GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Spero Dedes (play-by-play), Adam Archuleta (analyst) and Aditi Kinkhabwala (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals host the Cleveland Browns in this season's second installment of the "Battle of Ohio" on Sunday.

Cincinnati is coming off back-to-back road wins in Week 14 at Dallas and Week 15 at Tennessee. A home victory for the Bengals this week not only would complete a season sweep over their in-state rival, but also would keep their playoff hopes alive as they enter the final stretch of the 2024 schedule.

Last Sunday's 37-27 win at Tennessee featured several individual records as well as a team milestone. For the Bengals, it marked the 400th regular-season win in franchise history. Helping Cincinnati earn the result was QB Joe Burrow, who set a new single-season team record with his 36th TD pass, and WR Ja'Marr Chase, who surpassed his career high in receptions and now boasts a league-leading 102 on the year.

The Bengals' defense also enjoyed an afternoon full of highlights, as it recorded six takeaways with four INTs. Two of the picks came on back-to-back defensive plays late in the second quarter to help Cincinnati build a 10-point halftime lead, then midway through the third period S Geno Stone recorded his first career pick-six to break the game open.

But while the double-digit victory saw plays made in all three phases, head coach Zac Taylor pointed to areas that can still be improved upon. Namely, a season-high 14 penalties called against the Bengals.

"I'm happy we won — I don't take that lightly," Taylor said. "There are a lot of really positive things that we highlighted with the team that we did well. We got turnovers, scored off those turnovers. So, there was a lot of really good stuff there. The 14 penalties is not us. We addressed every single one of those. There's things that we can continue to clean up."

Cincinnati enters this week with an opportunity to sweep the Browns for the first time since the 2017 season. The Bengals picked up a 21-14 win at Cleveland in Week 7, as Burrow threw a pair of TD passes in the third quarter and the defense held the Browns to just 77 net rushing yards.

Through 15 weeks of regular-season play, Burrow leads the NFL in completions (361), passing attempts (527), passing yards (3977) and TD passes (36). He has passed for at least 250 yards and three TDs in each of Cincinnati's last six games, joining former New England QB Tom Brady as the only players in league history to reach those marks in six straight contests. Chase, meanwhile, remains in contention for the illustrious "Triple Crown," as he paces the NFL in receptions (102), receiving yards (1413) and receiving TDs (15).

The series: The Bengals lead 54-48 in the "Battle of Ohio" series. Cincinnati has won three of the past four meetings, but the Browns have won six of the past nine. Home field has been a factor over the series, as the Bengals lead 33-18 at home, but trail 21-30 as the road club.

Cincinnati has played more games against Cleveland (102) than any foe except Pittsburgh. The Bengals have 108 all-time regular-season games against

the Steelers (110 overall, including postseason).

Since the Browns' rebirth in 1999, the Bengals lead 30-21, with records of 17-8 as the home team and 13-13 as the visiting team.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at movement on the Bengals' individual career records lists (regular season) that has occurred this season, as well as potential upcoming movement:

- QB Joe Burrow has 2422 career passing attempts, the fifth-most in team history. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's all-time list. Burrow in Week 10 at Baltimore surpassed QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth.
- Burrow has 18,060 passing yards, the fifth-most in team history. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top four spots. Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for fifth.
- Burrow has 25 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the second-most in team history behind Dalton (28). Burrow in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh surpassed Esiason (23).
- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 44 receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh surpassed WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth.
- Chase in Week 14 at Dallas recorded his 18th game with 100 or more receiving yards, which tied WR Cris Collinsworth for the fifth-most in team history. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots for most 100-yard receiving games.
- DE Trey Hendrickson has 52.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, seven shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

Records vs. Browns: The two highest-scoring games in Bengals history have each been against the Browns. On Nov. 28, 2004 at Paycor Stadium (then known as Paul Brown Stadium), the Bengals won 58-48, and the 106 total points is not only a Bengals record, it is the second-most in NFL history, behind only 113 from Washington's 72-41 win over the N.Y. Giants in 1966. And on Sept. 16, 2007, the Bengals and Browns combined for 96 points at Cleveland in a 51-45 Browns win.

More on Bengals regular-season records against the Browns:

- On Dec. 21, 1980 vs. Cleveland, DE Eddie Edwards set the Bengals record for sacks in a game with five. The mark stood unchallenged for 19 years, until DE Antwan Odom tied it on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay.
- In the final Bengals game at Cinergy Field, on Dec. 12, 1999, Cincinnati limited the Browns to the fewest rushing yards ever by an opponent. Cleveland had only 11 net yards on 11 attempts.
- On Sept. 10, 2000, WR Craig Yeast tied a Bengals record for most punt returns in a game with seven. The record was set by RB Tony Davis in 1977, and in addition to Yeast, has since been tied by WR Brandon Tate in 2011.
- On Nov. 25, 2001 at Cleveland, T.J. Houshmandzadeh set the Bengals

record for punt return yards in a game with 126. His 86-yarder in that game ranks tied for third-longest in club history, and it still ranks as the longest punt return in team history which did not result in a touchdown.

- The 58-48 Bengals win on Nov. 28, 2004 is the only game in club history in which Cincinnati scored double figures in all four quarters (14-13-14-17 — 58).
- In the Sept. 16, 2007 shootout with the Browns noted above, QB Carson Palmer threw six TD passes, the most ever by a Bengals QB in a single game. That mark also stands tied for the team record for most TD passes in a game.
- On Dec. 21, 2008, at Cleveland, Bengals CB Leon Hall tied the team record for most interceptions in a game with three. He was the seventh Bengal to reach that mark in a contest, though no one has done it since.
- The Bengals' 23-20 overtime victory at Cleveland on Oct. 4, 2009 stands as the longest Bengals game not to end in a tie, and it will remain so for the foreseeable future. Only four seconds remained in the overtime period when K Shayne Graham booted a 31-yard field goal to break a 20-all deadlock. Elapsed scoreboard clock time for the game was 74:56. Only three games lasted longer in Bengals history, and all three were 75-minute ties — in 2008 vs. Philadelphia, in '14 vs. Carolina and '16 vs. Washington in London. The NFL shortened overtime from a 15-minute period to a 10-minute period in 2017, so the longest a game can last nowadays since that rule change is 70 total minutes.
- On Nov. 17, 2013, the Bengals scored 31 points in the second quarter, a team record for most points in a quarter, en route to a 41-20 Cincinnati victory.
- In their 30-0 win at Cleveland on Dec. 14, 2014, the Bengals allowed only five first downs, fewest by an opponent in Bengals history.
- On Oct 23, 2016 against Cleveland, HB Jeremy Hill rushed for 168 yards on nine carries (18.7 yards per rush) — the most rushing yards in club history without hitting double digits in carries. That 168-yard total broke a mark that had stood for 45 years — 113 yards on eight carries by Essex Johnson vs. Philadelphia on 9-19-71.

Individually vs. Browns: Here are offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against Cleveland (ordered by total games played):

- HB Trayveon Williams: Eight games; 13 rushes for 45 yards (3.5); Two receptions for 10 yards (5.0).
- QB Joe Burrow: Seven games; 272 attempts and 172 completions (63.2 percent) for 1738 yards, 12 TDs and five INTs (88.5 passer rating); 26 rushes for 62 yards (2.4) and one TD.
- TE Drew Sample: Seven games; 18 receptions for 148 yards (8.2).
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Six games; 32 receptions for 307 yards (9.6) and two TDs; Five rushes for 19 yards (3.8).
- WR Tee Higgins: Seven games; 21 receptions for 315 yards (15.0) and three TDs; one rush for seven yards.
- HB Chris Evans (Reserve/Injured): Four games; Nine rushes for 47 yards (5.2); Seven receptions for 60 yards (8.6) and one TD.
- WR Andrei Iosivas: Three games; Five receptions for 36 yards (7.2) and two TDs.
- WR Charlie Jones: Three games; Three receptions for 49 yards (16.3); Two rushes for 13 yards (6.5).
- HB Chase Brown: Two games; 26 rushes for 87 yards (3.3); Three receptions for 19 yards (6.3).
- QB Jake Browning: Two games; 18-of-25 passing for 156 yards, three TDs and one INT (111.0 passer rating); Three rushes for 17 yards.
- TE Tanner Hudson: Two games; Two receptions for 11 yards (5.5).
- TE Mike Gesicki: One game; One reception for two yards.
- HB Zack Moss (Reserve/Injured): One game; Six rushes for seven yards (1.2); Three receptions for 33 yards (11.0).

Bengals seek to regain biggest 'Battle' margin: With nine victories in its last 13 meetings with Cincinnati, Cleveland has whittled the Bengals' largest lead of 11 games in the team's all-time series down to six. The Bengals' 11-game lead after the 2017 season set the benchmark for the biggest lead held by either side in the "Battle of Ohio" series.

The series began in 1970 with the Browns winning six of the first seven, and their five-game margin at 6-1, after the first meeting of 1973, stands as their largest lead. The Bengals lead 53-42 since that Cleveland high-water mark. The Browns have not led the series since the end of 2005, when they were 33-32.

Since surrendering that 33-32 lead by giving up a sweep in the 2006 meetings, the Browns have twice pulled into ties — at 34-34 after the first meeting of '07 and at 35-35 after the first meeting of '08. But the Browns have now endured a 17-year stretch without a lead in the series. Barring possible additions to the series in postseason play, the Bengals cannot surrender their series lead until after the first game of 2027, at the earliest. The Browns could not lead again until after the second game of '27.

More Bengals-Browns facts: The first-ever Bengals-Browns meeting of any kind was Aug. 29, 1970. On that Saturday, the Browns were visitors for the second preseason game of Riverfront Stadium's debut year. The Bengals won 31-24, moving to 2-0 in preseason in their new home. Also:

- The Bengals were 17-10 against the Browns at Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field.
- The Browns were 17-8 against the Bengals at the old Cleveland Stadium, and now the series is tied 13-13 at Huntington Bank Field (named Cleveland Browns Stadium from 1999-12 and in '23, and FirstEnergy Stadium from '13-22).
- The Bengals and Browns never played at Nippert Stadium, as Nippert was the Bengals' American Football League home from 1968-69.
- The Bengals have posted 13 season sweeps, and the Browns have posted 11. The teams have split 26 times. In 1982, they played only once, with the scheduled contest at Cleveland cancelled due to a players' strike.
- The first Bengals-Browns regular-season game at Cincinnati on Nov. 15, 1970 drew the first home crowd of 60,000 in Bengals history (60,007 at Riverfront Stadium). The Bengals won 14-10 behind a 110-yard rushing effort from QB Virgil Carter, the only 100-yarder by a QB in Bengals history.
- The largest Bengals home crowd for a Browns game has been 66,222, on Dec. 11, 2022 at Paycor Stadium. That ranks as the 11th-largest home crowd in Bengals history. The previous high vs. Cleveland at home had stood for 17 years — a mark of 66,072 attended a Sept. 17, 2006 game at Paycor, which then was called Paul Brown Stadium.
- The Browns drew the largest Bengals crowd in the Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field era — 60,284 for a 27-24 Browns win on Oct. 17, 1971.
- The Bengals and Browns met three times in preseason at Ohio Stadium in Columbus, from 1972-74. All were Sunday afternoon games, and the Browns won two of the three.

'Battle' coaches: Here are some notes about head coaches in the "Battle of Ohio" series:

- When Cincinnati's Zac Taylor and Cleveland's Freddie Kitchens met in the first "Battle of Ohio" of 2019, it was just the second time in series history that a Bengals-Browns meeting featured two rookie head coaches who faced both each other and their Ohio rival for the first time in the same game. The Browns won that contest at FirstEnergy Stadium, 27-19. The first such instance occurred on Oct. 21, 1984, when Bengals first-year head coach Sam Wyche met Browns first-year head coach Marty Schottenheimer in Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium, with the Bengals winning, 12-9. The Bengals' Homer Rice and the Browns' Sam Rutigliano also were rookie head coaches when they met for the first time on Dec. 17, 1978 at Riverfront. However, that was Rutigliano's second "Battle of Ohio" as Cleveland's head coach. The two teams met in Game 2 that year, before Rice, who was named head coach after Game 5, took the reins.
- Former Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis, who was 22-10 overall against Cleveland, has the most total wins and best winning percentage (.688) of any Bengals head coach in the series. Lewis also has coached the most games (32) against Cleveland. Sam Wyche is second in all three categories, with 10 wins, a .625 winning percentage (10-6) and 16 games.
- Bill Belichick has been the top Browns coach in the series, having posted an 8-2 mark against the Bengals during his 1991-95 tenure.
- Lewis is the only Bengals head coach whose first Cincinnati victory came against Cleveland. Lewis took over as head coach in 2003, and his first win was a 21-14 decision at Cleveland on Sept. 28 of that year. The Bengals entered that game at 0-3, but went on to finish 8-8. The six-game improvement, after a 2-14 season in 2002, was the largest in the NFL for '03.
- Forrest Gregg is the only head coach to pilot both teams in the "Battle of Ohio." Gregg was 1-5 as Browns coach against the Bengals from 1975-77, and he was 3-4 as Bengals coach against the Browns from '80-83.
- Here are Bengals head coaches, in chronological order, and their records in the "Battle of Ohio:" Paul Brown (5-7), Bill "Tiger" Johnson (3-2), Homer Rice (2-1), Forrest Gregg (3-4), Sam Wyche (10-6), Dave Shula (1-7), Bruce Coslet (2-1), Dick LeBeau (2-3), Marvin Lewis (22-10) and Zac Taylor (4-7).
- The Bengals are 11-8 against Browns head coaches directing their first game in the series. Browns head coaches who won their first game have been Blanton Collier (1970), Nick Skorich ('71), Sam Rutigliano ('78), Bill Belichick ('91), Rob Chudzinski (2013), Mike Pettine ('14), Freddie Kitchens ('19) and Kevin Stefanski ('20). On the losing end for Cleveland have been Forrest Gregg (1975), Marty Schottenheimer ('84), Bud Carson ('89), Jim Shofner ('90), Chris Palmer ('99), Butch Davis (2001), Romeo Crennel ('05), Eric Mangini ('09), Pat Shurmur ('11), Hue Jackson ('16) and Gregg Williams ('18).
- Bengals coaches show a 7-3 record the first time out against Cleveland.

The seven winners have been Bill Johnson (1976), Homer Rice ('78), Sam Wyche ('84), Dave Shula ('92), Bruce Coslet ('99), Dick LeBeau (2000) and Marvin Lewis ('03). Losing in the first try vs. Cleveland were Paul Brown (1970), Forrest Gregg ('80) and Zac Taylor (2019).

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear black jerseys, orange pants (black stripes) and black socks this week against Cleveland. It will be the second time Cincinnati features that combination, and the third time the team dons its orange pants. The pants were introduced to the rotation this season and made their debut in Week 1 against New England (combined with orange jerseys and orange socks), then appeared again in Week 5 vs. Baltimore (black jerseys, black socks).

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance was in Week 8 of this season against Philadelphia.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 22 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That is the second-longest such streak in team history, two shy of 24 straight home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 13 highest-attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest announced crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous record of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas (played in January '22).

Cincinnati's game against Philadelphia in Week 8 of this season had an

announced attendance figure of 67,239, which now stands as the second-largest in team history. The Bengals' 2023 Week 9 victory over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football (66,965) ranks as the third-largest, and the following week's game vs. Houston (66,526) is the fourth-largest. The fifth-largest figure in team history is 66,399 for the Bengals' Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore in January of 2023.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LV1. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman

from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Kevin Stefanski, reigning NFL Coach of the Year, is in his fifth season as Cleveland Browns head coach after being named the 18th fulltime head coach in franchise history on Jan. 13, 2020. Stefanski became the 16th coach to win the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year Award multiple times since its inception in 1957, winning the honors in 2023 and '20, and joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Forrest Gregg (1976) as the only Browns coaches to win the award.

In his four seasons as head coach, the Browns were 37-30 (.552), the highest-regular-season winning percentage for the team over a four-year stretch since 1986-89. Stefanski has led the team to two postseason appearances and two 11-win seasons. He joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Paul Brown (1951 and '53) as the only coaches in team history to record multiple seasons with at least 11 regular-season wins.

Before the Browns, Stefanski spent 14 seasons (2006-19) with the Minnesota Vikings. He gained his first league experience with the Vikings in 2006 as assistant to the head coach before transitioning to assistant QBs coach from 2009-13, then spending two seasons tutoring the TEs ('14-15), one season as running backs coach ('16), two seasons guiding the QBs ('17-18) and adding the role of interim offensive coordinator for the remaining three games of the '18 season. The Vikings promoted him to offensive coordinator in 2019.

Stefanski played defensive back at Pennsylvania (2000-04) and earned a bachelor's degree in communications. He has no pro playing experience.

Stefanski was born on April 8, 1982. A native of Philadelphia, Pa., he and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Will and Gabe, and one daughter, Juliet.

BENGALS NOTES

Bengals pick up 400th W: Cincinnati's 37-27 win at Tennessee in Week 15 marked the 400th regular-season victory in franchise history. The Bengals have won 240 games played at home and 160 played on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly Paul Brown Stadium).

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt is serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

Pick party in Nashville: The Bengals' four INTs in Week 15 at Tennessee marked the 31st time in team history that Cincinnati recorded at least four picks in a game. The last time was Oct. 28, 2018, when the Bengals also grabbed four in a home win over Tampa Bay.

The win over the Titans also was the eighth time in team history in which four or more different players had at least one INT. Cincinnati's first INT came late in the second quarter, when CB Cam Taylor-Britt picked off QB Will Levis on a third-down play in a tie game. The Bengals' offense capitalized with a go-ahead TD drive that lasted just 47 seconds.

On the next play from scrimmage following the TD, CB Mike Hilton tracked down a tipped pass and got his hand underneath for a second Bengals INT. It marked the first time Cincinnati recorded an INT on back-to-back defensive plays since Week 8 of the 2023 season, when LBs Germaine Pratt and Logan Wilson picked off San Francisco QB Brock Purdy on consecutive passing attempts.

The Bengals' third INT at Nissan Stadium occurred midway through the third period, when S Geno Stone stepped in front of a Levis pass and returned it 39 yards to the end zone for his first career pick-six. Adding that in with Taylor-Britt's 51-yard return for a TD in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, the Bengals have recorded multiple pick-sixes in a season for the first time since 2018, when they had three.

Finishing off the INT tally was rookie CB Josh Newton, who notched his first career pick early in the fourth quarter to end a Titans drive that reached the Bengals' 27-yard line.

Combining the four INTs with fumble recoveries by LB Maema Njongmeta and S Jordan Battle, Cincinnati finished the Titans game with six total takeaways, its most since Nov. 11, 2007 at Baltimore. That day, the Bengals had two picks, three defensive FRs and one recovery on a fumbled kickoff return.

Red zone streak ends at 42: Early in the second quarter of Week 15, Tennessee forced and recovered a fumble to end a Bengals drive that reached the Titans' nine-yard line. It marked the first time Cincinnati's offense entered the red zone and did not score either a TD or FG since the third quarter of Week 1 vs. New England.

In between those two possessions — which both ended in a turnover — the Bengals came away with points on 42 consecutive drives that reached their

opponent's 20-yard line. That is the longest streak by any NFL team this season, and marked the longest streak by the Bengals since at least 1980, when the Elias Sports Bureau began tracking drive data. The recent streak surpassed 41 consecutive red zone scores for Cincinnati from Week 14 of the 2005 season through Week 10 of 2006.

The Bengals drove to the red zone three times following the fumble against the Titans and scored two TDs along with a FG. With 45 total scores (32 TDs, 13 FGs) on 47 possessions this season, Cincinnati's 95.7 red zone scoring percentage leads the NFL. The Bengals also rank fifth leaguewide in red zone TD percentage (68.1).

Top-ranked passing offense: The Bengals this season are averaging an NFL-best 271.4 net passing yards per game. They have recorded 300 or more passing yards five times, including in three of the last five contests.

Cincinnati has finished a regular season with the league's best passing offense on one previous occasion, when it averaged 231.5 yards through the air in 1975. Bengals Ring of Honor QB Ken Anderson led the NFL that year in passing yards (3169) and passer rating (93.9).

The team record for passing yards per game is 265.0, set during the 2022 campaign. Cincinnati ranked fifth leaguewide in passing average that season, with QB Joe Burrow setting team records for attempts (606), completions (414) and TD passes (35; since surpassed by Burrow).

Joe joins Tom: QB Joe Burrow has passed for at least 250 yards and three TDs in each of his last six games. He is the second QB in NFL history to accomplish that feat, joining former New England QB Tom Brady, who also did it in six straight contests during his 2007 MVP season.

Burrow began his current streak by tying his career high with five TD passes and throwing for 251 yards in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas. He then recorded a season-high 428 passing yards with four TDs in Week 10 at Baltimore, and in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers amassed 356 yards and three more scoring tosses.

Burrow, who was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month for November, opened December with 309 passing yards and three TDs in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He is coming off a 271-yard, three-TD day in the Week 15 victory at Tennessee, with each of his scoring passes coming in the first half.

Burrow's 21 total TD passes since Week 9 are the most in a span of six games in Bengals history. It also is the most by any NFL QB in a six-game stretch since Brady also had 21 from Week 14 of the 2020 season through Week 2 of the '21 campaign, while playing for Tampa Bay.

Burrow is the fifth QB all-time to pass for at least three TDs in six consecutive games. The only players to previously do it are Brady (10 straight games in 2007), former Indianapolis QB Peyton Manning (eight in '04), former Colts QB Andrew Luck (eight in '18) and former Miami QB Dan Marino (seven from 1986-87).

With his recent surge, Burrow now has 24 career games with three or more TD passes. That is the third-most such games in NFL history within a player's first five career seasons, trailing only Marino (33) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (28).

Single-season TD record: QB Joe Burrow's third TD pass of the afternoon in Week 15 at Tennessee was his league-leading 36th scoring pass of the 2024 campaign. That sets a Bengals single-season record, surpassing his own previous mark of 35 in 2022.

Burrow also holds the third spot on Cincinnati's single-season TD list, as he passed for 34 during his 2021 sophomore campaign. He is one of five players in NFL history to record 30 or more TD passes in three of his first five seasons, alongside former Miami QB Dan Marino, Buffalo QB Josh Allen and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes.

Burrow's 36 TD passes this season include a career-high five passing scores in two games — Week 5 vs. Baltimore and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He was the first NFL QB to pass for five or more TDs multiple times in a season since Mahomes and former Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady each had two such games in 2021. Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson matched Burrow in Week 15 with his second five-TD game of this season.

Burrow's career TD marks: QB Joe Burrow finished Week 15 with 133 career TD passes (regular season), which surpassed former Indianapolis QB Andrew Luck (132) for the fifth-most by a player in his first five seasons in NFL history. Only former Miami QB Dan Marino (168), Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (151), former Indianapolis QB Peyton Manning (138) and

Buffalo QB Josh Allen (138) had more TD passes in their first five years.

Burrow threw his 125th career TD pass in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, when he completed a jump pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in the end zone. Playing in his 64th game, he became the third-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 125 TD passes, trailing only Mahomes (50 games) and Marino (54).

Burrow also logged his 100th TD pass earlier this season, reaching that milestone on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington. He tied for the seventh-fastest QB in league history to pass for 100 TDs (55 games).

Joe masters the deep ball: QB Joe Burrow's 40-yard TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 14 at Dallas marked his 28th career scoring pass of 40 or more yards — the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020. It also tied Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning for the most such TD passes in a player's first five seasons among all QBs whose career began after 1990.

Burrow additionally leads the NFL in TD passes of 50 or more yards (18) and 60 or more yards (14) since 2020. Of his league-high nine TD passes of 40-plus yards this season, seven have gone to WR Ja'Marr Chase. The duo connected on two long scoring passes in Week 10 at Baltimore — a 67-yarder early in the third quarter and a 70-yarder midway through the fourth. The 70-yard bomb tied for the third-longest TD pass of Burrow's career, behind an 82-yarder to Chase in Week 7 of the 2021 season and a 72-yarder to Chase in Week 17 of that year.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22 and two in '23.

Burrow on the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.08, he ranks second in NFL history in the category, narrowly trailing Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (68.15).

Burrow leads the NFL this season in passing attempts (527) and completions (361). He surpassed 2000 career attempts in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark were the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 throws behind former San Diego Chargers QB Brees (1444).

In Week 15 at Tennessee, Burrow went 26 of 37 (70.3 percent), marking his 23rd career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts. That is the most such games within a player's first five seasons in NFL history, with the next closest being Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21).

In Week 9 against Las Vegas, Burrow recorded his 1500th career completion in what was his 61st regular-season game. That marked the second-fewest games in NFL history to reach 1500 completions, trailing only L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (57).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; min. 14 att./game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414).

No. 9 hits 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone.

Burrow's current career total of 18,060 passing yards rank as the eighth-

most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least five fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Burrow leads the NFL with 3977 passing yards through 14 games this season. He has six career games with 400 or more passing yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for second-most leaguewide since 2020.

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is the only NFL QB with at least 1000 completions, 100 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.6; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking second in completion percentage (68.6), third in TD passes (120), fifth in passing yards (15,372), fifth in completions (1385) and sixth in yards per attempt (7.62).

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase leads the NFL this season in receptions (102), receiving yards (1413) and receiving TDs (15). Should he hold the lead in each of those categories through the final three weeks of the regular season, he would become just the fifth player since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger to claim the "Triple Crown." The last player to earn the elusive honor was L.A. Rams WR Cooper Kupp, who paced the league with 145 receptions, 1947 yards and 16 TDs in 2021.

Chase is the fifth player in NFL history to record at least 100 receptions, 1400 receiving yards and 15 receiving TDs in a season. The only players who previously accomplished that feat are Kupp (2021), former Minnesota WR Randy Moss ('03), former Indianapolis WR Marvin Harrison ('01), and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice (1995). Chase also is the first player ever with at least 80 catches, 1000 receiving yards and seven TDs in each of his first four career seasons.

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 86.95 receiving yards per game (59 regular-season games). That is the second-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only his former Louisiana State teammate and current Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (96.51).

Chase also has nine career games with at least 100 receptions, 100 receiving yards and one receiving TD. That is tied with former WR Chad Johnson for the most such stat lines in a career in Bengals history, and is one shy of former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (10) for the most in NFL history within a player's first four seasons.

Ja'Marr catches career high: WR Ja'Marr Chase had nine catches in the Week 15 win over Tennessee, boosting his receptions total this season to a career-high 102. He surpassed his previous high of 100 from last season.

Chase's 102 grabs are the second-most in a season in Bengals history, behind former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh's team record of 112 in 2007. Chase also has 370 receptions in his career, the sixth-most in NFL history within a player's first four seasons.

Should no one overtake Chase in the next three weeks, he would become the first Bengal in history to finish a season as the NFL's outright receptions leader. Houshmandzadeh is the only Cincinnati player to come close, tying New England WR Wes Welker for the league lead with 112 catches in the 2007 season.

Chase earned his fourth career AFC Offensive Player of the Week honor in Week 14, when he totaled a season-high 14 catches for 177 yards and two TDs in a win at Dallas. His 14 grabs were his second-most in a game, one shy of his Bengals single-game record 15 in Week 5 of last season at Arizona.

In Week 6 of this season at the N.Y. Giants, Chase recorded his 300th career reception in what was his 51st regular-season game. He is the fastest player in team history to reach that mark, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and is tied for the eighth-fastest in NFL history.

Uno finds the end zone: WR Ja'Marr Chase's career-high 15 receiving TDs this season are two shy of the Bengals single-season record (17), set by former WR Carl Pickens in 1995. He enters Week 16 four receiving TDs ahead of Washington WR Terry McLaurin (11), and has an opportunity to become the first player in Bengals history to lead the NFL in that category.

Chase began his career with 13 receiving TDs in 2021, which tied for the second-most by a rookie in NFL history, then followed up with nine in '22 and seven in '23. His 44 career receiving TDs are the fourth-most in a player's first four seasons in NFL history, behind only a trio of Pro Football Hall of Famers in Randy Moss (53), Jerry Rice (49) and Bob Hayes (45).

Chase also has 11 career games with multiple TD receptions, which are tied with Moss and former Green Bay WR Antonio Freeman for the third-most by a player in his first four seasons in the Super Bowl era. The only players with more such games in their first four years are Moss (13) and former New England TE Rob Gronkowski (12).

Of Chase's 15 TDs this season, eight came during a four-game stretch from Weeks 10-14. It marked the most receiving TDs in a span of four games in Bengals history, and the most by any NFL player since former Kansas City WR Tyreek Hill also had eight from Weeks 8-12 of the 2020 campaign.

Chase caught his 40th career receiving TD in Week 11 at the Chargers. Playing in his 56th regular-season game, he became the fastest player in Bengals history and eighth-fastest in NFL history to reach that milestone.

Chase reaches 5K: WR Ja'Marr Chase surpassed 5000 career receiving yards on his 40-yard TD late in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas. Playing in his 58th regular-season game, he tied former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas as the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone.

The only players who have eclipsed 5000 receiving yards in fewer games are former San Diego Chargers WR Lance Alworth (52 games), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (52), former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (54), and former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (56). Chase opened his career with a Bengals single-season record 1455 receiving yards in his 2021 rookie campaign, then followed up with 1046 in 12 games played in '22. His 1216 receiving yards in 2023 included five games with 100 or more, which tied for the second-most such games in a season in team history.

In Week 11 of this season at the L.A. Chargers, Chase became the sixth player in league history to record 1000 receiving yards in each of his first four years. He joined former Minnesota WR Randy Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green, Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans, Michael Thomas and Justin Jefferson.

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase has 12 career receiving TDs of 60 or more yards, five more than any other player since he entered the league in 2021 (regular season). It also is the most in a career in Bengals history, ahead of former WR Isaac Curtis (10), and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (13) and 40-plus yards (18) since 2021. His most recent 40-yarder was a catch-and-run to the end zone late in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas, which proved to be the game winner in a 27-20 result.

In Week 10 at Baltimore, Chase scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards, becoming the first NFL player this season with two scores of 65-plus yards in a game.

Earlier this season, Chase had a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yard score in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He became the first NFL player to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games since former Dallas WR Terrell Owens in 2007.

Tee time: WR Tee Higgins has been inactive for five games this season due to injuries (Weeks 1-2, Weeks 8-10), but in his nine games played he has proven to be one of the NFL's most productive pass catchers.

From Weeks 3-7, Higgins tied for seventh in the NFL in catches (29), tied for eighth in receiving TDs (three) and ranked 10th in receiving yards (341). He passed 4000 career receiving yards in the Week 7 win over Cleveland in just his 63rd game, becoming the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that mark.

Higgins returned to action in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers following a three-game hiatus and caught nine passes for a season-high 148 yards and a TD. His scoring catch was a 42-yarder on a fourth-down play late in the third quarter, marking his longest reception since Week 16 of last season. The Chargers game also was his 13th career 100-yard receiving performance.

Higgins followed up his showing in L.A. with five grabs for 69 yards and a TD in Week 13 against Pittsburgh. He finished the Steelers contest with 300 career receptions, tying former WR Tyler Boyd for the fourth-fastest player in team history to reach that total (65 games).

A native of Oak Ridge, Tenn., Higgins returned to his home state in Week 15 against the Titans and brought in five catches for 88 yards, including a 38-yard TD to give Cincinnati its first lead in the second quarter.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 20 leaguewide in receiving yards (19th; 4353) and receiving TDs (T-18th; 30). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Holiday Higgins: WR Tee Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 13 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (12), seventh in receiving yards (1408), 13th in yards per reception (15.6) and 16th in total receptions (90) during the calendar's final month.

Higgins' single-game career high both for receptions (12) and receiving yards (194) came on Dec. 26, 2021, in a home win over Baltimore. He had two TDs that day, the first of which was set up by a 52-yard Higgins catch earlier in the drive. Previously in that same month, he caught nine passes for 138 yards and a TD on Dec. 5, 2021 against the L.A. Chargers.

Higgins' top statistical performance of last season occurred in Week 16 at Pittsburgh on Dec. 23, when he hauled in five catches for 140 yards and a TD. His 28.0 yards per reception were the second-most in any game of his career, and included a career-long 80-yard TD in the third quarter.

Higgins' notable production late in the year also has carried beyond December, as he ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457). He has two 100-yard receiving performances in the postseason, with 103 in the AFC Championship at Kansas City following the 2021 season and 100 two weeks later in Super Bowl LVI.

Brown does it all: Second-year HB Chase Brown has 1150 yards from scrimmage this season, with a team-leading 832 rushing yards on 191 carries as well as 318 receiving yards on 47 receptions. He has recorded 100 or more scrimmage yards in each of the last four games, and five out of the last six.

Brown is the sixth running back in team history to go four or more straight games with at least 100 scrimmage yards. The last Cincinnati back to do so was HB BenJarvis Green-Ellis, who logged 100 yards from scrimmage in five consecutive contests from Weeks 11-15 of the 2012 season.

Since Week 9, Brown ranks second among all NFL running backs in scrimmage yards (730) and is tied for fifth in total TDs from scrimmage (six). He is one of four players leaguewide in that span with at least 400 rushing yards and 200 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs, New Orleans RB Alvin Kamara and Arizona RB James Conner.

Brown has 11 total TDs this season (seven rushing, four receiving), with four coming over the past three games. He had a rushing and receiving score in the same game for the first time in his career in Week 15 at Tennessee, as he caught a six-yard TD pass from QB Joe Burrow in the first quarter then later found the end zone on a five-yard run late in the fourth.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson's 12.5 sacks this season lead the NFL through 15 weeks of regular-season play. With this year's tally following up his career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023, he is the first Bengals player to record double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81.

Since signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, Hendrickson has 52.0 sacks, the third-most in the NFL in that span behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (58.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (57.0). He has 11 multi-sack games as a member of the Bengals, tied for the third-most leaguewide since 2021.

Hendrickson has led Cincinnati in sacks and been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his three full seasons with the team (2021-23). He logged 14.0 sacks in his debut Bengals season in 2021, which ranked fifth in the NFL, then followed up with eight more in '22. His career-high 17.5 sacks last year tied for second in the NFL and ranked second in Bengals single-season history, trailing only DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson recorded two sacks in back-to-back games earlier this season (Weeks 6-7), becoming the first Cincinnati player to do so since former DE Antwan Odom in Weeks 1-2 of the 2009 campaign.

The Florida Atlantic University product spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with New Orleans, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL.

Hendrickson's production for the Bengals was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

Hendrickson wrecks the Raiders: DE Trey Hendrickson earned his second career AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor in Week 9, when he recorded a career-high four sacks in the win over Las Vegas. It marked the second-most sacks in any NFL game this season behind Detroit DL Aidan Hutchinson's 4.5 in Week 2 against Tampa Bay.

Hendrickson became the fourth player in Bengals history to record four or more sacks in a game, and the first since former DE Antwan Odom had five on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay. Odom's total is tied for the team single-game record with former DE/DT Eddie Edwards, who notched five sacks on Dec. 21, 1980 against Cleveland.

Three of Hendrickson's four sacks against the Raiders came during the fourth quarter, including a strip-sack that led to a recovery by Bengals LB Logan Wilson. The play marked Hendrickson's 10th forced fumble since joining the Bengals during the 2021 offseason, which are tied for the second-most in the

NFL in that span.

Hendrickson's previous single-game high for sacks was 2.5, which he recorded twice — in Week 3 of the 2022 season at the N.Y. Jets, and in Week 5 of '23 at Arizona.

Pratt stuffs the stat sheet: LB Germaine Pratt's career-high 125 tackles this season lead the Bengals and rank 10th in the NFL. He surpassed his previous career high of 118 (2023) during the Week 15 win at Tennessee.

Pratt also has contributed to three takeaways this season, beginning with a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City that led to a Bengals FG drive. He scooped up another loose ball in overtime of Week 5 vs. Baltimore to set up Cincinnati's offense inside Ravens territory, then in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants grabbed his first INT of the year to end a drive that reached the Bengals' 14-yard line.

Pratt has recorded double-digit tackles in 14 games in his career, including three this season. He notched a career-high 16 stops in the Week 2 contest against the Chiefs, then had 13 in both Week 7 at Cleveland and Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh.

Since the start of the 2021 season, Pratt is one of three players leaguewide with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs, alongside Dallas CB Jourdan Lewis and Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr.

Rehkwow's record debut: Rookie P Ryan Rehkwow kicked off his career with a bang in Week 1 vs. New England, as he punted four times for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards (189 on three punts) on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkwow's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers).

Through 15 weeks of regular-season play, Rehkwow has amassed 45 punts for 2204 yards, with 22 downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line compared to five touchbacks. His 42.7 net yards per punt rank sixth in the NFL, while his 49.0 gross average ranks 10th.

In Weeks 5-7, Rehkwow became the first punter in Bengals history to have four punts downed inside the 20-yard line in three consecutive games. He totaled season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkwow signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

Pro Bowl three-peats: WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and

receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 which tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor this season in former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the ROH during a ceremony in the Week 3 game vs. Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards

(8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.4 years ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals roster is DE Sam Hubbard, who is in his seventh season with the team ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 31 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is OT Amarius Mims, who is 22 (born Oct. 14, 2002) ... Mims and OT Orlando Brown Jr. are tied for both the heaviest player on the roster at 350 pounds and the tallest player on the roster at 6-8 ... The lightest player on the roster is CB Mike Hilton, who is listed at 184 pounds ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (36; '24) and passer rating (108.3; '21). Through 14 games this season, Burrow leads the NFL in passing attempts (527), completions (361), passing yards (3977) and TD passes (36), while third fourth in passer rating (107.1). He has passed for at least 250 yards and three TDs in each of his last six games, joining former New England QB Tom Brady (2007) as the only QBs in NFL history to do so. In the Week 15 win at Tennessee, Burrow completed 70.3 percent of his passes (26 of 37) for 271 yards and three TDs, with each of his three passing scores coming in the first half. His third TD put him at 36 on the year, which surpassed his previous career high and team record of 35 in 2022. He also has moved closer to several Cincinnati career records this season, as he surpassed former QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most passing attempts and fifth-most passing yards in team history. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, he capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a quarterback in team history, a 47-yarder to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time in 2023, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Browning has seen action in two games this season, taking late snaps to close out Week 8 vs. Philadelphia and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. The Bengals added **Logan Woodside** to the active roster ahead of their most recent contest at Tennessee, after the veteran spent the first 13 games on Cincinnati's practice squad. A fifth-year player, Woodside has seen action in 13 regular-season games as a reserve QB for Tennessee (2020-21) and Atlanta ('22-23). He played in all three preseason games for the Bengals this past August, completing 70.5 percent of his passes for 379 yards and two TDs with two INTs. He is a native of Frankfort, Ky. (Lexington area), and had a record-setting career at the University of Toledo which included winning Mid-American Conference Offensive Player of the Year in 2017.

Running backs: Second-year HB **Chase Brown** recently reached 1000 yards from scrimmage for the first time in his career, as he leads the Bengals this season with 832 rushing yards on 191 attempts while also contributing 318 receiving yards on 47 catches. Each of his 11 total TDs on the year (seven rushing, four receiving) have come since Week 4, which are tied for

the third-most among all NFL running backs in that span. He is coming off a 113-yard performance in Week 15 at Tennessee, as he ran 25 times for 97 yards with a TD while catching three passes for 16 yards and a score. It marked his first career game with both a rushing and receiving TD, and also was his fourth consecutive game with 100 or more scrimmage yards. Brown enjoyed perhaps his best day as a pro in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, when he set career highs in rushing attempts (27), rushing yards (120) and scrimmage yards (137). Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, he is averaging 4.4 yards per carry and has a team-best 21 runs of 10-plus yards. He entered the league as Cincinnati's fifth-round draft pick in 2023 and had 335 total yards (179 rushing, 156 receiving) in 12 games played as a rookie last season. The Bengals acquired HB **Khalil Herbert** in a trade with Chicago on Nov. 5. A fourth-year pro, Herbert played in 48 regular-season games (12 starts) for the Bears and served as a versatile back. He logged 1791 rushing yards and 291 receiving yards in his Chicago tenure, while also returning 33 kickoffs with a 25.0-yard average. He took his first carry as a Bengal for 14 yards in Week 13 against Pittsburgh, and has had three more rushing attempts in the last two contests. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in the latter half of 2022 and all of '23. Offensively, he has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, and caught 15 passes for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average), and he played seven offensive snaps in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas as an extra pass protector.

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, leads the NFL this season in receptions (102), receiving yards (1413) and receiving TDs (15). He paced Cincinnati in all three of those categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons, and he is one of six players in league history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns. A constant downfield threat, Chase also has the NFL's most TD catches of 40 or more yards (18), 50 or more yards (13) and 60 or more yards (12) since he entered the league in 2021. His 102 receptions this season are a career high, and he recently became the fifth player in NFL history to post at least 100 catches, 1400 yards and 15 TDs in a single season. Chase surpassed 5000 career receiving yards in Week 14 at Dallas, which tied him with former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas for the fifth-fastest player in league history to reach that milestone (58 games). He has four 100-yard receiving games on the year, highlighted by a 264-yard, three-TD performance in Week 10 at Baltimore. Higgins ranks second on the team this season in catches (50), receiving yards (669) and receiving TDs (6). He has missed five games due to injuries, but has played in the past four contests and provides Burrow with a secondary threat on the outside. He made his return from a three-game absence in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers and posted a season-high 148 yards and a TD on nine receptions. Higgins had five catches for 88 yards and a TD in Week 15 at Tennessee. His

TD, a 38-yarder in the second quarter that gave Cincinnati its first lead of the day, was his 30th career receiving score. He notched his 300th career reception in Week 13 vs. the Steelers, tying for the fourth-fastest player in team history to reach that mark (65 games). Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, Higgins has earned a reputation for being able to high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then posted 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andrei Iosivas** has contributed key plays in all areas of the field early in his career, but his most notable work comes in the low red zone. Each of his nine career receiving TDs have come on passes from inside the opponent's 10-yard line. He has five scoring grabs this season, with the most recent being a three-yarder from Burrow late in the fourth quarter of Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. Fellow 2023 draftee **Charlie Jones** has primarily contributed as a punt and kickoff returner, but he also has eight career receptions for 69 yards as a reserve WR. He has missed the past six games due to a groin injury, after suiting up in each of the first eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals selected **Jermaine Burton** in the third round of the 2024 draft, adding a proven downfield threat at the college level. Burton has played in 12 games as a rookie this season and made his first career start in Week 10 at Baltimore. His first two career receptions both went for over 40 yards — a 47-yarder in Week 2 at Kansas City and a 41-yarder in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia. He also came through with a clutch grab to convert a third down in the road game against the Ravens. He spent the first two seasons of his collegiate career (2020-21) at the University of Georgia, then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two years. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while pacing the Southeastern Conference in yards per reception (20.5). Burton led the NFL this past preseason with 157 receiving yards. Cincinnati added depth to the receiver room when it acquired **Isaiah Williams** on waivers from Detroit on Nov. 8. A rookie out of the University of Illinois, Williams originally signed with the Lions as a college free agent in May and played in two games earlier this season, totaling two catches for six yards while returning one kickoff for 36 yards. He earned first-team All-Big 10 honors last season at Illinois, when he led the conference during the regular season with 82 receptions and ranked second with 1055 receiving yards. Williams has lined up for four offensive snaps and returned five punts for 40 yards in the past two games.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 75 career games (47 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of last season, and has started 20 of his last 23 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 94 career receptions for 701 yards and four TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample caught four passes for 14 yards in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, including a two-yard TD reception on a third-and-goal play in the second half. The Bengals brought in a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last year. He has played in all 14 games in his debut Bengals season (three starts), and leads the team's tight ends in catches (45), receiving yards (497) and receiving TDs (two). He recorded his 300th career reception in Week 14 at Dallas, and enjoyed perhaps his best day in stripes during the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, as he caught five passes for 100 yards and his first two TDs of the year. His second TD, a 47-yarder to help seal the win in the fourth quarter, was the second-longest reception of his career. That performance also marked his first 100-yard receiving game since Week 6 of the 2021 season. Gesicki played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted seven catches for 91 yards, then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, he challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. He topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** scored his first TD of the season in Week 10 at Baltimore, bringing in a three-yard pass to give Cincinnati the lead just before halftime. He tied his career high with six receptions against the Ravens, and his

42 yards were the fifth-most in a game in his career. He played in his 50th career game in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and had two catches for 14 yards, including an 11-yarder to convert a fourth down on the Bengals' first possession. Hudson began the 2023 campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster in November of last year and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in receptions (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played in 2023, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. Rookie **Cam Grandy** spent the first 10 weeks of the regular season on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster on Nov. 15. He made his NFL debut as a practice squad elevation in Week 10 at Baltimore and recorded his first career reception (no gain). He has started each of the last three games and played a combined 34 offensive snaps in those contests, while catching two passes for 12 yards in Week 15 at Tennessee. A product of Illinois State University, Grandy led all Missouri Valley Football Conference TEs with 63 catches for 612 yards and three TDs in 2023. He spent his first five collegiate seasons at Missouri Western State University. The Bengals selected **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round of this year's draft. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He has been inactive for each of the first 14 regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 50 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 3293 of a possible 3312 offensive snaps in that time (99.4 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. This season's Man of the Year nominee for the Bengals is OT **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who in addition to serving as the team's left tackle has partnered with Breakthrough T1D, the leading global type 1 diabetes research organization. Brown was perhaps the biggest free agent splash in recent years for Cincinnati, as he signed with the Bengals in 2023 following four straight Pro Bowl selections from '19-22. He spent his first three pro seasons (2018-20) with Baltimore, then played two years ('21-22) with Kansas City. He started 25 straight games to begin his Bengals career, but has missed five contests this season (Weeks 9-11, Weeks 14-15) due to knee and fibula injuries. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. G/OT **Cody Ford** started five straight games from Weeks 9-14 (four at LOT, one at LG), but missed the Week 15 contest at Tennessee due to an illness. A sixth-year pro out of the University of Oklahoma, he has played in 79 career games with 39 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, nine at LG, two as a third TE and four at LOT. Ford signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and played in all 17 games last season, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He was inactive for Cincinnati's first two regular-season games due to a pectoral injury sustained during preseason, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 and has started each of the past 11 contests. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. **Cordell Volson** has started 49 out of 50 possible games (including postseason) at LG to begin his Bengals career. A 2022 fourth-

round pick of Cincinnati, he has lined up for every offensive snap in games that he started. He has settled in at LG as a pro, after playing guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals' final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft was seventh-round C **Matt Lee**. Lee played in 51 games during his college career, spending his first four years (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He earned second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16). Lee has contributed primarily on special teams through 14 games this season, but he also has lined up for 19 offensive snaps over the past eight contests. OT **Devin Cochran** made his first career start in Week 15 at Tennessee, lining up at LOT for all 69 offensive snaps. He has played in six games this season, contributing primarily on special teams. He spent the first 12 weeks on Cincinnati's practice squad, then was signed to the active roster in late November. Cochran originally joined the Bengals' practice squad in 2022 and missed the entire '23 campaign due to a knee injury. He started all 44 games of his college career at LOT, playing four years at Vanderbilt University before spending his final season at Georgia Tech. OT **Andrew Stueber** has appeared in six games for the Bengals this season after being signed off Atlanta's practice squad on Oct. 8. A seventh-round pick out of New England in 2022, he spent his rookie season on the Reserve/Non-Football injury list, then was on the Patriots' practice squad in '23. He played in 34 games with 22 starts (20 at ROT, two at RG) during a five-year career (2017-21) at the University of Michigan.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who currently leads the NFL with 12.5 sacks through 15 weeks of regular-season play. Hendrickson posted a career-high four sacks in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, which tied for the third-most in a game in team history and was the most since former DE Antwan Odom in 2009. He forced his 14th career fumble, and second of the season, in Week 15 at Tennessee, stripping QB Will Levis on a designed quarterback run in the second quarter. A 2021 free agency acquisition of the Bengals, Hendrickson led the team in sacks and earned a Pro Bowl nod in each of his three full seasons in Cincinnati. He posted a career-high 17.5 sacks last year, which tied for second in the league and went in as the second-most in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 65.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — his final season with New Orleans — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (73.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (69.0). On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has 38.5 career sacks, the fourth-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons. Hubbard has 41 total tackles through 14 games this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, and then a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone. He grabbed his first career INT and logged his second sack of the season in Week 7 at Cleveland. Hubbard played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 10 at Baltimore. In Week 15 at Tennessee, he entered the game in an offensive goal line package and caught a two-yard TD pass from Burrow to tie the score in the second quarter. It was his first career reception, and the first receiving TD by a defensive player in Bengals history. Hubbard sustained a knee injury on the play and did not return to action. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 51 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 16 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 13 passes at the line of scrimmage. He sustained a hamstring injury in Week 2 at Kansas City that caused him to miss the next two games, but he returned to action in Week 5 and has started each of the past 10 contests. Hill posted a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and he also deflected a pass by QB Daniel Jones that led to LB Germaine Pratt's INT in the first quarter. He has tallied a sack in each of the Bengals' last three games, most recently dropping Titans QB Will Levis for a seven-yard loss in Week 15 at Tennessee. Ninth-year veteran DT **Sheldon Rankins** has played in seven games (all starts) in his first Bengals season, after joining the team as an unrestricted free agent during the spring. He has been inactive for the past four

contests with an illness and missed Weeks 3-5 due to a hamstring injury, but when healthy has contributed 18 tackles with one sack. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, Rankins spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 30.5 career sacks and 44 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in any season of his career. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. He has 32 tackles across 14 games this season and recorded a sack in three straight games from Weeks 11-14. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, Ossai has played in 44 career regular-season games and totaled 59 tackles with 7.5 sacks. He was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins recorded his first NFL sack in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, and set a season-high with six tackles in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He missed the first two games of the season due to a thumb injury, then made his pro debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. He made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' game-opening drive. Jenkins was a team captain at Michigan and earned second-team All-America honors last season, while helping lead the Wolverines to a national championship. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has recorded 20 tackles and a PD in 10 games played this season, after spending the first four weeks on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last year, tallying 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons (2020-22) at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinley Jackson**, who also missed the first four contests of this season with a knee injury, made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He has seen action on 184 defensive snaps over the past 10 games and has nine tackles. Jackson made his first career start in Week 14 at Dallas and matched his season high with three tackles. He then recorded his first career FF in Week 15 at Tennessee, knocking the ball loose from RB Tony Pollard in the third quarter. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2024 out of Texas A&M, Jackson totaled 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks in 40 career games as an Aggie, and served as a captain in two seasons. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He has played in 10 games this season, recording 13 tackles on 213 defensive snaps played. Tufele He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has seen action in six games as a rookie, with a season-high 13 defensive snaps played in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention.

Linebackers: Sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt** has set a career high in tackles in each season from 2021-23, with his team-leading 125 stops this year currently ranking 10th in the NFL. He has a knack for creating game-changing takeaways, and has contributed to three of them this year with a pair of fumble recoveries and an INT. Since the start of the 2021 season, he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Dallas CB Jourdan Lewis and Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 85 of 93 career regular-season games played, with a current streak of 75 consecutive starts (including postseason). Pratt was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career. Also wearing a captain's patch for the first time this year is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 68 games with eight starts for the Bengals. His primary role historically has been on special teams, but he has started each of the last three contests at LB with Logan Wilson placed on Reserve/Injured. Since assuming the starting LB role, Davis-Gaither has 34 tackles in his last three games and tied his career high with 13 tackles in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He has a career-high 53 tackles on the year, with two TFLs, and has added three PDs and an INT through 14 games. Davis-Gaither picked off Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City for his second career regular-season INT (first since 2020). He also has lined up for 294 special teams snaps and has five ST tackles. Among the most notable stories on Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27). He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final

two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for a team-high 314 special teams snaps through 14 regular-season games, and recovered a blocked punt in Week 14 at Dallas that put Cincinnati in position to score the game-winning TD. He made his first career start in Week 15 at Tennessee, and recovered a fumble that ended a Titans drive at the Cincinnati 33-yard line, marking his second straight game with a key recovery. Njongmeta also has three defensive tackles, with two solo stops coming in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. The most recent addition to the defense is LB **Shaka Heyward**, who was signed off the team's practice squad on Dec. 2. Heyward spent all of his 2023 rookie campaign and the first 13 weeks of this season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He was elevated to the active roster for the team's Week 11 game at the L.A. Chargers and lined up for 24 special teams snaps. Heyward signed with the Bengals as a college free agent during the 2023 offseason, following a five-year career ('18-22) at Duke University.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, established himself as one of the NFL's top slot corners over his first three seasons in stripes. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzing with 11.5 career sacks. He has 56 total tackles in 13 games played this season (inactive for Week 5 due to knee injury). Hilton secured his first INT of the season in Week 15 at Tennessee when he came down with a tipped pass at the Titans' 38-yard line late in the first half. He had seven tackles in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, which included a career-high-tying three TFLs, and broke up a pass on a crucial fourth-down play in the second half in the Week 6 win at the N.Y. Giants. In 2023, Hilton recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 35 of 36 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. His 14 PDs this season lead the team and are tied for third in the NFL, and he also has contributed 64 tackles and three INTs. He most recently picked off QB Will Levis in Week 15 at Tennessee just before the two-minute warning of the first half and returned it 28 yards to set up a Bengals TD three plays later. His other two INTs include a highlight-reel one-handed grab on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City, and a 51-yard pick-six to give Cincinnati a first-quarter lead in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Taylor-Britt missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. The Bengals selected **Josh Newton** in the fifth round of this year's draft, and the rookie earned a spot on the 53-man roster after impressing coaches during training camp and preseason. Newton recorded his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee, picking off QB Mason Rudolph early in the fourth quarter. He has played in all 14 regular-season games, with starts in each of the past three contests. In addition to his 16 defensive tackles and six PDs, Newton has lined up for 182 special teams snaps and recorded two ST tackles. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to TCU from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups. Second-year pro **DJ Ivey** made his season debut in Week 7 at Cleveland, after spending the first six games on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury. He sustained the injury in Week 15 of the 2023 campaign against Minnesota, ending a promising rookie campaign in which he carved out a role as a special teams contributor and reserve defensive back. A 2023 seventh-round pick out of the University of Miami (Fla.), Ivey earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and played in eight games last season. The most recent addition to the secondary is fourth-year pro **Marco Wilson**, who the Bengals acquired on waivers from New England on Nov. 19. He made his Bengals debut in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh and played one defensive snap, but has seen an increased role over the past two contests with a combined 17 defensive snaps and 18 special teams snaps. A fourth-round draft pick of Arizona in 2021, Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons ('21-23) with the Cardinals before being waived and acquired by the Patriots last December. He suited up for 10 games with New England earlier this season, logging 15 tackles and a PD. In 57 total regular-season games (37 starts), he has recorded 175 tackles, 19 PDs, three INTs and three FFs.

Safeties: Among the notable additions in Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who recorded an AFC-leading seven INTs in his final season with Baltimore in '23. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 started 11 contests. Stone has already surpassed that total with 14 starts in his debut Bengals season, and his 75 tackles rank third on the team. He grabbed his third INT of the season when he picked off QB Will Levis and returned it 39 yards to the end zone for his

first career pick-six in Week 15 at Tennessee. He recorded his first INT as a Bengal in Week 7 at Cleveland, then had his second pick in Week 14 at Dallas to end a Cowboys drive in the red zone. Stone logged a season-best nine stops in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, and contributed to a game-altering play early in the fourth quarter when he recovered a fumble deep in Bengals territory to set up a game-tying TD drive. Second-year pro **Jordan Battle** has started each of the past three games, after beginning the season as a reserve safety. Of his 40 tackles this year, 29 have come over the past five games, including a season-best 10 stops in Week 15 at Tennessee. He started seven contests as a rookie last season and ranked fifth on the team with 69 tackles. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 49 tackles through 14 games this season, and grabbed his first INT of the season (eighth of career) against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina. Third-year pro **Tylen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading 10 special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. He finished last season with a team-leading eight special teams stops, despite missing the final 10 contests. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, Anderson sat out his entire rookie year due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Dajahn Anthony** made the Bengals' roster out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 11 defensive snaps and 130 special teams snaps in 10 games played this season (inactive for three games as coach's decision). In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

Special teams: The Bengals added **K Cade York** to their practice squad on Dec. 4, after Evan McPherson was placed on the Reserve/Injured list. York made Bengals debut in Week 14 at Dallas and converted both of his FG attempts along with three PATs. He spent the offseason and part of training camp with Cleveland, before being traded to Washington prior to the start of the regular season. He kicked in the Commanders' season opener, then was waived the following day and was not with a team prior to joining Cincinnati's practice squad. A 2022 fourth-round draft pick of Cleveland, he has appeared in 20 career regular-season games and converted 27 of 37 FG attempts along with 44 of 47 PATs. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 404 attempts in 49 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2 of that season. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through 14 games ranks sixth in the NFL in net punting average (42.7 net yards per punt; minimum 30 punts) and 10th in gross average (49.0). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. He had four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard lines in three consecutive games (Weeks 5-7), becoming the first Bengals punter ever to do so in three straight contests. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for Week 7, after returning the opening kickoff at Cleveland 100 yards for a TD. It marked the second time in team history that the Bengals scored a TD on the game's opening kick, and it was the longest KOR in the NFL this season. Jones also had an 81-yard punt return for a TD in his 2023 rookie season. He has returned 14 punts this season for 99 yards, including a season-long 23-yarder against the Browns. Rookie WR **Jermaine Burton** and fourth-year HB **Khalil Herbert** have lined up to return kicks with Jones out of the lineup due to a groin injury. Burton has logged eight returns for 231 yards (28.9), including five for 146 in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Four of his KORs have gone for 30 or more yards. Herbert has returned three kicks since being acquired via trade in November, including two for 67 yards in Week 14 at Dallas. WR **Isaiah Williams** has taken over punt return duties over the past three games, logging five returns for 40 yards.

New England Patriots 16, Cincinnati Bengals 10 Sunday, Sept. 8, 2024 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

The Bengals and Chiefs played to a one-score result for a sixth straight time since January 2022, as Kansas City K Harrison Butker kicked a 51-yard game-winning FG as time expired. The game featured six lead changes. Cincinnati held a two-point lead and forced the Chiefs into a fourth-and-16 with under a minute remaining, but a QB Patrick Mahomes downfield heave resulted in a defensive pass interference penalty to set up the kick. The Bengals' defense had three takeaways, including a pair of INTs, and allowed just 137 net passing yards. Offensively, Cincinnati scored points on five of its first six true possessions. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 23 of 36 passes for 258 yards and a 103.7 passer rating, as well as two TD passes to WR Andrei Iosivas. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Kansas City improved to 2-0.

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. The Bengals scored TDs to close out the first half and open the second half on the way to earning their first win of the season at Carolina. Cincinnati opened the scoring with the first of two rushing TDs by HB Chase Brown, who also finished with 80 rushing yards. In the second quarter, WR Ja'Marr Chase caught a pass from QB Joe Burrow near midfield and fought off several Panthers defenders before taking it down the sideline for a 63-yard TD.
