# CINCINNATI BENGALS (5-8) AT TENNESSEE TITANS (3-10)

### GAME INFORMATION

**Kickoff:** 1 p.m. Eastern.

**Television:** The game will air on FOX-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WXIX-TV (Ch. 19) in Cincinnati, WGRT-TV (Ch. 45) in Dayton and WDKY-TV (Ch. 56) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Kevin Kugler (play-by-play), Daryl Johnston (analyst) and Laura Okmin (sideline reporter).

**Radio:** The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

**Setting the scene:** The Bengals seek their second straight road win when they take on the Tennessee Titans at Nissan Stadium on Sunday.

Cincinnati is coming off a 27-20 victory at Dallas on Monday Night Football that snapped a three-game losing skid. The Bengals' offense took over possession with 1:53 remaining in a tie game, and marched down the field in three plays with WR Ja'Marr Chase's 40-yard TD turning out to be the game winner. The defense did not allow the Cowboys to cross midfield on each of their final three possessions, culminating in a fourth-down incompleting in the final minute that sealed the result.

"I'm so proud our guys for sticking together through a lot of adversity over the last month," said head coach Zac Taylor after the game. "We hadn't had this feeling in a while, so we're going to enjoy it for the four hours we get to enjoy it before we get back to work tomorrow and get ready for Tennessee. But again, proud of the guys. The way that they've responded with every practice, every rep, every meeting has been like a team that's in the mix, in the hunt — all the things we expected to do. So, glad that they were rewarded with this one tonight."

Leading the offensive effort in Dallas were once again Chase and QB Joe Burrow. Chase finished with a season-high 14 catches for 177 yards and two TDs, and in the process tied for the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach 5,000 career receiving yards (58 games). Burrow completed 33 of 44 passes for 369 yards and three TDs, becoming the sixth QB all-time to pass for at least 300 yards and three scores in four consecutive games.

Complementing the Bengals' top duo was second-year HB Chase Brown, who contributed 123 yards from scrimmage (58 rushing, 65 receiving) and scored his ninth total TD of the season. His performance helped him surpass 1000 scrimmage yards on the year, as he has a team-leading 735 rushing yards while adding 302 yards as a pass catching option out of the backfield.

"I think Chase is really emerging as a top back," Burrow said. "He's doing unbelievable stuff in the run game and the pass game, so his role is going to continue to evolve. We're going to keep getting him the ball more in a lot of different ways."

On the defensive side, the Bengals came through with timely plays to limit a Cowboys offense which had operated at a high level in its previous two games. Namely, S Geno Stone collected his second INT of the season to end a Dallas drive that reached Cincinnati's 12-yard line, DE Joseph Ossai had his third straight game with a sack, and DE Trey Hendrickson brought down QB Cooper Rush in the final minute to boost his league-leading sack total to 12.5.

While the Bengals enjoyed a victory that featured playmakers in all three phases, they now turn their attention to a Titans team that boasts one of the league's top defenses. Tennessee has held its opponents to just 175.5 net passing yards per game, the fewest in the NFL, while its 291.9 total yards

allowed per contest are the second-fewest.

"Happy that we got a win, but now it's a short week," Taylor said. "We're certainly not going to overlook the team that we're about to play. I've got a lot of respect for Tennessee, so we've got to turn the page very quickly and get ready for these guys."

The Bengals will see several familiar faces in Nashville, including Titans head coach Brian Callahan, who spent the past five seasons (2019-23) as Cincinnati's offensive coordinator. Tennessee WR Tyler Boyd was a key piece of the Bengals' offense for his first eight years in the league (2016-23), before joining the Titans as a free agent this past offseason, while their special teams coordinator Colt Anderson served as Cincinnati's assistant special teams coach from '20-23.

**The series:** The Bengals and Titans (formerly Oilers) have met 79 times (including postseason), making the Titans the third-most played foe in Bengals history. Cincinnati has played more games against only Pittsburgh (110) and Cleveland (102). The Bengals and Titans/Oilers were rivals in the old AFC Central Division, playing twice per year in the regular season from 1970-2001.

The series is a relatively even affair, with Tennessee leading 41-37-1 overall (regular season and postseason). The Titans lead 24-15-1 as the home team, and they lead the series 7-5 in games played in Tennessee since their relocation there in 1997. However, the Bengals have won seven of the past 10 meetings overall, and Cincinnati leads 4-3 in games played in Tennessee since parting ways as division opponents with NFL realignment in 2002.

The Bengals have won both postseason meetings between the two teams, 41-14 in a Wild Card Playoff at Cincinnati after the 1990 NFL season, and 19-16 in a Divisional Playoff at Tennessee after the 2021 season.

**Uniform watch:** The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks this week at Tennessee. It is the most frequently worn combination for Cincinnati over the past three-plus seasons, as the Bengals have featured it 16 times (regular season and postseason) and collected a 9-7 record in those games.

The Bengals sported this combination in each of their four road playoff games following the 2021 and '22 campaigns. Cincinnati earned three notable victories in those contests — at Tennessee (2021 Divisional), at Kansas City ('21 AFC Championship), and at Buffalo ('22 Divisional).

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and the recently introduced orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a

white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance was in Week 8 of this season against Philadelphia.

\* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

**Bengals career records watch:** As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at movement on the Bengals' individual career records lists (regular season) that has occurred this season, as well as potential upcoming movement:

- QB Joe Burrow in Week 10 at Baltimore surpassed QB Jeff Blake (2221) for the fifth-most passing attempts in Bengals history. Burrow's current attempts total of 2385 is 832 shy of QB Carson Palmer (3217) for the fourth-most. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449) and Boomer Esiason (3564) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history. Burrow's current passing yardage total of 17,789 is 4905 shy of Palmer (22,694) for the fourth-most. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594) and Esiason (27,149) hold the top three spots.

- Burrow has 24 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the second-most in team history behind Dalton (28). Burrow in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh surpassed Esiason (23).

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 44 receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh surpassed WR

Eddie Brown (41) for fifth.

- Chase in Week 14 at Dallas recorded his 18th game with 100 or more receiving yards, which tied WR Cris Collinsworth for the fifth-most in team history. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots for most 100-yard receiving games.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 52.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, seven shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

**Records vs. Titans:** In their long-standing series, both the Bengals and the Titans (formerly Oilers) have posted a number of record performances. The Bengals' records include:

- The Bengals record for points in a game was set in a 61-17 win at Houston on Dec. 17, 1972, and Cincinnati tied that mark 17 years to the day later in a 61-7 win vs. Houston on Dec. 17, 1989. In the 1972 win, the Bengals also set the team record for most points in a half, posting 45 second-half points. In the 1989 win, the team also matched the team record for most touchdowns in a game with eight.

- The Bengals record for victory margin (54) was set in the 61-7 win over Houston in 1989.

- Cincinnati scored a team-record five rushing TDs vs. Houston on Nov. 6, 1983. The Bengals have tied that mark twice since, including vs. the Oilers on Oct. 23, 1988.

- The Bengals' team record for first downs (35) was set vs. Houston on Dec. 17, 1989. It was later matched in an overtime game vs. Washington (at London, England) on Oct. 30, 2016.

- The Bengals' individual record for rushing TDs (four) in a game has been set twice, with the first of those against the Titans. The mark was first established by HB Corey Dillon vs. Tennessee on Dec. 4, 1997. Then in 2022, the mark was tied by HB Joe Mixon vs. Carolina on Nov. 6.

- On Dec. 17, 1972 in Houston, CB Lemar Parrish became the first Bengal to record three interceptions in a game. That mark has been matched seven times since, including by S David Fulcher, also against the Oilers, on Dec. 17, 1989. In the '72 contest, Parrish returned two of those INTs for TDs, which is the only instance in team history a Bengals defender has done so.

- On Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee, P Will Brice set a Bengals record for average yards per punt in a game (minimum three punts), with a 63.0-yard average (189 yards on three punts).

For the Titans/Oilers:

- On Oct. 14, 1990 at Houston, Oilers QB Warren Moon became the first passer to throw five TD passes against the Bengals. That record still stands, though it has been matched five times since, including again by Moon on Oct. 11, 1992 in Cincinnati.

- Twice against the Bengals, Oilers WR Haywood Jeffires matched an opponents' individual record for most receiving TDs against the Bengals with three. Opposing players have recorded three receiving TDs a total of eight times, and Jeffires is the only one who has done it twice — in consecutive seasons — on Oct. 11, 1992, and on Nov. 14, 1993. Both instances occurred in games played in Cincinnati.

**Individually vs. Titans:** Here are cumulative offensive statistics for current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Titans (ordered by total games played; includes postseason):

- QB Joe Burrow: Four games; 96 of 141 passing for 1032 yards, three TDs and one INT (93.5 rating); 17 rushes for 47 yards (2.8).

- WR Tee Higgins: Four games; 22 receptions for 307 yards (14.0) and one TD; Two rushes for six yards (3.0).

- HB Chris Evans (Reserve/Injured list): Three games; One rush for four yards.

- TE Drew Sample: Three games; One reception for minus-1 yard.

- HB Trayveon Williams: Three games; Three rushes for 22 yards (7.3); One reception for 24 yards.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Two games; 12 receptions for 182 yards (15.2); One rush for two yards.

- HB Chase Brown: One game; One reception for minus-3 yards.

- TE Tanner Hudson: One game; Two receptions for 18 yards (9.0).

**Call it the 'Breezer Bowl':** Though the game is not as well-known in Bengals lore as the famous "Freezer Bowl" AFC Championship Game of the 1981 season, the Titans' 2008 regular-season visit to Cincinnati perhaps should be remembered — with all due seriousness — as the "Breezer Bowl."

The wind speed at kickoff of the Titans' 24-7 win at Paul Brown Stadium (now named Paycor Stadium) on Sept. 14, 2008 was a somewhat notable 21 mph. However, it drastically increased very soon after kickoff. The remnants of Hurricane Ike combined with another strong weather system to produce a powerful windstorm by the end of the first quarter. The final three quarters were played in sustained winds of just over 70 mph, which nearly qualified as a Category 1 hurricane (defined as sustained winds of 74-95 mph). The Bengals and Titans managed only 127 and 118 passing yards, respectively, while food wrappers, paper cups and even pizza boxes swirled around the field.

Though the game was played without incident or other weather conditions such as rain, the windstorm was extremely dangerous and damaging outside the stadium. Five persons were killed by falling trees during the storm, which caused significant widespread damage to trees, homes and power utilities across southeast Missouri, southern Illinois, southern Indiana, western/northern Kentucky and southwestern Ohio. The storm left more than a million people in the Greater Cincinnati area without power, some for more than a month. It was the costliest natural disaster in the history of Ohio, with total damage estimates of nearly \$1.5 billion in the Buckeye State alone.

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Zac Taylor** was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP

Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator

and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TE's coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

**Brian Callahan** was named the 20th head coach in Titans franchise history on Jan. 24, 2024. He is in his 15th year as an NFL coach, in addition to two years as a college coach and two years as a high school coach.

Prior to joining the Titans, Callahan was the offensive coordinator for the Bengals from 2019-23. During his time in Cincinnati, he was part of two AFC

North titles, two AFC Championship Game appearances and a Super Bowl berth. He also helped guide quarterback Joe Burrow from the No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 to multiple single-season franchise records by his second year and Pro Bowl honors within three years. From 2021-23, the Bengals offense ranked in the NFL's top 10 in several categories, including sixth in scoring (24.9), seventh in passing (250.8 yards per game), seventh in red-zone efficiency (61.5 percent), 10th in third down percentage (41.0) and sixth in time of possession (31:00).

Callahan joined the Bengals after spending 2018 as the quarterbacks coach for the Oakland Raiders. Under his tutelage, Raiders quarterback Derek Carr passed for a then-career-high 4049 yards and led the AFC with a 68.9 completion percentage. From 2016-17, Callahan was the quarterbacks coach for the Detroit Lions. Working with Matthew Stafford, he helped the veteran finish third in passing yards (4446) in 2017, while posting a then-career-best 99.3 passer rating.

Callahan broke into the NFL with the Denver Broncos in 2010 and served in multiple roles for the franchise through '15, capped by the team's victory in Super Bowl 50.

Callahan attended De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif., where he was a part of the school's national-record 151-game winning streak and a No. 1 national ranking. As a walk-on QB at UCLA, he appeared in 13 games as a holder on PATs. He earned a bachelor's degree in sociology in 2006 and added a master's in education in '08. He spent time at UCLA as a graduate assistant (2006-07) and then spent two years ('08-09) as the offensive coordinator and QBs coach for Junipero Serra High School in San Mateo, Calif.

Callahan was born in Champaign, Ill. on June 10, 1984. He and his wife, Allyson, are the parents of son Ronan and daughter Norah. His father is longtime NFL coach Bill Callahan, the current offensive line coach with the Titans.

## BENGALS NOTES

**Bengals near 400th W:** The Bengals enter Week 15 with 399 all-time wins in the regular season, just one shy of 400. The team has won 240 games at home and 159 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly Paul Brown Stadium).

**2024 Bengals captains:** The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt is serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

**Red zone streak:** The Bengals have scored a touchdown or a field goal on 41 consecutive drives that reached their opponent's 20-yard line, dating back to the third quarter of Week 1 vs. New England. It is the longest active streak in the NFL, and the longest streak by the Bengals since they also scored on 41 straight red zone trips from Week 14 of the 2005 season through Week 10 of 2006.

Cincinnati has scored a TD on 69.0 percent of its red zone drives this season (29 of 42), the second-highest rate in the NFL behind Baltimore (75.0). With 41 total scores (29 TDs, 12 FGs) on 42 possessions, the Bengals' 97.6 red zone scoring percentage leads the league. Cincinnati is the only team this year to come away with zero points on one or fewer trips to the red zone.

**Top-ranked passing offense:** The Bengals this season are averaging an NFL-best 271.6 net passing yards per game. They have recorded 300 or more passing yards five times, including in three of the last four contests.

Cincinnati has finished a regular season with the league's best passing offense on one previous occasion, when it averaged 231.5 yards through the air in 1975. Bengals Ring of Honor QB Ken Anderson led the NFL that year in passing yards (3169) and passer rating (93.9).

The team record for passing yards per game is 265.0, set during the 2022 campaign. Cincinnati ranked fifth leaguewide in passing average that season, with QB Joe Burrow setting single-season team records for attempts (606), completions (414) and TD passes (35).

**Burrow joins elite company:** QB Joe Burrow has passed for at least 300 yards and three TDs in each of the Bengals' last four games, becoming the sixth QB in NFL history to reach those numbers in four straight contests.

Former San Francisco QB Steve Young logged 300-plus passing yards and three-plus TD passes in an NFL-record five consecutive games in 1998, while New Orleans QB Drew Brees (2011-12), Denver QB Peyton Manning ('12), Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers ('12-13) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes ('18) each did it in four straight.

Adding in Burrow's Week 9 performance against Las Vegas, when he threw for 251 yards and a career-high-tying five TDs, he has recorded at least three TD passes in each of his last five games. That ties for the fifth-most consecutive games with three or more passing scores in NFL history. It is the most such

games in a row since former Indianapolis QB Andrew Luck went eight straight contests from Weeks 4-12 of the 2018 season.

Burrow's 18 total TD passes since Week 9 are the most in a span of five games in Bengals history. It also marks the most in a five-game stretch by any NFL QB since former Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady had 19 from Week 15 of the 2020 season through Week 2 of the '21 campaign.

The recent surge for Burrow has boosted him to 23 career games with three or more TD passes. That is the third-most such games in NFL history within a player's first five seasons, trailing only Mahomes (28) and former Miami QB Dan Marino (33).

**Burrow reaches 125:** QB Joe Burrow threw his 125th career TD pass (regular season) in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, when he found WR Ja'Marr Chase in the back of the end zone during the second quarter. Playing in his 64th game, Burrow became the third-fastest QB in NFL history to record 125 TD passes. The only players to reach that mark in fewer games are Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (50) and former Miami QB Dan Marino (54).

Burrow threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, before breaking out with a then-team-record 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By besting his record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

Burrow leads the NFL with 33 TD passes this season, which include a career-high five passing scores in two games — Week 5 vs. Baltimore and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He is the first NFL QB to pass for five or more TDs in multiple games in a season since Mahomes and former Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady each had two such games in 2021. Burrow is the fourth player in league history to record 30 or more TD passes in three of his first five seasons, joining Marino, Mahomes and Buffalo QB Josh Allen.

**Joe masters the deep ball:** QB Joe Burrow's 40-yard TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 14 at Dallas marked his 28th career scoring pass of 40 or more yards — the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020. It also tied Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning for the most such TD passes in a player's first five seasons among all QBs whose career began after 1990.

Burrow additionally leads the NFL in TD passes of 50 or more yards (18) and 60 or more yards (14) since 2020. Of his league-high nine TD passes of 40-plus yards this season, seven have gone to WR Ja'Marr Chase. The duo connected on two long scoring passes in Week 10 at Baltimore — a 67-yarder early in the third quarter and a 70-yarder midway through the fourth. The 70-yard bomb tied for the third-longest TD pass of Burrow's career, behind an 82-yarder to Chase in Week 7 of the 2021 season and a 72-yarder to Chase in Week 17 of that year.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22 and two in '23.

**No. 9 hits 15K:** QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone.

Burrow's current career total of 17,789 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least five fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Burrow leads the NFL with 3706 passing yards through 14 weeks this season. He has six career games with 400 or more passing yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for second-most leaguewide since 2020.

**Burrow makes history:** In the Bengals' Week 10 and Week 11 contests, Joe Burrow became the first QB in NFL history to record at least 50 passing attempts, 350 passing yards and three TD passes with zero INTs in consecutive games.

In Week 10 at Baltimore, Burrow posted season highs in attempts (56), completions (34) and yards (428) while throwing four TDs. His 56 attempts were the second-most in a game in his career, trailing a career-high 61 in Week 2 of his 2020 rookie season at Cleveland. His 428 passing yards were the fourth-most he has ever thrown and marked his sixth career game with more than 400.

Burrow's performance against the Ravens also was just the eighth time in NFL history in which a QB had at least 50 attempts, 400 passing yards and four TD passes with no INTs.

Burrow followed up by going 28 of 50 for 356 yards and three TDs in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. Each of his three TD passes and 245 of his passing yards came in the second half as he helped Cincinnati climb back from a 21-point deficit to tie the game.

**Burrow on the mark:** QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.050, he ranks second in NFL history in the category, narrowly trailing Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (68.059).

Burrow leads the NFL this season in passing attempts (490) and completions (335). He surpassed 2000 career attempts in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark were the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 throws behind former San Diego Chargers QB Brees (1444).

In Week 14 at Dallas, Burrow went 33 of 44 (75.0 percent), marking his 22nd career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts. That surpassed Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21) for the most such games within a player's first five seasons in NFL history.

In Week 9 against Las Vegas, Burrow recorded his 1500th career completion in what was his 61st regular-season game. That marked the second-fewest games in NFL history to reach 1500 completions, trailing only L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (57).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; min. 14 att./game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414).

**More Burrow since '21:** Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is the only NFL QB with at least 1000 completions, 100 TD

passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.7; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking second in completion percentage (68.6), third in TD passes (117), fifth in passing yards (15,101), fifth in completions (1359) and seventh in yards per attempt (7.62).

**Chasing history:** WR Ja'Marr Chase leads the NFL this season in receptions (93), receiving yards (1319) and receiving TDs (15). Should he hold the lead in each of those categories through the final four weeks of the regular season, he would become the 17th player in league history to claim the "Triple Crown." The last player to earn the elusive honor was L.A. Rams WR Cooper Kupp, who paced the NFL with 145 receptions, 1947 yards and 16 TDs in 2021.

Chase's career-high 15 receiving TDs are two shy of the Bengals single-season record (17), set by former WR Carl Pickens in 1995. Chase has scored eight TDs over the past four games, the most in a four-game stretch in team history and the most by any NFL player in a span of four games since former Kansas City WR Tyreek Hill also had eight from Weeks 8-12 of the 2020 season.

Chase also has 44 career receiving TDs (regular season), the fourth-most in NFL history within a player's first four seasons. Only Pro Football Hall of Famers Randy Moss (53), Jerry Rice (49) and Bob Hayes (45) had more in their first four years.

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 86.83 receiving yards per game (58 regular-season games). That is the second-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only his former Louisiana State teammate and current Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (96.84).

Chase recorded his 80th reception of the season on the opening play from scrimmage in Week 14 at Dallas. He became the first player in league history to post at least 80 catches, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first four career seasons.

Chase finished the Cowboys game with 14 grabs for 177 yards and two TDs. It marked his third game this season with at least 175 receiving yards and two TDs, which tied former St. Louis Cardinals WR Roy Green (1984) for the most such games in a single season in NFL history. Week 14 also was Chase's ninth career game with at least 10 catches, 100 yards and one TD. That matched Chad Johnson for the most such stat lines in a career in Bengals history, and is one shy of former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (10) for the most such games within a player's first four seasons.

**5K for Uno:** WR Ja'Marr Chase's 40-yard TD late in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas was significant not only because of its timing in the game. Chase also surpassed 5000 career receiving yards during the play, and by doing so in his 58th regular-season game, he tied former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas as the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone.

The only players who have eclipsed 5000 receiving yards in fewer games are former San Diego Chargers WR Lance Alworth (52 games), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (52), former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (54), and former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (56). Chase opened his career with a Bengals single-season record 1455 receiving yards in his 2021 rookie campaign, then followed up with 1046 in 12 games played in '22. His 1216 receiving yards in 2023 included five games with 100 or more, which tied for the second-most such games in a season in team history.

In Week 11 of this season at the L.A. Chargers, Chase became the sixth player in league history to reach 1000 receiving yards in each of his first four years. He joined former Minnesota WR Randy Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green, Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans, Michael Thomas and Justin Jefferson.

**Other Chase milestones in '24:** In addition to his 5000 receiving yards, WR Ja'Marr Chase has hit several other career milestones during the 2024 campaign.

The Week 5 contest against Baltimore was Chase's 50th regular-season game played. His 4210 receiving yards following that game went in as the fifth-most in NFL history through a player's first 50 games, while his 297 receptions in

that span ranked as the ninth-most ever. He also became just the fifth player in the Super Bowl era (since 1966) to record at least 4000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs in his first 50 games.

In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, Chase recorded his 300th career reception in what was his 51st game. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that mark, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and tied for the eighth-fastest in NFL history.

Chase caught his 40th career receiving TD in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers. Playing in his 56th game, he became the fastest player in Bengals history and eighth-fastest in league history to reach that total.

**On the Chase:** WR Ja'Marr Chase has 12 career receiving TDs of 60 or more yards, five more than any other player since he entered the league in 2021 (regular season). It also is the most in a career in Bengals history, ahead of former WR Isaac Curtis (10), and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (13) and 40-plus yards (18) since 2021. His most recent 40-yarder was a catch-and-run to the end zone late in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas, which proved to be the game winner in a 27-20 result.

In Week 10 at Baltimore, Chase scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards, becoming the first NFL player this season with two scores of 65-plus yards in a game.

Earlier this season, Chase had a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yard score in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He became the first NFL player to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games since former Dallas WR Terrell Owens in 2007.

**Ja'Marr shines against Baltimore:** WR Ja'Marr Chase caught 10 passes for 193 yards and two TDs in the Bengals' first matchup against the Ravens this season in Week 5, then followed up with 11 grabs for 264 yards and three scores in the Week 10 Thursday Night Football contest at Baltimore. His combined 457 receiving yards are the most in NFL history for one player against a single opponent in a season, surpassing former Raiders WR Art Powell's 428 yards against the Houston Oilers in 1963.

Chase's Week 10 performance is the highest single-game receiving yardage total by any NFL player this season, while his Week 5 output ranks third. Cleveland WR Jerry Jeudy's 235 yards in Week 13 are the second-most.

Combining his Week 10 effort with a Bengals-record 266 yards and three scores in Week 17 of the 2021 season against Kansas City, Chase is the first player in NFL history to record 250 or more receiving yards and three or more receiving TDs in multiple games in his career. He also is the first player ever to notch 260 or more receiving yards more than once.

Chase's 264 receiving yards in Week 10 also are the second-most in an NFL game played on a Thursday, behind Cleveland Rams receiver Jim Benton's 303 yards on Thursday, Nov. 22, 1945.

Chase now has four career games with at least 10 catches, 150 yards and two TDs — the most in NFL history within a player's first four seasons.

**Tee time:** WR Tee Higgins has been inactive for five games this season due to injuries (Weeks 1-2, Weeks 8-10), but in his eight games played he has proven to be one of the NFL's most productive pass catchers.

From Weeks 3-7, Higgins tied for seventh leaguewide in receptions (29), tied for eighth in receiving TDs (three) and ranked 10th in receiving yards (341). He returned to action in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers following a three-game hiatus and caught nine passes for a season-high 148 yards and a TD. His scoring catch was a 42-yarder on a fourth-down play late in the third quarter, which marked his longest reception since he had an 80-yard TD at Pittsburgh in Week 16 of last season. The Chargers game also was Higgins' 13th career 100-yard receiving performance.

Higgins followed up his showing in L.A. with five grabs for 69 yards and a TD in Week 13 against the Steelers. Each of his four non-touchdown catches resulted in a first down for Cincinnati, highlighted by a 31-yarder to convert a third-and-21 during a FG drive in the third quarter.

Higgins finished the Steelers game with 300 career receptions. Playing in his

65th regular-season game, he tied former WR Tyler Boyd for the fourth-fastest player in team history to reach 300 catches. He previously surpassed 4000 career receiving yards in Week 7 of this season at Cleveland, becoming the fifth-fastest Bengal ever to do so (63 games).

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 25 leaguewide in receiving yards (21st; 4283) and receiving TDs (T-19th; 29). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

**Holiday Higgins:** WR Tee Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 13 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (11), eighth in receiving yards (1320), 13th in yards per reception (15.5) and 15th in total receptions (85) during the calendar's final month.

Higgins' single-game career high both for receptions (12) and receiving yards (194) came on Dec. 26, 2021, in a home win over Baltimore. He had two TDs that day, the first of which was set up by a 52-yard Higgins catch earlier in the drive. Previously in that same month, he caught nine passes for 138 yards and a TD on Dec. 5, 2021 against the L.A. Chargers.

Higgins' top statistical performance of last season occurred in Week 16 at Pittsburgh on Dec. 23, when he hauled in five catches for 140 yards and a TD. His 28.0 yards per reception were the second-most in any game of his career, and included a career-long 80-yard TD in the third quarter.

Higgins' notable production late in the year also has carried beyond December, as he ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457). He has two 100-yard receiving performances in the postseason, with 103 in the AFC Championship at Kansas City following the 2021 season and 100 two weeks later in Super Bowl LVI.

**Trey's torrid pace:** DE Trey Hendrickson boosted his season sack total to 12.5 in Week 14 at Dallas, as he brought down QB Cooper Rush for an eight-yard loss to force a third-and-15 in the game's final minute. His 12.5 sacks lead the NFL through 14 weeks of regular-season play.

With this season's tally following up his career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023, Hendrickson is the first Bengals player to record double-digit sacks in consecutive years since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980 and '81.

Since signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, Hendrickson has 52.0 sacks, the third-most in the NFL in that span behind Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (57.0) and Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (56.5). He has 11 multi-sack games as a member of the Bengals, tied for the third-most leaguewide since 2021.

Hendrickson has led Cincinnati in sacks and been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his three full seasons with the team (2021-23). He logged 14.0 sacks in his debut Bengals season in 2021, which ranked fifth in the NFL, then followed up with eight more in '22. His career-high 17.5 sacks last year tied for second in the NFL and ranked second in Bengals single-season history, trailing only DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson recorded two sacks in back-to-back games earlier this season (Weeks 6-7), becoming the first Cincinnati player to do so since former DE Antwan Odom in Weeks 1-2 of the 2009 campaign.

The Florida Atlantic University product spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with New Orleans, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL.

Hendrickson's production for the Bengals was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

**Hendrickson wrecks the Raiders:** DE Trey Hendrickson earned his second career AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor in Week 9, when he recorded a career-high four sacks in the win over Las Vegas. It marked the second-most sacks in any NFL game this season behind Detroit DL Aidan Hutchinson's 4.5 in Week 2 against Tampa Bay.

Hendrickson became the fourth player in Bengals history to record four or more sacks in a game, and the first since former DE Antwan Odom had five on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay. Odom's total is tied for the team single-game record with former DE/DT Eddie Edwards, who notched five sacks on Dec. 21, 1980 against Cleveland.

Three of Hendrickson's four sacks against the Raiders came during the fourth quarter, including a strip-sack that led to a recovery by Bengals LB Logan Wilson. The play marked Hendrickson's 10th forced fumble since joining the Bengals during the 2021 offseason, which are tied for the second-most in the NFL in that span.

Hendrickson's previous single-game high for sacks was 2.5, which he recorded twice — in Week 3 of the 2022 season at the N.Y. Jets, and in Week 5 of '23 at Arizona.

**Pratt stuffs the stat sheet:** LB Germaine Pratt's 117 total tackles this season lead the Bengals and are tied for ninth-most in the NFL. He enters Week 15 one tackle away from his career high of 118 recorded last year.

Pratt also has contributed to three takeaways this season, beginning with a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City that led to a Bengals FG drive. He scooped up another loose ball in overtime of Week 5 vs. Baltimore to set up Cincinnati's offense inside Ravens territory, then in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants grabbed his first INT of the year to end a drive that reached the Bengals' 14-yard line.

Pratt has recorded double-digit tackles in 14 games in his career, including three this season. He notched a career-high 16 stops in the Week 2 contest against the Chiefs, then had 13 in both Week 7 at Cleveland and Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh.

Since the start of the 2021 season, Pratt is one of three players leaguewide with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs, alongside Dallas CB Jourdan Lewis and Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr.

**Rehkwow's record debut:** Rookie P Ryan Rehkwow kicked off his career with a bang in Week 1 vs. New England, as he punted four times for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards (189 on three punts) on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkwow's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went

officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers).

Through 14 weeks of regular-season play, Rehkov has amassed 44 punts for 2168 yards, with 21 downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line compared to five touchbacks. His 49.3 gross punting average ranks 11th in the NFL, while his 42.9 net average ranks 10th.

In Weeks 5-7, Rehkov became the first punter in Bengals history to have four punts downed inside the 20-yard line in three consecutive games. He totaled season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkov signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

**Pro Bowl three-peats:** WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 which tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

**Three listed on "Top 100":** For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

**The Jungle is jammin':** The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 22 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022

campaign, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 13 highest-attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest announced crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15.

Cincinnati's game against Philadelphia in Week 8 of this season had an announced attendance figure of 67,239, which now stands as the second-largest in team history. The Bengals' 2023 Week 9 victory over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football (66,965) ranks as the third-largest, and the following week's game vs. Houston (66,526) is the fourth-largest. The fifth-largest figure in team history is 66,399 for the Bengals' Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore in January of 2023.

**Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor:** The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor this season in former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the ROH during a ceremony in the Week 3 game vs. Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

**Bengal bites:** The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.4 years ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals roster is DE Sam Hubbard, who is in his seventh season with the team ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 31 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is OT Amarius Mims, who is 22 (born Oct. 14, 2002) ... Mims and OT Orlando Brown Jr. are tied for both the heaviest player on the roster at 350 pounds and the tallest player on the roster at 6-8 ... The lightest player on the roster is CB Mike Hilton, who is listed at 184 pounds ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

## POSITION BY POSITION

**Quarterbacks:** Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). Through 14 weeks this season, Burrow leads the league in passing attempts (490), completions (335), passing yards (3706) and TD passes (33), while ranking fourth in passer rating (107.9). He recently became the sixth QB in NFL history to record at least 300 passing yards and three TD passes in four consecutive games, with the most recent such stat line coming in Week 14 at Dallas. Burrow completed 33 of 44 passes for 369 yards and three TDs with an INT against the Cowboys, good for a passer rating of 112.8. He has 18 TD passes over Cincinnati's last five games, the most in a five-game stretch in team history. Burrow also has moved closer to several Bengals career records this season, as he surpassed former QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most passing attempts and fifth-most passing yards in team history. In Week 6 at

the N.Y. Giants, he capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a quarterback in team history, a 47-yarder to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time in 2023, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Browning has seen action in two games this season, taking late snaps to close out Week 8 vs. Philadelphia and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas.



**Running backs:** Second-year HB **Chase Brown** recently reached 1000 scrimmage yards for the first time in his career, as he leads the Bengals this season with 735 rushing yards on 166 attempts and has contributed 302 receiving yards on 44 catches. Each of his nine total TDs on the year (six rushing, three receiving) have come since Week 4, which are tied for the fifth-most among all NFL running backs in that span. He is coming off a 123-yard performance in Week 14 at Dallas, as he ran 14 times for 58 yards while catching six passes for 65 yards and a TD. It marked his fourth game this season with over 100 yards from scrimmage. Brown enjoyed perhaps his best day as a pro in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, when he set career highs in rushing attempts (27), rushing yards (120) and scrimmage yards (137). Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, he is averaging 4.4 yards per carry and has a team-best 18 runs of 10-plus yards. He entered the league as Cincinnati's fifth-round draft pick in 2023 missed four games during his rookie campaign due to an injury, but returned to post 322 scrimmage yards over the final six contests. The Bengals acquired HB **Khalil Herbert** in a trade with Chicago on Nov. 5. A fourth-year pro, Herbert played in 48 regular-season games (12 starts) for the Bears and served as a versatile back. He logged 1791 rushing yards and 291 receiving yards in his Chicago tenure, while also returning 33 kickoffs with a 25.0-yard average. He took his first carry as a Bengal for 14 yards in Week 13 against Pittsburgh, then followed up with two more rushes in Week 14 at Dallas. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in the latter half of 2022 and all of '23. Offensively, he has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, and caught 15 passes for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average), and he played seven offensive snaps in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas as an extra pass protector.

**Wide Receivers:** The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, leads the NFL this season in receptions (93), receiving yards (1319) and receiving TDs (15). He paced Cincinnati in all three of those categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons, and he is one of six players in league history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns. A constant downfield threat, Chase also has the NFL's most TD catches of 40 or more yards (18), 50 or more yards (13) and 60 or more yards (12) since he entered the league in 2021. He had a season-high 14 catches for 177 yards and two TDs in Week 14 at Dallas, highlighted by a 40-yard game-winning score with just over a minute remaining. During the Dallas game, Chase surpassed 5000 career receiving yards in what was his 58th regular-season contest, which tied him with former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas for the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. He also is the first player ever to post at least 80 receptions, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first four seasons. Chase has four 100-yard receiving games on the year, highlighted by a 264-yard, three-TD performance in Week 10 at Baltimore. Higgins ranks second on the team this season in catches (45) and receiving yards (581), while tying for second in receiving TDs (five). He has missed five games due to injuries, but has played in the past three contests and provides Burrow with a secondary threat on the outside. He made his return from a three-game absence in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers and posted a season-high 148 yards and a TD on nine receptions, then followed up with five grabs for 69 yards and another score in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Higgins recorded his 300th career reception during the Steelers contest, tying for the fourth-fastest player in team history to reach that mark (65 games). Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, he has earned a reputation for being able to high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then posted 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andrei Iosivas** has contributed key plays in all areas of the field early in his career, but his most notable work comes in the low red zone. Each of his nine career receiving TDs have come on passes from inside the opponent's 10-yard line. He has five scoring grabs this season, with the most recent being a three-yarder from Burrow late in the fourth quarter of Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. Fellow 2023 draftee **Charlie Jones** has primarily contributed as a punt and kickoff returner, but he also has eight career receptions for 69 yards as a reserve

WR. He has missed the past five games due to a groin injury, after suiting up in each of the first eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals selected **Jermaine Burton** in the third round of the 2024 draft, adding a proven downfield threat at the college level. Burton has played in 11 games as a rookie this season and made his first career start in Week 10 at Baltimore. His first two career receptions both went for over 40 yards — a 47-yarder in Week 2 at Kansas City and a 41-yarder in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia. He also came through with a clutch grab to convert a third down in the road game against the Ravens. He spent the first two seasons of his collegiate career (2020-21) at the University of Georgia, then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two years. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while pacing the Southeastern Conference in yards per reception (20.5). Burton led the NFL this past preseason with 157 receiving yards. Cincinnati added depth to the receiver room when it acquired **Isaiah Williams** on waivers from Detroit on Nov. 8. A rookie out of the University of Illinois, Williams originally signed with the Lions as a college free agent in May and played in two games earlier this season, totaling two catches for six yards while returning one kickoff for 36 yards. He earned first-team All-Big 10 honors last season at Illinois, when he led the conference during the regular season with 82 receptions and ranked second with 1055 receiving yards. Williams lined up for four offensive snaps and returned four punts for 25 yards in Week 14 at Dallas.

**Tight ends:** A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 74 career games (46 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of last season, and has started 19 of his last 22 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 93 career receptions for 693 yards and four TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample caught four passes for 14 yards in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, including a two-yard TD reception on a third-and-goal play in the second half. The Bengals brought in a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last year. He has played in all 13 games in his debut Bengals season (three starts), and leads the team's tight ends in catches (42), receiving yards (460) and receiving TDs (two). He recorded his 300th career reception in Week 14 at Dallas, and enjoyed perhaps his best day in stripes during the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, as he caught five passes for 100 yards and his first two TDs of the year. His second TD, a 47-yarder to help seal the win in the fourth quarter, was the second-longest reception of his career. That performance also marked his first 100-yard receiving game since Week 6 of the 2021 season. Gesicki played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted seven catches for 91 yards, then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, he challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. He topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** scored his first TD of the season in Week 10 at Baltimore, bringing in a three-yard pass to give Cincinnati the lead just before halftime. He tied his career high with six receptions against the Ravens, and his 42 yards were the fifth-most in a game in his career. He played in his 50th career game in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and had two catches for 14 yards, including an 11-yarder to convert a fourth down on the Bengals' first possession. Hudson began the 2023 campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster in November of last year and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in receptions (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played in 2023, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals selected **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round of this year's draft. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He has been inactive for each of the first 13 regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown. Fellow rookie **Cam Grandy** spent the first 10 weeks of the regular season on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster on Nov. 15. He made his NFL debut as a practice squad elevation in Week 10 at Baltimore and recorded his first career reception (no gain). He has started each of the last two games and played a combined 26 offensive snaps in those

contests. A product of Illinois State University, Grandy led all Missouri Valley Football Conference TEs with 63 catches for 612 yards and three TDs in 2023. He spent his first five collegiate seasons at Missouri Western State University.

**Offensive linemen:** The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 49 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 3224 of a possible 3243 offensive snaps in that time (99.4 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. This season's Man of the Year nominee for the Bengals is OT **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who in addition to serving as the team's left tackle has partnered with Breakthrough T1D, the leading global type 1 diabetes research organization. Brown was perhaps the biggest free agent splash in recent years for Cincinnati, as he signed with the Bengals in 2023 following four straight Pro Bowl selections from '19-22. He spent his first three pro seasons (2018-20) with Baltimore, then played two years ('21-22) with Kansas City. He started 25 straight games to begin his Bengals career, but has missed four contests this season (Weeks 9-11, Week 14) due to knee and fibula injuries. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. G **Cody Ford** has started each of the last five games, with four coming at LOT (Weeks 9-11, Week 14) and one at LG (Week 13). A sixth-year pro out of the University of Oklahoma, he has played in 79 career games with 39 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, nine at LG, two as a third TE and four at LOT. Ford signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and played in all 17 games last season, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He was inactive for Cincinnati's first two regular-season games due to a pectoral injury sustained during preseason, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 and has started each of the past 10 contests. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. **Cordell Volson** has started 48 out of 49 possible games (including postseason) at LG to begin his Bengals career. A 2022 fourth-round pick of Cincinnati, he has lined up for every offensive snap in games that he started. He has settled in at LG as a pro, after playing guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals' final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft was seventh-round C **Matt Lee**. Lee played in 51 games during his college career, spending his first four years (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He earned second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16). Lee has contributed primarily on special teams through 13 games this season, but he also has lined up for 14 offensive snaps over the past seven contests. A recent addition to the O-Line is OT **Devin Cochran**, who was signed to the active roster on Nov. 29. Cochran spent the first 12 weeks of this season on Cincinnati's practice squad, jumping to the active roster as a standard elevation for Games 9-11. He joined the team's practice squad in 2022, then missed the entire '23 season with a knee injury. He started all 44 games of his college career at LOT, playing four years at Vanderbilt University before spending his final season at Georgia Tech. OT **Andrew Stueber** has appeared in five games as a Bengal this season after he was signed off Atlanta's practice squad on Oct. 8. A seventh-round pick out of New England in 2022, he spent his rookie season on

the Reserve/Non-Football injury list, then was on the Patriots' practice squad in '23. He played in 34 games with 22 starts (20 at ROT, two at RG) during a five-year career (2017-21) at the University of Michigan.

**Defensive linemen:** Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who currently leads the NFL with 12.5 sacks through 14 weeks of regular-season play. He posted a career-high four sacks in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, which tied for the third-most in a game in team history and was the most since former DE Antwan Odom in 2009. A 2021 free agency acquisition of the Bengals, Hendrickson led the team in sacks and earned a Pro Bowl nod in each of his three full seasons in Cincinnati. He posted a career-high 17.5 sacks last year, which tied for second in the league and went in as the second-most in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 65.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — his final season with New Orleans — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (71.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (69.0). On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has 38.5 career sacks, the fourth-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons. He has 40 total tackles through 13 games this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, and then a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone. He grabbed his first career INT and logged his second sack of the season in Week 7 at Cleveland. Hubbard played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 10 at Baltimore. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 50 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 15 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 13 passes at the line of scrimmage. He sustained a hamstring injury in Week 2 at Kansas City that caused him to miss the next two games, but he returned to action in Week 5 and has started each of the past nine contests. Hill posted a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and he also deflected a pass by QB Daniel Jones that led to LB Germaine Pratt's INT in the first quarter. He has tallied his first two sacks of the season in the Bengals' two most recent games. Ninth-year veteran DT **Sheldon Rankins** has played in seven games (all starts) in his first Bengals season, after joining the team as an unrestricted free agent during the spring. He has been inactive for the past three contests with an illness and missed Weeks 3-5 due to a hamstring injury, but when healthy has contributed 18 tackles with one sack. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, Rankins spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 30.5 career sacks and 44 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in any season of his career. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. He notched his third straight game with a sack in Week 14 at Dallas, as he brought down QB Cooper Rush for an eight-yard loss to force a Cowboys punt late in the first half. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, Ossai has played in 43 career regular-season games and totaled 58 tackles with 7.5 sacks. He was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins recorded his first NFL sack in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, and set a season-high with six tackles in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He missed the first two games of the season due to a thumb injury, then made his pro debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. He made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' game-opening drive. Jenkins was a team captain at Michigan and earned second-team All-America honors last season, while helping lead the Wolverines to a national championship. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has recorded 19 tackles and a PD in nine games played this season, after spending the first four weeks on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last year, tallying 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons (2020-22) at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinnley Jackson**, who also missed the first four contests of this season with a knee injury, made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He has seen action on 158 defensive snaps over the past nine games and has seven tackles. Jackson made his first career start

in Week 14 at Dallas and matched his season high with three tackles. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2024 out of Texas A&M, Jackson totaled 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks in 40 career games as an Aggie, and served as a captain in two seasons. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has seen action in six games as a rookie, with a season-high 13 defensive snaps played in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention.

**Linebackers:** Sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt** has set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons and has a knack for creating game-changing takeaways. Since the start of the 2021 season, he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Dallas CB Jourdan Lewis and Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 84 of 92 career regular-season games played, with a current streak of 74 consecutive starts (including postseason). His 117 total tackles through 14 weeks this season rank tied for ninth league-wide, and he has contributed to three takeaways with a pair of fumble recoveries and an INT. Pratt was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career. Also wearing a captain's patch for the first time this year is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 67 games with seven starts for the Bengals. His primary role historically has been on special teams, but he has started each of the last two contests at LB with Logan Wilson placed on Reserve/Injured. Davis-Gaither has a career-high 40 tackles on the year, with two TFLs, and has added three PDs and an INT. He picked off Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City for his second career regular-season INT (first since 2020). He tied his career high with 13 tackles in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, then had a team-leading eight stops in Week 14 at Dallas. Davis-Gaither also has lined up for 290 special teams snaps through 13 games and has five ST tackles. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 38 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 37 career tackles and one PD in 51 games played. He missed the Week 11 contest at the L.A. Chargers due to a hip injury, then sustained a groin injury in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas and did not return to action. Among the most notable stories on Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27). He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for a team-high 298 special teams snaps through 13 regular-season games, and recovered a blocked punt in Week 14 at Dallas that put Cincinnati in position to score the game-winning TD. He also has three defensive tackles, with two solo stops coming in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. The most recent addition to the defense is LB **Shaka Heyward**, who was signed off the team's practice squad on Dec. 2. Heyward spent all of his 2023 rookie campaign and the first 13 weeks of this season on Cincinnati's practice squad. He was elevated to the active roster for the team's Week 11 game at the L.A. Chargers and lined up for 24 special teams snaps. Heyward signed with the Bengals as a college free agent during the 2023 offseason, following a five-year career ('18-22) at Duke University.

**Cornerbacks:** Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, established himself as one of the NFL's top slot corners over his first three seasons in stripes. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzing with 11.5 career sacks. He has 50 total tackles in 12 games played this season (inactive for Week 5 due to knee injury). He recorded five stops in the Week 6 win at the N.Y. Giants and broke up a pass on a crucial fourth-down play early in the second half. He had seven tackles in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, which included a career-high-tying three TFLs. In 2023, Hilton recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 34 of 35 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams'

No. 1 WRs. His 13 PDs this season lead the team and are tied for third in the NFL, and he also has contributed 58 tackles and two INTs. His picks include a highlight-reel one-handed grab on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City, and a 51-yard pick-six to give Cincinnati a first-quarter lead in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Taylor-Britt missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. The Bengals selected **Josh Newton** in the fifth round of this year's draft, and the rookie earned a spot on the 53-man roster after impressing coaches during training camp and preseason. He has played in all 13 regular-season games, and made his first career start in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. In addition to his 12 defensive tackles and three PDs, Newton has lined up for 182 special teams snaps and recorded two ST tackles. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to TCU from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups. Second-year pro **DJ Ivey** made his season debut in Week 7 at Cleveland, after spending the first six games on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury. He sustained the injury in Week 15 of the 2023 campaign against Minnesota, ending a promising rookie campaign in which he carved out a role as a special teams contributor and reserve defensive back. A 2023 seventh-round pick out of the University of Miami (Fla.), Ivey earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and played in eight games last season. The most recent addition to the secondary is fourth-year pro **Marco Wilson**, who the Bengals acquired on waivers from New England on Nov. 19. He made his Bengals debut in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh and played one defensive snap, then saw an increased role with 12 defensive snaps and 10 special teams snaps in Week 14 at Dallas. A fourth-round draft pick of Arizona in 2021, Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons ('21-23) with the Cardinals before being waived and acquired by the Patriots last December. He suited up for 10 games with New England earlier this season, logging 15 tackles and a PD. In 56 total regular-season games (37 starts), he has recorded 175 tackles, 19 PDs, three INTs and three FFs.

**Safeties:** Among the notable additions in Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who recorded an AFC-leading seven INTs in his final season with Baltimore in '23. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 started 11 contests. He has already surpassed that total with 13 starts in his debut Bengals season, and his 70 tackles rank third on the team. He recorded a season-best nine stops in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, and contributed to a game-altering play early in the fourth quarter when he recovered a fumble deep in Bengals territory to set up a game-tying TD drive. He recorded his first INT as a Bengal in Week 7 at Cleveland, and most recently came up with his second pick in Week 14 at Dallas on a deflected pass to end a Cowboys drive in the red zone. Second-year pro **Jordan Battle** has started each of the past two games, after beginning the season as a reserve safety. Of his 40 tackles this year, 24 have come over the past five games, including a season-best 10 stops in Week 10 at Baltimore. He started seven contests as a rookie last season and ranked fifth on the team with 69 tackles. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 48 tackles through 13 games this season, and grabbed his first INT of the season (eighth of career) against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading 10 special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. He finished last season with a team-leading eight special teams stops, despite missing the final 10 contests. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, Anderson sat out his entire rookie year due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Dajahn Anthony** made the Bengals' roster out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 11 defensive snaps and 118 special teams snaps in 10 games played this season (inactive for three games as coach's decision). In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

**Special teams:** The Bengals added **K Cade York** to their practice

squad on Dec. 4, after Evan McPherson was placed on the Reserve/Injured list. York made Bengals debut in Week 14 at Dallas and converted both of his FG attempts along with three PATs. He spent the offseason and part of training camp with Cleveland, before being traded to Washington prior to the start of the regular season. He kicked in the Commanders' season opener, then was waived the following day and was not with a team prior to joining Cincinnati's practice squad. A 2022 fourth-round draft pick of Cleveland, he has appeared in 19 career regular-season games and converted 26 of 36 FG attempts along with 40 of 42 PATs. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 397 attempts in 48 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2 of that season. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through 13 games ranks 10th in the NFL in net punting average (42.9 net yards per punt; minimum 30 punts) and 11th in

gross average (49.3). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. He had four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard lines in three consecutive games (Weeks 5-7), becoming the first Bengals punter ever to do so in three straight contests. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for Week 7, after returning the opening kickoff at Cleveland 100 yards for a TD. It marked the second time in team history that the Bengals scored a TD on the game's opening kick, and it was the longest KOR in the NFL this season. Jones also had an 81-yard punt return for a TD in his 2023 rookie season. He has returned 14 punts this season for 99 yards, including a season-long 23-yarder against the Browns. Rookie WR **Jermaine Burton** and fourth-year HB **Khalil Herbert** have lined up to return kicks with Jones out of the lineup due to a groin injury. Burton has logged seven returns for 199 yards (28.4), including five for 146 in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Three of his KORs have gone for 30 or more yards. Herbert has returned three kicks since being acquired via trade in November, including two for 67 yards in Week 14 at Dallas.

QB Joe Burrow found WR Tee Higgins for a 27-yard TD in the fourth quarter to break a 13-13 tie, and the offense closed the game on a drive that started with 6:07 left to secure Cincinnati's third straight win. The Bengals' defense held Titans RB Derrick Henry, the NFL's leading rusher entering the game, to 38 yards on 17 carries, and in the second half Tennessee's offense was limited to 125 total yards and six points. The Titans went up 10-3 in the second quarter when Henry took a screen pass 69 yards and fumbled the ball into the end zone, where it was recovered by WR Treyron Burks. Later in the quarter, Cincinnati answered with a 92-yard drive, capped by a rushing TD from HB Samaje Perine, who started in place of an injured Joe Mixon. Both teams traded FGs before the Bengals went on a six-play, 75-yard march that included a back-shoulder catch from WR Trenton Irwin to convert a third-and-12. The following snap, Burrow lofted a jump ball for Higgins at the goal line, and the 6-4 receiver came down with what would be the game-winning TD. Cincinnati improved to 7-4, while Tennessee fell to 7-4.

The Bengals opened the game with an 11-play, 72-yard FG drive, but it proved to be their most successful possession as the Titans held them to just 139 net yards the rest of the way. Tennessee used a balanced offensive attack and totaled 400 net yards (227 passing, 173 rushing) to wear down the Cincinnati defense. The score was tied 3-3 at the midway point of the second quarter, before the Titans erupted for three TDs in the final 6:31 to take a commanding 24-3 halftime lead. RB Derrick Henry led the charge for Tennessee with 122 yards on 22 carries (5.5-yard average), including a 29-yard TD run that saw him break three tackles before reaching the end zone. The Titans repeatedly blitzed QB Joe Burrow, sacking him three times while holding the Bengals to two of nine on third down. Cincinnati fell to 1-3, while Tennessee improved to 2-2.

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

Cincinnati held a two-point lead and forced the Chiefs into a fourth-and-16 with under a minute remaining, but a QB Patrick Mahomes downfield heave resulted in a defensive pass interference penalty to set up the kick. The Bengals' defense had three takeaways, including a pair of INTs, and allowed just 137 net passing yards. Offensively, Cincinnati scored points on five of its first six true possessions. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 23 of 36 passes for 258 yards and a 103.7 passer rating, as well as two TD passes to WR Andrei Iosivas. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Kansas City improved to 2-0.

WR Ja'Marr Chase scored a 40-yard TD with just over a minute remaining to lift Cincinnati to a prime-time victory on Monday Night Football. The game-winning drive was set up when a Bengals punt initially was blocked by the Cowboys, but the ball was then touched by a Dallas player and ultimately recovered by LB Maema Njongmeta to give Cincinnati a fresh set of downs. Bengals QB Joe Burrow threw three TD passes, with two going to Chase and the other to HB Chase Brown. Chase finished with 14 catches for 177 yards, while Brown posted 123 yards from scrimmage (58 rushing, 65 receiving). Dallas scored 10 straight points to pull back in front 20-17, but the Bengals' defense closed the game by forcing two punts and a turnover on downs on the Cowboys' final three drives. Both Cincinnati and Dallas left the game with 5-8 records.
