GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 8 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air nationally on ESPN-TV and ABC-TV. In the Cincinnati market, the game will air on WCPO-TV (Channel 9). Broadcasters are Joe Buck (play-by-play), Troy Aikman (analyst), Lisa Salters (sideline reporter) and Russell Yurk (rules analyst).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

In addition, the game will air nationally on Westwood One Radio. Broadcasters are Ted Emrich (play-by-play) and Ryan Harris (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals aim to keep their playoff hopes alive when they travel to Pittsburgh for the regular-season finale on Saturday night.

Cincinnati has won each of its past four games to climb back to a .500 record this season, after sitting at 4-8 following a home loss to the Steelers on Dec. 1. The Bengals' path to an AFC Wild Card berth now consists of a win at Acrisure Stadium on Saturday, followed by Kansas City defeating Denver and the N.Y. Jets defeating Miami on Sunday afternoon.

Two of Cincinnati's victories during its four-game winning streak have come by a margin of one possession, with the most recent being a 30-24 result over Denver in an overtime thriller in Week 17. The Bengals' ability to close out tight games as of late has served as a contrast to the first three quarters of the season, as seven of their eight losses were one-score decisions. But according to head coach Zac Taylor, the adversity that came with those setbacks never affected his group's focus and preparation.

"We've known we've had a good football team all along," Taylor said. "Those games are disappointing that we came up short. It didn't change our process. It didn't change what our guys believed in. We didn't have to change everything we did. We still believed in what we were doing. Now we've won four in a row, and we've got to make it five in a row."

The finish to last Saturday's game against Denver tested the Bengals in all three phases as they staved off elimination. After QB Joe Burrow gave Cincinnati the lead on a one-yard sneak with 1:29 remaining in regulation, the Broncos drove down the field and tied it with a desperation heave to the end zone on fourth down. The Bengals' defense responded in the overtime period, forcing a three-and-out on Denver's first possession to put the ball back in Burrow's hands. Burrow completed three straight passes to move the offense deep into Broncos territory, but K Cade York's FG attempt to win the game hit the left upright and the back-and-forth affair continued.

Cincinnati's defense bowed up once again, forcing another punt that left 2:20 on the overtime clock for Burrow to operate. The NFL leader in nearly every passing category this season finished the night on his own terms, as he hit WR Tee Higgins in stride for a 31-yard gain to set up first-and-goal, then connected with Higgins again on the next play for the game-winning score.

Burrow's final stat line included 39 completions on 49 attempts (79.6 percent) for 412 yards and three TDs, along with the one rushing score. He enters Week 18 pacing all quarterbacks in completions (423), passing yards (4641) and TD passes (42), while his 109.3 passer rating ranks third leaguewide.

"I don't know that anybody can stand on the field and watch Joe Burrow and say he's not the best player in the world," Taylor said. "You can transfer that argument to Ja'Marr Chase as well, and you can argue those two to death. But

the clearest thing I can say is I would not trade Joe Burrow for any player in the universe."

Chase, who caught nine of Burrow's passes for 102 yards against Denver, has nearly re-written the Bengals' single-season receiving record book. He has notched career highs this season in receptions (117; team record), receiving yards (1612; team record) and receiving TDs (16; one shy of team record). Chase also leads the NFL in each of those categories, and has a chance to become the fifth player since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger to complete the receiving "Triple Crown."

The Bengals have come away victorious in two of their last three trips to Pittsburgh. Saturday night marks Cincinnati's fifth game this season that will be played on the road in prime-time (defined as games starting 7 p.m. ET or later). The only team to previously play five such road games in a season was the 1963 Oakland Raiders, when they competed in the American Football League.

A win against their AFC North Division rival this week would complete the Bengals' fourth consecutive regular season with a record above .500. Cincinnati also hopes to earn a third postseason berth in the last four years. Pittsburgh has dropped each of its last three contests, with the most recent being a 29-10 home loss to Kansas City on Christmas Day.

The series: The Steelers lead 71-39 overall (including 2-0 in postseason). The two postseason games both were Steelers wins in Wild Card round contests at Paycor Stadium (formerly named Paul Brown Stadium), after the 2005 and '15 seasons.

The Bengals have played more games against the Steelers (110) than any other foe. Cleveland is second in that category at 103, and Tennessee (formerly Houston Oilers) is third at 80.

The last meeting: A summary of the Bengals-Steelers meeting earlier this season on Dec. 1 at Paycor Stadium is on page 18 of this news release.

Records vs. Steelers: The following individual and team regular-season Bengals and Steelers entries are logged in Cincinnati's team record book:

- On Oct. 28, 1973 at Pittsburgh, Steelers S Mike Wagner became the first opponent to record three INTs in a game against the Bengals. Four players since have tied.
- On Nov. 10, 1974 at Cincinnati, QB Ken Anderson set the Bengals' game record for completion percentage (90.91), hitting 20 of 22 against the Steelers.
- On Nov. 29, 1992 at Cincinnati, the Steelers tied the record for most sacks against the Bengals in a game with 10, then tied the mark again on

Oct. 13, 1996 at Pittsburgh. The record originally was set by Denver on Oct. 19, 1969 at Cincinnati.

• On Oct. 16, 1994 at Cincinnati, the Bengals set a team record with eight sacks, all on QB Neil O'Donnell. That mark was tied on Dec. 9, 2001 vs. Jacksonville.

• On Oct. 15, 2000 at Pittsburgh, Steelers P Josh Miller tied for the most punts ever against the Bengals with 12.

• On Dec. 30, 2001 at Cincinnati, Jon Kitna had a Bengals-record 68 pass attempts in an overtime win over the Steelers. The 68 attempts also set a team record, which still stands.

• On Dec. 4, 2017 at Cincinnati, the Bengals set the dubious record of most penalty yardage incurred during a game at 173. That number shattered the previous mark of 134.

• On Sept. 26, 2021 at Pittsburgh, Steelers RB Najee Harris tied the mark for most receptions ever against the Bengals in a game with 14.

• On Sept. 11, 2022 at Cincinnati, Bengals K Evan McPherson kicked a 59-yard field goal vs. Pittsburgh, the longest field goal in team history.

Individually vs. Steelers: Here are cumulative regular-season offensive statistics for current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Steelers (ordered by total games played):

• TE Drew Sample: Nine games; Nine catches for 72 yards (8.0-yard average) and a TD.

• WR Tee Higgins: Seven games; 37 catches for 644 yards (17.4) and four TDs.

• HB Trayveon Williams: Seven games; Nine carries for 37 yards (4.1).

• QB Joe Burrow: Six games; 140-of-212 passing (66.0 percent) for 1577 yards, 14 TDs and nine INTs (92.4 rating); 18 rushes for 76 yards (4.2) and one TD.

• WR Ja'Marr Chase: Five games; 27 receptions for 400 yards (14.8) and four TDs.

• HB Chase Brown: Three games; 16 rushes for 86 yards (5.4) and one TD; Five receptions for 38 yards (7.6).

• HB Chris Evans (Reserve/Injured): Three games; Five rushes for 23 yards (4.6); Three receptions for 31 yards (10.3).

• TE Tanner Hudson: Three games; Nine receptions for 51 yards (5.7).

• WR Andrei Iosivas: Three games; Eight receptions for 87 yards (10.9) and one TD.

• QB Jake Browning: Two games; 47-of-68 passing for 562 yards, two TDs and four INTs (79.4 rating); Four rushes for nine yards (2.3).

• WR Charlie Jones: Two games; One reception for minus-1 yard (-1.0).

• TE Mike Gesicki: One game; Five receptions for 53 yards (10.6).

• HB Khalil Herbert: One game; One rush for 14 yards.

Bengals-Steelers connections: Bengals CB Mike Hilton played for the Steelers from 2017-20 ... Steelers defensive coordinator Teryl Austin served as the Bengals' defensive coordinator in 2018 ... Steelers DT Larry Ogunjobi played for the Bengals in 2021 ... Steelers G Max Scharping played for the Bengals from 2022-23 ... Bengals LS Cal Adomitis is a native of Pittsburgh and played at the University of Pittsburgh from 2017-21 ... Steelers QB Russell Wilson was born in Cincinnati on Nov. 29, 1988 ... Steelers head coach Mike Tomlin served as defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati from 1999-2000 ... Bengals LB Shaka Heyward is the cousin of Steelers DT Cameron Heyward and TE/FB Connor Heyward ... Bengals HB Khalil Herbert and Steelers QB Justin Fields were teammates on the Chicago Bears from 2021-23 ... Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear white jerseys, orange pants (black stripes) and white socks this week at Pittsburgh. It will be the second time Cincinnati features that combination, and the fifth time the team dons its orange pants.

The Bengals' orange pants were introduced to the rotation this season and made their debut in Week 1 vs. New England, in combination with orange jerseys and orange socks. Cincinnati then paired the orange pants with black jerseys and black socks both in Week 5 vs. Baltimore and Week 16 vs.

Cleveland, and sported what will be this week's combo (white, orange, white) in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. The helmet's most recent appearance was in Week 8 of this season against Philadelphia.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their uniform lineup in 2024.

Individual career records watch: As Cincinnati concludes the regular season, here is a look at movement on the Bengals' individual career records lists that has occurred in 2024, as well as potential upcoming movement:

• QB Joe Burrow has 2501 career passing attempts, the fifth-most in team history. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's all-time list. Burrow in Week 10 at Baltimore surpassed QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth.

• Burrow has 18,724 passing yards, the fifth-most in team history. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top

four spots. Burrow in Week 5 vs. Baltimore surpassed Blake (15,134) for fifth.

• Burrow has 26 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the second-most in team history behind Dalton (28). Burrow in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh surpassed Esiason (23).

• WR Ja'Marr Chase has 45 receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots. Chase in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh surpassed WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth.

• Chase in Week 17 vs. Denver recorded his 19th game with 100 or more receiving yards, which tied Pickens for the fourth-most in team history. Green (33), Johnson (31) and Curtis (20) hold the top three spots for most 100-yard receiving games. Chase previously was tied with WR Cris Collinsworth for fifth (18 games).

• DE Trey Hendrickson has 53.5 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 5.5 shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

Team records in reach: The Bengals enter Week 18 within striking distance of several team single-season records. Here is a look at potential upcoming movement on those lists:

• Cincinnati has scored 453 total points this season, seven shy of a team-record 460 points in the 2021 campaign.

• Cincinnati has scored 56 total TDs, three shy of a team-record 59 in 1988.

• Cincinnati has 606 passing attempts, 13 shy of a team-record 619 in 2019.

• Cincinnati has 4394 net passing yards, nine shy of a team-record 4403 in 2021.

• Cincinnati has 355 total first downs, six shy of a team-record 361 in 1981.

• Cincinnati has totaled 5900 offensive net yards, 590 shy of a team-record 6490 in 1986. The Bengals also are 245 shy of the second-highest mark in team history, which is 6145 net yards in 2021.

• Cincinnati has made 50 PATs, six shy of a team-record 56 in 1988.

The Bengals also already have set two single-season team records in 2024:

• Cincinnati has 423 pass completions, surpassing the previous team record of 420 in 2023.

• Cincinnati has 42 passing TDs, surpassing the previous team record of 36 in 2021.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL

QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Mike Tomlin was named the 16th head coach in Steelers history on Jan. 22, 2007. He became at the time the youngest coach (36 years, 323 days) in NFL history to win a Super Bowl when the Steelers defeated the Arizona Cardinals, 27-23, in Super Bowl XLIII on Feb. 1, 2009 (11 years later, Sean McVay established the current mark at 36 years, 10 days).

Tomlin reached the playoffs four times in his first five seasons and he is the only coach in Steelers history to win division titles each of his first two seasons. In his 17 years as head coach of the Steelers, Tomlin has led Pittsburgh to seven AFC North titles, most recently in 2020, and has guided the Steelers to the playoffs 11 times, including two trips to the Super Bowl (XLIII and XLV). From 2007-23, he led Pittsburgh to a 173-100-2 regular-season record — the best start for a head coach in franchise history.

Tomlin secured his 17th straight non-losing season with the Steelers in 2023, a streak dating back to his first season as the team's head coach in 2007. Tomlin is the only head coach in NFL history to begin a head-coaching tenure with at least 15 consecutive non-losing seasons.

Tomlin has led the Steelers to a .500-or-better record in each of his 17 seasons as head coach, the third-longest streak of .500-or-better seasons by a head coach in NFL history. He is one of two active NFL head coaches with over 170 wins and one of four active NFL head coaches to defeat at least 31 current NFL franchises.

In 2020, Tomlin's club won its seventh AFC North title. No other head coach has won the AFC North more than five times. In 2008, Tomlin directed the Steelers to a 12-4 record, winning his second-consecutive AFC North title. That season culminated with a Super Bowl triumph, making Tomlin one of only seven coaches in league history to win a Super Bowl within his first two seasons as an NFL head coach. In his first season, Tomlin guided the Steelers to a 10-6 record and their first AFC North title since 2004.

Tomlin was the Minnesota Vikings defensive coordinator in 2006 after spending the previous five seasons ('01-05) as defensive backs coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Tomlin coached one of the top defensive backfields in the NFL for the Buccaneers, culminating with its performance in Super Bowl XXXVII. The secondary recorded four interceptions, returning two for touchdowns to help Tampa Bay capture the franchise's first Super Bowl title.

Tomlin served two seasons as the defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati (1999-2000) before going to Tampa Bay. Prior to joining the Cincinnati staff, Tomlin had a short stint on the coaching staff at Tennessee-Martin and then spent two seasons at Arkansas State. Tomlin spent the 1996 season as a graduate assistant at Memphis. Tomlin began his coaching career in 1995 as wide receivers coach at Virginia Military Institute.

Tomlin was a three-year starter at wide receiver at William & Mary (1990-94) and finished his college career with 101 receptions for 2046 yards and a school-record 20 touchdown receptions. He was named a first-team All-Yankee Conference selection in 1994 after establishing a school record with a 20.2-yards-per catch average. He graduated in 1994 with a degree in sociology. He has no pro playing experience.

Tomlin was born in Hampton, Va., on March 15, 1972. He and his wife, Kiya, have two sons, Dino and Mason, and a daughter, Harlyn Quinn.

Taylor vs. Steelers: The Steelers lead, 7-4.

Taylor vs. Tomlin: Tomlin leads, 7-4.

Tomlin vs. Bengals: Tomlin leads 27-9 (that record includes a Wild Card Playoff victory after the 2015 season).

BENGALS NOTES

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt is serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers.

Top-ranked passing offense: The Bengals this season are averaging an NFL-best 274.6 net passing yards per game. They have recorded 300 or more passing yards six times, including in four of the last seven contests.

Cincinnati has finished a regular season with the league's best passing offense on one previous occasion, when it averaged 231.5 yards through the air in 1975. Bengals Ring of Honor QB Ken Anderson led the NFL that year in passing yards (3169) and passer rating (93.9).

The team record for passing yards per game is 265.0, set during the 2022 campaign. Cincinnati ranked fifth leaguewide in passing average that season, with QB Joe Burrow setting then-team records for attempts (606; since tied by Burrow), completions (414; since surpassed by Burrow) and TD passes (35; since surpassed by Burrow).

Offense shares the wealth vs. Broncos: In the Week 17 win over Denver, three different Bengals players recorded at least nine catches

— WR Tee Higgins (11), TE Mike Gesicki (10) and WR Ja'Marr Chase (nine). It marked the first game in team history in which three players had nine or more receptions.

The last NFL team to accomplish that feat was Carolina in Week 9 of the 2020 season, when RB Christian McCaffrey caught 10 passes while WRs Robbie Anderson and Curtis Samuel each brought in nine.

Higgins' 11 grabs against the Broncos were the second-most in any game of his career, one shy of his career-high 12 in Week 16 of the 2021 season against Baltimore. Gesicki's 10 catches matched his career high from Week 3 of 2021, when he played for Miami. Higgins and Gesicki also became the first Bengals duo to log at least 10 receptions apiece since Week 13 of 2004, when WRs T.J. Houshmandzadeh and Chad Johnson both had 10 in a road win over the Ravens.

Higgins finished the Week 17 contest with a game-high 131 receiving yards, while Chase posted 102. It marked the first game this season in which two Cincinnati players had 100 or more receiving yards. The last time two Bengals hit the century mark in the same contest was Week 10 of last season, when Chase (124) and WR Tyler Boyd (117) did it against Houston.

Dynamic duo re-writing season records: QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase each have set numerous Bengals single-season records during the 2024 campaign. Here is a look at which records already have been achieved, as well as potential upcoming movement on the team's single-season records lists:

- Burrow has thrown 606 passing attempts, which ties his own team record set in the 2022 season. He reached the mark on his final attempt of Week 17 vs. Denver.

- Burrow has completed 423 passes, surpassing his own team record of 414 in 2022. He set the record in the fourth quarter of Week 17 vs. Denver.

- Burrow has 42 TD passes, surpassing his own team record of 35 in 2022. He set the record in Week 15 at Tennessee.

- Burrow has 4641 passing yards, surpassing his own team record of 4611 in 2021. He set the record in the overtime period of Week 17 vs. Denver.

- Burrow has seven games with 300 or more passing yards, surpassing his own team record of six games in 2021. He set the record with a 412-yard game in Week 17 vs. Denver.

- Burrow has a passer rating of 109.8, which is on pace for the team record

entering Week 18. The current record is 108.3, set by Burrow in 2021.

• Burrow has completed 69.80 percent of his passes, which is on pace for the fourth-highest percentage in team history (minimum 14 attempts per games in season). The current record is 70.55, set by QB Ken Anderson in 1982.

• Chase has 117 receptions, surpassing the previous team record of 112 set by WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh in 2007. Chase set the record in the fourth quarter of Week 17 vs. Denver.

• Chase has 1612 receiving yards, surpassing his own team record of 1455 in 2021. He set the record in Week 16 vs. Cleveland.

• Chase has 16 receiving TDs, one shy of WR Carl Pickens' team-record 17 in 1995.

• Chase has five games with 100 or more receiving yards, one shy of WR A.J. Green's team-record six games in 2013.

Burrow's eight-game surge: QB Joe Burrow has passed for at least 250 yards and three TDs in each of his last eight games, the longest such streak in NFL history. The second-longest streak is six games, recorded by former New England QB Tom Brady during his 2007 MVP season.

Burrow's streak began in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, when he tied his career high with five TD passes and threw for 251 yards. He followed up four days later with a season-high 428 passing yards and four TDs on Thursday Night Football at Baltimore, then in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers amassed 356 yards through the air and three more scoring tosses.

In the Ravens and Chargers contests, Burrow also became the first QB in league history to record at least 50 passing attempts, 350 passing yards and three TD passes with zero INTs in consecutive games.

Burrow, who was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month for November, opened December with 309 passing yards and three TDs in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He led the Bengals to a Monday Night Football victory in Week 14 at Dallas with 369 yards and another three TDs, then posted a 271-yard, three-TD day in Week 15 at Tennessee. Burrow's third TD pass against the Titans was his 36th of the season, which surpassed his own previous single-season team record of 35 in 2022.

The former No. 1 overall draft pick logged 252 passing yards and three TDs in Week 16 vs. Cleveland, and also boasted his second-highest passer rating of the season (134.3). In the Week 17 thriller against Denver, Burrow finished with 412 passing yards and three TDs, including the game-winning scoring pass with 1:07 left in overtime.

Burrow is the fourth QB in NFL history with at least three TD passes in eight consecutive games, joining Brady (10 straight in 2007), and former Indianapolis QBs Peyton Manning (eight in '04) and Andrew Luck (eight in '18).

With his recent surge, Burrow now has 26 career games with three or more TD passes. That is the third-most such games in NFL history in a player's first five career seasons, trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer Dan Marino (33) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (28).

Burrow's career TD marks: QB Joe Burrow's game-winning TD pass in overtime of Week 17 vs. Denver was his 139th career passing score. That is the third-most TD passes in NFL history in a player's first five seasons, surpassing former Indianapolis QB Peyton Manning and Buffalo QB Josh Allen (138 each). The only QBs with more TD passes in their first five years are former Miami QB Dan Marino (168) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (151).

Burrow threw his 125th career TD pass in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Playing in his 64th regular-season game, he became the third-fastest QB in NFL history to reach that mark, trailing only Mahomes (50 games) and Marino (54).

Burrow also logged his 100th TD pass earlier this season, reaching that milestone on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington. He tied for the seventh-fastest QB in league history to pass for 100 TDs (55 games).

Single-season TD record: QB Joe Burrow's league-leading 42 TD passes in 2024 are a Bengals single-season record. He set the record with

his 36th TD pass of the season in Week 15 at Tennessee, which surpassed his own previous mark of 35 in the 2022 campaign.

Burrow also holds the third spot on Cincinnati's single-season TD list, as he passed for 34 during his 2021 sophomore campaign. He is one of five players in NFL history to record 30 or more TD passes in three of his first five seasons, alongside former Miami QB Dan Marino, Buffalo QB Josh Allen and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes.

Burrow is the 11th QB in NFL history to pass for 40 or more TDs in a season. His 42 TDs this year include a career-high five scoring passes on two occasions — Week 5 vs. Baltimore and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He became the first QB to throw five or more TD passes in multiple games in a season since 2021, when Mahomes and former Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady each had two such games. Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson matched Burrow in Week 15 with his second five-TD game of this season.

Burrow on the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.41, he is the all-time leader in the category, ahead of fellow 2020 draftee and current Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (68.09).

Burrow ranks fifth in the NFL this season in completion percentage (69.80; minimum 14 attempts per game), while leading the league in passing attempts (606) and completions (423). He has completed at least 70 percent of his passes in each of the last five games, marking the longest streak in his career. His previous long was a four-game streak from Weeks 6-9 of the 2022 season.

In the overtime period of Week 17 vs. Denver, Burrow surpassed 2500 career passing attempts. His 1710 completions at the time he reached that mark are the most in NFL history through any QB's first 2500 throws.

Burrow finished the win over the Broncos with 39 completions on 49 attempts (79.6 percent). It marked his 25th career game with a completion percentage of 70 or higher on at least 30 attempts, the most such games in a player's first five seasons in NFL history. The next closest are Tagovailoa and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21 games each).

In Week 9 against Las Vegas, Burrow recorded his 1500th career completion in what was his 61st regular-season game. That marked the second-fewest games in NFL history to reach 1500 completions, trailing only L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (57).

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; min. 14 att./game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, the second-highest rate in the league.

Joe masters the deep ball: QB Joe Burrow's 40-yard TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 14 at Dallas was his 28th scoring pass of 40 or more yards — the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020. It also tied Pro Football Hall of Famer Peyton Manning for the most such TD passes in a player's first five seasons among all QBs whose careers began after 1990.

Burrow additionally leads the NFL in TD passes of 50 or more yards (18) and 60 or more yards (14) since 2020. Of his league-high nine TD passes of 40-plus yards this season, seven have gone to WR Ja'Marr Chase. The duo connected on two long scoring passes in Week 10 at Baltimore — a 67-yarder early in the third quarter and a 70-yarder midway through the fourth. The 70-yard bomb tied for the third-longest TD pass of Burrow's career, behind an 82-yarder to Chase in Week 7 of the 2021 season and a 72-yarder to Chase in Week 17 of that year.

Burrow had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22 and two in '23.

No. 9 hits 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone.

Burrow's current career total of 18,724 passing yards rank as the seventh-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least three fewer games than every QB above him in that category. In Week 5 vs. Baltimore, he surpassed former Bengals QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for the fifth-most passing yards in team history.

Burrow holds the three highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4641 this season (leads NFL), 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) and 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Burrow is the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 4000 or more yards in three different seasons during his Cincinnati career. Former QBs Carson Palmer (2006-07) and Andy Dalton ('13, '16) each did it twice with the Bengals.

Burrow's 412-yard performance in Week 17 vs. Denver marked his seventh career game with 400 or more passing yards. That ties Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes for the most such games in the NFL since Burrow entered the league in 2020.

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is one of two NFL QBs with at least 1000 completions, 100 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100, alongside former L.A. Rams/current Detroit QB Jared Goff.

Burrow since 2021 ranks first leaguewide in completion percentage (69.0; minimum 500 attempts), second in passer rating (103.5), third in TD passes (126), fifth in passing yards (16,036), fifth in completions (1447) and fifth in yards per attempt (7.65).

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase leads the NFL this season in receptions (117), receiving yards (1612) and receiving TDs (16). Should he hold the lead in each of those categories through the final week of the regular season, he would become just the fifth player since the 1970 NFL/AFL merger to claim the receiving "Triple Crown." The last player to earn the elusive honor was L.A. Rams WR Cooper Kupp, who paced the league with 145 receptions, 1947 yards and 16 TDs in 2021.

Chase is the fifth player in NFL history to record at least 100 receptions, 1500 receiving yards and 15 receiving TDs in a season. The only players who previously accomplished that feat are Kupp (2021), former Minnesota WR Randy Moss ('03), former Indianapolis WR Marvin Harrison ('01), and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice (1995). Chase also is the first player ever with at least 80 catches, 1000 receiving yards and seven TDs in each of his first four career seasons.

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 87.36 receiving yards per game (61 regular-season games). That is the second-highest mark in NFL history, trailing only his former Louisiana State teammate and current Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (97.01).

Chase also has nine career games with at least 10 receptions, 100 receiving yards and one receiving TD. That is tied with former WR Chad Johnson for the most such stat lines in a career in Bengals history, and is one shy of former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (10) for the most in NFL history within a player's first four seasons.

Ja'Marr passes Housh: WR Ja'Marr Chase caught nine passes in the Week 17 win over Denver, boosting his receptions total this season to a league-leading 117. That set a Bengals single-season record, as he surpassed the previous team mark of 112 by WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh in 2007.

Should no one overtake Chase this week, he would become the first player in Bengals history to finish a season as the NFL's outright receptions leader. Houshmandzadeh is the only Cincinnati player to come close, as his 112 grabs in 2007 tied New England WR Wes Welker for the league lead.

Chase earned his fourth career AFC Offensive Player of the Week honor in

Week 14, when he totaled a season-high 14 receptions for 177 yards and two TDs in a win at Dallas. His 14 catches were the second-most in any game of his career, one shy of his Bengals single-game record 15 in Week 5 of last season at Arizona.

Chase enters Week 18 with 385 career receptions, the sixth-most in NFL history in a player's first four seasons. The next player he can catch is his former Louisiana State teammate and current Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson, whose 392 grabs in his first four years rank fifth all-time.

In Week 6 of this season at the N.Y. Giants, Chase recorded his 300th career reception in what was his 51st regular-season game. He is the fastest player in team history to reach that mark, four games ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (55), and is tied for the eighth-fastest in NFL history.

Chase breaks own yardage record: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 1612 receiving yards this season are the most in the NFL and the most in a single season in Bengals history. He eclipsed his own previous team record of 1455 receiving yards (2021 season) during the Week 16 win over Cleveland.

Chase's 1455 receiving yards in his 2021 rookie campaign were, at the time, the second-most by a rookie in NFL history (now third). He followed that up with 1046 yards in just 12 games played in 2022, then posted 1216 in '23. Chase is one of six players in NFL history to begin his career with four straight 1000-yard receiving seasons, alongside former Minnesota WR Randy Moss, former Cincinnati WR A.J. Green, Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans, former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas and Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson.

Chase surpassed 5000 career receiving yards in Week 14 of this season at Dallas. Playing in his 58th regular-season game, he tied Thomas for the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. The only players to reach the mark in fewer games are former San Diego Chargers WR Lance Alworth (52 games), Justin Jefferson (52), former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (54), and former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (56).

Chase has five games this season with at least 100 receiving yards, tied for the most in his career (2021, '23), and tied for the second-most in a season in Bengals history. The team record for most 100-yard receiving games is six, held by A.J. Green in 2013.

Uno finds the end zone: WR Ja'Marr Chase's career-high 16 receiving TDs this season are one shy of the Bengals single-season record (17), set by former WR Carl Pickens in 1995. He enters Week 18 four receiving TDs ahead of Washington WR Terry McLaurin and Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (12 each) for the league lead, and has an opportunity to become the first player in Bengals history to lead the NFL in that category.

Chase began his career with 13 receiving TDs in 2021, which tied for the second-most by a rookie in NFL history, then followed up with nine in '22 and seven in '23. His 45 career receiving TDs are tied with former Dallas receiver Bob Hayes for the third-most in league history in a player's first four seasons. Only Pro Football Hall of Famers Randy Moss (53) and Jerry Rice (49) caught more TDs in their first four years.

Chase also has 11 career games with multiple TD receptions, which are tied with Moss and former Green Bay WR Antonio Freeman for the third-most by a player in his first four seasons in the Super Bowl era. The only players with more such games in their first four years are Moss (13) and former New England TE Rob Gronkowski (12).

Of Chase's 16 TDs this season, eight came during a four-game stretch from Weeks 10-14. It marked the most receiving TDs in a span of four games in Bengals history, and the most by any NFL player since former Kansas City WR Tyreek Hill also had eight from Weeks 8-12 of the 2020 campaign.

Chase caught his 40th career receiving TD in Week 11 at the Chargers. Playing in his 56th regular-season game, he became the fastest player in Bengals history and eighth-fastest in NFL history to reach that milestone.

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase has 12 career receiving TDs of 60 or more yards, five more than any other player since he entered the league in 2021 (regular season). It also is the most in a career in Bengals history, ahead of former WR Isaac Curtis (10), and the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 25.

Chase additionally has the NFL's most TD catches of 50-plus yards (13) and 40-plus yards (18) since 2021. His most recent 40-yarder was a catch-and-run to the end zone late in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas, which proved to be the game winner in a 27-20 result.

In Week 10 at Baltimore, Chase scored TDs of 67 and 70 yards, becoming the first NFL player this season with two scores of 65-plus yards in a game.

Earlier this season, Chase had a 41-yard TD grab in Week 3 vs. Washington, a 63-yard score in Week 4 at Carolina, and a 41- and 70-yarder in

Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He became the first NFL player to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games since former Dallas WR Terrell Owens in 2007.

Tee time: WR Tee Higgins is coming off a season-high 11 receptions for 131 yards and three TDs in Week 17 vs. Denver. His most significant catch was his last of the evening, as he secured the game-winning TD pass from QB Joe Burrow with 1:07 left in the overtime period to give the Bengals their fourth straight victory.

The win over the Broncos was Higgins' first career game with three touchdown catches. It also was his 14th career outing with 100 or more receiving yards. He now has a career-high 10 receiving TDs this season, tied for the fifth-most in the NFL.

Higgins has been inactive for five games this season due to injuries (Weeks 1-2, Weeks 8-10), but in his 11 games played he has proven to be one of the NFL's most productive receivers. He has seven receiving TDs since returning to the lineup in Week 11, tied for the most in the NFL during that stretch even with Cincinnati having a Week 12 bye. Playing at full health from Weeks 3-7, he ranked seventh leaguewide in receptions (29) and 10th in receiving yards (341).

In Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers, Higgins' first action following a three-game hiatus, he caught nine passes for a season-high 148 yards and a TD. His scoring catch was a 42-yarder on a fourth-down play late in the third quarter, which marked his longest reception since Week 16 of last season.

Higgins followed up his showing in Los Angeles with five grabs for 69 yards and a TD in Week 13 against Pittsburgh. He finished the Steelers contest with 300 career receptions, tying former WR Tyler Boyd for the fourth-fastest player in team history to reach that total (65 games).

A native of Oak Ridge, Tenn., Higgins returned to his home state in Week 15 against the Titans and brought in five catches for 88 yards, including a 38-yard TD in the second quarter. He has eight receiving TDs over his last eight games played, the most in any eight-game stretch of his career.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 20 leaguewide in receiving yards (19th; 4542) and receiving TDs (T-14th; 34). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Holiday Higgins: WR Tee Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as six of his 14 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (16), tied for sixth in receiving yards (1597), and 11th in total receptions (109) during the

calendar's final month.

Higgins' single-game career high both for receptions (12) and receiving yards (194) came on Dec. 26, 2021, in a home win over Baltimore. He had two TDs that day, the first of which was set up by a 52-yard Higgins catch earlier in the drive. Previously in that same month, he caught nine passes for 138 yards and a TD on Dec. 5, 2021 against the L.A. Chargers.

Higgins' top statistical performance of last season occurred on Dec. 23, 2023 at Pittsburgh, when he hauled in five catches for 140 yards and a TD. His 28.0 yards per reception were the second-most in any game of his career, and included a career-long 80-yard TD in the third quarter.

Higgins is coming off perhaps his best performance of the 2024 campaign in Week 17 vs. Denver on Dec. 28, as he logged season highs in receptions (11) and TDs (three), while posting his second-highest yardage total of the year (131).

Higgins' notable production late in the year also has carried beyond December, as he ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457). He has two 100-yard receiving performances in the postseason, with 103 in the AFC Championship at Kansas City following the 2021 season and 100 two weeks later in Super Bowl LVI.

Brown does it all: Since taking over as the Bengals' full-time starting running back in Week 9, HB Chase Brown is one of two NFL players with at least 600 rushing yards and 250 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs. Brown ranks fourth among all running backs in total yards from scrimmage during that span (930), trailing only Philadelphia RB Saquon Barkley (1411), Gibbs (1014) and Baltimore RB Derrick Henry (959).

Brown logged 100 or more scrimmage yards in five consecutive games from Weeks 11-16, becoming the first Cincinnati running back to do so since HB BenJarvus Green-Ellis in 2012 (Weeks 11-15). Brown nearly made it six straight in Week 17 vs. Denver, as he had 91 scrimmage yards before suffering an ankle injury late in the fourth quarter that kept him out of action during the overtime period.

Brown's season total through 16 games played is 1350 scrimmage yards, which consist of a team-leading 990 rushing yards on 229 carries and 360 receiving yards on 54 catches. He has 11 total TDs this year (seven rushing, four receiving), after scoring just one in his 2023 rookie campaign. He scored a rushing and receiving TD in the same game for the first time in his career in Week 15 at Tennessee, as he caught a six-yard scoring pass from QB Joe Burrow in the first quarter then later found the end zone on a five-yard run late in the fourth.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson's 14 sacks this season are tied with Cleveland DE Myles Garrett for the NFL lead through 17 weeks of regular-season play. With this year's tally following up his career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023, Hendrickson is the first Bengals player to record double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81.

Since signing with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, Hendrickson has 53.5 sacks, tied with San Francisco DL Nick Bosa for the third-most in the NFL in that span behind Garrett (60.0) and Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (58.5). It also is 5.5 shy of former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for the fifth-most sacks in a player's Bengals career.

Hendrickson has led Cincinnati in sacks and been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his three full seasons with the team (2021-23). He logged 14 sacks in his debut Bengals season in 2021, which ranked fifth in the NFL, then followed up with eight more in '22. His career-high 17.5 sacks last year tied for second in the NFL and ranked second in Bengals single-season history, trailing only DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Hendrickson also has 11 forced fumbles since the start of the 2021 campaign, tied with L.A. Chargers OLB Joey Bosa for the second-most in the NFL in that span. He has forced two fumbles this season, as he strip-sacked Raiders QB Desmond Ridder in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and knocked the ball free from Titans QB Will Levis on a designed quarterback run in Week 15 at Tennessee.

A Florida Atlantic University product, Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with New Orleans, but started just three games over his first three years and totaled 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL.

Hendrickson's production for the Bengals was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season.

Hendrickson wrecks the Raiders: DE Trey Hendrickson earned his second career AFC Defensive Player of the Week honor in Week 9, when he recorded a career-high four sacks in the win over Las Vegas. It marked the second-most sacks in any NFL game this season behind Detroit DL Aidan Hutchinson's 4.5 in Week 2 against Tampa Bay.

Hendrickson became the fourth player in Bengals history to record four or more sacks in a game, and the first since former DE Antwan Odom had five on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay. Odom's total is tied for the team single-game record with former DE/DT Eddie Edwards, who notched five sacks on Dec. 21, 1980 against Cleveland.

Three of Hendrickson's four sacks against the Raiders came during the fourth quarter, including a strip-sack that led to a recovery by Bengals LB Logan Wilson. The play marked Hendrickson's 10th forced fumble since joining the Bengals during the 2021 offseason.

Hendrickson's previous single-game high for sacks was 2.5, which he recorded twice — in Week 3 of the 2022 season at the N.Y. Jets, and in Week 5 of '23 at Arizona.

Pratt stuffs the stat sheet: LB Germaine Pratt's 137 tackles this season are a career high, lead the Bengals and rank tied for eighth in the NFL. His previous high was 118, recorded last season.

Pratt also has contributed to four takeaways this season, beginning with a forced fumble and recovery in Week 2 at Kansas City that led to a Bengals FG drive. He scooped up another loose ball in overtime of Week 5 vs. Baltimore to set up Cincinnati's offense inside Ravens territory, then in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants grabbed his first INT of the year to end a drive that reached the Bengals' 14-yard line.

Pratt's most recent takeaway occurred late in the fourth quarter of Week 17 vs. Denver, when he picked off QB Bo Nix near midfield in a tie game. The INT led to a go-ahead TD drive for the Bengals

Pratt has had double-digit tackles in 14 career games, including three this season. He notched a career-high 16 stops in the Week 2 contest against the Chiefs, then had 13 in both Week 7 at Cleveland and Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh.

Since the start of the 2021 season, Pratt is one of three players leaguewide with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs, alongside Dallas CB Jourdan Lewis and Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr.

York ties team record: K Cade York drilled a 59-yard FG as the first half clock expired in Week 16 vs. Cleveland, extending Cincinnati's lead to 17-0 at the break. It tied for the longest made FG in Bengals history, matching Evan McPherson's 59-yarder in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh.

York's kick was a career long and tied for the fourth-longest made FG in the NFL this season. His previous long was a 58-yarder, which he converted in his NFL debut on Sept. 11, 2022 while playing for the Browns.

York spent his entire rookie season as Cleveland's kicker, going 24 of 32 on FG attempts and 35 of 37 on PATs. He then spent the 2023 campaign on the Browns' practice squad, and was acquired by Washington via trade during this past training camp. After being waived by the Commanders in September and not kicking for an NFL team for most of the season, he was added to Cincinnati's practice squad on Dec. 4. He has kicked in four games for the Bengals and knocked through five of seven FGs, along with 13 of 14 PATs.

York was teammates with Bengals QB Joe Burrow and WR Ja'Marr Chase at Louisiana State in 2019. He led the FBS that season in points scored (152)

and PATs (89), helping the Tigers to a 15-0 record and the national championship.

Rehkwow's record debut: Rookie P Ryan Rehkwow kicked off his career with four punts for 258 yards in Week 1 vs. New England. His gross average of 64.5 yards set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards (189 on three punts) on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkwow's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers).

Through 17 weeks of regular-season play, Rehkwow has amassed 50 punts for 2457 yards, with 24 downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line compared to five touchbacks. His 42.9 net yards per punt ranks sixth in the NFL, while his 49.1 gross average ranks ninth.

In Weeks 5-7, Rehkwow became the first punter in Bengals history to have four punts downed inside the 20-yard line in three consecutive games. He totaled season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

Following a four-year career (2020-23) at Brigham Young University that saw him average 47.4 yards on 176 punts, Rehkwow signed with Kansas City as a college free agent this past May. He was waived by the Chiefs in June, then joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 24 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That ties the longest streak in team history, matching a previous span of 24 straight home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 14 highest-attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. The Bengals beat Miami on Thursday Night Football in Week 4 of the 2022 season in front of a paid attendance of 67,260 at Paycor Stadium, marking the largest announced crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history. That figure surpassed the previous record of 66,277 set in the 2021 Wild Card Playoff win over Las Vegas (played in January '22).

Cincinnati's "White Bengal" game against Philadelphia in Week 8 of this season had an announced attendance figure of 67,239, which now stands as the second-largest in team history. The announced figure of 66,546 in the Bengals' most recent game, a 30-24 overtime victory against Denver, ranks fourth all-time.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77).

It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor this season in former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie. They became the ninth and 10th members of the ROH during a ceremony in the Week 3 game vs. Washington.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Established in 2021, the Bengals Ring of Honor recognizes former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members.

Bengals pick up 400th W: Cincinnati's 37-27 win at Tennessee in Week 15 marked the 400th regular-season victory in franchise history. The Bengals now are at 402 all-time wins, with 242 coming in games played at home and 160 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly Paul Brown Stadium).

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** has compiled perhaps the best individual season by a QB in Bengals history in 2024. Through 16 games, the Athens, Ohio, native has set single-season team records for completions (423), passing yards (4641) and TD passes (42), while tying his own team record for passing attempts (606, tied with 2022). He also leads the NFL in each of those categories, ranks third leaguewide in passer rating (109.8) and ranks fifth in completion percentage (69.8; minimum 14 attempts per game). He has passed for at least 250 yards and three TDs in each of his last eight games, the longest streak in NFL history. In Week 17 vs. Denver, Burrow completed 39 of 49 passes for 412 yards and three TDs, including the game-winning scoring pass with 1:07 remaining in overtime. He has moved into fifth place on the Bengals' career records lists in passing attempts and yards this season, and his 139 career TD passes are the third-most in NFL history in a player's first five years. He also is the first QB in team history to record 4000 passing yards in three seasons. In Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants, he capped off the Bengals' opening drive with the longest rushing TD by a QB in team history, a 47-yarder to give Cincinnati an early lead. Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who last season stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following a Burrow wrist injury in November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 record to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time in 2023, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). Browning has seen action in three games this season, taking late snaps to close out Week 8 vs. Philadelphia, Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and Week 16 vs. Cleveland.

Running backs: Second-year HB **Chase Brown** has totaled 1350 yards from scrimmage this season, as he leads the Bengals with 990 rushing yards on 229 attempts and has contributed 360 receiving yards on 54 catches. Each of his 11 total TDs on the year (seven rushing, four receiving) have come since Week 4, which are tied for the sixth-most among all NFL running backs in that span. Brown held a streak of five consecutive games with at least 100 scrimmage yards from Weeks 11-16, before exiting the Week 17 contest against Denver due to an ankle injury when he had 91 yards. Recognized for his quick burst out of the backfield, he is averaging 4.3 yards per carry and has a team-best 23 runs of 10 or more yards. He enjoyed perhaps his best day as a pro in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, when he set career highs in rushes (27), rushing yards (120) and scrimmage yards (137). Brown entered the league as Cincinnati's fifth-round draft pick in 2023 and had 335 total yards (179 rushing, 156 receiving) in 12 games played as a rookie last season. The Bengals acquired HB **Khalil**

Herbert in a trade with Chicago on Nov. 5. A fourth-year pro, Herbert played in 48 regular-season games (12 starts) for the Bears and amassed 1791 rushing yards. He also returned 33 kickoffs with a 25.0-yard average for Chicago. He has rushed for 45 yards on eight carries in seven games played for Cincinnati, highlighted by a 13-yard run in overtime of Week 17 vs. Denver that helped set up the Bengals' game-winning TD. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in the latter half of 2022 and all of '23. Offensively, he has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, and caught 15 passes for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average), and he played seven offensive snaps in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas as an extra pass protector.

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Tee Higgins**. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, leads the NFL this season in receptions (117), receiving yards (1612) and receiving TDs (16). Each of those marks are a career high, and both his catch total and receiving yardage are a Bengals single-season record. He was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three pro seasons (2021-23), and he is one of six players in league history to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns. A constant downfield threat, Chase also has the NFL's most TD catches of 40 or more yards (18), 50 or more yards (13) and 60 or more yards (12) since he entered the league in 2021. He caught nine passes for 102 yards in Week 17 vs. Denver, and in the process surpassed former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh (112) for the most receptions in a season by a Bengals player. Earlier this season, he tied former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas for the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach 5000 career receiving yards (58 games). Chase has five 100-yard receiving games this season, highlighted by a 264-yard, three-TD performance in Week 10 at Baltimore. Higgins ranks second on the team this season in catches (69), receiving yards (858) and receiving TDs (10). He has missed five games due to injuries, but has played in the past six contests and provides Burrow with a secondary threat on the outside. He made his return from a three-game absence in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers and posted a season-high 148 yards and a TD on nine receptions. Higgins is coming off his first career three-TD performance in Week 17 vs. Denver, which was capped by the game-winning TD on a three-yard pass from Burrow in overtime. He finished the Broncos game with a season-high 11 receptions for 131 yards. Higgins' 10 receiving TDs this season are a career high and are tied for the fifth-most in the NFL. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, he has earned a reputation for being able to high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He logged back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then posted 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and in June he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andrei Iosivas** has contributed key plays in all areas of the field early in his career, but his most notable work comes in the low red zone.

Each of his 10 career receiving TDs have come on passes from inside the opponent's 10-yard line. He has six scoring catches this season, with the most recent coming in Week 16 vs. Cleveland on a six-yard pass from Burrow. Iosivas posted a career-high 59 receiving yards on three catches in Week 17 vs. Denver, highlighted by a 16-yarder that kickstarted the game-winning drive in overtime. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and garnered All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. Fellow 2023 draftee **Charlie Jones** primarily has contributed as a punt and kickoff returner, but he also has eight career receptions for 69 yards as a reserve WR. He has missed the past eight games due to a groin injury, after suiting up for each of the first eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals selected **Jermaine Burton** in the third round of the 2024 draft, adding a proven downfield threat at the college level. Burton has played in 14 games as a rookie this season and made his first career start in Week 10 at Baltimore. His first two career receptions both went for over 40 yards — a 47-yarder in Week 2 at Kansas City and a 41-yarder in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia. He also came through with a clutch grab to convert a third down in the road game against the Ravens. He spent the first two seasons of his collegiate career (2020-21) at the University of Georgia, then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two years. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while pacing the Southeastern Conference in yards per reception (20.5). Burton led the NFL this past preseason with 157 receiving yards. Cincinnati added depth to the receiver room when it acquired **Isaiah Williams** on waivers from Detroit on Nov. 8. A rookie out of the University of Illinois, Williams originally signed with the Lions as a college free agent in May and played in two games earlier this season, totaling two catches for six yards. He primarily has been utilized as a punt returner through five games played for the Bengals. He earned first-team All-Big 10 honors last season at the University of Illinois, when he led the conference during the regular season with 82 receptions and ranked second with 1055 receiving yards.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 77 career games (49 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of last season, and has started 22 of his last 25 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 96 career receptions for 716 yards and four TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23. Sample caught four passes for 14 yards in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, including his first TD of the season on a two-yard reception in the second half. The Bengals added a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last year. He has played in all 16 games in his debut Bengals season (three starts), and leads the team's tight ends in receptions (57), receiving yards (597) and receiving TDs (two). His 57 catches are the most by a Bengals TE since 2014 (Jermaine Gresham, 62), while his 597 yards are the most since '15 (Tyler Eifert, 615). Gesicki tied his career high with 10 catches for 86 yards in Week 17 vs. Denver. He hit several career milestones earlier this season, as he played in his 100th regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City, reached 3000 receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington and recorded his 300th reception in Week 14 at Dallas. His top statistical performance came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, when he caught five passes for 100 yards and his first two TDs as a Bengal. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, Gesicki challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. He topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** scored his first TD of the season in Week 10 at Baltimore, bringing in a three-yard pass to give Cincinnati the lead just before halftime. He tied his career high with six receptions against the Ravens, and his 42 yards were the fifth-most in a game in his career. He played in his 50th career game in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and had two catches for 14 yards, including an 11-yarder to convert a fourth down. He has missed the past two games due to a knee injury. Hudson began the 2023 campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster in November of last year and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in receptions (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played in 2023, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco

49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. Rookie **Cam Grandy** spent the first 10 weeks of the regular season on the Bengals' practice squad, then was signed to the active roster on Nov. 15. He made his NFL debut as a practice squad elevation in Week 10 at Baltimore and recorded his first career reception (no gain). He has started each of the last five games and caught three passes for 19 yards, while lining up for a combined 61 offensive snaps. A product of Illinois State University, Grandy led all Missouri Valley Football Conference TEs with 63 catches for 612 yards and three TDs in 2023. He spent his first five collegiate seasons at Missouri Western State University. The Bengals selected **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round of this year's draft. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He was inactive for the first 14 games of this season, then made his NFL debut in Week 16 vs. Cleveland. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is **C Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 52 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 3439 of a possible 3458 offensive snaps in that time (99.5 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. This season's Man of the Year nominee for the Bengals is OT **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who in addition to serving as the team's left tackle has partnered with Breakthrough T1D, the leading global type 1 diabetes research organization. Brown was perhaps the biggest free agent splash in recent years for Cincinnati, as he signed with the Bengals in 2023 following four straight Pro Bowl selections from '19-22. He spent his first three pro seasons (2018-20) with Baltimore, then played two years ('21-22) with Kansas City. He has missed six contests this season (Weeks 9-11, Weeks 14-16) due to knee and fibula injuries, but made his return in Week 17 vs. Denver and lined up for all 90 offensive snaps. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 16 at Cleveland. He joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period and has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. Cappa suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to injury. G/OT **Cody Ford** has started seven games this season (five at LOT, two at LG). A sixth-year pro out of the University of Oklahoma, he has played in 81 career games with 41 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, 10 at LG, two as a third TE and five at LOT. Ford signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and played in all 17 games last season, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He was inactive for Cincinnati's first two regular-season games due to a pectoral injury sustained during preseason, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 and has started each of the past 13 contests. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. **Cordell Volson** has started 50 out of 52 possible games (including postseason) at LG to begin his Bengals career. A 2022 fourth-round pick of Cincinnati, he has lined up for every offensive snap in games that he started. He has settled in at LG as a pro, after playing guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. OT **Devin Cochran** made his first career start in Week 15 at Tennessee, lining up at LOT for all 69 offensive snaps. He has played a combined 82 offensive snaps in the last two games, filling in for an

injured Mims at ROT. Cochran has played in eight games overall this season, contributing primarily on special teams prior to his recent offensive role. He spent the first 12 weeks on Cincinnati's practice squad, then was signed to the active roster in late November. He originally joined the Bengals' practice squad in 2022 and missed the entire '23 campaign due to a knee injury. The Bengals' final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft was seventh-round C **Matt Lee**, who played in 51 games over a five-year collegiate career at the University of Central Florida (2019-22) and the University of Miami (Fla.; '23). He started his first career game in Week 16 vs. Cleveland, as he lined up as a tackle-eligible lineman on the Bengals' first offensive snap. Lee primarily has contributed on special teams during his rookie campaign, but he also has seen action on 27 offensive snaps over the past 10 contests. OT **Andrew Stueber** has played in seven games for the Bengals this season after being signed off Atlanta's practice squad on Oct. 8. A seventh-round pick out of New England in 2022, he spent his rookie season on the Reserve/Non-Football injury list, then was on the Patriots' practice squad in '23. He played in 34 games with 22 starts (20 at ROT, two at RG) during a five-year career (2017-21) at the University of Michigan.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who is tied for the NFL lead with 14.0 sacks this season. A career-best four of his sacks came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, which also tied for the third-most in a game in team history. A 2021 free agency acquisition of the Bengals, Hendrickson led the team in sacks and earned a Pro Bowl nod in each of his three full seasons in Cincinnati. He posted a career-high 17.5 sacks last year, which tied for second in the league and went in as the second-most in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 67.0 sacks since the start of the 2020 campaign — his final season with New Orleans — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (73.5) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (72.0). He also has 14 career forced fumbles (two this season), with the most recent coming in Week 15 at Tennessee. Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard** started the first 14 games of this season as the team's LDE, before suffering a knee injury in the Titans contest that has kept him out of the lineup for the past two contests. Hubbard was a third-round pick of his hometown Bengals in 2018 and now is the longest-tenured player on the active roster (seventh season). He has 38.5 career sacks, and his 41 tackles this season are tied for the third-most among Cincinnati's defensive linemen. He grabbed his first career INT in the Week 7 win at Cleveland and played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 10 at Baltimore. Hubbard entered the Week 15 game at Tennessee as an extra TE and caught a two-yard TD pass from Burrow, marking the first receiving score by a defensive player in Bengals history. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor during his Bengals tenure. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 53 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 16 sacks as a Bengal, while also batting down/tipping 13 passes at the line of scrimmage. He sustained a hamstring injury in Week 2 at Kansas City that caused him to miss the next two games, but he returned to action in Week 5 and has started each of the past 12 contests. Hill posted a season-high seven tackles and two PDs against his former team in Week 6 at the N.Y. Giants. He tallied a sack in three consecutive games from Weeks 13-15, most recently dropping Titans QB Will Levis for a seven-yard loss. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. He ranks second on the team this season with a career-high 4.5 sacks, and his 45 total tackles are the second-most among Cincinnati's D-linemen. He notched a season-best eight tackles with a half-sack in Week 17 vs. Denver. Each of his 4.5 sacks have come since Week 11. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, Ossai has played in 46 career regular-season games and totaled 72 tackles with 9.0 sacks. He was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins sacked Thompson-Robinson twice in the Week 16 game against Cleveland, becoming the first Bengals rookie with multiple sacks in a game since Hubbard in 2018. Jenkins' first career sack came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He missed the first two games of this season due to a thumb injury, but has played in each of the last 15 contests and has 29 total tackles. He was a team captain at Michigan and earned second-team All-America honors last season, while helping lead the Wolverines to a national championship. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft

pick in 2023, has recorded 20 tackles and a PD in 12 games played this season, after spending the first four weeks on the Reserved/Injured list with a knee injury. He played in all 17 games as a rookie last year, totaling 20 tackles and three sacks. Murphy racked up 17.5 sacks and 37 TFLs in three seasons (2020-22) at Clemson University. Rookie DT **McKinnley Jackson** missed the first four contests of this season with a knee injury, then made his NFL debut in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He recorded his first career FF in Week 15 at Tennessee, knocking the ball loose from RB Tony Pollard in the third quarter, then tallied his first career sack in the Week 16 win over Cleveland. He made his first start in Week 14 at Dallas, and in 12 total games played he has 12 tackles on 225 defensive snaps. Jackson played in 40 career games and was a team captain at Texas A&M, before being selected by Cincinnati in the third round of this year's draft. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He has played in 12 games this season, recording 14 tackles on 238 defensive snaps played. Tufele posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. Cincinnati took DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft. He has seen action in eight games as a rookie and recorded his first career sack in Week 17 vs. Denver, dropping QB Bo Nix for a six-yard loss in the second quarter. Johnson logged 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at the University of Mississippi to garner All-SEC Honorable Mention. The Bengals signed DE **Isaiah Thomas** off the practice squad to the active roster on Dec. 23. Thomas, a second-year player out of the University of Oklahoma, spent the first six games of this season on Cincinnati's practice squad before signing to Detroit's active roster in October. He played in two games for the Lions, totaling three tackles, then was released from their practice squad on Dec. 17. He signed back to the Bengals' practice squad the following day, and was elevated to the active roster for the team's Week 16 game against Cleveland (did not play). Thomas originally was a seventh-round draft pick of the Browns in 2022 and has played in 12 career games.

Linebackers: Sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt** has set a career high in tackles in each season from 2021-23, with his team-leading 137 stops this year currently ranking tied for eighth in the NFL. He has a knack for creating game-changing takeaways, and has contributed to four of them this year with a pair of fumble recoveries and two INTs. Pratt's most recent takeaway came in Week 17 vs. Denver, when he picked off QB Bo Nix with just over two minutes remaining in the fourth quarter to set up a go-ahead TD drive. Since the start of the 2021 season, he is one of three NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and five FRs alongside Dallas CB Jourdan Lewis and Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. Pratt has started 87 of 95 career regular-season games played, with a current streak of 77 consecutive starts (including postseason). He was voted a team captain this season for the first time in his career. Also wearing a captain's patch for the first time this year is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 70 games with 10 starts for the Bengals. His primary role historically has been on special teams, but he has started each of the last five contests at LB with Logan Wilson on Reserve/Injured. Davis-Gaither has 46 tackles since taking over the starting spot, including a career-high-tying 13 stops in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. His 65 total tackles this season are a career high, and he also has four PDs and an INT. He picked off Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City for his second career regular-season INT (first since 2020). He also has lined up for 305 special teams snaps and has five ST tackles. Among the most notable stories on Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27). He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Njongmeta has lined up for a team-high 350 special teams snaps through 16 regular-season games, and recovered a blocked punt in Week 14 at Dallas that put Cincinnati in position to score the game-winning TD. He made his first career start in Week 15 at Tennessee and recovered a fumble at the Cincinnati 38-yard line, marking his second straight game with a key recovery. Njongmeta also has six defensive tackles, with three stops coming in Week 16 vs. Cleveland. LB **Shaka Heyward** spent his entire 2023 rookie campaign and the first 13 weeks of this season on Cincinnati's practice squad, then signed to the active roster on Dec. 2. He recorded his first tackle of the season in Week 16 vs. Cleveland on his only defensive snap. Heyward signed with the Bengals as a college free agent during the 2023 offseason, following a five-year career ('18-22) at Duke University.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, established himself as one of the NFL's top slot corners over

his first three seasons in stripes. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzing with 11.5 career sacks. He has 69 total tackles in 15 games played this season (inactive for Week 5 due to knee injury), and his 12 TFLs are tied for the most by any NFL defensive back. Five of his TFLs have come over the past three games. Hilton secured his first INT of the season in Week 15 at Tennessee when he came down with a tipped pass late in the first half. He had a season-high eight tackles in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, and broke up a pass on a crucial fourth-down play in the second half in the Week 6 win at the N.Y. Giants. Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** has taken on the role of the team's top boundary corner since the start of last season. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 37 of 38 career games played and often lines up against opposing teams' No. 1 WRs. His 15 PDs this season lead the team and are tied for fourth in the NFL, and he also has contributed 75 tackles and three INTs. His most recent pick came late in the first half of Week 15 at Tennessee, and he returned the INT 28 yards to set up a Bengals TD drive. His other two INTs include a highlight-reel one-handed grab on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City, and a 51-yard pick-six to give Cincinnati a first-quarter lead in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. Taylor-Britt missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. The Bengals selected **Josh Newton** in the fifth round of this year's draft, and the rookie earned a spot on the 53-man roster after impressing coaches during training camp and preseason. Newton recorded his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee, picking off QB Mason Rudolph early in the fourth quarter. He has played in all 16 games this season, with starts in each of the past five contests. In addition to his 22 defensive tackles and six PDs, Newton has lined up for 182 special teams snaps and recorded two solo ST tackles. He began his career at the University of Louisiana-Monroe, then spent his final two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University. Second-year pro **DJ Ivey** made his season debut in Week 7 at Cleveland, after spending the first six games on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform list while recovering from a knee injury. He sustained the injury in Week 15 of the 2023 campaign against Minnesota, ending a promising rookie campaign in which he carved out a role as a special teams contributor and reserve defensive back. A 2023 seventh-round pick out of the University of Miami (Fla.), Ivey earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and played in eight games last season. The most recent addition to the secondary is fourth-year pro **Marco Wilson**, who the Bengals acquired on waivers from New England on Nov. 19. He made his Bengals debut in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh and played one defensive snap, but has seen an increased role over the past four contests with a combined 30 defensive snaps and 35 special teams snaps. A fourth-round draft pick of Arizona in 2021, Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons ('21-23) with the Cardinals before being waived and acquired by the Patriots last December. He played in 10 games with New England earlier this season, logging 15 tackles and a PD. In 59 total regular-season games (37 starts), he has recorded 176 tackles, 20 PDs, three INTs and three FFs.

Safeties: Among the most notable additions in Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who recorded an AFC-leading seven INTs in his final season with Baltimore in '23. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 started 11 contests. Stone already has surpassed that total with 16 starts in his debut Bengals season, and he leads the team with four INTs while ranking third with 80 tackles. He had a pick in three straight games from Weeks 14-16, becoming the first Bengals' player to do since former S Reggie Nelson in 2015. Stone's three-game surge was highlighted by his first career pick-six, a 39-yarder in Week 15 at Tennessee. Second-year pro **Jordan Battle** grabbed his first INT of the season in Week 16 vs. Cleveland, as he secured an INT in his own end zone to preserve a two-score Bengals lead in the fourth quarter. Battle has started each of the past five games after beginning the season as a rotational safety. Of his 52 tackles this year, 32 have come over the past five contests, including a season-best 10 stops in Week 15 at Tennessee. He started seven contests as a rookie last season and ranked fifth on the team with 69 tackles. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle was a team captain and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina

Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, and has been voted a team captain in each of his four total Bengals seasons. Bell has played in all 16 games this season with 11 starts, and totaled 50 tackles along with two PDs, an INT, a FF and a FR. He had a crucial takeaway early in the Week 16 contest against Cleveland, as he both forced and recovered a fumble near the Cincinnati goal line on the Browns' opening drive. It marked his 16th career FF, which is tied for the most among all NFL defensive backs since he entered the league in 2016. Bell's first INT of the season came against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** received a game ball from head coach Zac Taylor following the Week 6 win over the N.Y. Giants, in recognition of his effort as a gunner on special teams. Anderson has a team-leading 11 special teams tackles this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. He finished last season with a team-leading eight special teams stops, despite missing the final 10 contests. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, Anderson sat out his entire rookie year due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Dajahn Anthony** made the Bengals' roster out of his first training camp. He has lined up for 11 defensive snaps and 155 special teams snaps in 12 games played this season (inactive for three games as coach's decision). In Week 4 at Carolina, Anthony broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line. He worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. His three INTs last season tied for the Ole Miss team lead.

Special teams: Second-year **K Cade York** signed to Cincinnati's active roster on Dec. 17, after spending two weeks on the practice squad. York has kicked in four games for the Bengals, and in Week 16 vs. Cleveland he tied a team record with a career-long 59-yard FG going into halftime. That kick also tied for the fourth-longest made FG in the NFL this season. He has converted 29 of 41 FG attempts in his career, including five of seven in his early Cincinnati tenure. York was teammates with Burrow and Ja'Marr Chase at Louisiana State in 2019, and entered the NFL as a fourth-round draft pick of Cleveland in '22. He played in all 17 games during his rookie campaign with the Browns, then spent the '23 season on their practice squad and was traded to Washington this past summer. He was waived by the Commanders following their season opener, and was not with an NFL team prior to joining the Bengals. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 418 attempts in 51 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie campaign on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2 of that season. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow through 16 games ranks sixth in the NFL in net punting average (42.9 net yards per punt; minimum 35 punts) and ninth in gross average (49.1). He had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, as his 64.5 gross yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. He had four punts downed inside the opponents' 20-yard lines in three consecutive games (Weeks 5-7), becoming the first Bengals punter ever to do so in three straight contests. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned AFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for Week 7, after returning the opening kickoff at Cleveland 100 yards for a TD. It marked the second time in team history that the Bengals scored a TD on the game's opening kick, and it was the longest KOR in the NFL this season. Jones also had an 81-yard punt return for a TD in his 2023 rookie season. He has returned 14 punts this season for 99 yards, but has missed the past eight games due to a groin injury. Rookie WR **Jermaine Burton** and fourth-year HB **Khalil Herbert** have returned kicks with Jones out of the lineup. Burton has 13 returns for 378 yards, including three for 98 in Week 17 vs. Denver. Six of his KORs have gone for 30 or more yards. Herbert has returned three kicks since being acquired via trade in November, including two for 67 yards in Week 14 at Dallas. WR **Isaiah Williams** has taken over punt return duties over the past five games, contributing nine returns for 69 yards.

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

The Bengals and Chiefs played to a one-score result for a sixth straight time since January 2022, as Kansas City K Harrison Butker kicked a 51-yard game-winning FG as time expired. The game featured six lead changes. Cincinnati held a two-point lead and forced the Chiefs into a fourth-and-16 with under a minute remaining, but a QB Patrick Mahomes downfield heave resulted in a defensive pass interference penalty to set up the kick. The Bengals' defense had three takeaways, including a pair of INTs, and allowed just 137 net passing yards. Offensively, Cincinnati scored points on five of its first six true possessions. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 23 of 36 passes for 258 yards and a 103.7 passer rating, as well as two TD passes to WR Andrei Iosivas. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Kansas City improved to 2-0.

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. Commanders rookie QB Jayden Daniels completed 91.3 percent of his passes (21 of 23), which set both an NFL rookie record and a Bengals opponent record for a single game (minimum 20 attempts). Bengals QB Joe Burrow finished with 324 passing yards and three TDs, including his 100th career TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase on the game's opening drive. Cincinnati fell to 0-3, while Washington improved to 2-1.

Sunday, Dec. 22, 2024 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals recorded three takeaways against the Browns on defense and 326 net yards on offense to complete their first season sweep over Cleveland since 2017. Browns RB Jerome Ford broke off a 66-yard run on the opening play from scrimmage, but three plays later RB D'Onta Foreman was stripped by S Vonn Bell at the goal line to keep the game scoreless. Cincinnati followed the takeaway with a 99-yard drive, capped off by a two-yard TD pass from QB Joe Burrow to WR Tee Higgins. Burrow finished 23 of 30 for 252 yards and three TDs, becoming the first QB in NFL history to pass for at least 250 yards and three TDs in seven consecutive games. The Bengals stretched their lead to 17-0 when K Cade York tied a team record with a 59-yard FG as the first half expired. Cincinnati picked off Browns QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson twice in the fourth quarter, as S Jordan Battle and S Geno Stone had INTs on consecutive defensive possessions to maintain the Bengals' two-score advantage. Cincinnati improved to 7-8, while Cleveland fell to 3-12.
