

RONALD CURRY QUARTERBACKS

FIRST-AND-10

RONALD CURRY was named the Bills quarterbacks coach on February 7, 2024. Curry joins the Bills after spending the last eight seasons coaching in different offensive capacities on the Saints staff. Curry brings 11 years of NFL coaching experience and seven years of playing experience to the Bills coaching staff.

COACHING SHOUTOUTS

2016-2023: (New Orleans Saints)

• In 2023, helped Derek Carr tally the most passing yards (3,878) by a Saints QB since Drew Brees in 2018.

• In 2022, under Curry's collaboration with offensive coordinator Pete Carmichael and the offensive staff, the Saints improved from 32nd in the NFL to 16th in net passing yards per game, while he mentored Andy Dalton and Jameis Winston.

• Following the conclusion of the 2022 Saints season, served as the offensive coordinator for the Reese's Senior Bowl's National team, where Curry tutored the all-star game's MVP, Fresno State quarterback Jake Haener, who was later selected by New Orleans in the fourth round of the 2023 NFL Draft. In May, Curry was the Saints representative for the NFL's Coach Accelerator program at the Spring League Meeting in Minneapolis.

• In Curry's first season coaching quarterbacks in 2021, Winston posted a 5-2 record as a starter and ranked in the top 10 in the NFL in touchdown passes (14), touchdown percentage (8.7) and passer rating (102.8) through the first eight weeks of the season before suffering a season-ending injury. Following Winston's injury, Curry helped backup QB Taysom Hill win four of his five starts.

• In 2020, coached Emmanuel Sanders and helped him lead the Saints wideouts with 61 receptions for 726 yards and five touchdowns.

• In 2019, helped Michael Thomas shatter the NFL's receptions record and club receiving yardage records as he posted 149 receptions for 1,725 yards and nine touchdowns as he was selected Associated Press NFL Offensive Player of the Year. Thomas was selected as an AP first-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl starter for the second consecutive season.

COACHING SHOUTOUTS

2016-23: (New Orleans Saints - continued)

• In his first season as the primary wide receivers coach in 2018, helped Thomas record an NFL-best 125 catches for 1,405 yards and nine touchdowns.

• Coached alongisde Bills offensive coordinator Joe Brady during the 2017 and 2018 seasons in New Orleans, winning the NFC South in both seasons and reaching the NFC conference championship in 2018.

2013-15: (San Francisco 49ers)

• Served as wide receivers coach in 2015 and as an offensive assistant working with the wideouts from 2013-14. In 2015, Anquan Boldin recorded at least 65 receptions for the fourth consecutive season and Torrey Smith led the league in yards per catch (20.1). From 2013-14, Boldin became the first player in 49ers history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in each of his first two seasons with the team and the first 49ers receiver to eclipse the mark in back-to-back seasons since Terrell Owens from 2002-03.

2010-12: (Mooresville Christian Academy)

• Spent three years at Mooresville Christian Academy in Mooresville, N.C., as the athletic director and head football coach.

PLAYING SHOUTOUTS

• Played for the Oakland Raiders from 2002 to 2008 after being drafted by the team in the seventh round (235th overall) in 2002 out of North Carolina. Played in 76 games with 32 starts and registered 193 receptions for 2,347 yards and 13 touchdowns from 2002-08. In 2006, he was the team's recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award.

• Played quarterback at UNC and transitioned to playing wide receiver in the NFL.

PERSONAL

• Was a dual-sport athlete at UNC, playing point guard for the Tar Heels (1998-2001) alongside Julius Peppers. Also was a high school All-American in football and basketball.

• A native of Hampton, Virginia.
