GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 8:20 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air nationally on NBC-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WLWT-TV (Ch. 5) in Cincinnati, WDTN-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and on WLEX-TV (Ch. 2) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Mike Tirico (play-by-play), Cris Collinsworth (analyst), Melissa Stark (sideline reporter) and Terry McAuley (rules analyst).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

In addition, the game will air nationally on Westwood One Radio. Broadcasters are Ryan Radtke (play-by-play) and Mike Golic (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals face a prime-time road test when they take on the New York Giants at MetLife Stadium on Sunday Night Football.

Cincinnati is coming off a 41-38 OT loss to Baltimore in a Week 5 shootout at Paycor Stadium. The Bengals built a 10-point lead in the second half on the back of an impressive performance from QB Joe Burrow, who threw a career-high five TD passes to go with 392 passing yards and a 137.0 passer rating. Burrow's fifth scoring toss came via a quick screen to Pro Bowl WR Ja'Marr Chase, who took it 70 yards to the end zone for his second TD of the day.

The Chase 70-yarder increased Cincinnati's lead to 38-28 midway through the fourth, but Baltimore answered with 10 straight points to send the game to OT. Ravens QB Lamar Jackson continued his own notable outing with his fourth TD pass that cut the deficit to three, and then CB Marlon Humphrey picked off Burrow on the ensuing possession to make way for a game-tying FG drive. In the extra period, a fumbled snap by Jackson was scooped up by LB Germaine Pratt in Baltimore territory, giving the Bengals a prime opportunity to get in position for a game-winning kick. Cincinnati set up for a 53-yard attempt four plays later, but a mishandled snap led to K Evan McPherson sailing it wide left.

Baltimore needed just two plays to capitalize on the miss, as RB Derrick Henry broke through Cincinnati's defensive line and raced 52 yards to the Bengals' six. Ravens K Justin Tucker then knocked through the chip-shot winner to hand Cincinnati its fourth loss by a margin of one possession this season.

Head coach Zac Taylor preached the importance of not looking beyond this week's matchup against the Giants.

"We're five games into the season," Taylor said. "I know what the noise is. We're 1-4, and so we're accountable for all of that. It's not good enough. We have too much talent on this team to be in the position we've found ourselves in right now. But all we can do focusing forward is (to ask ourselves), how do we beat the New York Giants? How do we have a great week, how do we get back on the winning track? You look around the AFC and there's plenty of opportunity there moving forward, and we just need to take advantage of it."

Perhaps the leading cause for optimism in Cincinnati can be found in the team's recent offensive outputs. The Bengals have scored 30-plus points in each of their last three games, and they enter Week 6 ranking near the top of the NFL in scoring (28.0 points per game; tied for fourth), total offense (359.0 yards/game; ninth) and passing offense (263.0 yards/game; fifth).

The Giants won 29-20 at Seattle in Week 5, recording a season-best 420 net offensive yards. The Seahawks' 20 points were a season low, and New York enters this week allowing just 20.8 points per game (11th in NFL).

The series: The Bengals lead 6-5. The home team has won all but one of the contests, with the lone outlier being the most recent meeting in 2020, which the Giants won 19-17 in Cincinnati.

Entering this game, the Bengals have played fewer games against the Giants (11) than against any other long-established NFL team. The only team with fewer meetings against Cincinnati is Carolina (eight games), but the Panthers have been in operation only since 1995.

Close ones: Nine of the 11 Bengals-Giants games have been decided by a touchdown or less, and five of the last six games have been decided by a field goal or less. The Giants have never beaten the Bengals by more than seven points.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 2068 career passing attempts, 153 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.

- Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore had 392 passing yards, moving his career passing yardage total to 15,453. That surpassed Blake (15,134) for fourth place all-time. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.

- Burrow has 21 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the third-most all-time. Dalton (28) and Esiason (23) hold the top two spots for the team's most 300-yard passing games.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 34 career receiving TDs, seven shy of WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth all-time. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.

- Chase has 16 games with 100 or more receiving yards, two shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 42.5 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 16.5 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

- K Evan McPherson has an 83.7 career FG percentage (87 made/104 attempts), the third-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

Records vs. Giants: Here is a look at the regular-season records set in the Bengals-Giants series:

- On Nov. 27, 1977, Cincinnati's Tony Davis set a club record (since tied twice) with seven punt returns against the Giants at Riverfront Stadium.
- On Oct. 13, 1985, Giants QB Phil Simms set Bengals opponent records for passing yards (513) and completions (40), but the Bengals won the game, 35-30 at Riverfront Stadium.
- The two longest kickoff returns in Bengals history both were recorded against the Giants. On Oct. 26, 1997 at Giants Stadium, Bengals HB Eric Bieniemy had a 102-yard kickoff return for a TD, the longest at the time. Then, on Nov. 29, 2020, S Brandon Wilson returned a kickoff 103 yards for a TD. Wilson's 103-yarder is the Bengals' longest play of any kind in team history.

Individually vs. Giants: Here's a look at the stats for current Bengals offensive players against the Giants (ordered by total games played):

- WR Tee Higgins: One game; Five receptions for 44 yards (8.8-yard average) and one TD.
- TE Drew Sample: One game; Four receptions for 40 yards (10.0).
- HB Trayveon Williams: One game; one rush for minus-2 yards; one reception for 13 yards.

Bengals on Sunday night: This week's game offers an opportunity for Cincinnati to improve its record in regular-season Sunday night contests, as the Bengals have not fared well in those matchups historically. In 21 regular-season Sunday night games, the Bengals are 4-17 overall and have lost nine of the last 10.

The Bengals' most recent regular-season SNF game, however, was a win — a 24-18 victory over the Buffalo Bills at Paycor Stadium last season.

Overall at night: In regular season, the Bengals are 28-56 at night, including 4-17 on Sunday night, 14-27 playing on Monday night, 10-8 on Thursday night, 0-1 on Friday night and 0-3 on Saturday night.

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks this week at the N.Y. Giants. It is the most

frequently worn combination for Cincinnati over the past three-plus seasons, as the Bengals have used it 15 times (regular season and postseason) and posted an 8-7 record in those games.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and the recently unveiled orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet four times — twice in 2022 and twice in '23 — and have won all four games. The "White Bengal" look is set to make its return in Week 8 versus Philadelphia on Oct. 27.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

Bengals-Giants connections: Bengals DT B.J. Hill was a third-round draft pick of the Giants in 2018 and spent his first three pro seasons ('18-20) with New York ... Bengals TE Tanner Hudson played for the Giants in 2022 ... Bengals defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo served as the Giants' defensive backs coach in 2018 ... Anarumo also is a native of Staten Island, N.Y. ... Bengals linebackers coach James Bettcher served as the Giants' defensive coordinator from 2018-19 ... Giants CB Nick McCloud played for the Bengals in 2021 ... Bengals HB Zack Moss and Giants RB Devin Singletary were

teammates on the Buffalo Bills from 2020-22 ... Bengals G/OT Cody Ford and Giants G Greg Van Roten also were teammates on the Bills in 2022 ... Van Roten previously played for the N.Y. Jets in 2020, when Bengals offensive line coach/run game coordinator Frank Pollack served as the Jets' offensive line coach and Bengals assistant offensive line coach Derek Frazier held the same title ... THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman

from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Brian Daboll was named the Giants' head coach on Jan. 29, 2022.

Daboll joined the Bills in 2018 as offensive coordinator under coach Sean McDermott. The previous year, he helped lead the University of Alabama to its 17th national championship as the Crimson Tide's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

In 2020, Daboll was voted Associated Press NFL Assistant Coach of the Year after the Bills finished 13-3 and ended the Patriots' streak of 11 consecutive division titles.

Daboll has 20 years of NFL coaching experience. He spent 11 seasons with the New England Patriots (2000-06, '13-16) in a variety of roles and helped the franchise win five Super Bowls (XXXVI, XXXVIII, XXXIX, XLIX and LI).

Daboll began his coaching career at age 24 in 2000 — as Bill Belichick's first year with the team — as a defensive coaching assistant. He was promoted to wide receivers coach in 2002.

Daboll left the Patriots to become the Jets' QBs coach from 2007-08. He has been an offensive coordinator for the Cleveland Browns (2009-10), Miami Dolphins ('11) and Kansas City Chiefs ('12).

Prior to entering the NFL, Daboll spent one year (1997) as a volunteer assistant at the College of William & Mary, before serving two seasons ('98-99) as a graduate assistant for Nick Saban at Michigan State.

Daboll played safety at Rochester from 1995-97. He has no pro playing experience. He was born on April 14, 1975 in Welland, Ontario, Canada.

Taylor vs. Giants: The Giants lead, 1-0.

Taylor vs. Daboll: No previous meetings.

BENGALS NOTES

Bengals near 400th W: The Bengals enter Week 6 with 395 all-time wins in the regular season, just five shy of 400. The team has won 239 games at home and 156 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly known as Paul Brown Stadium). The team has reached the 10-win mark during the regular season 14 times, including in six of the past 12 years.

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt joins Orlando Brown Jr. in serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers. Davis-Gaither lined up for 289 special teams snaps during the 2023 season, the third-most on the team, while McPherson has handled the Bengals' kicking duties since he entered the league in '21.

Four drives, four TDs: In Week 4 at Carolina, the Bengals found the end zone on four consecutive offensive possessions lasting from their final drive of the first quarter through their opening drive of the third quarter. The burst helped them go from a 0-0 tie to a 28-14 lead on the way to their first win of the season.

Cincinnati pulled it off again in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, when the offense scored TDs on four straight drives from the end of the second quarter through a possession midway through the fourth quarter. Each of those drives traveled at least 70 yards and helped the Bengals turn a deficit into a 10-point advantage.

The past two weeks marked the first time the Bengals scored a TD on four consecutive offensive possessions in back-to-back games since 1985, when they did it on Dec. 1 vs. the Houston Oilers and Dec. 8 vs. Dallas. Cincinnati also is the first NFL team to accomplish that feat since New Orleans in Weeks 10-11 of the 2018 season.

Burrow masters the deep ball: QB Joe Burrow has connected with WR Ja'Marr Chase on a TD pass of 40 or more yards in three straight games, with two such plays coming in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He hit Chase on a 41-yard deep ball with nine seconds remaining in the first half to give Cincinnati its first lead of the day, then in the fourth quarter found Chase on a quick screen that the Pro Bowl receiver turned into a 70-yard TD.

Since he entered the NFL in 2020, Burrow leads the league in TD passes of 40 or more yards (23) and 50 or more yards (16), while tying for the lead in 60-plus-yard TD throws (12). He had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22. He has already surpassed his total of two 40-plus-yarders from last season, which both went to Chase — a 63-yarder in Week 5 at Arizona, and a 64-yarder in Week 10 against Houston.

Burrow's 23 TD passes of 40 or more yards are the third-most by a QB in his first five seasons among all QBs whose career began after 1990. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning (28) and Kansas City QB Patrick

Mahomes (26) had more in their first five years.

Burrow reaches 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that mark.

Burrow's current career total of 15,453 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least five fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Through five games this season, Burrow ranks sixth in the NFL in passing yards (1370) and seventh in yards per attempt (7.92; minimum 14 attempts per team game).

Burrow throws 100th TD: QB Joe Burrow recorded his 100th career regular-season TD pass on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington, when he hit WR Ja'Marr Chase in stride for a 41-yard score. Playing in his 55th career game, Burrow tied for the seventh-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 100 TD passes.

The former No. 1 overall pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, before breaking out with a then-team-record 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By besting his record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore had a career-high five TD passes, eclipsing his previous mark of four that he reached four times. His 12 TD passes through five games this season lead the NFL.

Joe hits the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.33, he is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, ahead of former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.69).

Burrow in Week 4 at Carolina surpassed 2000 career passing attempts, and

his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark went in as the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 attempts. Brees holds the record with 1444 completions.

In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, Burrow went 30 of 39 (76.9 percent) for 392 yards and five TDs. It marked his 19th career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts — the second-most such games in NFL history within a player's first five seasons behind Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 passing attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Burrow through five games this season has a 72.3 completion percentage (125 of 173), the second-highest rate in the league behind Washington QB Jayden Daniels (77.1; minimum 14 attempts per team game).

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is one of two NFL players with at least 1000 completions, 75 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100, alongside Dallas QB Dak Prescott.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.3; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking fourth in TD passes (96), fifth in yards per attempt (7.67), eighth in completions (1149) and eighth in passing yards (12,765).

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He ranks fifth in NFL history in receiving yards (4210) and ninth in receptions (297) through a player's first 50 games, and he is one of five players in the Super Bowl era to record over 4000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs within his first 50 contests.

Chase holds a career average of 84.20 receiving yards per game, the third-highest total in NFL history among all players with at least 3000 yards. In 2023, his career-high 100 receptions tied former WR Carl Pickens (1996) for the second-most in a season in Bengals history, and he became the eighth player in NFL history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns.

Chase in Week 4 at Carolina surpassed 4000 career receiving yards in his 49th game played. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that milestone, one ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (50).

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 70-yard catch-and-run to the end zone in Week 5 vs. Baltimore marked his 10th career receiving TD of 60 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. It also tied former Bengals WR Isaac Curtis for the most in a career in team history, and

surpassed former N.Y. Giants Odell Beckham Jr. for the most in the Super Bowl era by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (11) and 40-plus yards (15) since 2021. With a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder against Baltimore, he became the first NFL player since WR Terrell Owens in 2007 to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games.

Higgins back in action: Fifth-year WR Tee Higgins has played in the team's last three games after missing the first two contests due to a hamstring injury. He posted three catches for 39 yards in his 2024 debut in Week 3 vs. Washington, then in Week 4 at Carolina he led the Bengals with six grabs for 60 yards. His best outing of the season came in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, when he caught nine passes for 83 yards and two TDs.

Higgins' performance against the Ravens marked his fifth career multi-TD game and tied for his second-most receptions in a game (most since Week 11 of 2022). He is averaging 9.2 yards per catch this season, with 13 of his 18 receptions resulting in a first down for Cincinnati.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 25 leaguewide in receiving yards (22nd; 3866), receiving TDs (T-18th; 26) and yards per reception (T-25th; 14.1). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 12 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (10), seventh in receiving yards (1228) and 13th in yards per reception (15.7) during the calendar's final month. Higgins also ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing teammate Ja'Marr Chase in both categories.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Run-heavy in Carolina: The Bengals recorded season highs in team rushing attempts (31) and net rushing yards (141) during their Week 4 win at Carolina. The volume of carries was distributed evenly among the team's top two backs, as HB Zack Moss had 15 attempts for 51 yards and HB Chase Brown had 15 for a career-high 80 yards and two TDs.

The last time two Cincinnati halfbacks logged at least 15 rushing attempts in the same game was Dec. 14, 2014, when Jeremy Hill had 25 carries for 148 yards and two scores while Giovanni Bernard totaled 15 for 79 to help the Bengals earn a 30-0 road win at Cleveland.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson notched his third sack of 2024 in Week 3 vs. Washington, bringing down QB Jayden Daniels for a loss of five yards in the fourth quarter. It boosted his sack total to 42.5 since he joined the Bengals during the 2021 offseason, the fourth-most in the NFL in that span.

Hendrickson logged his first two sacks of the 2024 campaign in Week 2 at Kansas City, with both occurring on second down to force the Chiefs into a third-and-long. It marked his 12th career multi-sack game. He is coming off a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023, which tied for second-most leaguewide and ranked second in Bengals single-season history. The team record is held by DE Coy Bacon, who had 22.0 sacks in the 1976 campaign (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Combining his Cincinnati totals with 13.5 sacks in 2020, Hendrickson's final year with New Orleans, his 56 sacks rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh LB T.J. Watt (66.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62). Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then started 15 contests for New Orleans in 2020, and has started 50 of 52 regular-season games played for the Bengals.

Hendrickson's production was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a

one-year contract extension with the Bengals that keeps him in stripes through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard recorded his first sack of the 2024 season in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, bringing down QB Lamar Jackson for a loss of three yards in the first quarter. It improved Hubbard's career sack total to 37.5, the third-most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected that year — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. He has ranked second on the Bengals in sacks in each season since he became the team's starting left defensive end in 2019, and he has 54 career TFLs.

Hubbard's sack against the Ravens perhaps was superseded by his next impact play in the second quarter. With Baltimore starting a drive from its own two-yard line, Hubbard broke through the gap and stopped RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone for a safety. It marked the first safety forced by the Bengals since Week 13 of the 2019 season against the N.Y. Jets.

Hubbard additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in team history. A native of Cincinnati who attended Archbishop Moeller High School, Hubbard also is known for contributing one of the franchise's most iconic plays, a 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the game-winner in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore following the 2022 season.

LB duo stuffs the stat sheet: LB Logan Wilson ranks tied for third in the NFL this season with 52 tackles, while his fellow starting LB Germaine Pratt is tied for eighth with 51.

In Week 2 at Kansas City, Pratt and Wilson combined for 28 tackles, the most by a pair of Bengals teammates since LB Vontaze Burfict (18 tackles) and LB Rey Mauluga (10) also totaled 28 on Dec. 30, 2012 against Baltimore. Pratt had a career-high 16 stops against the Chiefs, the fourth-most in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994.

Wilson has tallied at least nine tackles in each game this season. He is the first Bengals player to post nine or more stops in five straight games since LB Dhani Jones (six straight) in 2008.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: LB Logan Wilson paced the Bengals in tackles for a third straight season in 2023 with a career-high 135 stops, but perhaps his most notable contributions came when dropping into coverage. A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson had four INTs last year, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh in the NFL. His 11 career picks are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick in 2020. It also is tied for the third-most ever by a Bengals LB, trailing Reggie Williams (16) and Al Beauchamp (15).

The 2023 season was Wilson's second in which he recorded four INTs. He also had four picks in 2021, the most by a Bengals LB in a single season since Odell Thurman (five) in '05. Wilson's 135 tackles were the most by any Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign.

Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of two NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five forced fumbles, alongside Minnesota's Harrison Smith.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the '27 season.

Rehkw on a run: Through five weeks of regular-season play, rookie P Ryan Rehkw leads the NFL in gross punting average (55.6 yards per punt; minimum 10 attempts) and net punting average (49.2; min. 10 att.). He has punted 14 times for 779 yards, with seven downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line compared to two touchbacks.

Rehkw kicked off his career with a historic debut on Sept. 8 vs. New England, as he logged four punts for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four attempts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole on Nov. 5, 2023. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkw's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers). Rehkw's 80-yarder tied for the 15th-longest punt in league history and was the third-longest in an NFL debut.

Rehkw in Week 5 vs. Baltimore punted five times for 253 yards (50.6 average), with four downed inside the Ravens' 20-yard line. It marked the most inside-20 punts in a game by a Bengals rookie since Kevin Huber had four on Nov. 29, 2009 against Cleveland. In the second quarter, Rehkw delivered a punt that rolled deep into Baltimore territory before being downed at the Ravens' two-yard line. It officially was a 66-yard punt, and led to DE Sam Hubbard forcing a safety on the next play.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkw signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson knocked through a 56-yard FG in the third quarter of Week 4 at Carolina, extending his Bengals record to 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards. It also tied for the fifth-longest FG in team history, with McPherson owning five of the top six on that list.

McPherson's 24 such FGs are the third-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021. He finished the 2023 campaign with 21 FGs from 50-plus yards, the most in NFL history in a player's first three seasons.

McPherson in Week 3 against Washington surpassed 100 career FG attempts, and he ranks third in Bengals history for most made FGs through his first 100 tries with 84. Only former kickers Shayne Graham and Randy Bullock (87 each) had a better conversion rate through their 100th attempt. McPherson's current career FG percentage of 83.7 (87 of 104) also is third in team history behind Graham (86.8) and Bullock (84.9; minimum 75 attempts).

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs, including two last season — in OT of Week 13 at Jacksonville, and again in OT of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. However, his two most notable such kicks came during the 2021 postseason, when he hit a 52-yarder in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and followed up a week later with a 31-yarder in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City that sent Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson is a perfect 19 of 19 in seven career postseason games and is the team's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points).

Cincinnati signed McPherson to a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18, securing its kicker through the 2027 season.

Pro Bowl three-peats: WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 that tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 19 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 season, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home games from 2005-07.

Each of the five highest-announced home attendance figures in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 season, including three that were played during the '23 campaign. Cincinnati's Week 9 win over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football last season had an attendance figure of 66,965, which stands as the second-largest in team history behind a record

67,260 in Week 4 of the '22 season against Miami. The Bengals faced Houston in Week 10 of 2023 in front of an announced crowd of 66,526, the third-largest ever, and earlier in the season had an attendance figure of 66,385 in a Week 6 win over Seattle that ranks fifth. The fourth-highest attendance figure is 66,399 for the team's Wild Card Playoff victory against Baltimore in January of 2023.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor with the induction of former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the Ring of Honor during a halftime ceremony in the team's Week 3 game against Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esian, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.6 years ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals roster is DE Sam Hubbard, who is in his seventh season with the team ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 31 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is OT Amarius Mims, who is 21 (born Oct. 14, 2002) ... Mims also is the heaviest player on the roster, listed at 350 pounds ... The lightest player on the roster is CB Mike Hilton, who is listed at 184 pounds ... There is a tie for tallest player on the roster between Mims and OT Orlando Brown Jr., who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). He also currently is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage, maintaining a mark of 68.33 percent (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Through five weeks this season, Burrow leads the league in TD passes (12) and passer rating (113.6; min. 50 attempts), while ranking second in completions (125), second in completion percentage (72.3) and sixth in passing yards (1370). He is coming off a career-high five TD passes in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, which tied for second-most in a game in Bengals history. In finishing 30 of 39 (76.9 percent) for 392 yards against the Ravens, Burrow became the 10th QB in NFL history to post a stat line of 390-plus passing yards, five-plus TD passes and a completion percentage above 75. He also surpassed former QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most passing yards in team history, with his career total now at 15,453. Burrow in Week 4 at Carolina eclipsed two career milestones in near record fashion, as he tied for the fourth-fastest QB in league history to reach 15,000 passing yards (56 games) and had the second-most completions through his 2000th pass attempt (1363). He threw his 100th career TD pass in Week 3 vs. Washington, tying for the seventh-fastest QB ever to hit that mark (55 games). Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed

second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time last year, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals (2021-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20).

Running backs: Fifth-year veteran **Zack Moss** joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent this past offseason, and through five games he has 211 rushing yards on a team-leading 57 carries. He also has 15 catches for 124 yards, and has scored three total TDs (two rushing, one receiving). His receiving TD came with one second remaining in the first half of Week 4 at Carolina. Moss entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2020, and after amassing 917 rushing yards and eight TDs in two-plus seasons with the Bills, he was traded to Indianapolis in November of '22. He had his best statistical season in 2023, when he set career highs in rushing attempts (183), rushing yards (794), rushing TDs (five) and receptions (27). Complementing Moss in the run game is second-year pro **Chase Brown**. Brown has three TDs over his last two games, with the first two rushing scores of his career in Week 4 at Carolina followed by a TD reception in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. Recognized for his quick burst out of the

backfield, he is averaging 5.6 yards per carry (41 for 230) through five games and has a team-best nine rushes of 10-plus yards. He finished the Panthers game with a career-high 80 rushing yards, while also returning two kickoffs for 52 yards. Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in the 2023 draft, Brown spent four games on the Reserve/Injured list midway through his rookie season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to post 322 yards from scrimmage over the final six contests. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in 2023, and now shares that responsibility with Brown as the Bengals approach the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, while also contributing 15 career receptions for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average).

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons. He is one of eight players in NFL history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns, and he posted a career-high 100 catches in 2023 that tied for the second-most in a season in team history. A constant downfield threat, Chase leads the league with 15 TD receptions of 40 or more yards, 11 TD receptions of 50 or more yards and 10 TD receptions of 60 or more yards since the start of his 2021 rookie campaign. He added to those totals in Week 5 vs. Baltimore with a 41-yard scoring catch late in the first half, and then a 70-yard catch-and-run to the end zone midway through the fourth quarter. The Ravens game marked Chase's 50th career regular-season contest, and with 4210 total receiving yards he surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (4164) for the fifth-most in NFL history through a player's first 50 games. He also is one of just five players in the Super Bowl era to amass 4000-plus receiving yards and 30-plus receiving TDs within his first 50 contests. Higgins missed the first two weeks of this season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to the lineup in Week 3 vs. Washington and has started the past three games. He caught nine passes for 83 yards and two TDs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, marking the fifth multi-TD game of his career. With his first score of the day on an 11-yard pass from Burrow in the second quarter, he became the 15th player in Bengals history to reach 25 receiving TDs. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, Higgins has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then finished with 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but when healthy he contributed five TD catches and averaged 15.6 yards per reception. Higgins was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andre Iosivas** has developed a connection with QB Joe Burrow, particularly in the low red zone. He has seven career TDs on just 27 total receptions, and five of those have come on Burrow passes from inside the opponents' five-yard line. He had two scoring grabs in Week 2 at Kansas City, then the following week had another on a fourth-and-goal play against Washington. Iosivas in Week 5 vs. Baltimore had a career-long 39-yard reception on the opening drive of the second half that set up a Bengals TD. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, he earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. **Trenton Irwin** spent his first three seasons with the Bengals (2019-21) primarily as a practice squad player and game day inactive, but over the past two-plus years he has emerged as a dependable option for Cincinnati's quarterbacks. After totaling just three receptions in those first three seasons, he has 42 catches for 558 yards and five TDs since the start of the 2022 campaign, including a career-high 25 grabs for 316 yards in '23. Though listed as a backup on the depth chart last season, he started five games and showed an ability to line up at multiple WR positions. Irwin has been active for three games this season (inactive for Weeks 3 and 5), and has two catches for 11 yards. Second-year pro **Charlie Jones** serves as the team's primary punt returner, in addition to his role as a reserve receiver. He has caught eight passes for 69 yards offensively, and returned 30 punts for 295 yards (9.8 average) with one TD. He missed six games last season due to a thumb injury, but returned to play in each of the final eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals added another downfield threat in the third round of April's draft when they selected **Jermaine Burton**. Burton played in 26 games at

the University of Alabama from 2022-23, after spending his first two collegiate seasons ('20-21) at the University of Georgia. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while his 20.5 yards per reception led the Southeastern Conference and ranked sixth nationally. Burton led the Bengals and ranked third leaguewide in preseason receiving yards with 157 on eight catches (19.6 average), with two TDs. His first NFL reception came in Week 2 at Kansas City, when he hauled in a 47-yard deep ball from Burrow on Cincinnati's first offensive play of the second half.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 66 career games (39 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of last season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 84 career receptions for 649 yards and three TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample logged his first statistics of the 2024 campaign in Week 2 at Kansas City, catching three passes for 28 yards. The Bengals added a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last season. He played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted a game-high seven catches for 91 yards. He then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington, totaling four catches for 47 yards. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, he challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. Gesicki topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** began the 2023 season on the Bengals' practice squad, but was signed to the active roster in early November and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in catches (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals used their fourth-round draft choice this past April to select **Erick All Jr.**, a native of Fairfield, Ohio (approximately 25 miles north of Cincinnati). All began training camp on the Active/Non-Football Injury list due to a knee injury sustained last October, but he was cleared to practice in late July and played in all three preseason games. Through five regular-season games (three starts), All has caught each of his 14 targets for 92 yards. He earned his first start in Week 2 at Kansas City and has caught a pass in each of his last four appearances, while also contributing as a blocker in the run game. He spent his first four collegiate seasons (2019-22) at the University of Michigan, then transferred to the University of Iowa for the '23 campaign. In 40 career college games, he caught 75 passes for 864 yards and five TDs. The Bengals doubled-up on tight ends during the draft when they took **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He caught three passes for 42 yards in the preseason, and has been inactive for each of the Bengals' five regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 41 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 2690 of a possible 2709 offensive snaps in that time (99.3 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who started all 17 games at LOT in his first Bengals season in 2023. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with the Baltimore Ravens, then played two ('21-22) with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was also selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started

each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. Cappa has played 100 percent of the team's offensive snaps through five games this season and is one of two Bengal linemen, along with Karras, who haven't been penalized this season. **Cordell Volson** has started each of the Bengals' 41 games (including postseason) at LG since they took him in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. He has lined up for every offensive snap in that time, the only player on the team to do so. Though he has found his role in Cincinnati as the team's LG, he played at guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. Last season, Mims started six games on an offensive line that led the SEC in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.93). He was inactive for the team's first two games of the regular season due to a pectoral injury sustained in the preseason opener. Mims made his NFL debut in Week 3 against Washington, taking over for Trent Brown following his first-quarter injury. He made his first career start in Week 4 at Carolina and lined up for all 67 offensive snaps. Mims briefly exited the Week 5 contest vs. Baltimore with an ankle injury, but returned in the fourth quarter. G/OT **Cody Ford**, a former college teammate of Orlando Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma, signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and served as a key depth piece in his first season with Cincinnati. He saw action in all 17 games, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He has played in 71 career games with 34 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG and two as a third TE. Ford was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. Head coach Zac Taylor told reporters on Monday that G/OT **Jaxson Kirkland** will miss the remainder of the 2024 season due to a biceps injury he sustained in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. Kirkland was an Active/DNP in the team's first three games, then made his NFL debut in Week 4 at Carolina. He spent the first 10 games of his rookie season in 2023 on Cincinnati's practice squad, then was moved to the Practice Squad/Injured list for the remainder of the year due to a wrist injury. A 2023 college free agent signee, he was an AP third-team All-American at the University of Washington in '22 and earned three first-team All-Pac-12 selections during his career with the Huskies. The team's final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft, C **Matt Lee** was taken in the seventh round (237th overall) after playing in 51 games during his college career. He spent the first four years of his career (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16), while blocking for an offense that ranked second in the conference in total yards per game (431.2). Lee has appeared in all five games this season on special teams.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who has led the Bengals in sacks and been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his three seasons with the team. He signed with Cincinnati as a free agent in 2021, and in '23 posted a career-high 17.5 sacks which tied for second in the league and ranked second in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 56.0 sacks since the start of the 2020 season — his final year with the New Orleans Saints — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (66.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62.0). He has three sacks through five games this season, including two on QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City. On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has recorded 37.5 career sacks, the third-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons, and his 58 total tackles in 2023 led all Bengals D-linemen. Hubbard has logged 21 total tackles through the first five games of this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, a three-yard takedown of QB Lamar Jackson in the first quarter, and a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the

Ravens' end zone in the second quarter. It marked the Bengals' first safety since Week 13 of the 2019 season. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 42 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22 and all 17 regular-season games in '23. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 13 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 10 passes at the line of scrimmage. Hill opened the season with three tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, but he suffered a hamstring injury the following week at Kansas City that kept him out of the lineup for Weeks 3-4. He returned to action in Week 5 vs Baltimore and totaled five tackles, a QB hit and a PD. Ninth-year veteran **Sheldon Rankins** started the Bengals' first two contests, but has missed the last three games due to a hamstring injury sustained in Week 2 at Kansas City. Rankins signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in March and has 111 games of NFL experience. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, he spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 29.5 career sacks and 43 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in his career, and included a career-high three on Nov. 12 at Paycor Stadium against the Bengals. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, he has played in 35 career regular-season games and totaled 38 tackles with 4.5 sacks. Ossai was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins missed the first two games of his rookie season due to a thumb injury, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. He made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' first drive of the game. He is coming off 45 defensive snaps played in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. Jenkins was a Michigan team captain and a second-team All-American last season, when he logged 37 tackles with 2.5 sacks and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has been inactive for three games this season, but played a combined 34 defensive snaps in Weeks 3 and 4. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. DT **Lawrence Guy** added depth and a veteran presence to the D-line room when he signed with the Bengals as a free agent on Sept. 17. Guy is in his 14th NFL season and previously spent time with Indianapolis, the San Diego Chargers, Baltimore and New England. He played for the Patriots from 2017-23, logging 379 tackles and 10.5 sacks in that stint. He made his Bengals debut in Week 3 vs. Washington, and over the past three games has played a combined 76 defensive snaps.

Linebackers: A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Logan Wilson** has developed into one of the NFL's top linebackers and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. Wilson through five games this season ranks tied for third in the NFL with 52 tackles, and he is the first Bengals player to open a campaign with nine or more tackles in five straight games since 2008. The team's starting LB tandem features Wilson and sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt**, who set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons. Pratt has a knack for forcing game-changing turnovers, and he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 76 of 84 career regular-season games played, and boasts a streak of 66 consecutive starts (including postseason). Pratt, who was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career, ranks just behind Wilson with 51 tackles through five games (tied for eighth in NFL). He posted a career-high 16 stops in Week 2 at Kansas City, and forced

and recovered a fumble to set up a Bengals FG drive. He had his second FR of the year in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, when he scooped up a loose ball in overtime and returned it into Ravens territory. Also wearing the captains patch for the first time this season is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 59 games with four starts for the Bengals. He serves as a rotational LB and core special teamer, and battled through a knee injury last season to play in 13 games. Davis-Gaither saw action on 16 defensive snaps in Week 2 at Kansas City, and picked off QB Patrick Mahomes late in the first quarter for his second career INT (first since 2020). He also has lined up for a team-high 111 special teams snaps through five games this season. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 31 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 34 career tackles and one PD in 44 games played. Among the most notable stories in Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27), and added two PDs. He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for 110 special teams snaps through five regular-season games.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzter with 11.5 career sacks. In 2023, he recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). He also had a pair of INTs and eight PDs last season. Hilton entered the league as a college free agent signee by Jacksonville in 2016 and was briefly on New England's practice squad before spending four-plus seasons with Pittsburgh. He totaled 12 tackles over the first four games this season, then was inactive for Week 5 vs. Baltimore due to a knee injury. Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 26 of 27 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. He missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. He opened this season with six tackles (four solos) in Week 1 against New England, then grabbed his first INT of the year with a highlight-reel one-handed pick on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City. He posted six more tackles (five solos) and two PDs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. Head coach Zac Taylor confirmed Monday that **Dax Hill** suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. Hill, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2022, converted to CB during this past offseason after spending his first two years at safety. He was the Bengals' starting safety in every game in 2023 and ranked third on the team with 110 tackles while adding 11 PDs and two INTs. He totaled 25 tackles, one sack and two PDs in five games this season prior to the injury. **DJ Turner II** is in his second pro season, after a rookie campaign in which he played in all 17 games and started 12 of the final 13 contests. A second-round draft choice last year, he ran the fastest 40-yard dash time among all players at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. Turner has 12 tackles and two PDs this season, with 10 of his stops coming in the past two games. He posted 50 stops and seven PDs as a rookie. The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice this year, **Josh Newton**, made the team out of training camp after posting nine tackles, two PDs and an INT in preseason. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of Newton after his name was called on the third day of the draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 68 tackles with 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to Texas Christian from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups and helped lead the team to the College Football Playoff National Championship game. Newton lined up for 11 defensive snaps in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and also has seen action on 64 special teams snaps through five games this season.

Safeties: Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 32 tackles through five games this season and has lined up for 328 of the team's 337 defensive snaps.

Bell grabbed his first INT of the season against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 32-yard return following the pick set up Cincinnati's first TD of the game. It marked his eighth career INT and his first since Week 2 of 2023. One of the headliners of Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who emerged as a ball-hawking safety in his final season with Baltimore. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 broke out with an AFC-leading seven INTs (second in NFL). His seven picks included a streak of four consecutive games with an INT. Stone originally was a seventh-round pick of the Ravens in 2020. He has 23 tackles through five games with the Bengals, including six in Week 2 at Kansas City. **Jordan Battle** is in his second pro season, after starting seven straight games at safety to close out his rookie year in 2023. He ranked fifth on the team in tackles last season with 69, while also contributing an INT, five PDs and two sacks. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, he was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Battle had a pick-six in the preseason finale against Indianapolis, and has played 85 special teams snaps through five regular-season contests. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** has a team-leading three special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, he led the team with eight special teams tackles last season despite missing the final 10 games. Anderson missed his entire rookie season due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Daijahn Anthony** made the Bengals' 53-man roster coming out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 10 defensive snaps and 82 special teams snaps through the first five games of this season. In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

Special teams: Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** has quickly become one of the top kickers in the NFL and a fan-favorite in Cincinnati. He ranks third on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (83.7 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history and the third-most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. McPherson's 28-yard FG midway through the second quarter in Week 3 vs. Washington marked his 100th career FG attempt, and his 84 made FGs to that point were the third-most in team history through a kicker's first 100 tries. McPherson inked a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 327 attempts in 40 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through five games leads the NFL in gross punting average (55.6 yards per punt; minimum 10 attempts) and net average (49.2). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (min. four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. His 52.0 net yards per punt also was the second-highest average in a game in team history. He had another strong showing in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, punting five times for 253 yards (50.6 gross average), with four downed inside the Ravens' 20-yard line which marked the most by a Bengals rookie punter since Kevin Huber in 2009. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned the primary punt returner job early in his rookie season, and took command of that role in just his second game when he returned a punt 81 yards for a TD against the Baltimore Ravens. The play marked the Bengals' first TD on a PR since 2012, and was the 10th punt return TD by a rookie in team history (first since 2000). Jones has returned seven punts this season for 47 yards, including a season-long 13-yard run back in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. Fifth-year WR **Trenton Irwin** had 10 of his 13 career punt returns last season. He averaged 9.8 yards per return in 2023, with two returns for over 20 yards in Week 5 at Arizona. Returning kickoffs this season are second-year HB **Chase Brown** and sixth-year vet HB **Trayveon Williams**. Brown is averaging 26.6 yards per return on seven attempts this season, with a long of 29 yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Williams served as the team's primary KOR over the past two-plus seasons and holds a career regular-season average of 22.5 yards on 33 returns.

Trailing 14-10 at halftime at MetLife Stadium, the Bengals came out strong to start the third quarter. Rookie WR Alex Erickson took the opening kickoff 84 yards to the New York 13-yard line, setting up a nine-yard TD from by HB Jeremy Hill for a 17-14 lead. The Bengals defense then forced a Giants three-and-out, and back came the Bengals offense again. QB Andy Dalton led the team 41 yards in six plays to the Giants' 20, and on play seven, it seemed for an instant that rookie WR Tyler Boyd had made an excellent mid-air catch on third down for another TD. But Boyd could not control the ball through his collision with the turf, and an incompletion was ruled. Cincinnati had to settle for a FG, keeping the game a one-score affair at 20-14, and the Giants scored what proved to be the winning TD early in the fourth quarter, converting a fourth-and-goal gamble from the Cincinnati three on a pass from QB Eli Manning to rookie WR Sterling Shepard. The Bengals fell to 3-5-1, while the Giants improved to 7-3.

QB Brandon Allen started the Bengals' first game after losing standout rookie QB Joe Burrow to a season-ending knee injury. Allen had spent the previous 11 weeks on Cincinnati's practice squad and, due to COVID-19, had been largely isolated from the rest of the team while serving as the team's emergency QB. On Cincinnati's first possession, S Brandon Wilson returned the kickoff 103 yards for a TD, good for the longest play of any kind in team history. Cincinnati's offense, though, struggled for much of the game, as six of its 10 possessions (not including a kneel-down at the end of the first half) ended in three or fewer plays. But the Bengals' defense kept things close and gave Cincinnati a chance to win late. Allen cut New York's lead to two points with a TD pass to rookie WR Tee Higgins with 2:33 left, then Cincinnati's defense forced a Giants three-and-out and a punt. But on Cincinnati's first play, with the ball at the 50-yard line and 57 seconds left, Giants DL Jabaal Sheard sacked Allen and forced a fumble, which the Giants recovered to seal a win.

2024 GAME SUMMARIES

WEEK 1, GAME 1

New England Patriots 16, Cincinnati Bengals 10 Sunday, Sept. 8, 2024 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

The Bengals' defense had three takeaways, including a pair of INTs, and allowed just 137 net passing yards. Offensively, Cincinnati scored points on five of its first six true possessions. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 23 of 36 passes for 258 yards and a 103.7 passer rating, as well as two TD passes to WR Andrei Iosivas. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Kansas City improved to 2-0.

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. Commanders rookie QB Jayden Daniels completed 91.3 percent of his passes (21 of 23), which set both an NFL rookie record and a Bengals opponent record for a single game (minimum 20 attempts). Bengals QB Joe Burrow finished with 324 passing yards and three TDs, including his 100th career TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase on the game's opening drive. Cincinnati fell to 0-3, while Washington improved to 2-1.
