



ARIZONA CARDINALS NOTE CARDS

- 3** Combined players on the Cardinals and Chiefs rosters that were with their respective teams that last time Arizona played at Kansas City (2010): AZ WR Larry Fitzgerald, KC S Eric Berry and P Dustin Colquitt.
- 8** Games in which the Cardinals defense has posted multiple sacks this season. Arizona and Houston are the only teams with multiple sacks in at least eight games in 2018.
- 10** First round draft slot for Cardinals QB Josh Rosen (2018) and Chiefs QB Patrick Mahomes (2017). Arizona moved up from 15th to 10th overall to select Rosen in the first round of the 2018 draft. Kansas City moved up from 27th to 10th overall to select Mahomes in the first round of the 2017 draft.
- 120** Consecutive starts for CB Patrick Peterson, who has never missed a game in his NFL career. Peterson's streak of 120 starts is tied for the fifth-longest active streak among NFL players behind only QB Philip Rivers (200), CB Brandon Carr (169), S Glover Quin (140) and QB Matt Ryan (139).

WITH A WIN...

- Combined with their victory over Kansas City in 2014, a win this week would give the Cardinals back-to-back wins against the Chiefs for the first time in the history of the series between the two teams.
- Arizona would earn its first-ever road victory against the Chiefs. The Cardinals are 0-4-1 all-time playing in Kansas City.

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH...

WR LARRY FITZGERALD

- With 33 receiving yards, Fitzgerald would pass Terrell Owens (15,934) for second place on the NFL's all-time receiving yardage list.
- With a catch, Fitzgerald would have at least one reception in 220 consecutive games, the second-longest streak in NFL history behind only Jerry Rice (274).
- With a TD reception, Fitzgerald would have 113 TD catches in his career. It would also give him a TD catch in three straight games in a season for the first time since 2013 (4 straight in Games 10-13).
- With a TD reception, Fitzgerald would have a TD catch in three of four career games against the Chiefs and in both career games played at Arrowhead Stadium.

RB DAVID JOHNSON

- With a TD (of any kind), Johnson would have 40 TDs in 42 career games played. He would reach 40 career TDs in fewer games than any player in franchise history (current record of 53 games held by John David Crow).
- With a rushing TD, Johnson would have 30 career rushing TDs. He would reach 30 rushing TDs in 19 fewer games (42) than any other player in franchise history.

WR CHRISTIAN KIRK

- With three receptions, Kirk would join Anquan Boldin (16 straight in 2003), Rob Awalt (8 in 1987) and Terry Metcalf (8 in 1973) as the only rookies in team history with three or more receptions in at least eight straight games.

DE CHANDLER JONES

- With a sack, Jones would have 35.5 sacks in 41 career games with Arizona. He would have at least one sack in 29 of 41 games with the Cardinals - and in 7 of 9 games this season.

CB PATRICK PETERSON

- With an INT, Peterson would have 24 INTs in his career. Only six players in team history would have more. It would give Peterson three INTs this season, and two in the last three games.

S TRE BOSTON

- With an INT, Boston would have an INT in each of his last three games played this season (missed games 7-8). He would also have four INTs in his last five games played. Boston would have 12 career INTs, nine of which would have come in his last 23 games dating back to last season.

DE MARKUS GOLDEN

- With a sack, Golden would have a sack in back-to-back games for the first time since the final two contests of the 2016 season.

DE ZACH MOORE

- With a sack, Moore would have a sack in each of the last three games. Moore has a sack in each of the last two games after posting just a half-sack in his 16 prior career games since entering the league with New England in 2014.

DEFENSE WITH MULTIPLE SACKS

- With two sacks, the Cardinals would have multiple sacks in each of the first nine games of a season for the first time in franchise history. The Cardinals would be the only team in the NFL this season with multiple sacks in at least nine games.

FITZ JUST 33 YARDS FOR #2 ALL-TIME

WR **Larry Fitzgerald**'s big performance in Week 8 vs. San Francisco (8 receptions for 102 yards) put him in striking distance of a few significant career milestones. The 11-time Pro Bowler enters Sunday's game just 33 receiving yards away from passing Hall of Fame WR Terrell Owens (15,934) for second place on the NFL's all-time list for career receiving yards.



Fitzgerald moved up six spots (9th to 3rd) on the all-time receiving yardage list during the 2017 season. His last move came in Week 14 vs. Tennessee when he passed Randy Moss for third place.

Two QBs have completed passes to both Fitzgerald and Terrell Owens: Carson Palmer and Tim Rattay.

Fitzgerald (1,268) also enters Sunday's game needing 14 receptions to pass HOF WR Jerry Rice (1,281) for the most receptions with a single team in NFL history.

A LOOK BACK AT FITZGERALD'S FIRST CATCH:

On Sunday, it will have been 5,174 days (14 years, 2 months) since Fitzgerald caught his first career pass. On the first play of the game in his NFL debut at St. Louis on 9/12/04, Fitzgerald caught a 37-yard pass from QB **Josh McCown**. A pair of Hall of Famers were also involved in the play: HOF RB **Emmitt Smith** received a handoff on the play and flipped it back to McCown on a flea flicker. Fitzgerald caught the pass over HOF DB **Aeneas Williams**, the former Cardinal who was then playing for the Rams.

A PAIR OF GREAT YOUNG BACKS

Two of the NFL's top young RBs - AZ's **David Johnson** and KC's **Kareem Hunt** - will be on the field at Arrowhead Stadium on Sunday. The duo have compiled 7,222 all-purpose yards and 63 total TDs in 66 career combined games.

David Johnson Career Snapshot

In his 30 career starts in the NFL, Johnson has posted 100+ yards from scrimmage 21 times. He has totaled 3,467 yards yards (2,098 rushing; 1,369 receiving) and 31 TDs in those 30 starts, averaging 115.6 scrimmage yards per start.

Kareem Hunt Career Snapshot
