THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals host their final regular season game of the season at State Farm Stadium on Saturday when they take on the San Francisco 49ers. It won't be the final regular season NFL game played at the venue, however, as the Niners will host Seattle at State Farm Stadium in Week 17 in San Francisco's 2020 "home" finale.

Since early December San Francisco has made the Valley - and State Farm Stadium - its temporary home due to restrictions on contact sports in Santa Clara County. The 49ers have played their last two "home" games at State Farm Stadium (Week 13 vs. Buf; Week 14 vs. Was).

Saturday's matchup between the teams will be the first NFL game to air exclusively on a national basis on Amazon Prime Video, Twitch and Amazon's various other platforms. It will also be televised in the home markets of both teams, including on FOX-10 (KSAZ) in Phoenix.

The Cardinals last played a Saturday game on Christmas Eve at Seattle in 2016 when they defeated the Seahawks 34-31. Arizona has a 3-1 record in Saturday games dating back to 2005. Three of those contests were held on Christmas Eve and one - a home win vs. Dallas in 2010 - was held on Christmas Day.

The 2020 season marks just the second time in franchise history (2016) that Arizona will have played a game on Monday (Week 6 at Dallas), Thursday (Week 11 at Sea), Saturday (Week 16 vs. SF) and Sunday in the same season.

In the 19 seasons Arizona and San Francisco have been division rivals (2002-20), the 49ers hold a slight 19-18 advantage in the series. Arizona had taken eight in a row in the series between the two teams before San Francisco won both games in 2019. The Cardinals ended the 49ers winning streak at two games as they defeated San Francisco 24-20 in Week 1 at Levi's Stadium.

Arizona enters this week's game looking to earn its fifth season sweep of the Niners in the last six years. That won't be an easy task as the Cardinals face a resilient 49ers team that - though eliminated from postseason contention with a loss in Dallas last week - will be looking to make Arizona's path to a postseason berth much more difficult.

When the teams met in Week 1, Arizona earned a 24-20 come-from-behind victory at Levi's Stadium. The Cardinals trailed 10-0 in the first quarter and - after taking a 17-13 lead early in the fourth - had to come back again following a 49ers TD. Arizona drove 75 yards in nine plays and scored the game-winning TD with just over five minutes remaining.

Both the Cardinals and 49ers are wrapping up the regular season with a pair of division games. After taking on the Niners on Saturday, Arizona heads west for a crucial Week 17 matchup with the Rams. San Francisco will stay in Arizona to host the Seahawks at State Farm Stadium.

#SFvsAZ - WEEK 16 HIGHLIGHTS

- On Monday three Cardinals players - S **Budda Baker**, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** and QB **Kyler Murray** - were named to the Pro Bowl.
- QB Kyler Murray has become the first player in NFL history to have 7,000+ passing yards, 45+ passing TDs and 15+ rushing TDs in his first two NFL seasons.**
- Murray posted a 75.0 completion percentage and a 127.8 passer rating last week vs. Philly. It marked his fourth career game with a completion percentage of 75% or higher and fourth outing with a passer rating of 125.0 or higher.
- WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has 103 receptions for 1,324 yards and six TDs in 2020. **He leads the NFL in receiving yards and ranks second in receptions. His seven games with 100+ receiving yards are tied for the most in the NFL.**
- LB **Haason Reddick** has five forced fumbles in the last two games. He is the first NFL player to have at least five forced fumbles in a two-game span since Pittsburgh's James Harrison (5 in Games 8-9) in 2007.
- DL **Zach Allen** had 11 tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss, a QB hit and a pass defended last week vs. Philly. According to *ProFootballReference.com*, **he joined New England's Willie McGinest - who accomplished the feat exactly 17 years prior (12/20/03 at NY Jets) - as the only NFL defensive lineman ever to have at least 11 tackles, a sack and a pass defended in a game.**

Cardinals P **Andy Lee** played the first 11 years (2004-14) of his NFL career with the 49ers. He played 11 seasons with the 49ers and appeared in 176 games, setting franchise records for punts (941), punting yards (43,468), gross average (46.2), net average (39.5) and punts inside the 20 (300).

Cardinals Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator **Jeff Rodgers** was the 49ers special teams quality control coach (2003-04) and assistant special teams coach (2005-07).

Cardinals Defensive Coordinator **Vance Joseph** was the asst. DBs coach (2005) and DBs coach (2006-10) for the 49ers.

Cardinals D-Line coach **Brentson Buckner** played DT for the 49ers from 1998-00.

Cardinals LBs coach **Bill Davis** was the 49ers defensive coordinator from 2005-06.

Cardinals Offensive Quality Control coach **Jim Dray** played TE for the 49ers in 2016. Dray was an All Pac-12 tight end at Stanford, where he appeared in 39 games and posted 41 receptions for 455 yards and seven TDs in four seasons (2006-09).

Cardinals Offensive Assistant **Jerry Sullivan** was the 49ers WRs coach from 2005-10.

Cardinals Assistant Special Teams coach **Derius Swinton III** was the Special Teams Coordinator for the 49ers in 2016.

CARDS VS. 49ERS - SERIES BREAKDOWN

The Cardinals and 49ers meet for the 59th time in a series that dates back to 1951. This game will mark the 38th meeting between the two teams since division realignment in 2002.

Arizona had taken eight in a row in the series between the two teams before San Francisco won both games in 2019. The Cardinals ended the 49ers winning streak at two games as they defeated San Francisco 24-20 in Week 1 at Levi's Stadium.

Arizona enters this week's game looking to earn its fifth season sweep of the Niners in the last six years. The Cardinals have won the season series nine times, the 49ers have won the series six times and they have split three times.

Arizona holds a 14-13 record at home vs. San Francisco, including an 8-6 record at State Farm Stadium. The Cardinals are 5-1 in the last six games in which they have hosted the 49ers.

FITZGERALD'S CAREER VS. THE NINERS

WR **Larry Fitzgerald** has played more than two full seasons worth of games against the 49ers in his career. Those 33 games resulted in some impressive numbers - ones that rank among the best in NFL history for a player against a single opponent.

In 33 games vs. the division rival, Fitzgerald has 186 receptions for 2,415 yards and 19 TDs. *He has more receptions, receiving yards and TD receptions against San Francisco than any other player in NFL history.*

Fitzgerald has more receiving yards against the 49ers (2,415) than any other active player has against any opponent. Only Jerry Rice (2,731 vs. Atlanta; 2,551 vs. LA Rams) has more receiving yards against any single opponent.

Jerry Rice (25 vs. Falcons; 20 vs. Rams) is the only player in NFL history who has more career receiving TDs vs. a single opponent than Fitzgerald has against the 49ers (19).

Fitzgerald has at least one TD catch against San Francisco in each of the last five seasons.

HOPKINS' RECORD-BREAKING DEBUT

Making his Cardinals debut, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** established a career-high with 14 receptions against the 49ers in Week 1, finishing with 151 receiving yards.

Hopkins' 14 receptions were the most in team history in a season-opener and tied for the second-highest single-game total in franchise history.

A DUAL "HOME" GAME AT STATE FARM STADIUM

A SUCCESSFUL TRACK RECORD VS. THE 49ERS

*In three career games against the 49ers, second-year QB **Kyler Murray** has completed 67-of-97 pass attempts (69.1%) for 621 yards, 5 TDs, 1 INT and a 99.2 passer rating. He has also added 192 rushing yards and 2 TDs on 26 rush attempts (7.4 avg.).*

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE FIRST MATCHUP OF 2020

In the Week 1 matchup earlier this season, Murray threw for 230 yards and a TD and also rushed for 91 yards and a TD in leading the Cardinals over the 49ers at Levi's Stadium.



It was one of just four games in franchise history in which a QB passed for 200+ yards and rushed for 90+ yards. Murray is responsible for three of those performances this season.

In leading the Cardinals to a come-from-behind victory over the 49ers earlier this season, Murray completed 11-of-16 pass attempts for 112 yards and rushed for 81 yards and a TD on 10 carries in the second half.

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

WR Larry Fitzgerald

- With a reception Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 256 consecutive games, extending the second-longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274).
- With 2 receptions Fitzgerald would reach 50 catches for the 17th consecutive season, the longest streak in NFL history. Tony Gonzalez (16; 1998-2013) and Fitzgerald are currently tied for the longest streak in league history.
- With a TD reception Fitzgerald would join Jerry Rice (25 vs. Falcons; 20 vs. Rams) as the only players in NFL history with at least 20 TD catches against a single opponent.

THREE CARDINALS NAMED TO PRO BOWL

On Monday, Cardinals S **Budda Baker** and WR **DeAndre Hopkins** were selected as starters for the NFC squad at the 2021 Pro Bowl while **Kyler Murray** was one of three QBs named to the NFC team joining Aaron Rodgers and Russell Wilson.

Under this year's Pro Bowl format, there are no alternates. Below are notes on Baker, Hopkins and Murray:

S BUDDA BAKER



- Baker was selected to his third Pro Bowl, including his second in a row at safety. He earned Pro Bowl honors as a special teamer as a rookie in 2017.

- Baker (3) and CB Patrick Peterson (4) are the only players in Cardinals history to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections before their 25th birthday.

- Baker (2) now joins Larry Wilson (8), Adrian Wilson (5), Jerry Norton (3) and Tim McDonald (3) as the only Cardinals selected to multiple Pro Bowls at safety. He joins Larry Wilson (2) as the only Cardinals safeties named to multiple Pro Bowls in their first four seasons.

- Through 14 games in 2020, Baker has recorded 104 tackles (79 solo), 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs, 6 tackles for loss, 3 QB hits 4 passes defended and a forced fumble.

- Baker has become just the seventh Cardinals player to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections in their first four seasons: HB Ollie Matson (4), CB Patrick Peterson (4), S Justin Bethel (3), G Bill Fischer (3), WR Sonny Randle (3) and FB Ron Wolfley (3).

WR DEANDRE HOPKINS



- Hopkins was selected to his fifth Pro Bowl and fourth in a row. He joins Davante Adams, Keenan Allen and Tyreek Hill as the four receivers selected to the Pro Bowl in each of the last four seasons.

- Hopkins has 103 receptions for 1,324 yards and 6 TDs in 2020. He leads the NFL in receiving yards and is tied for the NFL lead with seven games of 100+ receiving yards while his 103 catches rank second in the NFL behind only Buffalo's Stefon Diggs (111). He is currently on pace for a franchise single-season record 117 receptions in 2020, which would also set a career-high for the three-time All-Pro.

- With 103 receptions in 2020, Hopkins became the fourth Cardinals player to reach 100 catches in a season. It marks his fourth career 100-catch campaign and third in the last four years. He is one of just nine players in NFL history with at least four seasons of 100+ receptions.

- This is the 16th time that a Cardinals wide receiver has been selected to the Pro Bowl in the past 20 seasons (Fitzgerald-11, Boldin-3, Boston-1).

- Hopkins is the 20th different wide receiver in franchise history to earn a Pro Bowl selection. His selection marks the 39th all-time Pro Bowl nod for a Cardinals wide receiver.

- He joins Amari Cooper (Las Vegas, Dallas) as the only active wide receivers in the NFL to be named to the Pro Bowl in both the NFC and AFC.

QB KYLER MURRAY



- A Pro Bowl alternate as a rookie last year, Murray earns his first Pro Bowl selection this year. He becomes the eighth quarterback in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl and first since Carson Palmer in 2015.

- Murray is the first quarterback in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl within his first two NFL seasons and – at 23 years old – he is the youngest quarterback to earn a Pro Bowl selection for the Cardinals.

- Through 14 games Murray has completed 336-of-497 pass attempts (67.6%) for 3,637 yards and 26 TDs while adding 741 yards and 11 TDs rushing. His 741 rushing yards and 11 rushing TDs are franchise records for a QB.

- With 37 total TDs (passing & rushing) in 2020, Murray set the franchise record for the most total TDs in a season. Only four quarterbacks in the NFL have accounted for more TDs (passing & rushing) than Murray this season: Aaron Rodgers (43), Russell Wilson (38), Patrick Mahomes (38) and Josh Allen (38).

- With 26 passing TDs and 11 rushing TDs in 2020, Murray has become just the second player in NFL history to post 25+ passing TDs and 10+ rushing TDs in a season, joining Cam Newton (35 TD passes; 10 TD runs in 2015).

- With 3,637 passing yards and 741 rushing yards in 2020, Murray is making a run at becoming the first player in NFL history with 4,000+ passing yards and 900+ rushing yards in a single season.

The 2021 Pro Bowl is an all-new virtual Pro Bowl experience within Madden NFL 21. Roster selections are determined by the consensus votes of fans, players and coaches. Each group's vote counts one-third toward determining the 88 All-Star players.

AWARDS KEEP COMING

LB **Haason Reddick** was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Week" for his performance in the Cardinals 26-7 win over the Giants in Week 14.

Against the Giants, Reddick set a franchise single-game record with 5.0 sacks while also finishing the game with five tackles and three forced fumbles. He became the first NFL player with at least 5.0 sacks and three forced fumbles in a game since Green Bay's Vonnie Holliday had 5.0 sacks and three forced fumbles in 2002.

It was Reddick's first career "Defensive Player of the Week" selection and the fifth Cardinals "Player of the Week" award this season, the most the team has had since 2015 (six).



OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - DEANDRE HOPKINS (WEEK 10)

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" following his now-famous 43-yard Hail Mary TD grab over three Bills defenders in the Cardinals 32-30 win vs. Buffalo in Week 10.

It was just the second "Player of the Week" award for Hopkins, who also earned the honor in 2015 (Week 6) with Houston.

In the win over the Bills, Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards, including a 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation. It was Hopkins fourth career game-winning TD catch in the fourth quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.

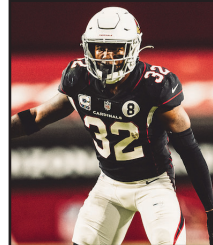


MURRAY AND BAKER CLEAN UP IN OCTOBER

The Cardinals piled up the awards in the month of October. S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October and QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his Week 7 performance vs. Seattle.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award.

It is just the fourth time (2015, Weeks 14-16; 2014, Weeks 8-10; 1998, Weeks 15-17) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.



DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER

Baker was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He played all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.

He was the only player in the NFL with multiple sacks and multiple INTs in October and his 31 tackles ranked second among all NFL DBs.

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5 & 7)

Murray was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5 and vs. the Seahawks in Week 7. With his two "Offensive Player of the Week" selections in 2020, he has now earned the honor three times in his career. He joins Kurt Warner (5x) and Neil Lomax (4x) as the only QBs in team history with at least three "Offensive Player of the Week" selections.

Murray also became the first Cardinals QB to be named "Player of the Week" twice in the same season since Warner in 2009.

WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE: Murray completed a career-high 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

WEEK 5 AT NY JETS: Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

Baker earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defended and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.



A TOP-5 OFFENSE IN 2020

The Cardinals offense piled up 526 total net yards and 33 points in Sunday's win over Philadelphia. Arizona's yardage total was the highest in a game under Kliff Kingsbury and it marked the third time the Cardinals have posted 500+ yards in a game during his 30 games as head coach.

Following yet another highly productive game by the Cardinals offense, Arizona now ranks #3 in the NFL in total offense (399.2 ypg) and is tied for fifth in offensive TDs (47).

OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION AGAINST THE EAGLES

Arizona's 526 total yards against the Eagles last week were the most for the Cardinals in a non-OT game since the team put up 589 yards vs. Philadelphia over 58 years ago (12/16/62).

The Cardinals have posted 500+ total yards and 30+ points in a game twice this season (519 yards & 37 points vs. Seattle in Week 7). The 2020 season marks just the second time in franchise history (2 – 1962) that the Cardinals have had multiple games with 500+ yards and 30+ points in a single season.

Arizona has as many games with 500+ yards and 30+ points in its last eight games this season (2) as it did the previous 23 seasons combined (2 from 1997-2019).



The Cardinals averaged 7.7 yards per play against the Eagles last Sunday. Prior to last week's game, the last time the Cardinals had a game in which they had 500+ yards of offense and averaged at least 7.7 yards per play was on 12/16/62 vs. Philadelphia (589 yards; 7.8 ypp).

PILING UP 400+ YARDS OFTEN UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have put up 400+ net yards in a game 12 times under head coach Kliff Kingsbury - including in eight games this season. Arizona had 400+ yards just once in 32 games over the two seasons combined (2017-18) prior to his arrival.

Only Kansas City (10) has put up 400+ yards in a game more times than Arizona (8) this season.

A RARE NINE IN A ROW WITH 100+ RUSHING YARDS

Arizona has rushed for 100+ yards in 12 of 14 games this season and started the year with 100+ rushing yards in each of the first nine games. **The 2020 season marked just the second time (1984) in the last 60 years (1961-20) that the Cardinals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first nine games of a season.**

RUNNING FOR 150 & 200 UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have rushed for 150+ yards in 12 of 30 games under Kingsbury. Arizona had seven such games in the three seasons (2016-18) prior to his arrival. The Cardinals are 10-2 when rushing for 150+ yards over the last two seasons.

Arizona has rushed for 200+ yards in a game five times under Kingsbury, including twice this season. The Cardinals had 200+ rushing yards in a game just five times in the previous 15 seasons combined (2004-18) prior to Kingsbury's arrival.

ALLEN'S CAREER GAME & OTHER WEEK 15 HIGHLIGHTS

ALLEN'S EXTREMELY RARE PERFORMANCE

Second-year DL Zach Allen had 11 tackles, a sack, a tackle for loss, a QB hit and a pass defended vs. Philadelphia. **According to ProFootballReference.com, he joined New England's Willie McGinest - who accomplished the feat exactly 17 years prior (12/20/03 at NY Jets) - as the only NFL defensive lineman ever to have at least 11 tackles, a sack and a pass defended in a game.**



Allen became the first Cardinals D-lineman to record at least 11 tackles in a game since Calais Campbell (11) on 10/4/15 vs. St. Louis.

ARIZONA ALREADY AT 8 WINS IN 2020

With the victory last week vs. Philly, **Arizona improved to 8-6 in 2020 and has now matched its win total from the previous two seasons (2018-19) combined (8).**

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY

In last week's win over the Eagles the Cardinals had a -3 turnover margin. Entering the game Arizona had a 2-40 record when it had a turnover margin of -3 or greater in the last 20 years (2001-20). The Cardinals had lost 14 of the last 15 such contests and hadn't won since 2016 vs. San Francisco (-3).

Dating back to 1940 the Cardinals have had a turnover differential of -3 or worse in a game 201 times. Last week's game was just the 10th win during that span. The win over Philadelphia also marks the first time in team history the Cardinals had a turnover differential of -3 or worse with a point differential of +7 or higher.

PERFECT AGAINST THE NFC EAST IN 2020

With the win over Philadelphia the Cardinals posted a perfect 4-0 record against the NFC East in 2020.

It marks just the second time (2014) since leaving the division in 2002 that Arizona swept the NFC East. In the four games the Cardinals outscored NFC East opponents 127-58.

HOPKINS CONTINUES RECORD-SETTING DEBUT SEASON IN AZ

Pro Bowl WR **DeAndre Hopkins** has been as good as advertised in his first season with the Cardinals, who acquired the three-time 1st-team All-Pro in the offseason in a trade with Houston.

HOPKINS GUNNING FOR THE TOP SPOT

Although he has never led the NFL in receptions or receiving yards in a season, Hopkins finished second in the NFL in receiving yards (1,572) in 2018 and has twice finished third in receptions (115 in 2018; 111 in 2015).

-He led the AFC in receptions in 2018 (115) and tied for the AFC lead in 2019 (104).

With his 169-yard outing against the Eagles last week, **Hopkins** has an NFL-high 1,324 receiving yards in 2020 which has him on pace to become just the fourth player in franchise history to reach 1,500 receiving yards in a season.

Hopkins is currently on pace to finish the year with 1,513 receiving yards which would rank as the fourth-best single-season total in franchise history.

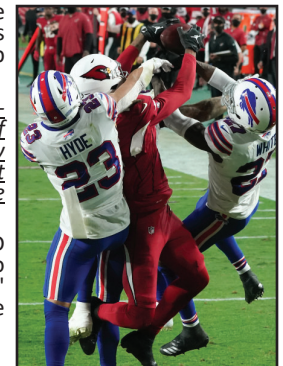

"HAIL MURRAY" NOT THE ONLY GAME-WINNER

Hopkins provided what remains perhaps the most exciting play of the 2020 season with his game-winning 43-yard "Hail Murray" TD grab against the Buffalo Bills in Week 10.

Last week against Philadelphia, Hopkins posted his second game-winning TD reception of the season. With the game tied at 26 midway through the fourth quarter, QB Kyler Murray hit Hopkins on a 20-yard TD pass on 3rd-n-2 to give the Cardinals the lead for good.

Hopkins now has five career game-winning TD receptions in the 4th quarter/OT - including two in his last six games this season. His "Hail Murray" grab against the Bills was the only one to come with under a minute left on the clock.

HOPKINS BRINGS IT DOWN IN SPECTACULAR FASHION

Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards in the victory over the Bills, *including the 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation in which he out-jumped three Buffalo defenders to come down with the ball.*

Hopkins' 43-yard game-winner against the Bills was the first go-ahead Hail Mary in the 4th quarter since 12/3/15 when Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers threw a game-winning 61-yard TD to TE Richard Rodgers as time expired to give the Packers a 27-23 victory over Detroit.

It also marked the first time the Cardinals won a game on a TD pass on the final scrimmage play of regulation since Josh McCown's 28-yard TD pass to WR Nate Poole as time expired on 12/29/03 vs. Minnesota. That TD gave the Cards an 18-17 win and knocked the Vikings out of postseason contention on the final day of the regular season.

THE YOUNGEST EVER TO 700 CATCHES

After catching five passes in Week 11 against Seattle, **Hopkins** surpassed 700 career receptions. **At 28 years, 166 days old, Hopkins became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career receptions. The previous record was held by Larry Fitzgerald, who hit 700 catches in Week 3 of the 2012 season when he was 29 years, 23 days old.**

He has as many QB hits in 2020 (15) as he had in his first three NFL seasons combined (15).

After posting a season-high 8.0 sacks against the Giants in Week 14, Arizona's defense was back at it last week against the Eagles as they recorded 6.0 sacks of Philly rookie QB Jalen Hurts. The Cardinals now have 43.0 sacks in 2020, tied with Tampa Bay for fourth in the NFL and just four shy of NFL-leading Pittsburgh.

After never playing a snap on defense in his first 34 career games, Gardeck now has 7.0 sacks in the last 11 games, including 5.0 sacks in his last three games.

Despite playing a career-high 24 snaps on defense last week vs. the Eagles, Gardeck has played just 93 defensive snaps this season. He has recorded his 7.0 sacks in four games (2 @ NYJ; 1 vs. LAR; 2 @ NYG; 2 vs. PHI) in which he played a combined 45 plays on defense.

A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

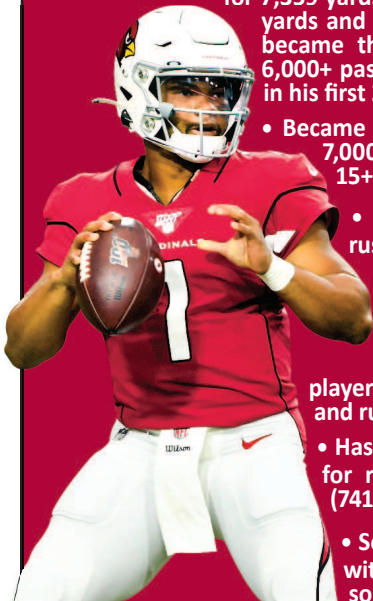
Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

2018 UNDRAFTED CLASS CONTINUES TO PRODUCE

TURNER MAKES A PAIR OF IMPACT PLAYS ON SPECIAL TEAMS

Third-year LB **Ezekiel Turner** made huge impact on last Sunday's game. The special teams standout recorded his second blocked punt of the season, his first career reception on a fake punt and also added a special teams tackle.

With the Cardinals leading 9-0 late in the first quarter, Philadelphia was forced to punt from its own 42-yard line when Turner broke through and blocked a Cameron Johnston punt attempt. The ball traveled all the way back to the Eagles six-yard line before going out of bounds. Two plays later QB Kyler Murray hit RB Chase Edmonds on a six-yard TD pass to give Arizona a 16-0 lead.



In the fourth quarter, with a Cardinals drive stalled at their own 33-yard line and the game tied at 26, Arizona ran a fake punt as P Andy Lee took the snap and completed a 26-yard pass to Turner on 4th-n-2. It was the first reception for Turner since his days as a RB at Glen Burie (MD) High School.

2018 UNDRAFTED CLASS - THE HIGHLIGHTS

Three players on the Cardinals roster joined the team as undrafted rookies in 2018: LBs **Dennis Gardeck** and **Ezekiel Turner** and WR **Trent Sherfield**. In last Sunday's game vs. Philadelphia, the trio combined for three defensive tackles, 2.0 sacks, a blocked punt, a 26-yard reception on a fake punt and three special teams tackles.

Over the last three games, the trio has combined for six defensive tackles, 5.0 sacks, a defensive fumble recovery, five tackles for loss, two special teams fumble recoveries, a blocked punt and seven special teams tackles.

The three have been highly productive for the Cardinals, especially in their roles as special teamers:

Turner: A PFWA All-Rookie selection on special teams in 2018, according to official league statistics Turner is tied for the NFL lead in special teams tackles (33) over the last three seasons (Pats S Justin Bethel). Turner has blocked two punts this season (at SF in Week 1; vs. Phi in Week 15).

Gardeck: A special teams Pro Bowl alternate in 2019, Gardeck has recorded 11 tackles, 7.0 sacks, 7 tackles for loss, a fumble recovery and 10 QB hits on defense. On special teams, he has 27 tackles, a fumble recovery, 3 punt deflections and a TD on a blocked punt in his three NFL seasons.

Sherfield: In addition to his 24 receptions for 296 yards and a TD on offense, Sherfield has recorded 17 tackles and three fumble recoveries on special teams during his career. He has a career-high 8 special teams tackles and two fumble recoveries in 2020.

AMONG THE BEST IN OVERTIME

In defeating the Seahawks in OT on Sunday Night Football in Week 7, the Cardinals earned their 27th all-time OT victory. In NFL history, only Denver (28) has more OT wins than Arizona (27).

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, Pro Bowl S **Budda Baker** is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a game-high 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defended in the win over Seattle. It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90 yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defended, 2 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6). The performance earned him NFC "Defensive Player of the Month" honors for October.

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker had an INT in back-to-back games in Weeks 6-7. He tallied his first career INT off Cowboys QB Andy Dalton on Monday Night Football in Week 6. Prior to that two-game stretch, the last time Baker had an INT in consecutive games was in his sophomore year at the University of Washington in 2015 when he had an INT at Stanford (10/24) and vs. Arizona (10/31).

ARNOLD A MAJOR WEAPON AT TIGHT END

TE **Dan Arnold** caught three passes for 54 against the Eagles last week. It marked the third time in the last eight games he has posted 50+ receiving yards.

Over the last three games Arnold has seven receptions for 141 yards, with three of those catches resulting in TDs. He had his first career multi-TD performance in Week 13 vs. the Rams.

After going without a TD catch in the first nine games this season, Arnold now has four TD receptions in his last five games.

With two games remaining, Arnold has 25 receptions for 367 yards and four TDs in 2020. He is the first Cardinals TE to have 300+ receiving yards and 4+ TDs in a season since both Rob Awalt (454 & 4) and Jay Novacek (569 & 4) both did so in 1988.

Claimed off waivers by the Cardinals in December of last season, Arnold has played in 17 games with Arizona and has 31 receptions for 469 yards (15.1 avg.) and six TDs.

A LONG DISTANCE TD VS. THE RAMS

Arnold hauled in two TD catches against the Rams in Week 13, including a 59-yard TD reception in the first quarter. It was the longest TD catch by a Cardinals TE since Hall of Famer Jackie Smith had a 68-yarder from Gary Cuozzo on 11/12/72 at Dallas. In two games vs. the Rams since coming to Arizona last season, Arnold has six receptions for 137 yards (22.8 avg.) and three TDs.

• In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

• Selected to a franchise-record 11 Pro Bowls, joining Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice (13) as the only WRs in NFL history selected to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times. Among active players only Tom Brady (14) has earned more Pro Bowl selections than Fitzgerald.

• His streak of 255 consecutive games with a reception is the second-longest in NFL history. Has a catch in 261 of 262 career games played.

• His 1,426 career receptions are the most for any player in NFL history with a single team, surpassing the previous record held by Rice (1,281 with SF).

• Named a co-winner (along with QB Eli Manning) of the 2016 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

• At #69 on the NFL Networks Top-100 Players of 2020, has now made the All-100 Team in all 10 years of its existence. He is the only non-QB to accomplish that feat.

• The 2019 season marked the 13th time in 16 seasons he led the Cards in receiving yards. In NFL history, only Jerry Rice (15 times) led his team in receiving yards more times.

• Has caught at least one pass in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career and has at least one TD reception in 27 different stadiums.

• In February of 2018, joined PGA pro Kevin Streelman in winning the Pebble Beach Pro-Am golf tournament. Became the first African-American amateur to win the event – which dates back to 1937 – and the first professional athlete to win the title since Dan Marino in 1988.

In the 2019 season-opener against the Lions, Fitzgerald appeared in his 235th career game, establishing a new franchise record for career games played. He surpassed the previous record for games played held by former K Jim Bakken (234).

With three receptions for 35 yards and a TD in the Cardinals Week 15 win over Philadelphia, Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 255 consecutive games played. That is the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Jerry Rice (274 straight).

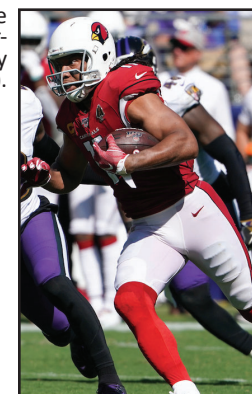

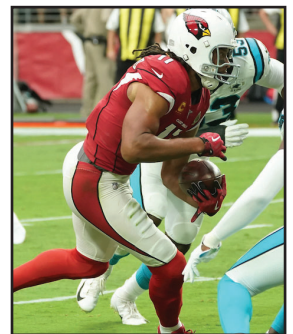
Fitzgerald caught a 14-yard TD reception to cap the Cardinals second quarter scoring drive in the Week 15 win over the Eagles.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,426), receiving yards (17,464), receiving TDs (121), total TDs (121) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 121 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.

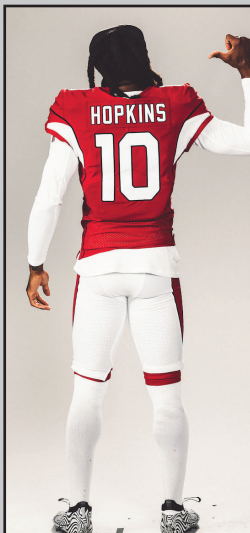

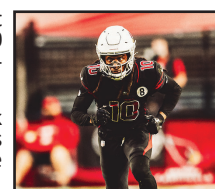


ANOTHER 1,000-YARD CAMPAIGN

With 52 yards on eight receptions in Week 13 against the Rams, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** surpassed 1,000 receiving yards on the season, marking his sixth career 1,000-yard campaign and fourth in a row.

Hopkins has the NFL's second-longest active streak of 1,000-yard seasons, trailing only Chiefs TE Travis Kelce who has reached the milestone in each of the last five seasons (2016-20).

Hopkins is the 14th different player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in a season and the first since WR Larry Fitzgerald had 1,156 yards on a franchise-record 109 receptions in 2017. He became the second player in franchise history to reach 1,000 receiving yards in his debut season with the team (Anquan Boldin as a rookie in 2003).



P2 IN YEAR #10

- Six-time team captain (2013, 2015-18, 2020) has totaled 480 tackles, 28 INTs (one returned for a TD) and 115 passes defended in 152 games (all starts) during his first 10 NFL seasons. Only five players in Cardinals history – including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees – have had more INTs than Peterson (28).
- Started all 128 games during his first eight NFL seasons, becoming the first Cardinal since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to start 100+ straight games to begin a career.
- In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.
- Voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons – seven times at CB (2012-18) and once as a kick returner (2011). Joined Hall of Famers Jim Brown and Barry Sanders as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to eight Pro Bowls before their 29th birthday.
- Peterson is the only player in team history selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons, and his eight consecutive Pro Bowl selections are a franchise record.
- Earned first-team All-Pro honors three times with two selections at CB (2013, 2015) and one as a kick returner (2011).
- Named NFC Defensive Player of the Week three times (Week 15, 2019; Week 10, 2014; Week 4, 2013), NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice (Week 9, 2011; Week 12, 2011) and Special Teams Player of the Month once (November 2011).



CARDS HAVE A TACKLING MACHINE IN HICKS

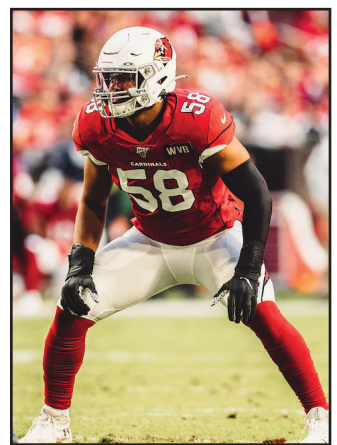
LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in 2019 after four years with the Eagles – put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

Hicks had a career-high 150 tackles (third in the NFL) to go along with 1.5 sacks, 11 tackles for loss, three INTs, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 2019.

Since the start of last season, Hicks ranks sixth in the NFL with 257 total tackles.

KIRKPATRICK HAS THREE PICKS FOR THE CARDS

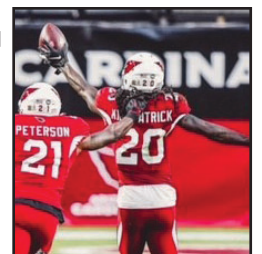
Through 13 games with the Cardinals, CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** has a three INTs, matching a single-season career best that he posted in 2013, '14 and '16. Most recently, he intercepted a Cam Newton pass near midfield with 4:37 remaining in Week 12 against New England.

Prior to 2020, Kirkpatrick had four total INTs in his previous five seasons (2015-19) combined, and his INT of Cam Newton was his third in a five-game stretch.

His first pick as a Cardinal came against his former Bengals teammate, QB Andy Dalton, in the Monday Night Football win over Dallas in Week 6. It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. Among active players, only New England CB Devin McCourty (5 in 12 games) has more INTs while playing on MNF.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona, which was played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, and the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB **Carson Palmer** from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of making meaningful change a reality in the United States.

OL Kelvin Beachum - 11/20/20

OL **Kelvin Beachum** participated in an NFL-produced video "Say Their Stories" and discussed Breonna Taylor specifically:

"Saying her name is not just a slogan that we're putting on the back of our helmets. It's more than that. It's a rallying cry for Black women all across America, to realize how special she is and how special she was."

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another, and we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."

OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

\$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

- St. Mary’s Food Bank
- St. Vincent DePaul
- United Food Bank
- Phoenix Rescue Mission
- Midwest Food Bank

ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago.
