### GAME NOTES

**Kickoff:** 8:15 p.m. Eastern.

**Television:** The game will air nationally on ESPN-TV. In the Cincinnati market, the ESPN broadcast also will be simulcast on WCPO-TV (Channel 9). Broadcasters are Joe Buck (play-by-play), Troy Aikman (analyst) and Lisa Salters (sideline analyst).

**Radio:** The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

The game also will air nationally on Westwood One Radio. Broadcasters are Kevin Harlan (play-by-play) and Kurt Warner (analyst).

**Setting the scene:** The Bengals look to get their first divisional win of the season when they travel to Cleveland for a Monday Night Football showdown with the Browns at FirstEnergy Stadium. Cincinnati has won four of its last five games and enters at 4-3, while Cleveland at 2-5 is looking to snap a four-game losing skid.

The Bengals are coming off a dominant 35-17 home win over Atlanta in Week 7 that featured complementary football throughout the game. Offensively, QB Joe Burrow led a unit that posted 537 net yards and scored a TD on each of its first four possessions to build a commanding early lead. Burrow completed 34 of 42 passes for 481 yards and three TDs for a passer rating of 138.2, and added another score on a one-yard QB sneak to extend the lead in the third quarter. The Bengals' defense, meanwhile, allowed just 214 yards and forced the Falcons to punt on each of their four drives in the second half, extending their streak to seven consecutive games without allowing a TD after halftime.

"I would say that," said Burrow when asked if he is playing his best football of the season. "I'm feeling comfortable. We're getting the timing down, we're starting to find a rhythm as an offense. Then, the defense is going to continue to do what the defense does. I think we're finding our stride."

Cincinnati's passing attack was nearly unstoppable and featured each of Burrow's top three targets — WRs Tyler Boyd, Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins. Boyd set a career high with 155 receiving yards on eight catches, including a 60-yard TD just two minutes into the first quarter that offered a preview of what was to come. Chase had eight grabs of his own for 130 yards, with two TD catches in the second quarter that showed off his unique skill set. The first saw him beat man-to-man coverage down the right sideline and haul in a 32-yard pass from Burrow near the front-right pylon. He used his explosive speed on the second score, turning a back-shoulder catch near the left sideline into a 41-yard TD as he accelerated past two defensive backs. Higgins had five receptions for 93 yards, highlighted by a 25-yard catch at the goal line that led to Burrow's one-yard sneak on the following play.

"We've really gotten back to the basics of our pass game," head coach Zac Taylor said. "Just some core bread and butter stuff that allows the ball to be spread around. They're trying to help on Ja'Marr and Tee on the outsides, and so it just opens it up for guys like Hayden (Hurst) and TB (Tyler Boyd)."

Burrow put himself in some elite company following his performance. He became just the third player in NFL history to record at least 475 passing yards, three TD passes and one rushing TD in a single game, and his five career games of 400 or more passing yards surpassed Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino for the most by any player in his first three seasons. The former No. 1 overall pick has strung together several high-level performances, completing 71.3 percent of his passes with 12 TDs to just one INT over the last five games.

Much of Burrow's success as of late has coincided with a shift in the team's offensive identity, as the Bengals have operated primarily out of shotgun and favored the passing game in recent weeks.

"I think we just have really good players on the outside that teams are concerned about," Burrow said. "That's where we've made our money the last couple weeks. We'll see how it is going forward — maybe we start to see some tighter boxes since we've been running it so well out of the gun, and then maybe we get back under center and it opens up those play-actions and under-center runs. So, we'll see what happens."

The Cincinnati offense has scored 30 or more points in each of its last two games after being held under that mark through the first five weeks. On Monday night, the unit faces a Browns team that ranks 28th in the NFL in points allowed per game (26.6). But although the Bengals carry in newfound momentum, Taylor has acknowledged how crucial this matchup is from a divisional standpoint, given that Cincinnati has dropped both of its contests against AFC North foes this season.

"There is still a long way to go," Taylor said. "We've just got to continue to gain on this momentum of these past wins. The path to where we want to be goes through the division, so we know how important it is right now to get on the right foot in our division. So far, we haven't started on the right foot, and so there's a lot that's going to go into getting ready for Cleveland."

**The series:** The Bengals lead 51-46 in the "Battle of Ohio" series, but the Browns have won seven of the last eight. Home field has been a factor over the series, as the Bengals lead 31-18 at home, but trail 20-28 as the road club.

Cincinnati has played more games against Cleveland (97) than any foe except Pittsburgh. The Bengals have 104 all-time, regular-season games against the Steelers (106 including postseason).

The Browns swept Cincinnati in both 2020 and '21. The Bengals' last win over the Browns was the second meeting of 2019 at Cincinnati. That was the Bengals' only win in the previous four seasons.

More series notes:

- When Cleveland swept Cincinnati in 2018, it was the Browns' first season sweep over the Bengals since 2002.
- Cleveland's win in Game 11 of 2018 snapped a seven-game Bengals winning streak against the Browns. That streak, the Bengals' longest in the series, began with the second meeting of 2014. The Bengals' previous longest streak had been a five-game run from Game 2 of 2004 through Game 2 of '06.
- The Browns' longest win streak over Cincinnati also has been seven games, extending from Game 2 of the 1992 season through Game 2 of '95.
- Since the Browns' rebirth in 1999, the Bengals lead 27-19, including 15-8 as the home team and 12-11 as the visiting team.

**Bengals seek to regain biggest 'Battle' margin:** With its seven victories in the last eight meetings with Cincinnati, Cleveland has whittled the Bengals' largest lead of 11 games in the team's all-time series down to five games.

The series began in 1970 with the Browns winning six of the first seven, and their five-game margin at 6-1, after the first meeting of 1973, stands as their largest lead. The Bengals lead 50-40 since that Cleveland high-water mark.

Since surrendering that 33-32 lead by giving up a sweep in the 2006 meetings, the Browns have twice pulled into ties — at 34-34 after the first meeting of '07 and at 35-35 after the first meeting of '08. But the Browns have now endured a 16-year stretch without a lead in the series.

**More Bengals-Browns facts:** The first-ever Bengals-Browns meeting of any kind was Aug. 29, 1970. On that Saturday, the Browns were visitors for the second preseason game of Riverfront Stadium's debut year.

Also:

- The Bengals were 17-10 against the Browns at Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field.
• The Browns were 17-8 against the Bengals at the old Cleveland Stadium, but the Bengals lead 12-11 at FirstEnergy Stadium (formerly Cleveland Browns Stadium).
• The Bengals and Browns never played at Nippert Stadium, as Nippert was the Bengals' American Football League home.
• The Bengals have posted 13 season sweeps, and the Browns have posted 11. The teams have split 23 times. In 1982, they played only once, with the scheduled contest at Cleveland cancelled due to a players' strike.

• The first Bengals-Browns regular-season game at Cincinnati on Nov. 15, 1970 drew the first home crowd of 60,000 in Bengals history (60,007 at Riverfront Stadium). The Bengals won 14-10 behind a 110-yard rushing effort from QB Virgil Carter, the only 100-yarder by a QB in Bengals history.

• The largest Bengals home crowd for a Browns game has been 66,072, on Sept. 17, 2006 at Paul Brown Stadium. That ranks as the ninth-largest home crowd in Bengals history.

• The Browns drew the largest Bengals crowd in the Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field era — 60,284 for a 27-24 Browns win on Oct. 17, 1971.

• The Bengals and Browns met three times in preseason at Ohio Stadium in Columbus, from 1972-74. All were Sunday afternoon games, and the Browns won two of the three.

**Coaches in 'Battle of Ohio'** Here are some notes about "Battle of Ohio" coaches:

• When Cincinnati's Zac Taylor and Cleveland's Freddie Kitchens met in the first Battle of Ohio of 2019, it was just the second time in series history that a Bengals-Browns meeting featured two rookie head coaches who faced both each other and their Ohio rival for the first time in the same game. The Browns won that contest at FirstEnergy Stadium, 27-19. The first such instance occurred on Oct. 21, 1984, when Bengals first-year head coach Sam Wyche met Browns first-year head coach Marty Schottenheimer in Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium. The Bengals won that meeting, 12-9. The Bengals' Homer Rice and the Browns' Sam Rutigliano also were rookie head coaches when they met for the first time on Dec. 17, 1978 at Riverfront Stadium. However, that was Rutigliano's second "Battle of Ohio" as Cleveland's head coach. The two teams met in Game 2 that year, before Rice took the reins in Cincinnati (Rice was named Bengals head coach after Game 5).

• Former Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis, who was 22-10 overall against Cleveland, has the most total wins and best winning percentage (.688) of any Bengals head coach in the series. Lewis also has coached the most games (32) against Cleveland. Sam Wyche is second in all three categories, with 10 wins, a .625 winning percentage (10-6) and 16 games.

• Bill Belichick has been the top Browns coach in the series, having posted an 8-2 mark against the Bengals during his 1991-95 tenure.

• Lewis is the only Bengals head coach whose first Cincinnati victory came against Cleveland. Lewis took over as head coach in 2003, and his first win was a 21-14 decision at Cleveland on Sept. 28 of that year. The Bengals entered that game at 0-3, but went on to finish 8-8. The six-game improvement, after a 2-14 season in 2002, was the largest in the NFL for '03.

• Forrest Gregg is the only head coach to pilot both teams in the "Battle of Ohio." Gregg was 1-5 as Browns coach against the Bengals from 1975-77, and he was 3-4 as Bengals coach against the Browns from '80-83.

• Here are Bengals head coaches, in chronological order, and their records in the "Battle of Ohio": Paul Brown (5-7), Bill "Tiger" Johnson (3-2), Homer Rice (2-1), Forrest Gregg (3-4), Sam Wyche (10-6), Dave Shula (1-7), Bruce Coslet (2-1), Dick LeBeau (2-3), Marvin Lewis (22-10) and Zac Taylor (1-5).

• The Bengals are 11-8 against Browns head coaches directing their first game in the series. Browns head coaches who won their first game have been Blanton Collier (1970), Nick Skorich ('71), Sam Rutigliano ('78), Bill Belichick ('91), Rob Chudzinski (2013), Mike Pettine ('14), Freddie Kitchens ('19) and Kevin Stefanski ('20). On the losing end for Cleveland have been Forrest Gregg (1975), Marty Schottenheimer ('84), Bud Carson ('89), Jim Shofner ('90), Chris Palmer ('99), Butch Davis (2001), Romeo Crennel ('05), Eric Mangini ('09), Pat Shurmur ('11), Hue Jackson ('16) and Gregg Williams ('18).

• Bengals coaches show a 7-3 record the first time out against Cleveland. The seven winners have been Bill Johnson (1976), Homer Rice ('78), Sam Wyche ('84), Dave Shula ('92), Bruce Coslet ('99), Dick LeBeau (2000) and Marvin Lewis ('03). Losing in the first try vs. Cleveland were Paul Brown (1970), Forrest Gregg ('80) and Zac Taylor (2019).

**Bengals career records watch:** As Cincinnati continues the 2022 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

• WR Tyler Boyd has 417 career receptions, tied with WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for fifth place all-time. Boyd tied Collinsworth with eight catches in Game 7 against Atlanta. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530), and T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) hold the top four spots on the team's career receptions list.

• HB Joe Mixon has 4969 career rushing yards, 452 shy of RB Pete Johnson (5421) for fourth place all-time. Mixon in 2021 passed Cedric Benson (4176).

• Mixon also has 35 career rushing TDs, two shy of RBs James Brooks and

Larry Kinnebrew (37) for fifth place all-time. RBs Pete Johnson (64), Rudi Johnson (48), and Corey Dillon (45) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- Mixon has 13 career games with 100 or more rushing yards, one shy of RB Pete Johnson for fifth place all-time. RBs Corey Dillon (28), Rudi Johnson (19), James Brooks (17), and Cedric Benson (15) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.

- Mixon in Week 1 had 27 rushing attempts and surpassed Cedric Benson (1109) for fifth place all-time. Mixon currently has 1225 career rushing attempts and is 119 behind James Brooks (1344) for fourth place all-time.

- QB Joe Burrow has 14 career games of 300 or more passing yards, three shy of QB Carson Palmer (17) for fourth place all-time. QBs Andy Dalton (28), Boomer Esiason (23), and Ken Anderson (19) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- S Brandon Wilson (Reserve/PUP) has two career kickoff returns for TDs, tied with S/CB Tremain Mack for the Bengals' all-time lead.

**Records vs. Browns:** The two highest-scoring games in Bengals history have each been against the Browns. On Nov. 28, 2004 at Paul Brown Stadium, the Bengals won 58-48, and the 106 total points is not only a Bengals record, it is the second-most in NFL history, behind only 113 from Washington's 72-41 win over the N.Y. Giants in 1966. And on Sept. 16, 2007, the Bengals and Browns combined for 96 points at Cleveland in a 51-45 Browns win.

More on Bengals records against the Browns:

- On Dec. 21, 1980 vs. Cleveland, DE Eddie Edwards set the Bengals record for sacks in a game with five. The mark stood unchallenged for 19 years, until DE Antwan Odom tied it on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay.

- In the final Bengals game at Cinergy Field, on Dec. 12, 1999, Cincinnati limited the Browns to the fewest rushing yards ever by an opponent. Cleveland had only 11 net yards on 11 attempts.

- On Sept. 10, 2000, WR Craig Yeast tied a Bengals record for most punt returns in a game with seven. The record was set by RB Tony Davis in 1977, and in addition to Yeast, has since been tied by WR Brandon Tate in 2011.

- On Nov. 25, 2001 at Cleveland, T.J. Houshmandzadeh set the Bengals record for punt return yards in a game with 126. His 86-yarder in that game ranks tied for third-longest in club history.

- The 58-48 Bengals win on Nov. 28, 2004 is the only game in club history in which Cincinnati scored double figures in all four quarters (14-13-14-17 — 58).

- In the Sept. 16, 2007 shootout with the Browns noted above, QB Carson Palmer threw six TD passes, the most ever by a Bengals QB in a single game. That mark also stands tied for the team record for most TD passes in a game.

- On Dec. 21, 2008, at Cleveland, Bengals CB Leon Hall tied the team record for most interceptions in a game with three. He was the seventh Bengal to reach that mark in a contest, though no one has done it since.

- On Nov. 17, 2013, the Bengals scored 31 points in the second quarter, a team record for most points in a quarter, en route to a 41-20 Cincinnati victory.

- In their 30-0 win at Cleveland on Dec. 14, 2014, the Bengals allowed only five first downs, fewest by an opponent in Bengals history.

- On Oct 23, 2016 against Cleveland, HB Jeremy Hill had the most rushing yards in club history without hitting double digits in carries, breaking a mark that had stood for 45 years. Hill went nine-for-168, averaging 18.7 yards per carry.

- The Bengals' 23-20 overtime victory at Cleveland on Oct. 4, 2009 stands as the longest Bengals game not to end in a tie. Only four seconds remained in the overtime period when K Shayne Graham booted a 31-yard field goal to break a 20-all deadlock. Elapsed scoreboard clock time for the game was 74:56. The only 75-minute games in Bengals history have been three ties, in 2008 vs. Philadelphia, in '14 vs. Carolina and '16 vs. Washington in London. The Bengals lost as overtime expired at Miami on Dec. 22, 2019 when K Jason Sanders kicked a 37-yard field goal, but that game was a 70-minute contest (the NFL shortened overtime from a 15-minute period to a 10-minute period in 2017).

**Individually vs. Browns:** Here is a look at the collective offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against Cleveland (ordered by total games played):

- WR Tyler Boyd: 10 games; 47 receptions for 487 yards (10.4) and four TDs; Three rushes for 47 yards (15.7).

- HB Joe Mixon: Eight games; 149 rushes for 718 yards (4.8) and six TDs; 29 receptions for 286 yards (10.0).

- HB Samaje Perine: Four games; Six rushes for 23 yards (3.8); Three receptions for 20 yards.

- TE Drew Sample (Reserve/Injured): Four games; 16 receptions for 141

yards (8.8).

- WR Mike D. Thomas: Four games; Seven receptions for 101 yards (14.4) and one TD.

- HB Trayveon Williams: Four games; Nine rushes for 38 yards (4.2); One reception for four yards.

- QB Joe Burrow: Three games; (0-3 W-L record); 148 attempts and 100 completions (67.6 percent) for 1004 yards, six TDs and three INTs (91.7 passer rating); 15 rushes for 54 yards (3.6) and one TD.

- WR Tee Higgins: Three games; 14 receptions for 184 yards (13.1) and one TD; one rush for seven yards.

- WR Stanley Morgan. Three games; One reception for eight yards; One rush for three yards.

- QB Brandon Allen: Two games; 31 attempts and 16 completions (51.6 percent) for 142 yards, one TD and zero INTs (74.9 passer rating); Two rushes for three yards (1.5).

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Two games; Eight receptions for 75 yards (9.4); Two rushes for zero yards (0.0).

- HB Chris Evans: Two games; Seven rushes for 35 yards (5.0); Five receptions for 35 yards and one TD.

- TE Mitchell Wilcox: Two games; Three receptions for 16 yards (5.3).

- WR Trenton Irwin (Practice Squad): Two games; One reception for nine yards.

- WR Trent Taylor: One game; Two receptions for 41 yards (20.5).

**Bengals-Browns connections:** Bengals offensive coordinator

Brian Callahan is the son of Browns offensive line coach Bill Callahan ... Bill Callahan also was the head coach at the University of Nebraska when Bengals head coach Zac Taylor was the starting QB there (2005-06) ... Bill Callahan also was the offensive line coach in Dallas from 2013-14, when Bengals offensive line coach Frank Pollack was the Cowboys' assistant offensive line coach ... Bengals defensive quality control coach Sigismondo Cioffi was the defensive backs coach in Cleveland for the 2013 and '16 seasons ... Browns offensive coordinator Alex Van Pelt was the quarterbacks coach in Cincinnati from 2018-19 ... Bengals OT La'el Collins (2018-21) and CB Chidobe Awuzie ('18-20) were teammates with Browns WR Amari Cooper ('18-21) on the Dallas Cowboys ... Bengals DT Jay Tufele and Browns DT Taven Bryan were teammates on the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2021 ... Bryan also played for Jacksonville in 2018, when Bengals defensive line coach Marion Hobby held the same title ... Bengals G Alex Cappa and Browns T Joe Haeg were teammates on the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2020 ... Bengals G Max Scharping (2020-21) and S Michael J. Thomas ('20) were teammates with Browns TE Pharaoh Brown ('20-21) on the Houston Texans ... Bengals CB Mike Hilton and Browns T Chris Hubbard were teammates on the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2017 ... Bengals CB Tre Flowers and Browns C Ethan Pocic were teammates on the Seattle Seahawks from 2018-21 ... Bengals QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase played at LSU from 2018-19, alongside Browns S Grant Delpit ('18-19), LB Jacob Phillips ('18-19) CB Greedy Williams ('18) and K Cade York ('19) ... Bengals DT B.J. Hill and LB Germaine Pratt were teammates with Browns QB Jacoby Brissett at NC State from 2014-15 ... Bengals CB Tre Flowers and Browns CB A.J. Green were teammates at Oklahoma State from 2016-17 ... Bengals LB Markus Bailey and Browns WR David Bell were teammates at Purdue from 2019-20 ... Bengals OT Jonah Williams played at Alabama from 2016-18, alongside Browns S Ronnie Harrison ('16-17) and T Jedrick Wills Jr. ('17-18) ... Bengals HB Chris Evans (2017-19) and S Dax Hill ('19) were teammates with Browns WR Donovan Peoples-Jones ('17-19) at Michigan ... Browns CB Denzel Ward played at Ohio State from 2015-17, alongside Bengals CB Eli Apple ('15), S Vonn Bell ('15), QB Joe Burrow ('15-17) and DE Sam Hubbard ('15-17) ... Browns T James Hudson played at the University of Cincinnati in 2020 ... Browns run game coordinator/running backs coach Stump Mitchell was the running backs coach in Arizona from 2013-16, when Bengals linebackers coach James Bettcher was the Cardinals' outside linebackers coach/defensive coordinator ... Bengals offensive coordinator Brian Callahan was the quarterbacks coach in Denver in 2015, when Browns defensive coordinator Joe Woods was the Broncos' defensive backs coach.

**Mixon approaching 5000 yards:** HB Joe Mixon, a sixth-year pro who was a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2017, enters Game 8 at Cleveland with 4969 career rushing yards. With 31 more yards he will become the fifth player in team history to reach the 5000-yard milestone, and the first since HB Rudi Johnson in 2006.

Mixon has logged over 1000 rushing yards in three of his four full seasons (missed 10 games in 2020 due to injury). His career-high 1205 yards in 2021 ranked third in the league, while his 13 rushing TDs were fourth as he earned his first Pro Bowl selection.

There are currently seven active players in the NFL with 5000 or more rushing yards. Here is a look at Cincinnati's all-time leaders in rushing yards while playing for the Bengals:

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, black pants (orange stripes) and orange socks in Game 8 at Cleveland. It will be the first time Cincinnati has featured that combination.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants also feature three different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, and white with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

This year, with the NFL's approval for the use of alternate helmets, the Bengals unveiled a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The helmet debuted in the Week 4 Thursday Night Football matchup against the Miami Dolphins, which saw the Bengals earn a 27-15 win in front of a white-out crowd at Paycor Stadium.

In the league's revised uniform policy, teams can pair their new helmet with an alternate, classic or Color Rush uniform. To accentuate the "White Bengal" helmet, the Bengals chose to bring back the fan-favorite Color Rush look — a white jersey/pant combination featuring black stripes and black lettering. The team wore the Color Rush uniform seven times from 2016-20.

Cincinnati's all-time MNF record is 12-25.

More MNF: Here's a further look at some history and milestones of the Bengals' MNF experience:

• Most recent appearance: Dec. 21, 2020, the Bengals won against the Pittsburgh Steelers, 27-17 at Paul Brown Stadium.

• First appearance: During the inaugural season of MNF, on Nov. 2, 1970, the Bengals lost 21-10 to Pittsburgh at Three Rivers Stadium. The loss dropped the Bengals to 1-6, but the game was pivotal. The Bengals won their final seven games to finish 8-6 and win the first AFC Central Division championship. It was the Bengals' first season in the NFL after two years in the AFL. The 1970 Bengals still are one of only three teams in NFL history to start 1-5 or worse after six games and make the playoffs. The other teams were the 2015 Kansas City Chiefs (started 1-5; was 11-5 Wild Card) and the '20 Washington Football Team (1-5; 7-9 NFC East Division champs).

• First home appearance: On Nov. 17, 1975, the Bengals defeated Buffalo 33-24 at Riverfront Stadium. The win lifted Cincinnati to an 8-1 record, en route to an 11-3 season which holds the mark for best regular-season winning percentage (.786) in franchise history.

• Most MNF regular-season appearances in a season: For the Bengals, it has been three, in both 1978 and '89. The Bengals also were on MNF three times in 2007, but one game was in preseason.

• Widest Bengals victory margin: 21 points, in a 34-13 win at Cleveland on Oct. 22, 1990.

Memorable MNF wins: A 37-28 home win over Denver in 2014 arguably ranks as the most memorable Bengals Monday night victory. The Bengals upended an 11-3 opponent in the game, with a fourth-quarter comeback, and clinched a playoff berth. The Broncos led 28-27 after three periods, but WR Brandon Tate's 49-yard punt return set up a 23-yard Mike Nugent FG for a 30-28 lead, and CB Dre Kirkpatrick sealed the win with a 30-yard return of an intercepted Peyton Manning pass for a TD with 2:41 to play.

Another memorable MNF win came Nov. 17, 1975 at Riverfront Stadium, when QB Ken Anderson and the Bengals outdueled RB O.J. Simpson and the

Buffalo Bills in an offensive showcase. The final score was 33-24. Simpson rushed for 197 yards and two TDs, but Anderson bombarded the Bills with 30 completions in 46 attempts for 447 yards, two TDs and no INTs. Overall, the game produced 57 first downs and 888 total net yards between the teams.

The 1975 win lifted the Bengals to an 8-1 record as they stormed toward an 11-3 mark that still rates as their best ever campaign for regular-season winning percentage (.786).

In 2020, the 14-point underdog Bengals pulled off a huge upset on Monday Night Football against the visiting Steelers, who entered the contest having won their last 11 games over Cincinnati. Led by third-string QB Ryan Finley, the 2-10-1 Bengals posted 27 points on an 11-2 Steelers team which entered the contest allowing an NFL-low 18.2 points per game. Cincinnati was helped by three takeaways in the first half, and jumped out to a 17-0 lead at the break while holding Pittsburgh QB Ben Roethlisberger to just 19 passing yards, his fewest ever before halftime in 230 career starts. The Steelers came alive after the break with 17 second-half points, but the Bengals' run-heavy offense (41 rushes, 13 passes), coupled with multiple key defensive stops, helped Cincinnati hold on for the win.

**Most memorable MNF loss:** The most-remembered Monday night loss in Bengals history is considered to be the 50-34 shootout won by the Chargers at San Diego on Dec. 20, 1982.

The two clubs combined for 1102 net yards, the second-most in NFL history at the time. The Chargers had 661 and the Bengals 441.

QB Ken Anderson's 40 pass completions in that game still stand as the Bengals' all-time record, and his total of 416 passing yards still stands as tied for ninth-most in Bengals history. San Diego's Wes Chandler had 260 receiving yards (on 10 catches), still the most yards ever by a receiver against Cincinnati.

**Most crucial MNF loss:** The only time the Bengals played a Monday night game to close a season was on Christmas night, Dec. 25, 1989 at Minnesota.

Cincinnati's defending AFC Champions needed a win to secure a playoff berth, but the Vikings prevailed, 29-21. Bengals QB Boomer Esiason passed for 367 yards and three TDs, but he also suffered three INTs.

**Also at night:** In regular season, the Bengals are 3-17 playing on Sunday night, 10-7 on Thursday night, 0-1 on Friday night and 0-3 on Saturday night.

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Zac Taylor** was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2022 season is his fourth in the position.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to an AFC North Division championship, an AFC championship and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Working with one of the NFL's top young offenses, he helped guide second-year QB Joe Burrow to a breakout year in which he set team records for passing yardage (4611), TD passes (34) and passer rating (108.3), as well as recording a league-high 70.4 completion percentage. Burrow was named the AP NFL Comeback Player of the Year — becoming the second player in franchise history to do so — after missing the final six weeks of his rookie season due to a knee injury. Taylor also oversaw the rapid rise of first-year WR Ja'Marr Chase, who posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455) en route to winning AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors. Chase and fellow WR Tee Higgins (1091 yards) became the first duo in NFL history to record 1000 receiving yards in the same season before the age of 23. Fifth-year RB Joe Mixon further established himself as one of the NFL's premier backs under Taylor, ranking third in the league in rushing yards (1205) and fourth in rushing TDs (13). Overall, the Cincinnati offense finished the regular season in the top half of the NFL in yards (13th, 361.5 per game), passing yards (seventh, 259.0) and points (eighth, 27.1).

Defensively, the Bengals showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, improving their league ranking in rushing yards allowed (29th to fifth), total yards allowed (26th to 18th) and points allowed (22nd to 17th).

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Burrow had one of the most productive starts to a career by a QB in NFL history before a knee injury ended the rookie's season after 10 games. Still, Burrow's 264 completions were the most ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games, while his 404 pass attempts were second and his 2688 passing yards were fifth. Defensively, Taylor oversaw the onboarding of seven new starters, and helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to just a 62.8 completion percentage (sixth-lowest in the NFL).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor headed off a wave of early season injuries to lead Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both offense and defense. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while their per-attempt average jumped 1.26 yards (3.17 to 4.43) and they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). The team's top four WRs — Boyd, Alex Erickson, Auden Tate and John Ross III — all posted career-highs in both receptions and receiving yards. Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped guide Rams QB Jared Goff to career highs in every major passing category. Goff ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards and eighth in passer rating. The Rams' QB play was a key component to their offense, which finished the regular season ranked second in the NFL in total net yards (421.1 per game), fifth in net passing yards (281.7), second in scoring (32.9), first in first downs (401) and fifth in third-down percentage (45.0). Los Angeles won the NFC West with a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII against the New England Patriots.

In 2017, Taylor helped oversee an emerging Rams passing offense that

ranked 10th in the NFL in passing yards per game (239.4). Taylor directed a Rams' young receiving corps headed by rookie Cooper Kupp, who finished the season with 62 catches, a team-high 869 receiving yards and five TDs.

Prior to his time with the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint in the college ranks, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. Taylor served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller, after the team made coaching staff changes.

During his time in Miami, Taylor was instrumental in the development of QB Ryan Tannehill, the team's first-round draft pick in 2012.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and tight ends coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies shared the Big 12 South Championship in 2010 and played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. Taylor had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 touchdowns. In his 2006 senior season, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but he was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

**Kevin Stefanski** was named the 18th full-time head coach in Browns franchise history on Jan. 13, 2020.

Stefanski spent 14 seasons (2006-19) with the Minnesota Vikings and moved up the coaching ladder from assistant to the head coach to offensive coordinator.

During his first two seasons in Cleveland, Stefanski led the Browns to 20 total wins, trailing only Hall of Famer Paul Brown (23 from 1950-51) and Blanton Collier (21 from '63-64) for the most NFL wins by a Browns coach in his first two seasons.

In his first season with the Browns, Stefanski led the team to their first playoff appearance since 2002 and first playoff victory in 26 years. He notched the most

wins (11) by a first-year Browns head coach since Hall of Famer Paul Brown had 12 in the team's inaugural season in 1946. Stefanski's 11 regular-season wins were the most by any first-year head coach in 2020 and marked just the 11th time since 1970 a first-year coach has won 11-or-more games.

Stefanski got his first start in the league with the Vikings in 2006 as an assistant to the head coach before serving as assistant quarterbacks coach from 2009-13, two seasons tutoring the tight ends group ('14-15), one season ('16) as running backs coach and two seasons guiding the quarterbacks ('17-18). He added the role of interim offensive coordinator for the remaining three games of

the 2018 season before being named the team's offensive coordinator in '19.

Stefanski played defensive back at Pennsylvania (2000-04) and earned a bachelor's degree in communications. He has no pro playing experience.

Stefanski was born on April 8, 1982. He is a native of Philadelphia, Pa. He and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Will and Gabe, and one daughter, Juliet.

## BENGALS NOTES

**2022 Bengals captains:** Head coach Zac Taylor announced the team's captains for the 2022 season, which were decided through a players-only vote. Wearing the captains' patch this year are three offensive players, three defensive players and one special teams representative.

On offense, the captains are third-year QB Joe Burrow, sixth-year HB Joe Mixon and seventh-year C Ted Karras. This is Burrow's third consecutive season as a captain and the second straight for Mixon. Karras, who joined the Bengals as a free agent in March, will serve as a team captain for the second time in his career, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

On defense, the captains are seventh-year S Vonn Bell, fifth-year DE Sam Hubbard and seventh-year DT DJ Reader. Bell has been voted a captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati, after joining the team as a free agent in 2020. It is the second captain nod for Hubbard and the first for Reader.

The lone captain on special teams is S Michael J. Thomas, who is in his ninth NFL season in 2022. Thomas has earned the respect of each locker room he has been in throughout his career, as this year is his seventh as a team captain while playing for four different teams. He held the title with the Miami Dolphins each season from 2015-17, with the N.Y. Giants from 2018-19, and with the Houston Texans in 2020.

**Passing game shines against Falcons:** The Bengals recorded 459 net passing yards in the 35-17 win over Atlanta in Week 7, marking the second-highest single-game total by any team this season (Miami, 461 in Week 2) and the third-highest total in team history. The unit was led by QB Joe Burrow, who completed 34 of 42 passes for 481 yards and three TDs, while also running three times for 20 yards and a TD. Burrow became the third player in NFL history with at least 475 passing yards, three TD passes and one rushing TD in a single game, joining Norm Van Brocklin (Sept. 28, 1951) and Billy Volek (Dec. 19, 2004).

Burrow's top three targets on the outside — WRs Tyler Boyd, Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins — were at their best, becoming the Bengals' first trio to each record 90 or more receiving yards since Dec. 30, 2001 (T.J. Houshmandzadeh, Darnay Scott and Peter Warrick vs. Pittsburgh). Boyd caught eight passes for a career-high 155 yards and a TD, while Chase had eight catches for 130 yards and two scores. Higgins added five grabs for 93 yards (18.6 average).

Much of Boyd and Chase's damage was done early on to help the Bengals score 28 points in the first half. Boyd caught five first-half passes for 118 yards, highlighted by a 60-yard TD on the game's opening drive. Chase matched the five catches and had 112 yards with two TDs, including a 41-yard catch and run to the end zone. They became the first WR duo to each record over 100 receiving yards and a TD in a single half since Randy Moss and Wes Welker for the New England Patriots in Week 6 of the 2009 season.

Cincinnati opened the game with four consecutive TD drives that traveled 84, 71, 75 and 84 yards. It was the first time the Bengals have found the end zone on each of their first four possessions since Sept. 30, 2018 — coincidentally also against Atlanta.

The Bengals' 537 total net yards on offense marked the 16th-highest single-game total in team history.

**Burrow's NFL journey:** After being selected No. 1 overall by the Bengals in the 2020 NFL Draft, former Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow had one of the most productive starts to a career by a QB in league history, as his 264 completions still count as the most ever by an NFL passer through their first 10 career games, while his 404 pass attempts are the second-most in that same category and his 2588 passing yards are fifth.

In the third quarter of Cincinnati's Week 11 game at Washington, Burrow suffered a season-ending left knee injury, halting a campaign that was on pace to shatter several NFL rookie passing records. He embarked on a rehab process that lasted over eight months and received medical clearance to participate in training camp in 2021.

Shortly after his injury in 2020, Burrow vowed publicly that he would start Cincinnati's '21 season opener. On Sept. 12 vs. Minnesota, not only did he make good on that promise, but he posted then-career highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.67) in a Bengals OT win.

Burrow in 2021 completed 366 of 520 passes (70.4 percent) for 4611 yards, 34 TDs and 14 INTs (108.3 rating). His passing yardage, TD pass total and passer rating were all single-season team records. And although the NFL season expanded to 17 games in 2021, Burrow sat out the regular-season finale (rest/knee) and thus played in only 16 games.

In the playoffs, he completed 97 of 142 passes (68.3 percent) for 1105 yards, with five TDs and two INTs (97.3 rating), and became the first No. 1 overall draft pick in NFL history to lead his team to a conference championship game (let alone a Super Bowl berth) in either of their first two seasons.

On July 26, the day before the first official training camp practice of 2022, Burrow was forced to undergo surgery to remove his appendix. He remained involved in team meetings and attended practices on a golf cart during a three-week recovery process, before returning to the field on Aug. 14.

**Burrow racks up yardage:** QB Joe Burrow's 481 passing yards in Game 7 against Atlanta were the second-most by an NFL QB since the start of the 2021 season, trailing only ... Joe Burrow. The former No. 1 overall pick threw for a Bengals-record 525 yards on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore, which also marked the fourth-highest single-game total in league history. Only Norm Van Brocklin (554 yards in 1951), Matt Schaub (527 in 2012) and Warren Moon (527 in '90) have put up more yards in a single contest.

In fact, three of the four highest single-game passing yardage totals since the start of last season belong to Burrow. His 446 yards against Kansas City on Jan. 2, 2021 rank third in that category. That game, he hit five passes for 30 or more yards, including TD throws of 72 and 69 yards to WR Ja'Marr Chase as Cincinnati clinched the AFC Division title for the first time since 2015.

Burrow has five career games with 400 or more passing yards, surpassing Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino (four) for the most such games by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history.

**Burrow masters the deep ball:** QB Joe Burrow in Game 7 against Atlanta connected with WR Tyler Boyd for a 60-yard TD just two minutes into the first quarter to give the Bengals an early 7-0 lead. It marked Burrow's 12th TD pass of 50 or more yards since he entered the league in 2020, four more than any NFL QB in that span.

It also ties Burrow with Hall of Famers Dan Marino and Fran Tarkenton (12 each) for the most TD passes of 50 or more yards by a player in his first three seasons in NFL history.

Four of Burrow's 50-plus yard TD passes have come over the last five games. In Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, he hit Boyd for a 56-yard TD on the final play of the first quarter that increased Cincinnati's lead to 14-6. The following game against Miami, Burrow launched a pinpoint pass down the left sideline that was grabbed by WR Tee Higgins and taken in for a 59-yard score. He threw the game-winning TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 6 at New Orleans, a 60-yard catch and run that gave the Bengals their first lead with 1:57 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Burrow also has eight 50-plus yard TD passes over his last 11 regular-

season games, dating back to Week 15 of the 2021 season — five more than any QB in that span (Josh Allen has three). In Game 16 vs. Kansas City, he threw TD passes of 72 and 69 yards to Chase in what was a 446-yard passing day that helped Cincinnati clinch the AFC North Division title.

Burrow additionally had an NFL-best 15 TD passes of 30 yards or more during the 2021 regular season. The next closest players in that category were Buccaneers QB Tom Brady (eight), Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes (seven) and then-Seahawks QB Russell Wilson (seven). It counted as a Bengals single-season record, surpassing the previous mark of nine that was shared by Ken Anderson (1973), Boomer Esiason ('89) and Carson Palmer ('06).

**Burrow surpasses 9000:** QB Joe Burrow surpassed 9000 career passing yards in Game 7 against Atlanta, in what was just his 33rd career game. That made him tied for the fifth-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 9000 passing yards. He is the fastest Bengal ever to 9000 passing yards, 8000 (29 games), 7500 (27), 7000 (26), 6000 (23), 5000 (19) and 4000 (16).

Over the last nine regular-season games in which Burrow has been active (inactive in 2021 season finale due to rest), he has passed for 3068 yards (340.9 average) and 23 TDs. He has recorded 300 or more passing yards in seven of his last 12 regular-season appearances, including each of the last two weeks. He enters the Week 8 matchup at Cleveland with 9396 yards in 33 games. Burrow's 2097 passing yards this season rank second in the NFL.

**Joe throws 50th career TD:** In the fourth quarter of Game 2 at Dallas, QB Joe Burrow capped off a 19-play, 83-yard drive by finding WR Tee Higgins on a scramble drill for the Bengals' first TD of the day. It marked Burrow's 50th career TD pass in just his 28th game, making him tied for the seventh-fastest QB in NFL history to throw for 50 TDs.

The third-year signal caller had 13 TD passes in 10 games as a rookie before suffering a season-ending knee injury. In his sophomore campaign, Burrow set a team record with 34 TD passes, which ranked eighth in the NFL. A league-best 15 of those came from 30 yards or longer. Burrow has thrown at least one TD pass in each of his last 14 regular-season games.

Over the past five games, Burrow has thrown for 12 TDs against just one INT, while completing 71.3 percent of his passes (129 of 181). His performance in Game 7 vs. Atlanta marked the 11th time in his career — and fifth time in his last nine regular-season games — that he passed for three or more scores. Burrow's 15 passing TDs this season rank third in the NFL.

Earlier in the game-tying drive at Dallas, Burrow hooked up with Higgins for 16 yards on a third-and-10 in what was his 1000th career pass attempt.

Coincidentally, former Bengals QB Carson Palmer also passed for his 50th TD in his 28th game. Palmer did so on Dec. 24, 2005 against the Buffalo Bills.

**Burrow's college connections:** Bengals QB Joe Burrow may only be in his third NFL season in 2022, but he has plenty of familiar faces around him in Cincinnati. The Bengals locker room (active roster and practice squad) currently features seven players who played with Burrow in college at either Ohio State or LSU. He spent the first three seasons of his collegiate career (2015-17) at Ohio State, including a redshirt year in '15, before transferring to LSU for his final two seasons ('18-19).

Bengals assistant wide receivers coach Brad Kragthorpe was also on the LSU coaching staff in 2018, serving as an offensive analyst during Burrow's first year in Baton Rouge.

**Burrow, Chase earned NFL honors in '21:** QB Joe Burrow was awarded the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year for 2021, while WR Ja'Marr Chase earned NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors. Both awards were voted on by members of the Associated Press who regularly cover the NFL.

Burrow, a second-year pro in 2021, suffered a season-ending left knee injury 10 games into his rookie season in '20. He was medically cleared to take the first snap of training camp in July 2021, and completed his rehab process in time to start the '21 regular-season opener. Burrow went on to break numerous team records while leading Cincinnati to a 10-7 record, AFC North title, AFC Conference Championship and berth in Super Bowl LVI.

The Bengals used the No. 5 overall pick in the 2021 NFL Draft to select Chase, who was Burrow's top target at Louisiana State. The two picked up where they left off in college, as Chase shattered numerous NFL rookie records, including single-season receiving yardage (in the Super Bowl era), single-game receiving yardage, and postseason receiving yardage. Each of those were also Bengals team records.

Burrow and Chase accepted their awards remotely during the NFL Honors ceremony on Feb. 11, while the team was in Los Angeles preparing for Super Bowl LVI.

**Three-headed monster at WR:** The Bengals' offense features one of the top receiving trios in the NFL, consisting of seventh-year veteran Tyler Boyd, second-year pro Ja'Marr Chase and third-year pro Tee Higgins.

Cincinnati is the only team this season with three players that have recorded 400 or more receiving yards. Boyd, Chase and Higgins are also each averaging over 12 yards per reception and have at least one TD catch of 50-plus yards. In the Week 7 win over Atlanta, they became the first trio to each log 90 or more receiving yards for the Bengals since Dec. 30, 2001. The Week 6 victory at New Orleans marked the first time all three players tallied at least six receptions in the same game. Chase led the way with seven receptions for 132 yards and two TDs, while Boyd had six for 66 yards and Higgins, who was battling through an ankle injury that kept his status unknown until just before kickoff, added six for 47 yards.

The trio had another strong output in Game 4 against Miami, led by a seven-catch, 124-yard stat line from Higgins. Boyd had two grabs for 47 yards, including a 43-yard reception on the opening play of the fourth quarter that set up a go-ahead FG. Chase caught four passes for 81 yards, none bigger than his 36-yarder late in the fourth that led to a game-sealing TD.

The three star WRs combined for 3374 receiving yards during the 2021 regular season, the most among any trio of pass catchers in the NFL (second was L.A. Rams — WR Cooper Kupp, TE Tyler Higbee and WR Van Jefferson combined for 3309 yards). Chase finished his rookie campaign with a team-record 1455 receiving yards, which also counted as the most by an NFL rookie during the Super Bowl era (started in 1966), while grabbing 13 TDs. Higgins had 1091 yards and six TDs in just 14 games played — he missed two games early in the season with a shoulder injury, and then was inactive (rest) for the regular-season finale at Cleveland. Boyd added 828 yards and five scores.

Chase (21 years old in 2021) and Higgins (22) became the first duo in

league history to post 1000 receiving yards in the same season before the age of 23. It marked the third time in Bengals history in which the team had multiple 1000-yard receivers — WRs Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh did it twice, in 2006 and '07.

**Chase shines in homecoming:** WR Ja'Marr Chase, a native of Metairie, La. (part of New Orleans metropolitan area), had perhaps his best game of the season in the Bengals' Week 6 road win over the Saints. He caught seven passes for 132 yards (18.9 average) and two TDs, highlighted by a 60-yard catch and run to the end zone with 1:57 remaining in the fourth quarter that proved to be the game-winner. It marked the first game-winning TD of 60 or more yards within the final two minutes of regulation or in overtime since Dec. 9, 2018 (Miami's Kenyan Drake, 69 yards). It was also Chase's fifth career TD of 50 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. His teammate, Tyler Boyd, is second on that list with four such TDs — the latest of which was a 60-yarder on the opening drive in Game 7 vs. Atlanta.

Chase's last trip to Caesars Superdome saw him help Louisiana State cap off an undefeated 2019 season by beating Clemson in the College Football Playoff National Championship. He caught nine passes for a championship-record 221 yards and two TDs in a 42-25 LSU victory. Burrow, meanwhile, went 31 of 49 for 463 yards and six total TDs in that game, putting an exclamation point on his Heisman-winning campaign for the Tigers.

**Chase hits 2000:** WR Ja'Marr Chase surpassed 2000 career receiving yards in the Week 7 win over Atlanta, in what was just his 24th career game. That made him tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach 2000 receiving yards, and the fastest Bengal to do so (previous fastest was A.J. Green in 26 games). The only players to eclipse that milestone in fewer games are Bill Groman (Houston Oilers, 21 games), Odell Beckham Jr. (N.Y. Giants, 21), and Charley Hennigan (Houston Oilers, 22). Chase's 24 games are tied with Bob Hayes (Dallas), Lance Alworth (San Diego), and Justin Jefferson (Minnesota).

The second-year Pro Bowler finished with eight catches for 130 yards (16.3 average) and two TDs against the Falcons. He caught a 32-yard pass from QB Joe Burrow near the front-right pylon on the opening play of the second quarter, then followed it up with a 41-yard catch and run to the end zone in the final minute of the first half. Chase now has 19 receiving TDs in 24 games, tied for the eighth-most by a player within their first 25 career games in NFL history.

Chase has also recorded 125 or more receiving yards on seven occasions, surpassing Amari Cooper (six), Victor Cruz (six), Andre Rison (six), and Marcus Robinson (six) for the second-most such games by a player in his first 25 career games in the Super Bowl era. Only Beckham Jr. (11) has more. Three of Chase's stat lines of over 125 yards have come this season, including his 129 yards on 10 receptions in Week 1 against Pittsburgh. He tied for the third-most catches by a Bengals player in a regular-season opener, and it marked the second time in Chase's career that he logged double-digit receptions.

Chase's 605 receiving yards through seven games this season rank sixth in the NFL, while his six TD catches are tied for second.

**Chase set Bengals rookie records in '21:** WR Ja'Marr Chase in 2021 had perhaps the best statistical season ever by a Bengals rookie regardless of position. Here's a look at the Bengals rookie records that Chase broke during the 2021 regular season. Although the NFL schedule was expanded to 17 games in 2021, Chase broke all of the previous Bengals rookie records in no more than 16 games.

- Chase's 81 receptions topped the previous team rookie record of 67, shared by WRs Cris Collinsworth and Tee Higgins. Chase caught his 68th pass in the 15th game of the season (Dec. 26 vs. Baltimore).
- Chase's 1455 receiving yards topped the previous team rookie record of 1057, held by WR A.J. Green. Chase passed 1057 receiving yards in the 15th game of the season (Dec. 26 vs. Baltimore).

- Chase's 13 receiving TDs topped the previous team rookie record of nine, held by WR Isaac Curtis. Chase caught his ninth receiving TD in just the 13th game of the season (Dec. 12 vs. San Francisco). Curtis' record was set in a 14-game season in 1973.

- Chase's five 100-yard receiving games topped the previous team rookie record of four, held by Green. Chase's fifth 100-yard receiving performance came in the 16th game of the season (Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City).

**Higgins heating up:** WR Tee Higgins has faced two on-field setbacks so far this season, first in the season opener against Pittsburgh when he suffered a concussion in the second quarter, and again in Week 5 at Baltimore when he left the game with an ankle injury. When healthy, however, Higgins has proven himself as one of the NFL's elite young receivers.

The third-year pro has 31 catches for 455 yards this season (14.7 average), good for the 18th-most yards in the NFL despite missing nearly five full quarters of play. He has recorded 90 or more receiving yards three times, led off by a five-catch, 93-yard performance in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets. The following week vs. Miami, Higgins totaled a season-high seven catches for 124 yards and a TD. His TD grab came on a third-and-11 in the second quarter, when he beat Pro Bowl CB Xavien Howard down the left sideline and caught a deep ball from QB Joe Burrow for a 59-yard score. It was the 14th receiving TD of his career. In Game 7 against Atlanta, Higgins caught five passes for 93 yards, with five of his receptions going for a first down.

A second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins had 74 catches for 1091 yards and six TDs during the '21 regular season, despite missing three games — Games 3-4 (shoulder), and the regular-season finale (rest). He also had four 100-yard receiving games, including in Game 15 vs. Baltimore, when he posted career-highs in catches (12) and receiving yards (194) and scored two TDs.

He continued his production in the postseason, with two 100-yard receiving performances — 103 yards in the AFC Championship at Kansas City, and 100 in Super Bowl LVI vs. the L.A. Rams. His 18 catches in the postseason tied teammate Joe Mixon and former teammate A.J. Green for fourth-most in Bengals history. His 309 receiving yards were fourth-most in team postseason history. His 75-yard TD on the first play of the second half in Super Bowl LVI was the longest play from scrimmage in Bengals postseason history, and he joined TE Dan Ross as the only Bengals ever with multiple TDs in a single postseason game — Higgins had two TDs in the Super Bowl.

Higgins has 1100 receiving yards over the last 14 weeks of regular-season football, dating back to Week 12 of the 2021 campaign. That total ranks sixth leaguewide — his teammate, WR Ja'Marr Chase, ranks third in that timeframe with 1193 yards.

**Mixon it up:** Bengals HB Joe Mixon has continually shown his ability as a threat in both the running and passing game. In Game 7 against Atlanta, he had 17 carries for 58 yards including a one-yard TD run in the first quarter that expanded Cincinnati's lead to 14-0. Mixon also caught three passes for 33 yards (11.0 average), highlighted by a 22-yard catch and run that put the Bengals in Atlanta territory and eventually led to his rushing score.

The sixth-year back has put together several stat lines that show off his versatility this season, led off by an 82-yard rushing, 63-yard receiving game in the opener vs. Pittsburgh. He had a career-high-tying seven catches in that contest, and it marked the third time in his career that he recorded 60 or more yards in both rushing and receiving. He followed that up with 83 combined yards (57 rushing, 26 receiving) in Week 2 at Dallas.

Mixon averaged 5.6 yards per carry in two straight games (Weeks 5 and 6), as he had 14 attempts for 78 yards at Baltimore and then eight for 45 at New Orleans. He also caught four passes for 23 yards against the Saints, including a nine-yard TD reception to get Cincinnati on the board in the opening quarter.

The University of Oklahoma product established himself among the NFL's elite HBs in 2021, earning his first career Pro Bowl selection. Mixon's career-high 1205 rushing yards ranked third in the league while his 13 rushing TDs were fourth.

In 2021, Mixon became one of just four Bengals ever to surpass 4000 career rushing yards and 1000 career receiving yards, joining Corey Dillon, James Brooks and Pete Johnson. Reaching the 4K/1K mark took Mixon just 60 career games, 11 faster than the next-quickest Bengal (Dillon, 71 games). He topped 1000 career receiving yards in the 2021 season opener vs. Minnesota, and then surpassed 4000 rushing yards in Game 10 at Las Vegas.

Mixon enters Week 8 of the 2022 season with 4969 career rushing yards (fifth-most in Bengals history, 31 away from 5000) and 1504 receiving yards.

It took Mixon just 50 games to reach 3000 rushing and 1000 receiving yards, which also was 11 games quicker than the next-fastest Bengal (Brooks, 61).

Here's a look at the fastest players ever to top 4000 career rushing yards and 1000 career receiving yards in a Bengals uniform (it should be noted that Brooks began his career with the San Diego Chargers from 1981-83; however, the data counts only rushing/receiving yardage and games played as a Bengal):

**Hurst getting in on the action:** Among the headliners of Cincinnati's free agency class in the 2022 offseason was fifth-year TE Hayden Hurst, who over the past four games has been a key part of the passing game. After totaling 11 receptions for 77 yards (7.0 average) in the first three contests, Hurst had 20 catches for 149 yards (7.5 avg.) with two TDs in Games 4-7.

He has faced his former teams in two of the last three weeks. Game 5 saw him make his return to Baltimore, where he spent his first two NFL seasons as a first-round pick of the Ravens in 2018. Hurst caught a season-high six passes for 53 yards, including a 19-yard TD in the second quarter that got Cincinnati on the board. In Game 7 against Atlanta, where he spent the 2020-21 seasons, Hurst had eight catches for 48 yards with four of his receptions going for first downs.

Hurst scored his first TD as a member of the Bengals in Game 4 against Miami, catching a two-yard pass from QB Joe Burrow to put Cincinnati ahead 27-15 with 1:52 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Hurst, who head coach Zac Taylor described in preseason as having "a high football IQ, really good hands, and the speed to be a tough matchup," played for the Ravens from 2018-19 before being acquired by Atlanta in a trade during the '20 offseason. In 2020, his first season with the Falcons, he recorded career highs in catches (56), receiving yards (571) and TDs (six).

Hurst was drafted by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 17th round of the 2012 MLB Draft, and played two seasons as a pitcher ('13) and first baseman ('14) in the Pirates' rookie-level Gulf Coast League affiliate. Following his baseball career, he walked on to the University of South Carolina football team in 2015.

**Bengals revamp O-line in 2022:** Cincinnati addressed its biggest need in the 2022 offseason, signing three premier offensive linemen to help protect QB Joe Burrow. The Bengals inked G Alex Cappa (formerly with Tampa Bay), OT La'el Collins (Dallas) and C Ted Karras (New England).

Prior to joining Cincinnati, the new additions played in a combined 236 games (regular and postseason), with 174 starts. They also provide a winning pedigree, as Karras helped the New England Patriots win Super Bowl LI and LIII, while Cappa was a key member of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers team that took home Super Bowl LV.

A fifth-year pro out of Humboldt State (now Cal Poly Humboldt), Cappa has started each his last 47 games played from 2019-22. He helped the Buccaneers offensive line allow a league-low 23 sacks in 2021, while the team led the NFL in yards per game (405.9) and passing yards per game (307.6).

Collins is in his eighth NFL season after originally signing with Dallas as a college free agent in 2015. The LSU product quickly became a mainstay on the Cowboys O-line, starting 61 of his first 62 career games before suffering a hip injury that kept him on the Reserve/Injured list for the entire 2020 season. With Collins in the lineup, Dallas ranked in the top five in rushing offense for three straight years (2017-19).

After playing his first three seasons (2016-18) primarily as a reserve, Karras became the Patriots' starting center entering '19 and has started 46 out of 49 games since then. He signed with Miami as a free agent in 2020, spending one season with the Dolphins before returning to New England in '21. He started two games at RG in 2021, then took over the starting LG spot for the remainder of the regular season and one playoff game.

The free agency trio, along with fourth-year pro Jonah Williams at LOT and 2022 fourth-round draft pick Cordell Volson at LG, has started each game for Cincinnati this season.

**D tightens after the break:** Through seven games this season, Cincinnati has allowed just 12 points in the third quarter and 30 in the second half/overtime. Comparatively, the Bengals have given up 102 first-half points.

Cincinnati's 12 points allowed in the third quarter are tied for the third-fewest in the league, while the 30 points yielded in the second half/overtime are the second-fewest behind Buffalo (17). In 36 opponent drives in the second half/overtime, the Bengals' defense has forced 16 punts, 11 field goal

attempts and four turnovers on downs, while also recording three FRs and two INTs. Atlanta in Week 7 punted on each of its four offensive possessions in the second half.

The Bengals are the only team in the NFL that has not allowed a TD after halftime this season. In fact, the Bengals are one of just three teams since the NFL/AFL merger in 1970 that have gone seven or more consecutive games without giving up a second-half TD. The 1997 Kansas City Chiefs lead that category with 10 straight games, while the '73 Miami Dolphins went seven straight.

Cincinnati's defensive dominance in the third quarter is a continuation of its 2021 efforts. The Bengals during the '21 regular season allowed just 40 third-quarter points, the second-fewest in the NFL behind Buffalo. They outscored their competition 102-40 in the third quarter, good for a plus-62 point differential that was third-best leaguewide behind Buffalo (plus-70) and Green Bay (plus-63).

**Trey's torrid pace:** In the third quarter of Game 7 vs. Atlanta, DE Trey Hendrickson sacked QB Marcus Mariota for a one-yard loss that forced the Falcons into a third-and-long situation. It bumped Hendrickson's sack total up to 3.5 this season, and added to his rapid rise in becoming one of the NFL's premier pass rushers.

Since the start of the 2020 season, Hendrickson's 31 sacks rank third in the league behind T.J. Watt (38.5) and Myles Garrett (34). A career-high 14 of which came in 2021, his first season with Cincinnati, which were good for fifth in the NFL and second-most in team history behind DE Coy Bacon's 22 in 1976 (Sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder). Hendrickson's production during the 2021 regular season helped him earn his first career Pro Bowl selection.

The sixth-year pro out of Florida Atlantic continued his impressive pace in the 2021 postseason, recording a team-high 3.5 sacks and a forced fumble to help lead Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI.

Hendrickson earned his first career AFC Defensive Player of the Week award for Week 3 of this season, when he logged a career-high 2.5 sacks and two forced fumbles in a win at the N.Y. Jets. After being held without a sack through Cincinnati's first two contests, he became the first Bengals player since at least 2000 to record two-plus sacks and two-plus forced fumbles in a single game. Hendrickson is the first Bengal to win AFC Defensive Player of the Week since DE Carlos Dunlap in Week 17 of 2019.

**Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal:** DE Sam Hubbard, a third-round pick (77th overall) of the Bengals in 2018, ranks third in sacks (26.5) among all players from the '18 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents). He notched his first sack of the 2022 season in the fourth quarter of Game 2 at Dallas, when he brought down QB Cooper Rush for a five-yard loss on third down to force a Cowboys punt. He forced another punt on third down in Game 7 against Atlanta, as he sacked QB Marcus Mariota for a loss of eight yards in the third quarter.

One of Hubbard's most crucial plays this season came late in the fourth quarter of Game 6 at New Orleans. With the Saints driving to take the lead in the final minute and the ball at the Cincinnati 41-yard line, Hubbard and DT B.J. Hill collapsed the pocket and brought down QB Andy Dalton for a seven-yard combined sack, backing New Orleans into a fourth-and-17.

Also known as one of the league's top run defenders on the edge, Hubbard leads the Bengals with six TFLs this season, including two in a Game 4 win against Miami.

Players' listed positions vary by media outlet (e.g. whether they're classified as a LB or DE), but according to NFL.com's draft record, Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected in 2018 — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. According to NFL.com, there were a total of 40 defensive linemen (20 DEs, 20 DTs) selected in the 2018 draft, along with 32 linebackers and one player classified as "EDGE."

Hubbard has been the Bengals' starting RDE since 2019, and during the '21 regular season his 7.5 sacks were second on the team. Hubbard's three sacks in

the postseason ranked tied for fifth among all players, second on the team, and tied for third-most ever by a Bengal for a postseason career (David Grant and Reggie Williams also had three, Trey Hendrickson has 3.5, and Jason Buck had four).

Hubbard signed a contract extension with the Bengals in July 2021 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the end of the 2025 season.

**Wilson among elite young LBs:** Third-year LB Logan Wilson recorded his first INT of the 2022 season in Game 3 at the N.Y. Jets, when he dropped back into deep coverage and picked off a throw by QB Joe Flacco over the middle before returning it 47 yards in the second quarter. Head coach Zac Taylor after the game said it "took him back to his receiver and safety days," as Wilson was an all-state WR and defensive back at Natrona County High School in Wyoming.

Wilson this season is second on the team in tackles (38), despite missing Game 7 against Atlanta with a right shoulder injury. The University of Wyoming product emerged as one of the league's top young linebackers in 2021, when he led the Bengals in tackles (98) and INTs (four) in just his second pro season. His four picks also tied for the most among all NFL LBs, and were the most by a Bengals LB since 2005 (Odell Thurman, five). Consider also that Wilson missed three games (Games 13-15) with a right shoulder injury, and then was inactive (rest) for the season finale at Cleveland. In the 12 full regular-season games in which he was healthy (was injured in first half of Game 12), Wilson led the Bengals in tackles six times.

His strong play continued into the postseason, as he was on the field for all 274 possible snaps in Cincinnati's four-game run. His 39 tackles not only led all NFL players — they were the most by any player in a single postseason since Baltimore's Ray Lewis (51) in 2012. Wilson made numerous key plays throughout the postseason, including an INT with 20 seconds remaining in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee, which gave the ball back to the Bengals' offense and helped set up K Evan McPherson's 52-yard game-winning FG as time expired. He also tackled Titans RB Derrick Henry for a loss on a fourth-and-one in the fourth quarter of that same game, thwarting a Titans drive that had reached Cincinnati's 35-yard line and giving the Bengals the ball back in what was a tie contest.

Since entering the league in 2020, Wilson has recorded seven INTs, the most by any LB. Here is a look at the INT leaders among linebackers since the start of the 2020 regular season:

**Bengals secondary is airtight:** Falcons QB Marcus Mariota in Week 7 finished eight of 13 for 124 yards, good for a passer rating of 118.8. That ended a streak of 10 consecutive games in which the Bengals held opposing QBs to a rating under 100.

The streak dated back to the Wild Card Playoff on Jan. 15 against Las Vegas, and featured 11 quarterbacks failing to eclipse a passer rating of 100 (minimum five pass attempts; Miami's Week 4 starter Tua Tagovailoa left the game in the second quarter and was replaced by Teddy Bridgewater). It becomes even more impressive when noting that two of those QBs — Las Vegas' Derek Carr and Kansas City's Patrick Mahomes — ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passer rating during the 2021 regular season. Also, 10 of the 11 signal callers during the streak were held to under 300 yards passing, and six were limited to fewer than 20 completions.

Despite the streak being snapped by Mariota, the Cincinnati secondary remains one of the most difficult to crack in the NFL. Over the past 11 games (2021 postseason, plus seven games in '22 regular season), the Bengals have held opposing QBs to a 58.6 completion percentage (232 of 396) for a combined 2581 passing yards (234.6 average), while collecting 13 INTs to just 14 pass TDs allowed.

**Corners stepped up in '21 postseason:** Each of the three veteran CBs signed by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason — Eli Apple, Chidobe Awuzie and Mike Hilton — made critical plays during the team's run to Super Bowl LVI.

Awuzie contributed to a stalwart defensive effort in the second half of the AFC Championship at Kansas City, as the Bengals limited the high-powered Chiefs offense to just 66 yards and six points. He led the Cincinnati secondary with eight tackles. Two weeks later, he played all but two snaps in Super Bowl LVI, and on the Rams' first offensive play of the second half picked off a pass from QB Matthew Stafford to set up a Bengals FG drive.

Hilton came through with back-to-back memorable plays in the third quarter of the AFC Divisional at Tennessee, starting with a chase-down tackle of RB D'Onta Foreman on a 45-yard run that prevented a TD. On the very next snap, he batted a pass from QB Ryan Tannehill into the air and intercepted it (19-yard return) to thwart a Titans goal-to-go scoring opportunity.

Apple made one of the signature plays of the team's postseason run with five seconds left before halftime of the AFC Championship at Kansas City. With the ball at the Bengals' one-yard line and the Chiefs leading 21-10, he tackled WR Tyreek Hill in the flat and forced the remaining clock to expire. The tackle is largely credited for providing a momentum shift going into halftime, as Cincinnati roared back in the third quarter with 11 unanswered points.

The CB trio helped limit opponents to 272 passing yards per game and a combined 77.2 passer rating in the postseason. Cincinnati's eight INTs in the postseason were the most by any team since Green Bay in 2010.

**Answering the Bell:** S Vonn Bell has been involved in four turnovers through seven games for the Bengals' defense, including a two-game stretch in which he recorded three INTs. He collected two picks in Game 4 against Miami to help lead the Bengals to a Thursday Night Football win, with one at the Cincinnati nine-yard line as the Dolphins were driving to take the lead late in the fourth quarter.

In Game 5 at Baltimore, he stepped up and intercepted QB Lamar Jackson at the Bengals' 17-yard line with the Ravens leading 10-0 in the second quarter. That INT provided a spark for the whole team, as Cincinnati's offense responded with a TD on the ensuing possession.

Bell also forced a turnover in Game 2 at Dallas, stripping the ball from TE Dalton Schultz in the third quarter. Since joining the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent prior to the 2020 season, Bell has forced seven fumbles, tying for the eighth-most in the NFL and third-most by a defensive back in that time frame.

The Ohio State product has earned a reputation as one of Cincinnati's most consistent players and a trusted leader. Much of that status comes from his remarkable availability, as Bell began his Bengals tenure by playing every snap in his first 20 games with the team. His consecutive snaps streak was broken on Oct. 17, 2021, when the starters were rested late in the fourth quarter of a 34-11 win at Detroit.

And although he missed more snaps throughout the year, including all of Game 17 at Cleveland while on the Reserve/COVID list, Bell still led Cincinnati's defense in snaps played (1004 of 1124) during the regular season. In his now 43 games played (regular and postseason) for the Bengals, he has seen action on 2779 of 2901 possible defensive snaps (95.8 percent), including all 450 through seven contests in 2022.

Bell has been voted a team captain in each of his three seasons with the Bengals. He led the team in tackles (114) in 2020, before ranking second in that category (97) in '21. Bell this season is third on the team in tackles (34) and second in PDs (four).

With an INT at Baltimore, two vs. Miami and another in Game 15 of 2021 against the Ravens, Bell has four INTs in his last nine regular-season games, after recording one in his previous 91 career appearances.

**Mr. Reliable wears No. 30:** Jessie Bates earned a starting S spot midway through his first preseason in Cincinnati, and he hasn't looked back since. The 2018 second-round pick started 51 straight games to begin his Bengals career — that's three full seasons plus three games — until a neck injury ended his streak in the fourth game of 2021 (Sept. 30 vs. Jacksonville). He missed just that one game before returning to the starting lineup the next week, and then started all but one game (pre-playoff rest) thereafter in 2021.

Still, Bates' streak of 51 tied for the sixth-most consecutive starts by a player to begin their career as a Bengal, and the second-most by a defender. Had he started the Jacksonville game, he would have tied former LB Takeo Spikes (52) for most starts to begin a career by a Bengals defender.

Over his first four-plus pro seasons, Bates has steadily established himself as one of the NFL's elite players at his position. Since entering the league in 2018, his 432 total tackles rank 22nd leaguewide and second among defensive

backs. He logged at least 100 tackles each of his first three seasons, and although that number dipped to 88 in the 2021 regular season (did not play in two games), he stepped up in the postseason with a team-leading two INTs and six PDs.

Bates grabbed his first INT of the 2022 season in Game 3 at the N.Y. Jets, when a tipped pass thrown by QB Joe Flacco fell into his hands at the Cincinnati three-yard line with 57 seconds left, sealing the Bengals win. He has logged 18 tackles over the past four games (14 solos), including six each against Miami (Week 4) and at Baltimore (Week 5).

**McPherson breaks own team record:** K Evan McPherson, who quickly became a fan-favorite in Cincinnati during his rookie season in 2021, notched another historic mark in the '22 regular-season opener against Pittsburgh. McPherson kicked a team-record 59-yard field goal in the first quarter to put the Bengals on the board, breaking the previous record of 58 yards that he hit on Dec. 19, 2021 at Denver.

It marked a continuation of some notable performances from training camp and preseason, as McPherson showed no signs of rust coming out of his rookie year. In three preseason games, McPherson hit nine of 10 FG attempts, with three coming from 50 or more yards. On Aug. 12 against Arizona, converted FGs of 58 and 56 yards just in the second quarter. His nine FGs tied for the league lead during preseason, while his 31 points accounted for (made four PATs) were third-most. In the Bengals' "Back Together Saturday" practice on July 30 at Paycor Stadium, McPherson closed out the afternoon by kicking a 65-yard FG in front of an announced crowd of 28,283.

He grabbed another spot on the team's all-time chart in Week 4 vs. Miami, as his 57-yarder in the fourth quarter tied Randy Bullock for the third-longest FG in Bengals history.

**Mac is money from deep:** K Evan McPherson has quickly earned a reputation for being one of the NFL's top kickers from long range. The second-year pro out of Florida is 13 of 15 on FG attempts of 50 or more yards, making him already the Bengals' career leader in 50-plus yard FGs. Even more impressive is that he reached the top of Cincinnati's career chart in that category just 14 games into his rookie season, breaking the previous record of eight.

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson made an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards during the 2021 regular season, and fell just one shy of tying the NFL record for most 50-yarders. His nine such FGs were more than double the previous team record for a single season (four, by K Horst Muhlmann in 1970).

In Week 4 against Miami, McPherson nailed a 57-yard kick in the fourth quarter, his second FG of the night. It marked his 12th FG of 50 or more yards in just his 20th regular-season game, tying Minnesota's Blair Walsh (2012-13) for an NFL record. The performance helped McPherson win his third career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week award.

He notched his 13th FG from 50-plus in Week 6 at New Orleans, converting from 52 yards with 3:42 left in the fourth quarter to make it a two-point game. The Week 7 win against Atlanta marked the first game in McPherson's career in which he did not attempt a FG.

**McPherson's rookie roundup:** K Evan McPherson took the league by storm in his rookie season, putting together one of the most

memorable seasons by a first-year kicker in NFL history. He started it off in style, by booting a game-winning 33-yard FG as time expired in OT to give the Bengals a Week 1 victory over Minnesota on Sept. 12.

At the time of his game-winner, he was 22 years and 53 days old (born 7-21-99), making him the youngest player in NFL history to kick a game-winning FG in overtime. It also made him just the second rookie kicker in NFL history to kick a game-winning FG with no time remaining in OT (the other was Miami K Jason Sanders in 2018).

McPherson went on to make 28 of his 33 FGs and 46 of 48 PATs during the 2021 regular season. Some of his highlights included an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards, which fell just one shy of tying the NFL rookie record (Blair Walsh kicked 10 in 2012). In a sign of things to come, his first NFL FG was a 53-yarder in the season opener vs. Minnesota. On Nov. 21 at Las Vegas, he tied a single-game NFL record with three FGs of at least 50 yards (54, 53 and 51). For perspective, there were only four instances prior to 2021 in which a Bengals kicker made as many as three 50-plus yarders in a full season. On Dec. 19 at Denver, he nailed a then-Bengals-record 58-yard FG as time expired in the first half.

The rookie sensation found a way to best his regular-season production during the Bengals' postseason run to Super Bowl LVI. Over the four-game stretch, he was a perfect 20-for-20 on placekicks, making all 14 of his FG attempts and all six of his PATs. No kicker in NFL history had previously been perfect on as many as 11 FGs in a single postseason. In his postseason debut, the AFC Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, McPherson set team postseason records for points (14) and FGs (four) in a game. In the following week's Divisional Playoff at Tennessee, he hit four more FGs, including a 52-yard game-winner as time expired in regulation — making him the first rookie kicker in NFL postseason history to kick a game-winning FG with no time remaining in the fourth quarter or overtime.

He matched that performance the next week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City, with four FGs including a 31-yarder in overtime that won the game and sent Cincinnati to the Super Bowl.

McPherson's 14 FGs tied former Colts K Adam Vinatieri (2006) for the most in a single postseason in NFL history. K Jim Breech (nine) held the previous Bengals record in that category. McPherson's 48 points are already the second-most by a Bengal for an entire postseason career, trailing Breech, who amassed 52 points in nine games.

**Huber boots 1000th punt:** P Kevin Huber, a 2009 Bengals fifth-round draft pick in his 14th season, recorded his 1000th career punt in Game 6 at New Orleans. He became the sixth player in NFL history to log 1000 punts with a single team, joining Sam Koch (Baltimore, 2006-21), Dustin Colquitt (Kansas City, '05-19), Ray Guy (Oakland/L.A. Raiders, 1973-86), Jerrel Wilson (Kansas City, '63-77) and Shane Lechler (Oakland, '00-12).

Huber's 1004 career punts are the 24th-most in NFL history. A Cincinnati native who played at the University of Cincinnati, Huber has long been considered the top punter in Bengals history. He has cemented that legacy in recent years by taking over the top spot in the few remaining career punting categories he did not already own.

Huber stands first in the following team categories (regular season):

- Punts (1004).
- Punting yards (45,499).
- Gross average (45.32).
- Net average (40.48).
- Inside-20 punts (344).

Huber also has many of the Bengals' single-season and single-game records. Among them are:

- He holds the top five Bengals season averages in both gross and net punting yardage, and in 2020, his 12th NFL season, he re-set his own single-season team records in both categories (47.18 gross, 42.82 net).
- He shares the record for the longest punt in team history (75 yards) with Kyle Larson.

- His 33 inside-20 punts in 2012 is a single-season franchise record.
- His six inside-20 punts on Sept. 14, 2017 vs. Houston are tied with Lee Johnson (Nov. 2, 1997) for the most in a game in Bengals history.

Huber also has been a part of seven Bengals playoff teams (2009, '11-15 and '21) and owns nearly every career postseason punting record in team history. Among those are:

- Total punts (42).
- Punting yards (1879).
- Gross average (44.74).
- Net average (41.29).
- Inside-20 punts (14).

**Huber breaks prestigious record:** P Kevin Huber played in his 208th career game in the regular-season opener against Pittsburgh, breaking a tie with former CB Ken Riley for the most in team history. Riley's record had stood alone since his retirement in 1983, before Huber matched it in the 2021 regular-season finale.

Huber also passed QB Ken Anderson (192 games) and LB Reggie Williams (206) in 2021.

Not far behind Huber on the list is LS Clark Harris, who played in his 202nd game for the Bengals in Week 1 before suffering a biceps injury in the fourth quarter. Harris, a 14th-year veteran who has snapped to Huber since joining Cincinnati midway through the 2009 season, was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 12. He stands fourth in career games as a Bengal, and last season passed Pro Football Hall of Famer Anthony Munoz (185), DT Tim Krumrie (188) and Anderson (192).

**2022 draft class overview:** Cincinnati's six-player draft class in April featured three defensive backs, two defensive linemen and one offensive lineman. The group played in a combined 288 games during their collegiate careers.

Here's a closer look at Cincinnati's 2022 draft class:

• S Dax Hill, Michigan (Round 1, Pick 31): Hill was one of the fastest players in this year's draft (4.38-second 40-yard dash at the NFL Combine) and brings a highly touted versatility to the Bengals' secondary. A first-team All-Big Ten selection as a junior last season, he totaled 42 tackles, including 4.5 for losses, with two INTs and eight PDs. Hill has the ability to line up as a nickel CB or a deep safety. Hill made his regular-season career debut in Game 1 against the Steelers, and started for the first time in Game 3 at the N.Y. Jets. He recorded his first tackle in Game 5 at Baltimore, stopping TE Isaiah Likely on a third down to force a Ravens FG.

• CB Cam Taylor-Britt, Nebraska (Round 2, Pick 60): Cincinnati took a defensive back with each of its first two picks for the first time in team history when it selected the speedy Taylor-Britt out of head coach Zac Taylor's alma mater, Nebraska. He totaled a career-high 51 tackles in 12 starts last season, and is known for his high energy and elite athleticism. After suffering an abdomen injury during training camp, Taylor-Britt was placed on the Reserve/Injured list and missed the first four weeks of the regular season. He returned to the active roster on Oct. 8 and made his career debut in Game 7 against Atlanta, recording three solo tackles on 28 defensive snaps.

• DT Zach Carter, Florida (Round 3, Pick 95): Carter had success lining up on the edge and at the three technique at Florida, where he collected 13 sacks over his final two seasons. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo has indicated Carter will play both on the interior of the defensive line and on the outside. He provides a valuable depth piece and possesses athleticism for his size. Carter had his best game as a pro in Week 7 against Atlanta, recording five tackles (four solos) on 34 defensive snaps.

• G Cordell Volson, North Dakota State (Round 4, Pick 136): The first and only offensive player taken by the Bengals in the 2022 draft, Volson earned the starting role at LG during training camp. He brings a winning pedigree from an elite FCS program at North Dakota State, where he won four national championships and played in a program-record 65 career games. He has lined up for each of the Bengals' 490 offensive snaps through seven games this season.

• S Tycen Anderson, Toledo (Round 5, Pick 166): Anderson tallied 131 tackles and 16 PDs in a five-year career at Toledo, but his earliest contributions with the Bengals may come via special teams, an area he excelled in college. As a defensive back, he relies on his size (6-2, 209) and natural speed (4.26 40-time). In Cincinnati's second preseason contest at the N.Y. Giants, Anderson recorded seven tackles (six solos). Anderson suffered a hamstring injury during preseason and was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 2.

• DE Jeff Gunter, Coastal Carolina (Round 7, Pick 93): Bengals coaches

were pleased to get Gunter in the seventh round, given his knack for rushing the passer and causing turnovers. A three-time All-Sun Belt Conference selection, he recorded 18 career sacks, nine FFs and two blocked FG attempts. In his career debut Week 1 vs. Pittsburgh, Gunter saw action on 20 special teams plays. He lined up for seven defensive snaps in Game 3 at the N.Y. Jets. Gunter has been inactive each of the last two weeks after suffering a left knee injury in pregame warmups before Game 6 at New Orleans.

**Four Bengals listed on "Top 100":** For the 12th consecutive year, current NFL players have voted to determine the top 100 players in the NFL, with the final list revealed throughout August on NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by four players in 2022 — QB Joe Burrow (No. 21), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 24), HB Joe Mixon (No. 38) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 78). It marks the team's second-most selections on a Top 100 list — there were seven Bengals included in 2016.

Burrow, Chase and Mixon made their Top 100 debuts, while Hendrickson made his second appearance after checking in at No. 73 on the 2021 list. Burrow's ranking at No. 21 is the fifth-highest by a Bengal, as WR A.J. Green was listed in the top 20 four times from 2013-17.

**Anderson, Curtis join Bengals Ring of Honor:** Bengals legends Willie Anderson and Isaac Curtis were inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of Game 4 against Miami. They joined the inaugural Ring of Honor class inducted last season, which included QB Ken Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

Regarded as the best right offensive tackle of his era, Anderson played in 182 games (regular and postseason) for Cincinnati from 1996-2007. A four-time Pro Bowler, his 181 regular-season contests are tied for the eighth-most in team history. He blocked for HB Corey Dillon's two NFL-record setting games — an NFL rookie record 246 rushing yards vs. the Tennessee Oilers in 1997 (since broken), and an NFL record 278 rushing yards vs. the Denver Broncos in 2000 (since broken). He also helped set the club record for fewest sacks allowed twice — 21 in 2005 and 17 in '07.

Considered a game-changing wide receiver in his era, Curtis played from 1973-84 and still holds the Bengals record for average yards per reception (17.07). The four-time Pro Bowler ranks third in team history in both career receiving yards (7101) and 100-yard games (20), and is fourth in receiving TDs (53).

Season Ticket Members selected Anderson and Curtis from a ballot that featured 15 individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's history and tradition.

Bengals President Mike Brown on the 2022 inductees: "These are two of our finest all-time players. Willie was as good a right offensive tackle as you could draw up. He had it all — strength, movement and attitude. Isaac had incredible speed along with great hands. This is evidence for how our fans felt about Isaac during his career. They knew he was special. The Bengals are fortunate to have both of these outstanding players in the Ring of Honor."

In addition to his spot in the Bengals Ring of Honor, Ken Riley has also been elected as one of three senior nominees for the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Riley, who passed away in June 2020 at age 72 after playing cornerback for the Bengals from 1969-83, was chosen from the senior committee's list of 12 finalists. To become a member of the 2023 Hall of Fame class, he will need to receive 80 percent of the vote from the regular committee when it meets in February.

Willie Anderson was included among the 129 modern-era nominees for the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 2023 class, which were announced on Sept. 20. That list will be cut to 25 semifinalists in November, before 15 finalists are revealed in early January. In 2022, Anderson was a finalist for the first time in his ninth year of eligibility.

**Bengals home now called Paycor Stadium:** Cincinnati's Week 1 game against Pittsburgh was the first regular-season contest in newly named Paycor Stadium.

The Bengals and Cincinnati-based Paycor expanded their partnership to include stadium naming rights, further strengthening their shared vision and commitment to the Cincinnati community and driving increased national awareness for both organizations.

Paycor, a leading human capital management (HCM) company, is a cornerstone partner of the Bengals, and has served as the team's official and exclusive HR software provider since 2018. Paycor has been headquartered in Cincinnati for over 30 years and recently celebrated one year as a public company following a July 2021 IPO.

The Bengals and Paycor hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the stadium on

Tuesday, Sept. 6 to unveil new branding and celebrate the partnership. Paycor Stadium branding will continue to be integrated throughout the stadium in the coming months.

The stadium was previously called Paul Brown Stadium, named after one of football's most influential coaches and the founder of the Bengals.

"This is a move that I think my father would have agreed to. He was always for what is best for the team," said Bengals President Mike Brown, son of Paul Brown. "This allows the Bengals to continue to compete at the highest level in the NFL and exemplifies our long-term commitment to the community."

**Record crowd at Paycor:** Cincinnati beat the Miami Dolphins in Week 4 in front of a paid attendance of 67,260, marking the largest home crowd in Bengals history. The figure surpassed the previous record of 66,277 set in the Wild Card Playoff against the Las Vegas Raiders on Jan. 15, 2022.

The Paycor Stadium attendance in the season opener vs. Pittsburgh on Sept. 11 was announced at 65,841. The attendance figure for Cincinnati's Week 7 win against Atlanta was 66,158, the fourth-largest in team history. The last time the Bengals had an attendance of more than 65,000 in three consecutive regular-season home games was the 2014 season, when they faced Cleveland in Week 10 (65,871), Pittsburgh in Week 14 (65,512) and Denver in Week 16 (66,107).

**2021 Bengals O boasted young nucleus:** During the 2021 regular season, the Bengals became the first team in NFL history with a 4000-yard passer, 1000-yard rusher and two 1000-yard receivers who were all under 26 years old. QB Joe Burrow (25 years old) had 4611 passing yards, HB Joe Mixon (25) had 1205 rushing yards, and Ja'Marr Chase (21) and Tee Higgins (22) had 1455 and 1091 receiving yards, respectively.

The 2006 Bengals were the only other squad in team history with a 4000-yard passer (Carson Palmer), 1000-yard rusher (Rudi Johnson), and two 1000-yard receivers (Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh).

**Bengal bites:** Since 2011, the Bengals own a 62-6-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points ... Cincinnati's Week 2 game against the Dallas Cowboys at AT&T Stadium had an attendance figure of 92,944, marking the largest crowd the Bengals have played in front of in team history ... WR Tee Higgins' 75-yard TD reception 12 seconds into the third quarter of Super Bowl LVI tied for the quickest second half score in Super Bowl history (Percy Harvin, KOR TD in Super Bowl XLVIII) ... WR Tyler Boyd's 56-yard TD catch from QB Joe Burrow on Dec. 19, 2021 at Denver was the 2000th TD in Bengals history ... According to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players' speed by using GPS, the fastest speed by a Bengals ball-carrier in 2022 came from HB Joe Mixon, who reached 21.11 MPH on a 31-yard run in Game 1 vs. Pittsburgh, the 13th-fastest speed by any player through Week 7 ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster in 2022 is P Kevin Huber, a 14th-year pro who joined the Bengals as a fifth-round pick in 2009 ... The oldest Bengal on the roster is also Huber, who is 37 (born July 16, 1985) ... The youngest Bengal on the roster is S Dax Hill, who is 21 (born Sept. 29, 2000) ... The lightest Bengal on the roster is WR Trent Taylor, who is listed at 181 pounds ... The heaviest Bengal is DT Josh Tupou, who is listed at 340 pounds ... There is a tie for the tallest Bengal between G Max Scharping and G Cordell Volson, who are both listed at 6-6 ... There is also a tie for the shortest player on the roster between WR Trent Taylor and HB Trayveon Williams, who are both 5-8.

### POSITION BY POSITION

**Quarterbacks:** Third-year pro **Joe Burrow** produced perhaps the best season by a QB in Bengals history in 2021, when he completed 366 of 520 pass attempts for 4611 yards (sixth in the NFL), 34 TDs (eighth) and 14 INTs in the regular season. He led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and yards per attempt (8.87), while ranking second in passer rating (108.3). Burrow was instrumental in the team's run to Super Bowl LVI, completing 97 of 142 passes (68.3 percent) for 1105 yards and five TDs over four postseason games. He was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year, becoming the second player in Bengals history to win the award (QB Jon Kitna, 2003). Burrow's 2097 passing yards through seven games this season rank second in the NFL, while his 15 passing TDs are third. In the regular-season opener vs. Pittsburgh, he completed 33 of 53 passes (62.2 percent) for 338 yards and two TDs, while also rushing six times for a career-high 47 yards. Burrow in Week 3 helped lead the Bengals to a road win over the N.Y. Jets with 275 passing yards and three TDs. In the Week 6 win at New Orleans, Burrow passed for 300 yards and three TDs, completing 28 of 37 passes and also notching a rushing score. He followed up that performance with a record-setting day in Game 7 vs. Atlanta, passing for 481 yards (second-highest single-game total in his career) and three touchdowns. Burrow's 81.0 completion percentage (completed 34 of 42 passes) was his second-highest in his career. Next on the depth chart is sixth-year veteran **Brandon Allen**, who started six games for the Bengals in his first two seasons with the team (2020-21). In 11 regular-season games with the Bengals, he has completed 107 of 176 passes (60.8 percent) for 1074 yards, with seven TDs and four INTs. The starting QB for all three preseason games, Allen completed 28 of 38 passes (73.7 percent) and finished with 264 passing yards in August.

**Running backs:** Leading the Bengals' running back room is sixth-year pro **Joe Mixon**, who posted career highs in rushing yards (1205), rushing TDs (13) and rushing attempts (292) in 2021. His rushing yards ranked third in NFL, while his rushing TDs were fourth-most and his total rushing attempts were third. 2021 marked Mixon's third season of 1000 or more rushing yards, and saw him earn his first career Pro Bowl selection. In Week 1 against the Steelers, Mixon had 27 carries for 82 yards while also tying his career high in receptions with seven for 63 yards. He scored his first TD of the season on the opening drive in the Week 4 win against Miami, and finished with 61 yards on 24 carries. In Week 6 at New Orleans, Mixon rushed eight times for 45 yards (5.6 average), while adding four catches for 23 yards and a TD. He found the end zone again in Week 7 vs. Atlanta on a one-yard run in the first quarter and ended the day with 58 yards on 17 carries. Fifth-year pro **Samaje Perine**, who also shared a backfield with Mixon in college at Oklahoma, is in his fourth Bengals season after

beginning his career with Washington. During the 2021 regular season, he had 55 carries for 246 yards and one TD, and 27 catches for 196 yards and one TD. At 5-11, 240 pounds, Perine brings size and a physical rushing style, and he's also used extensively on special teams. In Game 3 at the N.Y. Jets this year, he rushed for 47 yards on nine carries, his most yards on the ground since Week 7 of the 2021 season. Perine also opened the scoring in Week 3 with a 12-yard receiving TD on the Bengals' first drive. He posted season highs in receptions (four) and receiving yards (39) in Week 5 at Baltimore, also rushing three times for 17 yards (5.9 avg.). The next HB on Cincinnati's depth chart is **Chris Evans**, a second-year pro out of the University of Michigan. A sixth-round pick in the 2021 draft, Evans has been primarily utilized on special teams this season, especially at kick returner. **Trayveon Williams**, in his fourth season with the Bengals, has played in 27 career games and totaled 208 rushing yards on 41 attempts as well as six catches for 34 yards. He had a team-high nine carries for 28 yards and a TD in the second preseason contest at the N.Y. Giants.

**Wide receivers:** The top of the Bengals' wide receiver depth chart features one of the most explosive pass-catching trios in the NFL in **Tyler Boyd**, **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Through Week 7, each of them ranks in the top 20 in the NFL in receiving yards. Boyd, a seventh-year pro, is considered a premier slot receiver that poses a challenge for nickel corners with his size (6-2, 203). He has 417 career regular-season catches for 5026 yards and 27 TDs, and led the team in receptions each year from 2018-20 before sharing production with Chase and Higgins last season. Boyd scored the first TD of the Bengals' 2022 season on a two-yard pass from Burrow in Week 1 vs. Pittsburgh. He caught four passes for 105 yards in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, including a 56-yard TD reception on the final play of the first quarter. Boyd amassed a career-high 155 receiving yards on eight catches (19.4 avg.) in Week 7 vs. Atlanta, highlighted by a 60-yard TD reception from Burrow on the opening drive just two minutes into the game. Chase, the team's first-round pick in the 2021 NFL Draft (No. 5 overall), had one of the top rookie seasons in NFL history a year ago. He led the Bengals and set team rookie records in catches (81), receiving yards (1455) and receiving TDs (13). His yardage total was an NFL rookie record for the Super Bowl Era and the most in team history, topping Chad Johnson's 1440 yards in 2007. In the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, Chase paced the Bengals with 10 catches for 129 yards and a game-tying TD with two seconds remaining. In Week 5 at Baltimore, he led the team in receptions (seven) and had 50 yards receiving (7.1 avg.). A native of Metairie, La., Chase returned to his home state in Week 6 at New Orleans and led the Bengals with seven catches for 132 yards (18.9 avg.) and two TDs. His second score was a 60-yard catch

and run that went in as the game-winner with 1:57 remaining in the fourth quarter. It marked his sixth career TD reception of 50 or more yards, the most in the NFL since 2021. Chase had another excellent showing in Game 7 vs. Atlanta, catching eight passes for 130 yards (16.3 avg.) and two TDs. Through Week 7, he ranks sixth in the NFL in receiving yards (605) and tied for second in receiving TDs (six). Among the most promising young WRs in the NFL is third-year pro Higgins, who last season eclipsed 1000 receiving yards (1091) for the first time. After exiting the regular-season opener against Pittsburgh in the second quarter with a concussion, he returned to lead the team with six catches for 71 yards (11.8 avg.) and a TD in Week 2 at Dallas. Higgins added 93 more receiving yards on five catches in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, with all of his production coming in the first half. He paced the Bengals in receiving in Week 4, posting seven catches for 124 yards (17.7 avg.) and a 59-yard TD. Higgins finished the Week 7 game vs. Atlanta with five receptions for 93 yards (18.6 avg.). Fourth-year pro **Stanley Morgan**, a 2019 college free agent signee of the Bengals, provides depth at receiver and excels particularly as a blocker. Morgan also serves as one of Cincinnati's primary gunners on special teams, and saw action at KOR in 2021. Seventh-year pro **Mike D. Thomas** (not to be confused with Bengals S Michael J. Thomas) adds value as a speedy rotational receiver, as well as on special teams. Thomas joined the Bengals in 2020 but spent his first four NFL seasons with the L.A. Rams, where in '17 his assistant WRs coach was Zac Taylor. In Week 1 against the Steelers, Thomas caught a two-point conversion that cut the deficit to 17-14 in the third quarter. He hauled in a 33-yard pass from QB Joe Burrow in the second quarter in Week 5 at Baltimore, the second-longest reception of his career. Veteran slot WR **Trent Taylor** was signed to the Bengals practice squad in 2021 after three full seasons (missed '19) in San Francisco. Taylor had a strong preseason, catching six passes for 106 yards (17.7 avg.) in three games, while also returning one punt for 31 yards.

**Tight ends:** One of the headliners of the Bengals' 2022 free agency class was TE **Hayden Hurst**, who came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the Atlanta Falcons ('20-21) and two with the Baltimore Ravens ('18-19). He has proven himself as a downfield threat at the TE position, with 154 career catches for 1530 yards and 14 TDs. He caught five passes for 46 yards (9.2 avg.) in his Bengals debut against Pittsburgh. In Week 4, Hurst hauled in three passes for 27 yards (9.0 avg) including a two-yard TD pass from QB Joe Burrow in the fourth quarter to seal the win against the Dolphins. He followed up that performance with six catches for 53 yards at Baltimore, one of his two former teams, and he scored his second TD of the season on a 19-yard pass in the second quarter. Hurst matched his season-high in receptions (six) and garnered 48 yards receiving in Week 7 vs. Atlanta, his other former team. Third-year pro **Mitchell Wilcox**, a 2020 college free agent signee who spent his rookie year on the team's practice squad, has caught five passes for 44 yards this season, including two for 14 in Game 7 against Atlanta. Wilcox was called upon to serve as the team's long snapper after veteran LS Clark Harris left the season opener vs. Pittsburgh with a biceps injury. Rounding out the tight ends room is **Devin Asiasi**, who the Bengals acquired on waivers from New England on Aug. 31. Originally a third-round pick of the Patriots in 2020, he made his Bengals debut in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, playing 24 offensive snaps.

**Offensive linemen:** The Bengals invested heavily in revamping the offensive line during the offseason, signing three marquee free agents in RG **Alex Cappa**, ROT **La'el Collins** and C **Ted Karras**. Cappa, a fifth-year pro out of Humboldt State, spent the past four seasons with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He has started every regular-season contest in which he has been active since the start of the 2019 season, only missing three games in that span. Cappa was placed on the Active/Physically Unable to Perform (PUP) list at the start of training camp, but returned to make his first start as a Bengal at RG in the regular-season opener. Collins, who was placed on the Active/Non-Football Injury list at the start of camp, also returned in time to start at ROT in Week 1. From 2017-19, he started all but one regular-season contest and helped Dallas rank in the top five leaguewide in rushing yards per game each of those seasons. Karras has taken over the starting center spot for the Bengals, but he brings starting experience at all three interior OL positions. He has also quickly become a vocal leader in the Bengals' locker room and was voted one of seven team captains. Karras entered the 2022 season with 34 career starts at C, 12 at LG and five at RG. He was a member of two Super Bowl-winning Patriots teams in 2016 and '18, and became New England's starting C in '19. Now in his third season as Cincinnati's starting LOT is 2019 first-round pick **Jonah Williams**, who played a team-high 96 percent of offensive snaps in 2021 (regular and postseason). Williams has been praised by Burrow and head coach Zac Taylor for his steady play this season. The lone offensive player selected by the Bengals in the 2022 NFL Draft, G **Cordell Volson** earned the starting role at LG

during training camp. He has lined up for each of the Bengals' 490 offensive snaps through seven games this season. **Hakeem Adeniji**, a sixth-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, is a versatile backup on the Bengals' O-line. Currently listed at OT, he took over as the starting RG midway through the 2021 season and earned praise from coaches for his consistent play. In the AFC Championship at Kansas City, Adeniji started and split time at RG with **Jackson Carman**, a 2021 second-round pick of the Bengals who is in his second season. Carman, a native of Fairfield, Ohio (approx. 25 miles north of Cincinnati), started at LG in the preseason opener against Arizona and in the finale against the L.A. Rams, but missed the contest at the N.Y. Giants due to COVID-19 protocols. Carman saw action on four special teams plays in the season opener against Pittsburgh. Another key reserve along the interior of the line is second-year pro C **Trey Hill**, who played in 13 regular-season games (three starts) and all four postseason contests in 2021. The Bengals added more size and experience to the interior of the line when they acquired G **Max Scharping** on waivers on Aug. 31. Scharping, who is listed at 6-foot-6 and 325 pounds, played in 48 games with 33 starts for the Texans in three seasons (2019-'21), and made his Cincinnati debut in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, seeing action on six special teams plays. Adding depth at LOT is second-year pro **D'Ante Smith**, a fourth-round pick of the Bengals in 2021. He earned snaps at both LOT and G during his rookie campaign.

**Defensive linemen:** Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller graduate **Sam Hubbard** is in his fifth Bengals season (fourth as a full-time starter) and is considered the leader of the defensive line. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard has 26.5 career sacks and is also considered among the best DEs in the NFL against the run. He tallied his first sack of the season in the fourth quarter of the Week 2 contest at Dallas, bringing down QB Cooper Rush for a five-yard loss. He finished the day with four tackles (three solos), one sack and one PD. In Week 4 vs. Miami, Hubbard notched four tackles (three solos), including two for losses. He had a season-high seven tackles in Week 6 at New Orleans, including a half-sack on Saints QB Andy Dalton with under a minute remaining that forced a fourth-and-17. Hubbard added another sack in Week 7 vs. Atlanta, when he brought down QB Marcus Mariota for a loss of eight yards on third-and-seven to force a punt in the third quarter. His six TFLs this season lead the team. On the other side of the line is DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who joined the team as a free agent in 2021 and posted a career-high 14 sacks last season. That total ranked fifth in the NFL and second in team history. In Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, Hendrickson was a disruptive force with 2.5 sacks and two forced fumbles, becoming the first Bengal with that stat line since at least 2000. His 31 sacks since the start of the 2020 regular season are third-most among all players. DT **B.J. Hill** was acquired in a trade with the N.Y. Giants shortly before the 2021 regular season, and proved to be a productive interior defender with 5.5 sacks (fourth on team) in a reserve role. In Week 1, Hill recorded three tackles, including the team's first sack of the 2022 season on Steelers QB Mitchell Trubisky for a loss of two yards in the third quarter. He followed up that performance with five tackles, tied for second-most on the team, with one PD in Week 2 at Dallas. Hill collected his first two career fumble recoveries in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, while also recording four tackles, a half-sack and a forced fumble. He had a season-high six tackles (three solos) in Week 6 at New Orleans, including a half-sack on Dalton with under a minute remaining that forced a fourth-and-17. DT **Josh Tupou** played in 17 games with nine starts in 2021, and suffered a right knee injury in the regular-season finale that limited him to just five snaps in the first three postseason games. He returned to action in Super Bowl LVI, helping limit the Rams to just 1.9 yards per rushing attempt. Tupou became the team's starting NT in Week 4 this season after DJ Reader suffered a knee injury. A fourth-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, DE **Cam Sample** played in 14 regular-season games last year as a rotational defensive lineman, collecting 14 tackles including 1.5 sacks. He notched his first sack of the 2022 season in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, bringing down QB Joe Flacco for a six-yard loss in the second quarter. DT **Zach Carter** was selected by Cincinnati in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft, and is coming off a career-high five-tackle performance (four solos) in Week 7 against the Falcons. He made his first career start at DT in Game 4 vs. Miami and recorded his first NFL tackle. Second-year DE **Joseph Ossai** returned to action in the regular-season opener after missing the 2021 regular and postseason due to a knee injury. Originally a Bengals third-round pick in 2021, he moved to the United States at age 10 from Ketu Ijanikin, Lagos, Nigeria, and was raised in Conroe, Texas (outside Houston). In Week 7, Ossai recorded his first career sack, forcing the Falcons to punt on their only drive in the fourth quarter. Rookie DE **Jeff Gunter** was also taken in the seventh round, as the Bengals coaches were pleased to get the Coastal Carolina product late in the 2022 draft. Gunter is listed as a DE, but played at different spots along the line in college and recorded 18 sacks. The most recent addition to the D-line is DT **Jay Tufele**, who

was acquired on waivers from Jacksonville on Aug. 31. Listed at 6-foot-3, 305 pounds, he originally was a fourth-round pick of the Jaguars in 2021 and played in four games last season. With the DT spot missing a few players due to injuries in Week 7, Tufele took advantage of his opportunity and tied for second on the team in tackles with six (three solo). It was his second consecutive game with six tackles.

**Linebackers:** Among Cincinnati's most promising young defenders is third-year pro **Logan Wilson**, who wears the "green dot" as the defense's communicator. Despite missing four games in 2021, Wilson still finished as the team's leader in both tackles (98) and INTs (four). His INT total tied for the most among all NFL linebackers during the regular season (Shaquille Leonard, Indianapolis). Wilson made several crucial plays during Cincinnati's postseason run to Super Bowl LVI, with the two most notable coming in the AFC Divisional at Tennessee — he tackled RB Derrick Henry for a two-yard loss on a fourth-and-one in the fourth quarter while the game was tied at 16, and then he intercepted a QB Ryan Tannehill pass with 20 seconds remaining that set up a game-winning FG. Wilson logged 39 tackles in the postseason, the most by any NFL player in a single postseason since Ray Lewis in 2012 (51). In Week 1 vs. Pittsburgh, Wilson led the team in tackles (nine) and logged a PD. He grabbed his first INT of the season in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, picking off QB Joe Flacco in the second quarter. In the Week 4 contest vs. Miami, Wilson finished second on the team with seven tackles (four solos), including one TFL. He tied for second on the team with seven tackles (all solos) in Game 5 at Baltimore. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2019 was **Germaine Pratt**, who has grown into a key starter on defense after being considered a raw prospect early in his pro career. Pratt switched from S to LB late in his college career, but earned a starting LB spot with the Bengals midway through his rookie season. He drew praise from coaches for his grasp of the defense, and took over the "green dot" responsibility on defense while Wilson was out with an injury late in the 2021 regular season. In the Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, Pratt intercepted a QB Derek Carr pass on fourth-and-goal late in the fourth quarter that sealed a Cincinnati win. In the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh, he tied for the team lead with eight tackles, including a TFL, and had a PD. After missing the Week 3 contest at the N.Y. Jets with a knee injury, he bounced back to lead the defense with nine tackles (six solos) in Game 4 vs. Miami. In Week 5 at Baltimore, Pratt again paced the Bengals with eight tackles (two solos), including his first sack of the season on QB Lamar Jackson in the second quarter. He finished as the team's leading tackler for a third consecutive week in Game 6 at New Orleans and totaled 14 stops (five solos), the second-highest single-game total of his career. Pratt logged six (two solos) in Week 7 against Atlanta. He leads the Bengals in tackles (50) through the first seven games in '22. Third-year pro **Markus Bailey**, a 2020 seventh-round pick of the Bengals, was a rotational player early in the 2021 season, but late in the year he took on an increased role due to injury issues at LB. Bailey has earned the nickname "The Waterboy" from teammates for his all-out playing style. In Week 4 vs. Miami, Bailey led the team with two special teams tackles. The Bengals added second-year pro **Clay Johnston** to their LB room during the 2021 bye in Week 10 to help with injury and COVID-19 issues. He had a remarkable stat line in the second preseason game at the N.Y. Giants, finishing with 20 tackles (16 solo), including a sack in the second quarter. The 20 tackles surpassed his career total of 18 in 14 regular-season games played. Johnston's 29 total tackles in three preseason games led all NFL players. In the Divisional Playoff win at Tennessee last season, Johnston tackled Titans RB Derrick Henry for a loss on a two-point conversion to keep the score tied. Johnston has appeared in each of Cincinnati's first seven games this season. A 2020 Bengals fourth-round pick, **Akeem Davis-Gaither** turned in perhaps the best performance of his career in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets. He led Cincinnati with a career-high 13 tackles, including a TFL in the first quarter that put the Jets in a third-and-long situation. Davis-Gaither led the Bengals with eight tackles (six solos) in Week 7 against Atlanta.

**Defensive backs:** S **Jessie Bates III**, a fifth-year pro and 2018 Bengals second-round pick, is considered one of the core leaders of the team. Bates earned a starting S spot in training camp as a rookie and started the first 51 games of his career — that's three seasons plus three games — until a neck injury broke the streak and held him out of Cincinnati's Week 4 game vs. Jacksonville last season. He then returned to the lineup the following week and has not missed a game since. Named the team's designated franchise player on March 7, Bates signed the one-year tender offer on Aug. 23 and was placed on the Exempt/Commissioner Permission list. He reverted to the active roster on Sept. 5 and started in Week 1 vs. Pittsburgh. Bates snagged his first INT of the season in Game 3 at the N.Y. Jets, picking off QB Joe Flacco late in the fourth quarter to seal a Bengals win. Bates made several critical plays during

Cincinnati's postseason run to Super Bowl LVI, including an INT on the first play from scrimmage in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and a pick just before halftime of the Super Bowl. In overtime of the AFC Championship at Kansas City, Bates tipped a deep pass from QB Patrick Mahomes that was intercepted by S **Vonn Bell**, setting up Cincinnati's game-winning drive. Bell, a seventh-year pro, joined the Bengals in 2020 after spending his first four seasons with New Orleans. He has been a team captain in each of his three Bengals seasons, and finished the 2021 regular season with 97 tackles (second on team). Bell tallied a team-high seven tackles and had a key forced fumble in the Week 2 contest at Dallas. Against the Dolphins in Game 4, he recorded four tackles (all solos) and had two critical INTs. His second came with under four minutes left in the fourth quarter, when he picked off QB Teddy Bridgewater to end a potential go-ahead TD drive for Miami. It marked his first career multi-INT game. Bell, whose three INTs are tied for third in the NFL, added another takeaway in Week 5 at Baltimore, as he picked off QB Lamar Jackson at the Cincinnati 17-yard line in the second quarter. During the 2020 offseason, the Bengals brought in three free agent CBs to help bolster their pass defense. One of the high-profile additions was **Chidobe Awuzie**, who came to Cincinnati after spending the first four years of his career with the Dallas Cowboys. He started all four postseason contests, and in Super Bowl LVI had an INT on the Rams' first play of the second half to set up a Bengals FG. He had four tackles (one solo) and two PDs in Week 6 at New Orleans. Another 2020 free agency addition was **Mike Hilton**, who is widely considered one of the top slot CBs in the NFL. Hilton, who is under contract through the 2024 season, is among the smallest players on the roster at 5-9, 184 pounds, but he is known as a sure tackler and outstanding blitzer. Hilton had a 24-yard pick-six in last season's Nov. 28 win against Pittsburgh, his former team, and he said it was his first career pick-six at any level dating back to pee-wee football. In Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets, Hilton recorded a season-high eight tackles (five solos). CB **Eli Apple** was originally slated to add depth after signing with the Bengals in March of 2021, but he ended up starting nearly every game last season (15 of 16 in regular season, all four in postseason). He had two INTs and 10 PDs during the regular season, but his biggest play came just before halftime of the AFC Championship at Kansas City, when he tackled Chiefs WR Tyreek Hill at the one-yard line to keep the Bengals within 11 points at the break. Apple has a familiarity with Bell, whom he played alongside in college at Ohio State, as well as with defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo, who was his position coach with the N.Y. Giants in 2018. Apple totaled a season-high six tackles (three solos), including one for loss in Week 6 at New Orleans. The Bengals selected S **Dax Hill** with the No. 31 overall pick in the 2022 NFL Draft. Hill brings a highly touted versatility to the Bengals secondary, possessing the ability to line up as a nickel CB and occasionally on the outside, in addition to safety. He spent three seasons (2019-21) at Michigan, starting 23 consecutive games to conclude his career. Hill totaled 151 tackles, including seven for losses, with four INTs and 20 PDs. In the two preseason contests he suited up for, Hill recorded seven tackles (five solos), one INT and two PDs. His INT came in the opening quarter at the N.Y. Giants, when he tracked down a tipped ball and dove to get his hands under it. Hill made his first career start in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets. A physically imposing member of the secondary is 6-3, 200-pound CB **Tre Flowers**, who joined Cincinnati on waivers from Seattle in October of 2021. Flowers fills a rotational role for the Bengals, mostly used to cover TEs in passing situations. Also joining the Bengals last October was S **Michael J. Thomas**. Thomas went on to play in eight regular-season games (one start) and all four postseason games, quickly becoming a core contributor on special teams. He saw 72 snaps on special teams (tied for fourth on the team) in the postseason, including 21 in Super Bowl LVI. He was elected by his teammates as one of seven team captains, marking the seventh time in the past eight seasons that he has worn the captains' patch. Third-year pro **Jalen Davis** has also carved out a prominent role on special teams, in addition to serving as a rotational slot CB. The 5-10, 185-pound Davis joined the Bengals in mid-2020 and was thrust into action quickly while the team dealt with a wave of injuries and COVID-19 issues.

**Special teams:** Cincinnati native and the longest-tenured player on the roster, **Kevin Huber**, continues to handle the Bengals' punting duties for a 14th consecutive season. Huber, a graduate of Archbishop McNicholas High School and the University of Cincinnati, originally was a fifth-round pick of his hometown Bengals in 2009. In the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh, Huber surpassed CB Ken Riley for most career games played (208) in team history. He is considered the top punter in team history and stands as the Bengals' career leader in every significant punting category, including punts (1002), punting yards (45,406), gross average (45.32), net average (40.43) and inside-20 punts (344). LS **Cal Adomitis** is handling long-snapping duties for Cincinnati after being signed from the practice squad to the active roster on Sept. 12. Adomitis, who made his NFL debut in Week 2 at Dallas, originally joined the

team as a college free agent in May after a five-year career at the University of Pittsburgh. K **Evan McPherson** became a fan-favorite during his rookie season in 2021, when he produced one of the best debut seasons by a kicker in NFL history. He made five game-winning "walk-off" kicks with no time remaining or in OT — three during the regular season, two in the postseason. He clinched the AFC North Division title for Cincinnati with a 20-yarder on Jan. 2 vs. Kansas City, securing the Bengals' first playoff berth since 2015. He knocked through a 52-yarder in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee that sent Cincinnati to the AFC Championship, and also hit from 31 yards in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City, which punched Cincinnati's ticket to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson said that entering the season, he had never kicked a game-winning FG at any level of football. He was particularly effective from long range, and during the regular season netted nine field goals of at least 50 yards — the most-ever by a

Bengal in a season. In Week 1 against Pittsburgh, McPherson broke his own record for the longest kick in franchise history with a 59-yarder in the first quarter. He was perfect in Week 6 at New Orleans, converting his lone FG attempt of 52 yards in the fourth quarter and also going three for three on PATs. McPherson hit all five of his PATs in Week 7 against the Falcons, but did not attempt a FG for the first time in his career. Through seven games this season, he has converted 11 of 13 FG attempts (84.6 percent) and 16 of 17 PATs (94.1 percent). Four of his FGs have come from 50 or more yards. The Bengals used a rotation of players at PR in 2021, but late in the year WR **Trent Taylor** took over full-time duties. He had two returns for 33 yards (16.5 avg.) in Week 6 at New Orleans. Through seven games he has 14 punt returns for 170 yards (12.1 avg.), marking the eighth-best average in the NFL. HB **Chris Evans** is the Bengals' primary kick returner, who flashed his speed on two KORs in the preseason. After not having a kick return opportunity through the first four weeks of the season, Evans amassed 133 yards on six KOR (22.2 avg.) in the last three weeks.

Cincinnati also entered the game ranked seventh in rush defense, but allowed 9.8 yards per carry to Browns RB Nick Chubb. Forced to play from behind most of the game, Cincinnati went pass-heavy but never could find its footing. Cincinnati fell to 5-4, while Cleveland improved to 5-4.

Having clinched the AFC North title the previous week and with few seeding implications on the line, Cincinnati rested nearly every starter — including QB Joe Burrow — in the regular-season finale. The Browns, who had been mathematically eliminated from the playoff race, also were without their starting QB, Baker Mayfield (shoulder). Bengals rookie WR Ja'Marr Chase entered the contest needing 12 yards to break Chad Johnson's team receiving yardage record for a season, so he played five snaps, caught two passes for 26 yards, and then promptly exited for the remainder of the afternoon. Browns QB Case Keenum led Cleveland to a 14-0 lead early in the second quarter, but a 29-yard scoop-and-score by Bengals practice squad S Trayvon Henderson drew Cincinnati close at halftime. The Bengals added a FG and TD in the second half to keep the game close, but the Browns recovered an onside kick just before the two-minute warning and drained the remaining clock to hold on for the win. Cleveland ended its season 8-9, while Cincinnati finished 10-7 and secured the No. 4 seed in the AFC playoffs.

The Bengals had yet another opportunity for a game-winning kick when they moved into McPherson's FG range with less than two minutes left in OT, but Burrow was sacked on third down for the seventh time of the game to force a punt, and Pittsburgh quickly drove 45 yards to get in position to convert a 53-yard game-winning FG as OT expired.

QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase made their return to Caesars Superdome, where they helped Louisiana State win the 2019 college football national championship, and connected on two TDs in the second half to lead the Bengals to a road win. Chase, a New Orleans-area native, gave Cincinnati its first lead of the afternoon on a 60-yard catch and run to the end zone with 1:57 remaining in regulation. Chase finished with seven catches for 132 yards (18.9-yard average), while Burrow completed 28 of 37 passes for 300 yards and four total TDs (three passing, one rushing). Former Bengals QB Andy Dalton started for the Saints and helped them build a 17-7 lead early in the second quarter, and New Orleans had 164 rushing yards in the first half against a Bengals defense that came in allowing just 99.6 per game. But the Cincinnati offense flipped its switch late in the second quarter when Burrow recorded a 19-yard rushing TD on a scramble, and the Bengals scored on their final four drives. The Saints still had a chance for the win as the end of regulation approached, but Bengals DT B.J. Hill and DE Sam Hubbard teamed up for a late sack on Dalton to force a fourth-and-17 in the final minute, and his desperation heave on fourth down with 34 seconds left fell incomplete. Cincinnati improved to 3-3, while New Orleans fell to 2-4.

Sunday, Oct. 23, 2022 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals opened the game with four straight TD drives and recorded 537 net yards of offense in a dominant home win. QB Joe Burrow completed 34 of 42 passes for 481 yards and four total TDs (three passing, one rushing). He started the day with a 60-yard TD pass to WR Tyler Boyd on the game's fourth play from scrimmage. Boyd caught eight passes for 155 receiving yards (118 in the first half), while WR Ja'Marr Chase added eight receptions for 130 yards and two TDs. Chase's TDs both came in the second quarter, and both on receptions of over 30 yards. The Falcons scored 17 points in the final five minutes of the first half to cut their deficit to 11 points, 28-17, but the Bengals' defense forced Atlanta to punt on each of its four second-half possessions, and Burrow led a game-ending drive that took the last 8:44 off the clock to secure the win. The Bengals' defense extended to seven the number of consecutive games in which Cincinnati had not allowed a second-half touchdown, just the third such streak since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger. The Bengals improved to 4-3, while Atlanta fell to 3-4.
