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## ARIZONA CARDINALS VS. CINCINNATI BENGALS

Paul Brown Stadium | October 6, 2019 | 10:00 AM



### THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

The Cardinals travel to Cincinnati this week for Arizona's first game at Paul Brown Stadium since 2011. Having won three of the last four against the Bengals, Arizona travels to Cincy looking to even up the all-time series, which the Bengals currently lead 6-5.

The majority of the meetings between these franchises have taken place on the Bengals home field. This week's game marks Arizona's eighth road trip in 12 all-time matchups in the series. The home team has won 10 of the 11 contests, with the lone exception being the Cardinals 35-27 victory at Paul Brown Stadium in 2007.

Historically, matchups between these two teams have been decided by narrow margins, with five of the last six meetings determined by eight points or fewer. In the 11 combined games between the two teams, Cincinnati holds a three-point advantage over Arizona (274-271).

The last time Arizona and Cincinnati squared off was in Week 11 of the 2015 season on Sunday Night Football. In that contest the Cardinals overcame an early deficit to take the lead, only to have the Bengals tie the game with a minute remaining in regulation. Arizona drove down the field quickly on its final possession and kicked a game-winning FG as time expired for a 34-31 victory.

Although the Cardinals and Bengals don't meet often, one Arizona defender knows this week's opponent well. Sunday's game will mark LB **Terrell Suggs'** 29th career matchp against Cincinnati and his 14th at Paul Brown Stadium. The NFL's active sacks leader, Suggs has recorded 12.5 of his 136.0 career sacks against the Bengals. Six of those sacks have been of Cincinnati QB Andy Dalton.

Another Arizona player who has had success against the Bengals is WR **Larry Fitzgerald**. In three career games against Cincy, he has 22 receptions for 288 yards and two TDs. In two games at Paul Brown Stadium, Fitzgerald has 14 receptions for 198 yards and two TDs.

Both the Cardinals and Bengals are coming off home losses in Week 4, as Arizona fell 27-10 to Seattle and Cincinnati was defeated 27-3 by the Steelers on Monday Night Football.

Highlighting Week 4 for Arizona was Fitzgerald, who passed Hall of Fame TE Tony Gonzalez for second place on the NFL's all-time receptions list. Former QB **Carson Palmer** became the 18<sup>th</sup> member of the Cardinals Ring of Honor in a ceremony at halftime.

Next week, the Cardinals return to State Farm Stadium to face the Falcons in the sixth meeting between the two teams in the last eight seasons. Cincinnati will travel to Baltimore for an AFC North showdown against the Ravens.

### FITZGERALD #2 ALL-TIME WITH 1,326 CAREER CATCHES

With five receptions against the Seahawks last week, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** (1,326) passed Hall of Fame TE Tony Gonzalez (1,325) for second place on the NFL's all-time receptions list behind only Hall of Fame WR Jerry Rice (1,549). Rice was on hand at State Farm Stadium last week as Fitz moved up the all-time list.

### THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- This week's game marks the 12<sup>th</sup> all-time matchup between the Cardinals and Bengals. Of those 12 matchups, eight will have taken place in Cincinnati.
- This week's matchup features two first-time NFL head coaches in **Kliff Kingsbury** and **Zac Taylor**. Both were former college QBs who were named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year as seniors.
- Sunday's game will feature three players who were named Cardinals High School Player of the Year during their prep career: Cardinals CB **Byron Murphy** (2015) and RB **D.J. Foster** (2011) and Bengals QB **Ryan Finley** (2012).
- LB **Jordan Hicks** - who starred at Lakota West High School in Cincinnati - returns to Ohio as the league's leading tackler in 2019. Hicks has 48 tackles this season and is the only player in the NFL with 10+ tackles in all four games.
- LB **Terrell Suggs** recorded 1.5 sacks against the Seahawks last week, giving him 136.0 sacks for his career. Suggs enters Sunday's game with more career sacks against the Bengals (12.5) than any player in NFL history.
- Arizona leads the NFL with 10 forced fumbles in 2019. The Cardinals have five "strip-sacks" of opposing QBs this season, which ranks second behind only Houston (7).

## CARDS-BENGALS CONNECTIONS

### Bengals Connections

Cardinals Defensive Coordinator **Vance Joseph** was the Bengals DBs coach from 2014-15, helping the Bengals to back-to-back postseason appearances. During those two seasons the Bengals led the NFL with 41 INTs and were the only team to post more INTs than TDs allowed (36) in that span.

Cardinals OL **Clinton McDonald** was drafted by the Bengals in the seventh round of the 2010 NFL Draft and played eight games for the team during his rookie campaign.

Cardinals WR **Pharoh Cooper** was signed by the Bengals in September and played in one game with Cincinnati (Week 1 @ Sea) earlier this season.

Cardinals OL **Justin Murray** signed with the Bengals late in the 2017 season and spent the 2018 offseason with Cincinnati.

### Cardinals Connections

Bengals D-Line coach **Nick Eason** played 32 games for the Cardinals from 2011-12.

Bengals OT **Andre Smith** played eight games for the Cardinals during the 2018 season.

Bengals Asst. Strength and Conditioning coach **Garrett Swanson** played the 2016 preseason with the Cardinals after signing with the team as an undrafted rookie free agent.

### Cincinnati/Ohio Connections

Cardinals LB **Jordan Hicks** and OL **Justin Murray** both hail from Cincinnati. Hicks was named Gatorade's Ohio High School Player of the year in 2009, and Murray attended the University of Cincinnati from 2011-15.

Cardinals WR **Andy Isabella** (Mayfield), LBs coach **Bill Davis** (Youngstown) and Video Director **Jeff Wallo** (Youngstown) are Ohio natives. Davis was a QB and WR at the University of Cincinnati from 1985-88 and went on to coach at Ohio State from 2016-18.

Cardinals Asst. WRs coach **Peter Badovinac** (2018), LBs coach **Bill Davis** (2016-18) and Offensive Assistant **Jerry Sullivan** (1991) all coached at Ohio State.

Cardinals Head Athletic Trainer **Tom Reed** was as an assistant athletic trainer at Miami (OH) University from 1996-99.

### Arizona Connections

Bengals QB **Ryan Finley** attended Paradise Valley (Phoenix, AZ) High School where he earned first-team All-State honors after leading the state in passing with 3,442 yards and 35 TDs as a senior in 2012.

Bengals DT **Renell Wren** played at Arizona State from 2014-18 and earned honorable mention All-Pac 12 honors in 2018.

Bengals Offensive Assistant **Brad Kragthorpe** was born in Flagstaff.

## CARDS VS. BENGALS - SERIES BREAKDOWN

This Sunday's matchup between the Cardinals and Bengals represents the 12<sup>th</sup> all-time meeting between the two teams and first since 2015. Arizona enters this week's game having won three of the last four against Cincinnati and will look to even up the all-time series, which the Bengals currently lead 6-5.

The Cardinals are making their first trip to Cincinnati since 2011 but the majority of the meetings between these franchises have taken place on the Bengals home field. This week's game marks Arizona's eighth road trip in 12 all-time matchups against Cincinnati.

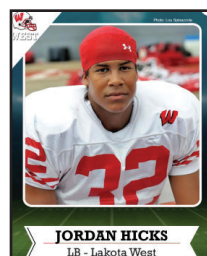
Cardinals head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** and Bengals head coach **Zac Taylor** were both hired as first-time NFL head coaches this offseason. The pair have much more in common than being among the six first-time NFL head coaches hired in 2019.

- Both began their coaching careers in 2008 - Kingsbury as an offensive quality control coach at Houston and Taylor as a grad assistant at Texas A&M.
- Both were star QBs at the college level and each was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year: Kingsbury at Texas Tech in 2002; Taylor at Nebraska in 2006. Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round (201<sup>st</sup> overall) in 2003. Taylor signed with the Buccaneers as a rookie free agent in 2007.
- Kingsbury set 39 school and 17 NCAA records at Texas Tech, throwing for 12,423 yards and 95 TDs. Taylor led the Cornhuskers to a 9-3 record and an appearance the Big 12 Championship Game in '06.
- Both have earned reputations for their work with young QBs. Kingsbury tutored six future NFL quarterbacks during his college tenure, a list includes first-round selections **Patrick Mahomes**, **Baker Mayfield** and **Johnny Manziel** as well as **Case Keenum**, **Davis Webb** and **Nic Shimonek**. Taylor was tasked with the development of first-round picks in both Miami (**Ryan Tannehill**) and Los Angeles (**Jared Goff**).

## THE LOCAL STARS

The rosters of both the Cardinals and Bengals feature players who starred at high schools in the opposing franchise's home state.

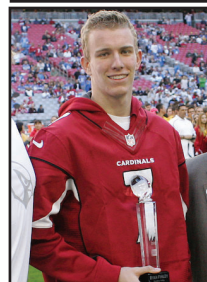
Arizona LB **Jordan Hicks** - the NFL's leading tackler in 2019 - attended Lakota West High School in Cincinnati where he was a prep All-American and two-time first-team All-State selection at LB. Following his senior season in 2009, Hicks was named the Butkus Award winner as the nation's top LB and Gatorade's Ohio High School Player of the Year.

He was also named a USA Today, EA Sports and PARADE first-team All-American selection that year. Hicks posted 216 tackles, 8.5 sacks, 36 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles, four INTs, 10 passes defended and a TD over his final three seasons. Hicks also lettered in basketball at Lakota, setting district records for most varsity basketball games played (87) and total steals (170).

Bengals rookie QB **Ryan Finley** (pictured bottom-right receiving HSOY Award at Cardinals game in 2012) starred at Paradise Valley High School, where he was named Arizona Cardinals High School Player of the Year and first-team All-State as a senior in '12.



He completed 270-of-424 passes for the Trojans that year, leading the state of Arizona with 3,442 passing yards. He threw for 35 TDs and also rushed 96 times for 282 yards and four scores during his final prep campaign when he led Paradise Valley to the state playoffs.

Consecutive sellouts at State Farm Stadium (including preseason and postseason). The Cardinals have sold out every game played at the stadium since it opened in 2006.

**1,326**

Career receptions for WR Larry Fitzgerald, who last week passed Hall of Fame TE Tony Gonzalez (1,325) for second place on the NFL's all-time receptions list. Fitzgerald also ranks #2 all-time in receiving yards (16,579) and #6 all-time in TD receptions (118).

**2**

Receiving TDs for Fitzgerald in two career games at Paul Brown Stadium. He has one TD in each game played on the Bengals home field. Fitzgerald also had 198 receiving yards in those two games at Paul Brown Stadium.

**12.5**

Sacks for Suggs in 28 games against the Bengals. He has more sacks against the Bengals than any other player in NFL history.

**136.0**

Career sacks for Suggs. With 1.5 sacks against the Seahawks last week, he tied Jared Allen for 11<sup>th</sup> place on the NFL's all-time sacks list.

**6.0**

Sacks for Suggs in 12 career games against Bengals QB Andy Dalton. The only QB Suggs has sacked more times in his career is Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger (12.0).

**2008**

Year that both Cardinals head coach Kliff Kingsbury and Bengals head coach Zac Taylor began their coaching careers. Kingsbury began as an offensive quality control coach at the University of Houston and Taylor started as a grad assistant at Texas A&M.

**3**

Players on the Arizona and Cincinnati combined rosters that were named Cardinals High School Player of the Year during their prep career: AZ CB Byron Murphy (2015) and RB D.J. Foster (2011) and Cin QB Ryan Finley (2012).

**48**

Tackles for LB Jordan Hicks through four games. Hicks leads the NFL in tackles this season and is the only player in the league with 10+ tackles in all four games played.

**2**

Forced fumbles for Hicks through four games. Entering this year, Hicks had just one forced fumble in his first four NFL seasons (spanning 43 games). That forced fumble came in his second-ever game during his rookie season in 2015.

**44.0**

Sacks for LB Chandler Jones in 52 career games with the Cardinals. Since being acquired by Arizona in a trade with New England in 2016, Jones has 3.5 more sacks than any other player in the NFL.

**10**

Forced fumbles for the Cardinals defense/special teams this season. That total leads the NFL. Three Arizona players - LBs Chandler Jones (3), Terrell Suggs (2) and Jordan Hicks (2) - are among the 10 players with at least two forced fumbles this season.

**106**

Completions for Murray this season, which is the most in NFL history in a player's first four career games.

**96**

Rushing yards for Murray in the last two games, including his first career rushing TD (9 yards) last week vs. Seattle. Murray rushed for 17 yards in the Cardinals first two games combined.

**67**

Receptions for second-year WR Christian Kirk in his first 16 career games. In franchise history, only Anquan Boldin (101 in 2003) and Sonny Randle (77 from 1959-60) had more receptions in their first 16 career games.

**46**

Career TDs (32 rushing, 13 receiving, 1 KOR) for RB David Johnson, which is tied with WR Mel Gray for seventh on the franchise all-time list for career TDs.

**26**

Games in which Johnson has posted 100+ yards for scrimmage during his career. He finished last week's game vs. Seattle with 139 total yards (99 receiving, 40 rushing). Dating back to 2015, only four active players have more games with 100+ scrimmage yards: Julio Jones (32), Ezekiel Elliott (31), Todd Gurley (29) and LeSean McCoy (28).

**11**

Rookies on the Cardinals current active roster, which is tied for the second-highest total in the NFL behind only Oakland (13). Arizona has had nine rookies appear in a game this season, including five who have started at least one game.

## PALMER ENTERS THE RING OF HONOR

The Cardinals inducted QB **Carson Palmer** into its Ring of Honor at halftime of last week's game vs. Seattle at State Farm Stadium.

Palmer became the 18<sup>th</sup> member of the Cardinals Ring of Honor, the creation of which coincided with the opening of State Farm Stadium in 2006.

"It was the most fun I've had playing football, and I had a lot of fun in college," Palmer said of his time with the Cardinals. "I had some fun playing for the Bengals, but it's the most fun I've had playing the game. I met some unbelievable (people). It's not just the coaches and the players. It's everybody that's affiliated with this organization."

### HIGHLIGHTS FROM PALMER'S ARIZONA TENURE

- Acquired by the Cardinals in a trade with Oakland prior to the 2013 in which Arizona gave up a sixth round pick. Played five seasons in Arizona (2013-17).
- His .642 win percentage (38-21-1) is the best for a starting QB in team history.
- Started 60 games, completing 1,373-of-2,197 pass attempts (62.5%) for 16,782 yards, 105 TDs, 57 INTs and a 91.1 passer rating.
- Holds the franchise's single-season records for passing yards (4,671), TDs (35) and passer rating (104.6), all of which he set in 2015.
- Led the Cardinals to a franchise single-season record 13 wins in 2015 and an appearance in the NFC Championship game.
- Holds the franchise record for 300-yard passing games (25) and 400-yard passing performances (3).



## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN WEEK 5...

### WITH A WIN THIS WEEK...

- The Cardinals would even their all-time series against the Bengals at six wins apiece. Arizona would have back-to-back wins against Cincinnati and four wins in the last five games against the Bengals.

### MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

#### WR Larry Fitzgerald

- With a reception, Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 232 consecutive games, the second-longest reception streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274).
- With a TD reception, Fitzgerald would have 119 career TD catches. It would give him a TD reception in all three career games played at Paul Brown Stadium.

#### RB David Johnson

- With a TD (of any kind), Johnson would have 47 TDs. That would set a new franchise record for TDs in a player's first five seasons.
- With a rushing TD, Johnson would tie John David Crow (33) for third place on the franchise all-time list for career rushing TDs.

#### QB Kyler Murray

- With 300+ passing yards, Murray would become the first player in franchise history to throw for 300+ yards at least three times in his rookie season.

#### LB Terrell Suggs

- With a sack, Suggs would have 137.0 career sacks, putting him alone in 11<sup>th</sup> place on the NFL's all-time sacks list.
- With a sack, Suggs would have 13.5 career sacks against the Bengals. He already has more sacks vs. Cincy (12.5) than any player in NFL history. It would also give him 7.0 career sacks of Cincinnati QB Andy Dalton.

#### LB Jordan Hicks

- With 10+ tackles this week, Hicks would extend his career-long streak to five consecutive games with double-digit tackles.

#### LB Chandler Jones

- With a sack, Jones would have 45.0 sacks in 53 games with Arizona.

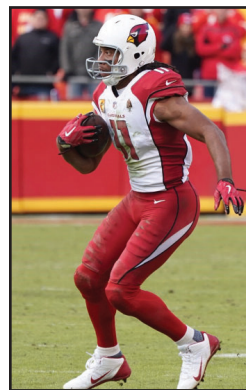

### MURRAY THROWS FOR 300+ IN 1st TWO GAMES

Playing his first-ever game in the Cardinals season-opener vs. Detroit, rookie QB **Kyler Murray** threw for 308 yards. *In doing so, he became just the fifth rookie in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in a season-opener.* He is the first Cardinals rookie in history to throw for 300+ yards in his first career game.

In Week 2 at Baltimore Murray exceeded that total, throwing for 349 yards against the Ravens. *He joined Cam Newton (2011) as the only QBs in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in each of their two career games.*

*Murray (657) and Newton (854) are the only two QBs in NFL history with at least 650 passing yards in their first two career games.*

Murray is the first rookie in Cardinals history to throw for 300+ yards in consecutive games. He joins Jake Plummer (2, 1997) as the only QBs with multiple 300-yard outings in their rookie season.

## #1'S RECORD-BREAKING DEBUT

*When Arizona hosted Detroit in Week 1, Murray became the first Cardinals rookie QB to start a season opener since Lamar McHan in 1954.*

That wasn't the only history Murray made in that contest. Below are a few more highlights:

- Leading the Cardinals to an 18-point fourth quarter comeback to tie the Lions, completed 29-of-54 pass attempts for 308 yards and 2 TDs.
- Became the first player in franchise history to throw for 300+ yards in his first career game.
- *Joined Jake Plummer (1997) as the only players in franchise history to throw for 300+ yards and multiple TDs in a game during their rookie season.*

- Sparked the comeback with his performance in the fourth quarter and OT, when he completed 20-of-29 pass attempts (68.9%) for 238 yards, 2 TDs, 0 INTs.

Murray is one of eight active QBs who were selected #1 overall in the NFL Draft. *He is the only one of the eight not to lose in their NFL debut.* Below is a look at the stat lines in their debut for all eight active QBs taken with the #1 overall:

After rushing for 17 total yards in the first two games, **Murray** has 96 rushing yards in the last two contests, including his first career rushing TD (9 yards) last week against Seattle.

Murray had his highest rushing output in Week 3 vs. Carolina when he finished with 69 yards on eight carries (8.6 avg.). His 69 rushing yards represent the fifth-best single-game total by a QB in franchise history. The only rookie QB to rush for more yards in a game was M.C. Reynolds (99) in 1958.

"I think they're more excited because they're getting a gift from Chandler Jones," said Tom Baleno, the U-E Football Coach, via *Spectrum News*.

"He's top-notch, he's mastered his craft in the NFL, and just to have – it could be anything – a gift from him is what's really special."

Jones, a 2008 graduate of U-E, went on to star at Syracuse before the Patriots selected him with the 21<sup>st</sup> overall pick in the 2012 NFL Draft. He was acquired by the Cardinals in 2016 and leads the NFL in sacks (44.0) over the last three-plus seasons (2016-19).

"We know what that's like and if something ever happened to our kids, we would want the same support so this just means the world to us," said Meghan.

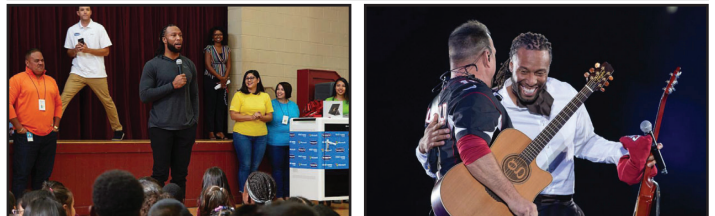
The Johnson Family's Mission 31 Foundation provides opportunities, encouragement and resources to seriously ill children and their families by offering daily support and life changing experiences.

Foster, Kirk and Murphy all attended Saguaro High School and won a collective six state championships with the Sabercats from 2008-15.

Foster set a single-season state record with 60 total TDs while leading Saguaro to an Arizona Division III State Championship as a senior in 2011.

Kirk was an All-American and earned 2014 Arizona Gatorade Player of the Year honors after surpassing 3,000 all-purpose yards and scoring 46 total TDs as a senior.

Murphy helped lead the Sabercats to state titles during both his junior and senior seasons and was named the Arizona Division II Player of the Year and first-team All-Arizona in 2015.

## CARDS JOIN NFL TO CELEBRATE 100TH SEASON

The NFL is celebrating its 100th season in 2019. As the United States' oldest professional football franchise still in existence, the Cardinals hold a unique place in league history.



The Cardinals were founded in 1898 as the Morgan Athletic Club, predating the formation of the NFL by over 20 years. By the time the NFL was founded in 1920 as the American Professional Football Association (APFA), the team was known as the Racine Cardinals when it became one of the 14 charter members of the upstart league after paying a \$100 franchise fee. Today, the Cardinals and Chicago Bears represent the only two charter members of the NFL still in existence.

In 1932, Hall of Fame owner Charles W. Bidwill, Sr., then a vice president of the Bears, purchased the Cardinals. After divesting himself of his Bears' holdings, that began a period of family ownership that continues today with current owner **William V. Bidwill** and team president **Michael Bidwill**.

In 2019, the Cardinals will join the NFL in celebrating 100 years of play with a year-long series of "NFL 100" events, initiatives and programs celebrating fans, players and communities.

The historic and unprecedented celebration is a salute to the millions of fans who love the game; highlighting the unifying nature of football and its positive impact in communities; bringing together generations of past, present and future players; and looking ahead to the NFL's next 100 years.

## CARDS A MEMBER OF NFL'S TWO OLDEST RIVALRIES

Having met twice during the NFL's inaugural season in 1920, the Cardinals and Bears represent the oldest rivalry in league history. The Cardinals and Packers – who joined the league in 1921 – are the NFL's second-oldest rivalry. The Packers were formed in 1919 by Earl (Curly) Lambeau and George Calhoun but did not gain entry into the APFA until 1921.

- The Cards and Bears have faced each other 90 times during the regular season, dating back to 1920.
- The first-ever meeting between the Cardinals and Bears – then known as the Racine Cardinals and Decatur Staleys – occurred at Normal Park in Chicago on November 28th, 1920, exactly 72 days after the league was conceived as the APFA during a meeting in Canton, OH. In that game, the Cardinals defeated the Staleys 7-6 at Normal Park.
- The first meeting between the Cardinals and Packers (a 3-3 tie) occurred on November 20, 1921 at Normal Park in Chicago. The following week (November 27, 1921), the Packers and Bears met for the first time.

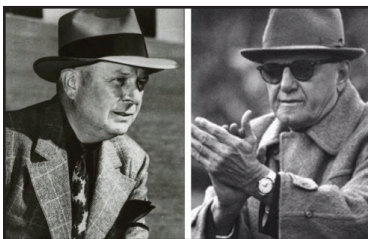
## FRIENDSHIP OF THE HALL OF FAME OWNERS

Cardinals Hall of Fame owner **Charles Bidwill** and Bears Hall of Fame owner **George Halas** had a friendship that endured even as their team's were cross-town rivals during their shared time in Chicago.

At one point during the Great Depression, that friendship helped save Halas' ownership of the Bears.

In 1931, Halas' co-owner Edward "Dutch" Sternaman proposed being bought out of his stake in the Bears for \$38,000, which was to be paid in installments. After suffering \$18,000 in losses during the 1932 season, Halas was \$15,000 short when the final payment was due in 1933. Defaulting on the payment meant ownership would revert to Sternaman.

"It was a case of finding \$15,000 in a hurry, or losing everything I'd worked for since moving the Staleys from Decatur to Chicago in 1921," Halas wrote in 1967 in a history of the Bears published in the Chicago Tribune. "From this desperate situation, I was rescued by the joint efforts of my mother and my good friend Charley Bidwill. Mother bought \$5,000 worth of stock from her savings. Bidwill purchased \$5,000 in stock and also arranged a bank loan for the remaining \$5,000 needed. But it was a mighty close call. As I remember, I finally got all the money together at 11:10 a.m. on the day the final note came due. Forfeit time was 12 o'clock noon."

## A HISTORY OF BEING THE FIRST

In addition to being the oldest professional football team in the country, the Cardinals also have a long history of serving as a pioneer in the sport – both on and off the playing field.

### DIVERSITY

**1st Female Owner in NFL History:** Following the 1947 death of Cardinals owner and Pro Football Hall of Fame Charles Bidwill, his wife Violet oversaw operations of the franchise for the next 15 years. As such, she became the first female to serve as principal owner in NFL history and is believed to be the first female owner in American pro sports.

**1st African American Female Executive in NFL History:**

Adele Harris spent 26 seasons with the franchise before retiring in 2001. She holds the distinction of being the first African American female to hold a front office position with an NFL team. Harris first worked as a secretary for the St. Louis Football Cardinals from 1971-74. She left the club to pursue a degree in business management and returned to the team in 1978 as a publicity assistant. By 1980, Harris became the team's director of community relations, and was instrumental in the team's civic efforts when it relocated to Arizona in 1988. Harris passed away in November of 2007.

**1st African American to Handle Contract Negotiations for NFL Team:** In 1981, the team hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club.

**1st African American Head Coach/General Manager Tandem:** In 2004, the Cardinals hired Dennis Green as the team's head coach. Joining General Manager Rod Graves, they became the first African American general manager/head coach pairing. Hired by Arizona in 1997 as Assistant to the President, Graves spent 16 seasons with the organization, including the last six years at the team's GM.

**1st Female Coach in NFL History:** In 2015, the Cardinals hired Jen Welter as a coaching intern for training camp and the preseason to work with inside linebackers, making her the first female coach of any kind in NFL history.

### INTERNATIONAL PLAY

**1st NFL Game Outside of North America:** The most popular sport in the United States played before an international audience for the first time ever when the Cardinals and San Diego Chargers met for a preseason matchup at Korakuen Stadium in Tokyo, Japan. On August 16, 1976 the Cardinals defeated the Chargers 20-10 before an estimated crowd of 38,000.

**1st NFL Game in Europe:** On August 6, 1983 the Cardinals faced the Minnesota Vikings in a preseason matchup at Wembley Stadium in London. The Vikings defeated the Cardinals 28-10 in front of 32,847 fans at the landmark event.

**1st NFL Regular Season Game Played Outside United States:** On October 2, 2005 the Cardinals earned a 17-point come-from-behind victory over the San Francisco 49ers in a game played in front of a then-record crowd of 103,467 at Mexico City's Estadio Azteca. It was the first NFL regular season game ever played outside of the US.

### FOOTBALL FIRSTS

**1st Night Game in NFL History:**

On November 6, 1929 the Providence Steamrollers became the first team to host a game at night using floodlights in a matchup against the Cardinals. That night contest also featured the first use of a football painted white during an actual game. With fan attendance crucial to generate revenue, the game was played in the evening rather than during the workday. The minor league baseball field of Kinsley Park was adorned with floodlights and the Cards earned a 16-0 victory over the Steamrollers.

**1st Out of Town Training Camp:** Prior to the 1929 season, the Cardinals conducted what is believed to be the NFL's first extended out-of-town training camp when the team spent the summer at Waterworks Park in Coldwater, Michigan.

**1st Indoor NFL Game:** With the country struggling through the Great Depression in late 1930, the Chicago Cardinals challenged the cross-town Bears to play a game to raise money for the governor's fund for unemployment relief. To battle the freezing temperatures the teams agreed to play at Chicago Stadium, then the largest indoor arena in the world. On December 15, 1930 the Bears earned a 9-7 victory in front of 10,000 fans. Six inches of dirt were hauled in and rolled for a playing surface, forcing the teams to use a white ball to increase visibility for both the players and fans. In addition to raising thousands of dollars for charity, it was a precursor to the 1932 championship when the Bears played for the NFL title in the same venue against the Portsmouth Spartans.

**1st Retractable Grass Field in NFL History:** When the Cardinals opened their new stadium in 2006, the venue broke the mold in terms of design and architecture. Among its most unique features is a fully retractable grass playing surface that resides outside the stadium for 300+ days a year and rolls in when needed. The first of its kind in NFL history, the stadium's grass playing surface has consistently ranked #1 in surveys of the league's players.



# THE KINGSBURY ERA BEGINS IN ARIZONA

## TAKING THE REINS

On January 8, 2019 the Cardinals announced the hiring of **Kliff Kingsbury** as the team's head coach.

The 40-year old Kingsbury spent the past six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech, and was hired as USC's offensive coordinator in December. The New Braunfels, TX native is an 11-year coaching veteran who has also worked at Texas A&M (2012) and at the University of Houston (2008-11) where he began his coaching career.

Recognized as one of the profession's brightest and most-innovative offensive minds, Kingsbury has tutored six future NFL QBs, including first-round selections Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield and Johnny Manziel as well as Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek. Under Kingsbury's guidance, Mahomes (2016) and Keenum (2009, '11) both led the nation in passing.



### Highlights from Kingsbury's Coaching Career

- While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive and productive offenses. The Red Raiders featured a passing attack that ranked in the top-10 in the country in all six seasons of his tenure, ranked in the top-20 nationally for total offense in all six seasons and finished in the top-25 in scoring five times.
- Under Kingsbury, Texas Tech averaged at least 30 points per game, 470 total yards per game and 300 passing yards per game in all six seasons. The Red Raiders averaged more than 500 yards of offense in four seasons and over 450 passing yards twice. They also averaged at least 140 rushing yards per game four times in six seasons under Kingsbury and averaged more than 40 points per game twice.
- At both Houston (2011) and Texas Tech (2016) Kingsbury's offenses led the nation in total offense and passing offense.
- Dating back to his first offensive coordinator job at Houston in 2011, a Kingsbury-led offense never finished outside the top-20 in the nation in total offense and never finished outside the top-15 in passing offense.
- In 2016, Texas Tech led the nation in total offense (566.6 ypg) and passing offense (463.0 ypg) while finishing #5 in scoring (43.7 ppg). It was the sixth consecutive season a Kingsbury-led unit finished in the top-10 in total offense dating back to his time at both Houston and Texas A&M.
- In 2015, the Red Raiders finished #2 in the nation in total offense (579.5 ypg), #2 in scoring offense (45.1 ppg) and had the nation's second ranked passing offense (388.2 ypg). The 45.1 points per game average established a school single-season record and Texas Tech was one of just two schools in the nation to score at least 25 points in every game. The Red Raiders featured a 4,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.
- With Kingsbury serving as co-offensive coordinator in 2011, Houston led the nation in total offense (599.1 ypg), passing offense (450.1 ypg) and scoring (49.3 ppg) as quarterback Case Keenum finished his collegiate career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history.

Kingsbury spent the 2012 season at Texas A&M as offensive coordinator/QBs coach working under current University of Arizona head coach Kevin Sumlin. Texas A&M finished third nationally in total offense (558.5 ypg) with an attack that finished 13th nationally in rushing (242.1 ypg) and 14th in passing (316.5 ypg). The Aggies beat #1 Alabama on the road and #11 Oklahoma in the Cotton Bowl.

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston under Sumlin as the offensive quality control coach (2008-09) prior to being elevated to QBs coach (2010) and then co-offensive coordinator in 2011.

Kingsbury played QB at Texas Tech (1999-2002) where he set 39 school records, 16 Big 12 marks and 17 NCAA records during his collegiate career while throwing for 12,423 yards and 95 TDs. As a senior in 2002, he was awarded the Sammy Baugh Trophy as the nation's top college QB and was also named the Associated Press Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year while finishing ninth in Heisman Trophy voting.

He was drafted in the sixth round of the NFL Draft by New England in 2003 and spent his rookie season on the Patriots injured reserve list before spending the 2004 season on the Saints practice squad. Kingsbury played in one game with the Jets in 2005 and attended training camp with the Bills in 2006. He also played with the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe in 2006 before playing with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League in 2007.

In 2018, Kingsbury was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame. He played high school football under his father, Tim, at New Braunfels (TX) High School where he threw for more than 3,000 yards and 34 TDs as a senior.

## KINGSBURY ERA BEGINS IN UNIQUE FASHION

Cardinals first-year head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** made his NFL debut in the Cardinals matchup against the Lions in Week 1. *At 40 years, 30 days old he became the youngest Week 1 head coach for the Cardinals since Joe Kuharich (35 years, 166 days) in 1952.*

### A RARE RESULT IN HIS FIRST GAME

Exactly 98 years, 10 months and 30 days after playing their first game as an NFL franchise (0-0 tie against the Chicago Tigers), the Cardinals played to a 27-27 tie with the Lions in the season-opener against the Lions in Week 1.

Kingsbury joins the coach from that '20 matchup vs. the Tigers – Pro Football Hall of Famer **Paddy Driscoll** – as the only coaches in franchise history to have their debut game end in a tie.

Prior to Kingsbury, the last NFL coaching debut that resulted in a tie was Detroit's Joe Schmidt, who led the Lions to a 17-17 tie against the Packers on 9/17/67.



## COACHING QUARTERBACKS

After joining the coaching ranks with the University of Houston in 2008, **Kliff Kingsbury** mentored six future NFL QBs during his coaching tenure: *Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield, Johnny Manziel, Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek*. Mahomes, Mayfield and Manziel were all selected in the 1st round of the NFL Draft.

### Mahomes (Texas Tech)

Under Kingsbury's tutelage, Mahomes spent two full seasons (2015-16) as the starter at Texas Tech. In those two years the Red Raiders finished #2 (2015) and #1 (2016) in the nation in total offense while Mahomes threw for a combined 9,705 yards and 77 TDs in 25 starts.

As a sophomore in 2015, Mahomes became the youngest QB in NCAA history to amass 5,000 yards of total offense. He eclipsed the 5,000-yard mark again in 2016, becoming just the third quarterback ever to record 5,000+ yards of total offense in back-to-back seasons.

### Keenum (Univ. of Houston)

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston where he was a quality control coach from 2008-09 before being promoted to QBs coach in 2010 and co-offensive coordinator in 2011. The Cougars led the nation in total offense, passing offense and scoring in 2011, while Keenum completed his record-setting career by placing seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and winning the Sammy Baugh Award.

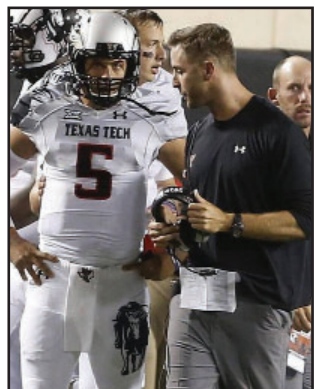
With Kingsbury calling plays, the Cougars averaged 599.1 total yards per game, including 450.1 through the air, while scoring over 49 points per game. Keenum wrapped up his career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history. In his one season with Kingsbury as his QBs coach, Keenum completed 428-of-604 passes for 5,631 yards and 48 TDs, all of which led the NCAA FBS.

### Manziel (Texas A&M)

Prior to taking over at Texas Tech, Kingsbury spent one season (2012) as the offensive coordinator at Texas A&M. In his lone season with the Aggies, Kingsbury played a crucial role in Manziel becoming the first freshman ever to win the Heisman Trophy.

### Webb and Shimonek (Texas Tech)

Two other Kingsbury quarterbacks have also moved on to the league in recent years as Webb was selected by the New York Giants in the third round of the 2017 draft while Shimonek signed an undrafted free agent agreement with the Los Angeles Chargers in 2018.



## TOM CLEMENTS - PASS GAME COORDINATOR/QBS

Now in his first season as the Cardinals Pass Game Coordinator/QBs coach, veteran assistant **Tom Clements** (CLEM-ents) is a 24-year coaching veteran who has spent 20 seasons as an assistant coach in the NFL, including five seasons as an offensive coordinator.

- Named Cardinals pass game coordinator/QBs coach on 1/22/19.
- Coached for 11 seasons with the Packers (2006-16). In his 11 seasons with Green Bay, the Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in total offense nine times, made the postseason nine times and won Super Bowl XLV following the 2010 season.
- During his tenure with the Packers, Clements helped with the development of QB Aaron Rodgers who was selected to six Pro Bowls and earned NFL MVP honors in 2011 and 2014.
- In three seasons as offensive coordinator with Green Bay (2012-14), the Packers ranked #3 in the NFL in scoring (27.8 ppg), #5 in total offense (381.9 ypg), #3 in giveaways (54) and #5 in first downs (1,048).
- The Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in scoring in each season Clements worked as offensive coordinator, including in 2014 when the Packers led the NFL with 486 points.
- Also coached QB Brett Favre, who in 2007 was selected to the Pro Bowl after throwing for more than 4,000 yards for the fifth time in his career and led the Packers to the NFC Championship game.
- Has coached 13 different offensive players to a total of 21 Pro Bowls and tutored five quarterbacks who had 13 total 3,000-yard passing seasons, including eight 4,000-yard campaigns.

Prior to joining Green Bay, Clements spent two seasons (2004-05) as the offensive coordinator in Buffalo. He spent the previous seven years as a QBs coach with Pittsburgh, Kansas City and New Orleans. Clements helped Elvis Grbac (Chiefs in 2000) and Kordell Stewart (Steelers in 2001) earn Pro Bowl selections while Tommy Maddox (Pittsburgh) was named NFL Comeback Player of the Year in 2002.

Clements got his start in coaching at his alma mater, Notre Dame, spending four seasons (1992-95) working under Lou Holtz. He played 12 years in the Canadian Football League as a QB and was a seven-time divisional All-Star, 1987 CFL MVP, 1975 CFL Rookie of the Year and two-time Gray Cup Champion with Ottawa (1976) and Winnipeg (1984), earning the Outstanding Offensive Player award in each game.



## JEFF RODGERS - ASST. HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS

**Jeff Rodgers** is in his second season with Arizona and first as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator.

He came to Cardinals in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019.

- Hired as Cardinals special teams coordinator in 2018 after working in the same capacity for three seasons (2015-17) with the Chicago Bears.
- Has 18 years of coaching experience, including 15 seasons coaching special teams in the NFL with Arizona, Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).

• Helped the Cardinals rank 5th in the NFL in special teams last season after the team finished 30th in 2017. P Andy Lee led the NFL and set a franchise single-season record with a 48.6-yard punting average and rookie LB Zeke Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles in 2018.

• The Broncos returned six kicks for TDs during Rodgers tenure in Denver (2011-14), tied for the second most in the NFL in that span. In 2012, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record multiple return TDs in a playoff game when he scored on a 90-yard punt return and a 104-yard kickoff return in a 38-35 double-overtime loss to the Ravens.

• Under Rodgers tutelage, Broncos K Matt Prater was named to the Pro Bowl in 2013 after setting franchise records in field goal percentage (96.2%; 25-of-26) and points scored (150). Prater's 64-yard field goal in 2013 is the longest in NFL history. In 2014, K Connor Barth's 93.8 field-goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest in team history.

Rodgers began his coaching career at the University of Arizona in 2001, spending two seasons as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and LBs under head coach John Mackovic. He entered the NFL coaching ranks with San Francisco in 2003 as a special teams quality control coach for two seasons.



## VANCE JOSEPH - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

**Vance Joseph** was hired as Arizona's Defensive Coordinator this offseason and joined the Cardinals after two years (2017-18) as head coach of the Denver Broncos.

He is a 20-year coaching veteran, including 14 seasons in the NFL with San Francisco (2005-10), Houston (2011-13), Cincinnati (2014-15), Miami (2016) and Denver (2017-18).

- Hired as Cardinals defensive coordinator on 1/11/19.
- Joseph has 12 years of coaching experience on the defensive side of the ball in the NFL, including as defensive coordinator with Miami in 2016.

• In Joseph's initial season with the Broncos in 2017, Denver had the NFL's #3 ranked defense and joined Minnesota as the only teams in the NFL that season to rank in the top-five in both run defense and pass defense. The Broncos ranked #5 in run defense in '17 after finishing the previous year ranked #28 in that category.

• In 2018, the Broncos defense ranked in the top-10 in the NFL in INTs (17), takeaways (28) and sacks (44). Rookie LB Bradley Chubb – Denver's first-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft – led all NFL rookies with 12.0 sacks last season. Pro Bowl LB Von Miller had 14.5 sacks, tied for fourth in the NFL last season. Denver was one of three teams (Seattle, Kansas City) to have two players record double digit sacks in 2018.

• In a stretch from 2011-16, which spanned jobs in Houston, Cincinnati and Miami, Joseph's teams made the postseason five times in six seasons.

• Joseph's teams have ranked in the top-10 in INTs in four of the past five seasons.

• Four different DBs earned a combined five Pro Bowl selections – Johnathan Joseph (2), Reggie Nelson (1), Adam Jones (1) and Walt Harris (1) – during Joseph's time coaching defensive backs in Cincinnati, Houston and San Francisco.

Prior to his tenure in Miami, Joseph coached DBs for two seasons (2014-15) with Cincinnati, helping the Bengals to back-to-back postseason appearances. During his two seasons with Cincinnati, the Bengals led the NFL with 41 INTs. Cincinnati was the only team to post more INTs than TDs allowed (36) during that two-year stretch while holding opposing QBs to the lowest combined passer rating (77.4) in the NFL.

Prior to beginning his coaching career as a grad assistant at the University of Colorado in 2000, Joseph appeared in 30 games for the Buffaloes (1990-94), playing QB, RB and on special teams, and was a member of the Buffaloes 1990 National Championship team. He served as a backup to All-American QBs Darian Hagan and Kordell Stewart and completed 34-of-61 passes for 454 yards and four TDs to go along with 50 carries for 237 yards and one TD in his college career.

He converted to CB in the NFL and signed with the Jets as an undrafted rookie free agent in 1995. As a rookie, Joseph played in 13 games and had 21 tackles (17 solo), two INTs and five passes defended. He played in four games with the Colts in 1996 before spending the preseason with Denver in 1997.



## COACHING STAFF HIGHLIGHTS

- Of the 25 coaches on the Cards staff, 18 are new to the organization. The seven returning coaches are **Chris Achuff** (Defensive Line), **Steve Heiden** (Tight Ends), **Randall McCray** (Asst. Special Teams), **Buddy Morris** (Strength & Conditioning), **Jeff Rodgers** (Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator), **Vernon Stephens** (Asst. Strength & Conditioning) and **Cam Turner** (Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks).



• The Cards coaching staff entered the 2019 season with a combined 419 years of coaching experience at the college and NFL levels: 201 in the NFL; 218 in college. Of the 25 coaches on staff, 21 entered the season with NFL coaching experience.

• In addition to their experience on the sidelines, the Cardinals staff features seven coaches who played a combined 38 years in the NFL: **Kliff Kingsbury** (3), **Vance Joseph** (2), **Tom Clements** (1), **Steve Heiden** (11), **Brian Natkin** (1), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **James Saxon** (8).

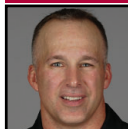
• Nine members of the Arizona staff entered the year having coached at least 10 seasons in the NFL: **Jerry Sullivan** (24), **Bill Davis** (24), **Tom Clements** (20), **James Saxon** (19), **Jeff Rodgers** (15), **Vance Joseph** (14), **Sean Kugler** (12), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **Greg Williams** (10).

• Three members of the staff - Kingsbury (Texas Tech), Joseph (Denver Broncos) and Sean Kugler (Texas-El Paso) - have previously served as a head coach either at the college or NFL level.



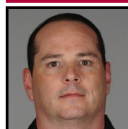

### CHRIS ACHUFF - Defensive Line



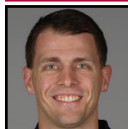

## ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2019 season is the 13<sup>th</sup> since **Michael Bidwill** took over as team President in 2007. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

### Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. Since it opened in 2006, the team has sold out all 139 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the venue, which has also hosted a pair of Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's 12 years as team president. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice during Bidwill's time as president (2008, 2015), including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- Arizona's 50 wins between 2013-17 were the most in any five-year span in franchise history.

- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Arizona Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

## SUPER BOWL COMING BACK TO AZ

### Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl When Game Returns in 2023

The biggest event in American sports is returning to Arizona as State Farm Stadium was selected to host Super Bowl LVII that will cap the 2022 NFL season.

Super Bowl LVII will be the fourth Super Bowl played in Arizona and the third in 15 years at State Farm Stadium. The Valley last hosted Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season. With Super Bowl LVII being held at State Farm Stadium, Arizona will join South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

—Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 237 of 238 career games played. His streak began in Week 9 of his rookie season in 2004 at Miami. That is seven weeks after Rice's 274-game streak — the longest in NFL history — ended.

—Included in his 231-game streak is an active streak of 81 consecutive games with multiple receptions. Only Cleveland's Jarvis Landry (83) has a longer active streak than Fitzgerald.

—Fitzgerald has at least one reception in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career.

## 10 MORE IN THE POSTSEASON

In addition to his 118 career TD catches in the regular season, Fitzgerald has 10 TD catches in nine career postseason games.

Fitzgerald is one of just eight players in NFL history with 10+ TD receptions in the postseason. Of those eight, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22 in 29 games) and John Stallworth (12 in 17 games) and Patriots TE Rob Gronkowski (12 in 16 games) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

## #11 HAS HALL OF FAME CREDENTIALS

Below is a look at the career of **Larry Fitzgerald** through his first 238 career games compared to the 27 modern era WRs currently in the HOF and where they stood at that point in their career.

At this point in his career, Fitzgerald has more receptions (1,326) than all of the receivers enshrined in Canton had through 238 games. Fitzgerald also has more receiving yards (16,579) than all HOF receivers except Jerry Rice (22,895).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

### A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,326), receiving yards (16,579), receiving TDs (118), total TDs (118) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just seven players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Julio Jones (5), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4), Antonio Brown (4) and Andre Johnson (4).
- At 28 years, 74 days old, he became the third-youngest player in NFL history to reach 70 career receiving TDs behind only Randy Moss (26 years, 269 days old) and Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (28 years, one day old).
- At 32 years, 97 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 1,000 career receptions.
- At 31 years, 102 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 900 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 57 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 800 career receptions.
- At 30 years, 85 days old, he became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 11,000 receiving yards.
- In 2010, he became the first player in NFL history to record 90+ receptions five times in their first seven seasons.
- During the 2008 postseason, he broke virtually every major playoff receiving record, establishing new single-season marks for receptions (30), receiving yards (546) and TDs (7). His four 100-yard receiving games in the postseason established a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100 yards receiving.
- His 10 TD receptions in nine career postseason games are an NFL record for a player in their first nine career playoff contests.
- With a then franchise-record 103 receptions during the 2005 season, he became the youngest player in NFL history to record a 100-catch campaign when he reached the mark at 22 years, 123 days old.
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record 15,000+ receiving yards and 100+ TD receptions in their career.

## DEFENSIVE DRAFT PICKS START FOR THE CARDS



A trio of rookie draft picks – DL **Zach Allen** (one game), CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** (four) and S **Deionte Thompson** (one) – have started for the Cardinals on defense this season.

### CB BYRON MURPHY JR.

The first pick in the second round of the 2019 NFL Draft out of Washington, **Murphy** has 19 tackles and leads all NFL rookies with three passes defended (tied with Packers S Darnell Savage), according to official league statistics.

He started all 20 games he played during his final two seasons (2017-18) with the Huskies and earned first-team All-America and All-Pac-12 honors with 58 tackles, four INTs (one returned for a TD), four tackles for loss, 17 passes defended and a forced fumble as a senior.

### DL ZACH ALLEN

**Allen** was drafted by the Cardinals in the third round (65th overall) out of Boston College. He was the ACC's highest-rated edge defender last season and one of the top edge defenders in the 2019 NFL Draft according to ProFootballFocus.com.

**Allen** played four seasons (2015-18) for the Eagles, appearing in 50 games and totaling 199 tackles, 40.5 tackles for loss, 18.5 sacks 16 passes defended, four fumble recoveries, two INTs and two blocked kicks.

### S DEIONTE THOMPSON

Arizona's fifth-round pick (139th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft, **Thompson** has played all four games this season and made his first-career start in a nickel formation in Week 2 against the Ravens.

In three seasons (2016-18) at Alabama, **Thompson** appeared in 43 games (17 starts) and totaled 113 tackles, 4.5 tackles for loss, three INTs, 10 passes defended, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. He was a consensus first-team All-American as a senior in 2018.

## UNDRAFTED BUT SPECIAL

Three second-year players have made significant contributions on special teams after joining the Cardinals as undrafted rookies in 2018.

### LB EZEKIEL TURNER

**Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles last season.** He finished second in the NFL with 15 total special teams tackles, and he has added four more in three games this season.



**Turner**, who appeared in all 16 games in 2018 (one start) was named Special Teams Player of the Month (September) by ProFootballFocus.com.

### LB DENNIS GARDECK

**Gardeck appeared in all 16 games and led all NFL rookies with 388 special teams snaps in 2018. Among all NFL players last season, only Jets WR Terrence Brooks (395) played more snaps on special teams than Gardeck.**

In the 2018 season finale at Seattle, **Gardeck** deflected a punt, recovered a blocked punt for a TD and had a special teams tackle against the Seahawks. Late in the third quarter, **Gardeck** recovered a blocked punt in the end zone for his first career TD.

It was the Cardinals first blocked punt returned for a TD since 10/12/08 vs. Dallas. For **Gardeck**, it was his first TD since his senior year at Crystal Lake (IL) South High School in 2012 (80-yard fumble return). In the 2019 season-opener vs. Detroit, **Gardeck** deflected another punt, giving Arizona possession at midfield and resulting in a TD drive that forced OT.

### WR TRENT SHERFIELD

In Week 1 against the Lions, **Sherfield** recorded an open-field tackle for minus-three yards on punt coverage and recovered a muffed punt at the Lions eight-yard line that led to the Cardinals first points of the season (Zane Gonzalez FG).

**Sherfield on playing gunner on punt coverage:** "I take pride in playing that position. I love it, being able to go down there and make plays, set the opposing team back in field position and help the defense out."

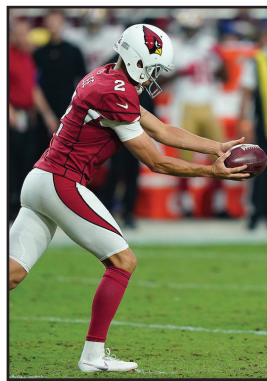
## TWO SEASONS IN AZ, TWO TEAM RECORDS

The Cardinals signed P **Andy Lee** just prior to the 2017 season, and during his first year in Arizona, he set a franchise single-season record with a 47.3-yard punting average. In 2018, Lee topped himself, breaking his own record with an NFL-high 48.6-yard average last season.

## LEE AMONG THE BEST ALL-TIME

Now in his 16th NFL season in 2019, **Lee** has appeared in 236 games with 1,245 punts for 58,009 yards (46.6-yard avg.) and has a 39.8 net average and 410 punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

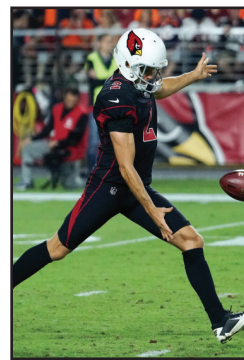
After leading the NFL in punting average for the second time in his career in 2018, Lee has finished in the top-10 in punting average in 12 of his 15 full NFL seasons.

His 46.6 career punting average ranks sixth in NFL history. He has averaged 48.0+ yards per punt in a season five times in his career and led the NFL in punting average (50.9) for the first time in 2011.

## SUN DEVIL RETURNS A CARDINAL

Arizona State product and 2016 Lou Groza Award winner **Zane Gonzalez** made his Cardinals debut in Week 13 at Green Bay last season. He connected on both FG attempts in the win over the Packers, including the game-winning 44-yard FG with just 1:41 remaining in the fourth quarter.

**Gonzalez** entered the NFL with Cleveland in 2017, and the Browns were 0-17-1 during his time with the team. He earned his first-career victory by kicking Arizona's game-winner against the Packers.



### GONZALEZ CARRIES MOMENTUM INTO 2019

In the 2018 season finale at Seattle, **Gonzalez** made all three FG attempts (36, 50 and 55 yards) and became the first Cardinals kicker to make multiple 50-yard FGs in a game since Neil Rackers (54 and 50) on 9/25/05 at Seattle.

He also had a perfect outing in the 2019 season-opener against the Lions (20, 42, 34 and 28 yards) and has made 10-of-12 attempts this season. Gonzalez's four FGs against the Lions set a new single-game career high, and his 10 made FGs this season are tied for the NFL lead.
