THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

As the Cardinals continue their push for a postseason berth they host the Philadelphia Eagles at State Farm Stadium in Week 15. It will be the final non-division game of 2020 for Arizona, who wraps up its regular season schedule with matchups against the 49ers (Week 16) and Rams (Week 17).

The Cardinals enter Sunday's game with a 3-0 record against the NFC East in 2020 following their 26-7 victory over the Giants at MetLife Stadium last week. Arizona has outscored the NFC East 94-32 this season. With a win on Sunday the Cardinals would earn their second season sweep of the NFC East (2014) since leaving that division in 2002.

Sunday's game marks the continuation of an old rivalry. The Cardinals and Eagles are meeting for the 118th time in the regular season with Arizona holding a 57-55-5 lead in the all-time series which dates back to 1935. The Cardinals 57 regular season wins vs. Philadelphia are more than they have against any other NFL franchise.

The two teams have also been frequent opponents over the last decade. Sunday's matchup marks the seventh regular season meeting between the two teams in the last 10 years. The Cardinals have won four of the last six vs. Philadelphia and enter Sunday's contest having won three consecutive home games against the Eagles.

Both the Cardinals and Eagles earned much-needed wins last week. Arizona's 19-point win over the Giants snapped a three-game losing streak. The Eagles are coming off their biggest win of the season, a 24-21 victory over a Saints team that was riding a nine-game winning streak. The Eagles win snapped a four-game skid.

This week's showdown between the Cardinals and Eagles features the intriguing matchup of Arizona QB **Kyler Murray** and Philadelphia QB **Jalen Hurts**. A pair of former high-profile prep stars from the state of Texas, both Murray (2018) and Hurts (2019) had breakout campaigns at the University of Oklahoma before entering the NFL draft in back-to-back seasons. Murray won the Heisman Trophy with the Sooners in 2018 the year before Hurts finished as the runner-up in 2019.

Including playoffs, Sunday's game will mark WR **Larry Fitzgerald's** 10th career meeting with the Eagles. In the previous nine he recorded 56 receptions for 896 yards and 11 TDs. In NFL history only Bobby Mitchell (14 TDs in 22 games) and Charley Taylor (14 TDs in 20 games) had more receiving TDs vs. Philadelphia. Fellow WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has also had success against the Eagles, posting 100+ receiving yards in each of his two career games vs. Philly.

Following this week's game the Cardinals host the 49ers in Arizona's regular season finale at State Farm Stadium (though the 49ers have played twice at State Farm Stadium since the Cardinals last have).

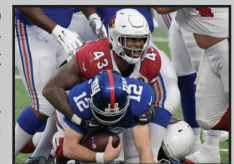

REDDICK SETS TEAM RECORD WITH 5.0 SACKS IN WEEK 14

LB **Haason Reddick** - a native of Camden, NJ who starred at Temple University in Philadelphia - established a franchise record with 5.0 sacks against the Giants in Week 14.

#PHIVsAZ - WEEK 15 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Cardinals and Eagles square off for the 118th time in the regular season when Philadelphia visits State Farm Stadium in Week 15.
- With last Sunday's win over New York the Cardinals improved to 3-0 against the NFC East in 2020 with Philadelphia coming up in Week 15. Arizona has outscored NFC East opponents 94-32 so far this season.
- Including postseason, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** has faced Philadelphia nine times. In those contests he totaled 56 receptions for 896 yards and 11 TDs. Combined with WR **DeAndre Hopkins** (15 catches for 219 yards and 1 TD in 2 games), the duo have 71 receptions for 1,115 yards and 12 TDs in 11 total games vs. the Eagles.
- In their two seasons as starters at Oklahoma, QBs **Kyler Murray** (54 in 2018) and **Jalen Hurts** (52 in 2019) combined for 106 total TDs (passing & rushing). Murray had 42 passing TDs and 12 rushing TDs in '18 while Hurts posted 32 passing TDs and 20 rushing TDs in '19.
- In last week's win over the Giants, Arizona became the first team to record at least 8.0 sacks and five forced fumbles in a game since Tampa Bay had 8.0 sacks and eight forced fumbles in a win vs. Green Bay on 12/7/98.

EAGLES CONNECTIONS

Cardinals LB **Jordan Hicks** was the Eagles third-round pick (84th overall) in the 2015 NFL Draft and played four seasons (2015-18) in Philadelphia before signing with the Cardinals.

Cardinals LBs coach **Bill Davis** served as the Eagles defensive coordinator from 2013-15.

Cardinals RBs coach **James Saxon** played FB for Philadelphia in 1995.

Cardinals Asst. Director of Player Personnel **Dru Grigson** was a volunteer scout for the Eagles from 2005-06.

Cardinals Senior VP of Media Relations **Mark Dalton** is a West Chester, PA native and Temple University graduate. He was a member of the Eagles public relations staff from 1991-94.

Cardinals Senior VP of Business Development **Steve Ryan** was the Director of Corporate Sales for the Eagles for six seasons (1998-2003) before he came to Arizona in 2004.

Cardinals Senior Director of Player Development **Anthony Edwards** began his NFL career as a WR and special teamer for the Eagles (1989-90).

Mark Whipple, father of Cardinals Asst. WRs coach **Spencer Whipple**, served as an offensive assistant for the Eagles in 2008.

CARDINALS CONNECTIONS

Eagles S **Rudy Ford** was the Cardinals sixth-round pick (208th overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft and was traded to the Eagles during the 2019 preseason.

Eagles T **Brett Toth** spent the 2019 season with the Cardinals after being claimed off waivers from the Eagles in Week 1.

PENNSYLVANIA CONNECTIONS

Cardinals WR **Larry Fitzgerald** attended Valley Forge (PA) Military Academy after his senior year of high school. He then played at Pittsburgh and is one of the most decorated receivers in Big East Conference history.

Cardinals LB **Haason Reddick** is a native of Camden, NJ, located across the Delaware River from Philadelphia. Reddick also played at Temple University from 2013-16 (more info on page 7).

Cardinals OL **Justin Pugh** is a native of Holland, PA and attended Council Rock South (Holland) High School where he earned the Maxwell Award as a senior, presented to the Top 50 high school scholar-athletes in the tri-state area (Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware).

Cardinals General Manager **Steve Keim** (Harrisburg), RB **Chase Edmonds** (Harrisburg), Director of Player Personnel **Quentin Harris** (Wilkes-Barre), Strength and Conditioning coach **Buddy Morris** (South Park) and Eastern Regional Scout **Luke Palko** (Imperial) are Pennsylvania natives.

Eagles Special Teams Coordinator **Dave Fipp** went to Arizona and played for the Wildcats from 1994-97, starting at safety during his final two seasons. He later served as a graduate assistant at Arizona in 2000.

Eagles Senior Offensive Consultant **Marty Mornhinweg** served as the RBs coach for Northern Arizona in 1988 and returned as Offensive Coordinator in 1994.

Eagles Senior Offensive Assistant **Rich Scangarello** was offensive coordinator/QBs coach at Northern Arizona from 2012-14.

PRO/COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

Cardinals O-line coach **Sean Kugler** was the asst. O-line coach (2007) and O-line coach (2008-09) for the Bills while Eagles T **Jason Peters** (2004-08) played in Buffalo.

Eagles Pass Game Analyst **Andrew Breiner** served as offensive coordinator/QBs coach (2012-15) before becoming head coach (2016-17) of Fordham while Cardinals RB **Chase Edmonds** (2014-17) played for the Rams.

Eagles Head Coach **Doug Pederson** (QB) and Cardinals RBs coach **James Saxon** (FB) played together for the Dolphins from 1992-94.

Cardinals LB **Haason Reddick** played with Eagles LB **Shaun Bradley** at Temple in 2016. Each wore single-digit jersey numbers during their college careers, which are awarded to the toughest Temple players as voted by teammates.

Cardinals LB **Isaiah Simmons** and Eagles S **K'Von Wallace** played together at Clemson from 2016-19 and won the College Football Playoff National Championship in 2016 and 2019.

Cardinals LB **Devon Kennard** (2018-19) played with Eagles CB **Darius Slay** (2013-19) and WR **Travis Fulgham** (2019) in Detroit.

Cardinals LB **De'Vondre Campbell** (2016-19) and Eagles LB **Duke Riley** (2017-19) played together in Atlanta.

Cardinals LB **Devon Kennard** (2009-13) and Eagles CB **Nickell Robey-Coleman** (2010-12) were teammates at USC.

Cardinals DL **Rashard Lawrence** and Eagles LB **Duke Riley** played together at LSU in 2016.

Eagles TE **Richard Rodgers** (2014-17) played with Cardinals S **Chris Banjo** (2013-16) and QB **Brett Hundley** (2016-17) in Green Bay.

Eagles DT **Malik Jackson** and Cardinals OL **Kelvin Beachum** played together for the Jaguars in 2016.

Cardinals OL **Josh Jones** and Eagles WR **Greg Ward** played together at the University of Houston in 2016.

CARDS VS. EAGLES - SERIES BREAKDOWN

This week's game between the Cardinals and Eagles marks the 118th all-time regular season meeting between the two teams. The Cards lead the series 57-55-5.

AWARD-WINNING PERFORMANCES VS. PHILADELPHIA

Fitzgerald has been named NFC Offensive Player of the Week four times in his career. He earned three of those in games against the Eagles: 2014 (Week 8), 2012 (Week 3) and 2011 (Week 10).

MURRAY & HURTS - PARALLEL PATHS CROSS

Eagles rookie QB **Jalen Hurts** and Cardinals 2nd-year signal-caller **Kyler Murray** - a pair of former Oklahoma Sooners QBs - share similar paths to the NFL.

Both played high school football in Texas, where Murray led Allen High School (near Dallas) to a perfect 43-0 record and earned National Player of the Year honors from Gatorade, Parade and USA Today while Hurts was ESPN's top-ranked dual-threat QB in the state at Channelview High School (near Houston).

After beginning their college careers elsewhere, both had breakout campaigns at Oklahoma before entering the NFL draft in back-to-back seasons. In 2018, Murray won the Heisman Trophy, Davey O'Brien Quarterback of the Year Award, Manning Award and Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award before being selected #1 overall by the Cardinals. In 2019, Hurts finished as the runner-up for the Heisman Trophy and earned All-America and first-team All-Big 12 honors with 5,149 yards of total offense and 53 total TDs. He was taken in the second round (53rd overall) by Philadelphia in the 2020 NFL Draft.

Since 2000, only two NCAA FBS QBs have totaled 3,500+ passing yards, 1,000+ rushing yards and 50+ offensive TDs in a single season: Murray (2018) and Hurts (2019).

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN WEEK 15

WITH A WIN THIS WEEK...

- Arizona would have eight wins in 2020, matching their combined win total from the previous two years (2018-19) combined (8).
- The Cardinals would earn their second (2014) season sweep of the NFC East since division realignment in 2002.

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

WR Larry Fitzgerald

- With a reception Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 255 consecutive games, extending the second-longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274).
- With 5 receptions Fitzgerald would reach 50 catches for the 17th consecutive season, the longest streak in NFL history. Tony Gonzalez (16; 1998-2013) and Fitzgerald are currently tied for the longest streak in league history.

QB Kyle Murray

- With a rushing TD Murray would have 11 rushing TDs in 2020. Among all QBs, only Cam Newton (14 in 2011) and Steve Grogan (12 in 1976) would have more rushing TDs in a single season.
- With both a rushing and passing TD Murray would establish an NFL single-season record for games with a passing and rushing TD (9).
- With two TD passes Murray (25 TD passes; 10 TD runs) would join Cam Newton (35 TD pass; 10 TD run in 2015) as the only players in NFL history with 25+ passing TDs and 10+ rushing TDs in a season.

WR DeAndre Hopkins

- With six receptions Hopkins would reach 100 catches in a season for the fourth time in his career, and for the third time in the last four seasons.
- With 100+ receiving yards, Hopkins would have 100+ yards in all three career games played against the Eagles.

RB Kenyan Drake

- With a rushing TD Drake would have at least one rushing TD in five consecutive games, tying the longest streak in franchise history.
- With a rushing TD Drake would have 10 rushing TDs in '20. He would join Kyle Murray (10) as just the second RB/QB combo in NFL history to each have 10+ rushing TDs in a season: Vikings QB Daunte Culpepper (10) and RB Moe Williams (11).

LB Haason Reddick

- With a sack Reddick would become just the 11th different player in franchise history to record at least 11.0 sacks in a season.

A TOP-5 OFFENSE IN 2020

After piling up 390 total yards of offense (231 passing; 159 rushing) against the Giants last week, the Cardinals rank #4 in the NFL averaging 389.5 yards per game in 2020. Arizona's 43 offensive TDs are tied for fifth in the NFL.

ANOTHER WIN AT METLIFE STADIUM

After defeating the Giants last Sunday the Cardinals improved to 4-1 at MetLife Stadium since the venue opened in 2010, including a 3-0 record against the Giants. It also gave the Cardinals road wins against both the Giants (Week 14) and Jets (Week 5) in the same season for just the second time ever (1975). The Cardinals ran their road winning streak against the Giants to four games, which is Arizona's longest road winning streak in its 94-year old rivalry with the Giants.

FRANCHISE RECORD POINTS STREAK

The Cardinals have scored 21+ points in 22 of 29 games under head coach Kliff Kingsbury. Arizona scored 21+ points in an NFL-low 9 games in the two seasons prior to his arrival (2017-18).

RUSHING AVERAGE NEAR A RECORD PACE

After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018 the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season.

Through 13 games the Cardinals are averaging 4.86 yards per rush attempt, giving them a chance at averaging 5.0 yards per carry for the second straight year.

A RARE NINE IN A ROW WITH 100+ RUSHING YARDS

Arizona has rushed for 100+ yards in 11 of 13 games this season and started the year with 100+ rushing yards in each of the first nine games. The 2020 season marked just the second time (1984) in the last 60 years (1961-20) that the Cardinals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first nine games of a season.

RUNNING FOR 150 & 200 UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have rushed for 150+ yards in 12 of 29 games under Kingsbury. Arizona had seven such games in the three seasons (2016-18) prior to his arrival. The Cardinals are 10-2 when rushing for 150+ yards over the last two seasons.

Arizona has rushed for 200+ yards in a game five times under Kingsbury, including twice this season. The Cardinals had 200+ rushing yards in a game just five times in the previous 15 seasons combined (2004-18) prior to Kingsbury's arrival.

LONG DISTANCE RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS

RB Kenyan Drake had a 69-yard rushing TD in Week 6 at Dallas giving Arizona four rushing TDs of 20+ yards in 2020 (QB Kyler Murray - 2; RB Chase Edmonds - 1). That is the most in the NFL this season.

DRAKE LEADS CARDS RUSHING ATTACK

The Cardinals rushing attack in 2020 is led by RB **Kenyan Drake** who has a team-high 848 yards and a career-high nine TDs on 201 carries (4.2 avg.) in 2020.

Despite missing Arizona's Week 9 contest vs. Miami due to injury, the fifth-year pro is on pace for his first career 1,000-yard season.

Drake has been one of the NFL's top backs since Arizona acquired him in a trade with the Dolphins in Week 9 last season. In that span he ranks sixth in the NFL in rushing yards (1,491) and third in rushing TDs (17).

AN ARIZONA SUCCESS STORY

Drake scored his ninth rushing TD of the season last week against the Giants, crossing the goal line on a one-yard carry in the third quarter. He now has 17 rushing TDs in 20 games played with the Cardinals.

Drake has more rushing TDs in 20 games with Arizona (17) than he had total TDs in 54 games played with Miami (15 – 9 rushing; 6 receiving).

Dating back to the final three weeks of the 2019 season, Drake has 16 rushing TDs in his last 15 games played.

Drake scored two rushing TDs in Week 12 against New England, marking his fourth career outing with multiple rushing TDs, all of which have come as a member of the Cardinals.

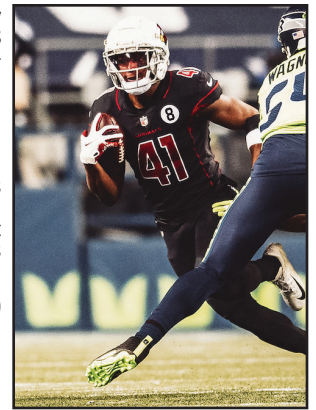

HITTING 100 YARDS WITH ARIZONA

In Week 10 vs. Buffalo, Drake posted 100 rushing yards on 16 carries (6.3 avg.). It was his seventh career 100-yard rushing performance and his fifth with Arizona.

After posting 100+ rushing yards in a game just twice in 54 contests with the Dolphins, Drake has five 100-yard outings in 20 games with the Cardinals.



ARNOLD A MAJOR WEAPON AT TIGHT END

TE **Dan Arnold** caught two passes for 27 yards against the Giants last week, including a seven-yard TD reception on a third-down pass from Kyler Murray in the second quarter.

Over the last two games Arnold has four receptions for 87 yards, with three of those catches resulting in TDs. He had his first career multi-TD performance in Week 13 vs. the Rams.

After going without a TD catch in the first nine games this season, Arnold now has four TD receptions in his last four games.

With three games remaining, Arnold has 22 receptions for 313 yards and four TDs in 2020. He is the first Cardinals TE to have 300+ receiving yards and 4+ TDs in a season since both Rob Awalt (454 & 4) and Jay Novacek (569 & 4) both did so in 1988.

Claimed off waivers by the Cardinals in December of last season, Arnold has played in 16 games with Arizona and has 28 receptions for 415 yards (14.8 avg.) and six TDs.

A LONG DISTANCE TD VS. THE RAMS

Arnold hauled in two TD catches against the Rams in Week 13, including a 59-yard TD reception in the first quarter. It was the longest TD catch by a Cardinals TE since Hall of Famer Jackie Smith had a 68-yarder from Gary Cuozzo on 11/12/72 at Dallas. In two games vs. the Rams since coming to Arizona last season, Arnold has six receptions for 137 yards (22.8 avg.) and three TDs.



AMONG THE BEST IN OVERTIME

In defeating the Seahawks in OT on Sunday Night Football in Week 7, the Cardinals earned their 27th all-time OT victory. In NFL history, only Denver (28) has more OT wins than Arizona (27).

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has been as good as advertised in his first season with the Cardinals, who acquired the three-time 1st-team All-Pro in the offseason in a trade with Houston.

Through 13 games, Hopkins has 94 receptions for 1,155 yards and five TDs.

He is currently on pace for 116 receptions and 1,422 receiving yards in 2020. The reception total would establish a new franchise single-season record while the receiving yardage total would rank fifth in team history.

Hopkins' 43-yard game-winner against the Bills was the first go-ahead Hail Mary in the 4th quarter since 12/3/15 when Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers threw a game-winning 61-yard TD to TE Richard Rodgers as time expired to give the Packers a 27-23 victory over Detroit.

It also marked the first time the Cardinals won a game on a TD pass on the final scrimmage play of regulation since Josh McCown's 28-yard TD pass to WR Nate Poole as time expired on 12/29/03 vs. Minnesota. That TD gave the Cards an 18-17 win and knocked the Vikings out of postseason contention on the final day of the regular season.

AWARDS COME POURING IN

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" following his 43-yard Hail Mary TD grab in the Cardinals 32-30 win vs. Buffalo in Week 10.

It was just the second "Player of the Week" award for Hopkins, who also earned the honor in 2015 (Week 6) with Houston.

In the win over the Bills, Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards, including a 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation.

It was the Cardinals 4th "Player of the Week" selection of 2020 and third "Offensive Player of the Week" award. The three "Offensive Player of the Week" awards are the most the Cardinals have had in a season since 1996 (four).



MURRAY AND BAKER CLEAN UP IN OCTOBER

The Cardinals piled up the awards in the month of October. S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October, and QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" in Weeks 5 and 7.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award - all of which came in October.

It is just the fourth time (2015) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.



DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER

Baker was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He played all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5 & 7)

Murray was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5 and the Seahawks in Week 7.

Murray became the first Cards QB to be named "Player of the Week" twice in the same season since Warner in 2009.



WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE: Murray completed a career-high 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a game.

WEEK 5 AT NY JETS: Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

Baker earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defended and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

Reddick and Rams DT Aaron Donald (4.0) are the only players in the NFL this season with at least 4.0 sacks in a game.

Reddick became the first NFL player with at least 5.0 sacks and three forced fumbles in a game since Vonnie Holliday had 5.0 sacks and three forced fumbles vs. Buffalo on 12/22/02 while playing for Green Bay.

Reddick is just the fourth NFL player in the last 11 seasons (2010-20) to record at least 5.0 sacks in a game. He is the first to do so since Atlanta's Adrian Clayborn (6.0) on 11/12/17 vs. Dallas.

Entering last Sunday's win over the Giants, Reddick had played 107 games at the NFL and college levels (60 w/ Cardinals; 47 w/ Temple) and had never recorded more than 2.0 sacks in a game. His previous career high in the NFL was 2.0 at Dallas in Week 6 earlier this season.

Reddick's three forced fumbles against the Giants equaled the total he had in his first 60 career games entering last Sunday's contest.

Through 13 games, Reddick has recorded 50 tackles, 10.0 sacks, 13 tackles for loss, 15 QB hits, four passes defended and three forced fumbles. His sack, forced fumble, QB hit and tackle for loss totals are all team highs and also represent career highs for Reddick. He has as many QB hits in 2020 (15) as he had in his first three NFL seasons combined (15).

After not recording more than 4.0 sacks in his first three NFL seasons, Reddick ranks #6 in the NFL with 10.0 sacks in 2020.

REDDICK'S DEEP ROOTS IN CAMDEN AND PHILADELPHIA



For the second time in his four-year NFL career Reddick is set to play the Philadelphia Eagles, a team the Camden, NJ native grew up watching from across the Delaware River.

Following a record-breaking senior season at Temple, Reddick was selected by the Cardinals 13th overall in the 2017 NFL Draft, which took place in Philadelphia. Just a few days before hearing his name called in the first round, Reddick received Camden's key to the city during a ceremony aboard the Battleship New Jersey.

He first played the Eagles as a rookie in 2017 when the Cardinals traveled to Lincoln Financial Field where played his last home game as a Temple Owl just 316 days earlier. His second meeting with Philly comes one week after breaking the Cardinals franchise single-game record with 5.0 sacks against the Giants at MetLife Stadium, just 95 miles from Camden.

After moving around Arizona's depth chart during his first three NFL seasons, Reddick has settled in at outside linebacker with a team-high 10.0 sacks in 2020. A self-made NFL prospect, his NFL career arc resembles his path to the pros. Injuries ended both Reddick's junior and senior seasons at Haddon Heights (NJ) High School, and he went to Temple as a walk-on cornerback. During his redshirt freshman season in 2012, Reddick was told by the coaching staff he would not have a spot on the team the following year, but a coaching change saved his college career as he was offered a chance to return as a defensive lineman.

Reddick did not receive a scholarship until after his junior season. To help out, his mother, Raelakia, took out a loan for a meal plan so he wouldn't miss out on bonding with scholarship players on the team after practice.

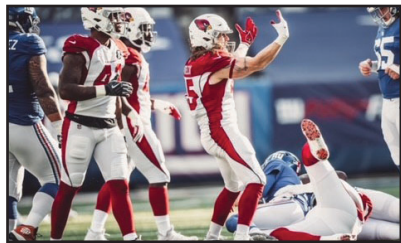
He went on to excel in his final season, starting all 14 games and totaling 65 tackles, 22.5 tackles for loss, 10.5 sacks, an INT, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. His 22.5 tackles for loss led all players in the FBS and also set an AAC single-season record.

PRESSURE COMING FROM EVERYWHERE

Despite missing the NFL's leading sack artist in LB **Chandler Jones**, the Cardinals defense continues to find a way to get to the QB in 2020. **Following an eight-sack performance against the Giants on Sunday, Arizona now has 37.0 sacks this season. That total ranks sixth in the NFL.**

GOLDEN SETS THE TONE IN WIN OVER FORMER TEAM

Just 52 days after he was traded from New York to Arizona, LB **Markus Golden** was back at MetLife Stadium to face his former team last week. It didn't take him long to make a major impact in the game. On the fifth play of the game Golden sacked QB Daniel Jones at the Giants 44-yard line, causing a fumble on the play. Golden scooped up the ball and returned it 30 yards.

It marked the second time in three games Golden made a big play on the opponent's opening drive. Against New England in Week 12, he posted his first career INT on a Cam Newton pass on the Patriots opening drive.

BAKER & HICKS HIT THE CENTURY MARK

Following their performances against the Giants last week, LB **Jordan Hicks** (8 tackles) and S **Budda Baker** (6 tackles) both reached 100 tackles in 2020. **They are the only pair of teammates in the NFL to have each reached 100 tackles in 2020. Hicks has 101 tackles on the year while Baker has 100.**

Both Hicks (who ranked 3rd in the NFL with 150 tackles in 2019) and Baker (who ranked 4th in the NFL with 147 tackles in 2019) have reached 100+ tackles for the second consecutive season. Baker reached 100 tackles for the third time in his career (2018-20) while Hicks reached the century mark for the second time (2019).

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, S **Budda Baker** is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a game-high 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defended in the win over Seattle. **It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90 yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defended, 2 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6).** The performance earn him NFC "Defensive Player of the Month" honors for October.

DEFENSE DOMINANT IN WIN OVER GIANTS

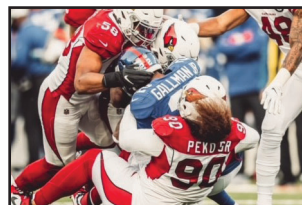
In the victory over the Giants last week, **Arizona's defense posted season lows in points allowed (7), total net yards allowed (159), first downs allowed (10), yards per play allowed (3.2) and time of possession (22:08).** The Cardinals defense also registered season highs in sacks (8.0) and forced fumbles (4). With the addition of a forced fumble on special teams, Arizona recorded a season high five total forced fumbles.

Arizona became the first team to record at least 8.0 sacks and five forced fumbles in a game since Tampa Bay had 8.0 sacks and eight forced fumbles in a win vs. Green Bay on 12/7/98.

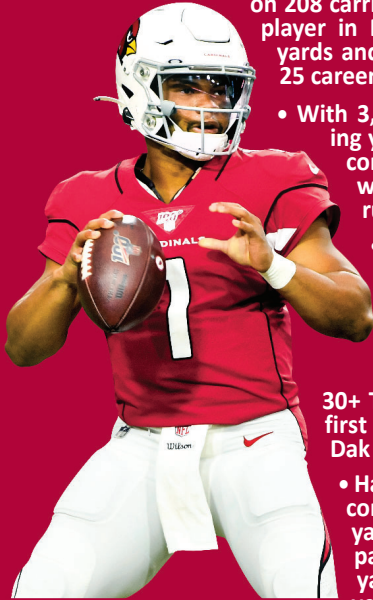

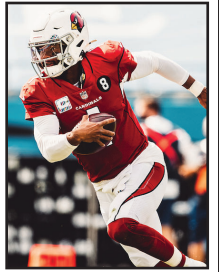

In the victory over Buffalo in Week 10, Murray completed 22-of-32 pass attempts (68.8%) for 245 yards and a TD, while also rushing for 61 yards and two TDs on 11 carries. It was a milestone performance for a number of reasons.

It was his eighth outing this season with both a passing and rushing TD in 2020. That is tied for the most in a single season in NFL history.

LARRY FITZGERALD - AT A GLANCE

- An 11-time Pro Bowl selection, ranks second in NFL history in receptions (1,423) and receiving yards (17,429) and sixth in league annals with 120 TD receptions.

- Named a team captain in 2020, marking the 10th time in his career he has earned the honor.

- Selected by the Cardinals 3rd overall in the 2004 NFL Draft, is in his 17th season in Arizona in 2020. In team history, only QB Jim Hart (18) played more seasons with the team.

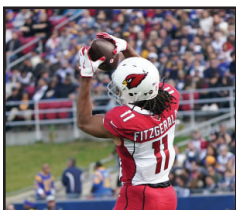

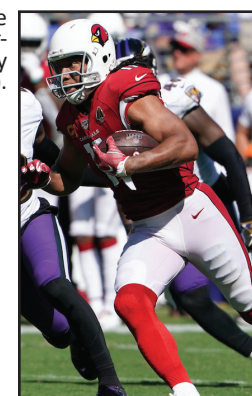

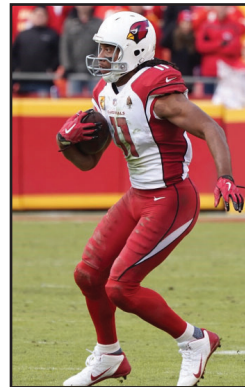

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,423), receiving yards (17,429), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.

Overall, Hopkins has caught 199 passes for 2,580 yards (13.0 avg.) and 16 TDs on third and fourth down in his NFL career (2013-20). Fitzgerald has caught 358 passes for 4,359 yards (12.2 avg.) and 31 TDs on third and fourth down in his career (2004-20).



23 STRAIGHT WITH 5+ CATCHES

With six receptions for 131 yards in Week 5 against the Jets, Hopkins pushed his streak of consecutive games with five-or-more receptions to 23. The streak ended in the Week 6 win over the Cowboys when he had two catches for 73 yards, **but in NFL history, Hopkins and Antonio Brown (36 straight) are the only players with 5+ receptions in at least 23 consecutive games.**

ANOTHER 1,000-YARD CAMPAIGN

With 52 yards on eight receptions in Week 13 against the Rams, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** surpassed 1,000 receiving yards on the season, marking his sixth career 1,000-yard campaign and fourth in a row.

Hopkins has the NFL's second-longest active streak of 1,000-yard seasons, trailing only Chiefs TE Travis Kelce who has reached the milestone in each of the last five seasons (2016-20).

Hopkins is the 14th different player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in a season and the first since WR Larry Fitzgerald had 1,156 yards on a franchise-record 109 receptions in 2017. He became the second player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in his debut season with the team (Anquan Boldin as a rookie in 2003).



ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona, which was played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, and the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB **Carson Palmer** from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

The NFL is partnering with players to tell the stories of the victims or phrase that they have chosen to honor on their helmets. Fans are able to learn more about these stories and how to get involved at nfl.com/inspirechange.

CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of making meaningful change a reality in the United States.

OL Kelvin Beachum - 11/20/20

OL **Kelvin Beachum** participated in an NFL-produced video "Say Their Stories" and discussed Breonna Taylor specifically:

"Saying her name is not just a slogan that we're putting on the back of our helmets. It's more than that. It's a rallying cry for Black women all across America, to realize how special she is and how special she was."

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another, and we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."

OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

GARDECK CONTINUES TO MAXIMIZE HIS TIME

Third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** – a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 – did not play a snap on defense in his first two NFL seasons. This year, he has played 69 snaps on defense and has six tackles, 5.0 sacks, 8 QB hits, 5 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery.

Gardeck's 5.0 sacks have come in three games – at the Jets, vs. the Rams and at the Giants – in which he played a total of 21 defense snaps.

The only game ball given out following the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets went to Gardeck – adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL.

Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck finished the game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps. His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017.

Gardeck played just eight snaps on defense against the Giants in Week 14, but that is all it took for him to post his second multi-sack outing of the season – both of which came at MetLife Stadium. Gardeck recorded two tackles, 2.0 sacks and his first career defensive fumble recovery in the win over New York.

His expanded role of defense is not the first success he has experienced in the NFL. A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 43 career games, he has 25 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and a TD on a blocked punt. In 2018, he led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams.

A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

Following the win over the Jets, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** spoke of how happy he was to see Gardeck's hard work paying off. "I rehabbed and trained with Dennis this offseason before I came here and I saw the work that he put in. I got to see the work he put in behind the scenes and for him to go in do what he did today, I knew he was going to give his all and it resulted in two sacks. That is what you look for in a guy like that. It gives the team motivation."



CARDS HAVE A TACKLING MACHINE IN HICKS

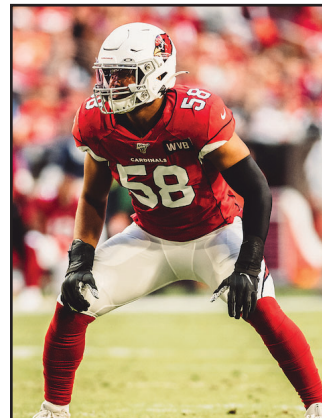
LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in 2019 after four years with the Eagles – put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

Hicks had a career-high 150 tackles (third in the NFL) to go along with 1.5 sacks, 11 tackles for loss, three INTs, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 2019.

Since the start of last season, Hicks ranks fifth in the NFL with 251 total tackles.

2018 UNRAFTED CLASS CONTINUES TO PRODUCE

Three players on the Cardinals roster joined the team as undrafted rookies in 2018: LBs **Dennis Gardeck** and **Ezekiel Turner** and WR **Trent Sherfield**. In Week 14 against the Giants, the trio combined for 2 defensive tackles, 2.0 sacks, a defensive fumble recovery, a special teams fumble recovery and a special teams tackle.

The three have been highly productive for the Cardinals, especially in their roles as special teamers:

- **Turner:** A PFWA All-Rookie selection on special teams in 2018, according to official league statistics Turner ranks second in the NFL in special teams tackles (32) over the last three seasons behind only Pats S Justin Bethel (33).

- **Gardeck:** A special teams Pro Bowl alternate in 2019, Gardeck has recorded 8 tackles, 5.0 sacks, 5 tackles for loss, a fumble recovery and 8 QB hits on defense. On special teams, he has 25 tackles, a fumble recovery, 3 punt deflections and a TD on a blocked punt in his three NFL seasons.

- **Sherfield:** In addition to his 24 receptions for 296 yard and a TD on offense, Sherfield has recorded 17 tackles and three fumble recoveries on special teams during his career. He has a career-high 8 special teams tackles and two fumble recoveries in 2020.



KIRKPATRICK HAS THREE PICKS FOR THE CARDS

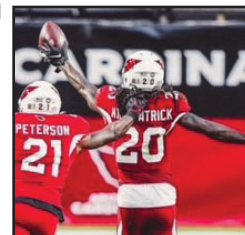
Through 12 games with the Cardinals, CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** has a team-high three INTs, matching a single-season career best that he posted in 2013, '14 and '16. Most recently, he intercepted a Cam Newton pass near midfield with 4:37 remaining in Week 12 against New England.

Prior to 2020, Kirkpatrick had four total INTs in his previous five seasons (2015-19) combined, and his INT of Cam Newton was his third in a five-game stretch.

His first pick as a Cardinal came against his former Bengals teammate, QB Andy Dalton, in the Monday Night Football win over Dallas in Week 6. It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. Among active players, only New England CB Devin McCourty (5 in 12 games) has more INTs while playing on MNF.

CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

\$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

With Memorial Day occurring in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.

DEVON KENNARD – DELIVERED MEALS TO FOUR VALLEY FIRE DEPARTMENTS; VIRTUAL HOSPITAL VISITS

In May, Arizona native – and Cardinals 2020 free agent signing – Kennard gave back to his hometown when he teamed with Salad and Go to provide dinner for firefighters at four different fire stations in the Ahwatukee area.

Every year Cardinals players and staff make numerous visits to Phoenix Children's Hospital to lift the spirits of the children and their families in pediatric units. Due to COVID-19 and the resulting safety restrictions, those visits have taken a new form. In late August, Kennard became the first Cardinals player to take the controls of a telepresence robot in order to spend time with children at PCH. While Kennard was at training camp at State Farm Stadium, he was able to drive the robot through the halls of PCH and interact with children through a video monitor.
