WEEK 18, GAME 17 SUNDAY, JAN. 7 AT PAYCOR STADIUM

GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Tom McCarthy (play-by-play), James Lofton (analyst), Jay Feely (analyst) and Tiffany Blackmon (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals conclude the 2023 regular season when they host the Cleveland Browns in the 101st installment of the "Battle of Ohio" on Sunday at Paycor Stadium.

Cincinnati was dealt a 25-17 loss in Week 17 at Kansas City that, combined with other results around the AFC, eliminated the Bengals from postseason contention. But while the team's players and coaches expressed disappointment in the outcome of a season that began with high aspirations, they enter this week looking to finish the year strong against a divisional rival.

"Unfortunately, not every year is your year," said head coach Zac Taylor after the Chiefs game. "But again, we still have one more game to play. It's a big game for us at home against a divisional team, so we're not sitting here talking today like our season is over, because it's not. We still have one big game left. We look forward to playing in front of our fans and I look forward to seeing our guys give their best effort."

The Bengals built a 10-point lead midway through the second quarter at Kansas City when a strip sack by DE Trey Hendrickson — his 17th sack of the season, which ties for the league lead — led to a Jake Browning rushing TD eight plays later. Browning, who made his sixth consecutive start at QB, completed 11 of 16 passes in the first half that included a go-ahead TD throw to HB Joe Mixon. But after coming away with points on each of its first three possessions, the Bengals' offense was shut out over its final seven drives of the game, and a desperation heave by Browning on fourth down late in the fourth quarter fell incomplete to end a final attempt at saving the season.

"It sucks to lose when you're still in the race," Browning said. "But I think the standard that was established even before I got here was to keep battling, and so that's what we're going to do."

Browning, who made his first career start in Week 12 of this season, helped steer the Bengals to a three-game win streak and a temporary playoff position in mid-December. And though the current two-game losing skid has knocked Cincinnati out of contention, Taylor remains inspired by his team's resolve after entering the final month with a 5-6 record.

"I am proud of the way this team continues to fight," Taylor said. "I was proud of the way Jake has stepped in and played for us, and continued to lead. This team has not laid down for anybody. It hasn't gone our way the last two weeks, but it doesn't mean that I'm not proud of what these guys have done for us."

A ninth win for the Bengals on Sunday would mark the first time since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger that every team in a division finishes a season above .500. Standing in Cincinnati's way of that feat is a Browns team that has locked up the No. 5 seed in the AFC with an 11-5 record. Cleveland comes to Paycor Stadium having won four straight games and is seeking its first 12-win regular season since 1986.

The series: The Bengals lead 52-48 in the "Battle of Ohio" series, but the Browns have won six of the past seven meetings, and nine of the last 11. Home field has been a factor over the series, as the Bengals lead 32-18 at home, but trail 20-30 as the road club.

Cincinnati has played more games against Cleveland (100) than any foe except Pittsburgh. The Bengals have 107 all-time regular-season games against the Steelers (109 overall, including postseason).

With regard to season sweeps, the series recently has been a relatively streaky affair. In the past five seasons (2018-22), the Browns have swept Cincinnati three times (in 2018, '20 and '21) and split twice (in '19 and '22). Prior to that stretch, the Bengals' had swept the Browns in three consecutive seasons (in 2015, '16 and '17).

More series notes:

- When Cleveland swept Cincinnati in 2018, it was the Browns' first season sweep over the Bengals since 2002.
- Cleveland's win in the first matchup of 2018 snapped a seven-game Bengals winning streak against the Browns. That streak, the Bengals' longest in the series, began with the second meeting of 2014.
- The Browns' longest win streak over Cincinnati also is seven games, from the second matchup of the 1992 season through the second matchup of '95.
- Since the Browns' rebirth in 1999, the Bengals lead 28-21, with records of 16-8 as the home team and 12-13 as the visiting team.

Team bests from the series:

Bengals seek to regain biggest 'Battle' margin: With its nine victories in its last 11 meetings with Cincinnati, Cleveland has whittled the Bengals' largest lead of 11 games in the team's all-time series down to four. The Bengals' 11-game lead after the 2017 season set the benchmark for the biggest lead held by either side in the "Battle of Ohio" series.

The series began in 1970 with the Browns winning six of the first seven, and their five-game margin at 6-1, after the first meeting of 1973, stands as their largest lead. The Bengals lead 51-41 since that Cleveland high-water mark. The Browns have not led the series since the end of 2005, when they were 33-32.

Since surrendering that 33-32 lead by giving up a sweep in the 2006 meetings, the Browns have twice pulled into ties — at 34-34 after the first meeting of '07 and at 35-35 after the first meeting of '08. But the Browns have now endured a 17-year stretch without a lead in the series. Barring possible additions to the series in postseason play, the Bengals cannot surrender their series lead until after the first game of 2025, at the earliest. The Browns could not lead again until after the second game of '25.

Bengals-Browns connections: Bengals offensive coordinator Brian Callahan is the son of Browns offensive line coach Bill Callahan ... Bengals head coach Zac Taylor played quarterback at the University of Nebraska from 2005-06, when Bill Callahan was the Cornhuskers' head coach ... Browns offensive coordinator Alex Van Pelt served as quarterbacks coach for the Bengals from 2018-19 ... Bengals defensive quality control coach Louie Cioffi had two coaching stints with the Browns, serving as defensive backs coach in 2013 and in '16 ... Browns RB Jerome Ford (2020-21) and T James Hudson III ('19-20) played collegiately at the University of Cincinnati ... Browns CB Denzel Ward played at Ohio State and was teammates with Bengals DE Sam Hubbard from 2015-17 ... Bengals OT Orlando Brown Jr. was teammates with Browns QB Joe Flacco (2018) and WR James Proche II ('20) on the Baltimore Ravens ... Brown also was teammates with Browns T Geron Christian Sr. on the Kansas City Chiefs (2022), while Bengals G Max Scharping lined up alongside Christian on the Houston Texans ('21) ... Bengals S Nick Scott and Browns DE Ogbo Okoronkwo were teammates on the L.A. Rams from 2019-21 ... Browns DT Dalvin Tomlinson played for the N.Y. Giants when Bengals linebackers coach James Bettcher was the defensive coordinator (2018-19) ... Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear black jerseys, white pants (orange stripes) and black socks this week against Cleveland. Cincinnati is 3-2 overall when wearing that combination, which was last featured in the team's Week 14 home win over Indianapolis.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants also feature three different options - black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, and white with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate jerseys and/or color rush (CR) uniforms and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet four times — twice last season and twice this season — and have collected a 4-0 record. The "White Bengal" look made its most recent appearance in Cincinnati's Week 13 victory at Jacksonville on Monday Night Football.

Here is a look at all of the Bengals' records in every possible uniform combination (regular season and postseason only) since the team redesigned the uniform in 2021:

- * NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or color rush (CR) and/or throwback uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes an orange jersey with one of the team's primary pants. The Bengals do not have a throwback
- ^ The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023, the Bengals are permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati concludes the 2023 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- HB Joe Mixon has 6301 career rushing yards, 146 shy of HB James Brooks (6447) for second place all-time. HB Corey Dillon (8061) is the team's career record holder. Mixon in Week 6 surpassed HB Rudi Johnson (5742) for
- Mixon in Week 15 vs. Minnesota scored his 48th career rushing TD, tying Rudi Johnson for second place all-time. FB Pete Johnson (64) is the team's career record holder. Mixon in Week 13 surpassed Dillon (45) for third place on
- Mixon's receiving TD in Week 17 at Kansas City was his 60th career total TD (48 rushing, 12 receiving). He is four total TDs shy of Brooks and WR Carl Pickens (64) for fifth place all-time. Pete Johnson (70) is the team's career record holder.
- Mixon has 14 games with 100 or more rushing yards, one shy of HB Cedric Benson for fourth place all-time. Dillon (28), Rudi Johnson (19) and

Brooks (17) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- WR Tyler Boyd has 512 career receptions, 18 shy of Pickens (530) for third place all-time. WRs Chad Johnson (751) and A.J. Green (649) hold the top two spots on the team's career list. Boyd in Week 16 surpassed WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fourth place.
- K Evan McPherson has an 83.7 career FG percentage (77 made/ 92 att.), the third highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9 percent; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

Bengals season records watch: Here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' single-season records lists (regular season):

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 96 receptions, one shy of WRs A.J. Green (97 in 2012) and Chad Johnson (97 in '05) for fifth most in team history. WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh holds the single-season team record for receptions with 112 in 2007.
- Chase has 1197 receiving yards, 172 shy of Johnson (1369 in 2006) for fifth most in team history. Chase holds the single-season team record for receiving yards with 1455 in 2021.
- Chase has five games with 100 or more receiving yards, tied for the second most in team history and one shy of Green (six in 2013) for the single-season team record
- DE Trey Hendrickson has 17.0 sacks, the second most in team history and five shy of DE Coy Bacon (22.0 in 1976) for the single-season team record. Sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder.
- K Evan McPherson has 25 made FGs, three shy of three players with 28 (most recently McPherson in '21) for fourth most in team history. K Mike Nugent holds the single-season team record for made FGs with 33 in 2011.

Records vs. Browns: The two highest-scoring games in Bengals history have each been against the Browns. On Nov. 28, 2004 at Paycor Stadium (then known as Paul Brown Stadium), the Bengals won 58-48, and the 106 total points is not only a Bengals record, it is the second-most in NFL history, behind only 113 from Washington's 72-41 win over the N.Y. Giants in 1966. And on Sept. 16, 2007, the Bengals and Browns combined for 96 points at Cleveland in a 51-45 Browns win.

More on Bengals regular-season records against the Browns:

- On Dec. 21, 1980 vs. Cleveland, DE Eddie Edwards set the Bengals record for sacks in a game with five. The mark stood unchallenged for 19 years, until DE Antwan Odom tied it on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay.
- In the final Bengals game at Cinergy Field, on Dec. 12, 1999, Cincinnati limited the Browns to the fewest rushing yards ever by an opponent. Cleveland had only 11 net yards on 11 attempts.
- On Sept. 10, 2000, WR Craig Yeast tied a Bengals record for most punt returns in a game with seven. The record was set by RB Tony Davis in 1977, and in addition to Yeast, has since been tied by WR Brandon Tate in 2011.
- On Nov. 25, 2001 at Cleveland, T.J. Houshmandzadeh set the Bengals record for punt return yards in a game with 126. His 86-yarder in that game ranks tied for third-longest in club history, and it still ranks as the longest punt return in team history which did not result in a touchdown.
- The 58-48 Bengals win on Nov. 28, 2004 is the only game in club history in which Cincinnati scored double figures in all four quarters (14-13-14-17 — 58).
- In the Sept. 16, 2007 shootout with the Browns noted above, QB Carson Palmer threw six TD passes, the most ever by a Bengals QB in a single game.
 That mark also stands tied for the team record for most TD passes in a game.
- On Dec. 21, 2008, at Cleveland, Bengals CB Leon Hall tied the team record for most interceptions in a game with three. He was the seventh Bengal to reach that mark in a contest, though no one has done it since.
- On Nov. 17, 2013, the Bengals scored 31 points in the second quarter, a team record for most points in a quarter, en route to a 41-20 Cincinnati victory.
- In their 30-0 win at Cleveland on Dec. 14, 2014, the Bengals allowed only five first downs, fewest by an opponent in Bengals history.
- On Oct 23, 2016 against Cleveland, HB Jeremy Hill rushed for 168 yards on nine carries (18.7 yards per rush) the most rushing yards in club history without hitting double digits in carries. That 168-yard total broke a mark that had stood for 45 years 113 yards on eight carries by Essex Johnson vs. Philadelphia on 9-19-71.
- The Bengals' 23-20 overtime victory at Cleveland on Oct. 4, 2009 stands as the longest Bengals game not to end in a tie, and it will remain so for the

foreseeable future. Only four seconds remained in the overtime period when K Shayne Graham booted a 31-yard field goal to break a 20-all deadlock. Elapsed scoreboard clock time for the game was 74:56. Only three games lasted longer in Bengals history, and all three were 75-minute ties — in 2008 vs. Philadelphia, in '14 vs. Carolina and '16 vs. Washington in London. The NFL shortened overtime from a 15-minute period to a 10-minute period in 2017, so the longest a game can last nowadays since that rule change is 70 total minutes.

Individually vs. Browns: Here is a look at the collective offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against Cleveland (ordered by total games played):

- WR Tyler Boyd: 13 games; 52 receptions for 535 yards (10.3-yard average) and five TDs; Three rushes for 47 yards (15.7).
- HB Joe Mixon: 11 games; 184 rushes for 897 yards (4.9) and six TDs; 41 receptions for 345 yards (8.4).
- QB Joe Burrow (Reserve/Injured): Six games; (1-5 W-L record); 247 attempts and 157 completions (63.6 percent) for 1557 yards, 10 TDs and five INTs (86.4 passer rating); 23 rushes for 65 yards (2.8) and one TD.
- WR Tee Higgins: Six games; 17 receptions for 233 yards (13.7) and two TDs; one rush for seven yards.
- HB Trayveon Williams: Six games; 12 rushes for 47 yards (3.9); Two receptions for 10 yards (5.0).
- WR Trenton Irwin: Five games; Five receptions for 94 yards (18.8) and one TD.
 - TE Drew Sample: Five games; 16 receptions for 141 yards (8.8).
 - TE Mitchell Wilcox: Five games; Five receptions for 29 yards (5.8).
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Four games; 23 receptions for 233 yards (10.1) and one TD; Four rushes for eight yards (2.0).
- HB Chris Evans: Four games; Nine rushes for 47 yards (5.2); Seven receptions for 60 yards (8.6) and one TD.
- WR Stanley Morgan (Practice Squad): Four games; One reception for eight yards; One rush for three yards.
- QB Jake Browning: One game; One pass attempt (no completions); One rush for minus-1 yard.
 - TE Irv Smith Jr.: One game; Three receptions for 17 yards (5.7).

More Bengals-Browns facts: The first-ever Bengals-Browns meeting of any kind was Aug. 29, 1970. On that Saturday, the Browns were visitors for the second preseason game of Riverfront Stadium's debut year. The Bengals won 31-24, moving to 2-0 in preseason in their new home.

Also:

- The Bengals were 17-10 against the Browns at Riverfront Stadium/ Cinergy Field.
- The Browns were 17-8 against the Bengals at the old Cleveland Stadium, and now lead 13-12 at FirstEnergy Stadium (named Cleveland Browns Stadium prior to 2013).
- The Bengals and Browns never played at Nippert Stadium, as Nippert was the Bengals' American Football League home from 1968-69.
- The Bengals have posted 13 season sweeps, and the Browns have posted 11. The teams have split 25 times. In 1982, they played only once, with the scheduled contest at Cleveland cancelled due to a players' strike.
- The first Bengals-Browns regular-season game at Cincinnati on Nov. 15, 1970 drew the first home crowd of 60,000 in Bengals history (60,007 at Riverfront Stadium). The Bengals won 14-10 behind a 110-yard rushing effort from QB Virgil Carter, the only 100-yarder by a QB in Bengals history.
- The largest Bengals home crowd for a Browns game has been 66,222, on Dec. 11 last season at Paycor Stadium. That ranks as the ninth-largest home crowd in Bengals history. The previous high vs. Cleveland at home had stood for 17 years a mark of 66,072 attended a Sept. 17, 2006 game at Paycor, which then called Paul Brown Stadium.
- The Browns drew the largest Bengals crowd in the Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field era 60,284 for a 27-24 Browns win on Oct. 17, 1971.
- The Bengals and Browns met three times in preseason at Ohio Stadium in Columbus, from 1972-74. All were Sunday afternoon games, and the Browns won two of the three.

'Battle' coaches: Here are some notes about head coaches in the "Battle of Ohio" series:

 When Cincinnati's Zac Taylor and Cleveland's Freddie Kitchens met in the first "Battle of Ohio" of 2019, it was just the second time in series history that a Bengals-Browns meeting featured two rookie head coaches who faced both each other and their Ohio rival for the first time in the same game. The Browns won that contest at FirstEnergy Stadium, 27-19. The first such instance occurred on Oct. 21, 1984, when Bengals first-year head coach Sam Wyche met Browns first-year head coach Marty Schottenheimer in Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium, with the Bengals winning, 12-9. The Bengals' Homer Rice and the Browns' Sam Rutigliano also were rookie head coaches when they met for the first time on Dec. 17, 1978 at Riverfront. However, that was Rutigliano's second "Battle of Ohio" as Cleveland's head coach. The two teams met in Game 2 that year, before Rice, who was named head coach after Game 5, took the reins.

- Former Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis, who was 22-10 overall against Cleveland, has the most total wins and best winning percentage (.688) of any Bengals head coach in the series. Lewis also has coached the most games (32) against Cleveland. Sam Wyche is second in all three categories, with 10 wins, a .625 winning percentage (10-6) and 16 games.
- Bill Belichick has been the top Browns coach in the series, having posted an 8-2 mark against the Bengals during his 1991-95 tenure.
- Lewis is the only Bengals head coach whose first Cincinnati victory came against Cleveland. Lewis took over as head coach in 2003, and his first win was a 21-14 decision at Cleveland on Sept. 28 of that year. The Bengals entered that game at 0-3, but went on to finish 8-8. The six-game improvement, after a 2-14

season in 2002, was the largest in the NFL for '03.

- Forrest Gregg is the only head coach to pilot both teams in the "Battle of Ohio." Gregg was 1-5 as Browns coach against the Bengals from 1975-77, and he was 3-4 as Bengals coach against the Browns from '80-83.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2023 season is his fifth in the position.

In 2022, Taylor led Cincinnati to a second consecutive AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship. The Bengals tied a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), and with a pair of playoff victories in January, Taylor became one of just 13 head coaches in NFL history with five wins in their first six career postseason games. He once again oversaw a dynamic offense that ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0).

The Bengals also boasted a versatile defense that held opposing passers to a league-low 58.9 completion percentage while also ranking sixth in points allowed (20.1 per game) and seventh in rushing yards allowed (106.6).

In 2021, Taylor guided the Bengals to their first division championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim the AFC crown and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. QB Joe Burrow, playing in his first full season in Taylor's system, was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after leading the league in completion percentage (70.4), while first-round draft pick WR Ja'Marr Chase totaled the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455) en route to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors.

In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped the Bengals navigate the league's COVID-19 pandemic protocols which included no in-person offseason program. Still, he guided a rookie Burrow to notable production that included the most ever completions by a QB through their first 10 games (264) and the fifth-most passing yards (2688).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both offense and defense. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while they allowed 10 fewer sacks (29 to 19). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped guide QB Jared Goff to career highs in every major passing category as the Rams won the NFC West and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Taylor had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and QBs coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant quarterbacks coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and tight ends coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during Taylor's time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03)

before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous program records, totaling 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. He was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year as a senior in 2006 after passing for 3197 yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

The 2020 NFL Coach of the Year, **Kevin Stefanski** is in his fourth season as the Cleveland Browns head coach after being named the 18th full-time head coach in franchise history on Jan. 13, 2020.

Prior to joining the Browns, Stefanski spent 14 seasons (2006-19) with the Minnesota Vikings and moved up the coaching ladder from assistant to the head coach to offensive coordinator.

In his first season at Cleveland, Stefanski led the team to its first playoff appearance since 2002 and first playoff victory in 26 years. He notched the most wins (11) by a first-year Browns head coach since Hall of Famer Paul Brown had 12 in the team's inaugural season in 1946. Stefanski's 11 regular-season wins were the most by any first-year head coach in 2020 and marked just the 11th time since 1970 a first-year coach had won 11 or more games.

Stefanski gained his first league experience with the Vikings in 2006 as an assistant to the head coach before transitioning to assistant quarterbacks coach from '09-13. He also spent two seasons tutoring the tight ends (2014-15), one season as running backs coach ('16), two seasons guiding the quarterbacks ('17-18) and added the role of interim offensive coordinator for the remaining three games of the '18 season. The Vikings promoted him to offensive coordinator in 2019.

Stefanski played defensive back at Pennsylvania (2000-04) and earned a bachelor's degree in communications. He has no pro playing experience.

Stefanski was born on April 8, 1982. A native of Philadelphia, Pa., he and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Will and Gabe, and one daughter, Juliet.

Taylor vs. Browns: The Browns lead, 7-2.

The Jungle is jammin': The five highest-attended home games (and nine of the top 10) in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15.

Cincinnati's Week 9 win over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football had an attendance figure of 66,965, which now stands as the second largest in team history. The Bengals' following game in Week 10 vs. Houston (66,526) ranks as the third largest, while the 2022 Wild Card Playoff victory over Baltimore (66,399) is fourth largest and a win over Seattle in Week 6 of this season (66,385) ranks fifth. The team's Week 15 win over Minnesota marked the sixth largest crowd for a Cincinnati home game with a figure of 66,376.

Beginning in Week 1 of the 2022 campaign against Pittsburgh, the Bengals have welcomed an attendance of 65,000 in 15 consecutive regular-season games. The Paycor Stadium crowds have coincided with a recent string of home success for the Bengals, as they have won 15 of their last 19 played at the venue dating back to Week 16 of the 2021 regular season (includes postseason). The last time Cincinnati topped the current stretch was when it won 15 of 18 home contests from Week 10 of the 2012 season through Week 9 of the '14 campaign.

Bengals find edge in turnover battle: Cincinnati this season has collected 24 takeaways (tied for 12th most in NFL) while committing just 15 giveaways (tied for third fewest), resulting in a turnover differential of plus-nine that ranks tied for fourth leaguewide.

The Bengals have won the turnover battle in 10 of their 16 games this season, collecting a 7-3 record in those contests. Cincinnati offensively has lost just two fumbles, the fewest in the NFL. Should the Bengals not commit a lost fumble in Week 18, their two lost fumbles on the season would mark the fewest by an NFL team since New Orleans (two) in 2019 and the fewest ever by Cincinnati. The team's current record for fewest fumbles lost in a season is four in 2018.

Twelve different Bengals players have contributed to the team's 24 takeaways with either an INT or fumble recovery. Cincinnati's 15 INTs this season are tied for ninth leaguewide and are the team's most since the 2016 campaign (17). The Bengals recorded at least one pick in seven straight games from Weeks 3-10, the longest such streak by Cincinnati since Weeks 2-8 of the 2020 season (also seven games). The Week 15 win over Minnesota marked the 11th straight game (including postseason) that the Bengals won when the defense had multiple INTs.

Leads lead to Bengals wins: Much of the Bengals' success over the past three seasons has been built on their ability to close out games after jumping in front early. Since the start of the 2021 campaign, Cincinnati has the third best record in the NFL when scoring first (20-4), the fourth best record when leading at halftime (20-3), and the second best record when leading at any point in a game (30-9). This season, the Bengals are 4-2 when ahead at the half and 6-1 when leading after three quarters.

Among the many factors contributing to the Bengals' knack for cementing wins is the defensive play coming out of halftime. Since 2021, Cincinnati has allowed just 48 TDs (second fewest leaguewide) and in the second half/overtime. The Bengals' four-game win streak from Weeks 5-9 this season was highlighted by the defense recording eight takeaways in the second half of play (five INTs, three FRs), while also forcing four turnovers on downs. In Week 14 against Indianapolis, the Bengals came up with two second-half takeaways — an INT and a FR on a muffed punt — while outscoring the Colts 20-0.

Offense opens strong: The Bengals have scored 68 first-quarter points since Week 5, the fourth most in the NFL in that span, while their eight first-quarter TDs during that timeframe are tied for third most leaguewide.

Cincinnati came away with points on its opening offensive possession in

seven consecutive games from Weeks 4-11. During that stretch, the Bengals scored an opening-drive TD in five straight games from Weeks 5-10 — the longest such streak in team history and the longest in the NFL since Atlanta went six straight (Weeks 12-17) during the 2016 season. The TD streak was ended in Week 11 at Baltimore, when a drive that reached the Ravens' 31-yard line resulted in a 50-yard FG from K Evan McPherson.

During the streak, the Bengals followed up with a TD on their second possession in three consecutive games from Weeks 6-9. It marked the first time Cincinnati opened three straight contests with back-to-back TD drives since Games 13-15 of the 1985 season. The most recent team to accomplish that feat was Green Bay, which did it in four straight (Weeks 14-17) in the 2020 season.

The Bengals have scored first in seven games this season, most recently in Week 15 vs. Minnesota when they marched 59 yards on 11 plays on the game's opening drive to set up an Evan McPherson FG. QB Jake Browning completed five of six passes during the drive, three of which went for over 10 yards. The previous week against Indianapolis, a four-play, 92-yard TD drive in the first quarter was followed by an 11-play, 61-yard drive early in the second as Cincinnati grabbed a 14-0 lead.

The Browning rundown: QB Jake Browning has started the Bengals' past six games after it was announced that QB Joe Burrow would miss the remainder of the season due to a wrist injury. His starting debut in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh marked his first start in a non-preseason game at any level since his senior season at the University of Washington in 2018, and marked just his third appearance in a regular-season NFL game. Browning made his NFL debut in Week 1 of this season at Cleveland, playing four snaps late in the fourth quarter in relief of Burrow, then saw extended action in Week 11 at Baltimore after Burrow exited in the second quarter.

Browning originally entered the league as a college free agent signee of Minnesota in 2019. He spent two seasons (2019-20) on the Vikings' practice squad, then was on the Bengals' practice squad for the past two years. He made the 53-man roster coming out of training camp for the first time in 2023, and spent the first 10 games of the season as Cincinnati's second-string QB before taking over the starting role.

Browning has played in six preseason games (two starts) for the Bengals over the past two years, completing 67.9 percent of his passes for 729 yards and two TDs with two INTs. Facing the Ravens' fourth-ranked passing defense in Week 11, Browning came in and went eight of 14 for 68 yards and one TD with no picks.

Browning was a four-year starter (2015-18) at Washington, where he helped steer the Huskies to a 39-14 record and set program records for career passing attempts (1483), completions (958), passing yards (12,296) and TD passes (94). As a sophomore in 2016, he finished sixth in Heisman Trophy voting while leading Washington to a Pac-12 title and a berth in the College Football Playoff. He also set California prep records in several categories while at Folsom High School, including career passing yards (16,775) and TD passes (229). Browning was teammates with Bengals OT Jonah Williams at Folsom.

Browning as a starter: QB Jake Browning, who took over the Bengals' starting QB role in Week 12 following Joe Burrow's season-ending injury, made his sixth career start in Week 17 at Kansas City. In those six contests, Browning has completed 145 of 204 passes (71.1 percent) for 1712 yards and eight TDs, good for a passer rating of 97.1. His 1712 passing yards are the ninth most by any NFL QB through their first six starts since 1950, and he is one of just two QBs in that timeframe to record 1500 or more passing yards with a completion percentage of 70 or above, alongside Pro Football Hall of Famer Kurt Warner.

Since Week 12, Browning leads the NFL in passing yards and ranks second in completions, second in completion percentage, second in yards per attempt (8.4), ninth in passer rating and tied for 10th in TD passes. He connected on over 70 percent of his passing attempts in each of his first three starts, and has thrown for over 300 yards three times — Week 13 at Jacksonville (354), Week 15 vs. Minnesota (324) and Week 16 at Pittsburgh (335).

In Week 14 against Indianapolis, Browning posted career highs in passer rating (122.7) and yards per attempt (11.5) to lead Cincinnati to a dominant home win. He finished 18 of 24 (75.0) for 275 yards and two TDs, with five of his completions going for 25 or more yards. In the following week's win over the Vikings, 243 of Browning's 324 passing yards came after halftime as he helped lead the Bengals back from a 14-point deficit entering the fourth quarter. He completed at least one pass to 11 different receivers, marking the fifth time in Bengals history — and the first since Nov. 4, 2007 at Buffalo — that 11 players recorded a catch in a game.

Browning shines on MNF: QB Jake Browning was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance in the Bengals' 34-31 overtime win at Jacksonville on Monday Night Football in Week 13. Making just his second career start, Browning completed 32 of 37 passes (86.5 percent) for 354 yards and one TD with zero INTs.

Browning's 86.5 completion percentage was the fifth highest in a game in Bengals history, and the highest in league history by a player in either of his first two starts (minimum 20 attempts). He became the 10th player in the Super Bowl era (1966-present) to pass for 350 or more yards with a completion percentage of 85 or higher. Browning's 354 passing yards marked the second most by a Bengals QB within his first two career starts behind Jeff Blake, who threw for 387 yards in his second start — an overtime win at Seattle on Nov. 6, 1994.

During the Bengals' game-winning drive in overtime, Browning went four of five for 36 yards to march Cincinnati into FG range. That included a 17-yarder through traffic to WR Ja'Marr Chase, and an 11-yarder to WR Tee Higgins on third-and-10 that kept the drive moving.

In the third quarter, Browning hit Chase for a 76-yard TD that gave the Bengals their first lead. It marked the team's longest play from scrimmage this season, and was one of Browning's four completions of over 20 yards.

Browning on third down completed nine of 11 passes for a passer rating of 149.1. He additionally ran for 22 yards on two carries, including a one-yard QB sneak into the end zone that tied the game 28-28 in the fourth quarter.

Burrow's season highlights: QB Joe Burrow's fourth pro season came to an end in Week 11, as he suffered a right wrist injury at Baltimore that will hold him out of action until the 2024 campaign.

Burrow finished his season with 244 completions on 365 pass attempts (66.8 percent) for 2309 yards and 15 TDs with six INTs, good for a passer rating of 91.0. After recovering from a calf injury that caused him to miss over a month of training camp, Burrow started the regular-season opener and went on to crack the top five for career completions, TD passes and 300-yard passing games in team history.

The 2022 Pro Bowler was at his best from Weeks 5-10 of this season, when he led the NFL in completion percentage (74.1), ranked second in completions (146), second in passer rating (107.0), third in TD passes (12) and fourth in passing yards (1480). He had three games with 300 or more passing yards in that stretch, led off by a 317-yard, three-TD performance in Week 5 against the Cardinals at Arizona. Burrow then threw for 348 yards on Sunday Night Football in Week 9 against the Buffalo Bills, and the following week had 347 vs. Houston.

In Week 8 at San Francisco, Burrow completed 28 of 32 passes for 283 yards and three TDs with no INTs to lead the Bengals to a crucial road win. His career-high 87.5 completion percentage was the second highest in a game in team history, trailing only QB Ken Anderson's 90.9 percent (20 of 22) on Nov. 10, 1974. Burrow closed out the first half against the 49ers by completing 19 consecutive passing attempts, marking the most consecutive completions in a game by any NFL passer this season and the second most in team history (Anderson, 20 on Jan. 2, 1983). Burrow's efforts at Levi's Stadium were rewarded with his sixth career AFC Offensive Player of the Week honor.

Burrow also rushed for 85 yards from Weeks 5-11, after totaling three rushing yards in the opening four games as he continued to work his way back to full health. He eclipsed some notable career marks in 2023 and did so in near-record timing, as he became the fifth fastest player in NFL history to reach 13,000 passing yards (48 games) and tied for the sixth fastest to 90 TD passes (49 games). Burrow additionally has a career completion percentage of 68.0, the highest in NFL history (minimum 1500 pass attempts).

Prior to the start of the regular season, Burrow signed a five-year contract extension that made him the highest-paid player in NFL history, based on average annual value. The extension keeps Burrow in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase surpassed 1000 receiving yards this season with a 149-yard effort in Week 13 at Jacksonville. He became the

eighth player in NFL history to reach 1000 yards receiving in each of his first three career seasons, and the second player in Bengals history to do so (A.J. Green, 2011-13). Chase also notched his 29th career receiving TD in Week 13 to tie Green for the most in team history in a player's first three seasons.

Through 44 career games, Chase has amassed 264 receptions for 3698 yards. His 84.05 receiving yards per game is the fifth highest average in league history among all players with at least 200 catches. A first-round pick of the Bengals in 2021 (fifth overall), Chase earned Pro Bowl selections in each of his first two seasons.

Chase finished the Jaguars game with a game-high 11 catches for 149 yards and one TD. It marked his sixth career game (third this season) with at least 10 receptions, at least 100 receiving yards and at least one receiving TD, the most such games in league history within a player's first three seasons.

Chase reached a pair of career milestones earlier this season, beginning with his 200th reception in Week 5 at Arizona. Playing in just his 34th career game, Chase tied as the fourth fastest player in league history to net 200 catches. Only former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (30 games), New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (32) and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry (33) reached the mark in fewer games.

In Week 6 vs. Seattle, Chase surpassed 3000 receiving yards in his 35th career game, tying as the fifth fastest player ever to reach that mark. Beckham (30 games), former Houston Oilers WR Charlie Hennigan (31), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (33) and former San Diego Chargers WR Lance Alworth (34) are the only players to net 3000 receiving yards in fewer total games.

Chase this season ranks 12th in the NFL in receptions (96), 11th in receiving yards (1197) and tied for 13th in receiving TDs (seven), despite missing the Bengals' Week 16 contest at Pittsburgh due to a shoulder injury. He netted a combined 50 receptions from Games 3-7, the most in a five-game stretch in Bengals history which included three stat lines of 10 or more catches.

On the Chase: In the third quarter of Week 13 at Jacksonville, WR Ja'Marr Chase caught a pass from QB Jake Browning down the left sideline and broke away from Jaguars defensive backs for a 76-yard TD. It marked Chase's 15th career reception of 40 or more yards (fourth this season), the third most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. It also was, at the time, the Bengals' longest TD from scrimmage since an 82-yarder by Chase in Week 7 of the 2021 season at Baltimore (since surpassed).

Chase finished the Jaguars game with a team-high 149 receiving yards, marking the fifth time this season and 14th time in his career that he went over the century mark. Chase enters Sunday's regular-season finale 172 receiving yards shy of WR Chad Johnson (1369) for the fifth most in a single season in team history. Chase's career-high 1455 receiving yards in his 2021 rookie campaign set both a Bengals single-season record and an NFL rookie record.

Chase, Boyd pose deep threats: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 76-yard TD in Week 13 at Jacksonville was his ninth career scoring catch of 50 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. It also tied former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. for the second most such TDs in NFL history by a player under the age of 24. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (11) has more.

Chase has three TDs of 50-plus yards this season. The first of which came in Week 5 at Arizona, when QB Joe Burrow found Chase streaking behind the

Cardinals' secondary for a 63-yard TD in the third quarter. Then in Week 10 vs. Houston, Chase broke free downfield on a scramble play and hauled in a pass from Burrow for a 64-yard score.

WR Tyler Boyd, meanwhile, has four TD catches of 50 or more yards since 2021, tied for the third most in the NFL behind Chase and former Kansas City/current Miami WR Tyreek Hill (seven). Two of those receptions occurred during the 2022 campaign — a 56-yard TD in Week 3 at the N.Y. Jets and a 60-yarder in Week 7 vs. Atlanta.

Boyd passes Housh: With five catches in Week 16 at Pittsburgh, WR Tyler Boyd surpassed former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for the fourth most career receptions in team history. An eighth-year veteran who is the longest tenured player on the Bengals active roster, Boyd currently has 512 career grabs, the 17th most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2016.

Boyd, who was a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2016, has played in 119 regular-season games (77 starts) and seven postseason contests (six starts). After totaling 76 catches for a combined 828 yards over his first two seasons, he broke out in 2018 with a team-leading 76 grabs for 1028 yards. He followed up in 2019 with career highs in receptions (90) and yards (1046), becoming the sixth player in team history to eclipse 1000 receiving yards in back-to-back years.

Boyd this season ranks second on the Bengals in receptions (66) and receiving yards (663). He hauled in a season-best eight catches for 117 yards in Week 10 against Houston, including a 64-yarder late in the fourth quarter that set up a game-tying FG. In overtime of Week 15 vs. Minnesota, Boyd caught a pass from QB Jake Browning on third-and-nine and turned it into a 44-yard gain that put Cincinnati in position for the game-winning FG.

Tee gets two vs. Vikings: WR Tee Higgins in Week 15 caught four passes for 61 yards and two TDs to help Cincinnati erase a 14-point deficit in the fourth quarter against Minnesota. His first TD came on the opening play of the quarter, when he caught an over-the-shoulder pass from QB Jake Browning to bring the Bengals within seven points. He then scored the game-tying TD with under a minute remaining in regulation, when he positioned himself in front of a Vikings defensive back to secure the catch before acrobatically reaching the ball across the goal line with one hand.

It marked Higgins' fourth career game with two receiving TDs, and his second this season (Week 2 vs. Baltimore). He has missed four games this season, including three straight from Weeks 10-12 due to a hamstring injury, but has been in the lineup for each of the past five contests. Higgins had his best statistical game of 2023 in Week 16 at Pittsburgh, when he posted 140 receiving yards on five catches that included a career-long 80-yard TD in the third quarter. It was his second time going over the century mark this season, as he also tallied 110 yards on eight receptions to help lead the Bengals to a Week 9 win over Buffalo.

Higgins has developed into one of the NFL's premier pass catchers since being drafted by the Bengals in the second round in 2020. He has 3684 career receiving yards, with back-to-back 1000-yard campaigns in 2021 and '22. He is one of five Bengals all-time with multiple 1K receiving seasons within the first three years of his career, alongside WRs Cris Collinsworth (1981, '83), Chad Johnson (2002-03), A.J. Green ('11-13) and Ja'Marr Chase ('21-22). Higgins' career yardage total at the end of 2022 (3028) marked the second most ever by a Bengals player through their first three seasons, trailing only Green (3833).

Higgins has continued to produce during his brief but impressive postseason career. He ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing Chase in both categories, while his three TD catches are tied with Chase and former TE Dan Ross for the team's postseason record. With two TDs in Super Bowl LVI vs. the L.A. Rams, he also joined Ross as the only players in team history with multiple TDs in a postseason game.

Holiday Higgins: WR Tee Higgins has asserted himself as one of the NFL's top receivers in the month of December since entering the league in 2020.

In that timeframe, Higgins ranks seventh leaguewide in receiving yards (1228) and second in receiving TDs (10) during the calendar's final month.

Of Higgins' 12 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, five have occurred in December. He recorded career highs in catches (12) and receiving yards (194) on Dec. 26, 2021 in a win over Baltimore, which included two TDs as well as a 52-yard grab near the end of the first half. Earlier that month, on Dec. 5, 2021, he caught nine passes for 138 yards and a TD against the L.A. Chargers.

Higgins' top statistical performance this season came in Week 16 at Pittsburgh on Dec. 23, as he hauled in five catches for 140 yards and a TD. His 28.0 yards per reception were the second most in a game in his career, and included a career-long 80-yard TD early in the third guarter.

He also had a 99-yard output on Dec. 27, 2020 in a win over Houston, which included a go-ahead TD in the second half.

Mixon moving up: HB Joe Mixon has climbed two of the Bengals' career records charts during his seventh pro season in 2023. Mixon began the year with the fifth most rushing yards in team history, and through 15 games he has shot up to third on the all-time list. He surpassed FB Pete Johnson (5421) in Week 1 at Cleveland, then in Week 6 vs. Seattle overtook HB Rudi Johnson (5742). HB Corey Dillon (8061) and HB James Brooks (6447) hold the top two spots in the Bengals' record book.

Mixon's 6301 career rushing yards are the fourth most in the NFL since he entered the league as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2017. He has logged over 1000 rushing yards in three of his five full seasons (missed 10 games in 2020 due to injury), including including the '21 campaign in which he posted career highs in rushing yards (1205; third in NFL) and rushing TDs (13, fourth) while earning his first Pro Bowl selection. Mixon has rushed for at least 60 yards in eight games this season.

Mixon also is tied Rudi Johnson for the second most rushing TDs in team history (48), after beginning the season ranked fourth in the category. He has eight rushing TDs this season, with four coming during the team's three-game win streak from Weeks 13-15. Mixon's 28 rushing TDs since the start of the 2021 season are tied for the fourth most in the NFL in that span.

Balanced Mix: While his rushing totals place him near the top of Cincinnati's all-time charts, HB Joe Mixon also has proven himself as a pass catching threat out of the backfield. He recently surpassed 40 catches and 300 receiving yards for the third straight season, and his receiving TD in Week 17 at Kansas City was the 12th TD catch of his career.

Mixon has 370 receiving yards to go with his 923 rushing yards in 2023, good for 1293 yards from scrimmage. He is one of two NFL players with at least 1200 scrimmage yards in each of the past three seasons, alongside former Kansas City/current Miami WR Tyreek Hill. Mixon, Hill and New Orleans RB Alvin Kamara also are the only three players to post 1200 scrimmage yards at least five times in the past six seasons dating back to 2018.

Mixon has topped 100 yards from scrimmage in four games this season, including back-to-back efforts in Week 13 at Jacksonville (117 yards) and Week 14 against the Colts (125). He enters the regular-season finale nine receptions and 71 receiving yards shy of his career highs (60 and 441), which both were recorded during the 2022 campaign.

Defense tightens after the break: Cincinnati's defense has proven itself among the league's elite units coming out of halftime in recent years. The Bengals have given up 48 total TDs in the second half/overtime since the start of the 2021 regular season, the second fewest in the NFL, while their 9.8 average points allowed in the second half/OT in that span are the eighth

fewest leaguewide.

Of the Bengals' 24 takeaways this season, 14 have come in the second half (tied for 10th most in NFL). In the fourth quarter of Week 14 against Indianapolis, DT B.J. Hill grabbed his first career regular-season INT to help seal a Cincinnati win. In Week 10 against Houston, CB Cam Taylor-Britt picked off Texans QB C.J. Stroud with 3:41 remaining and returned it to the Houston four-yard line, sparking a late surge that saw the Bengals score 10 points in less than two minutes of play to tie the game.

The previous week against Buffalo, LB Germaine Pratt forced a fumble at the Cincinnati 11-yard line that was recovered by S Nick Scott, preserving a 21-10 Bengals lead early in the fourth quarter.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson enters Week 18 tied for the NFL lead with a career-high 17 sacks. Hendrickson's strip-sack on Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes that led to a Bengals TD in Week 17 marked his seventh straight game with at least a full sack, his longest streak since Weeks 5-14 of the 2021 season (nine straight). Since the NFL began officially tracking sacks in 1982, no Bengals player has led the league in the category.

Hendrickson's 17 sacks also are the second most in a season in Bengals history behind DE Coy Bacon's 22 in 1976 (the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and thus recognize Bacon as the record-holder). His current total surpassed his previous career high of 14 set in 2021 — Hendrickson's first season in Cincinnati — that ranked fifth in the NFL and helped him earn his first career Pro Bowl nod. Hendrickson put together another Pro Bowl campaign in 2022 with a team-leading eight sacks. Combining his Bengals tally with 13.5 sacks in 2020, his final year with the New Orleans Saints, Hendrickson has 52.5 sacks over the past four seasons, the third most in the league in that span behind Pittsburgh's T.J. Watt (60) and Cleveland's Myles Garrett (58).

Originally a third-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017, Hendrickson spent his first four seasons with the Saints before signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in '21. His production for Cincinnati was rewarded on July 27, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in stripes through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard has recorded five sacks this season to boost his career total to 35.5, marking the third most sacks among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Hubbard also has 57 tackles in 2023, the most among Cincinnati's defensive linemen. Four of his sacks came in Games 3-7, his most in a five-game stretch since the 2021 season (Games 7-11). He also recovered a fumble midway through the fourth quarter in Week 5 at Arizona, setting up a Bengals FG drive that increased their lead.

Players' listed positions vary by media outlet (e.g. whether they're classified as a LB or DE), but according to NFL.com's draft record, Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected in 2018 — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. According to NFL.com, there were a total of 40 defensive linemen (20 DEs, 20 DTs) selected in the 2018 draft, along with 32 LBs and one player with his position listed as "edge."

Hubbard has been the Bengals⁷ starting LDE since 2019, and during the '21 regular season his 7.5 sacks were second on the team. While his 2022 campaign will be remembered primarily for his 98-yard fumble return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, Hubbard during the regular season tallied 60 total tackles — his fourth straight year with at least 60 — including 6.5 sacks and

a team-leading 11 TFLs.

Hubbard additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in Bengals history. He signed a contract extension with the Bengals in July 2021 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the '25 season.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs: Fourth-year pro Logan Wilson is poised to lead the Bengals in tackles for a third straight season, but perhaps his most notable contributions have come when dropping into coverage. A former defensive back at the University of Wyoming, Wilson has 10 career INTs, the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020.

Three of Wilson's picks have occurred this season, beginning in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams when he intercepted QB Matthew Stafford twice to help lead Cincinnati to a Monday Night Football victory. The second INT came at the Bengals' 30-yard line when the Rams were driving to potentially take the lead in the third quarter. In the fourth quarter of Week 8 at San Francisco, Wilson stepped in front of a pass thrown by QB Brock Purdy and returned it 16 yards to set up a Bengals TD on the following play.

Wilson had two picks as a rookie in 2020, then followed up with four in '21 — the most by a Bengals LB in a single season since Odell Thurman (five) in '05.

Also a sure tackler, Wilson has set a career high this season with 130 stops (76 solos), marking the most by a Cincinnati player since LB Vontaze Burfict (171) in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. During the 2022 campaign, Wilson tallied a team-leading 123 tackles (then-career high) that included a career-best 2.5 sacks. Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of six NFL players with at least 300 tackles, five sacks, five INTs and five FFs.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in early August that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season.

Money Mac from deep: In the fourth quarter of Week 13 at Jacksonville, K Evan McPherson drilled a 54-yard FG to give the Bengals a late 31-28 lead. It marked McPherson's 21st career made FG from 50 or more yards, extending his record for the most in NFL history by a player in his first three seasons.

McPherson's 21 FGs from 50-plus yards also are tied for the most by any NFL kicker since he entered the league in 2021. He has seven such FGs this season (tied for fourth leaguewide), including two in the Week 3 win over the L.A. Rams (distances of 53 and 54 yards), as well as a season-long 56-yarder in the Week 8 victory at San Francisco. The kick against the 49ers was the fifth longest made FG in Bengals history, with McPherson also boasting three of the four longest. He knocked through a Bengals-record 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, breaking his own previous record of 58 that he hit in Week 15 of the '21 campaign at Denver. Then in Week 4 of 2022 against Miami, he converted a 57-yarder, tying Randy Bullock for the third longest.

McPherson is already the team's career leader in 50-yard FGs. It took him just 14 games into his rookie season to reach the top of Cincinnati's career chart in that category, breaking the previous record of eight. Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson made an NFL-best nine FGs of 50 or more yards during the 2021 regular season and fell just one shy of tying the NFL record for most 50-yarders. His nine such FGs were more than double the previous team record for a single season (four, by K Horst Muhlmann in 1970). He followed that up by going a perfect five of five on attempts of 50-plus yards in 2022.

McPherson followed up his 54-yarder at Jacksonville with a 48-yarder in overtime that secured a win for the Bengals. He had another game-winner in overtime of the Week 15 contest against Minnesota, which marked his seventh

career "walk-off" FG. The first five such FGs occurred during his 2021 rookie campaign, including two of the most memorable kicks in team history in postseason play — a 52-yarder in the Divisional Playoff at Tennessee, and a 31-yarder in the AFC Championship at Kansas City that punched Cincinnati's ticket to Super Bowl LVI.

In seven postseason games, McPherson is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts, marking the most made postseason FGs in league history by a player in his first two career seasons, and the second most in consecutive fashion to begin a postseason career (Robbie Gould, 29).

2023 draft class overview: Cincinnati's eight-player draft class in April featured four players on defense, three on offense and one on special teams. The group played in a combined 356 collegiate games.

Here's a closer look at the Bengals' 2023 draft class:

- DE Myles Murphy, Clemson (Round 1, Pick 28): Murphy has three sacks in his rookie season, with the most recent coming in Week 15 vs. Minnesota. He has seen action in all 16 games, totaling 19 tackles (14 in past eight contests). At 6-5, 270 pounds, Murphy possesses an athletic frame and showcased his edge rushing ability with 17.5 career sacks in 38 games at Clemson. He earned second-team All-ACC honors as a junior in 2022.
- CB DJ Turner II, Michigan (Round 2, Pick 60): Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking a time of 4.26 seconds. He has played in all 16 games this season, starting 11 straight from Weeks 5-16 while earning an increased role in the secondary. Turner has six PDs and a FR, but also has showcased his physicality with 47 total tackles. He earned a pair of All-Big Ten accolades (honorable mention in 2021, second team in '22) while playing at the University of Michigan.
- S Jordan Battle, Alabama (Round 3, Pick 95): Battle has started each of the past six games and is emerging as a key member of the secondary. He has 54 tackles over the last seven contests, after totaling 11 in the first nine. He notched his first career sack while adding a PD in Week 13 at Jacksonville. Battle was twice named a third-team All-American at Alabama, where he started at safety from 2020-22. Three of his six career INTs in college were returned for a TD.
- WR Charlie Jones, Purdue (Round 4, Pick 131): Jones opened the season as the Bengals' primary punt returner and solidified that role with an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. He suffered a thumb injury in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams and spent the next six games on the Reserve/Injured list, before returning to the active roster ahead of the Week 11 contest at Baltimore. Jones was a second-team All-American in his lone season at Purdue in 2022, as he led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12).
- HB Chase Brown, Illinois (Round 5, Pick 163): Brown has seen extended action over the past five games, with 31 carries in that span compared to two in his previous six appearances. He totaled 105 yards from scrimmage in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis, highlighted by his first career TD on a screen pass that he took 54 yards to the end zone. Brown spent four games (Weeks 8-11) on the Reserve/Injured list due to a hamstring injury. He posted 1000 rushing yards in each of his final two seasons at Illinois, earning second-team All-America honors in 2022.
- WR Andrei Iosivas, Princeton (Round 6, Pick 206): Iosivas is the Bengals' seventh all-time draft pick out of an Ivy League program, and the first since LB Reggie Williams (Dartmouth) and QB Bob Bateman (Brown) in 1976. He had a receiving TD in back-to-back games, with the first of his career coming in Week 6 vs. Seattle followed by another in Week 8 at San Francisco. He recorded season highs in catches (four) and receiving yards (36) in Week 16 at Pittsburgh.
- P Brad Robbins, Michigan (Round 6, Pick 217): Robbins earned the Bengals' punting job out of training camp, and through 16 regular-season contests he has punted 70 times with a 44.2-yard gross average. Eight of his 19 punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line have come over the past six games. Robbins finished his career at Michigan with the second highest punting average (43.0 yards) in program history, and was a three-time All-Big Ten

selection.

● CB DJ Ivey, Miami (Fla.) (Round 7, Pick 246): Ivey suffered a seasonending knee injury in Week 15 vs. Minnesota, after seeing an increased role both defensively and on special teams in recent weeks. He had his best performance in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis, logging a solo tackle and a PD on defense along with a fumble recovery on punt coverage. Ivey showcased his athleticism during preseason with a team-leading three PDs. He totaled six PDs over a five-year career (2018-22) at Miami.

Coaching continuity under Taylor: Head coach Zac Taylor returned virtually the entire coaching staff for the 2023 season, including defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo, offensive coordinator Brian Callahan and assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons.

Anarumo, Callahan and Simmons have all been on staff since Taylor was hired in February 2019. The Bengals are the only team in the NFL with the same head coach and same coordinators in place for each season since 2021. Simmons, now in his 21st season with the team, is the longest-tenured coach on the Bengals' staff. He has led Cincinnati's special teams units each year since 2003.

Ken Riley enters Hall of Fame: Bengals legend Ken Riley, the most productive CB in team history, was officially inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on Aug. 5. He joined OT Anthony Munoz as former Bengals players immortalized in Canton, Ohio.

The honor came posthumously for Riley, who passed away in 2020 at the age of 72. Riley's wife, Barbara, received the gold jacket on his behalf and revealed the bust with his son, Ken Riley II, who spoke at the enshrinement.

"Dad is just getting inducted today, but his whole life he was a Hall of Famer on and off the field," Ken Riley II said.

Riley spent 15 seasons (1969-83) with the Bengals, playing in 207 games. His 65 career INTs constitute the most dominant lead in any major statistical category of the team's record book, nearly doubling the second-place total of 33. At the time of Riley's retirement, that total of 65 INTs was the fourth-most in NFL history, and it still stands tied for fifth-most. He was a member of five Bengals teams that reached the postseason, including the 1981 squad, which he helped lead to Super Bowl XVI.

Following his retirement, Riley spent two seasons as an assistant coach for the Green Bay Packers before taking over as head coach at his alma mater, Florida A&M University. He led the Rattlers' football program from 1986-93, then served as the school's athletic director from '94-2004. Riley was inducted into the FAMU Athletics Hall of Fame in 1982, the Black College Football Hall of Fame in 2015, and the Bengals Ring of Honor in '21.

Riley's family received his Hall of Fame Ring of Excellence during a halftime ceremony in the Bengals' Week 9 contest against Buffalo on Sunday Night Football.

Esiason, Johnson join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor with the induction of former QB Boomer Esiason and WR Chad Johnson. Remembered by fans for their on-field contributions as well as their charismatic personalities, Esiason and Johnson became the seventh and eighth members of the Ring of Honor during a ceremony at halftime of the team's Week 3 game against the L.A. Rams on Monday Night Football.

Esiason played for the Bengals from 1984-92 before returning for a final season in '97, and is regarded as one of the greatest locker-room leaders in team history. He earned three Pro Bowl nods (1986, '88-89), and ranks third in Bengals history in both career passing yards (27,149) and TD passes (187). Esiason in 1988 was named NFL MVP while leading the league with a 97.4 passer rating, before steering the Bengals to an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl XXIII.

Johnson, who was officially known as Chad Ochocinco from 2008-11, emerged as one of the NFL's best receivers during his 10 seasons with the Bengals ('01-10). He was selected to six Pro Bowls (2003-07, '09), and remains the team's all-time leader in receptions (751), receiving yards (10,783) and receiving TDs (66).

Bengals president Mike Brown on the 2023 inductees: "Boomer and Chad were both exceptional players. If you look at the statistics, Boomer has a long list of quarterback firsts here. And Chad was a superb athlete who was probably

the quickest receiver we have had here. They could have moments when they just carried the team by themselves. Both players are very deserving of this honor."

Esiason and Johnson joined QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley in the Ring of Honor.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Bengal bites: The Bengals' victory over Buffalo in Week 9 was the 400th win in team history (390 regular season, 10 postseason); the team now stands at 403 all-time wins ... Since 2011, the Bengals own a 72-7-2 record in the regular season when scoring 25 or more points ... The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.4 years ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is WR Tyler Boyd, who is in his eighth season with the team after joining the Bengals as a second-round draft pick in 2016 ... The oldest player on the roster is QB AJ McCarron, who is 30 (born Sept. 13, 1990) ... The youngest player on the roster is DE Myles Murphy, who is 21 (born Jan. 3, 2002) ... The lightest player on the roster is CB DJ Turner II, who is listed at 180 pounds ... The heaviest player on the roster is OT Orlando Brown Jr., who is listed at 345 pounds ... Brown is also the tallest player on the roster, listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Jake Browning took over the Bengals' starting QB role following Pro Bowler Joe Burrow's season-ending injury sustained in Week 11 and has started the past six games for Cincinnati. In those starts he has completed 145 of 204 passes for 1712 yards and eight TDs with six INTs for a passer rating of 97.1. Browning's passing yardage total is the ninth highest by any QB through their first six starts since 1950, and he joined Hall of Famer Kurt Warner as the only players with over 1500 passing yards along with a completion percentage of at least 70 in their first six starts. Browning's top performance thus far came in Week 13 at Jacksonville, when he posted the fifth highest completion percentage in a game in team history (86.5) with 354 passing yards and a TD to lead the Bengals to an overtime win on Monday Night Football. He was rewarded with AFC Offensive Player of the Week honors, and followed that up by going 18 of 24 (75 percent) for 275 yards and two TDs (career-high 122.7 rating) in the Week 14 victory over Indianapolis. In the following week's game against Minnesota, 243 of Browning's 324 passing yards came after halftime to help spearhead a comeback win in OT. Browning also has rushed for 109 yards on 25 attempts this season with three TDs. His first substantial action came in Week 11 at Baltimore, when he entered the game in the second guarter following Burrow's injury and passed for 68 yards and his first career TD. He spent the first 10 games of this season as Cincinnati's second-string QB behind Burrow, after earning a spot on the 53-man roster coming out of training camp for the first time in his career. Browning originally was a college free agent signee of Minnesota in 2019, and was on the Vikings' practice squad for the '19 and '20 seasons. He then joined the Bengals prior to the 2021 campaign and spent the past two years on Cincinnati's practice squad. He has played in six preseason games for the Bengals, including three (two starts) in 2023. He made his NFL debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, entering late in the fourth quarter in relief of Burrow. Browning was a four-year starter (2015-18) at the University of Washington, where he led the Huskies to the College Football Playoff in '16 and finished his career with numerous school records. Backing Browning up is ninth-year veteran AJ **McCarron**, who is in his second Bengals stint after being signed to the practice squad on Sept. 23. He was elevated to the active roster for the Week 12 contest against Pittsburgh, then on Dec. 4 was signed to the active roster off the practice squad. McCarron saw his first action of the season in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis when he played five snaps while Browning was being treated for muscle cramps. He came into the NFL as a fifth-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2014 and missed his rookie campaign due to a shoulder injury, but went on to play in 11 games over the next three seasons. That included three starts in 2015, when he helped the Bengals secure the AFC North Division title and started a Wild Card Playoff vs. Pittsburgh. McCarron also saw regular-season action with the Oakland Raiders (2018) and the Houston Texans ('19-20). He helped lead the University of Alabama to back-to-back national titles as a starter in 2011 and '12.

Running backs: Leading the Bengals running back room is seventh-year pro **Joe Mixon**, a team captain who ranks third in team history in career rushing yards (6301) and is tied for second in rushing TDs (48). Mixon recently eclipsed 1200 yards from scrimmage this season (923 rushing, 370 receiving), and is one of two players in the NFL to post at least 1200 scrimmage yards in

each of the past three years (Tyreek Hill). He has topped 100 scrimmage yards in four games, and has scored a TD in eight of the last 10 contests. His most recent score came in Week 17 at Kansas City, a receiving TD to put Cincinnati ahead in the second guarter that marked his 12th career TD catch. Mixon has reached the 1000-yard rushing mark in three of his five full seasons ahead of 2023 (played just six games in '20). His 6301 career rushing yards are fourth most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2017. Next on the running backs depth chart is rookie Chase Brown, who has seen an increased workload since returning from the Reserve/Injured list (hamstring) prior to Week 12. Brown provides the offense with big-play potential and quickly showed that in his first extended action in Week 13 at Jacksonville, when he had a 31-yard burst that marked the team's longest run of the season. Also a capable pass catcher, Brown had three grabs for 80 yards in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis, including his first career TD on a screen pass that he took 54 yards to the end zone. Brown's top speed on the play was 22.05 mph, which according to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service is the second fastest speed by any ball carrier in the league this season. He finished the Colts game with 105 yards from scrimmage, then went for 51 more the following week against Minnesota (23 rushing, 28 receiving). Up next in the running backs room is fifth-year pro Trayveon Williams, who also is Cincinnati's primary kickoff returner. Williams has 50 games of NFL experience, and this season has rushed for 71 yards on 14 carries. He contributed a key block on a third-down play in overtime of Week 15 vs. Minnesota, providing time for QB Jake Browning to escape the pocket and find WR Tyler Boyd for a 44yard gain. Third-year pro Chris Evans rounds out the position group. Evans had 17 carries for 77 yards his rookie season, but none in 2022. Both of his carries this season came in the opener at Cleveland. Evans has seen action in eight games, and has been inactive for the past six.

Wide receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is highlighted by one of the most explosive pass-catching trios in the NFL, with the senior member being eighth-year pro Tyler Boyd. Boyd is regarded as a premier slot receiver that poses a challenge for nickel CBs with his size (6-2, 203) and route-running ability. He ranks fourth in team history in career receptions (512) for 5996 yards and 31 TDs, and posted consecutive seasons of 1000-plus receiving yards in 2018-19. Boyd's two TD catches this season came in consecutive games vs. Seattle and at San Francisco, and each capped off the Bengals' opening offensive drive. He had a season-high eight receptions for 117 yards in Week 10 vs. Houston, including a 64-yard catch and run that set the Bengals up for a game-tying FG late in the fourth quarter. In Week 15 vs. Minnesota, Boyd reeled in a 44-yard catch during the overtime period that set up Cincinnati's gamewinning FG. His four TD catches of 50 or more yards since the start of the 2021 season are tied for the most in the league, and leading that category with nine such TDs is teammate and third-year pro Ja'Marr Chase. Chase was the team's first-round draft pick in 2021 and paced the Bengals in receptions, receiving yards and receiving TDs in each of his first two seasons, earning Pro Bowl honors both years. He ranks in the top-15 leaguewide in each of those categories through 16 games this season. Chase has netted 100 or more receiving yards in five games, beginning in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams when his

141 yards on 12 catches helped lead Cincinnati to its first win. In Week 5 at Arizona, he hauled in a Bengals single-game record 15 catches for 192 yards and three TDs, including a 63-yard TD early in the third quarter. Chase in Week 6 vs. Seattle surpassed 3000 career receiving yards, doing so in the fifth-fewest games (35) in NFL history. He had another double-digit catch game in Week 8 at San Francisco, finishing with 10 receptions for 100 yards including a 17-yard TD in the fourth quarter. Chase had a 64-yard TD as part of a 124-yard receiving day in Week 10 against Houston, and in Week 13 at Jacksonville he put up 149 yards to surpass 1000 on the season. His 76-yard TD in the third quarter of the Jaguars game marked the Bengals' longest play from scrimmage since 2021 (also a Chase TD). His 96 catches this season are a career high, surpassing his previous best of 87 in 2022. Chase sustained a shoulder injury late in the Week 15 contest vs. Minnesota that caused him to miss Week 16 at Pittsburgh, though he returned to action in Week 17 at Kansas City. Another Cincinnati receiver with a proven history of big plays is fourth-year pro Tee Higgins. Higgins, a secondround pick in 2020, has posted over 1000 receiving yards in each of the past two seasons, becoming one of five players in team history to do so within his first three years. At 6-4, he possesses elite athleticism and the ability to high-point the ball when contested by defensive backs. Higgins has two 100-yard receiving games this season, with the first coming in a Week 9 win over Buffalo when he went for 110 yards on eight catches. He missed four games due to injuries, including three straight in Weeks 10-12 with a hamstring ailment, but has returned to action and is averaging 21.9 yards per catch over the past five contests. He had two TDs in Week 15 vs. Minnesota, both coming in the fourth quarter to help Cincinnati climb back from a 14-point deficit. The second was a highlight-reel play with under a minute remaining in which Higgins caught a pass near the goal line and acrobatically reached the ball across with one arm. His best yardage output of the season came in Week 16 at Pittsburgh when he caught five passes for 140 yards, highlighted by an 80-yard TD in the third quarter. Fellow fourth-year pro Trenton Irwin is a dependable option that can play at multiple WR spots, and has started five of his 15 games played this season. He ranks sixth on the team with 282 receiving yards, including a 32-yard TD catch to cap off the Bengals' opening drive of Week 10 against Houston. He had an increased role with Higgins out of the lineup for Week 5 at Arizona, and delivered a career-high eight catches for 60 yards, and caught each of his four targets for 37 yards in Chase's absence at Pittsburgh in Week 16. Irwin spent parts of his first three seasons on Cincinnati's practice squad and saw limited game action, but then found a role in 2022 when he played in nine contests with two starts. Despite not making his season debut until Week 8 at Cleveland, Irwin managed to record 15 catches for 231 yards and four TDs. His best performance came on Christmas Eve at New England, when he caught three passes for 45 yards and two TDs, all in the first half. Two rookies comprise the rest of the WR room, including the team's fourth-round draft choice Charlie Jones. Jones is listed behind Boyd as the team's backup slot WR, and also serves as the team's primary punt returner. He was a second-team All-American last season at Purdue, when he led the FBS in receptions (110), while ranking second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). He recorded his first career catch in Week 3 vs. L.A. Rams and had two catches for 10 yards in Week 15 vs. Minnesota. Jones missed Weeks 4-10 while on Reserve/Injured with a thumb injury but returned to action in Week 11 at Baltimore. Rounding out the WR room is rookie sixth-round pick Andrei losivas. The former Princeton standout both in football and track and field had a TD catch in back-to-back games (Week 6 vs. Seattle and Week 8 at San Francisco). Both scores came on QB scrambles, with losivas working himself free for Burrow to find in the end zone. Iosivas led Cincinnati in catches (12) and receiving yards (129) during preseason, helping him earn a roster spot. He missed the Week 11 contest at Baltimore due to a knee injury, but returned the following game against Pittsburgh and had a 16yard catch to convert a third down. His lone catch in Week 15 vs. Minnesota was a five-yarder to convert a third down during the Bengals' game-tying TD drive late in the fourth quarter. He had a career-high four catches and 36 yards in Week 16 at Pittsburgh.

Tight ends: First on the depth chart is 2019 second-round pick **Drew Sample**, who since being drafted by the Bengals has established himself as a consistent blocking TE. Sample missed most of the 2022 season with a knee injury sustained in Week 2 at Dallas, but has played in all 16 games this season, making nine starts. He has 78 career receptions for 614 yards and three TDs. Sample recorded three catches for 30 yards and a TD in Week 9 vs. Buffalo, his first score since the 2020 season. In Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh, he caught an 11-yard TD to give the Bengals a lead in the second quarter, and in Week 16 at Pittsburgh he had three grabs for a season-high 38 yards. Sample had a streak of 39 consecutive games played (including postseason) prior to the 2022 knee

injury and has also been a core contributor on special teams for Cincinnati. Second on the depth chart is Irv Smith Jr., a fifth-year player who was one of Cincinnati's notable free agent acquisitions during the offseason. Originally a second-round draft pick of Minnesota in 2019, Smith spent his first four seasons with the Vikings before signing with the Bengals. He has played in 49 career games with 21 starts and totaled 109 catches for 973 yards and 10 TDs. He missed the entire 2021 campaign due to a knee injury and was limited to eight regular-season games in '22 due to an ankle injury, but has played in 12 contests this year with the Bengals. Smith missed Weeks 3-4 due to a hamstring injury, then returned to the lineup in Week 5 at Arizona. He scored his first TD as a Bengal on Cincinnati's opening drive in Week 9 vs. Buffalo. He was inactive in Week 16 at Pittsburgh and active/DNP in Week 17 at Kansas City. The Bengals in July re-signed Mitchell Wilcox, who spent his first three career seasons with Cincinnati. He had his first two receptions of the season for 10 yards in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams. Wilcox has played in all 16 games this season and made starts in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh and Week 14 vs. Indianapolis. The University of South Florida product has 29 career catches for 211 yards and a TD in 47 games. Tanner Hudson has emerged as a trusted pass catching option for both Bengals QBs this season and has career highs in receptions (37) and receiving yards (341). He joined the Bengals' practice squad late in the 2022 season after spending time with Tampa Bay ('19-20), San Francisco ('21) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). Hudson played in 11 regular-season and all four postseason contests for the Buccaneers team that won Super Bowl LV. He spent the first seven games of 2023 on Cincinnati's practice squad, and after being a standard elevation for two games earlier this season, he was signed to the active roster on Nov. 1. He made an immediate impact, starting in Week 9 vs. Buffalo and recording four catches for 45 yards. In Week 10 vs. Houston, he posted a career-high six receptions for 33 yards, including five for 28 on the Bengals' opening TD drive. He added four catches for 49 yards in Week 11 at Baltimore, and followed that up with a combined eight catches for 53 yards over the next two games. Hudson scored his first career TD in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis on an 11-yard reception that gave the Bengals the lead. He posted a team-high five catches for 49 yards in Week 15 vs. Minnesota, with four of his catches resulting in a first down.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in revamping the offensive line over the past two offseasons, signing four marquee free agents to bolster that unit. The most recent such addition is OT Orlando Brown Jr., who signed with Cincinnati in March after spending his first three seasons in Baltimore (2018-20) and the past two in Kansas City ('21-22). A Pro Bowl selection in each of the past four years, Brown took over as the Bengals' starting LOT. He was a crucial piece of offensive lines that blocked for Ravens QB Lamar Jackson (2019) and Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. Brown made his first 32 career starts at ROT, then transitioned to LOT midway through the 2020 season and has started his past 59 games at that spot. He has started all 16 contests for the Bengals, though he exited Week 6 vs. Seattle with a groin injury late in the third quarter. The nucleus of Cincinnati's Oline is C Ted Karras, who signed as a free agent in 2022 and almost instantaneously became a vocal leader in the locker room. Currently serving as a team captain for the second straight season, Karras has experience at all three interior OL positions but quickly cemented himself as the Bengals' starting center and played 99.4 percent of offensive snaps in 2022. He spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, with the only outlier coming in 2020 with Miami. Karras was a member of Patriots Super Bowl winning teams in 2016 and '18, before earning the starting center role in '19. Through 16 games, Karras has played 100 percent of offensive snaps. He was named the team's nominee for the 2023 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award, in recognition of his work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici and his charitable efforts through the fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Joining Karras in the 2022 free agency class was RG Alex Cappa, who spent his first four seasons with Tampa Bay. Cappa was perhaps the Bengals' most consistent performer on the line through most of the 2022 season, starting the first 16 games before suffering a left ankle injury in the regular-season finale that kept him out of all three playoff contests. He was the Bucs' starting RG from 2019-21 and was a member of the Super Bowl LVwinning team, though he did not play in the final three postseason games due to an injury sustained in the Wild Card Playoff. Cappa missed his first action of the season (four snaps) in Week 15 vs. Minnesota when he left the game for one offensive series in the second quarter. Cappa exited the Week 17 contest at Kansas City late in the fourth quarter. Second-year pro Cordell Volson is building off an impressive rookie season in which he was the team's only player to line up for every single offensive snap in the regular season and postseason (1311 total). Volson originally was a fourth-round draft pick out of North Dakota State University, where he played four different positions along the O-line during his career. He played in a school-record 65 games at NDSU, helping the Bison win four FCS national championships while earning three FCS All-America

honors. Through 16 games, Volson has played 100 percent of offensive snaps. Jonah Williams, the Bengals' first-round pick in 2019, is the team's starting ROT this year after lining up at LOT for his first three full seasons (missed '19 campaign due to shoulder injury). He has started all 58 regular-season games and all five postseason games he has played in. Williams carried a streak of 37 consecutive starts before suffering a left knee injury in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore that ended his season. He spent the majority of the offseason rehabbing, including all of the team's mandatory minicamp, but was a full participant in training camp and has played 100 percent of offensive snaps in the regular season. G Max Scharping is in his fifth pro season and serves as both a backup right guard and center for Cincinnati. Scharping was acquired by the Bengals on waivers prior to the start of the 2022 season and played in 14 regular-season contests before being thrust into the starting RG spot for all three postseason games following Cappa's injury. He spent his first three pro seasons with Houston, splitting time between RG and LG in 48 games played (33 starts). Another notable free agent addition this offseason was G Cody Ford, a fifth-year veteran who originally was a second-round pick of Buffalo in 2019. Ford spent his first three pro seasons with the Bills before playing for Arizona in 2022. He has played in 65 career games with 33 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG and one as a third tight end. Ford saw action on 17 offensive snaps in Week 6 vs. Seattle, filling in at LOT in relief of Brown. He made his first start of the season as a third TE in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh. In Week 13 at Jacksonville, Ford entered the contest as a sixth offensive lineman for three snaps. He did the same for six snaps against Indianapolis in Week 14. In Week 15 vs. Minnesota, Ford played six snaps while filling in for Cappa at RG and as a tackle-eligible lineman. Ford played 11 offensive snaps in Week 17 at Kansas City again as a tackle-eligible lineman and filling in for Cappa at RG. Ford previously lined up alongside Brown for two seasons (2016-17) at the University of Oklahoma. OT D'Ante Smith was inactive for all but one game for Cincinnati during the 2022 regular season, but played in all three postseason contests as a reserve lineman. He was originally a fourth-round pick in 2021 and battled injuries as a rookie, seeing action in just two regular-season games. Smith returned in time for the postseason run, playing in both the AFC Championship and Super Bowl LVI. Third-year pro Jackson Carman played in all 17 regular-season games as a rookie in 2021 but saw action in just three contests last season. With the O-line affected by injuries heading into the Divisional Playoff at Buffalo in January, Carman was called upon to start at LOT and played perhaps the best game of his young career, as he helped limit the Bills to one sack and paved the way for Cincinnati's 172 net rushing yards. A native of Fairfield, Ohio (Greater Cincinnati area), Carman played three collegiate seasons at Clemson before the Bengals drafted him in the second round in 2021. C Trey Hill has served primarily as a special teams contributor the last two seasons, but started three games (two at C, one at RG) in his 2021 rookie campaign. A sixth-round draft pick, Hill has played in all seven of Cincinnati's postseason games the past two years.

Defensive linemen: Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate Sam Hubbard is in his sixth Bengals season (fifth as a full-time starter). A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2018, Hubbard has 35.5 career sacks, the third most among all players from his rookie class. Four of those sacks came in a five-game span (Games 3-7), beginning in Week 3 when he took down Rams QB Matthew Stafford for an eight-yard loss in the fourth quarter. Hubbard was dominant in Week 6 vs. Seattle, recording six tackles (four solos) and five QB hits, including a sack of QB Geno Smith on fourth-and-goal to preserve Cincinnati's lead late in the fourth quarter. He helped preserve a halftime tie when he dropped QB Trevor Lawrence for a seven-yard loss right before the break in Week 13 at Jacksonville. In the second quarter of Week 17 at Kansas City, Hubbard recovered a fumble that gave the Bengals a short field and led to their second TD. Hubbard also is considered among the best DEs in the NFL against the run and led the Bengals with 11 TFLs in 2022. He made one of the most memorable plays in recent team history during the fourth quarter of the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore, returning a fumble 98 yards for what proved to be the game-winning TD. It was his second career fumble returned for a score (regular and postseason). Hubbard two games this season due to an ankle injury, but made four tackles including a TFL in his return to action in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh. On the other side of the line is DE Trey Hendrickson, whose career-high 17 sacks this season are tied for the league lead and are the second most in a season in team history. Hendrickson joined the team as a free agent in 2021 and has earned Pro Bowl selections in each of his two full Bengals seasons. His first year in stripes, Hendrickson posted a then career-high 14 sacks, the fifth most in the league. He followed that up with a team-leading eight sacks in 2022. The Florida Atlantic University product has at least one sack in 12 games this season, including a season-best 2.5 in Week 5 at Arizona. He helped

cement the Week 8 win over San Francisco with a strip sack of QB Brock Purdy that resulted in a Bengals recovery. Hendrickson notched two sacks, one on the first play of the game and one on fourth down in the fourth quarter, in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis. He also recorded a PD that led to a Bengals INT in the fourth quarter. In Week 15 vs. Minnesota, Hendrickson totaled 1.5 sacks, including dropping QB Nick Mullens for a seven-yard loss on the Vikings' final drive of regulation to help force overtime. He added another sack in Week 16 at Pittsburgh that helped force a Steelers punt. In Week 17 at Kansas City, Hendrickson recorded a strip sack on QB Patrick Mahomes (recovered by Sam Hubbard) that set up a Cincinnati TD drive in the second quarter. Hendrickson's 52.5 sacks since the start of the 2020 season are the third most in the NFL in that span. On July 27, he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. DT B.J. Hill is in his third season with the Bengals and has become a major contributor on the D-line. Hill was acquired in a trade with the N.Y. Giants shortly before the 2021 regular season and has played in 48 games (34 starts) for Cincinnati. Hill started all 16 contests in 2022, posting a career-high 68 tackles with three sacks, one FF, three FR and four PDs. He has added four more sacks this season, highlighted by a takedown of Rams QB Matthew Stafford in Week 3 that forced a punt in the fourth quarter. He also recovered the fumble forced by Hendrickson in the fourth guarter in Week 8 at San Francisco. He recorded an INT two-straight games, beginning with his first career regular-season pick in the fourth quarter of Week 14 vs. Indianapolis. The following week against Minnesota, Hill intercepted an attempted pass while bringing QB Nick Mullens to the ground to end a Vikings scoring threat. He had a season-high eight tackles at Pittsburgh in Week 16. Sixth-year DT Josh Tupou, who has been reliable against the run since joining the Bengals as a college free agent in 2017, is the team's starting nose tackle in place of injured starter DJ Reader (placed on the Reserve/Injured list with a knee injury on Dec. 18). The 6-3, 340-pound Tupou has appeared in 64 career games (23 starts) for the Bengals, and has logged 85 total career tackles, including a pair of sacks in 2022. DE Joseph Ossai is in his third season as a pro, but 2022 was his first healthy year as he missed his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. The athletic pass rusher showcased his potential last season with 3.5 sacks as a reserve DE. He then posted six tackles in postseason play, including five with a TFL in the AFC Championship at Kansas City. Ossai saw action in all three preseason games and had an INT on the opening drive at Atlanta, but suffered an ankle injury the following week at Washington that caused him to miss the first two regular-season contests. He made his season debut in Week 3 and has seen action on 151 defensive snaps in 13 games, and was an active DNP in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh. He tallied his first sack of the season in Week 13 at Jacksonville, taking down QB C.J. Beathard on the Jaguars' final drive of regulation to help force a FG attempt. Second-year DT Zach Carter has 21 tackles, a FF and a PD through 16 games this season, and made his first start in Week 8 at San Francisco. He forced a fumble to end a Steelers red zone possession in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh and started in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis. He started and saw extended action with 43 snaps at Pittsburgh in Week 16. Carter was a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2022 and played in all 16 games with nine starts in his rookie campaign. He also appeared in all three postseason games, starting the Wild Card round and AFC Championship as a second DT. Third-year pro Cam Sample logged his first sack of the season in Week 6 vs. Seattle, bringing down QB Geno Smith on the final play of the first half. Sample has played in 46 career regular-season games and serves as a rotational DE. He started in Week 10 vs. Houston and Week 11 at Baltimore in place of Hubbard. making five tackles against the Texans and three against the Ravens. He recorded a half sack against Indianapolis in Week 14. A product of Tulane University, he posted 25 tackles with two sacks in 2022, and then flashed in the AFC Championship with a sack of Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes along with another TFL. The Bengals selected DE Myles Murphy out of Clemson University in the first round (28th overall) of this year's draft, looking to bolster their pass rushing production. Murphy totaled 17.5 sacks in 38 games at Clemson, earning second-team All-ACC honors last season. He brings premier size and athleticism to the D-Line room at 6-5, 270 pounds. Murphy recorded his first career tackle and sack on a second-quarter takedown of QB Ryan Tannehill in Week 4 at Tennessee, and sacked QB Kenny Pickett for a two-yard loss in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh. He recorded four tackles, including a sack, in Week 15 vs. Minnesota. The Bengals acquired DT Jay Tufele on waivers from Jacksonville prior to the 2022 season opener and it proved to be a valuable move, as he started two games (Weeks 8-9) while Reader was recovering from a knee injury. Tufele finished with 16 total tackles in seven regular-season games. He has appeared in nine regular-season games this season, registering nine total tackles. Cincinnati acquired rookie DT Travis Bell on waivers from Atlanta on Dec. 20. Originally a seventh-round draft pick of Chicago in 2023, Bell spent the first eight regular season games on the Bears' practice squad before signing

to the Falcons' active roster. He played in two games with Atlanta, totaling two solo tackles. Bell has been inactive for the past two contests for the Bengals.

Linebackers: Among Cincinnati's most promising young defenders is fourth-year pro Logan Wilson, who wears the "green dot" as the defense's communicator. Wilson led the Bengals in tackles the past two regular seasons, with his then career-high 123 stops in 2022 marking the most by a Bengals player since Vontaze Burfict (171) in '13. Wilson has a team-high and careerhigh 130 total tackles through 16 games (all starts) this season. He also has shown a high proficiency when dropping into coverage, as his 10 career INTs are the most by an NFL LB since he entered the league in 2020. Three of those picks have come this season, including two in Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams and another in Week 8 at San Francisco. He and DE Trey Hendrickson split a sack in Week 10 vs. Houston, with Wilson forcing a fumble on the play that ended a Texans drive in Cincinnati territory. Wilson has tallied double-digit tackles in six games this season, most recently with 11 in Week 16 at Pittsburgh. Wilson was inked to a four-year contract extension on Aug. 5 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Ranking second on the team in tackles this season with 116 is Germaine Pratt. Pratt. a fifth-round Bengals pick in 2019 who is in his fifth pro season, has started 70 of 78 regular-season games played. He tied for the team lead with 11 tackles (seven solos) in Week 1 at Cleveland, with a sack and FF, and followed that up with nine stops in Week 2 vs. Baltimore. In Week 5 at Arizona, Pratt led the team with 10 tackles, including a key stop on a Cardinals fourth-and-one in the third guarter, then in the fourth guarter picked off QB Joshua Dobbs to help seal the win. Pratt added another INT in Week 8 at San Francisco, tipping a pass by QB Brock Purdy and coming down with it to end a potential game-tying drive that reached Cincinnati's eight-yard line. Pratt forced a fumble in the fourth guarter of Week 9 vs. Buffalo (recovered by S Nick Scott) that ended a Bills scoring threat. In Week 13 at Jacksonville, Pratt logged a team-high 12 combined tackles, tied for the most by a Bengals player this season. He tied for the team lead with 10 tackles and recorded a half sack in Week 14 vs. Indianapolis, and led the team with 12 tackles and registered a half sack in Week 15 vs. Minnesota. A 2020 seventh-round draft choice of the Bengals, Markus Bailey has grown into a key reserve role in the LB room as well as a valuable contributor on special teams. Bailey has played in 59 regularseason games (four starts), and has 52 total defensive tackles as well as 20 special teams tackles. He provided a crucial block during Sam Hubbard's 98yard fumble recovery return for a TD in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore this past January. Akeem Davis-Gaither played in the first three games this season before suffering a knee injury that has caused him to be inactive for four contests. He returned to game action in Week 9 vs. Buffalo. He logged a careerbest 37 tackles in 16 games (one start) in 2022. Davis-Gaither also played in all three postseason games, recording his first career INT in the Wild Card Playoff against Baltimore. Joe Bachie spent the first six games of 2022 on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a left knee injury, but returned to the active roster and saw action in 10 regular-season games and all three postseason contests. He resumed his role as a core special teams player, totaling seven ST tackles in 168 snaps. Bachie has seen action mostly on special teams in 2023. The Bengals acquired LB Devin Harper on waivers from Dallas on Sept. 29. Harper originally was a sixth-round pick of the Cowboys in 2022 and played in six games for them, including their first three contests of this season. He made his Bengals debut in Week 5 at Arizona and has played in five contests this year for Cincinnati.

Defensive backs: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, Hilton is a sure tackler and excellent blitzer. He was voted to serve as a team captain this season for the first time in his career, and has started 12 of 16 games played. Hilton came down with his first INT of the season in Week 6 vs. Seattle, picking off QB Geno Smith in the third quarter to end a Seahawks drive that reached the red zone. He recovered a fumble in the second guarter of Week 10 vs. Houston, ending a Texans drive that reached the Cincinnati 31-yard line. He posted a team-high eight solo tackles, including two TFLs, in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh. He recorded another red zone takeaway when he intercepted QB Nick Mullens at the Cincinnati one-yard line and returned it 16 yards in the second quarter of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. Hilton has notably made several game-altering plays in the postseason over the past two years, including an INT in the 2021 Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and a sack in the fourth quarter of the '22 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore. Chidobe Awuzie arrived in Cincinnati in 2021 alongside Hilton and quickly established himself as the team's No. 1 boundary corner. Awuzie has started 36 of 41 games he has played in for the Bengals (including postseason). His 2022 season was cut short by a knee injury suffered in Week 8 at Cleveland, and he spent the

following nine-plus months rehabbing before being cleared to practice on July 25 of this year. Awuzie's first game back came on the same field where he sustained the injury, as he played 43 defensive snaps in Week 1 at Cleveland and recorded a FR in the first quarter. Awuzie missed the Week 5 contest at Arizona due to a back injury, but returned to game action in Week 6 vs. Seattle. He has started the past four contests and in Week 13 at Jacksonville tallied eight tackles and a PD. He notched five tackles and two PDs against Indianapolis in Week 14. In Week 16 at Pittsburgh, Awuzie notched four tackles and a FF. Second-year pro Cam Taylor-Britt recorded his first two career INTs (regular season) in back-to-back games in Weeks 5-6, and added his third and fourth picks in Weeks 9 and 10. He is tied for seventh leaguewide in INTs this season. In Week 5 at Arizona, he picked off QB Joshua Dobbs and returned it 11 yards for a go-ahead TD near the end of the first half. Then in the fourth quarter of Week 6 vs. Seattle, he came down with a diving INT before returning it 24 yards. Taylor-Britt stepped in front of a Josh Allen pass in the second guarter of Week 9 vs. Buffalo for his third INT of the season. Late in the fourth quarter in Week 10 vs. Houston, he intercepted a C.J. Stroud pass and returned it 30 yards to the Texans' four-yard line to set up a Bengals TD three plays later. He was inactive in Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh before being placed on Reserve/Injured and missing Weeks 13-16 with an ankle injury. Taylor-Britt returned to the active roster on Dec. 29 and played in Week 17 at Kansas City, recording two tackles and a PD. Taylor-Britt began his rookie season in 2022 on the Reserve/Injured list (abdomen), but went on to play in the final 10 regular-season games with nine starts. He also started all three postseason games, and sealed the Bengals' victory over Buffalo in the Divisional Playoff with an INT in the closing minutes. Cincinnati used its 2023 second-round selection on DJ Turner II, a speedy boundary corner out of the University of Michigan. Turner ran the fastest 40-yard dash at this year's NFL Combine, clocking a time of 4.26 seconds. He recorded three INTs and 20 PDs in four seasons (2019-22) at Michigan and was named second-team All-Big Ten last season. He made his NFL debut in the regularseason opener at Cleveland and had his first career PD in the fourth quarter of Week 3 vs. the L.A. Rams. Turner has started 11 of his 16 games played, totaling 47 tackles (37 solos) and six PDs. In Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh, he broke up a would-be touchdown reception before recovering a fumble on the very next play to end a Steelers drive in the red zone. Jalen Davis serves as a reserve slot CB behind Hilton, but secondary/cornerbacks coach Charles Burks has expressed his opinion that Davis could start for many NFL teams. He has played in 56 career games (including postseason), carving out a role on special teams in addition to his CB duties. He notched his first PD of the season in Week 3 against the Rams. Davis missed the Week 17 contest at Kansas City due to a groin injury. At safety, second-year pro Dax Hill has stepped up as a consistent performer in his first season in a starting role. Hill was the Bengals' first-round draft choice in 2022 and played in 15 games with two starts as a rookie, but this season has started all 16 contests and ranks third on the team with 105 tackles. He also has six TFLs, 1.5 sacks, two INTs and 11 PDs. Hill's first career INT came in Week 1 at Cleveland, when he picked off QB Deshaun Watson and returned it 20 yards. He had a team-high eight stops, including his first sack, in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, and then grabbed his second INT the following week at Tennessee. Cincinnati took Jordan Battle in the third round of this April's draft, adding depth and championship pedigree to the safeties room. Battle was a third-team All-American in each of the past two seasons while at the University of Alabama, and helped the Crimson Tide win the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2020. He has played in all 16 games this season, starting each of the past six while he has earned an increased load of defensive snaps. Of his 65 tackles on the year, 54 have come over the past seven games. He led the Bengals in tackles in Week 11 at Baltimore with 11 (10 solos). Battle logged his first career sack in Week 13 at Jacksonville, which came on third down to force a FG attempt late in the fourth guarter. He tallied seven tackles including a TFL in Week 16 at Pittsburgh and led the Bengals with eight tackles (six solos) in Week 17 at Kansas City. Fifth-year veteran Nick Scott was among Cincinnati's notable acquisitions during the 2023 free agency period and holds 80 games of NFL experience (27 starts). He spent his first four seasons with the L.A. Rams, starting out as a special teams contributor before gradually increasing his role defensively and eventually becoming the team's starting safety in 2022. Scott is known for his physical play and sure tackling abilities, but also has four INTs and nine PDs. He started each of the Rams' four postseason contests on their run to a Super Bowl LVI title. Scott made his Bengals debut in Week 1 at Cleveland, tying for the team lead with 11 total tackles. He also led Cincinnati in tackles with 10 (nine solos) in Week 4 at Tennessee. Scott recovered a fumble in the red zone (forced by LB Germaine Pratt) in the fourth quarter of Week 9 vs. Buffalo.

Special teams: Rookie **Brad Robbins** earned the Bengals' punting role following a strong display in training camp and preseason. A native of

Westerville, Ohio (north of Columbus), he is averaging 44.2 gross yards per punt with 19 downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line through 16 regular-season contests. Robbins punted five times with an average of 51.4 yards in Week 4 at Tennessee, including a career-long 62-yard boot. In Week 9 vs. Buffalo, he landed each of his three punts inside the Bills' 20-yard line. He recorded two more inside-20 punts in Week 10 vs. Houston, and finished with a 51.8-yard average on five total punts. Two of his three punts in Week 16 at Pittsburgh were downed inside the Steelers' 20-yard line. Robbins was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of April's draft after a five-year playing career at the University of Michigan that saw him post the second highest career punting average (43.0 yards per attempt) in program history. He additionally handles holding duties on placekicks for the Bengals. Third-year K Evan McPherson has earned a reputation as one of the NFL's top kickers from long range, as his 21 FGs from 50 or more yards are the tied for the most in the league since the start of the 2021 campaign. The former fifth-round Bengals draft pick has kicked four of the five longest made FGs in Bengals history, including each of the two longest — a 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener vs. Pittsburgh, and a 58-yarder in Week 15 of the '21 season at Denver, McPherson also is 19 for 19 on FG attempts in the postseason, the second most consecutive FGs without a miss to begin a postseason career in NFL history. McPherson's 83.7 career FG percentage ranks third in Bengals history. He drilled four of his five FG attempts, with hits from 53 and 54 yards, in Week 3 against the L.A. Rams, and connected on a season-long 56-yard attempt at San Francisco in Week 8. He converted one of his two attempts from 50 or more yards in Week 11 at Baltimore, hitting a 50

varder. In Week 13 at Jacksonville, McPherson converted two of his three attempts, including a 54-yarder to give the Bengals the lead late in the fourth guarter and a 48-yard game-winner in overtime. He hit another "walk-off" FG in Week 15 vs. Minnesota, the seventh of his career, on a 29-yarder in OT. The Bengals' long-snapper is second-year pro Cal Adomitis, who took over the role in Week 2 of the 2022 season following a season-ending injury to veteran Clark Harris. In 34 career games (including postseason), Adomitis has delivered 280 snaps without an unplayable attempt. He originally joined the Bengals as a college free agent in 2022 after a five-year career ('17-21) at the University of Pittsburgh. Listed as the first-string punt returner and second-string kickoff returner is rookie WR Charlie Jones, who in 2021 was named Big Ten Return Specialist of the Year while at the University of Iowa. In Week 2 against Baltimore, Jones scored his first career TD on an 81-yard punt return, the Bengals' first punt return TD since 2012 (CB Adam Jones). Jones missed Weeks 4-10 while on Reserve/Injured with a thumb injury but returned to action in Week 11 at Baltimore and returned three punts for 24 yards. WR Trenton Irwin is listed as the second-string punt returner. Irwin has returned 10 punts for 98 yards, including four for 68 with two going for over 20 yards in Week 5 at Arizona. HB Trayveon Williams has been the team's primary KOR. Williams this season has returned 12 kickoffs for 290 vards, including a 41-vard run back in the first quarter of Week 8 at San Francisco that set up a Bengals TD drive. He followed that with three KORs for 61 yards in Week 9 vs. Buffalo. In Week 12 vs. Pittsburgh, he had a career-long 46-yard KOR in the second quarter that set up the Bengals at their own 47-yard line and led to a TD four plays later. Williams took over the role in the second half of last season and had 16 KORs for 356 vards (22.3) over the final eight regular-season games

Cleveland Browns 24, Cincinnati Bengals 3 Sunday, Sept. 10, 2023 at Cleveland Browns Stadium

Hindered by wet and rainy conditions, the Bengals were limited to three points and 142 offensive net yards in a season-opening loss to their in-state rival. The Cincinnati defense kept the game within reach, forcing two turnovers and holding the Browns to 13 points through three quarters, but Cleveland's strong rushing attack eventually broke through and finished the day with 206 yards, led by 106 from RB Nick Chubb. Browns QB Deshaun Watson found the end zone on a 13-yard run just before halftime to give the Browns a 10-0 lead at the break, but the Bengals responded with a 42-yard FG from K Evan McPherson early in the third quarter to cut the deficit to seven. A promising drive on Cincinnati's next offensive possession resulted in a missed FG attempt, and the offense did not reach Browns territory the rest of the way as Cleveland held the upper hand in the battle of field position. The Bengals went for it on fourth-and-four from their own 31-yard line with just over 10 minutes remaining in an attempt to jumpstart the offense, but QB Joe Burrow was dropped for a 13-yard sack and the Browns scored three plays later to seal the final outcome. The game was the 100th "Battle of Ohio" between the two teams.

Cincinnati faced two 10-point deficits in the second half and each time was able to cut it to three, but ultimately the Bengals never took the lead in a home-opener loss. Baltimore was efficient offensively, totaling 415 net yards — including 178 rushing — and scoring a TD on three of its four red zone trips. Cincinnati's offense had just three possessions in the first half and was limited to a FG, but an 81-yard punt return for a TD by rookie WR Charlie Jones in the second quarter helped keep the team within striking distance. QB Joe Burrow connected with WR Tee Higgins for a TD late in the third quarter to reduce Baltimore's lead to three points at 20-17, but the Ravens answered with a 12-play, 85-yard TD drive to regain the two-score advantage. Another Burrow-to-Higgins TD with 3:28 left closed the gap again, but the Ravens converted a pair of third downs on the ensuing possession to end the game. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Baltimore improved to 2-0.

The Bengals' defense recorded six sacks and two INTs to steer Cincinnati to its first win of the season on Monday Night Football. Neither offense established a rhythm in the first half, combining for seven punts in the opening two quarters, but each side put together a pair of FG drives for a 6-6 tie at halftime. The Bengals then struck with a 10-play, 75-yard march on their first possession of the third quarter that ended with a 14-yard TD run by HB Joe Mixon. WR Ja'Marr Chase contributed 33 of his 141 receiving yards on that go-ahead scoring drive, and his team-leading 12 catches on the night helped spark the offense. Cincinnati's defense continued to pressure Rams QB Matthew Stafford, and LB Logan Wilson's second INT of the game not only ended a L.A. scoring threat, but it led to another Bengals FG which extended the lead to 16-9 late in the third quarter. Five different Bengals tallied a sack — DE Trey Hendrickson recorded two in the second half — and the Rams' offense converted just one of 11 third-down attempts. Cincinnati improved to 1-2, while the Rams fell to 1-2.

The score was tied 3-3 at the midway point of the second quarter, before the Titans erupted for three TDs in the final 6:31 to take a commanding 24-3 halftime lead. RB Derrick Henry led the charge for Tennessee with 122 yards on 22 carries (5.5-yard average), including a 29-yard TD run that saw him break three tackles before reaching the end zone. Bengals WR Ja'Marr Chase posted a team-record 15 receptions for 192 yards and three TDs, while the Cincinnati defense forced three turnovers in a road victory. Chase's first TD capped an 11-play opening drive to give the Bengals an early lead, but Arizona answered with two TDs in the second quarter to pull ahead 14-10. The Cardinals then stopped HB Joe Mixon at the one-yard line on fourth-and-goal late in the first half, but two plays later CB Cam Taylor-Britt intercepted a Joshua Dobbs pass and returned it 11 yards to the end zone, putting Cincinnati back in front. Less than two minutes into the second half, QB Joe Burrow launched a deep ball that hit Chase in stride for a 63-yard TD to extend the Bengals' lead. Arizona responded with a TD and had a chance to reclaim the lead later in the third quarter, but LB Germaine Pratt stopped Dobbs on a rush on fourth down at the Bengals' 16-yard line. Cincinnati's offense took over and drove 83 yards in 15 plays, punctuated by Chase's third TD, to take command midway through the fourth quarter. The Bengals improved to 2-3, while Arizona fell to 1-4.

Cincinnati stopped Seattle on fourth down near its own goal line twice within the final minutes to secure the home win. Seattle snapped the ball at the Bengals' six-yard line on fourth down just ahead of the two-minute warning, but DE Sam Hubbard got to QB Geno Smith for a sack that gave possession back to Cincinnati. The Seahawks then quickly forced a punt and worked their way back inside the 10 with under a minute remaining, before pressure by Bengals DT B.J. Hill on fourth down forced the Seahawks' final pass to fall incomplete. The Bengals had grabbed an early lead with TD passes on their first two drives. QB Joe Burrow started the game completing 17 of 19 passes, which included a stretch of 15 straight completions, but Cincinnati's offense stalled as the game progressed, totaling just five first downs on its final eight possessions. The defense, however, held Seattle to just three points on four red zone opportunities in the second half, getting INTs from CBs Mike Hilton and Cam Taylor-Britt along the way. The Bengals' offense found the end zone on its opening two drives to grab an early 14-7 lead, and Burrow closed out the first half with a career-best 19 consecutive completions. San Francisco had a chance to tie the game on a first-andgoal late in the third quarter, before Pratt tipped a pass by QB Brock Purdy and picked it off to end the scoring threat. The 49ers forced a punt less than two minutes later, but Wilson intercepted Purdy's next pass and returned it inside the red zone to give the offense a short field. Baltimore Ravens 34, Cincinnati Bengals 20 Thursday night, Nov. 16, 2023 at M&T Bank Stadium

The Bengals held a narrow lead early in the second quarter in a highly anticipated Thursday Night Football showdown at Baltimore, but a wrist injury forced QB Joe Burrow to miss the remainder of the game and the Ravens went on to secure a 34-20 divisional win. Burrow left the contest after throwing a TD pass to HB Joe Mixon that put Cincinnati ahead 10-7, and Baltimore capitalized on his absence with two TD drives before halftime to build a double-digit advantage. The balanced Ravens offense totaled 405 net yards — with 248 coming through the air and 157 on the ground — and had seven plays of 20 or more yards. Backup QB Jake Browning was effective in relief of Burrow, leading a 10-play FG drive to open the second half that closed Cincinnati's deficit to 21-13. The Bengals also posted a season-best 136 rushing yards to help keep the game within reach through three quarters, but Baltimore managed to create separation with 13 straight points while forcing a punt on three consecutive Bengals possessions. Cincinnati fell to 5-5, while Baltimore improved to 8-3.

QB Jake Browning passed for 227 yards and a TD in his first career start, but the Bengals were held to three points in the second half of a 16-10 home loss. Pittsburgh's offense totaled 421 net yards and scored on each of its final three possessions to build a two-score lead, after being limited to a FG until the late stages of the third quarter. Cincinnati pulled ahead 7-3 in the second quarter when HB Trayveon Williams' 46-yard kickoff return set up strong field position for Browning, who finished off the ensuing drive with a TD pass to TE Drew Sample. The Bengals opened the second half by marching into the red zone, but an INT by Steelers S Trenton Thompson led to a 14-play, 79-yard TD drive that put Pittsburgh back in front. The Bengals were forced to punt twice in the fourth quarter while the Steelers expanded their lead, before Cincinnati kicked a FG ahead of the two-minute warning to close its gap to six. With no timeouts remaining, the Bengals attempted an onside kick, but a Steelers recovery allowed Pittsburgh to kneel out the remaining clock. Cincinnati fell to 5-6, while Pittsburgh improved to 7-4.

The Steelers jumped out to a 24-0 halftime lead and never looked back to snap Cincinnati's three-game winning streak in a nationally televised contest. The Bengals drove into the red zone twice in the first half but came away with zero points, as QB Jake Browning threw an ill-advised INT and the offense later was stopped on fourth-and-one at the Pittsburgh five-yard line. Browning finished with 335 passing yards, including an 80yard TD to WR Tee Higgins early in the third quarter, but was picked off three times. The Steelers totaled 397 offensive net yards, led by a 195-yard receiving game by WR George Pickens, who caught TD passes of 86 and 66 yards from QB Mason Rudolph. Pittsburgh found the end zone on three of its four first drives for a 24-0 halftime lead, as the Pickens 86-yard score on the Steelers' second play from scrimmage was followed in the second quarter by a pair of rushing TDs and a FG. Cincinnati fell to 8-7, while Pittsburgh improved to 8-7.
