GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Spero Dedes (play-by-play), Adam Archuleta (analyst) and Aditi Kinkhabwala (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals aim to get back to .500 on the season when they host the N.Y. Jets at Paycor Stadium on Sunday.

Cincinnati enters the contest at 3-4, and is coming off a thrilling 33-31 home victory over Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football. The back-and-forth affair featured both teams overcoming a 10-point deficit, but ultimately it was the Bengals who put together a drive late in the fourth quarter to set up K Evan McPherson's 36-yard game-winning FG.

"It's a huge win. We needed this," said head coach Zac Taylor, whose team ended a four-game losing skid in Week 7. "It had been too long since we won. When you're fighting for all these things that we fight for and these guys just keep coming — as a coach, you're (telling them), 'Keep sticking with it.' I see it coming. You need the results, and so we got the results. There were no non-believers in that locker room."

One of the several noteworthy individual performances against the Steelers came from veteran QB Joe Flacco, who was acquired in a trade with Cleveland just nine days prior to the Thursday night matchup. After making his first Bengals start in Week 6 at Green Bay and then preparing for Pittsburgh on a shortened week, Flacco threw for 342 yards and three TDs, good for a passer rating of 108.6. He and Steelers QB Aaron Rodgers led the two offenses to a combined 866 net yards in what was the third regular-season game in NFL history between two starting QBs over 40 years old.

Flacco's production featured a heavy dose of Cincinnati's top two receivers, Ja'Marr Chase and Tee Higgins. Chase set a Bengals single-game record with 16 receptions, surpassing his own team mark set in 2023, for 161 yards and a TD. Higgins also caught a TD pass and finished with 96 yards on six catches, including a 28-yarder late in the fourth quarter that put the Bengals in range for the game-winning kick.

Chase, who last year earned the NFL's receiving "Triple Crown," is compiling yet another Pro Bowl-worthy campaign in his fifth pro season. Through seven weeks of play, he leads the league in receptions (58), while ranking second in receiving yards (629) and tied for fifth in receiving TDs (five). But while Taylor acknowledged that getting his star receiver involved remains a priority each week, he also pointed to the efforts of other offensive contributors who present matchup issues for opposing defenses.

"Our whole game plan is trying to get him the ball every which way," said Taylor on Chase. "That's where Tee isn't getting the targets, but having Tee over there opposite of him or on the same side of him — you can't just play one-on-one all game, or the ball is going to go there. Sometimes, Ja'Marr's production is (because of) Ja'Marr, but it's also the other guys that we have that put pressure on the defense."

The complementary pieces last Thursday included HB Chase Brown, who averaged 9.8 yards per carry and finished with 108 rushing yards overall, as well as WR Andrei Iosivas (49 receiving yards) and TE Noah Fant (44 yards and a

TD). Defensively, the Bengals have flipped the momentum of several games this season with nine total takeaways, which are tied for eighth-most in the NFL. Cincinnati picked off Rodgers twice in Week 7, as S Jordan Battle notched his third INT of the year and CB DJ Turner II continued his breakout season with his second pick late in the first half.

The Bengals this week look to capitalize on takeaways again when they face a Jets team that ranks last in the NFL in turnover margin (minus-nine). New York enters at 0-7 on the season, with its most recent result being a 13-6 setback against Carolina in Week 7.

At halftime of Sunday's contest, former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish will be formally inducted into the Bengals Ring of Honor. Lapham, who is in his 50th season with Cincinnati in 2025, played in 140 games as a player and has been the team's radio analyst since 1986. Parrish is the highest scoring defensive player in team history, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff.

The series: The Jets lead, 18-11, including 2-0 in playoff games, which were both played in Cincinnati, after the 1982 and 2009 seasons.

The Bengals won the most recent contest between the two teams 27-12 in 2022 at MetLife Stadium, and they have won four of the last five.

The Bengals lead 7-5 in games played between the two teams in Cincinnati overall, though they have won six of the past regular-season meetings in the Queen City. The Jets last won in Cincinnati in the 2009 Wild Card Playoff. The Jets' last regular-season win in Cincinnati occurred in 1997.

Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2025 season, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 453 career receptions, the sixth-most in team history and 54 shy of tying T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530) and Tyler Boyd (513) hold the top four spots on the team's career list. Chase in Week 4 at Denver surpassed WR Isaac Curtis (416) for seventh place and WR Cris Collinsworth (417) for sixth.

- Chase has 6054 career receiving yards, the seventh-most in team history and 644 shy of fifth-most, which is held by WR Cris Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), WR Isaac Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh surpassed WR Darnay Scott (5975) for eighth and Tyler Boyd (6000) for seventh.

- Chase has 51 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and two shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.

- Chase has 22 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, the third-

most in team history and 10 shy of Johnson (31) for second. Green (33) holds the team record. Chase in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed Curtis (20) for third.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history and 1.5 shy of LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. DE/DT Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5) and DT Geno Atkins (75.5) hold the top three spots. Hendrickson in Week 5 vs. Detroit surpassed DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth.

- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 489 career points, the sixth-most in team history and 60 shy of fifth-most, which is held by K Horst Muhlmann (549).

- McPherson has 104 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and 16 shy of Muhlmann (120) for fifth.

- McPherson has 177 career made PATs, the sixth-most in team history and 12 shy of Muhlmann (189) for fifth.

- McPherson has a career FG percentage of 81.9 (104 made/127 att.), the third-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Kickers Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

- P Ryan Rehkow has 36 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the sixth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976. He is one inside-20 punt shy of P Nick Harris (37) for fifth-most.

Records vs. Jets: The following individual and team regular-season Bengals and Jets entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book:

- On Oct. 17, 2013, in a 49-9 Bengals win in Cincinnati (the 40-point victory margin is largest by either side in series history), WR Marvin Jones scored four receiving TDs in that contest to set a team record for most ever in a game (the record still stands).

- On Dec. 12, 1976, in a 42-3 Bengals win at New York, CB Ken Riley became the second Bengal to intercept three passes in a game. That Bengals record has now been achieved eight times, by a total of six players, with Riley and S David Fulcher both doing it twice. The Bengals' six total interceptions in that game tied the team record, which was set in 1971 vs. San Diego.

- In a 52-21 win over the Jets on Dec. 21, 1986 at Riverfront Stadium, Cincinnati amassed a club-record 621 yards net offense.

- In a 37-0 loss to the Jets in the 2009 regular-season finale, the Bengals were held to a record-low 72 yards net offense.

Individually vs. Jets: Here are regular-season offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against the Jets (ordered by total games played):

- QB Joe Burrow (Reserve/Injured): Two games; 44-of-70 passing for 534 yards, six TDs and one INT (108.9 passer rating); Six rushes for minus-1 yard.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Two games; Nine receptions for 61 yards (6.8) and two TDs; Three rush for seven yards (2.3).

- WR Tee Higgins: Two games; Nine receptions for 190 yards (21.1).

- HB Samaje Perine: Two games; Nine rushes for 47 yards (5.2); Four receptions for 30 yards (7.5) and one TD.

Lapham, Parrish to enter Bengals Ring of Honor: A pair of Bengals legends in former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish will be inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime on Sunday. They will become the 11th and 12th members of the Bengals Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who is in his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team's most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive linemen who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team's starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career, Lapham moved into the team's radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as "Mr. Bengal," he has been the team's radio analyst since 1986.

"It is rare to have someone who has the continuity with a team that Dave has," said Bengals President Mike Brown. "He was a smart player who represented us well, and he continues to do so with his work in the media. He has a personality that fans identify with. Dave is someone we are grateful to have in our organization and are very proud to have him in the Ring of Honor."

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most

in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

"Lemar was an exceptional player with phenomenal quickness," said Brown. "As a cornerback, he was great in coverage. Receivers couldn't shake free of him. As a punt returner, he was excellent — probably the most exciting punt returner we have ever had. He was a dynamic runner, quick and fast, and it showed when the ball was in his hands. Lemar is very deserving of this honor."

Ring of Honor inductees have been voted in each offseason since 2021 by Bengals Season Ticket Members. Lapham and Parrish will join the 10 current Ring of Honor inductees, which include QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of 65,000 or more in 27 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That marks the longest streak in team history, surpassing a previous span of 24 straight home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 15 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Cincinnati's most recent game, a 33-31 win over Pittsburgh in Week 7 on Thursday Night Football, was played in front of an announced crowd of 66,569, the fourth-largest figure on the list. A majority of those fans were dressed in white apparel to accentuate the fourth annual "White Bengal" game at Paycor Stadium.

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history.

Uniform watch: Cincinnati will wear black jerseys, orange pants (black stripes) and black socks this week against the N.Y. Jets. The Bengals wore this combination twice last season, in a Week 5 home contest against Baltimore and a Week 16 home win over Cleveland. This week also marks the seventh time Cincinnati will wear its orange pants, which were introduced to the rotation ahead of the 2024 campaign.

The Bengals unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new white helmet with its iconic black stripes. When paired with white jerseys and white pants (with black stripes), a new uniform combination was created and was branded as the "White Bengal." The team has worn the white helmet six times and collected a 5-1 record in those games. The helmet made its sixth overall appearance in the Bengals' most recent game, a 33-31 home win over Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football in Week 7.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL's most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to

Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor's system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to '21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC's top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team's per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams,

where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in '17 and quarterbacks coach in '18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the '15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor's began coaching at Texas A&M University as an offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during his College Station tenure.

Taylor played in college at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children —

Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Aaron Glenn was named the 22nd head coach in franchise history on Jan. 22, 2025.

A 15-year NFL veteran defensive back, Glenn returned to the Jets after starting his career with the organization as a first-round pick (12th overall) in the 1994 NFL Draft. He played eight seasons with the team (1994-2001) that included two Pro Bowl selections and 24 INTs, tied for the fourth most all-time in franchise history.

Glenn enters his 12th season as a coach in the NFL after serving as the defensive coordinator for the Detroit Lions the last four seasons (2021-24), and previously coaching with the Cleveland Browns ('14-15) and New Orleans Saints ('16-20). In Detroit, he led a defense that helped the team to a 39-28-1 record the last four seasons, including a League-best 27-7 record the last two seasons. In 2024, Glenn's defense finished in the top 10 in scoring and takeaways, as well as fifth in rushing yards allowed, first in opponents passer rating and second in opponents' completion percentage.

Glenn played defensive back at Navarro College (Texas) from 1990-91 and at Texas A&M from '92-93. As a pro, in addition to his eight seasons with the Jets, Glenn played for the Houston Texans (2002-04), the Dallas Cowboys ('05-06), the Jacksonville Jaguars ('07) and the New Orleans Saints ('08).

Glenn also served as general manager for the Houston Stallions (Lone Star Football League) in 2012, and as a pro scout and area scout for the N.Y. Jets from '12-13 before he began his coaching career.

Born July 16, 1972 in Humble, Texas, Glenn and his wife, Devaney, have two daughters, Tristen and Rheagan, and a son, Aaron II.

Taylor vs. Jets: Taylor leads, 2-1.

Taylor vs. Glenn: No previous meetings.

Glenn vs. Bengals: No previous meetings.

BENGALS NOTES

2025 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by seven captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of four offensive players and three defensive players.

The offensive captains are sixth-year QB Joe Burrow, eighth-year OT Orlando Brown Jr., 10th-year C Ted Karras and fifth-year WR Ja'Marr Chase. Burrow has been elected a captain in each of his six pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Brown carries the honor for the second straight year, after being voted a captain last season for the first time in his career. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the fourth straight season and fifth time overall, after also doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Chase, a four-time Pro Bowler, earned a captaincy role for the first time.

The three defensive captains are ninth-year DE Trey Hendrickson, eighth-year DT B.J. Hill and sixth-year LB Logan Wilson. Each player was voted a captain for the first time in their respective career.

Flacco impresses in first two starts: QB Joe Flacco, who Cincinnati acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7, has started the past two games for the Bengals. He has completed 60 of 92 passes (65.2 percent) for 561 yards and five TDs with zero INTs, good for a passer rating of 100.0.

Flacco's first start for Cincinnati came in Week 6 at Green Bay, just five days after joining the team. He finished the game with 219 passing yards, but the bulk of his production came in the second half, when he threw for 179 yards and two TDs as the offense began to find a rhythm. Both of his scoring passes came on fourth-down plays, including a 19-yarder to WR Ja'Marr Chase on fourth-and-five late in the fourth quarter.

Flacco then faced a short week of preparation for the Week 7 contest against Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football. The 18th-year veteran shined under the Paycor Stadium lights, as he recorded season highs in attempts (47), passing yards (342) and TD passes (three), while matching his season high with 31 completions. After the Steelers took the lead with 2:21 left in regulation, Flacco engineered an eight-play, 52-yard drive to set up the game-winning FG. He completed each of his three passing attempts on the drive for 61 yards, with the final pass being a 28-yard connection with WR Tee Higgins to get inside comfortable FG range.

With his effort against the Steelers, Flacco became the fourth QB in NFL history with at least 300 passing yards, three TD passes and zero INTs in a game after turning 40 years old. He joined Tom Brady (12 such games), Drew Brees (two) and Pro Football Hall of Famer Brett Favre (two).

Flacco also is the fourth QB in NFL history to pass for at least 550 yards and

five TDs while not throwing an INT in his first two games with a team. The previous QBs to do so were Jeff George with Atlanta in 1994, Brad Johnson with Washington in '99 and Case Keenum with Washington in 2019.

The wrap on Flacco: At 40 years old (born Jan. 16, 1985), QB Joe Flacco is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. He currently is in his 18th season and has played in 202 career regular-season games with 197 starts.

Flacco ranks in the top 25 in NFL history in career passing yards (14th; 47,073) and TD passes (21st; 264). He moved into 14th place on the league's all-time passing yardage list in the Bengals' Week 7 win over Pittsburgh, surpassing QBs Russell Wilson (46,921) and Fran Tarkenton (47,003).

Flacco originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent 11 seasons ('08-18) as the Ravens' starting QB. He then had stints with Denver (2019), the N.Y. Jets ('20-22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24).

Flacco also has played and started 16 postseason games, highlighted by a four-game run to help the Ravens win Super Bowl XLVII in the 2012 campaign. He won Super Bowl MVP honors after throwing three TD passes and posting a 124.2 passer rating in Baltimore's win over San Francisco.

In his first stint with Cleveland in 2023, Flacco stepped in as the Browns' starting QB for five games late in the year and helped lead them to a 4-1 record, which propelled them to a playoff berth. He averaged 323.2 passing yards and over two TDs per game in that stretch, and was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year.

Flacco had started the Browns' first four games of this season, including the Week 1 contest against Cincinnati, and passed for 815 yards and two TDs with six INTs. He then was Active/DNP in Cleveland's fifth game as rookie Dillon Gabriel made his NFL debut.

With his TD passes as a member of the Bengals going to WR Ja'Marr Chase, WR Tee Higgins, TE Noah Fant and TE Tanner Hudson, Flacco now has thrown at least one scoring pass to 69 different players in his career. That ranks as the fifth-most such players in NFL history, and is one shy of former QB Vinny Testaverde (70 players) for fourth.

Burrow's early 2025 totals: Sixth-year QB Joe Burrow started the first two games of the 2025 season before sustaining a toe injury in the second quarter of Week 2 vs. Jacksonville. He was placed on the Reserve/Injured list on Sept. 16, and underwent surgery on Sept. 19. In his five-plus quarters of action, Burrow completed 21 of 36 passes for 189 yards and two TDs with no INTs.

Burrow played in his 70th career game in the season opener at Cleveland and went 14 of 23 for 113 yards, with a one-yard TD pass to TE Noah Fant to give Cincinnati the lead in the second quarter. Burrow's 1762 career completions at the end of the Browns game were the most by any QB in NFL history through their first 70 games, while his 141 TD passes ranked as the third-most and his 19,114 passing yards ranked fifth.

Burrow had completed seven of his 13 passing attempts for 76 yards against the Jaguars prior to his injury. He connected with WR Ja'Marr Chase for a four-yard TD on third-and-goal late in the opening quarter.

Uno sets receptions record on TNF: WR Ja'Marr Chase broke his own Bengals single-game record with 16 receptions in the team's Week 7 win over Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football. His previous record of 15 catches came on Oct. 8, 2023, to help lead Cincinnati to a road win at Arizona.

Chase now has the four highest single-game reception totals in team history. He caught 14 passes in Week 14 of last season at Dallas, with his final grab of the night being a 40-yard TD with 1:01 remaining that proved to be the game-winning score. He matched that total with 14 catches in Week 2 of this year against Jacksonville.

Chase's four career games with 14 or more receptions already are tied for the second-most such games in NFL history, alongside former Pittsburgh/New England/Tampa Bay WR Antonio Brown. Current L.A. Chargers WR Keenan Allen holds the league record with six such games in his career.

After leading the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 receptions last season, Chase once again is pacing the league with 58 catches in 2025. The last player to finish as the league leader in receptions in consecutive seasons was New Orleans WR Michael Thomas in 2018 and '19.

Ja'Marr climbs up the ranks: WR Ja'Marr Chase's league-leading 58 receptions this season have boosted his career catch total to 453, which ranks sixth in Bengals history and is 54 shy of tying former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) for fifth.

Chase recently surpassed Bengals Ring of Honor member Isaac Curtis (416) and former WR Cris Collinsworth (417) on the team's all-time receptions list. In the Week 2 win over Jacksonville, he logged his 400th career reception in what was his 64th regular-season game. That tied Atlanta WR Julio Jones and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry for the fifth-fewest games in NFL history to reach 400 career catches.

Chase kicked off his career with 81 receptions in the 2021 season, which set a Bengals rookie record and still ranks in the top 20 among all rookies in NFL history. He followed that up with a team-leading 87 catches in just 12 games played in 2022, then hit triple digits for the first time when he had 100 receptions in '23 (12th in NFL).

In his 2024 "Triple Crown" season, Chase led the NFL with a Bengals-record 127 catches. He became the first player in team history to lead the league in receptions, and surpassed Houshmandzadeh's previous team mark of 112 in the 2007 campaign.

Chase leads the pack: WR Ja'Marr Chase's highlight-reel TD catch in the fourth quarter of Week 6 at Green Bay was the 50th receiving TD of his career. Playing in his 68th regular-season game, he became the seventh-fastest player in NFL history and the fourth-fastest in the Super Bowl era (1966-

present) to reach that milestone. He found the end zone again on an eight-yard scoring catch in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, moving his career tally to 51.

The only players in the Super Bowl era to record 50 receiving TDs in fewer games than Chase are Pro Football Hall of Famer Randy Moss (59 games), former New England TE Rob Gronkowski (59) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (61).

Chase's 51 TD catches are the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. In 2024, he led the league with 17 TDs, which tied the Bengals single-season record originally set by WR Carl Pickens in 1995. Chase became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in receiving TDs. He had a league-high five games with multiple TD catches last season, including a career-high-tying three scores in Week 10 at Baltimore on Thursday Night Football.

Chase's five receiving TDs this season are tied for fifth-most in the NFL. He caught two scoring passes from Jake Browning in Week 5 vs. Detroit, which marked his 12th career game with multiple TDs.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase surpassed 6000 career receiving yards during the Bengals' Week 7 win over Pittsburgh. Playing in his 69th career regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. The only players to hit the 6K yard mark in fewer games are Pro Football Hall of Famer Lance Alworth (62), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (62), former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (64) and former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (67).

Chase is one of three players in NFL history with at least 6000 receiving yards and 50 receiving TDs in his first five seasons, alongside Hall of Famers Randy Moss and Jerry Rice. The win over the Steelers also marked Chase's seventh career game with at least 10 catches and 150 receiving yards, which surpassed Jefferson for the most such games in a player's first five seasons in league history.

Chase's current career receiving yardage total is at 6054, which ranks seventh in team history and is 80 shy of tying former WR Eddie Brown (6134) for sixth. In Week 7, Chase surpassed former WRs Darnay Scott (5975) and Tyler Boyd (6000) on Cincinnati's all-time list.

Chase wrapped up his fourth pro season in 2024, and among all players in NFL history through their first four years, he ranks third in receiving yards (5425), third in receiving TDs (46) and fourth in receptions (395). He is the only player in league history with at least 80 receptions, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first four career seasons. He also is one of six players to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons, and the second Bengals player to do so following WR A.J. Green (2011-14).

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 87.7 receiving yards per game (69 regular-season games). That is the third-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only Jefferson (96.1) and L.A. Rams WR Puka Nacua (90.9). The players behind Chase in that category include Hall of Famer Calvin Johnson (fourth; 86.1 receiving yards per game), WR Antonio Brown (fifth; 84.2) and WR Julio Jones (sixth; 82.5).

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 64-yard TD catch in Week 5 vs. Detroit was his 13th career receiving score from 60 or more yards. That is the most such TDs in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021, and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 26.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD receptions of 50/+ yards (14) and 40/+ yards (19) since 2021. In his 2021 rookie campaign, six of his 13 receiving TDs came from at least 40 yards out. He had three scoring catches of 60 or more yards in 2023, then followed up with a league-leading four of at least 60 yards in '24. Two of those occurred in the same game last year, as he scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards in Week 10 at Baltimore on Thursday Night Football.

Uno reigns as Triple Crown winner: WR Ja'Marr Chase finished the 2024 season as the NFL leader in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17), earning him the prestigious receiving "Triple Crown." He became just the sixth Triple Crown winner in the Super Bowl era (1966-present), and the first since L.A. Rams WR Cooper Kupp in 2021.

Chase's receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Bengals single-season record, while his 17 receiving TDs tied WR Carl Pickens' team record set in 1995. Chase had 100 or more receiving yards in five games in 2024, tying for the second-most such games in a season in team history behind WR A.J. Green's six games in '13.

Chase also became the fifth player in NFL history to log at least 100 catches, 1500 receiving yards and 15 receiving TDs in a season, joining Kupp ('21), former Minnesota WR Randy Moss ('03), former Indianapolis WR Marvin Harrison ('01) and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice (1995).

Following the regular season, Chase was voted a unanimous first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press. It marked his second career All-Pro selection, as he received second-team honors in his 2021 rookie campaign. He became the first Bengals offensive player to earn first-team accolades since OT/G Andrew Whitworth in 2015.

Chase signed a contract extension with the Bengals in March of this year that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

Tee time: WR Tee Higgins has at least one receiving TD in each of his last seven home games, dating back to Week 5 of the 2024 season. That is the longest such streak in the NFL, and includes 10 total TD catches over those seven home contests.

Higgins' most recent TD grab was a 29-yarder in Week 7 against Pittsburgh, which gave Cincinnati its first lead of the night late in the second quarter. He finished the contest with season highs in receptions (six) and yards (96). His final catch of the game was a 28-yarder that put the Bengals in FG range with under two minutes remaining in regulation.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks tied for 14th in the league in receiving TDs (37) and 17th in receiving yards (4911). He recorded over 900 receiving yards in four of his first five seasons, including back-to-back 1000-yard campaigns in 2021 and '22. He also has played in seven postseason games for Cincinnati and has 457 receiving yards and three TDs.

In 2024, Higgins finished second on the Bengals in receptions (73), receiving yards (911) and receiving TDs (10). His 10 TD catches were a career high and tied for sixth in the NFL. He was inactive for five games last year due to injuries, but in the last nine weeks of the season, he tied for the league lead in receiving TDs (seven) and ranked 17th in receiving yards (570). He also reached a pair of career milestones in 2024, eclipsing 300 receptions and 4000 receiving yards.

In his career, Higgins has 14 games with 100 or more receiving yards, and six games with multiple receiving TDs. His most recent such performance came in Week 17 of last year against Denver, when he caught 11 passes for 131 yards and a career-best three TDs, including the game-winning score in overtime.

Higgins re-signed with the Bengals in March on a four-year deal which keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2028 season.

Brown runs wild against Steelers: HB Chase Brown is coming off a season-high 108 rushing yards on 11 attempts in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. His 9.8 yards per carry were the third-highest by any NFL player in a game this season (minimum 10 attempts).

In the second quarter, Brown reeled off his two longest runs of the season, a 37-yarder and 27-yarder. Both rushes occurred on the opening play of a Bengals TD drive. The 37-yard dash was the second-longest run of Brown's career, just shy of his 40-yard scamper in Week 13 of last season which also came against Pittsburgh.

Brown took over the starting HB role for Cincinnati midway through his second pro season in 2024, and emerged as a key piece of the offense down the stretch. From Weeks 9-17 of last season, when he started each game, Brown

ranked fifth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (930), fourth in scrimmage yards per game (116.3), seventh in rushing attempts (151) and ninth in rushing yards (631). He was one of just two NFL players in that span with at least 600 rushing yards and 250 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs.

Brown wrapped up his 2024 season by totaling at least 90 scrimmage yards in each of his final eight games played, making him the second player in team history to reach that total in eight straight contests. The only other Bengal to previously do so was FB Boobie Clark, who had an eight-game streak from Oct. 14-Dec. 2, 1973.

Brown finished the 2024 campaign ranking in the top 20 leaguewide in rushing attempts (229; 16th), rushing yards (990; 17th), rushing TDs (seven; T-19th), yards from scrimmage (1350; 17th) and TDs from scrimmage (11; T-17th). His top single-game statistical performance came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, when he posted his first career 100-yard rushing day (120), and added career highs in carries (27) and scrimmage yards (157).

Through seven games in 2025, Brown has 404 scrimmage yards (310 rushing, 94 receiving). He scored the Bengals' first TD of the season on a five-yard run in Week 1 at Cleveland.

Hendrickson cracks top five: With a team-leading four sacks through six games played this season, DE Trey Hendrickson has improved his sack total as a member of the Bengals to 61.0. That surpasses former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth-most in Bengals history, and is 1.5 shy of former LB Reggie Williams (62.5) for fourth. Hendrickson signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason.

Hendrickson, who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with the Bengals (2021-24), opened his Cincinnati tenure with 14.0 sacks in the '21 campaign, which led the team and ranked fifth in the NFL. He followed up with a team-high eight sacks in 2022.

Hendrickson posted 17.5 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 seasons, which are tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history behind former DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (the NFL began tracking sacks in '82, but the Bengals track the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder). He became the first Cincinnati player with double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81. Hendrickson also is just the fifth player in NFL history to post 17 or more sacks in back-to-back seasons.

Trey's torrid pace: Since the start of the 2023 season, DE Trey Hendrickson's league-leading 39.0 sacks are 4.5 more than any other player. He was the only NFL player with at least 15 sacks in both the 2023 and '24 campaign.

Hendrickson joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, and in his four-plus years in Cincinnati he has totaled 61.0 sacks. That ranks as the third-most in the NFL in that span, trailing only Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (65.0 sacks) and Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (62.5). He also has 13 games with multiple sacks (two or more) since the start of the 2021 season, the third-most leaguewide behind Watt and former Dallas/current Green Bay DE Micah Parsons (16 games each).

Hendrickson's most recent such performance came in Week 5 vs. Detroit, when he logged two sacks including a strip-sack which was recovered by Cincinnati in the first quarter.

Hendrickson's strip-sack against the Lions was his 12th forced fumble since 2021, which is tied for the third-most in the NFL in that span.

Originally a third-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017, Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons ('17-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and totaled 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL that season.

Trey reigns as sack champion: DE Trey Hendrickson in 2024 became the first Bengals player to lead the NFL in sacks since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982. His 17.5 sacks last season were 3.5 more than the second-highest total of 14.0 by Cleveland DE Myles Garrett.

Hendrickson compiled five games with multiple sacks in 2024, highlighted by a career-best four sacks in Week 9 against Las Vegas. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for that performance, then received the award again following Week 18 at Pittsburgh when he logged 3.5 sacks.

Hendrickson's performance in 2024 landed him his fourth consecutive Pro Bowl selection. He also was voted a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press, and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year.

On Aug. 25, the Bengals and Hendrickson agreed to a revised contract for the 2025 season.

Turner shuts it down: CB DJ Turner II has 13 PDs this season, which lead the NFL and already mark a career high for the third-year pro. His previous high was eight PDs in the 2024 campaign.

Turner has registered his first two career INTs this season, with the first coming late in the fourth quarter of Week 1 at Cleveland to help the Bengals protect a one-point lead. His second pick occurred just before halftime of the Week 7 contest vs. Pittsburgh, when he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf along the sideline in Cincinnati territory.

In Week 6 at Green Bay, Turner notched a career-best five PDs. He became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph had five on Nov. 8, 2009, in a win over Baltimore. Turner also is one of three players in the NFL this season to record five PDs in a game, alongside Green Bay CB Keisean Nixon in Week 2 and Philadelphia CB Quinyon Mitchell in Week 4. No player in the league had that many in a single contest last season.

Turner has played in all seven games with six starts this year, after missing the final six contests of the 2024 season due to a collarbone injury.

Geno racks up the picks: S Geno Stone's INT to end the Packers' opening drive in Week 6 was his 12th pick since the start of the 2023 season, which ties for the second-most in the NFL in that span.

After seeing the field as a rotational defensive back and special teams contributor for Baltimore through his first three pro seasons (2020-22), Stone broke out in '23 with seven INTs, which led all AFC players and ranked second in the NFL. He then signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason, and in his debut year in stripes he tied for the team lead with four picks. Three of those came in three consecutive games from Weeks 14-16, as he became the first Bengals player with an INT in three straight contests since S Reggie Nelson (five straight) in 2015.

In addition to his first INT of the 2025 campaign at Green Bay, Stone has 42 tackles with two TFLs and a sack this season. He has started at safety in all 24 games he has played in for the Bengals.

In the heat of Battle: Third-year S Jordan Battle's three INTs this season lead the Bengals and are tied for second in the NFL. He notched his third pick in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, when he tracked down a deep pass by QB Aaron Rodgers at the Cincinnati 24-yard line late in the second quarter.

Battle opened this season with an INT in Week 1 at Cleveland and Week 2 vs. Jacksonville. He became the first Bengals player to record a pick in each of the team's first two games of a season since CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. He also is tied for the team lead in tackles this season with 50.

Entering this season, Battle had two INTs in 34 career games. He began each of his first two seasons as a rotational safety for the Bengals, before taking on a starting role later in the year in both 2023 and '24. He now has started each of his last 13 contests dating back to Week 13 of the 2024 campaign.

Money Mac from deep: Of K Evan McPherson's 104 career made FGs, 25 have been from a distance of 50 or more yards. That marks the most such FGs in a career in Bengals history, and is tied for the eighth-most in the NFL since McPherson entered the league as a fifth-round pick of Cincinnati in 2021.

McPherson has made one kick from at least 50 yards this season on an exact 50-yarder in Week 5 vs. Detroit. The following week at Green Bay, he lined up to attempt an NFL-record 67-yard FG as the first half clock was expiring. He initially made the kick, but the Packers negated the try by calling a timeout. His ensuing attempt flew short of the uprights.

McPherson did notch a career milestone in the Green Bay contest, as he made his 100th career FG on a 45-yarder in the fourth quarter. Playing in his 67th career regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest kicker in Bengals history to reach the century mark, behind only Doug Pelfrey (59 games), Shayne Graham (62), Mike Nugent (62) and Horst Muhlmann (65).

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 104 of 127 FG attempts, good for the third-highest percentage in team history (81.9). Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," he is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson owns five of the seven longest made kicks in Bengals history, led by a career-long 59-yarder that he booted in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh. His season long in 2024 was a 56-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, which at the time tied for the fifth-longest in team history (now tied for sixth).

Rehkwow's ranks: P Ryan Rehkwow has punted 34 times for 1779 yards this season, with 11 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line. He ranks first in the NFL in gross punting average (53.1 per punt), 10th in net average (42.2) and tied for fourth in inside-20 punts.

As a rookie in 2024, Rehkwow set Bengals single-season records for gross punting average (49.11 yards) and net average (42.92 yards). Both figures surpassed former P Kevin Huber's previous records set in the 2020 season. Rehkwow also has 25 inside-20 punts last year compared to five touchbacks.

After signing with the Bengals as a free agent on the third day of training camp in 2024, Rehkwow made his NFL debut in Week 1 of last season against New England. That day, he punted four times for 258 yards, setting an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per attempt (minimum four punts). The previous league record belonged to Las Vegas P AJ Cole, who had a 63.60-yard average in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. Rehkwow's performance in the 2024 opener also included the longest punt in Bengals history, an 80-yarder kicked from his own 20-yard line to the Patriots' end zone.

Rehkwow finished his 2024 rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average.

In Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, Rehkwow saw one of his three punts downed inside the Steelers' 20-yard line. He improved his career total inside-20 punts to 36, which is one shy of former P Nick Harris (37) for the fifth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976.

Four Bengals listed on "Top 100": For the 15th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the

league, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on social media and NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by four players on the 2025 list — WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 4), QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 14) and WR Tee Higgins (No. 77). It marked the first appearance on the list in Higgins' career, the fourth overall for Burrow and Chase, and the fifth for Hendrickson.

Chase's ranking at No. 4 is the highest by a Bengals player since the "Top 100" debuted in 2011. The previous highest ranking was No. 6, which was Burrow's position on the 2023 list. Hendrickson's spot at No. 14 is his personal highest, substantially ahead of his previous best ranking of No. 77 (2021 list).

This marks the third time in the history of the "Top 100" in which four or more Bengals players were featured. Cincinnati had a record seven players on the 2016 list, then landed four on the '22 edition.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.9 years ... Cincinnati's win over Jacksonville in Week 2 of this season was the

250th home victory in team history (regular season and postseason) ... The Bengals played five road games in prime time (7 p.m. ET or later) during the 2024 regular season, which were the most such games in a season in NFL history and tied with the 1963 Oakland Raiders (American Football League) for the most ever by any pro team ... The Bengals have netted 21 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, tied for the third-most weekly awards by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who is in his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is QB Joe Flacco, who is 40 (born Jan. 16, 1985) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who is 21 (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the active roster is HB Tahj Brooks, who is listed at 5-9 ... Brown and Mims also are tied for the heaviest player on the active roster, listed at 350 pounds ... There is a tie for lightest player on the active roster between K Evan McPherson and CB DJ Turner II, who both are listed at 185 pounds.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Eighteenth-year veteran **Joe Flacco** has started the Bengals' past two games after being acquired in a trade with Cleveland on Oct. 7. In two outings with Cincinnati, he has completed 65.2 percent of his passes (60 of 92) for 561 yards and five TDs with no turnovers. He is one of two players in Bengals history with five or more scoring passes in his first two games with the team, joining QB Greg Cook in 1969. With a season-best 342 yards in the Bengals' Week 7 win over Pittsburgh, Flacco moved into 14th place on the NFL's all-time passing yardage list (47,073). At 40 years old (born Jan. 16, 1985), he is the oldest QB to start a game in Bengals history. He began the season starting the Browns' first four games, and in that stretch he passed for 815 yards and a two-to-six TD-INT ratio. He originally was a first-round draft pick of Baltimore in 2008 and spent his first 11 seasons with the Ravens, before stints with Denver ('19), the N.Y. Jets ('20-'22), Cleveland ('23 and '25) and Indianapolis ('24). He won Super Bowl MVP honors after helping lead Baltimore to a title in the 2012 campaign, and in '23 he was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year after helping steer the Browns to a playoff berth. Backup QB **Jake Browning** started three games for Cincinnati this season prior to Flacco's acquisition. He stepped into action following Joe Burrow's injury in Week 2 against Jacksonville, and in that game he passed for 241 yards and scored the game-winning TD on a QB sneak with 18 seconds remaining. Browning's totals on the season include 80 completions on 124 attempts (64.5 percent) for 757 yards and six TDs with eight INTs. He had a previous stint as the Bengals' starter in 2023, as he started the final seven games of that regular season and piloted the team to a 4-3 record. In that stretch, he ranked second in the NFL in passing yards (1868), while completing 71.5 percent of his attempts and throwing 11 TDs. He then spent the entire 2024 campaign as Cincinnati's second-string QB. He spent his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-'22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-'20).

Running backs: HB **Chase Brown** is in his third pro season and first as Cincinnati's full-time primary running back. A dynamic all-around threat, he has 404 yards from scrimmage this season, highlighted by his first 100-yard effort of the year in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. He averaged a career-best 9.8 yards per carry against the Steelers and finished with 108 rushing yards, marking the second time he crossed the century mark in rushing in his career. Brown took over as the team's starting HB midway through the 2024 season, and in Weeks 9-17 he ranked fifth in the NFL in scrimmage yards (930). He finished last year with 990 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs on 229 carries, along with 54 receptions for 360 yards and four TDs. His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at the University of Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB **Samaje Perine**. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. Perine contributed a season-high 31 rushing yards in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, and in the process eclipsed 2000 yards in his career. He is one of 14 active NFL players with at least 2000 rushing yards and 1500 receiving yards. Some of his top moments with the Bengals came during the team's postseason runs following the 2021 and '22 campaigns, including a 41-yard receiving TD in the '21 AFC Championship win at Kansas City. Rookie HB **Tahj Brooks** was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of this year's draft, after compiling a record-setting career at Texas Tech University. Brooks finished his time in Lubbock with the most rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557)

and 100-yard rushing games (23) in program history. He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back). He has seen action primarily on special teams through his first seven NFL games, but has five carries for 17 yards offensively.

Wide Receivers: Cincinnati's 2021 first-round draft choice **Ja'Marr Chase** has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons and has broken several Bengals single-season records early in his pro career. In 2024, he became the youngest player (24 years old) in the Super Bowl era to claim the receiving "Triple Crown," as he led the league in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17). His receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Cincinnati single-season record, while his TDs tied the franchise mark held by WR Carl Pickens (1995). He is vying for the NFL title in all three categories again in 2025, as he currently leads all players in receptions (58), while ranking second in yards (629) and tied for fifth in TDs (five). In Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, he broke his own Bengals single-game record with 16 receptions for 161 yards and a TD. During that game, he joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Jerry Rice and Randy Moss as the only players in league history with over 6000 receiving yards and 50 TDs in their first five seasons. Chase signed a four-year contract extension on March 18, the same day that his running mate **Tee Higgins** re-signed with Cincinnati on a four-year deal. Since entering the league as a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks tied for 14th in the NFL in TD catches (37) and 17th in receiving yards (4911). He recorded at least 900 yards in four of his first five pro seasons, including consecutive 1000-yard campaigns in 2021 and '22. He had a career-best 10 receiving TDs last season (tied for sixth in NFL), and has found the end zone three times this year, with his most recent score coming late in the second quarter of Week 7 vs Pittsburgh. Through seven games, Higgins ranks second on the team behind Chase in receptions (24) and receiving yards (316). **Andre Iosivas** is in his third NFL season and continues to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He brought in 36 catches for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024, following 116 yards and four TDs as a rookie in '23. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as each of his 10 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. Iosivas has 11 catches for 170 yards this season, including a career-high 82 yards in Week 5 vs. Detroit. He was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he earned All-America honors as a heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. Fellow third-year receiver **Charlie Jones** has served as the Bengals' primary punt returner since being selected in the fourth round of the 2023 draft, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. In 2022, his final collegiate season which he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Among the top offensive performers throughout this past training camp and preseason was WR **Mitch Tinsley**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster after signing a Reserve/Future contract with Cincinnati in February. Originally a college free agent signee of Washington in 2023, Tinsley played in two games as a rookie for the Commanders (no statistics), then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. He faced his former team in the Bengals' second preseason game at Washington and posted five catches for 73 yards and two highlight-reel TDs. He made the highlight tapes once again with his first career reception in Week 2 vs. Jacksonville, a one-handed TD grab on a 13-yard pass from Browning. He

finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-21). Second-year WR **Jermaine Burton** possesses the ability to stretch defensive coverages, as two of his four catches as a rookie last season went for over 40 yards. He also contributed in the kickoff return game following Jones' injury last year. Burton began his collegiate career at the University of Georgia (2020-21), then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two seasons ('22-23) before being selected by the Bengals in the third round of the '24 NFL Draft. In 2023, his final year with the Crimson Tide, he led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally in yards per reception (20.5).

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 85 career regular-season games with 56 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season and has started in 29 of his last 33 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 105 career receptions for 754 yards and five TDs. He missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned at the start of the '23 season and has suited up for each of Cincinnati's last 39 games. Now in his seventh season, Sample is the Bengals' longest-tenured player. **Noah Fant** signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late July this year, and already has built a rapport with Cincinnati's quarterbacks. He has 20 catches for 151 yards and two TDs in six games played, with his latest scoring grab coming on a five-yard pass from Flacco in the fourth quarter of Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. A former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), he spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21) and three with Seattle ('22-24). He has played in 101 career games with 85 starts, and his career totals include 320 receptions for 3456 yards and 17 TDs. After being held off the stat sheet through the first five games of this season, sixth-year TE **Tanner Hudson** scored a TD on his first catch of the year, a two-yarder from Flacco in Week 6 at Green Bay. Hudson is a reserve TE who enjoyed his best career statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with Cincinnati. After totaling 15 receptions for 199 yards over his first four seasons on an active roster (2019-22), he posted career highs in catches (39) and yards (352) for Cincinnati in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four postseason games. **Cam Grandy** began his 2024 rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, then signed to the active roster midway through the year and went on to play in eight games with six starts. He has six catches for 34 yards in his career, including a six-yard grab in Week 3 this season at Minnesota. Grandy was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University.

Offensive linemen: Headlining the Bengals' offensive line room is four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started all 34 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three NFL seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore and then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 32 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 77 regular-season games played. He has played all 428 offensive snaps through Cincinnati's first seven games this season. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who is in his fourth season with the Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his four years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 60 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.5 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span (3942 of 3961). Off the field, he was the team's 2023 nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award, honored for his charitable work with the Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. The starting ROT is second-year pro **Amarus Mims**, who was Cincinnati's first-round draft choice in 2024 (No. 18 overall). Mims began his rookie season in a reserve role but has started 20 of his last 21 games played. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Brown as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. Rookie **Jalen Rivers** has started the past four games at RG, lining up for all 251 Bengals offensive snaps in that stretch. A fifth-round pick of the Bengals in April, he boasted a proven ability to play at both tackle and guard spots during

his college career at the University of Miami (Fla.). He was the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two seasons, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. He suited up for 38 total games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) at Miami. Rookie **Dylan Fairchild** was taken in the third round of this year's draft and started at LG in each of the first five games of the season, before missing the Week 6 contest at Green Bay due to a knee injury. He then was active in Week 7 but did not see action against Pittsburgh. In 2024, his final season at the University of Georgia, he earned second-team All-America honors while blocking for a Bulldogs offense that ranked third in the Southeastern Conference in net passing yards per game (281.0). In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., Fairchild was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. **G Dalton Risner** has been the starting LG for each of the past two games, after lining up as the starting RG in two contests earlier this season. He signed with the Bengals as a free agent in late August, and quickly was thrust into action as he entered the season opener at Cleveland in the first half following starter Lucas Patrick's injury. Risner was a second-round draft pick of Denver in 2019 and spent his first four pro seasons ('19-22) with the Broncos, before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 93 career regular-season games with 85 starts — 75 at LG and 10 at RG. **Lucas Patrick**, who started this year's opener at RG, was sidelined for the past six games due to a calf injury sustained at Cleveland. He was returned to the active roster from the Reserve/Injured list ahead of the team's Week 7 contest against Pittsburgh, but did not see action in that game. Patrick joined the Bengals in this year's free agency period, after spending previous seasons with Green Bay (2016-21), Chicago ('22-23) and New Orleans ('24). He has played in 108 career regular-season games, and his 65 total starts have included 28 at center, 19 at LG and 18 at RG. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT **Cody Ford**, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. He has played 19 offensive snaps and 26 special teams snaps through seven games this season. Ford was college teammates with Brown at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17. C **Matt Lee** is in his second pro season with the Bengals, after seeing action in all 17 games in 2024 as a reserve O-lineman and special teams contributor. He has played in five contests this season, lining up for 16 special teams snaps. Lee was a seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, following a five-year college career (2019-23) that saw him go from the University of Central Florida ('19-22) to Miami (Fla.) for his final season. He garnered second-team All-ACC honors in his lone season at Miami.

Defensive linemen: The Bengals' defensive line room is headlined by DE **Trey Hendrickson**, a ninth-year pass rusher who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons with Cincinnati (2021-24). He recorded 17.5 sacks in each of the past two seasons, with last year's total leading the NFL. He was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press in 2024 and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year. Since joining the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason, he ranks third in the NFL in sacks (61.0) and tied for third in forced fumbles (12). He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of New Orleans in 2017 and spent his first four seasons ('17-20) with the Saints. Hendrickson has a team-leading four sacks in six games played this season, but missed the Week 7 contest against Pittsburgh due to a hip injury. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 61 games played, including six postseason contests. A productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 17 sacks as a Bengal while also batting down/tipping 13 passes. He leads the team's defensive line with 26 tackles this season, including two TFLs and a sack. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.**, who joined the Bengals after spending his first four pro seasons (2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 75 regular-season games and totaled 157 tackles, six TFLs, two sacks and four PDs. He made his first career start in the 2022 season finale and has started each of his last 43 games played. Slaton has logged 24 tackles through his first seven games with Cincinnati, including a season-high eight in Week 5 vs. Detroit. The Bengals added noteworthy athleticism to the D-line room when they selected DE **Shemar Stewart** in the first round of this year's draft (No. 17 overall) out of Texas A&M University. Touted in the scouting process for his physical traits, Stewart was one of two players in the 2025 draft class to produce a perfect 10.0 on the Relative Athletic Score, which grades a player's

measurements compared to their peer group. He played in 37 games with 19 starts across three seasons (2022-24) with the Aggies, and finished his career with third-team All-SEC honors last year. He played in the Bengals' first two games this season and tallied two tackles, then missed four contests due to an ankle injury. He returned to action in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. DE **Joseph Ossai** has two sacks through the first six games of this season, including a nine-yard takedown of Lions QB Jared Goff in Week 5. He now has seven sacks over his last 13 games played dating back to Week 11 of the 2024 campaign. Originally a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021, he missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just three games in the past three-plus seasons. He has 11.5 sacks and 10 TFLs in 54 career games (seven starts). Ossai was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has 1.5 sacks this season, including his first full sack of the year in Week 5 vs. Detroit. Murphy missed the early part of the 2024 season due to a knee injury, but returned to the lineup last October and has since played in 21 straight contests. In 37 career games, he has 54 tackles with five TFLs and 4.5 sacks. Murphy was a first-team All-ACC pick in his final season at Clemson University, where he amassed 17.5 career sacks in 38 games for the Tigers. Cincinnati added veteran depth when it signed free agent DT **Mike Pennel** off the practice squad to the active roster on Sept. 9. Pennel joined the practice squad the previous week, after serving as a key member of Kansas City's defense in 2023 and '24. An 11th-year player, he spent his first three pro seasons (2014-16) with Green Bay, before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('17-18), a first stint with the Chiefs ('19-20), Atlanta ('21) and Chicago ('22). He has suited up for 145 career regular-season games with 25 starts, and has 246 total tackles with 15 TFLs and five sacks. He has 15 tackles on 123 defensive snaps played through seven games with the Bengals. Second-year DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** got in the sack column for the first time this season in Week 3 at Minnesota, notching 1.5 in the first half of that contest. A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2024, Jenkins played in 15 games with nine starts as a rookie last year. He logged 31 tackles with three sacks last season, and has kicked off this year with 22 stops (13 solos) and two TFLs. In his final season at the University of Michigan in 2023, he earned second-team All-America honors and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., was a four-time Pro Bowler during his 10-year playing career (2001-10) as a DT for Carolina and the N.Y. Jets. Members of Cincinnati's defensive coaching staff expressed their excitement for the return of fifth-year DE **Cam Sample**, who missed the entire 2024 campaign due to an Achilles injury sustained during training camp. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 54 career games as a rotational lineman and has 76 tackles with five sacks. He made his return to game action in the preseason opener at Philadelphia, then made his first regular-season appearance since the Achilles injury in Week 1 at Cleveland. He has played in all seven games this season and posted seven tackles, including a TFL. DT **McKinnley Jackson**, a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2024, played in 13 games as a rookie last season after beginning the year on Reserve/Injured due to a knee injury. He contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He was a two-time team captain at Texas A&M, where he played in 40 career games. He made his season debut in Week 5 vs. Detroit, and has been inactive for the other six games this season. The Bengals acquired DT **Jordan Jefferson** on waivers from San Francisco prior to Week 5. Originally a fourth-round draft pick of Jacksonville in 2024, Jefferson has recorded 12 tackles with one sack in nine career games with the Jaguars (2024) and 49ers ('25). He finished his college career at Louisiana State in 2023, following four seasons ('19-22) at West Virginia University. He has been inactive for two games this season and was an active/DNP in Week 7.

Linebackers: Rookie LB **Demetrius Knight Jr.** has started six of his first seven career games, after being selected by the Bengals in the second round of this year's draft. He is currently tied for the team-lead in stops with 50 total tackles (29 solos), while also charting two PDs, including an INT. His first career pick came in Week 4 at Denver, when he intercepted QB Bo Nix in the Cincinnati end zone. Knight shot up draft boards following a breakout season at the University of South Carolina in 2024, in which he played in 13 games and ranked second on the Gamecocks with 82 tackles. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. He was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB early in his college career. Fellow rookie **Barrett Carter** is coming off his second career start in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, and in that contest he led the Bengals with a career-high 12 tackles. Cincinnati's fourth-round draft pick this past April, Carter has seen action in all seven contests this season and

has 36 tackles defensively along with four special teams stops. In his final season at Clemson last year, he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC pick, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). **Logan Wilson** returned to the field to start this season after missing the final six games of the 2024 campaign due to a knee injury. A 2020 third-round pick by Cincinnati, Wilson has topped 100 tackles in each of the past three seasons (2022-24), and his 11 career INTs are the most by any linebacker in the NFL since he entered the league. He also is one of three NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs since 2020, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith and Baltimore CB Marlon Humphrey. Wilson's injury last season ended a streak of 39 straight starts. He has 39 tackles (16 solos), four PDs and a FR through seven games this season. Eighth-year LB **Oren Burks** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. He was a key performer for the Eagles during their postseason run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. He has played in all seven games with three starts for the Bengals this season and has 13 total tackles with one TFL and one FF. **Shaka Heyward** spent the entire 2023 campaign and most of '24 on Cincinnati's practice squad, before playing in six games for the Bengals in the back half of last season. A 2023 college free agent signee out of Duke University, he has carved out a role on special teams, notching 10 ST stops through seven games this season, which ranks second on the team. Heyward also ranked second on the team this past preseason with 14 defensive tackles.

Cornerbacks: Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2022, **Dax Hill** spent his first two seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. He started the first five games of last season at CB, then suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 5. He underwent a full rehab and returned to full participation this past training camp. Hill has started all seven contests this season and leads the team's CBs with 43 tackles (27 solos), including a TFL, while also recording two PDs and an INT. A natural athlete who lined up at several positions in the secondary during his career at the University of Michigan (2019-21), Hill primarily contributed on special teams throughout his 2022 rookie season before starting all 17 contests at safety in '23. CB **DJ Turner II** is enjoying a breakout campaign in his third pro season, as he currently leads the NFL with a career-high 13 PDs. Five of those were recorded in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he became the first Bengals player with five PDs in a game since CB Johnathan Joseph in 2009. After missing the final six games of last season due to a collarbone injury, Turner opened this year with his first career INT to help seal the Week 1 win at Cleveland late in the fourth quarter. He is coming off his second pick of the year in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh, as he wrestled the ball away from WR DK Metcalf in the final minute of the first half. Turner originally was a second-round draft choice of the Bengals in 2023 and has played in 35 career games with 24 starts. He was a teammate of Hill's at Michigan, and ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine (4.26 seconds). CB **Josh Newton** looks to continue building his status as a core member of the defense in his second pro season. A fifth-round pick in 2024, he earned a roster spot out of his rookie training camp and played in all 17 games last season. He was thrust into the starting lineup following Turner's shoulder injury and started the final six contests, and that stretch included his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee. He has played in all seven games with two starts in 2025, and has contributed eight tackles (seven solos). Newton spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. Cincinnati's second-round draft choice in 2022 was **Cam Taylor-Britt**, who has played in 44 regular-season games with 39 starts in his career. He had a career-high 16 PDs in 2024, which led the Bengals and tied for fifth-most in the NFL, along with three INTs. He broke out during the 2023 campaign with four picks (tied for seventh in NFL) and 11 PDs in just 12 games played. Taylor-Britt has posted 11 tackles, including a TFL, and two PDs in five games played this season. The Bengals acquired **Marco Wilson** on waivers from New England last November, adding depth and experience to the CB room. Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons (2021-23) with Arizona, before being waived by the Cardinals and signed by the Patriots in December of '23. He has played in 63 career regular-season games with 37 starts, and his career totals include 20 PDs and three INTs. He played in each of Cincinnati's final six games last season, and made his 2025 debut in Week 3 at Minnesota. He has recorded two tackles in three games played this season. **DJ Ivey** made his return midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals, he carved out a role on special teams and showed flashes on defense prior to the injury. He played in 11 games last season and has seen action in all

seven contests this year. He has two special teams tackles this season, and sealed the Week 7 win over Pittsburgh when he knocked down a Hail Mary attempt as time expired.

Safeties: **Geno Stone** has started all 24 games he has played in for the Bengals since joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in the 2024 offseason. He led Cincinnati with four INTs last year (tied for 10th in NFL), which included a stretch of three straight games with a pick from Weeks 14-16. He recorded his first pick of this season in Week 6 at Green Bay, as he ended the Packers' opening drive by intercepting QB Jordan Love inside the red zone. Stone spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the AFC. His 12 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the second-most league-wide. He has 42 tackles through seven games this year. His fellow starting safety, **Jordan Battle**, had an INT in each of the first two games this season, becoming the first Bengals player to start a year with picks in back-to-back games since former CB Ashley Ambrose in 1996. Battle leads Cincinnati's defensive backs with 50 tackles through seven contests, highlighted by a career-best 12 stops in the opener at Cleveland. A third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2023, he has played in 41 career games (20 starts), and recorded 172 tackles along with five picks. He was a team captain and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). Fourth-year pro **Tycen Anderson** is a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two seasons, with eight in 2023 followed by 11 in '24, and his team-leading 11 ST stops this season are tied for fourth-most in the NFL. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. **PJ Jules** cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. Jules led the Bengals with 10 solo tackles this past preseason. He has five special teams tackles and two defensive stops through seven games this season.

Special Teams: A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, **K Evan McPherson** owns the third-highest career FG percentage in team history (81.9). He is 10-for-12 on FG attempts this season, and is coming off a career-high-tying four FGs on four attempts in Week 7 vs. Pittsburgh. His final kick against the Steelers was a 36-yard game-winner late in the fourth quarter. He has 25 career made FGs from 50 or more yards, the most in Bengals history and tied for the eighth-most in the NFL since the start of his 2021 rookie season. McPherson has been at full health through the first seven games of 2025, after missing the final five contests of last season due to a groin injury. Second-year P **Ryan Rehkow** compiled a record-setting rookie season in 2024 that saw him set Bengals single-season marks for gross punting average (49.11 yards per punt) and net average (42.92). His net average ranked sixth among all NFL punters last year, while his gross ranked ninth (both led all rookies). He was named to the 2024 Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team. In his career debut in the 2024 opener against New England, he set an NFL single-game record with 64.5 gross yards per punt (four punts for 258 yards). This season, he leads the NFL in gross average (52.3 yards) and is tied for fourth in punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line (11). Rookie **William Wagner** earned the role as the Bengals' long snapper coming out of this past training camp, and through his first seven career games he has recorded 60 snaps without an unplayable delivery. He spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he earned first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannelly Award (nation's top LS). WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. He is one of two players in team history to score a TD on both (CB Lemar Parrish), as he found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of the 2023 season vs. Baltimore, and also had a 100-yard KOR on the opening kickoff in Week 7 of '24 at Cleveland. He took over KOR duties for the first time in 2024, and finished the year with five returns for 200 yards. He also has 42 career PRs for 409 yards (9.73 average). Jones has 18 KORs for 423 yards and six PRs for 78 yards through seven games this season. Also in the mix to return kickoffs and punts is second-year WR **Jermaine Burton**, who took over KOR responsibilities late last season following an injury to Jones. Burton had 13 KORs for 378 yards in 2024 (29.1 average), including two 38-yarders. He logged four KORs for 84 yards this past preseason, as well as two PRs for 35 yards. HB **Samaje Perine** has returned 13 kickoffs this season for 318 yards (24.5). While playing for Kansas City last season, he had five KORs for 163 yards (32.6).

N.Y. Jets 34, Cincinnati Bengals 31 Sunday, Oct. 31, 2021 at MetLife Stadium

Jets QB Mike White, an injury replacement, completed 82 percent of his passes for the second-most yards (405) ever by a QB in his first career start to lead the upset over the Bengals. Midway through the fourth quarter, Cincinnati had a seemingly decisive 11-point lead. But White answered with a TD drive, and then the Jets' defense recorded its first INT of the season deep in Bengals territory. White then tossed his third TD and caught a pass on a two-point conversion to give the Jets a three-point lead which Cincinnati could not catch before time ran out. The Bengals fell to 5-3, while the Jets improved to 2-5.

2022 SEASON WEEK 3, GAME 3

Cincinnati Bengals 27, N.Y. Jets 12 Sunday, Sept. 25, 2022 at MetLife Stadium

The Bengals scored on four of their first five possessions, including an opening-drive TD, to build an early 20-6 lead. QB Joe Burrow had 95 passing yards on that initial drive, capped by a 12-yard TD throw to HB Samaje Perine on a third-and-goal. After a pair of Jets FGs, Cincinnati struck again on the final play of the first quarter when Burrow found WR Tyler Boyd over the middle, and Boyd spun off a hit and ran 45 yards to the end zone. LB Logan Wilson grabbed the Bengals' first INT of the season in the second quarter, picking off a deep pass from Jets QB Joe Flacco and returning it 47 yards. Cincinnati opened the second half with another TD, as a strip sack from DE Trey Hendrickson on the Jets' first possession set the Bengals up at the New York 24-yard line, and four plays later Burrow found WR Ja'Marr Chase alone in the end zone to make it 27-9. Another forced fumble from Hendrickson with 10:03 left in the fourth quarter led to a 13-play, 52-yard Bengals drive that drained the clock. The Bengals' defense recorded two takeaways in the second half and held Cleveland scoreless on its final six possessions to lead the way in a season-opening victory. P Ryan Rehkow then delivered a punt that was downed at the Browns' one-yard line, securing the win for Cincinnati.

The Bengals scored a TD on three straight possessions in the fourth quarter to cut into their deficit, but the comeback effort came up short in a home loss. Detroit built a 28-3 advantage thanks in large part to three INTs off Bengals QB Jake Browning, as each pick set up the Lions' offense inside Cincinnati territory. While the Bengals' defense sacked Lions QB Jared Goff four times and forced the high-powered Detroit attack to punt on five occasions, Goff battled through to complete 82.6 percent of his passes with three going for TDs. In the fourth quarter, Browning hit WR Ja'Marr Chase for two TDs, including a 64-yarder, and later found WR Tee Higgins in the end zone to make it an 11-point game. But a scramble for possession on the ensuing onside kick ultimately was won by the Lions, and a last gasp for the Bengals with under two minutes left was shut down with a safety. Cincinnati pulled to within six points late in the fourth quarter, but a Packers third-down conversion followed by a FG sealed the Bengals' road loss. QB Joe Flacco, who was acquired in a trade just five days earlier, passed for 219 yards and two TDs in his first Bengals start. Both scoring plays came on fourth down, with the second going to WR Ja'Marr Chase for his 50th career TD catch. After the Packers' opening drive ended in a red zone INT by Bengals S Geno Stone, they controlled the time of possession throughout the first half and built a 10-0 lead by halftime. Cincinnati responded at the start of the third quarter with a 17-play drive which ended with Flacco finding TE Tanner Hudson for a TD on fourth-and-goal. The Packers answered with two straight TD drives to make it 24-10, before the Chase score followed by a successful two-point conversion closed the gap. Cincinnati Bengals 33, Pittsburgh Steelers 31

Thursday night, Oct. 16, 2025 at Paycor Stadium

In a high-scoring, nationally televised matchup which saw the two offenses combine for 866 net yards, the Bengals put together a late drive to set up K Evan McPherson's 36-yard game-winning FG on Thursday Night Football. It marked the third regular-season game in NFL history between two starting QBs over 40 years old, as Joe Flacco, 40, passed for 342 yards and three TDs for the Bengals while Aaron Rodgers, 41, had 249 yards and four passing TDs for the Steelers. Flacco leaned heavily on WR Ja'Marr Chase, who finished with a Bengals-record 16 receptions for 161 yards and a TD. The Steelers took the lead with 2:21 remaining when Rodgers found TE Pat Freiermuth for a 68-yard TD, but Flacco engineered a quick drive down the field and connected on a 28-yard pass to WR Tee Higgins to get inside McPherson's range. Cincinnati picked off Rodgers twice in the second quarter and scored 17 points late in the period to pull ahead at halftime. The Bengals' offense also was aided by a strong rushing attack, led by HB Chase Brown's 9.8 yards per carry. Cincinnati improved to 3-4, while Pittsburgh fell to 4-2.
