



ARIZONA CARDINALS (0-1) VS. LAS VEGAS RAIDERS (0-1) Allegiant Stadium | September 18, 2022 | 1:25 PM



THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals embark on the first road trip of the 2022 regular season as they travel to Las Vegas to face the Raiders in their first-ever visit to Allegiant Stadium.

Having faced the Chiefs in the season-opener last week, this year marks the first time since 1996 (Indianapolis and Miami) that Arizona opens a season with back-to-back matchups vs. teams from the AFC.

The Cardinals are coming off a 2021 campaign in which the team went 8-1 on the road during the regular season, establishing a franchise record for road wins.

Arizona was dominant on the road last season, finishing ranked #1 in the NFL in points scored (267), total TDs (31), rushing TDs (12), passer rating (111.2), turnover margin (+18), forced fumbles (14) and fumble recoveries (11). The team also had the fewest turnovers on the road (3) in 2021.

Although the series between the Cardinals and Raiders dates back 49 years (1973), this week's matchup marks just the 11th all-time regular season meeting between the two teams. The Raiders hold a 6-4 advantage but the Cardinals have had success as the road team, with a 3-2 record overall and a 2-1 record in its last three road games in the series.

Sunday's game will see Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** trying to avoid former teammate DE **Chandler Jones** who is in his debut season with Las Vegas after six seasons (2016-21) in Arizona. Jones had a highly-successful tenure in the desert, playing in 84 games and leaving as the career franchise leader in sacks (71.5).

The head coaches in this weekend's matchup - Arizona's **Kliff Kingsbury** and Vegas' **Josh McDaniels** - also have history. McDaniels was a young coaching assistant in New England in 2003 when the Patriots drafted Kingsbury in the sixth round (201st overall) of the NFL Draft.

Next week the Cardinals return home to face the defending Super Bowl Champion Rams at State Farm Stadium in the first divisional matchup for either team. The Raiders will head to Nashville for a showdown with the Titans at Nissan Stadium.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

• The Cardinals and Raiders - the teams that play in stadiums hosting the next two Super Bowls - face off on Sunday. State Farm Stadium will host Super Bowl LVII following the 2022 season and Allegiant Stadium will host Super Bowl LVIII following the 2023 season.

• Sunday's game will be Arizona's first visit to Allegiant Stadium. <u>The Cardinals were scheduled to play the inaugural game at the venue in 2020 but the NFL preseason was canceled that year due to COVID.</u>

• Arizona enters Sunday's game with a 15-10 record on the road under head coach **Kliff Kingsbury**. <u>The Cardinals are 12-5 (.706) on the road in the last</u> two seasons (2020-21). Only Kansas City (.824), New Orleans (.722) and Tampa Bay (.722) hold higher road winning percentages during that span.

• Sunday's game is the Cardinals second of three straight against 2021 playoff teams to start the year. <u>Arizona is the only team in the NFL to start the</u> <u>season with three straight games vs. 2021 playoff teams.</u>

• Facing his former team on Sunday is Cardinals C **Rodney Hudson**, who played six seasons (2015-2020) with the Raiders. Hudson started at center in all 92 games he appeared in with the Raiders, was named to the Pro Bowl three times (2016-17, '19) and was named 2nd-team All-Pro in 2019.

• With his rushing TD vs. Kansas City last week, RB **James Conner** now has 19 total TDs in 16 regular season games with the Cardinals. <u>In NFL history, only</u> four players – all Hall of Famers – had more TDs in their first 16 games with a team: Gale Sayers (24 w/ Bears), Randy Moss (23 w/ Patriots), Jim Brown (20 w/ Browns) and Eric Dickerson (20 w/ Rams).

CARDINALS-RAIDERS CONNECTIONS

RAIDERS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals OL Rodney Hudson played six seasons (2015-2020) with the Raiders before being acquired by Arizona in a trade in 2021. During his time with the Raiders, Hudson started at center in all 92 games played. He was named to the Pro Bowl three times (2016-17, '19) and was named 2ndteam All-Pro in 2019

Cardinals CB Trayvon Mullen, Jr. was selected by Las Vegas in the 2nd round (40th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft and played three seasons (2019-21) with the Raiders. He appeared in 37 games (31 starts) with the Raiders and to-taled 134 tackles, four INTs, 28 passes defensed and two tackles for loss.

Arizona DBs coach **Marcus Robertson** served as an assistant DBs (2014) and DBs (2015-16) coach for the Raiders.

CARDINALS CONNECTIONS Raiders Senior Defensive Assistant Rob Ryan coached two seasons (1994-95) with the Cardinals serving as the defensive backs coach under his father, Buddy Ryan, who was the Cardinals head coach for those two seasons. His brother, Rex, also served as the Cardinals D-Line (1994) and LBs coach (1995) during that time.

Raiders CB Javelin Guidry was on the Cardinals roster for two weeks prior to being released the day before last week's opener vs. the Chiefs.

Raiders Assistant Strength and Conditioning coach D'Anthony Batiste played three seasons (2010-12) with the Cardinals.

Raiders Director of Scout Development **Keith Kidd** spent eight seasons (1991-99) with the Cardinals in the scouting department. Kidd also spent two seasons (1989-91) as a graduate assistant at Arizona State prior to joining the Cardinals staff.

NEVADA CONNECTIONS Cardinals OL Will Hernandez is a Las Vegas native. He attended Chaparral High School where he played multiple positions and was selected as an allconference player on both offense and defense.

ARIZONA CONNECTIONS Raiders LB Darien Butler played four seasons (2018-2021) at Arizona State where he was a three-time team captain. In four seasons, he appeared in 40 games and accumulated 243 tackles, 24.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, three INTS, seven passes defensed, three forced fumbles and four fumble recover-ion As a conject in 2021 he was a Putly of August and four fumble recoveries. As a senior in 2021 he was a Butkus Award semifinalist.

Raiders Senior National Scout Lenny McGill played four seasons (1990-93) at Arizona State, while also competing on the track & field team.

FAMILY CONNECTIONS

Cardinals VP, Football Operations & Facilities Matt Caracciolo is the brother of Peter Caracciolo, who serves as the Director of Operations for the Raiders.

PRO/COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

Cardinals Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round (201st overall) of the 2003 NFL Draft, when Raiders Head Coach Josh McDaniels was a coaching assistant on the New England staff. Kingsbury spent that season on IR, and would break down opponent game film with the Patriots assistants.

Cardinals OL Justin Pugh played for the Giants with Raiders DT Johnathan Hankins from 2013-16.

Cardinals LB Isaiah Simmons (2017-2019) and CB Trayvon Mullen, Jr. (2016-18) played with Raiders DE Clelin Ferrell (2016-18), WR Hunter Renfrow (2015-18), and G John Simpson (2016-19) at Clemson, where they were all teammates on the Tigers National Championship team in 2018.

Cardinals DL **Rashard Lawrence** (2016-19) and RB **Darrell Williams** (2014-17) played with Raiders DE **Tashawn Bower** (2013-16), DT **Neil Farrell** (2017-21), and WR **Foster Moreau** (2015-18) at LSU. Lawrence and Farrell won a national championship with LSU in 2019.

Cardinals WR Greg Dortch played with Raiders LB Luke Masterson at Wake For-est for two seasons (2017-18).



CARDS FACE THEIR ALL-TIME SACK LEADER

For the first time since his rookie season in 2012, the Cardinals will face DE Chandler Jones when they square off against the Raiders on Sunday.

Since the last time Arizona faced Jones, the team acquired him in a trade with New England in 2016 and over a six-season span (2016-21) he set the Cardinals franchise career and single-season records for sacks.

Jones started all 84 games played with the Cardinals, re-cording 262 tackles, 71.5 sacks, 80 tackles for loss, 131 QB hits, 23 forced fumbles, 8 fumble recoveries and 19 passes defensed. His 71.5 sacks are a franchise career record and his 19.0 sacks in 2019 are a single-season record.

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

OB Kyler Murray
 With a passer rating of 120.0+, Murray would have 10 such performances in his career. That would tie Neil Lomax (10 times in 108 games) for the most games with a passer rating of 120.0+ in franchise history.

• With 300+ passing yards, Murray would have 12 career 300-yard perfor-mances. Just 48 games into his career, that would tie for the fifth-best total in franchise hstory.

RB James Conner

 With two TDs (of any kind), Conner would have 21 TDs in 17 regular season games with the Cardinals. In NFL history only Hall of Famers Jim Brown (24 w/ Browns), Gale Sayers (24 w/ Bears) and Randy Moss (24 w/ Patriots) would have more in their first 17 games with a team.

• With two rushing TDs, Conner would have 18 rushing TDs in 17 regular season games with the Cardinals. In NFL history, only Hall of Fame RBs Jim Brown (22 w/ Browns) and Eric Dickerson (19 w/ Rams) would have more in their first 17 games with a team.

After facing the Chiefs last Sunday, Arizona travels to Las Vegas to play the Raiders this week before returning home to take on the de-fending Super Bowl LVI Champion Rams in Week 3.

The Chiefs (AFC West title), Raid-ers (AFC Wild Card) and Rams (Super Bow)) earned postseason berths in 202

CONNER'S HISTORIC TD TOTALS THRU 16 GAMES

In 2021 - playing his first season in Arizona after four years (2018-21) in Pittsburgh - RB James Conner scored 18 total TDs (15 rushing; 3 receiving) in 15 regular season games played.

In last week's opener vs. the Chiefs, Conner was back in the endzone again - scoring Arizona's first TD of the season on a two-yard run in the second quarter. <u>He now has 19 total TDs in 16 regular</u> season games with the Cardinals. In NFL history, only four players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – had more TDs in their first 16 games with a team.

ARIZONA AVOIDING TURNOVERS

The Cardinals were one of seven teams that went without a turnover in Week 1. Avoiding turnovers has been a hallmark of the team since head coach Kliff Kingsbury took over in 2019.

In 2021, Arizona committed just 15 turnovers, including four fumbles lost. Both numbers represent the lowest single-season totals in franchise history. The Cardinals have committed just 54 turnovers in 50 games under Kingsbury. Dating back to 2019, only three teams have fewer.

Conner and Thompson were both named team captains for the first time in their careers.





CARDS DEBUT ALTERNATE HELMET

In their nationally televised preseason contest vs. the Baltimore Ravens, the Cardinals debuted their new alternate helmet, which was first unveiled in July. It was the first of three games this season in which the team will wear the alternate helmet.

For the Week 5 matchup vs. Philadelphia the alternate helmet will accompa-ny the team's alternate black jersey. For the Week 7 clash with New Orleans, the Cardinals will wear the alternate helmet with their Color Rush uniform.

The alternate helmet has a shiny, gloss black shell with red flecks as well as a black facemask. It features iridescent chrome decals with a gradient screen of the team's Cardinal head logo as well as front and back bumpers displaying "ARIZONA" in black type.

CARDS EXTEND THEIR OWN IN 2022

The Cardinals gave out a number of high-profile contract extensions this offseason - beginning with head coach Kliff Kingsbury and GM Steve Keim in March, QB Kyler Murray in July, OL D.J. Humphries in August and S Jalen Thompson in September.

Murray (2019) and Humphries (2015) are former first-round draft picks by Arizona. The Cardinals selected Thompson in the 2019 Sup-plemental Draft. Keim has spent his entire professional career with the Cardinals and Kingsbury was made

an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the team in 2019.

CARDINALS SIGNING CONTRACT EXTENSIONS IN 2022

<u>S Jalen Thompson:</u> On September 2nd, the Cardinals signed Thompson to a contract extension that keeps him in Arizona through the 2025 season.

Thompson set career highs last season in tack-les (120), solo tackles (78), INTs (3), passes de-fensed (7) and tackles for loss (3). His 120 solo tackles led the team and were the second-most among all NFL defensive backs in 2021.

In three seasons with Arizona, the 24-year old Thompson has appeared in 37 games (25 starts) and has 197 tackles, four interceptions, 11 passes defensed and three tackles for loss.

<u>OL D.J. Humphries:</u> On August 2nd, the Cardinals signed Humphries to a threeyear contract extension. It was the second contract extension Humphries signed with the Cardinals after previously agreeing to a three-year deal in 2020.

A captain each of the last two seasons, the 8th-year pro was selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2021 after starting all 16 games he appeared in at LT. He became the first Cards offensive tackle selected to the Pro Bowl since Lomas Brown in 1996.

<u>QB Kyler Murray:</u> On July 21st the Cardinals announced they had signed their signal-caller to the largest extension in franchise history.

The 25-year old Murray earned NFL Rookie of the Year honors (2019), is a two-time team captain and was named to the Pro Bowl twice (2020-21) in his first three seasons.

He became the first QB in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl twice in his first three seasons and joined Patrick Mahomes, Aaron Rodgers and Russell Wilson as the only NFL QBs named to the Pro Bowl in each of the last two seasons (2020-21).

<u>GM Steve Keim & Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury:</u> On March 2nd, the Cardinals signed both Keim and Kingsbury to contract extensions.

Now in his 24th season with Arizona and 10th as the team's GM, Keim has now signed three extensions since being promoted to his current post: February of 2015, February of 2018 and March of 2022.





HARD KNOCKS IN SEASON: ARIZONA CARDINALS

In May it was announced that the second half of the Cardinals upcoming 2022 season will be featured on television's most acclaimed sports reality franchise Hard Knocks, which last year expanded its programming platform with the introduction of a multi-episode, in-season edition.



HBO Sports and NFL Films will

Knocks In Season: The Arizona Cardinals this fall for an all-access primetime docuseries on the franchise.

The first epsiode will premiere on Wednesday, November 9. Additional epi-sodes will premiere each Wednesday through the end of the Cardinals season.

The 18-time Emmy-winning weekly series will deliver its signature all access coverage to document an NFL franchise in-season and in real time, following the Cardinals as the team navigates the challenges of an NFL season and battles to return to the post-season. The series will be available on HBO and to stream on HBO Max during the 2022 NFL season beginning in November.

Hard Knocks In Season debuted last fall with the engaging and eventful drama of the Indianapolis Colts' 2021 regular season journey.

'Last season Hard Knocks made an unprecedented leap, documenting an NFL regular season in real time for the first time ever with the Indianapolis Colts, said Keith Cossrow, NFL Films Vice President and Senior Coordinating Producer. "This season, we are eager to build on that success and go even further with one of the most exciting teams in the NFL.

This will mark the Cardinals first appearance as part of the Hard Knocks franchise, which originally launched in 2001

A REMATCH IN MEXICO CITY

Later this season the Cardinals will take on the San Francisco 49ers at Estadio Azteca in Mexico City on ESPN's Monday Night Football.

The Week 11 contest will serve as a rematch of the 2005 Cardinals-49ers game at Estadio Azteca which was the NFL's first regular season game held outside the United States.

The Cards earned a 31-14 win over the 49ers in that game in front of a then-record crowd of 103,467.

The Cardinals have a long history with international games and have participated in many global "firsts" for the league:

• The franchise played in the first NFL regular season game held outside the United States when they defeated the San Francisco 49ers 31-14 at Estadio Azteca in Mexico City on October 2, 2005.

 The team also played the first NFL game outside of North America on August 16, 1976 against the San Diego Chargers in Tokyo's Korakuen Stadium. The Cardinals won, 20-10.

• The first American football contest played on British soil was a tilt between the Cardinals and Minnesota Vikings in London's Wembley Stadium on August 6.1983.

"We are proud and thrilled to be the NFL's first team to offer its fans this type of unprecedented amenity and innovative experience, Cardinals owner Michael Bidwill said at last week's opening. "The BetMGM Sportsbook at



State Farm Stadium gives us a chance to engage current and potential fans on a year-round basis in a fun, entertaining and responsible way.

Located on The Great Lawn, the BetMGM Sportsbook at State Farm Stadium operates on both event and non-event days, offering guests a massive 265-square-foot video wall, 38 TVs and indoor-and-outdoor dining options.

Throughout the year, the BetMGM Sportsbook at State Farm Stadium also will serve as an outdoor music and comedy concert amphitheater, hosting events for audiences gathered on The Great Lawn.

"MR. B" ENTERS RING OF HONOR

In a halftime ceremony during last week's season-opener vs. the Chiefs, the Cardi-nals inducted former owner **Bill Bidwill** into the team's Ring of Honor.

Bidwill, who passed away in October of 2019 at the age of 88, had a life-long association with the Cardinals which spanned eight decades. After his father, Hall of Fame owner Charles W. Bidwill, Sr. purchased the team, Bill worked as a ball boy when he was a child. Upon graduating from Georgetown University and serving proudly in the United States Navy, Bidwill took on a full-time role with the Cardinals in 1960.

While well-known for his understated



of the spotlight, "Mr. B" was recognized often for his contributions and ac-complishments as Cardinals owner. In 2017, he was enshrined in the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame which honors those who have made significant contributions to the state's athletics community. In 2010, Bidwill was inducted into the Sports Faith Hall of Fame in Lake Forest, IL. At its December 2010 commence-ment exercises, Northern Arizona University awarded Bidwill an honorary doctor of humane letters degree for "his contributions to the university, his community and his profession."

During his time as owner, Bidwill was also at the forefront of diversity in employment practices, which was evidenced by the hiring of the NFL's first Afri-can American female executive (Adele Harris), first African American contract negotiator (Bob Wallace) and first African American head coach/GM tandem (Dennis Green and Rod Graves). In 2015, the team established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship to increase diversity and provide opportunities to gain NFL coaching experience. At the 2010 annual NFL Combine in Indianapolis, Bidwill was honored with the Paul "Tank" Younger Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance, whose purpose is to promote diversity and equality of job opportunity in the NFL.

Bidwill became the 19th individual inducted into the Cardinals Ring of Honor. Biowill became the 19th Individual inducted into the Cardinals King of Honor. Created in 2006 to coincide with the opening of State Farm Stadium, the Ring of Honor also includes **Charles W. SUPER BOWL RETURNS TO AZ

Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl in February

The final game of the 2022 NFL season will take place in Arizona when State Farm Stadium plays host to Super Bowl LVII on Sunday, February 12, 2023.

It will be the fourth Super Bowl played in the state of Arizona and the third time the nation's most popular sporting event will be played at State Farm Stadium. The Cardinals home venue last staged the mega event when it hosted Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season.



Arizona joins South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

ECONOMIC IMPACT: The last time the game was staged in Arizona, it produced a record economic impact for the state. A 2015 study by the Seidman Research Institute, W.P. Carey School of Business at Arizona State University determined that Super Bowl XLIX, the 2015 Pro Bowl and related events produced a gross economic impact of \$719.4 million for the region. That was the largest economic impact of any special event ever held in Arizona. In addition to the games played in Glendale, more than 1 million people visited Verizon Super Bowl Central in downtown Phoenix and more than 500,000 people enjoyed events in downtown Scottsdale.

In a span of just over 26 months in 2015-17, State Farm Stadium hosted a Pro Bowl, Super Bowl, College Football National Championship Game and the NCAA Men's Final Four.

It was an unprecedented stretch for a stadium that generated \$1.3 billion in economic impact for the state during that 26-month span.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2022 season marks the 16th with owner **Michael Bidwill** steering the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure: • Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill, who purchased the team in 1933.

• Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 15 seasons, after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.

• Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

 With an 11-6 record in 2021, the Cardinals reached 11+ wins in a season for the sixth time in franchise history. Three of those six 11-win campaigns came with Michael leading the team: 13 in 2015, 11 in 2014, 11 in 2021.

• Among Bidwill's most substantial accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has proved a critical turning point for the franchise, an economic engine for the state of Arizona, and a crucial resource in the battle against the COVID-19 pandemic.

• At the conclusion of the 2022 season, State Farm Stadium will host Super Bowl LVII – the third Super Bowl held at the venue since it opened in 2006. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).

• In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

• Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006, the Cardinals have sold out 155 games at the venue (which is every non-pandemic game played there).

• During the 2022 season, the Cardinals will make their first-ever appearance on Hard Knocks, television's most acclaimed sports reality franchise. Arizona will be the second team to be featured on Hard Knocks In Season, which will document the second half of the Cardinals season in real time.

• In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

Within the National Football League, Bidwill's considerable influence is illus-trated by his appointment to 10 different league committees, including his inclusion on the prestigious Management Council Executive Committee. His 10 committee assignments are the most of any NFL owner.

In 2021, the league announced that Bidwill would replace Bengals owner Mike Brown on the Management Council Executive Committee that deals with the NFLPA on labor

75TH ANNIVERSARY OF HISTORIC SEASON

The 2022 season marks the 75th anniversary of the Cardinals historic 1947 season. It was a year in which Violet Bidwill made league history and one that ultimately ended in the team winning an NFL Championship.

The Cardinals suffered a big loss after team owner **Charles Bidwill** - having just recently put the finishing touches on his "Dream Backfield" with the un-precedented signing of All-American running back Charley Trippi - passed away in April. He had run the franchise since purchasing it in 1933 and

was credited with pulling the team - and on a larger scale the NFL - through the Great Depression.

With the passing of Charles, his wife, Violet Bidwill, took over as team owner. It was a historic moment, as she became the first female owner in NFL history and one of the first females to serve as a primary owner in professional sports.

She was a wonderful person and was in a tough situation with losing her husband at a young age," Violet's grandson, current Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**, said. "She decided she would take over the family businesses."

"Things worked out well," then-team president Ray Benningsen said of the front office under Violet. "I ran the business end of it, (head coach) Jimmy (Conzelman) ran the team on the field and we both appreciated Vi's (Violet) counsel. I'll tell you one thing. She knew her football and she was a shrewd businesswoman.

"She didn't suffer fools, and she was right there in the meetings with the rest of the owners and held her own," said Michael Bidwill.

Violet Bidwill's first year of ownership saw the franchise win the NFL Champion-ship after defeating the Philadelphia Eagles 28-21 in the Championship Game. Violet Bidwill served as Cardinals owner from 1947 through her death in

1962, having engineered the team's move to St. Louis in 1960.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

After 14 seasons working within the Cardinals personnel department, Steve Keim was elevated to GM on January 8, 2013.

AMONG THE NFL'S BEST IN 2021

In 2021, the Cardinals posted an 11-6 record and secured their first playoff berth since 2015.

In addition to winning 11 games during the regular season, the Cardinals also ranked in the top 10 in both offensive points scored and defensive points allowed per game.

• The 2021 season marked the fourth time in his tenure the Cardinals have won 10+ games. That includes the 2015 season when Arizona won a franchise record 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

• Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense four times dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger. In 2021, Arizona ranked 10th in the NFL in offensive points scored (435) and eighth in defensive points allowed (349).

 The 2021 free agency period was one of Keim's busiest as GM. The players the Cardinals acquired have a combined 20 Pro Bowl selections and 11 All-Pro nods. Arizona brought in five different Pro Bowlers in the offseason: DL J.J. Watt, WR A.J. Green, OL Rodney Hudson, K Matt Prater and RB James Conner. Conner was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2021.



Originally set a goal of \$200,000 but within 19 days, more than 200,000 individuals collectively donated \$37 million to the cause. Contributions continued, and the final tally reached \$41.6 million.

A LEADERSHIP ROLE IN FIRST SEASON WITH AZ

DL J.J. Watt had a reputation as one of the NFL's best defenders - and vocal leaders - when the Cardinals acquired him in free agency prior to the 2021 season. So it was no suprise that his presence in 2021 provided a huge boost to Arizona.

<u>He was voted a team captain before playing a</u> <u>snap with the Cardinals</u> and was just hitting his stride when he suffered a devasting shoulder injury in Week 7 vs. Houston. <u>Watt's final four games</u> played in 2021 - three in the regular season and his return to the lineup in the Wild Card matchup vs. Los Angeles - proved why he remains one of the NFL's top defenders.



In his final four regular season games last season, Watt collected 12 tackles, a sack, seven QB hits, four tackles for loss, two passes defensed and a forced fumble.

Those outings were highlighted in Week 6 at Cleveland by his first sack as a Cardinal. Watt finished the game with a season-high five tackles, a sack, a forced fumble, two QB hits and a pass defensed.

Watt's first sack as a member of the Cardinals came on a crucial play late in the third quarter. With Arizona holding a 23-14 lead and Cleveland at the AZ 45-yard line, Watt sacked Browns QB Baker Mayfield and forced a fumble on the play that was recovered by LB Devon Kennard.

<u>The sack gave Watt – who has played 135 games during his 11-year NFL career</u> <u>– 102.0 sacks. Only 10 players in NFL history had more in their first 135 games.</u>

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker has five in his last 29 games played.

Of Baker's five career INTs, three have come against division opponents (2 vs. San Francisco and 1 vs. Seattle).

THOMPSON'S BIG ASCENT IN 2021

S Jalen Thompson - selected in the fifth round of the 2019 NFL Supplemental Draft out of Washington State - had a Pro Bowl caliber season in 2021. He established career highs in tackles (120), solo tackles (78), INTs (3), passes defensed (7) and tackles for loss (3).

He was one of just five players - and three defensive backs - in the NFL with 100+ tackles, 3+ INTs and 5+ passes defensed during the regular season.



ARIZONA'S OWN INTERCEPTION LEADER

Third-year CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** - a native of Scottsdale and a product of Sa-guaro High School - was one of the Cardinals top defenders in 2021.

In 16 regular season games, he totaled 64 tack-les, 4 INTs (one returned for a TD), 12 passes defensed, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

Murphy's 4 INTs and 12 passes defensed both set ca-reer-highs. He had one INT and 18 passes defensed in his first two NFL seasons combined (31 games).

Murphy was one of just 11 players in the NFL with 12+ passes defensed and 4+ INTs in 2021.



ANOTHER GOLDEN SEASON



Following a standout season in 2021, third-year LB Isaiah Simmons - the Cardinals first round (8th overall) pick in the 2020 NFL Draft - is expected to make another big leap this season.

A rare athlete for his position, Simmons is one of the fastest players on the team - having run a 4.39 40yard dash at the 2020 NFL Combine.

He will continue to be used all over the field in 2022. seeing action at LB, nickel and safety according to de-fensive coordinator Vance Joseph.

"He's a big man who can tackle, run and chase, he can blitz, he could play that edge," Jospeh said at the start of training camp. "But also he's covered guys in the slot like CeeDee Lamb and those guys and he likes it. That's different from most linebackers. Right now

he is our STAR: star linebacker or safety, whatever you want to call him."

In 2021 Simmons proved to be the versatile defensive weapon the Cardinals hoped he would be. <u>He finished the regular season with 103 tackles</u>, 7 passes defensed, an INT, 4 forced fumbles, 4 tackles for loss, 4 QB hits and 1.5 sacks.

Simmons become the first Cardinals defender since Tim McDonald in 1988 to have 100+ tackles and 4+ forced fumbles in a season.

He also joined Colts All-Pro LB Darius Leonard as the only players in the NFL last season with 100+ tackles, 4+ forced fumbles and 7+ passes defensed.

ALLEN BECOMES A PLAYMAKER ON "D"

Like LB Isaiah Simmons - DL Zach Allen is a young defender who had a breakout season for the Cardinals in 2021. Selected in the third round (65th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft, Allen emerged as a playmaker last season.

In 15 games (14 starts) last season, Allen established ca-reer highs in tackles (48), sacks (4.0), tackles for loss (5), OB hits (14), passes defensed (4), fumble recoveries (3) and also recorded his first career INT. He scored his first career TD with a 16-yard fumble return in the regular season finale vs. the Seahawks.



Allen had twice as many sacks in 2021 (4.0) as he had in his first two years com-bined (2.0) while also more than doubling his previous career high for QB hits (from 6 in 2020 to 13 in 2021). Allen's three fumble recoveries were tied for the NFL lead among all defenders in 2021, and he was the only defensive lineman in the NFL with three fumble recoveries.





Trace McSorley – Baltimore's 2019 sixth-round pick (197th overall) out of Penn State, has appeared in three NFL games.

Kyler Murray – Won the 2018 Heisman Trophy, was selected 9th overall in the 2018 MLB Draft, 1st overall in the 2019 NFL Draft, earned 2019 AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors and selected to consecutive Pro Bowls in 2020-21.

RUNNING BACKS

Eno Benjamin – Has appeared in 10 games for Arizona after being selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round (222nd overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of Arizona State where he totaled 2,867 rushing yards and 27 TDs in 35 games (25 starts).

James Conner – Two-time Pro Bowler who signed with Arizona in 2021 after four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh, where he played 50 games (33 starts). Tied for second in the NFL in rushing TDs (15) and ranked third in total TDs (18) in his first season with the Cardinals.

Keaontay Ingram – Cardinals sixth-round pick (201st overall) in the 2022 NFL Draft out of USC. Rushed for 2,722 yards and 16 TDs on 495 carries in 42 collegiate games at Texas and USC.

Jonathan Ward – Played in 28 games for the Cardinals since joining the league in 2020 after joining Arizona as an undrafted free agent out of Central Michigan.

Darrel Williams – Played in 51 games in four seasons (2018-21) with Kansas City as an undrafted free agent out of LSU, rushing for 912 yards and 10 TDs on 237 carries and adding 83 receptions for 762 yards and four TDs. Member of Chiefs team that won Super Bowl LIV. Signed with Arizona in the offseason.

TIGHT ENDS

Stephen Anderson – Entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with the Texans and was signed by Arizona this summer after spending the last three seasons with the Chargers.

Zach Ertz – Ten-year NFL veteran, three-time Pro Bowler (2017-19) and first-team All-Pro (2018). His 637 career receptions rank ninth in NFL history among TEs. Was acquired by the Cardinals in a Week 6 trade last season.

Trey McBride – Cardinals 2nd round pick (55th overall) in the 2022 NFL draft out of Colorado State. Winner of the 2021 John Mackey Award as nation's top tight end and named the Mountain West 2021-22 Male Athlete of the Year.

Maxx Williams – Former 2nd round pick by the Ravens in the 2015 NFL Draft, has played in 31 games (24 starts) the past four seasons with Arizona.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Andre Baccellia – Spent last season on the Cardinals practice squad, originally signed with Kansas City as an undrafted rookie.

Marquise Brown– Reunites with college teammate Kyler Murray. Was acquired by the Cardinals in an offseason trade from Baltimore.

Greg Dortch – Originally signed with the Jets as an undrafted rookie free agent in 2019 and has appeared in eight carere NFL games (two starts) for the Panthers (2019) and Cardinals (2021-2022).

A.J. Green – Seven-time Pro Bowl selection (2011-17) and two-time second-team All-Pro honoree (2012-13). First receiver in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl in each of his first seven seasons.

Andy Isabella – Arizona's 2019 second-round pick (62nd overall) out of UMass, was a consensus first-team All-American as a senior.

Rondale Moore – Selected by the Cardinals in the secondround (49th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft out of Purdue. Last season finished sixth among NFL rookies with 973 allpurpose yards.


