THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals wrap up the 2019 season this week with a trip to Los Angeles to face the Rams in their final game at the L.A. Memorial Coliseum. It marks the fourth consecutive year Arizona plays its season finale on the road and the second time the Cardinals finish the year against the Rams in Los Angeles.

Arizona enters Sunday's finale on a two-game winning streak after defeating a pair of teams who were fighting for either a postseason berth or home field advantage in the playoffs. In Week 15, Arizona defeated a 6-7 Browns team that had won four of its last five and was playing for a spot in the posteason.

Last week in Seattle, the Cardinals knocked off an 11-3 Seahawks team that had won six of their previous seven games and needed a win to enter the regular season finale controlling their own path for home field advantage throughout the playoffs.

On Sunday the Cardinals will play their $15^{\rm th}$ - and final - game at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum when they take on the Rams in the season finale. Both the Rams and Chargers will play their home games at the new SoFi Stadium beginning in 2020.

The Cardinals first played at the Coliseum on 11/17/46 vs. the Rams in what was the team's first year (1946) in Los Angeles after relocating from Cleveland. This week's game marks the $13^{\rm th}$ all-time meeting between the Cardinals and Rams at the Memorial Coliseum. Arizona has also faced the Raiders twice at the venue.

Overall, the Cardinals are 6-8 playing in the Coliseum. Arizona has a 1-1 record against the Raiders and a 5-7 record against the Rams at the venue.

Arizona LB Chandler Jones - who leads the NFL in sacks (19.0), forced fumbles (8) and strip-sacks (7) in 2019 - enters the game looking to continue his record-breaking season and bolster his case for NFL Defensive Player of the Year. Jones needs just one sack to post the 13th all-time 20-sack campaign in NFL history.

WR Larry Fitzgerald - who will be playing his 250th career game on Sunday-will also be playing in his 32nd career game against the Rams. In the previous 31 matchups, he had more receptions (191) than any other player in NFL history has against any single opponent. He also has 2,154 receiving yards and 18 TD receptions against the Rams.

Coming off three consecutive solid outings - including a season-best peformance last week in Seattle - the Cardinals defense will look to slow down a Rams offense that put up 34 points in the meeting between the two teams four weeks ago in Arizona.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- LB **Chandler Jones** recorded his second 4.0-sack outing of 2019 last week in Seattle, becoming just the third player in NFL history and the first since Reggie White (2) in 1986 with multiple games of 4.0 sacks in a single season.
- Jones enters Week 17 leading the NFL in sacks (19.0), forced fumbles (8) and strip-sacks (7). Having already led the NFL in sacks in 2017 (17.0), Jones is looking to become just the eighth player in NFL history to lead the league in sacks multiple times.
- WR Larry Fitzgerald will appear in his 250th career regular season game in the Cardinals season finale at Los Angeles on Sunday. He will become just the 13th player in NFL history to appear in at least 250 games with a single team and his 250 games played with Arizona will be the most by a WR in NFL history with a single team.
- Arizona's defense allowed season-lows in points (13), TDs (1), first downs (13), first downs passing (8), third conversions (1), total net yards (224), net passing yards (133) and completion percentage (51.6%) in the win over Seattle on Sunday.
- RB **Kenyan Drake** rushed for a career-high 166 yards and added a pair of rushing TDs on 24 carries (6.9 avg.) against the Seahawks. He now has more 100-yard performances in seven games with the Cardinals (3) than he had in 54 games with Miami (2). Combined with his four TD peformance in Week 15 vs. Cleveland, Drake has six TDs in his last two games.
- Arizona's 479 rushing yards in the last two games is the most for the team in any two-game stretch in 38 years. The last time the Cards had more rushing yards in a two-game span was in Games 11-12 of the 1981 season (499).
- Entering Week 17, the Cardinals are averaging 5.06 yards per rush attempt in 2019 (1,919 yards on 379 carries), which would be a franchise record. The previous record 4.87 yards per attempt was established in 1960.
- Following the win last week, Arizona has a 4-1 record in its last five visits to CenturyLink Field, where they have twice as many wins (8) as any other team since the venue opened in 2002.

THE LIFE OF MR. B



William V. (Bill) Bidwill passed away on October 2 at the age of 88.

"Our dad passed away the same way he lived his life: peacefully, with grace, dignity and surrounded by family and loved ones," said Cardinals Chairman and President **Michael Bidwill**. "Above all else, we will remember him as a man devoted to the three central pillars of his life – his immense faith, his love for his family and his life-long passion for the Cardinals and the sport of football."

Born on July 31, 1931 in Chicago, he is the son of Charles and Violet Bidwill. His father purchased the Chicago Cardinals of the NFL in 1932, starting Bill's life-long association with the team which

spanned eight decades and started as a ball boy when he was a child. A two-sport athlete playing football and baseball at Georgetown Prep outside of Washington, DC, Bidwill received the school's highest honor, the Insignis Medal, in 1990 and was selected to the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2017.

After earning his undergraduate degree from Georgetown University, Bidwill proudly served in the United States Navy before taking on a full-time role with the team in 1960. That same year he married Nancy, his wife of more than 56 years until her passing in 2016 and had five children: daughter Nicole and sons Bill Jr., Michael, Patrick and Timothy. While well-known for his understated nature and a preference for staying out of the spotlight, "Mr. B" was recognized often for his contributions and accomplishments as Cardinals owner.

In 2017, he was enshrined in the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame which honors those who have made significant contributions to state's athletics community. In 2010, Bidwill was inducted into the Sports Faith Hall of Fame in Lake Forest, IL. At its December 2010 commencement exercises, Northern Arizona University awarded Bidwill an honorary doctor of humane letters degree for "his contributions to the university, his community and his profession."

In addition to his five children, 10 grandchildren and one great-grandchild, Bidwill is survived by his brother Charles (Stormy).

A LEADER IN DIVERSITY



Bidwill was at the forefront of diversity in hiring practices, which was evidenced by the hiring of the NFL's first African American female executive (Adele Harris), first African American contract negotiator (Bob Wallace) and first African American head coach/GM tandem (Dennis Green and Rod Graves). In 2015, the team established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship to increase diversity and provide opportunities to gain NFL coaching experience.

"He didn't care about the color of your skin, race or gender if he felt like you could do the job to the best of your ability to help us become better then you were the right person for it," Larry Fitzgerald said.

At the 2010 annual NFL Combine in Indianapolis, Bidwill was honored with the Paul "Tank" Younger Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance, whose purpose is to promote diversity and equality of job opportunity in the NFL.

ANOTHER SIGNIFICANT WIN IN CINCINNATI



Arizona's Week 5 victory in Cincinnati was the first game following the passing of team owner Bill Bidwill the previous Wednesday (10/2). Bill's father, Charles, purchased the team in 1932 and the first season the Cardinals played under Bidwill ownership was in 1933.

The first victory for the Cards during that 1933 season – which came on October 8th – was a 3-0 win in Cincinnati against the Reds.

On Tuesday (10/8/19) – exactly 86 years after that 1933 victory over the Reds – funeral services were held to honor the life of Bill Bidwill.

"It has been an emotional week," Chairman and President **Michael Bidwill** said after the victory over the Bengals. "The coaches and players all told me they were going to win it for (Bill Bidwill). It is great to get the win."

AN UNHERALDED COMMUNITY CHAMPION



Bidwill's devotion to the Cardinals and the game of football was matched by his passion for giving back to the community and supporting charitable causes, though he never sought recognition for his consistent and generous donations.

"He valued love, and loyalty and life. All of that came together to manifest itself in his giving," former Cardinals Pro Bowl fullback Ron Wolfley said. "The way that he would give millions and millions of dollars and nobody knew what he was giving so much of the time. He didn't sound the trumpet to let people know what he was doing."

Fitzgerald was inspired by Bidwill's work in the community without seeking the spotlight.

"The thing I really cherished about him was his selflessness and commitment to the community," WR Larry Fitzgerald said. "It was something he was passionate about and he wanted zero fanfare, and I always respected that about him."

STATEMENTS REGARDING THE PASSING OF ARIZONA CARDINALS OWNER BILL BIDWILL

CARDINALS WIDE RECEIVER LARRY FITZGERALD: "The NFL family lost a pioneer today. Bill Bidwill loved the Arizona Cardinals and the great State of Arizona. He paved the way for so many by being on the forefront of giving minorities the opportunity to thrive as coaches and executives in the NFL. He was also a man of quiet generosity giving of his time and resources to make lives better."



NFL COMMISSIONER ROGER GOODELL: "Bill Bidwill was part of the NFL family his entire life, starting from his days as a ball boy through his time as an owner. Although never one to seek the spotlight, Bill had an incredible sense of humor and he made extraordinary contributions to the NFL. Bill's vision brought the Cardinals, the NFL and multiple Super Bowls to Arizona. He was a leader in embracing diversity and employed the first African American female executive, and the first African American general manager and head coach tandem."

PATRIOTS CHAIRMAN AND CEO ROBERT KRAFT: "Bill Bidwill was one of the first owners to reach out to me and welcome me into the league when I bought the Patriots in 1994. He was one of the longest-tenured owners in the league and I always appreciated his historical perspective and his love of the game. When it came to the game of football and the NFL, we were mostly like-minded and aligned. The only thing more important to him than his beloved Cardinals was his family and I know how proud he was of his children."

COWBOYS OWNER, PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER JERRY JONES: "I always viewed Bill as a man who, through his father and his literally growing up with the NFL, was an extension of the founding fathers of the NFL. His leadership and influence contributed greatly to bridging the gap between what the earliest years of our professional game looked like and the growth and massive popularity of what it has become. He had a unique perspective of where the game began and where he thought it needed to go. I enjoyed him as a competitor and a colleague, and regardless of the circumstance, he had a unique gift of humor that not everyone knew about."

GIANTS PRESIDENT AND CEO JOHN MARA: "Bill Bidwill was one of the most important owners in the history of the National Football League. He was a kind and decent man who loved his team and the League. He leaves behind a wonderful family. Bill was someone I greatly admired and respected. I was proud to call him a friend."

BEARS CHAIRMAN GEORGE H. McCASKEY: "One of our family's proudest associations in the NFL is with the Bidwill family. It goes back three generations, and at the heart of it is Bill Bidwill. His sacrifices on behalf of our great game are not properly documented, nor properly appreciated. He was a gracious man, a raconteur, and a great friend."

FITZGERALD AGAINST THE RAMS

In 31 career games against the Rams, WR Larry Fitzgerald has 191 receptions for 2,154 yards and 18 TDs. <u>He has more receptions against the Rams (191)</u> than any other player in NFL history has against any single opponent.

Fitzgerald's reception totals against the Rams (191), 49ers (182) and Seahawks (179) are the three highest in NFL history against a single opponent.

ADD A TD PASS TO HIS CAREER TOTALS
When the Cardinals faced the Rams in Week 16 last season, Fitzgerald threw his first career TD pass: a 32-yarder to RB David Johnson.

It was the first TD pass by a WR in franchise history. At 35 years, 114 days old, Fitzgerald became the oldest WR in NFL history to throw a TD. Prior to Fitz, the oldest WR to throw a TD was Philly's Harold Carmichael (34 years, 38 days).

GAME #250 FOR #11

In the final contest of his 16th NFL season, WR Larry Fitzgerald will appear in his 250th career game on Sunday. All 249 games the 11-time Pro Bowl wideout has played have been with the Cardinals - and he is set to become just the 13th player in NFL history to play in 250 games with any single team.

Among the 12 players in NFL history who have appeared in at least 250 games with

a team, only two are active: New England QB Tom Brady (284 games with the Patriots) and Dallas TE Jason Witten (254 games with the Cowboys).

JONES AIMS FOR 20

A STRONG CONTENDER FOR DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE YEAR, LB **CHANDLER JONES** WILL GO FOR 20.0 SACKS IN 2019

With an NFL-high 19.0 sacks in 2019, Jones surpassed his own franchise single-season record for sacks (17.0 in 2017) and joins Aaron Donald (20.5 in 2018) as the only players in the last five seasons (2015-19) to have 19.0+ sacks in a season.

BY THE NUMBERS

Different decades in which Bill Bidwill - who passed away on October 2nd at the age of 88 - was affiliated with the Cardinals. Beginning as a ball boy, he served the franchise in countless fashions - public address announcer, ticket promotions, scouting, advertising, public relations and contract negotiator - in his time with the Cardinals.

Sacks for LB Chandler Jones in 2019, which represents a new franchise singleseason record and also leads the NFL.

Career sacks for Jones. Since entering the league as a first round draft pick in 2012, Jones' 96.0 sacks lead the NFL.

Career forced fumbles for Jones. That total also leads the NFL dating back to Jones' rookie season in 2012. Jones leads the NFL with a career-high eight forced fumbles in 2019.

Fumbles lost for QB Kyler Murray this season, despite the fact that he has 591 total pass/rush attempts in 2019. Murray could become the first rookie QB in NFL history to start all 16 games in a season without losing a fumble.

Wide receivers who were named to the NFL 100 All-Time Team last week. That group includes nine members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame and WR Larry Fitzgerald.

Rushing yards (to go along with 12 rushing TDs) for the Cardinals in their five wins this season. That averages out to 200.6 rushing yards and 2.4 rushing TDs per game.

479

Rushing yards for the Cardinals in their last two games. That is the highest total in any two-game stretch in the last 38 years.

Games this season in which the Cardinals have rushed for 200+ yards. It marks the first time since 1983 (3x) the Cardinals have posted 200+ yards in at least three games in a single season.

Rushing yards for RB Kenyan Drake since the Cardinals acquired him in a trade with Miami in Week 9. Drake has three 100-yard outings in seven games with Arizona after totaling two 100-yard performances in 54 games with Miami.

757Rushing yards for Drake in 2019 (583 with AZ; 174 with Mia). That represents a new single-season high for the fourth-year pro. His previous career high was 644 yards in 2017.



22 TOUCHDOWNS AND COUNTING IN 2019

After thowing his 18th TD pass of the year last week in Seattle, Murray now has 22 combined TDs in 2019 (18 passing, 4 rushing), extending his franchise rookie record for combined passing/rushing TDs.

Combined with his 544 rushing yards, he would become just the sixth different QB in NFL history with 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in a season. Cam Newton (3) and Russell Wilson (2) accomplished the feat twice.

HIGHLY RATED AGAINST THE 49ERS

Murray joins Saints QB Drew Brees as the only QBs to post a passer rating of 100+ against the 49ers this season. Murray did so twice.

In two games vs. the 49ers, Murray completed 41-of-57 pass attempts (71.9%) for 391 yards, 4 TDs and 0 INTs. He also rushed for 101 yards and a TD.

Murray's 130.7 passer rating against the Niners in Week 9 is the highest for any Cardinals QB in 57 alltime meetings against San Francisco.

NOTES ON MURRAY'S 300-YARD OUTINGS

- Playing his first-ever game in the Cardinals season-opener vs. Detroit, Murray threw for 308 yards. In doing so, he became just the fifth rookie in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in a season-opener. He is the first Cardinals rookie in history to throw for 300+ yards in his first career game.
- In Week 2 at Baltimore, Murray exceeded that total, throwing for 349 yards against the Ravens. He joined Cam Newton (2011) as the only QBs in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in each of their two career games.
- After throwing for 340 yards against the Falcons in Week 6, Murray <u>became</u> the first rookie QB in franchise history to throw for 300+ yards in a win.

Holding the #1 overall selection in the NFL Draft for just the fifth time in franchise history - and first time since 1958 - the Cardinals took Murray with the top pick this past April.

Murray took over in 2018, starting 13 of 14 games and completing 260-of-377 pass attempts (69.0%) for 4,361 yards, 42 TDs and just seven INTs while also rushing



for 1,001 yards and 12 TDs on 140 carries (7.2 avg.).

JONES AND BAKER HEADED TO PRO BOWL

Last Tuesday (12/17), Cardinals S **Budda Baker** and LB **Chandler Jones** were selected as starters for the NFC squad at the 2020 Pro Bowl.

In addition, special teamer **Dennis Gardeck**, K **Zane Gonzalez**, and QB **Kyler Mur** ray were selected as alternates.

S Budda Baker

- Earned his second Pro Bowl selection and first at safety after being chosen as a special teamer during his rookie campaign in 2017.
- Became the eighth safety in Cardinals history to be selected to the Pro Bowl and the first since Adrian Wilson in 2011.
- First player in franchise history selected to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer
- and as a position player.

 Became the 15th player in franchise history to be selected to at least two Pro Bowls in his first three seasons in the NFL.
- According to league statistics, Baker leads all NFL defensive backs and ranks fifth overall with a single-season career-high 134 tackles through 15 games this season. He has added six tackles for loss, a forced fumble and six passes defensed.
- He is tied for the NFL lead with 96 solo tackles this season and is the only defensive back among the top 10 leading tacklers in the league this season.

- LB Chandler Jones

 Earned his third career Pro Bowl selection, second with the Cardinals and second as a LB. He was previously selected to the Pro Bowl as a DE with the Patriots in 2015 and as a LB with the Cardinals in 2017.
- Became the fourth LB in franchise history to earn multiple Pro Bowl selections and the first since E.J. Junior (1984-85)
- Jones leads the NFL in sacks (19.0). forced fumbles (8) and "strip-sacks" (7) this season.
- Since entering the NFL in 2012, Jones leads the NFL in both sacks (96.0) and forced fumbles (27)
- Only five players in NFL history had more sacks in their first eight NFL seasons than Jones (96.0).
- Since joining the Cardinals in 2016, Jones leads the NFL with 60.0 sacks, is tied for the league lead with 17 forced fumbles and ranks second with 66 tackles
- He has at least a partial sack in 12 of 15 games this season, including in each

Month" for his performance in October (Weeks 5-8). During Arizona's three-game winning streak (Weeks 5-7) in October, Gonzalez made 8-of-9 field goals and all nine PATs in games the Cardinals won by a combined 10 points. In Arizona's Week 5 victory at Cincinnati, Gonzalez tied his single-game career high with four field goals, including a 31-yarder as time expired to give Arizona a 26-23 win. It was Gonzalez's second career game-winning field goal.

Gonzalez is the first Cardinals Player of the Month selection since 2017 when linebacker Chandler Jones won the defensive award in December. He becomes the first "Special Teams Player of the Month" since Justin Bethel was honored in December of 2014.



AN ARIZONA SUCCESS STORY

RB Kenyan Drake - acquired by Arizona in a trade with Miami in Week 9 - rushed for a career-high 166 yards and added a pair of rushing TDs on 24 carries (6.9 avg.) against the Seahawks last week.

He went over 100 rushing yards in a game for the fifth time in his career and third time with Arizona this season. <u>He now has more 100-yard performances in seven games with the Cardinals (3) than</u> he had in 54 games with Miami (2).

Last week's win over Seattle marked Drake's seventh career game with 100+ scrimmage yards. He has posted three of the four highest single-game scrimmage yardage totals of his career in his seven games with Arizona. His 184 total scrimmage yards against the Seahawks are the second-highest single-game total of his career.

In seven games with the Cardinals, Drake has rushed for 583 yards and seven TDs on 111 carries (5.3 avg.) and added 25 receptions for 148 yards. He has seven TDs in 111 carries with Arizona after totaling nine rushing TDs in 333 carries over three seasons with the Dolphins.

Combined with his 137-yard outing in Week 15 vs. Cleveland, Drake has rushed for 100+ yards in consecutive games for just the second time in his career. He had back-to-back 100-yard outings with Miami during the 2017 season (120 vs. Denver in Week 12; 114 vs. New England in Week 13).

TDS AT A RECORD PACE FOR DRAKE

Prior to the Cardinals win over Cleveland in Week 15, Drake (4 TDs) had never rushed for multiple TDs in a game. With his performances against the Browns and Seahawks (2 TDs) the past two weeks, he has now done so in consecutive games.

- <u>The Cardinals scored a season-high 38 points against the Browns in Week 15.</u> It is the highest single-game point total for Arizona since scoring 38 vs. Tampa Bay in Week 6 of the 2017 season.
- The Cardinals finished last week's game in Seattle with 412 total net yards of offense. It was the fifth time this season Arizona had 400+ net yards in a game. The Cardinals posted 400+ yards in a game just once over the previous two seasons (2017-18) combined.
- After allowing just two sacks against the Seahawks last week, Arizona improved to 5-1 when allowing two sacks or fewer this season.

SCORING WAY UP SINCE OCTOBER

Last week in Seattle, the Cardinals posted 27 points, 5 scoring drives, 3 TDs, 21 first downs, 412 total net yards and 253 rushing yards.

HUNDLEY ANSWERS THE CALL

After starting QB Kyler Murray left the game with an injury, QB Brett Hundley saw his most extensive action in nearly two years while helping lead the Cardinals to victory over his former team in Seattle last Sunday.

Hundley took the field with a 20-7 lead and 10:02 remaining in the third quarter, and under his direction, Arizona ran 33 plays for 131 yards and 10 first downs. In the fourth quarter alone, the Cardinals had seven first downs, held a 10:18 to 4:42 advantage in time of possession and outscored the Seahawks, 7-6.



Should he play again this week against the Rams, Hundley would be in another familiar setting. Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum is located about 14 miles from the Rose Bowl, where he served as UCLA's starting QB for three seasons (2012-14). During his time on campus, he became the first starting QB with three consecutive nine-win seasons.

Hundley was drafted by the Packers in the fifth round (147th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft and played 15 games (nine starts) during the first four years of his career with Green Bay (2015-17) and Seattle (2018).

HUNDLEY'S HOMECOMING
Signing a one-year deal with the Cardinals in March
was a homecoming for the Chandler, AZ native who
was named the 2009 Arizona Gatorade Player of the Year and earned Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Week in November of 2010.

During his standout prep career at Chandler High School, located about nine miles from the Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Training Center, Hundley completed 257-of-415 passes for 4,041 yards, 36 TDs and just four INTs.



A CAREER YEAR CONTINUES FOR HICKS

LB Jordan Hicks - signed as a free agent in the offseason after four years with the Eagles has put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

DEFENSE STANDS TALL IN SEATTLE

Arizona's defense allowed season-lows in points (13), TDs (1), first downs (13), first downs passing (8), third down conversions (1), total net yards (224), net passing yards (133) and completion percentage (51.6%) in the win over Seattle last week.

Below are the highlights from the defensive effort:

• The Cardinals defense forced Seattle's offense into season-lows in first downs (13), third down conversions (1), third down conversion percentage (8.3%), total net yards (224), average yards per play (4.0), net yards passing (133), gross passing yards (169) and average yards per pass attempt (3.7) last Sunday.



- Seattle's 13 points scored represents the Seahawks lowest total in a home game in over two years.
- On its opening drive of the game, Seattle went 89 yards on nine plays and scored a TD. On their final 12 drives, the Seahawks posted two FGs (both in fourth quarter) and gained just 135 total net yards (43 rushing, 92 passing).
- According to ESPN, Seahawks QB Russell Wilson finished Sunday's game with a 10.5 QBR, which is the second-lowest of his career. Of Wilson's four games with the lowest QBR, three have come against the Cardinals at CenturvLink Field.
- The five Seattle WRs who played in Sunday's game finished with a combined three receptions for 56 yards.
- Seahawks WR D.K. Metcalf was held without a reception for the first time this season. Prior to Sunday, Metcalf had at least one catch in each of the first 14 games and had multiple catches in 13 of 14 games. He entered Sunday averaging 3.7 receptions and 58.5 receiving yards per game.

21 NOW WITH 25 INTERCEPTIONS

The Cardinals selected CB Patrick Peterson with the fifth pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first eight seasons, he earned eight Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. Considered one of the game's best cover corners, he has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history.

Since his rookie season in 2011, only four NFL players have more INTs than Peterson.



Fitzgerald has been thrilling fans at State Farm Stadium since the venue opened in 2006. He has played 110 career regular season games in 14 seasons at State Farm Stadium after playing his first two NFL seasons (2004-05) at Sun Devil Stadium.

In those contests, he has totaled 638 receptions. In NFL history, only WR Jerry Rice had more



receptions in a single stadium. Fitzgerald is just nine catches shy of passing Rice for the most catches in a single venue.



He has more career receptions than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,374), receiving yards (17,038), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.
- •Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. CARDS JOIN NFL TO CELEBRATE 100TH SEASON

The NFL is celebrating its 100th season in 2019. As the United States' oldest professional football franchise still in existence, the Cardinals hold a unique place in league history.

The Cardinals were founded in 1898 as the Morgan Athletic Club, predating the formation



of the NFL by over 20 years. By the time the NFL was founded in 1920 as the American Professional Football Association (APFA), the team was known as the Racine Cardinals when it became one of the 14 charter members of the upstart league after paying a \$100 franchise fee. Today, the Cardinals and Chicago Bears represent the only two charter members of the NFL still in existence.

In 1932, Hall of Fame owner Charles W. Bidwill, Sr., then a vice president of the Bears, purchased the Cardinals. After divesting himself of his Bears' holdings, that began a period of family ownership that continues to this

In 2019, the Cardinals have joined the NFL in celebrating 100 years of play with a year-long series of "NFL 100" events, initiatives and programs celebrating fans, players and communities.

The historic and unprecedented celebration is a salute to the millions of fans who love the game; highlighting the unifying nature of football and its positive impact in communities; bringing together generations of past, present and future players; and looking ahead to the NFL's next 100 years.

CARDS A MEMBER OF NFL'S TWO OLDEST RIVALRIES

Having met twice during the NFL's inaugural season in 1920, the Cardinals and Bears represent the oldest rivalry in league history. The Cardinals and Packer's – who joined the league in 1921 – are the NFL's secondoldest rivalry. The Packers were formed in 1919 by Earl (Curly) Lambeau and George Calhoun but did not gain entry into the AFPA until 1921.

The Cards and Bears have faced each other 90 times during the regular season, dating back to 1920.

The first-ever meeting between the Cardinals and Bears – then known as the Racine Cardinals and Decatur Staleys – occurred at Normal Park in Chicago on November 28th, 1920, exactly 72 days after the league was conceived as the APFA during a meeting in Canton, OH. In that game, the Cardinals defeated the Staleys 7-6 at Normal Park.

• The first meeting between the Cardinals and Packers (a 3-3 tie) occurred on November 20, 1921 at Normal Park in Chicago. The following week (November 27, 1921), the Packers and Bears met for the first time.

FRIENDSHIP OF THE HALL OF FAME OWNERS

Cardinals Hall of Fame owner Charles Bidwill and Bears Hall of Fame owner George Halas had a friendship that endured even as their team's were cross-town rivals during their shared time in Chicago.

At one point during the Great Depression, that friendship helped save Halas' ownership of the Bears.

In 1931, Halas' co-owner Edward "Dutch" Sternaman proposed being bought out of his stake in the Bears

for \$38,000, which was to be payed in installments. After suffering \$18,000 in losses during the 1932 season, Halas was \$15,000 short when the final payment was due in 1933. Defaulting on the payment meant ownership would revert to Sternaman.

"It was a case of finding \$15,000 in a hurry, or losing everything I'd worked for since moving the Staleys from Decatur to Chicago in 1921," Halas wrote in 1967 in a history of the Bears published in the Chicago Tribune. "From this desperate situation, I was rescued by the joint efforts of my mother and my good friend Charley Bidwill. Mother bought \$5,000 worth of stock from her savings. Bidwill purchased \$5,000 in stock and also arranged a bank loan for the remaining \$5,000 needed. But it was a mighty close call. As I remember, I finally got all the money together at 11:10 a.m. on the day the final note came due. Forfeit time was 12 o'clock noon."

A HISTORY OF BEING THE FIRST

In addition to being the oldest professional football team in the country, the Cardinals also have a long history of serving as a pioneer in the sport - both on and off the playing field.

DIVERSITY

1st Female Owner in NFL History: Following the 1947 death of Cardinals owner and Pro Football HOFer Charles Bidwill, his wife Violet oversaw operations of the franchise for the next 15 years. As such, she became the first female to serve as principal own-

er in NFL history and is believed to be the first female owner in American pro sports.

1st African American Female Executive in NFL History:

Adele Harris spent 26 seasons with the franchise before retiring in 2001. She holds the distinction of being the first African American female to hold a front office position with an NFL team. Harris first worked as a secretary for the St. Louis Football Cardinals from 1971-74. She left the club to pursue a degree in business management and returned to the team in 1978 as a publicity assistant. By 1980, Harris became the team's director of community relations, and was instrumental in the team's civic efforts when it relocated to Arizona in 1988. Harris passed away in November of 2007.

1st African American to Handle Contract Negotiations for NFL Team: In 1981, the team hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club.

1st African American Head Coach/General Manager Tandem: In 2004, the Cardinals hired Dennis Green as the team's head coach. Joining General Manager Rod Graves, they became the first African American general manager/ head coach pairing. Hired by Arizona in 1997 as Assistant to the President, Graves spent 16 seasons with the organization, including the last six years at the team's GM.

1st Female Coach in NFL History: In 2015, the Cardinals hired Jen Welter as a coaching intern for training camp and the preseason to work with inside linebackers, making her the first female coach of any kind in NFL history.

INTERNATIONAL PLAY

1st NFL Game Outside of North America: The most popular sport in the United States played before an international audience for the first time ever when the Cardinals and San Diego Chargers met for a preseason matchup at Korakuen Stadium in Tokyo, Japan. On August 16, 1976 the Cardinals defeated the Chargers 20-10 before an estimated crowd of 38,000.

1st NFL Game in Europe: On August 6, 1983 the Cardinals faced the Minnesota Vikings in a preseason matchup at Wembley Stadium in London. The Vikings defeated the Cardinals 28-10 in front of 32,847 fans at the landmark event.

1st NFL Regular Season Game Played Outside United States: On October 2, 2005 the Cardinals earned a 17-point come-from-behind victory over the San Francisco 49ers in a game played in front of a then-record crowd of 103,467 at Mexico City's Estadio Azteca. It was the first NFL regular season game ever played outside of the US.

FOOTBALL FIRSTS

1st Night Game in NFL History: On November 6, 1929 the Providence Steamrollers became the first team to host a game at night using floodlights in a matchup against the Cardinals. That night contest also featured the first use of a football painted white during an actual game. With fan attendance crucial to generate revenue, the game was played in

the evening rather than during the workday. The minor league baseball field of Kinsley Park was adorned with floodlights and the Cards earned a 16-0 victory over the Steamrollers.

1st Out of Town Training Camp: Prior to the 1929 season, the Cardinals conducted what is believed to be the NFL's first extended out-of-town training camp when the team spent the summer at Waterworks Park in Coldwater, Michigan.

1st Indoor NFL Game: With the country struggling through the Great Depression in late 1930, the Chicago Cardinals challenged the cross-town Bears to play a game to raise money for the governor's fund for unemployment relief. To battle the freezing temperatures the teams agreed to play at Chicago Stadium, then the largest indoor arena in the world. On December 15, 1930 the Bears earned a 9-7 victory in front of 10,000 fans. Six inches of dirt were hauled in and rolled for a playing surface, forcing the teams to use a white ball to increase visibility for both the players and fans. In addition to raising thousands of dollars for charity, it was a precursor to the 1932 championship when the Bears played for the NFL title in the same venue against the Portsmouth Spartans.

1st Retractable Grass Field in NFL History: When the Cardinals opened their new stadium in 2006, the venue broke the mold in terms of design and architecture. Among its most unique features is a fully retractable grass playing surface that resides outside the stadium for 300+ days a year and rolls in when needed. The first of its kind in NFL history, the stadium's grass playing surface has consistently ranked #1 in surveys of the league's players.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2019 season is the 13th since Michael **Bidwill** took over as team President in 2007. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:
• Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. Since it opened in 2006, the team has sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the venue, which has also hosted a pair of Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's 12 years as team president. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007.
- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice during Bidwill's time as president (2008, 2015), including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- Arizona's 50 wins between 2013-17 were the most in any five-year span in franchise history.
- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Arizona Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.
- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's
- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

THE KINGSBURY ERA BEGINS IN ARIZONA

TAKING THE REINS

On January 8, 2019 the Cardinals announced the hiring of Kliff Kingsbury as the team's head coach.

The 40-year old Kingsbury spent the past six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech, and was hired as USC's offensive coordinator in December. The New Braunfels, TX native is an 11-year coaching veteran who has also worked at Texas A&M (2012) and at the University of Houston (2008-11) where he began his coaching career.

Recognized as one of the profession's brightest and most-innovative offensive originest and most-innovative oriensive minds, Kingsbury has tutored six future NFL QBs, including first-round selections Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield and Johnny Manziel as well as Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek. Under Kingsbury's guidance, Mahomes (2016) and Keenum (2009, '11) both led the nation in passing.



Highlights from Kingsbury's Coaching Career

- While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive and productive offenses. The Red Raiders featured a passing attack that ranked in the top-10 in the country in all six seasons of his tenure, ranked in the top-20 nationally for total offense in all six seasons and finished in the top-25 in scoring five times.
- Under Kingsbury, Texas Tech averaged at least 30 points per game, 470 total yards per game and 300 passing yards per game in all six seasons. The Red Raiders averaged more than 500 yards of offense in four seasons and over 450 passing yards twice. They also averaged at least 140 rushing yards per game four times in six seasons under Kingsbury and averaged more than 40 points per game twice.
- At both Houston (2011) and Texas Tech (2016) Kingsbury's offenses led the nation in total offense and passing offense.
- Dating back to his first offensive coordinator job at Houston in 2011, a Kingsbury-led offense never finished outside the top-20 in the nation in total offense and never finished outside the top-15 in passing offense.
- In 2016, Texas Tech led the nation in total offense (566.6 ypg) and passing offense (463.0 ypg) while finishing #5 in scoring (43.7 ppg). It was the sixth consecutive season a Kingsbury-led unit finished in the top-10 in total offense dating back to his time at both Houston and Texas A&M.
- In 2015, the Red Raiders finished #2 in the nation in total offense (579.5 • In 2015, the Red Raiders finished #2 in the nation in total offense (579.5 ypg), #2 in scoring offense (45.1 ppg) and had the nation's second ranked passing offense (388.2 ypg). The 45.1 points per game average established a school single-season record and Texas Tech was one of just two schools in the nation to score at least 25 points in every game. The Red Raiders featured a 4,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.
- With Kingsbury serving as co-offensive coordinator in 2011, Houston led the nation in total offense (599.1 ypg), passing offense (450.1 ypg) and scoring (49.3 ppg) as quarterback Case Keenum finished his collegiate career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history.

Kingsbury spent the 2012 season at Texas A&M as offensive coordinator/QBs coach working under current University of Arizona head coach Kevin Sumlin. Texas A&M finished third nationally in total offense (558.5 ypg) with an attack that finished 13th nationally in rushing (242.1 ypg) and 14th in passing (316.5 ypg). The Aggies beat #1 Alabama on the road and #11 Oklahoma in the Cotton Bowl.

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston under Sumlin as the offensive quality control coach (2008-09) prior to being elevated to QBs coach (2010) and then co-offensive coordinator in 2011.

Kingsbury played QB at Texas Tech (1999-2002) where he set 39 school records, 16 Big 12 marks and 17 NCAA records during his collegiate career while throwing for 12,423 yards and 95 TDs. As a senior in 2012, he was awarded the Sammy Baugh Trophy as the nation's top college QB and was also named the Associated Press Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year while finishing ninth in Heisman Trophy voting.

He was drafted in the sixth round of the NFL Draft by New England in 2003 and spent his rookie season on the Patriots injured reserve list before spending the 2004 season on the Saints practice squad. Kingsbury played in one game with the Jets in 2005 and attended training camp with the Bills in 2006. He also played with the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe in 2006 before playing with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League in 2007.

In 2018, Kingsbury was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame. He played high school football under his father, Tim, at New Braunfels (TX) High School where he threw for more than 3,000 yards and 34 TDs as a senior.

HIGH POWERED OFFENSES

During his eight seasons as an offense coordinator/head coach at the college level (2011 w/Houston through 2018 w/Texas Tech), Kingsbury's offenses averaged 40.3 points/game. During his six seasons at Texas Tech (2013-18), the Red Raiders averaged 37.8 points/game.

Under Kingsbury, the Tech Tech offenses averaged 502 yards/game in 24 contests against ranked opponents from 2013-18. The Red Raiders posted 600+ yards of offense in six of those games.

COACHING QUARTERBACKS

After joining the coaching ranks with the University of Houston in 2008, Kliff Kingsbury mentored six future NFL QBs during his coaching tenure: Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield, Johnny Manziel, Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek. Mahomes, Mayfield and Manziel were all selected in the 1st round of the NFL Draft.

Under Kingsbury's tutelage, Mahomes spent two full seasons (2015-16) as the starter at Texas Tech. In those two years the Red Raiders finished #2 (2015) and #1 (2016) in the nation in total offense while Mahomes threw for a combined 9,705 yards and 77 TDs in 25

As a sophomore in 2015, Mahomes became the youngest QB in NCAA history to amass 5,000 yards of total offense. He eclipsed the 5,000-yard mark again in 2016, becoming just the third quarterback ever to record 5,000+ vards of total offense in back-to-back seasons.

Keenum (Univ. of Houston)

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston where he was a quality control coach from 2008-09 before being promoted to QBs coach in 2010 and co-offensive

coordinator in 2011. The Cougars led the nation in total offense, passing offense and scoring in 2011, while Keenum completed his record-setting career by placing seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and winning the Sammy Baugh Award.

With Kingsbury calling plays, the Cougars averaged 599.1 total yards per game, including 450.1 through the air, while scoring over 49 points per game. Keenum wrapped up his career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history. In his one season with Kingsbury as his QBs coach, Keenum completed 428-of-604 passes for 5,631 yards and 48 TDs, all of which led the NCAA FBS.


Manziel (Texas A&M)

Prior to taking over at Texas Tech, Kingsbury spent one season (2012) as the offensive coordinator at Texas A&M. In his lone season with the Aggies, Kingsbury played a crucial role in Manziel becoming the first freshman ever to win the Heisman Trophy.


<u>Webb and Shimonek (Texas Tech)</u> Two other Kingsbury quarterbacks have also moved on to the league in recent years as Webb was selected by the New York Giants in the third round of the 2017 draft while Shimonek signed an undrafted free agent agreement with the Los Angeles Chargers in 2018.

TOM CLEMENTS - PASS GAME COORDINATOR/QBS

Now in his first season as the Cardinals Pass Game Coordinator/ QBs coach, veteran assistant **Tom** Clements (CLEM-ents) is a 24-year coaching veteran who has spent 20 seasons as an assistant coach in the NFL, including five seasons as an offensive coordinator.



• Coached for 11 seasons with the Packers (2006-16). In his 11 sea-



- During his tenure with the Packers, Clements helped with the development of QB Aaron Rodgers who was selected to six Pro Bowls and earned NFL MVP honors in 2011 and 2014.
- In three seasons as offensive coordinator with Green Bay (2012-14), the Packers ranked #3 in the NFL in scoring (27.8 ppg), #5 in total offense (381.9 ypg), #3 in giveaways (54) and #5 in first downs (1,048).
- The Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in scoring in each season Clements worked as offensive coordinator, including in 2014 when the Packers led the NFL with 486 points.
- Also coached QB Brett Favre, who in 2007 was selected to the Pro Bowl after throwing for more than 4,000 yards for the fifth time in his career and led the Packers to the NFC Championship game.
- Has coached 13 different offensive players to a total of 21 Pro Bowls and tutored five quarterbacks who had 13 total 3,000-yard passing seasons, including eight 4,000-yard campaigns.

Prior to joining Green Bay, Clements spent two seasons (2004-05) as the offensive coordinator in Buffalo. He spent the previous seven years as a QBs coach with Pittsburgh, Kansas City and New Orleans. Clements helped Elvis Grbac (Chiefs in 2000) and Kordell Stewart (Steelers in 2001) earn Pro Bowl selections while Tommy Maddox (Pittsburgh) was named NFL Comeback Player of the Year in 2002.


Clements got his start in coaching at his alma mater, Notre Dame, spending four seasons (1992-95) working under Lou Holtz. He played 12 years in the Canadian Football League as a QB and was a seven-time divisional All-Star, 1987 CFL MVP, 1975 CFL Rookie of the Year and two-time Gray Cup Champion with Ottawa (1976) and Winnipeg (1984), earning the Outstanding Offensive Player award in each game.

JEFF RODGERS - ASST. HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Rodgers is in his second season with Arizona and first as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator.

He came to Cardinals in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in

- Hired as Cardinals special teams coordinator in 2018 after working in the same capacity for three seasons (2015-17) with the Chicago Bears.
- Has 18 years of coaching experience, including 15 seasons coaching special teams in the NFL with Arizona, Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10)

- •The Broncos returned six kicks for TDs during Rodgers tenure in Denver (2011-14), tied for the second most in the NFL in that span. In 2012, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record multiple return TDs in a playoff game when he scored on a 90-yard punt return and a 104-yard kickoff return in a 38-35 double-overtime loss to the Ravens.
- Under Rodgers tutelage, Broncos K Matt Prater was named to the Pro Bowl in 2013 after setting franchise records in field goal percentage (96.2%; 25-of-26) and points scored (150). Prater's 64-yard field goal in 2013 is the longest in NFL history. In 2014, K Connor Barth's 93.8 field-goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest in team history.

Rodgers began his coaching career at the University of Arizona in 2001, spending two seasons as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and LBs under head coach John Mackovic. He entered the NFL coaching ranks with San Francisco in 2003 as a special teams quality control coach for two seasons.



VANCE JOSEPH - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Vance Joseph was hired as Arizona's Defensive Coordinator this offseason and joined the Cardinals after two years (2017-18) as head coach of the Denver Broncos.

He is a 20-year coaching veteran, including 14 seasons in the NFL with San Francisco (2005-10), Houston (2011-13), Cincinnati (2014-15), Miami (2016) and Denver (2017-18)

- Hired as Cardinals defensive coordinator on 1/11/19.
- Joseph has 12 years of coaching experience on the defensive side of the ball in the NFL, including as defensive coordinator with Miami in 2016.



- In Joseph's initial season with the Broncos in 2017, Denver had the NFL's #3 ranked defense and joined Minnesota as the only teams in the NFL that season to rank in the top-five in both run defense and pass defense. The Broncos ranked #5 in run defense in '17 after finishing the previous year ranked #28 in that category.
- In 2018, the Broncos defense ranked in the top-10 in the NFL in INTs (17), takeaways (28) and sacks (44). Rookie LB Bradley Chubb – Denver's first-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft – led all NFL rookies with 12.0 sacks last season. Pro Bowl LB Von Miller had 14.5 sacks, tied for fourth in the NFL last season. Denver was one of three teams (Seattle, Kansas City) to have two players record double digit sacks in 2018.
- In a stretch from 2011-16, which spanned jobs in Houston, Cincinnati and Miami, Joseph's teams made the postseason five times in six seasons.
- Joseph's teams have ranked in the top-10 in INTs in four of the past five seasons.
- Four different DBs earned a combined five Pro Bowl selections Johnathan Joseph (2), Reggie Nelson (1), Adam Jones (1) and Walt Harris (1) — during Joseph's time coaching defensive backs in Cincinnati, Houston and San Francisco.

Prior to his tenure in Miami, Joseph coached DBs for two seasons (2014-15) with Cincinnati, helping the Bengals to back-to-back postseason appearances. During his two seasons with Cincinnati, the Bengals led the NFL with 41 INTs. Cincinnati was the only team to post more INTs than TDs allowed (36) during that two-year stretch while holding opposing QBs to the lowest combined passer rating (77.4) in the NFL.

Prior to beginning his coaching career as a grad assistant at the University of Colorado in 2000, Joseph appeared in 30 games for the Buffaloes (1990-94), playing QB, RB and on special teams, and was a member of the Buffaloes 1990 National Championship team. He served as a backup to All-American QBs Darian Hagan and Kordell Stewart and completed 34-of-61 passes for 454 yards and four TDs to go along with 50 carries for 237 yards and one TD in his college career.

He converted to CB in the NFL and signed with the Jets as an undrafted rookie free agent in 1995. As a rookie, Joseph played in 13 games and had 21 tackles (17 solo), two INTs and five passes defensed. He played in four games with the Colts in 1996 before spending the preseason with Denver in 1997.

COACHING STAFF HIGHLIGHTS

• Of the 25 coaches on the Cards staff, 18 are new to the organization. The seven coaches who returned are Chris Achuff (Defensive Line), Steve Heiden (Tight Ends), Randall McCray (Asst. Special Teams), Buddy Morris Strength & Conditioning), Jeff Rodgers (Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator), Vernon Stephens (Asst. Strength & Conditioning) and Cam Turner (Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks).



- The Cards coaching staff entered the 2019 season with a combined 419 years of coaching experience at the college and NFL levels: 201 in the NFL; 218 in college. Of the 25 coaches on staff, 21 entered the season with NFL coaching experience.
- In addition to their experience on the sidelines, the Cardinals staff features seven coaches who played a combined 38 years in the NFL: Kliff Kingsbury (3), Vance Joseph (2), Tom Clements (1), Steve Heiden (11), Brian Natkin (1), Marcus Robertson (12) and James Saxon (8).
- Nine members of the Arizona staff entered the year having coached at least 10 seasons in the NFL: Jerry Sullivan (24), Bill Davis (24), Tom Clements (20), James Saxon (19), Jeff Rodgers (15), Vance Joseph (14), Sean Kugler (12), Marcus Robertson (12) and Greg Williams (10).
- Three members of the staff Kingsbury (Texas Tech), Joseph (Denver Broncos) and Sean Kugler (Texas-El Paso) - have previously served as a head coach either at the college or NFL level.

CHRIS ACHUFF - Defensive Line



Last name pronounced "A-cuff" ... long-time college assistant is in his second season with the Cardinals and first as the D-Line coach ... joined the Cardinals in 2018 after 19 years coaching at the collegiate level, coaching the D-line at Baylor (2008-16), Tennessee-Martin (2006-07), Charleston Southern (2005) and Tennessee-Chattanooga (2004).

PETER BEDOVINAC - Asst. Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "buh-DOE-vuh-nack" ... spent the last six seasons (2013-18) at the college level ... a former QB at Michigan State (2010-12), spent the 2018 season as a defensive graduate assistant at Ohio State ... spent the previous three seasons (2015-17) coaching LBs at Missouri State after beginning his coaching career at Missouri in 2013.

CHARLIE BULLEN - Asst. Linebackers



Is in his first season with Arizona and eighth in the NFL ... spent the last seven seasons (2012-18) with Miami, including the past three seasons as the Dolphins assistant LBs coach ... prior to working with the Dolphins, coached for three seasons (2009-11) as a graduate assistant, working with defensive backs at his alma mater, the University of Iowa.

BILL DAVIS - Linebackers



Returned to the Cardinals for his second tenure with the team after previously working as Arizona's defensive coordinator (2009-10) and LBs coach (2007-08) ... has 24 years of coaching experience in the NFL, including seven seasons as a defensive coordinator with Arizona, Philadelphia and San Francisco ... spent the past two seasons (2017-18) as LBs coach at Ohio State.

ROB GROSSO - Defensive Quality Control



Is in his first season in Arizona after working as the assistant to the head coach under Vance Joseph in Denver in 2018 ... previously served as an operations intern with the Broncos in 2017 ... a former WR at John Carroll University (2011-13), worked with the Arizona Rattlers of the IFL during the 2017 season as a coaching/player personnel intern.

STEVE HEIDEN - Tight Ends



Veteran NFL tight end is in his seventh season with the Cardinals and first as TEs coach after working the past six seasons as asst. O-Line coach (2018) and asst. special teams/asst. TEs coach (2013-17) ... after playing in the NFL for 11 seasons (1999-2009), entered the coaching ranks in 2012 as TEs coach at Concordia University in St. Paul, MN.

SEAN KUGLER - Offensive Line



Last name pronounced "KOOG-ler" ... a 29-year coaching veteran, has spent 12 seasons as an assistant in the NFL having previously coached with Detroit (2001-05), Buffalo (2007-09) and Pittsburgh (2010-12) in addition to last season with Denver as the Broncos O-Line/guards/centers coach ... was the head coach at his alma mater, Texas-El Paso, for five seasons (2013-17).

RANDALL McCRAY - Asst. Special Teams



Now in his second year with the Cardinals in '19 ... a college assistant coach for 26 seasons, was hired by the Cardinals in 2018 ... came to Arizona after spending two years as Texas State's assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and LBs coach ... began his coaching career as a grad assistant at South Carolina in 1991.

RUSTY MCKINNEY - Defensive Asst.



In his first season with the Cardinals - and sixth in the NFL - after after spending the past three seasons as a defensive quality control coach with Miami, including working under Cardinals defensive coordinator Vance Joseph in 2016 ... started in the NFL with Cleveland as a coaching intern for two seasons (2014-15) after five seasons (2009-13) at Bentley University.

BUDDY MORRIS - Strength & Conditioning



Now in his fifth season as the Cards strength and conditioning coach ... previously with the Browns (2002-04), returned to the NFL in 2014 with the Cardinals following stints at the Univ. of Buffalo and the Univ. of Pittsburgh ... in 2009, Muscle & Fitness Magazine named his private gym (New York Sports Center) one of the 10 toughest in America.

BRIAN NATKIN - Asst. Offensive Line



Joined the Cardinals in 2019 after spending the last 15 seasons at the college level ... a consensus All-American TE as a player at the University of Texas-El Paso, spent the 2018 season as run-game coordinator/O-Line coach at Hutchinson (KS) Community College ... worked the previous six seasons (2012-17) at his alma mater, UTEP.

DAVID RAIH - Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "RYE" ... spent the last five seasons with Green Bay as WRs coach (2018), offensive perimeter coach (2017), asst. O-Line coach (2016) and coaching administrator (2014-15) ... played QB at lowa (1999-2003) and helped the Hawkeyes to a 2002 Big Ten Conference Championship and a berth in the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl.

MARCUS ROBERTSON - Defensive Backs



A former NFL DB, is in his first season as Arizona's DBs coach after spending the past two seasons (2017-18) in the same role with the Broncos ... has spent the last 28 seasons in the NFL as a player, coach, and administrator and has coached DBs for the past 12 seasons with Tennessee (2007-11), Detroit (2012-13), Oakland (2014-16) and Denver.

JAMES SAXON - Running Backs



Has 19 seasons of experience as a RBs coach (2000-18) in the NFL after an eight-year playing career in the league with the Chiefs (1988-91), Dolphins (1992-94) and Eagles (1995)... came to AZ after coaching Pittsburgh's RBs the past five seasons (2014-18) ... has coached for four different franchises that had eight total postseason appearances.

DON SHUMPERT - Bill Bidwill Fellowship/RBs



Came to the Cardinals after spending last season with the NY Giants as an offensive assistant ... former WR who attended rookie mini-camp with the Chicago Bears and Kansas City Chiefs ... served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Iowa, for two seasons (2016-17), assisting the Hawkeyes WRs and special teams.

JERRY SULLIVAN - Offensive Asst.



Returned to the Cardinals as an offensive assistant for his second tenure with the team after previously serving as WRs coach (2001-02) and offensive coordinator (2003) ... has 47 years of experience, including 24 seasons in the NFL with the Chargers (1992-96), Lions (1997-2000), Cardinals (2001-03), Dolphins (2004), 49ers (2005-10) and Jaguars (2012-16).

CAM TURNER - Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks



A former WR and QB at The Citadel, now in his second year with Arizona's coaching staff in '19 ... spent three seasons (2015-17) in Carolina, where he assisted WRs for two years before serving as the assistant QBs coach in 2017 ... prior to Carolina, spent two seasons (2013-14) as the QBs and WRs coach at Florida International.

SPENCER WHIPPLE - Offensive Quality Control



In his first NFL season after spending the past seven years at the college level ... coached the last five seasons (2014-18) at the Univ. of Massachusetts where he served as the passing game coordinator/QBs coach in '18 ... joined the UMass staff in 2014 as TEs coach before working the following three seasons (2015-17) as passing game coordinator/WRs coach.

GREG WILLIAMS - Cornerbacks



Came to Arizona after spending last season coaching DBs with the Broncos ... has 15 years of coaching experience, including 10 seasons in the NFL ... a former WR and DB at the University of North Carolina (1994-97), spent time in training camp with the Bears and Giants ... began his coaching career at Arizona State as an intern in 2003.

CHRIS WILSON - Defensive Asst.



Is in his first season with the Cardinals as a defensive assistant ... came to Arizona after spending the past three seasons (2016-18) as the D-Line coach with the Eagles ... previously coached with the Cardinals as part of the NFL's minority internship program in 1997 ... son, Caleb, is a TE drafted by the Cardinals in the seventh round of the 2019 NFL Draft.
