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ARIZONA CARDINALS (0-0-1) VS. BALTIMORE RAVENS (1-0-0) M&T Bank Stadium | September 15, 2019 | 10:00 AM



THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

Arizona travels across the country this week as the Cardinals make their way to Baltimore for a Week 2 matchup against the Ravens. This week's game will serve as Baltimore's 2019 home opener.

Sunday's game marks the seventh all-time meeting between the Cardinals and Ravens, who last met in Arizona during the 2015 season. This week Arizona makes its first trip to Baltimore since 2011 and will be looking for its first road win against the Ravens since their first-ever meeting back in 1997.

Arizona and Baltimore are infrequent opponents. Of the 31 other current NFL franchises, the Cards have played only the Texans (4) and Jaguars (5) fewer times than they have the Ravens.

The previous six matchups between the two teams have all been close. None of the contests were decided by more than eight points, including two of the last three meetings (2007 and 2011) that were decided by three points.

One Cardinals player who will feel at home in M&T Bank Stadium is LB **Terrell Suggs**, who will be playing in his 125th career game at the venue (includes regular season and postseason). A native of Chandler, AZ, Suggs played his first 16 NFL seasons with the Ravens and left this offseason as the franchise's all-time leader in sacks and games played. Other Cardinals who spent time with the Ravens include WR **Michael Crabtree**, TE **Maxx Williams** and C **A.Q. Shipley**.

In their season-opener last week vs. Detroit, the Cardinals and 2019 #1 overall pick QB **Kyler Murray** rallied from an 18-point fourth quarter deficit to tie the Lions 27-27 at State Farm Stadium. WR **Larry Fitzgerald** (113 yards, TD) and RB **David Johnson** (137 total yards, TD) also helped lead the way on offense. The Cardinals scored on five of six possessions in the fourth quarter/OT in the comeback.

LBs **Chandler Jones** (sack, FF), Suggs (2.0 sacks, FF) and **Jordan Hicks** (NFL-high 14 tackles) led the effort on defense for Arizona.

Following this week's game in Baltimore, Arizona returns home for consecutive games as the team hosts Carolina (Week 3) and Seattle (Week 4). Baltimore heads to Kansas City next week to face the Chiefs.

FITZGERALD APPEARS IN TEAM RECORD 235th CAREER GAME

Last week's season opener against the Lions marked WR **Larry Fitzgerald**'s 235th career game. He now holds the franchise record for career games played. Fitzgerald entered last week's game tied with K Jim Bakken (234) for most games played with the Cardinals. He finished the game with 8 receptions for 113 yards and a TD.

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THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- The Cardinals embark upon their first road trip of the regular season this week when they travel to Baltimore to face the Ravens. This game marks the seventh all-time meeting between the two teams.
- WR **Larry Fitzgerald** had two receptions last week (41 and 45 yards) that were longer than any catch he had over the previous three seasons (2016-18). His 45-yard catch in the fourth quarter was his longest reception since 2014.
- Last week's game in Miami was the Ravens' first without either Ray Lewis or **Terrell Suggs** on the team since the finale of the 1995 regular season, their last in Cleveland. Lewis (17 yrs/228 games) and Suggs (16 yrs/229 games) combined to play 33 seasons and 457 games for the Ravens. Suggs will make his return to Baltimore this week when he faces the Ravens for the first time. It will be his 125th career game at M&T Bank Stadium, including postseason.
- Rookie QB **Kyler Murray** sparked the Cardinals comeback against the Lions last week with his second half performance, completing 20-of-29 pass attempts (68.9%) for 238 yards, 2 TDs, 0 INTs and a 116.7 passer rating in the fourth quarter/OT.

Cardinals LB **Terrell Suggs** was drafted 10th overall by the Ravens in the 2003 NFL draft and played 16 seasons with the teams (2003-18).

Cardinals TE **Maxx Williams** was drafted by the Ravens in the second round of the 2015 NFL Draft and played four seasons with the team.

Cardinals WR **Michael Crabtree** started all 16 games for the Ravens in 2018.

CARDS VS. RAVENS - SERIES BREAKDOWN

The Cardinals and Ravens meet for the seventh time in a series that dates back to 1997. Of the 31 other current NFL franchises, the Cards have played only the Texans (4) and Jaguars (5) fewer times than they have the Ravens.

After the Ravens won four consecutive games in the series between 2000 and 2011, the Cardinals snapped that streak with a 26-18 victory in the last meeting between the two teams in 2015 at State Farm Stadium.

Matchups between the Cardinals and Ravens have been close affairs. None of the previous six contests were decided by more than eight points, including two of the last three meetings (2007 and 2011) that were decided by three points. In both of those games the Ravens won on FGs in the final minute of regulation. That includes Arizona's last trip to Baltimore in 2011, when the Ravens kicked a 25-yard FG with :52 remaining for a 30-27 win.

Arizona heads to Baltimore this week looking for its first road win against the Ravens since the first-ever meeting between the two teams. In 1997, the Cardinals took down the Ravens 16-13 on a 43-yard FG as time expired in regulation.

John Harbaugh



Kliff Kingsbury was hired by the Cardinals on January 11, 2019, coming to Arizona after spending the last six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech. While with the Red Raiders, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of the college football's most explosive and productive offenses. Tech featured a passing attack that ranked in the top-10 in the country in all six seasons during his tenure, ranked in the top-20 nationally for total offense in all six seasons and finished in the top-25 in scoring five times. A former star QB at Texas Tech, Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft and also spent time with the Saints and Jets during his playing career.

Now in his 12th season as head coach in Baltimore, **John Harbaugh** was hired on January 19, 2008, and has led the Ravens to a 105-72 record in the regular season and a 10-6 mark in the postseason. Harbaugh has led the Ravens to a playoff berth in seven of his 11 seasons, and in 2012, captured the team's second Super Bowl Championship. In 2018, the Ravens earned their fifth-ever AFC North title and third under Harbaugh. Baltimore has appeared in three AFC Championship contests in Harbaugh's tenure and their 10 playoffs wins since '08 rank second in the AFC (NE-16). Prior to becoming head coach in Baltimore, Ravens spent 10 seasons in Philadelphia coaching special teams (1998-06) and the secondary (2007).

GREAT RECEIVERS, EVEN GREATER FRIENDS

Two of the best WRs to ever play in the NFL will be involved in Sunday's game between the Cardinals and Ravens. One will be in the middle of the action on the field and one will be calling the action from the FOX broadcast booth.

Long before he became one of the NFL's all-time leading WRs with the Cardinals, **Larry Fitzgerald** served as a ballboy for his hometown Minnesota Vikings during the tenure of former head coach Dennis Green. Starring on those Vikings teams were future Hall of Fame WRs **Cris Carter** and **Randy Moss**. The trio developed a friendship during that time that continues to this day.

Carter was among a group of Vikings players that used to attend Fitzgerald's prep games at Academy of Holy Angels (Minneapolis, MN) High School. Over two decades later, both rank in the top-15 in NFL history in receptions, receiving yards and TD receptions.

"I call him Uncle Cris," Fitzgerald once said of his longtime friend Carter. "I've known him since I was 11. I've lived with him down in Boca Raton (FL) working out with him, so our relationship, he's like an uncle."

This week marks the first time that Carter will be part of the broadcast crew for one of Fitzgerald's games.



SUGGS IN THE RAVENS RECORD BOOKS

On Sunday, Cardinals LB **Terrell Suggs** will return to Baltimore where he played his first 16 seasons after being selected 10th overall by the Ravens in the 2003 NFL Draft.

During that time, he made an indelible mark on the franchise and its record books.

Suggs is the Ravens all-time leader in games played (229), sacks (132.5), sack yardage (944.5) and forced fumbles (35).

A FAMILIAR ENVIRONMENT FOR SUGGS

This Sunday's matchup will mark the 125th game Suggs has played at M&T Bank Stadium. He played in 119 regular season and 5 postseason games at the venue as a member of the Ravens.

HEISMAN WORTHY MATCHUP

Of the nine active NFL players who won the Heisman during their college career, four will be on the field together at M&T Bank Stadium this Sunday when the Cardinals face the Ravens in Baltimore.

That includes both starting QBs in Arizona's **Kyler Murray** and Baltimore's **Lamar Jackson**. Murray took home the Heisman in 2018 while Jackson earned the honor in 2016.

Ravens RB **Mark Ingram** won the Heisman in 2009 while playing at Alabama and Ravens backup QB **Robert Griffin III** was named college football's most outstanding player with Baylor in 2011.

Murray became just the third Heisman recipient ever drafted by the Cardinals.

He was the 22nd former Heisman winner to be selected #1 overall in the NFL Draft, dating back to the University of Chicago's Jay Berwanger in 1936.

--With the selection of Mayfield (2018) and Murray (2019) at #1 overall in the last two drafts, it marks the first time since 2010-11 (Bradford/Newton) that a Heisman winner was taken #1 overall in consecutive drafts.

--When Murray took the field with AZ last Sunday, he became the fifth Heisman Trophy winner to play for the Cardinals: Bradford, Palmer, Leinart and Crow.

FRIENDS BECOME FOES FOR A DAY

In their one season starting together at Oklahoma in 2018 - QB **Kyler Murray** and WR **Marquise "Hollywood" Brown** produced record results.

Both earned first-team All-America honors on their way to becoming the first QB/WR duo from Oklahoma ever selected in the first round of the NFL Draft. Murray went #1 overall to Arizona and Brown was selected #25 overall by Baltimore.



Murray took over as the Sooners starting QB in 2018, completing 260-of-377 pass attempts (69.0%) for 4,361 yards, 42 TDs and just seven INTs while also rushing for 1,001 yards and 12 TDs.

He was named first-team All-American and became Oklahoma's seventh-ever Heisman Trophy winner.

Brown played in all 14 games for the Sooners last season and hauled in 75 receptions for 1,318 receiving yards and 10 TDs. All 10 of his TD catches were from Murray. Brown earned first-team All-American honors and was named a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award as the nation's top WR.

Shining in Week 1 - Murray and Brown in their NFL Debuts

Both Murray and Brown made a splash in their NFL debut last week.

Murray became the first Cards QB ever to throw for 300+ yards in his first career game as he led AZ back from an 18-point 4th quarter deficit to tie the Lions 27-27. In a 59-10 victory over Miami, Brown had four receptions for 147 yards and two TDs. His first two catches resulted in TDs (47 and 83 yards). *Both players were nominated for the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week for their performances in Week 1.*

AMONG THE ALL-TIME SACK LEADERS

Making his Cardinals debut vs. Detroit last week, Chandler AZ native LB **Terrell Suggs** recorded five tackles, two sacks, two tackles for loss, a QB hit and a forced fumble against the Lions. *Suggs' second sack gives him 134.5 for his career and he now sits alone in 12th place on the NFL's all-time sacks list.*

Suggs' 134.5 sacks lead all active players in the NFL. He has 34.0 more sacks than any other active player.

Suggs has joined new teammate LB **Chandler Jones** on Arizona's defense this season. Jones ranks ninth among active players with 78.0 career sacks. The Cardinals are the only team that has two of the top-10 active sack leaders.

SUGGS GOES FOR 31 AGAINST FORMER TEAM

Suggs has recorded at least a partial sack against 30 of 32 NFL franchises in his career. He could make that 31 this week when he faces his former team - the Baltimore Ravens - for the first time. The only team Suggs has played without recording a sack is the Philadelphia Eagles.

Suggs has more sacks against the Browns (19.0) than he does against any other team.

No active defender has more strip-sacks than Suggs, who has accumulated an NFL-high 32 career strip-sacks, including one of Lions QB Matthew Stafford last week vs. Detroit.

A RECORD-SETTING DEBUT

Leading the Cardinals to an 18-point fourth quarter comeback to tie the Lions last week, QB **Kyler Murray** completed 29-of-54 pass attempts for 308 yards, 2 TDs, an INT and a 75.2 pass rating.

Murray sparked the comeback with his performance in the fourth quarter and OT, when he completed 20-of-29 pass attempts (68.9%) for 238 yards, 2 TDs, 0 INTs and a 116.7 passer rating.

Murray became the first rookie QB in franchise history to throw for 300+ yards in his first-ever game. His 308 yards represent the fifth-best single-game total in franchise history by a rookie. Murray's 300-yard performance last Sunday was the first by a Cardinals rookie QB that did not come in a loss.

CARDS TAKE KYLER #1 OVERALL

Holding the #1 overall selection in the NFL Draft for just the fifth time in franchise history - and first time since 1958 - the Cardinals took Oklahoma QB **Kyler Murray** with the top pick this past April.

A STAR IS BORN IN OKLAHOMA

After starting his college career at Texas A&M in 2015, Murray played two seasons at Oklahoma (2017-18). In his first season with the Sooners in 2017, Murray backed up Heisman Trophy winner and 2018 #1 overall pick Baker Mayfield.

Murray took over in 2018, starting 13 of 14 games and completing 260-of-377 pass attempts (69.0%) for 4,361 yards, 42 TDs and just seven INTs while also rushing for 1,001 yards and 12 TDs on 140 carries (7.2 avg.).



Below is a look at what Murray accomplished with the Sooners in 2018:

- Became the first FBS player ever to average at least 300 passing yards (311.5) and at least 60 rushing yards (71.5) per game for a full season.

- Joined Clemson's Deshaun Watson (2015) as the only FBS players to ever record at least 4,000 passing yards and at least 1,000 rushing yards in a season.

- Led the nation in total yards (school-record 5,362), points responsible for (324), yards/completion (16.8) and yards/pass attempt (single-season FBS record of 11.6).

- Only player in school history to throw for 300 yards and rush for 100 in a game and did so three times.

- Threw at least two TD passes in all but one game and threw at least three TD passes in 10 of 14 contests.

- Set school and Big 12 records with at least three TD passes in eight straight games.

KINGSBURY ERA BEGINS

Cardinals first-year head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** made his NFL debut last week in the Cardinals matchup against the Lions. At 40 years, 30 days old he became the youngest Week 1 head coach for the Cardinals since Joe Kuharich (35 years, 166 days) in 1952.

A RARE RESULT IN HIS FIRST GAME

Exactly 98 years, 10 months and 30 days after playing their first game as an NFL franchise (0-0 tie against the Chicago Tigers), the Cardinals played to a 27-27 tie with the Lions last week.

Kingsbury joins the coach from that '20 matchup vs. the Tigers – Pro Football Hall of Famer **Paddy Driscoll** – as the only coaches in franchise history to have their debut game end in a tie.

Prior to Kingsbury, the last NFL coaching debut that resulted in a tie was Detroit's Joe Schmidt, who led the Lions to a 17-17 tie against the Packers on 9/17/67.

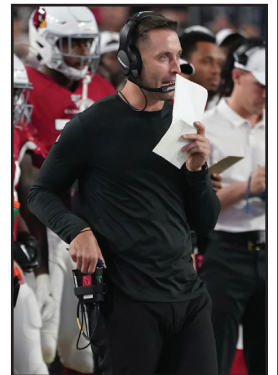

AN IMPROBABLE COMEBACK IN WEEK 1

• Arizona overcame an 18-point fourth quarter deficit to tie the Detroit Lions 27-27 in the season-opener last week. It represents the first Cardinals game to end in a tie since 10/23/16 when Arizona and Seattle played to a 6-6 tie on Sunday Night Football. Last week's game was the 41st in franchise history to end in a tie but just the second in the last 33 years (1987-2019).

• Entering last week's game, the Cardinals had a 2-288 record in games in which they trailed by at least 18 points in the fourth quarter. Arizona had lost 96 consecutive games in which it trailed by at least 18 points in the fourth quarter before coming back to earn a tie against the Lions. Dating back to 1990, NFL teams are now 10-2253-1 in games they trailed by at least 18 points in the fourth quarter. Arizona's game against the Lions accounts for the only tie.

• ESPN had the Lions win probability at 99.1% when they led the Cardinals 24-6 with 14:35 left in the fourth quarter last week.

• After scoring just once on its first 10 drives against the Lions, Arizona scored on five of its final six drives in the comeback.



WEEK 1 NOTES - HICKS BUSY IN OPENER

LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in the off-season after four seasons with the Eagles – posted a game-high 14 tackles last week (according to official game stats). He also added two tackles for loss and two QB hits.

His 14 total tackles established a new career single-game high for the fifth-year pro and also tied for the highest total among NFL defenders in Week 1.

Second-year WR **Trent Sherfield** made a number of key plays on special teams in the opener. He recorded an open-field tackle for minus-three yards on a punt return in the first quarter and in the second quarter, recovered a muffed punt at the Lions 8-yard line that led to the Cardinals first points of the season.

SEASON BEGINS WITH FOUR ROOKIE STARTERS

Among the 22 starters for the Cardinals last week were four 2019 draft picks making their NFL debut: QB **Kyler Murray** (1st round, #1 overall), WR **KeeSean Johnson** (6th round, #174 overall), CB **Byron Murphy** (2nd round, #33 overall) and DL **Zach Allen** (3rd round, #65 overall).

Last week's game marked the first time since the 1970 NFL-AFL merger that the Cardinals had multiple rookies start on both sides of the ball in a season-opener.

Eight total rookies made their NFL debut for the Cardinals last Sunday, including seven 2019 NFL Draft picks (Murray, K. Johnson, Murphy, Allen, WR **Andy Isabella**, S **Deionte Thompson**, OL **Josh Miles**) and their 2019 Supplemental Draft pick (S **Jalen Thompson**).

FEELING AT HOME IN WEEK 1

The 2019 marked the ninth time in 14 years (2006, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2014-16, '18-19) that the Cardinals began the regular season at home since the opening of State Farm Stadium. In 18 seasons at Sun Devil Stadium, the Cardinals never played at home in Week 1.

The Cardinals are (9-4-1) in regular season home openers since beginning play at State Farm Stadium.

IT GETS LOUD IN THERE

Having a sellout crowd on hand every game has given Arizona one of the NFL's most distinct home field advantages.

Dating back to the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006, Cards opponents have accumulated 172 accepted false start penalties in the regular season. That is the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

PALMER GOING INTO RING OF HONOR IN 2019

The Cardinals will induct QB Carson Palmer into its Ring of Honor at halftime of the game vs. Seattle on September 29 at State Farm Stadium.

Palmer played five seasons in Arizona (2013-17) and his .642 winning percentage is the best for a starting QB in team history. Acquired by the Cardinals in a trade with Oakland prior to the 2013 season, Palmer holds the franchise's single-season records for passing yards (4,671), TDs (35) and passer rating (104.6), all of which he set in 2015.



A five-time team captain in Arizona, Palmer posted a 38-21-1 record during his time with the Cardinals and led the team to a franchise single-season record 13 wins in 2015 and an appearance in the NFC Championship game. He started 60 games, completing 1,373-of-2,197 pass attempts (62.5%) for 16,782 yards, 105 TDs, 57 INTs and a 91.1 passer rating.

Palmer holds the franchise record for 300-yard passing games (25) and 400-yard passing performances (3). On the franchise career list, Palmer ranks 4th in team history in passing yards (16,782), 4th in pass attempts (2,197), 5th in completions (1,373), 2nd in completion percentage (62.5%), 1st in yards per attempt (7.64), 4th in TD passes (105), 2nd in TD percentage (4.8) and 2nd in passer rating (91.1).

With Palmer under center during the 2015 campaign, the Cardinals finished the year with the #1 offense in the NFL for the first time in team history and set team single-season records for wins (13), road wins (7), points (489) and total TDs (59) while earning the first postseason bye in team history. Palmer established single-season records for passing yards, TD passes, passer rating, 300-yard passing performances (9) and led the NFL with a team-record 11 games with a 100+ passer rating that season.

Palmer will become the 18th member of the Cardinals Ring of Honor, the creation of which coincided with the opening of State Farm Stadium in 2006. He will join Jim Hart and Kurt Warner as the only quarterbacks in the group. The other 15 members are: Charles W. Bidwill, Sr. (Owner), Jimmy Conzelman (Coach), T Dan Dierdorf, HB John "Paddy" Driscoll, HB/DB Marshall Goldberg, WR Roy Green, CB Dick "Night Train" Lane, HB Ollie Matson, HB Ernie Nevers, S Pat Tillman, HB Charley Trippi, CB Roger Wehrli, CB Aeneas Williams, S Adrian Wilson and S Larry Wilson.

CARDS JOIN NFL TO CELEBRATE 100TH SEASON

The NFL is celebrating its 100th season in 2019. As the United States' oldest professional football franchise still in existence, the Cardinals hold a unique place in league history.



The Cardinals were founded in 1898 as the Morgan Athletic Club, predating the formation of the NFL by over 20 years. By the time the NFL was founded in 1920 as the American Professional Football Association (APFA), the team was known as the Racine Cardinals when it became one of the 14 charter members of the upstart league after paying a \$100 franchise fee. Today, the Cardinals and Chicago Bears represent the only two charter members of the NFL still in existence.

In 1932, Hall of Fame owner Charles W. Bidwill, Sr., then a vice president of the Bears, purchased the Cardinals. After divesting himself of his Bears' holdings, that began a period of family ownership that continues today with current owner **William V. Bidwill** and team president **Michael Bidwill**.

In 2019, the Cardinals will join the NFL in celebrating 100 years of play with a year-long series of "NFL 100" events, initiatives and programs celebrating fans, players and communities.

The historic and unprecedented celebration is a salute to the millions of fans who love the game; highlighting the unifying nature of football and its positive impact in communities; bringing together generations of past, present and future players; and looking ahead to the NFL's next 100 years.

CARDS A MEMBER OF NFL'S TWO OLDEST RIVALRIES

Having met twice during the NFL's inaugural season in 1920, the Cardinals and Bears represent the oldest rivalry in league history. The Cardinals and Packers – who joined the league in 1921 – are the NFL's second-oldest rivalry. The Packers were formed in 1919 by Earl (Curly) Lambeau and George Calhoun but did not gain entry into the APFA until 1921.

- The Cards and Bears have faced each other 90 times during the regular season, dating back to 1920.
- The first-ever meeting between the Cardinals and Bears – then known as the Racine Cardinals and Decatur Staleys – occurred at Normal Park in Chicago on November 28th, 1920, exactly 72 days after the league was conceived as the APFA during a meeting in Canton, OH. In that game, the Cardinals defeated the Staleys 7-6 at Normal Park.
- The first meeting between the Cardinals and Packers (a 3-3 tie) occurred on November 20, 1921 at Normal Park in Chicago. The following week (November 27, 1921), the Packers and Bears met for the first time.

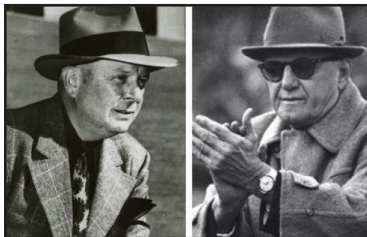
FRIENDSHIP OF THE HALL OF FAME OWNERS

Cardinals Hall of Fame owner **Charles Bidwill** and Bears Hall of Fame owner **George Halas** had a friendship that endured even as their team's were cross-town rivals during their shared time in Chicago.

At one point during the Great Depression, that friendship helped save Halas' ownership of the Bears.

In 1931, Halas' co-owner Edward "Dutch" Sternaman proposed being bought out of his stake in the Bears for \$38,000, which was to be paid in installments. After suffering \$18,000 in losses during the 1932 season, Halas was \$15,000 short when the final payment was due in 1933. Defaulting on the payment meant ownership would revert to Sternaman.

"It was a case of finding \$15,000 in a hurry, or losing everything I'd worked for since moving the Staleys from Decatur to Chicago in 1921," Halas wrote in 1967 in a history of the Bears published in the Chicago Tribune. "From this desperate situation, I was rescued by the joint efforts of my mother and my good friend Charley Bidwill. Mother bought \$5,000 worth of stock from her savings. Bidwill purchased \$5,000 in stock and also arranged a bank loan for the remaining \$5,000 needed. But it was a mighty close call. As I remember, I finally got all the money together at 11:10 a.m. on the day the final note came due. Forfeit time was 12 o'clock noon."

A HISTORY OF BEING THE FIRST

In addition to being the oldest professional football team in the country, the Cardinals also have a long history of serving as a pioneer in the sport – both on and off the playing field.

DIVERSITY

1st Female Owner in NFL History: Following the 1947 death of Cardinals owner and Pro Football Hall of Fame Charles Bidwill, his wife Violet oversaw operations of the franchise for the next 15 years. As such, she became the first female to serve as principal owner in NFL history and is believed to be the first female owner in American pro sports.

1st African American Female Executive in NFL History:

Adele Harris spent 26 seasons with the franchise before retiring in 2001. She holds the distinction of being the first African American female to hold a front office position with an NFL team. Harris first worked as a secretary for the St. Louis Football Cardinals from 1971-74. She left the club to pursue a degree in business management and returned to the team in 1978 as a publicity assistant. By 1980, Harris became the team's director of community relations, and was instrumental in the team's civic efforts when it relocated to Arizona in 1988. Harris passed away in November of 2007.

1st African American to Handle Contract Negotiations for NFL Team: In 1981, the team hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club.

1st African American Head Coach/General Manager Tandem: In 2004, the Cardinals hired Dennis Green as the team's head coach. Joining General Manager Rod Graves, they became the first African American general manager/head coach pairing. Hired by Arizona in 1997 as Assistant to the President, Graves spent 16 seasons with the organization, including the last six years at the team's GM.

1st Female Coach in NFL History: In 2015, the Cardinals hired Jen Welter as a coaching intern for training camp and the preseason to work with inside linebackers, making her the first female coach of any kind in NFL history.

INTERNATIONAL PLAY

1st NFL Game Outside of North America: The most popular sport in the United States played before an international audience for the first time ever when the Cardinals and San Diego Chargers met for a preseason matchup at Korakuen Stadium in Tokyo, Japan. On August 16, 1976 the Cardinals defeated the Chargers 20-10 before an estimated crowd of 38,000.

1st NFL Game in Europe: On August 6, 1983 the Cardinals faced the Minnesota Vikings in a preseason matchup at Wembley Stadium in London. The Vikings defeated the Cardinals 28-10 in front of 32,847 fans at the landmark event.

1st NFL Regular Season Game Played Outside United States: On October 2, 2005 the Cardinals earned a 17-point come-from-behind victory over the San Francisco 49ers in a game played in front of a then-record crowd of 103,467 at Mexico City's Estadio Azteca. It was the first NFL regular season game ever played outside of the US.

FOOTBALL FIRSTS

1st Night Game in NFL History:

On November 6, 1929 the Providence Steamrollers became the first team to host a game at night using floodlights in a matchup against the Cardinals. That night contest also featured the first use of a football painted white during an actual game. With fan attendance crucial to generate revenue, the game was played in the evening rather than during the workday. The minor league baseball field of Kinsley Park was adorned with floodlights and the Cards earned a 16-0 victory over the Steamrollers.

1st Out of Town Training Camp: Prior to the 1929 season, the Cardinals conducted what is believed to be the NFL's first extended out-of-town training camp when the team spent the summer at Waterworks Park in Coldwater, Michigan.

1st Indoor NFL Game: With the country struggling through the Great Depression in late 1930, the Chicago Cardinals challenged the cross-town Bears to play a game to raise money for the governor's fund for unemployment relief. To battle the freezing temperatures the teams agreed to play at Chicago Stadium, then the largest indoor arena in the world. On December 15, 1930 the Bears earned a 9-7 victory in front of 10,000 fans. Six inches of dirt were hauled in and rolled for a playing surface, forcing the teams to use a white ball to increase visibility for both the players and fans. In addition to raising thousands of dollars for charity, it was a precursor to the 1932 championship when the Bears played for the NFL title in the same venue against the Portsmouth Spartans.

1st Retractable Grass Field in NFL History: When the Cardinals opened their new stadium in 2006, the venue broke the mold in terms of design and architecture. Among its most unique features is a fully retractable grass playing surface that resides outside the stadium for 300+ days a year and rolls in when needed. The first of its kind in NFL history, the stadium's grass playing surface has consistently ranked #1 in surveys of the league's players.

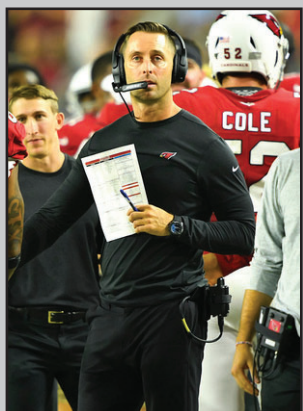
THE KINGSBURY ERA BEGINS IN ARIZONA

TAKING THE REINS

On January 8, 2019 the Cardinals announced the hiring of **Kliff Kingsbury** as the team's head coach.

The 40-year old Kingsbury spent the past six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech, and was hired as USC's offensive coordinator in December. The New Braunfels, TX native is an 11-year coaching veteran who has also worked at Texas A&M (2012) and at the University of Houston (2008-11) where he began his coaching career.

Recognized as one of the profession's brightest and most-innovative offensive minds, Kingsbury has tutored six future NFL QBs, including first-round selections Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield and Johnny Manziel as well as Case Keenum, Davis Webb and Nic Shimonek. Under Kingsbury's guidance, Mahomes (2016) and Keenum (2009, '11) both led the nation in passing.



Highlights from Kingsbury's Coaching Career

- While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive and productive offenses. The Red Raiders featured a passing attack that ranked in the top-10 in the country in all six seasons of his tenure, ranked in the top-20 nationally for total offense in all six seasons and finished in the top-25 in scoring five times.
- Under Kingsbury, Texas Tech averaged at least 30 points per game, 470 total yards per game and 300 passing yards per game in all six seasons. The Red Raiders averaged more than 500 yards of offense in four seasons and over 450 passing yards twice. They also averaged at least 140 rushing yards per game four times in six seasons under Kingsbury and averaged more than 40 points per game twice.
- At both Houston (2011) and Texas Tech (2016) Kingsbury's offenses led the nation in total offense and passing offense.
- Dating back to his first offensive coordinator job at Houston in 2011, a Kingsbury-led offense never finished outside the top-20 in the nation in total offense and never finished outside the top-15 in passing offense.
- In 2016, Texas Tech led the nation in total offense (566.6 ypg) and passing offense (463.0 ypg) while finishing #5 in scoring (43.7 ppg). It was the sixth consecutive season a Kingsbury-led unit finished in the top-10 in total offense dating back to his time at both Houston and Texas A&M.
- In 2015, the Red Raiders finished #2 in the nation in total offense (579.5 ypg), #2 in scoring offense (45.1 ppg) and had the nation's second ranked passing offense (388.2 ypg). The 45.1 points per game average established a school single-season record and Texas Tech was one of just two schools in the nation to score at least 25 points in every game. The Red Raiders featured a 4,000-yard passer, 1,000-yard receiver and a 1,000-yard rusher for the first time in school history.
- With Kingsbury serving as co-offensive coordinator in 2011, Houston led the nation in total offense (599.1 ypg), passing offense (450.1 ypg) and scoring (49.3 ppg) as quarterback Case Keenum finished his collegiate career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history.

Kingsbury spent the 2012 season at Texas A&M as offensive coordinator/QBs coach working under current University of Arizona head coach Kevin Sumlin. Texas A&M finished third nationally in total offense (558.5 ypg) with an attack that finished 13th nationally in rushing (242.1 ypg) and 14th in passing (316.5 ypg). The Aggies beat #1 Alabama on the road and #11 Oklahoma in the Cotton Bowl.

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston under Sumlin as the offensive quality control coach (2008-09) prior to being elevated to QBs coach (2010) and then co-offensive coordinator in 2011.

Kingsbury played QB at Texas Tech (1999-2002) where he set 39 school records, 16 Big 12 marks and 17 NCAA records during his collegiate career while throwing for 12,423 yards and 95 TDs. As a senior in 2012, he was awarded the Sammy Baugh Trophy as the nation's top college QB and was also named the Associated Press Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year while finishing ninth in Heisman Trophy voting.

He was drafted in the sixth round of the NFL Draft by New England in 2003 and spent his rookie season on the Patriots injured reserve list before spending the 2004 season on the Saints practice squad. Kingsbury played in one game with the Jets in 2005 and attended training camp with the Bills in 2006. He also played with the Cologne Centurions of NFL Europe in 2006 before playing with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League in 2007.

In 2018, Kingsbury was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame. He played high school football under his father, Tim, at New Braunfels (TX) High School where he threw for more than 3,000 yards and 34 TDs as a senior.

COACHING QUARTERBACKS

After joining the coaching ranks with the University of Houston in 2008, **Kliff Kingsbury** mentored six future NFL QBs during his coaching tenure: *Patrick Mahomes, Baker Mayfield, Johnny Manziel, Case Keenum, Davis Webb* and *Nic Shimonek*. Mahomes, Mayfield and Manziel were all selected in the 1st round of the NFL Draft.

NFL QBs Under Kingsbury

Mahomes (Texas Tech)

Under Kingsbury's tutelage, Mahomes spent two full seasons (2015-16) as the starter at Texas Tech. In those two years the Red Raiders finished #2 (2015) and #1 (2016) in the nation in total offense while Mahomes threw for a combined 9,705 yards and 77 TDs in 25 starts.

As a sophomore in 2015, Mahomes became the youngest QB in NCAA history to amass 5,000 yards of total offense. He eclipsed the 5,000-yard mark again in 2016, becoming just the third quarterback ever to record 5,000+ yards of total offense in back-to-back seasons.

Keenum (Univ. of Houston)

Kingsbury began his coaching career at the University of Houston where he was a quality control coach from 2008-09 before being promoted to QBs coach in 2010 and co-offensive coordinator in 2011. The Cougars led the nation in total offense, passing offense and scoring in 2011, while Keenum completed his record-setting career by placing seventh in the Heisman Trophy voting and winning the Sammy Baugh Award.

With Kingsbury calling plays, the Cougars averaged 599.1 total yards per game, including 450.1 through the air, while scoring over 49 points per game. Keenum wrapped up his career as the most prolific passer in NCAA FBS history. In his one season with Kingsbury as his QBs coach, Keenum completed 428-of-604 passes for 5,631 yards and 48 TDs, all of which led the NCAA FBS.

Manziel (Texas A&M)

Prior to taking over at Texas Tech, Kingsbury spent one season (2012) as the offensive coordinator at Texas A&M. In his lone season with the Aggies, Kingsbury played a crucial role in Manziel becoming the first freshman ever to win the Heisman Trophy.

Webb and Shimonek (Texas Tech)

Two other Kingsbury quarterbacks have also moved on to the league in recent years as Webb was selected by the New York Giants in the third round of the 2017 draft while Shimonek signed an undrafted free agent agreement with the Los Angeles Chargers in 2018.



HIGH-POWERED OFFENSE

Dating back to his first season as an offensive coordinator at the college level (2011 with Houston), **Kingsbury's** offenses have averaged 40.3 points/game. During his six seasons at Texas Tech (2013-18), the Red Raiders averaged 37.8 points/game.

Not Slowing Down Against Ranked Opponents

Under Kingsbury, the Tech Tech offenses averaged 502 yards/game in 24 contests against ranked opponents from 2013-18. The Red Raiders posted 600+ yards of offense in six of those games.



TOM CLEMENTS - PASS GAME COORDINATOR/QBS

Now in his first season as the Cardinals Pass Game Coordinator/QBs coach, veteran assistant **Tom Clements** (CLEM-ents) is a 24-year coaching veteran who has spent 20 seasons as an assistant coach in the NFL, including five seasons as an offensive coordinator.

- Named Cardinals pass game coordinator/QBs coach on 1/22/19.
- Coached for 11 seasons with the Packers (2006-16). In his 11 seasons with Green Bay, the Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in total offense nine times, made the postseason nine times and won Super Bowl XLV following the 2010 season.
- During his tenure with the Packers, Clements helped with the development of QB Aaron Rodgers who was selected to six Pro Bowls and earned NFL MVP honors in 2011 and 2014.
- In three seasons as offensive coordinator with Green Bay (2012-14), the Packers ranked #3 in the NFL in scoring (27.8 ppg), #5 in total offense (381.9 ypg), #3 in giveaways (54) and #5 in first downs (1,048).
- The Packers finished top-10 in the NFL in scoring in each season Clements worked as offensive coordinator, including in 2014 when the Packers led the NFL with 486 points.
- Also coached QB Brett Favre, who in 2007 was selected to the Pro Bowl after throwing for more than 4,000 yards for the fifth time in his career and led the Packers to the NFC Championship game.
- Has coached 13 different offensive players to a total of 21 Pro Bowls and tutored five quarterbacks who had 13 total 3,000-yard passing seasons, including eight 4,000-yard campaigns.

Prior to joining Green Bay, Clements spent two seasons (2004-05) as the offensive coordinator in Buffalo. He spent the previous seven years as a QBs coach with Pittsburgh, Kansas City and New Orleans. Clements helped Elvis Grbac (Chiefs in 2000) and Kordell Stewart (Steelers in 2001) earn Pro Bowl selections while Tommy Maddox (Pittsburgh) was named NFL Comeback Player of the Year in 2002.

Clements got his start in coaching at his alma mater, Notre Dame, spending four seasons (1992-95) working under Lou Holtz. He played 12 years in the Canadian Football League as a QB and was a seven-time divisional All-Star, 1987 CFL MVP, 1975 CFL Rookie of the Year and two-time Gray Cup Champion with Ottawa (1976) and Winnipeg (1984), earning the Outstanding Offensive Player award in each game.



JEFF RODGERS - ASST. HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Rodgers is in his second season with Arizona and first as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator.

He came to Cardinals in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019.

- Hired as Cardinals special teams coordinator in 2018 after working in the same capacity for three seasons (2015-17) with the Chicago Bears.
- Has 18 years of coaching experience, including 15 seasons coaching special teams in the NFL with Arizona, Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).
- Helped the Cardinals rank 5th in the NFL in special teams last season after the team finished 30th in 2017. P Andy Lee led the NFL and set a franchise single-season record with a 48.6-yard punting average and rookie LB Zeke Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles in 2018.
- The Broncos returned six kicks for TDs during Rodgers tenure in Denver (2011-14), tied for the second most in the NFL in that span. In 2012, Trindon Holliday became the first player in NFL history to record multiple return TDs in a playoff game when he scored on a 90-yard punt return and a 104-yard kickoff return in a 38-35 double-overtime loss to the Ravens.
- Under Rodgers tutelage, Broncos K Matt Prater was named to the Pro Bowl in 2013 after setting franchise records in field goal percentage (96.2%; 25-of-26) and points scored (150). Prater's 64-yard field goal in 2013 is the longest in NFL history. In 2014, K Connor Barth's 93.8 field-goal percentage (15-of-16) was the second-highest in team history.

Rodgers began his coaching career at the University of Arizona in 2001, spending two seasons as a graduate assistant working with the secondary and LBs under head coach John Mackovic. He entered the NFL coaching ranks with San Francisco in 2003 as a special teams quality control coach for two seasons.



VANCE JOSEPH - DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Vance Joseph was hired as Arizona's Defensive Coordinator this offseason and joined the Cardinals after two years (2017-18) as head coach of the Denver Broncos.

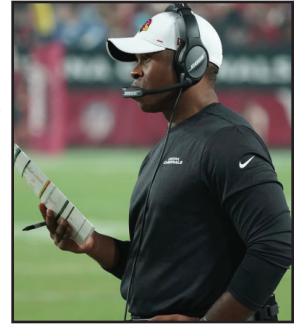
He is a 20-year coaching veteran, including 14 seasons in the NFL with San Francisco (2005-10), Houston (2011-13), Cincinnati (2014-15), Miami (2016) and Denver (2017-18).

- Hired as Cardinals defensive coordinator on 1/11/19.
- Joseph has 12 years of coaching experience on the defensive side of the ball in the NFL, including as defensive coordinator with Miami in 2016.
- In Joseph's initial season with the Broncos in 2017, Denver had the NFL's #3 ranked defense and joined Minnesota as the only teams in the NFL that season to rank in the top-five in both run defense and pass defense. The Broncos ranked #5 in run defense in '17 after finishing the previous year ranked #28 in that category.
- In 2018, the Broncos defense ranked in the top-10 in the NFL in INTs (17), takeaways (28) and sacks (44). Rookie LB Bradley Chubb – Denver's first-round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft – led all NFL rookies with 12.0 sacks last season. Pro Bowl LB Von Miller had 14.5 sacks, tied for fourth in the NFL last season. Denver was one of three teams (Seattle, Kansas City) to have two players record double digit sacks in 2018.
- In a stretch from 2011-16, which spanned jobs in Houston, Cincinnati and Miami, Joseph's teams made the postseason five times in six seasons.
- Joseph's teams have ranked in the top-10 in INTs in four of the past five seasons.
- Four different DBs earned a combined five Pro Bowl selections – Johnathan Joseph (2), Reggie Nelson (1), Adam Jones (1) and Walt Harris (1) – during Joseph's time coaching defensive backs in Cincinnati, Houston and San Francisco.

Prior to his tenure in Miami, Joseph coached DBs for two seasons (2014-15) with Cincinnati, helping the Bengals to back-to-back postseason appearances. During his two seasons with Cincinnati, the Bengals led the NFL with 41 INTs. Cincinnati was the only team to post more INTs than TDs allowed (36) during that two-year stretch while holding opposing QBs to the lowest combined passer rating (77.4) in the NFL.

Prior to beginning his coaching career as a grad assistant at the University of Colorado in 2000, Joseph appeared in 30 games for the Buffaloes (1990-94), playing QB, RB and on special teams, and was a member of the Buffaloes 1990 National Championship team. He served as a backup to All-American QBs Darian Hagan and Kordell Stewart and completed 34-of-61 passes for 454 yards and four TDs to go along with 50 carries for 237 yards and one TD in his college career.

He converted to CB in the NFL and signed with the Jets as an undrafted rookie free agent in 1995. As a rookie, Joseph played in 13 games and had 21 tackles (17 solo), two INTs and five passes defended. He played in four games with the Colts in 1996 before spending the preseason with Denver in 1997.



COACHING STAFF HIGHLIGHTS

- Of the 25 coaches on the Cards staff, 18 are new to the organization. The seven returning coaches are **Chris Achuff** (Defensive Line), **Steve Heiden** (Tight Ends), **Randall McCray** (Asst. Special Teams), **Buddy Morris** (Strength & Conditioning), **Jeff Rodgers** (Asst. Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator), **Vernon Stephens** (Asst. Strength & Conditioning) and **Cam Turner** (Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks).



- The Cards coaching staff entered the 2019 season with a combined 419 years of coaching experience at the college and NFL levels: 201 in the NFL; 218 in college. Of the 25 coaches on staff, 21 entered the season with NFL coaching experience.
- In addition to their experience on the sidelines, the Cardinals staff features seven coaches who played a combined 38 years in the NFL: **Kliff Kingsbury** (3), **Vance Joseph** (2), **Tom Clements** (1), **Steve Heiden** (11), **Brian Natkin** (1), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **James Saxon** (8).
- Nine members of the Arizona staff entered the year having coached at least 10 seasons in the NFL: **Jerry Sullivan** (24), **Bill Davis** (24), **Tom Clements** (20), **James Saxon** (19), **Jeff Rodgers** (15), **Vance Joseph** (14), **Sean Kugler** (12), **Marcus Robertson** (12) and **Greg Williams** (10).
- Three members of the staff - Kingsbury (Texas Tech), Joseph (Denver Broncos) and Sean Kugler (Texas-El Paso) - have previously served as a head coach either at the college or NFL level.

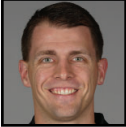

BRIAN NATKIN - Asst. Offensive Line



Joins the Cardinals in 2019 after spending the last 15 seasons at the college level ... a consensus All-American TE as a player at the University of Texas-El Paso, spent the 2018 season as run-game coordinator/O-Line coach at Hutchinson (KS) Community College ... worked the previous six seasons (2012-17) at his alma mater, UTEP.

PETER BEDOVINAC - Asst. Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "buh-DOE-vuh-nack" ... spent the last six seasons (2013-18) at the college level ... a former QB at Michigan State (2010-12), spent the 2018 season as a defensive graduate assistant at Ohio State ... spent the previous three seasons (2015-17) coaching LBs at Missouri State after beginning his coaching career at Missouri in 2013.

DAVID RAIH - Wide Receivers



Last name pronounced "RYE" ... spent the last five seasons with Green Bay as WRs coach (2018), offensive perimeter coach (2017), asst. O-Line coach (2016) and coaching administrator (2014-15) ... played QB at Iowa (1999-2003) and helped the Hawkeyes to a 2002 Big Ten Conference Championship and a berth in the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl.

CHARLIE BULLEN - Asst. Linebackers



Enters his first season with Arizona and eighth in the NFL ... spent the last seven seasons (2012-18) with Miami, including the past three seasons as the Dolphins assistant LBs coach ... prior to working with the Dolphins, coached for three seasons (2009-11) as a graduate assistant, working with defensive backs at his alma mater, the University of Iowa.

MARCUS ROBERTSON - Defensive Backs



A former NFL DB, enters his first season as Arizona's DBs coach after spending the past two seasons (2017-18) in the same role with the Broncos ... has spent the last 28 seasons in the NFL as a player, coach, and administrator and has coached DBs for the past 12 seasons with Tennessee (2007-11), Detroit (2012-13), Oakland (2014-16) and Denver.

BILL DAVIS - Linebackers



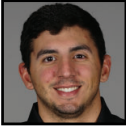

JAMES SAXON - Running Backs



Has 19 seasons of experience as a RBs coach (2000-18) in the NFL after an eight-year playing career in the league with the Chiefs (1988-91), Dolphins (1992-94) and Eagles (1995) ... came to AZ after coaching Pittsburgh's RBs the past five seasons (2014-18) ... has coached for four different franchises that had eight total postseason appearances.

ROB GROSSO - Defensive Quality Control



Begins his first season in Arizona after working as the assistant to the head coach under Vance Joseph in Denver in 2018 ... previously served as an operations intern with the Broncos in 2017 ... a former WR at John Carroll University (2011-13), worked with the Arizona Rattlers of the IFL during the 2017 season as a coaching/player personnel intern.

DON SHUMPERT - Bill Bidwill Fellowship/RBs



Comes to the Cardinals after spending last season with the NY Giants as an offensive assistant ... former WR who attended rookie mini-camp with the Chicago Bears and Kansas City Chiefs ... served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Iowa, for two seasons (2016-17), assisting the Hawkeyes WRs and special teams.

STEVE HEIDEN - Tight Ends



Veteran NFL tight end enters his seventh season with the Cardinals and first as TE's coach after working the past six seasons as asst. O-Line coach (2018) and asst. special teams/asst. TE's coach (2013-17) ... after playing in the NFL for 11 seasons (1999-2009), entered the coaching ranks in 2012 as TE's coach at Concordia University in St. Paul, MN.

JERRY SULLIVAN - Offensive Asst.



Returns to the Cardinals as an offensive assistant for his second tenure with the team after previously serving as WRs coach (2001-02) and offensive coordinator (2003) ... has 47 years of experience, including 24 seasons in the NFL with the Chargers (1992-96), Lions (1997-2000), Cardinals (2001-03), Dolphins (2004), 49ers (2005-10) and Jaguars (2012-16).

SEAN KUGLER - Offensive Line



Last name pronounced "KOOG-ler" ... a 29-year coaching veteran, has spent 12 seasons as an assistant in the NFL having previously coached with Detroit (2001-05), Buffalo (2007-09) and Pittsburgh (2010-12) in addition to last season with Denver as the Broncos O-Line/guards/centers coach ... was the head coach at his alma mater, Texas-El Paso, for five seasons (2013-17).

CAM TURNER - Offensive Asst./Asst. Quarterbacks



A former WR and QB at The Citadel, now in his second year with Arizona's coaching staff in '19 ... spent three seasons (2015-17) in Carolina, where he assisted WRs for two years before serving as the assistant QBs coach in 2017 ... prior to Carolina, spent two seasons (2013-14) as the QBs and WRs coach at Florida International.

RANDALL McCRAY - Asst. Special Teams



Enters his second year with the Cardinals in '19 ... a college assistant coach for 26 seasons, was hired by the Cardinals in 2018 ... came to Arizona after spending two years as Texas State's assistant head coach, defensive coordinator and LBs coach ... began his coaching career as a grad assistant at South Carolina in 1991.

SPENCER WHIPPLE - Offensive Quality Control



In his first NFL season after spending the past seven years at the college level ... coached the last five seasons (2014-18) at the Univ. of Massachusetts where he served as the passing game coordinator/QBs coach in '18 ... joined the UMass staff in 2014 as TE's coach before working the following three seasons (2015-17) as passing game coordinator/WRs coach.

RUSTY MCKINNEY - Defensive Asst.



In his first season with the Cardinals - and sixth in the NFL - after spending the past three seasons as a defensive quality control coach with Miami, including working under Cardinals defensive coordinator Vance Joseph in 2016 ... started in the NFL with Cleveland as a coaching intern for two seasons (2014-15) after five seasons (2009-13) at Bentley University.

GREG WILLIAMS - Cornerbacks



Came to Arizona after spending last season coaching DBs with the Broncos ... has 15 years of coaching experience, including 10 seasons in the NFL ... a former WR and DB at the University of North Carolina (1994-97), spent time in training camp with the Bears and Giants ... began his coaching career at Arizona State as an intern in 2003.

BUDDY MORRIS - Strength & Conditioning



Now in his fifth season as the Cards strength and conditioning coach ... previously with the Browns (2002-04), returned to the NFL in 2014 with the Cardinals following stints at the Univ. of Buffalo and the Univ. of Pittsburgh ... in 2009, Muscle & Fitness Magazine named his private gym (New York Sports Center) one of the 10 toughest in America.

CHRIS WILSON - Defensive Asst.



Is in his first season with the Cardinals as a defensive assistant ... came to Arizona after spending the past three seasons (2016-18) as the D-Line coach with the Eagles ... previously coached with the Cardinals as part of the NFL's minority internship program in 1997 ... son, Caleb, is a TE drafted by the Cardinals in the seventh round of the 2019 NFL Draft.

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2019 season is the 13th since **Michael Bidwill** took over as team President in 2007. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. Since it opened in 2006, the team has sold out all 137 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the venue, which has also hosted a pair of Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Bidwill's 12 years as team president. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests since Bidwill took over in 2007. The Cardinals played just seven total playoff games in their entire history prior to his tenure.

- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice during Bidwill's time as president (2008, 2015), including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- Arizona's 50 wins between 2013-17 were the most in any five-year span in franchise history.

- Oversaw the team's appearance in the groundbreaking Amazon Original series All or Nothing: A Season with the Arizona Cardinals. Produced by NFL Films, the eight-episode series was awarded the Sports Emmy for Outstanding Serialized Sports Documentary in May of 2017.

- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Arizona Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee. The committee reviews the league's Personal Conduct Policy at least annually and recommends appropriate changes with advice from outside experts.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity. In May of 2019, the Arizona Lodging and Tourism Association named Bidwill its Honoree of the Year for his efforts to unify the tourism industry by convening industry leadership throughout the state to advance economic development and increase visitation.

A GRANDFATHER'S GREAT ADVICE

With the NFL celebrating its 100th season in 2019, Cardinals President **Michael Bidwill** has talked extensively about his family's long-running involvement with the country's most popular sports league.

In an interview with AZCentral.com last month, Bidwill recalled how his grandfather **Charles Bidwill** - the Hall of Fame former owner of the Cardinals - was so confident of the NFL's future success that he advised one of his close friends to purchase a team.

"He thought it was going to be a good business," Michael Bidwill said of his grandfather. "So much so that he told his buddy **Art Rooney** (future owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers), 'You ought to get yourself one of these franchises one day. It's going to be a good business someday.' "

YEAR SEVEN AT THE HELM FOR KEIM

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. In guiding the team to an unprecedented run of success in his first five years as GM, Keim earned contract extensions in February of 2015 and February of 2018 that will keep him with the franchise through 2022.



Since his promotion in 2013, the Cardinals have posted a 52-43-2 regular season record, and Keim has developed into one of the league's most highly respected GMs.

Named the 2014 Sporting News NFL Executive of the Year in a vote of NFL coaches and team executives, Keim also earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

The teams put together by Keim during his time as GM have been some of the most successful in franchise history. In 2014 the team tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when the Cardinals won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

KEIM'S WINNING CULTURE

Since being named Arizona's GM on January 8, 2013, only seven of his NFL counterparts have won more regular season games than Keim (52).

PUTTING TOGETHER AN ACCOMPLISHED ROSTER

- The rosters Keim put together produced one of the NFL's top-10 defenses four times and one of the top-10 offenses twice. *Arizona had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.*

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

SUPER BOWL COMING BACK TO AZ

Valley Will Host 4th Super Bowl When Game Returns in 2023

The biggest event in American sports is returning to Arizona as State Farm Stadium was selected to host Super Bowl LVII that will cap the 2022 NFL season.

Super Bowl LVII will be the fourth Super Bowl played in Arizona and the third in 15 years at State Farm Stadium. The Valley last hosted Super Bowl XLIX following the 2014 season. With Super Bowl LVII being held at State Farm Stadium, Arizona will join South Florida, New Orleans, Los Angeles and Tampa Bay as the only sites selected to host the Super Bowl at least four times.

The nation's most popular sporting event and most widely-viewed television program, the Super Bowl provides an immense boost to the local economy. The last time the game was staged in Arizona it produced a record economic impact for the state. A 2015 study by the W.P. Carey School of Business at ASU determined that Super Bowl XLIX, the 2015 Pro Bowl and related events produced a gross economic impact of \$719.4 million for the region. That was the largest economic impact of any special event ever held in Arizona.

In a span of just over 26 months in 2015-17, the stadium hosted a Pro Bowl, Super Bowl, College Football National Championship Game and the NCAA Men's Final Four. It was an unprecedented stretch for a stadium that generated \$1.3 billion for the state during that span.

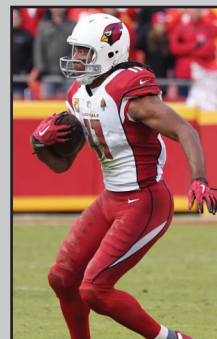

A Look at Fitzgerald's Reception Streak

—Fitzgerald has at least one catch in 234 of 235 career games played. His streak began in Week 9 of his rookie season in 2004 at Miami. That is seven weeks after Rice's 274-game streak — the longest in NFL history — ended.

—Included in his 228-game streak is an active streak of 78 consecutive games with multiple receptions. Only New England's Antonio Brown (115) and Cleveland's Jarvis Landry (80) have longer active streaks.

—Fitzgerald has at least one reception in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career. In Week 15 of 2018 against the Falcons, the Cardinals played at Mercedes-Benz Stadium for the first time, which became the 42nd different venue in which Fitzgerald has at least one catch.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 26 of the 27 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,311), receiving yards (16,392), receiving TDs (117), total TDs (117) and 100-yard receiving games (48). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.

DAVID THROUGH 50 CAREER GAMES

RB **David Johnson** played in his 50th career game in the Cardinals season-opener against the Lions last week.

He finished with 82 rushing yards on 18 attempts (4.6 avg.) and 55 receiving yards and a TD on six receptions. It marked his 25th career game with 100+ scrimmage yards (137).

Through 50 career games, Johnson has totaled 5,367 all-purpose yards (2,865 rushing; 1,904 receiving; 598 KOR) and 44 total TDs (31 rushing; 12 receiving; 1 KOR).

His 44 TDs are more than any other player in franchise history through their first 50 career games.

A PROMISING START AS A ROOKIE IN 2018

WR **Christian Kirk** - Arizona's second round selection in the 2018 NFL Draft - put up impressive numbers in his rookie campaign before a foot injury suffered in Week 13 at Green Bay ended his season.

In 12 games (7 starts), Kirk had 43 receptions for 590 yards and three TDs. He returned 21 punts for 164 yards and rushed three times for 35 yards.

GAME WINNER VS. SAN FRANCISCO: In Arizona's Week 8 victory over San Francisco, Kirk caught three passes for 42 yards - while also hauling in his second career TD reception when he caught a nine-yard game-winning TD with 34 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter.

LONGEST TD OF THE SEASON AT SAN FRANCISCO: On the Cardinals first offensive play of the game in Week 5 vs. the 49ers, Kirk hauled in a 75-yard TD pass. It was the longest offensive play of the season for Arizona and it tied for the longest TD reception by a rookie in the NFL.

CARDINALS SIGN CRABTREE

On August 21, the Cardinals signed WR **Michael Crabtree** to a one-year contract. Now in his 11th season in the NFL, Crabtree was selected 10th overall by the 49ers in 2009 and has played with San Francisco (2009-14), Oakland (2015-17) and Baltimore (2018).

Crabtree Career Highlights

- Since being selected by the 49ers in the first round (10th overall) of the 2009 NFL Draft, he has totaled 633 receptions for 7,477 yards and 54 TDs in 141 games (138 starts) during the regular season.

- In 10 career postseason games (nine starts), has 44 receptions for 587 yards and six TDs.

- Has scored at least eight TDs in four different seasons (2012, 2015-17) and his 28 receiving TDs since 2015.

- Has posted 100+ receiving yards in a game 14 times during the regular season. Also has three career 100-yard outings in the postseason.

- Of his 54 career TD receptions during the regular season, 22 have covered at least 25 yards.

- Has had multiple TD catches in a game eight times during the regular season and twice during the postseason.

- Totaled at least 85 receptions in a season three different times, including a career-high 89 catches in 2016.

WHEN JONES ARRIVED, SO DID THE SACKS

During Jones' first season in Arizona in 2016, the Cardinals led the NFL in sacks (48) for just the second time in franchise history (59 in 1983).

The following year (2017), Jones established a franchise record with 17.0 sacks and became the first player in team history to lead the NFL in the category.

In Jones' first three seasons with the Cardinals (2016-18), the team ranked in the top-5 in sacks twice (5th in 2018; 1st in 2016). The team never ranked in the top-5 in the 10 seasons prior to his arrival – and broke the top-10 just twice.

JONES GETS 40TH SACK WITH CARDINALS

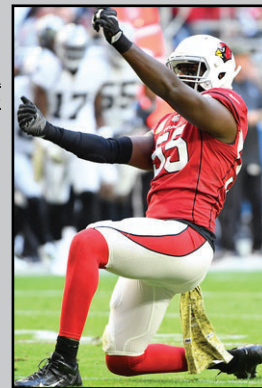

ALLEN EARNS A STARTING ROLE IN YEAR 1

DL **Zach Allen** is one of Arizona's two defensive starters selected in the 2019 NFL Draft.

Allen was drafted by the Cardinals in the third round (65th overall) out of Boston College. ProFootballFocus.com ranked Allen as the highest-rated edge defender in the ACC in 2018 and one of the top edge defenders in the 2019 NFL Draft. PFF had Allen ranked as the #6 edge defender in this year's draft.



Allen played four seasons (2015-18) at Boston College, appearing in 50 games and **totaled 199 tackles, 40.5 tackles for loss, 18.5 sacks 16 passes defended, four fumble recoveries, two INTs and two blocked kicks.**

Over his final two seasons, Allen totaled 161 tackles, 30.5 tackles for loss, 12.5 sacks, 12 passes defended, two INTs and two fumble recoveries.

Allen was named the 2014 Connecticut Gatorade Player of the Year at New Canaan High School, where he helped lead the team to state titles in 2013 and 2014. Allen set the school record for career sacks with 33.0 and also set the single-season record with 13.5 as a senior in '14.

FOUR LATE ADDITIONS ON DEFENSE

The Cardinals added four defenders to the active roster following the NFL's roster cut deadline (9/1) – three via waivers and one through free agency.

LB **Cassius Marsh** (Free Agent) is a five-year NFL veteran who played with Seattle (2014-16, '17), New England (2017) and San Francisco (2017-18) before joining Arizona. He has appeared in 69 games (five starts) and has 104 tackles (73 solo), 18 tackles for loss, 11.5 sacks, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Marsh played all 16 games (three starts) last season with the 49ers and set career highs in tackles (38) and sacks (5.5).



DL **Jonathan Bullard** (Waivers/Chicago) spent the past three seasons with the Bears after entering the league with Chicago as a third-round selection (72nd overall) in the 2016 NFL Draft out of the University of Florida. He appeared in 46 games (five starts) with Chicago and had 68 tackles (49 solo), two sacks, eight tackles for loss, one forced fumble and four passes defended. The 25-year old Bullard was an All-American as a senior at Florida in 2015.



CB **Kevin Peterson** (Waivers/L.A. Rams) played seven games (one start) with the Rams in 2017 and had 10 tackles, two INTs and six passes defended before missing last season on injured reserve. He entered the NFL as an undrafted rookie free agent with the Bears in 2016 out of Oklahoma State and spent time on the Rams active roster and practice squad during his first two years in the league. The 25-year old Peterson was a two-time first-team All-Big



S **Charles Washington** (Waivers/Detroit) spent the past three seasons with the Lions and played in 29 games, collecting 13 special teams tackles and seven tackles on defense. He entered the league with Detroit as a rookie free agent in 2016. The 26-year old played all 16 games in 2017 with Detroit and 13 games last season.



BUDDA'S EXPANDED ROLE IN 2018

S **Budda Baker** – the team's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) – earned Pro Bowl and first-team All-Pro honors as a special teamer in 2017. He also finished that season as a starter at safety.



In 2018, Baker appeared in 14 games (13 starts) and totaled 107 tackles, eight tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB pressures, four QB hits, two passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries (one returned 36 yards for his first career TD).

According to league statistics, the 195-pound Baker was one of just three NFL safeties with 100+ tackles, 2.0+ sacks and 8+ tackles for loss in 2018.

SWEARINGER RETURNS TO ROAM THE DESERT

S **D.J. Swearinger** had a breakout season with the Cardinals in 2016 and made his return to Arizona in the final week of the '18 season when the team acquired him off waivers from Washington.



Swearinger's first stint with the Cardinals was a successful run from 2015-16. After Arizona acquired him late in the 2015 season, he went on to appear in 20 games (13 starts) for the Cardinals, totaling 71 tackles, three INTs, nine passes defended 2.0 sacks, five tackles for loss, forced fumble and a fumble recovery in those contests.

He left for Washington in free agency in 2017 and in two seasons (2017-18) with the Redskins started all 31 games he appeared in, recording 132 tackles, 1.5 sacks, eight INTs, 20 passes defended, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

Since 2016 – covering his time in Arizona and Washington – Swearinger has 11 INTs. Among active NFL safeties, only Tennessee's Kevin Byard (13) has more INTs during that span (2016-19). Swearinger is one of just four NFL defenders (S Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, CB Marcus Peters and S Damarious Randall) who registered at least three INTs in each of the last three seasons.

SUN DEVIL RETURNS A CARDINAL

Arizona State product and 2016 Lou Groza Award winner **Zane Gonzalez** signed to the Cardinals practice squad on November 20th last year and was promoted to the active roster the following Monday (11/26) after Phil Dawson (hip) was placed on IR.

Playing in his first game for the Cardinals in Week 13 at Green Bay, Gonzalez connected on both FG attempts and both PATs in the win over the Packers. Gonzalez kicked the game-winning 44-yard FG with just 1:41 remaining in the fourth quarter.

Gonzalez entered the NFL with Cleveland in 2017, and the Browns were 0-17-1 in Gonzalez's tenure with the team. He earned the first victory of his career by kicking Arizona's game-winning FG against the Packers last year.

A STRONG FINISH TO 2018

Gonzalez played in the final five games for the Cardinals in 2018, connecting on seven-of-nine FG attempts and five-of-six PATs.

He finished the season with perhaps the best performance of his young career in the Cardinals season finale at Seattle. Gonzalez made all three FG attempts in the game, including kicks of 36, 50 and 55 yards.

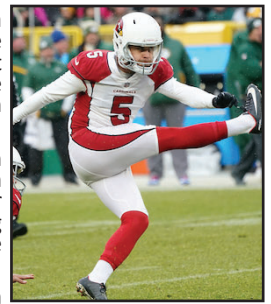
He became the first Cardinals kicker to connect on multiple FGs of 50+ yards in a game since Neil Rackers (54 and 50 yards) on 9/25/05 at Seattle.

GONZALEZ CONTINUES TO SHINE IN 2019

Gonzalez had a perfect outing in the Cardinals season-opener against the Lions last week, connecting on all four FG attempts (20, 42, 34 and 28 yards) and his lone PAT.

Since joining the Cardinals midway through the 2018 season, Gonzalez has connected on 11-of-13 FG attempts, including each of the last seven, and he's a perfect 9-of-9 inside 50 yards with the Cardinals.

Gonzalez's four FGs against the Lions last Sunday set a new career single-game high, and dating back to the 2018 finale and through the 2019 pre-season, Gonzalez has hit 13 consecutive FG attempts.

A trio of second-year players have made significant contributions on special teams after joining the Cardinals as undrafted rookie free agents in 2018.

Turner led the NFL with 13 solo special teams tackles last season. He finished second in the NFL with 15 total special teams tackles, and he added three more in Week 1 against the Lions this season.



Turner, who appeared in all 16 games in 2018 (1 start) was named Special Teams Player of the Month (September) by ProFootballFocus.com.

LB Dennis Gardeck (Rookie Free Agent)

Gardeck appeared in all 16 games and led all NFL rookies with 388 special teams snaps in 2018. Among all NFL players last season, only Jets WR Terrence Brooks (395) played more snaps on special teams than Gardeck.

In the 2018 season finale at Seattle, Gardeck posted a deflected punt, a blocked punt recovery for a TD and a special teams tackle. Late in the third quarter, with Arizona trailing 21-13, Gardeck recovered a blocked punt in the Seahawks endzone for his first career TD. It was the Cardinals first blocked punt returned for a TD since 10/12/08 vs. Dallas. For Gardeck, it was his first TD since his senior year at Crystal Lake (IL) South High School in 2012 (80-yard fumble return).

In the fourth quarter of the 2019 season-opener against Detroit last week, Gardeck deflected another punt, which gave the Cardinals possession at midfield and resulted in a TD drive that pushed the game into overtime.

In Week 1 against the Lions, Sherfield recorded an open-field tackle for minus-three yards on punt coverage and recovered a muffed punt at the Lions eight-yard line that led to the Cardinals first points of the season (Zane Gonzalez FG).

Sherfield on playing gunner on punt coverage: "I take pride in playing that position. I love it, being able to go down there and make plays, set the opposing team back in field position and help the defense out."
