GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Spero Dedes (play-by-play), Adam Archuleta (analyst) and Aditi Kinkhabwala (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals play their second straight road game when they renew the "Battle of Ohio" against the Cleveland Browns on Sunday at Huntington Bank Field.

Cincinnati improved to 2-4 on the season with a victory over the N.Y. Giants on Sunday Night Football in Week 6. The Bengals' defense enjoyed their best performance to this point, as they held New York to seven points and just 190 net passing yards to lead the way in a 17-7 result.

"I thought they did a great job getting pressure on the quarterback," head coach Zac Taylor said. "I'm really proud of the way the defense played. The players, the coaches — the way that they fought all week. To put on a performance like this was special."

The defense received contributions from all three levels, beginning with a now-healthy defensive tackle foursome of B.J. Hill, Sheldon Rankins, Kris Jenkins Jr. and McKinnley Jackson. Hill, playing against his former Giants team, tallied a season-high seven tackles and knocked down two passes at the line of scrimmage. He also contributed to the game's first turnover, when late in the opening quarter he affected a throw by Giants QB Daniel Jones that popped into the air and was intercepted by LB Germaine Pratt at the Bengals' three-yard line.

Cincinnati was able to create consistent pressure on Jones, as the defensive unit was credited with six QB hits and DE Trey Hendrickson notched two sacks. On the back end, CBs Mike Hilton and DJ Turner II each broke up Giants pass attempts on fourth down in the second half to give the ball back to the offense.

"It was great to see our defense step up today," QB Joe Burrow said. "That was exciting to see. We got healthier up front. You could see that really affected the pass rush and they were getting a lot of pressure. I think our defensive backs were sticky in coverage all day. Mike Hilton made some big plays, big tackles blitzing and in coverage, so that was great to get him back."

While the Bengals' offense stalled at times throughout the game, it managed to capitalize in key moments. On the game's opening drive, Burrow darted out of the pocket on a third-and-18 and raced 47 yards to the end zone to give Cincinnati an early lead. The play marked the longest TD run by a quarterback in Bengals history and was Burrow's first rushing score of the season.

When New York tied the game with a TD in the third quarter, Burrow answered on the very next play from scrimmage by finding WR Ja'Marr Chase downfield for a 33-yard gain. That longest pass play of the night set up K Evan McPherson's go-ahead FG that made it 10-7. Then, while facing a third-and-12 late in the fourth, Burrow again escaped pressure and hit WR Andrei Iosivas for a crucial conversion, which led to HB Chase Brown's 30-yard game-sealing TD.

"Our offense was a little sloppy at times tonight, but in the fourth quarter when we needed it, everyone stepped up," Taylor said. "Everyone did their job. Everybody finished. I thought special teams put us in some really good positions with some of those punts. Defensively, obviously getting the ball back, and then offense finishing with the touchdown. No better way to do it. We'll start building

on that and hopefully we can string some wins together."

Cincinnati prepares for a Browns team that is coming off a 20-16 loss at Philadelphia in Week 6. Sunday marks the 102nd all-time installment of the "Battle of Ohio," a rivalry which dates back to 1970.

The series: The Bengals lead 53-48 in the "Battle of Ohio" series, but the Browns have won six of the past eight meetings, and nine of the last 12. Home field has been a factor over the series, as the Bengals lead 33-18 at home, but trail 20-30 as the road club.

Cincinnati has played more games against Cleveland (101) than any foe except Pittsburgh. The Bengals have 107 all-time regular-season games against the Steelers (109 overall, including postseason).

More series notes:

- When Cleveland swept Cincinnati in 2018, it was the Browns' first season sweep over the Bengals since 2002.
- Cleveland's win in the first matchup of 2018 snapped a seven-game Bengals winning streak against the Browns. That streak, the Bengals' longest in the series, began with the second meeting of 2014.
- The Browns' longest win streak over Cincinnati also is seven games, from the second matchup of the 1992 season through the second matchup of '95.
- Since the Browns' rebirth in 1999, the Bengals lead 29-21, with records of 17-8 as the home team and 12-13 as the visiting team.

Bengals LB Joe Bachie is a native of Brook Park, Ohio (south of Cleveland) ... Bachie played for Philadelphia in 2020, when Browns defensive coordinator Jim Schwartz served in the same role for the Eagles ... Bengals defensive quality control coach Sigismondo "Louie" Cioffi had two coaching stints with the Browns, serving as their DBs coach in 2013 and '16 ... Bengals assistant special teams coach Ben Jacobs played LB for the Browns in 2011 ... Browns RB Jerome Ford played at the University of Cincinnati from 2020-21 ... Browns DT Dalvin Tomlinson played alongside Bengals DT B.J. Hill on the N.Y. Giants from 2018-20, which also was when Bengals LBs coach James Bettcher served as the Giants' defensive coordinator ('18-19) ... Bengals CB Mike Hilton and Browns LB Devin Bush were teammates on the Pittsburgh Steelers from 2019-20 ... Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 2096 career passing attempts, 125 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.
- Burrow has 15,661 passing yards, the fifth-most all-time. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top four spots. Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for fifth in team history.
- Burrow has 21 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the third-most all-time. Dalton (28) and Esiason (23) hold the top two spots for the team's most 300-yard passing games.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 34 career receiving TDs, seven shy of WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth all-time. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.
- Chase has 16 games with 100 or more receiving yards, two shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.
- DE Trey Hendrickson has 44.5 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 14.5 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.
- K Evan McPherson has an 83.8 career FG percentage (88 made/105 attempts), the third-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

Records vs. Browns: The two highest-scoring games in Bengals history have each been against the Browns. On Nov. 28, 2004 at Paycor Stadium (then known as Paul Brown Stadium), the Bengals won 58-48, and the 106 total points is not only a Bengals record, it is the second-most in NFL history, behind only 113 from Washington's 72-41 win over the N.Y. Giants in 1966. And on Sept. 16, 2007, the Bengals and Browns combined for 96 points at Cleveland in a 51-45 Browns win.

More on Bengals regular-season records against the Browns:

- On Dec. 21, 1980 vs. Cleveland, DE Eddie Edwards set the Bengals record for sacks in a game with five. The mark stood unchallenged for 19 years, until DE Antwan Odom tied it on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay.
 - In the final Bengals game at Cinergy Field, on Dec. 12, 1999, Cincinnati limited the Browns to the fewest rushing yards ever by an opponent. Cleveland had only 11 net yards on 11 attempts.
 - On Sept. 10, 2000, WR Craig Yeast tied a Bengals record for most punt returns in a game with seven. The record was set by RB Tony Davis in 1977, and in addition to Yeast, has since been tied by WR Brandon Tate in 2011.
 - On Nov. 25, 2001 at Cleveland, T.J. Houshmandzadeh set the Bengals record for punt return yards in a game with 126. His 86-yarder in that game ranks tied for third-longest in club history, and it still ranks as the longest punt return in team history which did not result in a touchdown.
 - The 58-48 Bengals win on Nov. 28, 2004 is the only game in club history in which Cincinnati scored double figures in all four quarters (14-13-14-17 — 58).
 - In the Sept. 16, 2007 shootout with the Browns noted above, QB Carson Palmer threw six TD passes, the most ever by a Bengals QB in a single game. That mark also stands tied for the team record for most TD passes in a game.
 - On Dec. 21, 2008, at Cleveland, Bengals CB Leon Hall tied the team record for most interceptions in a game with three. He was the seventh Bengal to reach that mark in a contest, though no one has done it since.
 - The Bengals' 23-20 overtime victory at Cleveland on Oct. 4, 2009 stands as the longest Bengals game not to end in a tie, and it will remain so for the foreseeable future. Only four seconds remained in the overtime period when K Shayne Graham booted a 31-yard field goal to break a 20-all deadlock. Elapsed scoreboard clock time for the game was 74:56. Only three games lasted longer in Bengals history, and all three were 75-minute ties — in 2008 vs. Philadelphia, in '14 vs. Carolina and '16 vs. Washington in London. The NFL shortened overtime from a 15-minute period to a 10-minute period in 2017, so the longest a game can last nowadays since that rule change is 70 total minutes.
 - On Nov. 17, 2013, the Bengals scored 31 points in the second quarter, a team record for most points in a quarter, en route to a 41-20 Cincinnati victory.
 - In their 30-0 win at Cleveland on Dec. 14, 2014, the Bengals allowed only five first downs, fewest by an opponent in Bengals history.
 - On Oct 23, 2016 against Cleveland, HB Jeremy Hill rushed for 168 yards on nine carries (18.7 yards per rush) — the most rushing yards in club history without hitting double digits in carries. That 168-yard total broke a mark that had stood for 45 years — 113 yards on eight carries by Essex Johnson vs. Philadelphia on 9-19-71.
- Individually vs. Browns:** Here are offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against Cleveland (ordered by total games played):
- HB Trayveon Williams: Seven games; 13 rushes for 45 yards (3.5); Two receptions for 10 yards (5.0).
 - QB Joe Burrow: Six games; 247 attempts and 157 completions (63.6 percent) for 1557 yards, 10 TDs and five INTs (86.4 passer rating); 23 rushes for 65 yards (2.8) and one TD.
 - WR Tee Higgins: Six games; 17 receptions for 233 yards (13.7) and two TDs; one rush for seven yards.
 - WR Trenton Irwin: Six games; Seven receptions for 128 yards (18.3) and one TD.
 - TE Drew Sample: Six games; 18 receptions for 148 yards (8.2).
 - WR Ja'Marr Chase: Five games; 27 receptions for 252 yards (9.3) and one TD; Four rushes for eight yards (2.0).
 - HB Chris Evans (Reserve/Injured): Four games; Nine rushes for 47 yards (5.2); Seven receptions for 60 yards (8.6) and one TD.
 - QB Jake Browning: Two games; 18-of-25 passing for 156 yards, three TDs and one INT (111.0 passer rating); Three rushes for 17 yards.
 - WR Andrei Iosivas: Two games: Five receptions for 36 yards (7.2) and two TDs.
 - WR Charlie Jones: Two games: Three receptions for 49 yards (16.3); Two rushes for 13 yards (6.5).
 - HB Chase Brown: One game; 11 rushes for 43 yards (3.9); One reception for 10 yards.
 - TE Tanner Hudson: One game; Two receptions for 11 yards (5.5).

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, black pants (orange stripes) and white socks this week at Cleveland. Cincinnati is 6-4 overall when wearing that combination, which was last featured in Week 16 of last season at Pittsburgh.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and the recently unveiled orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet four times — twice in 2022 and twice in '23 — and have won all four games. The "White Bengal" look is set to make its return in Week 8 versus Philadelphia on Oct. 27.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their lineup in 2024.

Bengals seek to regain biggest 'Battle' margin: With its nine victories in its last 12 meetings with Cincinnati, Cleveland has whittled the Bengals' largest lead of 11 games in the team's all-time series down to five. The Bengals' 11-game lead after the 2017 season set the benchmark for the biggest lead held by either side in the "Battle of Ohio" series.

The series began in 1970 with the Browns winning six of the first seven, and

their five-game margin at 6-1, after the first meeting of 1973, stands as their largest lead. The Bengals lead 52-42 since that Cleveland high-water mark. The Browns have not led the series since the end of 2005, when they were 33-32.

Since surrendering that 33-32 lead by giving up a sweep in the 2006 meetings, the Browns have twice pulled into ties — at 34-34 after the first meeting of '07 and at 35-35 after the first meeting of '08. But the Browns have now endured a 17-year stretch without a lead in the series. Barring possible additions to the series in postseason play, the Bengals cannot surrender their series lead until after the first game of 2026, at the earliest. The Browns could not lead again until after the second game of '26.

More Bengals-Browns facts: The first-ever Bengals-Browns meeting of any kind was Aug. 29, 1970. On that Saturday, the Browns were visitors for the second preseason game of Riverfront Stadium's debut year. The Bengals won 31-24, moving to 2-0 in preseason in their new home.

Also:

- The Bengals were 17-10 against the Browns at Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field.

- The Browns were 17-8 against the Bengals at the old Cleveland Stadium, and now lead 13-12 at Huntington Bank Field (named Cleveland Browns Stadium from 1999-12 and in '23; named FirstEnergy Stadium from '13-22).

- The Bengals and Browns never played at Nippert Stadium, as Nippert was the Bengals' American Football League home from 1968-69.

- The Bengals have posted 13 season sweeps, and the Browns have posted 11. The teams have split 26 times. In 1982, they played only once, with the scheduled contest at Cleveland cancelled due to a players' strike.

- The first Bengals-Browns regular-season game at Cincinnati on Nov. 15, 1970 drew the first home crowd of 60,000 in Bengals history (60,007 at Riverfront Stadium). The Bengals won 14-10 behind a 110-yard rushing effort from QB Virgil Carter, the only 100-yarder by a QB in Bengals history.

- The largest Bengals home crowd for a Browns game has been 66,222, on Dec. 11, 2022 at Paycor Stadium. That ranks as the 10th-largest home crowd in Bengals history. The previous high vs. Cleveland at home had stood for 17 years — a mark of 66,072 attended a Sept. 17, 2006 game at Paycor, which then called Paul Brown Stadium.

- The Browns drew the largest Bengals crowd in the Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field era — 60,284 for a 27-24 Browns win on Oct. 17, 1971.

- The Bengals and Browns met three times in preseason at Ohio Stadium in Columbus, from 1972-74. All were Sunday afternoon games, and the Browns won two of the three.

'Battle' coaches: Here are some notes about head coaches in the "Battle of Ohio" series:

- When Cincinnati's Zac Taylor and Cleveland's Freddie Kitchens met in the first "Battle of Ohio" of 2019, it was just the second time in series history that a Bengals-Browns meeting featured two rookie head coaches who faced both each other and their Ohio rival for the first time in the same game. The Browns won that contest at FirstEnergy Stadium, 27-19. The first such instance occurred on Oct. 21, 1984, when Bengals first-year head coach Sam Wyche met Browns first-year head coach Marty Schottenheimer in Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium, with the Bengals winning, 12-9. The Bengals' Homer Rice and the Browns' Sam Rutigliano also were rookie head coaches when they met for the first time on Dec. 17, 1978 at Riverfront. However, that was Rutigliano's second "Battle of Ohio" as Cleveland's head coach. The two teams met in Game 2 that year, before Rice, who was named head coach after Game 5, took the reins.

- Former Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis, who was 22-10 overall against Cleveland, has the most total wins and best winning percentage (.688) of any Bengals head coach in the series. Lewis also has coached the most games (32) against Cleveland. Sam Wyche is second in all three categories, with 10 wins, a .625 winning percentage (10-6) and 16 games.

- Bill Belichick has been the top Browns coach in the series, having posted an 8-2 mark against the Bengals during his 1991-95 tenure.

- Lewis is the only Bengals head coach whose first Cincinnati victory came against Cleveland. Lewis took over as head coach in 2003, and his first win was a 21-14 decision at Cleveland on Sept. 28 of that year. The Bengals entered that game at 0-3, but went on to finish 8-8. The six-game improvement, after a 2-14 season in 2002, was the largest in the NFL for '03.

- Forrest Gregg is the only head coach to pilot both teams in the "Battle of Ohio." Gregg was 1-5 as Browns coach against the Bengals from 1975-77, and he was 3-4 as Bengals coach against the Browns from '80-83.

- Here are Bengals head coaches, in chronological order, and their records in the "Battle of Ohio": Paul Brown (5-7), Bill "Tiger" Johnson (3-2), Homer Rice (2-1), Forrest Gregg (3-4), Sam Wyche (10-6), Dave Shula (1-7), Bruce Coslet

(2-1), Dick LeBeau (2-3), Marvin Lewis (22-10) and Zac Taylor (3-7).

• The Bengals are 11-8 against Browns head coaches directing their first game in the series. Browns head coaches who won their first game have been Blanton Collier (1970), Nick Skorich ('71), Sam Rutigliano ('78), Bill Belichick ('91), Rob Chudzinski (2013), Mike Pettine ('14), Freddie Kitchens ('19) and Kevin Stefanski ('20). On the losing end for Cleveland have been Forrest Gregg

(1975), Marty Schottenheimer ('84), Bud Carson ('89), Jim Shofner ('90), Chris Palmer ('99), Butch Davis (2001), Romeo Crennel ('05), Eric Mangini ('09), Pat Shurmur ('11), Hue Jackson ('16) and Gregg Williams ('18).

• Bengals coaches show a 7-3 record the first time out against Cleveland. The seven winners have been Bill Johnson (1976), Homer Rice ('78), Sam Wyche ('84), Dave Shula ('92), Bruce Coslet ('99), Dick LeBeau (2000) and Marvin Lewis ('03). Losing in the first try vs. Cleveland were Paul Brown (1970), Forrest Gregg ('80) and Zac Taylor (2019).

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman

from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Bary Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Kevin Stefanski is in his fifth season as Browns head coach after being named the 18th head coach in franchise history on Jan. 13, 2020.

Stefanski in 2023 became the 16th coach to win the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year Award multiple times since its inception in 1957 (he also won the honor in '20), and joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Forrest Gregg ('76) as the only Browns coaches to win the award. In his four seasons as head coach, the Browns are 37-30 (.552), the highest-regular-season winning percentage for the team over a four-year stretch since 1986-89.

Stefanski has led the team to two postseasons and two 11-win seasons. He joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Paul Brown (1951 and '53) as the only coaches in team history to record multiple seasons with at least 11 regular-season wins.

Before the Browns, he spent 14 seasons (2006-19) with the Minnesota Vikings. He gained his first league experience with the Vikings in 2006 as assistant to the head coach before transitioning to assistant QBs coach from '09-13. He then spent two seasons coaching the TEs ('14-15), one season ('16) as RBs coach, two seasons coaching the QBs ('17-18), and he was interim offensive coordinator for the last three games of the '18 season. The Vikings promoted him to offensive coordinator in 2019.

Stefanski played defensive back at Pennsylvania (2000-04) and earned a bachelor's degree in communications. A native of Philadelphia, Pa., he was born on April 8, 1982. He and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Will and Gabe, and one daughter, Juliet.

BENGALS NOTES

Bengals near 400th W: The Bengals enter Week 7 with 396 all-time wins in the regular season, just four shy of 400. The team has won 239 games at home and 157 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly known as Paul Brown Stadium). The team has reached the 10-win mark during the regular season 14

times, including in six of the past 12 years.

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-'22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt joins Orlando Brown Jr. in serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

Burrow's New York dash: QB Joe Burrow scored his first rushing TD of the season on the opening drive of Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, when on a third-and-18 he scrambled out of the pocket and sprinted 47 yards to the end zone. It was his 11th career rushing score (regular season), and his first since Week 13 of the 2022 campaign. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the longest rushing TD by a QB in Bengals history, surpassing the previous long of 27 yards by Jeff Driskel on Nov. 11, 2018 vs. New Orleans.
- It was the second-longest run by a QB in Bengals history, behind a 73-yarder by Virgil Carter on Nov. 15, 1970 vs. Cleveland.
- According to the NFL's NextGen Stats service, Burrow's top speed on the play was 19.86 mph, the fastest he has run on any play of his career.
- Burrow's previous longest rushing attempt was 23 yards, which he hit twice — on a TD in his career debut on Sept. 13, 2020 vs. the L.A. Chargers, and on a scramble on Sept. 11, 2022 vs. Pittsburgh.
- Burrow finished the Giants game with a career-high 55 rushing yards on four attempts.

Burrow masters the deep ball: Since entering the NFL in 2020, QB Joe Burrow leads the NFL in TD passes of 40 or more yards (23) and 50 or more yards (16), while tying for the league lead in TD throws of 60 or more yards (12).

Burrow already has four scoring passes of 40-plus yards this season, with each going to WR Ja'Marr Chase. He hit Chase on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington for a 41-yarder, then the following week at Carolina found Chase over the middle for what turned into a 63-yard catch-and-run to the end zone. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he connected with his Pro Bowl receiver on a 41-yard deep ball with nine seconds left in the first half, and on a quick screen in the fourth quarter that Chase took 70 yards for a TD.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22. Both of his 40-plus-yard TD throws last season were to Chase — a 63-yarder in Week 5 at Arizona and a 64-yarder in Week 10 against Houston.

Among all NFL QBs whose career began after 1990, Burrow's 23 TD passes of 40 or more yards are the third-most within his first five seasons. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning (28) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (26) had more in their first five years.

Burrow throws 100th TD: QB Joe Burrow recorded his 100th career regular-season TD pass on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington, when he hit WR Ja'Marr Chase in stride for a 41-yard score. Playing in his 55th

career game, Burrow tied for the seventh-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 100 TD passes.

The former No. 1 overall pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, before breaking out with a then-team-record 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By besting his record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

Burrow's 12 TD passes through six games this season are tied for second in the NFL. He threw for a career-high five TDs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, eclipsing his previous mark of four that he reached four times

Joe hits the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.32, he is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, ahead of former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.69).

Burrow in Week 4 at Carolina surpassed 2000 career passing attempts, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark were the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 attempts behind Brees (1444).

In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, Burrow completed 30 of 39 passes (76.9 percent) for 392 yards and five TDs. It marked his 19th career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts — the second-most such games in NFL history within a player's first five seasons behind Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 passing attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Burrow through six games this season has a 71.6 completion percentage (144 of 201), the second-highest rate in the league behind Washington QB Jayden Daniels (75.3; minimum 14 attempts per team game).

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is the only NFL QB with at least 1000 completions, 75 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.1; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking fourth in TD passes (96), sixth in yards per attempt (7.67), eighth in completions (1168) and eighth in passing yards (12,973).

Burrow reaches 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that mark.

Burrow's current career total of 15,661 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least four fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Through six games this season, Burrow ranks fifth in the NFL in passing yards (1578) and tied for sixth in yards per attempt (7.85; minimum 14 attempts per team game).

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He ranks fifth in NFL history in receiving yards (4210) and ninth in receptions (297) through any player's first 50 games, and he is one of five players in the Super Bowl era to record over 4000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs within his first 50 contests.

Chase holds a career average of 83.96 receiving yards per game, the fourth-highest mark in NFL history among all players with at least 3000 yards. In 2023, his career-high 100 receptions tied former WR Carl Pickens (1996) for the second-most in a season in Bengals history, and he became the eighth player in NFL history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns.

Chase in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants recorded his 300th career reception in his 51st game. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that milestone, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and tied for the eighth-fastest in league history. Chase also previously surpassed 4000 career receiving yards in Week 4 at Carolina, needing the fewest games ever by a Bengal to hit that mark (49).

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 70-yard catch-and-run to the end zone in Week 5 vs. Baltimore marked his 10th career receiving TD of 60 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. It also tied former Bengals WR Isaac Curtis for the most in a career in team history, and surpassed former N.Y. Giants Odell Beckham Jr. for the most in the Super Bowl era by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (11) and 40-plus yards (15) since 2021. With a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder against Baltimore, he became the first NFL player since WR Terrell Owens in 2007 to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games.

Higgins back in action: Fifth-year WR Tee Higgins has played in the Bengals' last four games after missing the first two contests due to a hamstring injury. He ranks second on the team in receptions (25) and receiving yards (259), and is coming off a game-high seven catches for 77 yards in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants.

Higgins in Week 5 vs. Baltimore caught nine passes for 83 yards and two TDs, marking his fifth career multi-TD performance. His nine receptions tied for the second-most in a game in his career (most since Week 11 of 2022). He is averaging 10.4 yards per catch this season, with 17 of his 25 grabs resulting in a first down for Cincinnati.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 20 leaguewide in receiving yards (20th; 3943) and receiving TDs (T-19th; 26). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 12 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (10), seventh in receiving yards (1228) and 13th in yards per reception (15.7) during the calendar's final month. Higgins also ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing teammate Ja'Marr Chase in both categories.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson notched his fourth and fifth sacks of the season in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, bringing down QB Daniel Jones for a loss of nine yards in the second quarter and six yards in the fourth. It marked his ninth multi-sack game since joining the Bengals during the 2021 offseason, tied for the fifth-most such games in the NFL in that span.

Hendrickson's five sacks this year are tied for seventh leaguewide. He boosted his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 44.5, the fourth-most in the NFL since 2021. Combining his Cincinnati log with 13.5 sacks in 2020, his final season with New Orleans, Hendrickson's 58 sacks rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh LB T.J. Watt (66.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62).

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023, which tied for second-most leaguewide and ranked second in Bengals history for a single season. The team record is held by DE Coy Bacon, who had 22.0 sacks in the 1976 campaign (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then started 15 contests for New Orleans in 2020, and has started 51 of 53 regular-season games played for the Bengals.

Hendrickson's production was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension with the Bengals that keeps him in stripes through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard recorded his first sack of the 2024 season in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, bringing down QB Lamar Jackson for a loss of three yards in the first quarter. It improved Hubbard's career sack total to 37.5, the third-most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected that year — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. He has ranked second on the Bengals in sacks in each season since he became the team's starting left defensive end in 2019, and he has 54 career TFLs.

Hubbard's sack against the Ravens perhaps was superseded by his next impact play in the second quarter. With Baltimore starting a drive from its own two-yard line, Hubbard broke through the gap and stopped RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone for a safety. It marked the first safety forced by the Bengals since Week 13 of the 2019 season against the N.Y. Jets.

Hubbard additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in team history. A native of Cincinnati who attended Archbishop Moeller High School, Hubbard also is known for contributing one of the franchise's most iconic plays, a 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the game-winner in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore following the 2022 season.

LB duo stuffs the stat sheet: LB Logan Wilson ranks second in the NFL this season with 61 tackles, while his fellow starting LB Germaine Pratt ranks eighth with 58.

In Week 2 at Kansas City, Pratt and Wilson combined for 28 tackles, the most by a pair of Bengals teammates since LB Vontaze Burfict (18 tackles) and LB Rey Mauluga (10) also totaled 28 on Dec. 30, 2012 against Baltimore. Pratt had a career-high 16 stops against the Chiefs, the fourth-most in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994.

Pratt also has contributed to three takeaways this season, beginning with a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City that set up a Bengals FG drive. He recovered another fumble in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, when he scooped up a loose ball in overtime and returned it nine yards into Ravens territory. Pratt notched his first INT of the year the following week at the N.Y. Giants, coming down with a pick on a tipped pass to end a Giants drive that reached Cincinnati's 14-yard line.

Since the start of the 2021 season, Pratt is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs, alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr.

Wilson has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons, highlighted by a career-high 135 stops in 2023 that marked the most by a Cincinnati defender since Burfict had 171 in '13. Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of two players leaguewide with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: LB Logan Wilson's 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2020. He had four picks last season, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh leaguewide.

A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson opened his career with two picks in his 2020 rookie campaign, then followed up with four in '21. That total marked the most in a season by a Bengals LB since Odell Thurman had five INTs in 2005.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the '27 season.

Rehkwow on a run: Through six weeks of regular-season play, rookie P Ryan Rehkwow leads the NFL in net punting average (47.3 net yards per punt; minimum 10 attempts), while ranking second in gross average (52.85; min. 10 att.). He has punted 20 times for 1057 yards, with 11 downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line compared to three touchbacks.

Rehkwow kicked off his career with a historic debut on Sept. 8 vs. New England, as he logged four punts for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four attempts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole on Nov. 5, 2023. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkwow's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers). Rehkwow's 80-yarder tied for the 15th-longest punt in league history and was the third-longest in an NFL debut.

Rehkwow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore punted five times for 253 yards (50.6 average), with four downed inside the Ravens' 20-yard line. It marked the most inside-20 punts in a game by a Bengals rookie since Kevin Huber had four on Nov. 29, 2009 against Cleveland. He then followed up with four more inside-20 punts on six total attempts in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkwow signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson knocked through a 56-yard FG in the third quarter of Week 4 at Carolina, extending his Bengals record to 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards. It also tied for the fifth-longest FG in team history, with McPherson owning five of the top six on that list.

McPherson's 24 such FGs are the third-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021. He finished the 2023 campaign with 21 FGs from 50-plus yards, the most in NFL history in a player's first three seasons.

McPherson in Week 3 against Washington surpassed 100 career FG attempts, and he ranks third in Bengals history for most made FGs through his first 100 tries with 84. Only former kickers Shayne Graham and Randy Bullock (87 each) had a better conversion rate through their 100th attempt. McPherson's current career FG percentage of 83.8 (88 of 105) also is third in team history behind Graham (86.8) and Bullock (84.9; minimum 75 attempts).

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs, including two last season — in OT of Week 13 at Jacksonville, and again in OT of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. However, his two most notable such kicks came during the 2021 postseason, when he hit a 52-yarder in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and followed up a week later with a 31-yarder in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City that sent Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson is a perfect 19 of 19 in seven career postseason games and is the team's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points).

Cincinnati signed McPherson to a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18, securing its kicker through the 2027 season.

Pro Bowl three-peats: WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 which tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe

Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor with the induction of former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the Ring of Honor during a halftime ceremony in the team's Week 3 game against Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 19 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022

season, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home games from 2005-07.

Each of the five highest-announced home attendance figures in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 season, including three that were played during the '23 campaign. Cincinnati's Week 9 win over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football last season had an attendance figure of 66,965, which stands as the second-largest in team history behind a record 67,260 in Week 4 of the '22 season against Miami. The Bengals faced Houston in Week 10 of 2023 in front of an announced crowd of 66,526, the third-largest ever, and earlier in the season had an attendance figure of 66,385 in a Week 6 win over Seattle that ranks fifth. The fourth-highest attendance figure is 66,399 for the team's Wild Card Playoff victory against Baltimore in January of 2023.

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). He also currently is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage, maintaining a mark of 68.32 percent (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Through six weeks this season, Burrow leads the league in passer rating (110.3), while ranking second in completions (144), second completion percentage (71.6), tied for second in TD passes (12) and fifth in passing yards (1578). He threw a career-high five TD passes in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and also in that game surpassed former QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most career passing yards in team history. Burrow reached a pair of career milestones in near record fashion during the previous week's game at Carolina, as he tied for the fourth-fastest QB in NFL history to pass for 15,000 yards (56 games) and had the second-most completions in league history through his 2000th pass attempt (1363). He threw his 100th career TD pass in Week 3 vs. Washington, tying for the seventh-fastest QB ever to hit that mark (55 games). In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, Burrow capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a quarterback in team history, a 47-yard run to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time last year, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals (2021-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20).

Running backs: Fifth-year veteran **Zack Moss** joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent this past offseason, and through six games he has 224 rushing yards on a team-leading 63 carries. He also has 16 catches for 126 yards, and has scored three total TDs (two rushing, one receiving). His receiving TD came with one second remaining in the first half of Week 4 at Carolina, while he ran for TDs in Week 1 vs. New England and Week 3 vs. Washington. Moss entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2020, and after

amassing 917 rushing yards and eight TDs in two-plus seasons with the Bills, he was traded to Indianapolis in November of '22. He had his best statistical season in 2023, when he set career highs in rushing attempts (183), rushing yards (794), rushing TDs (five) and receptions (27). Complementing Moss in the run game is second-year pro **Chase Brown**. Brown has a TD in each of the last three games, with the most recent being a game-sealing 30-yard run late in the fourth quarter of Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. He scored his first two career rushing TDs in Week 4 at Carolina, then in Week 5 vs. Baltimore caught a scoring pass from Burrow. Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, he is averaging 5.5 yards per carry (51 for 283) through six games and has a team-best 10 runs of 10-plus yards. He finished the Panthers game with a career-high 80 rushing yards, while also returning two kickoffs for 52 yards. Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in the 2023 draft, Brown spent four games on the Reserve/Injured list midway through his rookie season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to post 322 yards from scrimmage over the final six contests. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in 2023, and now shares that responsibility with Brown as the Bengals approach the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, while also contributing 15 career receptions for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average).

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons. He is one of eight players in NFL history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns, and he posted a career-high 100 catches in 2023 that tied for the second-most in a season in team history. A constant downfield threat, Chase leads the league with 15 TD receptions of 40 or more yards, 11 TD receptions of 50 or more yards and 10 TD receptions of 60 or more yards since the start of his 2021 rookie campaign. He recorded his league-leading sixth reception of 30-plus yards this season in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, hauling in a 33-yard grab in the third quarter to set up a Bengals go-ahead FG. He played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and had the fifth-most receiving yards in NFL history through any player's first 50 games (4210). He also is one of just five players in the Super Bowl era to amass 4000-plus receiving yards and 30-plus receiving TDs within his first 50 contests. Higgins missed the first two weeks of this season due to a hamstring injury, but

returned to the lineup in Week 3 vs. Washington and has started the past four games. He brought in all seven of his targets for 77 yards in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, with four of those catches resulting in a first down. Higgins had a pair of TD catches in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, marking his fifth career multi-TD game. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, Higgins has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then finished with 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but when healthy he contributed five TD catches and averaged 15.6 yards per reception. Higgins was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andrei Iosivas** has developed a connection with QB Joe Burrow, particularly in the low red zone. He has seven career TDs on just 29 total receptions, and five of those have come on Burrow passes from inside the opponents' five-yard line. He had two scoring grabs in Week 2 at Kansas City, then the following week had another on a fourth-and-goal play against Washington. Though he has just four catches over the last three games, he has contributed to crucial moments in those contests, beginning with a 29-yard grab in Week 4 at Carolina that helped set up a Bengals TD just before halftime. He hauled in a career-long 39-yard reception in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, leading to a TD three plays later. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, he worked free on a third-and-12 late in the fourth quarter and caught a 29-yard pass by Burrow, making way for the game-sealing TD. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. **Trenton Irwin** spent his first three seasons with the Bengals (2019-21) primarily as a practice squad player and game day inactive, but over the past two-plus years he has emerged as a dependable option for Cincinnati's quarterbacks. After totaling just three receptions in those first three seasons, he has 42 catches for 558 yards and five TDs since the start of the 2022 campaign, including a career-high 25 grabs for 316 yards in '23. Though listed as a backup on the depth chart last season, he started five games and showed an ability to line up at multiple WR positions. Irwin has been active for four games this season (inactive for Weeks 3 and 5), and has two catches for 11 yards. Second-year pro **Charlie Jones** serves as the team's primary punt returner, in addition to his role as a reserve receiver. Across his career, he has caught eight passes for 69 yards offensively, and returned 33 punts for 308 yards (9.3 average) with one TD. He missed six games last season due to a thumb injury, but returned to play in each of the final eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals added another downfield threat in the third round of April's draft when they selected **Jermaine Burton**. Burton played in 26 games at the University of Alabama from 2022-23, after spending his first two collegiate seasons ('20-21) at the University of Georgia. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while his 20.5 yards per reception led the Southeastern Conference and ranked sixth nationally. Burton led the Bengals and ranked third leaguewide in preseason receiving yards with 157 on eight catches (19.6 average), with two TDs. His first NFL reception came in Week 2 at Kansas City, when he hauled in a 47-yard deep ball from Burrow on Cincinnati's first offensive play of the second half.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 67 career games (40 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of last season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 84 career receptions for 649 yards and three TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample logged his first statistics of the 2024 campaign in Week 2 at Kansas City, catching three passes for 28 yards. The Bengals added a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last season. He played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted a game-high seven catches for 91 yards. He then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington, totaling four catches for 47 yards. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, he challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. Gesicki topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** began

the 2023 season on the Bengals' practice squad, but was signed to the active roster in early November and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in catches (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals used their fourth-round draft choice this past April to select **Erick All Jr.**, a native of Fairfield, Ohio (approximately 25 miles north of Cincinnati). All began training camp on the Active/Non-Football Injury list due to a knee injury sustained last October, but he was cleared to practice in late July and played in all three preseason games. Through six regular-season games (four starts), All has caught 16 of his 17 targets for 102 yards. He earned his first start in Week 2 at Kansas City and has caught a pass in each of his last five appearances, while also contributing as a blocker in the run game. He spent his first four collegiate seasons (2019-22) at the University of Michigan, then transferred to the University of Iowa for the '23 campaign. In 40 career college games, he caught 75 passes for 864 yards and five TDs. The Bengals doubled-up on tight ends during the draft when they took **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He caught three passes for 42 yards in the preseason, and has been inactive for each of the Bengals' six regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 42 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 2743 of a possible 2762 offensive snaps in that time (99.3 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started 23 straight games at LOT for the Bengals since signing with them in 2023. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with the Baltimore Ravens, then played two ('21-22) with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career, and has played 100 percent of the team's offensive snaps through six games. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. Cappa is one of two Bengal linemen, along with Karras, who haven't been penalized this season. **Cordell Volson** has started each of the Bengals' 42 games (including postseason) at LG since they took him in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. He has lined up for every offensive snap in that time, the only player on the team to do so. Though he has found his role in Cincinnati as the team's LG, he played at guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. Last season, Mims started six games on an offensive line that led the SEC in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.93). He was inactive for the team's first two games of the regular season due to a pectoral injury sustained in the preseason opener. Mims made his NFL debut in Week 3 against Washington, taking over for Trent Brown following his first-quarter injury. He made his first career start in Week 4 at Carolina and lined up for all 67 offensive snaps. Mims

briefly exited the Week 5 contest vs. Baltimore with an ankle injury, but returned in the fourth quarter. G/OT **Cody Ford**, a former college teammate of Orlando Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma, signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and served as a key depth piece in his first season with Cincinnati. He saw action in all 17 games, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He has played in 72 career games with 34 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG and two as a third TE. Ford was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The team's final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft, C **Matt Lee** was taken in the seventh round (237th overall) after playing in 51 games during his college career. He spent the first four years of his career (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16), while blocking for an offense that ranked second in the conference in total yards per game (431.2). Lee has appeared in all six games this season on special teams. The most recent addition to the O-Line is OT/G **Andrew Stueber**, who was signed off Atlanta's practice squad on Oct. 8, where he spent the first five weeks. A seventh-round pick of New England in 2022, he spent his rookie season on the Reserve/Non-Football Injury list, then was on the Patriots' practice squad in '23. Stueber played in 34 games with 22 starts (20 at ROT, two at RG) during a five-year career (2017-21) at the University of Michigan.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who has led the Bengals in sacks and been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his three seasons with the team. He signed with Cincinnati as a free agent in 2021, and in '23 posted a career-high 17.5 sacks which tied for second in the league and ranked second in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 58.0 sacks since the start of the 2020 season — his final year with the New Orleans Saints — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (66.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62.0). He has five sacks through six games this season, including two on QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City. Hendrickson recorded his 13th career multi-sack game in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, bringing down QB Daniel Jones twice for a combined loss of 15 yards. On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has recorded 37.5 career sacks, the third-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons, and his 58 total tackles in 2023 led all Bengals D-linemen. Hubbard has logged 25 total tackles through the first six games of this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, a three-yard takedown of QB Lamar Jackson in the first quarter, and a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone in the second quarter. It marked the Bengals' first safety since Week 13 of the 2019 season. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 43 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22 and all 17 regular-season games in '23. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 13 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 12 passes at the line of scrimmage. Hill opened the season with three tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, but he suffered a hamstring injury the following week at Kansas City that kept him out of the lineup for Weeks 3-4. He returned to action in Week 5 vs Baltimore and totaled five tackles, a QB hit and a PD. Hill is coming off a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and he also deflected a pass by QB Daniel Jones that led to LB Germaine Pratt's INT in the first quarter. Ninth-year veteran **Sheldon Rankins** returned to action in Week 6 after missing the previous three games due to a hamstring injury sustained in Week 2 at Kansas City. Rankins signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in March and has 112 games of NFL experience. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, he spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 29.5 career sacks and 43 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in his career, and included a career-high three on Nov. 12 at Paycor Stadium against the Bengals. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, he has played in 36 career regular-season games and totaled 41 tackles with 4.5

sacks. Ossai was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins missed the first two games of his rookie season due to a thumb injury, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. He made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' first drive of the game. He is coming off 39 defensive snaps played in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. Jenkins was a Michigan team captain and a second-team All-American last season, when he logged 37 tackles with 2.5 sacks and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has recorded five tackles in Weeks 5 and 6 after spending the first four games of the 2024 campaign on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last season, tallying 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinnley Jackson**, who also missed the first four contests with a knee injury, made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore and has seen action on 30 snaps over the past two games. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2024 out of Texas A&M, Jackson totaled 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks in 40 career games as an Aggie, and served as a captain for two seasons. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has been inactive for four games this season, but played a combined 34 defensive snaps in Weeks 3 and 4. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. DT **Lawrence Guy** added depth and a veteran presence to the D-line room when he signed with the Bengals as a free agent on Sept. 17. Guy is in his 14th NFL season and previously spent time with Indianapolis, the San Diego Chargers, Baltimore and New England. He played for the Patriots from 2017-23, logging 379 tackles and 10.5 sacks in that stint. He made his Bengals debut in Week 3 vs. Washington, and played a combined 76 defensive snaps in Weeks 3-5 (inactive for Week 6).

Linebackers: A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Logan Wilson** has developed into one of the NFL's top linebackers and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfitt had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. Wilson through six games this season ranks second in the NFL with 61 tackles. The team's starting LB tandem features Wilson and sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt**, who set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons. Pratt has a knack for forcing game-changing turnovers, and he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 77 of 85 career regular-season games played, and boasts a streak of 67 consecutive starts (including postseason). Pratt, who was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career, ranks eighth in the NFL with 58 tackles through six games. He posted a career-high 16 stops in Week 2 at Kansas City, and forced and recovered a fumble to set up a Bengals FG drive. He had his second FR of the year in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, when he scooped up a loose ball in overtime and returned it into Ravens territory. Pratt picked off a deflected ball at Cincinnati's three-yard for his first INT of 2024 in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. Also wearing the captains patch for the first time this season is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 60 games with four starts for the Bengals. He serves as a rotational LB and core special teamer, and battled through a knee injury last season to play in 13 games. Davis-Gaither saw action on 16 defensive snaps in Week 2 at Kansas City, and picked off QB Patrick Mahomes late in the first quarter for his second career INT (first since 2020). He also has lined up for a team-high 130 special teams snaps through six games this season. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 32 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 34 career tackles and one PD in 45 games

played. Among the most notable stories in Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27), and added two PDs. He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for 129 special teams snaps through six regular-season games.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzer with 11.5 career sacks. In 2023, he recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). He also had a pair of INTs and eight PDs last season. Hilton entered the league as a college free agent signee by Jacksonville in 2016 and was briefly on New England's practice squad before spending four-plus seasons with Pittsburgh. He has totaled 17 tackles in five games this season, missing Week 5 due to a knee injury. Hilton is coming off a season-best five stops in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and had a PD that shut down a Giants' fourth-down play on the opening drive of the second half. Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 27 of 28 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. He missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. He opened this season with six tackles (four solos) in Week 1 against New England, then grabbed his first INT of the year with a highlight-reel one-handed pick on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City. He has combined for 13 tackles and four PDs over the past two games against Baltimore and the N.Y. Giants. **DJ Turner II** is in his second pro season, after a rookie campaign in which he played in all 17 games and started 12 of the final 13 contests. A second-round draft choice last year, he ran the fastest 40-yard dash time among all players at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. Turner has 15 tackles and three PDs this season, and saw action on 78 defensive snaps in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants in his first start of the 2024 campaign. He helped secure the win against the Giants when he knocked down a fourth-down pass from the Bengals' 36-yard line late in the fourth quarter. Turner posted 50 stops and seven PDs as a rookie last season. The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice this year, **Josh Newton**, made the team out of training camp after posting nine tackles, two PDs and an INT in preseason. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of Newton after his name was called on the third day of the draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 68 tackles with 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to Texas Christian from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups and helped lead the team to the College Football Playoff National Championship game. Newton lined up for 11 defensive snaps in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and also has seen action on 77 special teams snaps through six games this season.

Safeties: Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 34 tackles through six games this season and has lined up for 394 of the team's 416 defensive snaps. Bell grabbed his first INT of the season against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 32-yard return following the pick set up Cincinnati's first TD of the game. It marked his eighth career INT and his first since Week 2 of 2023. One of the headliners of Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who emerged as a ball-hawking safety in his final season with Baltimore. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 broke out with an AFC-leading seven INTs (second in NFL). His seven picks included a streak of four consecutive games with an INT. Stone originally was a seventh-round pick of the Ravens in 2020. He has 30 tackles through six games with the Bengals, including seven in Week 6 at the N.Y.

Giants. **Jordan Battle** is in his second pro season, after starting seven straight games at safety to close out his rookie year in 2023. He ranked fifth on the team in tackles last season with 69, while also contributing an INT, five PDs and two sacks. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, he was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Battle had a pick-six in the preseason finale against Indianapolis, and has played 24 defensive snaps and 101 special teams snaps through six regular-season contests. He posted four tackles in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading five special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, he led the team with eight special teams stops last year despite missing the final 10 games. Anderson missed his entire rookie season due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Daijahn Anthony** made the Bengals' 53-man roster coming out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 10 defensive snaps and 93 special teams snaps through the first six games of this season. In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

Special teams: Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** has quickly become one of the top kickers in the NFL and a fan-favorite in Cincinnati. He ranks third on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (83.8 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history and the third-most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. McPherson's 28-yard FG midway through the second quarter in Week 3 vs. Washington marked his 100th career FG attempt, and his 84 made FGs to that point were the third-most in team history through a kicker's first 100 tries. McPherson inked a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 336 attempts in 41 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through six games leads the NFL in net punting average (47.3 net yards per punt; minimum 10 attempts) and ranks second in gross average (52.9). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (min. four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. His 52.0 net yards per punt also was the second-highest average in a game in team history. Rehkow had another strong showing in Week 6 at N.Y. Giants, punting six times for 278 yards (46.3 gross average). He has downed four punts inside opponents' 20-yard lines in each of the past two games, becoming the first Bengals punter to do so in back-to-back contests since Kevin Huber in 2012. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned the primary punt returner job early in his rookie season, and took command of that role in just his second game when he returned a punt 81 yards for a TD against the Baltimore Ravens. The play marked the Bengals' first TD on a PR since 2012, and was the 10th punt return TD by a rookie in team history (first since 2000). Jones has returned 10 punts this season for 60 yards, including a season-long 14-yard run in Week 6 at N.Y. Giants. Fifth-year WR **Trenton Irwin** had 10 of his 13 career punt returns last season. He averaged 9.8 yards per return in 2023, with two returns for over 20 yards in Week 5 at Arizona. Returning kickoffs this season are second-year HB **Chase Brown** and sixth-year vet HB Trayveon Williams. Brown is averaging 26.6 yards per return on seven attempts this season, with a long of 29 yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Williams served as the team's primary KOR over the past two-plus seasons and holds a career regular-season average of 22.5 yards on 33 returns.

Cleveland Browns 24, Cincinnati Bengals 3
Sunday, Sept. 10, 2023 at Cleveland Browns Stadium

Hindered by wet and rainy conditions, the Bengals were limited to three points and 142 offensive net yards in a season-opening loss to their in-state rival. The Cincinnati defense kept the game within reach, forcing two turnovers and holding the Browns to 13 points through three quarters, but Cleveland's strong rushing attack eventually broke through and finished the day with 206 yards, led by 106 from RB Nick Chubb. Browns QB Deshaun Watson found the end zone on a 13-yard run just before halftime to give the Browns a 10-0 lead at the break, but the Bengals responded with a 42-yard FG from K Evan McPherson early in the third quarter to cut the deficit to seven. A promising drive on Cincinnati's next offensive possession resulted in a missed FG attempt, and the offense did not reach Browns territory the rest of the way as Cleveland held the upper hand in the battle of field position. The Bengals went for it on fourth-and-four from their own 31-yard line with just over 10 minutes remaining in an attempt to jumpstart the offense, but QB Joe Burrow was dropped for a 13-yard sack and the Browns scored three plays later to seal the final outcome. The game was the 100th "Battle of Ohio" between the two teams.

The Bengals built a 24-0 halftime lead and cruised to a dominant home win in the regular-season finale. Cincinnati's defense held the Browns, who rested numerous starters with their playoff seeding solidified, to just 244 net yards while grabbing two INTs off QB Jeff Driskel in the first half. Offensively, the Bengals recorded 183 rushing yards, led by a 111-yard effort from HB Joe Mixon, who surpassed 1000 for the season. QB Jake Browning threw three TD passes, the first going to Mixon and the other two to rookie WR Andrei Iosivas. Iosivas' second TD capped off a season-long 99-yard scoring drive for the Bengals which lasted 14 plays and more than eight minutes in the third quarter. WR Ja'Marr Chase totaled four catches to reach 100 on the year, and DE Trey Hendrickson had a half-sack to post a final tally of 17.5, the second most in team single-season history. Cincinnati closed the regular season at 9-8, while Cleveland fell to 11-6.

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. Commanders rookie QB Jayden Daniels completed 91.3 percent of his passes (21 of 23), which set both an NFL rookie record and a Bengals opponent record for a single game (minimum 20 attempts). Bengals QB Joe Burrow finished with 324 passing yards and three TDs, including his 100th career TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase on the game's opening drive. The Bengals scored TDs to close out the first half and open the second half on the way to earning their first win of the season at Carolina.
