DALLAS COWBOYS VS. ARIZONA CARDINALS

State Farm Stadium | August 13, 2021 | 7:00 PM



THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

For the first time in nearly two years - or 716 days to be specific - the Cardinals will play in a preseason game when they host the Dallas Cowboys at State Farm Stadium on Friday (8/13). Due to the COVID-19 pandemic eliminating the 2020 preseason, this week's game comes just two days shy of two years since the Cardinals last hosted a preseason game.

Arizona's preseason opener vs. Dallas is the first of three contests for the Cardinals before they embark on the new 17-game regular season in 2021. Arizona will host Kansas City next week and then travel to New Orleans for the preseason finale before beginning the regular season at Tennessee in Week 1.

This week's game marks the seventh all-time preseason meeting between the Cardinals and Cowboys. Arizona enters this week's game with a 5-1 all-time record vs. Dallas in the preseason.

The former division opponents - who battled yearly as members of the NFC East from 1970-2001 - have met 89 times in the regular season. The 90th meeting will come later this season when the Cardinals travel to Dallas in Week 17. The teams played in Week 6 last season at Dallas when Arizona earned a 38-10 victory on Monday Night Football. With the win the Cardinals improved to 5-1 in their last six games vs. Dallas and also improved to 2-0 all time at AT&T Stadium.

Like every year, the Cardinals season begins with a host of new faces on the roster. A mix of 41 veterans and rookies will experience their first game in a Cardinals uniform on Friday. Among the veterans new to Arizona are Pro Bowlers DL J.J. Watt, WR A.J. Green, CB Malcolm Butler, OL Rodney Hudson, RB James Conner and K Matt Prater. The rookie class is highlighted by first round pick LB Zaven Collins and second round pick WR Rondale Moore.

Among the players returning for Arizona this season are 2020 Pro Bowlers QB Kyler Murray, WR DeAndre Hopkins and S Budda Baker. The trio highlights a talented group looking to build on a solid 2020 campaign in which Arizona finished with the NFL's #6 ranked offense and a defense that ranked in the top 10 in TDs allowed, sacks, tackles for loss and pass defense.

The Cowboys made their preseason debut last week in Canton, OH when they took on the Pittsburgh Steelers in the Hall of Fame Game. Dallas fell to Pittsburgh 16-3 in the inaugural game of the 2021 NFL season.

Next week (8/20) the Cardinals host the defending AFC Champion Kansas City Chiefs at State Farm Stadium in a game that will air nationally on ESPN.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- On Friday the Cardinals kick off their 2021 preseason slate when they welcome the Dallas Cowboys to State Farm Stadium.
- The Cardinals and Cowboys will meet again during the regular season, when Arizona travels to Dallas in Week 17.
- In addition to airing locally on 12 News KPNX-TV (NBC), Friday's Cardinals-Cowboys matchup can be seen nationally on NFL Network. Arizona's preseason contest vs. Kansas City next week will air nationally on ESPN.
- Friday's game takes place six days after the 24th birthday of QB Kyler Murray (8/7) and four days after the 42nd birthday of head coach Kliff Kingsbury (8/9).
- Since the beginning of 2021, Arizona has added 6 Pro Bowl players, 4 All-Pro's, 4 college All-Americans, the 2020 National Defensive Player of the Year and a Paul Hornung Award winner (most versatile college player in the nation).
- A total of 41 new players could make their Cardinals debut this week. That includes 31 veterans acquired during the free agent period, 7 draft picks and 3 rookie free agents.
- Arizona enters the 2021 season with OL D.J. Humphries (2015) and LS Aaron Brewer (2016) as the team's longest tenured players on the roster.

LEGENDARY TEXAS QBS

Football in the state of Texas is legendary. It is a state that produced future NFL QBs Drew Brees, Patrick Mahomes, Andrew Luck, Vince Young, Matthew Stafford and Baker Mayfield, to name just a few.

Even in that storied group, the accomplishments of **Kyler Murray** and **Colt McCoy** stand out.


Murray's prep career at Allen High School - a national powerhouse - made him one of the most accomplished high school players in the state's storied history. The majority of Murray's prep career took place just 47 miles northeast of AT&T Stadium - at Eagle Stadium.

In three seasons (2012-14) as a starting QB at Allen HS, Murray:
 --Won 3 consecutive state titles and posted a perfect 43-0 record
 --Totalled 14,515 yards (10,386 passing; 4,129 rushing)
 --Scored 186 TDs (117 passing; 69 rushing)

As a senior in 2014, Murray earned National Player of the Year honors from Gatorade, Parade and USA Today.

McCoy is etched in the record books as both a prep and college QB in Texas. He attended Jim Ned (Tuscola) High School where he finished his prep career as the 6th all-time leading passer in state history. During his career at Jim Ned, McCoy completed 536-of-849 pass attempts for 9,344 yard and 116 TDs.

He then went on to a record-breaking career at the University of Texas, where he earned 45 victories in 53 career starts to finish as the winningest QB in NCAA history at the time. He left Texas as the first QB in college history to win at least 10 games in each of his four seasons and owned 47 school records following his senior season.

Pro Bowlers that the Cardinals acquired during the offseason via free agency or trade: J.J. Watt, A.J. Green, Malcolm Butler, Rodney Hudson, Matt Prater and James Conner. Those six players have a combined 20 Pro Bowl selections and 11 All-Pro nods.

Combined sacks for Watt (101.0) and LB Chandler Jones (97.0) in their careers. The duo have combined for 9 Pro Bowl selections, 7 1st-team All-Pro nods, 451 QB hits, 278 tackles for loss and 52 forced fumbles.

61.0

Sacks for Jones in just 69 games with the Cardinals. He enters this year needing just 6.0 sacks to pass Freddie Joe Nunn (66.5) as the franchise all-time sack leader.

93.6

Pass-blocking grade for OL Rodney Hudson over the last six seasons (2015-20) according to ProFootballFocus.com, which ranks first among all NFL centers. The site credits him with just three sacks allowed in 3,445 pass-blocking snaps and a 1.2% pressure rate during that span.

6,153

Total yards for the Cardinals offense in 2020 - which represents the third-highest season total in franchise history. It also gave Arizona the NFL's #6 ranked offense in 2020 (384.6 ypg).

2,237

Rushing yards for the Cardinals in 2020. Along with Arizona's 22 rushing TDs, it marked just the sixth time in franchise history - and first time since 1984 - the Cardinals had 2,000+ rushing yards and 20+ rushing TDs in a season.

48

Sacks for the Cardinals defense in 2020 despite the absence of All-Pro LB Chandler Jones. That tied for 4th in the NFL.

179

Tackles for loss for the Cardinals defense in two seasons (2019-20) under defensive coordinator Vance Joseph. Only Pittsburgh (193) has more during that span.

61

Total TDs (passing and rushing) for QB Kyle Murray in his first two NFL seasons. In league history, only Dan Marino (68) and Cam Newton (62) had more total TDs in their first two NFL seasons.

67.2

Completion percentage for Murray in 2020 - a new franchise single-season record. Combined with his 64.4 completion percentage in 2019, Murray has posted two of the top-5 completion percentage totals in franchise history in his first two NFL seasons.

5

Players in the NFL that have at least 75 passes defensed and 15 INTs over the last six seasons (2015-20), a group that includes CB Malcolm Butler (79 PD & 17 INTs since 2015).

115

Receptions for WR DeAndre Hopkins in 2020. That set a franchise single-season record and also tied his career high for a single season. Hopkins tied for #2 in the NFL in receptions, ranked #3 in receiving yards (1,407) and his seven 100-yard outings tied for #2 in the league last season.

850

Scrimmage yards for RB Chase Edmonds in 2020. He had more scrimmage yards in 2020 than he had in his first two seasons (2018-19) combined (719). Edmonds also had a career-high five TDs in 2020.

1,454

Career points for K Matt Prater, which ranks third among active players behind only Robbie Gould (1,731) and Mason Crosby (1,682).

13

Career TD receptions of 50+ yards for WR A.J. Green. Over the last 10 seasons (2011-20), only DeSean Jackson (19) has more TD catches of 50+ yards.

7.0

Sacks in 2020 for LB Dennis Gardeck - who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of Sioux Falls in 2018. Gardeck's 7.0 sacks were the most in franchise history by a player who entered the league undrafted. He piled up 7.0 sacks despite playing just 93 snaps on defense in 2020.

WELCOMING BACK THE RED SEA IN 2021

Following a 2020 campaign in which the majority of NFL teams played in mostly empty stadiums due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Cardinals welcome fans back to State Farm Stadium as the team opens its 16th season at the world-class venue.



Prior to 2020 - when just 9,600 fans attended a game at State Farm Stadium - the Cardinals had sold out 144 games (preseason and post-season included) at the venue since it opened in 2006.

Of Arizona's 16 regular season games last season, just five were played with the general public in attendance. Those five contests saw a total of just 39,894 fans on hand.

A CATALYST FOR THE CARDINALS SUCCESS

State Farm Stadium has proven to be a catalyst for the Cardinals success in the last decade-plus. After selling out just 12 games in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium, Arizona has sold out 134 games at State Farm Stadium.

IT GETS LOUD IN THERE

With fans expected back in NFL stadiums across the country in 2021, the Cardinals return to one of the league's best home field advantages.



From the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006 through 2019, Cardinals opponents accumulated 170 accepted false start penalties in the regular season. That is the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

PLAYING A CRUCIAL ROLE DURING THE PANDEMIC

Since the start of the pandemic, State Farm Stadium has served a number of important functions as the site of numerous blood drives, PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) drives, testing drives and as one of the nation's first - and most successful - vaccination sites.



Early in the pandemic, blood donations and PPE hit critically low levels and State Farm Stadium served as the site of numerous blood drives and a pair of PPE drives to help ailing patients and first responders.

In 2021, State Farm Stadium was also host to one of the first - and most successful - vaccination sites in the nation. Between January and April, more than 800,000 COVID-19 vaccines were administered at State Farm Stadium, which accounted for nearly 20% of the total doses administered in Arizona during that period.

The site was so successful that President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris participated in a virtual tour on February 8 and the administration called the operation "an incredible model." Biden told Arizona Department of Health Services Director Dr. Cara Christ during the tour; "I got a call during the Super Bowl from the commissioner of football (Roger Goodell) offering us, the federal government, the 30 major stadiums. They're going to be coming to you to look at how you did it because you're doing such a great job."


ADDING AN ALL-PRO ON THE O-LINE

Arizona acquired C Rodney Hudson and a 7th-round selection in the 2021 NFL Draft from Las Vegas in exchange for the Cardinals 3rd-round selection. Hudson is a 10-year NFL veteran who played the past six seasons (2015-20) with the Raiders where he started at center in all 92 games he appeared in.

Recent Success: All three of Hudson's Pro Bowl selections (2016-17, 2019) have come in the last 5 seasons. He was named to the Pro Bowl and earned 2nd-team All-Pro honors in 2019.

A Reliable Player: In the last eight seasons, Hudson played 124 of a possible 128 games - *missing just one game in the last five years.* Hudson has played at least 800 snaps each of the last eight seasons, including six years playing 1,000+ snaps.

Keeping His QBs Clean: According to Pro Football Focus, *Hudson ranks first among all NFL centers with a 93.6 pass-blocking grade dating back to 2015.* The site credits him with *just three sacks allowed in 3,445 pass-blocking snaps and a 1.2% pressure rate over the last six seasons.*



DEBUT OF THE 17-GAME REGULAR SEASON

For the first time ever, the NFL will have a 17-game regular season beginning in 2021. Teams have played a 16-game regular season since 1978. The league had a 14-game regular season between 1961-77.

To accommodate the 17th game, teams will go from a four-game preseason to a three-game slate. With Arizona having an extra road game during the regular season, two of its three preseason matchups will be held at State Farm Stadium.

HOW THE EXTRA MATCHUP IS DECIDED

The additional game is an interconference matchup between AFC and NFC divisions two years removed from their last meeting, going against the team that finished in the same spot in their respective divisions. The site of a team's 17th game will rotate each year, with the AFC getting a 9th home game in 2021. That will give Arizona a 9th road game this season.



For the Cardinals - who finished 3rd in the NFC West in 2020 - the extra game means a trip to Cleveland to face the Browns, who finished 3rd in the AFC North last season. That game will take place in Week 6.



- Arizona is tied for the 13th-hardest strength of schedule in 2021 based on their opponents' .507 winning percentage in 2020.
- The Cardinals join the Ravens and Seahawks as the only three teams that start the season with three of their first four games on the road.
- The Cardinals take on the AFC South (Houston, Indianapolis, Jacksonville, Tennessee) and the NFC North (Chicago, Detroit, Green Bay, Minnesota).
- In addition to facing the AFC South and NFC North, Arizona will host Carolina, who finished the 2020 season in 3rd place in the NFC South. The Cardinals will travel to play the Cowboys, who finished 3rd in the NFC East in 2020.
- The Cards have eight games against teams that finished the 2020 season with at least 10 wins and seven games vs. teams that had 11+ wins.
- The Cardinals will play nine games against teams that earned a spot in the postseason in '20 - Seattle (twice), the L.A. Rams (twice), Green Bay, Chicago, Cleveland, Indianapolis and Tennessee. Five of those games will be played on the road and four will be played at State Farm Stadium.

CARDS PARTNER WITH BETMGM & GILA RIVER

"They are best-in-class partners whose excellence and expertise in this emerging space will provide a new and innovative way to engage and interact with our fans."

Gila River Hotels & Casinos operates three Arizona locations, all owned by the Gila River Indian Community: Wild Horse Pass, Lone Butte, and Vee Quiva. All three will feature custom built BetMGM Sportsbooks, set to open near football season, reflective of its sports-centric brand.

"Arizona sports fans are extremely passionate and we're confident they'll enjoy the BetMGM experience," said BetMGM CEO Adam Greenblatt. "Gila River Hotels & Casinos and the Arizona Cardinals represent the state's premier casino destinations and sports franchise, making them the ideal partners for us."

BetMGM plans to open a BetMGM Sportsbook at State Farm Stadium, with a targeted opening in time for the 2022 NFL season.

#99 COMES OUT OF RETIREMENT

DL.J.J. Watt has been wearing the #99 jersey since his college days at the University of Wisconsin. When the Cardinals acquired him in free agency, a number change seemed inevitable since the digits were retired by the Cardinals in tribute to **Marshall Goldberg**, a star on the 1947 championship team.

However, #99 was unretired for Watt after he received permission to wear it from Goldberg's daughter, **Ellen Goldberg Tullos**. Watt was prepared to select a new number after learning of Goldberg's impressive legacy, but then read an article saying Tullos would be fine with him taking over #99. Watt gave her a call to confirm and indeed had her blessing.



Remembering Marshall Goldberg

- Goldberg played eight seasons (1939-43, '46-48) for the Cardinals after a being selected in the 1939 NFL Draft.

- Was a member of the 1947 NFL Championship team, and his late INT in the title game vs. the Eagles sealed the victory.

- A six-time All-Pro defensive back, Goldberg also played halfback/fullback and was a return specialist. During the 1941 season Goldberg rushed for 427 yards and 3 TDs and had 313 receiving yards on offense. He also led the NFL with 7 INTs, 12 kick-off returns, 290 kickoff return yards and 1,236 all-purpose yards.

- Goldberg's playing career was interrupted by his service during World War II. He joined the Navy in 1943 and spent two years in the South Pacific rising to the rank of lieutenant. In preparation for his service Goldberg underwent rigorous Scout and Ranger training in a unit that was a forerunner of the Navy Seals. Two months after the bombing of Hiroshima, Goldberg walked the remains of the city to help assess the damage.



YOUNG GUYS IN THE MIDDLE

In the middle of the Cardinals defense is a pair of young linebackers that the team selected in the first round of the last two NFL Drafts: 22-year old rookie LB **Zaven Collins** and 23-year old second-year LB **Isaiah Simmons**.

Collins was taken 16th overall in the 2021 NFL Draft out of Tulsa and Simmons was taken 8th overall in 2020 out of Clemson. It marked just the second time in team history (1985-86) the Cardinals selected a LB in the first round of back-to-back drafts.

COLLINS AND SIMMONS - THE COLLEGE NUMBERS
Simmons was the 2019 Butkus Award Winner and Collins was the recipient of the Lombardi Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award in 2020. Both were unanimous 1st-team All-American selections in their final college season.

RARE ATHLETIC TALENTS

Both Simmons and Collins possess a rare combination of size and speed for the linebacker position.

Collins: At 6-4, 260, he clocked a 4.67 40-yard dash time at his pro day. In 2020, despite playing just eight games, he recorded 4 INTs with TD returns of 38 and 96 yards.

Simmons: At the 2020 NFL Combine, Simmons ran a 4.39 40-yard dash, tied for the 7th-best total among all prospects at any position.

SIMMONS EARNS ALL-ROOKIE HONORS IN 2020.

Simmons earned PFWA All-Rookie honors for the Cardinals last season after posting 47 tackles, four tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, an INT, two passes defensed, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in 16 games (seven starts).



PLAY OF THE YEAR IN 2020

One of the enduring moments of the 2020 NFL season was the Cardinals "**Hail Murray**" victory over the Buffalo Bills in Week 10. In that contest, Arizona earned 32-30 win over the Bills on a game-winning TD pass from QB **Kyler Murray** to WR **DeAndre Hopkins**, in which the Cardinals Pro Bowl receiver outjumped three Bills defenders to come down with the ball.

The "Hail Murray" was named the "Best Play" at the 2021 ESPYS, held in July in New York City.

The "Hail Murray" was also named the 2020 Bridgestone Clutch Play of the Year at NFL Honors in February.

According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Cardinals victory over the Bills marked just the second time in 60 years that a game featured multiple go-ahead passing TDs in the final 0:40 seconds of regulation. Bills WR **Stefon Diggs** had a 21-yard TD catch with 0:34 remaining that gave the Bills a 30-26 lead. Four plays later Hopkins brought down a 43-yard TD on a pass from Murray with just 0:02 remaining.

HOPKINS TRADE NAMED TRANSACTION OF THE YEAR

The "Hail Murray" would have never happened if the Cardinals hadn't acquired Hopkins last offseason. The trade that brought the All-Pro wideout to Arizona received the Alpha Award for "Best Sports Transaction of the Year" from the MIT Sloan Sports Analytics Conference at the group's annual gathering in April.

The other preseason broadcast on 12 News is Saturday, August 28 at New Orleans. The Cardinals regular radio team of **Dave Pasch** (play-by-play) and **Ron Wolfley** (analyst) will call the action.

Arizona will also appear in a nationally-televised preseason game on ESPN on Friday, August 20 vs. Kansas City at 5:00 p.m. MST.

Both games produced by the Cardinals will be preceded by a half-hour pregame show hosted by 12 News sports anchor **Cameron Cox**. Coverage of Friday's Cardinals-Cowboys game from State Farm Stadium will begin with a pregame show at 6:30 p.m. with kickoff to follow at 7:00 p.m. The Cardinals-Saints game on August 28 will get started with the pregame show at 4:30 p.m. and then kickoff at 5:00 p.m.

In addition, the pregame and game broadcasts will be shown on KOAT in Albuquerque and KTTU & KMSB in Tucson.

On the radio side, **Paul Calvisi** (play-by-play) will be joined by former Cardinals quarterback **Drew Stanton** (analyst) on the call for Friday's game and will work alongside former Cardinals linebacker **Rob Fredrickson** at the Saints game. Pasch (play-by-play), Wolfley (analyst) and Calvisi (sideline) will work the Chiefs contest. All three Cardinals preseason games can be heard on Arizona Sports 98.7 FM.




CEREAL FOR A GOOD CAUSE

VICTOR DIMUKEJE - ROUND 6a (210TH) - DUKE

- Last name pronounced “dee-moo-KAY-gee”.
- Hails from Lagos, Nigeria, and moved to the U.S. with his family when he was 8 years old.
- Started all 49 games at Duke after becoming starter as a true freshman. Recorded 166 tackles, 36 tackles for loss, 21.5 sacks, 28 QB pressures, 5 forced fumbles and 3 fumble recoveries. Was a Freshman All-America selection in 2017.
- His 21.5 career sacks are the 2nd-most in Duke history.
- As a senior in 2020, he started all 11 games for the fourth straight year and recorded 44 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, 2 forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and 5 QB pressures.
- Graduated from Duke a semester early with a degree in Evolutionary Anthropology. Also earned a Marketing and Management Certificate.



ZAVEN COLLINS - ROUND 1 (16TH) - TULSA

• Was the second linebacker selected in the 2021 draft (Micah Parsons, 12th to Cowboys) and the fourth defender selected.

• A three-year starter (2018-20) at Tulsa, played in 32 career games and totaled 236 tackles, 29 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, 8 passes defended, 5 INTs, 3 fumble recoveries and 3 forced fumbles. Recipient of the Lombardi Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy and the Chuck Bednarik Award in 2020. Was also a unanimous 1st-team All-American selection.

• Hails from Hominy, Oklahoma which has a population of 3,500. Did not receive a single DI scholarship offer until his mom, Haley, took money from her 401K and drove him to 12 camps across the region. Tulsa was his sole DI offer.

• Has a rare combination of size and speed - even at the linebacker position. At 6-4 and 260 pounds, the All-American clocked a 4.67 40-yard dash time at his pro day. Athleticism was on display in 2020 when - despite playing just eight games - he recorded 4 INTs and 152 return yards, with TD returns of 38 and 96 yards.

• In high school, was a four-year starter on both offense and defense, playing QB, linebacker and safety. As a starting QB at Hominy (OK) High, Collins' career totals were 4,084 rushing yards and 54 TDs to go along with 3,056 passing yards and 32 TDs. As a senior in 2016, led Hominy to a 14-0 record and a state title.


• Became the first UCF player ever drafted by the Cardinals.

• Opted out of 2020 season to protect the health of his newborn daughter, Skylar, who was born prematurely and with health complications.

• In his junior season in 2019, Pro Football Focus gave him an 80.1 coverage grade after he gave up just 20 receptions on 50 targets. According to the ratings site, his 26.6 passer rating allowed in single coverage since 2019 was the best in the nation.

• Transferred to UCF in 2019 from Butler (El Dorado, KS) Community College and had a breakout season, appeared in 12 games (9 starts) with 31 tackles, 2 INTs and 8 passes defended. Gave up just 20 receptions on 50 targets that season.

• Helped make UCF history in 2021. He was one of five players - and three defensive backs - drafted from the school.



JAMES WIGGINS - ROUND 7a (243RD) - CINCINNATI

• Just the 6th Cincinnati player ever drafted by the Cardinals and the first Bearcat defender.

• Played 32 career games at Cincinnati, collecting 87 tackles with 5 INTs (1 returned for a TD), 18 passes defended and 2 forced fumbles. He was a two-time All-AAC honoree.

• Named 2nd-team All-American and was a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award in 2020 after helping lead a Bearcats defense which ranked top-15 in the nation in rush defense, pass efficiency, scoring and total defense. Gave up just 11 catches for 84 yards in coverage in 2020.

• In final 22 games he appeared in at UC, team posted a 20-2 record, including a 9-0 mark in 2020.

• Had four game-changing INTs in 2018, including an 86-yard INT return TD in overtime vs. SMU that gave Cincinnati its first OT win in 10 years.

• When asked following the draft who he models his game after, replied with four names: **Budda Baker**, Tyrann Mathieu, Antrel Rolle and Ed Reed. Baker, Mathieu and Rolle were all Cardinals draft picks.



RONDALE MOORE - ROUND 2 (49TH) - PURDUE

• In three seasons (2018-20) at Purdue, Moore appeared in 20 games and recorded 178 receptions for 1,915 yards and 14 TDs. He also rushed for 248 yards and three TDs on 30 carries, returned 42 kickoffs for 813 yards and 17 punts for 118 yards.

• Earned a Business degree from Purdue in just 2.5 years. To do so, he averaged 21 hours a semester majoring in Selling and Sales Management. Took 27 hours during 2020 Fall semester and graduated with 3.5 GPA.

• Won the Paul Hornung Award in both high school (best player in state of Kentucky) and college (most versatile player in the nation) in back-to-back years (2017 & 2018).

• As a true freshman in 2018, led the FBS with 114 receptions - beating out new teammates **Andy Isabella** (2nd with 102) and **KeeSean Johnson** (4th with 95). First true freshman in Big 10 history to earn consensus All-American honors.



MARCO WILSON - ROUND 4 (136TH) - FLORIDA

• Arizona traded into the fourth-round to acquire Wilson, who started 35-of-36 games played at Florida (2017-20) and recorded 103 tackles, 3 INTs, 17 passes defended, 2.5 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery.

• Showed up at Florida and became an immediate starter. Joined an exclusive list of Gators who started at CB in a season-opener as a freshman (Joe Haden, Janoris Jenkins, Marcus Roberson).

• Had a record-setting performance at Pro Day: his 43.5-inch vertical was 5th-best ever by a college CB and his 136-inch broad jump tied for 3rd-best ever by a corner.

• USA Today All-American at Plantation High School, where he played alongside fellow 2021 draft picks CB Patrick Surtain II (9th overall to Denver) and CB Tyson Campbell (33rd overall to Jacksonville).



MICHAL MENET - ROUND 7b (247TH) - PENN STATE

• Last name pronounced “MEN-et”.

• Following a redshirt freshman year in 2016, went on to appear in 46 consecutive games for the Nittany Lions, including starts at center in each of his last 34 games.

• In 2020, anchored an O-line that helped Penn State rank second in the Big Ten in total offense (430.3 ypg).

• Served as a team captain the last two seasons (2019-20) and was recipient of the team's Captain Award following his junior year in 2019.

• A 5-star recruit out of Exeter Township (Reiffton, PA) High School and was ranked as the #2 guard in the country. Selected to play in the 2016 Under Armour All-American Game.



ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2021 season marks the 15th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill, in 1933.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Michael leading the organization. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 14 seasons, after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- Among Bidwill's most substantial accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has proved a critical turning point for the franchise, an economic engine for the state of Arizona, and most recently, a crucial resource in the battle against the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006 it has hosted two Super Bowls (with a third – Super Bowl LVII – set to cap the 2022 season) and the Cardinals have sold out 144 games at the venue (every non-pandemic game played there).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII, XLIX and LVII Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- State Farm Stadium served as a critical site since the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. The venue hosted three blood drives at the beginning of the outbreak and in 2021 it became one of the first - and most successful - mass vaccination site in the nation.
- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee. The committee reviews the league's Personal Conduct Policy at least annually and recommends appropriate changes with advice from outside experts.

CARDS HONOR ADELE HARRIS WITH SCHOLARSHIP

In May, the Cardinals announced the creation of the "**Adele Harris Scholarship**" to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Harris becoming the first African American female to hold a front office position in the NFL.

Harris spent 26 years in a variety of public and community relations roles within the Cardinals organization before retiring in 2001. A Chicago native, she was raised in St. Louis and joined the Cardinals in 1971 as an assistant in the PR department. She left the club to pursue a degree in business management and returned in 1978 as a publicity assistant.

By 1980, Harris became Director of Community Relations and was instrumental in the team's civic efforts when it relocated to Arizona in 1988. She played a key role in the formation of Cardinals Charities, which was launched in 1990 as a vehicle to support programs designed to improve the quality of life and enhance opportunities for children, women and minorities in Arizona. Adele passed away in 2007 at the age of 65.

The \$10,000 "Adele Harris Scholarship" will be awarded annually to assist a graduating high school student in the state of Arizona who is pursuing a career in sports.

"This scholarship serves two main purposes," said Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**. "It recognizes the valuable role that Adele played within our organization for more than a quarter of a century and also connects her to future generations who aspire to follow in her footsteps. We are grateful for the opportunity to do both of those things."



SUPER BOWL COMING BACK TO AZ

Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl When Game Returns in 2023

In June, the National Football League and the Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee announced that Super Bowl LVII will be played at State Farm Stadium on Sunday, February 12, 2023.

"The selection of the date for Super Bowl LVII means we are getting closer to the event all of Arizona is anticipating," said David Rousseau, Chairman of the Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee. "The exposure and economic impact it brings to our region is unmatched and so is the level of community support required to execute such a massive undertaking."



Arizona was selected to host Super Bowl LVII in May of 2018, marking the fourth time that a Super Bowl was awarded to the state. It is the third time the nation's most popular sporting event will be played at State Farm Stadium and first since Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season.

Arizona joins South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

ECONOMIC IMPACT: The last time the game was staged in Arizona, it produced a record economic impact for the state. A 2015 study by the Seidman Research Institute, W.P. Carey School of Business at Arizona State University determined that Super Bowl XLIX, the 2015 Pro Bowl and related events produced a gross economic impact of \$719.4 million for the region. That was the largest economic impact of any special event ever held in Arizona. In addition to the games played in Glendale, more than 1 million people visited Verizon Super Bowl Central in downtown Phoenix and more than 500,000 people enjoyed events in downtown Scottsdale.

In a span of just over 26 months in 2015-17, State Farm Stadium hosted a Pro Bowl, Super Bowl, College Football National Championship Game and the NCAA Men's Final Four.

It was an unprecedented stretch for a stadium that generated \$1.3 billion in economic impact for the state during that 26-month span.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

After 14 seasons working within the Cardinals personnel department, **Steve Keim** was elevated to GM on January 8, 2013. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense three times dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger. In 2020, Arizona offense ranked #6 overall after posting 6,153 total yards, the third-most in franchise history.

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the 2019 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and followed up in 2020 by becoming the youngest QB in franchise history (23) to earn a Pro Bowl nod.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB **Carson Palmer** from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016, the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020 and the trade with Las Vegas to acquire OL **Rodney Hudson** in 2021.

- The 2021 free agency period was one of Keim's busiest as GM. The players the Cardinals acquired have a combined 20 Pro Bowl selections and 11 All-Pro nods. Arizona brought in six different Pro Bowlers in the offseason: DL **J.J. Watt**, WR **A.J. Green**, OL **Rodney Hudson**, K **Matt Prater**, CB **Malcolm Butler** and RB **James Conner**.

- Named Sporting News 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from the editors of Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

A TOP-10 OFFENSE IN 2020

For the first time since 2015 - and just the third time in 12 seasons - Arizona finished with a top-10 offense in 2020. The Cardinals finished with the NFL's #6 ranked offense last season, averaging 384.6 yards per game.


CHASING A MILESTONE WITH 3,500 & 500

As a rookie in 2019, Murray threw for 3,722 yards and rushed for 544 yards. Last season he surpassed both of those totals, throwing for 3,971 yards and rushing for 819 yards.

Murray and Cam Newton (2011-12) are the only players in NFL history to record 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in each of their first two seasons.

No player has put up those numbers in each of their first three seasons, giving Murray a chance to make NFL history in 2021.

In 2020, Murray fell just 29 passing yards shy of becoming the first player in history with 4,000+ passing yards and 800+ rushing yards in a season.



EDMONDS READY FOR BIGGER ROLE

Entering his fourth NFL season in 2021, RB **Chase Edmonds** is poised to take on a much bigger role in the Cardinals offense.

The former Fordham All-American is coming off the most productive year of his career in 2020 - *one that saw him establish career highs for scrimmage yards (850), rushing attempts (97), rushing yards (448), receptions (53), receiving yards (402), receiving TDs (4) and total TDs (5).*

Edmonds 2020 Highlights:

- Averaged 4.6 yards per carry on a career-high 97 rushing attempts.
- Had more scrimmage yards (850) than he had in his first two seasons combined (719).
- His 448 receiving yards nearly doubled the total from his first two seasons combined (208).
- Had 4 receiving TDs in 2020, after posting one TD reception in his first two seasons combined. The only RBs in franchise history with more receiving TDs in a single season were Larry Centers (7 in 1996) and Charley Trippi (6 in 1949).



MAKING A HABIT OF LONG TOUCHDOWN RUNS

Edmonds has 157 rushing attempts over the last two seasons (2109-20) and has averaged 4.8 yards per carry. One of the main reasons for his high rushing average was his penchant for long TD runs. Edmonds has five TD runs of 20+ yards in that span.

Among all NFL players, only Titans RB Derrick Henry (7) had more TD runs of 20+ yards over the last two seasons (2019-20) than Edmonds.

PRO BOWLER IN THE BACKFIELD

The newest addition to the Cardinals backfield is Pro Bowl RB **James Conner**, who signed with Arizona as a free agent in April following four seasons (2017-20) with the Steelers.

During his time in Pittsburgh, *Conner appeared in 50 games (33 starts) and ran for 2,302 yards and 22 TDs on 532 carries (4.3 avg.) to along with 124 receptions for 963 yards and four TDs.*

He had his best season in 2018, when he was selected to the Pro Bowl after rushing for 12 TDs and 973 yards while catching 55 passes for 497 yards a TD in 13 games.

PRODUCTIVE AS A RUNNER AND RECEIVER

Over the last three seasons (2018-20), Conner totaled 3,121 scrimmage yards and 26 TDs in 36 games. *He is one of just 10 players in the NFL with 2,000+ rushing yards and 900+ receiving yards in that span.*

• A native of Erie, PA who went on to attend the University of Pittsburgh before being drafted by the Steelers - Conner will now play his home games outside the state of Pennsylvania for the first time ever.

AN AUSTRIAN IN ARIZONA

Bernhard Seikovits (BURN-hard / SIKE-oh-vitts) is a 23-year-old tight end from Austria who was allocated to the Cardinals in May as part of the NFL's International Player Pathway Program (IPP).

A Vienna native, he was a captain for the men's national team. Seikovits previously won two European Championships as a quarterback for the U19 national team. He played youth football for the Vienna Vikings until he was selected for the Austrian U19 national team at the age of 16.

The IPP was instituted in 2017 and provides international athletes with the opportunity to compete at the NFL level, improve their skills and ultimately earn a spot on an NFL roster.

Participating teams will carry these players on their roster until the end of training camp. The players are then eligible for an international player practice squad exemption, granting each team an extra practice squad member.

The IPP program currently has 14 international players on 11 clubs, hailing from eight different countries. *To support the IPP program's continued growth, players will be allowed to wear a decal of their home country's flag on their helmets (in addition to the US flag) during the 2021 pre-season.*

J.J. WATT - AT A GLANCE

- After spending his first 10 seasons with the Texans - who selected him in the first round (11th overall) in the 2011 NFL Draft - signed a two-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/2/21 as a free agent.

- A five-time 1st-team All-Pro and five-time Pro Bowl selection, was also named the 2017 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year.

- Has been named NFL Defensive Player of the Year three times (2012, '14-15), tied with Rams DT Aaron Donald and Giants LB Lawrence Taylor for the most in NFL history.

- In first 128 career games, totaled 101.0 sacks, 25 forced fumbles, 16 fumble recoveries, 282 QB hits, 172 tackles for loss, 531 tackles (409 solo), two INTs. Also had 28 tackles, 6.0 sacks, 9 tackles for loss, 6 passes defended and an INT in eight post-season contests.

- His 172 tackles for loss, 282 QB hits, 16 fumble recoveries, 47 games with multiple tackles for loss and 26 multi-sack games lead the NFL since he entered the league in 2011.

- His six AFC Defensive Player of the Month awards are tied for the most by any defensive player in NFL history (Bruce Smith) while his seven AFC Defensive Player of the Week awards are tied (Aaron Donald) for the most among any active player in the league.

- Wife, Kealia, plays for the Chicago Red Stars of the NWSL and his brothers, Derek (FB) and T.J. (LB), play for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

- In response to the devastation in Houston as the result of Hurricane Harvey in 2017, organized what would become the largest crowd-sourced fundraiser in history. Originally set an ambitious goal of \$200,000 but within 19 days, more than 200,000 individuals collectively donated \$37 million to the cause. Contributions continued, and the final tally reached \$41.6 million, which significantly benefited a large variety of relief efforts throughout the months following the storm.



#99 SURPASSES 100 CAREER SACKS

One of the NFL's most dominant defenders since entering the league in 2011, **Watt** surpassed 100.0 career sacks last season with Houston to become just the 35th player in NFL history to reach the milestone.

Watt (101.0) and Denver's Von Miller (106.0) are the only active players in the NFL who have reached 100.0 career sacks. Cardinals LB Chandler Jones enters the '21 season with 97.0 career sacks and needs just three to join the list.





- Three-time Pro Bowl selection (2015, '17 and '19) and two-time 1st-team All-Pro (2017 and '19) had 465 tackles, 97.0 sacks, 175 QB hits, 27 forced fumbles, nine fumble recoveries, one INT and 25 passes defended in 124 games (121 starts) during his first nine NFL seasons.

- Named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

- Had 13.0+ sacks in each of his last three full seasons (2017-19), trailing only Pro Football Hall of Famer Reggie White (four) for the most consecutive 13.0-sack campaigns in NFL history.

- Had 10.0+ sacks in five consecutive seasons (2015-19) before a season-ending injury in 2020, joining Von Miller (2014-18) as the only active NFL players to accomplish the feat. Also became the first player in Cardinals history with at least four 10.0+ sack campaigns (2016-19).

- Earned Pro Bowl, 1st-team All-Pro and NFC Defensive Player of the Year (NFL Committee of 101) honors after establishing a single-season franchise record with 19.0 sacks (second in the NFL) and setting career highs with eight forced fumbles (tied for first) and seven strip-sacks (first) in 2019. Also became the third NFL player - first since Reggie White (1986) - to post 4.0+ sacks in multiple games in a season.

- Earned a Pro Bowl selection and 1st-team All-Pro (AP, PFWA, Sporting News) honors after leading the NFL with 17.0 sacks in 2017. Jones, who became the first Cardinal to ever lead the league in sacks, also led the NFL in tackles for loss (28) and QB hits (38) that season.

- Has been named NFC Defensive Player of the Month (December, 2017; December, 2019), AFC Defensive Player of the Month (November, 2013), NFL Rookie of the Month (September, 2012), AFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 2, 2014) and NFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 5, 2018; Week 7, 2019 and Week 16, 2019).

- Became the third player in Cardinals history to be named Defensive Player of the Month after totaling 16 tackles, 5.0 sacks, eight tackles for loss, 12 QB hits and a forced fumble in December, 2017. Earned the award again with an NFL-high 6.0 sacks, 18 tackles, three forced fumbles, four tackles for loss and nine QB hits in the final four weeks of the 2019 season.

- Graduated from Syracuse University on Mother's Day in 2020 almost three years after his mother, Camille, passed away. Earned a degree in Human Development & Family Sciences.

GAME-AFTER-GAME JONES GETS A SACK

Jones has 61.0 sacks as a member of the Cardinals, leaving him just 6.0 sacks shy of becoming the franchise all-time leader. That is despite the All-Pro having played just 69 games with Arizona.

Jones has been remarkably consistent since joining the Cardinals in 2016. He has at least one sack in 43 of 69 games with the team. Over the last five seasons (2016-20) - and despite Jones missing 11 games in 2020 due to injury - no player in the NFL has more games with at least one sack.

The 2020 season - in which he missed the final 11 games due to a biceps injury - proved an injury is the only thing that can slow down Jones.

In just 69 games with the Cardinals, the All-Pro has recorded 61.0 sacks. He enters the 2021 season needing just 6.0 sacks to pass Freddie Joe Nunn as the franchise all-time leader.




CAPTAIN BAKER - CARDINALS HEART & SOUL

"The guy is a human eraser. He makes a ton of tackles, he brings energy, he brings juice, he's physical. He's our leader and our heart and soul on defense." - GM Steve Keim

S Budda Baker had a breakout season in 2019 and after signing a four-year extension prior to the start of the 2020 campaign, he delivered quite an encore performance in a career year.

After being named a team captain for the first time, he finished the 2020 season with 118 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 7 tackles for loss, 2 INTs, 6 passes defended and a forced fumble on his way to 1st-team All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors.

IN RARIFIED AIR AMONG CARDS PRO BOWLERS

Baker was selected to his third Pro Bowl (second straight at safety) in 2020, joining CB Patrick Peterson (4) as the only players in Cardinals history to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections before their 25th birthday.

Baker is also the only player in franchise history selected to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer and as a position player: 2017 (special teams), 2019-20 (safety).

SETTING THE STANDARD AT DEFENSIVE BACK

Baker's 118 tackles in 2020 matched a team high (LB Jordan Hicks) and tied for first among NFL DBs (Buffalo S Jordan Poyer). **It marked the second consecutive season Baker led or tied for the league lead for tackles among NFL DBs.**

ANOTHER NUMBER CHANGE FOR BAKER

Baker played his two first NFL seasons (2017-18) wearing jersey #36. Then from 2019-20 he wore #32. Baker switched numbers again prior to the 2021 season and will now wear #3.

FIRST 50 GAMES, 0 INTS - LAST 11 GAMES, 2 INTS

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker had an INT in back-to-back games in Weeks 6-7 last season. He had his first career INT vs. the Cowboys on Monday Night Football in Week 6 and had another in Week 7 vs. Seattle.

BUDDA'S CAREER THROUGH 61 GAMES

In his first four NFL seasons, Baker has started 51-of-61 games played and has posted 442 tackles (332 solo), 25 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, 2 INTs, 11 QB hits, five forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 20 passes defended.

AWARDS PILED UP IN 2020

All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors weren't the only awards Baker earned in 2020. He was named NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October and also earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors in Week 6.

Defensive Player of the Month (October): Became just the fourth player in franchise history to earn NFC Player of the Month honors. He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. **Baker became the first NFL player in seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.**

Defensive Player of the Week (Week 6): Recorded 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, 1 TFL, 2 QB hits, 1 PD and 1 FF in a victory over the Cowboys. He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

A STAR AS SOON AS HE STEPPED ON THE FIELD

In his first career NFL start - in Week 11 of the 2017 season at Houston - Baker recorded 12 tackles, a sack, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery. Became the first NFL rookie in 20 years and the first Cardinals player ever to register 10+ tackles, a sack and two forced fumbles in a game.



ALFORD PLAYS AN AGGRESSIVE STYLE


The Cardinals signed CB Robert Alford to a three-year contract as a free agent in February of 2019 following six seasons in Atlanta. However, season-ending injuries during training camp kept him out of action the last two seasons.

Now back in the lineup, the Cardinals are counting on a player whose aggressive style of play made him an extraordinarily productive presence in the defensive secondary.

In his first six NFL seasons, Alford recorded 291 tackles (243 solo), 10 INTs and 85 passes defended in 88 games (76 starts). **In that six-year stretch prior to the injuries that kept him out of the lineup in Arizona, only CB Darius Slay (91) had more passes defended than Alford (85).**

"He's a guy who is a big talker, a guy who loves the game, a guy who, last year, had a season-ending injury and would still go to meetings, still goes to practice and watch practice and help young guys out, even help older guys out and seeing things. Now that's he's on the field I know he's excited and looks like the great Robert Alford, a fresh Robert Alford and I'm excited to see him play."

BUTLER CONTINUES REMARKABLE CAREER

Two-time Pro Bowl CB Malcolm Butler - a former undrafted free agent out of West Alabama - is now in his eighth NFL season and first with the Cardinals after signing with the team as a free agent in March.

Butler came to Arizona after spending the last three seasons (2018-20) with Tennessee.

In his first seven NFL seasons, Butler appeared in 100 regular season games (84 starts) with 17 INTs, 390 tackles, 84 passes defended, five forced fumbles, and two fumble recoveries. Has also played in 12 playoff games and has 42 tackles, 10 passes defended and two INTs.

BUHLER GETS HIS HANDS ON THE BALL

Since becoming a full-time starter in 2015, Butler is one of just five NFL players with at least 75 passes defended and 15 INTs.



18 YEARS IN, STILL AMONG THE NFL'S BEST

Now in his 18th NFL season - and fifth with the Cardinals - P **Andy Lee** is remains one of the league's most productive punters.

Lee has finished in the top-10 in punting average in 14 of his 17 NFL seasons. That includes ranking 7th (2017), 1st (2018) and 2nd (2019) in punting average in his first three seasons with the Cardinals.

For his career, Lee has appeared in 264 games with 1,348 punts for 62,747 yards (46.5-yard avg.) and 446 punts landed inside the 20-yard line.

His 46.5-yard career punting average ranks sixth in NFL history.

Despite limited snaps on defense, LB **Dennis Gardeck** - named a team captain prior to the season - had a breakout season as a passer rusher in 2020.

Gardeck - a standout on special teams who signed with Arizona as a rookie free agent out of Sioux Falls in 2018 - totaled 7.0 sacks in 2020. That is the most in franchise history by a player who entered the league undrafted.

MAKING GOOD USE OF LIMITED ACTION

After never playing a snap on defense in his first 34 career games, Gardeck totaled 7.0 sacks in his last 11 games before a knee injury suffered in Week 15 ended his season. He had 5.0 sacks in his final three games played in 2020.

Gardeck finished the 2020 season with nine tackles, 7.0 sacks, seven tackles for loss and a fumble recovery - all while playing just 93 defensive snaps.

He recorded his 7.0 sacks in four games (2 @ NYJ; 1 vs. LAR; 2 @ NYG; 2 vs. PHI) in which he played a combined 45 plays on defense.

ENTERING 2021 SEASON WITH A SACK STREAK

Gardeck had at least one sack in each of his final three games played in 2020. That includes 2.0 sacks in his final two games - @ NYG (Week 14) and vs. Phi (Week 15).

He became the first Cardinals player with 2.0+ sacks in back-to-back games since Chandler Jones had 2.0 each in Games 9-10 in 2018.

GARDECK HAS BEEN A SUCCESS STORY

Gardeck's expanded role on defense in 2020 was not his first taste of success in the NFL. A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 44 career games, he has 27 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and a TD on a blocked punt.

PRATER AMONG ACTIVE SCORING LEADERS

Signed as a free agent this offseason, K **Matt Prater** has been one of the most productive kickers in NFL history since he made his debut in 2007. He enters the 2021 season having made 321-of-386 FG attempts (83.2%) and 491-of-503 PATs (97.6%).

In 203 career games, Prater has accumulated 1,454 total points. That total ranks third among active NFL players.

He also holds the franchise record for longest FG with both Denver (64 yards) and Detroit (59 yards, twice).

GUY YOU WANT WITH GAME ON THE LINE

Prater is one of the top clutch kickers in NFL history, having connected on all 16 game-winning FG attempts with two minutes or less remaining in the fourth quarter and OT (11-of-11 in regulation and 5-of-5 in OT).

Prater's most recent game-winner came with Detroit when he connected on a 59-yarder as time expired to give the Lions a 30-27 victory vs. Washington in Week 10 of the 2020 season.





QUARTERBACKS

Kyler Murray – Won the 2018 Heisman Trophy, selected first overall in the 2019 NFL Draft, earned 2019 AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors and selected to his first-career Pro Bowl in 2020.

Colt McCoy – Has thrown for 6,455 yards and 30 TDs while completing 600-of-989 passes (60.7%) in 44 games (30 starts) for Cleveland (2010-12), San Francisco (2013), Washington (2014-19) and the Giants (2020).

Chris Streveler – Played 35 games with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the CFL where he threw for 2,698 yards and 19 TDs and ran for 1,167 yards and 22 TDs from 2018-19. Played five games as the Cards backup QB in 2020.

RUNNING BACKS

Eno Benjamin – Inactive for all 16 games during his rookie campaign after being selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round (222nd overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft out of Arizona State.

James Conner – Pro Bowler who signed with Arizona after four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh, where he ran for 2,302 yards and 22 TDs on 532 carries plus 124 catches for 963 yards and four TDs in 50 games (33 starts).
