### feeding the future

One in nine Colorado youth face food insecurity, which negatively impacts their physical and mental health, social skills and performance in schools. Through direct services and collaboration with 800-plus Hunger Relief Partners, including food pantries, nonprofits, schools and more, Food Bank of the Rockies distributes enough food to provide upwards of 196,000 meals per day.

That collaboration inspired the Denver Broncos Foundation and CommonSpirit Health (formerly known as Centura Health) to team up to tackle food insecurity together. Together, the organizations support Food Bank of the Rockies' Totes of Hope<sup>™</sup> program at Doull Elementary, which assists youth with nutritious, kidfriendly food to sustain them over the weekend when school is not in session and other food programs may be unavailable. Every Friday, youth take home a tote filled with eight to nine pounds of food featuring shelf-stable

items (i.e., canned fruits and vegetables, peanut butter, whole grains) and fresh fruits and vegetables, as well as a recipe in both English and Spanish for a complete meal.

Additionally, the Denver Broncos Foundation and CommonSpirit Health are featured on a newly cobranded truck to ensure individuals have the food they need to thrive. This powerful partnership is driving impact across 32 Colorado counties and all 23 Wyoming counties to collectively impact the issue of food insecurity in our communities.

Throughout the 2023 season, the Denver Broncos Foundation teamed up with CommonSpirit Health and Food Bank of the Rockies for food packaging and distribution events, as well as a Thanksgiving-themed assembly at Doull Elementary School focused on gratitude and giving.

### expanding mental health Services

Suicide is the leading cause of death for youth in Colorado, with nearly one in five Colorado high school students reporting that they seriously considered suicide within one school year. Second Wind Fund (SWF) exists to provide youth (up to 19 years old) at risk for suicide access to professional counseling services by removing financial and social barriers.

The suicide death rate for ages 19-24 is more than double that of ages 10-18, but once a youth graduates high school, access to low-cost/free mental health care services decreases significantly. The Denver Broncos Foundation is proud to partner with SWF to expand access to mental health services through a multi-year, multifaceted approach:

- **Geographic expansion** to provide in-person therapy services in all Colorado counties with an intentional focus on expansion in rural and tribal communities to reach an additional 600 youth and provide 2,500 additional therapy sessions in the next three years.
- Fund and launch the Young Adult Pilot Program to provide services to young adults ages 19-21 increasing the age limit at which a youth can access SWF services from 19 to 21 —with an estimated reach of 780 youth and 3,120 therapy sessions provided during the pilot program.





### putting our best foot forward

Nationally, teachers estimate that nearly one in five students in their schools deal with lack of access to clean clothes on a regular basis, and more than half of teachers surveyed believe those students are more likely to struggle with absenteeism.

Clothes To Kids of Denver (CTKD) provides new and quality used clothing in a boutique setting to Denver area students from low-income or in-crisis families, free of charge. Youth are connected through schools, school districts, human service agencies, shelters, hospitals, clinics and other organizations throughout the 11-county Denver Metro Area.

Students set up an appointment to shop for a 21-piece wardrobe. While the bulk of the clothing comes in through in-kind donations, the Denver Broncos Foundation is helping CTKD fill the gaps of high-need, new items, including five new pairs of socks and underwear for the 12,000 youth served this year, and underwriting 4,660 pairs of new shoes for approximately one-third of youth served.






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Percentage of parents who agree or strongly agree that their child was more confident after shopping at CTKD

# 20 years of impact

The Denver Broncos have funded the Denver Broncos Boys & Girls Club since 2003, providing a foundation for thousands of youth to recognize their potential.

Kids ages 5-18 attend the Club from Monday through Friday during the school year and throughout the summer to access a myriad of activities and programs, nutritious meals and exposure to caring adults during their formative years.

This August, the team joined Denver Broncos Boys & Girls Club's community to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Club with Owner Carrie Walton Penner's announcement that the Denver Broncos Foundation will continue to support the Denver Broncos Boys & Girls Club for at least the next five years.

In her remarks ahead of a celebration that included games, food and prizes, Walton Penner expressed the importance of an organization that has helped more than 15,000 youth during its 20-year history. The Denver Broncos Foundation's commitment to Boys & Girls Club of Metro Denver will ensure that support continues long into the future.

### a focus on literacy

Students reading below grade level in third grade are four times as likely as their peers to drop out of school before earning their diploma. Throughout Colorado, 16.3 percent of K-3 students have been identified as having significant reading deficiency.

Studies also show programs that distribute books to children to foster book ownership help improve students' reading performance, writing performance, attitudes toward reading and general academic performance.

Through grantmaking, programming and events, the Denver Broncos Foundation is supporting key literacy initiatives focused on helping students read at grade level and ensuring access to books featuring characters and storylines with which they can identify.

In September, the Foundation teamed up with Scholastic and HidrateSpark to host Montview Elementary School's first-ever book fair. The three-day celebration invited each student to select four free books to take home for their personal libraries, with the school selecting an additional 300 books to keep for classrooms and the library. Students also received branded stickers and bookmarks for their collection.

Through multi-year grant funding to Reading Partners Colorado, the Foundation will ensure an additional Title I school receives individualized intervention services and one-on-one support for students who have fallen behind in reading progress and need more support than teachers and school staff can provide during the school day.

### uplifting the next generation

One in three kids in America are growing up without a sustained, positive adult mentor in their lives. Colorado UpLift's mission is to build long-term, life-changing relationships with urban youth, equipping them to thrive and contribute to their community.

UpLift employs full-time teacher-mentors representative of the communities they serve — who are available to students 24/7, year-round. The teachermentors engage in year-round programming, cross-age mentoring and a long-term relational approach (fourth grade through high school).

Through a multi-year Denver Broncos Foundation grant commitment, UpLift expanded out-of-school

year-round programming at Denver Public Schools' West Middle School, ensuring kids have access to positive and consistent role models and impactful programming focused on academic support, leadership development, college and career exploration and planning and wraparound support.

If you can see it, you can be it — and Junior Achievement (JA) believes any young person can succeed with the right inspirational and preparation tools. JA recently opened the internationally recognized JA Free Enterprise building to support Colorado students as they dream big and identify pathways to their futures.

The Denver Broncos Foundation is funding the JA Dream Accelerator's "Picture Your Strengths" interactive, which will enable 10,000 students annually to gain further perspectives about how their unique interests and hobbies should inform their journey to identify a fulfilling career that pays a living wage.

### picture your strengths

Overall, the Daniels Fund JA Dream Accelerator brings careers to life by sharing stories of emerging entrepreneurs and business leaders tailored to each student's interests and aptitudes, motivating them to develop a plan that will empower them and help them launch a meaningful career.

This program begins at individual schools where students utilize a robust online resource, JA Here to Career, and culminates with a field trip to the JA Free Enterprise Center in Greenwood Village, Colorado, where they visit a high-tech learning lab comprised of six activities that are customized to align with each student's assessment results.

### closing the gap

Only one in four Colorado students will attend a four-year college, while 90 percent of top jobs in Colorado that pay a living wage require post-secondary education.

Minds Matter Colorado (MMCO) is working to close the post-secondary education gap by connecting driven and determined students from low-income families with the people, preparation and possibilities to succeed in college, create their future and change the world. A college degree can result in a low-income student experiencing longer life expectancy, better job security and a higher income over their lifetime.

MMCO's College Access Mentoring Program combines three years of mentorship with committed college-educated

volunteers, weekly college-prep instruction (SAT prep, financial aid education, application support) and access to two summer programs at colleges across the country. Programming is delivered at four different sites, and MMCO provides transportation support for students to remove a barrier to access.

The Denver Broncos Foundation is working with MMCO to increase sophomore enrollment by 50 percent for the Class of 2027, ensuring more Colorado youth will have access to a four-year college degree and the transformational benefits that degree can bring over a lifetime.

Nationally, one in four girls will not finish high school on time, and in the districts that Girls Inc. of Metro Denver serves, nearly 1,000 girls (approx. 750 girls of color) are pushed out, and subsequently drop out of high school every year. The negative economic, social and emotional effects of dropping out of high school are staggering for girls. On average, a female dropout earns just over one-third of what her male counterparts earn, and female dropouts have increased rates of health challenges and less access to health care.

Girls Inc. of Metro Denver's Career and College Success program provides year-round academic support and programing focused on college and career exploration, planning and successful transitions, with the goal of helping girls learn skills to be healthy, independent and successful adults.

The Denver Broncos Foundation is teaming up with Girls Inc. Metro of Denver to expand two key components of the Career and College Success program:

The Denver Broncos are committed to growing the game of football in Mexico, the team's International Home Market Area (IHMA).

The Denver Broncos Foundation committed more than \$100,000 in grant support to launch a partnership with NFL Mexico's Tochito programming, which is Mexico's national flag football program launched by the NFL in 2000.

Funding provides 60 elementary schools across Mexico City and Monterrey with in-school physical education curriculum, flag football equipment kit donations (footballs, flags, bags, etc.) and teacher certification in football fundamentals.

Additionally, the Broncos funding sponsors two age groups in nationwide flag football tournaments for both 12U coed and 16U female leagues. In December, Denver Broncos Cheerleaders, alumni and members of the Community Impact department traveled to Monterrey for the co-ed Tochito U12 tournament, which drew teams from each of Mexico's 32 states. The tournament's champion was from Coahuila, and the team advanced to compete in the 2024 NFL Flag National Championships in Orlando, Florida at the Pro Bowl.

The Broncos will continue to invest in expanding football's reach beyond the nation's borders and growing the sport with the next generation of players.

### equitable access

The Women's Sports Foundation notes that by age 14, many girls are dropping out of sports at twice the rate of boys, and girls have 1.3 million fewer opportunities to play high school sports than boys.

In its second season of a Colorado High School Activities Association (CHSAA) pilot sport, the Denver Broncos' girls flag football program is working to combat this issue, more than doubling the number of girls participating in high school flag football in Colorado. The program boasted 50 schools fielding 76 teams, providing an opportunity for 1,316 student athletes to participate; 67 percent of student athletes had never played flag football prior to this season.

Before the start of the season, the Denver Broncos Foundation hosted the second annual Girls Flag Coaches Clinic for athletic directors, head coaches and assistants. The clinic included a thorough review of the rulebook, playbook development, practice planning, on-field drills

and more. A board-certified specialist in sports dietetics, Bob Seebohar, spoke on behalf of Dairy MAX and discussed the role nutrition plays in the health-and-wellness routine of athletes.

Through weekly in-season jamborees, teams had the opportunity to play 18 regular season games, and work toward becoming eligible for the postseason tournament and high school girls flag football state championship held at Centura Health Training Center.

Led by the 2023 Denver Broncos High School Flag Football Coach of the Year Mario Lopez, Arvada West High School capped off an undefeated season with a state title after defeating Cherry Creek High School in the championship game. The Wildcats finished their season with 534 points scored and only 44 points allowed, and junior Saylor Swanson was named the Gold Belt award winner as the Colorado High School Flag Football Player of the Year.

# equipping for the unexpected

Sudden cardiac arrest is the leading cause of death among youth athletes, but the survival rate for sudden cardiac arrest is 50-70 percent if an AED is administered within five minutes of the event. With every passing minute that one is not placed and used, survival rate drops an additional 10 percent.

The Denver Broncos Foundation is working to improve student-athlete safety by equipping Colorado schools and organizations with the equipment and knowledge needed in case of unexpected events.

Ahead of the football season, the Foundation teamed up with Children's Hospital Colorado and Rocky Mountain CPR to provide 32 AEDs to 27 high schools and youth organizations. Additionally, the groups made free CPR and AED certification available as part of a program to educate coaches, athletic directors and athletic trainers on several health protocols for young athletes.


Sudden cardiac arrest can occur in young athletes for a number of reasons, including commotio cordis, genetic conditions or other disorders. If an AED is available, it can cut fatality rates simply by being within reach.


In addition to learning how to recognize symptoms of sudden cardiac arrest and when to treat the medical event, Children's Colorado professionals spoke about heat illness and concussions, aiming to increase knowledge and safety of youth athletes in Colorado.

## cultivating change

According to the Sentencing Project, youth who are placed in diversion programming are less likely to recidivate, commit less violence, have higher rates of school completion and college enrollment and earn higher incomes in adulthood.

The Urban Farm (TUF) in collaboration with Denver's Public Safety Youth Services operates the HYPE: Cultivating Change in Youth diversion programming for youth ages 14-18 focused on supporting justice-involved and at-risk youth with life skills and career pathway programming. Approximately 10-15 youth are employed in each cohort of the earn-while-you-learn 10-week program, receiving 6.5 hours of daily programming, wraparound services, meals and training to monitor and manage emotions, practice empathy towards themselves and others and develop foundational strategies to help them navigate the world as adults. HYPE youth leave the program with a bank account to support a financially-sound future and a resume for future employment.

In addition to providing funding to support 40-plus youth accessing the diversion program annually, the Denver Broncos Foundation partnered with TUF for an on-site beautification project. Denver Broncos staff and defensive lineman Haggai Chisom Ndubuisi joined youth in the program to paint a shipping container that will be used to further TUF's mission to provide the opportunity for urban youth to engage and participate in local agricultural systems by removing the barriers such as land access, time, location and finances.

The Denver Broncos named The Urban Farm's Michelle Graham Rodriguez as their 2023 Inspire Change Changemaker Award winner. The Inspire Change Changemaker Award recognizes an individual in each NFL team market who is making a difference in the community through their work in social justice initiatives.

Michelle joined The Urban Farm (TUF) as Executive Director in November 2019, and oversees the organization's Cultivating Change in Youth diversion programming.

The Broncos Foundation Grant provided critical funding and exposure for The Urban Farm's Cultivating Change in Youth vocational programming, which is provided in collaboration with Denver's Public Safety Youth Programs. With a 90% successful completion rate for 2023, we have been able to provide over \$85,000 in wages paid directly to youth participants. In addition, participants had a direct contribution to the production of over 10,000 lbs. of fresh produce, meat and eggs donated to the community per year, supporting a restorative justice model. Further, over 1750 meals were provided during programming and over \$20,000 worth of healthy groceries were distributed to participant households.


### momentum to denver

An estimated 22,000 young people in Colorado are justice-engaged through pre-trial, lock-up, diversion and other justice programs. To increase avenues of support for this group of youth, the Denver Broncos Foundation is supporting the expansion of Café Momentum, a nationally recognized nonprofit, to Denver. The new arm of the program is expected to begin construction on its Denver location in 2024.

The grant will facilitate the expansion of Café Momentum's ecosystem of support, which offers comprehensive services, including 24/7 case management, education,

mental health and workforce development. With a proven track record of aiding more than 1,000 youths, Café Momentum Denver aims to break the cycle of incarceration and support justice-involved youth by instilling hope and fostering positive change within the community.

Over the past few years, Denver Broncos players, alumni and staff have had the opportunity to meet with youth who have graduated from Café Momentum's program, as well as enjoy the restaurant's food through various virtual and inperson events both in Denver and across the country. Café Momentum is an NFL Inspire Change partner.

### mental health power play

A 2021-22 Colorado Division of Youth Services report found that 85% of newly committed youth require formal mental health intervention services.

WellPower's Juvenile Justice Mental Health Services provide counseling and case management services to youth who are currently engaged in the juvenile justice system. Each youth has an individualized plan tailored to their needs, goals, consequences and harm-reduction outlook. However, many justice-involved youth struggle with basic needs and often face barriers that prohibit them from

fully participating in, and benefiting from, mental health services.

The Denver Broncos Foundation is teaming up with WellPower to begin to tackle that problem through support for a new Clinical Case Manager to provide culturally sensitive, trauma-informed case management with the goals of increasing stabilization and reducing recidivism.

The Foundation is also increasing the support justiceinvolved youth receive for wrapround support including rent assistance, basic needs, educational support and more.





# grant spotlights

### **Karis** karis, inc.

Karis, Inc.'s Wildly Integrated Mental Health Program provides mental and behavioral health services in non-institutional settings where youth feel safe and supported, lowering barriers to care. Karis is the only agency in Mesa County that provides services specifically tailored to homeless youth, who are at higher risk for challenges related to mental health.

### **CABPES** the colorado association of black professional engineers and scientists

The Colorado Association of Black Professional Engineers and Scientists' Junior Engineers Tomorrow's Scientists program helps underrepresented minority youth in the metro Denver area prepare for careers in STEM professions. Youth learn STEM skills through hands-on experiences and real-life problem solving while learning about various career pathways.

### peak education

Peak Education's Impact Service Project is a semester-long service-learning project where middle and high school students work in small teams with local businesses, nonprofits and educational institutions to identify root causes of local area problems and find creative solutions. Peak scholars are empowered to take ownership of their educational journey and receive the support and mentorship to overcome barriers.

### sierra grande k-12 school

Sierra Grande K-12 School is a Title I rural school in southern Colorado serving 83 percent minority students. The Sierra Grande high school football program received funding to enhance player safety through the purchase of new football helmets.



# volunteerism spotlights

Selected by the Broncos in the first round (20th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft from the University of Utah, Bolles has started all 99 games played during his seven seasons while making a consistent impact in the community. Named the Broncos' Community Impact Award winner in 2022 and a Broncos Community Ambassador in 2021, Bolles has focused his community outreach efforts on providing meaningful and impactful mentorship to justice-involved youth.

Over the last several seasons. Bolles has been an active

participant in a juvenile probation court mentorship program and redecorated a court room in Arapahoe County while also making regular visits to the Marvin W. Foote Youth Services Center. Following a visit alongside Owner Carrie Walton Penner and teammates, Bolles launched a rewards program to incentivize positive behavior within specific pods he mentored. He has impacted hundreds of youth with his outreach, providing mentorship and developing a unique, in-person connection with each child.

Beyond his work in the juvenile justice system and involvement in both organizational and teammate-related community outreach, Bolles is passionate about his personal foundation, the GB3 Foundation. Its mission is to empower youth with learning disabilities to find success through mentors in educational strategies, spiritual and mental wellbeing, whole body nutrition and physical health for the purpose of equipping them to live their dream.

I do this because I genuinely love and care for these kids. I know they say I help them, but they help me, and they give me that fight every single day to go out there on the football field and live out my dream.

### champions in the community

Each season, the Denver Broncos present "Champions in the Community" Awards to recognize players who have gone above and beyond in both team and personal philanthropic efforts throughout the year. Throughout 2023, 94 different players participated in a voluntary community event or initiative. Through 469 total impact points (appearances, programs and donations), Denver Broncos players completed more than 800 total service hours.





#### community impact award: Pat Surtain II

Cornerback Pat Surtain II received the team's Community Impact Award for his dedication to youth and disadvantaged communities. He launched the Patrick Surtain II Foundation in 2023, which aims to level the playing field for underprivileged youth by ensuring the same access to opportunities as their suburban peers. He was awarded the NFLPA Week 14 Community MVP award after providing two high schools with grants to build Inspiration STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics) rooms. He continues to support youth by collaborating with teammates to host events, including youth football camps.

#### community ambassador: Lloyd Cushenberry III

Center Lloyd Cushenberry III participated in more than 10 community events, attending nearly every Thanksgiving and holiday event hosted by the team this season. Cushenberry also spearheaded a community initiative in which he gave 300 winter coats to students at Eiber Elementary School in Lakewood, Colorado.









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#### community ambassador: Elijah Garcia

Defensive lineman Elijah Garcia participated in more than 50 percent of team community events in the regular season, making him one of the top three participants on the team. He hosted a two-day youth football camp ahead of the offseason program for youth ages 8-13.

#### community ambassador: Will Sherman

Offensive lineman Will Sherman increased his regular-season community involvement by over 65 percent from 2022 and participated in over half of the team's community events in the regular season. Will represented Black Nurses, Inc. and Adopt-A-Classroom to support causes close to his heart for the NFL's My Cause My Cleats initiative.

#### community ambassador: Justin Simmons

Safety Justin Simmons, a three-time nominee for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award and four-time Community Ambassador recipient, was active in the community nearly every week of the regular season. He participated in over 40 community service opportunities, many of which focused on local youth. He provided grants to 10 girls high school flag football teams to support program growth and led six sessions of the team's youth leadership program with the Denver Broncos Boys & Girls Club.

#### community ambassador: Russell Wilson

Quarterback Russell Wilson was involved in more than 20 community service events and made regular visits to local hospitals to provide support to individuals and families facing difficult times. Additionally, he partnered with CommonSpirit Health to distribute \$1 million in grants to 10 local organizations that share a passion for health equity, education, food security and social justice.





Former Denver Broncos linebacker Randy Gradishar, who was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame Class of 2024, was selected as the team's nominee for the 2023 Salute to Service Award, presented by USAA. The annual award acknowledges the exceptional efforts by members of the NFL community to honor and support U.S. service members, veterans and their families.

Gradishar serves as the Outreach Coordinator at Mt. Carmel Veterans Services Center where he empowers and assists veterans in adjusting back to civilian life. In addition to his work with Mt. Carmel Veterans Services Center, Gradishar has participated in three USO tours visiting troops in Iraq, Kuwait, Afghanistan, Kyrgyzstan, Qatar, UAE, Bahrain and Saudi Arabia and took part in the 2022 Salute to Service Caravan presented by USAA to visit with and honor local service men and women.

Prior to his successful playing career, Gradishar joined the ROTC as an undergraduate at Ohio State University. A son of a WWII veteran, Gradishar has a passion to honor and connect service members, veterans and their families, year after year.



The Denver Broncos, through the support of Owner Carrie Walton Penner and Head Coach Sean Payton, sponsored the training of two service dogs in partnership with K9s For Warriors, an organization committed to ending veteran suicide by pairing highly trained service dogs with military veterans suffering from PTSD, traumatic brain injury and other invisible wounds of war.

Dedicated to saving not just one life, but two, K9s For Warriors rescues a majority of its dogs for its service dog program, allowing both the K9 and veteran to build an unwavering bond that facilitates their collective healing

and recovery. On average, the organization pairs up to 16 veterans with service dogs each month. To date, K9s For Warriors has rescued more than 2,000 dogs and paired nearly 1,000 veterans with lifesaving service dogs.

The two black Labrador brothers, named Bucky and Thunder, traveled to Denver as part of their service dog training. Bucky and Thunder are the Broncos' first-ever "team dogs" and made their debut during the team's Salute to Service game on Nov. 19 against the Minnesota Vikings. Once the dogs have completed their training, they will each be paired with a veteran in need.



### staff service series

The organization's Staff Community Service Series features monthly volunteer opportunities for Broncos staff and families. From planting community gardens to assembling no-sew blankets and holiday care packages, employees can give back to various causes and organizations over the year with fellow team members. In 2023, 89 employees participated in 15 events totaling 525 volunteer hours.

Since the program's launch in 2017, the Broncos have averaged 91 employee participants annually. Including employees and their family members, the program has impacted 48 different nonprofit organizations through more than 5,175 hours of service.








