THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

Looking for their fourth consecutive win over the Buccaneers, the Cardinals head to Tampa Bay this week for a showdown with the Bucs and former head coach Bruce Arians, who is in his first season at the helm in Tampa.

This week's matchup between the Cardinals and Buccaneers is the 21st all-time meeting in a series that dates back to 1977. Arizona holds an 11-9 advantage over Tampa Bay and is looking for its sixth-ever road win over the Buccaneers. The Cardinals earned a victory in their last visit to Raymond James Stadium when they took down the Bucs 13-10 in 2013. That game marked the first road win of Arians' tenure with the Cardinals.

Sunday's game will mark the third meeting between Arizona and Tampa Bay in the last four seasons. The teams last met at State Farm Stadium in 2017 when the Cardinals earned a 38-33 victory.

Cardinals QB Kyler Murray heads to Tampa looking for his fourth career victory and can become the first rookie QB in franchise history with three road wins in a season. Murray is coming off one of the best games of his young career against the NFL's #1 ranked defense last week. He threw for 241 yards and a pair of TDs while posting a career-best 130.7 passer rating against a San Francisco defense that had held the previous four QBs it faced to a combined 48.6 passer rating.

One of the weapons at Murray's disposal this week - 11-time Pro Bowl WR Larry Fitzgerald - has had significant success against Tampa Bay during his Hall of Fame bound career. In six career games against the Buccaneers, Fitzgerald has 34 receptions for 486 yards and five TDs. All five of those TDs have come in the last four meetings.

Following a spectacular Arizona debut vs. San Francisco, recently acquired RB Kenyan Drake heads back to the Sunshine State this week. Drake joined the Cardinals on October 28 following a trade with Miami, and on Sunday will be playing his fifth game in the state of Florida this season. Further bolstering the Arizona backfield is the return of All-Pro RB David Johnson - who is expected to be back in the lineup after missing the last two games due to injury.

Protecting the ball - a strength for the Cardinals offense this season - will be an important factor on Sunday. Arizona has committed an NFL-low four turnovers this season and enters the contest with a streak of five straight games without a turnover. However, the Buccaneers defense - led by former Cards defensive coordinator Todd Bowles - ranks in the top-10 with 13 total takeaways so far this season. In fact, nearly 30 percent of Tampa's 230 points this season have come as a result of takeaways. Only three teams in the NFL have more points off takeaways than Tampa Bay (67) in 2019.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- The Cardinals travel to Tampa Bay this week as they square off against former head coach **Bruce Arians** for the first time. Arians left Arizona following the 2017 season with more wins (50) than any head coach in franchise history.
- Sunday's game marks the Cardinals third visit to Raymond James Stadium in the last 12 seasons. Arizona defeated Tampa at the venue in 2013 and prior to that faced the Steelers in Super Bowl XLIII at Raymond James Stadium at the conclusion of the 2008 season.
- WR **Larry Fitzgerald** has five career TD catches against the Buccaneers, all of which have come in his last four games against the team. Fitzgerald has had at least one TD catch in each of the last four games vs. Tampa Bay.
- QB **Kyler Murray** enters Sunday's game with an active streak of 172 consecutive pass attempts without an INT. That is the NFL's longest active streak.
- Murray ('18 Heisman; 1st overall in '19) and Bucs QB **Jameis Winston** ('13 Heisman; 1st overall in '15) are two of nine Heisman Trophy winners active in the NFL. They are among the 22 all-time players who won the Heisman Trophy and were selected #1 overall in the NFL Draft.
- Arizona has committed an NFL-low four turnovers in 2019, which also represents the lowest total in franchise history through the first nine games of a season. Dating back to 1940, the Cardinals are the only NFL team to not lose a fumble in their first nine games.
- Just 72 hours after being acquired by Arizona in a trade with Miami, RB **Kenyan Drake** had one of the most productive games of his career in the Cardinals TNF matchup vs. San Francisco last week. Drake finished the game with 110 rushing yards and a TD on 15 carries (7.3-yard avg.) and 52 yards on four receptions.
- The Cardinals had three scoring drives in the second half vs. SF last week that covered at least 80 yards (85, 88 and 90). In their first seven games, the 49ers defense allowed just one scoring drive that covered 80+ yards.

THE LIFE OF MR. B



William V. (Bill) Bidwill passed away on October 2 at the age of 88.

"Our dad passed away the same way he lived his life: peacefully, with grace, dignity and surrounded by family and loved ones," said Cardinals Chairman and President **Michael Bidwill**. "Above all else, we will remember him as a man devoted to the three central pillars of his life – his immense faith, his love for his family and his life-long passion for the Cardinals and the sport of football."

Born on July 31, 1931 in Chicago, he is the son of Charles and Violet Bidwill. His father purchased the Chicago Cardinals of the NFL in 1932, starting Bill's life-long association with the team which spanned eight decades and started as a ball boy when he was a child. A two-sport athlete playing football and baseball at Georgetown Prep outside of Washington, DC, Bidwill received the school's highest honor, the Insignis Medal, in 1990 and was selected to the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2017.

After earning his undergraduate degree from Georgetown University, Bidwill proudly served in the United States Navy before taking on a full-time role with the team in 1960. That same year he married Nancy, his wife of more than 56 years until her passing in 2016 and had five children: daughter Nicole and sons Bill Jr., Michael, Patrick and Timothy. While well-known for his understated nature and a preference for staying out of the spotlight, "Mr. B" was recognized often for his contributions and accomplishments as Cardinals owner.

In 2017, he was enshrined in the Arizona Sports Hall of Fame which honors those who have made significant contributions to state's athletics community. In 2010, Bidwill was inducted into the Sports Faith Hall of Fame in Lake Forest, IL. At its December 2010 commencement exercises, Northern Arizona University awarded Bidwill an honorary doctor of humane letters degree for "his contributions to the university, his community and his profession."

In addition to his five children, 10 grandchildren and one great-grandchild, Bidwill is survived by his brother Charles (Stormy).

A LEADER IN DIVERSITY



Bidwill was at the forefront of diversity in hiring practices, which was evidenced by the hiring of the NFL's first African American female executive (Adele Harris), first African American contract negotiator (Bob Wallace) and first African American head coach/GM tandem (Dennis Green and Rod Graves). In 2015, the team established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship to increase diversity and provide opportunities to gain NFL coaching experience.

"He didn't care about the color of your skin, race or gender if he felt like you could do the job to the best of your ability to help us become better than you were the right person for it," **Larry Fitzgerald** said.

At the 2010 annual NFL Combine in Indianapolis, Bidwill was honored with the Paul "Tank" Younger Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance, whose purpose is to promote diversity and equality of job opportunity in the NFL.

ANOTHER SIGNIFICANT WIN IN CINCINNATI



Arizona's Week 5 victory in Cincinnati was the first game following the passing of team owner **Bill Bidwill** the previous Wednesday (10/2). Bill's father, Charles, purchased the team in 1932 and the first season the Cardinals played under Bidwill ownership was in 1933.

The first victory for the Cards during that 1933 season – which came on October 8th – was a 3-0 win in Cincinnati against the Reds.

On Tuesday (10/8/19) – exactly 86 years after that 1933 victory over the Reds – funeral services were held to honor the life of Bill Bidwill.

"It has been an emotional week," Chairman and President **Michael Bidwill** said after the victory over the Bengals. "The coaches and players all told me they were going to win it for (Bill Bidwill). It is great to get the win."

AN UNHERALDED COMMUNITY CHAMPION



Bidwill's devotion to the Cardinals and the game of football was matched by his passion for giving back to the community and supporting charitable causes, though he never sought recognition for his consistent and generous donations.

"He valued love, and loyalty and life. All of that came together to manifest itself in his giving," former Cardinals Pro Bowl fullback **Ron Wolfley** said. "The way that he would give millions and millions of dollars and nobody knew what he was giving so much of the time. He didn't sound the trumpet to let people know what he was doing."

Fitzgerald was inspired by Bidwill's work in the community without seeking the spotlight.

"The thing I really cherished about him was his selflessness and commitment to the community," WR **Larry Fitzgerald** said. "It was something he was passionate about and he wanted zero fanfare, and I always respected that about him."

STATEMENTS REGARDING THE PASSING OF ARIZONA CARDINALS OWNER BILL BIDWILL

CARDINALS WIDE RECEIVER LARRY FITZGERALD:

"The NFL family lost a pioneer today. Bill Bidwill loved the Arizona Cardinals and the great State of Arizona. He paved the way for so many by being on the forefront of giving minorities the opportunity to thrive as coaches and executives in the NFL. He was also a man of quiet generosity giving of his time and resources to make lives better."



NFL COMMISSIONER ROGER GOODELL: "Bill Bidwill was part of the NFL family his entire life, starting from his days as a ball boy through his time as an owner. Although never one to seek the spotlight, Bill had an incredible sense of humor and he made extraordinary contributions to the NFL. Bill's vision brought the Cardinals, the NFL and multiple Super Bowls to Arizona. He was a leader in embracing diversity and employed the first African American female executive, and the first African American general manager and head coach tandem."

PATRIOTS CHAIRMAN AND CEO ROBERT KRAFT: "Bill Bidwill was one of the first owners to reach out to me and welcome me into the league when I bought the Patriots in 1994. He was one of the longest-tenured owners in the league and I always appreciated his historical perspective and his love of the game. When it came to the game of football and the NFL, we were mostly like-minded and aligned. The only thing more important to him than his beloved Cardinals was his family and I know how proud he was of his children."

COWBOYS OWNER, PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER JERRY JONES:

"I always viewed Bill as a man who, through his father and his literally growing up with the NFL, was an extension of the founding fathers of the NFL. His leadership and influence contributed greatly to bridging the gap between what the earliest years of our professional game looked like and the growth and massive popularity of what it has become. He had a unique perspective of where the game began and where he thought it needed to go. I enjoyed him as a competitor and a colleague, and regardless of the circumstance, he had a unique gift of humor that not everyone knew about."

GIANTS PRESIDENT AND CEO JOHN MARA: "Bill Bidwill was one of the most important owners in the history of the National Football League. He was a kind and decent man who loved his team and the League. He leaves behind a wonderful family. Bill was someone I greatly admired and respected. I was proud to call him a friend."

BEARS CHAIRMAN GEORGE H. McCASKEY: "One of our family's proudest associations in the NFL is with the Bidwill family. It goes back three generations, and at the heart of it is Bill Bidwill. His sacrifices on behalf of our great game are not properly documented, nor properly appreciated. He was a gracious man, a raconteur, and a great friend."

CARDS FACE FORMER HEAD COACH

The Cardinals will face their former head coach for the first time this week when they travel to Tampa Bay to take on the Buccaneers.

Bruce Arians - who served as head coach in Arizona from 2013-17 - is in his first season at the helm in Tampa Bay in 2019.

Arians had a record-setting run as the Cardinals head coach. The team won more games (50) than in any other five-year span in franchise history.

Arians announced his retirement following the 2017 season and left as the winningest head coach in team history. The Cardinals victory over Seattle in the '17 finale was team's 50th under Arians - including postseason. He surpassed the previous record of 49, established by Ken Whisenhunt (2007-12).

Arians retired with four more regular season wins (49) than any other coach in team history.

Arizona had a 21-21 record on the road under Arians, including postseason. His 21 road wins are the highest total in team history.

Sunday's game in Tampa Bay won't be the first time the Cardinals have seen Arians since he left the franchise. He served as a color analyst for CBS when Arizona played at Kansas City in Week 10 last season.

A LOT OF FAMILIAR FACES ON ARIANS' STAFF

Defensive Coordinator **Todd Bowles** spent two seasons (2013-14) in the same position with Arizona, and was named NFL Assistant Coach of the Year in 2014 before being hired as the Jets head coach in 2015.

Asst. Head Coach/Run Game Coordinator **Harold Goodwin** served as the Cardinals offensive coordinator for five seasons (2013-17).

Offensive Coordinator **Byron Leftwich** was a QBs coach for Arizona in 2017 before serving as QBs coach/offensive coordinator in 2018.

In four seasons (2015-18) on the Cardinals coaching staff, Bucs OLBs coach **Larry Foote** served as the ILBs coach (2015-17) and LBs coach (2018). Foote played for the Cardinals in 2014, leading the team with 104 tackles.

WRs coach **Kevin Garver** spent six seasons (2013-18) with Arizona as offensive asst./WRs (2013-17) and WRs coach (2018).

Asst. Special Teams coach **Amos Jones** served as the Cardinals special teams coordinator from 2013-17.

ILBs coach **Mike Caldwell** was the Cardinals LBs coach from 2013-14.

Safeties coach **Nick Rapone** was the Cardinals DBs coach from 2013-17.

CBs coach **Kevin Ross** held the same title with the Cardinals from 2013-17.

TEs coach **Rick Christophel** held the same position with Arizona from 2013-17.

Asst. Strength and Conditioning coach **Roger Kingdom** held the same position with Arizona from 2014-17.

Head Strength and Conditioning coach **Anthony Piroli** was the assistant strength and conditioning coach in Arizona from 2015-17.

Drake's four-yard TD run in the first quarter vs. the 49ers was his first TD as a Cardinal, but his second in two all-time appearances at State Farm Stadium. As a senior at Alabama, Drake scored on a 95-yard kickoff return as the Crimson Tide defeated Clemson 45-40 in the College Football Playoff championship game on 1/11/16.

BUDDA'S BIG GAME - WEEK 9 NOTES

Third-year S **Budda Baker** had one of the most impactful games a player has produced in the NFL this season. In fact, it was a performance so rare it has happened just three times in the last 21 seasons.

Baker finished last week's game with 13 tackles, two tackles for loss and three passes defended against San Francisco.

Since ProFootballReference.com began tracking tackles for loss in 1999, only three players have had 13+ tackles, 2+ tackles for loss and 3+ passes defended in a game. Baker is the first to accomplish the feat in the last six seasons.

THREE DO WHAT THEY HAVE NEVER DONE BEFORE

Arizona scored three TDs against the 49ers last week - and all three came via players who had never scored for the Cardinals. Two of the three were rookies.

A pair of Cardinals 2019 draft picks scored their first TD last week. WR **KeeSean Johnson** (6th round, 174th overall) scored his first career TD on a nine-yard pass from **Kyler Murray** in the third quarter. WR **Andy Isabella** (2nd round, 62nd overall) scored on an electrifying 88-yard TD in the fourth quarter. It was his third catch of the year.

Arizona's first TD on the game was a four-yard run for RB **Kenyan Drake**. It was his 17th career TD but his first as a member of the Cardinals.

SOME IMPRESSIVE NUMBERS VS. SF

Facing the NFL's #1 ranked defense and #2 ranked defense in points allowed last week, the Cardinals put up some impressive numbers against the 49ers on Thursday Night Football.

Against the Cardinals offense, the 49ers defense allowed season-high totals in:

Points (25); Total TDs (3); Total Net Yards (357); Yards/Play (7.1); Rushing Yards (153); Yards/Pass Att (7.6).

The Cardinals had three scoring drives in the second half that covered at least 80 yards (85, 88 and 90). In their first seven games this season, the 49ers defense allowed just one scoring drive that covered 80+ yards. Arizona's three second-half scoring drives are the longest three scoring drives allowed by San Francisco in 2019.

• Arizona had more yards in the second half last week (275) than any of San Francisco's previous five opponents had in an entire game.

• Arizona became the first team to score both on the ground (4-yard TD run) and through the air (9 and 88-yard TD passes) in a game vs. the 49ers this season. San Francisco had gone four straight games without allowing a TD pass before QB **Kyler Murray** had a pair of TD passes.

• San Francisco had held four consecutive opponents under 4.0 yards per play before Arizona averaged 7.1 last week.

• The 49ers had held four consecutive opponents to 100 net yards passing or fewer before Arizona posted 204 net passing yards.

• The Cardinals had the longest pass play (88-yard TD catch by WR **Andy Isabella**) and second-longest run (36-yarder by **Kenyan Drake**) against the 49ers defense so far this season.

• Arizona had more passing yards on the Murray-to-Isabella TD (88) than the 49ers had allowed against three of their last four opponents.



MURRAY TO ISABELLA FOR 88 YARDS

In the fourth quarter of last week's game against San Francisco, QB **Kyler Murray** connected with WR **Andy Isabella** on an 88-yard TD pass. It was the third-longest rookie-to-rookie TD play in franchise history and the longest since 1958 when QB M.C. Reynolds hit John David Crow for a 91-yard TD.



It was the longest rookie-to-rookie TD pass in the NFL since New England QB Jim Plunkett hit WR Andy Vataha for an 88-yard TD on 12/19/71 at Baltimore.

FIVE STRAIGHT WITH NO TURNOVERS

Last Thursday's matchup against the 49ers marked the sixth game this season – and fifth in a row – in which the Cardinals did not commit a turnover.

Arizona's current five-game stretch without a turnover is the longest streak in franchise history, surpassing their four-game streak in 2015 (Games 11-14).

HISTORIC LEVEL OF BALL SECURITY IN 2019

FOUR TURNOVERS THROUGH NINE GAMES

The 2019 season marks the first time in franchise history that the Cardinals had four turnovers or fewer through the first nine games of a season. Prior to this season, the fewest number of turnovers through nine games for Arizona was seven in 2014.

OVER 23 QUARTERS WITHOUT A TURNOVER

Dating back to the first quarter of the Week 4 contest vs. Seattle, the Cardinals offense has run 344 consecutive plays without a turnover.

AZ HAS YET TO LOSE A FUMBLE IN 2019

The 2019 season marks the first time in franchise history the Cardinals did not lose a fumble in the first nine games of a season. Arizona is the only team in the NFL that has yet to lose a fumble in 2019.

Dating back to 1940, the Cardinals are the first team in the NFL to go without a lost fumble through the first nine games of a season.

AWARD-WINNING CARDINALS

The Cardinals have had two players win NFC Player of the Week and one player named NFC Player of the Month this season.

SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - K ZANE GONZALEZ



Gonzalez was named "NFC Special Teams Player of the Month" for his performance in October (Weeks 5-8). During Arizona's three-game winning streak (Weeks 5-7) in October, Gonzalez made 8-of-9 field goals and all nine PATs in games the Cardinals won by a combined 10 points. In Arizona's Week 5 victory at Cincinnati, Gonzalez tied his single-game career high with four field goals, including a 31-yarder as time expired to give Arizona a 26-23 win. It was Gonzalez's second career game-winning field goal.

Gonzalez is the first Cardinals Player of the Month selection since 2017 when linebacker Chandler Jones won the defensive award in December.

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK (WEEK 6) - QB KYLER MURRAY



Murray had the best game of his young career in the Cardinals victory over the Falcons in Week 6. He completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for 340 yards, 3 TDs, 0 INTs and a 128.2 passer rating. His completion percentage, TD total and passer rating were all career highs.

Murray became just the second Cardinals rookie ever to be chosen as "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" and the first since RB Ronald Moore in 1993 (Weeks 14 & 17).

Murray became the ninth rookie in team history to be selected as NFC Player of the Week and the first since David Johnson (Special Teams, Week 2) in 2015.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK (WEEK 7) - LB CHANDLER JONES



Jones was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Week" for his performance in Arizona's 27-21 victory over the Giants, when he totaled a career-high 4.0 sacks, three tackles for loss, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. He became just the fifth NFL player since 2000 with 4.0 sacks, a forced fumble and fumble recovery in a game.

It was Jones' third career "Defensive Player of the Week" selection and his second with the Cardinals.

SECURE THE BALL ROOKIE!

Dating back to Week 4 vs. Seattle, rookie QB **Kyler Murray** has attempted 172 consecutive passes without throwing an INT. He has also run the ball 56 times this season without losing a fumble.

In his last six games, Murray has 1,626 total yards (1,399 passing; 227 rushing), seven TDs and one turnover in 221 combined pass/rush attempts.

Murray is riding a five-game streak without a turnover.

172 AND COUNTING WITHOUT AN INTERCEPTION

Dating back to the first quarter of Week 4, Murray has attempted 172 consecutive pass attempts without an INT.

That is easily the longest active streak in the NFL.

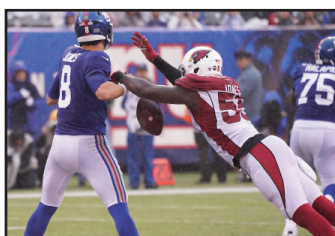

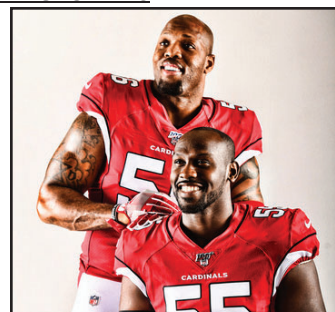

Baker - Arizona's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) - earned Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors as a special teamer during his rookie campaign.

In 2018, he moved into the starting lineup and totaled 107 tackles, eight tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB pressures, four QB hits, two passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries (one returned 36 yards for his first career TD).

#1 GOES FOR WIN #4

Rookie QB **Kyler Murray** led the Cardinals to three straight victories in Weeks 5-7. In doing so, he became the first rookie QB to win at least three consecutive games for Arizona since Neil Lomax won four straight in 1981 (Games 11-14).

Against the Buccaneers in Tampa Bay this week, Murray will look to tie the franchise record for wins by a rookie QB. He will also look to become the first rookie franchise history with three road wins in a season.

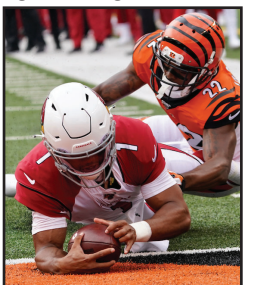

In Jones' first three seasons with the Cardinals (2016-18), the team ranked in the top-5 in sacks twice (5th in 2018; 1st in 2016). The team never ranked in the top-5 in the 10 seasons prior to his arrival – and broke the top-10 just twice.

Filling in for injured Pro Bowl RB **David Johnson**, second-year RB **Chase Edmonds** finished the Cardinals Week 7 victory over the Giants with career highs in total scrimmage yards (150), rushing yards (126) and TDs (3).

He rushed for 126 yards and three TDs on 27 carries and added four receptions for 24 yards in a record-breaking performance.



Edmonds' three rushing TDs covered 20, 20 and 22 yards. He became the first player in franchise history – and just the sixth player in NFL history – with at least three rushing TDs of 20+ yards in a game.

Edmonds had two 20-yard rushing TDs in the first quarter in the victory over New York. Prior to Edmonds, the last Cardinals player to have two rushing TDs in the first quarter of a game was Earl Ferrell on 10/22/1989 vs. Atlanta.

Edmonds became the first player in Cardinals history with multiple rushing TDs of 20+ yards in the first quarter of a game.

Combined with his 37-yard rushing TD at Cincinnati in Week 5 and his two-yard rushing TD in Week 6 vs. Atlanta, Edmonds had at least one TD in three consecutive games for the first time in his career.

Edmonds has over twice as many TDs in the last four games played (5) than he had in his first 20 career games combined (2).

FIRST 100-YARD GAME SINCE HIS DAYS AT FORDHAM

The game against the Giants two weeks ago was Edmonds' first career outing with 100+ rushing yards. His previous career high was 68, which he established in Week 5 in Cincinnati (10/6) earlier this season.

Prior to the win over the Giants in Week 7, Edmonds last rushed for 100+ yards in a game during the final outing of his college career at Fordham. In that contest, Edmonds ran for 185 yards on 28 carries against Bucknell on 11/18/17.

That game was held at Jack Coffey Field in The Bronx, just 18 miles from MetLife Stadium. Jack Coffey Field has a capacity of 7,000 while the attendance at MetLife Stadium was 73,577.

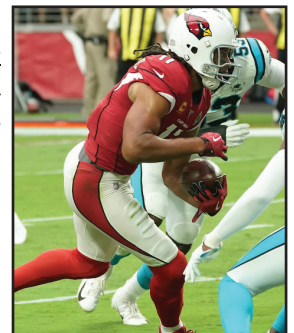

Last week against the 49ers, Fitzgerald made his 77th consecutive start in a streak that dates back to 2014. His 77 consecutive starts represent the longest streak among active NFL receivers and the 8th-longest streak among all active offensive players in the league.

236 STRAIGHT WITH A CATCH

Last week vs. San Francisco, **Fitzgerald** extended his streak to 236 consecutive games with a reception. That represents the second-longest streak in NFL history behind only Jerry Rice (274 straight).

Fitzgerald's streak of 236 consecutive games with a catch is the longest in NFL history with a single team.

A Look at Fitzgerald's Reception Streak

-Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 242 of 243 career games played. His streak began in Week 9 of his rookie season in 2004 at Miami. That is seven weeks after Rice's 274-game streak - the longest in NFL history - ended.

-Fitzgerald has at least one reception in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career.

THRILLING THE HOME FANS

Fitzgerald has been thrilling fans at State Farm Stadium since the venue opened in 2006. He has played 107 career regular season games in 13-plus seasons at State Farm Stadium.

In those contests, he has totaled 626 receptions. In NFL history, only WR Jerry Rice had more receptions in a single stadium. Fitzgerald needs 21 receptions over the final three home games in 2019 to pass Rice for the most catches in a single venue.

Fitzgerald is one of just eight players in NFL history with 10+ TD receptions in the postseason. Of those eight, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22 in 29 games) and John Stallworth (12 in 17 games) and Patriots TE Rob Gronkowski (12 in 16 games) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,345), receiving yards (16,764), receiving TDs (118), total TDs (118) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just seven players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Julio Jones (5), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4), Antonio Brown (4) and Andre Johnson (4).
- At 28 years, 74 days old, he became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 70 career receiving TDs behind only Randy Moss (26 years, 269 days old) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (28 years, one day old).
- At 32 years, 97 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 1,000 career receptions.
- At 31 years, 102 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 900 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 57 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 800 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 85 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 11,000 receiving yards.
- In 2010, he became the first player in NFL history to record 90+ receptions five times in their first seven seasons.
- During the 2008 postseason, he broke virtually every major playoff receiving record, establishing new single-season marks for receptions (30), receiving yards (546) and TDs (7). His four 100-yard receiving games in the postseason established a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100 yards receiving.
- His 10 TD receptions in nine career postseason games are an NFL record for a player in their first nine career playoff contests.
- With a then franchise-record 103 receptions during the 2005 season, he became the youngest player in NFL history to record a 100-catch campaign when he reached the mark at 22 years, 123 days old.
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record 15,000+ receiving yards and 100+ TD receptions in their career.

21 HAS 24 INTERCEPTIONS

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first eight seasons, he earned eight Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. Considered one of the game's best shutdown corners, he has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history.

Since his rookie season in 2011, only four players have more INTs than Peterson.

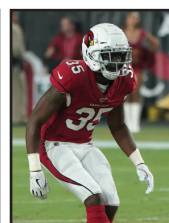

Peterson's performance in 2018 earned him the second highest coverage grade (83.7) of his career by *ProFootballFocus.com*. He faced the fewest targets of any season in his eight-year career, while allowing the second-fewest receptions, the fewest receiving yards and he fewest TD catches.



DEFENSIVE DRAFT PICKS START FOR THE CARDS



Four rookie draft picks – DL **Zach Allen** (one game), CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** (nine), S **Deionte Thompson** (two) and S **Jalen Thompson** (four) – have all started for the Cardinals on defense this season.

CB BYRON MURPHY JR.

The first pick in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Washington, **Murphy** started all 20 games he played during his final two seasons (2017-18) with the Huskies. He earned first-team All-America and All-Pac-12 honors with four INTs and 17 passes defended as a senior.

This season, Murphy has 47 tackles, a tackle for loss and five passes defended, *which is tied for the lead among NFL rookies*. With the Cardinals top-two cornerbacks absent to start the season, Murphy was pressed into action early, and is one of just three rookie defenders in the NFL to start nine games in 2019.

DL ZACH ALLEN

Allen was drafted by the Cardinals in the third round (65th overall) out of Boston College, where he was the ACC's highest-rated edge defender last season according to *ProFootballFocus.com*. He played four seasons (2015-18) for the Eagles, appearing in 50 games and totaling 199 tackles, 40.5 tackles for loss, 18.5 sacks, 16 passes defended, two INTs and two blocked kicks.

Allen entered the season as the starting defensive end but has missed the last five games due to injury.

S DEIONTE THOMPSON

Arizona's fifth-round pick (139th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft, **Thompson** has played all nine games this season, starting against the Ravens (Week 2) and Falcons (Week 6). He played 43 games (17 starts) and had 113 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss, three INTs and 10 passes defended at Alabama. He was a consensus first-team All-American as a senior in 2018.

S JALEN THOMPSON

Selected in the fifth round of the 2019 NFL Supplemental Draft, **Thompson** has started four games and registered a career-high eight tackles in Week 5 against the Bengals. He had 191 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss, six INTs, 23 passes defended, two forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries in 39 games (all starts) in three seasons (2016-18) at Washington State.

ONE OF THE ALL-TIME GREATS

The Cardinals signed P **Andy Lee** just prior to the 2017 season, and during his first year in Arizona, he set a franchise single-season record with a 47.3-yard punting average. *In 2018, Lee topped himself, breaking his own record with an NFL-high 48.6-yard average last season.*

Lee now *owns team records for punting average in a season with both the Cardinals and 49ers (50.9 yards in 2011)*. He owns the top two single-season punting averages for the Cardinals. *After leading the NFL in punting average for the second time in his career in 2018, Lee has finished in the top-10 in punting average in 12 of his 15 full NFL seasons.*

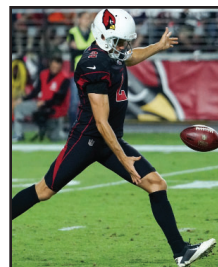
Now in his 16th NFL season in 2019, Lee has appeared in 241 games with 1,262 punts for 58,825 yards (46.6-yard avg.) and has a 39.8 net average and 426 punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

His 46.6 career punting average ranks sixth in NFL history. He has averaged 48.0+ yards per punt in a season five times in his career and led the NFL in punting average (50.9) for the first time in 2011.

CARDS JOIN NFL TO CELEBRATE 100TH SEASON

The NFL is celebrating its 100th season in 2019. As the United States' oldest professional football franchise still in existence, the Cardinals hold a unique place in league history.



The Cardinals were founded in 1898 as the Morgan Athletic Club, predating the formation of the NFL by over 20 years. By the time the NFL was founded in 1920 as the American Professional Football Association (APFA), the team was known as the Racine Cardinals when it became one of the 14 charter members of the upstart league after paying a \$100 franchise fee. Today, the Cardinals and Chicago Bears represent the only two charter members of the NFL still in existence.

In 1932, Hall of Fame owner Charles W. Bidwill, Sr., then a vice president of the Bears, purchased the Cardinals. After divesting himself of his Bears' holdings, that began a period of family ownership that continues to this day.

In 2019, the Cardinals have joined the NFL in celebrating 100 years of play with a year-long series of "NFL 100" events, initiatives and programs celebrating fans, players and communities.

The historic and unprecedented celebration is a salute to the millions of fans who love the game; highlighting the unifying nature of football and its positive impact in communities; bringing together generations of past, present and future players; and looking ahead to the NFL's next 100 years.

CARDS A MEMBER OF NFL'S TWO OLDEST RIVALRIES

Having met twice during the NFL's inaugural season in 1920, the Cardinals and Bears represent the oldest rivalry in league history. The Cardinals and Packers – who joined the league in 1921 – are the NFL's second-oldest rivalry. The Packers were formed in 1919 by Earl (Curly) Lambeau and George Calhoun but did not gain entry into the APFA until 1921.

- The Cards and Bears have faced each other 90 times during the regular season, dating back to 1920.
- The first-ever meeting between the Cardinals and Bears – then known as the Racine Cardinals and Decatur Staleys – occurred at Normal Park in Chicago on November 28th, 1920, exactly 72 days after the league was conceived as the APFA during a meeting in Canton, OH. In that game, the Cardinals defeated the Staleys 7-6 at Normal Park.
- The first meeting between the Cardinals and Packers (a 3-3 tie) occurred on November 20, 1921 at Normal Park in Chicago. The following week (November 27, 1921), the Packers and Bears met for the first time.

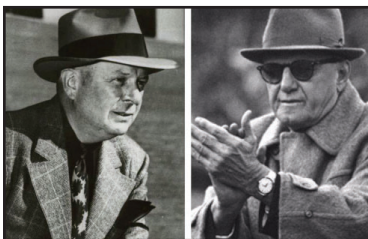
FRIENDSHIP OF THE HALL OF FAME OWNERS

Cardinals Hall of Fame owner **Charles Bidwill** and Bears Hall of Fame owner **George Halas** had a friendship that endured even as their team's were cross-town rivals during their shared time in Chicago.

At one point during the Great Depression, that friendship helped save Halas' ownership of the Bears.

In 1931, Halas' co-owner Edward "Dutch" Sternaman proposed being bought out of his stake in the Bears for \$38,000, which was to be paid in installments. After suffering \$18,000 in losses during the 1932 season, Halas was \$15,000 short when the final payment was due in 1933. Defaulting on the payment meant ownership would revert to Sternaman.

"It was a case of finding \$15,000 in a hurry, or losing everything I'd worked for since moving the Staleys from Decatur to Chicago in 1921," Halas wrote in 1967 in a history of the Bears published in the Chicago Tribune. "From this desperate situation, I was rescued by the joint efforts of my mother and my good friend Charley Bidwill. Mother bought \$5,000 worth of stock from her savings. Bidwill purchased \$5,000 in stock and also arranged a bank loan for the remaining \$5,000 needed. But it was a mighty close call. As I remember, I finally got all the money together at 11:10 a.m. on the day the final note came due. Forfeit time was 12 o'clock noon."

A HISTORY OF BEING THE FIRST

In addition to being the oldest professional football team in the country, the Cardinals also have a long history of serving as a pioneer in the sport – both on and off the playing field.

DIVERSITY

1st Female Owner in NFL History: Following the 1947 death of Cardinals owner and Pro Football Hall of Fame Charles Bidwill, his wife Violet oversaw operations of the franchise for the next 15 years. As such, she became the first female to serve as principal owner in NFL history and is believed to be the first female owner in American pro sports.

1st African American Female Executive in NFL History:

Adele Harris spent 26 seasons with the franchise before retiring in 2001. She holds the distinction of being the first African American female to hold a front office position with an NFL team. Harris first worked as a secretary for the St. Louis Football Cardinals from 1971-74. She left the club to pursue a degree in business management and returned to the team in 1978 as a publicity assistant. By 1980, Harris became the team's director of community relations, and was instrumental in the team's civic efforts when it relocated to Arizona in 1988. Harris passed away in November of 2007.

1st African American to Handle Contract Negotiations for NFL Team: In 1981, the team hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club.

1st African American Head Coach/General Manager Tandem: In 2004, the Cardinals hired Dennis Green as the team's head coach. Joining General Manager Rod Graves, they became the first African American general manager/head coach pairing. Hired by Arizona in 1997 as Assistant to the President, Graves spent 16 seasons with the organization, including the last six years at the team's GM.

1st Female Coach in NFL History: In 2015, the Cardinals hired Jen Welter as a coaching intern for training camp and the preseason to work with inside linebackers, making her the first female coach of any kind in NFL history.

INTERNATIONAL PLAY

1st NFL Game Outside of North America: The most popular sport in the United States played before an international audience for the first time ever when the Cardinals and San Diego Chargers met for a preseason matchup at Korakuen Stadium in Tokyo, Japan. On August 16, 1976 the Cardinals defeated the Chargers 20-10 before an estimated crowd of 38,000.

1st NFL Game in Europe: On August 6, 1983 the Cardinals faced the Minnesota Vikings in a preseason matchup at Wembley Stadium in London. The Vikings defeated the Cardinals 28-10 in front of 32,847 fans at the landmark event.

1st NFL Regular Season Game Played Outside United States: On October 2, 2005 the Cardinals earned a 17-point come-from-behind victory over the San Francisco 49ers in a game played in front of a then-record crowd of 103,467 at Mexico City's Estadio Azteca. It was the first NFL regular season game ever played outside of the US.

FOOTBALL FIRSTS

1st Night Game in NFL History:

On November 6, 1929 the Providence Steamrollers became the first team to host a game at night using floodlights in a matchup against the Cardinals. That night contest also featured the first use of a football painted white during an actual game. With fan attendance crucial to generate revenue, the game was played in the evening rather than during the workday. The minor league baseball field of Kinsley Park was adorned with floodlights and the Cards earned a 16-0 victory over the Steamrollers.

1st Out of Town Training Camp: Prior to the 1929 season, the Cardinals conducted what is believed to be the NFL's first extended out-of-town training camp when the team spent the summer at Waterworks Park in Coldwater, Michigan.

1st Indoor NFL Game: With the country struggling through the Great Depression in late 1930, the Chicago Cardinals challenged the cross-town Bears to play a game to raise money for the governor's fund for unemployment relief. To battle the freezing temperatures the teams agreed to play at Chicago Stadium, then the largest indoor arena in the world. On December 15, 1930 the Bears earned a 9-7 victory in front of 10,000 fans. Six inches of dirt were hauled in and rolled for a playing surface, forcing the teams to use a white ball to increase visibility for both the players and fans. In addition to raising thousands of dollars for charity, it was a precursor to the 1932 championship when the Bears played for the NFL title in the same venue against the Portsmouth Spartans.

1st Retractable Grass Field in NFL History: When the Cardinals opened their new stadium in 2006, the venue broke the mold in terms of design and architecture. Among its most unique features is a fully retractable grass playing surface that resides outside the stadium for 300+ days a year and rolls in when needed. The first of its kind in NFL history, the stadium's grass playing surface has consistently ranked #1 in surveys of the league's players.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2019 season is the 13th since **Michael Bidwill** took over as team President in 2007. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. Since it opened in 2006, the team has sold out all 141 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the venue, which has also hosted a pair of Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's 12 years as team president. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice during Bidwill's time as president (2008, 2015), including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- Arizona's 50 wins between 2013-17 were the most in any five-year span in franchise history.

- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Arizona Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

SUPER BOWL COMING BACK TO AZ

Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl When Game Returns in 2023

The biggest event in American sports is returning to Arizona as State Farm Stadium was selected to host Super Bowl LVII that will cap the 2022 NFL season.

Super Bowl LVII will be the fourth Super Bowl played in Arizona and the third in 15 years at State Farm Stadium. The Valley last hosted Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season. With Super Bowl LVII being held at State Farm Stadium, Arizona will join South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

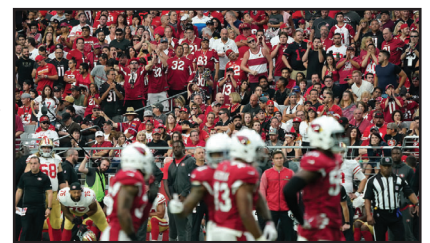

"I had some fun playing for the Bengals, but it's the most fun I've had playing the game. I met some unbelievable (people). It's not just the coaches and the players. It's everybody that's affiliated with this organization."

THE KINGSBURY ERA BEGINS IN ARIZONA

TAKING THE REINS

On January 8, 2019 the Cardinals announced the hiring of **Kliff Kingsbury** as the team's head coach.

The 40-year old Kingsbury spent the past six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech, and was hired as USC's offensive coordinator in December. The New Braunfels, TX native is an 11-year coaching veteran who has also worked at Texas A&M (2012) and at the University of Houston (2008-11) where he began his coaching career.

Recognized as one of the profession's brightest and most-innovative offensive minds, Kingsbury has tutored six future NFL QBs, including first-round selections Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield and Johnny Manziel as well as Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek. Under Kingsbury's guidance, Mahomes (2016) and Keenum (2009, '11) both led the nation in passing.



Highlights from Kingsbury's Coaching Career

- While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive and productive offenses. The Red Raiders featured a passing attack that ranked in the top-10 in the country in all six seasons of his tenure, ranked in the top-20 nationally for total offense in all six seasons and finished in the top-25 in scoring five times.
- Under Kingsbury, Texas Tech averaged at least 30 points per game, 470 total yards per game and 300 passing yards per game in all six seasons. The Red Raiders averaged more than 500 yards of offense in four seasons and over 450 passing yards twice. They also averaged at least 140 rushing yards per game four times in six seasons under Kingsbury and averaged more than 40 points per game twice.
- At both Houston (2011) and Texas Tech (2016) Kingsbury's offenses led the nation in total offense and passing offense.
- Dating back to his first offensive coordinator job at Houston in 2011, a Kingsbury-led offense never finished outside the top-20 in the nation in total offense and never finished outside the top-15 in passing offense.
- In 2016, Texas Tech led the nation in total offense (566.6 ypg) and passing offense (463.0 ypg) while finishing #5 in scoring (43.7 ppg). It was the sixth consecutive season a Kingsbury-led unit finished in the top-10 in total offense dating back to his time at both Houston and Texas A&M.
- In 2015, the Red Raiders finished #2 in the nation in total offense (579.5 ypg), #2 in scoring offense (45.1 ppg) and had the nation's second ranked passing offense (388.2 ypg). The 45.1 points per game average established a school single-season record and Texas Tech was one of just two schools in the nation to score at least 25 points in every game. The Red Raiders featured a 4,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.
- With Kingsbury serving as co-offensive coordinator in 2011, Houston led the nation in total offense (599.1 ypg), passing offense (450.1 ypg) and scoring (49.3 ppg) as quarterback Case Keenum finished his collegiate career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history.

Kingsbury spent the 2012 season at Texas A&M as offensive coordinator/QBs coach working under current University of Arizona head coach Kevin Sumlin. Texas A&M finished third nationally in total offense (558.5 ypg) with an attack that finished 13th nationally in rushing (242.1 ypg) and 14th in passing (316.5 ypg). The Aggies beat #1 Alabama on the road and #11 Oklahoma in the Cotton Bowl.

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston under Sumlin as the offensive quality control coach (2008-09) prior to being elevated to QBs coach (2010) and then co-offensive coordinator in 2011.

Kingsbury played QB at Texas Tech (1999-2002) where he set 39 school records, 16 Big 12 marks and 17 NCAA records during his collegiate career while throwing for 12,423 yards and 95 TDs. As a senior in 2012, he was awarded the Sammy Baugh Trophy as the nation's top college QB and was also named the Associated Press Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year while finishing ninth in Heisman Trophy voting.

He was drafted in the sixth round of the NFL Draft by New England in 2003 and spent his rookie season on the Patriots injured reserve list before spending the 2004 season on the Saints practice squad. Kingsbury played in one game with the Jets in 2005 and attended training camp with the Bills in 2006. He also played with the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe in 2006 before playing with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League in 2007.

In 2018, Kingsbury was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame. He played high school football under his father, Tim, at New Braunfels (TX) High School where he threw for more than 3,000 yards and 34 TDs as a senior.

CARDS IMPROVING UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have a 3-5-1 record under head coach **Kliff Kingsbury**. *Arizona had as many wins in October as it had in all of 2018.*

Among the eight first-year head coaches in 2019, Green Bay's Matt LaFleur (7-2) and Kingsbury (3-5-1) have the two best records. LaFleur (7) and Kingsbury (3) have more combined wins (10) than the other six first-year head coaches combined (9).

COACHING QUARTERBACKS

After joining the coaching ranks with the University of Houston in 2008, **Kliff Kingsbury** mentored six future NFL QBs during his coaching tenure: *Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield, Johnny Manziel, Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek*. Mahomes, Mayfield and Manziel were all selected in the 1st round of the NFL Draft.

Mahomes (Texas Tech)

Under Kingsbury's tutelage, Mahomes spent two full seasons (2015-16) as the starter at Texas Tech. In those two years the Red Raiders finished #2 (2015) and #1 (2016) in the nation in total offense while Mahomes threw for a combined 9,705 yards and 77 TDs in 25 starts.

As a sophomore in 2015, Mahomes became the youngest QB in NCAA history to amass 5,000 yards of total offense. He eclipsed the 5,000-yard mark again in 2016, becoming just the third quarterback ever to record 5,000+ yards of total offense in back-to-back seasons.

Keenum (Univ. of Houston)

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston where he was a quality control coach from 2008-09 before being promoted to QBs coach in 2010 and co-offensive coordinator in 2011. The Cougars led the nation in total offense, passing offense and scoring in 2011, while Keenum completed his record-setting career by placing seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and winning the Sammy Baugh Award.

With Kingsbury calling plays, the Cougars averaged 599.1 total yards per game, including 450.1 through the air, while scoring over 49 points per game. Keenum wrapped up his career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history. In his one season with Kingsbury as his QBs coach, Keenum completed 428-of-604 passes for 5,631 yards and 48 TDs, all of which led the NCAA FBS.

Manziel (Texas A&M)

Prior to taking over at Texas Tech, Kingsbury spent one season (2012) as the offensive coordinator at Texas A&M. In his lone season with the Aggies, Kingsbury played a crucial role in Manziel becoming the first freshman ever to win the Heisman Trophy.

Webb and Shimonek (Texas Tech)

Two other Kingsbury quarterbacks have also moved on to the league in recent years as Webb was selected by the New York Giants in the third round of the 2017 draft while Shimonek signed an undrafted free agent agreement with the Los Angeles Chargers in 2018.



TOM CLEMENTS - PASS GAME COORDINATOR/QBS

Now in his first season as the Cardinals Pass Game Coordinator/QBs coach, veteran assistant **Tom Clements** (CLEM-ents) is a 24-year coaching veteran who has spent 20 seasons as an assistant coach in the NFL, including five seasons as an offensive coordinator.

- Named Cardinals pass game coordinator/QBs coach on 1/22/19.
- Coached for 11 seasons with the Packers (2006-16). In his 11 seasons with Green Bay, the Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in total offense nine times, made the postseason nine times and won Super Bowl XLV following the 2010 season.
- During his tenure with the Packers, Clements helped with the development of QB Aaron Rodgers who was selected to six Pro Bowls and earned NFL MVP honors in 2011 and 2014.
- In three seasons as offensive coordinator with Green Bay (2012-14), the Packers ranked #3 in the NFL in scoring (27.8 ppg), #5 in total offense (381.9 ypg), #3 in giveaways (54) and #5 in first downs (1,048).
- The Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in scoring in each season Clements worked as offensive coordinator, including in 2014 when the Packers led the NFL with 486 points.
- Also coached QB Brett Favre, who in 2007 was selected to the Pro Bowl after throwing for more than 4,000 yards for the fifth time in his career and led the Packers to the NFC Championship game.
- Has coached 13 different offensive players to a total of 21 Pro Bowls and tutored five quarterbacks who had 13 total 3,000-yard passing seasons, including eight 4,000-yard campaigns.

Prior to joining Green Bay, Clements spent two seasons (2004-05) as the offensive coordinator in Buffalo. He spent the previous seven years as a QBs coach with Pittsburgh, Kansas City and New Orleans. Clements helped Elvis Grbac (Chiefs in 2000) and Kordell Stewart (Steelers in 2001) earn Pro Bowl selections while Tommy Maddox (Pittsburgh) was named NFL Comeback Player of the Year in 2002.

Clements got his start in coaching at his alma mater, Notre Dame, spending four seasons (1992-95) working under Lou Holtz. He played 12 years in the Canadian Football League as a QB and was a seven-time divisional All-Star, 1987 CFL MVP, 1975 CFL Rookie of the Year and two-time Gray Cup Champion with Ottawa (1976) and Winnipeg (1984), earning the Outstanding Offensive Player award in each game.



JEFF RODGERS - ASST. HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Rodgers is in his second season with Arizona and first as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator.

He came to Cardinals in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019.

- Hired as Cardinals special teams coordinator in 2018 after working in the same capacity for three seasons (2015-17) with the Chicago Bears.
- Has 18 years of coaching experience, including 15 seasons coaching special teams in the NFL with Arizona, Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).

• Helped the Cardinals rank 5th in the NFL in special teams last season after the team finished 30th in 2017. P Andy Lee led the NFL and set a franchise single-season record with a 48.6-yard punting average and rookie LB Zeke Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles in 2018.

• The Broncos returned six kicks for TDs during Rodgers tenure in Denver (2011-14), tied for the second most in the NFL in that span. In 2012, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record multiple return TDs in a playoff game when he scored on a 90-yard punt return and a 104-yard kickoff return in a 38-35 double-overtime loss to the Ravens.

• Under Rodgers tutelage, Broncos K Matt Prater was named to the Pro Bowl in 2013 after setting franchise records in field goal percentage (96.2%; 25-of-26) and points scored (150). Prater's 64-yard field goal in 2013 is the longest in NFL history. In 2014, K Connor Barth's 93.8 field-goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest in team history.

Rodgers began his coaching career at the University of Arizona in 2001, spending two seasons as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and LBs under head coach John Mackovic. He entered the NFL coaching ranks with San Francisco in 2003 as a special teams quality control coach for two seasons.



VANCE JOSEPH - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Vance Joseph was hired as Arizona's Defensive Coordinator this offseason and joined the Cardinals after two years (2017-18) as head coach of the Denver Broncos.

He is a 20-year coaching veteran, including 14 seasons in the NFL with San Francisco (2005-10), Houston (2011-13), Cincinnati (2014-15), Miami (2016) and Denver (2017-18).

- Hired as Cardinals defensive coordinator on 1/11/19.
- Joseph has 12 years of coaching experience on the defensive side of the ball in the NFL, including as defensive coordinator with Miami in 2016.

• In Joseph's initial season with the Broncos in 2017, Denver had the NFL's #3 ranked defense and joined Minnesota as the only teams in the NFL that season to rank in the top-five in both run defense and pass defense. The Broncos ranked #5 in run defense in '17 after finishing the previous year ranked #28 in that category.

• In 2018, the Broncos defense ranked in the top-10 in the NFL in INTs (17), takeaways (28) and sacks (44). Rookie LB Bradley Chubb – Denver's first-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft – led all NFL rookies with 12.0 sacks last season. Pro Bowl LB Von Miller had 14.5 sacks, tied for fourth in the NFL last season. Denver was one of three teams (Seattle, Kansas City) to have two players record double digit sacks in 2018.

• In a stretch from 2011-16, which spanned jobs in Houston, Cincinnati and Miami, Joseph's teams made the postseason five times in six seasons.

• Joseph's teams have ranked in the top-10 in INTs in four of the past five seasons.

• Four different DBs earned a combined five Pro Bowl selections – Johnathan Joseph (2), Reggie Nelson (1), Adam Jones (1) and Walt Harris (1) – during Joseph's time coaching defensive backs in Cincinnati, Houston and San Francisco.

Prior to his tenure in Miami, Joseph coached DBs for two seasons (2014-15) with Cincinnati, helping the Bengals to back-to-back postseason appearances. During his two seasons with Cincinnati, the Bengals led the NFL with 41 INTs. Cincinnati was the only team to post more INTs than TDs allowed (36) during that two-year stretch while holding opposing QBs to the lowest combined passer rating (77.4) in the NFL.

Prior to beginning his coaching career as a grad assistant at the University of Colorado in 2000, Joseph appeared in 30 games for the Buffaloes (1990-94), playing QB, RB and on special teams, and was a member of the Buffaloes 1990 National Championship team. He served as a backup to All-American QBs Darian Hagan and Kordell Stewart and completed 34-of-61 passes for 454 yards and four TDs to go along with 50 carries for 237 yards and one TD in his college career.

He converted to CB in the NFL and signed with the Jets as an undrafted rookie free agent in 1995. As a rookie, Joseph played in 13 games and had 21 tackles (17 solo), two INTs and five passes defended. He played in four games with the Colts in 1996 before spending the preseason with Denver in 1997.



COACHING STAFF HIGHLIGHTS

- Of the 25 coaches on the Cards staff, 18 are new to the organization. The seven coaches who returned are **Chris Achuff** (Defensive Line), **Steve Heiden** (Tight Ends), **Randall McCray** (Asst. Special Teams), **Buddy Morris** (Strength & Conditioning), **Jeff Rodgers** (Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator), **Vernon Stephens** (Asst. Strength & Conditioning) and **Cam Turner** (Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks).



• The Cards coaching staff entered the 2019 season with a combined 419 years of coaching experience at the college and NFL levels: 201 in the NFL; 218 in college. Of the 25 coaches on staff, 21 entered the season with NFL coaching experience.

• In addition to their experience on the sidelines, the Cardinals staff features seven coaches who played a combined 38 years in the NFL: **Kliff Kingsbury** (3), **Vance Joseph** (2), **Tom Clements** (1), **Steve Heiden** (11), **Brian Natkin** (1), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **James Saxon** (8).

• Nine members of the Arizona staff entered the year having coached at least 10 seasons in the NFL: **Jerry Sullivan** (24), **Bill Davis** (24), **Tom Clements** (20), **James Saxon** (19), **Jeff Rodgers** (15), **Vance Joseph** (14), **Sean Kugler** (12), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **Greg Williams** (10).

• Three members of the staff - Kingsbury (Texas Tech), Joseph (Denver Broncos) and Sean Kugler (Texas-El Paso) - have previously served as a head coach either at the college or NFL level.

CHRIS ACHUFF - Defensive Line



Last name pronounced "A-cuff" ... long-time college assistant in his second season with the Cardinals and first as the D-Line coach ... joined the Cardinals in 2018 after 19 years coaching at the collegiate level, coaching the D-line at Baylor (2008-16), Tennessee-Martin (2006-07), Charleston Southern (2005) and Tennessee-Chattanooga (2004).

BRIAN NATKIN - Asst. Offensive Line



Joined the Cardinals in 2019 after spending the last 15 seasons at the college level ... a consensus All-American TE as a player at the University of Texas-El Paso, spent the 2018 season as run-game coordinator/O-Line coach at Hutchinson (KS) Community College ... worked the previous six seasons (2012-17) at his alma mater, UTEP.

PETER BEDOVINAC - Asst. Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "buh-DOE-vuh-nack" ... spent the last six seasons (2013-18) at the college level ... a former QB at Michigan State (2010-12), spent the 2018 season as a defensive graduate assistant at Ohio State ... spent the previous three seasons (2015-17) coaching LBs at Missouri State after beginning his coaching career at Missouri in 2013.

DAVID RAIH - Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "RYE" ... spent the last five seasons with Green Bay as WRs coach (2018), offensive perimeter coach (2017), asst. O-Line coach (2016) and coaching administrator (2014-15) ... played QB at Iowa (1999-2003) and helped the Hawkeyes to a 2002 Big Ten Conference Championship and a berth in the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl.

CHARLIE BULLEN - Asst. Linebackers



Is in his first season with Arizona and eighth in the NFL ... spent the last seven seasons (2012-18) with Miami, including the past three seasons as the Dolphins assistant LBs coach ... prior to working with the Dolphins, coached for three seasons (2009-11) as a graduate assistant, working with defensive backs at his alma mater, the University of Iowa.

MARCUS ROBERTSON - Defensive Backs



A former NFL DB, is in his first season as Arizona's DBs coach after spending the past two seasons (2017-18) in the same role with the Broncos ... has spent the last 28 seasons in the NFL as a player, coach, and administrator and has coached DBs for the past 12 seasons with Tennessee (2007-11), Detroit (2012-13), Oakland (2014-16) and Denver.

BILL DAVIS - Linebackers



Returned to the Cardinals for his second tenure with the team after previously working as Arizona's defensive coordinator (2009-10) and LBs coach (2007-08) ... has 24 years of coaching experience in the NFL, including seven seasons as a defensive coordinator with Arizona, Philadelphia and San Francisco ... spent the past two seasons (2017-18) as LBs coach at Ohio State.

JAMES SAXON - Running Backs



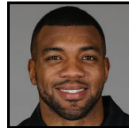

Came to the Cardinals after spending last season with the NY Giants as an offensive assistant ... former WR who attended rookie mini-camp with the Chicago Bears and Kansas City Chiefs ... served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Iowa, for two seasons (2016-17), assisting the Hawkeyes WRs and special teams.

STEVE HEIDEN - Tight Ends



Veteran NFL tight end is in his seventh season with the Cardinals and first as TE's coach after working the past six seasons as asst. O-Line coach (2018) and asst. special teams/asst. TE's coach (2013-17) ... after playing in the NFL for 11 seasons (1999-2009), entered the coaching ranks in 2012 as TE's coach at Concordia University in St. Paul, MN.

JERRY SULLIVAN - Offensive Asst.



Returned to the Cardinals as an offensive assistant for his second tenure with the team after previously serving as WRs coach (2001-02) and offensive coordinator (2003) ... has 47 years of experience, including 24 seasons in the NFL with the Chargers (1992-96), Lions (1997-2000), Cardinals (2001-03), Dolphins (2004), 49ers (2005-10) and Jaguars (2012-16).

SEAN KUGLER - Offensive Line



Last name pronounced "KOOG-ler" ... a 29-year coaching veteran, has spent 12 seasons as an assistant in the NFL having previously coached with Detroit (2001-05), Buffalo (2007-09) and Pittsburgh (2010-12) in addition to last season with Denver as the Broncos O-Line/guards/centers coach ... was the head coach at his alma mater, Texas-El Paso, for five seasons (2013-17).

CAM TURNER - Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks



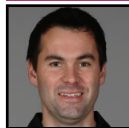

SPENCER WHIPPLE - Offensive Quality Control



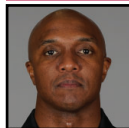

CHRIS WILSON - Defensive Asst.



Is in his first season with the Cardinals as a defensive assistant ... came to Arizona after spending the past three seasons (2016-18) as the D-Line coach with the Eagles ... previously coached with the Cardinals as part of the NFL's minority internship program in 1997 ... son, Caleb, is a TE drafted by the Cardinals in the seventh round of the 2019 NFL Draft.

"I think they're more excited because they're getting a gift from Chandler Jones," said Tom Baleno, the U-E Football Coach, via *Spectrum News*. "He's top-notch, he's mastered his craft in the NFL, and just to have - it could be anything - a gift from him is what's really special."

Jones, a 2008 graduate of U-E, went on to star at Syracuse before the Patriots selected him with the 21st overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft.

"I think it's fantastic that he inspires us to be the best version of ourselves," Baleno said. "He's a great role model. I think he really embodies what U-E football is. And us as a community, we're very proud of him."
