GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 8:15 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will be streamed live on Prime Video. In Cincinnati, it also will air live locally on WCPO-TV (ABC Ch. 9). Broadcasters are Al Michaels (play-by-play), Kirk Herbstreit (analyst) and Kaylee Hartung (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst). In addition, the game will air nationally on Westwood One Radio. Broadcasters are Ian Eagle (play-by-play) and Devin McCourty (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals head to Baltimore for a pivotal AFC North matchup against the Ravens on Thursday Night Football.

Cincinnati enters the contest at 4-5 this season, and looks to even its overall record as well as the season series with its divisional foe. The Bengals suffered a 41-38 overtime loss to the Ravens in Week 5 at Paycor Stadium, a game that saw QBs Joe Burrow and Lamar Jackson combine for 740 passing yards and nine TDs. Cincinnati responded to that setback by winning three of its past four, including a dominant 41-24 home victory over Las Vegas in Week 9.

"We just take it one game at a time," said head coach Zac Taylor. "That's the mentality this group has had, and we're going to stick with it right now with where we're at in the season. Just find a way to win this one, and then look forward to the next week."

The Bengals' Week 9 win was highlighted by some notable individual efforts, led by Burrow matching his career high with five TD passes. Four of those went to different receivers, which tied for the most players with a scoring catch in any game in team history. Burrow's 20 TD throws on the season are tied with Jackson for the second-most in the NFL, while he boosted his passer rating to 108.1 — the third-best mark leaguewide.

In the run game, Cincinnati leaned heavily on second-year HB Chase Brown, who posted career highs in rushing attempts (27), rushing yards (120) and scrimmage yards (157). Brown's 27 carries were the most by a Bengals player since Joe Mixon had the same amount in the 2022 season opener. The London, Ontario native also scored Cincinnati's first TD of the game, working himself free in the end zone to catch Burrow's pass on a scramble play.

TE Mike Gesicki, a free agent acquisition this past offseason, enjoyed perhaps his best day yet as a Bengal. Gesicki caught five passes for a season-high 100 yards and his first two TDs of the year. It was his third career 100-yard receiving game, and included a 47-yard score late in the fourth quarter that marked his second-longest career reception.

"He just continues to get open in zone, win versus man, make big-time catches, contested catches," said Burrow on Gesicki. "He continues to show why I have so much trust in him and continues to make plays for us, so his role is going to continue to increase."

Defensively, the afternoon belonged to DE Trey Hendrickson. The Pro Bowl edge rusher had a career-high four sacks, the second-most in any NFL game this season and the most by a Bengals player since former DE Antwan Odom in 2009. Hendrickson's final takedown was a strip-sack late in the fourth quarter, which led to LB Logan Wilson's recovery at the Raiders' 13-yard line. He enters Week 10 with a league-leading 11 sacks, and he became just the second player in team history to record double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons, following DT/DE Eddie Edwards in 1980-81.

"There's moments where we needed that big stop on defense, and a lot of guys came up big for us, but Trey came up the biggest," Taylor said. "We're counting on him to make those plays and he did that today. Proud of him."

Hendrickson and the defense now turn their attention to a dynamic Ravens attack that leads the NFL in total offense (445.9 yards per game) and rushing offense (191.9), while ranking third in passing offense (254.0). Baltimore is coming off a 41-10 home win over Denver in Week 9, which was highlighted by the Ravens scoring points on seven consecutive possessions.

The series: The series is relatively even overall, with Baltimore currently holding a 31-26 lead in regular season, and Cincinnati holding a 1-0 lead in postseason. The Ravens, however, currently hold a three-game win streak with a sweep of the Bengals last season.

It hasn't been an easy series for the visiting team. The Ravens lead 19-9 in Baltimore, and the Bengals lead 18-12 in Cincinnati (including postseason).

Bengals-Ravens connections: Bengals OT Orlando Brown Jr. is a native of Baltimore, was a third-round draft pick of the Ravens in 2018 and spent his first three pro seasons ('18-20) with the Ravens ... Brown's late father, Orlando Brown, also played for the Ravens for six seasons (1996-98, 2003-05) ... Bengals S Geno Stone was a seventh-round draft pick of the Ravens in 2020 and spent his first three seasons ('20-23) with Baltimore ... Bengals DT Kris Jenkins Jr. is a native of Olney, Md. (approximately 30 miles west of Baltimore) ... Bengals assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons served as the Ravens' assistant special teams coach and assistant strength and conditioning coach in 1998 ... Ravens head coach John Harbaugh played defensive back at the University of Miami (Ohio) and served on the University of Cincinnati coaching staff from 1989-96 ... Ravens assistant head coach/pass game coordinator Chris Hewitt played defensive back at the University of Cincinnati from 1993-96 ... Bengals senior defensive assistant Mark Duffner served as head coach at the University of Maryland from 1992-96 ... Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

• QB Joe Burrow has 2197 career passing attempts, 24 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.

• Burrow has 16,327 passing yards, the fifth-most all-time. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top four spots. Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for fifth in team history.

• Burrow has 21 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the third-most all-time. Dalton (28) and Esiason (23) hold the top two spots for the team's most 300-yard passing games.

• WR Ja'Marr Chase has 36 career receiving TDs, five shy of WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth all-time. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.

• Chase has 16 games with 100 or more receiving yards, two shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.

• DE Trey Hendrickson has 50.5 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 8.5 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

• K Evan McPherson has an 82.7 career FG percentage (91 made/110 attempts), the third-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

Bengals-Ravens series records: In the first-ever Bengals-Ravens game on Nov. 3, 1996 at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium, head coach Bruce Coslet's Bengals overcame what still stands today as the largest deficit (18 points) to win a regular-season road game in franchise history. The Ravens

led 21-3 at halftime, but Cincinnati rallied for a 24-21 win on a 34-yard Doug Pelfrey field goal at the final gun. Not until the 2021 season's AFC Championship did the Bengals finally match that road feat (overcoming a 21-3 deficit at Kansas City to earn a berth in Super Bowl LVI).

The Bengals' second-biggest regular-season comeback in a road win also was set at Baltimore. On Dec. 5, 2004 at M&T Bank Stadium, Cincinnati rallied from a 20-3 deficit to win 27-26. The Bengals matched that 17-point deficit road comeback on Dec. 18, 2022 when they came back from being down 17-0 to win 34-23 at Tampa Bay.

Also:

• On Nov. 22, 1998 in Cincinnati, Ravens RB Priest Holmes rushed for 227 yards, the most ever recorded against the Bengals in a game.

• On Sept. 23, 2001 in Cincinnati, Ravens QB Elvis Grbac attempted 63 passes, the most ever against the Bengals in a game.

• The Bengals record for kickoff return yardage in a game (228 yards) was set at Baltimore by HB Brandon Bennett on Nov. 10, 2002. Bennett had a 94-yarder for a TD.

• Also on Nov. 10, 2002, Ravens CB Lamont Brightful recorded the longest punt return ever against Cincinnati, a 95-yarder for a TD.

• K Shayne Graham kicked a Bengals-record seven field goals — for all of Cincinnati's scoring — in a 21-7 win at Baltimore on Nov. 11, 2007. Graham did not have a missed attempt. The NFL record for field goals in a game is eight, set by Rob Bironas of Tennessee in 2007, and Graham is one of nine players sharing second place with seven.

• On Nov. 30, 2008 against the Ravens in Cincinnati, P Kyle Larson punted 11 times, which is tied with three other instances for most in a game in team history. Larson's 480 yards punting that day also stand as the third-most for a single game in Bengals history.

• In the 2014 season opener at Baltimore, Bengals K Mike Nugent tied the NFL record for field goals in a half (five; still tied). His five in the first half gave the Bengals a 15-0 lead toward an eventual 23-16 win.

• On Jan. 3, 2021, the Ravens set a record for most net rushing yards against the Bengals in a single game with 404. That total shattered the previous mark of 313, which had stood since 1969.

• On Dec. 26, 2021, Bengals QB Joe Burrow set a team record for most passing yards in a game with 525, which still is the fourth-highest single-game total in NFL history (more info in following item).

Burrow's big day vs. Ravens: QB Joe Burrow had one of the top individual performances by a QB in NFL history on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore, when he passed for a Bengals-record 525 yards and four TDs while completing 80.4 percent of his attempts (37 of 46). His passing yardage total still ranks as the fourth-highest in a single game in league history, and he became the first Cincinnati QB ever to post a completion percentage of 80 or higher while throwing at least 40 times.

Burrow's 525 yards and four TD passes came on the heels of a 416-yard, three-TD stat line in Week 7 of the 2021 season at Baltimore. That made him the only QB ever to pass for 400 yards and three TDs more than once in an entire career against the Ravens. He also became the first QB in NFL history to top 400 passing yards against the same opponent twice in one regular season, and his 941 combined passing yards vs. Baltimore were the most-ever against one opponent in one regular season. The previous record was 874 passing yards, shared by former San Francisco QB Joe Montana against Atlanta in 1990 and former Miami QB Dan Marino against the N.Y. Jets in '88.

In the Dec. 26 matchup, Burrow became just the eighth QB since 2000 to have three completions of at least 52 yards in a game (there now have been nine QBs to hit that mark). On the receiving end of those passes were WR Tyler Boyd (68-yard TD), WR Tee Higgins (52) and HB Joe Mixon (52), who became the first trio of Bengals to catch passes of 50-plus yards in a single game since Nov. 17, 1968 at Miami.

• TE Drew Sample: Nine games; 10 receptions for 67 yards (6.7).

• QB Joe Burrow: Eight games; 196-of-288 passing for 2271 yards, 17 TDs

and five INTs (104.1 passer rating); 16 rushes for 50 yards (3.1) and one TD.

- WR Tee Higgins: Eight games; 41 catches for 497 yards (12.1) and six TDs.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Seven games; 47 receptions for 698 yards (14.9) and five TDs; One rush for zero yards.
- HB Trayveon Williams: Seven games; Six rushes for 94 yards (15.7); Three reception for seven yards (2.3).
- HB Chris Evans (Reserve/Injured): Four games; One rush for one yard.
- WR Trenton Irwin: Four games; Four receptions for 48 yards (12.0).

Hubbard's wild (card) recovery return: DE Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the difference in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore will go down as one of the most memorable defensive plays in Bengals history.

The return was dubbed by some as "The Hubbard-Yard Dash," while others refer to the fumble itself as "The Fumble in the Jungle." Regardless of the name, here are some notable facts on the play:

- The 98-yard return is the longest fumble return for a TD in NFL postseason history. The previous longest was a 93-yard return by Andy Russell of the Pittsburgh Steelers in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Dec. 27, 1975.
- It is the longest TD of any kind in a postseason game in Bengals history. The previous longest was a 93-yard kickoff return by RB Stanford Jennings in Super Bowl XXIII on Jan. 22, 1989.
- It is the longest go-ahead TD in the fourth quarter in NFL postseason history. The previous longest was a 90-yard blocked FG return by Anthony Mitchell of the Baltimore Ravens in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Jan. 7, 2001.
- According to NFL's Next Gen Stats service, Hubbard's top speed on the return was 17.43 mph. He also traveled 123.6 total yards, the most distance traveled by a ball carrier on a TD in the 2022 regular season or postseason.
- It marked Hubbard's second career TD on a fumble recovery. As a rookie in 2018, he ran a fumble back 19 yards in the fourth quarter of Week 5 against Miami that helped seal a 27-17 Bengals win.

Bengals on Thursday: The Bengals have played 18 times previously on Thursday, posting a 10-8 record. Cincinnati has a 7-2 record on TNF at home, but just a 3-6 mark on the road. One of the Thursday games, in 2010, was played on Thanksgiving.

The Bengals have won two of their three previous Thursday night meetings against Baltimore, winning twice in Cincinnati and losing once in Baltimore. This week's game will be the fifth TNF game the Bengals have played under head coach Zac Taylor and QB Joe Burrow (2-2 record).

Overall at night: In regular season, the Bengals are 28-57 at night, including 4-17 on Sunday night, 14-28 playing on Monday night, 10-8 on Thursday night, 0-1 on Friday night and 0-3 on Saturday night.

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, black pants (orange stripes) and white socks this week at Baltimore. Cincinnati is 7-4 overall when wearing that combination, which was last featured the team's win at Cleveland in Week 7 of this season.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and the recently unveiled orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance was in Week 8 of this season against Philadelphia.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LV1. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football

League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

John Harbaugh is in his 17th season at the helm in Baltimore. He has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in 11 (2008-12, '14, '18-20, '22-23) of his 16 full seasons, and in '12, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship.

Under Harbaugh's guidance, Baltimore is one of four teams with at least 11 playoff berths in the past 16 seasons, joining New England (12), Green Bay (12) and Kansas City (11). Harbaugh has also led the Ravens to playoff berths in five (2018-20, '22-23) of the past six seasons, producing the league's second-most regular-season victories (66) during that span.

The 2023 AFC North Champion Ravens produced the NFL's best record (13-4), earned a No. 1 playoff seed and hosted the first conference title game in franchise history. During the regular season, Baltimore tallied an NFL-record 10 victories vs. teams that finished with a winning record.

In 2019, Harbaugh became the first Ravens coach to win Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year, leading the team to the AFC's No. 1 playoff seed and a franchise-best 14-2 record. Baltimore also won a franchise-record 12 straight games to close out the regular season. In 2018, Baltimore (10-6) captured the AFC North Division title, earning a Wild Card berth. In 2014, the Ravens posted a 10-6 record, en route to capturing a 30-17 victory at Pittsburgh in the Wild Card round.

In 2012, the Ravens seized the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. Baltimore topped the Colts in the Wild Card round and followed that by earning a Divisional Round victory over top-seeded Denver before advancing to Super Bowl XLVII with a win in the AFC Championship Game at New England. In the Super Bowl in New Orleans, the Ravens bested the San Francisco 49ers, 34-31.

In his initial season with the team (2008), Harbaugh led Baltimore to an 11-5 record and a berth in the AFC Championship Game. Baltimore set an NFL record that season for most total wins (13) by a team with both a rookie head coach and a rookie starting quarterback (Joe Flacco).

Harbaugh spent his first 10 NFL seasons (1998-2007) with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was the team's secondary coach in 2007, after nine seasons as its special teams coordinator. In 2001, he was voted the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers.

Harbaugh played defensive back at Miami (Ohio) from 1980-83, earning a degree in political science. He has no pro playing experience. He coached collegiately at Western Michigan (1984-86), Pittsburgh ('87), Morehead State ('88), Cincinnati ('89-96), and Indiana ('97).

Harbaugh was born in Perrysburg, Ohio on Sept. 23, 1962. He and his wife, Ingrid, have a daughter, Alison.

Harbaugh is the son of longtime college coach Jack. His brother, Jim, is head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers, and played for the Ravens in 1998. John's sister, Joani, is married to Tom Crean, a longtime college head basketball coach, most recently for the University of Georgia from 2018-22.

Taylor vs. Ravens: The Ravens lead the series overall, 8-4 (the series includes one postseason game).

Taylor vs. Harbaugh: Harbaugh leads the series overall, 8-4 (the series includes one postseason game).

Harbaugh vs. Bengals: Harbaugh leads overall, 18-16 (the series includes one postseason game).

BENGALS NOTES

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team

captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt is serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

Bengals near 400th W: The Bengals enter Week 9 with 398 all-time wins in the regular season, just two shy of 400. The team has won 240 games at home and 158 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly known as Paul Brown Stadium). The team has reached the 10-win mark during the regular season 14 times, including in six of the past 12 years.

Burrow hits the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.27, he is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, ahead of former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.69).

Burrow this season ranks third in the NFL in completions (212), fifth in passing attempts (302) and fifth in completion percentage (70.2; minimum 14 attempts per team game). He surpassed 2000 career attempts in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark were the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 throws behind Brees (1444).

In Week 8 vs. Philadelphia, Burrow went 26 of 37 (70.3 percent), marking his 20th career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts. That is the second-most such games in league history within a player's first five seasons behind Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21).

Last week against Las Vegas, Burrow recorded his 1500th career completion in what was his 61st regular-season game. That marked the second-fewest games in NFL history to reach 1500 completions, trailing only L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (57).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; min. 14 att./game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Joe masters the deep ball: QB Joe Burrow's 47-yard TD pass to TE Mike Gesicki in the fourth quarter of Week 9 vs. Las Vegas marked his

24th career scoring pass of 40 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020.

Burrow also leads the league in TD passes of 50 or more yards (16) and is tied for the lead in 60 or more yards (12) since 2020. Four of his five 40-plus-yard scoring tosses this season were to WR Ja'Marr Chase, beginning with a 41-yarder on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington. The following week at Carolina, he found Chase over the middle for what turned into a 63-yard catch-and-run to the end zone. In Week 5 at Baltimore, he connected with his Pro Bowl receiver on a 41-yard deep ball with nine seconds left in the first half, and on a quick screen in the fourth quarter that Chase took 70 yards for a TD.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22 and two in '23.

Among all NFL QBs whose career began after 1990, Burrow's 24 TD passes of 40 or more yards are the third-most within his first five seasons. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning (28) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (26) had more in their first five years.

Burrow reaches 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that mark.

Burrow's current career total of 16,327 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least four fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Through nine games this season, Burrow ranks fifth in the NFL in passing yards (2244).

Burrow throws 100th TD: QB Joe Burrow threw his 100th career regular-season TD pass on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington, when he hit WR Ja'Marr Chase in stride for a 41-yard score. Playing in his 55th game, Burrow tied for the seventh-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 100 TD passes.

Burrow's 20 TD passes through nine games this season are tied for second-most in the NFL. He threw a career-high five TDs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, then matched that number in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He is the first QB to pass for five or more TDs in multiple games in a season since Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and former Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady each had two such games in 2021.

Of Burrow's five passing scores against the Raiders, four went to different receivers. It tied for the most players with a receiving TD in any game in Bengals history. There have been nine such instances in team history, with Burrow accounting for three of those.

The former No. 1 overall pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, before breaking out with a then-team-record 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By besting his record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is the only NFL QB with at least 1000 completions, 100 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100.

Burrow since 2021 leads the league in passer rating (102.2; minimum 1000 attempts), while ranking fourth in TD passes (104), sixth in yards per attempt (7.61), seventh in completions (1236) and seventh in passing yards (13,639).

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase leads the NFL this season in receiving TDs (seven), while ranking second in receiving yards (717) and tied for third in receptions (55).

Chase, the team's first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, is one of eight players in league history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000yard receiving seasons. He holds a career average of 82.11 receiving yards per game (54 games), the fifth-highest mark in NFL history among all players with at least 3000 yards.

Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. His 4210 receiving yards following that matchup went in as the fifth-most ever through a player's first 50 games, while his 297 receptions ranked ninth. He also became one of just five players in the Super Bowl era to record over 4000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs within his first 50 games.

Chase in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants recorded his 300th career reception in his 51st game. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that milestone, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and tied for the eighth-fastest in league history. Chase also previously surpassed 4000 career receiving yards in Week 4 at Carolina, needing the fewest games ever by a Bengal to hit that mark (49).

Last season, Chase logged a career-high 100 receptions that tied former WR Carl Pickens (1996) for the second-most in a season in Bengals history. The single-season team record belongs to former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh, who had 112 catches in 2007.

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 70-yard catch-and-run to the end zone in Week 5 vs. Baltimore marked his 10th career receiving TD of 60 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. It also tied former Bengals WR Isaac Curtis for the most in a career in team history, and surpassed former N.Y. Giants Odell Beckham Jr. for the most in the Super Bowl era by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (11) and 40-plus yards (15) since 2021. With a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder against Baltimore, he became the first NFL player since WR Terrell Owens in 2007 to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games.

Higgins reaches 4K yards: WR Tee Higgins led the Bengals with 82 yards on four receptions in Week 7 at Cleveland, and in the process surpassed 4000 receiving yards in his career. Playing in his 63rd regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in team history to reach that mark.

Higgins has been inactive for four games this season due to injuries (Weeks 1-2, Weeks 8-9), but in his five games played he has proven to be one of the NFL's most productive pass catchers. From Weeks 3-7, he tied for seventh in the league in receptions (29), tied for eighth in receiving TDs (three) and ranked 10th

in receiving yards (341).

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 25 leaguewide in receiving yards (23rd; 4025) and receiving TDs (T-18th; 27). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 12 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (10), seventh in receiving yards (1228) and 13th in yards per reception (15.7) during the calendar's final month. He also ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing teammate Ja'Marr Chase in both categories.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Hendrickson wrecks the Raiders: DE Trey Hendrickson posted a career-high four sacks in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, the second-most in an NFL game this season behind Detroit DL Aidan Hutchinson's 4.5 in Week 2 against Tampa Bay. He is the fourth player in Bengals history to record four or more sacks in a game, and the first since former DE Antwan Odom had five on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay.

Hendrickson's first sack of the afternoon occurred late in the second quarter, when he brought down Raiders QB Gardner Minshew for a seven-yard loss to back Las Vegas into a third-and-19. He then notched three sacks in the fourth quarter, beginning with a five-yard takedown of QB Desmond Ridder on the opening play of the period. He got to Ridder again midway through the quarter to force a fourth-and-long, then on the Raiders' next drive he had a strip-sack that led to a recovery by Bengals LB Logan Wilson. The play marked Hendrickson's 13th career forced fumble.

Hendrickson's previous single-game high for sacks was 2.5, which he recorded twice — in Week 3 of the 2022 season at the N.Y. Jets, and in Week 5 of '23 at Arizona.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson's 11 sacks this season lead the NFL through nine weeks of regular-season play. With this year's tally following up his 17.5 sacks during the 2023 season, he is the first Bengals player to record double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980 and '81.

Since signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, Hendrickson has 50.5 sacks, the third-most in the NFL in that span behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (53.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (53.0). He has 11 multi-sack games as a member of the Bengals, tied for the second-most leaguewide since 2021.

Hendrickson has led Cincinnati in sacks and been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his three full seasons with the team (2021-23). He logged 14.0 sacks in his debut Bengals season in 2021, which ranked fifth in the NFL, then followed up with eight more in '22. His career-high 17.5 sacks last year tied for second in the NFL and ranked second in Bengals single-season history, trailing only DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson also has 10 forced fumbles since the start of the 2021 season (all strip-sacks), tied for the second-most FFs in the league in that span. He recorded two sacks in back-to-back games earlier this season (Weeks 6-7), becoming the first Cincinnati player to do so since former DE Antwan Odom in

Weeks 1-2 of the 2009 campaign.

The Florida Atlantic University product spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with New Orleans, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL.

Hendrickson's production for the Bengals was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard logged his second sack of the season in Week 7 at Cleveland, when he forced a fumble by QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson in the Browns' backfield. It improved Hubbard's career sack total to 38.5, the fourth-most among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents).

Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected that year — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him. He has ranked second on the Bengals in sacks in each season since he became the team's starting left defensive end in 2019, and he has 55 career TFLs.

Hubbard had a pair of TFLs in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, with the second stopping RB Derrick Henry in his own end zone to force a safety. It marked the first safety forced by the Bengals since Week 13 of the 2019 season against the N.Y. Jets. Hubbard then recorded his first career INT in the Week 7 win over Cleveland, as he dropped into coverage and came down with a tipped pass thrown by Thompson-Robinson.

Hubbard additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in team history. A native of Cincinnati who attended Archbishop Moeller High School, Hubbard also is known for contributing one of the franchise's most iconic plays, a 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the game-winner in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore following the 2022 season.

The Week 10 contest at Baltimore will be Hubbard's 100th career regular-season game played.

LB duo stuffs the stat sheet: Fifth-year pro Logan Wilson ranks third in the NFL this season with 88 tackles, while his fellow starting LB Germaine Pratt ranks ninth with 81.

Wilson is coming off a productive outing in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, as he totaled a team-high nine tackles and recorded his first two career fumble recoveries. The first recovery came early in the third quarter, when he scooped up a Gardner Minshew fumble and returned it to the Raiders' 21-yard line, leading to a Bengals TD five plays later. Then in the fourth quarter, Wilson jumped on a fumble forced by DE Trey Hendrickson to set up the Cincinnati offense at the Las Vegas 13-yard line.

Wilson has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons, highlighted by a career-high 135 stops in 2023 which marked the most by a Cincinnati defender since Burfict had 171 in '13. Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of three players leaguewide with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith and Baltimore CB Marlon Humphrey.

Pratt has contributed to three takeaways this season, beginning with a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City that set up a Bengals FG drive. He recovered another fumble in overtime of Week 5 vs. Baltimore, then the following week had his first INT of the year at the N.Y. Giants. Since the start of the 2021 season, Pratt is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs

and five FRs, along with Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr.

In Week 2 at Kansas City, Wilson and Pratt combined for 28 tackles, the most by a pair of Bengals since LB Vontaze Burfict (18 tackles) and LB Rey Mauluga (10) also totaled 28 on Dec. 30, 2012 against Baltimore. Pratt had a career-high 16 stops against the Chiefs, the fourth-most in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994. He went into double digits in tackles for a second time this year in Week 7 at Cleveland, finishing with a game-high 13 (10 solos).

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: LB Logan Wilson's 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Cincinnati in 2020. He had four picks last season, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh leaguewide.

A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson opened his career with two picks in his 2020 rookie campaign, then followed up with four in '21. That total marked the most in a season by a Bengals LB since Odell Thurman had five INTs in 2005.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the '27 season.

Rehkw on a run: Through nine weeks of regular-season play, rookie P Ryan Rehkw ranks third the NFL in net punting average (44.6 net yards per punt; minimum 10 attempts) and fifth in gross average (51.2; min. 10 att.). He has punted 31 times for 1586 yards, with 15 downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line compared to four touchbacks.

Rehkw kicked off his career with a historic debut on Sept. 8 vs. New England, when he logged four punts for 258 yards. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four attempts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole on Nov. 5, 2023. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkw's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers).

In Weeks 5-7, Rehkw became the first punter in Bengals history to have four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard line in three consecutive games. He amassed season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkw signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson knocked through a 56-yard FG in the third quarter of Week 4 at Carolina, extending his Bengals record to 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards. It also tied for the fifth-longest FG in team history, with McPherson owning five of the top six on that list.

McPherson's 24 such FGs are the fourth-most in the NFL since he entered the league as a fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021. He finished the 2023 campaign with 21 FGs from 50-plus yards, the most in NFL history in a player's first three seasons.

McPherson's current career FG percentage of 82.7 (91 of 110) ranks third in Bengals history (minimum 75 attempts) behind former kickers Shayne Graham (86.8) and Randy Bullock (84.9). He surpassed 100 career attempts in Week 3 vs. Washington, and his 84 made FGs at the time he reached that mark are the

third-most through a Bengals kicker's first 100 tries.

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs, including two last season — in OT of Week 13 at Jacksonville, and again in OT of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. However, his two most notable such kicks came during the 2021 postseason, when he hit a 52-yarder in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and followed up a week later with a 31-yarder in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City that sent Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson is a perfect 19 of 19 in seven career postseason games and is the team's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points).

Cincinnati signed McPherson to a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18, securing its kicker through the 2027 season.

Charlie's 100-Yard Return: WR Charlie Jones took the opening kickoff of Week 7 at Cleveland from his own goal line and returned it 100 yards to the end zone for a Bengals TD just 12 seconds in. The play garnered Jones his first career AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honor, and was the first return of 100 or more yards in the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Here are some notable facts on the play:

- It was the 13th TD on a KOR in team history, and the first since former S Brandon Wilson had a 103-yard return on Nov. 29, 2020 against the N.Y. Giants.
- It was the second time in team history that the Bengals returned the game's opening kickoff for a TD. The first time came on Oct. 13, 2019, when Wilson had a 92-yard return at Baltimore.
- It tied for the third-longest KOR in team history and the sixth-longest play overall. The previous KORs that went for 100 or more yards were Wilson's 103-yarder, HB Eric Bieniemy's 102-yarder on Oct. 26, 2007 vs. the N.Y. Giants, and WR Glenn Holt's 100-yarder on Nov. 4, 2007 at Buffalo.
- Jones also had an 81-yard punt return TD in Week 2 of the 2023 season against Baltimore. He and former CB Lemar Parrish are the only players in team history to score a TD via KOR and PR during their Bengals career.
- It marked the longest KOR in the NFL this season and the third KOR TD. The last time an NFL player had a KOR TD of 100 or more yards was Jan. 8, 2023, when Buffalo RB Nyheim Hines opened a game against New England with a 101-yard return.

Pro Bowl three-peats: WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 which tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with

the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

The Jungle is jammin': Each of the 13 highest-attended home games in Bengals history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest announced crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous mark of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas on Jan. 15.

Cincinnati's game against Philadelphia in Week 8 of this season had an announced attendance figure of 67,239, which now stands as the second-largest in team history. The Bengals' 2023 Week 9 victory over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football (66,965) ranks as the third-largest, and the following week's game vs. Houston (66,526) is the fourth-largest. The fifth-largest figure in team history is 66,399 for the Bengals' Wild Card Playoff win over Baltimore in January of 2023.

The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 21 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home contests from 2005-07.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor this season with the induction of former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the Ring of Honor during a halftime ceremony in the team's Week 3 game against Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esian, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.3 years ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals roster is DE Sam Hubbard, who is in his seventh season with the team ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 31 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is OT Amarius Mims, who is 22 (born Oct. 14, 2002) ... Mims and OT Orlando Brown Jr. are tied for both the heaviest player on the roster at 350 pounds and the tallest player on the roster at 6-8 ... The lightest player on the roster is CB Mike Hilton, who is listed at 184 pounds ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). He also currently is the NFL's all-time leader

in career completion percentage, maintaining a mark of 68.27 percent (minimum 1500 passing attempts). Through nine weeks this season, Burrow ranks tied for second in the NFL in TD passes (20), third in completions (212), third in passer rating (108.1), fifth in passing yards (2244) and fifth in completion percentage (70.2). He has thrown a career-high five TDs twice this season, once in Week 5 vs. Baltimore and again in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Burrow posted a passer rating

of 115.5 in the win over the Raiders, and completed 69.2 percent (27 of 39) of his passes for 251 yards. The previous Ravens game also saw him surpass former QB Jeff Blake for the fifth-most career passing yards in team history. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, Burrow capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a quarterback in team history, a 47-yarder to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time last year, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals (2021-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Browning has seen action in two games this season, taking late snaps to close out Week 8 vs. Philadelphia and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas.

Running backs: Second-year HB **Chase Brown** leads the Cincinnati this season in rushing attempts (105) and rushing yards (479), and his six total TDs since Week 4 (four rushing, two receiving) are tied for the third-most among all NFL running backs in that span. He is coming off perhaps his best performance as a pro in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, as he set career highs in carries (27), rushing yards (120) and scrimmage yards (137), while also catching a Joe Burrow TD pass on the Bengals' first offensive possession. He scored his first two career rushing TDs in Week 4 at Carolina, then the following week against Baltimore had his first scoring reception of the season. He sealed the Week 6 victory over the N.Y. Giants with a season-long 30-yard run to the end zone late in the fourth quarter, and two games later his four-yard rushing TD tied the score against Philadelphia in the second half. Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, Brown is averaging 4.6 yards per carry and has a team-best 14 runs of 10-plus yards. Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in the 2023 draft, Brown spent four games on the Reserve/Injured list midway through his rookie season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to post 322 yards from scrimmage over the final six contests. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in 2023, and now shares that responsibility with Brown as the Bengals approach the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, and caught 15 passes for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average), and he played seven offensive snaps in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas as an extra pass protector with Moss out of the lineup. **Kendall Milton** spent the first eight weeks of the season on Cincinnati's practice squad, then was signed to the active roster ahead of Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He made his NFL debut in the win over the Raiders, lining up for five offensive snaps. He originally was a college free agent signee of Philadelphia in May and spent training camp and preseason with the Eagles before being waived on final cuts. He played four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Georgia, rushing for 1839 yards and 23 TDs while helping the Bulldogs win back-to-back national titles in '21-22. Milton's uncle, Kevin Hardy, spent nine seasons in the NFL, including two with the Bengals (2003-04). Cincinnati's most recent addition to the roster is fourth-year HB **Khalil Herbert**, who was acquired in a trade with the Chicago Bears on Nov. 5. Herbert played in 48 regular-season games (12 starts) for the Bears and rushed for 1791 yards on 372 carries with nine TDs. He showcased his versatility with 45 catches for 291 yards, along with a 25.0-yard kickoff return average on 33 attempts. Herbert spent his first four collegiate seasons (2016-19) at the University of Kansas, before transferring to Virginia Tech for the '20 campaign. He was a second-team All-ACC selection as an all-purpose performer for the Hokies.

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, leads the NFL this season in receiving TDs (seven), while ranking second in receiving yards (717) and tied for third in receptions (55). He paced Cincinnati in all major receiving categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons, and he is one of eight players in league history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns. A constant downfield threat, Chase also has the NFL's most TD catches of 40 or more yards (15), 50 or more yards (11) and 60 or more yards (10) since he entered the league in 2021. He caught his seventh TD of the season to cap off the Bengals' opening drive of Week 8 vs.

Philadelphia, and finished with a team-high nine grabs for 54 yards. In the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, he became the fastest player in team history to reach 300 career receptions (51 games). Chase played in his 50th career regular-season game in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, and his 4210 career receiving yards following that matchup went in as the fifth-most in NFL history through any player's first 50 appearances. He also is one of just five players in the Super Bowl era to amass 4000-plus receiving yards and 30-plus receiving TDs within his first 50 contests. Higgins has missed four games this season due to injuries — Weeks 1-2 due to a hamstring and Weeks 8-9 with a quadricep — but when healthy has contributed 29 catches for 341 yards and three TDs. He had two scores in Week 5 vs. Baltimore, marking his fifth career multi-TD game, then in Week 7 at Cleveland turned a slant pass from Burrow into a 25-yard TD. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, Higgins has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then posted 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andre Iosivas** has developed a connection with QB Joe Burrow, particularly in the low red zone. He has eight career TDs on just 30 total receptions, and six of those have come on Burrow passes from inside the opponents' 10-yard line. He had two scoring grabs in Week 2 at Kansas City, then the following week had another on a fourth-and-goal play against Washington. He caught his fourth TD of the year in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, finding the end zone on a 10-yard pass from Burrow just before halftime. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. **Trenton Irwin** spent his first three seasons with the Bengals (2019-21) primarily as a practice squad player and game day inactive, but over the past two-plus years he has emerged as a dependable option for Cincinnati's quarterbacks. After totaling just three receptions in those first three seasons, he has 43 catches for 562 yards and five TDs since the start of the 2022 campaign, including a career-high 25 grabs for 316 yards in '23. Though listed as a backup on the depth chart last season, he started five games and showed an ability to line up at multiple WR positions. Irwin has three catches for 15 yards in five games played this season (two starts). Second-year pro **Charlie Jones** primarily contributes as a punt and kickoff returner, but he also has eight career catches for 69 yards as a reserve WR. Jones missed six games last season due to a thumb injury, but returned to play in each of the final eight contests. He spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Jones has played in eight games this season, but was inactive in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas with a groin injury. The Bengals added another downfield threat in the third round of April's draft when they selected **Jermaine Burton**. Burton played in 26 games at the University of Alabama from 2022-23, after spending his first two collegiate seasons ('20-21) at the University of Georgia. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while his 20.5 yards per catch led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally. Burton led the Bengals and ranked third leaguewide in preseason receiving yards with 157 on eight catches (19.6 average), with two TDs. His first NFL reception came in Week 2 at Kansas City, when he caught a 47-yard deep ball from Burrow on Cincinnati's first offensive play of the second half. Burrow and Burton connected on another big play in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia, a 41-yarder down the sideline in the second quarter.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 70 career games (42 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of last season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 88 career receptions for 663 yards and four TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample caught four passes for 14 yards in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, including a two-yard TD reception on a third-and-goal play to finish off the Bengals' opening drive of the second half. Cincinnati brought in a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when it signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last year. He is coming off perhaps his best day as a Bengal in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, as he caught five passes for a team-high 100 yards and his first two TDs of the season. His second TD, a 47-yarder to help seal the win in the fourth quarter, marked his second-longest career reception. It also was his first 100-yard receiving game since Week 6 of the 2021 season. Through nine games this season, Gesicki

leads the Bengals' TEs in receptions (30), receiving yards (353) and TDs (two). He played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City and posted seven catches for 91 yards, then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. He combined for just four catches in Weeks 4-7, then stepped up with seven grabs for 73 yards in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, he challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. Gesicki topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** played in his 50th career game in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and had two catches for 14 yards, including an 11-yarder on a fourth-down play on Cincinnati's first offensive possession. He began the 2023 campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster in November of last year and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in receptions (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played in 2023, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. He spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. In five games played this season, he has four grabs for 32 yards. The Bengals selected **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round of this year's draft. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He has been inactive for each of the first nine regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 45 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 2927 of a possible 2946 offensive snaps in that time (99.4 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who signed in 2023 and started 25 straight games to begin his Bengals career before missing the Week 9 contest against Las Vegas due to a knee/fibula injury. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with the Baltimore Ravens, then played two ('21-22) with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. Cappa is one of two Bengals linemen who have not been penalized this season, alongside Karras. **Cordell Volson** has started each of the Bengals' 45 games (including postseason) at LG since they took him in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. He has lined up for every offensive snap in that time, the only player on the team to do so. Though he has found his role in Cincinnati as the team's LG, he played at guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. Last season, Mims started six games on an offensive line that led the SEC in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.93). He was inactive for the Bengals' first two games this season due to a pectoral injury sustained in the preseason opener. Mims made his NFL debut in Week 3 against Washington, taking over for OT Trent Brown following

his first-quarter injury, and has started each of the last six games. G/OT **Cody Ford** started at LOT for the first time in his career in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, filling in for the injured Orlando Brown Jr. A former college teammate of Brown's at the University of Oklahoma, Ford is a sixth-year pro who has played in 75 career games with 35 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG, two as a third TE and one at LOT. He signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and played in all 17 games last season, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. Ford was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The team's final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft, C **Matt Lee** was taken in the seventh round (237th overall) after playing in 51 games during his college career. He spent the first four years of his career (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16). Lee has contributed primarily on special teams through nine games this season, but he also has lined up for 10 offensive snaps over the past three weeks. The most recent addition to the O-Line is OT/G **Andrew Stueber**, who was signed off Atlanta's practice squad on Oct. 8. Stueber made his Bengals debut in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia and has seen limited action on offense and special teams over the past two games. A seventh-round pick of New England in 2022, he spent his rookie season on the Reserve/Non-Football Injury list, then was on the Patriots' practice squad in '23. He played in 34 games with 22 starts (20 at ROT, two at RG) during a five-year career (2017-21) at the University of Michigan.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who currently leads the NFL with 11 sacks through nine games this season. He is coming off a career-high four sacks in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, which tied for the third-most in a game in team history and the most since former DE Antwan Odom in 2009. A 2021 free agency acquisition of the Bengals, Hendrickson has led the team in sacks and earned a Pro Bowl nod in each of his three full seasons in Cincinnati. He posted a career-high 17.5 sacks last year, which tied for second in the league and went in as the second-most in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 64.0 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — his final season with New Orleans — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (68.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (65.0). On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has 38.5 career sacks, the fourth-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons, and his 58 total tackles in 2023 led all Bengals D-linemen. He has 36 total tackles through nine games of this season, including a season-best nine stops in Week 5 vs. the Ravens. That effort included his first sack of the season, and then a safety when he stuffed RB Derrick Henry in the Ravens' end zone. Hubbard grabbed his first career INT in Week 7 at Cleveland on a tipped pass thrown by QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson, then recorded his second sack of the year when he forced a Thompson-Robinson fumble in Cleveland's backfield. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 46 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 13 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 13 passes at the line of scrimmage. Hill sustained a hamstring injury in Week 2 at Kansas City that caused him to miss the next two games, but he returned to action in Week 5 and has started each of the past five contests. He posted a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, and he also deflected a pass by QB Daniel Jones that led to LB Germaine Pratt's INT in the first quarter. He left the Week 9 game vs. Las Vegas and was declared out in the third quarter with a rib injury. Ninth-year veteran DT **Sheldon Rankins** has played in six games (all starts) in his first Bengals season, after joining the team as an unrestricted free agent during the spring. He missed Weeks 3-5 due to a hamstring injury, but when healthy has contributed 17 tackles with one sack. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, Rankins spent his first five seasons with the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). He provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 30.5 career sacks and 44 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in any season of his career. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, he has played in 39 career regular-season games and totaled 46 tackles with 4.5 sacks. Ossai was born in Nigeria and moved to the

United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins is coming off his first NFL sack in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, as he brought down QB Desmond Ridder for a four-yard loss in the fourth quarter. He also finished with a career-best five total tackles in the win over the Raiders. He missed the first two games of the season due to a thumb injury, then made his pro debut in Week 3 vs. Washington. Jenkins made a crucial play early in Week 4 at Carolina when he stuffed a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on the Panthers' game-opening drive. He was a team captain at Michigan and earned second-team All-America honors last season, while helping lead the Wolverines to a national championship. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, has recorded 11 tackles and a PD over the last five games, after spending the first four weeks of the season on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last season, tallying 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons (2020-22) at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinnley Jackson**, who also missed the first four contests of this year with a knee injury, made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore and has seen action on 92 defensive snaps over the past five games. He recorded three tackles in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Cincinnati's third-round pick in 2024 out of Texas A&M, Jackson totaled 15.5 TFLs and 7.5 sacks in 40 career games as an Aggie, and served as a captain in two seasons. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has been inactive for six games this season, but is coming off 13 defensive snaps and four special teams snaps played in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington.

Linebackers: A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Logan Wilson** has developed into one of the NFL's top linebackers and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. Wilson had his first two career fumble recoveries in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, and his 88 tackles this season rank third in the NFL. The team's starting LB tandem features Wilson and sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt**, who has set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons and has a knack for creating game-changing takeaways. Since the start of the 2021 season, he is one of two NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs since 2021, alongside Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 80 of 88 career regular-season games played, with a current streak of 70 consecutive starts (including postseason). His 81 total tackles through nine games this season rank ninth leaguewide, and he has contributed to three takeaways with a pair of fumble recoveries and an INT. Pratt was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career. Also wearing the captains patch for the first time this year is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 63 games with five starts for the Bengals. He serves primarily as a core special teamer, but also has 17 tackles with two TFLs this season as a rotational LB. He picked off Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City for his second career regular-season INT (first since 2020). He has lined up for a team-high 196 special teams snaps through nine contests and has four special teams tackles. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 35 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 36 career tackles and one PD in 48 games played. Among the most notable stories on Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27). He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of

Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for 195 special teams snaps through nine regular-season games. He also has three defensive tackles, with two solo stops coming in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzer with 11.5 career sacks. He has 32 total tackles in eight games played this season, missing Week 5 due to a knee injury. He notched five stops in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants and broke up a pass on a fourth-down play early in the second half, then followed up with five more tackles (one TFL) the next week at Cleveland. He is coming off a season-best eight stops with a TFL in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. In 2023, Hilton recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 30 of 31 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. He missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. He opened this season with six tackles (four solos) in Week 1 against New England, then grabbed his first INT of the year with a highlight-reel one-handed pick on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City. He has combined for 30 tackles and six PDs over the past five games, including a season-best nine stops in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia. **DJ Turner II** is in his second pro season, after a rookie campaign in which he played in all 17 games and started 12 of the final 13 contests. A second-round draft choice last year, he ran the fastest 40-yard dash time among all players at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. Turner has 24 tackles and four PDs this season, and has started each of the past four games. He helped secure the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants when he knocked down a fourth-down pass from the Bengals' 36-yard line late in the fourth quarter. Turner posted 50 stops and seven PDs as a rookie last season. The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice this year, **Josh Newton**, made the team out of training camp after recording nine tackles, two PDs and an INT in preseason. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of Newton after his name was called on the third day of the draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 68 tackles with 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to Texas Christian from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups and helped lead the team to the College Football Playoff National Championship game. Newton has lined up for 52 defensive snaps and 131 special teams snaps through nine games this season. Second-year pro **DJ Ivey** made his season debut in Week 7 at Cleveland, after spending the first six games on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury. He sustained the injury in Week 15 of the 2023 campaign against Minnesota, ending a promising rookie campaign in which he carved out a role as a special teams contributor and reserve defensive back. A 2023 seventh-round pick out of the University of Miami (Fla.), Ivey earned a roster spot coming out of his rookie training camp with the Bengals and played in eight games last season.

Safeties: Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 44 tackles through nine games this season and has lined up for 551 of the team's 622 defensive snaps. Bell grabbed his first INT of the season against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 32-yard return following the pick set up Cincinnati's first TD of the game. It marked his eighth career INT and his first since Week 2 of 2023. One of the headliners of Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who emerged as a ball-hawking safety in his final season with Baltimore. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 broke out with an AFC-leading seven INTs (second in NFL). He has 46 tackles through nine games in 2024, including 23 over the last four contests. Stone recorded his first INT as a Bengal in Week 7 at Cleveland, picking off QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson in the fourth quarter and returning it 49 yards. **Jordan Battle** is in his second pro season, after starting seven straight games at safety to close out his rookie year in 2023. He ranked fifth on the team in tackles last season with 69, while also contributing an INT, five PDs and two sacks. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, he was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Battle had a pick-six in the preseason finale against Indianapolis, and has played 77 defensive snaps and 157 special teams snaps through nine regular-season contests. He posted a

season-best five tackles along with a QB hit and a PD in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading eight special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, he led the team with eight special teams stops last year despite missing the final 10 games. Anderson missed his entire rookie season due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Daijahn Anthony** made the Bengals' roster out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 11 defensive snaps and 105 special teams snaps in eight games played this season (inactive for Week 8). In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

Special teams: Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** has quickly become one of the top kickers in the NFL and a fan-favorite in Cincinnati. He ranks third on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (82.7 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history and the fourth-most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. McPherson's 28-yard FG midway through the second quarter in Week 3 vs. Washington marked his 100th career FG attempt, and his 84 made FGs to that point were the third-most in team history through a kicker's first 100 tries. McPherson inked a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season.

Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 362 attempts in 44 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through nine games ranks third in the NFL in net punting average (44.6 net yards per punt; minimum 15 attempts) and fifth in gross average (51.2). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (min. four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. His 52.0 net yards per punt also was the second-highest average in a game in team history. He downed four punts inside opponents' 20-yard lines in each game of Weeks 5-7, becoming the first Bengals punter to do so in three straight contests. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors in Week 7, after returning the opening kickoff at Cleveland 100 yards for a TD. It marked the second time in team history that the Bengals scored a TD on the game's opening kick, and it was the longest KOR in the NFL this season. Jones earned the punt returner job early in his rookie season in 2023 and took command of that role in just his second game, when he returned a punt 81 yards for a TD against Baltimore. He has returned 14 punts this season for 99 yards, including a season-long 23-yarder against the Browns. Fifth-year WR **Trenton Irwin** had his first three punt returns of this season in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, totaling 26 yards. He has returned 16 punts in his career with a 9.7-yard return average. HBs **Chase Brown** and **Trayveon Williams** also have returned kickoffs this season. Brown is averaging 26.6 yards per return on seven attempts, with a long of 29 yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Williams served as the team's primary KOR over the past two-plus years and holds a career regular-season average of 22.5 yards on 33 returns.

New England Patriots 16, Cincinnati Bengals 10 Sunday, Sept. 8, 2024 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

The Bengals and Chiefs played to a one-score result for a sixth straight time since January 2022, as Kansas City K Harrison Butker kicked a 51-yard game-winning FG as time expired. The game featured six lead changes. Cincinnati held a two-point lead and forced the Chiefs into a fourth-and-16 with under a minute remaining, but a QB Patrick Mahomes downfield heave resulted in a defensive pass interference penalty to set up the kick. The Bengals' defense had three takeaways, including a pair of INTs, and allowed just 137 net passing yards. Offensively, Cincinnati scored points on five of its first six true possessions. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 23 of 36 passes for 258 yards and a 103.7 passer rating, as well as two TD passes to WR Andrei Iosivas. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Kansas City improved to 2-0.

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. Commanders rookie QB Jayden Daniels completed 91.3 percent of his passes (21 of 23), which set both an NFL rookie record and a Bengals opponent record for a single game (minimum 20 attempts). Bengals QB Joe Burrow finished with 324 passing yards and three TDs, including his 100th career TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase on the game's opening drive. Cincinnati fell to 0-3, while Washington improved to 2-1.
