### THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

Arizona welcomes the L.A. Rams to State Farm Stadium to begin a stretch of three games against division opponents over the final five weeks of the regular season. That includes a re-match between the Cardinals and Rams in Week 17 at Los Angeles.

Sunday's game is the 83rd all-time regular season meeting between the Cardinals and Rams in a series that dates back to 1937 when the Cardinals were located in Chicago and the Rams were based in Cleveland.

Between 2006-17 the Cardinals won 15-of-22 games against the Rams, including a nine-game winning streak that is the longest in the history of the series for either team. However, Los Angeles enters this week's contest having won six in a row overall and five straight in Arizona. On Sunday the Cards are going for their first win in the series since the 2016 season finale and their first home win since 2014.

Sunday's matchup is a crucial one for both teams, who sit a game apart in the NFC West standings and are looking to improve their standing in the race for a playoff spot in a crowded NFC field. Arizona currently holds the #7 seed in the NFC and Los Angeles holds the #5 seed.

Both the Rams and Cardinals are coming off three-point losses decided by a FG as time expired. Arizona lost 20-17 in New England on a 50-yard FG by Nick Folk. Los Angeles fell 23-20 at home to San Francisco as Niners K Robbie Gould connected from 42 yards out.

Between the two teams Arizona (5) and Los Angeles (3) have played eight consecutive games decided by seven points or fewer, including six that were decided by three points or less.

The Cardinals enter Week 13 with the NFL's #2 ranked offense (403.7 ypg) and #8 ranked scoring offense (27.6 ppg) while the Rams counter with the NFL's #2 ranked defense (297.0 ypg) and #3 ranked scoring defense (19.5 ppg). Both teams feature strong rushing attacks and come into the game with a combined 33 rushing TDs (18 for AZ; 15 for LA).

CB Patrick Peterson will play the Rams for the 19th time and enters the game with seven INTs and three TDs (2 PR, 1 INT) against Los Angeles.

After taking on the Rams, the Cardinals have back-to-back games against the NFC East - @ NY Giants (Week 14) and vs. Philadelphia (Week 15) - before wrapping up the regular season against the 49ers and Rams. Los Angeles will travel to New England for a Thursday Night showdown with the Patriot in the first of consecutive games against the AFC West (@ NY Jets in Week 15).

### #LARVSAZ - WEEK 13 HIGHLIGHTS

- Currently one game apart in the NFC West standings, both the Cardinals and Rams look to bounce back from Week 12 losses that were decided by FGs as time expired.
- Each of the Cardinals last five games have been decided by seven points or fewer, including four games decided by three points or less.
- After collecting just one INT in the first five games, Arizona's defense has recorded nine INTs in the last six games, including two last week in New England.
- CB Patrick Peterson has played the Rams 18 times and has more INTs (7) and TDs (3) against Los Angeles than he does against any other franchise.
- The Cardinals enter Week 13 with the NFL's #2 ranked offense (403.7 ypg) and #8 ranked scoring offense (27.6 ppg) while the Rams counter with the NFL's #2 ranked defense (297.0 ypg) and #3 ranked scoring defense (19.5 ppg).
- Arizona (403.7) and Kansas City (425.8) are the only teams in the NFL averaging at least 400 yards per game on offense this season.
- RB Kenyan Drake who scored twice last week in New England has as many rushing TDs in 18 games with Arizona (15) as he had total TDs in 54 games played with Miami (15 - 9 rushing; 6 receiving).
- In the last five games rookie LB Isaiah Simmons has played 130 snaps and recorded 25 tackles, an INT, 2.0 sacks, four tackles for loss, a pass defensed and three QB hits. Simmons has a sack in each of the last two games, becoming the first Cardinals rookie since Sam Acho in 2011 (Games 15-16) with a sack in backto-back games.
- DL **Domata Peko** signed last Monday (11/23) started against the Patriots last week, becoming the 24<sup>th</sup> different player to start a game on defense for the Cardinals. Only Jacksonville (25) has had more players start a game on defense in 2020.

Fitzgerald's reception totals against the Rams, Seahawks and 49ers (186) are the three highest in NFL history against a single opponent.

### ADD A TD PASS TO HIS CAREER TOTALS

When the Cardinals faced the Rams in Week 16 of the 2018 season, Fitzgerald threw the only TD pass of his career: a 32-yarder to RB David Johnson. It was the first TD pass by a WR in franchise history. At 35 years, 114 days old, Fitzgerald became the oldest WR in NFL history to throw a TD. Prior to Fitz, the oldest WR to throw a TD was Philly's Harold Carmichael (34 years, 38 days).

### CARDINALS TO SHARE STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals and Rams aren't the only NFC West teams that will be playing at State Farm Stadium in Week 13. On Monday it was announced that San Francisco will make the Valley - and State Farm Stadium - its temporary home due to restrictions on contact sports in Santa Clara County.

The 49ers will play their next two "home" games at State Farm Stadium, beginning with a Monday Night Football matchup vs. Buffalo in Week 13. The Niners will also host Washington at State Farm Stadium in Week 14. Arizona and San Francisco will square off in Week 16, making it the 49ers third game at State Farm Stadium in a four-week span.

### **RETURNING HOME FOR WEEK 13**

The Cardinals are back at State Farm Stadium this week when they take on the Los Angeles Rams in a crucial matchup against a division opponent.

The Cardinals will look to improve to 4-2 at home this season. Arizona will also be looking to snap the Rams five-game winning streak on the Cardinals home field.



Arizona needs two home wins to earn its ninth season with a winning record at State Farm Stadium in 15 seasons at the venue. Since beginning play at State Farm Stadium in 2006, the Cardinals have four playoff berths and three NFC West titles. The Cardinals finished .500 or better just twice and made the playoffs only one time in 18 seasons prior.

THE LAST THREE AT STATE FARM STADIUM WERE THRILLERS The Cardinals last-second victory over the Bills in Week 10 capped a threegame home stand that featured:

- All three games decided by 3 points or fewer.
- A win vs. Seattle in Week 7 in which the Cardinals never led until the gamewinning FG with 0:15 remaining in OT.
- A Week 10 victory over Buffalo that featured two go-ahead TD catches in the final 0:34 of regulation and a game-winning 43-yard Hail Mary TD with 0:02 remaining.

  19 points in the final 0:30 of the 4th Qtr/OT

The Cardinals victory over the Bills marked just the second time in the last 60 years that a game featured multiple go-ahead passing TDs in the final 0:40 seconds of regulation. Bills WR Stefon Diggs had a 21-yard TD catch with 0:34 remaining that gave the Bills a 30-26 lead. Four plays later Cardinals WR De-Andre Hopkins brought down a 43-yard TD on a Hail Mary pass from QB Kyler Murray with just 0:02 remaining.

Players who have at least one sack for the Cardinals this season. That is the most in the NFL. Arizona also leads the league with nine players who have at least 2.0 sacks.

INTs for the Cardinals defense in the last six games. The unit had one INT through the first five games in 2020.

Percentage of opponent goal-to-go possessions (9 of 19) that have resulted in TDs this season. That is the lowest in the NFL. Minnesota (56.0%) ranks second.

Total TDs - 19 passing and 10 rushing - for Murray in 2020. Only Aaron Rodgers (34), Patrick Mahomes (32), Russell Wilson (32) and Tom Brady (31) have more total TDs this season.

Receiving yards WR DeAndre Hopkins needs to reach 1,000 for the year. It would mark his sixth career season with 1,000+ receiving yards and fourth in a row.

Rushing TDs for RB Kenyan Drake in 18 career games with the Cardinals. He now has as many rushing TDs in 18 games with Arizona (15) as he had total TDs in 54 games played with Miami (15 – 9 rushing; 6 receiving).

Career games in which Drake has at least two TDs. All four of those outings have come in his 18 games with Arizona. Drake had two rushing TDs last week in New England.

Consecutive games in which rookie LB Isaiah Simmons has a sack. He is the first Cardinals rookie with a sack in back-to-back games since Sam Acho (Games 15-16) in 2011.

INTs for CB Dre Kirkpatrick this season. That ties his career high for a single season (also had 3 in 2013, 2014, 2016). Prior to 2020, Kirkpatrick had four total INTs in his previous five seasons (2015-19) combined. His INT of Cam Newton last week was Kirkpatrick's third in his last five games.

Career INTs for CB Patrick Peterson, who has three picks in 2020. Only four active players - Richard Sherman, Tramon Williams, Johnathan Joseph and Marcus Peters - have more.

Total tackles for S Budda Baker over the last two seasons (2019-20). The All-Pro leads all NFL DBs in total tackles and solo tackles (150) during that span.

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN WEEK 13

### WITH A WIN THIS WEEK...

- Arizona would improve to 4-2 at home this season. The 2020 campaign would mark the 12th time in 15 seasons at State Farm Stadium the Cardinals posted at least four home wins.
- The Cardinals would earn their first win over the Rams since the 2016 season finale and would also snap the Rams five-game winning streak at State Farm Stadium.

### MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

### **QB Kyler Murray**

- With a rushing TD Murray would have 11 rushing TDs in 2020. Among all QBs, only Cam Newton (14 in 2011) and Steve Grogan (12 in 1976) would have more rushing TDs in a single season.
- With both a rushing and passing TD Murray would establish an NFL single-season record for games with a passing and rushing TD (9).

### **WR Larry Fitzgerald**

- With a reception Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 254 consecutive games, extending the second-longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274).
- With a reception Fitzgerald would have 196 career receptions against the Rams. That would be the most for any player in NFL history vs. a single opponent. Fitzgerald currently has 195 catches against both the Rams and Seahawks.
- With a TD reception Fitzgerald would have 19 career TD catches against the Rams. In NFL history only Jerry Rice (25 vs. Falcons; 20 vs. Rams) would have more TD receptions vs. a single opponent.

### WR DeAndre Hopkins

- With 33 receiving yards Hopkins would reach 1,000 for the year. It would mark his sixth career 1,000-yard campaign and fourth in a row.
- With 100+ receiving yards Hopkins would have six 100-yard outings in 2020. The only season in his career he would have had more was in 2018 (7).

• With a sack Simmons would become just the fifth rookie in franchise history with at least one sack in three straight games: Sam Acho (3 in 2011), Simeon Rice (4 & 3 in 1996), Ken Harvey (3 in 1988) and Freddie Joe Nunn (3 in 1985).

• With a TD reception Kirk would have six TD catches in his last seven games. In his first 29 career games, Kirk had seven TD receptions.



RUSHING AVERAGE ABOVE RECORD PACE

After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018 the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season.

Through 11 games in 2020 the Cardinals are averaging 5.04 yards per rush attempt, putting them on pace to break the franchise record set in 2019.

### A RARE NINE IN A ROW WITH 100+ RUSHING YARDS

Arizona has rushed for 100+ yards in 10 of 11 games this season and started the year with 100+ rushing yards in each of the first nine games. <u>The 2020 season marked just the second time</u> (1984) in the last 60 years (1961-20) that the Cardi nals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first nine games of a season.

### **RUNNING FOR 150 & 200 UNDER KINGSBURY**

The Cardinals have rushed for 150+ yards in 11 of 27 games under Kingsbury. Arizona had seven such games in the three seasons (2016-18) prior to his arrival. The Cardinals are 9-2 when rushing for 150+ yards over the last two seasons.

Arizona has rushed for 200+ yards in a game five times under Kingsbury, including twice this season. The Cardinals had 200+ rushing yards in a game just five times in the previous 15 seasons combined (2004-18) prior to Kingsbury's arrival.

### LONG DISTANCE RUSHING TOUCHDOWNS

RB **Kenyan Drake** had a 69-yard rushing TD in Week 6 at Dallas giving Arizona four rushing TDs of 20+ yards in 2020 (QB **Kyler Murray** - 2; RB **Chase Edmonds** 1). That is the most in the NFL this season.

### THE ROOKIE PLAYMAKER

Cardinals 2020 first-round draft pick LB Isaiah Simmons - taken #8 overall by Arizona in April - has developed into a key playmaker for the Cardinals over the past month.

In the last five games Simmons has played 130 snaps and recorded 25 tackles, an INT, 2.0 sacks, four tackles for loss, a pass defensed and three QB hits.

He has a sack in each of the last two contests (@ Sea; @ NE), becoming the first Cards rookie since Sam Acho (Games 15-16 in 2011) with a sack in back-to-back games.

Simmons had his best in game in Week 11 at Seattle, posting a team-high 10 tackles, his first career sack, two tackles for loss and a QB hit.

In the Cardinals thrilling victory over Seattle in Week 7 came up with the INT that led to Arizona's game-winning FG in OT.



### **CAPTAIN BAKER - CARDINALS HEART & SOUL**

"The guy is a human eraser. He makes a ton of tackles, he brings energy, he brings juice, he's physical. He's our leader and our heart and soul on defense." - GM Steve Keim

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, S **Budda Baker** is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a gamehigh 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defensed in the win over Seattle. It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90



yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defensed, 2 tack-les for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6). The performance earn him NFC "Defensive Player of the Month" honors for October.

Baker has registered 82 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 5 tackles for loss, 2 INTs, 4 passes defensed and a forced fumble in 2020. His 82 tackles rank second on the team (Jordan Hicks - 87). Baker's 82 tackles rank fourth among all NFL DBs in 2020, despite having played in fewer games than any other player in the top-5.

In 2020, Murray became the first player in NFL history to throw for 2,000+ yards and rush for 500+ yards in the first eight games of a season. He now has a shot to become the first player in league history with 4,000+ passing yards and 1,000+ rushing yards in a season.



In victory over Buffalo in Week 10, **Murray** completed 22-of-32 pass attempts (68.8%) for 245 yards and a TD, while also rushing for 61 yards and two TDs on 11 carries. It was a milestone performance for a number of reasons.

WR DeAndre Hopkins has been as good as advertised in his first season with the Cardinals, who acquired the three-time 1st-team All-Pro in the offseason in a trade with Houston.

Through 11 games, Hopkins has 77 receptions for 967 yards and four TDs.

He is currently on pace for 112 receptions and 1,407 receiving yards in 2020. The reception total would establish a new franchise single-season record while the receiving yardage total would rank eighth in team history.

Hopkins' 43-yard game-winner against the Bills was the first go-ahead Hail Mary in the 4th quarter since 12/3/15 when Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers threw a game-winning 61-yard TD to TE Richard Rodgers as time expired to give the Packers a 27-23 victory over Detroit.

It also marked the first time the Cardinals won a game on a TD pass on the final scrimmage play of regulation since Josh McCown's 28-yard TD pass to WR Nate Poole as time expired on 12/29/03 vs. Minnesota. That TD gave the Cards an 18-17 win and knocked the Vikings out of postseason contention on the final day of the regular season.

Despite missing Arizona's Week 9 contest vs. Miami due to injury, the fifth-year pro is on pace for his first career 1,000-yard season.



### **UNDER THE RADAR BREAKOUT SEASON**

With much of the attention focused on All-Pro wideouts Larry Fitzgerald and DeAndre Hopkins - Kirk is quietly posting a breakout season in 2020, in which he leads the team with six TD catches.

But for anyone who saw Kirk play in his first two NFL seasons, it was easy to see the talent the local product possessed. In his first two seasons after being draft by Arizona, Kirk piled up 111 receptions for 1,299 yards and six TDs despite missing seven games due to injury.

<u>ONLY ANQUAN WAS FASTER TO 100</u> Playing in his  $22^{nd}$  career game in Week 14 vs. Pittsburgh last season, Kirk reached 100 receptions for his career. In franchise history, the only player to have 100 catches in fewer games was Anguan Boldin (16)

### AWARDS COME POURING IN

WR DeAndre Hopkins was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" following his now-famous 43-yard Hail Mary TD grab over three Bills defenders in the Cardinals 32-30 win vs. Buffalo in Week 10.

It was just the second "Player of the Week" award for Hopkins, who also earned the honor in 2015 (Week 6) with Houston.

In the win over the Bills, Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards, including a 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation. It was Hopkins fourth career game-winning TD catch in the fourth quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.

It is the Cardinals fourth "Player of the Week" selection this season and third "Offensive Player of the Week" award. The three "Of-fensive Player of the Week" awards are the most the Cardinals have had in a single season since 1996 (four).

### MURRAY AND BAKER CLEAN UP IN OCTOBER

The Cardinals piled up the awards in the month of October. S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October and QB **Kyler Mur**ray was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week' for his Week 7 performance vs. Seattle.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award all of which came in October.

It is just the fourth time (2015, Weeks 14-16; 2014, Weeks 8-10; 1998, Weeks 15-17) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.



DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER Baker was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his perfor-

mance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He played all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to re-cord at least 30 tackles, 2.0, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.

He was the only player in the NFL with multiple sacks and multiple INTs in October and his 31 tackles ranked second among all NFL DBs.

OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5 & 7)
Murray was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the
Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5 and vs. the Seahawks in Week 7. With his two "Offensive Player of the Week" selections in 2020, he has now earned the honor three times in his career. He joins Kurt Warner (5x) and Neil Lomax (4x) as the only QBs in team history with at least three "Offensive Player of the Week" selections.

Murray also became the first Cardinals QB to be named "Player of the Week" twice in the same season since Warner in 2009.

WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE: Murray completed a careerhigh 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3

TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

WEEK 5 AT NY JETS: Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for velta S Ai W 3613. Multily complete 27-01-37 plass attempts (72.3%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.

DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

Baker earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defensed and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

### **EDMONDS CHASES 1,000**

RB Chase Edmonds has 344 rushing yards on 70 carries (4.9 avg.) and 311 receiving yards on 40 receptions (8.3 avg.) so far in 2020. He also has four total TDs (1 rushing; 3 receiving).

With 655 yards in 2020, Edmonds has already established a career high for scrimmage yards in a season. He needs 345 yards over the final five games (69.0 ypg) to reach 1,000 scrimmage yards for the first time in his career.



### LARRY FITZGERALD - AT A GLANCE

 An 11-time Pro Bowl selection, ranks second in NFL history in receptions (1,421) and receiving yards (17,419) and sixth in league annals with 120 TD receptions.

With a team-high eight receptions against Seattle in Week 11, Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 253 consecutive games played. That is the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Jerry Rice (274 straight).

Fitzgerald's streak of 253 consecutive games with a catch is the longest in NFL history with a single team, and he has at least one catch in 259 of 260 career games played.

Fitzgerald missed the Cardinals Week 12 game against New England, but his streak was not affected by the absence.



### 10 MORE IN THE POSTSEASON

In addition to his 120 career TD catches in the regular season,  ${\it Fitzgerald}$  has 10 TD catches in nine career postseason games.

Fitzgerald is one of just eight players in NFL history with 10+ TD receptions in the postseason. Of those eight, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22 in 29 games) and John Stallworth (12 in 17 games) plus Bucs TE Rob Gronkowski (12 in 16 games) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

### A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- •Franchise career leader in receptions (1,421), receiving yards (17,419), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- •Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- •Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- •Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.

- Has appeared in 121 of a possible 123 games in his NFL career and has missed just one game (in 2017) due to injury.
- Has at least one reception in all 121 career games played during the regular season, the fifth-longest active streak in the NFL.
- In 2019, had 104 receptions for 1,165 yards and seven TDs while being named to the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive year and being named 1st-team All-Pro for the third straight season.
- Has surpassed 100 receptions three times in his career, has five seasons of 1,000+ receiving yards, three seasons with 10+ TDs and has posted 100+ receiving yards in a game 35 times in the regular season.
- Only active NFL player with at least 100 receptions, 1,500 receiving yards and 11 TD receptions in multiple seasons (2015; 2018).

### HISTORIC START TO HOP'S CAREER

**Hopkins** put up some historic numbers during his first seven seasons, totals that placed him among some of the best receivers to ever play in the NFL.

In league history, only Hall of Famer Marvin Harrison (665) had more receptions in his first seven NFL seasons than Hopkins (632).

### **ELEVATING A FRANCHISE**

The 2020 season is the 14<sup>th</sup> since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:
• Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona, which was played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, and the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.
- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.
- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee
- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

### KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

**Steve Keim** was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.





Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total of-fense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).
- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a recordsetting season.
- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB Carson Palmer from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB Chandler Jones from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR DeAndre Hopkins from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB Kenyan Drake.
- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.
- Named Sporting News 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-toback NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

### CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

Numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of making meaningful change a reality in the United States.

OL Kelvin Beachum - 11/20/20

OL Kelvin Beachum participated in an NFL-produced video "Say Their Stories" and discussed Breonna Taylor specifically:

"Saying her name is not just a slogan that we're putting on the back of our helmets. It's more than that. It's a rallying cry for Black women all across America, to realize how special she is and how special she was.

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL Corey Peters spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another, and we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody.

OL D.J. Humpries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is.

<u>Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020</u> Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature.

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very per-sonal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves.

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different.

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

**QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20** Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

### **P2 IN YEAR #10**

• Six-time team captain (2013, 2015-18, 2020) has totaled 466 tackles, 28 INTs (one returned for a TD) and 113 passes defensed in 149 games (all starts) during his first 10 NFL seasons. Only five players in Cardinals history – including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees – have had more INTs than Peterson (28).

• Started all 128 games during his first eight NFL seasons, becoming the first Cardinal since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to start 100+ straight games to begin a career.

 In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

• Voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons – seven times at CB (2012-18) and once as a kick returner (2011). Joined Hall of Famers Jim Brown and Barry Sanders as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to eight Pro Bowls before their 29th birthday.

 Peterson is the only player in team history selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons, and his eight consecutive Pro Bowl selections are a franchise record.

- Earned first-team All-Pro honors three times with two selections at CB (2013, 2015) and one as a kick returner (2011).
- Named NFC Defensive Player of the Week three times (Week 15, 2019; Week 10, 2014; Week 4, 2013), NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice (Week 9, 2011; Week 12, 2011) and Special Teams Player of the Month once (November 2011).
- Became the first NFL defender since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to have a reception and a completion in the same game vs. Det (9/15/13). Peterson's gloves and the football used on the pass completion were sent to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH.

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first nine seasons, he earned eight Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. Considered one of the game's best cover corners, he has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. Since his rookie season in 2011, only three NFL players have more INTs than Peterson.





Only five players in franchise history, including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees, have more INTs than Peterson.

Through 10 games with the Cardinals, CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** has a team-high three INTs, matching a single-season career best that he posted in 2013, '14 and '16. In Week 12 against New England, he intercepted a Cam Newton pass near midfield with 4:37 remaining in the game.

Prior to 2020, Kirkpatrick had four total INTs in his previous five seasons (2015-19) combined. His INT of Cam Newton last week was Kirkpatrick's third in his last five games.

His first pick as a Cardinal came against his former Bengals teammate, QB Andy Dalton, in the Monday Night Football win over Dallas in Week 6. It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. ### ACCOMPLISHED VET JOINS THE SECONDARY

In Week 10, the Cardinals signed CB Johna**than Joseph**, a two-time Pro Bowl selection who is in his 15<sup>th</sup> NFL season in 2020.

In his career, Joseph has played 210 games (192 starts) and has 780 tackles (663 solo), 32 INTs, 8 forced fumbles, 5 fumble recover ies and 200 passes defensed. He has scored 8 TDs in his career (7 INT return; 1 fumble return).

The 36-year old Joseph entered the league with Cincinnati as a first-round selection (24th overall) in the 2006 NFL Draft out of South Carolina and spent his first five seasons in the league with the Bengals before signing as a free agent with Houston in 2011 where he played the next nine seasons.



Now with the Cardinals, Joseph reunites with defensive coordinator Vance Joseph who was his position coach in Houston between 2011-13.


### TRADING THE DEEP FRYER FOR A GAME BALL

The only game ball given out following the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets went to third-year LB Dennis Gardeck - adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL playing field.

Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck – a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 – finished the game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps.

His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017.

It was a big performance for the Lake of the Hills, IL native but it wasn't the first success he has experienced in the NFL.



A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryars. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers


ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

### KICKING HIS WAY TO THE TOP

Since joining the Cardinals in 2018, K Zane Gonzalez has connected on 54-of-65 FG attempts, including 20 consecutive FGs between Weeks 5-16 of the 2019 season.

The ASU product matched a career high with four made FGs in the Week 10 win over Buffalo and made three-of-four FG attempts in the Week 7 win over the Seahawks on SNF.

He connected on a 44-yarder as time expired in regulation to send the Seahawks game into OT and a 48-yarder to win it in OT, marking the third game-winning kick of his career and the first to come in OT. He also had game-winners at Green Bay in 2018 and in Cincinnati in 2019.

### **CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)**

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

# \$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set upestablished to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

"Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact," said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. "We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, are proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together."

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona's Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund





In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the "Million Meal" donation were:

ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES "CARDINALS CARRY-OUT" INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched "Cardinals Carry-out" - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team's interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

"It's great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we're kind of in survival mode but we're going to make it out," said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

# HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community,

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced "vye-TAL-ent" and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local health care community, including our protection face chiefle curried marks. NOT marks, gloves

healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state's drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.

### CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

# DEANDRE HOPKINS - \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On

March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals -- Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK
In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS — \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE
Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY — \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUTH FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND
With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

<u>ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA</u>
Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued duringto the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

### COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND
With Memorial Day occurring in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.

### DEVON KENNARD - DELIVERED MEALS TO FOUR VALLEY FIRE DEPARTMENTS; VIRTUAL HOSPITAL VISITS

In May, Arizona native – and Cardinals 2020 free agent signing – Kennard gave back to his hometown when he teamed with Salad and Go to provide dinner for firefighters at dour different fire stations in the Ahwatukee area.

Every year Cardinals players and staff make numerous visits to Phoenix Children's Hospital to lift the spirits of the children and their families in pediatric units. Due to COVID-19 and the resulting safety restrictions, those visits have taken a new form. In late August, Kennard became the first Cardinals player to take the controls of a telepresence robot in order to spend time with children at PCH. While Kennard was at training camp at State Farm Stadium, he was able to drive the robot through the halls of PCH and interact with children through a video monitor.
