GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on FOX-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WXIX-TV (Ch. 19) in Cincinnati, WGRT-TV (Ch. 45) in Dayton and WDKY-TV (Ch. 56) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Kevin Kugler (play-by-play), Daryl Johnston (analyst) and Allison Williams (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, led by Cincinnati flagship radio stations WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals kick off the regular season with a divisional road test when they face the Cleveland Browns in the "Battle of Ohio" on Sunday at Huntington Bank Field.

Cincinnati enters the 2025 campaign aiming to return to the postseason after falling just shy of the AFC playoffs in each of the past two years. While the 2024 season yielded the team's fourth consecutive winning record at 9-8, a five-game win streak to close out the schedule, and several noteworthy individual performances, Bengals players and coaches alike have stated that the collective expectation remains to reach greater heights. And through a busy offseason that included the retention of key players as well as new additions via free agency and the NFL Draft, Cincinnati has built a roster it believes will contend against the league's best.

A point of emphasis for the Bengals over the past six months has been to create an environment that will lead to success early in the regular season. Cincinnati has dropped its first two games of the season in each of the past three years, a fact that head coach Zac Taylor accounted for when structuring how the team approached training camp. The Bengals' practices during camp took place earlier in the day than in years past, and perhaps more notably, the starting offensive and defensive units both saw substantial playing time in the first two preseason games.

According to Taylor, the increased level of intensity felt throughout August will benefit the Bengals as they look to get off to a hot start against an AFC North Division rival on Sunday.

"I think it's a great opportunity for us," said Taylor. "To start on the road in a divisional game right out of the gate, put your best foot forward and find a way to get a win — you set yourself up for a great start to the season. That's about the best thing you can ask for."

Spearheading the Bengals' roster once again is a dynamic offensive attack orchestrated by sixth-year QB Joe Burrow. The two-time Pro Bowler is coming off a 2024 campaign in which he led the NFL and set Cincinnati single-season records in completions (460), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43). Burrow is flanked by what he has described as the deepest group of pass catchers in his pro career, and the headliner of that arsenal is fifth-year WR Ja'Marr Chase. Chase last season became the sixth player in the Super Bowl era to claim the receiving "Triple Crown," as he paced the league in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17). He was rewarded with a four-year contract extension with the Bengals on March 18, the same day that fellow standout WR Tee Higgins inked his own four-year deal. Higgins, who enters his sixth NFL season in 2025, set a career high last year with 10 TD catches.

Defensively, the Bengals boast the reigning NFL sack champion in ninth-year DE Trey Hendrickson. Hendrickson's league-leading 17.5 sacks in 2024 matched his career high set the previous year, and his 35 combined sacks over the past two seasons are 4.5 more than any other player. In the free agency

period, Cincinnati added DT T.J. Slaton Jr., a fifth-year pro who spent his first four seasons establishing himself as a run-stuffing force with the Green Bay Packers.

However, the key addition to the defense during the offseason occurred on the coaching staff, as Al Golden was hired as defensive coordinator after three seasons in the same role at the University of Notre Dame. A former linebackers coach of the Bengals from 2020-21, Golden returns to Cincinnati with oversight of a unit that features a blend of veteran experience and young contributors with high-end potential.

Taylor, Golden and the rest of the Cincinnati coaching staff spent the entirety of the offseason program and training camp formulating a team identity they hope will translate to a win on Sunday. But according to Taylor, the motivation for that process began in January, when the Bengals were relegated to watching the NFL postseason unfold from the outside looking in.

"I've been eager since the day the season ended," said Taylor. "As soon as our season ended and we weren't in the playoffs, (our mentality was), 'Okay, fresh start. Let's go get it.' I think immediately, guys got to work for the spring and tried to get ourselves ready for training camp. We've got everything achieved that we wanted to get achieved. Now, we've just got to go out there and get it done. I think I speak for everybody — it's an entire group that's been champing at the bit to get back on the field and set the tone."

The Bengals follow Sunday's contest with their home opener against Jacksonville on Sept. 14 at Paycor Stadium. Three of Cincinnati's first four games will be played on the road, as in addition to this week at Cleveland, the Bengals travel to Minnesota in Week 3 and Denver on Monday Night Football in Week 4.

The series: The Bengals lead 55-48 in the "Battle of Ohio" series. Cincinnati has won four of the past five meetings, but the Browns have won six of the past 10. Home field has been a factor over the series, as the Bengals lead 34-18 at home, but trail 30-21 as the road club.

Cincinnati has played more games against Cleveland (103) than any foe except Pittsburgh. The Bengals have 109 all-time regular-season games against the Steelers (111 overall, including postseason).

The longest winning streak for both teams is seven. The Bengals won seven straight from the second game of 2014 through '17, while the Browns won seven consecutive from the second meeting of 1992 through '95.

Since the Browns' rebirth in 1999, the Bengals lead 31-21, with records of 18-8 as the home team and 13-13 as the visiting team.

Uniform watch: Cincinnati is slated to wear white jerseys, white pants (black stripes) and black socks this week at Cleveland. It is the Bengals' most frequently used combination since they redesigned their uniforms prior to the 2021 season, as they have worn it 17 total times (regular season and postseason). Most notably, this combination was sported in each of the team's four road playoff games following the 2021 and '22 campaigns.

The Bengals wore nine different uniform combinations during the 2024

regular season, with three different jerseys, four pants and three socks featured at least once. Cincinnati's most frequent combination last season was black jerseys, white pants (orange stripes) and orange socks, which was donned in four total contests.

The Bengals unveiled new uniforms prior to the 2021 campaign, marking the team's first significant redesign since 2004. Introduced to the rotation in 2024 were orange pants with black stripes, which the team debuted in the regular-season opener against New England and wore five total times. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," which features a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet five times and collected a 4-1 record in those games. The helmet's lone appearance of the 2024 season came in Week 8 against Philadelphia. Cincinnati announced that it will wear the white helmet in Week 7 of this season against Pittsburgh on Thursday Night Football.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

+ — The Bengals added orange pants with black stripes to their uniform lineup in 2024.

Bengals career records watch: As the 2025 season kicks off, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 2547 career passing attempts, which are the fifth-most in team history and 670 shy of QB Carson Palmer (3217) for fourth-most. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449) and Boomer Esiason (3564) hold the top three spots on the team's career list.

- Burrow has completed 1748 career passes, the fifth-most in team history and 267 shy of Esiason (2015) for fourth. Dalton (2757), Anderson (2654) and

Palmer (2024) hold the top three spots.

- Burrow has 19,001 career passing yards, the fifth-most in team history and 3693 shy of Palmer for fourth. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594) and Esiason (27,149) hold the top three spots.

- Burrow has 140 career TD passes, the fifth-most in team history and 14 shy of Palmer (154) for fourth. Dalton (204), Anderson (197) and Esiason (187) hold the top three spots.

- Burrow has 26 career games with 300 or more passing yards, the second-most in team history and two shy of Dalton (28) for the team record.

- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 395 career receptions, the eighth-most in team history and 112 shy of cracking the top five. WRs Chad Johnson (751), A.J. Green (649), Carl Pickens (530), Tyler Boyd (513) and T.J. Houshmandzadeh (507) hold the top five spots.

- Chase has 5425 career receiving yards, the 10th-most in team history and 1273 shy of fifth-most, which is held by WR Cris Collinsworth (6698). Johnson (10,783), Green (9430), WR Isaac Curtis (7101) and Pickens (6887) hold the top four spots.

- Chase has 46 career receiving TDs, the fifth-most in team history and seven shy of Curtis (53) for fourth. Johnson (66), Green (65) and Pickens (63) hold the top three spots.

- Chase has 19 career games with 100 or more receiving yards, tied with Pickens for the fourth-most in team history and one shy of Curtis (20) for third. Green (33) and Johnson (31) have the two most such games.

- DE Trey Hendrickson has 57.0 sacks as a member of the Bengals, the sixth-most in team history and two shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth. DE/DT Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

- K Evan McPherson has accounted for 445 career points, the sixth-most in team history and 104 shy of fifth-most, which is held by K Horst Muhlmann (549).

- McPherson has 94 career made FGs, the sixth-most in team history and 26 shy of Muhlmann (120) for fifth.

- McPherson has 163 career made PATs, the sixth-most in team history and 26 shy of Muhlmann (189) for fifth.

- McPherson has a career FG percentage of 81.74 (94 made/115 att.), the fourth-highest mark in team history (minimum 75 attempts). Kickers Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202), Randy Bullock (84.9; 90/106) and Mike Nugent (81.77; 157/192) hold the top three spots.

- P Ryan Rehkow has 25 career punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line, the sixth-most by a Bengal since the stat began being tracked in 1976. He is 12 inside-20 punts shy of P Nick Harris (37) for fifth-most.

Records vs. Browns: The two highest-scoring games in Bengals history have each been against the Browns. On Nov. 28, 2004 at Paycor Stadium (then known as Paul Brown Stadium), the Bengals won 58-48, and the 106 total points is not only a Bengals record, it is the second-most in NFL history, behind only 113 from Washington's 72-41 win over the N.Y. Giants in 1966. And on Sept. 16, 2007, the Bengals and Browns combined for 96 points at Cleveland in a 51-45 Browns win.

More on Bengals regular-season records against the Browns:

- On Dec. 21, 1980 vs. Cleveland, DE Eddie Edwards set the Bengals record for sacks in a game with five. The mark stood unchallenged for 19 years, until DE Antwan Odom tied it on Sept. 20, 2009 at Green Bay.

- In the final Bengals game at Cinergy Field, on Dec. 12, 1999, Cincinnati limited the Browns to the fewest rushing yards ever by an opponent. Cleveland had only 11 net yards on 11 attempts.

- On Sept. 10, 2000, WR Craig Yeast tied a Bengals record for most punt returns in a game with seven. The record was set by HB Tony Davis in 1977, and in addition to Yeast, has since been tied by WR Brandon Tate in 2011.

- On Nov. 25, 2001 at Cleveland, T.J. Houshmandzadeh set the Bengals record for punt return yards in a game with 126. His 86-yarder in that game ranks tied for third-longest in club history, and it still ranks as the longest punt return in team history which did not result in a touchdown.

- The 58-48 Bengals win on Nov. 28, 2004 is the only game in club history in which Cincinnati scored double figures in all four quarters (14-13-14-17 — 58).

- In the Sept. 16, 2007 shootout with the Browns noted above, QB Carson Palmer threw six TD passes, the most ever by a Bengals QB in a single game. That mark also stands tied for the team record for most TD passes in a game.

- On Dec. 21, 2008, at Cleveland, Bengals CB Leon Hall tied the team record for most interceptions in a game with three. He was the seventh Bengal to reach that mark in a contest, though no one has done it since.

- The Bengals' 23-20 overtime victory at Cleveland on Oct. 4, 2009 stands

as the longest Bengals game not to end in a tie, and it will remain so for the foreseeable future. Only four seconds remained in the overtime period when K Shayne Graham booted a 31-yard field goal to break a 20-all deadlock. Elapsed scoreboard clock time for the game was 74:56. Only three games lasted longer in Bengals history, and all three were 75-minute ties — in 2008 vs. Philadelphia, in '14 vs. Carolina and '16 vs. Washington in London. The NFL shortened overtime from a 15-minute period to a 10-minute period in 2017, so the longest a game can last nowadays since that rule change is 70 total minutes.

- On Nov. 17, 2013, the Bengals scored 31 points in the second quarter, a team record for most points in a quarter, en route to a 41-20 Cincinnati victory.

- In their 30-0 win at Cleveland on Dec. 14, 2014, the Bengals allowed only five first downs, fewest by an opponent in Bengals history.

- On Oct 23, 2016 vs. Cleveland, HB Jeremy Hill rushed for 168 yards on nine carries (18.7 yards per rush) — the most rushing yards in club history without hitting double digits in carries. That 168-yard total broke a mark that had stood for 45 years — 113 yards on eight carries by Essex Johnson vs. Philadelphia on Sept. 19, 1971.

- On Dec. 22, 2024 vs. Cleveland, K Cade York tied K Evan McPherson for ownership of the longest field goal in team history with a 59-yarder.

Individually vs. Browns: Here are offensive statistics for current Bengals in Cincinnati games against Cleveland (ordered by total games played):

- QB Joe Burrow: Eight games; 302 attempts and 195 completions (64.6 percent) for 1990 yards, 15 TDs and five INTs (93.0 passer rating); 28 rushes for 81 yards (2.9-yard average) and one TD.

- WR Tee Higgins: Eight games; 29 receptions for 373 yards (12.9) and four TDs; One rush for seven yards.

- TE Drew Sample: Eight games; 19 receptions for 160 yards (8.4).

- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Seven games; 38 receptions for 404 yards (10.6) and three TDs; Six rushes for 26 yards (4.3).

- WR Andrei Iosivas: Four games; Eight receptions for 89 yards (11.1) and three TDs.

- HB Chase Brown: Three games; 44 rushes for 178 yards (4.0); Six receptions for 37 yards (6.1).

- QB Jake Browning: Three games; 18-of-25 passing for 156 yards, three TDs and one INT (111.0 passer rating); Four rushes for 16 yards (4.0).

- WR Charlie Jones: Three games; Three receptions for 49 yards (16.3); Two rushes for 13 yards (6.5).

- TE Mike Gesicki: Two games; Three receptions for 16 yards (5.3).

- TE Tanner Hudson: Two games; Two receptions for 11 yards (5.5).

Bengals seek to regain biggest 'Battle' margin: With 10 victories in its last 15 meetings with Cincinnati, Cleveland has whittled the Bengals' largest lead of 11 games in the team's all-time series down to seven. The Bengals' 11-game lead after the 2017 season set the benchmark for the biggest lead held by either side in the "Battle of Ohio" series.

The series began in 1970 with the Browns winning six of the first seven, and their five-game margin at 6-1, after the first meeting of 1973, stands as their largest lead. The Bengals lead 53-42 since that Cleveland high-water mark. The Browns have not led the series since the end of 2005, when they were 33-32.

Since surrendering that 33-32 lead by giving up a sweep in the 2006 meetings, the Browns have twice pulled into ties — at 34-34 after the first meeting of '07 and at 35-35 after the first meeting of '08. But the Browns have now endured a 17-year stretch without a lead in the series. Barring possible additions to the series in postseason play, the Bengals cannot surrender their series lead until after the first game of 2028 at the earliest, and the Browns could not lead again until after the second game of '28.

More Bengals-Browns facts: The first-ever Bengals-Browns meeting of any kind was Aug. 29, 1970. On that Saturday, the Browns were visitors for the second preseason game of Riverfront Stadium's debut year. The Bengals won 31-24, moving to 2-0 in preseason in their new home.

Also:

- The Bengals were 17-10 against the Browns at Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field.

- The Browns were 17-8 against the Bengals at the old Cleveland Stadium, and now the series is tied 13-13 at Huntington Bank Field (named Cleveland Browns Stadium from 1999-12 and in '23, and FirstEnergy Stadium from '13-22).

- The Bengals and Browns never played at Nippert Stadium, as Nippert was the Bengals' American Football League home from 1968-69.

- The Bengals have posted 14 season sweeps, and the Browns have posted 11. The teams have split 26 times. In 1982, they played only once, with the scheduled contest at Cleveland cancelled due to a players' strike.

- The first Bengals-Browns regular-season game at Cincinnati on Nov. 15, 1970 drew the first home crowd of 60,000 in Bengals history (60,007 at Riverfront Stadium). The Bengals won 14-10 behind a 110-yard rushing effort from QB Virgil Carter, the only 100-yarder by a QB in Bengals history.

- The largest Bengals home crowd for a Browns game has been 66,222, on Dec. 11, 2022 at Paycor Stadium. The previous high vs. Cleveland at home had stood for 17 years — a mark of 66,072 attended a Sept. 17, 2006 game at Paycor, which then was called Paul Brown Stadium.

- The Browns drew the largest Bengals crowd in the Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field era — 60,284 for a 27-24 Browns win on Oct. 17, 1971.

- The Bengals and Browns met three times in preseason at Ohio Stadium in Columbus, from 1972-74. All were Sunday afternoon games, and the Browns won two of the three.

‘Battle’ coaches: Here are some notes about head coaches in the “Battle of Ohio” series:

- When Cincinnati’s Zac Taylor and Cleveland’s Freddie Kitchens met in the first “Battle of Ohio” of 2019, it was just the second time in series history that a Bengals-Browns meeting featured two rookie head coaches who faced both each other and their Ohio rival for the first time in the same game. The Browns won that contest at FirstEnergy Stadium, 27-19. The first such instance occurred on Oct. 21, 1984, when Bengals first-year head coach Sam Wyche met Browns first-year head coach Marty Schottenheimer in Cincinnati at Riverfront Stadium, with the Bengals winning, 12-9. The Bengals’ Homer Rice and the Browns’ Sam Rutigliano also were rookie head coaches when they met for the first time on Dec. 17, 1978 at Riverfront. However, that was Rutigliano’s second “Battle of Ohio” as Cleveland’s head coach. The two teams met in Game 2 that year, before Rice, who was named head coach after Game 5, took the reins.

- Former Bengals head coach Marvin Lewis, who was 22-10 overall against

Cleveland, has the most total wins and best winning percentage (.688) of any Bengals head coach in the series. Lewis also has coached the most games (32) against Cleveland. Sam Wyche is second in all three categories, with 10 wins, a .625 winning percentage (10-6) and 16 games.

- Bill Belichick has been the top Browns coach in the series, having posted an 8-2 mark against the Bengals during his 1991-95 tenure.

- Lewis is the only Bengals head coach whose first Cincinnati victory came against Cleveland. Lewis took over as head coach in 2003, and his first win was a 21-14 decision at Cleveland on Sept. 28 of that year. The Bengals entered that game at 0-3, but went on to finish 8-8. The six-game improvement, after a 2-14 season in 2002, was the largest in the NFL for ‘03.

- Forrest Gregg is the only head coach to pilot both teams in the “Battle of Ohio.” Gregg was 1-5 as Browns coach against the Bengals from 1975-77, and he was 3-4 as Bengals coach against the Browns from ‘80-83.

- Here are Bengals head coaches, in chronological order, and their records in the “Battle of Ohio”: Paul Brown (5-7), Bill “Tiger” Johnson (3-2), Homer Rice (2-1), Forrest Gregg (3-4), Sam Wyche (10-6), Dave Shula (1-7), Bruce Coslet (2-1), Dick LeBeau (2-3), Marvin Lewis (22-10) and Zac Taylor (5-7).

- The Bengals are 11-8 against Browns head coaches directing their first game in the series. Browns head coaches who won their first game have been Blanton Collier (1970), Nick Skorich (‘71), Sam Rutigliano (‘78), Bill Belichick (‘91), Rob Chudzinski (2013), Mike Pettine (‘14), Freddie Kitchens (‘19) and Kevin Stefanski (‘20). On the losing end for Cleveland have been Forrest Gregg (1975), Marty Schottenheimer (‘84), Bud Carson (‘89), Jim Shofner (‘90), Chris Palmer (‘99), Butch Davis (2001), Romeo Crennel (‘05), Eric Mangini (‘09), Pat Shurmur (‘11), Hue Jackson (‘16) and Gregg Williams (‘18).

- Bengals coaches show a 7-3 record the first time out against Cleveland. The seven winners have been Bill Johnson (1976), Homer Rice (‘78), Sam Wyche (‘84), Dave Shula (‘92), Bruce Coslet (‘99), Dick LeBeau (2000) and Marvin Lewis (‘03). Losing in the first try vs. Cleveland were Paul Brown (1970), Forrest Gregg (‘80) and Zac Taylor (2019).

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2025 season is his seventh in the position.

In 2024, he guided the Bengals to their fourth consecutive winning season at 9-8, which was highlighted by five straight victories to close out the schedule. He orchestrated one of the NFL’s most dynamic offenses, serving as play-caller for a unit that led the league in passing yards per game (272.9), ranked sixth in points per game (27.8) and ninth in total yards (365.5).

In 2023, Taylor led the Bengals to a 9-8 record despite a few key players missing time due to injuries, including QB Joe Burrow, who suffered a season-ending injury in Week 11. Taylor worked with backup QB Jake Browning over the final seven weeks and guided Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the slate.

The 2022 season saw Taylor lead the Bengals to their second straight AFC North Division title and a repeat appearance in the AFC Championship Game. He became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals posted impressive numbers on both sides of the ball under Taylor, as the offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide in passing (fifth, 265.0), scoring (seventh, 26.1) and total yards (eighth, 360.5), and the defense held opponents to a league-low 59.8 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor guided Cincinnati to its first division crown in six years and then three postseason victories to win the AFC Championship and advance to Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, in his first full season in Taylor’s system, led the league in completion percentage (70.4) and was named the NFL’s Comeback Player of the Year. Chase, the team’s first-round draft pick, posted the most receiving yards by a rookie in the Super Bowl era (1455, since surpassed) en route to winning Offensive Rookie of the Year. Defensively, Cincinnati showed marked improvement from 2020 to ‘21, jumping from 29th in rushing yards allowed to fifth (102.5). In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years, a home Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before the team went on the road to defeat the AFC’s top two seeds, Tennessee and Kansas City.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow, the No. 1 overall pick in the NFL draft, to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Defensively, Taylor oversaw seven new starters who helped Cincinnati hold opposing passers to the sixth-lowest completion percentage in the NFL (62.8). In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led the Bengals to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the team’s per-game rushing average jumped from 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second half (130.1). Defensively, Cincinnati notched 11 more sacks in the second half of the season compared to the first, and allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to the Bengals after two seasons (2017-18) with the L.A. Rams,

where he served as assistant wide receivers coach in ‘17 and quarterbacks coach in ‘18. He had a one-year stint at the University of Cincinnati in 2016, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach under head coach Tommy Tuberville. He broke into NFL coaching in 2012 as assistant QBs coach for the Miami Dolphins. He was elevated to QBs coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of the ‘15 season as interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller after the team made coaching staff changes.

Taylor’s coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11. The Aggies played in three bowl games during Taylor’s time in College Station.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas (‘04) and then playing his final two seasons (‘05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He had a decorated career with the Cornhuskers, setting numerous school records and passing for 5850 yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 total yards and leading the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record, an appearance in the Big 12 Championship Game and a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

His father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State University. Taylor’s younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the pass game coordinator for the Chicago Bears.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor’s degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children — Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

Two-time NFL Coach of the Year **Kevin Stefanski** enters his sixth season as the Cleveland Browns head coach after being named the 18th full-time head coach in franchise history on Jan. 13, 2020. Stefanski became the 16th coach to win the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year Award multiple times since its inception in 1957, winning the honors in 2020 and ‘23 and joined

Forrest Gregg (1976) as the only Browns coaches to win the award.

In his five seasons as head coach, Stefanski has led the team to two postseason appearances and two 11-win seasons. He joined Pro Football Hall of Famer Paul Brown (1951 and '53) as the only coaches in team history to record multiple seasons with at least 11 regular season wins. During the Browns 78-year history, the team has surpassed 6000 scrimmage yards in a single season just seven times, but have reached the mark in four seasons under Stefanski.

Before the Browns, Stefanski spent 14 seasons (2006-19) with the Minnesota Vikings. He gained his first league experience with the Vikings in 2006 as assistant to the head coach before transitioning to assistant QBs coach from '09-13, then spending two seasons tutoring the TEs ('14-15), one season

('16) as RBs coach, two seasons guiding the QBs ('17-18) and added the role of interim offensive coordinator for the final three games of the '18 season. The Vikings promoted him to offensive coordinator in 2019.

Stefanski played defensive back at Pennsylvania (2000-04) and earned a bachelor's degree in communications. He has no pro playing experience.

Stefanski was born on April 8, 1982. A native of Philadelphia, Pa., he and his wife, Michelle, have two sons, Will and Gabe, and one daughter, Juliet.

BENGALS NOTES

2025 schedule notes: In addition to their six games against teams in the AFC North Division, Cincinnati will face all teams in the AFC East and NFC North this season.

The Bengals also will play two games — at home against Jacksonville (Week 2) and on the road against Denver (Week 4) — that were determined by 2024 divisional standings. As third-place finishers in the AFC North, the Bengals are matched up against the third-place teams from the AFC South (Jacksonville) and AFC West (Denver).

In 2021, the NFL added a 17th game to the regular-season schedule, and for the Bengals in '25 that will be a home contest against Arizona. The additional game each year features an interconference matchup and is based on the prior season's standings on a rotating four-year cycle. These contests match a first-place team from one division with a first-place team in an opposite-conference division that the team is not scheduled to play that season. The second, third and fourth-place finishers in each division are matched the same way. The home conference for this game alternates each season, with the AFC hosting the game in 2025.

Here is a list of Cincinnati's opponents this season, ordered by the date of the game:

HOME: Jacksonville, Detroit, Pittsburgh, N.Y. Jets, Chicago, New England, Baltimore, Arizona, Cleveland.

AWAY: Cleveland, Minnesota, Denver, Green Bay, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Buffalo, Miami.

2025 Bengals captains: The Bengals on Monday announced seven captains for the 2025 season, which were decided through a players-only vote. Wearing the captains' patch this year are four offensive players and three defensive players.

The offensive captains are sixth-year QB Joe Burrow, eighth-year OT Orlando Brown Jr., 10th-year C Ted Karras and fifth-year WR Ja'Marr Chase. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his six pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Brown carries the honor for the second straight year, after being voted a captain last season for the first time in his career. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the fourth straight season and fifth time overall, after also doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Chase, a four-time Pro Bowler, earns a captaincy role for the first time.

The three defensive captains are ninth-year DE Trey Hendrickson, eighth-year DT B.J. Hill and sixth-year LB Logan Wilson. Each player was voted a captain for the first time in their career.

Coaching staff changes: Head coach Zac Taylor made six additions to the coaching staff during the offseason, headlined by defensive coordinator Al Golden. A former head coach at the college level who spent two seasons (2020-21) as linebackers coach for the Bengals, Golden returns to Cincinnati following three years ('22-24) as defensive coordinator at the University of Notre Dame.

Other new faces on the staff include Sean Desai (senior defensive assistant), Mike Hodges (linebackers), Michael McCarthy (assistant offensive line), Jerry Montgomery (defensive line/run game coordinator), Mike Moon (defensive assistant) and Scott Peters (offensive line). Desai spent the 2024 season as senior defensive assistant for the L.A. Rams, after serving as defensive coordinator for Philadelphia in '23. He also had a defensive coordinator stint with Chicago in 2021, then held the title of associate head coach and defensive assistant for Seattle in '22.

Hodges joins the Bengals after seven seasons (2017-24) with New Orleans, where he went from defensive assistant ('17-18) to assistant LBs coach ('19) to LBs coach ('20-24). He played LB at Texas A&M University from 2008-11,

when Taylor and Bengals WRs coach Troy Walters were on the Aggies' coaching staff. McCarthy served as an offensive coaching assistant for New England last year, following five seasons (2019-23) as offensive line coach at Brown University.

Montgomery coached New England's defensive line in 2024 after nine seasons ('15-23) with Green Bay, where he began his stint as defensive front assistant before serving as defensive line coach for six years. Moon joins Golden in making the transition from Notre Dame to the Bengals. He served as an assistant graduate coach for the Fighting Irish from 2021-22, then was a defensive assistant in '23 and senior defensive analyst in '24.

Peters also comes to Cincinnati from New England, where he spent the 2024 campaign coaching the Patriots' offensive linemen. He was assistant O-line coach for Cleveland from 2020-23. As a player, Peters spent time with five NFL teams from 2002-09, then had a career as a Brazilian jiu-jitsu competitor and trainer.

- P Ryan Rehkow averaged 49.11 yards per punt, surpassing P Kevin Huber's team record of 47.18 in 2020 (minimum 40 punts).

- Rehkow averaged 42.92 net yards per punt, surpassing Huber's team record of 42.82 in 2020 (min. 40 punts).

Team records set in '24: An explosive Bengals offense allowed for several team single-season records to be set in 2024. Here is a look at the movement in Cincinnati's team record book that occurred last season. Full details on team single-season records entering 2025 can be found on page 184

- Cincinnati scored 472 total points, surpassing the previous team record of 460 in the 2021 season.

- Cincinnati scored 43 passing TDs, surpassing the previous team record of 36 in 2021.

- Cincinnati had 376 total first downs, surpassing the previous team record of 361 in 1981.

- Cincinnati had 4640 net passing yards, surpassing the previous team record of 4403 in 2021.

- Cincinnati averaged 272.94 net passing yards per game, surpassing the previous team record of 265.00 in 2022.

- Cincinnati attempted 652 passes, surpassing the previous team record of 619 in 2019.

- Cincinnati completed 460 passes, surpassing the previous team record of 420 in 2023.

- Cincinnati scored 57 total TDs, the second-most in team history behind a record 59 in 1988.

- Cincinnati totaled 6214 offensive net yards, the second-most in team history behind a record 6490 in 1986.

- Cincinnati made 51 PATs, the third-most in team history behind a record 56 in 1988 and 52 in 2013.

Top-ranked passing offense: The Bengals finished the 2024 campaign averaging 272.9 net passing yards per game, which both led the NFL and set a team single-season record. It marked the second time in team history in which Cincinnati led the league in passing offense, with the first instance being the 1975 season. That year, Ring of Honor QB Ken Anderson guided the Bengals to an average of 231.5 net passing yards.

Cincinnati recorded 300 or more net passing yards six times in 2024, led by a season-high 421 in Week 10 at Baltimore. That figure marked the fifth-highest passing yardage total by any team in a game last season.

Bengals net three Pro Bowlers: QB Joe Burrow, WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson were selected to the AFC team for the 2025 Pro Bowl Games. Chase and Hendrickson were voted starters at their respective positions, and both players earned their fourth consecutive — and fourth career — Pro Bowl nod. They became the 11th and 12th players in Bengals history to receive four Pro Bowl honors during their Cincinnati careers.

Burrow was voted a Pro Bowler for the second time in his career, with his first selection coming in the 2022 season. He became the fifth QB in team history to be selected to the Pro Bowl multiple times, joining Ken Anderson (1975-76, '81-82), Boomer Esiason ('86, '88-89), Carson Palmer (2005-06) and Andy Dalton ('11, '14, '16).

Chase became the second player in team history to receive a Pro Bowl selection in each of his first four seasons, joining WR A.J. Green (2011-14). Hendrickson is the third defensive player to notch four Pro Bowl honors during his Cincinnati career, joining DT Geno Atkins (eight selections) and CB Lemar Parrish (six).

Pro Bowl trio records an NFL first: Cincinnati's best individual performances in the 2024 season also were tops in the NFL, as QB Joe Burrow led the league in passing yards (4918), WR Ja'Marr Chase led in receiving yards (1708) and DE Trey Hendrickson led in sacks (17.5). The Bengals were the first team to boast the league leader in each of those three categories since 1982, when the NFL began officially tracking sacks.

Coincidentally, Cincinnati also became the first team since 1982 to have the NFL leaders in passing yards, TD passes, receiving yards and receiving TDs. In addition to their respective yardage totals, Burrow paced the league with a career-high 43 scoring passes, while Chase's career-best 17 TD catches led all players. The 1982 San Diego Chargers accomplished that feat with QB Dan Fouts and WR Wes Chandler.

Four Bengals listed on "Top 100": For the 15th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July and August on social media and NFL Network.

Cincinnati is represented by four players on the 2025 list — WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 4), QB Joe Burrow (No. 6), DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 14) and WR Tee Higgins (No. 77). It marked the first appearance on the list in Higgins' career, the fourth overall for Burrow and Chase, and the fifth for Hendrickson.

Chase's ranking at No. 4 is the highest by a Bengals player since the "Top 100" debuted in 2011. The previous highest ranking was No. 6, which was Burrow's position on the 2023 list. Hendrickson's spot at No. 14 is his personal

highest, substantially ahead of his previous best ranking of No. 77 (2021 list). This marks the third time in the history of the "Top 100" in which four or more Bengals players were featured. Cincinnati had a record seven players on the 2016 list, then landed four on the '22 edition.

Burrow's preseason highlights: For the first time in his NFL career, sixth-year QB Joe Burrow saw substantial playing action during the preseason, as he took snaps for the first two offensive series in the preseason opener at Philadelphia and the first three drives the following week at Washington. He led Cincinnati to TDs on four of the five possessions, completing 18 of 24 passes (75.0 percent) for 185 yards and three passing scores.

Burrow's passer rating of 136.3 was the second-highest in the NFL during preseason play (minimum 20 attempts). He kicked it off by going nine of 10 for 123 yards and two TDs (157.5 rating) against the Eagles, an effort which included nine straight completions to close out the first quarter. His TD throws were a 12-yarder to TE Tanner Hudson and a 36-yarder to WR Ja'Marr Chase.

In the Bengals' second preseason game at Washington on Monday Night Football, Burrow again played the opening series surrounded by Cincinnati's first-team offense and led a nine-play, 58-yard drive that ended with a rushing TD by HB Chase Brown. Chase and WR Tee Higgins were pulled from the game following that series, allowing Burrow to get reps with the team's backup receivers on the two ensuing offensive possessions. While the next drive ended in a third-down sack that forced Cincinnati to punt, Burrow trotted out once more minutes later to steer a lengthy 12-play, 70-yard scoring march.

Burrow's final drive against the Commanders was perhaps his best of the preseason, as he completed seven of nine passes which included a third-down conversion to WR Andrei Iosivas and a fourth-down hookup with WR Charlie Jones. On his last throw of the night, Burrow threaded a pass over a Washington LB and between two defensive backs to find Jones in the end zone, knotting the game at 14-14.

Coming into this year, Burrow had attempted just eight passes in two previous preseason games. He saw limited action in the 2021 preseason finale against Miami, then piloted the first drive of the '24 preseason opener vs. Tampa Bay.

Burrow on top: Joe Burrow, who completed his fifth pro season in 2024, put together arguably the best individual campaign by a QB in Bengals history. The former No. 1 overall draft pick led the NFL in completions (460), passing attempts (652), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43), while ranking third in passer rating (108.5) and fourth in completion percentage (70.6; minimum 14 attempts per team's games). Each of those figures also set a Bengals single-season record.

Burrow became the first Bengals QB to lead the league in completions, passing yards and TD passes in the same season. The last Cincinnati signal caller to pace the NFL in completions was QB Ken Anderson in 1982 (218 completions). Anderson also threw for the most passing yards twice, in 1974 (2667) and '75 (3169). The only other QB in team history to lead the NFL in TD passes was Carson Palmer in 2005 (32).

Since 2000, there have been five instances of a QB finishing a season as the outright league leader in all three categories — St. Louis Rams QB Kurt Warner in '01, New Orleans QB Drew Brees in '11, Denver QB Peyton Manning in '13, Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady in '21 and Burrow in '24.

Burrow also became the fourth QB in NFL history to pass for at least 4500 yards and 40 TDs while throwing 10 or fewer INTs, joining Manning (2004 and '13), Brady ('07) and Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers (2011).

Historic eight games for No. 9: QB Joe Burrow passed for at least 250 yards and three TDs in eight straight games from Weeks 9-17 of the 2024 season. That marked the longest such streak in NFL history, surpassing six consecutive games by former New England QB Tom Brady during his 2007 MVP campaign.

Burrow's streak began in a dominant Week 9 win over Las Vegas, when he tied his career high with five TD passes and threw for 251 yards. He followed up four days later with a season-high 428 passing yards and four TDs on Thursday Night Football at Baltimore, then in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers amassed 356 yards through the air and three more scoring tosses.

Burrow, who was named AFC Offensive Player of the Month for November, opened December with 309 passing yards and three TDs in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh. He then led Cincinnati to a Monday Night Football victory at Dallas in Week 14, logging 369 passing yards and another three TDs. He posted a 271-yard, three-TD stat line in Week 15 at Tennessee, with his third scoring pass

marking a franchise-record 36 on the season.

Burrow eclipsed Brady's streak with 252 passing yards and three TDs in Week 16 vs. Cleveland, while also recording his second-highest passer rating of the season (134.3). In the Week 17 thriller against Denver, Burrow finished with 412 passing yards and three TDs, including the game-winning scoring pass with 1:07 left in overtime.

Burrow became the fourth QB in NFL history with at least three TD passes in eight consecutive games, joining Brady (10 straight in 2007), and former Indianapolis QBs Peyton Manning (eight in '04) and Andrew Luck (eight in '18). He also became the first QB to pass for 27 or more TDs in a span of eight games since 2020, when Seattle QB Russell Wilson had 28 from Weeks 1-9.

Single-season TD record: QB Joe Burrow's league-leading 43 TD passes in 2024 set a Bengals single-season record. He clinched the record with his 36th TD pass in Week 15 at Tennessee, which surpassed his own previous mark of 35 in the 2022 campaign.

Burrow also holds the third spot on Cincinnati's single-season TD list, as he passed for 34 in 2021. He became just the fourth player in NFL history to record 30 or more TD passes in three of his first five seasons, joining Miami QB Dan Marino, Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and Buffalo QB Josh Allen.

Burrow in 2024 was the 11th QB in league history to pass for 40-plus TDs in a season. His 43 TD passes included a career-high five scoring passes on two occasions — Week 5 vs. Baltimore and Week 9 vs. Las Vegas. He became the first QB to throw five or more TD passes multiple times in a season since 2021, when Mahomes and Tampa Bay QB Tom Brady each had two such games. Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson also passed for five TDs in two games in 2024 (Weeks 7 and 15).

Burrow's career TD tally: QB Joe Burrow's 43 TD passes in 2024 boosted his career total to 140. That marked the third-most scoring passes in a player's first five seasons in NFL history, trailing only Miami QB Dan Marino (168) and Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (151).

Burrow threw his 125th career TD pass in Week 13 of the 2024 campaign vs. Pittsburgh, when he completed a highlight-reel jump-pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase in the end zone. Playing in his 64th regular-season game, he became the third-fastest QB in league history to reach 125 TDs, behind Mahomes (50 games) and Marino (54).

Burrow also logged his 100th career TD pass last season, doing so on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington. He tied for the seventh-fastest QB to reach that milestone (55 games).

By the end of the 2024 campaign, Burrow had 26 career games with three or more TD passes — the third-most such games in NFL history in a player's first five seasons behind Marino (33) and Mahomes (28).

Burrow on the mark: QB Joe Burrow threw his 1500th career passing attempt in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's completion percentage record. With a current career percentage of 68.63, he is the all-time leader in the category.

Burrow's 70.552 completion percentage in the 2024 season ranked fourth leaguewide (minimum 14 attempts per team's games in season). It also set a Bengals single-season record, narrowly edging out QB Ken Anderson's completion rate of 70.550 in 1982. Burrow completed at least 70 percent of his passes in 11 games in 2024, including each of the final six — the longest such streak in his career. His previous long was a four-game streak from Weeks 6-9 of the 2022 season.

In the overtime period of Week 17 vs. Denver, Burrow surpassed 2500 career passing attempts. His 1710 completions at the time he reached that mark are the most in NFL history through a QB's first 2500 throws.

Burrow completed 37 of 46 passes (80.4 percent) in the 2024 regular-season finale at Pittsburgh. It marked his 26th career game with a completion percentage of 70 or higher on at least 30 attempts, the most such games in a player's first five seasons in NFL history. The next closest are Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes and Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa (21 games each).

In Week 9 of last season vs. Las Vegas, Burrow recorded his 1500th career completion in what was his 61st regular-season game. That marked the second-fewest games in NFL history to reach 1500 completions, trailing only L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert (57).

In three of Burrow's five pro seasons, he finished the year ranking in the top five leaguewide in completion percentage. After leading the NFL in 2021 with a 70.4 percentage, he followed up with the second-highest clip in '22 (68.3).

Burrow hits yardage milestones: QB Joe Burrow led the NFL and set a Bengals single-season record with 4918 passing yards in 2024. He passed for at least 300 yards in seven games, the most by any QB during the 2024 campaign and most in a season in team history.

Burrow now owns the three highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, as in addition to his 2024 total, he had 4611 in '21 (sixth-most in NFL that year) and 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He is the first Cincinnati QB to pass for 4000 or more yards in three different seasons during his Bengals career. Carson Palmer (2006-07) and Andy Dalton ('13, '16) each did it twice.

Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards during Week 4 of the 2024 season at Carolina. Playing in his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. He finished the 2024 campaign with 19,001 career passing yards, the sixth-most within a player's first five seasons in league history.

Joe masters the deep ball: Since entering the NFL in 2020, QB Joe Burrow has a league-leading 28 TD passes of 40-plus yards. The next closest player in that time frame is former Las Vegas/New Orleans QB Derek Carr with 21.

Burrow threw an NFL-best nine TD passes from at least 40 yards out in 2024, with seven going to WR Ja'Marr Chase. He also connected with TE Mike

Gesicki for a 47-yarder in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, and hit WR Tee Higgins for a 42-yard score on a fourth-down play in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers.

Burrow led the NFL with 10 TD passes of 40-plus yards in 2021, then followed up with seven in '22 and two in '23. He also leads the league in scoring passes of 50 or more yards (18) and 60 or more yards (14) since 2020.

Chase claims Triple Crown: WR Ja'Marr Chase finished the 2024 season as the NFL leader in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17), earning him the prestigious receiving "Triple Crown." He became just the sixth Triple Crown winner in the Super Bowl era (1966-present), and the first since L.A. Rams WR Cooper Kupp in 2021.

Chase's receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Bengals single-season record, while his 17 receiving TDs tied WR Carl Pickens' team record set in 1995. Chase had 100 or more receiving yards in five games in 2024, tying for the second-most such games in a season in team history behind WR A.J. Green's six games in '13.

Chase also became the fifth player in NFL history to log at least 100 catches, 1500 receiving yards and 15 receiving TDs in a season, joining Kupp ('21), former Minnesota WR Randy Moss ('03), former Indianapolis WR Marvin Harrison ('01) and former San Francisco WR Jerry Rice (1995).

Following the regular season, Chase was voted a unanimous first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press. It marked his second career All-Pro selection, as he received second-team honors in his 2021 rookie campaign. He became the first Bengals offensive player to earn first-team accolades since OT/G Andrew Whitworth in 2015.

Chase signed a contract extension with the Bengals in March that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2029 season.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase's career numbers at the end of the 2024 campaign placed him alongside some of the top receivers in NFL history through their first four seasons.

Chase's 46 career receiving TDs are the third-most in a player's first four seasons in league history, behind only Pro Football Hall of Famers Randy Moss (53) and Jerry Rice (49). In 2024, he surpassed former New England All-Pro TE Rob Gronkowski (42) for fourth place on that list, and Hall of Famer Bob Hayes (45) for third. Chase had 11 career games with multiple TD catches by the end of the 2024 season, tied with Moss and former Green Bay WR Antonio Freeman for the third-most in a player's first four years. Only Rice (13 games) and Gronkowski (12) had more in their first four seasons.

Chase's 5425 career receiving yards also are third-most in any player's first four seasons, behind Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (5899) and former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas (5512). His 395 career receptions are the fourth-most, trailing Thomas (470), Detroit WR Amon-Ra St. Brown (430) and former Miami WR Jarvis Landry (400).

Chase became the first player in NFL history to record at least 80 receptions, 1000 receiving yards and seven receiving TDs in each of his first four career seasons. He also is one of six players all-time to begin his career with four consecutive 1000-yard receiving seasons, and the second Bengals player to do so following WR A.J. Green (2011-14).

The Bengals' first-round draft pick (No. 5 overall) in 2021, Chase holds a career average of 87.5 receiving yards per game (62 regular-season games). That is the second-highest mark in NFL history behind Jefferson (96.5). The players behind Chase in that category include Hall of Famer Calvin Johnson (third; 86.1 receiving yards per game), WR Antonio Brown (fourth; 84.2) and WR Julio Jones (fifth; 82.5).

In 2024, Chase became the 11th player in NFL history to average at least 100 receiving yards and one receiving TD per game. The last player to accomplish that feat was former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. in 2014. Chase also became the first player ever with at least 1700 receiving yards and 17 receiving TDs in a single season.

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase in 2024 led the NFL in TD catches of 40 or more yards (seven), 50 or more yards (four) and 60 or more yards (four).

Chase enters the 2025 season with 12 career receiving scores from at least

60 yards out, which are five more than any other player since he came into the league in '21 (regular season). It also is the most such TDs in a career in Bengals history, ahead of former WR Isaac Curtis (10), and marks the most in NFL history by a player under the age of 25. Chase turned 25 on March 1 of this year.

Chase's first TD of the 2024 campaign came on a 41-yard pass from QB Joe Burrow on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington. He then scored on a 63-yard catch-and-run to the end zone in Week 4 at Carolina, and the following week against Baltimore he had TDs of 41 and 70 yards. He became the first NFL player to log four TD receptions of 40-plus yards in a span of three games since former Dallas WR Terrell Owens in 2007.

Ja'Marr passes Housh: WR Ja'Marr Chase's league-leading 127 receptions in 2024 set a Bengals single-season record, surpassing former WR T.J. Houshmandzadeh's previous team mark of 112 in the '07 campaign.

Chase became the first player in Bengals history to finish a season as the NFL's outright receptions leader. Houshmandzadeh is the only other Cincinnati player to come close, as his 112 grabs in 2007 tied New England WR Wes Welker for the league lead.

Chase logged 10 or more catches in four games during the 2024 season, including a season-high 14 in the Week 14 win at Dallas on Monday Night Football. That marked the second-most receptions in a game in Bengals history, trailing Chase's own team record of 15 in Week 5 of the 2023 campaign at Arizona.

In Week 6 of last season against the N.Y. Giants, Chase recorded his 300th career reception in what was his 51st regular-season game played. He became the fastest player in team history to reach that mark, four games ahead of WR A.J. Green (55), and tied for the eighth-fastest in NFL history.

Chase breaks own yardage record: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 1708 receiving yards in 2024 led the NFL and were the most in a season in Bengals history. He eclipsed his own previous team record of 1455 receiving yards set in his 2021 rookie season.

Chase became the second player in team history to lead the league in receiving yards, joining former WR Chad Johnson, who topped the NFL with 1369 yards in 2006.

Chase totaled 100 or more receiving yards in five games in 2024, tied with several players for the most such games in the NFL. It also tied for the most 100-yard receiving games in a season in Chase's career, alongside 2021 and '23.

On his game-winning TD late in the fourth quarter of Week 14 at Dallas, Chase surpassed 5000 career receiving yards. Playing in his 58th regular-season game, he tied former New Orleans WR Michael Thomas for the fifth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that milestone. The only players to get to 5000 receiving yards in fewer games are former San Diego Chargers WR Lance Alworth (52), Minnesota WR Justin Jefferson (52), former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. (54), and former Atlanta WR Julio Jones (56).

Uno finds the end zone: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 17 receiving TDs in 2024 tied the Bengals single-season record, which originally was set by former WR Carl Pickens in 1995. Chase became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in TD catches.

Chase had an NFL-best five games with multiple receiving TDs in 2024, including a career-high-tying three scores in Week 10 at Baltimore. He previously caught three TD passes in Week 17 of the 2021 season vs. Kansas City and Week 5 of 2023 at Arizona. He became the third player in team history to score three receiving TDs in at least three games during his Bengals career, joining Pickens (four games) and former WR Chad Johnson (three).

Chase scored his 40th career receiving TD in Week 11 of 2024 against the L.A. Chargers, in what was his 56th regular-season game. He became the fastest player in Bengals history and the eighth-fastest in NFL history to reach that mark.

Tee's 2024 highlights: WR Tee Higgins, who enters his sixth pro season in 2025, finished the '24 campaign ranking second on the Bengals in receptions (73), receiving yards (911) and receiving TDs (10). His 10 TD catches were a career high and tied for sixth in the NFL last season.

Higgins was inactive for five games in 2024 due to injuries, but in his 12 appearances (nine starts), he further established himself as one of the league's most productive receivers. He returned to the lineup after a three-game hiatus from Weeks 8-10, and over the last nine weeks of the regular season he tied for the NFL lead in receiving TDs (seven) and ranked 17th in receiving yards (570).

Higgins' most notable performance of 2024 came in Week 17 vs. Denver. With Cincinnati facing a must-win situation to keep its playoff hopes alive, Higgins logged a season-high 11 receptions for 131 yards and three TDs, including the game-winning TD catch with 1:07 remaining in overtime. It marked his first career game with three TD receptions, and his 14th career outing with 100 or more receiving yards.

Higgins reached a pair of career milestones in 2024, beginning in Week 7 at Cleveland when he eclipsed 4000 receiving yards. Playing in his 63rd regular-season game, he became the fifth-fastest player in Bengals history to hit that mark. He then recorded his 300th reception in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh, tying former WR Tyler Boyd as the fourth-fastest player in team history to do so (65 games).

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020 (No. 33 overall), Higgins ranks in the top 20 leaguwide in receiving yards (18th; 4595) and receiving TDs (T-14th; 34). He has recorded over 900 receiving yards in four of his five pro seasons, including back-to-back 1000-yard campaigns in 2021 and '22.

Higgins re-signed with the Bengals in March on a four-year contract which keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2028 season.

Tinsley earns roster spot: WR Mitchell Tinsley, who signed a Reserve/Future contract with the Bengals as a free agent in February, emerged as one of the team's top performers during training camp and ultimately earned a role on the initial 53-man roster.

Tinsley caught six passes for 88 yards (tied team lead) and two TDs in two preseason games played. His top showing came in the second preseason contest on Monday Night Football at Washington, when he hauled in five catches for 73 yards and two scores in front of a national audience. His TD grabs were separated by just 20 seconds of game clock, vaulting the Bengals from a 14-14 tie to a 28-14 lead just before halftime.

Both of Tinsley's TDs were highlight-reel plays, beginning with a back-shoulder catch on a throw by QB Jake Browning for a 13-yard score. After a Cincinnati interception on the next play from scrimmage, Browning once again looked Tinsley's way and launched a deep ball that the second-year receiver high-pointed over a defensive back in the corner of the end zone. Both plays continued a trend of contested catches that were a regular sight through four weeks of training camp practices.

"That guy has been making plays all camp," said QB Joe Burrow. "I'm really happy for him. He's a guy that you can really count on. He's smart. He knows all the positions. You have a guy that you can trust like that — that's very valuable."

Tinsley originally entered the NFL as a college free agent signee of Washington in 2023. He saw action in two games for the Commanders as a rookie (no statistics), and was a game day inactive for the remaining 15 games that year. He spent the entire 2024 campaign on Washington's practice squad.

Brown does it all: Chase Brown took over the Bengals' starting HB role midway through his second pro season in 2024 and emerged as a key piece of the offense down the stretch. From Weeks 9-17, when he started at HB in each game, Brown ranked fifth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage (930), fourth in scrimmage yards per game (116.3), seventh in rushing attempts (151) and ninth in rushing yards (631).

Brown also was one of just two players from Weeks 9-17 with at least 600 rushing yards and 250 receiving yards, alongside Detroit RB Jahmyr Gibbs. He wrapped up his season by totaling at least 90 scrimmage yards in each of his final eight games played, making him the second player in team history to reach that total in eight straight contests. The only other Bengal to previously do so was FB Boobie Clark, who had an eight-game streak from Oct. 14-Dec. 2, 1973.

Brown also reached 100 yards from scrimmage in five consecutive games from Weeks 11-16, becoming the first Cincinnati running back to do so since HB BenJarvus Green-Ellis in 2012 (Weeks 11-15). Brown nearly made it six straight in Week 17 vs. Denver, as he had 91 scrimmage yards before suffering an ankle injury late in the fourth quarter that kept him out of action during the overtime period, and ultimately held him out of the regular-season finale at Pittsburgh the following week.

Brown's top statistical performance of last season came in the Week 9 win over Las Vegas, when he posted his first career 100-yard rushing day (120), and added career highs in carries (27) and scrimmage yards (157). In Week 15 at Tennessee, he found the end zone via a rushing and receiving score for the first time in his career.

Brown finished the 2024 season ranking in the top 20 leaguewide in rushing attempts (229; 16th), rushing yards (990; 17th), rushing TDs (seven; T-19th), yards from scrimmage (1350; 17th) and TDs from scrimmage (11; T-17th).

Gesicki's debut season in stripes: The Bengals added Mike Gesicki in the 2024 free agency period, looking to complement their talented receiving corps with a proven pass catcher at the tight end position. The seventh-year pro became a dependable option for QB Joe Burrow in his first season with Cincinnati, as he contributed 65 receptions (second-most in career), 665 receiving yards (third-most) and two receiving TDs.

Gesicki's 65 catches were the second-most in a season by a tight end in Bengals history, trailing only Dan Ross' 71 in 1981. His 665 receiving yards also were the most by a Cincinnati TE since Jermaine Gresham had 737 in 2012.

Gesicki hit several career milestones in the 2024 campaign, beginning with his 100th regular-season game played in Week 2 at Kansas City. He honored the occasion that day with a game-high seven catches for 91 yards. He went on to surpass 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington and 300 receptions in Week 14 at Dallas.

Gesicki's best statistical performance as a Bengal came in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas, when he caught five passes for a season-best 100 yards and two TDs. His second TD, a 47-yarder to help seal the win in the fourth quarter, was the second-longest reception of his career. In Week 17 vs. Denver, Gesicki tied his career high with 10 receptions that went for 86 yards.

Hendrickson reigns as sack champion: DE Trey Hendrickson, who enters his ninth pro season in 2025, is coming off a '24 campaign that saw him lead the NFL with 17.5 sacks. He became the first Bengals player to lead the league in sacks since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982.

Hendrickson's 2024 sack total tied his career high which he recorded the previous year. His 17.5 sacks are the second-most in a season in Cincinnati history, behind former DE Coy Bacon's 22.0 in 1976 (the Bengals tracked sacks back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder). Hendrickson became the first Bengals player to log double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons since former DE/DT Eddie Edwards in 1980-81. He also is just the fifth player in NFL history with 17 or more sacks in back-to-back seasons.

Hendrickson compiled five games with multiple sacks in 2024, highlighted by a career-best four sacks in Week 9 against Las Vegas. He earned AFC Defensive Player of the Week honors for that performance, then received the award again following Week 18 at Pittsburgh when he logged 3.5 sacks.

On Aug. 25, the Bengals and Hendrickson agreed to a revised contract for the 2025 season.

Trey's torrid pace: Since the 2023 season, DE Trey Hendrickson's league-leading 35.0 combined sacks are 4.5 more than any other player. He also is the only NFL player with at least 15 sacks in each of the past two years.

Hendrickson joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2021 offseason, and in his four years in Cincinnati he has totaled 57.0 sacks. That ranks as the third-most in the NFL in that span, trailing only Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (60.0 sacks) and Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (58.5). It also is two shy of former DE Ross Browner (59.0) for the fifth-most sacks in Bengals history.

In addition to his sack totals, Hendrickson has forced 11 fumbles since the start of the 2021 campaign, tied for the second-most leaguewide behind Watt (16). He forced two fumbles in 2024, with a strip-sack in Week 9 vs. Las Vegas and a punch-out on a QB run in Week 15 at Tennessee. Both fumbles were recovered by Cincinnati.

Originally a third-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2017, Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons ('17-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and totaled 6.5 sacks. He then broke out with 13.5 sacks in 2020, which tied for second in the NFL that season.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: LB Logan Wilson enters his sixth NFL season in 2025 with 11 career INTs (regular season), which are the most by any NFL linebacker since he came into the league as a third-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020.

A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson opened his career with two picks in his 2020 rookie campaign, then followed up with four in '21. That 2021 total marked the most INTs in a season by a Bengals LB since Odell Thurman had five in '05. Wilson then followed up with one pick in 2022 and four more in '23.

Wilson's career INTs are the third-most ever by a Bengals LB, trailing only Reggie Williams (16) and Al Beauchamp (15). He also has posted 100 or more tackles in each of the past three seasons, including a career-high 135 stops in 2023 which ranked 15th in the NFL.

Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of three players in the league with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith and Baltimore CB Marlon Humphrey.

Rookie Rehkow sets records: P Ryan Rehkow, who the Bengals acquired on the third day of training camp in 2024, punted 53 times for 2603 yards during his rookie campaign. His 49.11 total yards per punt and 42.92 net yards per punt each set a team single-season record, with both figures surpassing former P Kevin Huber's previous records set in the 2020 season.

Rehkow finished his rookie season ranking sixth in the NFL in net punting average and ninth in gross average. He had 25 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line compared to five touchbacks.

From Weeks 5-7 of last season, Rehkow became the first punter in team history to record four inside-20 punts in three consecutive games. He totaled season highs in punts (eight) and punting yards (354) in Week 7 at Cleveland, with zero attempts going for a touchback.

A historic debut: P Ryan Rehkow kicked off his career with four punts for 258 yards in the 2024 regular-season opener vs. New England. His gross average of 64.5 yards set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole in Week 9 of the 2023 campaign. The previous Bengals (min. three punts) record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkow's second punt against the Patriots was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the New England goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers). Rehkow's 80-yarder also was the third-longest punt in a career debut in NFL history.

In the fourth quarter of the Patriots game, Rehkow launched a 70-yard punt that traveled from the Cincinnati 15-yard line to the New England 15. He also had a 57-yarder for a touchback on his first career punt in the first quarter, and in the second quarter dropped a 51-yarder that was fair caught at the Patriots' 17-yard line.

Rehkow's 52.0 net average was the second-highest in a game in team history behind 55.5 by Huber in Week 13 of 2013 at the San Diego Chargers. It also was the second-highest ever in an NFL debut, trailing only Seattle P Michael Dickson, who averaged 57.5 net yards on Sept. 9, 2018.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson, who heads into his fifth pro season in 2025, has made 24 FGs from 50 or more yards through his first four years. That already is the most such FGs in a career in Bengals history, and is tied for the fifth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021.

McPherson kicked off his career with an NFL-best and Bengals-record nine FGs from at least 50 yards out in his 2021 rookie season. He followed up by going a perfect five-for-five on 50-yard attempts in 2022, then converted seven such kicks in '23. He drilled three FGs from 50-plus yards in 2024, before sustaining a groin injury in Week 13 that kept him out of the final five games.

Overall for his career, McPherson has made 94 of 115 FG attempts, good for

the fourth-highest percentage in team history (81.74). Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," he is a perfect 19-for-19 on FG attempts in the postseason and is Cincinnati's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points). He has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs (including postseason), with the two most memorable coming in the 2021 AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee (52 yards) and the following week in the AFC Championship at Kansas City (31 yards).

McPherson owns five of the seven longest made kicks in Bengals history, led by a career-long 59-yarder that he booted in the 2022 season opener against Pittsburgh. His season long in 2024 was a 56-yarder in Week 4 at Carolina, which at the time tied for the fifth-longest in team history (now tied for sixth).

Preseason kicks: K Evan McPherson has shown off his long-distance kicking ability during the preseason over the last five years, as 11 of his 26 career made FGs in preseason play have been from 50 or more yards.

McPherson converted both of his attempts from 50-plus yards this past preseason, with a 51-yarder on Aug. 7 at Philadelphia and a 54-yarder the following week at Washington. Some of his previous kicks in preseason games include a 57-yarder on Aug. 29, 2021 vs. Miami, a 58- and 56-yarder in the second quarter alone on Aug. 12, 2022 vs. Arizona, and another 58-yarder on Aug. 26, 2023 at Washington.

Overall, McPherson is 26-for-28 on FG attempts and 11-for-13 on tries of 50 or more yards in the preseason. He also is a perfect 19-for-19 on PATs.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of 65,000 or more in 24 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 campaign. That ties the longest streak in team history, matching a previous span of 24 straight home contests from 2005-07.

Each of the 14 highest attended home games in team history, in terms of announced attendance figure, have occurred since the start of the 2022 calendar year. Two of those contests were played in the 2024 season, as Cincinnati welcomed an announced crowd of 67,239 for its "White Bengal" game in Week 8 vs. Philadelphia (second-largest in team history), then hosted an announced figure of 66,546 for the Week 17 overtime thriller against Denver (fourth-largest).

The largest home attendance figure in team history is 67,260, which came in Week 4 of the 2022 season when the Bengals defeated Miami on Thursday Night Football. That figure also marked the largest crowd for a sporting event in Cincinnati history.

Lapham, Parrish to enter Bengals Ring of Honor:

The Bengals announced in July that former OT Dave Lapham and CB Lemar Parrish will be inducted into the team's Ring of Honor at halftime of the Week 8 game against the N.Y. Jets. They will become the 11th and 12th members of the Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 in recognition of former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Lapham, who enters his 50th season with the Bengals in 2025, is one of the team's most popular and beloved historical figures. He was a versatile offensive linemen who donned the stripes from 1974-83, lining up at all five O-line positions during his 140-game career. He served as the team's starting left guard in 1981, when the Bengals advanced to Super Bowl XVI. After his playing career, Lapham moved into the team's radio broadcast booth, where he has worked ever since. Often known as "Mr. Bengal," he has been the team's radio analyst since 1986.

Parrish, known by fans as "Leapin' Lamar," is remembered as one of the most athletically gifted and exciting players in team history. He remains the franchise's highest scoring defensive player, with TD returns on four INTs, four

punts, three fumble recoveries and one kickoff. His 18.8-yard punt return average in 1974 still is the best mark by any player in a season since the '70 NFL/AFL merger. He tallied 25 INTs as a member of the Bengals, the fifth-most in team history, and his six Pro Bowl selections are the second-most by a Cincinnati defensive player.

Lapham and Parrish will join the 10 current Ring of Honor inductees, which include QB Ken Anderson, OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, HB Corey Dillon, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, NT Tim Krumrie, OT Anthony Munoz and CB Ken Riley. Inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Season Ticket Members, then are officially enshrined in the ring during halftime of a Bengals home game that year.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.47 years ... Cincinnati's win at Tennessee in Week 15 of the 2024 season was the 400th regular-season victory in team history ... The Bengals' next win at home will be the franchise's 250th all-time home victory (currently 242 regular-season and seven postseason home wins) ... The Bengals played five road games in

prime time (7 p.m. ET or later) during the 2024 regular season, which were the most such games in a season in NFL history and tied with the 1963 Oakland Raiders (American Football League) for the most ever by any pro team ... The Bengals have netted 21 AFC Player of the Week honors (Offensive, Defensive or Special Teams) since the start of the 2021 season, the third-most by any NFL team in that span, regardless of conference ... According to the NFL's Next Gen Stats service, which tracks players' speed using GPS, the top speed by a Bengals ball-carrier in 2024 was 21.42 mph by WR Ja'Marr Chase on his 70-yard TD in Week 5 vs. Baltimore ... The longest-tenured player on the active roster is TE Drew Sample, who enters his seventh season with the Bengals in 2025 ... The oldest player on the active roster is C Ted Karras, who is 32 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the active roster is DE Shemar Stewart, who is 21 (born Nov. 12, 2003) ... There is a tie for tallest player on the active roster between OT Orlando Brown Jr. and OT Amarius Mims, who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the active roster is HB Tajh Brooks, who is listed at 5-9 ... Brown and Mims also are tied for the heaviest player on the active roster, listed at 350 pounds ... POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** enters his sixth pro season in 2025, and has already established himself as one of the top quarterbacks both in the modern NFL era and in Bengals franchise history. In 2024, he led the league and set Cincinnati single-season records in passing attempts (652), completions (460), passing yards (4918) and TD passes (43). He was named the NFL's Comeback Player of the Year for the second time in his career (also earned honor in 2021 season), after recovering from a wrist injury that held him out of action for the final seven games of the '23 campaign. A native of Athens, Ohio (roughly 2.5 hours from Cincinnati), Burrow helped lead the Bengals to an appearance in Super Bowl LVI in his second NFL season (2021), then piloted Cincinnati to a second straight AFC Championship Game in '22. Known primarily as a traditional pocket passer, he boasts the highest career completion percentage in NFL history (68.6; minimum 1500 attempts), and his 140 career TD passes are the third-most ever in a player's first five seasons. Burrow has been voted to the Pro Bowl twice, in the 2022 and '24 seasons. The Bengals reached the end zone on four out of the five drives Burrow directed in the 2025 preseason, as he completed 18 of 24 passes for 185 yards and three TDs (136.3 passer rating). Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who in 2023 stepped into the starting role for the final seven contests following Burrow's injury. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage above 70 in his first seven career starts. His 1868 passing yards also ranked second leaguewide over the final seven weeks of that regular season. Browning made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time in 2023, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals ('21-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20). He saw action in three games last season as a reserve QB in late-fourth-quarter situations. Browning played in the first two games this preseason and completed 22 of 39 passes for 221 yards and two TDs with one INT.

Running backs: Third-year HB **Chase Brown** looks to continue his ascension in Cincinnati's offense after taking over the starting running back role in the second half of his sophomore season. From Weeks 9-18 of the 2024 campaign, Brown averaged 116.3 yards from scrimmage per game, and his 930 total scrimmage yards in that span ranked eighth among all NFL running backs. His totals last season included 990 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs on 229 carries, along with 54 receptions for 360 yards and four TDs. He also contributed as a rotational kickoff returner, averaging 26.6 yards per return (seven returns for 186 yards). The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice in 2023 out of the University of Illinois, Brown flashed his potential with 335 scrimmage yards as a rookie. His twin brother, Sydney Brown, was his teammate at Illinois and currently plays safety for the Philadelphia Eagles. Chase Brown rushed for 39 yards on 10 carries with one TD this preseason. The Bengals welcomed back a familiar face during the offseason when they signed ninth-year HB **Samaje Perine**. Perine previously had a four-year stint with Cincinnati (2019-22), before spending the '23 season with Denver and '24 with Kansas City. Listed at 5-11, 240 pounds, he is a physical back who contributes both as a pass blocker on third down and as a rotational ball-carrier. In 110 career regular-season games, he has 1922 rushing yards and nine rushing TDs on 474 carries. Some of his top moments with the Bengals came during the team's postseason runs following the 2021 and '22 campaigns, including a 41-yard receiving TD in the '21 AFC Championship win at Kansas City. Perine lined up for 13 total offensive snaps this preseason.

Cincinnati added speed and power to the running backs room when it selected **Tajh Brooks** in the sixth round of this past April's draft. Brooks compiled a record-setting career at Texas Tech University, where he finished his career with the most rushing attempts (879), rushing yards (4557) and 100-yard rushing games (23) in program history. He earned first-team All-Big 12 Conference honors in 2023 and second-team accolades in '24, and in both years he was a semifinalist for the Doak Walker Award (nation's top running back). He also had 548 receiving yards and returned one kickoff for 21 yards, boosting his career all-purpose yards total to 5126 (fifth in school history). Brooks received the most substantial workload among Bengals running backs this preseason, rushing 21 times for 73 yards.

Wide Receivers: Cincinnati's 2021 first-round draft choice **Ja'Marr Chase** has put together one of the most promising starts to a career by a receiver in NFL history. Nicknamed "Uno," Chase has been selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first four seasons, has broken several Bengals single-season records and has established a statistical pace that rivals some of the all-time greatest at his position. He is coming off a 2024 season in which he became the youngest player (24 years old) in the Super Bowl era to claim the receiving "Triple Crown," as he led the league in receptions (127), receiving yards (1708) and receiving TDs (17). His receptions total and receiving yardage each set a Bengals single-season record, while his TDs tied the franchise mark held by WR Carl Pickens (1995). Among all players in NFL history through their first four seasons, Chase ranks third in receiving yards (5425), third in receiving TDs (46) and fourth in catches (395). A constant downfield threat, he also leads the NFL in TD catches of at least 40 yards (18), 50 yards (13) and 60 yards (12) since entering the league in 2021. In the preseason opener at Philadelphia, he picked up where he left off in 2024 by hauling in four catches for a team-high 77 yards with a 36-yard TD. Chase signed a four-year contract extension on March 18, the same day that his running mate **Tee Higgins** re-signed with Cincinnati on a four-year deal. A 2020 second-round pick of the Bengals, Higgins has recorded at least 900 receiving yards in four of his five pro seasons, including consecutive 1000-yard campaigns in '21 and '22. He played in 12 games during the 2024 season (missed five due to injuries), and ranked second on the team behind Chase in catches (73), receiving yards (911) and receiving TDs (10). His 10 scoring grabs were a career high and tied for sixth in the NFL last season. Higgins has 4595 career receiving yards, the 18th-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020 and 13th-most in Bengals history. Listed at 6-4, he has earned a reputation for his extended catch radius and being able to high-point the ball over defensive backs. Higgins lined up for 22 offensive snaps this preseason. **Andre Iosivas** enters his third season aiming to build on a promising sophomore campaign. He brought in 36 catches for 479 yards and six TDs in 2024, following a rookie year in '23 that saw him net 116 yards and four TDs on 15 grabs. He has carved out a niche for getting open in the low red zone, as each of his 10 career TD catches have come on plays inside the opponent's 10-yard line. Iosivas was a two-sport athlete at Princeton, as in addition to his All-Ivy League football resume, he was an All-American heptathlete for the Tigers' track and field program. He was selected by the Bengals in the sixth round of the 2023 NFL Draft and earned a spot on the 53-man roster out of his rookie training camp. WR **Jermaine Burton** is eyeing an increased role in the offense going into his sophomore season, after totaling four catches for 107 yards in 14 games played as a rookie. Two of his receptions went for over 40 yards, and he also contributed 13 kickoff returns for 378 yards (29.1 average).

Burton began his collegiate career at the University of Georgia (2020-21), then transferred to the University of Alabama for his final two seasons ('22-23) before being selected by the Bengals in the third round of the '24 NFL Draft. In 2023, his final year with the Crimson Tide, he led the SEC and ranked sixth nationally in yards per reception (20.5). Burton caught 10 passes for 19 yards and returned four kickoffs for 84 yards (21.0) this preseason. Third-year receiver **Charlie Jones** has served as the Bengals' primary kickoff and punt returner during his first two pro seasons, but he also has contributed eight career receptions for 69 yards. He saw action in the first eight games of 2024, before suffering a groin injury that kept him out of the final nine contests. He returned to action this preseason and led all Bengals WRs in receptions (seven) for 73 yards and one TD. In 2022, his final collegiate season which he spent at Purdue University, Jones led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). Among the top offensive performers throughout this training camp and preseason was WR **Mitchell Tinsley**, who earned a spot on the 53-man roster after signing a Reserve/Future contract with Cincinnati in February. Originally a college free agent signee of Washington in 2023, Tinsley played in two games as a rookie for the Commanders (no statistics), then spent the '24 season on their practice squad. He faced his former team in the Bengals' second preseason game at Washington and posted five catches for 73 yards and two highlight-reel TDs. The 6-1, 205-pound prospect finished his college career at Penn State in 2022, after previous stops at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas ('18-19) and Western Kentucky University ('20-21).

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 78 career regular-season games with 50 starts and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. He took over the top spot on the depth chart in the second half of the 2023 season, and has started 23 of his last 26 appearances. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 100 career receptions for 730 yards and four TDs. He missed most of the 2022 campaign due to a knee injury, but returned for the '23 opener and has suited up in each of Cincinnati's last 34 games. Sample enters his seventh season with the Bengals as the longest-tenured player on the team. He played 31 offensive in two preseason games this year and had one catch. Eighth-year veteran **Mike Gesicki** joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent during the 2024 offseason and provides the offense with an athletic pass-catching TE. In his first season in Cincinnati, he ranked third on the team in receptions (65) and receiving yards (665). His catch total was the second-most in a season by a Bengals TE (Dan Ross, 71 in 1981), while his yardage was the most by a Cincinnati TE since 2012 (Jermaine Gresham, 737). Gesicki hit several career milestones last season, including his 100th regular-season game played (Week 2 at Kansas City), his 3000th receiving yard (Week 3 vs. Washington) and his 300th reception (Week 14 at Dallas). He entered the league as a second-round pick of Miami in 2018, and spent his first five seasons ('18-22) with the Dolphins before playing for New England in '23. One of the most recent additions to the Bengals' roster is TE **Noah Fant**, who signed with the team as a free agent on July 31. A former first-round pick of Denver in 2019 (No. 20 overall), Fant spent three seasons with the Broncos ('19-21), before being traded to Seattle, where he played the past three years ('22-24). He has suited up for 95 career regular-season games with 83 starts, and has caught 300 passes for 3305 yards and 15 TDs. Known for his speed at the TE position, he has logged at least 400 receiving yards in each season he has been in the NFL, including a career-high 673 yards with the Broncos in 2020. Fant made his first appearance in stripes in the second preseason game at Washington, starting at TE and playing 16 offensive snaps. Sixth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** is a reserve TE who has enjoyed his best career statistical seasons in 2023 and '24 with the Bengals. After totaling 15 receptions for 199 yards over his first four seasons on an active roster (2019-22), he posted career highs in catches (39) and yards (352) for Cincinnati in '23, then followed up with 19 for 154 in '24. Hudson joined the Bengals' practice squad late in 2022, after spending time with Tampa Bay ('18-20), San Francisco ('19) and the N.Y. Giants ('22). He won Super Bowl LV with the Buccaneers (2020 season), seeing action in each of their four games during that postseason. He led all Bengals with nine receptions in the 2025 preseason, which included a two-TD performance on Aug. 7 at Philadelphia. **Cam Grandy** aims for an increased role in his second season with the Bengals, after playing in eight games with six starts as a rookie last year. He began the 2024 campaign on the team's practice squad before signing to the active roster midway through the regular season. He totaled five catches for 28 yards while contributing as a blocker in the run game. Grandy was an All-American at the FCS level with Illinois State University, where in 2023 he led all Missouri Valley Conference tight ends with 612 receiving yards on 63 receptions.

Offensive linemen: Headlining the Bengals' offensive line room is

four-time Pro Bowler **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who has started all 28 games he has played in for Cincinnati at LOT. Brown signed with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023, after spending his first three pro seasons ('18-20) with Baltimore then two ('21-22) with Kansas City. He made his first 32 career starts at ROT for the Ravens before transitioning midway through the 2020 campaign to LOT, where he has lined up for each of his last 70 regular-season games played. He started 11 contests for the Bengals last season, but missed six due to knee and fibula injuries. Brown also was Cincinnati's nominee for the 2024 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his efforts with Breakthrough T1D, a type 1 diabetes research organization. His father, the late Orlando Brown Sr., played nine NFL seasons (1994-99, 2003-05), spending time with Cleveland and Baltimore. Brown Jr. started at LOT in each of the Bengals' first two preseason games this year, lining up for 44 total offensive snaps. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who enters his fourth season with the Bengals and 10th in the NFL in 2025. Karras has been voted a team captain in each of his three previous years with Cincinnati, as he became a vocal leader in the locker room almost instantaneously after signing with the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2022. On field, he has started 53 consecutive games at center for the Bengals, lining up for 99.5 percent of the team's offensive snaps in that span. Off the field, he was the team's 2023 nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award, honored for his charitable work with the Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." Karras spent five of his first six pro seasons with New England, where he won a pair of Super Bowls in 2016 and '18. Slotted as the starting ROT is second-year pro **Amarius Mims**, who impressed his teammates and coaches during his rookie season after being selected by Cincinnati in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft (No. 18 overall). Mims played in 15 games with 13 starts at ROT last year, taking over the starting role in Week 4. He came to the Bengals following three seasons (2021-23) at the University of Georgia, where he played in 29 career games and was part of back-to-back national championship teams ('21-22). Listed at 6-8, 350 pounds, he is tied with Brown Jr. as both the tallest and heaviest player on the Bengals' roster. Cincinnati added more veteran experience to the offensive line room when it signed ninth-year G **Lucas Patrick** this past March. Patrick has seen action in 112 total NFL games (including postseason), spending time with Green Bay (2016-21), Chicago ('22-23) and New Orleans ('24). Of his 64 career starts, 28 have come at center, 19 at LG and 17 at RG. He has started 58 of his last 67 games played, after making just six starts in his first 40 career appearances. Patrick lined up primarily at LG in his 11 games played for the Saints last season. He started Cincinnati's first two preseason contests at RG this year and played a combined 37 offensive snaps. Rookie **Dylan Fairchild** looks to cement his spot as the Bengals' starting LG early this season. A fourth-round pick of Cincinnati this past April, Fairchild concluded his career at the University of Georgia last season with second-team All-America and second-team All-SEC honors. He started all 14 games for the Bulldogs in 2024 and pass-protected for an offense that ranked third in the conference in passing (281.0 net yards per game). He played in 34 total games over four seasons (2021-24) at Georgia, with each of his 24 career starts occurring in the past two years. In addition to being a football standout at West Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga., he was a two-time Georgia state champion wrestler in the Class 7A heavyweight division. A veteran with valuable position versatility is OT **Cody Ford**, whose nine starts for the Bengals in 2024 included five at LOT, two at LG, one at ROT and one as a tackle-eligible third TE. Ford entered the league as a second-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2019 and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, before being traded to Arizona during training camp in '22. He signed with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent in 2023 and saw action in all 17 contests during his debut season with the Bengals. Ford was college teammates with Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma from 2015-17. Cincinnati's most recent addition to the O-line room is seventh-year G **Dalton Risner**, who signed with the Bengals as a free agent on Aug. 28. A 2019 second-round draft pick of Denver, Risner spent his first four seasons ('19-22) with the Broncos before playing for Minnesota from '23-24. He has played in 87 career regular-season games with 81 starts — 73 at LG and eight at RG. The Bengals' offensive coaching staff noted the positional versatility of G **Jalen Rivers**, who enters his rookie season listed at tackle but also lined up at guard during his career at the University of Miami (Fla.). Rivers was selected by Cincinnati in the fifth round of this year's draft after appearing in 38 games with 29 starts over five seasons (2020-24) in Coral Gables. He was the Hurricanes' starting LOT his final two years, and picked up second-team All-ACC honors in 2023 followed by honorable mention all-conference in '24. Rivers played 101 offensive snaps this preseason. C **Matt Lee** enters his second pro season with the Bengals after seeing action in all 17 games for Cincinnati in 2024. He lined up for 27 total offensive snaps and 86 special teams snaps, and made his first career start in Week 16 vs. Cleveland as a tackle-eligible third TE. Lee was a seventh-round

pick of the Bengals in the 2024 draft, following a five-year college career (2019-23) that saw him go from the University of Central Florida ('19-22) to Miami (Fla.) for his final season. He started 11 games at C in his lone season at Miami and was named second-team All-ACC.

Defensive linemen: The Bengals' defensive line room is headlined by **Trey Hendrickson**, a ninth-year defensive end who has been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his four seasons with Cincinnati (2021-24). He has posted 17.5 sacks in each of the past two seasons, with last year's total leading the NFL. He became the first Bengals player to pace the league in sacks since it became an officially tracked statistic in 1982. Hendrickson was a first-team All-Pro selection by the Associated Press in 2024 and finished second in voting for AP Defensive Player of the Year. He has 57 total sacks since joining the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in the 2021 offseason, the third-most leaguewide in that span, while his 11 FFs are tied for second-most. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of New Orleans in 2017 and spent his first four seasons ('17-20) with the Saints. Anchoring the D-line is eighth-year DT **B.J. Hill**, who was acquired by Cincinnati in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first Bengals season, Hill has started each of his last 54 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22. A productive pass rusher from the interior of the D-line, he has totaled 16 sacks as a Bengal while also batting down/tipping 13 passes. Each of his three sacks last season came in December, as he got to the QB in three straight games from Weeks 13-15. Among the notable free agent acquisitions this year for the Bengals was DT **T.J. Slaton Jr.**, who spent his first four pro seasons (2021-24) with Green Bay. Originally a fifth-round pick of the Packers in 2021, he has played in 68 regular-season games with 36 starts and totaled 133 tackles, six TFLs, two sacks and four PDs. He made his first career start in the 2022 season finale and has started each of his last 36 games played, with 18 of those coming at nose tackle, 17 at DT and one at DE. He also has suited up for four postseason games with three starts. Slaton started each of Cincinnati's first two preseason games this year. DE **Joseph Ossai** looks to carry his productive finish to the 2024 campaign into his fifth pro season in '25. Ossai logged five sacks over the final seven contests, which included a streak of three straight games with a sack from Weeks 11-14. He originally was a third-round pick of the Bengals in 2021 and missed his entire rookie year due to a knee injury, but has since been out of the lineup for just three games in the past three seasons. He has 9.5 sacks and seven TFLs in 47 career regular-season games (three starts). Ossai was born in Nigeria (Keti Ijanikin, Lagos), and moved to the United States at age 10 — the same year he saw his first football game. DE **Myles Murphy**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2023, began his sophomore season in '24 on the Reserve/Injured list due to a knee injury before returning to action in early October. He played in 13 games last season, tallying 20 tackles and one PD. He saw action in all 17 contests during his 2023 rookie campaign and logged 20 stops with three sacks. He was a first-team All-ACC pick in his final season at Clemson University, where he amassed 17.5 career sacks in 38 games for the Tigers. Second-year DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** looks to build off a 2024 rookie season that saw him move into the starting lineup for the final seven games. He saw action in 15 contests with nine starts overall, and posted 31 tackles with three sacks. He finished off an impressive career at the University of Michigan by earning second-team All-America honors and helping the Wolverines win the national title in 2023, then was selected by the Bengals in the second round of the '24 draft. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., was a four-time Pro Bowler during his 10-year playing career (2001-10) as a DT for Carolina and the N.Y. Jets. Cincinnati followed up their selection of Jenkins in 2024 by picking DT **McKinnley Jackson** in the third round. Jackson began his rookie season on the Reserve/Injured list with a knee injury, but returned ahead of Week 5 and played in 13 games. He contributed 15 tackles, two TFLs, one sack and one FF, earning an increased role in the back half of the season. He played in 40 career games at Texas A&M University, where he was voted a team captain in each of his final two years (2022-23). He played in all three Bengals preseason games this year and led the team with four TFLs. A teammate of Jackson's at Texas A&M was DE **Shemar Stewart**, who heard his name called by the Bengals in the first round of this year's draft (No. 17 overall). Noted in the scouting process for his physical traits, Stewart was one of two players in the 2025 draft class to produce a perfect 10.0 on the Relative Athletic Score, which grades a player's measurements compared to their peer group. He played in 37 games with 19 starts across three seasons (2022-24) with the Aggies, and totaled 65 tackles with 11 TFLs and 4.5 sacks. He earned third-team All-SEC honors last season, when he led Texas A&M with 39 pressures and seven QB hurries. Members of Cincinnati's defensive coaching staff have expressed their excitement for the return of fifth-year DE **Cam Sample**, who missed the entire 2024 campaign due

to an Achilles injury sustained during training camp. A 2021 Bengals fourth-round pick, Sample has played in 47 career games with three starts and has five sacks. He also has seen action in six postseason games, and notched a sack in the AFC Championship at Kansas City following the 2022 season. Sample lined up in two preseason contests this year and served as one of two game captains in his return to action on Aug. 7 at Philadelphia. Rookie DT **Howard Cross III** made the 53-man roster after signing with the Bengals as a college free agent in May. Cross compiled a noteworthy career under current Bengals defensive coordinator Al Golden at Notre Dame, where he suited up in 65 games with 35 starts across six seasons (2019-24). He was named a second-team All American by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA) in 2024, when he started 13 games for a Fighting Irish team that reached the College Football Playoff National Championship Game. His father, Howard Cross Jr., played 13 seasons as a TE with the N.Y. Giants (1989-2001). Cross III posted seven tackles and an INT in three preseason games played for Cincinnati.

Linebackers: **Logan Wilson** missed the final six games of the 2024 season due to a knee injury, but was a full participant this training camp and will lead the Bengals' LB room in his sixth pro season. A 2020 third-round pick of Cincinnati, he has played in 68 career regular-season games (58 starts) and has developed into one of the NFL's most productive LBs. He has topped 100 tackles in each of the past three seasons, and his 11 career INTs are the most by any player at his position since he entered the league. He is one of three NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five FFs since 2020, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith and Baltimore CB Marlon Humphrey. Wilson's injury last season ended a streak of 39 straight starts. Rookie **Demetrius Knight Jr.** was selected by the Bengals in the second round of this year's NFL Draft, coming off a breakout season at the University of South Carolina in 2024. A versatile LB who was touted for his leadership qualities during the draft process, Knight played in 13 games with 10 starts during his lone season with the Gamecocks and ranked second on the team with 82 tackles. He spent his first four college seasons (2019-22) at Georgia Tech, then played at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in '23. He was a four-year starter at QB in high school, then transitioned to LB at Georgia Tech. Eighth-year veteran **Oren Burks** signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March, after helping Philadelphia win Super Bowl LIX the previous month. Burks was a key performer for the Eagles during their postseason run, as he recorded 24 tackles, three TFLs, one sack and two FFs (one defensive, one on kickoff coverage) in four games. He entered the NFL as a third-round pick of Green Bay in 2018 and spent his first four pro seasons with the Packers ('18-21), before playing for San Francisco from '22-23. Burks has played in 108 career regular-season games with 17 starts, and he has been a part of six playoff teams in his seven pro seasons. Rookie **Barrett Carter** was noted for his versatility and all-around value when the Bengals drafted him in the fourth round this April. He played in 52 games with 40 starts during a four-year career (2021-24) at Clemson University, and amassed 233 tackles, 31.5 TFLs, 12.5 sacks, 21 pass breakups, three INTs and two FFs. Over the span of his four collegiate seasons, he was the nation's only player with at least 30 TFLs, 20 PBUs and three picks. Last season, he was a team captain, first-team All-ACC, third-team All-American and a finalist for the Butkus Award (nation's top LB). Carter made several splash plays in two preseason appearances for Cincinnati, including an INT on Aug. 18 at Washington. **Shaka Heyward** aims for an increased role this season after playing in six games for the Bengals in the back half of the 2024 campaign. A 2023 college free agent signee, he spent his entire rookie year and most of the '24 season on Cincinnati's practice squad, before signing to the active roster in December. He earned a role on special teams, recording three ST tackles and forcing a fumble on punt coverage, while also contributing four defensive stops. Heyward ranked second on the Bengals with 14 tackles this preseason.

Cornerbacks: A second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2022, **Cam Taylor-Britt** has played in 39 regular-season games with 38 starts for Cincinnati and taken on the role as the team's top boundary cornerback. He had a career-high 16 PDs in 2024, which led the team and tied for fifth-most in the NFL, along with three INTs. He missed four games late in the 2023 campaign due to injury, but still managed to tie for the team lead with four picks and notched 11 PDs. Taylor-Britt suited up for all 17 games for the first time in his career last season. The Bengals' first draft choice in 2022 was **Dax Hill**, who spent his first two seasons at safety before making the transition to CB ahead of the '24 campaign. He started the first five games of last season at CB, but suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 5 vs. Baltimore. He underwent a full rehabilitation over the past 10 months and participated in team drills as well as the team's second preseason game at Washington. A natural athlete who lined up at several positions in the secondary during his career at the University of Michigan (2019-21), Hill primarily contributed on special teams throughout his 2022 rookie season before starting all 17 contests at S in '23. That year, he led Cincinnati's

defensive backs with a career-high 110 tackles. CB **DJ Turner II** was emerging as a starting CB for the Bengals in 2024, before a collarbone injury in Week 11 at the L.A. Chargers ended his sophomore campaign. A second-round draft choice in 2023, he has played in 28 games with 18 starts through two seasons and recorded 78 tackles, three TFLs, one sack, 15 PDs and one FR. He was a teammate of Hill's at Michigan, where he earned two All-Big Ten honors. Turner ran the fastest time in the 40-yard dash at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. Turner started the preseason opener at Philadelphia and played 14 defensive snaps. Nickel CB **Josh Newton** looks to continue building his status as a core member of the defense in his second pro season. A fifth-round pick in 2024, he earned a roster spot as a rookie last August and played in all 17 games. He was thrust into the starting lineup following Turner's shoulder injury and started the final six games, and that stretch included his first career INT in Week 15 at Tennessee and a season-high seven tackles in the season finale at Pittsburgh. He finished his rookie campaign with 29 tackles, seven PDs and one pick. Newton spent his final two collegiate seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, where he started all 27 games he played in. The Bengals acquired CB **Marco Wilson** on waivers from New England last November, adding needed depth and experience after Turner's injury. Wilson spent the majority of his first three pro seasons (2021-23) with Arizona, before being waived by the Cardinals and signed by the Patriots in December of '23. He has played in 60 career regular-season games with 37 starts, and has logged 176 tackles, 20 PDs, three INTs and three FFs. He saw action in the final six games for Cincinnati last season and tallied two tackles along with one PD. **DJ Ivey** made his return to action midway through the 2024 season, after recovering from a knee injury sustained late in the '23 campaign. A 2023 seventh-round draft pick of the Bengals, he carved out a role on special teams and showed flashes on defense prior to the injury. In 11 games played last season, he recorded three solo tackles and two PDs defensively, while also contributing one tackle on special teams. Ivey totaled eight tackles in three games played this preseason.

Safeties: **Geno Stone** started all 17 games at safety in his debut Bengals season in 2024, after signing with Cincinnati as an unrestricted free agent last offseason. He led the team with four INTs (tied for 10th in NFL), which included a stretch of three straight games with a pick from Weeks 14-16. He spent his first four pro seasons (2020-23) with Baltimore, and emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in '23 when his career-high seven INTs led the AFC. His 11 total INTs since the start of the 2023 campaign are tied for the second-most leaguewide. Stone also ranked third on the Bengals last season with 81 tackles. **Jordan Battle** enters his third pro season in 2025 slotted alongside Stone as a starting safety for Cincinnati. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, Battle has played in 34 games with 13 starts through two seasons and registered 122 tackles, five TFLs, two sacks, eight PDs, two INTs and one FR. His starting roles in previous seasons have come late in the year, as he started each of the final seven contests in 2023, then each of the final six in '24. He was a team captain and third-team All-American in his final season at the University of Alabama (2022). **Tycen Anderson** enters his fourth season as a special teams ace and rotational safety. He has led the Bengals in special teams tackles in each of the past two seasons, with eight in 2023 followed by 11 in '24. He missed his entire rookie regular season in 2022 due to a knee injury, but

recovered in time for the start of the following training camp and had two INTs in the '23 preseason opener. He was the recipient of the team's 2024 Ed Block Courage Award, in recognition of his dedication and work ethic during his injury rehab process. Anderson logged eight tackles and an INT in two preseason games played this year. **PJ Jules** cracked the 53-man roster for the first time this year, after spending his entire rookie season in 2024 on the Bengals' practice squad. A 2024 college free agent signee, he was a consensus first-team FCS All-American and first-team All-Missouri Valley Football Conference choice at Southern Illinois University in 2023. He wrapped up his tenure with the Salukis by totaling 111 tackles, 13 TFLs and 11 PBUs in 2023. Jules played in all three preseason games for the Bengals this year and registered a team-leading 10 solo tackles.

Special Teams: A fifth-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2021, **K Evan McPherson** owns the fourth-highest career FG percentage in team history (81.74). He has converted 94 of 115 FG attempts in the regular season, and is a perfect 19 of 19 in postseason play. He knocked through 16 of 22 tries in the 2024 campaign, before sustaining a groin injury in Week 13 vs. Pittsburgh that kept him out of the final five games. His 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards already are the most in Bengals history, and are tied for the fifth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. He has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times, and has seven career "walk-off" game-winning FGs as time expired (including postseason). McPherson has converted each of his three FG attempts during preseason play this year, with two coming from 50-plus yards. Second-year P **Ryan Rehkow** is coming off a record-setting rookie campaign in 2024 that saw him set Bengals single-season marks for gross punting average (49.11 yards per punt) and net average (42.92). His net average ranked sixth among all NFL punters last season, while his gross ranked ninth (both led all rookies). Rehkow was named to the 2024 Pro Football Writers of America All-Rookie Team. He kicked off his career with an NFL single-game record 64.5 yards per punt (minimum four punts) in the 2024 regular-season opener against New England. He joined the Bengals as a free agent three days into training camp in 2024. Rehkow punted 15 times for 674 yards with eight downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line this preseason. Rookie **William Wagner** earned the role as the Bengals' long snapper entering this season, after signing with the team as a college free agent in May. He spent six seasons (2019-24) at the University of Michigan, where he saw action in 53 total games. In 2024, he delivered snaps on 22 FG attempts, 26 PATs and 54 punts, earning first-team All-Big Ten honors while being named a finalist for the Mannelly Award (nation's top LS). Wagner recorded 13 snaps without an unplayable delivery this preseason. WR **Charlie Jones** serves as Cincinnati's primary kickoff and punt returner. He is one of two players in team history to score a TD on both (CB **Lemar Parrish**), as he found the end zone on an 81-yard PR in Week 2 of the 2023 season vs. Baltimore, and also had a 100-yard KOR on the opening kickoff of Week 7 at Cleveland last year. He took over KOR duties for the first time in 2024, and finished the year with five returns for 200 yards. He has 37 career PRs for 347 yards (9.4). This preseason, Jones logged one KOR for 30 yards and one PR for four yards. Also in the mix to return kickoffs and punts is second-year WR **Jermaine Burton**, who took over KOR responsibilities late last season following an injury to Jones. Burton had 13 KORs for 378 yards (29.1 average), including two 38-yarders. He logged four KORs for 84 yards this preseason, as well as two PRs for 35 yards.

THE LAST BENGALS-BROWNS MEETINGS

Cincinnati Bengals 21, Cleveland Browns 14 Sunday, Oct. 20, 2024 at Huntington Bank Field

WR Charlie Jones returned the opening kickoff 100 yards for a TD and Cincinnati's defense recorded two INTs as the Bengals earned their first win at Cleveland since 2017. A Browns TD before halftime pulled them within a point, but starting QB Deshaun Watson exited the game with an Achilles injury during the scoring drive and did not return. QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson entered the game and threw two picks in the second half, one to Bengals DE Sam Hubbard and the second to S Geno Stone. Cincinnati built a 21-6 lead in the third period on a pair of TD passes from QB Joe Burrow, who finished the game 15 of 25 for 181 yards and no turnovers. The Browns turned to their emergency third QB, Jameis Winston, on their final drive of the game, and Winston threw a TD pass followed by a two-point conversion to cut the Bengals' lead to seven with 1:27 left. However, Cincinnati recovered the ensuing onside kick to squander any potential Cleveland final-minute comeback attempt. The Bengals improved to 3-4, while Cleveland fell to 1-6.

2024 SEASON WEEK 16, GAME 15

Cincinnati Bengals 24, Cleveland Browns 6 Sunday, Dec. 22, 2024 at Paycor Stadium

The Bengals recorded three takeaways against the Browns on defense and 326 net yards on offense to complete their first season sweep over Cleveland since 2017. Browns RB Jerome Ford broke off a 66-yard run on the opening play from scrimmage, but three plays later RB D'Onta Foreman was stripped by S Vonn Bell at the goal line to keep the game scoreless. Cincinnati followed the takeaway with a 99-yard drive, capped off by a two-yard TD pass from QB Joe Burrow to WR Tee Higgins. Burrow finished 23 of 30 for 252 yards and three TDs, becoming the first QB in NFL history to pass for at least 250 yards and three TDs in seven consecutive games. The Bengals stretched their lead to 17-0 when K Cade York tied a team record with a 59-yard FG as the first half expired. Cincinnati picked off Browns QB Dorian Thompson-Robinson twice in the fourth quarter, as S Jordan Battle and S Geno Stone had INTs on consecutive defensive possessions to maintain the Bengals' two-score advantage. Cincinnati improved to 7-8, while Cleveland fell to 3-12.
