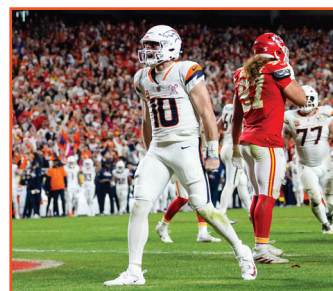

MATCHUP PREVIEW

The **Denver Broncos** (0-0) start their 2026 campaign on the road in primetime on *Monday Night Football* as they travel to face their division rival **Kansas City Chiefs** (0-0) at Arrowhead Stadium at 7:15 p.m. CDT. Denver will start its regular season on primetime for the 19th time overall and first time since 2022.



The Broncos' 41 wins and .638 winning percentage in Week 1 contests lead the NFL since the club's inaugural season in 1960.

Heading into the Week 1 of the 2026 NFL season, Denver owns immense success in the league's opening weekend. In 56 Week 1 games played since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970, the Denver Broncos have tallied a 36-19-1 (.655) record.

Among current NFL clubs, Denver's .655 winning percentage and 36 wins are the highest marks in the league.

Additionally, the Broncos have notched an 11-7 record in prime-time matchups in Week 1, most recently losing in 2022 to Seattle. Denver's 18 primetime matchups in Week 1 are the third most amongst NFL teams while its 11 wins rank second.

Cornerback Pat Surtain II was named the top defensive player in the NFL in 2024 when he was named the Associated Press Defensive Player of the Year. He became just the seventh cornerback in league history—and first since 2019—to be named the top defensive player of the season.

Additionally, he became just the second player in team history to earn the honor, joining Pro Football Hall of Fame linebacker Randy Gradishar, who was named Defensive Player of the Year in 1978.

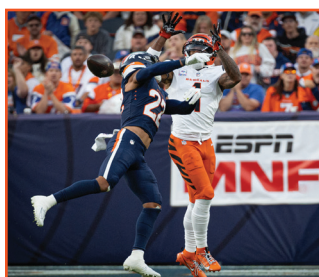

MIMS BACK IN ORLANDO

Selected by the Broncos in the second round (63rd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft, wide receiver Marvin Mims Jr. posted impressive numbers as a returner in his second season in the NFL in 2024. He totaled 26 punt returns for 408 yards (15.7 avg.) and seven kickoff returns for 194 yards (27.7 avg.).

Mims' efforts in 2024 earned him his second consecutive Pro Bowl selection. He became the third Bronco to receive a Pro Bowl nod as a return specialist and the second player in team history to be named to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons.

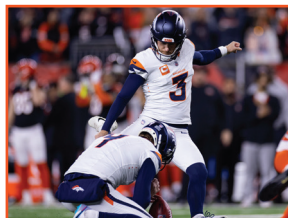
