### GAME NOTES

**Kickoff:** 3 p.m. Eastern.

**Television:** The game will air nationally on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and on WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are play-by-play announcer Jim Nantz and analyst Tony Romo, with sideline reporters Tracy Wolfson, Evan Washburn and Jay Feely.

**Radio:** The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (ESPN 1530; all sports) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

The game also will air nationally on Westwood One Radio. Broadcasters are Ian Eagle (play-by-play), Tony Boselli (analyst) and Ross Tucker (sideline reporter).

**Setting the scene:** The Bengals on Sunday travel to Arrowhead Stadium to take on the two-time defending AFC-champion Kansas City Chiefs, in what will be Cincinnati's third-ever appearance in an AFC Championship Game. Cincinnati won both of its previous AFC Championship appearances — vs. San Diego in the 1981 season, and vs. Buffalo in the 1988 season.

The Bengals earned their spot in the NFL's final four in thrilling fashion on Saturday, when rookie K Evan McPherson nailed a 52-yard FG as time expired in the Divisional Playoff to give Cincinnati a 19-16 win over top-seeded Tennessee.

"It feels great," said Bengals head coach Zac Taylor. "This is the expectation for these guys — it's not too big for them.

"I know we haven't been here before, but it sure feels like we have. You see the attitude of the team and the confidence that they have, that we're going to find a way to win. You just can't replace the confidence that these guys have earned in themselves."

The contest began in what turned out to be fitting fashion — with a key defensive play that swung the game's momentum. On the very first play from scrimmage, Titans QB Ryan Tannehill faked a handoff to star RB Derrick Henry, who was playing for the first time since Halloween (foot injury), and then fired a pass over the middle that was intercepted by Bengals S Jessie Bates.

"They were in a 'pass-alert' formation that we talked about all week," Bates said. "Honestly, Tannehill just stared it down, and I knew exactly what was going on. We talked about coming out fast with a sense of urgency, and it couldn't have worked out any better."

The Bengals took over possession at the Titans' 42-yard line, however the offense managed just a FG. Cincinnati went on to add two more FGs in a first half dominated by defense, and took a 9-6 lead into the locker room.

The Bengals received the opening kickoff of the second half and quickly jumped ahead 16-6, thanks to a nine-play, 65-yard drive that HB Joe Mixon capped with a 16-yard TD run. The Bengals have now come away with points on their first offensive drive of the second half in 14 of 19 games this season (six TDs, eight FGs). During the regular season, Cincinnati's 56 combined points on the first possession of the second half were second-most in the NFL (see "... And come out firing after the break" on page 6).

"We called 'stretch right,' and all of a sudden the linebackers and safety were flowing hard over the top," Mixon said. "I put my toe in the ground, then I put my toe in the ground again, and I just (saw) the backside was like open like the Red Sea. I was fortunate enough to find daylight, and everything worked out. I

thought that was a big difference in the game."

On the ensuing possession, Tennessee turned to its fifth-ranked rushing attack and marched 66 yards on just four runs to reach Cincinnati's nine-yard line. But on the fifth play of the drive, Bengals nickel CB Mike Hilton batted a screen pass from Tannehill into the air and came down with an INT.

"We had a lot of jokes about Mike getting caught after that pick," Bates said with a laugh. Hilton returned the INT 19 yards before being caught by Tannehill.

"We were trying to line up the order of who had the worst returns this year, and I think Mike's pretty much at the top of that list right now (laughs). But he made a hell of a play. You jump in the air and you track the ball — I think he was almost maxed out at that point, so we can't complain too much about that."

After a Bengals punt, the Titans again marched downfield but mustered only a 34-yard FG that cut the margin to seven points. On the ensuing possession, a pass from QB Joe Burrow bounced off the hands of HB Samaje Perine and into the grasp of Titans S Amani Hooker. The INT was Burrow's first since Week 13 against the L.A. Chargers, and broke a string of 209 consecutive passes (regular season plus playoffs) without a pick — the second-longest such streak in team history (see "Bengals kick the turnovers" on page 6).

Tennessee took over possession on Cincinnati's 27-yard line, and two plays later Tannehill found WR A.J. Brown for a 33-yard TD that knotted the game at 16. Entering the game, Cincinnati had allowed just one third-quarter TD in its previous nine contests (see "D tightens after the break" on page 6). It was also just the fourth TD allowed by Cincinnati's defense in the 19 combined possessions (regular season plus playoffs) immediately following a Bengals turnover (see "'Fire department' tough after turnovers" on page 10).

After scoring a combined 17 points in the third quarter, neither team's offense found much traction in the final period. Cincinnati's first two possessions in the fourth quarter both were thwarted by third-down sacks of Burrow. The Titans ended the day with nine total sacks of Burrow, the most takedowns of a winning QB in NFL postseason history.

"He's the toughest guy in the league," DT D.J. Reader said of Burrow. "He's a super tough guy, and he's gritty. I love that about him. He doesn't complain, he just goes out there and does his job. I really appreciate Joe."

But the Bengals' defense put together an impressive showing of its own. Henry was held to just 3.1 yards per carry on 20 attempts, and most notably was stopped for a two-yard loss by LB Logan Wilson on a fourth-and-one play midway through the fourth quarter. But while Bates, Hilton and Wilson made the highlight plays of the day, there was little question among players and coaches about the defense's key component.

"D.J. Reader was unbelievable," Taylor said on Sunday. "He was Superman, quite frankly.

"You see him make some plays during the game, but then you really dial in and watch the tape, and you can further understand the impact he had on the game. Overall, you can point out every single player on defense making some key plays in that game. But if you're going to single out one guy for their performance, D.J. Reader is certainly deserving of that."

With the score knotted at 16, Tennessee took over possession just before the two-minute warning and looked to move into range for a potential game-winning FG. But Reader yet again stopped Henry for no gain, and then Tannehill threw a five-yard completion as the Titans seemed content to drain nearly all of the remaining clock. On the next play — a third-and-five with 28 seconds remaining — Bengals CB Eli Apple tipped a pass into the air, and a leaping Wilson came down with one of the most significant INTs in team history.

"That was a great play by Eli to break up the pass," Wilson said. "Good

things happen when you run to the ball.

"I knew there wasn't much time left, and I knew we had the ball near the 50-yard line. My initial reaction when I got it was to make sure I came down with the ball and just give our offense an opportunity to move it."

The Bengals' offense took over at their own 47-yard line with 20 seconds remaining. On the very first play, Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase connected on a 19-yard completion that got Cincinnati into FG range. McPherson's "walk-off" FG came three plays later, and Cincinnati was on it's way back to the AFC Championship.

"It's a kicker's dream to have the game on your shoulders," McPherson said after the game. "I told Kevin (Bengals P Kevin Huber) right before the kick, 'Alright, we did this in practice, let's do it one more time.' That's kind of what was going through my mind. And all I knew was to just hit it clean, and it was going to get there."

The official temperature at kickoff in Nashville was listed as 34 degrees, but by the time the Alabama native and former Florida Gator put foot to ball at the end of regulation, daylight had vanished, the wind had picked up and the temperature had dropped below freezing. The kick also made McPherson the first rookie in NFL postseason history to make a game-winning FG with no time remaining in regulation or OT.

"That guy is unbelievable," Burrow said of McPherson. "He was talking to Brandon (Bengals QB Brandon Allen) as he was going out to kick, and he gave a little warmup swing and said, 'Ah, it looks like we're going to the AFC Championship.' Right before he went out there and kicked it (laughs)."

This week's AFC Championship features a battle between two of the NFL's top young players in Burrow and Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes. This will be Mahomes' fourth consecutive AFC Championship game (all at home), while Burrow last week became the first QB picked No. 1 overall to reach a conference title game within his first two seasons.

The game is also a rematch of a dramatic Jan. 2 meeting between the two teams, which ended in a 34-31 Bengals win at Paul Brown Stadium. That contest was also decided by a McPherson walk-off FG (see "Make that four walk-offs" on page 13), and it clinched the AFC North division title for Cincinnati. But among Bengals fans, it is perhaps best remembered for Chase's 266 receiving yards, which set both a Bengals single-game record and the NFL's single-game rookie record (see "Uno shattered records vs. Chiefs" on page 8).

"I'm tired of the underdog narrative," Burrow said after the Titans game. "We're a really, really good team. We're here to make noise, and teams are going to have to pay attention to us. We're a really good team with really good players and coaches, and we're coming for it all."

The AFC West champion Chiefs finished the regular season 12-5, and earned the No. 2 seed in the AFC playoffs. They opened postseason play with a 42-21 home win over Pittsburgh in the Wild Card Playoff. Then, in Sunday night's Divisional Playoff against Buffalo, they scored a walk-off TD in overtime to win 42-36 at Arrowhead.

**The series:** The Bengals lead the regular-season series 16-14 overall and have won five of the last six meetings, including the most recent contest just four weeks ago, 34-31 at Cincinnati. The Chiefs, however, lead 9-7 as the home team.

This weekend's game will mark the first-ever postseason meeting between the two teams.

The Bengals' first game of any kind was against the Chiefs, in Cincinnati's inaugural preseason contest, played Aug. 3, 1968 at Nippert Stadium on the University of Cincinnati campus. The Chiefs won, 38-14.

The Bengals began regular-season play in 1968 as co-members with Kansas City in the American Football League's Western Division, and the teams played each other twice in both 1968 and '69.

**Regular-season records vs. Chiefs:** S David Fulcher had three interceptions in a 21-17 win at Kansas City on Oct. 1, 1989, tying a Bengals record that now has been achieved eight times.

Chiefs K Cairo Santos kicked seven field goals at Paul Brown Stadium on Oct. 4, 2015, setting a record for most field goals by a kicker in a game against the Bengals. He connected on all seven of his attempts and accounted for all 21 of Kansas City's points in the 36-21 Cincinnati win.

**Bengals-Chiefs connections:** Chiefs TE Travis Kelce played at the University of Cincinnati ... Chiefs OL Joe Thuney is from Centerville, Ohio (Archbishop Alter High School) ... Chiefs offensive coordinator Eric Bieniemy played for the Bengals from 1995-98 ... Bengals head coach Zac Taylor played QB at Butler County (Kan.) Community College in 2004 ... Bengals G Hakeem Adeniji and WR Pooka Williams (practice squad) both played at the University of Kansas ... **Uniform watch:** The Bengals are scheduled to wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks this week at Kansas City. The team over the offseason unveiled new uniforms, marking Cincinnati's first significant uniform redesign since 2004.

There are three different color options for the new jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants also feature three different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, and white with black stripes. And there are three options for sock color — black, white and orange. The team's iconic striped helmet was unchanged.

\* — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate jerseys and/or color rush (CR) uniforms and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. As in years past, orange will serve as the Bengals' designated alternate jersey. The Bengals no longer has a CR uniform, and the team does not have a throwback uniform.

**Bengals career records roundup:** Here's a look at the movement from the 2021 season in Cincinnati's career record book (regular-season):

- P Kevin Huber has played in 207 career Bengals games, tied with CB Ken Riley for the most in Bengals history. Huber in 2021 passed both QB Ken Anderson (192) and LB Reggie Williams (206).
- LS Clark Harris has played in 201 career Bengals games, five shy of Williams (206) for third place all-time. Riley and Huber (207) are tied for the all-time lead. Harris in 2021 passed OT Anthony Munoz (185), DT Tim Krumrie (188) and QB Ken Anderson (192).
- HB Joe Mixon has 4564 career rushing yards, which is 857 shy of RB Pete Johnson for fourth place all-time. Mixon in 2021 passed Cedric Benson (4176).

**Bengals single-season records set in 2021:** Here's a look at the single-season Bengals records that were set during the 2021 regular season. Full detail on team individual records entering the 2021 season can be found on page 160 of the '21 Bengals Media Guide.

WR Ja'Marr Chase played in 17 games; QB Joe Burrow and K Evan McPherson played in 16 games.

- Chase had 1455 receiving yards, which counts as a new Bengals record. The previous record was 1440, by Chad Johnson in 2007.
- Burrow had a 108.3 passer rating, which counts as a new Bengals record. The previous record was 106.3, by Andy Dalton in 2015.
- Burrow passed for 4611 yards, which counts as a new Bengals record. The previous record was 4293, by Dalton in 2013.
- Burrow had 34 passing TDs, which counts as a new Bengals record. The previous record was 33, by Dalton in 2013.
- Burrow had six 300-yard passing games, which counts as a new Bengals record. The previous record was five, held by Burrow (2020), Dalton (13) and Carson Palmer ('07).
- McPherson kicked a 58-yard FG (Dec. 19 at Denver), a new Bengals record. The previous record was 57 yards, by Randy Bullock in 2019.

**Other record-book movement:** Here's a look at other movement during the 2021 regular season in the Bengals' single-season record book. Full details on team individual records entering the 2021 season can be found on page 160 of the '21 Bengals Media Guide.

QB Joe Burrow, HB Joe Mixon, K Evan McPherson and DE Trey Hendrickson all played in 16 games; WR Ja'Marr Chase and P Kevin Huber played in 17 games.

- Burrow had 366 completions, second-most in team history. The record is 373, by Carson Palmer in 2007.
- Burrow had a 70.38 completion percentage, second-best in team history. The record is 70.55, by Ken Anderson in 1982.
- Burrow averaged 8.87 yards per attempt, third-best in team history. The record is 9.41, by Greg Cook in 1969.
- Chase had 13 receiving TDs, tied with TE Tyler Eifert for second-most in team history. The record is 17, by Carl Pickens in 1995.
- Chase had five 100-yard receiving games, tied with many players for second-most in team history. The record is six, by A.J. Green in 2013.
- Mixon had 16 total TDs, tied with RB Pete Johnson for second-most in team history. The record is 17, by Pickens in 1995.
- Mixon had 13 rushing TDs, fourth-most in team history. The record is 15, by Ickey Woods in 1988.
- Mixon scored a TD in nine straight games, tied with Green for the second-longest streak in team history. The record is 10, by Carl Pickens in 1995.
- McPherson scored 130 points, tied for third-most in team history. The record is 132, by Mike Nugent in 2011.
- McPherson made 28 FGs, tied for fourth-most in team history. The record is 33, by Nugent in 2011.
- Huber averaged 46.42 gross yards per punt, the fourth-best mark in team history. The record is 47.18, set by Huber in 2020.
- Huber averaged 41.05 net yards per punt, the fifth-best mark in team history. The record is 42.82, set by Huber in 2020.
- Hendrickson had 14 sacks, second-most in team history. Sacks became an official statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked that stat back to 1976, therefore the team recognizes DE Coy Bacon's 22 sacks in '76 as the team record. Hendrickson, though, has the most sacks by a Bengal since 1982, and thus the NFL notes him as the record-holder for their information.

**And a few more miscellaneous records:** A few other Bengals "records" were broken this year that are not officially kept in the team's media guide. Here's the run-down.

QB Joe Burrow, HB Joe Mixon and K Evan McPherson each played in 16 games; WR Ja'Marr Chase played in 17 games.

- Burrow had 15 TD passes of at least 30 yards, the most-ever by a Bengal. The previous high was nine, by Ken Anderson (1973), Boomer Esiason ('89) and Carson Palmer ('06).
- Mixon scored a rushing TD in six straight games (Games 7-12), tied with HB Rudi Johnson (2006) and RB Stan Fritts (1975) for the longest such streak in team history.
- Mixon scored multiple TDs in four straight games (Games 8-11) the longest such streak in team history. The previous longest streak was three games, by Pete Johnson in 1981 and Rudi Johnson in 2005.
- Chase had 13 receiving TDs, the most-ever by a Bengals rookie. The

previous high was nine, by WR Isaac Curtis in 1973.

- Chase had 81 receptions, the most-ever by a Bengals rookie. The previous high was 67, by Cris Collinsworth in 1981 and Tee Higgins in 2020.
- Chase had 1455 receiving yards, the most-ever by a Bengals rookie. The previous high was 1057, by A.J. Green in 2011.
- Chase had five 100-yard receiving games, the most-ever by a Bengals rookie. The previous high was four, by Green in 2011.
- McPherson made nine FGs of 50 or more yards, the most in team history. The previous high was four, by Horst Muhlmann in 1970.
- The Bengals combined for 10 100-yard receiving games, the most in team history. The previous high was nine, in 2006. Chase had five 100-yard games, while Higgins had four and Boyd had one.

**Career postseason record watch:** Here's a look at possible upcoming movement in the Bengals' career postseason record book. Full detail on team postseason records entering the 2021 season can be found on page 296 of the Bengals' 2021 Media Guide.

- K Evan McPherson has scored 27 points, 25 behind Jim Breech (52) for first place in Bengals postseason history.
- McPherson has made eight FGs, one shy of Breech (nine) for the most in Bengals postseason history.
- McPherson has made three PATs, one shy of Dave Green, Shayne Graham and Mike Nugent (each with four) for second place in Bengals postseason history. Breech is the all-time leader (25).
- HB Joe Mixon has 31 rushing attempts, three shy of Charles Alexander (34) for fourth place in Bengals history. Ickey Woods (89) is the all-time leader.
- QB Joe Burrow has 71 pass attempts, 28 shy of Boomer Esiason (99) for third place in Bengals postseason history. Ken Anderson (166) is the all-time leader.
- Burrow has 52 completions, 36 behind Andy Dalton (88) for second place in Bengals postseason history. Ken Anderson (110) is the all-time leader.
- Burrow has 592 passing yards, eight shy of Boomer Esiason (600) for third place in Bengals postseason history. Anderson (1321) is the all-time leader.

- Burrow has two TD passes, two shy of QB Boomer Esiason (four) for second place in Bengals postseason history. Anderson (nine) is the all-time leader.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 14 receptions, one shy of WR Marvin Jones (14) for fifth place in Bengals postseason history. TE Dan Ross (28) is the all-time leader.
- Chase has 225 receiving yards, 108 shy of Ross (333) for second place in Bengals postseason history. WR Cris Collinsworth (354) is the all-time leader.
- WR Trent Taylor has 26 punt return yards, 16 shy of CB Mitchell Price (42) for fourth place in Bengals postseason history. WR Brandon Tate (67) is the all-time leader.
- HB Chris Evans has eight kickoff returns, tied with RB Stanford Jennings for third-most in Bengals postseason history and one shy of Adam Jones (nine) for second place. WR David Verser (17) is the all-time leader.
- Evans has 185 kickoff return yards, eight shy of Tate (193) for fourth-most in Bengals postseason history. Verser (302) is the all-time leader.

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Zac Taylor** was named the 10th head coach in Cincinnati Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019.

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor headed off a wave of early season injuries to lead Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both offense and defense. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while their per-attempt average jumped 1.26 yards (3.17 to 4.43) and they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). The team's top four WRs — Tyler Boyd, Alex Erickson, Auden Tate and John Ross III — all posted career-highs in both receptions and receiving yards. Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game. The team finished 2-14 that season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition QB Joe Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the draft, to the pro level despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Taylor helped Burrow to one of the most productive starts to a career by a QB in NFL history, before a knee injury ended the rookie's season after 10 games. Still, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games, while his 404 pass attempts were second and his 2688 passing yards were fifth. Defensively, Taylor oversaw the onboarding of seven new starters, and helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to just a 62.8 completion percentage (sixth-lowest in the NFL).

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped guide Rams QB Jared Goff to career highs in every major passing category. Goff ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards and eighth in passer rating. The Rams' QB play was a key component to their offense, which finished the regular season ranked second in the NFL in total net yards (421.1 per game), fifth in net passing yards (281.7), second in scoring (32.9), first in first downs (401) and fifth in third-down percentage (45.0). Los Angeles won the NFC West with a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII against the New England Patriots.

In 2017, Taylor helped oversee an emerging Rams passing offense that ranked 10th in the NFL in passing yards per game (239.4). Taylor directed a young Rams receiving corps headed by rookie Cooper Kupp, who finished the season with 62 catches, a team-high 869 receiving yards and five TDs.

Prior to his time with the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint in the college

ranks, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. Taylor served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller, after the team made coaching staff changes.

During his time in Miami, Taylor was instrumental in the development of QB Ryan Tannehill, the team's first-round draft pick in 2012.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and tight ends coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies shared the Big 12 South Championship in 2010 and played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03), before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. Taylor had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for a combined 5850 yards and 45 touchdowns. In his senior season of 2006, Taylor was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but he was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and is currently senior offensive assistant for the Indianapolis Colts.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

**Andy Reid** was named the 13th head coach in Kansas City Chiefs history on Jan. 7, 2013. He is entering his 30th season in the National Football League and his 23rd season as an NFL head coach in 2021.

In 2020, his eighth season with the Chiefs, Reid and company tallied a franchise best 14 wins, bringing his total to 91 victories in his first eight seasons with Kansas City, the most by any head coach in franchise history in that time frame. After that record-setting regular season in 2020, the Chiefs made their third-consecutive appearance in the AFC Championship Game and their second-consecutive berth in the Super Bowl.

In 2019, Reid led the Chiefs to their first Super Bowl appearance and victory in 50 years, bringing the Lombardi Trophy back to Kansas City for the first time since 1969. Additionally, the Chiefs' 35-24 victory over the Tennessee Titans in the AFC Championship Game brought the Lamar Hunt Trophy to Kansas City for the first time since then.

In 2015, Reid also led the Chiefs to their first playoff win since 1993, with a win at Houston in the Wild Card round of the playoffs. In his first season in Kansas City in 2013, he helped orchestrate the franchise's best single-season turnaround as the Chiefs won 11 games and made the playoffs after going 2-14 the previous season.

Prior to joining the Chiefs, Reid served as the head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles for 14 years (1999-2012), earning NFL Coach of the Year honors three times. Reid compiled the best win total (140) and playoff victory total (10) in

Eagles history. He captured six division titles and five trips to the NFC Championship Game.

In his 29-year NFL career as a head coach or assistant, Reid's teams have made the playoffs 20 times (24-19 record). He has coached in the Super Bowl four times, the NFC Championship Game nine times and the AFC Championship Game on three occasions. Reid was an assistant coach with Green Bay (1992-98) under Mike Holmgren. With Green Bay, he helped the Packers earn a Super Bowl XXXI victory over New England.

Reid coached at Brigham Young (1982), San Francisco State (1983-85), Northern Arizona (1986), Texas-El Paso (1987-88) and Missouri (1989-1991). Reid played offensive tackle and guard on three Brigham Young University holiday bowl teams. He graduated with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He also received a master's degree in professional leadership in physical education and athletics.

Reid was born on March 19, 1958 in Los Angeles, Calif.. He and his wife Tammy have five children — Britt, Crosby, Drew Ann, Spencer, and the late Garrett — and 11 grandchildren.

**Three Bengals make Pro Bowl:** WR Ja'Marr Chase, DE Trey Hendrickson and HB Joe Mixon all were voted to the AFC team for this season's

Pro Bowl game. It was the first Pro Bowl nod for all three.

Chase, a rookie out of Louisiana State University, was the lone Bengal voted as a starter. During regular season, he led the team in receptions (81), receiving yards (1455) and receiving TDs (13). All three of those totals are Bengals rookie records. His receiving yardage total is a Bengals single-season record, and the most by any NFL rookie in the Super Bowl era (began in 1966 season).

Chase opened his postseason career with back-to-back 100-yard receiving games, and became the first rookie in league history with multiple 100-yard receiving games in the playoffs.

Chase is the sixth Bengals rookie ever to be voted to the Pro Bowl at any position. The others were QB Andy Dalton (2011), WR A.J. Green ('11), WR Cris Collinsworth (1981), WR Isaac Curtis ('73) and CB Lemar Parrish ('70). Additionally, four Bengals rookies were in the American Football League All-Star Game — LB Bill Bergey in 1969, and C Bob Johnson, RB Paul Robinson and TE Bob Trumpy in '68.

Hendrickson, a fifth-year pro out of Florida Atlantic University, is in his first Bengals season after joining the team in March as an unrestricted free agent. He led the team and ranked fifth leaguewide with 14 sacks, second-most in team history. Hendrickson recorded at least a half-sack in 11 straight games this season (Games 5-15) — the longest streak in the NFL in 2021, the longest streak in team history, and tied for the second-longest streak in NFL history (one shy of the league record).

Mixon, a fifth-year player out of the University of Oklahoma, originally was a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2017. He finished the season ranked third in the NFL in rushing yards (1205), third in rushing attempts (292) and fourth in rushing TDs (13). He also finished the regular season with 16 TDs, tied for second-most in team history, and 13 rushing TDs, fourth in team history (see "Mixon falls shy of Pick and Ickey" on page 9).

Additionally, five Bengals were voted as alternates for the AFC squad. QB Joe Burrow and LS Clark Harris are both second alternates, DE Sam Hubbard and DT Larry Ogunjobi are fourth alternates, and CB Mike Hilton is a fifth alternate. Alternates are added to the game if voted player(s) in their position group are unable to participate. Selections from the two teams reaching the Super Bowl will be among those unable to play, as will players who are not cleared due to injury.

**Taylor's special delivery:** After the Bengals' 26-19 win over the Raiders in the Wild Card Playoff on Jan. 17, Bengals head coach Zac Taylor told his team in the locker room that he was giving out two game balls.

The first went to Bengals president Mike Brown.

"Personally, if I coached in any other organization in football, I probably wouldn't be here right now in my third year," Taylor said. "That's the truth. But (Brown) just has the experience and understanding. There's no other owner that sits at every walk through, at every practice in the freezing cold, the rain, the snow. This means the world to him. And because he's around, and because (Bengals ownership) cares so much, they get a chance to hear your vision firsthand on a daily basis. So we're all on the same page, and there's no

miscommunication. They can see where we need to go, and that we're going to get there. They just believe in these players and coaches."

The second went to the City of Cincinnati. Different members of the organization dropped off game balls at bars and restaurants around the city after the game in what Taylor said would be a new tradition after playoff wins. The game balls for the Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas went to local establishments — Pontiac, Walt's Hitching Post and Mount Lookout Tavern. Taylor and P Kevin Huber — a Cincinnati native — made the delivery to MLT, and video surfaced of the two presenting the ball to a packed crowd.

"This is the first of many playoff games we win here," he said. "We're starting a new tradition where we give the game ball to fans. You pass it around, you take selfies with it, and by the end of the night the ball stays here at MLT."

Earlier, in his postgame news conference, Taylor expanded on why the organization is starting the new tradition.

"Some people had their greatest moments tonight," he said. "So we want them to get a chance to enjoy these game balls with us. I told this to the players — some of them may not understand the significance of this win that happened today, but I know a lot of you (media) in the room who are homegrown Cincinnati certainly do. I think the city can finally exhale and just enjoy this team for what it is and take that pressure off those last 31 years."

On Jan. 22, shortly after returning to town following their Divisional Playoff win at Tennessee, Huber and TE C.J. Uzomah dropped off a game ball at the Holy Grail Tavern downtown.

**Bengals kick the turnovers:** Midway through the season, one of the primary knocks on the Bengals was the team's propensity to turn the ball over. Much of that criticism was focused on QB Joe Burrow, who through 13 weeks had thrown the most INTs (14) in the NFL.

Since then, Burrow and the offense have turned the tide on their turnover problem. Burrow's INT in the Divisional Playoff win over Tennessee — a pass that went off the hands of the intended receiver before being picked — was his first since Week 13 against the Chargers. His INT in the divisional round broke a string of 209 consecutive pass attempts without a pick, the second-longest such streak in team history (counting playoffs) and second-longest in the NFL at the time behind Packers QB Aaron Rodgers (243). Burrow went five consecutive starts (counting playoffs) without an INT, tied for the third-longest such streak in team history (minimum 15 attempts per game). Ken Anderson also went five straight in 1973, while Andy Dalton went six straight in 2017 and Neil O'Donnell went seven straight in 1998.

The Bengals' offense has not lost a fumble since the aforementioned Week 13 matchup against the Chargers, and Cincinnati's only two turnovers since — both Dec. 12 vs. San Francisco — were muffed punts. Cincinnati is plus-six in turnover margin over its last six games (including playoffs).

**Bengals go 'worst to first':** Cincinnati's 2021 AFC North division title is the fifth instance in Bengals history that the team won a division title after finishing last in their division the previous season. The 2021 team now joins the 1970, '81, '88 and '90 Bengals as division champions who finished last in their division the season before.

Cincinnati finished 4-11-1 in 2020, and was fourth in the AFC North behind Cleveland (11-5), Baltimore (11-5) and division-champion Pittsburgh (12-4).

**Bengals great in "middle eight":** Much has been made in recent years about the importance of the "middle eight," a stretch of a game that spans the last four minutes of the first half and first four minutes of the second half. Among the people who have touted the importance of the "middle eight" have been former NFL GM Michael Lombardi and current Buccaneers QB Tom Brady.

"The 'middle eight' minutes of the game are so important to the overall outcome," Brady said in 2021 on ESPN's Monday Night Football broadcast with Peyton and Eli Manning. "Who wins the end of the first half and then the start of the third quarter? A lot of times when you defer and you get the ball on offense (to start the second half), you can create a 14-point swing without them ever

touching the ball if you score before the half and then you score coming out in the third quarter. You definitely don't want to give the ball back to your opponents (at the end of the half). We always call it "the last shot" in basketball — you don't want to throw up a three-pointer with 18 seconds left on the shot clock."

So how did the Bengals stack up during the "middle eight" during the 2021 regular season? Their plus-56 point differential during that time period tied for the best in the NFL, and equated to an 8.0-point per game edge. During the playoffs, the Bengals are plus-three — they have scored 10 points and and given up seven.

Here's a look at the teams during the 2021 regular season with the largest point differential in the time period spanning the last four minutes of the first half and first four minutes of the second half.

**Bengals carry "Mo" into halftime ... :** The Bengals scored a combined 63 points in the last two minutes of the first half during the 2021 regular season. That total was fourth among all NFL teams. When divided out among Cincinnati's 17 regular-season games, that's an average of 3.7 points per game in the last two minutes.

When taking the playoffs into account, the Bengals have scored points (seven TDs, eight FGs) in the last two minutes of the first half in 14 of their 19 games.

**... And come out firing after the break:** Not only were the Bengals one of the NFL's top teams at scoring before halftime during the regular season, they were also among the leaders in points scored (56) on the first possession of the second half. And that trend has continued during the playoffs. The Bengals have come away with points on their first offensive possession of the second half in 14 of their 19 games (six TDs, eight FGs) this season, including both of the team's playoff wins (FG in Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, TD in Divisional Playoff at Tennessee).

It should be noted that the Bengals received the opening kickoff of the second half in 12 of their 19 games this year (including playoffs), thanks in part to a streak of luck that saw them win the opening coin toss in each of their first six games (see "Coin-toss roller coaster" on page 15). The Bengals deferred to the second half in each of those six games.

**D tightens after the break:** Cincinnati during the regular season allowed just 40 third-quarter points, second-fewest in the NFL behind Buffalo. The Bengals outscored their competition 102-40 in the third quarter during the regular season, good for a plus-62 point differential that was third-best leaguewide behind only Buffalo (plus-70) and Green Bay (plus-63).

Cincinnati's third-quarter defense has only gotten better as the season has gone along. The Bengals have allowed just 10 combined third-quarter points over their last five games (including playoffs), and all 10 of those came in the divisional playoff win at Tennessee. Since their Week 10 bye — a 10-game stretch (including playoffs) — the Bengals have allowed just 20 combined points, including just two TDs, in the third quarter. Cincinnati has held its opponents scoreless in the third quarter in 11 of its 19 games this season.

**Flipping the script on the road:** The Bengals during the regular season won five road games, which counted as their most wins away from home since 2015 (six). They fell one regular-season road win shy of tying the single-season team record of six, accomplished in 1981, 2005, '12, and '15.

Dating back to 2020, Cincinnati has won seven of its last 10 road games (including playoffs).

It wasn't long ago, though, that the shoe was on the other foot. The Bengals lost 13 straight road games between 2018 and early '20, and that bleeding was stopped only by a tie at Philadelphia. Head coach Zac Taylor did not pick up his first road win until his 16th game away from Paul Brown Stadium (includes a 2019 neutral site loss to the Rams in London), a fact the third-year Bengals head coach has not forgotten.

"We've really matured," Taylor told the media after his team's 31-13 win at Las Vegas on Nov. 21. "We lost 15 games in a row on the road at one point — I don't know if you all remember that, but I do (laughs).

"This team has really turned their mentality. When we get on a plane, get on a bus and go to a hotel, we come out there really focused. They've handled it really well. I have no concerns taking this team on the road and wondering how they're going to handle it. I'm proud of them."

**Bengals' O boasts young nucleus:** During the 2021 regular season, the Bengals became the first team in NFL history with a 4000-yard passer, 1000-yard rusher and two 1000-yard receivers who were all under 26 years old. QB Joe Burrow (25 years old) had 4611 passing yards, HB Joe Mixon (25) had 1205 rushing yards, and Ja'Marr Chase (21) and Tee Higgins (22) had 1455 and 1091 receiving yards, respectively.

The 2006 Bengals are the only other squad in team history with a 4000-yard passer (Carson Palmer), 1000-yard rusher (Rudi Johnson), and two 1000-yard receivers (Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh).

**Recapping Burrow's NFL journey:** Bengals QB Joe Burrow returned healthy to begin 2021, after his rookie campaign the previous year ended due to a left knee injury suffered early in the third quarter of Cincinnati's game at Washington (Nov. 22, 2020). Burrow had surgery on Dec. 2, 2020, then embarked on a long rehab process and was medically cleared in time to take the first snap of training camp on July 28, 2020. He participated fully in every practice of training camp (save for one scheduled rest day) but took just three snaps in preseason — all came in the finale vs. Miami.

Shortly after his injury in 2020, Burrow had vowed publicly that he would start Cincinnati's '21 season opener. On Sept. 12 vs. Minnesota, less than 10 months after his injury, he not only made good on that promise, he posted then-career highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.67) in a dramatic Bengals OT win.

Burrow in 2021 completed 366 of 520 passes (70.4 percent) for 4611 yards, 34 TDs and 14 INTs (108.3 rating). His passing yardage, TD pass total and passer rating were all single-season team records. And although the NFL season expanded to 17 games in 2021, Burrow sat out the regular-season finale (rest/knee) and thus played in only 16 games.

In the playoffs, Burrow has completed 52 of 71 passes (73.2 percent) for 592 yards, with two TDs and one INT (101.4 rating). He is the first No. 1 overall draft pick in NFL history to lead his team to a conference championship game in either of their first two seasons.

**Burrow masters the deep ball:** An NFL-best 15 of QB Joe Burrow's team-record 34 TD passes during the 2021 regular season came from 30 yards or longer. The next-closest players in that category this season were Buccaneers QB Tom Brady (eight), Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes (seven) and Seahawks QB Russell Wilson (seven). The NFL record is 19, by Giants QB Fran Tarkenton in 1967.

Burrow's 15 TDs of 30-plus also count as the most in Bengals history. The previous team record was nine, and was shared by Ken Anderson (1973), Boomer Esiason ('89) and Carson Palmer ('06). Burrow played in 16 games during the regular season (inactive [rest] for season finale).

Burrow has not yet had a TD pass of 30 or more yards during the playoffs.

**Burrow's big days vs. Ravens:** On Dec. 26 vs. Baltimore, QB Joe Burrow passed for a Bengals-record 525 yards, the fourth-highest single-game total in NFL history. He also posted then-career highs in passer rating (143.2), TD passes (four) and yards per pass attempt (11.4), and tied a career-high with 37 completions. He became the first Bengals QB ever to complete 80 percent of his passes (80.4) while throwing at least 40 times (46).

Burrow's 525 yards and four TDs came on the heels of 416 yards and three TDs earlier this season at Baltimore. That made him the only QB ever to pass for 400 yards and three TDs more than once in an entire career against the Ravens.

Burrow also became the first QB in NFL history to top 400 passing yards against the same opponent twice in one regular season, and his 941 combined passing yards against Baltimore were the most-ever against the same opponent in one regular season (tops 874, shared by 49ers QB Joe Montana against the Falcons in 1990 and Dolphins QB Dan Marino against the Jets in '88).

In the Dec. 26 matchup, Burrow became just the eighth QB since 2000 to have three completions of at least 52 yards in a game. On the receiving end of those passes were WR Tyler Boyd (68-yard TD), WR Tee Higgins (52) and HB Joe Mixon (52), who became the first trio of Bengals to catch passes of at least 50 yards in a single game since Nov. 17, 1968 at Miami.

**Burrow surpasses 7K:** Bengals QB Joe Burrow surpassed 7000 career passing yards on Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City this season, in what was just his 26th career game. That made him the fastest Bengal ever to 7000 passing yards — ahead of Carson Palmer (31), Andy Dalton (32) and Jeff Blake (32) — and the fourth-fastest QB in NFL history.

Burrow was also the fastest Bengal to 6000 passing yards (23 games), 5000 passing yards (19) and 4000 passing yards (16).

Here's a look at the fastest QBs in NFL history — in terms of games played — to reach 7000 passing yards.

Burrow ended the 2021 regular season with 7299 career passing yards.

**Burrow's college connections:** Bengals QB Joe Burrow may only be in his second NFL season, but he has plenty familiar faces around him in Cincinnati. There are seven current Bengals who played with Burrow in college at either Ohio State or LSU, meaning 13.5 percent of Burrow's 52 Bengals teammates suited up with him for at least one season in college.

The Bengals also have one player on the Practice Squad/Injured list (TE Thaddeus Moss) who played with Burrow in college, along with one assistant coach (assistant WRs coach Brad Kragthorpe) who was on LSU's staff in 2018, Burrow's first season with the Tigers.

Here's a look at the current Bengals who played with Burrow in college, along with the years they played together. Burrow played at Ohio State from 2015-17, and at Louisiana State from '18-19:

**Chase, Higgins youngest duo to 1K:** Bengals WRs Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins this year became the first duo in NFL history to post 1000 receiving yards in the same season before the age of 23. Chase, a rookie, is 21 years old, while Higgins, a second-year pro, was 22 during the regular season (turned 23 on Jan. 18).

Chase finished his rookie season with a team-record 1455 receiving yards, which also counted as the most by an NFL rookie during the Super Bowl era (started in 1966). Higgins finished with 1091 yards in just 14 games played — he

missed two games early in the season with a shoulder injury, and then was inactive (rest) for the regular-season finale at Cleveland.

The old man in the Bengals' wide receivers room is 27-year old Tyler Boyd, who finished the regular season with 828 receiving yards. Boyd, who hit 1000 receiving yards in both 2018 and '19, played in 16 regular-season games.

The 2021 regular season marked the third time in Bengals history in which the team had multiple 1000-yard receivers — WRs Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh did it twice, in 2006 and '07.

Only five teams in NFL history have had three 1000-yard receivers in the same season. The last to do so was the 2008 Arizona Cardinals, who had Hall of Fame QB Kurt Warner throwing to Larry Fitzgerald (1431), Anquan Boldin (1038) and Steve Breaston (1006). The only other team to do it since the turn of the century was the 2004 Indianapolis Colts, who had Hall of Fame QB Peyton Manning throwing to HOF WR Marvin Harrison (1113), Reggie Wayne (1210) and Brandon Stokley (1077).

**Chase, Burrow reunite in Cincinnati:** One of the most statistically accomplished QB-WR duos in college football history reunited in Cincinnati in 2021. Bengals QB Joe Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the 2020 draft, and WR Ja'Marr Chase, the No. 5 overall pick in the '21 draft, are teammates again after helping power the Louisiana State Tigers to a college football national championship in 2019.

With Burrow as his QB in 2019, Chase set single-season SEC records for receiving yards (1780) and TDs (20), en route to winning the Biletnikoff Award as college football's top receiver. Burrow, of course, went on to win the Heisman Trophy as college football's top player that year, after setting numerous NCAA and SEC passing records.

Burrow and Chase connected on 79 passes for 1429 yards (18.1 average) and 13 TDs during the regular season (Burrow did not play in the season finale). Chase's receiving yardage total was a team record, and the most ever by an NFL rookie during the Super Bowl era (see "Chase tops LSU teammate Jefferson" on page 9). Additionally, his receptions and receiving TDs totals were Bengals rookie records.

Chase and Burrow have continued their production during the postseason, and have connected on 14 passes for 225 yards in Cincinnati's two playoff wins.

**Uno tops Ocho:** WR Ja'Marr Chase, who is the first player in Bengals history to wear uniform No. 1 and has thus earned the nickname "Uno" among fans, posted a team-record 1455 receiving yards as a rookie this season. That edged out the previous team record of 1440, set in 2007 former Bengals WR Chad Johnson, who famously went by the nickname "Ochocinco" and even made that his legal last name in 2008.

It should be noted that Johnson played in 16 games, while Chase played 17. Chase, though, played just five snaps before exiting the 17th game — Week 18 at Cleveland — as the Bengals rested most of their starters after clinching the AFC North division title the previous week. Chase, who entered the game just 12 yards shy of breaking Johnson's record, caught two passes for 26 yards at Cleveland before heading to the bench.

**Chase gathers Bengals rookie records:** WR Ja'Marr Chase in 2021 had perhaps the best statistical season ever by a Bengals rookie. Here's a look at the Bengals rookie records that Chase broke during the 2021 regular season. It should be noted that, although the NFL schedule was expanded to 17 games in 2021, Chase broke all of the previous Bengals rookie records in no more than 16 games.

• Chase's 81 receptions topped the previous team rookie record of 67, shared by WRs Cris Collinsworth and Tee Higgins. Chase caught his 68th pass in the 15th game of the season (Dec. 26 vs. Baltimore).

• Chase's 1455 receiving yards topped the previous team rookie record of 1057, held by WR A.J. Green. Chase passed 1057 receiving yards in the 15th game of the season (Dec. 26 vs. Baltimore).

• Chase's 13 receiving TDs topped the previous team rookie record of nine, held by WR Isaac Curtis. Chase caught his ninth receiving TD in just the 13th

game of the season (Dec. 12 vs. San Francisco). Curtis' record was set in a 14-game season in 1973.

• Chase's five 100-yard receiving games topped the previous team rookie record of four, held by Green. Chase's fifth 100-yard receiving performance came in the 16th game of the season (Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City).

**The rundown on Chase:** Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase this year has had one of the best seasons ever by a rookie receiver. Here's a rundown of some of his accomplishments during both the regular season and playoffs.

• Chase's 1455 receiving yards during the regular season were a Bengals team record and the most ever by an NFL rookie in the Super Bowl era (see "Chase tops LSU teammate Jefferson" on page 9). In addition to receiving yardage, he also led all rookies in receiving TDs (13).

• Chase set the NFL's single-game receiving yardage mark for a rookie (team-record 266 on Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City). He also had 201 receiving yards on Oct. 24 at Baltimore, which gave him two of the three highest single-game receiving yardage outputs in the NFL during the 2021 regular season.

• Chase's 1571 combined receiving yards in the regular season and playoffs count as the most-ever by an NFL rookie, ahead of the Houston Oilers' Bill Groman (1510 yards in 1960), Minnesota's Randy Moss (1461 in '98) and Minnesota's Justin Jefferson (1400 in 2020).

• He is the first rookie in NFL history with multiple 100-yard receiving games in the postseason (116 in Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, and 109 in Divisional Playoff at Tennessee).

• He became the first rookie and fifth player ever with multiple 200-yard receiving games in a single season. The others are Hall of Famers Calvin Johnson (2011 and '12) and Don Maynard (1968), along with Josh Gordon ('13) and Alshon Jeffrey ('13).

• He became just the fifth rookie ever with at least 1000 receiving yards and 10 TDs. He joins John Jefferson (1978), Randy Moss ('98), Mike Evans (2014) and Odell Beckham Jr. ('14). It should be noted that Chase hit the 1000 yard/10 TD mark in just 13 games.

• He was the second rookie in NFL history to record at least 50 receiving yards in each of his first seven games. Detroit WR Earl McCullough, who at one time was the world-record holder in the 110-meter hurdles, also did it in 1968. Chase's streak ended in Game 8 at the N.Y. Jets.

• He was one of two players in NFL history with a reception of at least 30 yards in each of their first seven career games. McCullough is the other. Chase's streak ended in Game 8 at the N.Y. Jets.

• In Game 7 at Baltimore, Chase (21 years, 237 days) became the second-youngest player ever to record at least 200 receiving yards in a single game (Mike Evans; 21 years, 87 days).

• In Game 1 vs. Minnesota, his NFL debut, he became the youngest (21 years, 195 days) Bengal ever to top 100 receiving yards.

**Uno shattered records vs. Chiefs:** Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase's 266 receiving yards on Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City were not only a Bengals record, they were the most in any regular-season game by a rookie in NFL history. Chase scored three TDs on the day — catches of 72, 18 and 69 yards — in what was the 34th time in league history that a rookie scored at least three TDs in a single game. Five of those have now come from Bengals — RB Paul Robinson (1968), WR Isaac Curtis ('73), RB Ickey Woods ('88), RB Corey Dillon ('97) and Chase.

Chase's performance helped Cincinnati to a 34-31 win over Kansas City that officially secured the 2021 AFC North title.

**Uno takes aim at playoff records:** Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase this postseason became the first rookie in NFL history with multiple 100-yard receiving games in the playoffs. He hit the century mark in each of his first two playoff games — 116 yards in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, and 109 in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee.

His 225 receiving yards so far in the playoffs are the second-most ever by a rookie in postseason play, and he needs only 17 more yards to tie Torry Holt's rookie record from 1999.



Chase also has 14 receptions in the postseason, and could match Colts RB Joseph Addai's rookie playoff record of 22, set in 2006. Chase has not yet scored a TD in the playoffs, but he could still catch the rookie postseason record of three, shared by Sammy White (1976) and Steve Junker (1957).

**Chase tops LSU teammate Jefferson:** Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase during the 2021 regular season had 1455 receiving yards, second-most in NFL history behind the Houston Oilers' Bill Groman in 1960. But in the Super Bowl era (since 1966), Chase's 1455 are the most ahead of his friend and former LSU teammate Justin Jefferson, who had 1400 with the Minnesota Vikings in 2020.

Chase, Jefferson and Bengals QB Joe Burrow played together at Louisiana State University, where in 2019 they shattered numerous offensive records and led the Tigers to an undefeated season and national championship.

It should be noted that Chase had 1429 yards (and thus topped Jefferson) after 16 games. Groman, a native of Tiffin, Ohio who attended Heidelberg University, set his record in just 14 games in 1960.

**Chase heats up before halftime:** Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase in 2021 was arguably the most productive WR in the NFL during the last two minutes of the first half. During that time period in the regular season, Chase ranked first league-wide in receiving yards (248) and catches of at least 20 yards (five), and tied for second in receiving TDs (three).

Chase has not had a catch in the last two minutes in either of Cincinnati's postseason games.

Here's a look at Chase's game-changing plays just before halftime during the 2021 regular season:

- In Game 1 vs. Minnesota, Chase hauled in a 50-yard bomb from Burrow with 42 seconds left in the half to score his first career TD and give the Bengals a 14-7 lead heading into the locker room.
- In Game 3 at Pittsburgh, Chase got behind the defense again and made a fingertip grab for a 34-yard TD with 43 seconds left, helping Cincinnati to a 14-7 halftime lead.
- In Game 5 vs. Green Bay, QB Joe Burrow extended the play and rolled right to find Chase streaking across the field for a 70-yard TD with 50 seconds remaining, cutting the Packers' lead to two at halftime.
- In Game 6 at Detroit, Chase caught a 34-yard pass down the sideline with 23 seconds remaining. But while he didn't find the end zone, the play got the Bengals into Lions territory and set up a FG three plays later that gave the Bengals a 10-point lead at halftime.
- In Game 7 at Baltimore, Chase caught three passes for 45 yards on Cincinnati's final drive of the first half, which ended with a FG. Those three catches included a 26-yarder to the Baltimore 19-yard line.

**Three big days for Uno:** During the 2021 regular season, Chase posted three of the four highest single-game receiving yardage totals ever by a Bengals rookie.

His first entry came on Oct. 10 vs. Green Bay, when he recorded 159 yards on nine catches, including a 70-yard TD just before halftime. It should be noted that the Packers game went into overtime, and that Chase had one catch for 21 yards in the extra period.

Then, on Oct. 24 at Baltimore, he exploded for a then-Bengals rookie record

201 receiving yards on eight catches, including an 82-yard bomb in the third quarter that widened Cincinnati's lead to 10 points. At the time he was 21 years and 237 days old, making him the second-youngest player in NFL history to record at least 200 receiving yards in a single game.

Later in the season, on Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City, Chase posted a team-record 266 receiving yards and three TDs (72, 18 and 69 yards). His 266 receiving yards were the most-ever by a rookie in NFL history, and the most by any player in the NFL this season.

**Tee continues rookie momentum:** Bengals WR Tee Higgins in 2021 has continued the momentum he built during his rookie campaign in 2020. Higgins, a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, had 74 catches for 1091 yards and six TDs during the 2021 regular season, despite missing three games — Games 3-4 (shoulder), and the regular-season finale (rest). He also had four 100-yard receiving games, including on Dec. 26 vs. Baltimore, when he posted career-highs in catches (12) and receiving yards (194) and scored two TDs. So far in the playoffs, Higgins has eight catches for 106 yards.

As a rookie in 2020, Higgins caught 67 passes to tie former WR Cris Collinsworth for the most by a rookie in team history, while his team-high 908 receiving yards were at the time the fourth-most ever by a Bengals rookie (both were topped this year by rookie WR Ja'Marr Chase).

Higgins drew praise from numerous Bengals coaches and teammates in 2021 for transforming his body over offseason. "My biggest thing was to get stronger," Higgins said over the summer. "I didn't do any routes, I didn't run. I was just really in the weight room for the most part. Then, once I was able to actually get on the field and do like a workout or something, I just went out there and it felt good. I just felt like I had to get stronger, so I focused a little bit more on the weight room. Now I'm weighing like 220 (pounds), and it feels good. Last year I came in at like 220, but it was too heavy for me, so I had to lose a few pounds. Now it feels really good and I feel even faster."

**Tee goes 3 x 100:** Bengals second-year WR Tee Higgins topped 100 receiving yards in Games 12-14 of the regular season, tying the third-longest streak of consecutive 100-yard receiving games in team history. He had 114 yards on Nov. 28 vs. Pittsburgh, 138 yards on Dec. 5 vs. the L.A. Chargers, and 114 yards on Dec. 12 vs. San Francisco.

The last Bengal with 100 receiving yards in three straight games was WR A.J. Green, who eventually ran his streak to a team-record five games in 2013.

Higgins had four total 100-yard games during the 2021 regular season, and all came in the last six games in which he played (inactive [rest] for season finale).

**Mixon falls shy of Pick and Ickey:** Bengals HB Joe Mixon during the regular season fell just shy of two team scoring records.

Mixon's 16 total TDs (13 rushing, three receiving) tied for second-most in team history behind WR Carl Pickens, who had 17 in 1995. Mixon and RB Pete Johnson (1981) share second place. Mixon had multiple TDs in five games during the regular season, which tied for the most in Bengals history with Pete Johnson (1979, '81 and '83), James Brooks ('88) and Ickey Woods ('88).

Mixon's 13 rushing TDs were the fourth-most in team history, behind Woods' 15 in 1988 and Johnson's 14 in both 1979 and '83.

It should be noted that, while the NFL's schedule moved to 17 games in

2021, Mixon played in just 16 contests — he missed Game 17 at Cleveland while on the Reserve/COVID-19 list. The NFL expanded its schedule from 14 to 16 games in 1978, therefore Woods and Pickens both set their team records in 16-game seasons.

So far in the postseason, Mixon has one rushing TD — a 16-yarder in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee.

**Mixon's TD streak ends at nine:** During the 2021 regular season, Bengals HB Joe Mixon put together a streak of nine consecutive games with at least one TD, which tied WR A.J. Green (nine in 2012) for the second-longest such streak in team history. Mixon's streak was broken when he was held out of the end zone on Dec. 12 vs. San Francisco, and he fell one short of the team record of 10, set over the 1994 and '95 seasons by WR Carl Pickens.

Mixon scored 13 total TDs (11 rushing, two receiving) during his nine-game streak, which lasted between Game 4 vs. Jacksonville and Game 12 vs. the L.A. Chargers.

Within his nine-game streak were two other streaks that tied or set team records. He scored a rushing TD in six straight contests (Games 7-12), tied for the longest such streak in team history (RB Rudi Johnson/2006, and RB Stan Fritts/1975). And he scored multiple TDs in four straight games (Games 8-11), the longest such streak in team history.

The longest previous streak of consecutive games with multiple TDs was three, accomplished by Pete Johnson in 1981 and Rudi Johnson in 2005. The last NFL player with multiple TDs in at least four games was Saints RB Alvin Kamara, who had five straight between the 2019 and '20 seasons. Seahawks WR Doug Baldwin in 2015 was the last player with multiple TDs in four straight games within one season.

**Bengals tough when Mixon hits 20 carries:** The Bengals hold an 11-7 record when HB Joe Mixon reaches the 20-carry mark (combined regular season and playoffs). And in those 18 games, Mixon has topped 100 rushing yards 12 times. Eleven of his last 14 games with 20 carries have resulted in 100 or more rushing yards.

The Bengals were 3-1 during the 2021 regular season when Mixon hit the mark. He has not hit the 20-carry mark yet this postseason.

**Mixon tops 4K:** Bengals HB Joe Mixon in 2021 became one of only six Bengals ever to rush for 4000 yards in a career. He achieved the feat on Nov. 21, 2021 at Las Vegas, in what was his 60th career game.

Mixon has 4564 career rushing yards, fifth-most in Bengals history. He passed Harold Green (3727) and Cedric Benson (4176) this year, but he's unlikely to catch Pete Johnson (5421) for fourth place until at least next season. Corey Dillon (8061) is the Bengals' all-time leading rusher, followed by James Brooks (6447), Rudi Johnson (5472) and Pete Johnson (5421).

**Mixon fastest to 4K/1K:** Bengals HB Joe Mixon in 2021 also became one of just four Bengals ever to surpass 4000 career rushing yards and 1000 career receiving yards. He joins Corey Dillon, James Brooks and Pete Johnson in that category.

Reaching the 4k/1k mark took Mixon just 60 career games, 11 faster than the next-quickest Bengal (Dillon, 71 games). He topped 1000 career receiving yards in the 2021 season opener vs. Minnesota, and then surpassed 4000 rushing yards in Game 10 at Las Vegas.

Mixon finished the 2021 regular season with 4564 career rushing yards and 1322 receiving yards.

It took Mixon just 50 games to reach 3000 rushing and 1000 receiving yards, which also was 11 games quicker than the next-fastest Bengal (Brooks, 61).

Here's a look at the fastest players ever to top 4000 career rushing yards and 1000 career receiving yards in a Bengals uniform (it should be noted that Brooks began his career with the San Diego Chargers from 1981-83; however, the data counts only rushing/receiving yardage and games played as a Bengal):

**Mixon secures the rock:** Not only is Bengals HB Joe Mixon considered one of the top rushers in the NFL, he's also proven effective at protecting the football. Mixon has fumbled just six times (three lost) since

entering the league in 2017, a span that covers 1316 combined touches on offense (1135 rushes, 181 catches). That includes just three fumbles (two lost) since the start of 2018. All of those totals include regular season and the playoffs.

Mixon owns two of the three longest regular-season streaks of rushing attempts without a fumble by a Bengal since at least 1990 (when the Elias Sports Bureau began tracking the stat). From 2017-20, he went 541 rushing attempts without a fumble, good for the second-longest by a Bengal over that time period. That streak was halted by a fumble in the 2020 season opener. He then rattled off 327 carries without a fumble, the third-longest such streak in team history, before fumbling on a carry in Game 12 in 2021.

**'Fire department' tough after turnovers:** The Bengals' offense and special teams units this season (regular season plus playoffs) have committed 22 turnovers, including three that were returned for TDs, which means opposing offenses have taken over possession 19 times after Bengals turnovers. In those 19 instances, the Bengals' defense has allowed just four TDs and eight FGs (53 points). That means opponents failed to produce points on seven of those possessions — two punts, one missed FG, a turnover on downs and three INTs (one pick-six).

Opposing offenses have taken over in plus territory after Bengals turnovers on 13 occasions this year. Those have resulted in three TDs, seven FGs, a punt, a missed FG and an INT (34 points).

When opposing offenses take over inside the Bengals' 20-yard line, they have one TD, three FGs and a missed FG (17 points).

Bengals defenders and coaches say that they have embraced these kinds of back-to-the-wall situations. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo has even coined a name for them. "I tell our guys all the time that we're like the fire department," he said. "We're here to put the fire out. We don't ask how or why. We just go out there and we put it out."

**Trey's 14 sacks second-most by a Bengal:** DE Trey Hendrickson, one of the headliners of Cincinnati's free agency haul in March, had a team-high 14.0 sacks (fifth in NFL) during the 2021 regular season. Those 14 sacks were the second-most in team history, between DE Carlos Dunlap's 13 in 2015 and DE Coy Bacon's team-record 22 in 1976. (Sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson's sack total this season more than doubled the 2020 team lead (former DE Carl Lawson, 5.5). He also was the first Bengal with double-digit sacks since former DT Geno Atkins' 10 in 2018.

In 2020 with New Orleans, Hendrickson's 13.5 sacks tied for the NFC lead and tied for second-most leaguewide. Hendrickson's 27.5 combined sacks in the 2020 and '21 regular seasons were third-most in the NFL, behind only Pittsburgh's T.J. Watt (37.5) and Cleveland's Myles Garrett (28.0).

Hendrickson has continued his stellar production in the postseason, and has one sack and one FF (recorded on same play in Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas. Hendrickson left the Wild Card Playoff late in the first half with a concussion, but returned to the starting lineup in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee.

**Trey's sack streak ends at 11:** Bengals DE Trey Hendrickson recorded at least a half sack in 11 straight games (Games 5-15) during the 2021 regular season — the longest such streak in Bengals history, the longest streak in the NFL in 2021, and tied for the second-longest in NFL history. The previous Bengals record was six straight games, by Eddie Edwards (1984), Reggie Williams (1984), Carlos Dunlap (2010-11) and Geno Atkins (2016-17).

Hendrickson fell just one game shy of former Titans DE Jevon Kearse's NFL-record of 12. It should be noted, though, that Hendrickson's 11-game streak tied for the longest ever within one season.

Within his 11-game streak, Hendrickson recorded a full sack in nine consecutive games (Games 5-13), which tied for the fourth-longest such streak in NFL history and just two games shy of Chiefs DT Chris Jones' 11 straight in 2018. It was also the longest such streak in Bengals history, topping the previous

record of six straight by Williams (1984) and Edwards ('83).

Hendrickson's 14 sacks during the regular season were fifth in the NFL and second-most in team history. He recorded at least a half sack in 13 of the 16 regular-season games in which he played (missed the finale while on Reserve/COVID-19).

Here's a look at the longest streaks of games with at least a half sack in NFL history.

**Bengals improve 2020 pass rush:** One of Cincinnati's primary areas of focus over the 2021 offseason was to improve a pass-rush that in '20 totaled a league-low 17 sacks. Injuries were a key factor a year ago, especially toward the end of the season, but the front office nonetheless made clear its intent of strengthening the defensive front through the draft and free agency.

Those efforts worked. Cincinnati finished the 2021 regular season ranked tied for 11th leaguewide with 42 sacks, more than double the 17 from 2020. DE Trey Hendrickson, one of the team's key acquisitions in free agency in March, led the team and ranked fifth leaguewide with 14 sacks (plus one more in the playoffs). That's more than double 2020's individual team high (5.5, DE Carl Lawson). Eleven Bengals got into the sack column during the regular season, including DT Larry Ogunjobi (7.0), another 2021 free agent acquisition, DT B.J. Hill (5.5), who was acquired in a trade just before the regular season, and DE Cam Sample (1.5), who was one of four defensive linemen Cincinnati selected in April's draft. The revamped defensive line accounted for all but 2.5 of Cincinnati's 41 sacks this year (one additional sack was counted as a team sack). DE Sam Hubbard (7.5) was the only defender in the sack column who was with Cincinnati prior to the 2020 season.

Four players — Hendrickson, Hubbard, Ogunjobi and Hill — matched or surpassed last season's team lead of 5.5 sacks.

**Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal:** DE Sam Hubbard, a third-round pick (77th overall) of the Bengals in 2018, ranks second in sacks (24.0) among all players from the '18 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Players' listed positions vary by media outlet (e.g. whether they're classified as a LB or DE), but according to NFL.com's draft record, Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected in 2018 — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. According to NFL.com, there were a total of 40 defensive linemen (20 DEs, 20 DTs) selected in the 2018 draft, along with 32 linebackers and one player classified as "EDGE." There were also, of course, numerous undrafted rookies in 2018.

Hubbard has been the Bengals' starting RDE since 2019, and during the '21 regular season his 7.5 sacks were second on the team. He signed a contract extension with the Bengals in July that keeps him in Cincinnati through the end of the 2025 season.

**Logan's four INTs tied for LB lead:** Bengals second-year LB Logan Wilson had a team-high four INTs during the regular season — tied for the most among all LBs, and the most by a Bengal LB since 2005 (Odell Thurman, five). Consider also that Wilson missed three games (Games 13-15) with a right shoulder injury, and then was inactive (rest) for the season finale at Cleveland.

Wilson was also strong against the run. The 2020 third-round pick of the Bengals had a team-high 98 tackles, despite his missed time, and he led the Bengals in tackles in six of the 12 full games in which he was healthy (was injured in the first half of Game 12 vs. the L.A. Chargers).

Wilson's strong play has continued in the playoffs. He has one INT, and it was a significant one — with 20 seconds remaining in the Divisional Playoff at

Tennessee, he picked off a Ryan Tannehill pass to give the ball back to the Bengals' offense, which quickly got into FG range to set up K Evan McPherson's walk-off winner. Wilson also leads the NFL in tackles in post-season play, and has come up with some of the most important stops of Cincinnati's playoff run, including a fourth-and-one TFL of Titans RB Derrick Henry on a fourth-and-one in the fourth quarter of a tie game.

As a rookie in 2020, Wilson was eased into the regular defensive rotation and then battled injuries late in the year. In 2021, he was assigned the green dot on his helmet as the team's designated communicator, and was credited by teammates for being a vocal leader.

"He has a huge responsibility on his shoulders this year," DE Trey Hendrickson said of Wilson. "He's taken in a lot in just two years, and you wouldn't know that he's a second-year guy. He's our play-caller out there, and he's getting the calls out quickly. That's what we need from a guy inside like that. And he's got hands too."

**Healthy Reader leads stout D-line:** During the 2020 offseason, the Bengals made one of the most significant free agency splashes in team history when they signed DT D.J. Reader to a lucrative four-year contract that lasts through the 2023 season. Big things were expected of Reader, but his impact in 2020 was short-lived after he suffered a season-ending left quad injury in the fifth game.

In 2021, the 6-3, 347-pound Reader returned healthy and undoubtedly proved his value as a leader and physical presence in the middle of the defensive line. And while the impact of interior defensive linemen is often difficult to quantify with statistics, consider that Cincinnati's run defense ranked fifth in the NFL (102.5 yards/game allowed) in 2021 compared to 29th a year earlier (148.0) and 32nd the year before (148.9).

Another measure of the impact of an interior defensive lineman — particularly a nose tackle — is the play of the linebackers behind them. In 2021, Cincinnati's linebacker play has been among the brightest and most-improved spots on the defense. Leading the way has been second-year pro Logan Wilson, who led the team in both and INTs (four) during the regular season. His INT total tied for the most among all LBs leaguewide, and was the most by a Bengal LB since 2005.

But perhaps the most impressive part of Reader's 2021 season was his actual recovery from the aforementioned quad injury. He talked about the severity of it on the Bengals Booth Podcast with Bengals play-by-play radio announcer Dan Hoard.

"I ruptured the tendon, so it was pretty severe," Reader said. "The first six weeks after surgery, you can't move. You have to keep it straight because the tendon has to repair. And then it was a nine-month rehab. They say it only has about a 50 percent 'return' rate — not very high — but it's gotten better with modern medicine and the surgeries.

"Sleeping was probably the hardest thing, because you can't move at all — you have to sleep on your back, you have to keep it straight, and you're in a brace."

Reader started 15 of 17 games at NT during the 2021 regular season, and had 43 tackles and two sacks. He missed Game 15 vs. Baltimore while on Reserve/COVID-19, and he was inactive (rest) for the regular-season finale at Cleveland.

**'Superman' Reader:** One of the unsung heroes of Cincinnati's 19-16 Divisional Playoff win at Tennessee was Bengals DT D.J. Reader, who recorded six tackles (five solo), including two for losses, while helping the defense hold Tennessee's fifth-ranked rushing offense in check. Of course, 347-pound nose tackles aren't known for stuffing the stat sheet, so here's a sampling of quotes from Reader's teammates and coaches talking about his performance against the Titans.

• Head coach Zac Taylor: "D.J. Reader was unbelievable. He was Superman, quite frankly. You see him make some plays during the game, but then you really dial in and watch the tape, and you can further understand the impact he had on the game. Overall, you can point out every single player on defense making some key plays in that game. But if you're going to single out one guy for their performance, D.J. Reader is certainly deserving of that."

• S Jessie Bates: "A guy named D.J. Reader stepped up big time. I could say stuff about all the guys up front, but D.J. really, really stepped up. People maybe know his name now, which they should have before. D.J. is one of my best friends on the team. He's the guy that I was going to when I was in my little funk (earlier in the season). When I was a little isolated, D.J. was the one that was calling me, D.J. was the one that was texting me, coming over to my house, just hanging out. I can't say enough about him. He's the best of the best up front. I don't think a lot of people give him enough credit. He's a hell of a person, a hell

of an up-front guy, and a guy that you've got to have in the locker room."

● TE C.J. Uzomah: "He's a monster. He's a beast. I love D.J., straight up. His leadership in the locker room, his presence on the field. He's a force, he's a freak of nature, he's a savage. When the whole defense plays as well as they played (at Tennessee) and coach is up there and he goes, 'I could call out each individual player but I'm going to specifically say that D.J. Reader played a hell of a game,' that's how you know you're an absolute animal out there."

**Mr. Reliable wears No. 30:** Jessie Bates earned a starting S spot midway through his first preseason in Cincinnati, and he hasn't looked back since. The 2018 second-round pick started 51 straight games to begin his Bengals career — that's three full seasons plus three games — until a neck injury ended his streak in the fourth game of 2021 (Sept. 30 vs. Jacksonville). He missed just that one game before returning to the starting lineup the next week, and then started every 2021 game thereafter.

Still, Bates' streak of 51 tied for the sixth-most consecutive starts by a player to begin their career as a Bengal, and the second-most by a defender. Had he started the Jacksonville game, he would have tied former LB Takeo Spikes (52) for most starts to begin a career by a Bengals defender.

**Bell rings of reliability:** One of Cincinnati's most trusted leaders and consistent players on the field over the last two seasons has been S Vonn Bell. The sixth-year pro joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent prior to the 2020 season, and then proceeded to play in every snap of his first 20 games with the team. His streak of consecutive snaps was broken in Cincinnati's 34-11 win at Detroit on Oct. 17, when the starters were rested late in the fourth quarter.

And although he ended up missing more snaps throughout the year, including missing Game 17 at Cleveland while on Reserve/COVID-19, Bell still led defense in snaps played (1004 of 1124) during the regular season. In his now 34 games played (regular season plus playoffs) for the Bengals, he has seen action on 2193 of 2313 possible defensive snaps (94.8 percent).

Bell has been a captain in both of his Bengals seasons. He finished the 2021 regular season ranked second on the team in tackles (97), after leading the team in that category (114) in '20.

**Special teams soar under Simmons:** Over the 19-year tenure of Darrin Simmons, the Bengals have consistently boasted one of the top special teams units in the NFL. Simmons in 2020 added the title of assistant head coach to his usual role as special teams coordinator, a nod to a successful run that has seen 17 of his pupils appear in the team's record book.

Here's an overview of Simmons' players' dominance in the records (for more info, see the Bengals' records section on page 160 in the 2021 media guide):

- The three most accurate FG kickers (by career percentage) in team history — Shayne Graham, Randy Bullock, and Mike Nugent — were all coached by Simmons for their entire Bengals careers. Simmons has also been at the helm for each of the six most accurate single seasons by Bengals kickers.
- The five longest consecutive FG streaks in team history have all come under Simmons' watch, as have three of the five longest PAT streaks.
- Simmons, who punted at the University of Kansas, has had particular success coaching his former position. Current P Kevin Huber holds the top spot in every Bengals career punting category, along with the top five single seasons for gross average, net average and inside-20s. Former P Kyle Larson, who spent his entire Bengals term (2004-08) under Simmons, ranks within the top four in every career punting category, and shares with Huber the record for longest punt in team history (75 yards).
- Simmons has coached three of the Bengals' top four leaders in career punt return average — Adam Jones, Quan Cosby and Peter Warrick.
- Simmons has coached five of the team's top seven leaders in career kickoff return average — Jones, Brandon Wilson, Alex Erickson, Bernard Scott, Glenn Holt — along with five of the six best single seasons by a kickoff returner

(based on yards per kickoff return).

And although the category is not kept as an official team record, it should be noted that LS Clark Harris has executed 1866 deep snaps without a single unplayable delivery since joining the Bengals in mid-2009 (including playoffs).

Simmons has also coached four players who have made the Pro Bowl as special teamers — Huber, Jones, Harris and HB Cedric Peerman.

**Huber matches Riley, while Harris closes in:** One of the most prestigious Bengals records in existence, and one that stood for 38 years, was matched late this year. Former CB Ken Riley's team-record 207 games played as a Bengal was tied in the 2021 season finale by P Kevin Huber, a 13th-year player and Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in 2009. Riley's record had stood since his retirement in 1983.

Huber also passed QB Ken Anderson (192 games) and LB Reggie Williams (206) in 2021.

Not far behind, though, is current LS Clark Harris (201 games played), who has snapped to Huber since joining Cincinnati midway through the 2009 season. Harris now stands fourth in career games as a Bengal, and earlier in the season passed Pro Football Hall of Famer Anthony Munoz (185), DT Tim Krumrie (188) and Anderson (192).

**Huber among NFL's best at pinning 'em:** As the evidence shows, no Bengals punter has ever been nearly as successful as Kevin Huber at pinning opponents inside the 20-yard line. The 2009 fifth-round draft choice has 337 career inside-20 punts, more than double the next-best in team history (Lee Johnson, 186).

But the numbers also show that Huber is among the best active punters in the NFL at pinning opponents deep.

**The Huber roundup:** Bengals P Kevin Huber, a 2009 Bengals fifth-round pick who is now in his 13th season, has long been considered the top punter in team history. He has cemented that legacy in recent years by taking over the top spot in the few remaining career punting categories he did not already own.

Huber now stands first in team history in the following categories (regular season only):

- Punts (980)
- Punting yards (44,426)
- Gross average (45.33)
- Net average (40.27)
- Inside-20 punts (337)

Huber has also taken over many of the Bengals' single-season and single-game records. Among them are:

- He holds the top five Bengals season averages in both gross and net punting yardage, and in 2020, his 12th NFL season, he re-set his own single-season team records in both categories (47.18 gross, 42.82 net).
- He shares the team record for longest punt (75 yards) with Kyle Larson.
- His 33 inside-20 punts in 2012 is a single-season franchise record.
- His six inside-20 punts on Sept. 14, 2017 vs. Houston are tied with Lee Johnson (Nov. 2, 1997) for the most in a game in Bengals history.

**McPherson from deep:** Bengals rookie K Evan McPherson made an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards during the 2021 regular season, and

fell just one shy of tying the NFL record for most 50-plus yarders. Former Vikings K Blair Walsh (10) holds the rookie record and is tied for the NFL record.

McPherson's nine FGs from 50-plus were more than double the previous team record for a single season (four, by K Horst Muhlmann in 1970). Even more impressive is that he's now the Bengals' career leader in 50-plus yard FGs, and it took him only 14 games to break the previous record of eight.

In a sign of things to come, McPherson's first-ever NFL FG was a 53-yarder in Cincinnati's season-opener vs. Minnesota. Then, on Nov. 21 at Las Vegas, he tied a single-game NFL record with three FGs of at least 50 yards (54, 53 and 51). For perspective, there were only four instances (including Muhlmann in 1970) prior to this year where a Bengals kicker made as many as three 50-plus yarders in a full season.

On Dec. 19 at Denver, McPherson booted a Bengals-record 58-yard FG as time expired in the first half. It was his second 50-plus yarder of the day.

McPherson has made two 50-plus yarders in the playoffs as well — 54 and 52 yards, which both came in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee. The 52-yarder was a game-winner as time expired in regulation.

**McPherson the youngest with OT winner:** Bengals rookie K Evan McPherson made his NFL debut in style on Sept. 12 vs. Minnesota, booting a game-winning 33-yard FG as time expired in OT.

McPherson, a fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April's draft, chose to forgo his final year of college eligibility to enter the NFL draft, and thus was among the youngest Bengals on the roster. At the time of his game-winner against Minnesota, which he says was the first "walk-off" kick of his career on any level, he was 22 years and 53 days old (born 7-21-99), making him the youngest player in NFL history to kick a game-winning FG in overtime. It also made him just the second rookie kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning FG with no time remaining in OT (the other was Miami K Jason Sanders in 2018). Earlier in the game, McPherson became the youngest Bengal ever to kick a FG or PAT.

McPherson made 46 of 48 PATs and 28 of his 33 FGs during the 2021 regular season. He also has made all 11 of his placekicks during the playoffs — eight FGs, three PATs. Two of his postseason FGs were from 50-plus, including a 52-yard game-winner as time expired in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee.

**... Make that four walk-offs:** Bengals rookie K Evan McPherson said before the 2021 season that he had never, at any level of football, even been in a position to kick a game-winning FG or PAT as time expired — a "walk-off," if you will. That changed in a hurry in 2021, as the rookie went on to boot three game-winning FGs as time expired in regulation or OT during the regular season, before adding yet another "walk-off" kick in the playoffs.

His first "walk-off" came in the season-opener — his NFL debut — when he nailed a 33-yarder as time expired in OT to give Cincinnati a dramatic 27-24 win. He did it again three weeks later, in Cincinnati's Sept. 30 Thursday Night Football matchup vs. Jacksonville, this time converting a 35-yarder as time expired in regulation to give the Bengals a 24-21 win. He did it for a third time on Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City, when his 20-yard FG as time expired in regulation won the game and clinched the AFC North division title.

And although playoff stats count separately from regular-season stats, McPherson booted a fourth "walk-off" — a 52-yarder — in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee. It should be noted that the game-time temperature at Tennessee was 34 degrees, but by the time the Alabama native and former Florida Gator put foot to ball for the game-winner, the temperature had dropped below

freezing. The kick also made him the first rookie in NFL postseason history with a "walk-off" FG at the end of regulation or OT.

For what it's worth, McPherson's three regular-season "walk-offs" are still well short of Bengals K Jim Breech's 10, which stand as the most in team history for a career.

But at 22 years old, McPherson does stand as the youngest player in NFL history — by a more than two years — with at least three career "walk-off" kicks in the regular season.

**"Shooter McPherson" perfect in playoffs:** Bengals rookie K Evan McPherson, who earned the nickname "Shooter McPherson" from longtime Bengals LS Clark Harris, is perfect on placekicks so far in the playoffs. He has made all eight of his FG attempts, and all three of his PATs.

McPherson's nickname is a reference to Shooter McGavin, a character played by actor Christopher McDonald in the 1996 movie Happy Gilmore.

In McPherson's postseason debut — Wild Card Playoff vs. the Las Vegas Raiders on Jan. 15 — he set team postseason records for points (14) and FGs (four) in a game. The next week — Divisional Playoff at Tennessee on Jan. 22 — he booted another four FGs, including two from 50-plus yards. One of those was a 52-yard game-winner as time expired in regulation, which made him the only rookie in NFL postseason history to kick a game-winning FG with no time remaining in the fourth quarter or OT. It also made him the first kicker in NFL history to make at least four FGs in multiple games in a single postseason.

McPherson's 27 points this postseason already are the second-most for a career in Bengals postseason history, and his eight FGs are just one shy of tying Jim Breech's career postseason record (nine).

**Roster flip noticeable in Year 3:** Zac Taylor took over as Bengals head coach in 2019, and throughout his now three-year tenure there has been a steady but noticeable churn of the roster. Of the 53 players on the current roster (as of Tuesday, Jan. 25), only nine suited up as Bengals prior to Taylor's arrival. That means 44 current Bengals — or 83.0 percent of the roster — have joined Cincinnati since 2019.

Cincinnati's roster overhaul has hit overdrive since the end of last season. Twenty-three current Bengals — that's 43.4 percent of the 53-player roster — had never suited up in a game for Cincinnati prior to the 2021 regular season. (It should be noted that figure includes OT Isaiah Prince, CB Trae Waynes and TE Mitchell Wilcox, who were with Cincinnati previously but never played).

**Recent acquisitions boost Bengals:** Cincinnati's player personnel department struck gold in acquiring new top talent in each of the last two years. On top of solid drafts (see the next item titled "2020 rookies continue to deliver"), the team has unearthed a bounty of player production in free agency, as well as a trade.

Here's a look at how some of the team's 2020 and '21 additions are faring this season (all are unrestricted free agent additions, unless otherwise noted). Games-starts totals include playoffs; the notes include only regular-season stats.

**2020 rookies continue to deliver:** Cincinnati's 2020 draft class combined to play in 96 games (33 starts) as rookies, just three games shy of the most by a Bengals draft class (99 in 2017) since the draft went to seven rounds in 1994. Consider also that the 2020 class was just seven players, while the 2017 class was 11 players.

After being leaned upon heavily as rookies, Cincinnati's 2020 draft class continued to deliver in their sophomore campaigns, combining to play in 84 games (56 starts) during the 2021 regular season. In the playoffs, they have combined for 12 games and seven starts.

It should be noted that 2020 draft picks dealt with more injuries in 2021, and spent a combined 23 games on reserve lists during the regular season. LB Akeem Davis-Gaither (left foot), a 2020 fourth-rounder, is on Reserve/Injured and is not expected return this season.

Here is the 2020 Bengals draft class: QB Joe Burrow (first round), WR Tee Higgins (second), LB Logan Wilson (third), Davis-Gaither (fourth), DE Khalid Kareem (fifth), G Hakeem Adeniji (sixth), LB Markus Bailey (seventh). Burrow, Higgins, Wilson and Adeniji are regular starters when healthy.

**Bengals tap Senior Bowl pipeline:** One of the key factors in Cincinnati's success in the draft the last two years has been the team's ability to identify prospects at the Senior Bowl, a college all-star game held each January that serves as the unofficial start to the pre-draft process.

The Bengals drafted seven players over the last two years who participated in the Senior Bowl, and all seven are still with the team. Five are on the active roster — OT Hakeem Adeniji (2020, sixth round), HB Chris Evans ('21 sixth round), DE Cam Sample ('21, fourth round), G D'Ante Smith ('21, fourth round) and LB Logan Wilson ('20, third round) — while the other two are on reserve lists — LB Akeem Davis-Gaither ('20, fourth round; Reserve/Injured) and DE Wyatt Hubert ('21, seventh round; Reserve/Non-Football Injury).

Zac Taylor and the rest of the Bengals staff coached the South team at the 2020 Senior Bowl, and Davis-Gaither was on their roster. Wilson and Adeniji were on the North team that year, however coaches cite their close exposure to both during that experience as a major reason they ended up in Cincinnati.

Taylor and his staff attended the 2020 and '21 Senior Bowls. He was on the Rams' staff in 2018 and was hired by Cincinnati after L.A.'s Super Bowl that season, therefore neither he nor his full staff attended the '19 Senior Bowl.

**25 points does the trick:** Since 2011, the Bengals own a 58-6-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points. That's good for the second-best winning percentage (.879) in the NFL when topping the 25-point mark over that span.

The Bengals are 12-5 under head coach Zac Taylor (7-1 this season) when reaching the 25-point plateau. The Bengals are also 1-0 in the playoffs under Taylor when scoring at least 25.

**Tracking weekly/monthly awards:** Four different Bengals won a total of nine weekly and/or monthly awards given out by the NFL during the 2021 regular season. This year also marked the first time in team history that two Bengals rookies (McPherson and WR Ja'Marr Chase) have won a player of the week award in the same season. Here's a rundown of all the winners:

• K Evan McPherson, Week 1, AFC Special Teams Player of the Week: In what was his NFL debut, the Bengals' rookie fifth-round pick kicked a game-winning 33-yard FG as time expired in OT to give Cincinnati a 27-24 win over Minnesota. At the time, he was 22 years and 53 days old, making him the youngest kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winner in OT. He also was just the second rookie kicker ever to convert a FG as time expired in OT. Earlier in the game, McPherson made his first career NFL field goal, a 53-yarder that counted as the second-longest in the AFC in Week 1.

• QB Joe Burrow, Week 4, AFC Offensive Player of the Week: Burrow threw for 348 yards and two TDs in Cincinnati's Week 4 Thursday Night matchup vs. Jacksonville, while also posting then-career highs in both completion percentage (78.1) and passer rating (132.8) as he helped lead the Bengals to a

comeback win. Burrow led Cincinnati to scores on all four of its second-half possessions (TD, TD, TD, FG), and his 10-play, 73-yard drive late in the fourth quarter bled 5:33 off the clock and set up a game-winning FG as time expired. In the second half alone, Burrow completed 17 of 20 passes (85 percent) for 253 yards and two TDs (152.1 rating).

• WR Ja'Marr Chase, September, NFL Offensive Rookie of the Month: The fifth overall pick in the 2021 draft led all rookies in receiving yardage (220) and TDs (four) in September. He was one of just nine rookies ever to catch at least one TD in each of his first three career games, and was one of just three players ever to catch TDs of at least 25 yards in each of his first three career games. He also was the youngest player (21 years old) with four receiving TDs through his first three career games, edging out Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss' three in three games in 1998. Chase joined QB Andy Dalton (offense, Oct. 2011), LB Odell Thurman (defense, Sept. 2005) and HB Corey Dillon (offense, Dec. 1997) as the only Bengals ever to win NFL rookie of the month (award issued since 1996).

• WR Ja'Marr Chase, Week 7, AFC Offensive Player of the Week: Chase caught eight passes for a Bengals rookie-record 201 receiving yards and a TD in Cincinnati's 41-17 win in Week 7 at Baltimore. His receiving yardage total was the highest in the AFC through seven weeks, and his 82-yard TD in the third quarter was the longest pass play in the AFC through seven weeks. Chase's 754 receiving yards through Week 7 led the AFC and ranked as the most ever by an NFL player through his first seven career games. Chase is the first Bengals rookie WR ever to win AFC Offensive Player of the Week, and the first Bengals rookie (at any position) to win the award since HB Jeremy Hill in 2014. AFC player of the week awards have been issued since 1984.

• K Evan McPherson, Week 11, AFC Special Teams Player of the Week: McPherson made all four of his FG attempts in the Cincinnati's Week 11 win at Las Vegas, and accounted for 14 of the team's 32 points on the day. Three of his FGs were from 50-plus yards (54, 53, 51), which tied a single-game NFL record.

• HB Joe Mixon, Week 12, AFC Offensive Player of the Week: Mixon helped Cincinnati to a 41-10 win over division-rival Pittsburgh by rushing for a career-high 165 yards, the most-ever by a Bengal against the Steelers. He also scored two TDs, and ran his tally of consecutive games with multiple TDs to four, the longest such streak in team history and the longest active streak in the NFL at the time. It was also his eighth straight game with a TD, which tied the third-longest streak in team history (streak ultimately stretched to nine games, tied for second in team history).

• QB Joe Burrow, Week 16, AFC Offensive Player of the Week: In the Bengals' 41-21 win over Baltimore on Dec. 26, Burrow posted career-highs in passing yardage (525), passing TDs (four), passer rating (143.2) and completions (37; tied career-high). Each of those totals led the AFC in Week 16, and his passing yardage total was a team record and the fourth-highest in NFL history. Burrow's 941 combined passing yards against the Ravens in 2021 are the most in NFL history by a single player against an opponent in one regular season. The previous record was 874 yards, held by both San Francisco 49ers QB Joe Montana (1990 vs. the Atlanta Falcons) and Miami Dolphins QB Dan Marino (1988 vs. the N.Y. Jets).

• K Evan McPherson, December, AFC Special Teams Player of the Month: McPherson made nine of his 11 FGs and eight of his nine PATs in December. Two of his December FGs were from 50-plus, including a Bengals-record 58-yarder on Dec. 19 at Denver. McPherson scored 35 points in December — more than one-third of Cincinnati's 101 total points for the month. McPherson is the first rookie kicker to win a Special Teams Player of the Month award since the Chiefs' Harrison Butker (Oct. and Dec. 2017). He's also the fourth Bengal ever to win the award, joining K Josh Brown (Dec. 2012), K Mike Nugent (Sept. 2010), and KR Brandon Bennett (Nov. 2002). AFC Player of the Month Awards have been issued since 1986.

• WR Ja'Marr Chase, Week 17, AFC Offensive Player of the Week: Chase had 11 catches for 266 receiving yards and three TDs (72, 18 and 69 yards) in Cincinnati's 34-31 win over Kansas City on Jan. 2. The victory clinched the AFC North division title for the Bengals. Chase's receiving yardage total was a Bengals single-game record, an NFL rookie record, and the highest in the NFL during the 2021 regular season. Chase, who had 201 receiving yards on Oct. 24 at Baltimore, is the first rookie in NFL history and the fifth player ever to record multiple games with 200-plus receiving yards in a single season — the others were Pro Football Hall of Famers Calvin Johnson (2011 and '12) and Don Maynard (1968), along with Josh Gordon ('13) and Alshon Jeffrey ('13).

**2021 Bengals captains:** Prior to start of the regular season, the Bengals named team captains for 2021 on offense, defense and special teams.

On offense, the captains were second-year QB Joe Burrow, fifth-year HB Joe Mixon and sixth-year WR Tyler Boyd. This is Burrow's second season as a

captain, while Mixon and Boyd are first-time captains.

On defense, the captains are fourth-year S Jessie Bates, fourth-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year S Vonn Bell. It's the first captain nod for both Bates and Hubbard, and the second for Bell, who joined the Bengals in 2020.

The lone captain on special teams is P Kevin Huber, who is the longest-tenured Bengal on the roster at 13 seasons. Huber is 36 years old, while Boyd (27), Bell (27) and Hubbard (26) are the next-oldest captains.

**Bengals' Nebraska connections:** The Bengals have of course drawn attention this season for their many connections to the LSU Tigers, but look closer and you'll find several significant links to another school — the University of Nebraska.

Bengals QB Joe Burrow's father, Jimmy, was a starting safety at Nebraska under Tom Osborne in the mid-1970s, and then later served as an assistant under Huskers head coach Frank Solich from 2000-02. While on Nebraska's staff, Jimmy coached Joe's older brothers, Jamie (MLB) and Dan (S), who helped Nebraska to a berth in the BCS National Championship Game (Rose Bowl) in the 2001 season. Joe was five at the time.

Solich was fired by Nebraska after the 2003 season, but then caught on in '05 as head coach at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. He promptly hired Jimmy Burrow as defensive coordinator, and the Burrow family moved to Athens, where Joe went on to play in high school and win Ohio's Mr. Football award in 2014.

Solich was replaced at Nebraska by Bill Callahan, who served as Huskers head coach from 2004-07. Bill Callahan is the father of Bengals offensive coordinator Brian Callahan, who at the time of his dad's Nebraska hiring was already a walk-on QB at UCLA. In 2005, Bill Callahan's Huskers got a transfer QB from Butler County (Kan.) Community College by the name of Zac Taylor, who went on to play two seasons with the Huskers and win Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year in his senior season of 2006. Taylor was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Joe Burrow grew up a Nebraska fan, but was not offered a scholarship by the Huskers out of high school or after his transfer from Ohio State in 2018.

**Examining Week 1 Bengals since '02:** Here's a look at how Cincinnati's opening-week roster in 2021 stacked up with the Bengals' Week 1 rosters of the last 20 seasons (since 2002). All info is according to the NFL's annual kickoff weekend roster info press release, which compares the height, weight, age and experience of all 32 teams in Week 1.

The 2021 Bengals' average height was 6.18 feet, which tied for the fourth-shortest Week 1 roster Cincinnati has had over the last 20 years. The 2002 team (6.11 feet) was the shortest, while the '16 squad (6.22 feet) was the tallest.

This year's Bengals averaged 248.83 pounds, good for the sixth-heaviest opening-week squad Cincinnati has had over the last 20 years. The 2010 team (251.53) was the heaviest, while the '02 squad (244.6) was the lightest.

The players on the Bengals' 2021 opening-week roster averaged 25.68 years old, good for the third-youngest Week 1 roster Cincinnati has had over the last 20 years. The 2018 squad (25.38) was the youngest, while the '06 team (26.57) was the oldest.

This year's Bengals players averaged 3.81 years of NFL experience, the eighth-fewest by a Cincinnati squad over the last 20 years. The 2004 team (3.57) was the least-experienced, while the '15 squad (4.49) was the most-experienced.

The 2021 Bengals had 11 rookie and first-year players on the roster, tied for sixth-most over the last 20 years. The 2017 Bengals (14) had the most rookies and first-year players, while the '13 team (seven) had the fewest.

This year's Bengals had just five players age 30 or older, the second-fewest by a Cincinnati team over the last 20 years. The 2011 Bengals (two) had the fewest players 30 or older, while the '15 team (11) had the most.

The 2021 Bengals had just eight players 200 pounds or lighter, which tied for the third-fewest over the last 17 years (the league's info in this category goes back only to 2005). The 2017 and '19 Bengals (seven) had the fewest, while the '09 team (13) had the most.

This year's Bengals had nine players listed shorter than six feet, which tied for the fifth-fewest in that category over the last 17 years (the league's info in this category goes back only to 2005). The 2008 Bengals (five) had the fewest players under six feet, while the 2004, '10 and '15 teams (all 11) had the most.

Finally, the 2021 Bengals had 14 players who weighed 300 or more pounds, tied with the '08 team for the most in the last 19 years (league info goes back only to 2003). The 2003, '04 and '17 Bengals (all eight) tied for the fewest.

**Willie Anderson a HOF finalist:** The Pro Football Hall of Fame announced on Dec. 30 that former Bengals OT Willie Anderson was among 15

Modern Era finalists for the class of 2022. Anderson, the 10th overall pick of the Bengals in 1996, was widely considered to be among the top right tackles in football throughout his 12 seasons (1996-2007) in Cincinnati.

"I consider him to be right there as the best right tackle of his generation," Giants Hall-of-Fame pass rusher Michael Strahan told Bengals.com. "When I found out Willie wasn't in the Hall of Fame, I was surprised. Unbeatable."

This is the first appearance on the Hall of Fame ballot for Anderson, who is in his ninth year of eligibility after retiring from football after the 2009 season. Anderson earned three AP All-Pro nods (2004-06), and joined Hall of Famers Dan Dierdorf, Ron Yary and Rayfield Wright as the only right tackles to previously be selected in three straight seasons.

Anderson was dominant as both a run blocker and pass blocker. On the ground, he blocked for HB Corey Dillon's team-record 8061 yards and 28 100-yard games between 1997-2003. He was also a key figure in both of Dillon's record-setting performances — 246 yards for the NFL rookie record in 1997, and 278 yards for the all-time record in 2000. Each of the five best rushing seasons by a Bengal — in terms of yardage — were accomplished with Anderson at RT.

As a pass blocker, he was equally dominant. It's believed that he allowed just one sack in the 15 career games in which he lined up against Hall-of-Fame pass-rushers (and that was to Bruce Smith in the final seconds of a rout in his rookie year in 1996).

"(Anderson) should absolutely be in the discussion," said former Buccaneers and Colts head coach Tony Dungy in an interview with Bengals.com. "Did he dominate his era? Was he one of the guys that you game-planned for? He was a guy who was tough to beat. He was as good as any right tackle in his era. To me, that says he should be in the (finals) discussion."

The Hall of Fame's 49-member selection committee votes for the 2022 class in a Zoom meeting set for mid-January. Up to five finalists can be elected, and all must receive 80 percent of the votes to make the August induction.

**Kickoff weekend roster comparisons:** Early in the 2021 regular season, the NFL released its annual comparison of rosters throughout the league on kickoff weekend. The data includes comparisons of height, weight, experience and age across all 32 NFL rosters on the Week 1 of the season.

Here's a look at the Bengals' opening-week roster data from each of the last five seasons (all info is according to the NFL's annual kickoff weekend roster comparison press release):

**Coin-toss roller coaster:** The Bengals were on both ends of rather improbable coin-toss streaks between late-2020 and mid-2021.

On the good-luck side, the Bengals won 11 straight coin tosses between Game 14 vs. Pittsburgh last season and Game 6 at Detroit this season. That's a span of nine games, but it included two OT contests, and the Bengals won the toss prior to the extra period in both of those. Winning 11 straight coin tosses equates to one in 2048 odds.

Now for the other side of the coin. The Bengals lost five straight coin tosses between Game 7 and Game 11 this season (no OT games), which equates to one in 32 odds. That streak, though, was broken with a coin-toss win in Game 12 vs. the L.A. Chargers.

**Three Bengals hail from Queen City:** The Bengals have three players — DE Sam Hubbard, P Kevin Huber and G Jackson Carman — who grew up in Greater Cincinnati.

Hubbard, a Moeller High School alum and former Ohio State standout, played his third Bengals season, after joining the team as a third-round draft pick (77th overall) in 2018. He is in his third season as a full-time starting DE, and in July signed a contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through 2025.

Huber, an Anderson Township native and alum of McNicholas High School and the University of Cincinnati, was a fifth-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2009. He is the longest-tenured player on the roster and has played in all but two games throughout his career in Cincinnati. He currently stands as the Bengals'

career leader in both gross (45.33) and net (40.27) punting average.

Carman, a rookie, is a native of Fairfield, Ohio, a Cincinnati suburb about 35 minutes north of the city. He attended Fairfield High School before playing at Clemson University for three seasons, and then the Bengals selected him in the second round of the 2021 draft.

**2022 opponents:** The Bengals' home and away opponents for 2022 are set. The full schedule, with dates and kickoff times, will be released this spring.

In addition to their six games against fellow AFC North Division teams, the Bengals and the rest of the AFC North will play against all teams in the AFC East and NFC South divisions.

Cincinnati will also play two games — at home against Kansas City and on the road against Tennessee — that were determined by 2021 standings. As first-place finishers in the AFC North, the Bengals are matched against the first-place teams from the AFC West (Kansas City) and AFC South (Tennessee).

The NFL in 2021 added a 17th game, and in '22 that will be road contest at New Orleans. The additional game is always an interconference matchup, and is based on the prior year's standings on a rotating four-year cycle. These games match a first-place team from one division against a first-place team in an opposite-conference division that the team is not scheduled to play that season. The second-place, third-place and fourth-place teams in each division are matched in the same way each year. The home conference for this game will rotate each season, with the NFC teams hosting the game in 2022.

Here is the list of opponents for 2022:

• HOME: Baltimore-Cleveland-Pittsburgh, plus Atlanta, Buffalo, Carolina, Kansas City and Miami.

• AWAY: Baltimore-Cleveland-Pittsburgh, plus Dallas, New England, New Orleans, N.Y. Jets, Tampa Bay and Tennessee.

**Bengal bites:** WR Tyler Boyd's 56-yard TD catch from QB Joe Burrow on Dec. 19 at Denver was the 2000th TD in Bengals history ... Rookie WR Ja'Marr Chase, Cincinnati's first-round pick in April's draft, is the first player in Bengals history to wear uniform No. 1 ... According to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players' speed by using GPS, S Brandon Wilson's kickoff return for a TD at Baltimore in 2019 (22.03 MPH) stands as the fastest speed by a Bengal ball-carrier since NGS' launch in '16 ... The fastest speed by a Bengals ball-carrier during the 2021 regular season came from WR Ja'Marr Chase, who reached 21.74 MPH on a 72-yard TD reception on Jan. 2, 2022 vs. Kansas City; Chase reached 21.66 MPH on a 57-yard catch in Cincinnati's Divisional Playoff win at Tennessee, which marked the fastest speed by any NFL player on a reception in the postseason since 2016 ... The longest-tenured player on the roster in 2021 is P Kevin Huber, a 13th-year pro who joined the Bengals as a fifth-round pick in 2009 ... The oldest Bengal on the roster is LS Clark Harris, who is 37 (born July 10, 1984) ... The youngest Bengal is WR Ja'Marr Chase, who is 21 (born March 1, 2000) ... The lightest Bengal on the roster is CB Mike Hilton, who is 184 pounds ... The heaviest Bengal is DT Tyler Shelvin, who is 350 pounds ... The tallest Bengal is OT Isaiah Prince, who is 6-7 ... The shortest Bengal on the roster is CB Mike Hilton, who is 5-9 ... The Bengals have two persons with the name of Michael Thomas on the active roster — No. 80 WR Mike D. Thomas (goes by "Mike"; middle name is Davonta), and No. 31 S Michael J. Thomas (goes by "Michael"; has two middle names, "Jacob James").

## POSITION BY POSITION

**Quarterbacks:** Second-year pro **Joe Burrow** has returned to action this season, after his rookie campaign was limited to just 10 games due to a left knee injury. Burrow during the regular season completed 366 of 520 pass attempts for 4611 yards (sixth in the NFL), 34 TDs (eighth in the NFL) and 14 INTs. Burrow led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and yards per attempt (8.87), and ranked second in passer rating (108.3). In Cincinnati's Game 1 overtime win vs. Minnesota, his first game back since the injury, he posted then-career highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.6) — he re-set each of those marks multiple times throughout the year. In Game 15 vs. Baltimore, Burrow passed for a Bengals-record 525 yards (fourth-most in NFL history) and four TDs, and posted a 143.2 passer rating. Burrow had passed for 416 yards (and three TDs) at Baltimore on Oct. 24, so that gave him a combined 941 passing yards against the Ravens in 2021, good for the most-ever by a QB against a single opponent during the regular season (see "Burrow's big days vs. Ravens" on page 7). Burrow followed his performance against Baltimore with 426 passing yards and another four TDs in Cincinnati's division-clinching win over Kansas City in Week 17. Burrow's 971 combined passing yards in Weeks 16-17 were the second-most ever by a QB in consecutive games (Dak Prescott, 974 yards in 2020), and it made him the first QB in NFL history with at least 400 yards, four TDs and no INTs in consecutive games. Burrow passed for 300 or more yards in a team-record six games during the 2021 regular season (plus one more in the playoffs), and he has 12 such games for his career (including playoffs). Burrow had three 400-plus games in 2021, and he has four for his career. Burrow posted a passer rating of 100 or better in 10 games during the 2021 regular season (plus one more during the playoffs), and he has 14 such games for his career (including playoffs). Burrow was medically cleared in time to take the first snap of training camp on July 28, and in Game 1 this season he followed through on a vow he made shortly after his injury that he would start the 2021 regular-season opener. Listed second on the depth chart is veteran **Brandon Allen**, who started in Burrow's absence late in 2020. Allen played in six games in 2021, including one start for Burrow in the regular-season finale at Cleveland while Cincinnati rested most of its starters. Allen joined the Bengals in August of 2020, and began that season on the practice squad as the team's "quarantine QB" that was kept away from the rest of the QBs at practice/meetings in case they could not play due to COVID-19.

**Running backs:** Leading the Bengals' running back room is fifth-year pro **Joe Mixon**, who returned to action in 2021 after his '20 campaign was limited to just six games due to a right foot injury. Mixon in 2021 had perhaps his best pro season yet, and posted career-highs in rushing yards (1205), rushing TDs (13) and rushing attempts (292). His rushing yardage total ranked third in NFL, his rushing TDs total was fourth, and his rushing attempts total was third. Mixon also caught 42 passes for 314 yards and three TDs during the regular season. Mixon's 16 total TDs this season tied for second-most ever by a Bengal, and fell just one shy of WR Carl Pickens' team-record 17, set in 1995. Mixon's 13

rushing TDs were also just two shy of Ickey Woods' team-record 15, set in 1988 (see "Mixon falls shy of Pick and Ickey" on page 9). Mixon had three 100-yard rushing games during the 2021 regular season, and he has 13 for his career. Mixon also had six games with at least 100 yards from scrimmage during the 2021 regular season (plus one more in the playoffs), which now gives him 23 such games for his career (including playoffs). Mixon in 2021 eclipsed 1000 rushing yards for the third time in his career; he also hit the mark in both 2018 and '19, before his foot injury in '20 prevented him from making it three seasons in a row. Mixon signed a contract extension in 2020 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the '24 season. Fifth-year pro **Samaje Perine**, who also shared a backfield with Mixon in college at Oklahoma, is in his third Bengals season after beginning his career with Washington. During the regular season, Perine had 55 carries for 246 yards and one TD, and 27 catches for 196 yards and one TD. At 5-11, 240 pounds, Perine brings size and a physical rushing style, and he's also used extensively on special teams. The third running back on Cincinnati's active roster is **Chris Evans**, a rookie sixth-round pick out of the University of Michigan. Evans is known for his receiving ability out of the backfield, and during the regular season had 15 catches for 151 yards and two TDs, along with 17 carries for 77 yards. Bengals coaches say they first took notice of Evans' route-running and hands during receiving drills at 2021 Senior Bowl practices. **Trayveon Williams**, a sixth-round pick by Cincinnati in the 2019 draft, was singled from the practice squad to the active roster on Dec. 4. Williams played in five games during the 2021 regular season, including two earlier in the year as a standard elevation from the practice squad.

**Wide receivers:** The newest addition to the Bengals' offense this season is first-round draft pick **Ja'Marr Chase**, who brings previous experience with Joe Burrow from their time together in college at LSU. Chase was one of Cincinnati's top performers during the regular season, and led the team in all three receiving categories — 81 catches, 1455 receiving yards and 13 receiving TDs. All three of those totals are Bengals rookie records (see "Chase gathers Bengals rookie records" on page 8). His receiving yardage total was an NFL rookie record for the Super Bowl Era (see "Chase tops LSU teammate Jefferson" on page 9) and the most in team history, topping Chad Johnson (1440). Chase led all NFL rookies this season in receiving yards (fourth leaguewide) and receiving TDs (third leaguewide). Chase provided Cincinnati's offense with a downfield threat, and finished the regular season fourth leaguewide in catches of 40 or more yards (eight). In Game 1 vs. Minnesota, his NFL debut, Chase became the youngest (21 years, 195 days) Bengal ever to post 100 receiving yards, the third-youngest Bengal ever to score a TD, and his 50-yard TD catch at the end of the first half was the longest TD of any kind by a Bengal rookie in their NFL debut. In Game 7 at Baltimore, Chase posted what at the time was a Bengals rookie-record 201 receiving yards and became the second-youngest player in NFL history to record at least 200 receiving yards in a single game. Chase then topped that performance in Game 16 vs. Kansas City, with 266



receiving yards — the most in team history and most-ever by a rookie (see “Uno shattered records vs. Chiefs” on page 8). Chase has eclipsed the 100-yard receiving mark in each of his first two postseason games, making him the first rookie ever with multiple 100-yard games in the playoffs. With Burrow as his QB in 2019 at LSU, Chase set single-season SEC records for receiving yards (1780) and TDs (20), and won the prestigious Biletnikoff Award as college football’s top receiver. Chase was assigned uniform No. 1, and is the first player in Bengals history to wear that number. Considered one of the top slot receivers in football, 27-year-old **Tyler Boyd** is the veteran among a young group of Bengals receivers. During the regular season, Boyd had 67 catches for 828 yards and five TDs. Boyd led the team in catches each season from 2018-20, and stands as one of six Bengals ever to top 1000 receiving yards in consecutive seasons (‘18-19). Boyd had one 100-yard game during the 2021 regular season (Sept. 30 vs. Jacksonville), and has 10 for his career. Boyd also has five career games with at least 10 catches. Boyd, a 2016 second-round pick, signed a contract extension in 2019 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the ‘23 season. One of the most promising and productive young players on the roster is second-year pro **Tee Higgins**, a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020. During the regular season, Higgins had 74 catches for 1091 yards and six TDs, despite missing three games (two early in the season with a shoulder injury, and rested during the regular-season finale). Higgins had four 100-yard receiving games in 2021, and now has six for his career. Higgins was particularly productive late in the regular season, and posted four 100-yard performances in his final six games. That included Game 15 vs Baltimore, when he put up career-highs in receptions (12) and receiving yards (194), and scored two TDs. Higgins brings considerable size (6-4, 216) to the receiving corps, and coaches credited him early in 2021 for transforming his body over the offseason to get stronger. Sixth-year pro **Mike D. Thomas** (not to be confused with Bengals S Michael J. Thomas) adds value as a speedy rotational receiver, as well as on special teams. Thomas joined the Bengals in 2020 but spent his first four NFL seasons with the L.A. Rams, where in ‘17 his assistant WRs coach was Zac Taylor. Third-year pro **Stanley Morgan**, a 2019 college free agent signee of the Bengals, also adds depth at receiver and excels particularly as a blocker. Morgan also serves as one of Cincinnati’s primary gunners on special teams, and has even seen action at KOR. Rounding out the receivers room is first-year pro **Trenton Irwin**, who has bounced between the active roster and practice squad in each of his three Bengals seasons. Irwin adds depth at slot WR and PR.

**Tight ends:** **C.J. Uzomah**, a 2015 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, returned to action in 2021 after suffering a season-ending right Achilles injury in the second game of 2020. Uzomah in 2021 had the most productive season of his career, and set new highs in catches (49), receiving yards (493) and TDs (five). Uzomah also was a key figure in some of Cincinnati’s most important non-scoring plays of the regular season. In Cincinnati’s overtime win over Minnesota in the season-opener, his first game back since the injury, Uzomah caught a 32-yard pass on fourth-and-inches in OT to help set up a game-winning FG as time expired three plays later. And in Game 4 vs. Jacksonville, Uzomah caught a career-high two TDs (since matched), and then with the game tied late, he took a jailbreak screen 25 yards deep into Jaguars territory to help set up the game-winning FG. In Game 7 at Baltimore, Uzomah had 91 yards receiving and caught TDs of 55 and 32 yards. **Drew Sample**, a 2019 second-round pick of the Bengals, is known as complete tight end with both receiving and blocking ability. Bengals coaches have called him one of the best blocking TEs in the league. Also considered a complete TE prospect is **Mitchell Wilcox**, a 2020 college free agent signee of the Bengals. Wilcox left college at USF in 2019 with every single-season and career receiving record for a TE, and also helped block for three different 1000-yard rushers.

**Offensive linemen:** Now in his second season as Cincinnati’s starting LOT is 2019 first-round pick **Jonah Williams**, who started all but one game (rested in season finale at Cleveland) during the 2021 regular season after being limited by injuries to just 10 games in his first two years as a pro. Williams missed his entire rookie season due to a shoulder injury, and then was limited by a right knee injury to 10 games in 2020. Cincinnati’s starting C since 2019 has been **Trey Hopkins**, who originally was a college free agent signee of the Bengals in ‘14. Hopkins battled injuries and bounced between the practice squad and roster for his first three seasons, before settling into a regular role and gaining starting experience at all three interior OL spots. Hopkins suffered a torn left ACL in last season’s finale, but he was medically cleared in time to participate in the first practice of training camp on July 28. Hopkins started all but two games this year — Game 12 vs. L.A. Chargers (ankle) and Game 17 at Cleveland (Reserve/COVID). Cincinnati’s starter at LG is seventh-year pro **Quinton Spain**, who stands at a massive 6-4, 330 pounds. Undrafted out of

college in 2015, Spain began his career with the Titans and Bills before joining the Bengals on waivers mid-season in 2020. Spain has remained at LG this year, but in 2020 after joining Cincinnati mid-season he made starts at RG, LG and even ROT when the line was dealing with injuries and COVID-19 issues. **Hakeem Adeniji**, a sixth-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, took over mid-season as the starter at RG and earned praise from coaches for his consistent play. Adeniji spent the first eight games of the 2021 regular season on Reserve/Non-Football Injury (pectoral), but jumped into the starting lineup immediately upon returning in Game 9 vs. Cleveland. Adeniji was drafted as an OT, and played OT in college and as a rookie, so the 2021 season was his first-ever at G. At ROT is **Isaiah Prince**, the tallest Bengal on the roster (6-7). Prince, who returned to action in 2021 after opting out of the ‘20 season due to COVID-19, began the season as a reserve before taking over the starting ROT position after **Riley Reiff** suffered an ankle injury (Zac Taylor has said Reiff will not return during the playoffs). Prince originally was a sixth-round draft pick of the Dolphins in 2019, and then joined the Bengals on waivers later that year. Rookie G **Jackson Carman**, Cincinnati’s second-round pick in April’s draft, was Cincinnati’s No. 1 RG early in the regular season, but moved to a reserve role later in the year. Carman has since seen action as an injury replacement, and took over for the injured Spain in Games 16-17. Another key reserve along the interior of the line is rookie C **Trey Hill**, who is touted as a stout blocker with good movement skills. Hill has three starts this season as an injury replacement. Adding depth at OT are third-year pro **Fred Johnson** and rookie **D’Ante Smith**. Johnson has starts at both OT and G during his now three-year career in Cincinnati, but he has worked mostly at OT this season and has filled in at ROT as an injury replacement. He primarily has been a reserve at OT in his career, but the Bengals are a combined 5-1 throughout his career when he has filled in as a starter at either OT spot. Smith played in three regular-season games with one start at LOT in the season finale.

**Defensive linemen:** Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller graduate **Sam Hubbard** is in his fourth Bengals season, including his third as a full-time starter, and is considered the leader of the defensive line. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard had 7.5 sacks (second on team) during the regular season, and his 24 career sacks are second-most among players from his draft class (including college free agents). Hubbard is also considered among the best DEs in the NFL against the run. Hubbard signed a contract extension in July that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. At the LDE is **Trey Hendrickson**, one of Cincinnati’s most high-profile additions from free agency in March. Hendrickson posted a team-high 14 sacks during the regular season — fifth in the NFL in 2021, and second-most in team history. Hendrickson’s 14 sacks more than doubled last season’s team lead of 5.5. Hendrickson during the regular season. Hendrickson during the regular season also recorded at least a half sack in 11 straight games (Games 5-15) — the longest such streak in Bengals history, the longest streak in the NFL in 2021, and tied for the second-longest streak in NFL history (see “Trey’s sack streak ends at 11” on page 10). Hendrickson spent 2017-20 with New Orleans, and 13.5 sacks in 2020 tied for the NFC lead and tied for second in the NFL. Hendrickson’s 27.5 combined sacks between 2020 and ‘21 were third-most among all players. Last year’s high-profile addition in free agency was DT **D.J. Reader**, a 6-3, 347-pound nose tackle who excels against the run. Reader was limited to just five games last season due to a left quad injury, but he returned healthy this year and had two sacks during the regular season. Reader was the team’s 2021 winner of the Ed Block Courage Award. Reader’s only missed action during the regular season came in Game 15 vs. Baltimore, when he was on Reserve/COVID-19, and in the season finale at Cleveland (rest). Recent injuries at DT have thrust **B.J. Hill** into the starting three-technique role. Hill, who was acquired in an Aug. 30 trade with the N.Y. Giants, had 5.5 sacks during the regular season and has one so far in the playoffs. Hill stands 6-3, 311 pounds, and has played in all but one game (Week 18 at Cleveland, Reserve/COVID-19) over his four-year career. Back in the lineup this season is 6-3, 345-pound DT **Josh Tupou**, who opted out of last season due to COVID-19. Tupou was a college free agent signee of the Bengals in 2017, and has worked his way into the regular defensive rotation as a reliable run-stuffer. Tupou, though, suffered a right knee injury in the season finale at Cleveland and missed the Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas. Due to injury issues on the interior of the defensive line, Cincinnati signed 334-pound DT **Zach Kerr** from the Arizona Cardinals’ practice squad on ahead of the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee. Kerr, though, isn’t short on experience, and brings with him 95 career regular-season games played (16 starts) over eight NFL seasons. DE **Khalid Kareem**, a Bengals fifth-round pick in 2020, spent the first seven games of the 2021 regular season on Reserve/Injured (shoulder) before returning to action and sliding into a rotational DE role. Kareem made one of the top defensive plays of the year in Game 14 at Denver, when he crashed into the backfield and wrestled the ball away from

Broncos QB Drew Lock at the Bengals' nine-yard line, as the Broncos were nearing what would've been a go-ahead TD in the fourth quarter. In the fourth round of April's draft, the Bengals selected Tulane DE **Cam Sample**, who saw rotational action during the regular season and had 1.5 sacks. Sample suffered a hamstring injury on Dec. 26 vs. Baltimore and missed the final two regular-season games, but he returned for the Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas. Sample was rated the most valuable defensive lineman in college football last season by Pro Football Focus in 2020, and Bengals coaches say that he caught their eye during the 2021 Senior Bowl, where he earned Defensive MVP honors. Later in the fourth round, the Bengals selected 6-2, 350-pound DT **Tyler Shelvin**, a space-eater with a rare blend of strength and athleticism. Shelvin was a key player on LSU's defense during their national championship run in 2019, but he opted out of the '20 college season due to COVID-19. With veterans Reader and Tupou in the top two NT spots on the depth chart, Shelvin played in just three regular-season games in 2021. Adding depth at DE is second-year pro **Wyatt Ray**, who was acquired on waivers from Tennessee on Sept. 1. Ray originally was a college free agent signee of the Cleveland Browns in 2019, and has also spent time with Houston, Buffalo, the N.Y. Jets and Tennessee.

**Linebackers:** Among Cincinnati's most promising young defenders is second-year pro **Logan Wilson**, who wears the green dot as the defense's communicator. Wilson missed Games 12-15 with a right shoulder injury (suffered Dec. 5 vs. the L.A. Chargers), and then was inactive (rest) for the regular season finale at Cleveland, but he still finished as the team's leader in both tackles (98) and INTs (four). His INT total tied for the most among all NFL linebackers during the regular season. The last Bengals LB with three or more INTs in a season was Odell Thurman (five) in 2005. Wilson continued his strong play in the playoffs, and made two critical plays in Cincinnati's Divisional Playoff win at Tennessee — he tackled RB Derrick Henry for a two-yard loss on a fourth-and-one in the fourth quarter while the game was tied at 16, and then he intercepted a Ryan Tannehill pass with 20 seconds remaining that set the table for the offense to gain 19 yards and set up a game-winning FG from 52 yards. Wilson was Cincinnati's third-round draft pick in 2020. Cincinnati's third-round pick a year earlier was **Germaine Pratt**, who has grown into a key starter on defense after being considered a raw prospect early in his pro career. Pratt switched from S to LB late in his college career, but earned a starting LB spot with the Bengals midway through his rookie season in 2019. Pratt during the regular season totaled 88 tackles (tied for third on the team), including five for losses and a half sack, along with an INT, two PDs, two FFs and two FRs. Pratt missed Game 16 vs. Kansas City while on Reserve/COVID-19, and then sat out the season finale at Cleveland (rest). In Cincinnati's season-opening win vs. Minnesota, Pratt made the defensive play of the game late in overtime when he forced and recovered a fumble by Vikings RB Dalvin Cook; the play thwarted Minnesota's potential game-winning drive, which had reached the Bengals' 38-yard line, and set up a Cincinnati drive that ended with a game-winning FG as time expired in OT. Pratt has drawn particular praise from coaches this season for his grasp of the defense, and took over the "green dot" on defense while Wilson was out injured late in the regular season. Pratt had the most productive game of his career in Game 14 at Denver, when he recorded a career-high 15 tackles (most by a Bengal since 2018) and a half sack. Then, in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, Pratt intercepted a Derek Carr pass on fourth-and-goal late in the fourth quarter that sealed a Cincinnati win. Second-year pro **Markus Bailey**, a 2020 seventh-round pick of the Bengals, was a rotational player when healthy earlier in the season, but late in the year he took on an increased role due to injury issues at LB. Bailey, who has earned the nickname "The Waterboy" from teammates for his all-out playing style, saw more time on defense in 2021 after gradually working his way back from a serious college knee injury during his rookie season. To help with their injury and COVID-19 issues, the Bengals added to their LB room over their bye (Week 10) by acquiring second-year pro **Clay Johnston** on waivers from Carolina. The 6-1, 232-pound Johnston was a seventh-round pick of the Rams in 2020, and has been used mainly on special teams by the Bengals. Another addition due to injuries at LB is first-year pro **Keandre Jones**, who was signed to the roster on Dec. 21. Jones opened the season on Cincinnati's practice squad, played in two games as a standard elevation, and then was signed to the active roster prior to Cincinnati's Week 16 game vs. Baltimore.

**Defensive backs:** S **Jessie Bates III**, a fourth-year pro and 2018 Bengals second-round pick, is a team captain and is considered one of the core leaders of the team. Bates during the regular season had 88 tackles (tied for third on team), along with an INT (65-yard return) and a FR (46-yard return). Bates earned a starting S spot in training camp as a rookie and started the first 51 games of his career — that's three seasons plus three games — until a neck

injury broke the streak and held him out of Cincinnati's Sept. 30 matchup vs. Jacksonville. Bates, though, returned to the lineup the following week and hasn't missed a game since. Bates topped 100 tackles in each of his first three seasons (2018-20). Next to Bates at S is sixth-year pro **Vonn Bell**, who joined the Bengals in 2020 after spending his first four years with New Orleans. Bell, a team captain in both of his Bengals seasons, finished the 2021 regular season with 97 tackles (second on team), including five for losses and a half sack. Bell led the defense in snaps in each of his first two Bengals seasons, and played a combined 94.5 percent of the regular-season snaps. Depth at CB was a primary focus for the Bengals in 2020 free agency, as the team brought in an influx of reinforcements at the position. The most high-profile of those additions was **Chidobe Awuzie**, a former second-round pick of the Cowboys who spent his first four seasons in Dallas. Awuzie, who signed as an unrestricted free agent and is under contract through the 2023 season, has impressed with his coverage and tackling ability this season, and finished the regular season with 64 tackles, 14 PDs and two INTs. Awuzie missed Game 4 vs. Jacksonville due to a groin injury, battled a foot injury midway through the season (though it did not cause him to miss a start), was on Reserve/COVID-19 for Game 14 at Denver, and then DNP in the season finale at Cleveland (rest). The second free agency addition was **Mike Hilton**, who is widely considered among the top slot CBs in the NFL. Hilton, who is under contract through the 2024 season, is among the smallest players on the roster at 5-9, 184 pounds, but he is known as a sure tackler and outstanding blitz. Hilton had a 24-yard pick-six in Game 11 vs. Pittsburgh, his former team, and he said it was first-career pick-six at any level dating back to pee-wee football. Another veteran CB addition is **Eli Apple**, a former first-round pick of the Giants. Apple brings familiarity with Bell, whom he played alongside in college at Ohio State, as well as with defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo, who was his position coach with the Giants in 2018. Injuries in the Bengals' defensive backfield thrust Apple into a starting role early in the year, and he ended up starting all but two games during the regular season and had two INTs. One of the headliners of the 2020 free agency class was CB **Trae Waynes**, who has struggled with injuries throughout his two Bengals seasons. Waynes missed the entire 2020 season with a pectoral injury suffered early in training camp, and during the 2021 regular season he spent eight games on Reserve/Injured with a hamstring injury before returning in Game 14 at Denver. Waynes also missed Game 16 vs. Kansas City while on Reserve/COVID-19. The most physically imposing member of the secondary is 6-3, 203-pound CB **Tre Flowers**, who joined Cincinnati on waivers from Seattle in October. Flowers has filled a rotational role for the Bengals, and mostly has been used to cover TEs in passing situations. Another mid-season addition in the mix is CB **Vernon Hargreaves III**, whom the Bengals acquired on waivers from Houston on Nov. 4. Hargreaves was a first-round pick of the Buccaneers in 2016, and adds depth and experience in the secondary. Yet another mid-season acquisition is veteran S **Michael J. Thomas** (not to be confused with WR Mike D. Thomas), who originally was a college free agent signee of the 49ers back in 2012, and has 107 games (including playoffs) of NFL experience with five teams (including Cincinnati). Thomas is known for his impact on special teams, and has either led or finished second on his team in special teams tackles in six of the last eight seasons (outliers were injury shortened 2020 season, and '21 when he joined Cincinnati mid-season). S **Ricardo Allen** adds another veteran presence. A former starter for the Atlanta Falcons, Allen fills a key reserve roll with the Bengals. CB **Jalen Davis** also fills a rotational role on defense this season, and has been a valuable special teams contributor. The 5-10, 185-pound Davis joined the Bengals in mid-2020 and was thrust into action quickly while the team dealt with a wave of injuries and COVID-19 issues. Davis missed the final two regular-season games with an ankle injury, however head coach Zac Taylor left open the possibility of him returning for the playoffs.

**Special teams:** Cincinnati native and the longest-tenured player on the roster **Kevin Huber** is handling the Bengals' punting duties for the 13th consecutive season. Huber, a graduate of Archbishop McNicholas High School and the University of Cincinnati, originally was a fifth-round pick of his hometown Bengals in 2009. In the season finale at Cleveland, Huber tied CB Ken Riley for most career games played (207) in Bengals history. Huber averaged 46.4 gross yards and 41.05 net yards on punts during the 2021 regular season. Huber is considered the top punter in team history and stands as the Bengals' career leader in every significant punting category, including punts (980), punting yards (44,426), gross average (45.33), net average (40.27) and inside-20 punts (337). Huber was a Pro Bowl selection in 2014, but he has maintained a high level of play and in 2020 posted career-highs in both gross (47.2) and net (42.8) average. The oldest Bengal on the roster is LS **Clark Harris** (37 years old), who joined the Bengals early in 2009 and has snapped to Huber nearly his entire career. Harris has been a paragon of reliability for Cincinnati, and has never had an unplayable snap in 1866 career attempts (984 punts, 880 placekicks) as a

Bengal — including playoffs. Harris, a Pro Bowler in 2017, has played in 201 career regular-season games as a Bengal, third most in franchise history. Among the youngest players on the roster is 21-year-old rookie K **Evan McPherson**, whom the Bengals selected in the fifth round of April's draft. McPherson made a significant impact in 2021, and has made four game-winning "walk-off" kicks with no time remaining — three during the regular season, one in the playoffs. The first came in overtime of Game 1 vs. Minnesota — his NFL debut — when he nailed a 33-yarder. The second was in Game 4 vs. Jacksonville on Thursday Night Football, and came from 35 yards out as time expired in regulation. The third was a 20-yarder in Game 16 vs. Kansas City, which clinched the AFC North division title and secured a playoff berth for the first time since 2015. The fourth was a 52-yarder in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee that sent Cincinnati to the AFC Championship. McPherson said that entering this season, he had never kicked a game-winning FG at any level of football. McPherson was particularly effective from long range, and during the regular season netted nine field goals of at least 50 yards — the most-ever by a

Bengal in a season, the most in the NFL during the regular season and just one short of the NFL's single-season record (see "McPherson from deep" on page 12). In Cincinnati's Game 10 win at Las Vegas, McPherson made four FGs, including an NFL-record tying three from 50-plus yards (54, 53, 51). And then in Game 14 at Denver, he made a 58 yard field goal — the longest in Bengals history. McPherson made 46 of 48 PATs and 28 of 33 FGs during the regular season. In Cincinnati's Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas, McPherson made all six of his placekicks — four FGs, two PATs — and set the team postseason record for points in a game (14). McPherson followed that in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee with another four FGs, including two from 50-plus. One of those was the aforementioned 52-yard game-winner. The Bengals have used a rotation of players at PR, but late in the year WR **Trent Taylor** (practice squad) took over full-time duties. The Bengals also used a rotation at KOR after S Brandon Wilson suffered a season-ending injury in November, with Taylor and HB **Chris Evans** seeing most of the action late in the season. The Bengals also feature a number of experienced players in kick and punt coverage, including HB **Samaje Perine**, S **Michael J. Thomas**, WR **Stanley Morgan** and WR **Mike D. Thomas**.

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# 2021 GAME SUMMARIES

## WEEK 1, GAME 1

### Cincinnati Bengals 27, Minnesota Vikings 24 (OT) Sunday, Sept. 12, 2021 at Paul Brown Stadium

Bengals QB Joe Burrow, who was less than 10 months removed from a left knee injury that ended his rookie season, showed few signs of rust, posting career-highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.67). HB Joe Mixon, whose 2020 season also ended early due to injury, rushed for 127 yards and a TD on 29 carries. Rookie WR Ja'Marr Chase impressed in his NFL debut with five catches for 101 yards, including a 50-yard TD. Minnesota closed a 14-point second-half deficit and sent the game to OT with a 53-yard FG at the end of regulation. Late in OT, LB Germaine Pratt forced and recovered a fumble by Vikings RB Dalvin Cook, setting up a seven-play, 46-yard drive that was highlighted by a 32-yard pass from Burrow to TE C.J. Uzomah on fourth-and-inches. Rookie K Evan McPherson, making his NFL debut, then nailed a 33-yard FG as time expired to give Cincinnati the win. The game was the first in NFL history with a game-tying FG with no time left in regulation, and a game-winning FG with no time left in OT. Cincinnati moved to 1-0, and Minnesota dropped to 0-1.

## WEEK 2, GAME 2

### Chicago Bears 20, Cincinnati Bengals 17 Sunday, Sept. 19, 2021 at Soldier Field

The visiting Bengals allowed the fewest total yards (206) by a Cincinnati defense in seven years, but the offense struggled to protect the football and find the scoreboard. Bengals QB Joe Burrow threw three INTs — including a pick-six — on consecutive attempts in the fourth quarter, helping the Bears to a comfortable 17-point margin late. But Burrow connected with rookie WR Ja'Marr Chase for a 42-yard score with 4:39 remaining, and then an INT by Bengals LB Logan Wilson on the ensuing possession set up a seven-yard TD from Burrow to WR Tee Higgins on the next play to cut the margin to just three. Burrow was the first NFL player in 20 years with INTs on three consecutive plays and TD passes on two consecutive plays in the same game (Steelers QB Kordell Stewart on Dec. 30, 2001 at Cincinnati). The Bengals' comeback bid fell short though, as Bears rookie QB Justin Fields, who was filling in for injured starter Andy Dalton, led Chicago to two first downs as the Bears ran out the clock and hung on for a 20-17 win. Cincinnati dropped to 1-1, while Chicago improved to 1-1.

WEEK 3, GAME 3

Cincinnati Bengals 24, Pittsburgh Steelers 10
Sunday, Sept. 26, 2021 at Heinz Field

The Steelers were without numerous starters due to injury, including All-Pro OLB T.J. Watt, and the Bengals took full advantage. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 77.8 percent of his passes, tossed three TDs to just one INT, and posted a 122.9 passer rating. He averaged 9.6 yards per attempt through the air, while HB Joe Mixon averaged 5.0 yards per carry on the ground. Rookie Ja'Marr Chase scored two TDs, including a 34-yarder down the sideline before the half to give Cincinnati the lead for good. The Bengals also held the Steelers without a sack, breaking Pittsburgh's NFL-record streak of 75 straight games with a sack. Uzomah, who ran it for 25 yards to the Jacksonville 21-yard line. That play set up a 35-yard, game-winning FG by K Evan McPherson two plays later. At halftime of the game, the Bengals inducted four people as part of their inaugural Ring of Honor class — founder/GM/head coach Paul Brown, OT Anthony Munoz, QB Ken Anderson and CB Ben Riley. The Bengals added a FG and TD in the second half to keep the game close, but the Browns recovered an onside kick just before the two-minute warning and drained the remaining clock to hold on for the win. Cleveland ended its season 8-9, while Cincinnati finished 10-7 and secured the No. 4 seed in the AFC playoffs.

In front of the largest home crowd in team history, the Bengals snapped an eight-game playoff losing streak and 31-year drought without a postseason win. The Raiders scored an opening-drive FG, but Cincinnati countered with a 75-yard TD drive and never trailed again. The Bengals lost three key defensive linemen to injuries — DT Larry Ogunjobi (foot), DE Trey Hendrickson (concussion) and DT Mike Daniels (groin) — but the defense still managed to hold the Raiders to just one TD. Las Vegas had little trouble moving the ball — QB Derek Carr passed for 310 yards and RB Josh Jacobs averaged 6.4 yards per carry — but the Raiders scored just one TD in five red-zone trips. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 70.4 percent of his passes, tossed two TDs and posted a 110.4 rating. Trailing by seven points late, Las Vegas staged a near comeback and drove to the Cincinnati nine-yard line with 30 seconds left. But three plays later, on fourth-and-goal from the nine, Bengals LB Germaine Pratt intercepted a pass over the middle to seal a win.

Rookie K Evan McPherson booted a 52-yard FG as time expired to give Cincinnati its first-ever road playoff win and send the No. 4 seed Bengals to their first AFC Championship game in 33 years. The game began with an INT by S Jessie Bates on the first play from scrimmage — it was the first of three INTs thrown by Titans QB Ryan Tannehill. Cincinnati reached the end zone just once, but McPherson made all five of his placekicks (four FGs, one PAT) — including two 50-plus yard FGs — in below-freezing temperatures. The Bengals' offensive line struggled in pass protection, as Burrow was sacked nine times — the most takedowns of a winning QB in NFL postseason history. Titans star RB Derrick Henry, who was playing in his first game since Halloween (foot injury), averaged just 3.1 yards on 20 carries, and the Titans converted just one third down on the afternoon. With the game tied at 16 at the two-minute warning, Tennessee began a drive for a potential game-winning FG. But CB Eli Apple batted a Tannehill pass, and LB Logan Wilson intercepted it with 20 seconds remaining. Burrow quickly hit WR Ja'Marr Chase on a 19-yard pass to set up McPherson's game-winner.
