GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 8:15 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will be streamed live on Prime Video. In Cincinnati, it also will air live on WCPO-TV (ABC Ch. 9). Broadcasters are Al Michaels (play-by-play), Kirk Herbstreit (analyst) and Kaylee Hartung (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

In addition, the game will air nationally on Westwood One Radio. Broadcasters are Tom McCarthy (play-by-play) and Jason McCourty (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals face a familiar divisional foe on Thursday Night Football when they take on the Baltimore Ravens at M&T Bank Stadium. Cincinnati is looking to get back in the win column after falling to Houston 30-27 on a last-second FG in Week 10.

The loss snapped a four-game win streak for the Bengals, who now hold a 5-4 record through nine games for the third consecutive season. Cincinnati is a combined 12-3 from this point over the past two regular seasons, using a late surge to earn back-to-back AFC North Division titles. But still ahead for the 2023 Bengals are six opponents that enter Week 11 with a winning record, beginning with a Ravens team that leads the division at 7-3.

"It's only the halfway point," head coach Zac Taylor said. "We know we've got four more divisional games left. We can just focus on this one right now and deal with the chaos. All that matters to us is this Baltimore game, putting our best foot forward and finding a way to get a win, and then we'll deal with what's thrown at us next."

Houston held an advantage for most of the game on Sunday, building a 10-point lead late in the fourth quarter. A Bengals loss appeared imminent after QB Joe Burrow threw his second INT of the quarter with 3:53 remaining, but when CB Cam Taylor-Britt came up with his own pick three plays later and returned it to the Texans' four-yard line, Cincinnati found new life. The offense capitalized with a TD run from HB Joe Mixon, then the defense forced a quick punt to get Burrow the ball back ahead of the two-minute warning. Burrow hit WR Tyler Boyd for a 64-yard gain on the second play of the drive to give the Bengals a chance to take the lead, but an incompletion on third-and-goal caused them to settle for a FG that knotted the score 27-27.

The Texans' final drive proved to be representative of their afternoon, as rookie QB C.J. Stroud completed passes of 25 and 22 yards to set up the game-winning FG. Houston posted 544 offensive net yards — the most by any Bengals opponent this season — with Stroud contributing 356 through the air and RB Devin Singletary logging 150 rushing yards.

On the other side, Cincinnati scored a TD on its opening possession for a fifth consecutive game — the longest streak in team history and longest in the NFL since 2016 (Atlanta, six games). But the Bengals' offense stalled through the next two quarters, punting on five consecutive possessions while picking up two first downs in that stretch. The Houston offense was firing on all cylinders in the meantime, scoring 20 straight points to build a 20-7 Texans lead.

Cincinnati found its stride again midway through the third, when an Evan McPherson FG was followed by a 64-yard TD from Burrow to WR Ja'Marr Chase to make it a three-point affair. Chase, whose status coming into the game was

questionable due to a back injury, battled through and finished with five catches for a team-high 124 yards.

"He had a good mindset and wanted to compete," said Burrow on his Pro Bowl receiver. "He certainly did that today, so anytime you get a guy like Ja'Marr out there on the field, it certainly raises the entire team, raises the whole stadium. I was proud of him for fighting through that, coming out there today and making some big plays for us."

Burrow, Chase and the rest of the Bengals now face a quick turnaround for Thursday, and prepare to go against a Baltimore defense that is allowing the fewest points per game (15.7) and second fewest yards per game (273.6) in the NFL this season. The Bengals dropped their first matchup against the Ravens, a 27-24 final at Paycor Stadium in Week 2 that saw Baltimore's vaunted rushing attack net 178 yards on the ground.

The series: The series is relatively even overall, with Baltimore currently holding a slim 29-26 lead in regular season, and Cincinnati holding a 1-0 lead in postseason. The Bengals, however, have won four of the last six matchups, including a 24-17 win in an AFC Wild Card Playoff last season.

Here are some series notes:

- When Cincinnati took a 23-22 series lead in Week 2 of the 2018 season, it was the first time the Bengals had led the series since after the first of two meetings in 1998, when they were up 3-2. That lead didn't last long, however, as the Ravens followed up by winning the next five meetings.

- The Ravens swept the Bengals in two consecutive seasons (2019 and '20) before the Bengals swept the Ravens in '21. Prior to 2019, the Ravens had not swept the Bengals since 2011.

- The Bengals' 2021 sweep of the Ravens was their first since '15.

- It hasn't been an easy series for the visiting team. The Bengals lead 18-11 in Cincinnati (including postseason); the Ravens lead 18-9 in Baltimore.

- Since 2010, 17 of the teams' 28 meetings have been one-score decisions, by eight or fewer points.

The last meeting: A summary of the most recent Bengals-Ravens game (on Sept. 17 at Paycor Stadium) is on page 17 of this news release.

Bengals on Thursday: The Bengals have played 17 times previously on Thursday, posting a 10-7 record. Cincinnati has a 7-2 record on TNF at home, but just a 3-5 mark on the road. One of the Thursday games, in 2010, was played on Thanksgiving. The Bengals have won both of their previous Thursday night meetings against Baltimore (both were played in Cincinnati). This week's game will be the fourth TNF game the Bengals have played under head coach Zac Taylor and QB Joe Burrow (2-1 record).

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2023 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 1878 career passing attempts, 343 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth place all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.
- Burrow has 1277 completions, 738 shy of Esiason (2015) for fourth place all-time. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654) and Palmer (2024) hold the top three spots on the team's career list. Burrow in Week 9 surpassed Blake (1240) for fifth place.

- Burrow has 13,982 passing yards, 1152 shy of Blake (15,134) for fifth place all-time.
- Burrow has 96 TD passes, 58 shy of Palmer (154) for fourth place all-time. Burrow in Week 9 surpassed Blake (93) for fifth place.
- Burrow in Week 10 vs. Houston had his 19th career game with 300 or more passing yards, tying Anderson for third most all-time. Dalton (28) and Esiason (23) have the two most in team history.
- HB Joe Mixon in Week 10 vs. Houston had 11 rushing attempts, moving his career total to 1451. That surpassed HB Rudi Johnson (1441) for second place all-time. HB Corey Dillon (1865) is the team's career record holder.
- Mixon has 5914 career rushing yards, 533 shy of HB James Brooks (6447) for second place all-time. Dillon (8061) is the team's career record holder. Mixon in Week 6 surpassed Rudi Johnson (5742) for third place.
- Mixon has 44 rushing TDs, one shy of Dillon (45) for third place all-time and four shy of Rudi Johnson (48) for second place. FB Pete Johnson (64) is the team's career record holder.
- Mixon has 14 games with 100 or more rushing yards, one shy of HB Cedric Benson for fourth place all-time. Dillon (28), Rudi Johnson (19) and Brooks (17) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.
- WR Tyler Boyd has 490 career receptions, 17 shy of WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fourth place all-time. Boyd in 2022 surpassed WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for fifth place.
- K Evan McPherson has an 83.5 career FG percentage (66 made/79 att.), the third highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9 percent; 90/106) hold the top two spots.
- McPherson has converted 79.2 percent of his career FG attempts from 50 or more yards (19 made/24 att.), the best mark in team history (minimum 10 attempts). Bullock (50 percent; 7/14) ranks second on the team's career list.

Records vs. Ravens: In the first-ever Bengals-Ravens game on Nov. 3, 1996 at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium, head coach Bruce Coslet's Bengals overcame what still stands today as the largest deficit (18 points) to win a regular-season road game in franchise history. The Ravens led 21-3 at halftime, but Cincinnati rallied for a 24-21 win on a 39-yard Doug Pelfrey field goal at the final gun. Not until the 2021 season's AFC Championship did the Bengals finally match that road feat (overcoming a 21-3 deficit at Kansas City to earn a berth in Super Bowl LVI).

The Bengals' second-biggest regular-season comeback in a road win also was set at Baltimore. On Dec. 5, 2004 at M&T Bank Stadium, Cincinnati rallied from a 20-3 deficit to win 27-26. The Bengals matched that 17-point deficit road comeback last season when they came back from being down 17-0 to win 34-23 on Dec. 18 at Tampa Bay.

- Also:
- On Nov. 22, 1998 in Cincinnati, Ravens RB Priest Holmes rushed for 227 yards, the most ever recorded against the Bengals in a game.
 - On Sept. 23, 2001 in Cincinnati, Ravens QB Elvis Grbac attempted 63 passes, the most ever against the Bengals in a game.
 - The Bengals record for kickoff return yardage in a game (228 yards) was set at Baltimore by HB Brandon Bennett on Nov. 10, 2002. Bennett had a 94-yarder for a TD.
 - Also on Nov. 10, 2002, Ravens CB Lamont Brightful recorded the longest punt return ever against Cincinnati, a 95-yarder for a TD.
 - K Shayne Graham kicked a Bengals-record seven field goals — for all of Cincinnati's scoring — in a 21-7 win at Baltimore on Nov. 11, 2007. Graham did not have a missed attempt. The NFL record for field goals in a game is eight, set by Rob Bironas of Tennessee in 2007, and Graham is one of nine players sharing second place with seven.
 - On Nov. 30, 2008 against the Ravens in Cincinnati, P Kyle Larson punted 11 times, which is tied with three other instances for most in a game in team history. Larson's 480 yards punting that day also stand as the third-most for a single game in Bengals history.
 - In the 2014 season opener at Baltimore, Bengals K Mike Nugent tied the NFL record for field goals in a half (five; still tied). His five in the first half gave the Bengals a 15-0 lead toward an eventual 23-16 win.
 - On Jan. 3, 2021, the Ravens set a record for most net rushing yards against the Bengals in a single game with 404. That total shattered the previous mark of 313, which had stood since 1969.
 - On Dec. 26, 2021, Bengals QB Joe Burrow set a team record for most passing yards in a game with 525, which still is the fourth-highest single-game total in NFL history. Burrow, who eight games earlier in the season had recorded 416 passing yards against the Ravens, became the first QB in NFL history to top 400 passing yards against the same opponent twice in one regular season (he

still is the only one to do it), and his 941 combined passing yards against the Ravens still are the highest mark ever by an NFL QB against the same opponent in one regular season. The Bengals' 498 net passing yards in that game also set a Bengals team record (still stands) and still are the most ever against the Ravens in a game.

Individually vs. Ravens: Here are past regular-season offensive statistics recorded by current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Ravens (ordered by total games played):

- WR Tyler Boyd: 15 games; 58 receptions for 739 yards (12.7-yard average) and three TDs; two rushes for 26 yards (13.0); one pass attempt (incomplete).
- HB Joe Mixon: 12 games; 189 rushes for 674 yards (3.6) and four TDs; 36 receptions for 315 yards (8.8) and one TD.
- WR Tee Higgins: Seven games; 32 receptions for 414 yards (12.9) and four TDs.
- TE Drew Sample: Seven games; Eight receptions for 48 yards (6.0).
- QB Joe Burrow: Six games; 155-of-232 passing for 1778 yards, 11 TDs and four INTs (98.3 passer rating); 13 rushes for 42 yards (3.2) and one TD.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Five games; 35 receptions for 493 yards (14.1) and two TDs; One rush for zero yards.
- HB Trayveon Williams: Five games; Four rushes for 74 yards (18.5); Three reception for seven yards (2.3).
- HB Chris Evans: Three games; One rush for one yard.
- WR Trenton Irwin: Three games; One reception for 12 yards.
- HB Chase Brown (Reserve/Injured list): One game; One rush for two yards.
- TE Irv Smith Jr.: One game; Two receptions for 10 yards (5.0).

Burrow's big day vs. Ravens: QB Joe Burrow had one of the top individual performances by a QB in NFL history on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore, when he passed for a Bengals-record 525 yards and four TDs while completing 80.4 percent of his attempts (37 of 46). His passing yardage total still ranks as the fourth-highest in a single game in league history, and he became the first Cincinnati QB ever to post a completion percentage of 80 or higher while throwing at least 40 times.

Burrow's 525 yards and four TD passes came on the heels of a 416-yard, three-TD stat line in Week 7 of the 2021 season at Baltimore. That made him the only QB ever to pass for 400 yards and three TDs more than once in an entire career against the Ravens. He also became the first QB in NFL history to top 400 passing yards against the same opponent twice in one regular season, and his 941 combined passing yards vs. Baltimore were the most-ever against one opponent in one regular season. The previous record was 874 passing yards, shared by former San Francisco QB Joe Montana against Atlanta in 1990 and former Miami QB Dan Marino against the N.Y. Jets in '88.

In the Dec. 26 matchup, Burrow became just the eighth QB since 2000 to have three completions of at least 52 yards in a game. On the receiving end of those passes were WR Tyler Boyd (68-yard TD), WR Tee Higgins (52) and HB Joe Mixon (52), who became the first trio of Bengals to catch passes of 50-plus yards in a single game since Nov. 17, 1968 at Miami.

Hubbard's wild (card) recovery return: DE Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the difference in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore will go down as one of the most memorable defensive plays in Bengals history.

The return was dubbed by some as "The Hubbard-Yard Dash," while others refer to the fumble itself as "The Fumble in the Jungle." Regardless of the name, here are some notable facts on the play:

- The 98-yard return is the longest fumble return for a TD in NFL postseason history. The previous longest was a 93-yard return by Andy Russell of the Pittsburgh Steelers in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Dec. 27, 1975.
- It is the longest TD of any kind in a postseason game in Bengals history. The previous longest was a 93-yard kickoff return by RB Stanford Jennings in

Super Bowl XXIII on Jan. 22, 1989.

• It is the longest go-ahead TD in the fourth quarter in NFL postseason history. The previous longest was a 90-yard blocked FG return by Anthony Mitchell of the Baltimore Ravens in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Jan. 7, 2001.

• It marked the longest defensive TD in an NFL postseason game since Taron Johnson of the Buffalo Bills returned an INT 101 yards against Baltimore in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Jan. 16, 2021.

• According to NFL's Next Gen Stats service, Hubbard's top speed on the return was 17.43 mph. He also traveled 123.6 total yards, the most distance traveled by a ball carrier on a TD in the 2022 regular season or postseason.

• It marked Hubbard's second career TD on a fumble recovery. As a rookie in 2018, he ran a fumble back 19 yards in the fourth quarter of Week 5 against Miami that helped seal a 27-17 Bengals win.

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks on Thursday night at Baltimore. Cincinnati is 8-4 overall when wearing that combination, which was last featured in the team's loss at Tennessee in Week 4. The Bengals also sported this look in each of their four road postseason contests over the past two years, collecting a 3-1 record.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants also feature three different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, and white with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate jerseys and/or color rush (CR) uniforms and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals wore the helmet twice last season, in a Week 4 home win over Miami and a Week 11 road victory at Pittsburgh. The "White Bengal" look made its return on Monday Night Football in Week 3, as Cincinnati defeated the L.A. Rams 19-16 in front of a "White Out" crowd at Paycor Stadium. The white helmets are slated to be featured again in the Bengals' Week 13 road contest at Jacksonville.

* — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or color rush (CR) and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes an orange jersey with one of the team's primary pants. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

^ — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023, the Bengals are permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

Bengals-Ravens connections: Bengals S Dax Hill is the younger brother of Ravens RB Justice Hill ... Bengals OT Orlando Brown Jr., a native of Baltimore, Md., was a third-round pick of the Ravens in 2018, and spent his first three seasons ('18-20) with the team ... Brown's late father, Orlando Brown, spent six seasons (1996-98, 2003-05) with the Ravens ... Ravens G Kevin Zeitler was a first-round pick of the Bengals in 2012 and spent five seasons ('12-16) with Cincinnati ... Ravens pass game coordinator/secondary coach Chris Hewitt played defensive back at the University of Cincinnati (1993-96) ... Ravens head coach John Harbaugh played defensive back at Miami (Ohio) and coached at the University of Cincinnati, serving as special teams, tight ends, outside linebackers and running backs coach (1989-94) and assistant head coach ('95-96) ... Bengals senior defensive assistant Mark Duffner was the head coach at the University of Maryland from 1992-96 ... Ravens QB Josh Johnson played two games for the Bengals in 2013 ... Orlando Brown Jr.'s college teammate at Oklahoma, TE Mark Andrews (2015-17), was drafted by the Ravens three picks after him in '18 ... Andrews also played with Bengals HB Joe Mixon (2015-16) and G Cody Ford ('15-17) at Oklahoma ... Ravens senior

football analyst/game planning coach James Urban coached wide receivers for the Bengals for seven years (2011-17) ... Bengals assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons served as assistant special teams and assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Ravens in 1998 ... Bengals DT DJ Reader and Ravens OLB Jadeveon Clowney were teammates on the Houston Texans (2016-18) ... Bengals CB Chidobe Awuzie played with Ravens DB Daryl Worley on the Dallas Cowboys (2020) ... Ravens offensive coordinator Todd Monken coached Bengals G Alex Cappa and TE Tanner Hudson while serving as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' offensive coordinator (2018) ... THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2023 season is his fifth in the position.

In 2022, Taylor led Cincinnati to a second consecutive AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship. The Bengals tied a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), and with a pair of playoff victories in January, Taylor became one of just 13 head coaches in NFL history with five wins in their first six career postseason games. He once again oversaw a dynamic offense that ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0).

The Bengals also boasted a versatile defense that held opposing passers to a league-low 58.9 completion percentage while also ranking sixth in points allowed (20.1 per game) and seventh in rushing yards allowed (106.6).

In 2021, Taylor guided the Bengals to their first division championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim the AFC crown and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. QB Joe Burrow, playing in his first full season in Taylor's system, was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after leading the league in completion percentage (70.4), while first-round draft pick WR Ja'Marr Chase totaled the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455) en route to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped the Bengals navigate the league's COVID-19 pandemic protocols which included no in-person offseason program. Still, he guided a rookie Burrow to notable production that included the most ever completions by a QB through their first 10 games (264) and the fifth-most passing yards (2688).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both offense and defense. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped guide QB Jared Goff to career highs in every major passing category as the Rams won the NFC West and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Taylor had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and QBs coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant quarterbacks coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as interim offensive coordinator and primary

play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and tight ends coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous program records, totaling 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. He was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2006 after passing for 3197 yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

John Harbaugh is in his 16th season at the helm in Baltimore. He has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in 10 (2008-12, '14, '18-20 and '22) of his 15 full seasons, and in '12, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship.

Under Harbaugh's guidance, Baltimore is one of five teams with at least 10 playoff berths in the past 15 seasons, joining New England (12), Green Bay (11), Kansas City (10) and Seattle (10). He has also led the Ravens to playoff berths in four (2018-20, '22) of the past five seasons, producing the league's third most regular-season victories (53, tied with Buffalo and Green Bay) during that span.

In 2019, Harbaugh became the first Ravens coach to win Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year, leading the Ravens to the AFC's No. 1 playoff seed and a franchise-best 14-2 record. Baltimore also won a franchise-record 12-straight games to close out the regular season. In 2018, Baltimore (10-6) captured the AFC North Division title, earning a Wild Card berth. In 2014, the Ravens posted a 10-6 record en route to capturing a 30-17 victory at Pittsburgh in the Wild Card round.

In 2012 the Ravens seized the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. Baltimore topped the Colts in the Wild Card round and followed that by earning a Divisional Round victory over top-seeded Denver before advancing to Super Bowl XLVII with a win in the AFC Championship Game at New England. In the Super Bowl in New Orleans, the Ravens bested the San Francisco 49ers, 34-31.

In his initial season with the team (2008), Harbaugh led Baltimore to an 11-5 record and a berth in the AFC Championship. Baltimore set an NFL record that season for most total wins (13) by a team with both a rookie head coach and a rookie starting quarterback (Joe Flacco).

Harbaugh spent his first 10 NFL seasons (1998-2007) with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was the team's secondary coach in 2007, after nine seasons as its special teams coordinator. In 2001, he was voted the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers.

Harbaugh played defensive back at Miami (Ohio) from 1980-83, earning a degree in political science. He has no pro playing experience. He coached

collegiately at Western Michigan (1984-86), Pittsburgh ('87), Morehead State ('88), Cincinnati ('89-96), and Indiana ('97).

Harbaugh was born in Perrysburg, Ohio on Sept. 23, 1962. He and his wife, Ingrid, have a daughter, Alison.

Harbaugh is the son of longtime college coach Jack. His brother, Jim, is head coach at the University of Michigan and played for the Ravens in 1998. John's sister, Joani, is married to Tom Crean, a longtime college head basketball coach, most recently for the University of Georgia.

Taylor vs. Ravens: The Ravens lead the series overall, 6-4 (the series includes one postseason game).

Taylor vs. Harbaugh: Harbaugh leads the series overall, 6-4 (the series includes one postseason game).

Harbaugh vs. Bengals: The series is tied overall, 16-16 (the series includes one postseason game).

BENGALS NOTES

Bengals at 5-4: For the third consecutive season, Cincinnati holds a 5-4 record through its first nine games. The Bengals in the past two years have posted a combined record of 12-3 from this point on, vaulting them to back-to-back AFC North Division titles for the first time in team history.

In 2021, the Bengals entered their Week 10 bye at 5-4, before winning two straight games by a combined score of 73-23 to improve to 7-4. Consecutive losses left Cincinnati at 7-6 and on the outside of the AFC playoff picture, but the team proceeded to win its next three, including a thrilling Week 17 home victory over Kansas City, to claim the division crown and the conference's No. 4 seed. That late-season surge propelled the Bengals to a Wild Card Playoff win against Las Vegas — the team's first postseason victory in 31 years — and then a pair of road wins at top-seeded Tennessee and No. 2-seed Kansas City as Cincinnati advanced to Super Bowl LVI.

In 2022, a Halloween night loss at Cleveland brought Cincinnati's record down to 4-4. The Bengals responded with eight straight wins, including five against teams that qualified for the postseason the previous year, to finish the regular season with a 12-4 record and the No. 3 seed in the AFC playoffs. The 12 total wins and eight consecutive victories each tied a franchise record. Cincinnati closed out the regular-season slate with a Week 18 win over Baltimore to officially secure home field advantage in a rematch against the Ravens in the following week's Wild Card Playoff, which the Bengals won 24-17. The team then defeated Buffalo 27-10 on the road to advance to its second straight AFC Championship.

Offense comes out firing: The Bengals' offense has scored a TD on its opening possession in each of the past five games, the longest streak in team history and longest in the NFL since Atlanta went six straight (Weeks 12-17) during the 2016 season. Cincinnati's 51 total points scored in the first quarter of play since Week 5 are the most in the league in that span — even with the team having a bye in Week 7.

The Bengals followed up with a TD on their second possession in three consecutive games from Weeks 6-9, marking the first time Cincinnati opened three straight contests with back-to-back TD drives since Games 13-15 of the 1985 campaign. The most recent team to accomplish that feat was Green Bay, which did it in four straight (Weeks 14-17) during the 2020 season.

Each opening-possession score over the past five games has come through the air, beginning in Week 5 at Arizona when an 11-play, 64-yard march was capped by a two-yard pass from QB Joe Burrow to WR Ja'Marr Chase. The following game against Seattle, Cincinnati worked its way to the Seahawks' 42-yard line before Burrow hit seven straight passes, including an eight-yard TD throw to WR Tyler Boyd. Burrow and Boyd hooked up once again in Week 8 at San Francisco, as a seven-yard toss to Boyd completed a 10-play, 85-yard drive to give the Bengals an early 7-0 lead.

In Week 9 vs. Buffalo, Cincinnati won the coin toss and elected to receive the ball before driving 76 yards in nine plays. Burrow went six-for-six, capped off by a seven-yard TD pass to TE Irv Smith Jr. for his first receiving score of the season. The Bengals converted three third downs on their opening drive in Week 10 vs. Houston, the last of which being a third-and-seven that resulted in a 32-yard TD strike to WR Trenton Irwin.

Bengals find edge in turnover battle: Cincinnati this season has been among the league's best at both forcing turnovers defensively and taking care of the ball offensively. The Bengals have collected 18 takeaways

(tied for most in NFL) while committing just eight giveaways (tied for second fewest), resulting in a turnover differential of plus-10 that is tied with Pittsburgh for the league lead.

Cincinnati has won the turnover battle in seven of its nine games this season, collecting a 5-2 record in those contests. The Bengals' offense has lost just two fumbles, tied for the fewest in the NFL.

Defensively, 15 of Cincinnati's 18 takeaways have come over the past five games. Ten different Bengals have contributed to that season total with either an INT or a fumble recovery.

The Bengals are tied for second in INTs leaguewide with 12 and hold the NFL's longest active streak of games with at least one pick (seven). That also is Cincinnati's longest such streak since it went seven straight games from Weeks 2-8 of the 2020 season. Leading the Bengals in INTs this season is second-year CB Cam Taylor-Britt, who has recorded each of his four picks in the past five games. Cincinnati has won each of its last 10 games (including postseason) in which the defense had multiple INTs.

Leads lead to Bengals wins: Much of the Bengals' success over the past two-plus seasons has been built on their ability to close out games after jumping in front early. Since the start of the 2021 campaign, Cincinnati has the fourth best record in the NFL when scoring first (18-3), the best record when leading at halftime (20-1), and the second best record when leading at any point in a game (27-6). This season, the Bengals are a perfect 3-0 when ahead at the half and 4-0 when leading after three quarters.

Several factors have contributed to the Bengals' knack for cementing wins, including the strong play of QB Joe Burrow. Since 2021, Burrow ranks third in the NFL in passing TDs (24), fifth in passing yards (2705) and eighth in passer rating (99.6; minimum 200 pass attempts) in the fourth quarter. In that same span, Cincinnati's defense has given up just 41 TDs (second fewest leaguewide) and 398 total points (third fewest) in the second half/overtime. The Bengals' recent four-game win streak from Weeks 5-9 was highlighted by the defense recording eight takeaways in the second half of play (five INTs, three FRs, while also forcing four turnovers on downs).

Burrow's NFL journey: After being selected No. 1 overall by the Bengals in the 2020 NFL Draft, former Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow had one of the most productive starts to a career by a QB in league history, as his 264 completions still count as the most ever by an NFL passer through their first 10 career games while his 404 pass attempts are the second most in that same category.

In Week 11 of his rookie year at Washington, Burrow suffered a season-ending left knee injury, halting a campaign that was on pace to shatter several NFL rookie passing records. He embarked on a rehab process that lasted over eight months and received clearance to participate in training camp in 2021.

Shortly after his injury in 2020, Burrow vowed publicly that he would start Cincinnati's '21 season opener. In Week 1 vs. Minnesota, not only did he make good on that promise, but he posted then-career highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.67) in a Bengals OT win.

Burrow in 2021 completed a league-leading 70.4 percent of his passes (366 of 520) for 4611 yards and 34 TDs en route to being named the AP Comeback Player of the Year. His passing yardage and 108.3 passer rating stand as single-season team records. In the postseason, he threw for 1105 yards and five TDs in four games, becoming the first No. 1 overall draft pick in NFL history to lead his

team to a conference championship game (let alone a Super Bowl berth) in either of their first two seasons.

On the day before the first training camp practice of 2022, Burrow was forced to undergo surgery to remove his appendix. He remained involved in team meetings and attended practices on a golf cart during a three-week recovery, before returning to the field in mid-August. He started the regular-season opener and went on to set Bengals single-season records for completions (414, fifth in NFL) and TD passes (35, tied for second). Burrow then helped guide the Bengals to the AFC Championship once again, becoming the first player drafted No. 1 overall to win five playoff games within his first three seasons.

The Athens, Ohio, native again faced adversity in training camp this season as he worked his way back from a calf strain. Burrow sustained the injury on July 27 — the second day of camp — and returned to practice on Aug. 30. On Sept. 9, he signed a five-year contract extension that makes him the highest-paid player in NFL history, based on average annual value. The extension keeps Burrow in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

Burrow through 50: QB Joe Burrow played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 9 vs. Buffalo, completing 31 of 44 passes (70.5 percent) for 348 yards and two TDs to help lead the Bengals to a win on Sunday Night Football.

Among all QBs in NFL history through their 50th game played, Burrow ranks second in completions (1250), first in completion percentage (68.0; minimum 1000 attempts), fifth in passing yards (13,635), sixth in TD passes (94), sixth in passer rating (98.8; min. 1000 att.), and tied for eighth in 300-yard passing games (18).

Hitting the mark: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 1500 career passing attempts in the 2022 regular-season finale against Baltimore, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.0, Burrow is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, ahead of former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.7).

Burrow has completed over 70 percent of his passes in three of the past five games. In Week 8 at San Francisco, he earned his sixth career AFC Offensive Player of the Week Award after going 28 of 32 (87.5 percent) for 283 yards and three TDs with zero INTs. It marked his ninth career game with a completion percentage of 75 or higher on at least 30 attempts — the second most such performances by a QB in NFL history in their first four seasons. Burrow's 87.5 completion percentage was the second highest in a game in team history (minimum 20 attempts), and was largely fueled by a career-best 19 consecutive completions to end the first half (second most in team history). QB Ken Anderson holds the Bengals single-game completion percentage record of 90.91, which he set when he hit 20 of 22 passes on Nov. 10, 1974 against Pittsburgh.

Burrow in Week 5 at Arizona went 36 of 46 (78.3 percent) for 317 yards and three TDs, marking his fourth career game with a completion percentage of 75 or higher on at least 40 attempts. The only other QB in Bengals history with one such game is Andy Dalton, who went 33 of 43 (76.7 percent) on Oct. 12, 2014 vs. Carolina.

After leading the league in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 pass attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Burrow racks up yardage: QB Joe Burrow in Week 6 vs. Seattle eclipsed 13,000 career passing yards in what was his 48th game, making him the fifth fastest QB in NFL history to reach that mark. Burrow also is the fastest Bengal ever and ranks in the top five in league history to 12,000 passing yards (44 games), 11,000 (40) and 10,000 (36).

In Week 10 against Houston, Burrow completed 27 of 40 passes for 347 yards with two TDs. It marked his 19th career game with 300 or more passing yards, tying former QB Ken Anderson for the third most such games in team history. The previous week versus Buffalo, Burrow went 31 of 44 for a season-high 348 yards. It was his 10th career outing with at least 30 completions and 300 passing yards, the second most such games in a player's first four seasons in NFL history behind Justin Herbert of the L.A. Chargers (11).

Burrow's 11,294 passing yards since the start of the 2021 regular season are third most in the NFL in that span. He has ranked in the top six leaguewide in passing yards in each of the past two seasons, with a Bengals-record 4611 in 2021 (sixth) and 4475 in '22 (fifth).

Burrow masters the deep ball: In the third quarter of Week 10 vs. Houston, QB Joe Burrow rolled out of the pocket and hit WR Ja'Marr Chase downfield for a 64-yard TD to cut Cincinnati's deficit to 20-17. It marked Burrow's 19th career TD pass of 40 or more yards, the most by any QB since he entered the league in 2020.

Burrow also connected with Chase on a 63-yard TD in the third quarter of Week 5 at Arizona, which at the time was the team's longest TD from scrimmage since Week 17 of the 2021 campaign (72-yarder from Burrow to Chase). According to NFL's Next Gen Stats service, Burrow's 58.1 air yards on the throw against the Cardinals were the most for any TD pass in his career.

Six of Burrow's 40-plus yard TD passes came during Weeks 3-8 of the 2022 campaign. He also totaled a league-best 12 TD passes of 50 or more yards from the 2020-22 seasons, which tied Pro Football Hall of Famers Dan Marino and Fran Tarkenton for the most by any player in NFL history in their first three years.

Joe throws 90th career TD: QB Joe Burrow threw his 90th career TD pass on the opening drive of Week 8 at San Francisco, in what was his 49th game. That tied him as the sixth fastest QB in NFL history to throw for 90 TDs.

The former No. 1 overall draft pick had 13 TD passes in 10 games as a rookie, before setting a then-team record with 34 TDs in his sophomore campaign. By eclipsing his own record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to throw for 30 or more TDs in multiple seasons. Burrow, Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino and Chargers QB Justin Herbert are the only players in NFL history with at least 30 TD passes and 4000 passing yards in two of their first three seasons.

Burrow currently has 96 career TD passes, the fifth most in Bengals history. Prior to Week 1 at Cleveland, he held a streak of 23 consecutive regular-season games in which he threw at least one TD pass, the longest such streak in team history.

Burrow last season joined former Indianapolis QB Andrew Luck as the only players in NFL history with at least 75 TD passes and 10 rushing TDs in their first three seasons. A career-high five of Burrow's 10 rushing TDs came in 2022.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase has reached a pair of career milestones in recent Bengals wins, beginning with his 200th reception in Week 5 at Arizona. Playing in just his 34th career game, Chase tied for the fourth fastest player in NFL history to record 200 catches. Only former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (30 games), New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (32) and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry (33) reached the mark in fewer games.

Chase then surpassed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 6 vs. Seattle, in what was his 35th game. That tied him for the fifth fastest in league history to reach that milestone. Beckham (30 games), former Houston Oilers WR Charlie Hennigan (31), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (33) and former San Diego

Chargers WR Lance Alworth (34) are the only players to net 3000 receiving yards in fewer games.

Chase has continued to establish himself as one of the NFL's top pass catchers in his third season. He had 50 receptions from Games 3-7, the most in a five-game stretch in Bengals history which included three stat lines of 10 or more catches. Since Week 3, Chase ranks tied for first leaguewide in receptions (59), fourth in receiving yards (751) and tied for fourth in receiving TDs (five). He caught four passes in Week 9 vs. Buffalo, ending what was the league's longest active streak of consecutive regular-season games played with at least five receptions (15).

Chase led the Bengals in receptions in each of his first two pro seasons, beginning with a team rookie-record 81 catches in 2021. He followed that with 87 grabs in 2022, including at least seven in each of his final eight regular-season games played. During the 2022 campaign, he became the second player under the age of 23 to reach 2000 career receiving yards and 20 receiving TDs in NFL history, joining Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss.

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 64-yard TD catch in Week 10 vs. Houston marked his 14th career reception of 40 or more yards, the second most such catches in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. Only former Kansas City/current Miami WR Tyreek Hill (17) has more in that span.

With a team-high 124 receiving yards against the Texans, Chase went over the century mark for the fourth time this season and 13th time in his career. He went for 192 yards on 15 catches in Week 5 at Arizona, including a 63-yard TD reception early in the third quarter. Chase's 821 receiving yards this season are tied for seventh in the NFL.

Chase also is one of two players in Bengals history who have posted consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons to begin their career, joining A.J. Green (2011-12).

Ja'Marr's record day: WR Ja'Marr Chase earned his third career AFC Offensive Player of the Week award for his performance in Week 5 at Arizona, in which he hauled in a Bengals single-game record 15 receptions for 192 yards and three TDs. His receptions total surpassed the previous team mark of 13, set by WR Carl Pickens on Oct. 11, 1998 against Pittsburgh.

Chase became the fifth player in NFL history to register at least 15 catches, 150 receiving yards and three receiving TDs in a game. At 23 years old, he also is the fourth player in NFL history under the age of 24 to record 15 receptions in a single game. Combining his performance at Arizona with a stat line of 11 catches for a Bengals-record 266 yards and three TDs in Week 17 of the 2021 campaign vs. Kansas City, Chase is the first player in league history with multiple games of at least 10 receptions, 150 receiving yards and three receiving TDs in his first three career seasons.

Chase's second TD at Arizona came early in the third quarter, when he got behind the Cardinals' secondary and caught a deep ball from QB Joe Burrow for a 63-yard score. It marked Chase's seventh career TD of 50 or more yards, and was Cincinnati's longest TD from scrimmage since Chase scored a 72-yarder in the 2021 win over the Chiefs.

Since he entered the NFL in 2021, Chase is one of four players with three or more receiving TDs in multiple games, alongside Buffalo WR Stefon Diggs, Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans and Kansas City TE Travis Kelce.

Three-headed monster at WR: The Bengals' offense has featured arguably the top receiving trio in the NFL over the past two-plus

seasons consisting of WRs Tyler Boyd, Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins.

All three players recorded 100 or more receiving yards in their most recent game played. In Week 9 vs. Buffalo, Higgins led the way with eight catches for a game-high 110 yards, his most since Week 16 of the 2022 season. This past Sunday vs. Houston, both Chase and Boyd eclipsed the century mark as Chase went for 124 yards on five receptions while Boyd netted 117 on eight grabs.

Chase and Boyd also each had a 64-yard catch in the second half against the Texans, with Chase's resulting in a third-quarter TD to trim the deficit to 20-17 and Boyd's coming late in the fourth quarter to set up a game-tying FG. It marked the first time Cincinnati had two players record a reception of over 60 yards since Bruce Coslet (71) and Essex Johnson (67) on Nov. 14, 1971 at Denver.

In Week 8 at San Francisco, Boyd opened the scoring for a second straight game with a seven-yard TD on Cincinnati's first offensive possession, while Chase had a game-high 10 catches for 100 yards highlighted by a 17-yard TD in the fourth quarter. Higgins caught five passes for 69 yards, including a 33-yarder at the end of the third quarter that went in as the Bengals' longest play from scrimmage.

Though each player missed action during the 2022 regular season due to injuries, Cincinnati was one of two teams (L.A. Chargers) with three WRs that recorded 700 or more receiving yards. The Bengals also were the only team with three players that each had a game with 130-plus receiving yards. Boyd, Chase and Higgins all averaged at least 12 yards per reception and had at least one TD catch of 50-plus yards.

Their 3374 combined receiving yards in the 2021 regular season led all trios, with Chase posting a Bengals-record 1455, Higgins going for 1091 and Boyd netting 828.

Chase (1046 yards) and Higgins (1029) both notched 1000 receiving yards for the second straight season in 2022, marking the fourth time the Bengals had multiple 1000-yard receivers — WRs Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh also did it twice, in 2006 and '07. In 2021, Chase (21 years old) and Higgins (22) became the first duo in league history to log 1000 receiving yards in the same season before the age of 23.

Chase, Boyd pose deep threats: QB Joe Burrow has the NFL's most TD passes of 50 or more yards since the start of the 2021 season, and much of that production can be attributed to WRs Ja'Marr Chase and Tyler Boyd.

Chase has a league-leading eight TD receptions of 50-plus yards in that span, which ranks as the third most such TDs by a player under the age of 24 in NFL history. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (11) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (nine) have more.

Chase's most recent TD of 50-plus yards came late in the third quarter of Week 10 vs. Houston, when he broke free downfield on a scramble play and hauled in a Burrow pass for a 64-yard score. It marked the Bengals' longest TD from scrimmage since Chase's 72-yarder in Week 17 of the 2021 season against Kansas City. Earlier this season in Week 5 at Arizona, Burrow and Chase connected for a 63-yard TD to increase the Bengals' lead to 24-14 early in the second half.

Boyd, meanwhile, has four TD catches of 50 or more yards since 2021, the third most in the NFL behind Chase and former Kansas City/current Miami WR Tyreek Hill (five). Two of those scoring receptions occurred last season — a 56-yarder in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets and a 60-yarder in Week 7 vs. Atlanta.

Tee among top young WRs: Though sharing production with his fellow star WRs, fourth-year pro Tee Higgins has developed into one of the NFL's premier pass catchers since being drafted by the Bengals in the second round in 2020.

Higgins has 3356 career receiving yards, the 16th most by a WR since he entered the league, and he has eclipsed the 1000-yard milestone in each of the past two seasons. He is one of five players in Bengals history with multiple 1000-yard receiving seasons within the first three years of his career, alongside WRs Cris Collinsworth (1981, '83), Chad Johnson (2002-03), A.J. Green ('11-13) and

Ja'Marr Chase ('21-22). Higgins' career yardage total at the end of 2022 (3028) marked the second most ever by a Bengals player through their first three seasons, trailing only Green (3833).

Higgins enjoyed his best statistical game of 2023 in Week 9 vs. Buffalo, when he caught eight passes for a season-high 110 yards. It marked his 11th career game with 100 or more receiving yards. Six of his eight grabs went for a first down, including an 18-yarder on third-and-six in the fourth quarter that led to a Bengals FG.

Higgins missed the Week 5 contest at Arizona due to a rib injury, but returned to full health for Week 8 at San Francisco when he hauled in five grabs for 69 yards. He sustained a hamstring injury prior to Week 10 that caused him to miss the contest against Houston.

With Ja'Marr Chase out of the lineup due to injury in Weeks 11-12 last season, Higgins was relied on as the team's No. 1 receiver and delivered back-to-back 100-yard performances. He had a season-high nine catches for 148 yards in Week 11 at Pittsburgh, marking the second-most in a game in his career (194 on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore). He then followed that up with seven grabs for 114 yards and a TD in Week 12 at Tennessee, with the score coming on a 27-yard contested catch that gave Cincinnati a fourth-quarter lead.

Higgins has continued to produce during his brief but impressive postseason career. He ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing Chase in both categories, while his three TD catches are tied with Chase and former TE Dan Ross for the team's postseason record. With two TDs in Super Bowl LVI vs. the L.A. Rams, he also joined Ross as the only players in team history with multiple TDs in a postseason game.

Mixon moving up: HB Joe Mixon began the season with the fifth-most rushing yards in Bengals history, and through nine games he has already climbed to third on the team's all-time chart. Mixon, who currently has 5914 career rushing yards, surpassed FB Pete Johnson (5421) in Week 1 at Cleveland, then in Week 6 vs. Seattle overtook HB Rudi Johnson (5742). HB Corey Dillon (8061) and HB James Brooks (6447) hold the top two spots in the Bengals' record book.

Mixon's 5914 rushing yards are the fifth most in the NFL since he entered the league as a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2017. He has logged over 1000 rushing yards in three of his five full seasons (missed 10 games in 2020 due to injury), including the '21 campaign in which he posted career highs in rushing yards (1205; third in NFL) and rushing TDs (13, fourth) while earning his first Pro Bowl selection.

Mixon has rushed for over 80 yards in a pair of recent wins, beginning with an 81-yard effort on 25 carries in Week 5 at Arizona. He topped that number in Week 8 at San Francisco, when he recorded a season-best 87 yards on 16 attempts (5.4 per carry), including a five-yard TD late in the fourth quarter that helped seal the victory.

Mixon also has a rushing TD in each of the past three games, improving his career total to 44. He enters Week 11 one rushing TD shy of Dillon (45) for third most in team history and four shy of Rudi Johnson (48) for second.

Mixon additionally has developed as a pass-catching threat out of the backfield. In 2022, he set career bests in receptions (60) and receiving yards (441), and went over 100 yards from scrimmage four times. He tallied a season-high five catches for 31 yards in Week 9 of this season vs. Buffalo.

First-quarter defense among league's best: Though defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo is regarded as one of the best in the NFL when it comes to in-game adjustments, his Bengals defense has also been consistently prepared from the opening kickoff. Since the start of the 2022 season, Cincinnati has allowed just eight TDs in the first quarter of play, tied for the third fewest in the league during that stretch, while its 86 total first-quarter points given up are fourth fewest.

Baltimore's TD on the opening drive of Week 2 marked the first TD allowed by Cincinnati in a first quarter since Week 6 of the 2022 season at New Orleans. The Bengals' 14-game streak without giving up a first-quarter TD was the longest in the NFL since Buffalo went 16 straight from Week 14 of the 2020 season

through Week 10 of the '21 campaign. Cincinnati during its streak allowed just 12 total points, with never more than three given up in an opening quarter.

Defense tightens after the break: As referenced previously, Cincinnati's defense has proven itself among the league's elite units coming out of halftime. The Bengals have given up 41 total TDs in the second half/overtime since the start of the 2021 regular season, the second fewest in the NFL behind Buffalo (39), while their 9.5 average points allowed in the second half/OT in that span are the fifth fewest leaguewide.

Of the Bengals' 13 takeaways in the past five games, nine have come in the second half. In Week 10, CB Cam Taylor-Britt picked off Texans QB C.J. Stroud with 3:41 remaining and returned it to the Houston four-yard line, sparking a late surge that saw the Bengals score 10 points in less than two minutes of play to tie the game.

The previous week against Buffalo, LB Germaine Pratt forced a fumble at the Cincinnati 11-yard line that was recovered by S Nick Scott, preserving a 21-10 Bengals lead.

Cincinnati opened the 2022 season by going seven straight games without allowing a TD in the second half of play, becoming the first team to do so in each of its first seven contests since the 1934 Detroit Lions (eight games).

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson leads the Bengals this season with 8.5 sacks (tied for seventh in NFL), and five of those have come over the last five games. Hendrickson's sack late in the fourth quarter of Week 8 at San Francisco was the 50th of his career, and resulted in a forced fumble that was recovered by DT B.J. Hill to help seal a Cincinnati win.

After spending his first four pro seasons with New Orleans, Hendrickson joined the Bengals as a free agent in March of 2021 and quickly asserted himself among the NFL's best pass rushers. His debut season in stripes saw him post a career-best 14 sacks, which ranked fifth in the league and second in Bengals single-season history behind DE Coy Bacon's 22 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in '82, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder). Hendrickson earned his first career Pro Bowl nod, and then followed up with another Pro Bowl campaign in 2022 when he notched a team-leading eight sacks.

Combined with a team-high 13.5 sacks in his final season with the Saints (tied for second in NFL), Hendrickson has 44 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — the fourth most in the league in that span. His production was rewarded on July 27, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard logged his fourth sack of the season in Week 8 when he sacked 49ers QB Brock Purdy for a loss of six yards late in the fourth quarter. It boosted Hubbard's career sack total to 34.5, tied for the third most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Hubbard this season has 37 total tackles, the most among Cincinnati's defensive linemen. He also recovered a fumble midway through the fourth quarter in Week 5 at Arizona, setting up a Bengals FG drive that increased their lead. Each of Hubbard's four sacks came in Games 3-7, his most in a five-game stretch since Games 7-11 of the 2021 season.

Players' listed positions vary by media outlet (e.g. whether they're classified as a LB or DE), but according to NFL.com's draft record, Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected in 2018 — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. According to NFL.com, there were a total of 40 defensive linemen (20 DEs, 20 DTs) selected in the 2018 draft, along with 32 LBs and one player with his position listed as "edge."

Hubbard has been the Bengals' starting LDE since 2019, and during the '21 regular season his 7.5 sacks were second on the team. While his 2022 campaign will be remembered primarily for his 98-yard fumble return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, Hubbard during the regular season tallied 60 total tackles — his fourth straight year with at least 60 — including a team-leading 11 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. He also recorded three PDs and a forced fumble.

Hubbard additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE

Jason Buck for the most in Bengals history. He signed a contract extension with the Bengals in July 2021 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the '25 season.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs ... : Fourth-year pro Logan Wilson has developed into a consistent LB that has led the Bengals in tackles each of the past two seasons, but his most notable contributions have come when dropping into coverage. A former defensive back at the University of Wyoming, Wilson has 10 career INTs, the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020.

Three of Wilson's picks have come this season, beginning in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams when he intercepted QB Matthew Stafford twice to help lead Cincinnati to a Monday Night Football victory. The second INT occurred at the Bengals' 30-yard line when the Rams were driving to potentially take the lead in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter of Week 8 at San Francisco, Wilson stepped in front of a pass thrown by QB Brock Purdy and returned it 16 yards to set up a Bengals TD on the following play.

Wilson is one of three LBs in the NFL this season with three INTs. He had two picks as a rookie in 2020, then followed up with four in '21 — the most by a Bengals LB in a single season since Odell Thurman (five) in '05.

Also a sure tackler, Wilson posted a career-high 123 stops last season that marked the most by a Cincinnati player since LB Vontaze Burfict in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. Wilson again paces the Bengals in that category with 70 tackles (46 solos) through nine games in 2023. He additionally had a career-best 2.5 sacks in the 2022 season, all coming in a three-game stretch from Weeks 14-16. Wilson is one of six NFL players with at least 250 tackles, four sacks and four INTs since the start of the 2021 season.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in early August that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season.

... and Pratt racks up takeaways: Wilson's fellow starting LB, fifth-year pro Germaine Pratt, has had a similar knack for coming up with turnovers at crucial points in the game. In the fourth quarter of Week 9 vs. Buffalo, Pratt forced a fumble from TE Dalton Kincaid at the Cincinnati 11-yard line that was recovered by S Nick Scott, ending a Bills scoring threat that would have made it a one-possession game.

It marked the fourth turnover Pratt has contributed to this season, including his third in a four-game span. He logged his first INT of the year in Week 5 at Arizona, picking off QB Josh Dobbs midway through the fourth quarter to help seal a win, but his biggest play of that game came earlier in the third quarter when he tackled Dobbs for a loss on fourth-and-one at the Bengals' 16-yard line when Cincinnati led 24-20. Then in Week 8 at San Francisco, the 49ers had a chance to tie the game in the third quarter with a first-and-goal from the Cincinnati eight before Pratt tipped a Brock Purdy pass and came down with the INT.

Since the start of the 2021 season, Pratt is one of five NFL players (one of two LBs) with at least five FFs and five INTs. His lone FF last season occurred in Week 13 vs. Kansas City, when he stripped the ball from TE Travis Kelce early in the fourth quarter and recovered it to set up a go-ahead Bengals TD drive.

Pratt inked a contract extension in March and will remain a Bengal through the 2025 season.

Nothing easy in the air: Since the start of the 2022 season, the Bengals have held opposing passers to the third lowest completion percentage

in the NFL (60.3) and the fourth lowest passer rating (81.1). Cincinnati has given up just 28 TD passes in that span of 25 regular-season games, the fourth fewest leaguewide.

In 42 regular-season games since the start of the 2021 regular season, the Bengals have yielded 300 net passing yards on just six occasions. San Francisco in Week 8 reached 300 net passing yards, becoming Cincinnati's first opponent to do so since Tampa Bay in Week 16 of the 2022 campaign. In both instances, the Bengals led by over 10 points late in the fourth quarter when the opposing QB surpassed 300 yards.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson has quickly earned a reputation as one of the NFL's top long-range kickers. Now in his third season, he is 19 of 24 on FG attempts of 50 or more yards, tied for the most from that distance since 2021.

McPherson most recently knocked through his fifth FG of 50 or more yards this season (tied for third most in NFL), a 50-yarder in Week 10 vs. Houston that cut the Bengals' deficit to 20-10 in the third quarter. He played in his 40th career game in Week 9 vs. Buffalo, and his 18 FGs from 50 or more yards at that time are the most in NFL history through any player's first 40 games.

McPherson in Week 8 at San Francisco knocked through a season-long 56-yarder that extended Cincinnati's lead to 17-10 in the third quarter. It marked fifth longest made FG in team history, with McPherson also boasting three of the four longest. He kicked a Bengals-record 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, breaking his own previous record of 58 that he hit in Week 15 of the '21 campaign at Denver. Then in Week 4 of 2022 against Miami, he converted a 57-yarder, tying Randy Bullock for the third longest.

McPherson is already the team's career leader in 50-yard FGs. It took him just 14 games into his rookie season to reach the top of Cincinnati's career chart in that category, breaking the previous record of eight. Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson made an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards during the 2021 regular season and fell just one shy of tying the NFL record for most 50-yarders. His nine such FGs were more than double the previous team record for a single season (four, by K Horst Muhlmann in 1970). He followed that up by going a perfect five of five on attempts of 50-plus yards in 2022.

McPherson has notably wasted no time getting into midseason form in each of the past three years, as he is 22-for-23 on FG attempts and a perfect eight-for-eight on PATs in eight preseason contests. He has eight preseason FGs of 50 or more yards, including a 58- and 56-yarder in the second quarter alone on Aug. 12, 2022 vs. Arizona.

2023 draft class overview: Cincinnati's eight-player draft class in April featured four players on defense, three on offense and one on special teams. The group played in a combined 356 collegiate games.

Here's a closer look at the Bengals' 2023 draft class:

- DE Myles Murphy, Clemson (Round 1, Pick 28): A 6-5, 270-pound pass rusher with highly touted athleticism, Murphy logged his first NFL sack in Week 4 at Tennessee. He recorded 17.5 sacks in 38 career games at Clemson, earning second-team All-ACC honors as a junior in 2022. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo has noted Murphy's ability to line up on the outside or interior of the defensive line.

- CB DJ Turner II, Michigan (Round 2, Pick 60): Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year's NFL Combine, clocking 4.26 seconds. He has played in all nine games this season, starting each of the past five while earning an increased role in the secondary. Turner has 19 combined tackles and is tied for fourth on the team with three PDs. He earned a pair of All-Big Ten accolades (honorable mention in '21, second team in '22) while playing at the University of Michigan.

- S Jordan Battle, Alabama (Round 3, Pick 95): Battle is proving himself as a serviceable backup safety in his rookie campaign, with 97 defensive snaps played and 11 total tackles through eight games. He had his best statistical performance in Week 5 at Arizona, registering two solo stops and two PDs. Battle was twice named a third-team All-American at Alabama, where he started at S from 2020-22. Three of his six career INTs in college were returned for a TD.

- WR Charlie Jones, Purdue (Round 4, Pick 131): Jones opened the

season as the Bengals' primary punt returner and solidified that role with an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. He suffered a thumb injury in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams and was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 29. Jones was a second-team All-American in his lone season at Purdue in 2022, as he led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12).

● HB Chase Brown, Illinois (Round 5, Pick 163): Brown led the Bengals during preseason in rushing attempts (28) and yards (69), but has seen action on just eight offensive snaps in the regular season. He was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Oct. 28 with a hamstring injury. Brown put together an impressive career at Illinois, earning second-team All-America honors in 2022 and totaling 1000 rushing yards in each of his final two seasons.

● WR Andrei Iosivas, Princeton (Round 6, Pick 206): Iosivas is the Bengals' seventh all-time draft pick out of an Ivy League program, and the first since LB Reggie Williams (Dartmouth) and QB Bob Bateman (Brown) in 1976. He had a receiving TD in back-to-back games, with the first of his career coming in Week 6 vs. Seattle followed by another in Week 8 at San Francisco. Iosivas led the team in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129) during the preseason, and also has seen action on special teams in regular-season play.

● P Brad Robbins, Michigan (Round 6, Pick 217): Robbins earned the Bengals' punting job out of training camp, and through nine regular-season contests has punted 43 times with a 45.0-yard gross average. Five of his 11 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line have come in the past two games. Robbins spent six seasons (2017-22) at Michigan, where he finished his career with the second highest punting average (43.0 yards) in program history and was a three-time All-Big Ten selection.

● CB DJ Ivey, Miami (Fla.) (Round 7, Pick 246): The Bengals' final draft pick logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason, showcasing an athleticism and tight coverage that has already impressed his coaches. He made his NFL debut in Week 5 at Arizona and has seen action in three games, appearing primarily on special teams. Ivey started 32 of 58 games played over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.), netting six INTs and 17 PDs.

2023 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by six players wearing the captains' patch, which were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive and three defensive players.

Cincinnati's offensive captains remain unchanged from the 2022 season and include fourth-year QB Joe Burrow, seventh-year HB Joe Mixon and eighth-year C Ted Karras. This is Burrow's fourth consecutive season as a captain and the third straight for Mixon. Karras, who joined the Bengals as a free agent in March of 2022, serves as a team captain for the third time in his career, after previously doing so with the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

The defensive captains are seventh-year CB Mike Hilton, sixth-year DE Sam Hubbard and eighth-year DT DJ Reader. Hubbard is wearing the patch for a third consecutive season, while Reader dons it for a second straight year. Hilton is the lone Bengals captain this season who is carrying the honor for the first time.

Coaching continuity under Taylor: Head coach Zac Taylor returned virtually the entire coaching staff for the 2023 season, including defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo, offensive coordinator Brian Callahan and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons.

Anarumo, Callahan and Simmons have all been on staff since Taylor was hired in February 2019. The Bengals are the only team in the NFL with the same head coach and same coordinators in place for each season since 2021. Simmons, now in his 21st season with the team, is the longest-tenured coach on the Bengals' staff. He has led Cincinnati's special teams units each year since 2003.

The Jungle is jammin': The five highest-attended home games (and nine of the top 10) in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15.

Cincinnati's Sunday Night Football win over Buffalo in Week 9 had an attendance figure of 66,965, which now stands as the second largest in team history. The team's following game in Week 10 vs. Houston (66,526) ranks as the third largest, while the 2022 Wild Card Playoff victory over Baltimore (66,399) is fourth largest and a win over Seattle in Week 6 of this season (66,385) ranks fifth.

Three contests during the 2022 regular season rank in the top 10 for largest home crowds in team history, with each resulting in a win — Week 13 vs. Kansas City (seventh), Week 14 vs. Cleveland (eighth) and Week 9 vs. Carolina (10th). Adding in figures of 65,841 for the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and 65,849 for the Week 18 matchup vs. Baltimore, the Bengals welcomed an attendance of over 65,000 in each of their regular-season home games for the first time since 2007. That streak has continued into this season and now stands at 12 straight regular-season home contests.

The Paycor Stadium crowds have coincided with a recent string of home success for the Bengals, as they have won 13 of their last 16 played at the venue dating back to Week 16 of the 2021 regular season (includes postseason). The last time Cincinnati topped the current stretch was when it won 15 of 18 home contests from Week 10 of the 2012 season through Week 9 of the '14 campaign.

Back-to-back division champs: The Bengals captured the AFC North Division title in 2022 for the second consecutive season, marking the first time in franchise history that Cincinnati won a division in back-to-back years. The 2022 division title was the team's 11th all-time.

While some databases list the Bengals as repeat division winners in 1981 and '82, the '82 postseason featured a special 16-team format (dubbed the "Super Bowl Tournament") that was implemented by the NFL, as the regular season was reduced to nine games due to a players' strike. Eight teams from each conference were seeded 1-8 based on their regular-season records, so despite the Bengals boasting the top record in the AFC Central, they went in as the conference's No. 3 seed and were not recognized as division champions.

Bengals net three Pro Bowlers in '22: QB Joe Burrow, WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson were all voted to the AFC Team for the 2023 Pro Bowl Games. It was the first Pro Bowl nod of Burrow's career, while Chase and Hendrickson both received their second after being selected in the 2021 season.

Burrow became the sixth QB in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl, joining Ken Anderson (1975-76, '81-82), Boomer Esiason ('86, '88-89), Jeff Blake ('95), Carson Palmer (2005-06) and Andy Dalton ('11, '14, '16). The former

No. 1 overall draft pick out of Louisiana State finished the 2022 regular season tied for second in the NFL in passing TDs (35), fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). He surpassed multiple career milestones, including 11,000 passing yards, 75 passing TDs and 1000 pass completions.

Chase in 2022 led Cincinnati in receptions (87), receiving yards (1046) and receiving TDs (nine), despite missing four games due to a hip injury. In Week 14, he joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players in NFL history with 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches under the age of 23. Chase became the seventh player in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons.

Hendrickson, who concluded his second Bengals season in 2022 after signing as an unrestricted free agent in '21, led Cincinnati in sacks (eight) and was tied for second in TFLs (six).

Chase and Hendrickson both participated in the 2023 Pro Bowl Games, which were held Sunday, Feb. 5 at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 13th consecutive season, current NFL players have voted to determine the top 100 players in the NFL, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players in 2023 — QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 39) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 75). It marked the second career appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the third for Hendrickson.

Burrow's ranking at No. 6 is the highest ever by a Bengal, surpassing A.J. Green, who was voted at No. 9 in 2014. This year's list was the fourth time that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Esiason, Johnson join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor with the induction of former QB Boomer Esiason and WR Chad Johnson. Remembered by fans for their on-field contributions as well as their charismatic personalities, Esiason and Johnson became the seventh and eighth members of the Ring of Honor during a ceremony at halftime of the team's Week 3 game against the L.A. Rams on Monday Night Football.

Esiason played for the Bengals from 1984-92 before returning for a final season in '97, and is regarded as one of the greatest locker-room leaders in team history. He earned three Pro Bowl nods (1986, '88-89), and ranks third in Bengals history in both career passing yards (27,149) and TD passes (187). Esiason in 1988 was named NFL MVP while leading the league with a 97.4 passer rating, before steering the Bengals to an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII.

Johnson, who was officially known as Chad Ochocinco from 2008-11, emerged as one of the NFL's best receivers during his 10 seasons with the Bengals ('01-10). He was selected to six Pro Bowls (2003-07, '09), and remains the team's all-time leader in receptions (751), receiving yards (10,783) and receiving TDs (66).

Bengals president Mike Brown on the 2023 inductees: "Boomer and Chad were both exceptional players. If you look at the statistics, Boomer has a long list

of quarterback firsts here. And Chad was a superb athlete who was probably the quickest receiver we have had here. They could have moments when they just carried the team by themselves. Both players are very deserving of this honor."

Esiason and Johnson joined QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley in the Ring of Honor.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Ken Riley enters Hall of Fame: Bengals legend Ken Riley, the most productive CB in team history, was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5. He joined OT Anthony Munoz as former Bengals players immortalized in Canton, Ohio.

The honor came posthumously for Riley, who passed away in 2020 at the age of 72. Riley's wife, Barbara, received the gold jacket on his behalf and revealed the bust with his son, Ken Riley II, who spoke at the enshrinement.

"Dad is just getting inducted today, but his whole life he was a Hall of Famer on and off the field," Ken Riley II said.

Riley spent 15 seasons (1969-83) with the Bengals, playing in 207 games. His 65 career INTs constitute the most dominant lead in any major statistical category of the team's record book, nearly doubling the second-place total of 33. At the time of Riley's retirement, that total of 65 INTs was the fourth-most in NFL history, and it still stands tied for fifth-most. He was a member of five Bengals teams that reached the postseason, including the 1981 squad, which he helped lead to Super Bowl XVI.

Following his retirement, Riley spent two seasons as an assistant coach for the Green Bay Packers before taking over as head coach at his alma mater, Florida A&M University. He led the Rattlers' football program from 1986-93, then served as the school's athletic director from '94-2004. Riley was inducted into the FAMU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1982, the Black College Football Hall of Fame in 2015, and the Bengals Ring of Honor in '21.

Riley's family received his Hall of Fame Ring of Excellence during a halftime ceremony in the Bengals' Week 9 contest against Buffalo on Sunday Night Football.

Bengal bites: The Bengals' victory over Buffalo in Week 9 was the 400th win in team history (390 regular season, 10 postseason) ... Since 2011, the Bengals own a 69-7-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points ... The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.3 years ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is WR Tyler Boyd, who is in his eighth season with the team after joining the Bengals as a second-round draft pick in 2016 ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 30 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is DE Myles Murphy, who is 21 (born Jan. 3, 2002) ... The lightest player on the roster is CB DJ Turner II, who is listed at 180 pounds ... The heaviest player on the roster is OT Orlando Brown Jr., who is listed at 345 pounds ... Brown is also the tallest player on the roster, listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Fourth-year pro **Joe Burrow** has put together one of the most promising starts to a career by a QB in NFL history. The No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 has the highest career completion percentage in league history at 68.0 (minimum 1500 passing attempts), and he holds Bengals single-season records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22), passer rating (108.3; '21) and 300-yard passing games (six; '21). He earned his first career Pro Bowl nod and was an MVP candidate in 2022, when he tied for second in the NFL in TD passes, ranked fifth in completions, fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). A team captain for the fourth consecutive year, Burrow returned to practice on Aug. 30 after missing the majority of training camp due to a calf strain. He signed a five-year contract extension on Sept. 9 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2029 season. Since Week 5 (five games), Burrow leads the league in completion percentage (74.1), ranks second in completions (146), second in passer rating (107.0), fourth in passing yards (1480) and third in TD passes (12). Listed second on the QB depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster coming out of training camp for the first time in his career. Originally a college free agent signee of Minnesota in 2019, Browning spent the '19 and '20 seasons on the Vikings' practice squad, then joined the Bengals prior to the '21 campaign and spent the past two years on the Cincinnati practice squad. He saw action in all three preseason games, completing 32 of 45 attempts for 277 yards

(71.1 completion percentage) and one TD. He made his NFL debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, entering late in the fourth quarter in relief of Burrow. Browning was a four-year starter (2015-18) at the University of Washington, where he led the Huskies to the College Football Playoff in '16 and finished his career with numerous school records.

Running backs: Leading the Bengals running back room is seventh-year pro **Joe Mixon**, who ranks third in team history in career rushing yards (5914) and fourth in rushing TDs (44). Mixon has surpassed the 1000-yard mark in three of his five full seasons (played just six games in 2020), and in 2022 he asserted himself as a reliable pass catching option with career highs in receptions (60) and receiving yards (441). Voted a team captain for the third straight year, Mixon has 536 rushing yards on 137 carries (3.9) through nine games. In Week 8 at San Francisco, he tallied a season-high 87 rushing yards on 16 attempts (5.4), with a TD late in the fourth quarter to seal the win. Mixon has scored a rushing TD in each of the past three games, his first time doing so in three straight contests since Weeks 11-13 of the 2021 season. Mixon's 5914 career rushing yards are fifth most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2017. Next on the running backs depth chart is fifth-year veteran **Trayveon Williams**. Williams has served as a reserve HB with 43 games of experience, totaling 277 rushing yards on 57 carries along with 13 catches for 73 yards. He stepped in as the team's primary KOR midway through the 2022 season,

returning 16 kicks for 356 yards (22.3 average). In Week 6 vs. Seattle, Williams had two receptions and added a 27-yard kickoff return on the Bengals' opening possession. Third-year pro **Chris Evans** had 17 carries for 77 yards his rookie season, but none in 2022. He opened the 2023 season with two carries for 12 yards in Week 1 at Cleveland.

Wide receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is highlighted by one of the most explosive pass-catching trios in the NFL, with the senior member being eighth-year pro **Tyler Boyd**. Boyd is regarded as a premier slot receiver that poses a challenge for nickel CBs with his size (6-2, 203) and route-running ability. He ranks fifth in team history in career receptions (490) for 5750 yards and 31 TDs, and posted consecutive seasons of 1000-plus receiving yards in 2018-19. Boyd's two TD catches this season came in consecutive games vs. Seattle and at San Francisco, and each capped off the Bengals' opening offensive drive. He had a season-high eight receptions for 117 yards, including a 64-yard catch and run that set the Bengals up for a game-tying FG late in the fourth quarter of Week 10 vs. Houston. Boyd's four TD catches of 50 or more yards since the start of the 2021 season rank as the third most in the league, and leading that category with eight such TDs is teammate and third-year pro **Ja'Marr Chase**. Chase was the team's first-round draft pick in 2021 and paced the Bengals in receptions, receiving yards and receiving TDs in each of his first two seasons, earning Pro Bowl honors both years. Chase helped lead the Bengals to their first win in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, amassing 141 yards on 12 catches. In Week 5 at Arizona, he hauled in a Bengals single-game record 15 catches for 192 yards and three TDs, including a 63-yard TD early in the third quarter. He became the fifth player since 1950 with 15 receptions and three receiving TDs in a single game. Chase in Week 6 vs. Seattle surpassed 3000 career receiving yards, doing so in the fifth-fewest games (35) in NFL history. He had another double-digit catch game in Week 8 at San Francisco, finishing with 10 receptions for 100 yards including a 17-yard TD in the fourth quarter that gave the Bengals a two-score advantage. Chase hauled in five catches for 124 yards including a season-long 64-yard TD in Week 10 vs. Houston. He missed four games in 2022 due to a hip injury, but still managed 87 grabs for 1046 yards and nine TDs. Another Cincinnati receiver with a proven history of big plays is fourth-year pro **Tee Higgins**. Higgins, a second-round pick in 2020, has quickly developed into one of the NFL's top young talents. He has posted over 1000 receiving yards in each of the past two seasons, becoming one of five players in team history to do so within his first three years. Higgins had four 100-yard receiving games in 2022, including two when Chase was out of the lineup in Weeks 11-12. At 6-4, he possesses elite athleticism and the ability to high-point the ball when contested by defensive backs. Higgins' top performance so far this season came in Week 9 vs. Buffalo, when he caught eight passes for a season-high 110 yards. He has missed two games this season due to injuries — Week 5 at Arizona (ribs) and Week 10 vs. Houston (hamstring). Fellow fourth-year pro **Trenton Irwin** emerged as a dependable option in the WR room last season and is publicly lauded by his coaches and teammates for a strong work ethic. He spent parts of his first three seasons on Cincinnati's practice squad and saw limited game action, but then found a role in 2022 when he played in nine contests with two starts. Despite not making his season debut until Week 8 at Cleveland, Irwin managed to record 15 catches for 231 yards and four TDs. His best performance came on Christmas Eve at New England, when he caught three passes for 45 yards and two TDs, all in the first half. Irwin had an increased role in Week 5 of this season at Arizona with Higgins out of the lineup and delivered a career-high eight catches for 60 yards. In Week 8 at San Francisco, he caught passes on consecutive plays for 24 total yards during a fourth-quarter TD drive. Irwin kicked off Week 10 vs. Houston with his first TD catch of the season, a 32-yarder on Cincinnati's opening drive. Rounding out the WR room is rookie sixth-round pick **Andrei Iosivas**. The former Princeton standout both in football and track and field had a TD catch in back-to-back games (Week 6 vs. Seattle and Week 8 at San Francisco). Both scores were the result of scramble drills, with Iosivas working himself free for Burrow to find in the end zone. Iosivas led Cincinnati in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129) during the preseason, helping him earn a spot on the 53-man roster.

Tight ends: Among Cincinnati's key free agent acquisitions this offseason was **Irv Smith Jr.**, who is in his fifth NFL season after spending his first four years with Minnesota. Originally a second-round draft pick of the Vikings in 2019, Smith has played in 44 career games with 20 starts and totaled 105 catches for 947 yards and 10 TDs. He missed the entire 2021 campaign due to a knee injury and was limited to eight regular-season games in '22 due to an ankle injury, but has played in seven contests this year with the Bengals. Smith missed Weeks 3-4 due to a hamstring injury, but returned to the lineup in Week 5 at Arizona. He scored his first TD as a Bengal on Cincinnati's opening drive in

Week 9 vs. Buffalo. Next on the depth chart is fellow 2019 second-round pick **Drew Sample**, who since being drafted by the Bengals has established himself as a premier blocking TE in the NFL. Sample missed most of the 2022 season with a knee injury sustained in Week 2 at Dallas, but has played in all eight games this season, making two starts. Sample recorded three catches for 30 yards and a TD in Week 9 vs. Buffalo, his first score since the 2020 season. He had a streak of 39 consecutive games played (including postseason) prior to the injury and has also been a core contributor on special teams for Cincinnati. The Bengals in July re-signed **Mitchell Wilcox**, who spent his first three career seasons with Cincinnati. He had his first two receptions of the season for 10 yards in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams. The University of South Florida product has 23 career catches for 172 yards and a TD in 40 games. **Tanner Hudson**, who has played in 37 career games with two starts, signed with the Bengals practice squad late in the 2022 season after spending time with Tampa Bay ('19-20), San Francisco ('21) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He played in 11 regular-season and all four postseason contests for the Buccaneers team that won Super Bowl LV. Hudson spent the first seven games of 2023 on Cincinnati's practice squad, and after being a standard elevation for two games earlier this season, he was signed to the active roster on Nov. 1. Hudson made an immediate impact, starting in Week 9 vs. Buffalo and recording four catches for 45 yards. In Week 10 vs. Houston, he posted a career-high six catches for 33 yards, including five for 28 on the Bengals' opening TD drive.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in revamping the offensive line over the past two offseasons, signing four marquee free agents to bolster that unit. The most recent such addition is OT **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who signed with Cincinnati in March after spending his first three seasons in Baltimore (2018-20) and the past two in Kansas City ('21-22). A Pro Bowl selection in each of the past four years, Brown took over as the Bengals' starting LOT and is tasked with protecting QB Joe Burrow's blind side. He was a crucial piece of offensive lines that blocked for Ravens QB Lamar Jackson (2019) and Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. Brown made his first 32 career starts at ROT, then transitioned to LOT midway through the 2020 season and has started his past 52 games at that spot. Brown has started all nine contests for the Bengals, though he exited Week 6 vs. Seattle with a groin injury late in the third quarter. The nucleus of Cincinnati's O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who signed as a free agent in 2022 and almost instantaneously became a vocal leader in the locker room. Currently serving as a team captain for the second straight season, Karras has experience at all three interior OL positions but quickly cemented himself as the Bengals' starting center and played 99.4 percent of offensive snaps in 2022. He spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, with the only outlier coming in 2020 with Miami. Karras was a member of Patriots Super Bowl winning teams in 2016 and '18, before earning the starting center role in '19. Through nine games, Karras has played 100 percent of offensive snaps. Joining Karras in the 2022 free agency class was RG **Alex Cappa**, who spent his first four seasons with Tampa Bay. Cappa was perhaps the Bengals' most consistent performer on the line through most of the 2022 season, starting the first 16 games before suffering a left ankle injury in the regular-season finale that kept him out of all three playoff contests. He was the Bucs' starting RG from 2019-21 and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team, though he did not play in the final three postseason games due to an injury sustained in the Wild Card Playoff. Cappa has played 100 percent of offensive snaps through nine games this season. Second-year pro **Cordell Volson** is building off an impressive rookie season in which he was the team's only player to line up for every single offensive snap in the regular season and postseason (1311 total). Volson originally was a fourth-round draft pick out of North Dakota State University, where he played four different positions along the O-line during his career. He played in a school-record 65 games at NDSU, helping the Bison win four FCS national championships while earning three FCS All-America honors. Through nine games, Volson has played 100 percent of offensive snaps. **Jonah Williams**, the Bengals' first-round pick in 2019, is the team's starting ROT this year after lining up at LOT for his first three full seasons (missed '19 campaign due to shoulder injury). He has started all 51 regular-season games and all five postseason games he has played in. Williams carried a streak of 37 consecutive starts before suffering a left knee injury in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore that ended his season. He spent the majority of the offseason rehabbing, including all of the team's mandatory minicamp, but was a full participant in training camp and has played 100 percent of offensive snaps in the regular season. G **Max Scharping** is in his fifth pro season and serves as both a backup right guard and center for Cincinnati. Scharping was acquired by the Bengals on waivers prior to the start of the 2022 season and played in 14 regular-season contests before being thrust into the starting RG spot for all three postseason games following Cappa's injury. He spent his first three pro seasons with Houston, splitting time between RG and LG in 48 games

played (33 starts). Another notable free agent addition this offseason was G **Cody Ford**, a fifth-year veteran who originally was a second-round pick of Buffalo in 2019. Ford spent his first three pro seasons with the Bills before playing for Arizona in 2022. He has played in 58 career games with 32 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG and eight at LG. Ford saw action on 17 offensive snaps in Week 6 vs. Seattle, filling in at LOT in relief of Brown. Ford had previously lined up alongside Brown for two seasons (2016-17) at the University of Oklahoma. OT **D'Ante Smith** was inactive for all but one game for Cincinnati during the 2022 regular season, but played in all three postseason contests as a reserve lineman. He was originally a fourth-round pick in 2021 and battled injuries as a rookie, seeing action in just two regular-season games. Smith returned in time for the postseason run, playing in both the AFC Championship and Super Bowl LVI. Third-year pro **Jackson Carman** played in all 17 regular-season games as a rookie in 2021 but saw action in just three contests last season. With the O-line affected by injuries heading into the Divisional Playoff at Buffalo in January, Carman was called upon to start at LOT and played perhaps the best game of his young career, as he helped limit the Bills to one sack and paved the way for Cincinnati's 172 net rushing yards. A native of Fairfield, Ohio (Greater Cincinnati area), Carman played three collegiate seasons at Clemson before the Bengals drafted him in the second round in 2021. C **Trey Hill** has served primarily as a special teams contributor the last two seasons, but started three games (two at C, one at RG) in his 2021 rookie campaign. A sixth-round draft pick, Hill has played in all seven of Cincinnati's postseason games the past two years.

Defensive linemen: Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard** is in his sixth Bengals season (fifth as a full-time starter). A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard has 34.5 career sacks, tied for the third most among all players from his rookie class. Four of those sacks came in a five-game span (Games 3-7), beginning in Week 3 when he took down Rams QB Matthew Stafford for an eight-yard loss in the fourth quarter. Hubbard was dominant in Week 6 vs. Seattle, recording six tackles (four solos) and five QB hits, including a sack of QB Geno Smith on fourth-and-goal to preserve Cincinnati's lead late in the fourth quarter. Hubbard also is considered among the best DEs in the NFL against the run and led the Bengals with 11 TFLs in 2022. He made one of the most memorable plays in recent team history during the fourth quarter of the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, returning a fumble 98 yards for what proved to be the game-winning TD. It was his second career fumble returned for a score (regular and postseason). Hubbard was inactive in Week 10 vs. Houston with an ankle injury. On the other side of the line is DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who leads Cincinnati with 8.5 sacks this season (tied for seventh in NFL). Hendrickson joined the team as a free agent in 2021 and has earned Pro Bowl selections in each of his two Bengals seasons. His first year in stripes, Hendrickson posted a career-high 14 sacks, the fifth most in the league and second most in a season in team history. He followed that up with a team-leading eight sacks in 2022. The Florida Atlantic University product has 7.5 sacks over the past seven games, including 2.5 in Week 5 at Arizona. He helped cement the Week 8 win over San Francisco with a strip sack of QB Brock Purdy that resulted in a Bengals recovery. Hendrickson's 44 sacks since the start of the 2020 season are the fourth most in the NFL in that span. On July 27, he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. DT **DJ Reader**, a 6-3, 335-pound run stuffer, has anchored the defensive line since signing with the Bengals as a free agent in 2020. Reader is a key component of a unit that has ranked in the top seven leaguewide in rushing yards allowed per game in each of the past two seasons. His first sack of the 2023 campaign came in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, when he brought down QB Matthew Stafford for a nine-yard loss on a goal-to-go situation to help force the Rams into a FG. In Week 10 vs. Houston, Reader recovered a C.J. Stroud fumble on fourth-and-one in the red zone. Reader spent six games on the Reserve/Injured list in 2022 due to a knee injury, but returned in Week 11 and started each contest through the AFC Championship. DT **B.J. Hill** is in his third season with the Bengals and has become a major contributor on the D-line. Hill was acquired in a trade with the N.Y. Giants shortly before the 2021 regular season and has played in 41 games (27 starts) for Cincinnati. Hill started all 16 contests in 2022, posting a career-high 68 tackles with three sacks, one FF, three FR and four PDs. He has added four more sacks this season, highlighted by a takedown of Rams QB Matthew Stafford in Week 3 that forced a punt in the fourth quarter. He also recovered the fumble forced by Hendrickson in the fourth quarter in Week 8 at San Francisco. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his third season as a pro, but 2022 was his first healthy year as he missed his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. The athletic pass rusher showcased his potential last season with 3.5 sacks as a reserve DE. He then posted six tackles in postseason play, including five with a TFL in the AFC Championship at Kansas

City. Ossai saw action in all three preseason games and had an INT on the opening drive at Atlanta, but suffered an ankle injury the following week at Washington that caused him to miss the first two regular-season contests. He made his season debut in Week 3 and has seen action on 85 defensive snaps in seven games. Second-year DT **Zach Carter** had a strong 2022 rookie campaign in which he played in all 16 regular-season games with nine starts. Carter, a 2022 third-round pick out of the University of Florida, contributed to the run defense while totaling 23 tackles, a half-sack and a PD. He appeared in all three postseason games, starting the Wild Card round and AFC Championship as a second DT. Carter has nine tackles and a PD through nine games this season, and made his first start in Week 8 at San Francisco. Third-year pro **Cam Sample** logged his first sack of the season in Week 6 vs. Seattle, bringing down QB Geno Smith on the final play of the first half. Sample has played in 39 career regular-season games and serves as a rotational DE. He started in Week 10 vs. Houston in place of Sam Hubbard and made five tackles. A product of Tulane University, he posted 25 tackles with two sacks in 2022, and then flashed in the AFC Championship with a sack of Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes along with another TFL. Sixth-year DT **Josh Tupou** has been a reliable DT against the run since joining the Bengals as a college free agent in 2017. The 6-3, 340-pound veteran has appeared in 57 games (22 starts) for the Bengals, and has logged 72 total tackles, including a pair of sacks in 2022. The Bengals selected DE **Myles Murphy** out of Clemson University in the first round (28th overall) of this year's draft, looking to bolster their pass rushing production. Murphy totaled 17.5 sacks in 38 games at Clemson, earning second-team All-ACC honors last season. He brings premier size and athleticism to the D-Line room at 6-5, 270 pounds. Murphy recorded his first career tackle and sack on a second-quarter takedown of QB Ryan Tannehill in Week 4 at Tennessee. The Bengals acquired DT **Jay Tufele** on waivers from Jacksonville prior to the 2022 season opener and it proved to be a valuable move, as he started two games (Weeks 8-9) while Reader was recovering from a knee injury. Tufele finished with 16 total tackles in seven regular-season games for Cincinnati. He has appeared in six regular-season games this season, registering five total tackles.

Linebackers: Among Cincinnati's most promising young defenders is fourth-year pro **Logan Wilson**, who wears the "green dot" as the defense's communicator. Wilson led the Bengals in tackles the past two regular seasons, with his career-high 123 stops in 2022 marking the most by a Bengals player since Vontaze Burfict (171) in '13. Wilson has a team-high 70 total tackles through nine games (all starts) this season. He also has shown a high proficiency when dropping into coverage, as his 10 career INTs are the most by an NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020. Three of those picks have come this season, including two in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams and another in Week 8 at San Francisco. He and DE Trey Hendrickson split a sack in Week 10 vs. Houston, with Wilson forcing a fumble on the play that ended a Texans drive in Cincinnati territory. Wilson was inked to a four-year contract extension on Aug. 5 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Ranking second on the team in tackles last season with 99 was **Germaine Pratt**. Pratt, a fifth-round Bengals pick in 2019 who is in his fifth pro season, has started 63 of 71 regular-season games played. He tied for the team lead with 11 tackles (seven solos) in Week 1 at Cleveland, with a sack and FF, and followed that up with nine stops in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. In Week 5 at Arizona, Pratt led the team with 10 tackles, including a key stop on a Cardinals fourth-and-one in the third quarter, then in the fourth quarter picked off QB Joshua Dobbs to help seal the win. Pratt added another INT in Week 8 at San Francisco, tipping a pass by QB Brock Purdy and coming down with it to end a potential game-tying drive that reached Cincinnati's eight-yard line. Pratt led the team in tackles (11) and forced a fumble in the fourth quarter of Week 9 vs. Buffalo (recovered by S Nick Scott) that ended a Bills scoring threat. A 2020 seventh-round draft choice of the Bengals, **Markus Bailey** has grown into a key reserve role in the LB room as well as a valuable contributor on special teams. Bailey has played in 52 regular-season games (four starts), and has 51 total defensive tackles as well as 15 special teams tackles. He provided a crucial block during Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble recovery return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore this past January. Joe Bachie spent the first six games of 2022 on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a left knee injury, but returned to the active roster and saw action in 10 regular-season games and all three postseason contests. He resumed his role as a core special teams player, totaling seven ST tackles in 168 snaps. Bachie has seen action mostly on special teams so far in 2023. The Bengals acquired LB **Devin Harper** on waivers from Dallas on Sept. 29. Harper originally was a sixth-round pick of the Cowboys in 2022 and played in six games for them, including their first three contests of this season. He made his Bengals debut in Week 5 at Arizona. **Akeem Davis-Gaither** played in the first three games this season before suffering a knee injury that has caused him to be inactive for four contests before returning to game action in Week 9 vs.

Buffalo. He logged a career-best 37 tackles in 16 games (one start) in 2022, with 13 of those stops coming in a notable Week 3 performance at the N.Y. Jets. Davis-Gaither also played in all three postseason games, recording his first career INT in the Wild Card Playoff against Baltimore.

Defensive backs: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, Hilton is a sure tackler and excellent blitzer. He was voted to serve as a team captain this season for the first time in his career, and has started eight of nine games played. Hilton came down with his first INT of the season in Week 6 vs. Seattle, picking off QB Geno Smith in the third quarter to end a Seahawks drive that reached the red zone. In Week 10 vs. Houston, he recovered a C.J. Stroud fumble in the second quarter. Hilton has notably made several game-altering plays in the postseason over the past two years, including an INT in the 2021 Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and a sack in the fourth quarter of the '22 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore. **Chidobe Awuzie** arrived in Cincinnati in 2021 alongside Hilton and quickly established himself as the team's No. 1 boundary corner. Awuzie has started 30 of 34 games he has played in for the Bengals (including postseason). His 2022 season was cut short by a knee injury suffered in Week 8 at Cleveland, and he spent the following nine-plus months rehabbing before being cleared to practice on July 25 of this year. Awuzie's first game back came on the same field where he sustained the injury, as he played 43 defensive snaps in Week 1 at Cleveland and recorded a FR in the first quarter. Awuzie missed the Week 5 contest at Arizona due to a back injury, but returned to game action in Week 6 vs. Seattle. Second-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** recorded his first two career INTs (regular season) in back-to-back games in Weeks 5-6, and added his third and fourth picks in Weeks 9 and 10. He is tied for third leaguewide in INTs this season. In Week 5 at Arizona, he picked off QB Joshua Dobbs and returned it 11 yards for a go-ahead TD near the end of the first half. Then in the fourth quarter of Week 6 vs. Seattle, he came down with a diving INT before returning it 24 yards. Taylor-Britt stepped in front of a Josh Allen pass in the second quarter of Week 9 vs. Buffalo for his third INT of the season. Late in the fourth quarter in Week 10 vs. Houston, he intercepted a C.J. Stroud pass and returned it 30 yards to the Texans' four-yard line to set up a Bengals TD three plays later. Taylor-Britt began his rookie season in 2022 on the Reserve/Injured list (abdomen), but went on to play in the final 10 regular-season games with nine starts. He also started all three postseason games, and sealed the Bengals' victory over Buffalo in the Divisional Playoff with an INT in the closing minutes. Cincinnati used its 2023 second-round selection on **DJ Turner II**, a speedy boundary corner out of the University of Michigan. Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year's NFL Combine, clocking a time of 4.26 seconds. He recorded three INTs and 20 PDs in four seasons (2019-22) at Michigan and was named second-team All-Big Ten last season. He made his NFL debut in the regular-season opener at Cleveland and had his first career PD in the fourth quarter of Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. Turner has started each of the past five games, totaling 15 tackles (12 solos) and two PDs in that stretch. **Jalen Davis** serves as a reserve slot CB behind Hilton, but secondary/cornerbacks coach Charles Burks has expressed his opinion that Davis could start for many NFL teams. He has played in 50 career games (including postseason), carving out a role on special teams in addition to his CB duties. He notched his first PD of the season in Week 3 against the Rams. **DJ Ivey**, the Bengals' seventh-round pick in April, made his NFL debut in Week 5 at Arizona after he was inactive for the first four games. Ivey played in 58 games with 32 starts over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.). At 6-1, 192, he provides a rangy frame and displayed impressive ball skills in training camp. Ivey logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason. The Bengals this season are rolling out a new-look starting safety tandem consisting of fifth-year veteran **Nick Scott** and second-year pro **Dax Hill**. Scott was among Cincinnati's notable acquisitions during the 2023 free agency period and holds 73 games of NFL experience (26 starts). He spent his first four seasons with the L.A. Rams, starting out as a special teams contributor before gradually increasing his role defensively and eventually becoming the team's starting safety in 2022. Scott is

known for his physical play and sure tackling abilities, but also has four INTs and nine PDs. He started each of the Rams' four postseason contests on their run to a Super Bowl LVI title. Scott made his Bengals debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, tying for the team lead with 11 total tackles. He also led Cincinnati in tackles with 10 (nine solos) in Week 4 at Tennessee. Scott recovered a fumble in the red zone (forced by LB Germaine Pratt) in the fourth quarter of Week 9 vs. Buffalo. Hill was the Bengals' first-round draft choice in 2022 and played in 15 games with two starts as a rookie. He has emerged as one of the defense's top playmakers through nine games this season with 60 total tackles (third on team), four TFLs, 1.5 sacks, two INTs and eight PDs. His first career INT came in Week 1 at Cleveland, when he picked off QB Deshaun Watson and returned it 20 yards. He had a team-high eight stops, including his first sack, in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, and then grabbed his second INT the following week at Tennessee. Cincinnati took **Jordan Battle** in the third round of this April's draft, adding depth and championship pedigree to the safeties room. Battle was a third-team All-American in each of the past two seasons while at the University of Alabama, and helped the Crimson Tide win the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2020. A fundamentally sound rookie with noted leadership characteristics, Battle had six career INTs with three returned for a TD. He has seen action on 97 defensive snaps through nine games, and in Week 5 at Arizona he stepped up with two solo tackles and two PDs.

Special teams: Rookie **Brad Robbins** earned the Bengals' punting role following a strong display in training camp and preseason. A native of Westerville, Ohio (north of Columbus), he is averaging 45.0 gross yards per punt with 11 downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line through nine regular-season contests. Robbins punted five times with an average of 51.4 yards in Week 4 at Tennessee, including a career-long 62-yard boot. In Week 9 vs. Buffalo, he landed each of his three punts inside the Bills' 20-yard line. He recorded two more inside-20 punts in Week 10 vs. Houston, and finished with a 51.8-yard average on five total punts. Robbins was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of April's draft after a five-year playing career at the University of Michigan that saw him post the second highest career punting average (43.0 yards per attempt) in program history. He additionally handles holding duties on placekicks for the Bengals. Third-year K **Evan McPherson** has earned a reputation as one of the NFL's top kickers from long range, as his 19 FGs from 50 or more yards are tied for the most in the league since the start of the 2021 campaign. The former fifth-round Bengals draft pick has kicked four of the five longest made FGs in Bengals history, including each of the two longest — a 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and a 58-yarder in Week 15 of the '21 season at Denver. McPherson is also 19 for 19 on FG attempts in the postseason, the second most consecutive FGs without a miss to begin a postseason career in NFL history. McPherson's 83.5 career FG percentage ranks third in Bengals history. He drilled four of his five FG attempts, with hits from 53 and 54 yards, in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, and connected on a season-long 56-yard attempt at San Francisco in Week 8. The Bengals' long-snapper is second-year pro **Cal Adomitis**, who took over the role in Week 2 of the 2022 season following a season-ending injury to veteran Clark Harris. In 27 career games (including postseason), Adomitis has delivered 225 snaps without an unplayable attempt. He originally joined the Bengals as a college free agent in 2022 after a five-year career ('17-21) at the University of Pittsburgh. WR **Trenton Irwin** is handling punt return duties for the Bengals while rookie WR Charlie Jones, the first-string PR, is on the Reserve/Injured list with a thumb injury. Irwin has returned 10 punts for 98 yards, including four for 68 with two going for over 20 yards in Week 5 at Arizona. HB **Trayveon Williams** has been the team's primary KOR. Williams this season has returned eight kickoffs for 183 yards, including a 41-yard runback in the first quarter of Week 8 at San Francisco that set up a Bengals TD drive. He followed that with three KORs for 61 yards in Week 9 vs. Buffalo. Williams took over the role in the second half of last season and had 16 KORs for 356 yards (22.3) over the final eight regular-season games. HB **Chris Evans**, who is listed as the second-string kickoff returner on the depth chart, has 14 career KORs for 314 yards (22.4), with two for 45 coming this season. He had a 27-yard return on the opening kick of the game in Week 1 at Cleveland.

Hindered by wet and rainy conditions, the Bengals were limited to three points and 142 offensive net yards in a season-opening loss to their in-state rival. The Cincinnati defense kept the game within reach, forcing two turnovers and holding the Browns to 13 points through three quarters, but Cleveland's strong rushing attack eventually broke through and finished the day with 206 yards, led by 106 from RB Nick Chubb. Browns QB Deshaun Watson found the end zone on a 13-yard run just before halftime to give the Browns a 10-0 lead at the break, but the Bengals responded with a 42-yard FG from K Evan McPherson early in the third quarter to cut the deficit to seven. A promising drive on Cincinnati's next offensive possession resulted in a missed FG attempt, and the offense did not reach Browns territory the rest of the way as Cleveland held the upper hand in the battle of field position. The Bengals went for it on fourth-and-four from their own 31-yard line with just over 10 minutes remaining in an attempt to jumpstart the offense, but QB Joe Burrow was dropped for a 13-yard sack and the Browns scored three plays later to seal the final outcome. The game was the 100th "Battle of Ohio" between the two teams.
