### GAME INFORMATION

**Kickoff:** 1 p.m. Eastern.

**Television:** The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Ian Eagle (play-by-play), Charles Davis (analyst) and Evan Washburn (sideline reporter).

**Radio:** The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

**Setting the scene:** The Bengals prepare for their final game before the bye week when they host Seattle on Sunday at Paycor Stadium. Cincinnati enters the matchup with a 2-3 record this season and is coming off a 34-20 win at Arizona in Week 5.

The victory over the Cardinals was highlighted by a historic performance from third-year WR Ja'Marr Chase. Chase, who figured to have an even more increased role in the offense than usual with WR Tee Higgins out of the lineup (ribs injury), hauled in a Bengals single-game record 15 receptions for 192 yards and three TDs. He became the fourth player in league history under the age of 24 to catch 15 passes in a game, and the fifth player ever (regardless of age) to post at least 15 receptions, 150 receiving yards and three TDs.

Chase's stat line, which was fed by a strong showing from QB Joe Burrow, sparked a Cincinnati offense that totaled a season-high 380 net yards. With the Bengals searching for ways to get their playmakers more involved over the past several weeks, head coach Zac Taylor noted his Pro Bowl receiver's ability to make an impact while lining up anywhere on the field.

"(With) Ja'Marr, nothing really surprises you," Taylor said. "You just keep finding ways to get him the ball. It can come in so many different ways because of how flexible he is as a football player and his football IQ. I say it all the time — you can put him in the slot, you can put him in a Z, you can put him in an X, you can put him in the backfield. Just keep getting the ball in his hands and good things are going to happen."

Burrow, meanwhile, had his best outing of the young season. The fourth-year signal caller completed 78.3 percent of his passes (36 of 46) for 317 yards and three scores, good for a 108.1 passer rating. After working his way back to full health following a calf injury sustained during training camp, Burrow showcased his ability to navigate the pocket and buy extra time with his legs. In a game in which he extended plays to find open receivers — including a deep launch to Chase for a 63-yard TD in the third quarter — and even scrambled for 10 yards later in the second half, Burrow acknowledged the importance of his mobility for sustaining drives.

"It's something I haven't been able to do for the last couple of weeks," Burrow said. "When your quarterback can't do that — can't steal first downs, can't extend plays, can't find guys downfield — it's tough to move the ball. So, it felt good today. I'm going to continue to get healthier, and I'm excited about that."

Defensively, Cincinnati recorded three sacks and three turnovers, including CB Cam Taylor-Britt's first career INT that resulted in a pick six to put the Bengals in front going into halftime. Pro Bowl DE Trey Hendrickson continued his notable start to the season with 2.5 sacks, none bigger than a fourth-quarter takedown of QB Joshua Dobbs that caused a fumble and was recovered by fellow DE Sam Hubbard.

Fifth-year LB Germaine Pratt came up with two crucial plays in the second

half to get the ball back to the Bengals' offense. The first of which came on a fourth-and-one at the Cincinnati 16-yard line, with the Bengals leading 24-20 near the end of the third quarter. Dobbs rolled to his right on a designed run, but Pratt raced through the Arizona offensive line to meet him behind the line of scrimmage and end a potential go-ahead scoring drive. Then with five minutes remaining in the fourth quarter, Pratt picked off a Dobbs pass on another fourth down, allowing the offense to use up clock and seal the win.

"It doesn't matter how well you play on offense, if your defense doesn't play well, you're not going to win," Burrow said. "Whenever you have a defense like that it makes our jobs easier. We have to play complimentary football."

Burrow and his teammates expressed their belief that the Week 5 win will serve as a turning point in the Bengals' season after a 1-3 start. Their chance to get to .500 ahead of the bye comes against a Seahawks team that has won its past three and is averaging 27.8 points per game (sixth in NFL). Seattle looked dominant in a 24-3 road win at the N.Y. Giants on Monday Night Football in Week 4, and is coming off its own bye in Week 5.

**The series:** The Bengals lead 11-10 overall, including 1-0 in postseason. The Bengals also lead 7-5 in all games played in Cincinnati, including 2-0 at Paycor Stadium (formerly called Paul Brown Stadium).

The teams have met only five times since 2003, with the Bengals winning three of those contests. Seattle won the most recent meeting 21-20 in the 2019 regular-season opener at Lumen Field (then called CenturyLink Field).

The only postseason meeting, during the Seahawks' time as an AFC team, was a 1988 Divisional round game at Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium, won 21-13 by the Bengals en route to Super Bowl XXIII.

**Remembering the 2015 OT thriller:** On Oct. 11, 2015, the defending NFC Champion Seattle Seahawks stormed into Paycor Stadium (then called Paul Brown Stadium) and looked poised to hand the 4-0 Bengals their first loss of the season, after cruising to a 24-7 lead through three quarters. But Cincinnati staged one of the great comebacks in franchise history, and rallied for 17 fourth-quarter points to force overtime and eventually escape with a win.

One of the most memorable plays of the game came at the end of the fourth quarter, when on fourth down and on Seattle's 13-yard line with no timeouts, Cincinnati's field goal team rushed onto the field while the offense ran off, and K Mike Nugent kicked a nail-biting 31-yard FG as time expired to send the game into OT. Nugent later made a 42-yard FG in OT to give the Bengals the win.

That 17-point rally still is tied for the sixth biggest comeback in the Bengals'

56-season history. Before that Cincinnati win, NFL teams facing fourth-quarter deficits of 17 or more points had lost 427 consecutive games, dating back to the start of the 2011 season.

**Uniform watch:** The Bengals are slated to wear black jerseys, white pants (orange stripes) and orange socks this week against Seattle. Cincinnati is 2-3 overall when wearing that combination, which was last featured in the team's 24-17 win over Baltimore in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants also feature three different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, and white with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate jerseys and/or color rush (CR) uniforms and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals wore the helmet twice last season, in a Week 4 home win over Miami and a Week 11 road victory at Pittsburgh. The "White Bengal" look made its return on Monday Night Football in Week 3, as Cincinnati defeated the L.A. Rams 19-16 in front of a "White Out" crowd at Paycor Stadium. The white helmets are slated to be featured again in the Bengals' Week 13 road contest at Jacksonville.

^ — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023, the Bengals are permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

**Bengals career records watch:** As Cincinnati continues the 2023 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 1727 career passing attempts, 494 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth place all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.
- Burrow has 1167 completions, 73 shy of Blake (1240) for fifth place all-time. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654), Palmer (2024) and Esiason (2015) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.
- Burrow has 12,819 passing yards, 2315 shy of Blake (15,134) for fifth place all-time.
- Burrow has 87 TD passes, six shy of Blake (93) for fifth place all-time.
- Burrow additionally has 17 career games of 300 or more passing yards, tied with Palmer for fourth place all-time. Dalton (28), Esiason (23) and Anderson (19) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.
- HB Joe Mixon has 1398 rushing attempts, four shy of FB Pete Johnson (1402) for third place all-time. Mixon in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams surpassed HB James Brooks (1344) for fourth place. HB Corey Dillon (1865) is the team's career record holder.
- Mixon has 5706 career rushing yards, 36 shy of HB Rudi Johnson (5742) for third place all-time. Mixon in Week 1 at Cleveland surpassed Pete Johnson (5421) for fourth place. Dillon (8061) is the team's career record holder.
- Mixon has 41 rushing TDs, four shy of HB Corey Dillon (45) for third place all-time and eight shy of Rudi Johnson (48) for second place all-time. Pete Johnson (64) is the team's career record holder.
- Mixon has 14 games with 100 or more rushing yards, one shy of HB Cedric Benson for fourth place all-time. Dillon (28), Rudi Johnson (19) and

Brooks (17) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- WR Tyler Boyd has 469 career receptions, 38 shy of WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fourth place all-time. Boyd in 2022 surpassed WR Cris Collinsworth (417).
- K Evan McPherson needs two FG attempts to reach 75 in his career, which would qualify him for the Bengals' all-time FG percentage record. McPherson currently has an 83.6 career percentage (61 made/73 att.). There are two qualifying former Bengals with higher career FG percentages — Shayne Graham (86.76 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.91 percent; 90/106).

**Records vs. Seahawks:** The Bengals set a team record for rushing attempts (61) in a 17-10 win at Seattle on Oct. 11, 1987. The contest was a "replacement player" game during the 1987 work stoppage.

A Cincinnati 20-17 overtime win at Seattle on Nov. 6, 1994 generated a couple of special teams records which stood for many years, but both have since been broken. In that game, P Lee Johnson averaged a then Bengals-record 51.3 net yards per punt (four punts), a mark which stood for 19 years until Dec. 1, 2013, when Kevin Huber logged a 55.5 net, which still stands. Also in that game, K Doug Pelfrey booted a then Bengals-record six FGs, a total which stood for 13 years until Nov. 11, 2007, when Shayne Graham set the new mark with seven, which still stands.

The 1994 contest also marked the Bengals' most total net yards in a game (496) without scoring a touchdown.

**Individually vs. Seahawks:** Current Bengals' past offensive performances for Cincinnati against Seattle in regular season include:

- WR Tyler Boyd: One game: Eight receptions for 60 yards (7.5-yard average; One rush for three yards).
- HB Joe Mixon: One game; Six rushes for 10 yards (1.7); Two receptions for seven yards (3.5).

## THE HEAD COACHES

**Zac Taylor** was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2023 season is his fifth in the position.

In 2022, Taylor led Cincinnati to a second consecutive AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship. The Bengals tied a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), and with a pair of playoff victories in January, Taylor became one of just 13 head coaches in NFL history with five wins in their first six career postseason games. He once again oversaw a dynamic offense that ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0).

The Bengals also boasted a versatile defense that held opposing passers to a league-low 58.9 completion percentage while also ranking sixth in points allowed (20.1 per game) and seventh in rushing yards allowed (106.6).

In 2021, Taylor guided the Bengals to their first division championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim the AFC crown and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. QB Joe Burrow, playing in his first full season in Taylor's system, was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after leading the league in completion percentage (70.4), while first-round draft pick WR Ja'Marr Chase totaled the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455) en route to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped the Bengals navigate the league's COVID-19 pandemic protocols which included no in-person offseason program. Still, he guided a rookie Burrow to notable production that included the most ever completions by a QB through their first 10 games (264) and the fifth-most passing yards (2688).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both offense and defense. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped guide QB Jared Goff to career highs in every major passing category as the Rams won the NFC West and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Taylor had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and QBs coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant quarterbacks coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and tight ends coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous program records, totaling 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. He was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2006 after passing for 3197 yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

**Pete Carroll** was named Seattle's eighth head coach on Jan. 11, 2010. He led the Seahawks to their first Super Bowl title in franchise history in 2013 after posting a 13-3 record and a 43-8 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XLVIII, followed by a consecutive appearance in Super Bowl XLIX vs. New England.

Carroll's NFL coaching background includes stints with the Buffalo Bills (defensive backs, 1984), the Minnesota Vikings (defensive backs, '85-89), the N.Y. Jets (defensive coordinator, '90-93; head coach, '94), the San Francisco 49ers (defensive coordinator, '95-96) and the New England Patriots (head coach, '97-99). As Patriots head coach, he posted a 27-21 record and had two playoff appearances.

Carroll was a college coach with Pacific (1974-76 and '83), Arkansas ('77),

Iowa State ('78), Ohio State ('79), North Carolina State ('80-82) and Southern California, where he served as head coach from 2001-09. With the Trojans, he posted a 97-19 record, won seven consecutive Pac-10 titles, six bowl games and back-to-back national championships in 2003 and '04.

Carroll was a two-time All-Pacific Coast Conference safety at Pacific (1971-72), where he earned his degree in business administration ('73) and a secondary teaching credential, as well as a master's degree in physical

education ('76). He has no pro playing experience.

Carroll was born in San Francisco, Calif. on Sept. 15, 1951. He and his wife, Glenna, have three children and seven grandchildren.

## BENGALS NOTES

**Coaching continuity under Taylor:** Head coach Zac Taylor returned virtually the entire coaching staff for the 2023 season, including defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo, offensive coordinator Brian Callahan and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons.

Anarumo, Callahan and Simmons have all been on staff since Taylor was hired in February 2019. The Bengals are the only team in the NFL with the same head and same coordinators in place for each season since 2021.

Simmons, now in his 21st season with the team in 2023, is the longest-tenured coach on the Bengals' staff. He has led Cincinnati's special teams units each year since 2003. Defensive quality control coach Sigismondo "Louie" Cioffi has returned for his 17th Bengals season, after serving as an assistant coach from 1997-2010 and then rejoining the staff in '21. Senior defensive assistant Mark Duffner, who previously was a Bengals assistant from 1997-2002 before returning in '19, now is in his 11th season in Cincinnati.

Brad Kragthorpe is in his first season in the role of assistant quarterbacks coach, after spending the previous two years (2021-22) as assistant wide receivers coach. Kragthorpe played QB collegiately at Louisiana State from 2013-15, then returned to LSU in '18 as an offensive analyst in QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase's first season with the Tigers. He joined the Cincinnati staff as an offensive assistant in 2019.

**2023 Bengals captains:** The Bengals this season are led by six players wearing the captains' patch, which were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive and three defensive players.

Cincinnati's offensive captains remain unchanged from the 2022 season and include fourth-year QB Joe Burrow, seventh-year HB Joe Mixon and eighth-year C Ted Karras. This is Burrow's fourth consecutive season as a captain and the third straight for Mixon. Karras, who joined the Bengals as a free agent in March of 2022, serves as a team captain for the third time in his career, after previously doing so with the Miami Dolphins in 2020.

The defensive captains are seventh-year CB Mike Hilton, sixth-year DE Sam Hubbard and eighth-year DT DJ Reader. Hubbard is wearing the patch for a third consecutive season, while Reader dons it for a second straight year. Hilton is the lone Bengals captain this season who is carrying the honor for the first time.

**The Jungle is jammin':** The five highest-attended home games (and seven of the top eight) in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15. The 2022 Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore had an attendance figure of 66,399, which now stands as the second largest in team history.

The attendance figure for Cincinnati's Week 13 win against Kansas City last season was 66,243 (fourth largest), while other 2022 home contests against Cleveland (66,222), Carolina (66,160) and Atlanta (66,158) rank fifth, seventh and eighth all-time, respectively. Adding in figures of 65,841 for the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and 65,849 for the Week 18 matchup vs. Baltimore, the Bengals welcomed an attendance of over 65,000 in seven consecutive regular-season home games for the first time since 2007. That year, Cincinnati hosted over 65,000 in each of its eight regular-season home contests. The streak has continued into this season, as the Bengals' 2023 home opener vs. Baltimore in Week 2 had an attendance figure of 66,015 and was followed by a figure of 65,158 in the Week 3 Monday Night Football contest against the L.A. Rams.

The Paycor Stadium crowds have coincided with a recent string of home success for the Bengals, as they have won 11 of their last 13 played at the venue dating back to Week 16 of the 2021 regular season (includes postseason). The last time Cincinnati matched that number was when it won 13 of 15 home contests from the 2012 regular-season finale through Week 9 of the '14 campaign.

**Burrow's NFL journey:** After being selected No. 1 overall by the Bengals in the 2020 NFL Draft, former Heisman Trophy winner Joe Burrow had one of the most productive starts to a career by a QB in league history, as his 264 completions still count as the most ever by an NFL passer through their first 10 career games, while his 404 pass attempts are the second-most in that same category and his 2588 passing yards are fifth.

In Week 11 of his rookie year at Washington, Burrow suffered a season-ending left knee injury, halting a campaign that was on pace to shatter several NFL rookie passing records. He embarked on a rehab process that lasted over eight months and received clearance to participate in training camp in 2021.

Shortly after his injury in 2020, Burrow vowed publicly that he would start Cincinnati's '21 season opener. On Sept. 12 vs. Minnesota, not only did he make good on that promise, but he posted then-career highs in passer rating (128.8), completion percentage (74.1) and yards per attempt (9.67) in a Bengals OT win.

Burrow in 2021 completed a league-leading 70.4 percent of his passes (366 of 520) for 4611 yards and 34 TDs en route to being named the AP Comeback Player of the Year. His passing yardage and 108.3 passer rating stand as single-season team records. In the postseason, he threw for 1105 yards and five TDs in four games, becoming the first No. 1 overall draft pick in NFL history to lead his team to a conference championship game (let alone a Super Bowl berth) in either of their first two seasons.

On the day before the first official training camp practice of 2022, Burrow was forced to undergo surgery to remove his appendix. He remained involved in team meetings and attended practices on a golf cart during a three-week recovery process, before returning to the field in mid-August. He started the regular-season opener and went on to set Bengals single-season records for completions (414, fifth in NFL) and TD passes (35, tied for second). Burrow then

completed 66.1 percent of his passes (72 of 109) for 721 yards and four TDs in three postseason games, guiding the Bengals to the AFC Championship once again. He became the first player drafted No. 1 overall to win five playoff games within his first three seasons.

The Athens, Ohio, native again faced adversity in training camp this season as he worked his way back from a calf strain. Burrow sustained the injury on July 27 — the second day of camp — and returned to practice on Aug. 30. On Sept. 9, he signed a five-year contract extension that makes him the highest-paid player in NFL history, based on average annual value. The extension keeps Burrow in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

**Burrow masters the deep ball:** QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase opened the second half of Sunday's contest at Arizona with a bang, connecting on a 63-yard TD less than two minutes into the third quarter to increase Cincinnati's lead to 24-14. According to NFL's Next Gen Stats service, Burrow's 58.1 air yards on the throw were the most for any TD pass in his career. It also marked Burrow's 18th career TD pass of 40 or more yards, the most by any QB since he entered the league in 2020.

Six of Burrow's 40-plus yard TD passes came during Weeks 3-8 of the 2022 campaign. He also totaled a league-best 12 TD passes of 50 or more yards from the 2020-22 seasons, which tied Pro Football Hall of Famers Dan Marino and Fran Tarkenton for the most by any player in NFL history in their first three years.

**Burrow racks up yardage:** QB Joe Burrow in Week 5 at Arizona completed 36 of 46 passes (78.3 percent) for 317 yards and three TDs. It marked his 17th career game with 300 or more passing yards, which tied former QB Carson Palmer for the fourth most such games in team history.

Burrow's performance against the Cardinals also was his seventh career outing with at least 30 completions, 300 passing yards and three passing TDs. That total ties Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes for the most such games within a player's first four seasons in NFL history.

Burrow in Week 2 vs. Baltimore passed for 222 yards, eclipsing 12,000 career passing yards in what was his 44th game. That tied him with former Indianapolis QB Andrew Luck as the fifth-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 12,000 passing yards. He is the fastest Bengal ever to 11,000 passing yards (40 games), 10,000 (36), 9000 (33), 8000 (29), 7000 (26), 6000 (23), 5000 (19) and 4000 (16).

Burrow's 10,131 passing yards since the start of the 2021 regular season are fourth most in the NFL in that span. He has ranked in the top six leaguewide in passing yards in each of the past two seasons, with a Bengals-record 4611 in 2021 (sixth) and 4475 in '22 (fifth).

**Hitting the mark:** QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 1500 career passing attempts in the 2022 regular-season finale against Baltimore, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 67.57, Burrow ranks third in NFL history in the category. Las Vegas QB Jimmy Garoppolo (67.693) and former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.690) hold the top two spots.

After leading the league in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 pass attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts

(606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Burrow in Week 5 at Arizona completed 36 of 46 passes (78.3 percent), marking his fourth career game with a completion percentage of 75 or higher on 40 or more attempts. The only other QB in Bengals history with one such game is Andy Dalton, who went 33 of 43 (76.7 percent) on Oct. 12, 2014 vs. Carolina.

In Week 16 of the 2022 season at New England, Burrow surpassed 1000 career completions in what was just his 41st game. That tied him with former Detroit QB Matthew Stafford as the second-fastest player in NFL history to reach 1000 completions.

With numerous pass-catching options missing time due to injuries in 2022, Burrow found a way to spread the ball around the entire offense, as six Bengals (three WRs, two HBs and one TE) finished the year with 35 or more receptions. Burrow had 13 games in which he completed a pass to seven or more players.

**Joe throws 80th career TD:** QB Joe Burrow threw his 80th career TD pass in Week 16 last season at New England, in what was his 41st game. That made him the fifth-fastest QB in NFL history to throw for 80 TDs.

The former No. 1 overall draft pick had 13 TD passes in 10 games as a rookie, before setting a then-team record with 34 TDs in his sophomore campaign. By eclipsing his own record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to throw for 30 or more TDs in multiple seasons. Burrow, Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino and Chargers QB Justin Herbert are the only players in NFL history with at least 30 TD passes and 4000 passing yards in two of their first three seasons.

Burrow had three TD passes in Week 5 at Arizona, marking his 28th career multi-TD game (regular season). With 87 TD passes in his career, Burrow is six shy of former QB Jeff Blake (93) for the fifth most in Bengals history. Prior to Week 1 at Cleveland, Burrow held a streak of 23 consecutive regular-season games in which he threw at least one TD pass, surpassing Blake (21 games in 1994-95) for the longest such streak in team history.

Burrow last season joined former Indianapolis QB Andrew Luck as the only players in NFL history with at least 75 TD passes and 10 rushing TDs in their first three seasons. A career-high five of Burrow's 10 rushing TDs came in 2022.

**Ja'Marr makes history:** WR Ja'Marr Chase added another historic performance to his young career in the Week 5 win at Arizona, as he hauled in a Bengals single-game record 15 receptions for 192 yards and three TDs. His receptions total surpassed the previous team mark of 13, set by WR Carl Pickens on Oct. 11, 1998 against Pittsburgh.

Chase became the fifth player in NFL history to register at least 15 catches, 150 receiving yards and three receiving TDs in a game. At 23 years old, he also is the fourth player in NFL history under the age of 24 to record 15 receptions in a single game. Combining his performance on Sunday with a stat line of 11 catches for a Bengals-record 266 yards and three TDs in Week 17 of the 2021 campaign vs. Kansas City, Chase is the first player in league history with multiple games of at least 10 receptions, 150 receiving yards and three receiving TDs in his first three career seasons.

Chase's first TD at Arizona — which was also his first of the season — came less than eight minutes into the game to cap off an 11-play, 64-yard opening drive for the Bengals. He found the end zone again early in the third quarter, when he got behind the Cardinals' secondary and caught a deep ball from QB Joe Burrow for a 63-yard score. It marked Chase's seventh career TD of 50 or more yards, and was Cincinnati's longest TD from scrimmage since Chase scored a 72-yarder in the 2021 win over the Chiefs.

His third TD occurred midway through the fourth quarter, when he worked himself free in the back of the end zone and secured a bullet pass from Burrow to extend the Bengals' lead to 31-20. Since he entered the NFL in 2021, Chase is one of four players with three or more receiving TDs in multiple games, alongside Buffalo WR Stefon Diggs, Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans and Kansas City TE Travis Kelce.

**Chase nets 200:** WR Ja'Marr Chase secured his 200th career reception on his first TD of the day in Week 5 at Arizona. Playing in just his 34th career game, Chase tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach 200 catches. Only former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (30 games), New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (32) and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry (33) reached the mark in fewer games.

The two-time Pro Bowler has been QB Joe Burrow's go-to target as of late, as Chase's 34 receptions from Weeks 3-5 of this season are the most in a three-game stretch in Bengals history. His team-record 15 catches in Week 5 at Arizona also marked his 13th consecutive regular-season game played with at least five receptions, the longest active streak in the NFL.

Chase has led the Bengals in receptions each of the past two seasons, beginning with a team rookie-record 81 catches in 2021. He followed that with 87 grabs in 2022, including at least seven in each of his final eight regular-season games played.

**On the Chase:** WR Ja'Marr Chase's 63-yard TD catch in Week 5 at Arizona marked his 13th career reception of 40 or more yards. That ties him with former Louisiana State teammate and current Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson for the second most such catches in the NFL since Chase entered the league in 2021. Only former Kansas City/current Miami WR Tyreek Hill (14) has more in that span.

Chase's 192 receiving yards against the Cardinals marked the 11th time he has surpassed the century mark in a game. He went for 141 yards on 12 catches in the Week 3 win over the L.A. Rams, including a 43-yard grab in the third quarter that helped set up a Bengals FG.

Chase during the 2022 season eclipsed two career milestones — 2000 receiving yards and 20 receiving TDs. His 2000th yard came in just his 24th career game (Week 7 vs. Atlanta), tying Chase for the fourth fastest player in NFL history to hit the 2K mark. He recorded his 20th TD catch in Week 14 vs. Cleveland, in what was his 26th game — that tied him as the fourth fastest since 1970 to reach that number. Chase, who turned 23 on March 1 of this year, joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players under the age of 23 with 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches in league history.

Chase also is one of two players in Bengals history who have posted consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons to begin their career, joining A.J. Green (2011-12).

**Three-headed monster at WR:** The Bengals' offense has featured arguably the top receiving trio in the NFL over the past two-plus seasons consisting of WRs Tyler Boyd, Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins.

Each player has showcased their abilities through four games this season, beginning with Higgins in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. The fourth-year pro out of Clemson led Cincinnati with eight catches for 89 yards, including two TD grabs in the second half to help cut the Bengals' deficit. It marked Higgins' fourth career

game (including postseason) with multiple TD catches, and his second against the Ravens. The following week, on Monday Night Football against the L.A. Rams, Chase erupted for 141 yards on 12 receptions. His 12 catches were at the time the most by a Bengal since Higgins in Week 16 the 2021 season, and he reached the century mark in receiving yards for the 10th time in his young career. Chase in Week 5 at Arizona set a Bengals single-game record with 15 receptions for 192 yards and three TDs.

Boyd has served as a consistent pass catching option since being drafted by Cincinnati in the second round in 2016. His 23 catches this season rank second on the team behind Chase (44), with 21 of those coming over the past four games. The longest-tenured Bengals player on the active roster, Boyd enters Week 6 with 469 career receptions, the fifth most in team history.

Though each player missed substantial action during the 2022 regular season due to injuries, Cincinnati was one of two teams (L.A. Chargers) with three WRs that recorded 700 or more receiving yards. The Bengals were also the only team with three players that each had a game with 130-plus receiving yards. Boyd, Chase and Higgins all averaged at least 12 yards per reception and had at least one TD catch of 50-plus yards.

Their 3374 combined receiving yards in the 2021 regular season led all trios, with Chase posting a Bengals-record 1455, Higgins going for 1091 and Boyd netting 828.

Chase (1046 yards) and Higgins (1029) both notched 1000 receiving yards for the second straight season in 2022, marking the fourth time the Bengals had multiple 1000-yard receivers — WRs Chad Johnson and T.J. Houshmandzadeh also did it twice, in 2006 and '07. In 2021, Chase (21 years old) and Higgins (22) became the first duo in league history to log 1000 receiving yards in the same season before the age of 23.

**Chase, Boyd pose deep threats:** QB Joe Burrow has the NFL's most TD passes of 50 or more yards since the start of the 2021 season, and much of that production can be attributed to WRs Ja'Marr Chase and Tyler Boyd.

Chase has a league-leading seven TD receptions of 50-plus yards in that span, which ties for the third most such TDs by a player under the age of 24 in NFL history. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (11) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (nine) have more.

Chase's most recent TD of 50-plus yards came early in the second half of Week 5 at Arizona, when he hauled in a deep pass from Burrow for a 63-yard score. It marked the Bengals' longest TD from scrimmage since Chase's 72-yarder in Week 17 of the 2021 season against Kansas City. In Week 6 of last season, Chase returned to his hometown of New Orleans and led Cincinnati to victory with a game-winning 60-yard catch and run to the end zone with just under two minutes remaining.

Boyd, meanwhile, has four TD catches of 50 or more yards since 2021, the third most in the NFL behind Chase and former Kansas City/current Miami WR Tyreek Hill (five). Two of those scoring receptions occurred last season, beginning with a 56-yarder on the final play of the first quarter in a Week 3 win at the N.Y. Jets. In Week 7 vs. Atlanta, Burrow and Boyd connected for a 60-yard TD on just the fourth play from scrimmage to give the Bengals an early 7-0 lead.

**Tee tops 1000 again:** WR Tee Higgins was held without a catch in the season opener at Cleveland, but bounced back in Week 2 vs. Baltimore with eight grabs for 89 yards and two TDs. A majority of his production came in the second half, including a fourth-quarter scoring drive that saw him net three receptions for 40 yards capped off by a four-yard TD that cut Cincinnati's deficit to 27-24.

Higgins during the 2022 regular season ranked second on the Bengals in receptions (74), receiving yards (1029) and receiving TDs (seven). That followed a 2021 sophomore campaign in which he logged 1091 yards and six TDs on 74 catches. Higgins is one of five players in Bengals history with multiple 1000-yard receiving seasons within the first three years of his career, alongside WRs Cris Collinsworth (1981, '83), Chad Johnson (2002-03), A.J. Green ('11-13) and Ja'Marr Chase ('21-22). His career yardage total at the end of 2022 (3028) marked the second most ever by a Bengals player through their first three



seasons, trailing only Green (3833).

With Chase out of the lineup due to injury in Weeks 11-12 last season, Higgins was relied on as the team's No. 1 receiver and delivered back-to-back 100-yard performances. He had a season-high nine catches for 148 yards in Week 11 at Pittsburgh, marking the second-most in a game in his career (194 on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore). He then followed that up with seven grabs for 114 yards and a TD in Week 12 at Tennessee, including a 27-yard TD that gave Cincinnati a fourth-quarter lead.

Higgins has continued to produce during his brief but impressive postseason career. He ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing Chase in both categories, while his three TD catches are tied with Chase and former TE Dan Ross for the team's postseason record. With two TDs in Super Bowl LVI vs. the L.A. Rams, he also joined Ross as the only players in team history with multiple TDs in a postseason game.

**Mixton it up:** While seventh-year HB Joe Mixton has established himself as one of the top running backs to ever wear a Bengals uniform, he also has proven to be a pass-catching threat out of the backfield. Mixton ranks fourth in team history with 5706 career rushing yards, while additionally totaling 1843 receiving yards in 85 games. He is one of eight active NFL players with at least 5000 rushing yards and 1500 receiving yards.

A 2017 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, Mixton has logged over 1000 rushing yards in three of his five full seasons (missed 10 games in '20 due to injury). He surpassed 5000 career rushing yards in Week 9 of the 2022 season, becoming the fifth player in team history to reach that milestone and the first since HB Rudi Johnson in '06. Mixton has been one of Cincinnati's most consistent offensive performers through five games this season, as he has recorded at least 50 rushing yards in each contest including a season-high 81 in Week 5 at Arizona.

Mixton in 2022 set career highs for receptions (60) and receiving yards (441), and topped 100 scrimmage yards four times. In Week 9 vs. Carolina, he scored a Bengals single-game record five TDs (four rushing, one receiving) and posted a career-best 211 yards from scrimmage (153 rushing, 58 receiving). He had another strong performance in the Divisional Playoff win at Buffalo, rushing for 105 yards — the third most in a postseason game in team history — on 20 carries (5.3 average).

Mixton enters Week 6 vs. Seattle 36 rushing yards shy of Rudi Johnson (5742) for third most in Bengals history. In Week 1 at Cleveland, he surpassed FB Pete Johnson (5421) for fourth place.

**First-quarter defense among league's best:** Though defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo is regarded as one of the best in the NFL when it comes to in-game adjustments, his Bengals defense has also been consistently prepared from the opening kickoff. Since the start of the 2022 season, Cincinnati has allowed just five TDs in the first quarter of play, tied for the second fewest in the league during that stretch, while its 65 total first-quarter points and 1354 net yards given up each are the fourth fewest.

Baltimore's TD on the opening drive of Week 2 marked the first TD allowed by Cincinnati in a first quarter since Week 6 of the 2022 season at New Orleans. The Bengals' 14-game streak without giving up a first-quarter TD was the longest in the NFL since Buffalo went 16 straight from Week 14 of the 2020 season through Week 10 of the '21 campaign. Cincinnati during its streak allowed just 12 total points (never more than three in an opening quarter), while collecting three

INTs and forcing 14 punts.

The L.A. Rams reached Cincinnati's two-yard line on their opening drive in Week 3, but the Bengals stood tall with a nine-yard sack by DT DJ Reader on first down, followed by incompletions on the next two plays to force a FG. Tennessee in Week 4 drove to the Bengals' 24-yard line on its opening possession, but a third-down sack split by DT B.J. Hill and DE Trey Hendrickson pushed the Titans back 11 yards and resulted in a FG. In Week 5, the Cincinnati defense forced Arizona to go three-and-out in both of its first-quarter possessions, helping the Bengals build an early 10-0 lead.

**Defense tightens after the break:** As referenced previously, Cincinnati's defense has proven itself among the league's elite units coming out of halftime. The Bengals have given up 37 total TDs in the second half/overtime since the start of the 2021 regular season, the second fewest in the NFL behind Buffalo (35), while their 9.4 points allowed per second half/OT in that span ranks as the fifth best average leaguewide.

Cincinnati opened the 2022 season by going seven straight games without allowing a TD in the second half of play, becoming the first team to do so in each of its first seven contests since the 1934 Detroit Lions (eight games). The 2022 Bengals are also one of just six teams since 1930 to not give up a second-half TD in seven or more consecutive games at any point in a season. The 1973 Miami Dolphins (seven games) and '97 Kansas City Chiefs (10 games) are the only other teams to accomplish that feat since the '70 NFL/AFL merger.

**Trey's torrid pace:** DE Trey Hendrickson's skill set has been on full display this season, as he has posted a team-leading six sacks (tied for second in the NFL) with five coming over the past three games. He logged 2.5 sacks in Week 5 at Arizona, including one midway through the fourth quarter in which he forced a fumble that was recovered by DE Sam Hubbard. The Bengals capitalized six plays later with a FG to increase their lead to 34-20.

After spending his first four pro seasons with New Orleans, Hendrickson joined the Bengals as a free agent in March of 2021 and quickly asserted himself among the NFL's elite pass rushers. His debut season in stripes saw him post a career-best 14 sacks, which ranked fifth in the league and second in Bengals single-season history behind DE Coy Bacon's 22 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in '82, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder). Hendrickson earned his first career Pro Bowl nod, and then followed up with another Pro Bowl campaign in 2022 when he notched a team-leading eight sacks.

Combined with a team-high 13.5 sacks in his final season with the Saints (tied for second in NFL), Hendrickson has 41.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — the fourth most in the league in that span. He is one of six players in the NFL with at least eight sacks in each of the past three seasons.

Hendrickson's production was rewarded on July 27, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

**Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal:** DE Sam Hubbard logged his second sack of the season in Week 4 when he got to Tennessee QB Ryan Tannehill for a two-yard loss in the third quarter. It boosted Hubbard's career sack total to 32.5, giving him the most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

While Hubbard's 2022 campaign will be remembered primarily for his 98-yard fumble return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, he put together yet another complete season that further established him as a foundational piece on the Bengals defense. During the regular season, Hubbard tallied 60 total tackles — his fourth straight year with at least 60 — including a team-leading 11 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. He also recorded three PDs and a forced fumble.

Hubbard this season has 25 total tackles, the most among Cincinnati's defensive linemen. He recovered a Cardinals fumble midway through the fourth quarter of Week 5, setting up a Bengals FG drive that increased their lead to 34-20.

Players' listed positions vary by media outlet (e.g. whether they're classified as a LB or DE), but according to NFL.com's draft record, Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected in 2018 — five DEs and seven DTs came off the

board before him. According to NFL.com, there were a total of 40 defensive linemen (20 DEs, 20 DTs) selected in the 2018 draft, along with 32 LBs and one player with his position listed as “edge.”

Hubbard has been the Bengals’ starting RDE since 2019, and during the ‘21 regular season his 7.5 sacks were second on the team. He has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in Bengals history.

Hubbard signed a contract extension with the Bengals in July 2021 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the ‘25 season.

**Wilson, Pratt form elite LB duo:** At the center of Cincinnati’s defense is one of the top LB tandems in the NFL in fifth-year pro Germaine Pratt and fourth-year pro Logan Wilson. The pair has combined for 74 tackles and contributed to four turnovers through five games this season.

Wilson in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams grabbed two INTs that helped lead the Bengals to a Monday Night Football win. His first pick occurred late in the second quarter, when he dropped into coverage and jumped a pass by QB Matthew Stafford to set Cincinnati up at the Rams’ 41-yard line. Then in the third quarter, when the Rams were driving at the Bengals’ 30 with a chance to take the lead, Wilson capitalized on a pass tipped by CB Mike Hilton to end the scoring threat. The fourth-year pro out of the University of Wyoming now has nine career INTs, the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020.

Pratt’s top performance came in Week 5 at Arizona, when he led the team with 10 tackles (two TFLs) and intercepted a Joshua Dobbs pass on fourth down in the fourth quarter to help cement a Bengals win. Late in the third quarter, with Cincinnati leading 24-20, the Cardinals went for it on fourth-and-one at the Bengals’ 16-yard line. Pratt shot through the line to corral Dobbs for a one-yard loss, forcing a turnover on downs and ending the scoring threat.

Both players set career highs in tackles during the 2022 regular season. Wilson’s team-leading 123 stops marked the most by a Bengal since Vontaze Burfict (171) in his 2013 Pro Bowl season, while Pratt’s 99 ranked second on the team. Pratt additionally set career bests in INTs (two) and PDs (10) in 2022.

Though they have served as consistent contributors for the Bengals in regular-season play, Pratt and Wilson save their most crucial plays for when it matters most. With 17 seconds remaining in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff vs. Las Vegas, Pratt intercepted a pass by QB Derek Carr on fourth down from the Cincinnati nine-yard line to secure the Bengals’ first playoff win in 31 years. The following week in a Divisional Playoff at Tennessee, Wilson picked off QB Ryan Tannehill in the final minute of the fourth quarter to set up a game-winning FG drive.

This past January in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, both Pratt and Wilson stopped QB Tyler Huntley as he attempted to reach the ball over a pile of linemen for a potential go-ahead Ravens TD in the fourth quarter. Wilson, who was credited with the FF, knocked the ball free, leading to DE Sam Hubbard’s 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the difference in a 24-17 victory.

Wilson has totaled a league-leading 62 combined tackles over the past two postseasons, while Pratt ranks second in the category with 49 stops. Both players inked contract extensions in 2023, with Pratt locked in with the Bengals through the ‘25 season and Wilson staying put in Cincinnati through ‘27.

**Nothing easy in the air:** Since the start of the 2022 season, the Bengals have held opposing passers to the lowest completion percentage in the NFL (59.1) and the third lowest passer rating (80.6). Cincinnati has given up just 25 TD passes in that span of 21 regular-season games, tied for the sixth fewest leaguewide.

In 38 regular-season games since the start of the 2021 regular season, the Bengals have yielded 300 net passing yards on just four occasions. Only one opponent reached 300 net passing yards last season (Tampa Bay in Week 15).

Cincinnati has held three of its five opponents this season to a completion percentage below 60. The Bengals have also limited opposing passers to fewer than 20 completions in four games — Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson was the only QB to eclipse that number with 24 completions in Week 2.

**Money Mac from deep:** K Evan McPherson has quickly earned a reputation as one of the NFL’s top long-range kickers. Now in his third season, he is 16 of 20 on FG attempts of 50 or more yards, tying for the fourth most FGs from that distance since 2021. McPherson knocked through two 50-plus yarders in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, from 53 yards on the final play of the first half and 54 midway through the fourth quarter to extend Cincinnati’s lead.

McPherson is already the team’s career leader in 50-yard FGs. It took him just 14 games into his rookie season to reach the top of Cincinnati’s career chart in that category, breaking the previous record of eight. Referred to by fans as “Money Mac,” McPherson made an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards during the 2021 regular season and fell just one shy of tying the NFL record for most 50-yarders. His nine such FGs were more than double the previous team record for a single season (four, by K Horst Muhlmann in 1970). He followed that up by going a perfect five of five on attempts of 50-plus yards in 2022.

McPherson additionally has the two longest made FGs — and is tied for the third longest — in team history. He kicked a Bengals-record 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, breaking his own previous record of 58 that he hit in Week 15 of the ‘21 campaign at Denver. Then in Week 4 of 2022 against Miami, he knocked through a 57-yarder, tying Randy Bullock for the third longest.

McPherson has notably wasted no time getting into midseason form in each of the past three years, as he is 22-for-23 on FG attempts and a perfect eight-for-eight on PATs in eight preseason contests. He has eight preseason FGs of 50 or more yards, including a 58- and 56-yarder in the second quarter alone on Aug. 12, 2022 vs. Arizona.

**2023 draft class overview:** Cincinnati’s eight-player draft class in April featured four players on defense, three on offense and one on special teams. The group combined to total 356 collegiate games played.

Here’s a closer look at the Bengals’ 2023 draft class:

- DE Myles Murphy, Clemson (Round 1, Pick 28): A 6-5, 270-pound edge rusher with highly touted athleticism, Murphy logged his first NFL sack in Week 4 at Tennessee. He recorded 17.5 sacks in 38 career games at Clemson, earning second-team All-ACC honors as a junior in 2022. Defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo has noted Murphy’s ability to line up on the outside or interior of the defensive line.

- CB DJ Turner II, Michigan (Round 2, Pick 60): Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year’s NFL Combine, clocking 4.26 seconds. He has played in all five games this season and made his first career start in Week 5 at Arizona, where he totaled four tackles (three solos) and a PD. Turner recorded 20 PDs with three INTs in a four-year career at Michigan, earning a pair of All-Big Ten accolades (honorable mention in ‘21, second team in ‘22).

- S Jordan Battle, Alabama (Round 3, Pick 95): Battle is establishing himself as a dependable backup safety in his rookie campaign, with 53 defensive snaps played through five games. He had his best statistical performance in Week 5 at Arizona, registering two solo tackles and two PDs. Battle was twice named a third-team All-American at Alabama, where he started at S from 2020-22. Three of his six career INTs in college were returned for a TD.

- WR Charlie Jones, Purdue (Round 4, Pick 131): Jones opened the season as the Bengals’ primary punt returner and solidified that role with an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. He suffered a thumb injury in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams and was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 29. Jones was a second-team All-American in his lone season at Purdue in 2022, as he led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12).

- HB Chase Brown, Illinois (Round 5, Pick 163): Brown led the Bengals during preseason in rushing attempts (28) and yards (69), but has seen action on just four offensive snaps in the regular season. He put together an impressive career at Illinois, earning second-team All-America honors in 2022 and totaling 1000 rushing yards in each of his final two seasons.

- WR Andrei Iosivas, Princeton (Round 6, Pick 206): Iosivas is the Bengals’ seventh all-time draft pick out of an Ivy League program, and the first since LB Reggie Williams (Dartmouth) and QB Bob Bateman (Brown) in 1976. He led Cincinnati in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129) during the preseason. Iosivas is a former All-American as a member of the Princeton men’s track and



field team and carries an athletic frame (6-3, 205 pounds). He has been used primarily on special teams through five regular-season games, seeing action on 85 ST snaps (sixth most on team).

- P Brad Robbins, Michigan (Round 6, Pick 217): Robbins earned the Bengals' punting job after recording eight punts for 371 yards (46.4 gross average) in three preseason games. Through five regular-season contests, he has punted 26 times with a 43.9 gross average and five downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Robbins spent six seasons (2017-22) at Michigan, where he finished his career with the second highest punting average (43.0 yards) in program history and was a three-time All-Big Ten selection.

- CB DJ Ivey, Miami (Fla.) (Round 7, Pick 246): The Bengals' final draft pick logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason, showcasing an athleticism and tight coverage that has already impressed his coaches. He made his NFL debut in Week 5 at Arizona after being inactive in the first four regular-season contests. Ivey started 32 of 58 games played over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.), netting six INTs and 17 PDs.

**Back-to-back division champs:** The Bengals captured the AFC North Division title in 2022 for the second consecutive season, marking the first time in franchise history that Cincinnati won a division in back-to-back years. The 2022 division title was the team's 11th all-time.

While some databases list the Bengals as repeat division winners in 1981 and '82, the '82 postseason featured a special 16-team format (dubbed the "Super Bowl Tournament") that was implemented by the NFL, as the regular season was reduced to nine games due to a players' strike. Eight teams from each conference were seeded 1-8 based on their regular-season records, so despite the Bengals boasting the top record in the AFC Central, they went in as the conference's No. 3 seed and were not recognized as division champions.

**Bengals net three Pro Bowlers in '22:** QB Joe Burrow, WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson were all voted to the AFC Team for the 2023 Pro Bowl Games. It was the first Pro Bowl nod of Burrow's career, while Chase and Hendrickson both received their second after being selected in the 2021 season.

Burrow became the sixth QB in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl, joining Ken Anderson (1975-76, '81-82), Boomer Esiason ('86, '88-89), Jeff Blake ('95), Carson Palmer (2005-06) and Andy Dalton ('11, '14, '16). The former No. 1 overall draft pick out of Louisiana State finished the 2022 regular season tied for second in the NFL in passing TDs (35), fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). He surpassed multiple career milestones, including 11,000 passing yards, 75 passing TDs and 1000 pass completions.

Chase in 2022 led Cincinnati in receptions (87), receiving yards (1046) and receiving TDs (nine), despite missing four games due to a hip injury. In Week 14, he joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players in NFL history with 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches under the age of 23. Chase became the seventh player in Bengals history to be voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons.

Hendrickson, who concluded his second Bengals season in 2022 after signing as an unrestricted free agent in '21, led Cincinnati in sacks (eight) and was tied for second in TFLs (six).

Chase and Hendrickson both participated in the 2023 Pro Bowl Games, which were held Sunday, Feb. 5 at Allegiant Stadium in Las Vegas.

**Three listed on "Top 100":** For the 13th consecutive season, current NFL players have voted to determine the top 100 players in the NFL, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players in 2023 — QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 39) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 75). It marked the second career appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the third for Hendrickson.

Burrow's ranking at No. 6 is the highest ever by a Bengal, surpassing A.J. Green, who was voted at No. 9 in 2014. This year's list was the fourth time that three or more Bengals players were featured.

**Esiason, Johnson join Bengals Ring of Honor:** The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor with the induction of former QB Boomer Esiason and WR Chad Johnson. Remembered by fans for their on-field contributions as well as their charismatic personalities, Esiason and Johnson became the seventh and eighth members of the Ring of Honor during a ceremony at halftime of the team's Week 3 game against the L.A. Rams on Monday Night Football.

Esiason played for the Bengals from 1984-92 before returning for a final season in '97, and is regarded as one of the greatest locker-room leaders in team history. He earned three Pro Bowl nods (1986, '88-89), and ranks third in Bengals history in both career passing yards (27,149) and TD passes (187). Esiason in 1988 was named NFL MVP while leading the league with a 97.4 passer rating, before steering the Bengals to an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII.

Johnson, who was officially known as Chad Ochocinco from 2008-11, emerged as one of the NFL's elite receivers during his 10 seasons with the Bengals ('01-10). He was selected to six Pro Bowls (2003-07, '09), and remains the team's all-time leader in receptions (751), receiving yards (10,783) and receiving TDs (66).

Bengals president Mike Brown on the 2023 inductees: "Boomer and Chad were both exceptional players. If you look at the statistics, Boomer has a long list of quarterback firsts here. And Chad was a superb athlete who was probably the quickest receiver we have had here. They could have moments when they just carried the team by themselves. Both players are very deserving of this honor."

Esiason and Johnson joined QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley in the Ring of Honor.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

**Ken Riley enters Hall of Fame:** Bengals legend Ken Riley, the most productive CB in team history, was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5. He joined OT Anthony Munoz as former Bengals players immortalized in Canton, Ohio.

The honor came posthumously for Riley, who passed away in 2020 at the age of 72. Riley's wife, Barbara, received the gold jacket on his behalf and revealed the bust with his son, Ken Riley II, who spoke at the enshrinement.

"Dad is just getting inducted today, but his whole life he was a Hall of Famer on and off the field," Ken Riley II said.

Riley spent 15 seasons (1969-83) with the Bengals, playing in 207 games. His 65 career INTs constitute the most dominant lead in any major statistical category of the team's record book, nearly doubling the second-place total of 33. At the time of Riley's retirement, that total of 65 INTs was the fourth-most in NFL history, and it still stands tied for fifth-most. He was a member of five Bengals teams that reached the postseason, including the 1981 squad, which he helped lead to Super Bowl XVI.

Following his retirement, Riley spent two seasons as an assistant coach for the Green Bay Packers before taking over as head coach at his alma mater, Florida A&M University. He led the Rattlers' football program from 1986-93, then served as the school's athletic director from '94-2004. Riley was inducted into the FAMU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1982, the Black College Football Hall of Fame in 2015, and the Bengals Ring of Honor in '21.

**Bengal bites:** Since 2011, the Bengals own a 68-6-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points ... Entering Week 6, the average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.04 years ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is WR Tyler Boyd, who is in his eighth season with the team after joining the Bengals as a second-round draft pick in 2016 ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 30 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is DE Myles Murphy, who is 21 (born Jan. 3, 2002) ... The lightest player on the roster is CB DJ Turner II, who is listed at 180 pounds ... The heaviest player on the roster is OT Orlando Brown Jr., who is listed at 345 pounds ... Brown is also the tallest player on the roster, listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

## POSITION BY POSITION

**Quarterbacks:** Fourth-year pro Joe Burrow has put together one of the most promising starts to a career by a QB in NFL history. The No. 1 overall draft pick in 2020 has already reached several career milestones including 1000 completions, 12,000 passing yards and 85 TD passes. He also has the third highest career completion percentage in league history at 67.57 (minimum 1500

passing attempts). Burrow holds Bengals single-season records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22), passer rating (108.3; '21) and 300-yard passing games (six; '21). He earned his first career Pro Bowl nod and was an MVP candidate in 2022, when he tied for second in the NFL in TD passes, ranked fifth in

completions, fifth in passing yards (4475) and sixth in passer rating (100.8). A team captain for the fourth consecutive year, Burrow returned to practice on Aug. 30 after missing the majority of training camp due to a calf strain. He signed a five-year contract extension on Sept. 9 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2029 season. Burrow in Week 5 at Arizona completed 36 of 46 passes for 317 yards and three TDs, marking his sixth-most attempts and fourth-most completions in any career game. Listed second on the QB depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster coming out of training camp for the first time in his career. Originally a college free agent signee of Minnesota in 2019, Browning spent the '19 and '20 seasons on the Vikings' practice squad, then joined the Bengals prior to the '21 campaign and spent the past two years on the Cincinnati practice squad. He saw action in all three preseason games, completing 32 of 45 attempts for 277 yards (71.1 completion percentage) and one TD. He made his NFL debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, entering late in the fourth quarter in relief of Burrow. Browning was a four-year starter (2015-18) at the University of Washington, where he led the Huskies to the College Football Playoff in '16 and finished his career with numerous school records.

**Running backs:** Leading the Bengals running back room is seventh-year pro **Joe Mixon**, who ranks fourth in team history in career rushing yards (5706) and rushing TDs (41). Mixon has surpassed the 1000-yard mark in three of his five full seasons (played just six games in 2020), and in 2022 he asserted himself as a reliable pass catching option with career highs in receptions (60) and receiving yards (441). Voted a team captain for the third straight year, Mixon has 328 rushing yards on 84 carries (3.9) through five games. He scored his first TD of the year in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, finding the end zone on a 14-yard run to give Cincinnati a lead in the third quarter. Mixon's 5706 yards are the seventh most among active NFL players. Next on the running backs depth chart is fifth-year veteran **Trayveon Williams**. Williams has served as a reserve HB with 39 games of experience, totaling 258 rushing yards on 52 carries along with 10 catches for 68 yards. He stepped in as the team's primary KOR midway through the 2022 season, returning 16 kicks for 356 yards (22.3 average), with a 42-yard long in Week 11 at Pittsburgh. Third-year pro **Chris Evans** had 17 carries for 77 yards his rookie season, but none in 2022. He opened the 2023 season with two carries for 12 yards in Week 1 at Cleveland. Evans also is the team's primary kickoff returner. Cincinnati used its fifth-round draft choice this past April to select **Chase Brown**, a compact runner out of the University of Illinois. Brown had an impressive career with the Illini, totaling 3206 rushing yards on 605 attempts (5.3 average) with 18 TDs. He was a second-team All-American, second-team All-Big Ten selection and the first Doak Walker Award finalist (nation's top running back) in program history in 2022. He made his NFL debut and recorded his first rushing attempt in Week 2 vs. Baltimore, then had his first reception in Week 4 at Tennessee.

**Wide receivers:** The Bengals' wide receiver room is highlighted by one of the most explosive pass-catching trios in the NFL, with the senior member being eighth-year pro **Tyler Boyd**. Boyd is regarded as a premier slot receiver that poses a challenge for nickel CBs with his size (6-2, 203) and route-running ability. He ranks fifth in team history in career receptions (469) for 5499 yards and 29 TDs, and posted consecutive seasons of 1000 or more yards in 2018-19. In Week 2 vs. Baltimore, Boyd had 52 receiving yards on six catches, including on crucial third- and fourth-down conversions on Cincinnati's two TD drives. Boyd's four TD catches of 50-plus yards since the start of the 2021 season rank as the third most in the league, and leading that category with seven such TDs is teammate and third-year pro **Ja'Marr Chase**. Chase was the team's first-round draft pick in 2021 and has led the Bengals in receptions, receiving yards and receiving TDs in each of his first two seasons. He is a two-time Pro Bowler and last season joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss as the only players in NFL history with over 2000 receiving yards and 20 TD catches before turning 23 (turned 23 on March 1, 2023). Chase helped lead the Bengals to their first win in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, amassing 141 yards on 12 catches. In Week 5 at Arizona, Chase had a Bengals-record 15 catches for 192 yards and three TDs, including a 63-yard TD early in the third quarter. He became the fifth player since 1950 with 15 receptions and three receiving TDs in a single game. Chase missed four games in 2022 due to a hip injury, but still managed 87 grabs for 1046 yards and nine TDs. Another Cincinnati receiver with a proven history of big plays is fourth-year pro **Tee Higgins**. Higgins, a second-round pick in 2020, has quickly developed into one of the NFL's top young talents. He has posted over 1000 receiving yards in each of the past two seasons, becoming one of five players in team history to do so within his first three years. Higgins had four 100-yard receiving games in 2022, including two when Chase was out of the lineup in Weeks 11-12. At 6-4, he possesses elite athleticism and the ability to high-point the ball when contested by defensive backs. Higgins led Cincinnati with eight

receptions for 89 yards, including two TD grabs in the second half, in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. He left the Week 4 contest at Tennessee with a rib injury in the third quarter and was inactive in Week 5 at Arizona. Fellow fourth-year pro **Trenton Irwin** emerged as a dependable option in the WR room last season and is publicly lauded by his coaches and teammates for a strong work ethic. He spent parts of his first three seasons on Cincinnati's practice squad and saw limited game action, but then found a role in 2022 when he played in nine contests with two starts. Despite not making his season debut until Week 8 at Cleveland, Irwin managed to record 15 catches for 231 yards and four TDs. His best performance came on Christmas Eve at New England, when he caught three passes for 45 yards and two TDs in the first half alone to help the Bengals build a 22-0 lead. Irwin saw an increased role in Week 5 at Arizona with Higgins out of the lineup, and delivered with a career-high eight catches for 60 yards. Rounding out the WR room is rookie sixth-round pick **Andrei Iosivas**. The former Princeton Tiger led Cincinnati in receptions (12) and receiving yards (129) during the preseason, and has seen action in all five regular-season contests. He notched his first career catch in Week 5 at Arizona, securing a nine-yard reception during a fourth-quarter TD drive.

**Tight ends:** Among Cincinnati's key free agent acquisitions this offseason was **Irv Smith Jr.**, who is in his fifth NFL season after spending his first four years with Minnesota. Originally a second-round draft pick of the Vikings in 2019, Smith has played in 40 career games with 18 starts and totaled 96 catches for 885 yards and nine TDs. He missed the entire 2021 campaign due to a knee injury and was limited to eight regular-season games in '22 due to an ankle injury, but started the first two regular-season contests for the Bengals and recorded five grabs for 27 yards. Smith missed Weeks 3-4 due to a hamstring injury, but returned to the lineup in Week 5 at Arizona. Next on the depth chart is fellow 2019 second-round pick **Drew Sample**, who since being drafted by the Bengals has established himself as a premier blocking TE in the NFL. Sample missed most of the 2022 season with a knee injury sustained in Week 2 at Dallas, but has played in all five games this season, making two starts. He had a streak of 39 consecutive games played (including postseason) prior to the injury, and has also been a core contributor on special teams for Cincinnati. The Bengals on July 24 re-signed **Mitchell Wilcox**, who spent his first three career seasons with Cincinnati. He had his first two receptions of the season for 10 yards in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams. The University of South Florida product has 23 career catches for 172 yards and a TD in 36 games.

**Offensive linemen:** The Bengals have invested heavily in revamping the offensive line over the past two offseasons, signing four marquee free agents to bolster that unit. The most recent such addition is OT **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who signed with Cincinnati in March after spending his first three seasons in Baltimore (2018-20) and the past two in Kansas City ('21-22). A Pro Bowl selection in each of the past four years, Brown took over as the Bengals' starting LOT and is tasked with protecting QB Joe Burrow's blind side. He was a crucial piece of offensive lines that blocked for Ravens QB Lamar Jackson (2019) and Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. Brown made his first 32 career starts at ROT, then transitioned to LOT midway through the 2020 season and has started his past 48 games at that spot. The nucleus of Cincinnati's O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who signed as a free agent in 2022 and almost instantaneously became a vocal leader in the locker room. Currently serving as a team captain for the second straight season, Karras has experience at all three interior OL positions but quickly cemented himself as the Bengals' starting center and played 99.4 percent of offensive snaps in 2022. He spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, with the only outlier coming in 2020 with Miami. Karras was a member of Patriots Super Bowl winning teams in 2016 and '18, before earning the starting center role in '19. Joining Karras in the 2022 free agency class was RG **Alex Cappa**, who spent his first four seasons with Tampa Bay. Cappa was perhaps the Bengals' most consistent performer on the line through most of the 2022 season, starting the first 16 games before suffering a left ankle injury in the regular-season finale that kept him out of all three playoff contests. He was the Bucs' starting RG from 2019-21 and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team, though he did not play in the final three postseason games due to an injury sustained in the Wild Card Playoff. Second-year pro **Cordell Volson** is building off an impressive rookie season in which he was the team's only player to line up for every single offensive snap in the regular season and postseason (1311 total). Volson originally was a fourth-round draft pick out of North Dakota State University, where he played four different positions along the O-line during his career. He played in a school-record 65 games at NDSU, helping the Bison win four FCS national championships while earning three FCS All-America honors. **Jonah Williams**, the Bengals' first-round pick in 2019, is the team's starting ROT this year after lining up at LOT for his first three full seasons. He has started all 47 regular-season games and all five postseason games he has played in. Williams carried

a streak of 37 consecutive starts before suffering a left knee injury in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore that ended his season. He spent the majority of the offseason rehabbing, including all of the team's mandatory minicamp, but was a full participant in training camp and has played 100 percent of offensive snaps in the regular season. G **Max Scharping** is in his fifth pro season and serves as both a backup right guard and center for Cincinnati. Scharping was acquired by the Bengals on waivers prior to the start of the 2022 season and played in 14 regular-season contests before being thrust into the starting RG spot for all three postseason games following Cappa's injury. He spent his first three pro seasons with Houston, splitting time between RG and LG in 48 games played (33 starts). Another notable free agent addition this offseason was G **Cody Ford**, a fifth-year veteran who originally was a second-round pick of Buffalo in 2019. Ford spent his first three pro seasons with the Bills before playing for Arizona in 2022. He has played in 54 career games with 32 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG and eight at LG. Ford lined up alongside Brown for two seasons (2016-17) at the University of Oklahoma. OT **D'Ante Smith** was inactive for all but one game for Cincinnati during the 2022 regular season, but played in all three postseason contests as a reserve lineman. He was originally a fourth-round pick in 2021 and battled injuries as a rookie, seeing action in just two regular-season games. Smith returned in time for the postseason run, playing in both the AFC Championship and Super Bowl LVI. Third-year pro **Jackson Carman** played in all 17 regular-season games as a rookie in 2021 but saw action in just three contests last season. With the O-line affected by injuries heading into the Divisional Playoff at Buffalo in January, Carman was called upon to start at LOT and played perhaps the best game of his young career, as he helped limit the Bills to one sack and paved the way for Cincinnati's 172 net rushing yards. A native of Fairfield, Ohio (Greater Cincinnati area), Carman played three collegiate seasons at Clemson before the Bengals drafted him in the second round in 2021. C **Trey Hill** has served primarily as a special teams contributor the last two seasons, but started three games (two at C, one at RG) in his 2021 rookie campaign. A sixth-round draft pick, Hill has played in all seven of Cincinnati's postseason games the past two years.

**Defensive linemen:** Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard** is in his sixth Bengals season (fifth as a full-time starter). A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard has 32.5 career sacks, the most among all players from his rookie class. Hubbard recorded his first sack of the season late in the fourth quarter of the Week 3 contest vs. the L.A. Rams, taking down QB Matthew Stafford for an eight-yard loss. He then followed up with a two-yard takedown of QB Ryan Tannehill in Week 4 at Tennessee. In Week 5 at Arizona, Hubbard recovered a Joshua Dobbs fumble in the fourth quarter, setting up a Bengals FG drive. Hubbard also is considered among the best DEs in the NFL against the run and led the Bengals with 11 TFLs in 2022. He made one of the most memorable plays in recent team history during the fourth quarter of the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, returning a fumble 98 yards for what proved to be the game-winning TD. It was his second career fumble returned for a score (regular and postseason). On the other side of the line is DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who led Cincinnati with eight sacks in 2022 to earn his second straight Pro Bowl nod. Hendrickson joined the team as a free agent in 2021 and in his first year posted a career-high 14 sacks, the second most in a season in team history. He is off to a hot start this season with six sacks (tied for second in NFL), including five over the past three games. In Week 5 at Arizona, Hendrickson logged 2.5 sacks, and on one he forced a fumble that Hubbard recovered in the fourth quarter. Hendrickson has totaled 41.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 season are the fourth most in the NFL in that span. On July 27, he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. DT **DJ Reader**, a 6-3, 335-pound run stuffer, has anchored the defensive line since signing with the Bengals as a free agent in 2020. Reader is a key component of a unit that has ranked in the top seven leaguewide in rushing yards allowed per game in each of the past two seasons. His first sack of the 2023 campaign came in the first quarter of Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams, when he brought down QB Matthew Stafford for a nine-yard loss on a goal-to-go situation to help force the Rams into a FG. Reader spent six games on the Reserve/Injured list in 2022 due to a knee injury, but returned in Week 11 and started each contest through the AFC Championship. DT **B.J. Hill** is in his third season with the Bengals and has become a major contributor on the D-line. Hill was acquired in a trade with the N.Y. Giants shortly before the 2021 regular season and has played in 37 games (23 starts) for Cincinnati. Hill started all 16 contests in 2022, posting a career-high 68 tackles with three sacks, one FF, three FR and four PDs. Hill this season has 2.5 sacks, highlighted by a takedown of Rams QB Matthew Stafford in Week 3 that forced an L.A. punt in the fourth quarter. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his third season as a pro, but 2022 was his first

healthy year as he missed his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. The athletic edge rusher showcased his potential last season with 3.5 sacks as a reserve DE. He then posted six tackles in postseason play, including five with a TFL in the AFC Championship at Kansas City. Ossai saw action in all three preseason games and had an INT on the opening drive at Atlanta, but suffered an ankle injury the following week at Washington that caused him to miss the first two regular-season contests. He made his season debut in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, playing five defensive snaps. Second-year DT **Zach Carter** looks to build off a strong rookie season in which he played in all 16 regular-season games with nine starts. Carter, a 2022 third-round pick out of the University of Florida, contributed to the run defense while totaling 23 tackles, a half-sack and a PD. He played in all three postseason games, starting the Wild Card round and AFC Championship as a second DT. He has appeared in all five regular-season contests on defense. Third-year pro **Cam Sample** has played in 35 career regular-season games and serves as a rotational DE. The Tulane University product had 25 tackles with two sacks last season. Sample flashed in the AFC Championship, sacking Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes and bringing down RB Jerick McKinnon for a one-yard loss. Sixth-year DT **Josh Tupou** has been a reliable DT against the run since joining the Bengals as a college free agent in 2017. The 6-3, 340-pound veteran has appeared in 55 games (22 starts) for the Bengals, and has logged 71 total tackles, including a pair of sacks in 2022. The Bengals selected DE **Myles Murphy** out of Clemson University in the first round (28th overall) of this year's draft, looking to bolster their pass rushing production. Murphy totaled 17.5 sacks in 38 games at Clemson, earning second-team All-ACC honors last season. He brings premier size and athleticism to the D-Line room at 6-5, 270 pounds. Murphy recorded his first career tackle and sack on a second-quarter takedown of Ryan Tannehill in Week 4 at Tennessee. The Bengals acquired DT **Jay Tufele** on waivers from Jacksonville prior to the 2022 season opener and it proved to be a valuable move, as he started two games (Weeks 8-9) while Reader was recovering from a knee injury. Tufele finished with 16 total tackles in seven regular-season games for Cincinnati. He has appeared in three regular-season games this season, registering three total tackles.

**Linebackers:** Among Cincinnati's most promising young defenders is fourth-year pro **Logan Wilson**, who wears the "green dot" as the defense's communicator. Wilson led the Bengals in tackles the past two regular seasons, with his career-high 123 stops in 2022 marking the most by a Bengals player since Vontaze Burfict (171) in '13. Wilson also has shown a high proficiency when dropping into coverage, as his nine career INTs are the most by an NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020. That knack for the ball was highlighted in Week 3 when Wilson picked off Rams QB Matthew Stafford twice, including an INT at Cincinnati's 22-yard line that kept points off the board and led to a Bengals FG drive in the third quarter. Wilson was inked to a four-year contract extension on Aug. 5 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Ranking second on the team in tackles last season with 99 was **Germaine Pratt**. Pratt, a fifth-round Bengals pick in 2019 who is in his fifth pro season, has started 59 of 67 regular-season games played. He tied for the team lead with 11 tackles (seven solos) in Week 1 at Cleveland, with a sack and FF, and followed that up with nine stops in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. In Week 5 at Arizona, Pratt led the team with 10 tackles, including a key stop on a Cardinals fourth-and-one in the third quarter, then in the fourth quarter picked off QB Joshua Dobbs to help seal the win. A 2020 seventh-round draft choice of the Bengals, **Markus Bailey** has grown into a key reserve role in the LB room as well as a valuable contributor on special teams. Bailey has played in 48 regular-season games (four starts), and has 51 total defensive tackles as well as 14 special teams tackles. He provided a crucial block during Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble recovery return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore this past January. **Akeem Davis-Gaither** looks to step into an increased role this season after logging a career-best 37 tackles in 16 games (one start) in 2022. Thirteen of those stops came in a dominant Week 3 performance at the N.Y. Jets. Davis-Gaither also played in all three postseason games, recording his first career INT in the Wild Card Playoff against Baltimore. **Joe Bachie** spent the first six games of 2022 on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a left knee injury, but returned to the active roster and saw action in 10 regular-season games and all three postseason contests. He resumed his role as a core special teams player, totaling seven ST tackles in 168 snaps. Bachie has seen action mostly on special teams so far in 2023. The Bengals acquired LB **Devin Harper** on waivers from Dallas on Sept. 29. Harper originally was a sixth-round pick of the Cowboys in 2022 and played in six games for Dallas, including the first three contests of this season. He made his Bengals debut in Week 5 at Arizona, lining up for 14 special teams snaps.

**Defensive backs:** Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the

NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, Hilton is a sure tackler and excellent blitzer. He played in 14 games with four starts during the 2022 regular season, amassing 60 tackles, six PDs and an INT. He has also made several notable plays in the postseason over the past two years, including an INT in the 2021 Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and a sack in the fourth quarter of the '22 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore. Hilton was voted to serve as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. In Week 2 against Baltimore, Hilton tallied five tackles (four solos) along with a PD, and in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams he tipped a pass in the third quarter that resulted in a Logan Wilson INT. **Chidobe Awuzie** arrived in Cincinnati in 2021 alongside Hilton and quickly established himself as the team's No. 1 boundary corner. Awuzie has started all 30 games he's played in for the Bengals (including postseason). His 2022 season was cut short by a knee injury suffered in Week 8 at Cleveland, and he spent the following nine-plus months rehabbing before being cleared to practice on July 25 of this year. Awuzie's first game back came on the same field where he sustained the injury, as he played 43 defensive snaps in Week 1 at Cleveland and recorded a FR in the first quarter. Awuzie missed the Week 5 contest at Arizona due to a back injury. Second-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** is coming off his first career INT (regular season) in Week 5 at Arizona, when he picked off a Joshua Dobbs pass and returned it 11 yards for a go-ahead TD before halftime. Taylor-Britt had a promising rookie season in 2022 that saw him play in the final 10 games with nine starts at outside CB, after beginning the season on Reserve/Injured while recovering from an abdomen injury. He totaled 55 tackles, the eighth most on the team, and went on to start all three postseason contests. His first postseason INT cemented a Bengals victory late in the fourth quarter of the Divisional Playoff at Buffalo. Cincinnati used its 2023 second-round selection on **DJ Turner II**, a speedy boundary corner out of the University of Michigan. Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year's NFL Combine, clocking a time of 4.26 seconds. He recorded three INTs and 20 PDs in four seasons (2019-22) at Michigan and was named second-team All-Big Ten last season. He made his NFL debut in the regular-season opener at Cleveland, notching two solo tackles, and had his first PD in the fourth quarter of Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. His first NFL start came in Week 5 at Arizona in place of an injured Awuzie. **Jalen Davis** serves as a reserve slot CB behind Hilton, but secondary/cornerbacks coach Charles Burks has expressed his opinion that Davis could start for many NFL teams. He has played in 46 career games (including postseason), carving out a role on special teams in addition to his CB duties. He notched his first PD of the season in Week 3 against the Rams. **DJ Ivey**, the Bengals' seventh-round pick in April, made his NFL debut in Week 5 at Arizona after he was inactive for the first four games. Ivey played in 58 games with 32 starts over a five-year career (2018-22) at the University of Miami (Fla.). At 6-1, 192, he provides a rangy frame and displayed impressive ball skills in training camp. Ivey logged 10 tackles and a team-leading three PDs in the preseason. The Bengals this season are rolling out a new-look starting safety tandem consisting of fifth-year veteran **Nick Scott** and second-year pro **Dax Hill**. Scott was among Cincinnati's notable acquisitions during the 2023 free agency period and holds 69 games of NFL experience (22 starts). He spent his first four seasons with the L.A. Rams, starting out as a special teams contributor before gradually increasing his role defensively and eventually becoming the team's starting safety in 2022. Scott is known for his physical play and sure tackling abilities, but also has four INTs and nine PDs. He started each of the Rams four postseason contests on their run to a Super Bowl LVI title. Scott made his Bengals debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, tying for the team lead with 11 total tackles. He also led Cincinnati in tackles with 10 (nine solos) in Week 4 at Tennessee. Hill was the Bengals' first-round draft

choice in 2022 and played in 15 games with two starts as a rookie. He has emerged as one of the defense's top playmakers through five games this season with 35 total tackles (second on team), four TFLs, 1.5 sacks, two INTs and three PDs. His first career INT came in Week 1 at Cleveland, when he picked off QB Deshaun Watson and returned it 20 yards. He had a team-high eight stops, including his first sack and a key TFL, in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, and then grabbed his second INT the following week at Tennessee. Cincinnati took **Jordan Battle** in the third round of this April's draft, adding depth and championship pedigree to the safeties room. Battle was a third-team All-American in each of the past two seasons while at the University of Alabama, and helped the Crimson Tide win the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2020. A fundamentally sound rookie with noted leadership characteristics, Battle had six career INTs with three returned for a TD. He has seen action on 53 defensive snaps in five games, and in Week 5 at Arizona he stepped up with two solo tackles and two PDs. **Tycen Anderson** looks to further carve out a role on the Bengals' defense and took a step toward doing so in the preseason opener vs. Green Bay, when he had two INTs in the second quarter including a 43-yard pick-six. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in 2022, he has seen action primarily on special teams so far this season. Anderson spent the 2022 regular season on the Reserve/Injured list with a hamstring injury, then was designated to return and cleared to practice ahead of postseason play but did not see game action.

**Special teams:** Rookie **Brad Robbins** earned the Bengals' punting role following a strong display in training camp and preseason. A native of Westerville, Ohio (north of Columbus), he is averaging 43.9 gross yards per punt with five downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line through five regular-season contests. In Week 4 at Tennessee, he punted five times for an average of 51.4 yards, including a career-long 62-yard boot. Robbins was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of April's draft after a five-year playing career at the University of Michigan that saw him post the second highest career punting average (43.0 yards per attempt) in program history. Robbins additionally handles holding duties on placekicks. Third-year K **Evan McPherson** has earned a reputation as one of the NFL's top kickers from long range, as his 16 FGs from 50 or more yards are tied for the fourth most in the league since the start of the 2021 campaign. The former fifth-round Bengals draft pick has kicked the two longest FGs in team history — a 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and a 58-yarder in Week 15 of the '21 season at Denver. McPherson is also 19 for 19 on FG attempts in the postseason, the second most consecutive FGs without a miss to begin a postseason career in NFL history. He drilled four of his five FG attempts, with hits from 53 and 54 yards, in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams. The Bengals' long-snapper is second-year pro **Cal Adomitis**, who took over the role in Week 2 of the 2022 season following a season-ending injury to veteran Clark Harris. In 23 career games (including postseason), Adomitis has delivered 191 snaps without an unplayable attempt. He originally joined the Bengals as a college free agent in 2022 after a five-year career ('17-21) at the University of Pittsburgh. WR **Trenton Irwin** is handling punt return duties for the Bengals while rookie WR Charlie Jones, the first-string PR, is on the Reserve/Injured list with a thumb injury. Irwin returned four punts for 68 yards in Week 5 at Arizona, including two for over 20 yards in the first half. HB Chris Evans is slotted as the first-string KOR, a role he held through the first nine games of the 2022 season. In that stretch, he had 10 KORs for 211 yards, with a 29-yard long in Week 5 at Baltimore. He logged two KORs for 45 yards in Week 1 at Cleveland, led off by a 27-yarder on the game's opening kick. HB **Trayveon Williams**, who last season returned 16 kickoffs for 356 yards over the final eight regular-season contests, is also listed at KOR. Williams returned one kickoff for 25 yards in Week 4 at Tennessee.

The Bengals staged one of the great comebacks in franchise history, rallying from a 24-7 deficit in the fourth quarter to force overtime and win on Mike Nugent's 42-yard FG with 3:36 remaining in the extra period. NFL teams facing fourth-quarter deficits of 17 or more points had lost 427 consecutive games, dating back to the start of the 2011 season, before Cincinnati's win. Bengals QB Andy Dalton posted a 136.7 passer rating in the fourth quarter as the Bengals outscored the Seahawks 17-0. He had a 10-yard TD pass to TE Tyler Eifert in the early in the fourth quarter, and later scored himself on a five-yard run. The defense, led by DE Carlos Dunlap and DT Geno Atkins, held the Seahawks to one first down and 27 net yards in the fourth quarter. At the end of the fourth quarter, on fourth down and on Seattle's 13-yard with no timeouts, the Bengals' field goal team rushed onto the field while the offense ran off, and Nugent kicked a nail-biting 31-yard FG as time expired to send the game into OT. The Bengals improved to 5-0 and finished Week 5 with a two-game lead over Pittsburgh in the AFC North Division. Seattle fell to 2-3.

 Sunday, Sept. 8, 2019 at CenturyLink Field

Cincinnati outgained Seattle by 196 net yards (395-161), recorded 10 more first downs (22-12) and held more than a 10-minute advantage in time of possession (35:50-24:10), but the Bengals ultimately were inefficient in converting yards into points and lost their first game under new head coach Zac Taylor. The Bengals scored just one FG in three trips inside the Seahawks' red zone in the game. And in the third quarter alone, three times Cincinnati reached Seattle's 36-yard line or farther (36, 27 and 12) and came away with no points (the drives ended on a fumble, a missed FG and a turnover on downs). Seattle, however, scored TDs on three of their four drives into Cincinnati territory overall, including two TDs on their only two trips inside the Bengals' red-zone. QB Andy Dalton had career highs in yards (418) and completions (35) in 51 attempts, tossed two long TDs to WR John Ross III, and had a 106.5 passer rating. Ross had career highs in catches (seven) and receiving yards (158), and his TDs came on passes of 55 and 33 yards. The Bengals' defense enjoyed a solid game overall, recording four sacks and holding the Seahawks, who led the NFL in rushing in 2018, to just 72 yards on the ground. Seahawks QB Russell Wilson, however, stung the Bengals with a 44-yard TD pass to WR Tyler Lockett on the first play of the fourth quarter for what ultimately were the game's winning points.

### Cleveland Browns 24, Cincinnati Bengals 3 Sunday, Sept. 10, 2023 at Cleveland Browns Stadium

Hindered by wet and rainy conditions, the Bengals were limited to three points and 142 offensive net yards in a season-opening loss to their in-state rival. The Cincinnati defense kept the game within reach, forcing two turnovers and holding the Browns to 13 points through three quarters, but Cleveland's strong rushing attack eventually broke through and finished the day with 206 yards, led by 106 from RB Nick Chubb. Browns QB Deshaun Watson found the end zone on a 13-yard run just before halftime to give the Browns a 10-0 lead at the break, but the Bengals responded with a 42-yard FG from K Evan McPherson early in the third quarter to cut the deficit to seven. A promising drive on Cincinnati's next offensive possession resulted in a missed FG attempt, and the offense did not reach Browns territory the rest of the way as Cleveland held the upper hand in the battle of field position. The Bengals went for it on fourth-and-four from their own 31-yard line with just over 10 minutes remaining in an attempt to jumpstart the offense, but QB Joe Burrow was dropped for a 13-yard sack and the Browns scored three plays later to seal the final outcome. The game was the 100th "Battle of Ohio" between the two teams.

The Bengals' defense recorded six sacks and two INTs to steer Cincinnati to its first win of the season on Monday Night Football.
