THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

Playing their fourth road game of the season, and third in three weeks following back-to-back East Coast games, the Cardinals travel to Dallas for a Monday Night Football showdown with the Cowboys.

Former NFC East rivals, the Cardinals and Cowboys have faced each other 88 times during the regular season. Arizona has won four of the last five - and six of the last 10 - meetings. Dallas snapped the Cardinals four-game winning streak in the series with a Week 3 victory on Monday Night Football in 2017 - which was the last matchup between the two teams.

Five of the last six games between the Cardinals and Cowboys took place in Arizona and this week the Cardinals make just their second-ever regular season visit to AT&T Stadium. Arizona earned a 28-17 victory at Dallas in 2014.

This week's game also marks the 12th primetime matchup between the Cardinals and Cowboys. They have faced each other seven times on MNF (Dallas holds a 4-3 edge in those contests) and four times on Sunday Night Football (teams split those games 2-2).

The Cardinals hosted the last nine primetime contests against the Cowboys and Monday night's game marks the first time Dallas has hosted the Cardinals in primetime since 1977.

Significantly more experienced at AT&T Stadium than their current team, Cardinals head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** and QB **Kyler Murray** make their NFL debuts at the venue on Monday Night Football. Kingsbury coached six games at AT&T Stadium during his time as HC at Texas Tech. Dating back to his sophomore year at Allen (TX) High School in 2012, Murray has played seven games and made six starts at AT&T Stadium. He started five games there during his prep career and started one of two games played at the venue in college. This week's game will serve as the MNF debut for both Kingsbury and Murray. WR **Christian Kirk** is also familiar with AT&T Stadium, having played there three times while at Texas A&M. In those three games - all vs. Arkansas - Kirk had 520 yards (receiving and KOR) and six TDs, including an 81-yard TD reception and 100-yard KOR TD.

Not new to the spotlight game are WRs **Larry Fitzgerald** and **DeAndre Hopkins**. Each player has played on Monday Night Football nine times. Hopkins has 700 receiving yards, four TD catches and three 100-yard performances playing on MNF. In his last appearance playing on Monday Night - in Week 3 of the 2017 season vs. Dallas - Fitzgerald finished with 13 receptions for 149 yards and a TD.

Following this week's game against the Cowboys, the Cardinals return home to host the undefeated division rival Seahawks. Playing on a short week, Arizona will face a Seattle team coming off the bye in Week 6. Dallas follows up this week's game with a visit to Washington in Week 7.

#AZvsDAL - WEEK 6 HIGHLIGHTS

- In their third consecutive road game, the Cardinals travel to Dallas in Week 6 for a Monday Night matchup against the Cowboys. It will be the 89th all-time regular season meeting between the two teams. Arizona enters the game having won four of the last five vs. Dallas.
- QB **Kyler Murray** is the first QB in the Super Bowl era with at least 8 passing TDs and 5 rushing TDs in the first five games of a season. Murray has completed 128-of-181 pass attempts for 1,299 yards and 8 TDs, while also rushing for 296 yards and 5 TDs on 41 carries in 2020.
- A native of Allen, TX, Murray had a legendary high school career which saw him post a perfect 43-0 record and win three consecutive state titles for the national powerhouse Allen Eagles. All three of the state title games were played at AT&T Stadium.
- WR **DeAndre Hopkins** leads the NFL in receptions (45), receiving yards (528) and first down receptions (29) in 2020.
- In two career appearances on Monday Night Football (both in 2017 w/Miami), RB **Kenyan Drake** totaled 285 yards (196 rushing, 89 receiving), including a 66-yard TD run vs. Carolina in Week 10.
- Appearing on defense for the first time in his career last week, third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** posted 2.0 sacks in just 10 total defensive snaps vs. the Jets. A special teams captain and 2019 Pro Bowl alternate, Gardeck signed with Arizona as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018.
- RB **Chase Edmonds** scored his third TD of the season - and 10th career TD - on a 29-yard run in the first quarter last week. Edmonds now leads the NFL with five TD runs of 20+ yards over the last two seasons (2019-20). That is one more than Carolina RB Christian McCaffrey, who ranks second with 4.

Cardinals Assistant Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator **Jeff Rodgers** attended Westlake (Austin, TX) High School where he was Drew Brees' center before going on to play LB at North Texas from 1996-99.

Cardinals O-Line coach **Sean Kugler** played at the University of Texas-El Paso and later served as an assistant (1993-2000) and head coach (2013-17) for the program.

Cardinals Asst. O-Line coach **Brian Natkin** is a San Antonio, TX native and was a consensus All-American selection at TE for the University of Texas-El Paso before two stints on the school's coaching staff (2004-05, '12-17).

Cardinals WRs coach **David Raih** served as Director of High School Relations/Outside WRs coach under Cardinals Head Coach **Kliff Kingsbury** at Texas Tech in 2013.

Cardinals Offensive Assistant **Jerry Sullivan** coached WRs at Texas Tech from 1973-75.

Cardinals Assistant to the Head Coach **Kenny Bell** is a Houston, TX native and has worked with Cardinals Head Coach **Kliff Kingsbury** at Houston (2008-11), Texas A&M (2012) and Texas Tech (2013-18).

Cardinals media relations coordinator **Imani Suber** is a native of Dallas and attended TCU, where she was a member of the school's Sports Information Dpt.

Cowboys DE **Everson Griffen** is an Avondale, AZ native and attended Agua Fria High School.

Cowboys Asst. Special Teams coach **Matt Daniels** is a native of Tucson, AZ.

Cowboys RBs coach **Skip Peete** is a Phoenix, AZ native, attended Sahuaro (Tucson) High School and played WR at the University of Arizona.

College/Pro Connections

Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** (2017-18) played with Cowboys WR **Ceedee Lamb** (2017-19) and DT **Neville Gallimore** (2016-19) at Oklahoma. The Sooners were 2018 Big 12 Champions and finished the season ranked No. 4. With Murray in 2018, Lamb posted 1,158 yards and 11 TDs on 65 catches.

Cowboys Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** was the Saints Offensive Coordinator while Cardinals Head Coach **Kliff Kingsbury** played QB for the team in 2004.

Cowboys Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** held the same post in Green Bay (2006-18) while Cardinals Pass Coordinator/QBs coach **Tom Clements** (2006-16), WRs coach **David Raih** (2014-18), Cowboys Asst. O-Line coach **Jeff Blasko** (2016-18), LBs coach **Scott McCurley** (2006-19) and O-Line coach **Joe Philbin** (2003-11, '18) were on the coaching staff.

Cardinals WR **Christian Kirk** (2015-17) and Cowboys S **Donovan Wilson** (2014-18) played together at Texas A&M.

Cowboys WR **Amari Cooper** (2012-14) and Cardinals RB **Kenyan Drake** (2012-15) played together at Alabama. They were part of the Crimson Tide team that won the BCS National Championship following the 2012 season.

Cardinals QB **Brett Hundley** (2015-17) and Cowboys Coaching Assistant **Scott Tolzien** (2013-15) played together for the Packers under Cowboys Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**.

Cardinals DL **Jordan Phillips** (2012-14) and Cowboys TE **Blake Bell** (2011-14) played together at Oklahoma.

Cowboys CB **Trevon Diggs** (2016-19), CB **Saivion Smith** (2018) and Cardinals S **Deionte Thompson** (2015-18) played together at Alabama. Diggs and Thompson won a BCS National Championship following the 2017 season.

Cardinals CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** (2012-19) played alongside Cowboys QB **Andy Dalton** (2011-19) in Cincinnati.

Cardinals DE **Jordan Phillips** (2015-18) and RB **Kenyan Drake** (2016-19) played with Cowboys LB **Justin March** (2017) in Miami.

Cardinals DL **Angelo Blackson** (2015-16) played with Cowboys DT **Antwaun Woods** (2016) and C **Joe Looney** (2015) in Tennessee.

A TEXAS HIGH SCHOOL LEGEND

Even in a place where high school football is legendary, **Kyler Murray's** accomplishments at Allen (TX) High School - a national powerhouse - made him one of the most accomplished high school players in the state's storied history.

The state that produced future NFL QBs Drew Brees, Patrick Mahomes, Andrew Luck, Vince Young, Matthew Stafford and Baker Mayfield - to name a few - had never seen the types of numbers Murray put up at Allen High.

The majority of Murray's remarkable prep career took place just 47 miles northeast of AT&T Stadium - at Eagle Stadium.

In three seasons (2012-14) as a starting QB at Allen HS, Murray:

- Won 3 consecutive state titles
- Posted a perfect 43-0 record
- Totalled 14,515 yards (10,386 passing; 4,129 rushing)
- Scored 186 TDs (117 passing; 69 rushing)

As a senior in 2014, Murray earned National Player of the Year honors from Gatorade, Parade and USA Today.

MURRAY'S HISTORY AT AT&T STADIUM

Although he is facing Dallas for the first time, Murray has played seven games at AT&T Stadium dating back to his sophomore year of high school in 2012. He was 7-0 in those games, including 6-0 as a starter.

While at Allen High, Murray played five playoff games - including all three state championship games - at AT&T Stadium.

KINGSBURY'S DEEP TEXAS ROOTS

A native of New Braunfels, TX, Cards head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** will be coaching his first NFL game in his home state on Monday Night Football.

This will mark Kingsbury's seventh game as a head coach at AT&T Stadium. His Texas Tech teams played Baylor at the venue six times.

Kingsbury grew up and played high school football under his father, **Tim**, at New Braunfels (TX) High School. As a senior in 1997, he threw for over 3,000 yards and 34 TDs to lead the Unicorns to the Class 5A Division II state semifinals. He was inducted into the Texas High School Football Hall of Fame in 2018.

Kingsbury then went on to a prolific career as a QB at Texas Tech (1999-2002), where he threw for more than 12,000 and 95 TDs while setting 39 school and 17 NCAA records during his collegiate career. Kingsbury recorded more than 12,000 passing yards and total offense, including over 1,000 completions, making him just the third player in NCAA history to accomplish all three feats.

As a senior in 2002, he was awarded the Sammy Baugh Trophy as the nation's top college QB and was also named the Associated Press Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year while finishing ninth in Heisman Trophy voting.

Following his playing days, Kingsbury embarked on a coaching career that - until he was hired by Arizona in 2019 - had taken place entirely in his home state of Texas. He started at the University of Houston (2008-11), before moving on to Texas A&M (2012) and then back to his alma mater, Texas Tech, where he served as head coach from 2013-18.



CARDS-COWBOYS ON MONDAY NIGHT

The Cardinals face the Cowboys on Monday Night Football this week in the first of two primetime appearances for Arizona in 2020 (Week 11 at Seattle on Thursday Night Football).

Arizona is making its 27th appearance on Monday Night Football dating back to 1970 and its 14th appearance dating back to 1988. This week's game marks the 11th time in 15 seasons the Cards have played on MNF.

This week's game is Arizona's first MNF appearance since facing Dallas in Week 3 of the 2017 season at State Farm Stadium.

CARDINALS AND COWBOYS IN PRIMETIME

This week's game also marks the 12th ever primetime matchup between Arizona and Dallas, and the first since the teams faced off on Monday Night Football in 2017.

The Cardinals and Cowboys have faced each other seven times on MNF (Dallas holds a 4-3 edge in those contests) and four times on Sunday Night Football (teams split those games 2-2).

Monday's game marks just the second primetime matchup between the two teams in the last 20 years (2001-20).

The Cardinals hosted the last nine primetime contests against the Cowboys and Monday Night's game marks the first time Arizona will be on the road in this primetime series since 1977.

CARDINALS VS. COWBOYS - THE SERIES

Former NFC East foes, the Cardinals and Cowboys have faced each other 88 times during the regular season with the Cowboys holding a 56-31-1 advantage in the all-time regular season series. Arizona won the only playoff game in this series (1998 Wild Card).

Despite Dallas' lead in the series, the Cardinals have won four of the last five - and six of the last 10 - meetings.

Five of the last six games between the Cardinals and Cowboys took place in Arizona and this week the Cardinals make just their second-ever visit to AT&T Stadium. Arizona earned a 28-17 victory at Dallas in 2014.

The series dates back to 1960 and from 1970 to 2001, the two teams met twice annually as members of the NFC East. Since realignment in 2002, the two teams have met nine times. In those nine meetings, the Cardinals hold a 5-4 advantage.

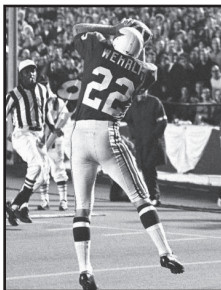

50TH ANNIVERSARY OF MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

The 2020 season marks the 50th anniversary of Monday Night Football, which began in 1970 on ABC with Howard Cosell, Keith Jackson and Don Meredith calling the action.

Then NFC East foes, the Cardinals and Cowboys squared off in the debut season of MNF when they met on 11/16/70 in front of 69,323 fans at the Cotton Bowl. In was the ninth MNF broadcast of the season and the first-ever MNF appearance for both the Cardinals and Cowboys.

The Cardinals dominated the game, earning a 38-0 victory in the first-ever shutout on MNF. RB **Johnny Roland** provided three of the Cardinals five TDs, including a 74-yard punt return for a score. The Cardinals defense forced six turnovers in the contest, including four INTs of Cowboys QBs Craig Morton (3) and Roger Staubach (1). Two of those INTs were recorded by Cardinals Hall of Fame CB **Roger Wehrli**.

WR DEANDRE HOPKINS

In nine career appearances on Monday Night Football, Hopkins has 50 receptions for 700 yards and four TDs. His most recent appearance - playing the Saints in 2019 with Houston - was also his most productive. He finished with eight receptions for 111 yards and two TDs.

Fitzgerald had one of the most productive games of his career when the Cardinals last faced the Cowboys on Monday Night Football. On 9/25/17 vs. Dallas, Fitzgerald posted 13 receptions for 149 yards and a TD. His 13 catches are the most for any Cardinals player in 27 all-time appearances on MNF.

CB DRE KIRKPATRICK

In seven career games on MNF, Kirkpatrick has 32 tackles, 3 INTs (1 returned for a TD) and eight passes defended.

While playing for Cincinnati, Kirkpatrick scored his second career TD when he picked off a Peyton Manning pass late in the fourth quarter and returned it 30 yards for a TD to seal the Bengals 37-28 win over Denver on 12/22/14.

A TIGHT RACE IN THE NFC WEST

The Cardinals remain in the thick of a tough race in the NFL's winningest division in 2020. Arizona's 30-10 victory over the Jets last week improved its record to 3-2 this season.

OFFENSE HAS ANOTHER BIG OUTING IN WEEK 5

The Cardinals finished last Sunday's win over the Jets with a season-high 496 total net yards (369 passing, 127 rushing) and 28 first downs.

It marked the seventh time Arizona reached 400+ total yards in 21 games under head coach Kliff Kingsbury. Arizona reached 400+ yards just once in 32 games over the two seasons combined (2017-18) prior to his arrival.

Through five games, the Cardinals have piled up 1,977 total net yards on offense (1,272 passing; 705 rushing). *Arizona's 1,977 total yards represent the fifth-highest total in franchise history through the first five games of a season -- and the most since the team had 2,058 total yards in 1988.*

GOING FOR 21+ UNDER KINGSBURY

The Cardinals have scored 21+ points in 15 of 21 games under Kingsbury. Arizona scored 21+ points in an NFL-low 9 games in the two seasons prior to his arrival (2017-18).

DEFENSE HOLDS JETS TO 10 POINTS

The Cardinals defense allowed season-lows in points (10), total yards (285), passing yards (162), yards per play (4.5) and average yards per pass play (4.5) last week against the Jets.

The 10 points allowed are the fewest for the Cardinals under defensive coordinator **Vance Joseph**. *It also marked the fourth time in the last seven games Arizona's defense has allowed 20 points or fewer.*

With the win last Sunday, the Cardinals improved to 3-0 this season when holding an opponent to 20 points or fewer.

KEEPING THE OPPONENT OUT OF THE ENDZONE

The Cardinals also held the Jets to just one TD on three red zone possessions and kept them out of the end zone in their only goal-to-goal possession.

That performance kept with a trend for the Cardinals defense in 2020. Arizona has allowed opponents to score a TD on just nine of 21 red zone possessions this season. *Only Chicago (36.8%) has a better opponent red zone TD percentage than Arizona (42.9) in 2020.*

When opponents get really close is when the Cardinals defense clamps down best. *In goal-to-goal situations, Arizona has allowed TDs on just four of 10 possessions. The Cardinals 40.0% opponent goal-to-goal percentage leads the NFL in 2020.*

TWO MORE GET FIRST SACK OF 2020 IN NEW YORK

With LB **Dennis Gardeck** (2.0) and S **Budda Baker** recording their first sack of the season last Sunday in New York, the Cardinals now have had nine different players post at least 1.0 sack in 2020.

Baltimore (11) is the only team who has more players with at least 1.0 sack.



TRADING THE DEEP FRYER FOR A GAME BALL

The only game ball given out following last week's victory over the Jets went to third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** - adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL playing field.

Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck - a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 - finished last week's game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps.

His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017.

It was a big performance for the Lake of the Hills, IL native but it wasn't the first success he has experienced in the NFL.

A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 35 career games, he has 24 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and also scored a TD on a blocked punt. In 2018, he led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams.

A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

Following last week's game, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** spoke of how happy he was to see Gardeck's hard work paying off. "I rehabbed and trained with Dennis this offseason before I came here and I saw the work that he put in. I got to see the work he put in behind the scenes and for him to go in do what he did today, I knew he was going to give his all and it resulted in two sacks. That is what you look for in a guy like that. It gives the team motivation."



HOPKINS' RECORD-SETTING START

After catching six passes for 131 yards and a TD in last Sunday's win over the Jets, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** continues his record-breaking debut season with the Cardinals.

Through five games, Hopkins has 45 receptions for 528 yards and two TDs. **He leads the NFL in receptions, receiving yards and first down receptions in 2020.**

ONE OF NFL'S TOP RUN GAMES

- Set franchise rookie records for wins by a QB (5), passing yards (3,722), TD passes (20), completions (349), attempts (542), and games with multiple TD passes (8).

- In franchise history, only Kurt Warner (3x) had a better completion percentage in a season than Murray had in 2019 (64.39).

- Became the first rookie QB in team history to start all 16 games in a season and was only rookie QB to start all 16 games in 2019 (NFL's first since 2016).

- His 544 rushing yards in 2019 were the most by a QB in franchise history, surpassing the previous record of 501 (Hall of Famer Charley Trippi in 1951).

- First QB in team history to throw for 3,000+ yards and run for 500+ yards in a season.

- One of three rookies in NFL history with at least five 300-yard passing performances: Andrew Luck (6 in 2012) and Daniel Jones (5 in 2019).

- Between Weeks 4-10 last season, set an NFL rookie record with 211 consecutive pass attempts without an INT.

- First player in NFL history with 20+ completions in each of his first six games.

- Joined Cam Newton (2011) as the only QBs in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in each of their first two career games.

- Became the first Cardinals rookie QB to start a season opener since Lamar McHan in 1954.

- Selected #1 overall by the Cardinals in the 2019 NFL Draft. Fifth play-

BRINGING HOME ROOKIE OF THE YEAR HONORS

In February, **Murray** was named the Associated Press 2019 NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. He became the third player in team history to be selected as the NFL's Offensive Rookie of the Year: RB Ottis Anderson (1979) and WR Anquan Boldin (2003).

RARE NUMBERS IN YEAR ONE

With 3,722 passing yards and 544 rushing yards in 2019, **Murray became just the sixth different QB in NFL history with 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in a season. Murray and Carolina's Cam Newton (2011) are the only rookie QBs in NFL history to accomplish the feat.**

NOTHING LIKE NUMBERS MURRAY IS PUTTING UP

Through five games in 2020, **Murray** has completed 128-of-181 pass attempts for 1,299 yards and 8 TDs, while also rushing for 296 yards and five TDs on 41 carries.

He is the first QB in the Super Bowl era with at least 8 passing TDs and 5 rushing TDs in the first five games of a season.

RARE NUMBERS THRU 21 CAREER GAMES

In 21 NFL starts, Murray has completed 475-of-723 pass attempts (65.7%) for 5,021 yards and 28 TDs while rushing for 840 yards and nine TDs on 134 carries (6.3 avg.).

That kind of combined production is rare in NFL history. **Murray joins Cam Newton (5,205 passing yards; 915 rushing yards) as the only players in NFL history with 5,000+ passing yards and 800+ rushing yards in their first 21 career starts.**

He now needs just five more to pass Jake Plummer (32) for the most in franchise history by a player in his first two seasons.

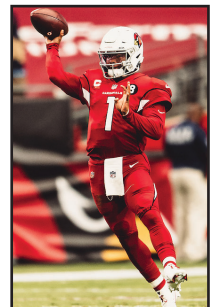

A CAREER HIGH IN NEW YORK

In last Sunday's win over the Jets, Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also rushed for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries.

Murray's 380 passing yards represent the highest total for a Cardinals QB since Carson Palmer threw for 421 yards on 10/18/15 at Pittsburgh. It was the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville on 11/17/13.

Murray now has six career 300-yard outings. No other QB in franchise history had more than four games with 300+ passing yards in their first two NFL seasons.

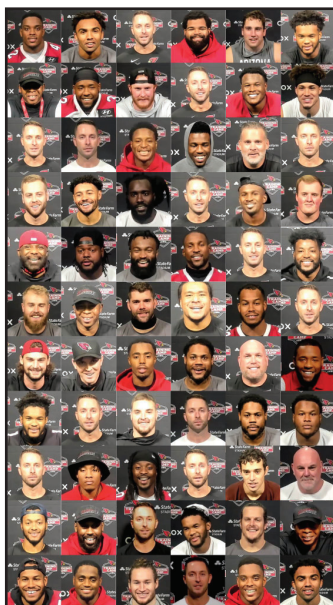
Over the next 142 days, Arizona held over 50 press conferences with players and staff before Kennard returned to speak with media over Zoom on the first day of training camp.

2020 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

TAKING DOWN THE NFC CHAMPS IN WEEK 1

The Cardinals defeated the defending NFC Champion San Francisco 49ers 24-20 in the season-opener at Levi's Stadium. With the victory, Arizona earned its first Week 1 win since 2015 and first Week 1 road victory since 2010.



With the victory, Arizona improved to 5-2 at Levi's Stadium. The Cardinals also improved to 9-2 in their last 11 games vs. the 49ers.

COMING FROM BEHIND FOR THE WIN

• The Cardinals (who trailed 13-10 entering the 4th quarter) were one of seven teams to come back to win after trailing in the fourth quarter on Kickoff Weekend (Chicago, Jacksonville, Las Vegas, the L.A. Chargers, Tennessee and Washington). That is the most 4th-quarter comeback victories on Kickoff Weekend since 2016 (nine teams).

• **Arizona trailed 10-0 early and entered the 4th quarter trailing 13-10 but went on to earn the comeback victory. In 2019, the Cardinals were 0-7-1 in games they trailed entering the fourth quarter.** Prior to the win over the Niners, the last time the Cardinals won a game in which they trailed entering the fourth quarter was on 10/28/18 vs. San Francisco (trailed 12-3 entering the fourth and won 18-15).

CARDINALS EARN ANOTHER WIN IN NEW YORK

The Cardinals defeated the NY Jets 30-10 last week. **In doing so, Arizona earned its second-ever road win against the Jets and the first since 1975.**

With the win, the Cardinals improved to 3-1 all-time at MetLife Stadium and have won three in a row at the venue. Arizona will return to MetLife in Week 14 later this season to face the Giants. Should the Cardinals win that game, it will mark just the second time in franchise history the team beat both the Jets and Giants on the road in the same season (1975).

LONG SUNDAY DRIVES

The Cardinals have nine scoring drives of 10+ plays this season (14, 12, 11, 11, 10, 10, 10, 10 and 10). Arizona has has 10 scoring drives of 75 yards (96, 94, 89, 80, 75, 75, 75, 75, 75 and 75).

AN INTERIOR PUSH

Arizona's defensive line has the nearly the same number of sacks through five games in 2020 (6.0) as it had all of last season (7.0).

Benjamin (222nd overall) was **selected in nearly the same spot as the last ASU player drafted before him: 5 Pat Tillman (7th round, 226th overall) in 1998.**

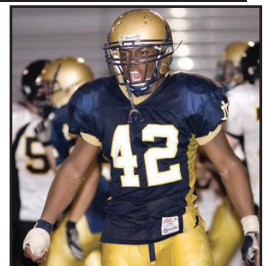

A LOCAL KID RETURNS TO AZ, FOLLOWS IN FATHER'S CARDINALS FOOTSTEPS

One of the Cardinals top signings of the 2020 free agency period was LB **Devon Kennard**. He is the son of former Cardinals offensive lineman Derek Kennard Sr., who also played for the Los Angeles Express of the USFL in addition to the Saints and Cowboys.



Following his playing career, Derek returned to Arizona to raise his family. Devon grew up in Phoenix and starred at Desert Vista High School before attending USC.

When Devon took the field in Week 1 at San Francisco, the Kennards became the third father-son duo to play for the Cardinals, joining the Butlers (Kevin and Drew) and the Metcalfs (Terry and Eric).

ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill's leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB Carson Palmer from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Throughout the offseason, numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of coming together to make meaningful change a reality in the United States.

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another and you know, we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."

OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

15TH SEASON AT STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals opened the 15th season at State Farm Stadium with a 30-15 victory over Washington in Week 2.

With the win over Washington, Arizona improved to 10-5 in home openers at State Farm Stadium.

Opened in 2006, State Farm Stadium has proved a catalyst for the Cardinals success in the last decade-plus.

The Cardinals have posted a winning record at home in eight of 14 full seasons at State Farm Stadium, earning four playoff berths and three NFC West titles during that time. The Cardinals finished .500 or better just twice and made the playoffs only one time in 18 seasons prior.

In five seasons between 2013-17, the Cardinals posted a winning record each season, which represents the longest such streak in franchise history. Between 2007-17 Arizona posted a record of .500 or better in 11 consecutive seasons.

14 SEASONS AND 144 SELLOUTS

Arizona sold out every game (preseason and postseason included) in the first 14 seasons at the venue. There were only 12 games that sold out in time to be televised locally in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium.

BIRD GANG BRINGS THE NOISE - ONE OF THE NFL'S LOUDEST VENUES

Dating back to the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006, Cards opponents have accumulated 182 accepted false start penalties in the regular season. That is the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

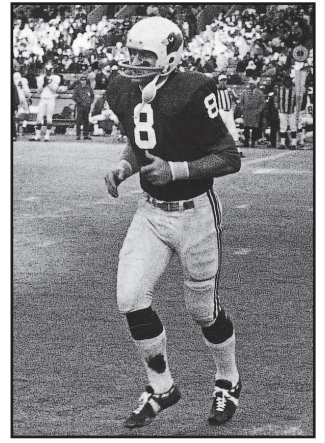


THE PASSING OF A LEGEND

On September 17th, Hall of Fame safety **Larry Wilson** passed away at the age of 82.

A legendary figure in NFL history, Wilson spent more than 43 years with the Cardinals organization. Some of those highlights:

- A seventh-round selection in the 1960 Draft out of Utah, he played 13 seasons for the Cardinals
- Earned 8 Pro Bowl selections and was named 1st-team All-Pro 5 times
- Was named to both the NFL's 75th and 100th Anniversary teams
- Enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1978
- Held a variety of roles in the Cardinals front office from 1973-2002 including VP & General Manager from 1988-93



- Inducted into the Cardinals Ring of Honor at State Farm Stadium in 2006, his #8 jersey was retired at the end of his playing career - and is one just five retired jersey numbers in franchise history

Wilson played in 169 games and his toughness and versatility as a player have come to define the safety position. During his career, he is credited with originating the safety blitz, a tactic that was originally named "Wildcat" after Wilson's nickname.

To celebrate the NFL's 100th season last year, Wilson was one of six safeties (Jack Christiansen, Ken Houston, Ronnie Lott, Emlen Tunnell, Ed Reed) selected to the NFL 100 All-Time team after previously being named to the All-NFL team in 1994 to commemorate the league's 75th anniversary.

His 52 INTs are a Cardinals franchise record as are his 800 career INT return yards. Wilson led the NFL with 10 INTs in 1966, a year in which he established a franchise record with INTs in seven straight games, which also is tied for the second-longest streak in NFL history.

Regarded as one of the toughest players in NFL history, Wilson once intercepted a pass in a 1965 game against the Steelers with casts on both hands to protect broken fingers. He returned the INT 35 yards for a TD, giving the Cardinals a 21-17 victory.

Following his playing days, Wilson embarked on a 30-year career as a team executive with the Cardinals. He worked as the team's director of pro scouting (1973-76), director of pro personnel (1977-78) and also served as interim head coach for the final three games of the 1979 season, earning victories over the San Francisco 49ers and New York Giants.

Wilson was appointed to Vice President and General Manager with the team during the Cardinals inaugural season in Arizona in 1988, a position he served through 1993. Wilson continued his role as the team's Vice President until his retirement in 2003.

Larry Wilson was born on March 24, 1938 in Rigby, ID. He is survived by Nancy, his wife of 40 years, as well as daughter Christie, son Larry, Jr. and numerous grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

REMEMBERING LARRY IN THEIR OWN WORDS

Nancy Wilson (Larry's wife of 40 years)

"Larry Wilson was the kindest, most humble person that I will ever know. To most, he was this ferocious and fierce football player who some described as pound for pound the toughest player of his generation. To me, he was the most generous and gentle soul you would ever meet. For Larry, it was always about everyone else and what he could do for them. And especially in the times we live, that's something that that we could use more of today."

Michael Bidwill (Cardinals Owner)

"Besides my father, Larry Wilson was the most influential male figure in my life. He was someone who truly lived his faith and demonstrated it daily in the kindness he showed every single person he met. Any of us lucky enough to be in his orbit - whether that was for a few minutes or four decades - was always better off from the experience. I will remember Larry Wilson first as a fantastic person but then obviously as one of the greatest players the National Football League has ever seen. It's fitting that his passing coincides with the league's 100th birthday because his toughness and the way he revolutionized his position make him one of our game's most unforgettable figures. Whether on the field playing with casts on both hands or brightening the lives of every person he knew, Larry's selflessness defined who he was and how we will all remember him."

Roger Goodell (NFL Commissioner)

"For more than 40 years, Larry Wilson played a remarkable role in the history of the Cardinals and National Football League as a Hall of Fame player and team executive. While he will be recognized for his toughness and excellence on the field and his many contributions to the Cardinals organization, we will also remember Larry as loyal, humble and kind to everyone he met. Larry enriched the lives of many players and colleagues around the league."

Larry helped revolutionize the safety position in his 13 years as the versatile anchor of the Cardinals' defense. His toughness and football instincts earned him recognition as one of the greatest to ever play the game."



FITZ TIES STADIUM RECEPTIONS RECORD

The Week 3 matchup vs. Detroit was WR **Larry Fitzgerald's** 112th career game at State Farm Stadium. He has now appeared in 112 of 114 regular season games played at the venue since it opened in 2006.

With eight receptions in the first two home games this season, the 11-time Pro Bowler now has 646 career receptions at State Farm Stadium.

That ties Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (646 at Candlestick Park) for the most receptions in NFL history at a single stadium.

LARRY FITZGERALD - AT A GLANCE

- An 11-time Pro Bowl selection, ranks second in NFL history in receptions (1,396) and receiving yards (17,206) and sixth in league annals with 120 TD receptions.

- Named a team captain in 2020, marking the 10th time in his career he has earned the honor.

- Selected by the Cardinals 3rd overall in the 2004 NFL Draft, is in his 17th season in Arizona in 2020. In team history, only QB Jim Hart (18) played more seasons with the team.

- Has played more games with the Cardinals (255) than any other WR in NFL history has played with a single team.

- Has an active streak of 89 consecutive starts, the longest active streak among NFL WRs.

- Named a co-winner (along with QB Eli Manning) of the 2016 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

- At #69 on the NFL Networks Top-100 Players of 2020, has now made the All-100 Team in all 10 years of its existence. He is the only non-QB to accomplish that feat.

- The 2019 season marked the 13th time in 16 seasons he led the Cards in receiving yards. In NFL history, only Jerry Rice (15 times) led his team in receiving yards more times.

- Has caught at least one pass in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career and has at least one TD reception in 27 different stadiums.

- In February of 2018, joined PGA pro Kevin Streelman in winning the Pebble Beach Pro-Am golf tournament. Became the first African-American amateur to win the event – which dates back to 1937 – and the first professional athlete to win the title since Dan Marino in 1988.

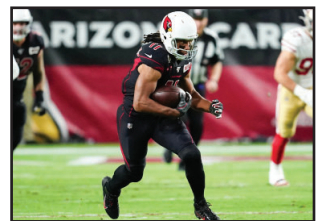
ACTIVE STARTS STREAK LEADS ALL WRS

Fitzgerald - who ranks second on the NFL's all-time receiving yardage list behind Jerry Rice (22,895) - has 17,206 receiving yards for his career, which converts to over 9.7 miles.

No other player in NFL history is within 1,000 yards of Fitzgerald or Rice on the all-time receiving yardage list. Fitzgerald has over 4,000 more receiving yards than any other active player. Raiders TE Jason Witten - who ranks second among active players - has 13,006 career receiving yards.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,396), receiving yards (17,206), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.

- With a then franchise-record 103 receptions during the 2005 season, he became the youngest player in NFL history to record a 100-catch campaign when he reached the mark at 22 years, 123 days old.
- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record 15,000+ receiving yards and 100+ TD receptions in their career.

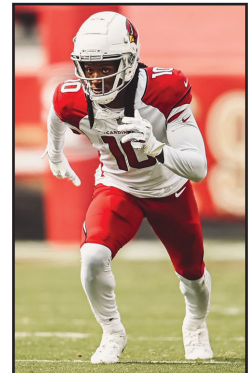

After rushing for his second TD of the season last week against the Jets, Drake now has more rushing TDs in 13 games with Arizona (10) as he had in 54 games with Miami (9).

FOUR STRAIGHT WITH A RUSHING TD

Drake scored the game-winning TD against the 49ers in Week 1 on a one-yard run with just over five minutes remaining. It gave him at least one rushing TD in four consecutive games. Only five players in franchise history had a rushing TD in more consecutive games.

Drake's streak was snapped in Week 2 vs. Washington.

A FOUR TD PERFORMANCE VS. THE BROWNS

In Week 15 vs. Cleveland last season, Drake led the Cardinals to a victory by rushing for a 133 yards and a career-high four TDs. He became the first Cardinals player to rush for at least four TDs in a game since RB Ronald Moore had four vs. the L.A. Rams on 12/5/93. Drafted by the Cardinals in the fourth round (134th overall) in the 2018 NFL Draft out of Fordham - RB **Chase Edmonds** is in his third NFL season in 2020.

Much like fellow 2018 draftee WR Christian Kirk, the Cardinals see big things ahead.

"We all feel like he's a starting running back in this league, and he does, too," head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** said of Edmonds. "When he had his opportunities, he shined, and he continues to shine. He can catch it, run it, block, play special teams, and he's really bright football-wise. He's everything you want."

THE HOME RUN THREAT

One of the reasons the Cardinals are so high on Edmonds is his big-play ability, which was on display again last week in the win over the Jets. His 29-yard TD run in the first quarter was his fifth career TD run of 20+ yards. Only three players in franchise history had more TD runs of 20+ yards in their career.

EDMONDS SHINES NEAR HIS OLD STOMPING GROUNDS

After becoming just the sixth player in NFL history with three TD runs of 20+ yards in a single game in the Cardinals Week 7 victory over the Giants at MetLife Stadium last season, Edmonds broke off yet another long TD run against the Jets last Sunday. The third-year back scored the first TD of the game on a 29-yard run in the first quarter.

Combined with his three rushing TDs (20, 20 and 22 yards) against the Giants last season, Edmonds now has four TDs in two career games at MetLife Stadium. He has 6 TDs in 32 career games played away from MetLife Stadium.

Against the Giants last year, Edmonds became just the sixth player in NFL history with at least three rushing TDs of 20+ yards in a game.

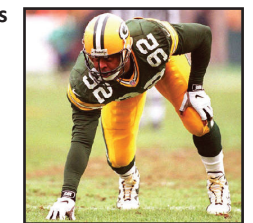
JONES IN ELITE COMPANY

- Six-time team captain (2013, 2015-18, 2020) has totaled 436 tackles, 26 INTs (one returned for a TD) and 109 passes defended in 143 games (all starts) during his first 10 NFL seasons. Only six players in Cardinals history – including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees – have had more INTs than Peterson (26).

- Started all 128 games during his first eight NFL seasons, becoming the first Cardinal since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to start 100+ straight games to begin a career.

- In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

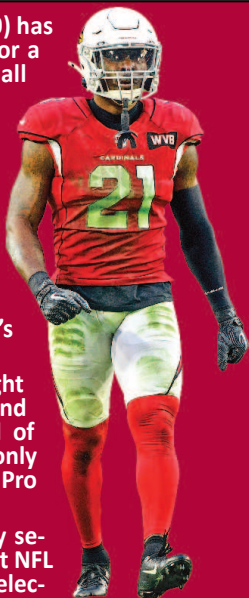

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first nine seasons, he earned eight Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. Considered one of the game's best cover corners, he has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. Since his rookie season in 2011, only three NFL players have more INTs than Peterson.

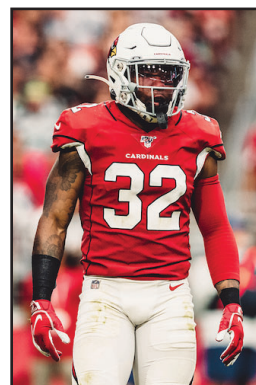

THE "HEART AND SOUL" ON DEFENSE

Baker missed the Cardinals Week 4 game against the Panthers while recovering from thumb surgery, and in his first game back, he led the team with 10 tackles and had a 16-yard sack in the win against the Jets.

His absence was felt, and those within the organization spoke highly of the standout safety prior to his Week 5 return:

General Manager Steve Keim: "When you don't see him out on the field, it just goes to show how valuable he is. The guy is a human eraser. He makes a ton of tackles. He brings energy. He brings juice. He's physical. He's our leader and our heart and soul on defense."

WR Larry Fitzgerald: "Nobody means more to this football team than Budda Baker, and you can take that to the bank. The guy plays the game the right way. He works at it the right way. The way he's wired mentally, as a teammate, he's approachable. ... This guy is the best of the best as a human being, as a football player, as a teammate. And I love him. I know his teammates all feel the same way about him and we're very privileged to have him back on the field with us."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury: "Budda is one of the best players in the league and is a real eraser for us back there and can fix a lot of things. You could tell we missed him."

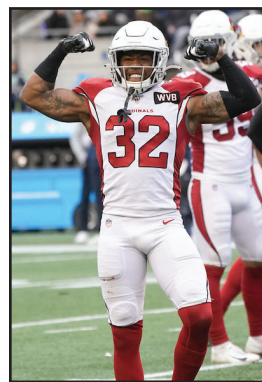
BAKER'S BREAKOUT CAMPAIGN

Arizona's second-round pick (36th overall) in the 2017 NFL Draft, **Baker** was named to his second Pro Bowl last season, becoming the eighth Cardinals safety to earn the honor and the first player in franchise history selected as a special teamer (2017) and position player (2019). He also became the 15th player in team history selected to multiple Pro Bowls in his first three NFL seasons.

Baker led all NFL DBs and ranked fourth overall with a career-high 147 tackles last season, and no player had more solo tackles in 2019.

SPECIAL TEAMS COMES UP BIG IN 2020

In their three victories this season, the Cardinals have benefitted from big plays on special teams:

- Third-year LB **Ezekiel Turner** – a PFWA All-Rookie pick as a special teamer in 2018 – made one of the biggest plays of the game in Arizona's Week 1 win over San Francisco. He set up the Cardinals first TD of the game in the first quarter when he blocked a 49ers punt, which was recovered by LB **Dennis Gardeck** and returned to the SF 10-yard line. It was the Cardinals first blocked punt since the 2018 season finale, which was also recovered by Gardeck for a TD.



- K **Zane Gonzalez** connected on a 56-yard FG just prior to halftime against San Francisco. It was the longest FG of his career and tied for the fourth-longest FG in franchise history.

- LS **Aaron Brewer** – now in his ninth NFL season and playing in his 119th career game in Week 2 – recovered the first fumble of his career in the first quarter. Covering a punt return, Brewer jumped on a ball forced loose by TE Darrell Daniels at the Washington 40-yard line. Six plays later QB Kyler Murray scored on a 14-yard TD run to give Arizona a 14-0 lead.

- In the fourth quarter of the Cardinals Week 5 games against the Jets, CB **Kevin Peterson** recovered a muffed punt near the Cardinals goal line, setting up a six-play, 96-yard TD drive on Arizona's next possession.

KICKING HIS WAY TO THE TOP

Through five games this season, K **Zane Gonzalez** has connected on six-of-eight FG attempts with his two misses coming from 52 and 49 yards in the season-opener.

He has converted two-of-three beyond 50 yards, including a 54-yard FG in Week 3 against the Lions and a career-long 56-yarder in Week 1 against the 49ers.

In franchise history, just three made FGs have covered more ground than his 56-yard FG against San Francisco.

KINGSBURY TURNS OFFENSE AROUND IN 2019

OFFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS IN 2019

• Posted 400+ net yards in a game five times in 2019 after totaling 400+ net yards just once over the previous two seasons combined (2017-18).

• Scored 25+ points in game nine times, including eight times in the final 12 games. From the beginning of October (Week 5) through the end of the season, only New Orleans (10), San Francisco (9) and Baltimore (9) scored 25+ points in more games than the Cardinals (8).

• Arizona's seven games without a turnover in 2019 were the most in a season in franchise history.

• Arizona averaged a franchise record 5.03 yards per rush attempt as a team in 2019 after rushing for 1,990 yards and 18 TDs on 396 attempts. The Cardinals 1,990 rushing yards were the most in a season since 1988 (2,027), the team's first in Arizona.

• 2019 marked just the sixth time in franchise history (2016, 1984, 1975, 1949, 1948) the Cardinals had at least 20 passing TDs and 18 rushing TDs in a season.

• The Cardinals rushed for 200+ yards in a game three times in 2019. It is the first time since 1983 (3x) that Arizona had 200+ rushing yards in at least three games.

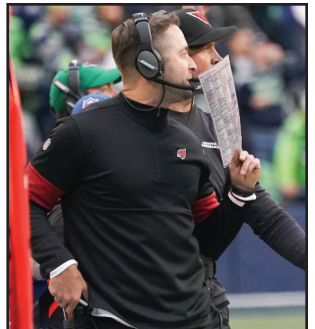
• In Week 5 at Cincinnati, the Cardinals posted 500+ net yards and 250+ rushing yards in a game for the first time since 1960.

KINGSBURY'S RECORD-BREAKING RUN GAME

When Arizona hired **Kingsbury** in 2019, much of the talk surrounding the hire involved the former Texas-Tech head coach implementing a pass-heavy "Air-Raid" system in the desert.

Although the passing offense made significant strides in 2019, it was the rushing attack that showed the biggest improvement last season.

After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018, the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season (1,990 yards & 18 TDs on 396 attempts).



The previous record for team rushing average (4.87) was established in 1960.

The Cardinals 1,990 rushing yards in 2019 represent the team's highest total since rushing for 2,027 yards in 1988, the year the team moved to Arizona.

The 2019 season marked the first time since 1984 (2,008 yards; 21 TDs) that the Cardinals rushed for at least 1,900 yards and 18 TDs in a season.

After having the #32 ranked rushing attack in 2018, the Cardinals had the #10 ranked rushing attack in 2019, averaging 124.4 yards per game. It marked just the second time in the last 35 years (#8 in 2015) that the Cardinals ranked in the top-10 in rushing yards per game.

The Cardinals went without a turnover in seven games last season, a franchise record despite a rookie starting all 16 games at QB.

The Cardinals committed just 18 total turnovers in 2019. There have only been three seasons in franchise history in which Arizona turned the ball over fewer times than it did last season: 1982 (16), 2014 (17) and 1974 (17).

POINTS BY THE BUNCH

After scoring 25+ points in a game just once in 2018 - tied for the lowest total in the NFL - **Kingsbury's** offense posted 25+ points in a game nine times last season, doing so eight times in the final 12 games.

Arizona's nine games with 25+ points in 2019 tied for the sixth-best total in the NFL.

Over the final three months of last season (Weeks 5-17), only New Orleans (10), San Francisco (9) and Baltimore (9) scored 25+ points in more games than the Cardinals (8).

CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

\$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

- St. Vincent DePaul
- United Food Bank
- Phoenix Rescue Mission
- Midwest Food Bank

ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

With Memorial Day occurring in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.

DEVON KENNARD – DELIVERED MEALS TO FOUR VALLEY FIRE DEPARTMENTS; VIRTUAL HOSPITAL VISITS

In May, Arizona native – and Cardinals 2020 free agent signing – Kennard gave back to his hometown when he teamed with Salad and Go to provide dinner for firefighters at four different fire stations in the Ahwatukee area.

Every year Cardinals players and staff make numerous visits to Phoenix Children's Hospital to lift the spirits of the children and their families in pediatric units. Due to COVID-19 and the resulting safety restrictions, those visits have taken a new form. In late August, Kennard became the first Cardinals player to take the controls of a telepresence robot in order to spend time with children at PCH. While Kennard was at training camp at State Farm Stadium, he was able to drive the robot through the halls of PCH and interact with children through a video monitor.
