GAME INFORMATION

Kickoff: 1 p.m. Eastern.

Television: The game will air on CBS-TV. In the Bengals' home region, it will be carried by WKRC-TV (Ch. 12) in Cincinnati, WHIO-TV (Ch. 7) in Dayton and WKYT-TV (Ch. 27) in Lexington. Broadcasters are Kevin Harlan (play-by-play), Trent Green (analyst) and Melanie Collins (sideline reporter).

Radio: The game will air on the Bengals Radio Network, which is led by Cincinnati flagship stations WLW-AM (700), WCKY-AM (1530) and WEBN-FM (102.7). Broadcasters are Dan Hoard (play-by-play) and Dave Lapham (analyst).

In addition, the game will air nationally on Compass Radio Networks. Broadcasters are Chris Carrino (play-by-play) and Brian Baldinger (analyst).

Setting the scene: The Bengals meet their first AFC North Division foe of the 2024 season when they welcome the Baltimore Ravens to Paycor Stadium on Sunday.

Cincinnati is coming off its first win of the young season, a 34-24 victory at Carolina. The Bengals mounted a 17-point lead late in the third quarter, which was built in large part by executing the "double-dip" with TDs to close out the first half and open the second. The Panthers then cut their deficit to seven and regained possession with a chance to tie it late in the fourth quarter, but Cincinnati forced a three-and-out and put together an extended FG drive that sealed the result.

"It's good to get a win," said head coach Zac Taylor. "I thought there were a lot of good things all the way around. Still things we're going to have to clean up that we could have capitalized on there in the second half. But I thought there was really good team football there with defense getting stops, great field position off the punts and offense capitalizing. I thought there was really good complementary football there over the course of the game."

The Bengals were able to create a crucial momentum shift early in the game, when after Carolina marched down to the Cincinnati one-yard line on its opening drive, the defensive front led by rookie DT Kris Jenkins Jr. stuffed the Panthers on fourth-and-goal. Cincinnati's defense stepped up again later in the first quarter when DE Trey Hendrickson altered a passing attempt by Panthers QB Andy Dalton, and S Vonn Bell — who spent the 2023 season with Carolina — grabbed his first INT of the season.

The Bell pick was followed by four consecutive TD drives from the Bengals' offense, beginning with HB Chase Brown's first career rushing score that gave Cincinnati a 7-0 lead. Then midway through the second quarter, WR Ja'Marr Chase caught a pass from QB Joe Burrow near midfield and fought off several would-be tacklers before taking it down the left sideline for a 63-yard TD. It was the third receiving TD of over 30 yards this season for Chase, who finished his afternoon with three grabs for a team-high 85 yards.

"That was an unbelievable play," Burrow said. "He continues to make incredible plays like that and it's a reminder for me, you've just got to find ways to get him the ball."

After the Panthers tied the score at 14, Cincinnati took over possession with 1:09 remaining in the first half and quickly moved down the field to set up a third-and-goal with six seconds remaining. Burrow took the snap and found HB Zack Moss out of the backfield, and the free agent acquisition shook off an oncoming safety to find the end zone with one tick left.

The Bengals then opened the third quarter by moving 71 yards in eight plays, culminating in Brown's second rushing TD to make it 28-14. Brown, a

second-year back out of the University of Illinois who is seeing his offensive role increase by the game, finished with a career-high 80 yards on 15 attempts. Coupled with Moss' 51 yards on the ground and a 10-yard scramble from Burrow, Cincinnati posted a season-best 141 rushing yards with 4.5 per carry.

"With the O-line up front, with the way they're blocking, it makes my life easier," Brown said. "We're just going to keep on doing what we're doing right now, I'm going to keep sticking to my routing and keep this style of football going."

The offensive line also had a strong showing in pass protection and gave up zero sacks, allowing Burrow to complete 71 percent of his passes (22 of 31) for 232 yards and two TDs with one INT. Burrow has led the offense to an average of 30.7 points over the past three games, and he heads into Week 5 ranking in the top five leaguewide in completions (95; third), TD passes (seven; T-third) and passer rating (105.9; fifth).

"Apart from Week 1, we've played at a really, really high level," said Burrow on the offensive execution. "That's exciting. By no means has it been perfect. We've still got a lot of room to improve. I have a lot of room to improve."

Burrow and company get set to take on a stingy Ravens defense that held Buffalo to 10 points in its Week 4 win. On the other side of the ball, Cincinnati prepares for a Ravens offense that is leading the NFL in total yards per game (429.5 yards per game) and rushing yards per game (220.3).

The series: The series is relatively even overall, with Baltimore currently holding a 30-26 lead in regular season, and Cincinnati holding a 1-0 lead in postseason. The Ravens, however, currently hold a two-game win streak with a sweep of the Bengals last season.

It hasn't been an easy series for the visiting team. The Ravens lead 19-9 in Baltimore, and the Bengals lead 18-11 in Cincinnati (including postseason).

Brown's late father, Orlando Brown, also played for the Ravens for six seasons (1996-98, 2003-05) ... Bengals S Geno Stone was a seventh-round draft pick of the Ravens in 2020 and spent his first three seasons ('20-23) with Baltimore ... Bengals DT Lawrence Guy played for the Ravens from 2014-16 ... Bengals assistant head coach/special teams coordinator Darrin Simmons served as the Ravens'

assistant special teams coach and assistant strength and conditioning coach in 1998 ... Bengals career records watch: As Cincinnati continues the 2024 campaign, here is a look at potential upcoming movement on the Bengals' career records lists (regular season):

- QB Joe Burrow has 2029 career passing attempts, 192 shy of QB Jeff Blake (2221) for fifth all-time. QBs Ken Anderson (4475), Andy Dalton (4449), Boomer Esiason (3564) and Carson Palmer (3217) hold the top four spots on the team's career list.
- Burrow has 15,061 passing yards, 73 shy of Blake (15,134) for fifth all-time. Anderson (32,838), Dalton (31,594), Esiason (27,149) and Palmer (22,694) hold the top four spots.
- Burrow in Week 3 vs. Washington recorded his 20th career game with 300 or more passing yards, which surpassed Anderson for third-most all-time. Dalton (28) and Esiason (23) hold the top two spots for the team's most 300-yard passing games.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase has 32 career receiving TDs, nine shy of WR Eddie Brown (41) for fifth all-time. WRs Chad Johnson (66), A.J. Green (65), Carl Pickens (63) and Isaac Curtis (53) hold the top four spots.
- Chase has 15 games with 100 or more receiving yards, three shy of WR Cris Collinsworth (18) for fifth all-time. Green (33), Johnson (31), Curtis (20) and Pickens (19) hold the top four spots.
- DE Trey Hendrickson has 42.5 sacks as a member of the Bengals, 16.5

shy of DE Ross Browner (59.0) for fifth all-time. DE Eddie Edwards (83.5), DE Carlos Dunlap (82.5), DT Geno Atkins (75.5) and LB Reggie Williams (62.5) hold the top four spots.

- K Evan McPherson has an 84.5 career FG percentage (87 made/103 attempts), the third-highest mark in team history. K Shayne Graham (86.8 percent; 177/202) and Randy Bullock (84.9 percent; 90/106) hold the top two spots.

Records vs. Ravens: In the first-ever Bengals-Ravens game on Nov. 3, 1996 at Baltimore's Memorial Stadium, head coach Bruce Coslet's Bengals overcame what still stands today as the largest deficit (18 points) to win a regular-season road game in franchise history. The Ravens led 21-3 at halftime, but Cincinnati rallied for a 24-21 win on a 39-yard Doug Pelfrey field goal at the final gun. Not until the 2021 season's AFC Championship did the Bengals finally match that road feat (overcoming a 21-3 deficit at Kansas City to earn a berth in Super Bowl LVI).

The Bengals' second-biggest regular-season comeback in a road win also was set at Baltimore. On Dec. 5, 2004 at M&T Bank Stadium, Cincinnati rallied from a 20-3 deficit to win 27-26. The Bengals matched that 17-point deficit road comeback on Dec. 18, 2022 when they came back from being down 17-0 to win 34-23 at Tampa Bay.

Also:

- On Nov. 22, 1998 in Cincinnati, Ravens RB Priest Holmes rushed for 227 yards, the most ever recorded against the Bengals in a game.
- On Sept. 23, 2001 in Cincinnati, Ravens QB Elvis Grbac attempted 63 passes, the most ever against the Bengals in a game.
- The Bengals record for kickoff return yardage in a game (228 yards) was set at Baltimore by HB Brandon Bennett on Nov. 10, 2002. Bennett had a 94-yarder for a TD.
- Also on Nov. 10, 2002, Ravens CB Lamont Brightful recorded the longest punt return ever against Cincinnati, a 95-yarder for a TD.
- K Shayne Graham kicked a Bengals-record seven field goals — for all of Cincinnati's scoring — in a 21-7 win at Baltimore on Nov. 11, 2007. Graham did not have a missed attempt. The NFL record for field goals in a game is eight, set by Rob Bironas of Tennessee in 2007, and Graham is one of nine players sharing second place with seven.
- On Nov. 30, 2008 against the Ravens in Cincinnati, P Kyle Larson punted 11 times, which is tied with three other instances for most in a game in team history. Larson's 480 yards punting that day also stand as the third-most for a single game in Bengals history.
- In the 2014 season opener at Baltimore, Bengals K Mike Nugent tied the NFL record for field goals in a half (five; still tied). His five in the first half gave the Bengals a 15-0 lead toward an eventual 23-16 win.
- On Jan. 3, 2021, the Ravens set a record for most net rushing yards against the Bengals in a single game with 404. That total shattered the previous mark of 313, which had stood since 1969.
- On Dec. 26, 2021, Bengals QB Joe Burrow set a team record for most passing yards in a game with 525, which still is the fourth-highest single-game total in NFL history (more info in following item).

Burrow's big day vs. Ravens: QB Joe Burrow had one of the top individual performances by a QB in NFL history on Dec. 26, 2021 vs. Baltimore, when he passed for a Bengals-record 525 yards and four TDs while completing 80.4 percent of his attempts (37 of 46). His passing yardage total still ranks as the fourth-highest in a single game in league history, and he became the first Cincinnati QB ever to post a completion percentage of 80 or higher while throwing at least 40 times.

Burrow's 525 yards and four TD passes came on the heels of a 416-yard, three-TD stat line in Week 7 of the 2021 season at Baltimore. That made him the only QB ever to pass for 400 yards and three TDs more than once in an entire career against the Ravens. He also became the first QB in NFL history to top 400 passing yards against the same opponent twice in one regular season, and his 941 combined passing yards vs. Baltimore were the most-ever against one opponent in one regular season. The previous record was 874 passing yards, shared by former San Francisco QB Joe Montana against Atlanta in 1990 and former Miami QB Dan Marino against the N.Y. Jets in '88.

In the Dec. 26 matchup, Burrow became just the eighth QB since 2000 to have three completions of at least 52 yards in a game (there now have been nine QBs to hit that mark). On the receiving end of those passes were WR Tyler Boyd (68-yard TD), WR Tee Higgins (52) and HB Joe Mixon (52), who became the first trio of Bengals to catch passes of 50-plus yards in a single game since Nov. 17, 1968 at Miami.

Individually vs. Ravens: Here are past regular-season offensive statistics recorded by current Cincinnati players in Bengals games against the Ravens (ordered by total games played):

- TE Drew Sample: Eight games; 10 receptions for 67 yards (6.7).
- QB Joe Burrow: Seven games; 166-of-249 passing for 1879 yards, 12 TDs and four INTs (98.5 passer rating); 14 rushes for 49 yards (3.5) and one TD.
- WR Tee Higgins: Seven games; 32 receptions for 414 yards (12.9) and four TDs.
- WR Ja'Marr Chase: Six games; 37 receptions for 505 yards (13.6) and three TDs; One rush for zero yards.
- HB Trayveon Williams: Six games; Six rushes for 94 yards (15.7); Three reception for seven yards (2.3).
- HB Chris Evans: Four games; One rush for one yard.
- WR Trenton Irwin: Four games; Four receptions for 48 yards (12.0).
- HB Chase Brown: One game; One rush for two yards.
- QB Jake Browning: One game; 8-of-14 passing for 68 yards and one TD; Four rushes for 40 yards (10.0).
- TE Tanner Hudson: One game; Four receptions for 49 yards (12.3).

Hubbard's wild (card) recovery return: DE Sam Hubbard's 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the difference in the 2022 Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore will go down as one of the most memorable defensive plays in Bengals history.

The return was dubbed by some as "The Hubbard-Yard Dash," while others refer to the fumble itself as "The Fumble in the Jungle." Regardless of the name, here are some notable facts on the play:

- The 98-yard return is the longest fumble return for a TD in NFL postseason history. The previous longest was a 93-yard return by Andy Russell of the Pittsburgh Steelers in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Dec. 27, 1975.
- It is the longest TD of any kind in a postseason game in Bengals history. The previous longest was a 93-yard kickoff return by RB Stanford Jennings in Super Bowl XXIII on Jan. 22, 1989.
- It is the longest go-ahead TD in the fourth quarter in NFL postseason history. The previous longest was a 90-yard blocked FG return by Anthony Mitchell of the Baltimore Ravens in an AFC Divisional Playoff on Jan. 7, 2001.
- According to NFL's Next Gen Stats service, Hubbard's top speed on the return was 17.43 mph. He also traveled 123.6 total yards, the most distance traveled by a ball carrier on a TD in the 2022 regular season or postseason.
- It marked Hubbard's second career TD on a fumble recovery. As a rookie in 2018, he ran a fumble back 19 yards in the fourth quarter of Week 5 against Miami that helped seal a 27-17 Bengals win.

Uniform watch: The Bengals are slated to wear black jerseys and black socks along with their recently introduced orange pants (black stripes) this week against Baltimore. It will be the first time Cincinnati wears that combination, and the second time the team dons its orange pants. The pants were unveiled on social media in August and were debuted in Week 1 against New England, in combo with the Bengals' alternate orange jersey and black socks.

Cincinnati unveiled new uniforms in 2021, marking the team's first significant

uniform redesign since '04. There are three different color options for the current jerseys — black, white and orange. The pants now feature four different options — black with orange stripes, white with orange stripes, white with black stripes, and orange with black stripes. Options for sock color include black, white and orange.

In 2022, with the league's approval for the use of alternate helmets, Cincinnati introduced a new helmet branded as the "White Bengal," featuring a white base coat and the team's iconic black stripes. The Bengals have worn the helmet four times — twice in 2022 and twice in '23 — and have won all four games. The "White Bengal" look is set to make its return in Week 8 versus Philadelphia on Oct. 27.

* — The league permitted teams to create alternate helmets for the 2022 season. However, teams were required to wear those alternate helmets only with alternate, throwback or color rush uniforms (CR) that season. The Bengals donned their new alternate white helmet in 2022 with their color rush jersey, which at the time had not been worn since '20, prior to the '21 primary uniform redesign. In 2023 and thereafter, the Bengals were permitted to wear their alternate white helmet with their primary white jersey.

^ — NFL rules allow teams to wear designated alternate and/or throwback and/or color rush uniforms for a combined total of three regular-season games. The Bengals' designated alternate uniform includes the team's orange jersey. The Bengals do not have a throwback uniform.

THE HEAD COACHES

Zac Taylor was named the 10th head coach in Bengals history on Feb. 4, 2019. The 2024 season is his sixth in the position.

In 2023, Taylor guided the Bengals to their third consecutive winning season at 9-8, despite a few key players missing time due to injuries. During a five-game stretch from Weeks 5-10 in which QB Joe Burrow was at full health, Taylor oversaw an offense that ranked fourth in the NFL in passing yards per game (275.6) and seventh in scoring (26.6 points). Over the final seven weeks of the season, Taylor worked with QB Jake Browning as he stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career. In that span, Browning ranked second in the league in passing yards (1868) and completion percentage (71.5), and Taylor led Cincinnati to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule.

Under Taylor in 2022, the Bengals rallied from a 4-4 start to tie a team record for regular-season wins (12) and consecutive wins (eight), earning their second consecutive AFC North Division title. With a pair of playoff victories that brought Cincinnati to its second straight AFC Championship, Taylor became the 13th head coach in NFL history to win five of his first six career postseason games. The Bengals' offense ranked in the top 10 leaguewide during the regular season in scoring (seventh, 26.1 points per game), total yards (eighth, 360.5), and passing yards (fifth, 265.0), while the defense held opposing QBs to an NFL-low 58.9 completion percentage.

In 2021, Taylor led Cincinnati to its first AFC North championship since '15, before winning three postseason games to claim an AFC title and a berth in

Super Bowl LVI. Burrow, playing his first full NFL season, led the NFL in completion percentage (70.4) and set team records for passing yardage (4611) and passer rating (108.3). Taylor also helped WR Ja'Marr Chase win AP Offensive Rookie of the Year honors, as the team's first-round pick notched a Bengals-record 1455 receiving yards. In the postseason, Taylor led the Bengals to their first playoff win in 31 years in a Wild Card victory over Las Vegas, before then defeating Tennessee and Kansas City on the road to make the franchise's first Super Bowl appearance since the 1988 season.

In 2020, Taylor helped transition Burrow to the pros, despite the absence of an in-person offseason program due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to his season-ending knee injury, Burrow had the most completions ever by an NFL QB through their first 10 career games (264).

In 2019, his first season as head coach, Taylor led Cincinnati to second-half turnarounds on both sides of the ball. Offensively, the Bengals' per-game rushing average jumped 70.6 yards from the first half of the season (59.5) to the second (130.1), while the defense allowed 84.1 fewer yards per game.

Taylor came to Cincinnati after two seasons with the L.A. Rams, where he served as assistant WRs coach in 2017 and quarterbacks coach in '18. In 2018, he helped QB Jared Goff rank fourth in the NFL in passing yards, while the Rams finished second leaguewide in passing yards per game (281.7). Los Angeles had a 13-3 regular-season record and advanced to Super Bowl LIII.

Prior to the Rams, Taylor had a one-year stint as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at the University of Cincinnati in 2016. He served under head coach Tommy Tuberville at UC.

Taylor broke into NFL coaching in 2012 with the Miami Dolphins as assistant quarterbacks coach. He was elevated to quarterbacks coach from 2013-15, and spent the final five games of '15 as the Dolphins' interim offensive coordinator and primary play-caller.

Taylor's coaching career began at Texas A&M University, where he served as offensive graduate assistant and TEs coach under head coach Mike Sherman from 2008-11.

As a player, Taylor began his college career at Wake Forest (2002-03) before transferring to Butler County Community College in Kansas ('04) and then playing his final two seasons ('05-06) at the University of Nebraska. He set numerous school records with the Cornhuskers, finishing his two-year stint with 5850 passing yards and 45 TDs. As a senior in 2006, he was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year after passing for 3197 yards and leading Nebraska to a berth in the Cotton Bowl. He was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame in 2017.

Taylor joined the Tampa Bay Buccaneers as a college free agent in 2007, but was waived prior to the start of training camp and never saw NFL action. Later that year, he joined the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League, where he spent one season (did not play).

Taylor's father, Sherwood, was a defensive back and captain at the University of Oklahoma, playing under Sooners head coach Barry Switzer from 1976-79. Sherwood Taylor later served as an assistant coach at Oklahoma and Kansas State. Taylor's younger brother, Press, played quarterback at Marshall University and currently is the offensive coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars.

Taylor was born in Norman, Okla., on May 10, 1983. After attending Norman High School, he earned a bachelor's degree in communication studies from the University of Nebraska in 2006. He and his wife, Sarah, have four children —

Brooks, Luke, Emma Claire and Milly. Sarah Taylor is the daughter of former Green Bay Packers and Texas A&M head coach Mike Sherman.

John Harbaugh is in his 17th season at the helm in Baltimore. He has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in 11 (2008-12, '14, '18-20, '22-23) of his 16 full seasons, and in '12, captured the franchise's second Super Bowl championship.

Under Harbaugh's guidance, Baltimore is one of four teams with at least 11 playoff berths in the past 16 seasons, joining New England (12), Green Bay (12) and Kansas City (11). Harbaugh has also led the Ravens to playoff berths in five (2018-20, '22-23) of the past six seasons, producing the league's second-most regular-season victories (66) during that span.

The 2023 AFC North Champion Ravens produced the NFL's best record (13-4), earned a No. 1 playoff seed and hosted the first conference title game in franchise history. During the regular season, Baltimore tallied an NFL-record 10 victories vs. teams that finished with a winning record.

In 2019, Harbaugh became the first Ravens coach to win Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year, leading the team to the AFC's No. 1 playoff seed and a franchise-best 14-2 record. Baltimore also won a franchise-record 12 straight games to close out the regular season. In 2018, Baltimore (10-6) captured the AFC North Division title, earning a Wild Card berth. In 2014, the Ravens posted a 10-6 record, en route to capturing a 30-17 victory at Pittsburgh in the Wild Card round.

In 2012, the Ravens seized the franchise's second Super Bowl championship. Baltimore topped the Colts in the Wild Card round and followed that by earning a Divisional Round victory over top-seeded Denver before advancing to Super Bowl XLVII with a win in the AFC Championship Game at New England. In the Super Bowl in New Orleans, the Ravens bested the San Francisco 49ers, 34-31.

In his initial season with the team (2008), Harbaugh led Baltimore to an 11-5 record and a berth in the AFC Championship Game. Baltimore set an NFL record that season for most total wins (13) by a team with both a rookie head coach and a rookie starting quarterback (Joe Flacco).

Harbaugh spent his first 10 NFL seasons (1998-2007) with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was the team's secondary coach in 2007, after nine seasons as its special teams coordinator. In 2001, he was voted the NFL's Special Teams Coach of the Year by his peers.

Harbaugh played defensive back at Miami (Ohio) from 1980-83, earning a degree in political science. He has no pro playing experience. He coached collegiately at Western Michigan (1984-86), Pittsburgh ('87), Morehead State ('88), Cincinnati ('89-96), and Indiana ('97).

Harbaugh was born in Perrysburg, Ohio on Sept. 23, 1962. He and his wife, Ingrid, have a daughter, Alison.

Harbaugh is the son of longtime college coach Jack. His brother, Jim, is head coach of the Los Angeles Chargers, and played for the Ravens in 1998. John's sister, Joani, is married to Tom Crean, a longtime college head basketball coach, most recently for the University of Georgia from 2018-22.

Taylor vs. Ravens: The Ravens lead the series overall, 7-4 (the series includes one postseason game).

Taylor vs. Harbaugh: Harbaugh leads the series overall, 7-4 (the series includes one postseason game).

Harbaugh vs. Bengals: Harbaugh leads overall, 17-16 (the series includes one postseason game).

BENGALS NOTES

Bengals near 400th W: The Bengals enter Week 4 with 395 all-time wins in the regular season, just five shy of 400. The team has won 239 games at home and 156 on the road.

The first regular-season win in Bengals history came on Sept. 15, 1968, when they defeated the Denver Broncos 24-10 at Nippert Stadium on the campus of the University of Cincinnati. One hundred and five Bengals regular-season victories have come at Paycor Stadium (formerly known as Paul Brown Stadium). The team has reached the 10-win mark during the regular season 14 times, including in six of the past 12 years.

The Jungle is jammin': The Bengals have welcomed an announced attendance figure of over 65,000 at Paycor Stadium in 18 consecutive regular-season home games dating back to Week 1 of the 2022 season, marking the second-longest streak in team history. The longest such streak lasted 24 home games from 2005-07.

Each of the five highest-announced home attendance figures in Bengals history have occurred since the start of the 2022 season, including three that were played during the '23 campaign. Cincinnati's Week 9 win over Buffalo on Sunday Night Football last season had an attendance figure of 66,965, which stands as the second-largest in team history behind a record 67,260 in Week 4 of the '22 season against Miami. The Bengals then faced Houston in Week 10 of 2023 in front of an announced crowd of 66,526, the third-largest ever, and earlier in the season had an attendance figure of 66,385 in a Week 6 win over Seattle that ranks fifth. The fourth-highest attendance figure is 66,399 for the team's Wild Card Playoff victory against Baltimore in January of 2023.

2024 Bengals captains: The Bengals this season are led by eight captains who were decided through a players-only vote. The captains are composed of three offensive players, three defensive players and two special teams representatives.

On offense, the captains are fifth-year QB Joe Burrow, ninth-year C Ted Karras and seventh-year OT Orlando Brown Jr. Burrow has been elected a team captain in each of his five pro seasons since entering the league in 2020. Karras, who joined Cincinnati as a free agent in 2022, serves as a captain for the third straight season with the Bengals and a fourth time overall, after doing so with the Miami Dolphins in '20. Brown, a four-time Pro Bowler who previously played for the Baltimore Ravens (2018-20) and Kansas City Chiefs ('21-22), carries the honor for the first time in his career.

The defensive captains are ninth-year S Vonn Bell, seventh-year DE Sam Hubbard and sixth-year LB Germaine Pratt. Bell was voted a Bengals captain in each of his previous three seasons with the team (2020-22), before he spent the '23 campaign with Carolina. Hubbard, a Cincinnati native and third-round pick of the Bengals in 2018, is wearing the patch for a fourth straight year. Pratt joins Orlando Brown Jr. in serving as a captain for the first time in his career.

Cincinnati's two special teams captains — fifth-year LB Akeem Davis-Gaither and fifth-year K Evan McPherson — each were elected captains for the first time in their careers. Davis-Gaither lined up for 289 special teams snaps during the 2023 season, the third-most on the team, while McPherson has handled the Bengals' kicking duties since he entered the league in '21.

Burrow reaches 15K: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 15,000 career passing yards in Week 4 at Carolina. Playing his 56th regular-season game, he tied for the fourth-fastest player in NFL history to reach that mark.

Burrow's current career total of 15,061 passing yards rank as the eighth-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2020, and he has played in at least five fewer games than every QB above him in that category. He holds the two highest single-season passing yardage marks in Bengals history, with a team record 4611 in 2021 (sixth in NFL) followed by 4475 in '22 (fifth in NFL). He also is the fastest QB in Bengals history to reach 5000 passing yards (19 games) and 10,000 passing yards (36).

Burrow enters Week 5 vs. Baltimore just 73 passing yards shy of former QB Jeff Blake (15,134) for fifth in team history.

Burrow throws 100th TD: QB Joe Burrow recorded his 100th career regular-season TD pass on the opening drive of Week 3 vs. Washington, when he connected with WR Ja'Marr Chase for a 41-yard score. Playing in his 55th career game, Burrow tied for the seventh-fastest QB in NFL history to reach 100 TD passes.

The former No. 1 overall pick threw for 13 TDs in 10 games during his 2020 rookie season, then broke out with 34 passing scores in his sophomore campaign. By eclipsing his own single-season team record with 35 TDs in 2022, Burrow became the first QB in Bengals history to pass for 30 or more TDs in multiple years. He finished last season with 15 TD passes in 10 games played.

Burrow went on to throw two more TD passes on Monday night against the Commanders, marking his 17th career game with three or more — the fifth-most

such games in Bengals history.

Joe hits the mark: QB Joe Burrow eclipsed 1500 career passing attempts in the 2022 regular-season finale, which qualified him for the NFL's career completion percentage record. With a current completion percentage of 68.16, he is the NFL's all-time leader in the category, ahead of former San Diego Chargers/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (67.69).

Burrow in Week 4 at Carolina surpassed 2000 career passing attempts, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that mark went in as the second-most in NFL history through a QB's first 2000 attempts. Brees holds the record with 1444 completions.

Sunday's contest against the Panthers marked Burrow's 18th career game in which he completed at least 70 percent of his passes on 30 or more attempts. That tied L.A. Chargers QB Justin Herbert for the second-most such games in league history within a player's first five seasons — only Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes (21) had more in his first five years.

After leading the NFL in completion percentage in 2021 (70.4; minimum 14 passing attempts per game), Burrow followed up by completing 68.3 percent of his passes in the '22 regular season, good for the second-highest rate in the league. He did so while setting single-season team records for total attempts (606) and completions (414) — both ranked fifth in the NFL.

Burrow masters the deep ball: Since entering the NFL in 2020, QB Joe Burrow leads the league in TD passes of 50 or more yards (15) and TD passes of 40 or more yards (21). He also ranks second leaguewide in scoring passes of 60 or more yards (11), with his most recent being a 63-yarder to WR Ja'Marr Chase in Week 4 at Carolina.

Burrow in Week 3 vs. Washington hit Chase in stride for a 41-yard TD on the game's opening drive. He had an NFL-best 10 TD passes from at least 40 yards out during the 2021 regular season, then followed up with seven in '22. In four games this season, he has already matched his two 40-plus-yard TD throws from last season, which both went to Chase — a 63-yarder in Week 5 at Arizona, and a 64-yarder in Week 10 against Houston.

More Burrow since '21: Since the start of the 2021 regular season, Joe Burrow is one of two NFL players with at least 1000 completions, 75 TD passes, 10,000 passing yards and a passer rating of 100, alongside Dallas QB Dak Prescott.

Burrow's 91 TD passes since 2021 are the fourth-most leaguewide, despite him playing at least three fewer games than any other QB in the top five of that category. He also ranks in the top 10 since 2021 in passer rating (second; 101.4), passing yards per attempt (sixth; 7.61), completions (eighth; 1119), and passing yards (eighth; 12,373).

On the Chase: WR Ja'Marr Chase's 63-yard TD in the second quarter of Week 4 at Carolina was his ninth career scoring reception of 60 or more yards, the most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021. It also is the second-most such TDs in Bengals history behind former WR Isaac Curtis (10), and is tied with former N.Y. Giants WR Odell Beckham Jr. for the most 60-plus-yard receiving TDs before turning 25 years old in the Super Bowl era.

Chase also has the NFL's most TD catches of 50 or more yards (10) since 2021, and his 13 scoring receptions from 40 or more yards are tied with former Kansas City/current Miami WR Tyreek Hill for the league lead in that span.

Chase had three TD catches of 60 or more yards during his historic 2021 rookie season, when he finished the year with a Bengals-record and then-NFL record 1455 receiving yards. He then had one such TD in 2022, a 60-yarder in his return to his hometown New Orleans that came late in the fourth quarter of Week 6 to help the Bengals beat the Saints.

His three 60-plus-yard scores in 2023 included a 63-yarder from Burrow in Week 5 at Arizona, a 64-yarder from Burrow in Week 10 vs. Houston, and a season-long 76-yarder from QB Jake Browning on Monday Night Football in Week 13 at Jacksonville.

Chasing history: WR Ja'Marr Chase led the Bengals with 85 yards on three catches in Week 4 at Carolina, and in the process surpassed 4000 career receiving yards. Playing in his 49th game, he became the fastest player in team history to reach that milestone, one ahead of former Pro Bowl WR A.J. Green (50). Chase also became the fifth player in the Super Bowl era to record at least 4,000 receiving yards and 30 receiving TDs within his first 50 career games, joining Pro Football Hall of Famers Randy Moss and Jerry Rice as well as Green and Odell Beckham Jr.

Chase holds a career average of 81.98 receiving yards per game (4017 in 49 games), the fifth-highest total in NFL history among all players with at least 3000 yards. In 2023, his career-high 100 receptions tied former WR Carl Pickens (1996) for the second-most in a season in Bengals history, and he became the eighth player in NFL history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns.

Higgins back in action: Fifth-year WR Tee Higgins has played in the team's last two games after missing the first two contests due to a hamstring injury. He posted three catches for 39 yards in his 2024 debut in Week 3 vs. Washington, then in Week 4 at Carolina he led the Bengals with six grabs for 60 yards. Seven of his nine receptions have resulted in a first down for Cincinnati.

Since entering the NFL as a second-round draft pick of the Bengals in 2020, Higgins ranks in the top 25 leaguewide in receiving yards (23rd; 3783), receiving TDs (T-21st; 24) and yards per reception (19th; 14.2). He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving campaigns in 2021 and '22, then followed up with 656 on 42 catches in 12 games played in '23.

Higgins has saved some of his best performances for when it matters most, as five of his 12 career 100-yard receiving games have occurred in the month of December. Since his 2020 rookie season, he ranks second in the NFL in receiving TDs (10), seventh in receiving yards (1228) and 13th in yards per reception (15.7) during the calendar's final month. Higgins also ranks second in Bengals postseason history in receptions (31) and receiving yards (457), trailing teammate Ja'Marr Chase in both categories.

Higgins was named the Bengals' designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season.

Run-heavy in Carolina: The Bengals totaled season highs for team rushing attempts (31) and net rushing yards (141) in Week 4 at Carolina. The volume of carries was distributed evenly among the team's top two backs, as HB Zack Moss had 15 attempts for 51 yards and HB Chase Brown had 15 for a career-high 80 yards and two TDs.

The last time two Cincinnati halfbacks logged at least 15 rushing attempts in the same game was Dec. 14, 2014, when Jeremy Hill had 25 carries for 148 yards and two scores while Giovani Bernard totaled 15 for 79 to help the Bengals earn a 30-0 road win at Cleveland.

Trey's torrid pace: DE Trey Hendrickson notched his third sack of 2024 in Week 3 vs. Washington, bringing down QB Jayden Daniels for a loss of five yards in the fourth quarter. It boosted his sack total to 42.5 since he joined the Bengals during the 2021 offseason, the fourth-most in the NFL in that span.

Hendrickson logged his first two sacks of the young 2024 campaign in Week 2 at Kansas City, with both occurring on second down to force the Chiefs into a third-and-long. It marked his 12th career multi-sack game, tied for the seventh-most among all active players. He is coming off a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023, which tied for second-most leaguewide and ranked second in Bengals single-season history. The team record is held by DE Coy Bacon, who had 22.0 sacks in the 1976 campaign (sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however the Bengals tracked the stat back to '76 and recognize Bacon as the record-holder).

Combining his Cincinnati totals with 13.5 sacks in 2020, Hendrickson's final year with New Orleans, his 56 sacks rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh LB T.J. Watt (65) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62). Hendrickson spent his first four pro seasons (2017-20) with the Saints, but started just three games over his first three years and registered 6.5 sacks. He then started 15 contests for New Orleans in 2020, and has started 49 of 51 regular-season games played for the Bengals.

Hendrickson's production was rewarded in July of 2023, when he signed a one-year contract extension with the Bengals that keeps him in stripes through the 2025 season.

Hubbard a Day 2 draft steal: DE Sam Hubbard recorded six sacks during the 2023 regular season, marking his third straight year with at least six and boosting his career tally to 36.5. That total ranks third among all players from the 2018 rookie class (draft picks and college free agents). Hubbard was the 13th defensive lineman selected that year — five DEs and seven DTs came off the board before him.

Hubbard also finished the 2023 season with 58 total tackles, the most among Cincinnati's defensive linemen. Seven of his tackles were for losses, and he added two fumble recoveries that each led to points on the ensuing Bengals offensive possession.

Hubbard has ranked second on the Bengals in sacks in each season since he became the team's starting LDE in 2019. He additionally has four career postseason sacks, tied with former DE Jason Buck for the most in team history. A native of Cincinnati who attended Archbishop Moeller High School, Hubbard also is known for contributing one of the franchise's most iconic plays, a 98-yard fumble return for a TD that proved to be the game-winner in the Wild Card Playoff vs. Baltimore following the 2022 season.

LB duo stuffs the stat sheet: LB Logan Wilson ranks tied for fourth in the NFL this season with 43 tackles, while his fellow starting LB

Germaine Pratt is tied for sixth with 42.

In Week 2 at Kansas City, Pratt and Wilson combined for 28 tackles, the most by a pair of Bengals teammates since LB Vontaze Burfict (18 tackles) and LB Rey Mauluga (10) also totaled 28 on Dec. 30, 2012 against Baltimore. Pratt had a career-high 16 stops against the Chiefs, the fourth-most in a game by a Bengals player since at least 1994.

Wilson has tallied at least nine tackles in each game this season. He is the first Bengals player to post nine or more stops in four straight games to open a season since former LB Dhani Jones in 2008.

Wilson leads LBs in INTs since '20: LB Logan Wilson paced the Bengals in tackles for a third straight season in 2023 with a career-high 135 stops, but perhaps his most notable contributions came when dropping into coverage. A former defensive back during his collegiate playing days at the University of Wyoming, Wilson had four INTs last year, which tied for the Bengals team lead and tied for seventh in the NFL. His 11 career picks are the most by any NFL linebacker since he entered the league as a third-round draft pick in 2020. It also is tied for the third-most ever by a Bengals LB, trailing Reggie Williams (16) and Al Beauchamp (15).

The 2023 season was Wilson's second in which he recorded four INTs. He also had four picks in 2021, the most by a Bengals LB in a single season since Odell Thurman (five) in '05. Wilson's 135 tackles were the most by any Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign.

Since the start of the 2020 season, Wilson is one of two NFL players with at least 10 INTs, five sacks and five forced fumbles, alongside Minnesota S Harrison Smith.

Wilson additionally wears the "green dot" as the player that relays defensive play calls. He signed a contract extension in August of 2023 and will remain a Bengal through the '27 season.

Rehkwow's record debut: Rookie P Ryan Rehkwow punted four times for 258 yards during his NFL debut in Week 1 against New England. His gross average of 64.5 yards per punt set an NFL single-game record (minimum four punts), surpassing the previous mark of 63.60 by Las Vegas P AJ Cole on Nov. 5, 2023. The previous Bengals record belonged to Will Brice, who averaged 63.0 yards on Sept. 12, 1999 at Tennessee.

Rehkwow's second punt of the day, which came midway through the first quarter, was booted from his own 20-yard line and rolled just past the Patriots' goal line for a touchback. It went in officially as an 80-yard punt, marking the longest in team history. The previous longest punt by a Bengal was 75 yards, shared by Kyle Larson (Oct. 9, 2005 at Jacksonville) and Kevin Huber (Dec. 1, 2013 at San Diego Chargers). Rehkwow's 80-yarder tied for the 15th-longest punt in league history and was the third-longest in an NFL debut.

In the fourth quarter, Rehkwow launched a 70-yard punt that went from the Cincinnati 15-yard line to the New England 15. He also had a 57-yarder for a touchback on his first career attempt in the first quarter of the game, and in the second quarter dropped a 51-yarder that was fair caught at the Patriots' 17-yard line.

Rehkwow's 52.0 net yards per punt marked the second-highest net average in a game in team history behind 55.5 by Huber (2013 game at Chargers). It also was the second-highest ever in an NFL debut, trailing only Seattle P Michael Dickson, who averaged 57.5 net yards on Sept. 9, 2018.

Rehkwow originally signed with Kansas City as a college free agent in May, before being waived by the Chiefs in June. He joined the Bengals as a free agent on July 26, the third day of training camp.

Money Mac from deep: K Evan McPherson knocked through a 56-yard FG in the third quarter of Week 4 at Carolina, extending his Bengals record to 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards. It also tied for the fifth-longest FG in team history, with McPherson owning five of the top six on that list.

McPherson's 24 such FGs are the second-most in the NFL since he entered the league in 2021 behind Pittsburgh K Chris Boswell (26). A former fifth-round pick of the Bengals, he finished the 2023 campaign with 21 50+-yarders in his career, the most in NFL history in a player's first three seasons. He converted seven kicks from 50 or more yards in 2023, highlighted by a season-long 56-yarder in Week 8 at San Francisco. The longest FG in team history was a 59-yarder by McPherson in Week 1 of the 2022 season vs. Pittsburgh.

McPherson in Week 3 against Washington surpassed 100 career FG attempts, and he ranks third in Bengals history for most made FGs through his first 100 tries with 84. Only former kickers Shayne Graham and Randy Bullock (87 each) had a better conversion rate through their 100th attempt. McPherson's current career FG percentage of 84.5 (87 of 103) also is third in team history behind Graham (86.8) and Bullock (84.9; minimum 75 attempts).

Referred to by fans as "Money Mac," McPherson also has seven career game-winning "walk-off" FGs, including two last season — in OT of Week 13 at Jacksonville, and again in OT of Week 15 vs. Minnesota. However, his two most notable such kicks came during the 2021 postseason, when he hit a 52-yarder in the AFC Divisional Playoff at Tennessee and followed up a week later with a 31-yarder in OT of the AFC Championship at Kansas City that sent Cincinnati to Super Bowl LVI. McPherson is a perfect 19 of 19 in seven career postseason games and is the team's all-time leader in postseason scoring (69 points).

Cincinnati signed McPherson to a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18, securing its kicker through the 2027 season.

Pro Bowl three-peats: WR Ja'Marr Chase and DE Trey Hendrickson have been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of the past three seasons (2021-23), becoming the 20th and 21st players in team history to receive the honor at least three times.

Chase became the fifth player in Bengals history to earn Pro Bowl honors in each of his first three career seasons, joining TE Bob Trumpy (1968-70), WR Isaac Curtis ('73-75), WR Cris Collinsworth ('81-83) and WR A.J. Green (2011-13). He led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories during the 2023 regular season, including receptions (career-high 100), receiving yards (1216) and receiving TDs (seven). Chase had four games with at least 10 catches and five games with at least 100 receiving yards.

Hendrickson posted a career-high 17.5 sacks in 2023 that tied for second-most in the NFL and ranked second in team history for a single season (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). He recorded at least one full sack in seven straight games from Weeks 11-17, tying for the longest such streak in the league. He also had three FFs and three PDs.

Three listed on "Top 100": For the 14th consecutive season, current NFL players voted to determine the top 100 players in the league, with the final list revealed throughout July on social media and the NFL Network.

Cincinnati was represented by three players on the 2024 list — QB Joe Burrow (No. 39), WR Ja'Marr Chase (No. 45) and DE Trey Hendrickson (No. 77). It marked the third appearance on the list for Burrow and Chase, and the fourth for Hendrickson. It also was the fifth time in the history of "Top 100" that three or more Bengals players were featured.

Dillon, Krumrie join Bengals Ring of Honor: The Bengals welcomed two new members to the team's Ring of Honor in Week 3 against Washington, when they inducted former HB Corey Dillon and NT Tim Krumrie during a halftime ceremony. They became the ninth and 10th members of the Ring of Honor, which was established in 2021 to recognize former players, coaches and individuals who have played a significant role in the franchise's storied history and tradition.

Dillon is the team's all-time leader in rushing attempts (1865), rushing yards (8061) and 100-yard rushing games (28). He earned three consecutive Pro Bowl selections from 1999-2001, and owns the top three single-game rushing performances in team history.

Krumrie entered the NFL as a 10th-round pick of the Bengals in 1983 and went on to spend his entire 12-year playing career ('83-94) in Cincinnati. He played in 188 regular-season games, the most ever by a Bengals lineman on either side of the ball, and was a two-time Pro Bowler (1987-88) in addition to earning All-Pro honors in '88.

Bengals Ring of Honor inductees are voted in each offseason by Bengals Ticket Members. Dillon and Krumrie joined existing members QB Ken Anderson,

OT Willie Anderson, team founder/head coach Paul Brown, WR Isaac Curtis, QB Boomer Esiason, WR Chad Johnson, OT Anthony Muñoz and CB Ken Riley.

Bengal bites: The average age of the Bengals' active roster is 26.6 years ... The longest-tenured player on the Bengals roster is DE Sam Hubbard, who is in his seventh season with the team ... The oldest player on the roster is C Ted Karras, who is 31 (born March 15, 1993) ... The youngest player on the roster is OT Amarius Mims, who is 21 (born Oct. 14, 2002) ... Mims also is the heaviest player on the roster, listed at 350 pounds ... The lightest player on the roster is CB Mike Hilton, who is listed at 184 pounds ... There is a tie for tallest player on the roster between Mims and OT Orlando Brown Jr., who both are listed at 6-8 ... The shortest player on the roster is HB Trayveon Williams, who is listed at 5-8.

POSITION BY POSITION

Quarterbacks: Former No. 1 overall draft pick **Joe Burrow** once again leads a talented Cincinnati offense in his fifth pro season. The Athens, Ohio native has nearly re-written the Bengals' quarterback record book over the past four years, as he holds single-season team records for passing attempts (606; 2022), completions (414; '22), passing yards (4611; '21), TD passes (35; '22) and passer rating (108.3; '21). He also currently is the NFL's all-time leader in career completion percentage, maintaining a mark of 68.16 percent (minimum 1500 passing attempts). He started the 2024 preseason opener vs. Tampa Bay, seeing his first game action since a season-ending wrist injury in Week 11 of last year. Burrow is completing 70.9 percent of his passes through four regular-season games, and he ranks third in the NFL in completions (95), tied for third in TD passes (seven), fifth in passer rating (105.9) and tied for seventh in passing yards (978). He surpassed two notable career marks in Week 4 at Carolina including 15,000 passing yards, which he did in tied for the fourth-fewest games in NFL history (56). He also eclipsed 2000 career passing attempts, and his 1363 completions at the time he reached that number were the second-most in league history behind former San Diego/New Orleans QB Drew Brees (1444). In Week 3 vs. Washington, Burrow tied for the seventh-fastest QB ever to reach 100 TD passes (55 games). Prior to the start of the 2023 season, the Bengals signed Burrow to a five-year contract extension through the '29 campaign. Listed second on the depth chart is **Jake Browning**, who stepped into the starting role for the first time in his career following Burrow's season-ending injury last November. He piloted the Bengals to a 4-3 mark to close out the schedule, highlighted by a three-game winning streak in which the offense averaged 31.7 points. Browning completed 71.5 percent of his passing attempts for 1868 yards and 11 TDs as a starter, becoming just the third NFL QB since 1950 to record at least 1500 passing yards and 10 TDs with a completion percentage of 70 or higher in his first seven career starts. He made the 53-man roster out of training camp for the first time last year, after spending his first four pro seasons on the practice squads of the Bengals (2021-22) and Minnesota Vikings ('19-20).

Running backs: Fifth-year veteran **Zack Moss** joined the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent this past offseason, and through four games he leads the team in carries (48) and rushing yards (187). He also has three total TDs (two rushing, one receiving), with the most recent coming in Week 4 at Carolina when he caught a pass out of the backfield and found the end zone with one second remaining in the first half. Moss entered the league as a third-round draft pick of Buffalo in 2020, and after amassing 917 rushing yards and eight TDs in two-plus seasons with the Bills, he was traded to Indianapolis in November of '22. He had his best statistical season in 2023, as he set career highs in rushing attempts (183), rushing yards (794), rushing TDs (five) and receptions (27). Complementing Moss in the run game is second-year pro **Chase Brown**. Brown is finding an increased role in the offense early this season, and is coming off a career-high 80 yards on the ground along with his first two career rushing TDs in Week 4 at Carolina. Recognized for his quick burst, he is averaging 6.3 yards per carry (29 for 184) through four games. Cincinnati's fifth-round pick in the 2023 draft, Brown provided an explosive element to the offense late in his rookie campaign with 322 scrimmage yards over the final six games. He spent four games last season on the Reserve/Injured list due to a hamstring injury, but has since suited up for 11 straight contests. **Trayveon Williams** is in his sixth NFL season (all with Cincinnati), and has served as a reserve HB in addition to his primary role on special teams. He was the team's primary kickoff returner in 2023, and now shares that responsibility with Brown as the Bengals approach the NFL's new Dynamic Kickoff. Offensively, Williams has rushed for 307 yards on 62 carries, while also contributing 15 career receptions for 74 yards. He led the Bengals this past preseason with 95 rushing yards on 20 carries (4.8 average).

Wide Receivers: The Bengals' wide receiver room is headlined by one of the NFL's most productive pass-catching duos in **Ja'Marr Chase** and **Te**

Higgins. Chase, the team's first-round draft pick in 2021, led Cincinnati in all major receiving categories and was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first three seasons. He is one of eight players in NFL history to begin his career with three consecutive 1000-yard receiving campaigns, and he posted a career-high 100 catches in 2023 that tied for the second-most in a season in team history. A constant downfield threat, Chase has a league-leading nine TD receptions of 60 or more yards since the start of the 2021 campaign, with the most recent coming in Week 4 at Carolina when he had a 63-yard catch-and-run to the end zone. Week 5 against Baltimore will be Chase's 50th career regular-season game, and he is one of just five players in the Super Bowl era to amass 4000-plus receiving yards and 30-plus receiving TDs within his first 50 contests. Higgins missed the first two games of the season due to a hamstring injury, but returned to the lineup in Week 3 vs. Washington. He is coming off a team-leading six receptions for 60 yards in Week 4 at Carolina, with five of his grabs going for a first down. Listed at 6-4, 220 pounds, Higgins has earned a reputation as an athletic outside receiver who can high-point the ball over contesting defensive backs. He posted back-to-back 1000-yard receiving seasons in 2021 and '22, then finished with 656 yards in 12 games played last year. He missed five games in 2023 due to injuries, but when healthy he contributed five TD catches and averaged 15.6 yards per reception. Higgins was named the team's designated franchise player in February, and on June 17 he signed the one-year tender for the 2024 season. Second-year pro **Andrei Iosivas** has developed a connection with QB Joe Burrow, particularly in the low red zone. He has seven career TDs on just 26 total receptions, including three scores this season (tied for third in NFL). He caught two Burrow TD passes in Week 2 at Kansas City, then followed up with another on a fourth-and-goal play in Week 3 vs. Washington. Iosivas in Week 4 at Carolina had a career-long 29-yard reception late in the second quarter that helped set up a Bengals TD just before halftime. A sixth-round pick out of Princeton in 2023, Iosivas earned a roster spot following his rookie training camp and contributed both offensively and on special teams last year. He is a native of Honolulu, Hawaii, and earned All-America honors at Princeton both in the FCS division in football and as a heptathlon participant for the Tigers' track and field team. **Trenton Irwin** spent his first three seasons with the Bengals (2019-21) primarily as a practice squad player and game day inactive, but over the past two-plus years he has emerged as a dependable option for Cincinnati's quarterbacks. After totaling just three receptions in those first three seasons, he has 42 catches for 558 yards and five TDs since the start of the 2022 campaign, including a career-high 25 grabs for 316 yards in '23. Though listed as a backup on the depth chart last season, he started five games and showed an ability to line up at multiple WR positions. Irwin has been active for three games this season (inactive for Week 3 vs. Washington), and has two grabs for 11 yards. Second-year pro **Charlie Jones** serves as the team's primary punt returner, in addition to his role as a reserve receiver. He has caught eight passes for 69 yards offensively, and returned 28 punts for 279 yards (10.0 average) with one TD. He missed six games last season due to a thumb injury, but returned to play in each of the final eight contests. Jones spent his final collegiate season in 2022 at Purdue University, where he led the FBS in receptions (110), ranked second in receiving yards (1361) and fifth in receiving TDs (12). The Bengals added another downfield threat in the third round of April's draft when they selected **Jermaine Burton**. Burton played in 26 games at the University of Alabama from 2022-23, after spending his first two collegiate seasons ('20-21) at the University of Georgia. He led the Crimson Tide last season in receiving yards (798) and receiving TDs (eight), while his 20.5 yards per reception led the Southeastern Conference and ranked sixth nationally. Burton led the Bengals and ranked third leaguewide in preseason receiving yards with 157 on eight catches (19.6 average), with two TDs. His first NFL reception came in Week 2 at Kansas City, when he hauled in a 47-yard deep ball from Burrow on Cincinnati's first offensive play of the second half.

Tight ends: A 2019 second-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Drew Sample** has played in 65 career games (38 starts) and earned a reputation as a reliable blocking TE. Eight of his starts came during the final nine games of last season, when he took over the top spot on the depth chart. In addition to his blocking responsibilities, he has 84 career receptions for 649 yards and three TDs. He missed most of the 2022 season due to a knee injury, but returned to play in all 17 games in '23 and recorded 22 catches for 162 yards and two scores. Sample logged his first statistics of the 2024 campaign in Week 2 at Kansas City, catching three passes for 28 yards. The Bengals added a downfield pass-catching threat at the TE position when they signed unrestricted free agent **Mike Gesicki** in March. Gesicki spent his first five pro seasons (2018-22) with the Miami Dolphins, before playing for the New England Patriots last season. He played in his 100th career regular-season game in Week 2 at Kansas City, and posted a game-high seven catches for 91 yards. He then eclipsed 3000 career receiving yards in Week 3 vs. Washington, totaling four catches for 47 yards. Standing at 6-6 and possessing a blend of speed and agility, he challenges LBs and DBs in coverage. Gesicki topped 700 receiving yards in back-to-back years in 2020 and '21 while with the Dolphins. Fifth-year pro **Tanner Hudson** began the 2023 season on the Bengals' practice squad, but was signed to the active roster in early November and emerged as a prominent offensive contributor. He recorded career highs in catches (39) and receiving yards (352) in just 12 games played, after totaling 15 grabs for 199 yards in his previous 33 career contests. Hudson spent time with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (2019-20), San Francisco 49ers ('21) and N.Y. Giants ('22), before joining Cincinnati's practice squad late in the '22 season. The Bengals used their fourth-round draft choice this past April to select **Erick All Jr.**, a native of Fairfield, Ohio (approximately 25 miles north of Cincinnati). All began training camp on the Active/Non-Football Injury list due to a knee injury sustained last October, but he was cleared to practice in late July and played in all three preseason games. Through four regular-season games (three starts), All has caught each of his 12 targets for 82 yards. He earned his first start in Week 2 at Kansas City and has contributed four-or-more catches in each of his last three appearances, while also contributing as a blocker in the run game. He spent his first four collegiate seasons (2019-22) at the University of Michigan, then transferred to the University of Iowa for the '23 campaign. In 40 career college games, he caught 75 passes for 864 yards and five TDs. The Bengals doubled-up on tight ends during the draft when they took **Tanner McLachlan** out of the University of Arizona in the sixth round. McLachlan was a second-team All-Pac-12 Conference selection last season, when his 45 receptions were the second-most by a TE in Arizona history and his 528 receiving yards led all Pac-12 TEs. He spent two seasons (2022-23) with the Wildcats, after beginning his career at Southern Utah University. He caught three passes for 42 yards in the preseason, and has been inactive for each of the Bengals' four regular-season contests. A native of Lethbridge, Alberta, McLachlan is one of two Canadians on the Bengals roster alongside HB Chase Brown.

Offensive linemen: The Bengals have invested heavily in upgrading their offensive line over the past three offseasons, signing an array of free agents and using early draft picks to bolster the unit. The nucleus of the O-line is C **Ted Karras**, who joined the team in free agency in 2022 and has been elected a team captain in each of his three seasons in Cincinnati. Karras has started each of the Bengals' past 40 games at center (regular season and postseason), and lined up for 2623 of a possible 2642 offensive snaps in that time (99.3 percent). Last season, he was named the Bengals' nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award in recognition of his charitable work with Indianapolis-based Village of Merici through his fan-favorite "Cincy Hat." The Bengals signed Karras to a one-year contract extension in June that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2025 season. Perhaps the team's biggest free agent splash in recent years is **Orlando Brown Jr.**, who started all 17 games at LOT in his first Bengals season in 2023. Brown is a four-time Pro Bowler who spent his first three seasons (2018-20) with the Baltimore Ravens, then played two ('21-22) with the Kansas City Chiefs. He was a key piece of the offensive lines that protected QBs Lamar Jackson (2019) and Patrick Mahomes ('22) in their MVP seasons. His father, the late Orlando "Zeus" Brown Sr., was an offensive tackle for the Cleveland Browns and the Ravens. Brown Jr. was also selected as a team captain this season for the first time in his career. RG **Alex Cappa** joined Karras in signing with Cincinnati during the 2022 free agency period, and he has started each game he has played in as a Bengal. He suffered a left ankle injury in the 2022 regular-season finale and missed the entire postseason, but he recovered in time to start all 17 contests in '23. He previously was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' starting RG from 2019-21, and was a member of the Super Bowl LV-winning team though he did not play in the final three playoff games due to

injury. Cappa has played 100 percent of the team's offensive snaps through four games this season. **Cordell Volson** has started each of the Bengals' 40 games (including postseason) at LG since they took him in the fourth round of the 2022 NFL Draft. He has lined up for every offensive snap in that time, the only player on the team to do so. Though he has found his role in Cincinnati as the team's LG, he played at guard and tackle on both sides of the O-line during his five-year collegiate career at North Dakota State. While at NDSU, he played in a school-record 65 games, was a three-time FCS All-American and helped the Bison win four FCS national championships. The Bengals used their first-round draft pick this past April (18th overall) to select ROT **Amarius Mims** out of the University of Georgia. Mims brings a physically imposing presence at 6-8, 350 pounds, but was noted by draft analysts for his athletic potential. He spent three seasons (2021-23) with the Bulldogs, playing in 29 games with eight starts while helping UGA win back-to-back national titles in '21 and '22. Last season, Mims started six games on an offensive line that led the SEC in fewest sacks allowed per game (0.93). He was inactive for the team's first two games of the regular season due to a pectoral injury sustained in the preseason opener. Mims made his NFL debut in Week 3 against Washington, taking over for Trent Brown following his first-quarter injury. He made his first career start in Week 4 at Carolina and lined up for all 67 offensive snaps. G/OT **Cody Ford**, a former college teammate of Orlando Brown Jr. at the University of Oklahoma, signed with the Bengals as a free agent in 2023 and served as a key depth piece in his first season with Cincinnati. He saw action in all 17 games, utilized as a reserve guard, a sixth O-lineman in heavy packages, and a special teams contributor. He has played in 70 career games with 34 starts — 15 at ROT, nine at RG, eight at LG and two as a third TE. Ford was a 2019 second-round pick by Buffalo and spent his first three seasons with the Bills, then played for the Arizona Cardinals in '22. G/OT **Jaxson Kirkland** spent the first 10 games of his rookie season in 2023 on Cincinnati's practice squad, then was moved to the Practice Squad/Injured list for the remainder of the year due to a wrist injury. A 2023 college free agent signee, he was an AP third-team All-American at the University of Washington in '22 and earned three first-team All-Pac-12 selections during his career with the Huskies. Kirkland was an Active/DNP in the Bengals' first three games this season, then made his NFL debut in Week 4 at Carolina and played six special teams snaps. The team's final selection of the 2024 NFL Draft, C **Matt Lee** was taken in the seventh round (237th overall) after playing in 51 games during his college career. He spent the first four years of his career (2019-22) at the University of Central Florida before transferring to the University of Miami (Fla.) for the '23 campaign. He was named second-team All-Atlantic Coast Conference last season, when he helped the Hurricanes allow the second-fewest sacks in the ACC (16), while blocking for an offense that ranked second in the conference in total yards per game (431.2). Lee has appeared in all four games this season on special teams.

Defensive linemen: Among the NFL's premier pass rushers is eighth-year DE **Trey Hendrickson**, who has led the Bengals in sacks and been voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his three seasons with the team. He signed with Cincinnati as a free agent in 2021, and in '23 posted a career-high 17.5 sacks which tied for second in the league and ranked second in team history (DE Coy Bacon, 22.0 in 1976). Hendrickson's 56.0 sacks since the start of the 2020 season — his final year with the New Orleans Saints — rank third in the NFL behind Pittsburgh OLB T.J. Watt (65.0) and Cleveland DE Myles Garrett (62.0). He has three sacks through four games this season, including two on QB Patrick Mahomes in Week 2 at Kansas City. On the other side of the line is Cincinnati native and Archbishop Moeller High School graduate **Sam Hubbard**, who is in his seventh Bengals season (sixth as a full-time starter). A third-round pick by his hometown team in 2018, Hubbard has recorded 36.5 career sacks, the third-most among all players in his draft class. He has notched at least six sacks in each of the past three seasons, and his 58 total tackles in 2023 led all Bengals D-linemen. Hubbard has logged 12 total tackles through the first four games of this season. Cincinnati acquired DT **B.J. Hill** in a trade with the N.Y. Giants prior to the start of the 2021 season, and the seventh-year pro has established himself as a key contributor for defensive coordinator Lou Anarumo. After seeing action primarily as a reserve DT in his first season with the team, Hill has started each of his last 40 games played, including six postseason contests from 2021-22 and all 17 regular-season games in '23. A productive pass rusher from the interior, he has totaled 13 sacks over the past three seasons while also batting down/tipping nine passes at the line of scrimmage. Hill opened the season with three tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, but he suffered a hamstring injury the following week at Kansas City that kept him out of the lineup for the past two games. Ninth-year veteran **Sheldon Rankins** also missed Weeks 3 and 4 due to a hamstring injury sustained at Kansas City. Rankins signed with the Bengals as an unrestricted free agent in March and has 111 games of NFL experience. A first-round draft pick of New Orleans in 2016, he spent his first five seasons with

the Saints before playing for the N.Y. Jets ('21-22) and Houston Texans ('23). Alongside Hill, he provides a strong pass rushing ability from the inside with 29.5 career sacks and 43 TFLs. His six sacks for the Texans last season were the second-most in his career, and included a career-high three on Nov. 12 at Paycor Stadium against the Bengals. DE **Joseph Ossai** is in his fourth season in the NFL, but third healthy year after missing his entire rookie campaign due to a knee injury. A 2021 third-round pick of the Bengals, he has played in 34 career regular-season games and totaled 36 tackles with 4.5 sacks. Ossai was born in Nigeria and moved to the United States with his family when he was 10 years old, and that year he watched his first football game. Third-year DT **Zach Carter** has seen an increased share of snaps the past two games with Hill and Rankins out of the lineup, and tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. Carter played in all 17 games last season, making five starts as an extra DT. A third-round selection of the Bengals in 2022, he has 55 total tackles in 37 career appearances (16 starts). The Bengals used their second-round choice this past April to select DT **Kris Jenkins Jr.** out of the University of Michigan. Jenkins missed the first two games of his rookie season due to a thumb injury, but made his NFL debut in Week 3 vs. Washington and is coming off 22 defensive snaps played last Sunday at Carolina. He made a crucial play early against the Panthers, stuffing a rushing attempt on fourth-and-goal on their first drive of the game. Jenkins was a Michigan team captain and a second-team All-American last season, when he logged 37 tackles with 2.5 sacks and helped lead the Wolverines to a national title. His father, Kris Jenkins Sr., played 10 seasons in the NFL (2001-10) as a DT for the Carolina Panthers and N.Y. Jets, and was a four-time Pro Bowler. Cincinnati selected DE **Cedric Johnson** in the sixth round of this year's draft, and the University of Mississippi product looks to carry over an honorable mention All-SEC season in 2023 to the NFL ranks. He logged a career-high 40 tackles with 5.5 sacks last season at Ole Miss, and went on to participate in the 2024 Reese's Senior Bowl. Johnson has played a combined 34 defensive snaps over the past two games, after beginning his rookie season as a game day inactive in the first two contests. DT **Jay Tufele** has provided depth for the Bengals' defensive line since being acquired on waivers prior to the 2022 season. He played in 10 games in 2023, recording 11 tackles on 96 defensive snaps played. Tufele originally was a fourth-round draft choice by Jacksonville in 2021 and played in four games as a rookie for the Jaguars. He posted four tackles in Week 1 vs. New England, including a TFL on a Patriots first-and-goal play in the opening quarter, then tallied a half-sack in Week 3 vs. Washington. The most recent addition to the active roster is veteran DT **Lawrence Guy**, who signed with the Bengals as a free agent on Sept. 17. A 14th-year veteran, Guy previously spent time with Indianapolis, the San Diego Chargers, Baltimore and New England. He played for the Patriots from 2017-23, logging 379 tackles and 10.5 sacks in that stint. He made his Bengals debut in Week 3 vs. Washington, and over the past two games has played a combined 48 defensive snaps.

Linebackers: A 2020 third-round draft pick of the Bengals, **Logan Wilson** has developed into one of the NFL's top linebackers and is a highly productive member of the Cincinnati defense. His 11 career INTs are the most by any NFL LB since he entered the league, and he has led the Bengals in tackles in each of the past three seasons. His career-high 135 tackles in 2023 were the most by a Bengals player since LB Vontaze Burfict had 171 in his 2013 Pro Bowl campaign. He also wears the "green dot" as the Bengals' defensive communicator on the field. Wilson through four games this season ranks tied for fourth in the NFL with 43 tackles, and he is the first Bengals player to open a campaign with nine or more tackles in four straight games since LB Dhani Jones in 2008. The team's starting LB tandem features Wilson and sixth-year pro **Germaine Pratt**, who set a career high in tackles in each of the past two seasons. Pratt has a knack for forcing game-changing turnovers, and he is one of three NFL players with at least five INTs, five FFs and four FRs since 2021, alongside Miami S Jevon Holland and Tampa Bay S Antoine Winfield Jr. He has started 75 of 83 career regular-season games played, and boasts a streak of 65 consecutive starts (including postseason). Pratt, who recently was voted a team captain for the first time in his career, led the defense with a career-high 16 tackles in Week 2 at Kansas City, and forced and recovered a fumble late in the second quarter that set up a Cincinnati FG drive. His 42 tackles through four games are tied for sixth in the NFL. Also wearing the captains patch for the first time this season is **Akeem Davis-Gaither**, who has played in 58 games with four starts for the Bengals. He serves as a rotational LB and core special teamer, and battled through a knee injury last season to play in 13 games. Davis-Gaither saw action on 16 defensive snaps in Week 2 at Kansas City, and picked off QB Patrick Mahomes late in the first quarter for his second career INT (first since 2020). He also has lined up for a team-high 81 special teams snaps through four games this season. Another key piece of Cincinnati's special teams units is fifth-

year pro **Joe Bachie**. Bachie suffered an injury late in the 2021 season that caused him to miss the early portion of the '22 campaign, but he has since suited up in 30 regular-season contests, including 16 in '23. He spent time with New Orleans and Philadelphia to begin his career, then was acquired on waivers by the Bengals during the 2021 offseason. Defensively, he has 34 career tackles and one PD in 43 games played. Among the most notable stories in Cincinnati's initial 53-man roster was rookie LB **Maema Njongmeta**, who made the team after signing as a college free agent in May. Njongmeta (pronounced "moo-MUH jong-METT-uh") led the Bengals and ranked second in the NFL in tackles during the preseason (27), and added two PDs. He spent four seasons (2020-23) at the University of Wisconsin, where he took over a starting LB job as a junior in '22. Over his final two years with the Badgers, he posted a combined 154 tackles with 21 TFLs and 6.5 sacks. Njongmeta has lined up for 80 special teams snaps through four regular-season games.

Cornerbacks: Nickel CB **Mike Hilton**, a free agency acquisition of the Bengals in 2021, is widely considered one of the top slot corners in the NFL. Though listed at 5-9, 184 pounds, he is a sure tackler and an excellent blitzer with 11.5 career sacks. In 2023, he recorded career highs in total tackles (84) and TFLs (12). He also had a pair of INTs and eight PDs last season. Hilton entered the league as a college free agent signee by Jacksonville in 2016 and was briefly on New England's practice squad before spending four-plus seasons with Pittsburgh. He has totaled 12 tackles through the first four games of this season. Third-year pro **Cam Taylor-Britt** looks to continue his ascension as a bona fide number one CB. The Bengals' 2022 second-round draft pick has started 25 of 26 career games played and quickly proven he can match up against opposing teams' top WRs. He missed five games last season due to injuries, but still tied for the team lead with four INTs (tied for seventh in NFL), while collecting 11 PDs and 50 tackles. He opened the season with six tackles (four solos) in Week 1 against New England, then grabbed his first INT of the year with a highlight-reel one-handed pick on a Patrick Mahomes pass in Week 2 at Kansas City. **Dax Hill**, Cincinnati's first-round draft pick in 2022, is in his first season at CB after spending the past two years as a safety. He started every game at S in 2023, and ranked third on the team with 110 tackles while adding 11 PDs and two INTs. Hill tallied eight tackles (seven solos) and was credited with the Bengals' first sack of the season in Week 1 vs. New England. **DJ Turner II** is in his second pro season, after a rookie campaign in which he played in all 17 games and started 12 of the final 13 contests. A second-round draft choice last year, he ran the fastest 40-yard dash time among all players at the 2023 NFL Combine, clocking in at 4.26 seconds. Turner recorded 50 tackles and seven PDs as a rookie, and is coming off a stat line of six solo tackles and two PDs in Week 4 at Carolina. The Bengals' fifth-round draft choice this year, **Josh Newton**, made the team out of training camp after posting nine tackles, two PDs and an INT in preseason. Lou Anarumo spoke highly of Newton after his name was called on the third day of the draft, citing his ability to line up on the outside or at nickel. He started all 27 games he played in over two seasons (2022-23) at Texas Christian University, logging 68 tackles with 24 PDs and four INTs. He transferred to Texas Christian from the University of Louisiana-Monroe, and in his first season with the Horned Frogs he ranked second in the Big 12 Conference with 12 pass breakups and helped lead the team to the College Football Playoff National Championship game. Newton has seen action on 46 special teams snaps through four regular-season games.

Safeties: Ninth-year veteran **Vonn Bell** is in his second Bengals stint in 2024, after spending the '23 season with the Carolina Panthers. He previously played for Cincinnati from 2020-22, serving as a team captain in all three seasons. Bell's eight FFs from 2020-22 were the eighth-most in the NFL, and he also contributed five INTs and 288 total tackles. He has 29 tackles through four games this season and has lined up for 258 of the team's 259 defensive snaps. Bell grabbed his first INT of the season against his former team in Week 4 at Carolina, and his 32-yard return following the pick set up Cincinnati's first TD of the game. It marked his eighth career INT and his first since Week 2 of 2023. In 13 games played for the Panthers last season, Bell ranked third on the team in tackles (69) and had two PDs. One of the headliners of Cincinnati's 2024 free agency class was **Geno Stone**, who emerged as a premier ball-hawking safety in his final season with Baltimore. He spent his first three pro seasons (2020-22) as a reserve defensive back for the Ravens, then in '23 broke out with an AFC-leading seven INTs (second in NFL). His seven picks included a streak of four consecutive games with an INT, which tied for the longest streak league-wide last season. Stone originally was a seventh-round pick of the Ravens in 2020. He has 18 tackles through four games with the Bengals, including six in Week 2 at Kansas City. **Jordan Battle** is in his second pro season, after starting seven straight games at safety to close out his rookie year in 2023. He ranked fifth on the team in tackles last season with 69, while also contributing an INT, five PDs and two sacks. A third-round pick of the Bengals in 2023, he was a team captain

and two-time third-team All-American at the University of Alabama. Battle had a pick-six in the preseason finale against Indianapolis, and has played 62 special teams snaps through four regular-season contests. Third-year pro **Tycen Anderson** also has lined up for 62 special teams snaps through four games this season, after returning from a season-ending injury he sustained midway through the 2023 campaign. A 2022 fifth-round pick of the Bengals, he led the team with eight special teams tackles last season despite missing the final 10 games. Anderson missed his entire rookie season due to a hamstring injury, then in his return to game action during the 2023 preseason opener vs. Green Bay, he had two INTs including a 43-yard pick-six. Seventh-round pick **Daijahn Anthony** made the Bengals' 53-man roster coming out of his first training camp. Anthony worked his way from Division II Shepherd University (2019-20) to Liberty University ('21-22), before finishing out his collegiate career at the University of Mississippi in '23. He started 10 of 13 games played with the Rebels last season, tying for the team lead with three INTs while totaling 61 tackles. Anthony has lined up for nine defensive snaps and 60 special teams snaps through the first four games of this season. In Week 4 at Carolina, he broke up a pass attempt on a fake punt in the third quarter, setting up the Bengals' offense at the Carolina 35-yard line.

Special teams: Fourth-year K **Evan McPherson** has quickly become one of the top kickers in the NFL and a fan-favorite in Cincinnati. He ranks third on the team's all-time field goal percentage list (84.5 percent; minimum 75 attempts) and has been named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week three times. Known for his long-distance accuracy, his 24 career made FGs from 50 or more yards are the most in Bengals history and the second-most by any kicker since he entered the league in 2021. McPherson's 28-yard field goal midway through the second quarter in Week 3 vs. Washington marked his 100th career field goal attempt, and his 84 made FGs to that point were the third-most in team

history through a kicker's first 100 tries. McPherson inked a three-year contract extension on Aug. 18 that keeps him in Cincinnati through the 2027 season. Long-snapper **Cal Adomitis** has delivered zero unplayable snaps on 317 attempts in 39 career games (including postseason). The 2022 college free agent signee out of the University of Pittsburgh began his rookie season on the Bengals' practice squad, before taking over primary long-snapping duties in Week 2. Rookie **Ryan Rehkow** is handling punting and holding duties for the Bengals, after signing with the team two days into training camp. He originally was a college free agent signee of Kansas City in May, then was waived by the Chiefs in June. Rehkow had a historic debut in Week 1 vs. New England, highlighted by an NFL record 64.5 gross yards per punt (minimum four punts). That included a Bengals-record 80-yarder in the first quarter, and a 70-yarder in the fourth quarter. His 52.0 net yards per punt also was the second-highest average in a game in team history. He had another strong showing in Week 4 at Carolina, punting three times for 170 yards (56.7 gross average), with two downed inside the Panthers' 20-yard line. Rehkow averaged 47.4 yards on 176 punts in 50 games played at Brigham Young University. Second-year WR **Charlie Jones** earned the primary punt returner job early in his rookie season, and took command of that role in just his second game when he returned a punt 81 yards for a TD against the Baltimore Ravens. The play marked the Bengals' first TD on a PR since 2012, and was the 10th punt return TD by a rookie in team history (first since 2000). Jones finished the 2023 season with 248 PR yards on 23 attempts, good for a 10.8-yard average. Fifth-year WR **Trenton Irwin** had 10 of his 13 career punt returns last season. He averaged 9.8 yards per return in 2023, with two returns for over 20 yards in Week 5 at Arizona. Returning kickoffs this season are second-year HB **Chase Brown** and sixth-year vet HB **Trayveon Williams**. Brown is averaging 26.6 yards per return on seven runbacks this season, with a long of 29 yards in Week 3 vs. Washington. Williams served as the team's primary KOR over the past two-plus seasons and holds a career regular-season average of 22.5 yards on 33 returns.

Cincinnati faced two 10-point deficits in the second half and each time was able to cut it to three, but ultimately the Bengals never took the lead in a home-opener loss. Baltimore was efficient offensively, totaling 415 net yards — including 178 rushing — and scoring a TD on three of its four red zone trips. Cincinnati's offense had just three possessions in the first half and was limited to a FG, but an 81-yard punt return for a TD by rookie WR Charlie Jones in the second quarter helped keep the team within striking distance. QB Joe Burrow connected with WR Tee Higgins for a TD late in the third quarter to reduce Baltimore's lead to three points at 20-17, but the Ravens answered with a 12-play, 85-yard TD drive to regain the two-score advantage. Another Burrow-to-Higgins TD with 3:28 left closed the gap again, but the Ravens converted a pair of third downs on the ensuing possession to end the game. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Baltimore improved to 2-0.

The Bengals held a narrow lead early in the second quarter in a highly anticipated Thursday Night Football showdown at Baltimore, but a wrist injury forced QB Joe Burrow to miss the remainder of the game and the Ravens went on to secure a 34-20 divisional win. Burrow left the contest after throwing a TD pass to HB Joe Mixon that put Cincinnati ahead 10-7, and Baltimore capitalized on his absence with two TD drives before halftime to build a double-digit advantage. The balanced Ravens offense totaled 405 net yards — with 248 coming through the air and 157 on the ground — and had seven plays of 20 or more yards. Cincinnati fell to 5-5, while Baltimore improved to 8-3.

The Bengals trimmed their deficit to six points twice in the second half, but the Patriots forced a punt late in the fourth quarter and ran out the final 2:13 of regulation to hand Cincinnati a regular-season opening loss. New England controlled the clock for much of the game while rushing for 170 yards, while the Bengals' offense had to overcome a slow start with three straight three-and-outs. Cincinnati found its rhythm during a 13-play drive in the second quarter but came away with no points, as what was originally ruled a TD catch by TE Mike Gesicki was overturned, and two snaps later TE Tanner Hudson fumbled near the goal line and New England recovered. The Patriots capitalized with a FG as the first half expired, then forced a fumble on a Bengals punt return early in the third and cashed in with another FG to extend their lead to 13-0. Cincinnati responded later in the quarter with a rushing TD by HB Zack Moss, who finished with a team-high 44 yards on the ground in his Bengals debut. A Patriots FG midway through the fourth quarter was answered with a 51-yarder by Bengals K Evan McPherson, but that proved to be the last time Cincinnati crossed midfield.

The Bengals and Chiefs played to a one-score result for a sixth straight time since January 2022, as Kansas City K Harrison Butker kicked a 51-yard game-winning FG as time expired. The game featured six lead changes. Cincinnati held a two-point lead and forced the Chiefs into a fourth-and-16 with under a minute remaining, but a QB Patrick Mahomes downfield heave resulted in a defensive pass interference penalty to set up the kick. The Bengals' defense had three takeaways, including a pair of INTs, and allowed just 137 net passing yards. Offensively, Cincinnati scored points on five of its first six true possessions. Bengals QB Joe Burrow completed 23 of 36 passes for 258 yards and a 103.7 passer rating, as well as two TD passes to WR Andrei Iosivas. Cincinnati fell to 0-2, while Kansas City improved to 2-0.

Washington scored on all six of its offensive possessions which didn't end halves to defeat Cincinnati on Monday Night Football. The Bengals also were efficient offensively, totaling 436 net yards and coming away with points on six of their seven drives, but they ultimately could not climb back from a double-digit deficit in the second half. The game marked the NFL's first matchup since 1940 in which neither team punted nor committed a turnover. Commanders rookie QB Jayden Daniels completed 91.3 percent of his passes (21 of 23), which set both an NFL rookie record and a Bengals opponent record for a single game (minimum 20 attempts). Bengals QB Joe Burrow finished with 324 passing yards and three TDs, including his 100th career TD pass to WR Ja'Marr Chase on the game's opening drive. Cincinnati fell to 0-3, while Washington improved to 2-1.
