** and C **Maurkice Pouncey** were selected to serve as offensive captains, DT **Cameron Heyward** and LB **T.J. Watt** were picked to serve as defensive captains and S **Jordan Dangerfield** was chosen to serve as the special teams captain.
- Roethlisberger was selected as an offensive captain for the 12th time in his career (2008-09, 2011-20). This marks Heyward's sixth consecutive year as a captain (2015-20), and the fourth time Pouncey has been named a captain (2013, 2018-20).
- Watt and Dangerfield were named captains for the first time in their respective careers.

#### HALFTIME GOT YOU DOWN

- Pittsburgh rallied from second-half deficits of 10 or more points in back-to-back weeks (Week 8 at Baltimore, Week 9 at Dallas).
- The Steelers have not erased 10-point deficits en route to back-to-back wins on the road since Week 11 and 12 of 1953.
- The Steelers improved their record to 3-0 this season when trailing at halftime. Pittsburgh trailed Houston in Week 3, Baltimore in Week 8 and Dallas in Week 9.
- Pittsburgh has registered 16 victories when trailing in the second half by 10 or more points since QB **Ben Roethlisberger** entered the NFL in 2004, which ranks tied for second in the League over that span.

- Pittsburgh outscored Dallas, 15-0, in the fourth quarter of its 24-19 victory in Week 9.
- The 15-point margin for the Steelers in the fourth quarter was their largest since Week 11 of 2017 when Pittsburgh routed Tennessee, 40-17.

#### STEELERS HARBOR NO ILL WILL WITH BALTIMORE

- Pittsburgh overcame a 10-point halftime deficit to win, 27-24, in Week 8 at Baltimore (17-7). The Steelers had not overcome a deficit of 10 or more points and won on the road since a 23-20 victory at Cincinnati in Week 13 of 2017 at Cincinnati (17-3).
- Pittsburgh was the first opponent to overcome a halftime deficit of 10 or more points at Baltimore since Oct. 5, 1997.
- The comeback was tied for sixth best in road franchise history. The franchise record occurred in Week 6 of 1997 when the Steelers overcame a 17-point halftime deficit (24-7) en route to a 42-34 victory over Baltimore.
- The Ravens entered their Week 8 meeting with the Steelers 110-17-1 (.857) in franchise history at home when leading at halftime.
- Baltimore is now 59-3 (.952) in franchise history at home when leading at halftime by 10 or more points. The three defeats?

- One of the three teams to win the Super Bowl following a Week 4 bye -- Pittsburgh in 2005. The Steelers played 17 straight weeks and defeated Seattle, 21-10, in Super Bowl XL.

## BATTLE OF THE UNDEFEATED

- Pittsburgh and Tennessee, two of the last three undefeated teams in the NFL, both entered their Week 7 game with 5-0 records.
- It marked the first time in franchise history that the Steelers face another undefeated foe in Week 5 or later.
- It was the eighth in League history of undefeated and untied teams with at least five victories.
- It was the sixth such meeting since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, and just the fifth in the last 46 seasons.

## WIN FIRST SIX HOME GAMES OF A SEASON

- With the 19-14 victory in Week 12 over Baltimore, Pittsburgh has opened eight seasons in franchise history with victories in its first six home games (1972, 1973, 1979, 1992, 1996, 2004, 2007 and 2020).
- The Steelers have not opened a season with victories in each of its first six home games since 2007 when Pittsburgh won its first seven home games. ## DIFFICULT STRETCH

- Pittsburgh completed a treacherous three-game stretch of the 2020 schedule (Weeks 6-8) with a 3-0 record.
- The Steelers toppled Cleveland (4-1) in Week 6, Tennessee in Week 7 (5-0) and Baltimore in Week 8 (5-1).
- Pittsburgh's three opponents had a combined 14-2 record entering the game with the Steelers.

## CONNER STRONG

- RB **James Conner** has rushed for 663 yards on 155 carries and five TDs this season. He ranks 19th in franchise history with 2,244 rush yards.
- Conner ran for 101 yards on 20 carries and one TD in the Week 6 victory over Cleveland (28-7). He scored on a three-yard run in the second quarter to extend Pittsburgh's lead to 17-0. The TD run was his fourth of the season and 20th of his career.

## STEELERS BOTTLE UP THE BENGALS

- Pittsburgh forced Cincinnati into six 3-and-outs over their 14 offensive possessions in Week 10. The Steelers limited the Bengals to 22 yards or less on 10 of those 14 drives.
- Pittsburgh held Cincinnati to 0-for-13 on third down. The last time an NFL team held an opponent to 0-for-13 or worse on third down attempts was the New York Jets when they held Arizona on December 2, 2012 (0-for-15).
- The last time the Steelers held an opponent without a third-down conversion was Week 9 of 2014. Pittsburgh routed unbeaten Philadelphia, 27-3, and held the Eagles to 0-for-8 on third down.
- Pittsburgh is the fourth team in the League this season to hold an opponent without a third down conversion.
- The Steelers are the eighth team in the NFL to hold a foe without a third down conversion with at least 13 third down attempts since 1991.

## STEELERS RUSH DEFENSE TURNS EAGLES TO THE AIR

- Pittsburgh allowed just 162 yards rushing on the year entering its game with Philadelphia in Week 5. The Steelers then yielded a first-quarter 74-yard TD run to Eagles' running back Miles Sanders.
- Pittsburgh limited Philadelphia to only 20 rushing yards over its other 15 carries (1.3 yards per rush).
- Sanders rushed for just 8 yards over his final seven carries of the game.

## STEELERS HANDLE HOUSTON IN THE SECOND HALF

- After allowing 209 total yards and 21 points in the first half against Houston in Week 3, the Steelers defense shut out the Texans in the second half and limited Houston to just 51 total yards.
- The Texans had TD drives of 74, 54 and 75 in the opening 30 minutes, but managed more than 6 total yards on one of their four offensive possessions in the second half, including a trio of three-and-outs.
- Pittsburgh yielded 11 first downs in the first half and just two after halftime.
- Pittsburgh held the Texans to 29 yards rushing on 15 carries, good for a 1.9 yards per rush average. The 29-yard rushing output was Houston's fourth-lowest total in franchise history and lowest total since they ran for 24 yards against the Giants in Week 5 of 2010.

## STEELERS D-MEN DOMINATES GIANTS

- Pittsburgh bottled up Giants' RB Saquon Barkley in Week 1. The Steelers limited the dynamic back to just six yards on 15 carries, tied for the second-fewest yards by any player with 15 or more rushes in a game since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger.
- Barkley's six yards rushing were the second-fewest of his career. He had one yard rushing in Week 10 of 2019 at the New York Jets.
- The Steelers were just the sixth defense since 1970 NFL-AFL merger to limit an opposing running back to fewer than 10 yards on 15 or more carries.
- Pittsburgh held the Giants to 29 yards rushing on 20 carries, good for a 1.5 yards per rush average. The 29-yard rushing output was New York's lowest total since they ran for 23 yards at the Jets in Week 10 of 2019.
- The Steelers registered 11 tackles for loss, eight quarterback hits, five passes defended, 3.0 sacks and two interceptions. Pittsburgh forced 3 three-and-outs and limited the Giants to two yards or less on six of their 11 offensive possessions.

## TURN DOWN FOR WATT

- LB **T.J. Watt** has opened the 2020 season exactly where he left off in 2019.
- Watt 12.0 sacks, 19 tackles for loss and 39 quarterback hits through his first 13 games this season. He's the second player since at least 2006 to record at least 12.0 sacks, 19 tackles for loss and 39 quarterback hits in the first 13 games of a season.

**PITTSBURGH** - Steelers quarterback **Ben Roethlisberger** threw for four touchdowns, two to wide receiver **Chase Claypool**, and the defense held Cincinnati without a conversion on third down on all 13 Bengals' attempts in a 36-10 victory on Sunday afternoon at Heinz Field.

"I like what we did on third down," Steelers head coach **Mike Tomlin** said. "We were very good on the possession downs."

The Steelers improved to 9-0 for the first time in franchise history.

The Bengals fell to 2-6-1.

Announced attendance was 5,909.

"We're just taking it one game at a time," outside linebacker **T.J. Watt** said. "We'll take a win any way we can get it."

"The train keeps rolling."

Roethlisberger's fourth touchdown pass and Claypool's second touchdown reception, a 5-yard connection, finished off a five-play drive that began at the Cincinnati 15-yard line following a 42-yard punt return by wide receiver **Ray-Ray McCloud**. Kicker **Chris Boswell**'s extra point gave the Steelers a 36-7 lead with 10:31 left in the fourth quarter.

Roethlisberger finished 27-for-46 passing for a season-high 333 yards and four touchdowns and wasn't intercepted.

His preparation in the week leading up to the game was virtual until he was activated from the Steelers' Reserve/COVID-19 list and able to participate in what Roethlisberger described as an "up-tempo walk-through" on Saturday.

"I attribute it to the guys around me," he said. "It was way more than me. It was a total team victory."

Added wide receiver **JuJu Smith-Schuster**: "Ben does what Ben does, I'm nit surprised."

**Mason Rudolph** took over at quarterback for a possession that began with 5:02 left in regulation, just after a 37-yard field goal by Bengals kicker Randy Bullock accounted for the final margin.

The Steelers took a 22-point lead late in the third quarter on a 12-play, 67-yard drive in 4:12 that culminated on an 11-yard pass from Roethlisberger to Claypool. Roethlisberger converted three third downs, including two third-and-10s, with completions on the march (11 yards to Claypool, 14 yards to tight end **Eric Ebron** and 12 yards to Smith Schuster). Boswell's extra point gave the Steelers a 29-7 advantage.

Boswell's third field goal in three tries in the first half gave the Steelers a 22-7 lead with 1:48 left in the second quarter. They carried that 15-point advantage into halftime.

The Steelers opened the scoring thanks in part to a turnover generated on special teams.

Outside linebacker **Ola Adeniyi** forced a fumble on a punt return and running back **Benny Snell** recovered at the Cincinnati 32-yard line. The Steelers were unable to register a first down but Boswell converted from 41 yards away from a 3-0 lead with 11:23 left in the first quarter.

A 15-yard punt return by McCloud gave the Steelers possession at the Bengals' 46 midway through the first. They drove to the Cincinnati 12 but ultimately settled for a 30-yard Boswell field goal and a 6-0 lead with 4:50 left in the opening quarter.

The offense required just three plays to score the game's first touchdown on the Steelers' next possession. Roethlisberger hit wide receiver **Diontae Johnson** for 46 yards, wide receiver **James Washington** for 16 and then Johnson again for a 12-yard touchdown on successive snaps. A two-point conversion pass from Roethlisberger to Claypool fell incomplete, keeping the Steelers' lead at 12-0 with 1:51 left in the first.

The Bengals responded with an eight-play, 90-yard touchdown drive in 3:21. A pass from quarterback Joe Burrow to wide receiver Tee Higgins on fourth-and-goal from the Steelers' 2 got Cincinnati into the end zone and onto the scoreboard. Bullock's extra point trimmed the Steelers' lead to 12-7 with 10:37 left in the second.

Cincinnati went 2-for-3 on fourth down, including a fake punt that gained 39 yards to the Steelers' 27 and set up Bullock's field goal.

The Steelers' second touchdown, an 8-yard pass from Roethlisberger to Smith-Schuster, capped a seven-play, 78-yard drive in 3:14. Boswell's extra point upped the Steelers' advantage to 19-7 with 7:23 remaining prior to the break.

Johnson finished the first half with six catches for 116 yards and a touchdown and didn't catch a pass in the second half.

The two teams combined for just 45 rushing yards in the opening 30 minutes (29 for the Bengals and 16 for the Steelers). The Bengals out-rushed the Steelers, 139-44, overall.

The Steelers sacked Burrow four times and have registered at least one sack in 66th consecutive regular-season games, three off the NFL record of 69 set by Tampa Bay from 1999-2003.
