MATCHUP PREVIEW

The **Denver Broncos (5-2)** look to build on their league-high-tying four-game winning streak as they host the **Dallas Cowboys (3-3-1)** at Empower Field at Mile High (2:25 p.m. MDT, CBS) on Sunday. It is the first time since 2017 that Dallas has visited the Mile High City.



The Broncos have won their last seven meetings against the Cowboys, most recently defeating Dallas 30-16 at AT&T Stadium in 2021. Denver leads the all-time series 9-4.

The Broncos own the longest active home winning streak in the NFL with eight straight wins at Empower Field at Mile High dating back to Week 8 of last season. This marks the club's longest home winning streak since 2014-15, when it logged 11 straight wins in Denver.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR VS. COWBOYS

TEAM (9-4-0 all-time record versus Cowboys; 5-2 at home)

* - Needs a win to improve to 10-4 overall and 6-2 at home in the all-time series versus the Cowboys.

TEAM (7 straight wins vs. Dallas)

* - Needs a win on Sunday to extend its winning streak to eight games, Denver's longest active win streak against any opponent across the NFL.

TEAM (8 straight home wins)

* - Needs a win on Sunday to increase its league-high home winning streak to nine games.

TEAM (5-2 record in first seven games)

* - Needs a win on Sunday to start the season with a 6-2 record for the first time since 2016.

OLB NIK BONITTO (8.0 sacks in first seven games)

* - Needs 2.5 sacks to tie defensive end Elvis Dumervil for the second-most sacks by a Bronco through eight games of a season.

OLB JONATHON COOPER (1.5 sacks in last two games)

* - Needs 1.5 sacks to become the first seventh-round draft pick since 1996 to record multiple sacks in three straight games.

T GARETT BOLLES (123 career starts with Broncos)

* - Needs to start on Sunday to tie tackle Dave Studdard for the third-most regular-season starts by a tackle in team history.

QB BO NIX (1 passing TD in 15 consecutive games)

* - Needs one passing score to become the third player with an active passing touchdown streak of at least 16 games.

QB BO NIX (48 total touchdowns in 24 games)

* - Needs three total touchdowns to tie QB Kyler Murray for the fifth-most touchdowns by a player in his first 25 career games.

WR COURTLAND SUTTON (412 career receptions)

* - Needs three receptions for tie wide receiver Vance Johnson for the sixth-most catches in team history.

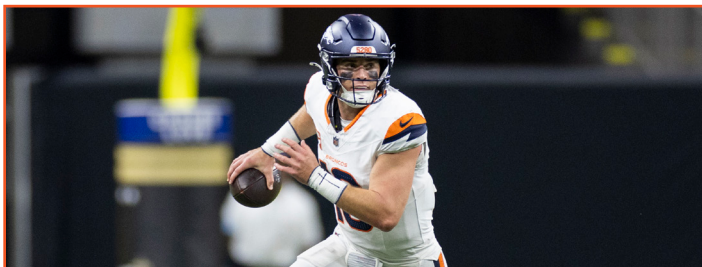

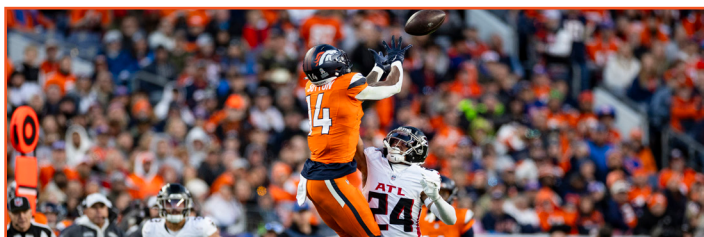

GROUNDING THE JETS

Since his rookie campaign in 2023, wide receiver Marvin Mims Jr. has been one of the best kick returners in the NFL, averaging 15.0 yards per punt return and 26.9 yards per kickoff return. His 15.0 yards per punt return is the highest in team history among players with at least 10 returns while his 26.9 kickoff return average is the second highest among Broncos with at least 15 returns.

MIMS A PUNT RETURN WEAPON



Wide receiver Marvin Mims Jr. has been one of the best returners in the NFL since entering the league in 2023. In 2024, he returned a total of 26 punts for a league high 408 yards (15.7 avg.).

Mims' 15.7 punt return average led the NFL last year, making it the first time in franchise history a player led the league in that category since 1982 (Rick Upchurch, 16.1).

Additionally, he has totaled 900 punt return yards in his first three seasons, which is the fourth most by a Bronco in his first three years in team history.

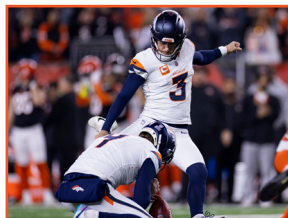
