DEWAYNE CARTER was selected by the Bills in the third round in 2024. Carter is the first player the Bills have drafted out of Duke since Ross Cockrell in 2014.

SHOUTOUTS

- Made his NFL debut vs. Arz. (9/8/24).
- Played in 52 games during his five years (2019-23) at Duke. Was a team captain for three consecutive years (2021-23), becoming the first player in school history to do so. Totaled 126 tackles (48 solo), 25 TFLs, 12 sacks, 11 passes defensed, seven forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries.
- Played in all 13 games in 2023, making 41 tackles (10 solo), 3.5 TFLs, one sack, four passes defensed, one fumble recovery & blocked a punt. Was named a Phil Steele Publications All-America selection and was a First Team All-ACC recipient
- In 2022, started all 13 games and tallied 36 tackles, with a team-best 11.0 TFL and 5.5 sacks. Added four PBUs, three caused fumbles, three fumble recoveries and five QB pressures.
- In 2021, started 12 games, compiling 37 tackles, 7.5 TFL, 4.5 sacks, three PBUs, six QB hurries and four forced fumbles. Finished first in the ACC and tied for 11th in the nation in forced fumbles, while placing second on the team in both TFL and sacks.
- In 2020, played in all 11 games, totaling 12 tackles, 3.0 TFL and 1.0 sack.

A FOOTBALL FAMILY

His father, DeWayne Sr., was a star for the Buckeyes throughout the early nineties. His uncle and grandfather, both named Raymond, played college football for Notre Dame and Youngstown State, respectively. Another uncle, John Carter, played at Western Kentucky. In other words, Carter comes from an accomplished football family and grew up with one of the country's most storied programs on the other side of town. "It was never pushed on me," Carter said. "Which is funny to say because I wasn't allowed to play football until sixth grade." His father originally insisted that he couldn't play until ninth grade. "My mom told him: 'Listen, he's not gonna suck when he gets to high school, he needs at least a couple of years," Carter said. "So we got down to sixth grade. But after then, he became the coach of my first team, and then it kind of took off from there." It certainly did. Carter lettered all four years at Pickerington Central and led his team to the Division I state semifinals on three occasions.
