GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 7 p.m. Eastern.

Television: Live coverage on the Bengals Preseason TV Network with broadcasters Mike Watts (play-by-play), Anthony Munoz (analyst) and Marisa Contipelli (sideline reporter). The network is led by flagship WXIX-TV (FOX Channel 19) in Cincinnati. Also on the network are WKEF-TV (Ch. 22) in Dayton, Ohio; WSYX-TV (Ch. 6) in Columbus, Ohio; WLIO-TV (Ch. 8.2) in Lima, Ohio; WLEX-TV (Ch. 18; Bounce TV 18.3) in Lexington, Ky.; and WDRB-TV (Ch. 41) in Louisville, Ky.

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals open the preseason at home for a third straight year when they host the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at Paycor Stadium on Saturday night.

Cincinnati heads into the 2024 campaign seeking a return to the postseason, after narrowly missing the playoffs in '23 with a 9-8 record. Despite the team overcoming injuries at key positions to keep itself in the AFC race near the end of December, head coach Zac Taylor has emphasized improvement in all areas during the offseason and through the start of training camp. That priority has been evident in the Bengals' intense approach to practices during the first two weeks of camp, which have featured live tackling drills and extended 11-on-11 periods.

"Everything is pieced together," Taylor said. "Everything needs to improve on our football team. We went 9-8. Everything we're doing in this camp is focused on making us a better team than we were last year. We don't forget anything that we did poorly or was perceived as a weakness last year. We've got to improve on all of it."

Saturday is the start of a busy stretch for Cincinnati, as the Bengals will participate in joint practices with the Chicago Bears and Indianapolis Colts in addition to their preseason games against those opponents over the following two weeks. The schedule reflects Taylor's vision for his team to regain its form from the 2021 and '22 seasons, when it followed up a run to Super Bowl LVI with a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship game.

Taylor said earlier in training camp that he has targeted Saturday's contest as one that could feature several of the Bengals' usual starters. While the roster once again is highlighted by a talented core consisting of QB Joe Burrow, WRs Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins, DE Trey Hendrickson and others, the preseason games also will provide Cincinnati's coaches a chance to evaluate newcomers. That includes notable veteran free agent acquisitions such as TE Mike Gesicki, HB Zack Moss, DT Sheldon Rankins and S Geno Stone, as well as a 10-player rookie draft class and 14 college free agent signees.

Each offseason addition has traits that Bengals coaches and player personnel staffers have said will add to a diligently crafted team environment. History of playing in big games, serving as a team captain and carrying a reputation for competitiveness all are shared commonalities that Taylor stressed the importance of while charting the course for the season ahead.

"There's a lot of guys that have played for Super Bowls and played for national championships," Taylor said. "You look around the room, and guys know what it's supposed to look like. We're certainly at the point where, yes, the coaches have to hold everybody accountable, but so do the players. They're embracing that mentality. We'll see how training camp goes, but I have high

expectations for the standard they're going to set for themselves and for their teammates."

As is always the case in preseason, there are a variety of battles to watch for roster spots, playing time and even starting positions. Some of the notable competitions include running back, right offensive tackle, tight end and punter.

After facing the Buccaneers, Cincinnati will travel to Lake Forest, Ill., for an intersquad practice with the Bears on Thursday, Aug. 15, then face Chicago in the second preseason game on Saturday, Aug. 17 at Soldier Field.

The series: Tampa Bay leads the regular-season series 7-6, thanks to a six-game series win streak in meetings spanning from 1995 through 2010. The Buccaneers are 5-3 in regular-season games played in Cincinnati, including 3-1 at Paycor Stadium. The Bengals, however, now have won the last three regular-season meetings.

Tampa Bay leads the preseason series 9-6, though the Bengals have won the last two meetings — 23-12 at Cincinnati in 2017 and 19-14 at Tampa Bay in 21.

Bengals-Buccaneers connections: Bengals G Alex Cappa (2018-21) and TE Tanner Hudson (2018-20) both played for the Buccaneers ... Bengals senior defensive assistant Mark Duffner served as linebackers coach for the Buccaneers from 2016-18, and spent the final 11 games of the '18 season as the team's interim defensive coordinator ... Bengals G Eric Miller and Buccaneers WR Tanner Knue were teammates at Mason High School in Mason, Ohio (north of Cincinnati) ... Bengals DE Cedric Johnson is the younger brother of Buccaneers WR Cephus Johnson III ... Buccaneers QB Baker Mayfield (2015-17) and WR Sterling Shepherd ('12-15) played at the University of Oklahoma, alongside Bengals OT Orlando Brown Jr. ('15-17) and G Cody Ford ('15-18) ... Buccaneers OT Luke Goedeke played at Central Michigan University in 2018, when Bengals assistant offensive line coach Derek Frazier was the offensive line coach and run game coordinator ... Bengals career records watch: As the 2024 campaign approaches, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 1895 career passing attempts, 326 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list
- Burrow has 14,083 passing yards, 1051 shy of Blake (15,134) for fifth alltime. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top four spots.
- Burrow has 19 games with 300 or more passing yards, tied with Anderson for third-most all-time and four shy of Esiason (23) for second. Dalton (28) is the team's record holder in the category.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 29 career receiving TDs, 12 shy of WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth all-time. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.
- Chase has 14 games with 100 or more receiving yards, four shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.
- DE Trey Hendrickson has 39.5 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 19.5 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.
- K Evan McPherson has an 83.9 career FG percentage (78 made/93 att.), the third-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9 percent; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

Uniform watch: The Bengals wore eight different uniform combinations during the 2023 season, with three different jerseys, three pants and three socks featured at least once. Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms prior to the 2021 campaign, marking the team's first significant redesign since 2004.

The Bengals' most frequent combination in 2023 was white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks, which was worn in four road contests. Cincinnati's most common look at home was black jerseys, white pants (orange stripes) and black socks, which was donned in three games.

NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate jerseys and/or color rush (CR) uniforms and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet four times — twice in 2022 and twice in '23 — and collected a 4-0 record. The "White Bengal" look made its first appearance of the 2023 season in the team's Week 3 win over the L.A. Rams, then was worn again in the Week 13 win at Jacksonville. Both games were played on Monday Night Football.

- * NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or color rush (CR) and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes an orange jersey with one of the team's primary pants. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.
- ^ The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season marks his sixth in the position.

Entering 2024, Taylor holds a regular-season record of 37-44-1 and a postseason record of 5-2. In 2023, he guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6), seventh in scoring (26.6 points) and 11th in

total yards (354.2). Following Burrow's season-ending injury in Week 11, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. Over the final seven weeks of the season, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Taylor's offense in 2023 once again featured several playmakers, including Pro Bowl WR Ja'Marr Chase, who totaled 100 catches (tied for second most in team history) and became the eighth player ever to reach 1000 receiving yards

in each of his first three seasons. In addition, HB Joe Mixon had his fourth career 1000-yard rushing season (1034; third under Taylor), while also topping 1200 yards from scrimmage for the third straight year.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second straight AFC North Division title and the No. 3 seed in the AFC Playoffs. With a pair of postseason victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. He orchestrated a dynamic offense that ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5 per game), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0). Burrow earned his first career Pro Bowl selection and was an MVP candidate, as he set single-season team records for completions (414) and TD passes (35), while Cincinnati boasted a pair of 1000yard receivers in Chase (1046) and Tee Higgins (1029). The Bengals' offensive line featured four new starters, but rapidly improved as the year progressed and allowed no more than two sacks in each of the final eight games. The Bengals also had one of the NFL's most complete defenses in 2022, holding opposing QBs to a league-low 58.9 completion percentage while also ranking sixth in points allowed (20.1 per game) and seventh in rushing yards allowed (106.6).

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3) en route to being named the AP Comeback Player of the Year. Taylor also helped Chase put together one of the top rookie seasons in league history, as the team's first-round pick recorded the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455; since surpassed) and won AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas. Cincinnati then went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City, to earn the franchise's first trip to the Super Bowl since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264). Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor headed off a wave of early season injuries to lead Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). Defensively, Cincinnati allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game in the second half of the season, and notched 11 more sacks.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards and eighth in passer rating, while the Rams' offense finished second leaguewide in total yards per game (421.1) and fifth in passing (281.7). Los Angeles won the NFC West with a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to his time with the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller, after the team made coaching staff changes. During his time in Miami, Taylor was instrumental in the development of QB Ryan Tannehill, the team's first-round draft pick in 2012.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the

Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Todd Bowles enters his third season as head coach of the Buccaneers following three seasons as the team's defensive coordinator (2019-21). Bowles has led the Buccaneers to consecutive NFC South titles, becoming the first coach in team history to lead the Buccaneers to consecutive playoff appearances and consecutive division titles in his first two seasons.

Bowles in 2023 was the play-caller for a defense that finished top 10 in the NFL in points allowed per game (19.1), sacks (48), rushing yards per game (95.3), yards per carry (3.8), red-zone efficiency (42.6 percent), goal-to-go efficiency (58.6 percent) and turnover margin (plus-8). On offense, newly signed quarterback Baker Mayfield put together a Pro Bowl-caliber season with career highs in passing yards (4,044), passing touchdowns (28) and completion percentage (64.3).

Since Bowles joined the Buccaneers in 2019, Tampa Bay's defense ranks first in fewest rushing yards per game allowed (93.0), fewest rush yards per attempt allowed (3.9), opponent fumble recoveries (59), strip sacks (41) and quarterback hits (535) while ranking second in sacks (235), forced fumbles (82) and tackles for loss (439). Additionally, Tampa Bay has also ranked in the top 10 in goal-to-go efficiency (third), takeaways (fifth), red-zone efficiency (fifth), fewest yards per play allowed (sixth), fewest net passing yards allowed per attempt (eighth), defensive touchdowns (tied, eighth), fewest yards per game allowed (ninth), passes defensed (ninth) and lowest third-down conversion rate against (10th). Bowles is considered the architect behind a historic defensive performance that catapulted the Buccaneers to a Super Bowl LV victory, as Tampa Bay held the explosive Kansas City offense to nine points and without a touchdown for the first time in 54 games with Patrick Mahomes as the starting quarterback.

Bowles joined the Buccaneers after four seasons as head coach of the N.Y. Jets (2015-18). Under Bowles, the Jets posted one of the best run defenses in the NFL, holding teams to just 4.0 yards per carry, the sixth-lowest figure in the NFL during that span, and allowed 44 rushing touchdowns, tied for eighth-fewest in that time. Bowles' defense also allowed conversions on 36.0 percent of third downs, the NFL's fourth-lowest mark. Opposing passers completed 60.6 percent of their attempts against the Jets under Bowles, the third-lowest mark in the NFL.

Prior to serving as Jets head coach, Bowles spent two seasons as defensive coordinator of the Arizona Cardinals (2013-14), where he won Assistant Coach of the Year honors from the PFWA and AP in '14. During Bowles' time in Arizona, the Cardinals defense allowed the third-fewest rushing touchdowns (14), fifth-fewest points per game (19.5) and fifth-fewest rushing yards per game (96.6). Bowles' defenses in Arizona also showed a knack for takeaways, recording the fifth-most interceptions (38) and most defensive touchdowns (nine) in the NFL.

Bowles spent one year with the Philadelphia Eagles (2012) as the team's secondary coach, before being named interim defensive coordinator for the final 10 games of the season. Before Philadelphia, Bowles was the Dolphins' assistant head coach/secondary coach for four seasons (2008-11). In 2011, he was named interim head coach for the final three games, going 2-1. Bowles also worked as Cowboys defensive backs coach from 2005-07. His NFL coaching career began in 2000 as the defensive backs coach of the New York Jets prior to four years with the Cleveland Browns, working as the team's nickel package coach ('01-03) and secondary coach ('04).

Bowles got his start as the defensive coordinator for Morehouse College in 1997, followed by a two-year stint as defensive coordinator at Grambling State ('98-99). He played collegiately at Temple, and despite going undrafted in 1986, played eight years in the NFL, with Washington ('86-90 and '92-93) and San Francisco ('91), starting on the '87 Washington team that won Super Bowl

XXII. Following his retirement as a player, Bowles spent two seasons (1995-96) with the Green Bay Packers player personnel department.

Bowles was born in Elizabeth, N.J.. He and his wife, Taneka, have three sons, Todd Jr., Troy and Tyson.

Taylor vs. Buccaneers: Taylor leads, 1-0.

BENGALS NOTES

Coaching staff changes: After returning virtually the entire coaching staff from the 2022 season to the '23 campaign, head coach Zac Taylor now welcomes some new faces in '24, while also internally promoting several coaches to new positions. Perhaps most notably, Dan Pitcher enters his first season as the Bengals' offensive coordinator after serving as the team's quarterbacks coach from 2020-23. Pitcher fills the role left by Brian Callahan, who spent five seasons (2019-23) as Cincinnati's offensive coordinator before becoming head coach of the Tennessee Titans in January.

Taylor also promoted Brad Kragthorpe to quarterbacks coach and Fredi Knighten to assistant quarterbacks coach. Kragthorpe, a former Division-I college quarterback, served as the Bengals' assistant QBs coach last season following two years (2021-22) as assistant wide receivers coach. Knighten also was a D-I signal caller who joined the Cincinnati staff in 2022 as an offensive assistant. Additionally, Jordan Kovacs is in his first season as secondary/safeties coach, after spending the 2022-23 seasons as assistant linebackers coach and '19-21 as defensive quality control coach.

New additions to the staff include Ben Jacobs (assistant special teams coach) Justin Rascati (pass game coordinator), Ronnie Regula (defensive assistant), Jordan Salkin (offensive assistant) and Diamond Simmons (assistant strength and conditioning). Jacobs had an eight-year pro playing career that included five seasons (2014-18) with the Carolina Panthers. He broke into the coaching ranks as assistant special teams coach for the Panthers in 2019, then held the same role for the Washington Commanders from '20-23. Rascati came to Cincinnati from the Minnesota Vikings, where he served as assistant offensive line coach from 2022-23. He previously spent three seasons (2019-21) as an offensive quality control coach with the Denver Broncos.

Regula is in his first season as an NFL coach, after spending the past nine years in the collegiate ranks. He most recently served as a senior defensive analyst at the University of Notre Dame from 2022-23. Salkin spent last season as an offensive analyst at the University of Oregon, following one year (2022) as a defensive analyst at the University of North Carolina. Simmons heads into his first season on an NFL coaching staff, after spending the 2021-23 seasons as associate director of football strength and conditioning at UCLA.

2024 schedule notes: In addition to their six games against fellow AFC North Division teams, the Bengals will face all teams in the AFC West and NFC East divisions.

Cincinnati also will play two games — at home against New England and on the road against Tennessee — that were determined by 2023 divisional standings. As fourth-place finishers in the AFC North, the Bengals are matched up against the fourth-place teams from the AFC East (vs. New England, Week 1) and AFC South (at Tennessee, Week 15).

The NFL in 2021 added a 17th game to the regular-season schedule, and for the Bengals in '24 that will be a Week 4 road contest at Carolina. The additional game each year features an interconference matchup, and is based on the prior season's standings on a rotating four-year cycle. These contests match a first-place team from one division with a first-place team in an opposite-conference division that the team is not scheduled to play that season. The second, third and fourth-place finishers in each division are matched the same way. The home conference for this game switches each season, with the NFC teams hosting the game in 2024.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium for 16 consecutive regular-season games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 season, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home games from 2005-07.

Each of the five highest-attended home contests in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year, with three of those games coming during the '23 season. Cincinnati's Week 9 win over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football had an attendance figure of 66,965, which stands as the second-largest home crowd in team history behind a record 67,260 in Week 4 of the '22 season against Miami. The Bengals faced Houston in Week 10 of 2023 in front of a crowd of 66,526, the third-largest ever, and earlier in the season had an attendance of 66,385 in the Week 6 win over Seattle that ranks fifth. The fourth-

highest attendance figure is 66,399 for the team's Wild Card Playoff victory against Baltimore in January of 2023.

The Paycor Stadium crowds have coincided with a recent string of home success for the Bengals, as they have won 16 of their last 20 games played at the venue dating back to Week 16 of the 2021 season (including postseason). The last time Cincinnati had more home wins in a 20-game stretch was when it went 17-3 at Riverfront Stadium from the 1988 season opener through Week 3 of the '90 season.

Pro Bowl three-peat: WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons, becoming the 20st and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 that tied for second in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Leads lead to Bengals wins: Much of the Bengals' success over the past three seasons has been built on their ability to close out games after jumping in front early. Since the start of the 2021 campaign, Cincinnati has the third-best record in the NFL when scoring first (21-4), the third-best record when leading at halftime (21-3), and the fifth-best record when leading at any point in a game (31-9). The Bengals in 2023 were 5-2 when ahead at the half and 7-1 when leading after three quarters.

Among the many factors contributing to the Bengals' knack for cementing wins has been their defensive play coming out of halftime. Since 2021, Cincinnati has allowed 50 total TDs in the second half/overtime, the second-fewest leaguewide behind Buffalo (46). The Bengals' four-game win streak from Weeks 5-9 last season was highlighted by the defense recording eight takeaways in the second half of play (five INTs, three FRs), while also forcing four turnovers on downs.

Burrow hits the mark: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 1500 career passing attempts in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 67.97, he is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, narrowly ahead of former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.69).

Burrow had three games during the 2023 season in which he completed over 70 percent of his passing attempts. His career-high 87.5 completion percentage on 32 attempts in Week 8 at San Francisco marked the ninth time in his career that he completed at least 75 percent of his passes with 30-plus attempts — the second-most such games in NFL history in a player's first four seasons behind L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (11). Burrow followed his 49ers performance by connecting on 70.5 percent of his passes (31 of 44) for 348 yards and two TDs in the Week 9 win over Buffalo.

Burrow in Week 5 at Arizona went 36 of 46 (78.3 percent) for 317 yards and three TDs, marking his fourth career game with a completion percentage of 75 or higher on at least 40 attempts. The only other QB in team history to accomplish that once was Andy Dalton, who went 33 of 43 (76.7 percent) on Oct. 12, 2014 vs. Carolina.

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 passing attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of

his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Joe guns for 100th TD: QB Joe Burrow enters the 2024 season with 97 career TD passes, the fifth-most in team history, in 52 games played. There are just six QBs in NFL history who have reached 100 TD passes in 53 or fewer games.

Burrow threw his 90th TD pass in Week 8 of the 2023 season at San Francisco, in what was his 49th game. That tied him as the sixth-fastest QB in league history to get to 90 scoring tosses. The former No. 1 overall draft pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, then broke out with 34 TDs in his sophomore campaign. By eclipsing his own team single-season record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years.

Browning as a starter: QB Jake Browning started the Bengals' final seven games of the 2023 season after QB Joe Burrow suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. In those seven contests, Browning completed 163 of 228 passes (71.5 percent) for 1868 yards and 11 TDs with seven INTs, good for a passer rating of 99.1. His 1868 passing yards were the 13th most by any NFL QB since 1950 through their first seven starts, and he became the third QB in that time frame to pass for at least 1500 yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven starts, joining former St. Louis Rams QB Kurt Warner and former N.Y. Jets QB Chad Pennington.

From Weeks 12-18 of last season, Browning ranked second in the NFL in passing yards and completion percentage, third in total completions and yards per attempt, and 10th in TD passes and passer rating. He connected on over 70 percent of his passing attempts in four games in that stretch, including each of his first three starts. He also passed for over 300 yards three times — Week 13 at Jacksonville (354), Week 15 vs. Minnesota (324) and Week 16 at Pittsburgh (335)

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase in 2023 led the Bengals in receptions (100; 12th in NFL), receiving yards (1216; 12th) and receiving TDs (seven, T-18th) to earn his third consecutive Pro Bowl selection. His career-high 100 catches tied former WR Carl Pickens (1996) for the second-most in a season in Bengals history, and his 268 career receptions are the most in a player's first three seasons in team history.

Chase became the eighth player in NFL history to reach the 1000-yard receiving mark in each of his first three seasons, and the second player in team history to do so, joining former WR A.J. Green (2011-13). His 29 career receiving TDs tied with Green for the most ever by a Bengal in their first three years.

Chase holds a career average of 82.6 receiving yards per game (3717 in 45

games), the fourth-highest total in NFL history among all players with at least 3000 yards. He also has 10 career games with 125 or more receiving yards, the fourth-most in league history in a player's first three seasons.

A constant deep threat, Chase's nine career TDs of 50 or more yards are the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. He reached a pair of milestones during the 2023 season, beginning with his 200th catch in Week 5 at Arizona. Playing in just his 34th game, Chase tied as the fourth fastest player in league history to record 200 catches. Only former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (30 games), New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (32) and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry (33) reached the mark in fewer games.

In Week 6 vs. Seattle, Chase surpassed 3000 receiving yards in his 35th career game, tying as the fifth fastest player ever to hit that mark. Beckham (30 games), former Houston Oilers WR Charlie Hennigan (31), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (33) and former San Diego Chargers WR Lance Alworth (34) are the only players to do so in fewer total games.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson further established himself as one of the NFL's top pass rushers in 2023, as he posted a career-high 17.5 sacks that tied for second leaguewide and rank second in Bengals single-season history. The team record is held by DE Coy Bacon, who had 22.0 sacks in the 1976 campaign (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson's 17.5 sacks surpassed his previous career high of 14 in 2021, his first season in Cincinnati, which ranked fifth in the NFL and helped him earn his first career Pro Bowl selection. He put together another Pro Bowl campaign in 2022 with a team-leading eight sacks. Combining his Bengals totals with 13.5 sacks in 2020, his final year with the New Orleans Saints, Hendrickson has 53 sacks over the past four seasons, the third most in the league in that span behind Pittsburgh LB T.J. Watt (62.0) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (58.0).

Originally a third-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017, Hendrickson spent his first four seasons with the Saints before signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in '21. His production for Cincinnati was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in stripes through the '25 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard recorded six sacks during the 2023 regular season, marking his third straight year with at least six and boosting his career tally to 36.5. That total ranks third among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents). Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected that year — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him.

Hubbard also finished the 2023 season with 58 total tackles, the most among Cincinnati's defensive linemen. Seven of his tackles were for losses, and

he added two fumble recoveries that each led to points on the ensuing Bengals offensive possession.

Hubbard has ranked second on the Bengals in sacks in each season since he became the team's starting LDE in 2019. He additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in team history. A native of Cincinnati who attended Archbishop Moeller High School, Hubbard also is known for contributing one of the franchise's most iconic plays, a 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the game-winner in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore following the 2022 season.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: LB Logan Wilson paced the Bengals in tackles for a third straight season with a career-high 135 stops, but perhaps his most notable contributions came when dropping into coverage. A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson had four INTs in 2023, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh in the NFL. His 11 career picks are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick in 2020. It also is tied for the third-most ever by a Bengals LB, trailing Reggie Williams (16) and Al Beauchamp (15).

The 2023 season was Wilson's second in which he recorded four INTs. He also had four picks in 2021, the most by a Bengals LB in a single season since Odell Thurman (five) in '05. Wilson's 135 tackles were the most by any Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign.

Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of two NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five forced fumbles, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith. His three FFs in the 2023 campaign came during a four-game stretch from Weeks 10-13.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the '27 season.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson heads into his fourth pro season with a reputation as one of the NFL's top long-distance kickers. He has 21 career made FGs from 50 or more yards, which already are the most in Bengals history and the most in league history in a player's first three seasons. That total also is tied for the most by any kicker since McPherson entered the league in 2021, alongside Pittsburgh K Chris Boswell and Arizona K Matt Prater.

Seven of McPherson's made kicks from 50-plus yards out came in 2023, highlighted by a 56-yarder in Week 8 at San Francisco that tied for the second-longest FG ever at Levi's Stadium (opened in 2014). It also was the fifth-longest made FG in Bengals history, with McPherson already owning three of the top four on that list.

Also known for his ability to convert kicks in high-pressure situations, McPherson nailed two game-winning "walk-off" FGs in 2023, beginning with a 48-yarder in overtime of Week 13 at Jacksonville. Two weeks later, he drilled a 29-yarder in OT to help the Bengals defeat Minnesota.

Dillon, Krumrie to enter Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals announced in July that former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie will be inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of the Week 3 Monday Night Football game against the Washington Commanders. They will become the ninth and 10th members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, joining QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. This was the fifth time that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Bengal bites: The Bengals enter the 2024 season with 394 all-time regular-season wins, just six shy of 400; Cincinnati captured its 100th regular-season victory on Sept. 12, 1982 vs. the Houston Oilers, its 200th on Dec. 22, 1996 vs. Indianapolis, and its 300th on Nov. 18, 2012 vs. Kansas City ... Since 2011, the Bengals own a 73-7-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals roster is DE Sam Hubbard, who enters his seventh season with the team ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 31 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is OT Amarius Mims, who is 21 (born Oct. 14, 2002) ... The lightest player on the roster is CB DJ Turner II, who is listed at 180 pounds ... The heaviest player on the roster is OT Trent Brown, who is listed at 380 pounds ... There is a four-way tie for tallest player on the roster at 6-8 between Brown, Mims, OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Eric Miller ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick Joe Burrow enters his fifth pro season once again leading a young and talented Cincinnati offense. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). He also currently is the NFL's alltime leader in career completion percentage, maintaining a mark of 67.97 percent (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Though his 2023 season was limited due to injuries, including a wrist injury that caused him to miss the final seven games, he was at full health from Weeks 5-10 and led Cincinnati to a 4-1 record in that stretch. During those six weeks (five games played), he led the league in completion percentage (74.1) and ranked second in passer rating (107.0). Prior to the start of last season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension which, at the time, made him the highest-paid player in NFL history (average annual value since surpassed). Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following Burrow's season-ending injury last November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time last year, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals (2021-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Fifth-year veteran Logan Woodside returned to Cincinnati during the offseason, after originally entering the league as a seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018. He has seen action in 13 regular-season games during his career, primarily as a reserve QB for the Tennessee Titans (2020-21) and Atlanta Falcons ('22-23). His career numbers are four completions on seven attempts for 34 yards with an INT. He also played in seven games for the San Antonio Commanders of the Alliance of American Football (AAF) in 2019. Woodside is a native of Frankfort, Ky. (approximately 80 miles south of Cincinnati), and had an impressive collegiate career at the University of Toledo which included being named the Mid-American Conference Offensive Player of the Year in 2017. Rounding out the Bengals' QB room is rookie Rocky Lombardi, who signed with the team as a college free agent in May. Lombardi spent the past three seasons (2021-23) at Northern Illinois University, after beginning his collegiate career at Michigan State University ('18-20). He finished his Northern Illinois career ranking second in program history in passing yards per game (183.9), third in completions per game (14.5), fifth in total completions (439) and sixth in passing yards (5516). Lombardi was a foursport athlete at Valley High School in West Des Moines, Iowa, where in addition to football, he participated in wrestling, baseball and track and field.

Running backs: The Bengals' running backs room features an explosive duo in fifth-year veteran **Zack Moss** and second-year pro **Chase Brown**. One of Cincinnati's marquee acquisitions in free agency this offseason, Moss has played in 53 career games with 11 starts for the Buffalo Bills and Indianapolis Colts. He entered the league as a third-round draft pick of the Bills

in 2020, and after amassing 917 rushing yards and eight TDs in two-plus seasons with Buffalo, he was traded to the Colts in November of '22. He is coming off his best statistical season in 2023, as he set career highs in rushing attempts (183), rushing yards (794), rushing TDs (five) and receptions (27). Brown heads into his second season figuring to have a larger role in the Bengals' offense. Cincinnati's fifth-round draft choice in 2023 saw limited action over the first 12 weeks of his rookie campaign, which included four games spent on the Reserve/Injured list due to a hamstring injury, but he provided an explosive element to the offense during the final six contests of the regular season. In that stretch, he netted 322 yards from scrimmage with 4.1 yards per carry and 13.5 yards per reception. His first career TD (Dec. 10 vs. Indianapolis) came via a screen pass that he took 54 yards to the end zone, and his top speed of 22.05 mph on the play made him the second-fastest ball carrier in the NFL last season. Trayveon Williams enters his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's kickoff returner in 2023, netting 290 return yards on 12 attempts. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, while also contributing 15 career receptions for 74 yards. Sixth-year veteran Chris Evans also has experience as a kickoff returner, taking over that role late in the 2021 regular season and maintaining it through the Bengals' postseason run to Super Bowl LVI. Evans has played in 34 career games and rushed for 89 yards on 19 attempts, along with 19 catches for 188 yards and three TDs. He saw action in eight games last season, primarily as a special teams contributor (122 ST snaps played). A pair of rookies who signed with the team as college free agents round out the running backs depth chart — Noah Cain and Elijah Collins. Cain finished his collegiate career at Louisiana State (2022-23), after spending three years ('19-21) at Penn State. He played in 51 total games in college, and rushed for 1396 yards on 306 attempts with 25 TDs. A powerful short-vardage back listed at 5-10, 222 pounds, he scored 10 rushing TDs during his first LSU season in 2022, which tied for fourth in the Southeastern Conference. Collins spent the majority of his collegiate career at Michigan State University (2018-22), before finishing up with one season at Oklahoma State in '23. In 52 total games played (42 at MSU, 10 at OSU), he rushed 383 times for 1648 yards (4.7 average) with 13 TDs. He was used as a rotational back over his final four seasons, but in 2019 at Michigan State he ranked fourth in the Big Ten Conference in rushing attempts (222) and rushing yards (988).

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receivers are led by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the Bengals' first-round draft pick in 2021, has kicked off his career with three straight Pro Bowl seasons. He has led the team in receptions, receiving yards and receiving TDs in each year, and he is one of eight players in NFL history to reach 1000 receiving yards in three consecutive seasons to begin his career. He posted a career-high 100 receptions in 2023, which tied former WR Carl Pickens for the second-most in a season in team history, while his 1216 yards ranked 12th in the NFL. A constant downfield threat, Chase has a league-leading nine TD catches of 50 or more yards since the start of the 2021 campaign. Higgins had back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then finished with 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He missed five

games in 2023 due to injuries, but when healthy he contributed five TD catches and averaged 15.6 yards per reception. Listed at 6-4, 219 pounds, Higgins has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Higgins' 3684 career receiving yards rank 20th in the NFL since he entered the league as a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2020. Trenton Irwin spent his first three seasons with the Bengals (2019-21) primarily as a practice squad player and game day inactive, but over the past two years he has emerged as a dependable option for Cincinnati quarterbacks. After totaling just three receptions in those first three seasons, he has 40 catches for 547 yards and five TDs since the start of the 2022 campaign, including a careerhigh 25 grabs for 316 yards in '23. Though listed as a backup on the depth chart last season, he started five games and showed an ability to line up at multiple WR positions. Bengals coaches and players have shared their predictions for Andrei losivas to make a jump in his second pro season. A sixth-rounder out of Princeton in 2023, losivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams. He caught 15 passes for 116 yards and four TDs, highlighted by a two-TD performance in the season finale against Cleveland on Jan. 7. He possesses an ideal frame for an outside receiver at 6-3, but during the current training camp he also has seen action lining up in the slot. A native of Honolulu, Hawaii, he earned All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. Second-year pro Charlie Jones served as the team's primary punt returner in his rookie campaign, in addition to being a reserve receiver. He caught seven passes for 64 yards offensively, and returned 23 punts for 248 yards (10.8 average) and one TD. He missed six games midseason due to a thumb injury, but returned to play in each of the final eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals added another downfield threat in the third round of April's draft when they selected slot receiver **Jermaine Burton**. Burton played in 26 games at the University of Alabama from 2022-23, after seeing action in 24 games at the University of Georgia from '20-21. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while his 20.5 yards per reception led the Southeastern Conference and ranked sixth nationally. Burton has spent each offseason since 2020 being trained by former Bengals WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh in Southern California. Second-year pro **Kendric Pryor** originally was a college free agent signee of the Bengals in 2022 and impressed during his rookie preseason, but was waived at final cuts and spent his first regular season with the Jacksonville Jaguars (no games played). He returned to Cincinnati in October of last year and spent the final 13 games of the 2023 season on the team's practice squad. Kwamie Lassiter II spent his second straight season on the Bengals' practice squad after joining the team as a college free agent in 2022. He has played in two regularseason games as a practice squad elevation, including Week 5 at Arizona last season when he recorded his first career reception. The moment was notable for Lassiter, whose late father, Kwamie Lassiter, played DB for the Cardinals from 1995-2002. **Shedrick Jackson** spent his rookie season in 2023 on the Bengals' practice squad, but was elevated to the active roster for three games and saw action on offense and special teams. He signed with Cincinnati as a college free agent in 2023 following a five-year career at Auburn University (2018-22). His great uncle, Bo Jackson, was a Heisman Trophy winner at Auburn and played four seasons as an RB for the Los Angeles Raiders along with nine seasons in Major League Baseball. The Bengals added to their receiver depth when they signed free agent Hakeem Butler on July 26. The tallest listed WR for Cincinnati at 6-5, Butler has already been active in training camp while developing a rapport with the team's quarterbacks. He originally was a fourth-round draft pick of the Arizona Cardinals in 2019, but missed his entire rookie season due to a hand injury and was waived the following year. He played in two games for the Philadelphia Eagles in 2020 as a converted tight end, and was not on an NFL roster during the '21-23 regular seasons. He had two separate stints with the St. Louis Battlehawks of the XFL/United Football League, and in 2024 he was named the UFL Offensive Player of the Year after leading the league in receiving yards (652) and yards per reception (14.5). College free agent signee Cole Burgess put together a noteworthy career at Division III SUNY Cortland, the alma mater of Bengals offensive coordinator Dan Pitcher. His Cortland accolades included four first-team All-Empire 8 Conference selections and a D-III national title in 2023. Last season, he led the conference in receptions (87), receiving yards (1375; fourth in D-III) and receiving TDs (16), and in the national championship game he caught the go-ahead TD with under two minutes left to

help lead the Red Dragons to victory. Fellow CFA **Tre Mosley** spent the past five seasons (2019-23) at Michigan State, where he posted 126 catches for 1464 yards and 10 TDs in 43 games played. He had at least one catch in 42 of 43 games, including a streak of 25 straight games to end his career. Mosley last season ranked third on the Spartans in catches (28) and receiving yards (288).

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, Drew Sample has played in 61 career games with 35 starts and has earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of last season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 80 career receptions for 621 yards and three TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and post 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. The Bengals looked to add a pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent Mike Gesicki in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last season. In 98 career games, he has 260 receptions for 2861 yards (11.0 average) and 20 TDs. Standing 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, Gesicki challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. He topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** began the 2023 season on the Bengals' practice squad, but was signed to the active roster in early November and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in catches (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals used their fourth-round draft choice this past April to select Erick All Jr., a native of Fairfield, Ohio (approximately 25 miles north of Cincinnati). All is working his way back to full health from a knee injury and began training camp on the Active/Non-Football Injury list, but on July 28 passed a physical and was cleared to practice. He spent his first four collegiate seasons (2019-22) at the University of Michigan, then transferred to the University of Iowa for the '23 campaign. In 40 career games, he caught 75 passes for 864 yards and five TDs, and Bengals coaches said they were impressed with his wellrounded skill set during the scouting process. The Bengals doubled-up on tight ends during the draft when they took Tanner McLachlan out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, he is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown. Cam Grandy signed with Cincinnati as a college free agent during the offseason, after putting together an All-American season at the FCS level in his lone year at Illinois State University. In 11 starts for the Redbirds, he led all Missouri Valley Football Conference TEs with 612 receiving yards on 63 catches with three TDs. He transferred to Northern Illinois from Missouri Western State University.

Offensive line: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C Ted Karras, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his two seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 36 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 2379 of a possible 2398 offensive snaps in that time (99.2 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolisbased Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who started all 17 games at LOT in his first Bengals season in 2023. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with the Baltimore Ravens, then played two ('21-22) with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. RG Alex Cappa joined Karras in signing with the Bengals during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in over the past two seasons. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. Former fourth-round draft pick Cordell Volson heads into his third pro

season having started 36 consecutive games at LG to begin his career (including postseason). He is the only player on the Bengals to line up for every offensive snap during the 2022 regular season, '22 postseason and '23 regular season. Though he has found his role in Cincinnati as the team's LG, he lined up at guard and tackle on both sides during his five-year collegiate playing career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. A free agent signee this offseason, OT Trent Brown brings nine years of pro playing experience to the O-line room. He is the heaviest player on Cincinnati's roster, listed at 380 pounds, and at 6-8 he is tied with four fellow Olinemen for the tallest Bengal. He played for three teams prior to the Bengals, including two separate stints with the New England Patriots, and has seen action in 100 regular-season games (93 starts). He entered the league as a seventhround pick of the San Francisco 49ers in 2015, and earned a Pro Bowl selection in '19 as a member of the Oakland Raiders. He also was a starter for the Patriots on their Super Bowl LIII winning team in 2018. Brown began training camp on the Active/Non-Football Injury list, but passed a physical and was cleared to practice on Aug. 4. Competing with Brown for the starting ROT spot is rookie Amarius Mims, the Bengals' first-round draft choice this past April (18th overall). Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 340 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He spent three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping the Bulldogs win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. Last season, he started six games on an offensive line that led the SEC in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.93). His first career start at Georgia came in the 2022 College Football Playoff semifinal against Ohio State. Cody Ford, a former college teammate of Orlando Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma, signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and served as a key depth piece in his first season with Cincinnati. He saw action in all 17 games, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth Olineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He has played in 66 career games with 33 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG and one as a third TE. Ford was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. A fellow former second-rounder, **Jackson Carman** was drafted by the Bengals in 2021 and has played in 22 regular-season games with six starts. He has seen action both at guard and tackle, but his most notable contribution came during the 2022 postseason when he was thrust into the starting LOT role ahead of the AFC Divisional Playoff at Buffalo. That game, he helped limit the Bills to just one sack while paving the way for 172 Bengals rushing yards. He appeared in two games in 2023, primarily on special teams, while being inactive for eight contests and active/DNP for seven. C Trey Hill was inactive for each game in 2023, after serving as a reserve center and special teams contributor during his first two pro seasons. A sixth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, he started three games during his rookie season, and he has played in each of the team's seven postseason contests from '21-22. G Jaxson Kirkland spent the first 10 games of his rookie season in 2023 on Cincinnati's practice squad, then was moved to the Practice Squad/Injured list for the remainder of the year due to a wrist injury. A 2023 college free agent signee, he was an AP third-team All-American at the University of Washington in '22 and earned three first-team All-Pac-12 selections during his career with the Huskies. OT D'Ante Smith was active for eight games in 2023, but did not see game action. A fourth-round pick in 2021, he battled injuries throughout his rookie season and has played in just three regular-season contests, but also has seen the field in five postseason games for Cincinnati, including a pair of AFC Championship contests and Super Bowl LVI. OT Devin **Cochran** signed with the Bengals as a college free agent in 2022 and spent his entire rookie season on the team's practice squad, then missed the '23 campaign due to a knee injury. He started all 44 games he played in during his collegiate career at Vanderbilt (2016-19) and Georgia Tech ('21). The Bengals signed C Nate Gilliam midway through training camp in 2022, and he has spent the past two regular seasons on the team's practice squad. He previously spent time on the practice squads of the L.A. Chargers and Pittsburgh Steelers, after a four-year career (2016-19) at Wake Forest University. C Matt Lee was the Bengals' final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft. Lee played in 51 games in college, spending the first four years of his career (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16), while blocking for an offense that ranked second in the conference in total yards per game (431.2). Rounding out the O-line room is G Eric Miller, a local college free agent signee from Mason, Ohio (north of Cincinnati). He spent his final collegiate season in 2023 at the University of Louisville, following four

years ('19-22) at Purdue. He played in 14 games for the Cardinals last season and picked up honorable mention All-ACC accolades.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE Trey Hendrickson, who has led the Bengals in sacks and been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his three seasons with the team. A 2021 free agent acquisition, he is coming off a career-high 17.5 sacks in '23 that tied for second in the league and ranked second in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 53.0 sacks since the start of the 2020 season — his final year with the New Orleans Saints — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (62.0) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (58.0). On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate Sam Hubbard, who enters his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has recorded 36.5 career sacks, the third-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons, and his 58 total tackles in 2023 led all Bengals D-linemen. Cincinnati acquired DT B.J. Hill in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team. Hill has started each of his last 39 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22 and all 17 regular-season games in '23. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 13 sacks over the past three seasons while also batting down/tipping nine passes at the line of scrimmage. Ninth-year veteran **Sheldon Rankins** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March and brings 109 games of NFL experience to the D-line group. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, he spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). Alongside Hill, he provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 29.5 career sacks and 43 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in his career, and included a career-high three on Nov. 12 at Paycor Stadium against the Bengals. DE Joseph Ossai enters his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, he has played in 30 career regular-season games and totaled 27 tackles with 4.5 sacks. Ossai was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, the same year he watched his first football game. Anarumo has praised the potential of third-year DT Zach Carter during training camp, listing him among the veteran starters and high draft picks as interior linemen who can see substantial playing time. Carter played in all 17 games last season, making five starts as an extra DT. A third-round selection of the Bengals in 2022, he has 46 total tackles in 33 career appearances (14 starts). Nose tackle Jay Tufele has provided depth for the Bengals since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He saw action in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. Fourth-year pro Cam Sample has played in 47 career regular-season games with three starts as a rotational DE. The Tulane University product had a careerbest 29 tackles with 1.5 sacks last season. DE Myles Murphy, the team's firstround draft pick in 2022 out of Clemson University, played in all 17 games during his rookie campaign. He logged 20 tackles with three sacks, while also contributing on special teams. Murphy was the first D-lineman taken by the Bengals in the first round since DE Justin Smith in 2001. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT Kris Jenkins Jr. out of the University of Michigan. Noted for his leadership qualities in addition to his onfield production, Jenkins was a team captain who started every game for the national champion Wolverines in 2023. He was a second-team All-American and second-team All-Big Ten selection in his final season in Ann Arbor, racking up 37 tackles, 4.5 TFLs and 2.5 sacks. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. Forty-eight picks after Jenkins, Cincinnati took run-stuffing DT McKinnley Jackson out of Texas A&M. Jackson was a two-time team captain for the Aggies who played in 40 career games. He totaled 91 tackles, with 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks. At 331 pounds, he Is the heaviest defensive player on the Bengals roster (fifth heaviest overall). DE **Jeff Gunter** saw action in 10 games as a rookie with the Bengals in 2022, then spent the entire '23 campaign on the team's practice squad. Gunter racked up 18 career sacks in four seasons at Coastal Carolina University, where he was a three-time All-Sun Belt Conference selection. DT Domenique Davis has spent his two Bengals seasons (2022-23) on the team's practice squad, but three times he has been elevated to the active roster and he saw action in two contests in '22 (three tackles). He was not with an NFL team for two seasons after originally entering the league as a college free agent signee of the N.Y. Jets, and in that time he played for the Houston Gamblers of the USFL. Davis is the first player out of the

University of North Carolina-Pembroke to play in the NFL. DT Travis Bell was acquired on waivers by Cincinnati in December of 2023, after spending time with Chicago and Atlanta earlier in his rookie season. He played in two games for the Falcons, then was inactive for the Bengals' final three games of the regular season. A seventh-round pick of the Bears, Bell was the first ever NFL draft pick out of Kennesaw State University. DT Devonnsha Maxwell spent his entire rookie season in 2023 on the Reserve/Injured list due to a knee injury, after signing with the Bengals as a college free agent last offseason. He played five seasons (2018-22) at the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga, where he posted a school-record 37.5 career sacks and was the Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Year in '21. Maxwell was placed on the Active/Physically Unable to Perform list on July 20. The Bengals selected DE Cedric Johnson in the sixth round of this year's draft, and the University of Mississippi product looks to carry over an honorable mention All-SEC season in 2023 to the NFL ranks. He logged a career-high 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at Ole Miss, and went on to participate in the 2024 Reese's Senior Bowl. Fellow rookie DE Justin Blazek joined the Bengals as a college free agent signee following a standout career at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville (Division III). He was a two-time American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) first-team All-American, and in 33 career games he tallied 19.5 sacks and 37 TFLs. Blazek also showed capability in pass coverage with four career INTs and nine pass breakups. He was named the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) Defensive Player of the Year each of the past two seasons.

Linebackers: A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, Logan Wilson has developed into one of the NFL's top LB and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most by any LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. Recognized for his versatility, Wilson is one of two NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs since the start of the 2020 season, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. The team's starting LB tandem features Wilson and sixth-year pro Germaine Pratt, who has set career highs in tackles in each of the past two seasons. Pratt has a knack for forcing gamechanging turnovers, and is one of four players leaguewide with at least 300 tackles, five INTs and five FFs since the start of the 2021 campaign. He has started 71 of 79 career regular-season games played, and brings a streak of 61 consecutive starts (including postseason) into 2024. Akeem Davis-Gaither has played in 54 games with four starts over four seasons with the Bengals, serving as a rotational LB and core special teamer. He battled through a knee injury in 2023, but managed to play in 13 contests and record 16 tackles. His 289 special teams snaps played last season were third-most on the team. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro Joe Bachie. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 26 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 34 career tackles and one PD in 39 games played. Third-year pro Devin Harper was acquired on waivers by Cincinnati in September of last year, and saw action in six games in a special teams role. He originally was a third-round draft pick of the Dallas Cowboys in 2022, and played in the first three games of his rookie campaign before suffering a season-ending Achilles injury. LB Shaka Heyward signed with Cincinnati as a college free agent during the 2023 offseason and spent his rookie season on the practice squad. He was a two-time All-ACC performer at Duke, where he logged 340 tackles with 11 sacks in 51 games played. Rookie LB Aaron Casey signed with the Bengals as a college free agent in May, coming off a final season at Indiana University in which he tallied 109 tackles and earned first-team All-Big Ten honors. He was the first Hoosiers player since 2016 to reach 100 stops, and his 20 TFLs ranked fourth on the school's single-season record list. A fellow rookie CFA from the Big Ten, Maema Njongmeta spent the past four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin. He took over a starting LB job in his junior season, and over his final two years he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though one of the smallest players on the roster at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and excellent blitzer with 11.5 career sacks. He was voted a team captain for the first time in 2023, and recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). He also had a pair of INTs and eight PDs last season. Hilton entered the

league as a college free agent signee by Jacksonville in 2016, and was briefly on New England's practice squad before spending four-plus seasons with Pittsburgh. Third-year pro Cam Taylor-Britt looks to continue his ascension as a bona fide number one outside CB. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 21 of 22 career games played and quickly proven he can match up against opposing teams' top WRs. He missed five games last season due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. Taylor-Britt was not in uniform for the start of training camp as he recovered from tonsil surgery, but has since returned to action and is a full participant in practices. DJ Turner II gained valuable experience as a rookie in 2023. Turner played in all 17 games, with 12 starts in the final 13 contests, and logged 50 tackles along with seven PDs. He was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals who ran the fastest 40-yard dash time among all players at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. Dax Hill, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2022 and Turner's former University of Michigan teammate, is making the transition from safety to cornerback ahead of his third season. He started every game at S in 2023, ranking third on the team with 110 tackles while adding 11 PDs and two INTs. He was a reserve S during his rookie campaign, contributing primarily on special teams. Fifth-year pro Jalen Davis is a reserve slot corner and special teams contributor who joined the Bengals midway through the 2020 season. He played in 16 games last season, tallying three defensive tackles and two special teams stops. He saw action in just 11 games over his first three years in the league, spending time with Miami and Arizona before Cincinnati, but has since played in 44 regular-season contests in his past three seasons as a Bengal. Cincinnati signed free agent CB Nate Brooks on July 26, adding a second-year pro with four games of NFL experience. Brooks originally was a college free agent signee of Arizona in 2019, and he saw action in three games with Miami in '19 and one with Baltimore in '20. His career totals are 11 tackles and two PDs. Allan George came to Cincinnati as a college free agent signee in 2022 and spent most of his rookie season on the team's practice squad, but was signed to the active roster late in the year and played in seven games (four regular season, three postseason). He was on the practice squad for the entirety of the 2023 regular season, after totaling 10 tackles in three preseason contests. DJ Ivey was placed on the Active/Physically Unable to Perform list as he works his way back from a knee injury he sustained in Week 15 of the 2023 season. A seventh-rounder in the 2023 draft, he carved out a special teams role during his rookie campaign and saw action as a reserve CB prior to his injury. He had a team-leading three PDs during preseason last year. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of rookie Josh Newton after the Bengals selected him in the fifth round of April's draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. Newton started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 68 tackles with 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to TCU from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups and helped lead the team to the College Football Playoff National Championship game. Lance Robinson joined the Bengals as a college free agent in May, coming off an impressive final season at Tulane University in 2023. His career-high four INTs tied for the most in the American Athletic Conference and helped him earn second-team All-AAC honors. He spent his final three collegiate seasons at Tulane (2021-23), after two years at Kansas State ('18-19). He played in 53 total games and closed out his career with 28 straight starts.

Safeties: Ninth-year veteran Vonn Bell returns for his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons while helping the Bengals emerge as Super Bowl contenders. He started all 48 regular-season games he played in for the Bengals, lining up for a team-high 96.3 percent of defensive snaps. His eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. In 13 games played for the Panthers last season, he ranked third on the team in tackles (69) and had two PDs. One of the headliners of Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class is Geno Stone, who emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in his final season with Baltimore. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 broke out with an AFCleading seven INTs (second in NFL). His seven picks included a streak of four consecutive games with an INT, which tied for the longest streak leaguewide last season. Stone originally was a seventh-round pick of the Ravens in 2020, and 18 of his 19 career starts have come in the past two seasons. Jordan Battle looks to build off a strong rookie season in 2023 that saw him start seven straight games at S to close out the year. He recorded the fifth-most tackles on the team (69), while adding one INT, five PDs and two sacks. A third-round pick of the Bengals, he was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Third-year pro Tycen Anderson was emerging as a key

special teams contributor in the early half of last season before suffering a season-ending knee injury in Week 8. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in 2022, he missed his entire rookie season due to a hamstring injury, then led the team with eight special teams tackles in '23 prior despite missing the final 10 games. He had two INTs in last year's preseason opener against Green Bay, including a 43-yard pick-six. A trio of rookies round out the Bengals' safety group, including Daijahn Anthony, who has turned heads in training camp with multiple INTs during 11-on-11 team periods. A seventh-rounder in April's draft, Anthony worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. He started 10 of 13 games played with the Rebels last season, tying for the team lead with three INTs while totaling 61 tackles. Michael Dowell joined the roster as a college free agent signee this offseason, following two years (2022-23) at the University of Miami (Ohio). He began his career at Michigan State (2019-21), and has experience lining up at S and at nickel CB. In 58 career games played (32 at MSU, 26 at Miami), his totals included 240 tackles, 11 TFLs, 18 PDs and two INTs. Fellow CFA signee PJ Jules was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference (MVFC) pick in 2023 at Southern Illinois University. He led the Salukis last season in tackles (111), TFLs (13) and pass breakups (11).

Special teams: Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** has quickly become one of the top kickers in the NFL and a fan-favorite in Cincinnati. He ranks third on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (83.9 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 50 made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history, the most in NFL history in a player's first three career seasons, and tied for the most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. Last season, McPherson converted 26 of 31 FG attempts and was a perfect 40-for-40 on PATs. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** enters his third pro season having delivered zero unplayable snaps on 288 attempts in 35 career games. The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh

began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. The Bengals' roster features three punters, including second-year pro Brad Robbins. A native of Westerville, Ohio (north of Columbus), Robbins was a sixth-round pick of the Bengals in 2023 and earned the team's punting role coming out of his rookie training camp. He punted 76 times last season with a 44.3-yard gross average and 20 downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line. He was a three-time All-Big Ten honoree at the University of Michigan who finished his career with the second-highest punting average (43.0 yards) in school history. The Bengals in May signed college free agent Austin McNamara, a 6-5 punter who compiled a record-breaking career at Texas Tech. McNamara's 45.91-yard career average set both the all-time Red Raider and Big 12 mark, and ranked 10th in FBS history among punters with at least 150 attempts. He was the first player in Texas Tech history to earn firstteam All-Big 12 honors three times, and also was the first Red Raider ever to be named the Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Year when he received the accolade in 2023. Cincinnati signed P Ryan Rehkow on July 26, nearly a month after he was waived by Kansas City. He signed with the Chiefs as a college free agent out of Brigham Young University, where he played in 50 career games and averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts. Second-year WR Charlie Jones earned the primary punt returner job early in his rookie season, and took firm command of that role in just his second game when he returned a punt 81 yards for a TD against the Baltimore Ravens. The play marked the Bengals' first TD on a PR since 2012, and was the 10th punt return TD by a rookie in team history (first since 2000). Jones finished the season with 248 PR yards on 23 attempts, good for a 10.8-yard average. Listed behind Jones on the PR depth chart is fifth-year WR Trenton Irwin, who had 10 of his 13 career punt returns last season. He averaged 9.8 yards per return in 2023, with two returns for over 20 yards in Week 5 at Arizona. HB Trayveon Williams figures to serve as the primary kick returner once again, a responsibility he has held since midway through the 2022 season. Williams has 28 career KORs for 646 yards (23.1), and last season had his career-long run back of 46 yards in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh. Also in the mix to return kickoffs is second-year HB Chase Brown, who logged two KORs for 44 yards in the 2023 season-finale against Cleveland.
