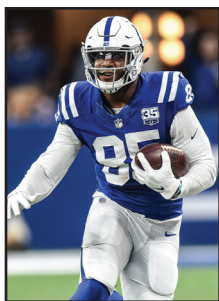

### COLTS CLOSE OUT 2018 PRESEASON IN CINCINNATI

Last week, Indianapolis hosted the San Francisco 49ers and won, 23-17.

The 49ers scored the first points of the game on an early field goal before quarterback **Andrew Luck** connected with tight end **Eric Ebron** on a 15-yard touchdown pass.

San Francisco converted a field goal in the second and third quarters en route to a 9-7 lead.

Running back **Christine Michael** scored on a one-yard run and kicker **Michael Badgley** converted two fourth quarter field goals to take a 20-9 advantage.

The 49ers scored a rushing touchdown to chip away at the deficit, but **Badgley** connected on a 40-yard field goal as Indianapolis earned their second preseason victory.

## 35TH SEASON

The 2018 season marks the Colts' 35th in the city of Indianapolis. This year the team will honor the teams of the past.



Since relocating to Indianapolis, the Colts have won 11 division titles, including five consecutive AFC South crowns from 2003-07.

The Colts are one of only two NFL teams to have 12-plus victories in seven consecutive seasons (2003-09). Indianapolis won 115 regular season games from 2000-09, the highest decade total in NFL history, and the team's 23 consecutive regular season wins (2008-09) set another NFL record. The club won Super Bowl XLI following a 12-4 record in the 2006 regular season, and the Colts reached Super Bowl XLIV after winning the AFC title during the 2009 season.

## 2018 REGULAR SEASON OPPONENTS

Along with their normal slate of home and road contests against AFC South opponents - Houston, Jacksonville and Tennessee - the Colts will compete against the AFC East and NFC East Divisions in 2018. Indianapolis will face five 2017 playoff teams.

## IMPORTANT NFL DATES

### August 30

Final Preseason Games

### September 1

Prior to 4:00 p.m., New York time, clubs must reduce rosters to a maximum of 53 players on the Active/Inactive List.

### September 1

Simultaneously with the cut-down to 53, clubs that have players in the categories of Active/Physically Unable to Perform or Active/Non-Football Injury or Illness must select one of the following options: place player on Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform or Reserve/Non-Football Injury or Illness, whichever is applicable; request waivers; terminate contract; trade contract; or continue to count the player on the Active List.

### September 2

Claiming period for players placed on waivers at the final roster reduction will expire at 12:00 noon, New York time.

### September 2

Upon receipt of the Personnel Notice at approximately 1:00 p.m., New York time, clubs may establish a Practice Squad of 10 players (clubs participating in the International Player Development Program may sign one additional international player to a Practice Player Contract.) No club, including the player's prior club, will be permitted to sign a player to a Practice Player Contract until all clubs have received simultaneous notification via the above Personnel Notice that such player's prior NFL player contract has been terminated via the waiver system.

### September 3-8

In accordance with the 2018 Personnel (Injury) Report Policy, each club is required to file a Practice Report with the NFL Communications Department by 4:00 p.m., New York time, (or as soon as possible after the completion of practice) every Wednesday, Thursday and Friday for a regular season Sunday game; Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday for a Thursday game; Thursday, Friday, and Saturday for a Monday game; and Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday for a Saturday game.

Each club must also file a weekly regular season Game Status Report with the NFL communications department by 4:00 p.m., New York time (or as soon as possible after the completion of practice) on Wednesday for a Thursday game, Friday for a Sunday game, Saturday for a Monday game, and Thursday for a Saturday game. An update must be reported if there is any change in a player's condition after the initial Game Status Report is filed.

### September 6

At 12:00 a.m., New York time, the Top 51 Rule expires for all NFL clubs.

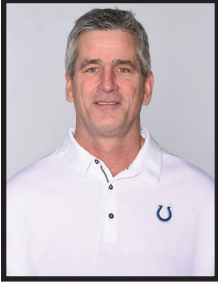

## COLTS HEAD COACH FRANK REICH

**PRO CAREER:** Frank Reich was named head coach of the Indianapolis Colts on Feb. 11, 2018. He has 26 years of NFL experience as both a player (1985-98) and coach (2006-2017). Reich spent the last two seasons as offensive

coordinator of the Philadelphia Eagles and was instrumental in the team's Super Bowl LII championship following the 2017 season. In Philadelphia, he assisted with the development of quarterback Carson Wentz, whom the team selected in the first round (second overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft. The Eagles started the 2017 season in dominant fashion under the direction of Reich and his offense. Wentz started the first 13 games of the season, led the team to an 11-2 record and was in the running for NFL MVP before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week 14. Backup quarterback Nick Foles was thrust into the spotlight and guided the Eagles to a 2-1 record and a first round bye in the playoffs. In postseason play, Foles led Philadelphia to underdog wins over the Atlanta Falcons in the NFC Divisional round, Minnesota Vikings in the NFC Championship and the New England Patriots in Super Bowl LII for the team's first-ever Super Bowl championship. He was named Super Bowl MVP after completing 28-of-43 passes for 373 yards with three touchdowns and one interception for a 106.1 passer rating. Foles also caught a one-yard touchdown pass late in the second quarter and became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw for and catch a touchdown in a Super Bowl. In 2016, Reich helped then rookie Wentz make the transition from FCS-level North Dakota State to the pros. Wentz started all 16 games and completed 379-of-607 passes for 3,782 yards with 16 touchdowns and 14 interceptions for a 79.3 passer rating. He set a franchise and NFL rookie record for completions. Prior to Philadelphia, Reich served on the coaching staffs of the San Diego Chargers (2013-15) and Arizona Cardinals (2012). He spent the first six seasons (2006-2011) of his coaching career with the Colts. Reich enjoyed a 14-year playing career with the Buffalo Bills, Carolina Panthers, New York Jets and Detroit Lions after being selected by the Bills in the third round (57th overall) of the 1985 NFL Draft. Including postseason play, he played in 129 career games (22 starts) and completed 575-of-1,036 passes for 6,858 yards and 47 touchdowns. Reich is most notably known for engineering the greatest comeback in NFL history in the 1992 Wild Card Round playoff game against the Houston Oilers. Making his first postseason start in relief of injured quarterback Jim Kelly, Reich led the Bills to a 41-38 overtime victory despite being down by 32 points early in the third quarter. He orchestrated five second half touchdown drives, four of which were capped by touchdown passes, and led a game-winning field goal drive in overtime.

**BACKGROUND:** Reich was a quarterback at the University of Maryland from 1981-84 where he backed up Boomer Esiason before earning the starting job as a senior in 1984. As a senior, Reich rallied the Terrapins from a 31-0 deficit to defeat the Miami Hurricanes, 42-40. At the time, Maryland's victory over Miami marked the greatest comeback win in college football history and is now only second to Michigan State's 2006 35-point comeback over Northwestern.

## RECORD YEAR FOR WENTZ IN 2017

Philadelphia quarterback **Carson Wentz's** 379 completions, 607 passing attempts and 33 touchdowns compiled in a little over 13 games all rank as the highest totals in a single season by any Eagles quarterback in team history. His passer rating of 101.9 ranks as the third highest in a single season in team history. Additionally, Wentz's interception rating of 1.59 is the third lowest in Eagles history.

## OFFENSIVE SHOOTOUT IN SUPER BOWL

The combined 1,151 total yards amassed between the Eagles and Patriots in Super Bowl LII are the most total yards gained in a single game in NFL history. The 538 net yards registered by Philadelphia are also the most yards gained in a playoff game by the Eagles in team history.

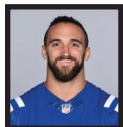
### RB-CHRISTINE MICHAEL

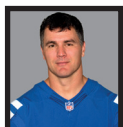
### LS-LUKE RHODES

He has played in 17 career games (four starts) and has totaled 15 receptions for 297 yards and one touchdown in addition to six special teams tackles. Swoope spent the 2017 season on the team's Injured Reserve List. In 2016, he saw action in all 16 games (four starts) for the first time in his career and caught 15 passes for 297 yards and one touchdown. Swoope also registered six special teams stops. He spent time on the Colts active roster and practice squad in 2015. As a rookie in 2014, Swoope spent the season on the team's practice squad.



### K-ADAM VINATIERI

Vinatieri was originally signed by the Colts as an unrestricted free agent on March 22, 2006. In Indianapolis, Vinatieri has converted 296-of-342 field goal attempts (86.5 percent) and 441-of-449 PATs for 1,329 points. He owns the Colts record for points scored, extra points made and field goals made. Vinatieri was a member of the Colts Super Bowl XLI championship team. He has played in the second-most playoff games (30) in league history and holds multiple career NFL postseason records including points scored (234) and field goals made (56).

Vinatieri, a three-time Pro Bowl selection, has played in 337 career games over his 22-year NFL career. He has connected on 559-of-663 field goal attempts (84.3 percent), made 808-of-823 PATs and scored one two-point conversion for 2,487 career points. Vinatieri ranks second in league history in field goals made and total points. Entering the 2018 season, Vinatieri is 58 points shy of passing Morten Andersen for the most points in NFL history and needs seven field goals to pass Andersen for the most in league history. He ranks fifth all-time in career regular season games played. Vinatieri registered 1,158 points during his 10 seasons (1996-2005) with the New England Patriots and is the only player in league history to record 1,000 points with two franchises. His 84.3 career field goal percentage ranks 13th all-time. Vinatieri has 27 game-winning field goals in the final minute of the fourth quarter or overtime. He has earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors 17 times (NFL record), NFL Player of the Week honors one time (playoffs) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of Month five times (tied for NFL record). From 2015-16, Vinatieri set a new NFL record and franchise record for the most consecutive field goals converted with 44.

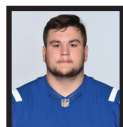
In 2017, Vinatieri connected on 29-of-34 field goals (85.3 percent) and 22-of-24 PATs for 109 points. It marked his 20th 100-point season of his career, which extended his NFL record. Vinatieri joined the Colts after playing 10 seasons (1996-2005) with the New England Patriots. He is the only kicker in NFL history to record successful field goals in four Super Bowls (XXXVI, XXXVIII, XXXIX and XLI).



### G-JEREMY VUJNOVICH

Vujnovich originally signed with the Colts as a free agent on May 12, 2016. He has played in 18 career games (16 starts) in his time with Indianapolis (2016-17) and the Green Bay Packers (2015). In 2017, Vujnovich started all 16 games at left guard for the first time in his career. He blocked for a Colts offense that averaged 284.6 yards per game. Vujnovich spent time on the Colts' active roster and practice squad in 2016 and appeared in two games. As a rookie in 2015, he spent the season on the Packers practice squad.

**QUENTON NELSON**

Nelson started 36-of-37 career games at Notre Dame at left guard. In 2,474 career snaps, he surrendered just 3.0 sacks, none in the last two years, and four quarterback hits, two in the last two years. Nelson was named a unanimous All-America selection in 2017 and was a finalist for the Outland Trophy, an award given to the nation's top interior lineman. He earned Second Team All-America honors from the Associated Press and *Sports Illustrated* in 2016.

In 2017, Nelson started all 13 games and spearheaded an offensive line that won the Joe Moore Award as college football's most outstanding offensive line. He helped pave the way for the seventh-best FBS rushing attack in rushing offense (269.3 rush yards/game). Nelson surrendered zero sacks, one QB hit and three QB hurries in 883 offensive snaps.



**DARIUS LEONARD**

Leonard started all 43 games he played in at South Carolina State and led the team in tackles three times (2014, 2016-17). He set the all-time school record with 394 tackles (274 solo) while adding 53.0 tackles for loss, 21.5 sacks, six interceptions, eight forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and two blocked kicks. Leonard earned First Team All-Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference honors in three consecutive seasons (2015-17). He was named the MEAC Defensive Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons (2016-17).

In 2017, Leonard started all 10 games and tallied 113 tackles (73 solo), 11.5 tackles for loss, 8.0 sacks, two interceptions and one forced fumble.

Smith saw action in 53 career games at Auburn and started 41 consecutive games dating back to his freshman season. He earned All-America honors in each of his final two seasons and won the 2017 SEC Jacobs Blocking Trophy, given to the conference's best blocker.

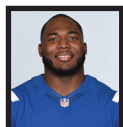

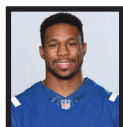

He registered 4,638 all-purpose yards which is the third most in Wolfpack history.

In 2017, Hines started 12-of-13 games and compiled 197 carries for 1,112 yards and 12 touchdowns, 26 receptions for 152 yards, 21 kickoff returns for 469 yards and 11 punt returns for 135 yards and one touchdown. He was a First Team All-ACC selection as a running back and was named a Third Team All-ACC choice as a specialist. Hines earned Second Team All-America recognition from the American Football Coaches Association as an all-purpose player and was one of four finalists for the Paul Hornung Award, given to the nation's most versatile player.

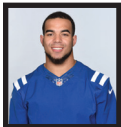

Fountain became the 19th player from UNI selected in the NFL Draft. He became the first player from the Missouri Valley Football Conference to earn MVP honors at the East-West Shrine Game. Fountain was named Offensive MVP after catching three passes for 61 yards and adding 40 yards on punt returns in the contest.

In 2017, Fountain started all 13 games and collected 66 receptions for 943 yards and 12 touchdowns. He earned First Team All-MVFC honors and was an All-America selection after leading the team in receptions, receiving yards and touchdowns. Fountain's 12 receiving touchdowns ranked fifth in single-season school history while his 66 receptions ranked ninth.

In 2017, Wilkins started all 12 games and finished with 155 carries for 1,011 yards and nine touchdowns to become just the fifth Rebel to surpass the 1,000-yard mark. His 6.5 yards per carry average ranked second in the SEC and 13th nationally. Wilkins also caught 26 passes for 241 yards and one touchdown.

In 2017, Cain was named a Third Team All-ACC selection after starting 13-of-14 games and collecting 58 receptions for 734 yards and six touchdowns. He led the team in receiving yards and receiving touchdowns.

Adams played in 48 games [26 starts] at Houston from 2014-17 and totaled 259 tackles [161 solo], 21.0 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, three passes defended, five forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. He was named to the American All-Academic Team in 2016 and 2017.

In 2017, Adams played in 11 games [nine starts] and tallied 88 tackles [54 solo], 6.5 tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, two passes defended, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery.

Franklin played in all 48 games over his four seasons at Syracuse and started the final 39 contests of his career. Franklin was just the second three-time captain in program history and was a two-time All-ACC selection. His 31.5 tackles for loss rank tied for ninth in school history.

In 2017, Franklin started all 12 games at middle linebacker and earned Honorable Mention All-ACC recognition after compiling 85 tackles [41 solo], 5.5 tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, two passes defended and one forced fumble.



## MILESTONES REACHED IN 2017

## COLTS DEFENSE

- In Week 2 vs. Arizona, the game marked the first time the Colts defense recorded 4.0 sacks and one interception dating back to a Week 15 win at Minnesota in 2016 (5.0 sacks and one interception).
- In Week 6 at Tennessee, outside linebacker John Simon registered his first career interception which he returned for a 26-yard touchdown. Simon's touchdown was the first defensive score for the team since Robert Mathis returned a fumble for a touchdown at Tennessee on Oct. 23, 2016. It was the first pick-six for the team since Jerrell Freeman's 23-yard return on Jan. 3, 2016 against the Titans.
- In Week 8 at Cincinnati, Indianapolis' defense held the Bengals to 53 rushing yards (2.8 average per carry), which was a season low for an opponent.
- In Week 9 at Houston, the Texans finished the contest with 194 net passing yards, which was the lowest total for a Colts opponent this season and the lowest dating back to Dec. 11, 2016 vs. Houston (131).
- In Week 12 vs. Tennessee, the Colts defense held the Titans to nine net rushing yards in the first half of play. It was the lowest total for Tennessee this season and the lowest first half total for a Colts opponent dating back to Oct. 7, 2007, when they held Tampa Bay to six net rushing yards in the first half. Indianapolis recorded two interceptions in the second quarter marking the first time the team intercepted two passes in the first half of play dating back to Nov. 16, 2014 against New England.

## COLTS OFFENSE

- In Week 2 vs. Arizona, running back Frank Gore gave Indianapolis a 7-0 lead with his five-yard touchdown on the team's opening offensive possession of the game. It was the first touchdown for the Colts on the first drive of a game dating back to Week 13 of the 2016 season at the New York Jets.
- In Week 3 vs. Cleveland, the Colts scored touchdowns in four consecutive drives in the first half. The last time Indianapolis scored touchdowns on four consecutive possessions came on December 9, 2007, in a 44-20 victory against Baltimore. The Colts scored 28 points in the first half, the highest total for the team in the first half of a single game dating back to September 21, 2014, in a win against Jacksonville (30 points). Dating back to Dec. 18, 2016, the Colts scored a rushing touchdown in six consecutive games. The streak is the longest for the team dating back to Dec. 30, 2012 - Oct. 6, 2013.
- In Week 4 at Seattle, running back Robert Turbin tallied a rushing touchdown in the second quarter. It marked the seventh-consecutive game that the Colts had recorded a rushing score, which was the longest streak for the team dating back to Dec. 31, 2006 - Nov. 4, 2007 (nine straight games).
- In Week 5 vs. San Francisco, following Marlon Mack's third quarter rushing touchdown, Indianapolis increased its streak of consecutive games with at least one rushing touchdown to eight. It is the longest streak for the team dating back to Dec. 31, 2006 - Nov. 4, 2007 (nine straight games).
- In Week 14 at Buffalo, the Colts opened the game with 17 consecutive rushes and finished with 46 rushing attempts for 163 yards. The team's 46 attempts are the most in a game dating back to Dec. 7, 1997 against the New York Jets and the 163 yards were the most for Indianapolis last season.

## COLTS SPECIAL TEAMS

- In Week 8 at Cincinnati, defensive tackle Henry Anderson blocked a Bengals 34-yard field goal in the first quarter to keep Cincinnati's lead to 3-0. It was Indianapolis' first field goal block dating back to Nov. 24, 2013 (Sergio Brown at Arizona).
- In Week 10 vs. Pittsburgh, defensive end Margus Hunt blocked a Steelers extra point in the third quarter to preserve a 17-9 Colts lead. It was the second blocked kick for the team in 2017.

- In Week 16 at Baltimore, inside linebacker Anthony Walker blocked a punt in the fourth quarter to give the Colts possession at the Ravens 27-yard line. It was the first blocked punt for the Colts dating back to Oct. 26, 2014, at Pittsburgh. Last season, the Colts blocked a punt, an extra point (Margus Hunt vs. Pittsburgh on Nov. 12) and a field goal (Henry Anderson at Cincinnati on Oct. 29).

## DE-TARELL BASHAM

- In Week 8 at Cincinnati, he finished with two tackles, 1.0 sack and two quarterback hits. Basham recorded his first career sack in the fourth quarter when he brought down Andy Dalton for a 14-yard loss.
- In Week 13 at Jacksonville, he contributed with one tackle and one sack-forced fumble. Basham posted his second sack of the season and forced his first career fumble on the play when he stripped Blake Bortles for an eight-yard loss in the second quarter.

## C-DEYSHAWN BOND

- In Week 1 at the Los Angeles Rams, he registered his first career start at center in his first NFL game.

## QB-JACOBY BRISSETT

- In Week 2 vs. Arizona, he completed 20-of-37 passes for 216 yards and one interception in his first start as a member of the Colts.
- In Week 3 vs. Cleveland, he completed 17-of-24 passes (70.8 percent) for 259 yards and one touchdown for a 120.0 passer rating. Brissett also added five rushes for 14 yards and two rushing scores. He became the first Colts quarterback since Andrew Luck in 2012 (vs. Cleveland 10/21/12 and at Jacksonville 11/8/12) to rush for multiple touchdowns in a single game. Brissett also became the first Colts quarterback to rush for two touchdowns and throw for one touchdown in a single game dating back to October 20, 1974, when Bert Jones accomplished the feat.
- In Week 4 at Seattle, he completed 16-of-29 passes for 157 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Brissett logged his second career touchdown pass on an 18-yard connection with Donte Moncrief in the second quarter.
- In Week 5 vs. San Francisco, he completed 22-of-34 passes for 314 yards and one interception for an 82.2 passer rating. He also rushed eight times for 14 yards and one touchdown. Brissett threw his longest career pass in the fourth quarter when he found T.Y. Hilton for a 63-yard gain. His 22 completions and 314 passing yards were both single-game career highs.
- In Week 6 at Tennessee, he completed 21-of-37 passes for 212 yards and one touchdown for an 82.3 passer rating. Brissett tied a career-high with 37 passing attempts, which he previously set in Week 2 against Arizona.
- In Week 8 at Cincinnati, he completed 25-of-39 passes for 233 yards, two touchdowns and one interception for an 86.8 passer rating. It marked Brissett's first career game with multiple touchdown passes.
- In Week 9 at Houston, he completed 20-of-30 passes for 308 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions for a single-game career-best 122.6 passer rating. Brissett gave the Colts a 17-7 advantage with his 80-yard touchdown throw to Hilton in the third quarter. The throw marked his longest career pass. It was also the longest pass for a Colts quarterback dating back to Andrew Luck's 87-yard touchdown against New Orleans on Oct. 25, 2015.
- In Week 10 vs. Pittsburgh, he completed 14-of-24 passes for 222 yards, two touchdowns and one interception for a 99.7 passer rating. Brissett recorded two touchdown throws in three consecutive games. He threw his second touchdown of the game on a 61-yard connection to Chester Rogers on the team's first drive of the third quarter.
- In Week 15 vs. Denver, he completed 17-of-30 passes for 158 yards totaling a 71.2 passer rating. He also added five carries for 18 yards and one touchdown. Following a Colts takeaway on Denver's opening drive, Brissett led the team on a seven-play, 50-yard scoring drive capped by his seven-yard rushing touchdown. It was the team's first touchdown on their opening offensive drive dating back to a Week 9 victory at Houston. Brissett's rushing touchdown was his fourth of the season, which is tied for the second most in

- In Week 12 vs. Tennessee, he started and played in his 100th career game.

### TE-DARRELL DANIELS

- In Week 4 at Seattle, he made his first career NFL start.

### CB-PIERRE DESIR

- In Week 10 vs. Pittsburgh, he totaled eight tackles (six solo), one interception and two passes defended. On Pittsburgh's first drive of the game, Desir notched his first career interception when he picked off Ben Roethlisberger on a deep pass intended for Martavis Bryant.

### TE-JACK DOYLE

- In Week 2 vs. Arizona, he led the team in receiving with eight catches for 79 yards. His receiving total set a new single-game career-high, while his eight receptions were one shy of his single-game best.
- In Week 6 at Tennessee, he led the Colts with seven receptions totaling 50 yards with one touchdown. Doyle gave the Colts a 10-6 lead in the second quarter with his first touchdown reception of the season. Three of Doyle's nine career touchdown catches have come against the Titans.
- In Week 8 at Cincinnati, he sets single-game career highs in receptions (12) and receiving yards (121) while adding one touchdown. Doyle's 121 receiving yards were the most for a Colts tight end in a game since Coby Fleener finished with 127 against Washington on Nov. 30, 2014. His 12 receptions are tied with Dallas Clark (Dec. 14, 2008) for the second-most in a single game by a Colts tight end in franchise history.
- In Week 9 at Houston, he led the team with eight receptions totaling 63 yards.
- In Week 12 vs. Tennessee, he led the team in receiving with seven catches for 94 yards.
- In Week 13 at Jacksonville, he caught three passes for 16 yards. With three receptions, Doyle set a new single-season career-high in catches (62), which ranks as the fourth-most for a tight end in Colts history in a single year.
- In Week 14 at Buffalo, he caught two passes for four yards and one touchdown. Doyle's three-yard touchdown reception from Jacoby Brissett with 1:16 remaining in the fourth quarter sent the game to overtime.
- In Week 15 vs. Denver, he led the team in receiving with seven receptions for 47 yards. With seven receptions, Doyle surpassed Jacob Tamme (67) for the third-most receptions by a tight end in a single season in Colts history.
- In Week 17 vs. Houston, he led the team with four receptions for 38 yards and one touchdown. With four receptions, Doyle passed Dallas Clark (77) for the second-most receptions by a tight end in a single season in Colts history.

### S-MATTHIAS FARLEY

- In Week 1 at the Los Angeles Rams, he registered his first career start and led the team with a career-high 10 tackles (eight solo).
- In Week 2 vs. Arizona, he tied with cornerback Rashaan Melvin for the team lead with seven tackles and two passes defended.
- In Week 4 at Seattle, he ranked second on the team with 10 tackles (four solo) and added one interception and one pass defended. Farley intercepted his first career pass at the 3:41 mark of the second quarter.
- In Week 9 at Houston, he led the team with eight tackles (six solo) and added one pass defended.
- In Week 13 at Jacksonville, he led the team with seven tackles (five solo) in addition to one quarterback hit.

- In Week 4 at Seattle, he posted six tackles (three solo) and 1.0 sack which went for a safety. Hairston's safety was the team's first dating back to Dec. 27, 2015 in a win against Miami. He has recorded 2.0 sacks in his last three games.
- In Week 12 vs. Tennessee, he finished with five tackles (three solo), one interception and two passes defended. Hairston intercepted his first career pass in the second quarter.

### WR-T.Y. HILTON

- In Week 3 vs. Cleveland, he caught seven passes for 153 yards and one touchdown. With 153 receiving yards, Hilton passed Lenny Moore (6,039) for the fourth most receiving yards in franchise history. The 100-yard receiving performance was the 25th of his career, which ranks third in franchise history. Hilton topped 145 receiving yards in the first half, which is the third-highest total in franchise history for a first half. He holds the first half record when he recorded 156 yards on Oct. 9, 2014.
- In Week 5 vs. San Francisco, he led the team in receiving with seven catches for 177 yards (25.3 avg.). His yardage total was the third highest of any game in his career (regular or postseason) and the second most for a regular season game. The 100-yard receiving performance was the 26th of Hilton's career, which ranks third in franchise history.
- In Week 9 at Houston, he caught five passes for 175 yards and two touchdowns. Hilton's receiving yardage total was the third highest for a regular season game in his career. Two of Hilton's top three receiving yardage performances have come this season (Week 5 vs. San Francisco, 177). He also tied with Antonio Brown for the most 150-yard receiving performances in the NFL this season with three. It marked Hilton's seventh career multiple touchdown game. He also topped the 100-yard mark for the 27th time in his career.
- In Week 12 vs. Tennessee, he caught two passes for 15 yards and passed Bill Brooks (411) for the fifth-most receptions in franchise history.
- In Week 13 at Jacksonville, he caught three passes for 51 yards and one touchdown. It was his fourth touchdown of the season.
- In Week 16 at Baltimore, he led both teams in receiving with six catches for 100 yards. With his 16-yard reception in the fourth quarter, Hilton passed Dallas Clark for the fourth-most receptions in franchise history. The 100-yard receiving performance was the 28th of his career, which ranks third in franchise history.

### S-MALIK HOOKER

- In Week 2 vs. Arizona, he registered his first career start at free safety and compiled two tackles (one solo), one interception and one pass defended.
- In Week 3 vs. Cleveland, he posted three tackles, one interception and one pass defended. With his fourth quarter interception, Hooker became the first Colts rookie since Jason David in 2004 to pick off passes in back-to-back games.
- In Week 4 at Seattle, he notched three tackles, one interception and one pass defended. With his third quarter interception, Hooker became the first Colts rookie to intercept at least one pass in three consecutive games dating back to 1984 when Eugene Daniel accomplished the feat from Weeks 13-15.

**DT-MARGUS HUNT**

- In Week 1 at the Los Angeles Rams, he logged two tackles, 1.0 tackle for loss, 1.0 sack and two quarterback hits. Hunt's sack at the beginning of the fourth quarter was the first of the season for the Colts.
- In Week 10 vs. Pittsburgh, he earned his first start of the season at defensive end and contributed with one tackle and a blocked extra point. Hunt blocked a Steelers extra point in the third quarter to preserve a 17-9 Colts lead. It was the second blocked kick for the team this season and the fourth block of Hunt's career.
- In Week 14 at Buffalo, he set a new single-game best in tackles [seven].

**RB-MARLON MACK**

- In Week 1 at the Los Angeles Rams, he had 10 carries for 24 yards and one touchdown and added one reception for 21 yards. Mack posted the team's first touchdown of the season and the first of his career at the 11:32 mark of the fourth quarter when he found the end zone on a three-yard rush.
- In Week 5 vs. San Francisco, he tallied his best rushing performance of the season with nine carries for 91 yards and one touchdown and contributed with one catch for two yards. - In Week 17 vs. Houston, he totaled seven carries for 28 yards and one touchdown and added two catches for 10 yards. Mack gave the Colts a 14-13 lead in the third quarter with his one-yard rushing touchdown. It was his third rushing touchdown of the season.

**CB-KENNY MOORE II**

- In Week 15 vs. Denver, he totaled six tackles (three solo), one interception and two passes defended. Moore II intercepted his first career pass when he stepped in front of a Trevor Siemian ball on Denver's opening drive. He returned the interception 25 yards.
- In Week 16 at Baltimore, he tied for the team lead in tackles with inside linebacker Antonio Morrison (nine). Moore also added 1.0 tackle for loss, one pass defended and one forced fumble. He forced his first career fumble in the second quarter, which was recovered by the Ravens.

- In Week 5 vs. San Francisco, he compiled seven tackles (four solo), 1.5 sacks and 2.0 tackles for loss. He shared the team lead in tackles with Jon Bostic and Antonio Morrison.

The kick also marked his 42nd different stadium having converted at least one field goal. The game at Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum was the first of his career at the venue.
- In Week 2 vs. Arizona, he converted two field goals and one PAT for seven points. Vinatieri gave the Colts a 10-0 lead with his 46-yard field goal at the 1:27 mark in the first quarter. He added his second conversion from 29 yards in the fourth quarter to give the team a 13-3 lead. On the kick, he passed Morten Andersen (176) for the most field goals made from 20-29 yards in NFL history.
- In Week 3 vs. Cleveland, he converted one field goal and four PATs for seven points. With the victory, Vinatieri passed Gary Anderson (201) for the second-most career regular season wins in NFL history. George Blanda holds the league record for regular season wins with 209. Vinatieri currently holds the NFL record for the most regular season and postseason wins combined with 222.
- In Week 4 at Seattle, he converted one field goal and one PAT for four points against the Seahawks. After converting his second quarter PAT, Vinatieri has tallied at least one point in 46 different stadiums. The contest at CenturyLink Field was his first career game in Seattle.

Vinatieri gave the Colts a 3-0 lead with his 52-yard field goal on the team's opening possession of the game. On the kick, he became the third player in NFL history to accumulate 2,400-plus points (Morten Andersen, 2,544 and Gary Anderson 2,434). Vinatieri converted two field goals of 50-plus yards in a single game for the third time in his career (2013 at San Diego and 2016 vs. Chicago).

- In Week 6 at Tennessee, he converted 3-of-3 field goals and one PAT for 10 points. Vinatieri passed Jason Hanson (327) for the fifth-most regular season games played in NFL history. He tied the game at 3-3 with his 36-yard field goal at the 6:45 mark of the first quarter. With the kick, Vinatieri passed George Blanda (639) for the third most field goal attempts in NFL history. He tied the game at 22-22 with his 52-yard field goal conversion at the 7:27 mark in the fourth quarter. Vinatieri was 3-of-3 in field goals from 50-plus yards this season.
- In Week 8 at Cincinnati, he converted 3-of-3 field goals and two PATs for 11 points. Vinatieri tied the game at 3-3 with his 29-yard field goal in the second quarter. He then gave the Colts a 13-10 halftime lead with his 33-yard conversion as time expired in the second quarter. Vinatieri converted a 29-yard field goal in the fourth quarter to give the Colts a 23-17 lead. On the kick, he tied Gary Anderson for the second-most points scored in NFL history with 2,434.
- In Week 9 at Houston, he converted 2-of-2 field goals and two PATs for eight points against the Texans. With his extra point conversion on the team's first touchdown of the game, Vinatieri passed Gary Anderson (2,434) for the second-most points scored in NFL history. ### BRISSETT'S BIG DAY

In Week 3 vs. Cleveland in 2017, Indianapolis quarterback **Jacoby Brissett** recorded his second start for the Colts this season and completed 17-of-24 passes (70.8 percent) for 259 yards and one touchdown for a 120.0 passer rating. He also added five rushes for 14 yards and two rushing touchdowns.

Brissett became the first Colts quarterback since Andrew Luck in 2012 (vs. Cleveland 10/21/12 and at Jacksonville 11/8/12) to rush for multiple touchdowns in a single game. He also became the first Colts quarterback to rush for two touchdowns and throw for one touchdown in a single game dating back to October 20, 1974, when Bert Jones accomplished the feat.

### HILTON PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Colts wide receiver **T.Y. Hilton** was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Week for Week 9 of the 2017 season. It marked the first time he had earned the award in his career. Hilton garnered AFC Special Teams Player of the Week recognition as a rookie in 2012 (Week 12).

In the Colts' 20-14 win over the Houston Texans, Hilton caught five passes for 175 yards and two touchdowns. The receiving yardage total was the third highest for a regular season game in his career. The performance marked his 27th career 100-yard receiving game and his seventh career multiple touchdown game. Hilton has compiled 10 career 150+ yard receiving games, which is tied for the fourth most in a player's first six seasons in the NFL.

### VINATIERI PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Indianapolis kicker **Adam Vinatieri** was named the AFC Special Teams Player of the Week for Week 5 of the 2017 season. It marked the 17th time he had earned the award in his career, which is the most by any player in NFL history.

In the Colts' Week 5 26-23 overtime victory over the San Francisco 49ers, **Vinatieri** converted 4-of-4 field goal attempts and two PATs for 14 points. He connected on field goals of 52, 51, 38 and 23 yards. **Vinatieri** split the uprights on a 51-yard field goal attempt in overtime to seal the Indianapolis win. **It was his 27th career game-winning kick. Vinatieri has 24 game-winning field goals in the regular season in the final minute of the fourth quarter or overtime and 10 game-winners in overtime, both the most in NFL history.** With the field goal, he also moved into second place all-time in NFL history in field goals made with 539.

During the performance, **Vinatieri** also became the third player in NFL history to accumulate 2,400-plus points (**Morten Andersen, 2,544** and **Gary Anderson 2,434**) and tied **George Blanda (639)** for the third-most field goal attempts in NFL history. For the third time in his career (2013 at San Diego and 2016 vs. Chicago), he converted two field goals of 50-plus yards in a single game.

### ROOKIE RIGO

In 2017, Colts rookie punter **Rigoberto Sanchez** punted 84 times for 3,764 yards (44.8 avg./42.6 net avg.) with 28 punts inside the 20-yard line. He set franchise rookie records for total punts and punt yards and after one season ranks third in highest punting average in team history.
