THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

After playing at Washington in Week 1, the Cardinals host the New York Giants this week in the second of three straight games vs. teams from the NFC East to begin the 2023 campaign.

For the Giants, this will be the first of back-to-back road games vs. NFC West opponents. After facing the Cardinals on Sunday, the Giants will remain in Arizona to prepare for their Thursday night game at San Francisco in Week 3.

This week's game vs. New York marks the Cardinals 18th home opener at State Farm Stadium. Arizona enters Sunday's matchup with an 11-5-1 record in home-openers since beginning play at the venue in 2006.

This contest represents the 129th all-time meeting between the Cardinals and Giants in a series that dates back to 1926. It is Arizona's third-oldest rivalry (Chicago, Green Bay). The Cardinals have faced the Giants more times than any other NFL franchise.

Former NFC East rivals, the Cardinals and Giants are meeting for the 11th time since Arizona left to join the NFC West in 2002. The Cardinals hold a 7-3 advantage in the previous 10 matchups.

The Cardinals enter the contest having won four straight - and five of the last six - against the Giants. It is Arizona's second-longest winning streak in the history of the series (won 7 straight between 1974-77).

The last time the Cardinals and Giants met was in Week 14 of 2020 when the Cardinals earned a 26-7 win at MetLife Stadium. Arizona's defense registered 8.0 sacks and four forced fumbles in the contest.

Returning from the knee injury that ended his 2022 campaign early, TE Zach Ertz led the Cardinals in receptions last week and now resumes his rivalry with an old NFC East foe. A former Eagle, Ertz will face the Giants for the first time as a member of the Cardinals and the first time overall since Week 13 of the 2019 season. After posting one TD reception in his first eight career games vs. the Giants, Ertz has six TD catches in his last five meetings with New York.

THE HIGHLIGHTS

• The Cardinals host their season-opener this week when they welcome the New York Giants to State Farm Stadium. Arizona last hosted the Giants in Week 16 of the 2017 season.

• *In his last game against the Giants (12/9/19 @ Philadelphia), TE Zach Ertz caught nine passes for 91 yards and two TDs. He has at least one TD reception in five straight games vs. New York. Ertz has more TD receptions vs. the Giants (7) than against any other team in his career.*

• Sunday's game vs. the Giants will see Cardinals rookie LB BJ Ojuluri facing his brother, LB Azeez Ojuluri, for the first time. BJ was drafted 41st overall by Arizona in 2023 and Azeez was taken 50th overall by the Giants in 2021.

• In last week's season-opener vs. the Commanders, 22 players made their Cardinals debut, six players (Paris Johnson Jr., Michael Wilson, Kei'Trel Clark, BJ Ojuluri, Nolan Cooney and Emari Demercado) made their NFL debut and three rookies (Johnson, Wilson and Clark) made their first career start.

• *Dating back to the final five games of 2022, K Matt Prater is 6-for-6 on FG attempts of 50+ yards. During that stretch he has made FGs of 50, 53, 54, 55, 56 and 57 yards. Prater is the NFL's all-time career leader with 72 FGs of 50+ yards.*

• Last Sunday, LB Zaven Collins became the first Cardinals player since Justin Bethel (1/1/17 @ LAR) to have both an INT and fumble recovery in the same game. He became the first Arizona player to do so in a season-opener since current Cards VP, Player Personnel Quentin Harris (9/12/04 @ LAR).

• After he posted 2.0 sacks against Washington last week, LB Dennis Gardeck now has 10.0 career sacks. Of those, 6.0 have come against teams from the NFC East: Commanders (2.0), Eagles (2.0) and Giants (2.0).

• In last week's opener, DL Jonathan Ledbetter matched a career-high for tackles (6) and recorded the second full sack of his career.

CARDINALS-GIANTS CONNECTIONS

GIANTS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals OL **Will Hernandez** was selected by the Giants in the second round (34th overall) of the 2018 NFL Draft. He appeared in 62 games (56 starts) at guard during his four seasons (2018-21) with the Giants before signing with Arizona in free agency in 2022.

Cardinals CB **Antonio Hamilton** played two seasons (2018-19) with the Giants, appearing in 29 games (two starts).

Cardinals OL **Jackson Barton** spent the 2020 season with the Giants.

Cardinals VP, Player Personnel **Quentin Harris** signed with the Giants as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 and spent the preseason/training camp with the team. Harris was a four-year starter at free safety for Syracuse from 1998-2001, finishing his college career with 327 tackles (183 solo), four forced fumbles, four fumble recoveries and 10 INTs in 42 career games.

Cardinals Director of Football Administration **Matt Harriss** spent 10 seasons (2006-2015) in the Giants football operations department.

CARDINALS CONNECTIONS

Giants S/LB **Isaiah Simmons** was selected by the Cardinals in the first round of the 2020 NFL Draft. He appeared in 50 regular season games (37 starts) and one postseason contest, and amassed 247 tackles (173 solo), 13 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, 11 QB hits, four INTs, 16 passes defended, seven forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries during his three seasons (2020-22) with the team.

Giants Defensive Assistant **Ben Burress** spent one season with the Cardinals in 2018 serving as assistant to the head coach.

NEW YORK/NEW JERSEY CONNECTIONS

Cardinals VP of Football Operations and Facilities **Matt Caracciolo** (Oceanside), Director of Football Administration **Matt Harriss** (Bronxville), and Area Scout **John Mancini** (Long Island) are natives of New York. Caracciolo attended Ithaca College and earned a master's degree from Syracuse while Mancini attended SUNY-Plattsburgh.

ARIZONA CONNECTIONS

Giants DL **D.J. Davidson** is an Arizona native (Mesa) and attended Desert Ridge (Mesa) High School. As a senior, he played in 13 games and had 67 tackles, 19.5 tackles for loss, 5.5 sacks, four forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and a TD. Davidson then spent four seasons (2017-21) at Arizona State where he appeared in 37 games (28 starts), finishing his college career with 137 tackles (62 solo), 16 tackles for loss, 5.0 sacks, one fumble recovery and six passes defended.

Giants RB **Gary Brightwell** played collegiately at University of Arizona (2017-20) and over four seasons appeared in 40 games (7 starts) and had 245 carries for 1,305 yards and nine TDs. Also recorded 19 receptions for 121 yards and one TD in 2017 prior to switching to RB.

PRO/COLLEGE CONNECTIONS

Cardinals General Manager **Monti Ossenfort** and Giants Head Coach **Brian Daboll** worked together for six seasons (2003, '06, '13-16) in New England where they both served in a variety of roles. Ossenfort was in the front office and Daboll on the coaching staff. In their six seasons together, the Patriots won six divisional titles, five AFC Conference titles (2003, 2013-16) and four Super Bowls (XXXVIII, XLIX, LI, LII).

Cardinals Head Coach **Jonathan Gannon** (2018-20) and O-Line coach **Klayton Adams** (2019-22) coached with Giants WRs coach **Mike Groh** (2020-21) and OL coach **Bobby Johnson** (2018) with the Colts.

Giants Assistant QBs coach **Christian Jones** (2019-21) and D-Line coach **Andre Patterson** (2014-21) coached with Cardinals Offensive Coordinator **Drew Petzing** (2014-19), Defensive Coordinator **Nick Rallis** (2018-20), OLBs coach **Rob Rodriguez** (2015-19), LBs coach **Sam Siefkes** (2021-22), and TEs coach **Ben Steele** (2021) in Minnesota.

Cardinals DBs coach **Jerome Henderson** (2016-19) and Cardinals TEs coach **Ben Steele** (2019-20) coached one season together with the Falcons.

Giants Offensive Assistant **Angela Baker** coached with Cardinals Offensive Coordinator **Drew Petzing** with the Browns in 2020.

Cardinals OL **Kelvin Beachum** (2017-19) and Giants DL **Leonard Williams** (2015-19) played together for the Jets.

Cardinals DL **Jonathan Ledbetter** played two seasons (2017-18) with Giants OL **Andrew Thomas** at Georgia.

Cardinals LB **Kyzir White** (2018-21) and Giants QB **Tyrod Taylor** (2019-20) were teammates for two seasons with the Chargers.

Cardinals WR **Greg Dortch** (2016-18) played with Giants OLB **Boogie Bashman** (2017-20) at Wake Forest.

Cardinals LB **Cam Thomas** and Giants TE **Daniel Bellinger** were teammates for four seasons (2018-21) at San Diego State before each was selected in the 2022 draft.

Cardinals LB **Victor Dimukeje** (2017-20) and Giants QB **Daniel Jones** (2016-18) played together at Duke.

Cardinals LB **BJ Ojulari** (2020-22) and Giants CB **Cordale Flott** (2019-22) were teammates at LSU.

CARDS VS. GIANTS - SERIES BREAKDOWN

Sunday's game between the Cardinals and Giants is the 129th all-time meeting between the two teams in a series that dates back to 1926. It is the Cardinals third-oldest rivalry (Chicago, Green Bay) and the Cardinals have faced the Giants more times than any other NFL franchise.

Between 1950 and 2001, the Cardinals and Giants played twice a year (except in 1968 and 1982) as members of the NFC East before the Cardinals joined the NFC West in division realignment in 2002.

This week's meeting marks the 11th time the two teams have faced off since the Cardinals joined the NFC West, with Arizona holding a 7-3 advantage in the previous 10 matchups. The Cardinals have won four straight - and five of the last six - against the Giants



CARDS VS. GIANTS - ITEMS OF NOTE

- Arizona's current four-game winning streak vs. the Giants is its second-longest in the history of the series (won 7 straight between 1974-77).
- In the Cardinals current four game winning streak they have outscored the Giants 101-42 (+59 point differential).
- Sunday's game will mark the Giants first visit to State Farm Stadium since 2017 when the Cardinals won 23-0 and earned their first shutout in 25 years (remains AZ's lone shutout in the last 30 years).
- Cardinals TE **Zach Ertz** has 70 receptions for 807 yards and seven TDs in 13 career games against his former NFC East rival. He has more TDs against the Giants than he has against any other team in his NFL career.
- In the last meeting between the two teams (AZ 26-7 win @ NYG on 12/13/20), LB **Dennis Gardeck** played just eight snaps on defense and recorded two tackles, 2.0 sacks and his first career defensive fumble recovery.
- The last time the Cardinals and Giants squared off - in Week 14 of 2020 - the Cardinals earned a 26-7 win at MetLife Stadium. Arizona's defense registered 8.0 sacks and four forced fumbles in the contest.

CARDS GO FOR FIFTH STRAIGHT VS. GIANTS

On Sunday the Cardinals will be shooting for their fifth straight win vs. the Giants, continuing a streak that dates back to 2014.

Arizona's longest winning streak against the Giants - their former division rival in the NFC East and one of its oldest rivals overall - was seven games between 1974-77.

The Cardinals recent success against the Giants has also extended to the other two New York teams. Entering Sunday, Arizona has won six straight games against the Giants, Jets and Bills. The Cardinals haven't lost to any of the three since 2016.

After dropping a road game against the Bills in Week 3 of the 2016 season, Arizona defeated the Jets in Week 6. That began the Cardinals current six-game winning streak vs. New York teams.



OJULARI BROTHERS ARE FOES IN WEEK 2

After being selected by the Cardinals in the second round (41st overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft, rookie LB **BJ Ojulari** earned bragging rights over his brother. He was picked nine spots earlier than Azeez Ojulari was taken in the 2021 NFL Draft (2nd round - 50th overall).

This Sunday's game is another chance for bragging rights as BJ and the Cardinals host Azeez and the Giants at State Farm Stadium. It will also mark the first time they have faced each other on the field.

The brothers shared just one season together at the college level - in 2020 when BJ was a freshman at LSU and Azeez was in his final year at Georgia - but the teams did not play that season.

The last time they shared a field was as teammates for two seasons (2016-17) at Marietta (GA) High School.

BJ NOT THE ONLY CARDINAL WITH A BROTHER IN THE NFL

There are currently 24 sets of brothers currently on NFL rosters in 2023. In addition to BJ and Azeez Ojulari, that list also includes Cardinals LB **Cameron Thomas** and Rams OL **Zach Thomas**. The two are scheduled to meet twice this season (Weeks 6 and 12).



18TH SEASON AT STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals begin their 18th regular season at State Farm Stadium this week when they host the New York Giants. It is the first of back-to-back home games for Arizona in which the team will face NFC East opponents who are coming off a playoff berth in 2022 (vs. Dallas in Week 3).

CARDS GO FOR 12TH WIN IN HOME OPENER AT STATE FARM STADIUM
The Cardinals enter Sunday's game against the Giants with an 11-5-1 record in home-openers since beginning play at State Farm Stadium.

IT GETS LOUD IN THERE

The home crowd at State Farm Stadium has given the Cardinals a significant advantage. Dating back to the inaugural year at the venue in 2006, Cardinals opponents have accumulated 208 accepted false start penalties in the regular season. That is the most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

SUCCESS VS. THE REMAINDER OF THE EAST

Jonathan Gannon became an NFL head coach for the first time when hired by Arizona on February 14, 2023. He came to Arizona after spending the past two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator with the Philadelphia Eagles. Gannon has 15 years of experience in the NFL with the Eagles (2021-22), Colts (2018-20), Vikings (2014-17), Titans (2012-13), Rams (2009-11) and Falcons (2007). Prior to being hired in Arizona, Gannon coached with three different teams (Eagles, Colts, Vikings) who combined for six playoff berths in the last eight seasons (2015-22).

Brian Daboll is in his second season as an NFL head coach after being hired by the Giants in January of 2022 following four seasons (2018-21) as the offensive coordinator for the Buffalo Bills. In his first season with New York in 2022, he directed one of the most successful debut seasons in the 98-year history of the franchise. Daboll was named the 2022 NFL Coach of the Year after leading the team to nine regular-season victories, the team's first playoff berth in six years, and its first postseason victory in 11 seasons. Now in his 22nd season coaching in the NFL, Daboll first broke into the league as a defensive assistant with the New England Patriots in 2000.

GANNON AMONG FIVE NEW HEAD COACHES IN 2023

Gannon is among the five head coaches hired during the 2023 offseason. He is one of three who made their NFL head coaching debut in last week's openers.

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

TE Zach Ertz

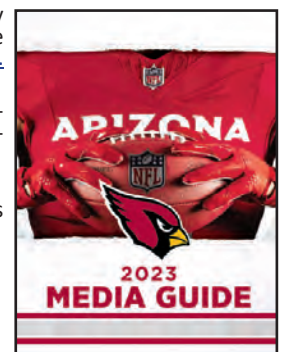

DOBBS GETS THE START IN WEEK 1

Just 17 days after being acquired by Arizona in a trade with the Cleveland Browns, **Joshua Dobbs** was the starting QB for the Cardinals in last Sunday's season-opener at Washington.

With just a handful of practices under his belt - and making only his third-ever NFL start - Dobbs completed 21-of-30 pass attempts (70.0%) for 132 yards against the Commanders.

Following the game, Dobbs spoke about starting two weeks after joining the team and the jump he and the offense can make from Week 1 to Week 2.

On Taking Advantages Of Starting Opportunities

"Opportunities come in this league, right, you've got to take advantage of them. So whenever you get the opportunity, go out, execute, play to win every time you step on the field. So it doesn't matter when you get the opportunity. That's the expectation. That's at least my expectation."

On What He Expects From The Offense From Week 1 To Week 2

"I think a huge jump is in store. Just getting out there, getting in the flow of a game, getting in the flow with the guys and the rhythm. Just getting out there to play ball can definitely (provide) a huge jump and I expect to make a huge jump, especially situationally."



ANOTHER TWO-SACK OUTING FOR GARDECK

LB **Dennis Gardeck** - who has been with the Cardinals since signing with the team as a rookie free agent out of Sioux Falls in 2018 - began his sixth NFL season with a big performance in Washington last week.

He finished the contest with four tackles, 2.0 sacks, three QB hits, a tackle for loss and a forced fumble that was picked up by LB Cameron Thomas and returned for a TD.

After posting a pair of sacks against the Commanders, Gardeck now has **10.0 career sacks**. That is the **second-highest total in franchise history among players who entered the NFL undrafted.**

THOMAS SCORES FIRST TD SINCE HIGH SCHOOL

Second-year LB Cameron Thomas kicked off the 2023 season with a tackle, a pass defensed and a fumble recovery he returned for his first career TD in Washington. He also had a first quarter sack that was nullified by a penalty.

Thomas scored the Cardinals first TD of the 2023 season when he recovered a fumble by Commanders QB Sam Howell in the second quarter and returned it two yards for the score.

It was the first TD for Thomas in nearly six years - going all the way back his senior year as a TE at Carlsbad (CA) High School in 2017 when he had a six-yard TD reception vs. Cathedral Catholic in a CIF Division I quarterfinal playoff game.



PRATER BUILDS ON NFL RECORD FROM 50+

K **Matt Prater** was a perfect 3-for-3 on FG attempts and made his only PAT in last Sunday's opener against Washington. His second FG of the game was good from 54 yards.

It was Prater's 72nd career FGs of 50+ yards, extending his NFL record. He now has 14 more FGs of 50+ yards than the player who ranks second on the all-time list.

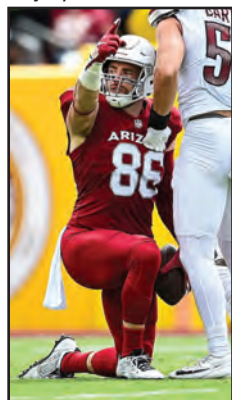

11 ROOKIES ON THE ROSTER

Arizona started the 2023 campaign with 11 rookies on the active roster. **It marks just the second time (12 in 2019) in the last 20 seasons (2004-23) that the Cardinals had at least 11 rookies on the Week 1 roster.**

For just the third time in the last 20 seasons (4 in 2018; 4 in 2010) the Cardinals had three undrafted players earn a spot on the Week 1 roster. Arizona had a total of three undrafted players make the Week 1 roster in the previous four seasons (2019-22) combined.



ROSTER FACTS & FIGURES

Below is a breakdown of the Cardinals active roster:

- The Cards added **16** veteran free agents, **7** of their own 2023 draft picks, **1** 2023 Miami draft pick and **3** rookie free agents that were not with the team at any point last season. In all, **27** of the 53 players (50.9%) on the current roster were not with the Cardinals during the 2022 season.

- OL **D.J. Humphries** (2015) and LS **Aaron Brewer** (2016) are the most tenured players on the Cardinals roster.

- The Cardinals oldest player is K **Matt Prater** (39 years old) and the team's youngest player is rookie LB **BJ Ojulari** (21). *At 39 years old (born 8/10/84), the only active NFL players older than Prater are Jets QB Aaron Rodgers (39 - born 12/2/83) and Bears TE Mercedes Lewis (39 - born 5/19/84).*

- The average age on the Cardinals Week 1 roster was 26.9 years old. Arizona's Week 1 roster featured just five players age 30+, compared to 12 such players on the Week 1 roster in 2022.

- Arizona's roster features the only active player in the NFL who entered the league through the Supplemental Draft (**S Jalen Thompson**) and 17 players who entered the NFL as undrafted free agents.

A WELL-TRAVELED TEAM IN 2023

Arizona will travel a total distance of 25,126 miles for road games during the regular season, making the Cardinals one of seven teams in the NFL that will "travel around the world" at least once. A trip around the globe is 25,000 miles.

The Cardinals will cross 26 times zone this season. With the season kicking off at Washington last week, Arizona covered over 4,500 miles.

The Cardinals have four games in the Eastern time zone in 2023: Week 1 @ Washington; Week 9 @ Cleveland; Week 13 @ Pittsburgh; Week 17 @ Philadelphia. It marks the sixth time in the last nine seasons (2015-23) Arizona has at least four games in the Eastern time zone.

MURRAY STARTS YEAR ON PUP

Two-time Pro Bowl QB **Kyler Murray** is starting the 2023 season on the Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform (PUP) list as he continues his recovery from a knee injury suffered in Week 14 last season.

The injury to Murray's right knee occurred in the Cardinals matchup vs. New England on December 12.

STARTING THE YEAR ON RESERVE/PUP

Starting the season on reserve/PUP means Murray will miss at least the first four games. He is eligible to be activated immediately after such time has elapsed.

- While on reserve/PUP Murray cannot practice with the team but can take part in team activities (i.e. team & position meetings).
- The earliest Murray will be able to practice with the team is October 2, the day after the Cardinals Week 4 game vs. the 49ers.
- The earliest Murray can play a game is October 8, when the Cardinals host the Bengals.

Selected #1 overall by the Cardinals in the 2019 NFL Draft, Murray started all 57 games played in his first four seasons, completing 1,316-of-1,971 pass attempts (66.8%) for 13,848 yards and 84 TDs while rushing for 2,204 yards and 23 TDs on 381 carries (5.8 avg.). He is one of just four players in NFL history (Josh Allen, Russell Wilson and Cam Newton) with 13,000+ passing yards and 2,000+ rushing yards in his first four seasons.



AZ MAKES LATE PLAY FOR DOBBS

On the day that featured three different trades for the Cardinals, one netted the QB who started for Arizona in last week's opener at Washington.

On August 24, while the team was in Minnesota practicing against the Vikings, Arizona acquired **Joshua Dobbs** in a trade with the Cleveland Browns.

About The Cardinals QB Addition

• A six-year NFL veteran, was drafted by Pittsburgh in the fourth round (135th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of the University of Tennessee.

• Re-signed with Cleveland as a free agent in the offseason after serving as a backup QB in 11 games with the Browns last year.

• With the Browns in 2022, worked under current Cardinals offensive coordinator Drew Petzing, who was Dobbs QBs coach in Cleveland.

• Made his first two career regular season starts with the Titans late in the 2022 season, completing 40-of-68 passes (58.8%) for 411 yards, two TDs and two INTs while also rushing for 44 yards on eight carries.

• Has appeared in nine games (three starts) with the Steelers (2018, '20), Titans (2022) and Cardinals (2023) while also spending time with the Jaguars (2019), Browns (2022) and Lions (2022). Has completed 71-of-115 pass attempts (61.7%) for 588 yards, two TDs and three INTs while rushing for 72 yards on 17 carries.

• An All-SEC selection, Dobbs set UT records for career rushing yards by a QB (2,160), career rushing TDs by a QB (32), single-season rushing yards by a QB (831 in 2016) and single-season rushing TDs by a QB (12 in 2016).



STRONG PRESEASON LIFTS TUNE

Selected by the Cardinals in the fifth round (139th overall) in 2023 out of Houston, rookie QB **Clayton Tune** has made a strong push for playing time with his performance this offseason.

Building on his play in OTAs and training camp, Tune took advantage of his playing time in the preseason. He completed 34-of-59 pass attempts (57.6%) for 353 yards and a TD. He also rushed for 44 yards on 10 carries.

"I feel like I have learned a lot, grown a lot," Tune said. "I just continue to learn each day that goes by. I was really happy to get in there and get those live game reps, see different coverages, see different pressures, that type of stuff."

Although he is a rookie in the NFL, Tune saw a lot of action at the college level. He appeared in 47 games (44 starts) over five seasons for the Cougars, completing 956-of-1,497 pass attempts (63.9%) for 11,994 yards and 104 TDs. He also rushed for 1,248 yards and 15 TDs on 412 carries.



Nolan Cooney earned a spot on the Cardinals roster in 2023 following a stellar performance in the preseason. He led the NFL with a 49.2-yard punting average (10 punts for 492 yards) while landing seven punts inside the 20-yard line.

Earning Arizona's punting duties this season is the culmination of a long, and unusual road for Cooney.

OVERCOMING CANCER - AND LEARNING TO PUNT ON YOUTUBE

Cooney was diagnosed with testicular cancer which spread to his lungs during his junior year of high school. He underwent surgery and nine weeks of chemotherapy to eventually beat the disease.

Cooney was also to return to sports at Bridgton (ME) Academy - where he was a three-sport star prior to his diagnosis.

However, football was not one of those sports. Cooney had specialized in baseball, soccer and basketball.

It was during his cancer treatment that Cooney - on the suggestion of his father - look into punting.

His first step was learning to punt, and he did that by watching videos on Youtube before attending a punting and kicking camp.

In his lone season as a punter in high school he became a top recruit, earning a spot at Syracuse.

In five seasons at the college level, Cooney played in just 11 games - all coming in his senior season in 2020. He earned All-ACC honors that season.

After initially signing as a rookie free agent with the Saints 2021 and bouncing around various practice squads his first two NFL seasons, Cooney made his NFL debut in the Cardinals season-opener at Washington last week.



NEW CARDS HAVE FRANCHISE TIES

Two of Arizona's 2023 Draft picks - OL **Paris Johnson Jr.** and QB **Clayton Tune** - are not the only members of their families to be drafted by the Cardinals.

JOHNSON HOPES TO BUILD ON FATHER'S LEGACY WITH CARDINALS

Exactly 8,776 days (24 years, 10 days) after his father - Paris Sr. - was selected by Arizona in the 5th round (155th overall) of the 1999 NFL Draft - Paris Jr. became the newest Cardinals draft pick when he was taken 6th overall in the 2023 NFL Draft.

Although the eldest Johnson spent just one season in Arizona and never played in an NFL game, Paris Jr. talked of using that as motivation. "I wanted to be a Cardinal," Johnson said following the draft. "(I) told the coaches I want to finish what my Dad couldn't. I want to finish what he started originally as the original Paris Johnson. So to be able to carry that legacy with the Cardinals is everything."

TUNE A RELATIVE OF CARDS FIRST-EVER DRAFT PICK

QB Clayton Tune was drafted by the Cardinals in the fifth round (139th overall).

His selection came exactly 87 years, 2 months and 22 days after his great-great uncle Jimmy Lawrence was the Cardinals first-ever draft pick.

During the inaugural NFL Draft held in Philadelphia in 1936, the Cardinals selected Lawrence in the first round (5th overall) out of TCU.



Jimmy Lawrence carries the ball vs. the NY Giants on October 6, 1938.

Lawrence went on to play four seasons (1936-39) with the Cardinals (1936-39) and Green Bay Packers (1939). He played one game with the Cardinals and three with the Packers during the '39 season.

OTHER CARDINALS PLAYERS WITH NFL FAMILY TIES

LB **BJ Ojulari** - Brother is N.Y. Giants second-year LB **Azeez Ojulari**. The duo will face off when Arizona hosts the Giants this week.

LB **Cameron Thomas** - Brother is Rams second-year OL **Zach Thomas**. Both Cameron and Zach were selected in the 2022 NFL Draft. They will face off twice this season: Weeks 6 and 12.

DL **Dante Stills** - Has numerous NFL family connections: father, **Gary Stills**, played 10 years (1999-08) in the NFL with the Chiefs, Ravens and Rams; uncle, **Ken Stills**, played six years (1985-90) with the Packers and Vikings; cousin, **Kenny Stills**, played nine years (2013-21) with the Saints, Dolphins and Texans.

LB **Kyzir White** - Brother is current free agent WR **Kevin White**, who was drafted by the Chicago Bears with the 7th overall pick in the 2015 NFL Draft and spent the 2019 offseason and training camp with the Cardinals.

GANNON TAKES THE REINS

- On Tuesday, February 14, the Cardinals announced **Jonathan Gannon** as the team's new head coach.
- The 40-year old Gannon came to the Cardinals after spending the past two seasons (2021-22) as the defensive coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles.

Under Gannon, the Eagles boasted a top-10 defense in each of the past two seasons, ranking 2nd in total defense in 2022 (301.5 ypg) and 10th in the NFL in 2021 (328.8 ypg). Last season the Eagles also featured the NFL's top-ranked pass defense (179.8 ypg) and the league's 8th ranked scoring defense (20.2 ppg).

Just two days prior to being hired in Arizona, Philadelphia played in Super Bowl LVII at State Farm Stadium after finishing the regular season as the #1 seed in the NFC with a 14-3 record. The Eagles made the postseason in each year Gannon was the defensive coordinator.

- Has coached with three different teams (Eagles, Colts, Vikings) who have combined for six playoff berths in the last eight seasons.

MORE HIGHLIGHTS FROM PHILADELPHIA

In 2022, the Eagles easily led the NFL with a franchise single-season record 70 sacks in the regular season. No other team in the NFL had more than 55.

Philadelphia's 70 sacks in 2022 were the most by any team in a single season since the 1989 Minnesota Vikings (71). Combined with their eight sacks in the postseason, the Eagles 78 total sacks in 2022 were the third-most in NFL history behind only the 1984 (82 sacks) and 1985 Chicago Bears (80 sacks).

Since individual sacks became an official stat in 1982, Philadelphia became the first team ever to have four different players with 10.0+ sacks in a single season when they did so in 2022: Haason Reddick (16.0), Brandon Graham (11.0), Javon Hargrave (11.0) and Josh Sweat (11.0).

Between 2021-22, the Eagles defense led the NFL with 99 sacks, ranked 3rd in total defense (315.1 ypg), 3rd in pass defense (200.4 ypg), 6th in tackles for loss (168), tied for 4th in total return TDs (7) and interception return TDs (4) and tied for 10th in interceptions (29).

In his first season with the Eagles in 2021, directed the NFL's 10th-ranked defense (328.8 ypg). Philadelphia had the 2nd-most defensive TDs (5) and allowed the 5th-fewest explosive plays (117) in the league, also finished 9th in opponent rushing yards per game (107.9) and opponent three-and-out percentage (33.1%).

GANNON'S BACKGROUND

A Cleveland, OH native, Gannon has 15 years of experience in the NFL. Prior to working with the Eagles, he was the DBs/CBs coach with the Colts (2018-20) and the assistant DBs/quality control coach with the Vikings (2014-17) after working as a defensive assistant with the Titans (2012-13).

Spent three seasons (2009-11) as a scout with the St. Louis Rams after beginning his NFL coaching career as a defensive assistant with the Atlanta Falcons in 2007.

Played collegiately as a safety at Louisville and appeared in nine games as a red-shirt freshman in 2002 before suffering a career-ending hip injury in his first career start at Cincinnati.



ARIZONA'S COORDINATORS

PETZING LEADS THE OFFENSE

Drew Petzing is in his first season with the Cardinals and 10th in the NFL after being hired as Arizona's offensive coordinator in February. Prior to coming to AZ, Petzing spent three seasons (2020-22) with Cleveland, including last year as QBs coach.

With the Browns in 2022, QB Jacoby Brissett started 11 games and completed 236-of-369 passes for 2,608 yards, 12 TDs and an 88.9 QB rating. Brissett's 63.9 completion percentage and 88.9 passer rating were both career highs.

Prior to Cleveland, he spent six seasons (2014-19) coaching with Minnesota. As the Vikings WRs coach in 2019, WR Stefon Diggs set a then career-high with 1,130 receiving yards and finished 4th in the league that season with a 17.9-yard average on 63 receptions.

Working with Kirk Cousins in 2018, the Vikings QB set a team record for completions (425), threw for the third-most passing yards (4,298), had the second-highest completion percentage (70.1) and recorded the fourth-highest passer rating (99.7) by a Viking in team history.



RALLIS TAKES THE REINS ON DEFENSE

Nick Rallis was hired as Arizona's defensive coordinator in February after spending the past two seasons (2021-22) coaching LBs in Philadelphia. Prior to working with the Eagles, Rallis spent three seasons (2018-20) with the Minnesota Vikings as defensive quality control/assistant linebackers coach.

Having turned 30 on July 13th, he is the youngest coordinator in the NFL.

Helped Eagles LB T.J. Edwards to a career season in 2022 as he finished with 159 tackles, 2.0 sacks, seven passes defended, 10 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery. His 159 tackles ranked 7th in the NFL in 2022 and represented the highest single-season total for an Eagles defender since Byron Evans (175) in 1992.

With the Vikings, Rallis coached LB Eric Kendricks who was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro in 2019 after having a career-high and team-leading 110 tackles to go along with 12 passes defended, tied for the most among NFL linebackers.



RODGERS STILL IN CHARGE OF SPECIAL TEAMS

Jeff Rodgers is in his sixth season with the Cardinals and fifth as the team's assistant head coach/special teams coordinator. He came to Arizona in January, 2018 as the team's special teams coordinator and added the title of assistant head coach in 2019.

Rodgers is in his 20th NFL season after previously coaching special teams with Chicago (2015-17), Denver (2011-14), Carolina (2009-10) and San Francisco (2003-07).

K Matt Prater had 137 points in 2021, the second-highest total in franchise history and tied for the fourth-highest total in the NFL that season. In just 30 games over two seasons (2021-22) under Rodgers, Prater connected on 12 FGs of 50+ yards, the second-most for any player in team history.

P Andy Lee finished in the top-five in the NFL in punting average three times over the past five seasons (2018-22), including leading the league with a 48.6-yard average in 2018.



PHILLY "D" AMONG NFL'S BEST UNDER GANNON

One of the main factors in the Eagles reaching the Super Bowl last season was the performance of the team's defense under then-second year coordinator **Jonathan Gannon**.

Drew Terrell is in his sixth season in the NFL and first with the Cardinals as passing game coordinator/WRs. He came to AZ after coaching WRs in Washington the past three years (2020-22).

During his three-year (2020-22) tenure coaching receivers with the Commanders, guided WR Terry McLaurin to three consecutive 1,000+ yard receiving seasons and his first Pro Bowl selection in 2022.

A Chandler, AZ native, Terrell attended Hamilton High School and received All-State honors as both a WR and punt returner. He helped the Huskies win three regional championships and two 5A Division I state titles.

- 1st season with AZ and 5th NFL season, having spent the previous four years (2019-22) with the Colts.

- 5th season with AZ and 5th NFL season, after joining the team in January 2019.

- 4th season with AZ and 5th NFL season, after joining the team in 2020.

The 2023 NFL Draft marked just the third time in the last 22 years (11 in 2019; 9 in 2013) the Cardinals had at least nine picks in a single draft.

OL PARIS JOHNSON JR. (ROUND 1)

• **First offensive lineman taken in the draft and the fourth offensive player behind QBs Bryce Young, C.J. Stroud and Anthony Richardson.**

• Taken #6 overall by the Cardinals, **became the highest-drafted offensive lineman out of Ohio State since Orlando Pace was picked #1 overall by the Rams in 1997.**

• **Graduated from Ohio State in less than three years, earning a degree in Journalism.** An All-American on the field, he was also a credentialed member of the media while working for the school newspaper, The Lantern. Johnson has also learned to speak Mandarin Chinese and Portuguese.

• Played in 31 games in three seasons (2020-22) at Ohio State, starting 26 consecutive games over his final two years. He was a 13-game starter at RG in 2021 and started all 13 games at LT in 2022. He played five games at guard as a true freshman.

• **As a junior in 2022, earned unanimous first-team All-American honors.**



LB BJ OJULARI (ROUND 2)

• Last name pronounced "oh-joo-LARR-ee".

• **Selected nine picks earlier than his brother - Giants LB Azeez Ojulari - was taken by New York in the second round (50th overall) of the 2021 NFL Draft. The brothers will face off when Arizona hosts the Giants in Week 2 of the regular season.**

• A first-team All-SEC selection as a junior in 2022, Ojulari started 24-of-34 games played in three seasons (2020-22) at LSU and totaled 129 tackles, 25.0 tackles for loss, 16.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and two passes defended.

• **A permanent captain, was awarded the prestigious #18 jersey for LSU as a junior in 2022.**

• Descendant of Nigerian royalty. His maternal grandfather was Olaniyi Osuntoki, who later changed his name to Prince Twins Seven-Seven (he was the sole survivor of his parents' seven sets of twins). In the late 1890s, Prince Twins Seven-Sevens' grandfather was the King of Ibadan, a city in southwestern Nigeria.



CB GARRETT WILLIAMS (ROUND 3a)

• Begins the 2023 season on Reserve/NFI list.

• Spent four seasons (2019-22) at Syracuse where he appeared in 32 games (28 starts) and had 152 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, four INTs (one returned for a TD) and 27 passes defended.

• **A three-time All-ACC selection and Freshman All-American (2020), led the ACC in passes defended in both 2020 and 2021.**

• In 2021, was an All-ACC selection after starting 10 games and totaling 52 tackles, an ACC-leading 10 passes defended and five tackles for loss.

• **During his redshirt freshman season in 2020, recorded his first college INT when he picked off a Trevor Lawrence pass and returned in 39 yards for a TD. It was the first pick-six surrendered by Lawrence.**



WR MICHAEL WILSON (ROUND 3b)

• Spent five years (2018-22) at Stanford, where he appeared in 39 games (30 starts) and totaled 134 receptions for 1,662 yards (12.4 avg.) and 11 TDs.

• **A two-time honorable-mention All-Pac-12 selection (2020, 2022), was limited to six games played in 2022, but posted 16 receptions for 418 yards and four TDs, averaging career high for receiving yards per game (69.7) and receiving average (16.1).**

• **Four-time member of the Pac-12 All-Academic Honor Roll (2019, 2020, 2021, 2022), graduated from Stanford with a master's degree in Communication and Media Studies in 2022 and a bachelor's degree in Management Science and Engineering, Finance, and Decision in 2021.**

• **In Arizona, is being mentored by passing game coordinator/WRs coach Drew Terrell, who played WR at Stanford from 2009-12.**



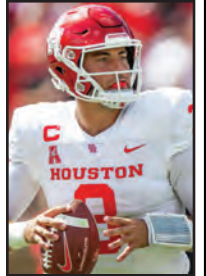
QB CLAYTON TUNE (ROUND 5a)

• **During his five years (2018-22) with the Cougars, was a three-time team captain and played in 47 games (44 starts), completing 956-of-1,497 pass attempts (63.9%) for 11,994 yards and 104 TDs. He also rushed for 1,248 yards and 15 TDs on 412 carries.**

• **He left Houston ranked second in school history in career TD passes (104) and TDs responsible for (119), third in completions (956) and fourth in victories (25).**

• In his final two years at Houston (2021-22), led the Cougars to a 20-7 record and **was named the MVP of the Birmingham Bowl (2021 vs. Auburn) and Offensive MVP of the Independence Bowl (2022 vs. Louisiana).**

• **As a junior in 2021, Tune led Houston to an 12-2 record, marking just the third season of 12+ wins in school history.**



LB OWEN PAPPOE (ROUND 5b)

• **A two-time team captain and 2022 Butkus Award semifinalist, started all 41 games played at Auburn dating back to his true freshman season in 2019.**

• Finished his college career with 256 tackles, 15.0 tackles for loss, 8.0 sacks, two INTs, nine passes defended, three forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

• **Despite his size (6-0, 225) is an exceptional athlete. Ran the fastest 40-yard dash time (4.39 seconds) of all linebackers at the 2023 NFL Combine. In fact, the only LB in Combine history to run the 40-yard dash faster was Shaq Griffin (4.38) in 2018.**

• **Graduated from Auburn in December of 2022 with a bachelor's degree in Exercise Science.**



CB KEI'TREL CLARK (ROUND 6a)

• After spending his freshman season (2018) at Liberty University, **played his final three seasons (2020-22) at Louisville where he was a two-time All-ACC selection who started 28-of-31 games played and recorded 127 tackles, five INTs (one returned for a TD), 28 passes defended, 9.5 tackles for loss, a sack and two fumble recoveries (one returned for a TD).**

• **Scored TDs on both takeaways in 2022. Clark had his first college TD on a 59-yard fumble return vs. Pittsburgh. The following week vs. Wake Forest, he returned an INT 46 yards for a TD.**



DL DANTE STILL (ROUND 6b)

• In his five years (2018-22) with the Mountaineers, started 26-of-58 games played and totaled 138 tackles, 52.5 tackles for loss, 23.5 sacks, an INT, five passes defended, six forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and two blocked kicks.

- **Played school-record 58 career games (36 starts)**
- **Set school career record in tackles for loss (52.5)**

CARDINALS HAVE NEW UNIFORMS IN 2023



In April, the Cardinals unveiled new uniforms that the team will wear this season.

The new uniforms were designed in collaboration with Nike in a process that spanned over three years. It began in late 2019 before being interrupted by COVID-19 a short time later and then re-starting. The end result is a product that is world-class in terms of both performance and aesthetics.

The Nike Vapor Field Utility Special Edition (F.U.S.E.) uniforms combine leading edge fabric technology with a precision fit. The stretch woven body fabric of Nike Vapor F.U.S.E. is made with at least 85% recycled nylon. Lightweight with superior breathability and mobility, it is also the first football uniform to meet Nike Dri-FIT standards for thermal regulation and airflow.

In terms of appearance, the sleek, new Cardinals uniforms feature three different styles:

HOME UNIFORM

The team's home uniform consists of red jerseys with matching red pants. The jersey features white, perforated twill numbers accented by silver, kiss cut framis material.

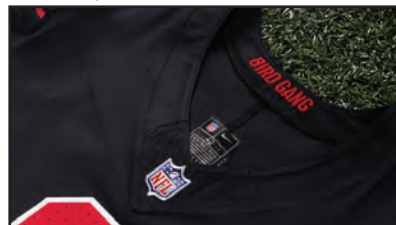
Sewn-in twill lettering spells out the "Arizona" wordmark that spans the front and a white thermoplastic polyurethane (TPU) Cardinals birdhead adorns the upper back. Embroidered in white lettering on the inside back of the red jersey's neckline is the phrase "Protect the Nest."



ALTERNATE BLACK UNIFORM

Also unveiled were the team's alternate uniforms that closely resemble the design of the road ones except that they are black from head to toe rather than white.

Like the white road uniform, the alternate black one also features red perforated numerals - though outlined in silver material - and its sleeves are also adorned with the same red and silver stripes and Cardinals wordmark. Similarly the black pants feature red and silver framis stripes down each side, identical to the white ones.



AWAY UNIFORM

On the road, the Cardinals will sport an all-white look from head to toe. Red perforated twill numerals outlined in black pop from the white jersey. In an homage to past Cardinals uniforms, its sleeves feature a pair of red framis stripes surrounding a single silver one with the Cardinals wordmark printed on it.

The upper back of the jersey features a three-color TPU Cardinals birdhead while the inner back neckline is embroidered with "Bird Gang" in red. The uniform's all-white pants are interrupted only by red and silver framis stripes down each side that mimic the stripes on the jersey's sleeves.



HELMET RE-DESIGN

Capping off the new look for the Cardinals is a re-designed helmet. Its white shell gets a subtle silver sparkle from Large Texas Flakes. This complements a new silver facemask that replaces the previous gray one. The helmets front and rear "bumpers" feature rubberized, 3-D Cardinals wordmarks in red.

The Cardinals logo on each side of the helmet is now larger and updated with digital shading and a metallic sheen. The white helmet accompanies the home and road uniforms while a black helmet is paired with the alternate black uniform.



ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

Owner **Michael Bidwill** has been steering the Cardinals organization for nearly two decades. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Michael continues a tradition of Bidwill ownership of the Cardinals that dates back to his grandfather, Hall of Famer Charles Bidwill, who purchased the team in 1933.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 16 seasons, after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).
- With an 11-6 record in 2021, the Cardinals reached 11+ wins in a season for the sixth time in franchise history. Three of those six 11-win campaigns came with Michael leading the team: 13 in 2015, 11 in 2014, 11 in 2021.
- Among Bidwill's most substantial accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has not only been critical for the franchise but has also resulted in over \$5 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.
- On February 12, 2023, State Farm Stadium hosted its third Super Bowl when a record 115 million viewers watched Super Bowl LVII. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- Since State Farm Stadium opened in 2006, the Cardinals have sold out 164 games at the venue (every non-pandemic game played there).
- In 2022, the Cardinals made their first-ever appearance on *Hard Knocks*, television's most acclaimed sports reality franchise. Arizona was the second team to be featured on *Hard Knocks In Season*, which documented the second half of the Cardinals 2022 campaign in real time.
- In January of 2016, the National Football Foundation (NFF) and College Hall of Fame inducted Bidwill and Governor Doug Ducey into the NFF Leadership Hall of Fame.

GAUTIER BECOMES 6TH BIDWILL FELLOWSHIP HIRE

In March, the Cardinals announced the addition of Blaine Gautier (GO-chay) to the coaching staff as the newest participant in the **Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship** program.

ABOUT THE BILL BIDWILL COACHING FELLOWSHIP: The Cardinals established the *Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship* prior to the 2015 season. Gautier is the sixth individual to participate in the program, which is designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities for coaching experience at the highest level. The three most recent participants advanced from the fellowship to full-time assistant coach positions – two on the Cardinals coaching staff and one at the NCAA level.

Long-time Cardinals owner **Bill Bidwill**, who passed away in 2019, was at the forefront of providing opportunities to individuals regardless of race or gender. In 2010, he was honored with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger Award for promoting diversity in the NFL. In 1978, Adele Harris became the first African American female executive in the NFL when she was hired as the Cardinals director of community relations. In 1981, Bidwill hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club. In 2004, the Cardinals became the first NFL team to have an African American general manager/head coach duo in Graves and Dennis Green.

A NEW GM IN THE DESERT

On January 16, the Cardinals announced the hiring of **Monti Ossenfort** as the team's general manager.

Ossenfort came to Arizona with 21 years of NFL experience (2002-22). That includes 15 with the New England Patriots and the past three as Director of Player Personnel with the Tennessee Titans.

During his time in New England, Ossenfort helped the Patriots win four Super Bowl titles and earn seven Super Bowl appearances overall. In 21 total NFL seasons, his teams earned postseason berths 16 times.

"It was critically-important for us to find the right person to lead us as General Manager and there is no doubt in my mind that we have that in Monti Ossenfort," said Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**. *"He possesses every attribute of a successful GM – passion, leadership, intelligence, work ethic – and his extensive experience has clearly prepared him for this role. We could not be more thrilled to have Monti and his family joining the Cardinals."*

Over the course of his 15 seasons with New England, Ossenfort served as the Director of College Scouting (2014-19), Assistant Director of College Scouting (2011-13), National Scout (2008-10), Area Scout (2006-07) and a Personnel Assistant (2003).

The 44-year old Ossenfort started his tenure in the NFL with Minnesota as a training camp intern in 2001 and worked with the Texans as a pro personnel intern in 2002. After spending 2003 with the Patriots, Ossenfort returned to Houston where he spent two seasons (2004-05) with the Texans as a pro and college scouting assistant. He rejoined the Patriots in 2006 where remained through the 2019 season.

Ossenfort was a four-year letterman and two-year starter at quarterback for the University of Minnesota-Morris and graduated from the school in 2000 with a degree in Economics and Management. He later earned a master's degree in Business Administration and Sports Management from Ohio University.

A native of Luverne, MN, Ossenfort and his wife, Shannon, have three daughters, Emery, Finley and Landry.



TRADES HIGHLIGHT OSSENFORT'S FIRST OFFSEASON

Ossenfort has kept busy in his first offseason as the Cardinals GM, particularly when it comes to trades. Dating back to the 2023 NFL Draft, he has executed seven trades: four draft-day trades and three more during training camp/preseason.

Those transactions netted QB Josh Dobbs and six picks in the 2024 NFL Draft.

A LOOK INSIDE OSSENFORT'S FIRST DRAFT

Ossenfort executed four trades in the first three rounds of this year's draft.

Arizona entered the draft with eight selections and the team used only three of those original picks (#168, #180, #213) - including one (#168) - that was traded to Detroit in round one only to be acquired back by Arizona in day two.

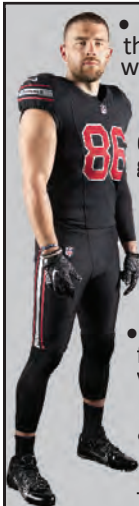

ZACH ERTZ - AT A GLANCE



- Selected by Philadelphia in the 2nd round (35th overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft and was acquired by Arizona in a trade with the Eagles in Week 6 of the 2021 season.
- A three-time Pro Bowl selection (2017-19), has appeared in 145 games (107 starts) during the regular season with 688 receptions for 7,268 yards and 45 TDs. Also has 12 games with 100+ receiving yards.
- In eight career playoff games (six starts), has 36 receptions for 381 yards and two TDs.
- Caught game-winning TD in Super Bowl LII that gave the Eagles a 38-33 lead with just over two minutes left in regulation.
- In just 22 games with the Cardinals, already ranks 5th in franchise history in receptions (109) and 9th in receiving yards (1,001) among TEs.

NFL LEADER

- Dating back to his first season in 2013, ranks 2nd in receptions (688), 3rd in receiving yards (7,268) and 4th in TD receptions (45) and 100-yard receiving games (12) among TEs.

NFL HISTORY

- His 688 receptions rank 8th in NFL history among TEs. From 2013-22, his 682 receptions were the fourth-highest total in NFL history by a TE through his first 10 seasons trailing only Travis Kelce (814), Jason Witten (806) and Tony Gonzalez (721).
- In NFL history, the only TEs to reach 650 receptions in fewer games than Ertz (137) were Travis Kelce (117) and Jason Witten (133).
- Set the NFL single-season record for receptions by a TE with 116 catches in 2018, surpassing the mark of Jason Witten (110 in 2012).
- Playing his first game with Arizona in Week 7 vs. Houston, caught a 47-yard TD reception. Combined with his five-yard TD catch in Week 6 in his final game with Philly, became the first player in NFL history with a TD reception in back-to-back games in a season for two different teams.
- Ertz (6) joins Tony Gonzalez (14), Jason Witten (9), Travis Kelce (8) and Antonio Gates (6) as the only TEs in NFL history with at least six seasons of 70+ receptions.
- Ertz (7) joins Tony Gonzalez (14), Jason Witten (12), Antonio Gates (10), Shannon Sharpe (9) and Travis Kelce (9) as the only TEs in NFL history with at least seven seasons of 700+ receiving yards.

AMONG NFL'S MOST PROLIFIC TIGHT ENDS

Since entering the NFL as a second round (35th overall) pick by the Eagles in the 2013 NFL Draft, Ertz has developed into one of the most prolific TEs in NFL history.

Below is a look at some of his achievements from his first 10 NFL seasons.

SIX SEASONS WITH 70+ RECEPTIONS

Ertz is one of just five TEs in NFL history to have at least six seasons of 70+ receptions in their career.

A SEASON OF MILESTONES IN 2022

TE Zach Ertz was among the Cardinals top offensive weapons in 11 games with the team in 2021 - after he was acquired in an October trade with the Philadelphia Eagles.

He was even better in 2022 before a knee injury cut his season short after 10 games. At the time of his injury, Ertz ranked second in the NFL among TEs with 47 receptions.

JAMES CONNER - AT A GLANCE



- Signed a one-year contract with the Cardinals on 4/13/21 as an unrestricted free agent following four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh. Re-signed with Arizona in March of 2022, agreeing to a three-year contract.

- He is a two-time Pro Bowl selection (2018, '21), two-time Player of the Week (Week 8 of 2018; Week 8 of 2019) and one-time Player of the Month (October of 2018) selection.

CARDINALS HIGHLIGHTS

- Earned Pro Bowl honors for the second time in his career during his inaugural season with Arizona in 2021, becoming just the fifth Cardinals RB to be named to the Pro Bowl during his first season with the team: Ollie Matson (1952), Johnny Roland (1966), Ottis Anderson (1979) and Johnny Johnson (1990).

- Has scored 26 TDs in his first 29 games with the Cardinals. In franchise history only RB David Johnson (28) had more TDs in his first 29 games with the team. Conner's 26 TDs rank second in the NFL (Austin Ekeler - 39) from 2021-23. His 22 rushing TDs through 29 games as a Cardinal are the second-most in franchise history in a player's first 29 games with the team.

- Finished the 2022 season with 1,082 scrimmage yards and eight TDs in 13 games. It marked his second consecutive season with 1,000+ scrimmage yards in Arizona, after posting just one 1,000-yard campaign in four years with Pittsburgh.

- Earned Pro Bowl honors in 2021 after playing in 15 games (six starts) during the regular season, finishing the year with 752 yards and 15 rushing TDs on 202 rushing attempts while adding 37 receptions for 375 yards and three TDs. Also scored the Cardinals lone TD in the Wild Card matchup.

- His 18 total TDs in 2021 marked the second-highest single-season total in Cardinals history and ranked third in the NFL that year. His 15 rushing TDs also represented the second-highest single-season total in team annals and ranked second in the NFL.

- All 18 of his TDs during the 2021 regular season came in his final 13 games played. Had six games with multiple TDs in '21, joining RB David Johnson (8 in 2016) as the only players in franchise history to have at least six such performances in a single season.

- Had at least one TD (rushing or receiving) in seven consecutive games (Games 7-13) in 2021, tied for the longest streak in franchise history. Included in that stretch was a streak of five straight games with a rushing TD, tying the longest such streak in team history.

- Rushed for two TDs in a Week 10 win at the Los Angeles Rams in 2022, marking the 13th game of his career with two-or-more TDs. Since entering the NFL in 2017, his 13 games with two-or-more TDs is tied for the sixth-most league-wide among RBs.

- In 2022 had a streak of six consecutive games with a TD (Games 10-15), tying the third longest streak in team history. In the Cardinals first 101 seasons (1920-20) as an NFL franchise, a player had a streak of six consecutive games with a TD in a single season just twice. Conner has had a streak of 6+ games in each of the last two seasons.

CAREER/PERSONAL HIGHLIGHTS

- Earned his first career Pro Bowl selection with the Steelers in 2018, when he rushed for 12 TDs (third in the NFL) and 973 yards on 215 carries (4.5 avg.) while catching 55 passes for 497 yards a TD in just 13 games.

- With the Steelers, appeared in 50 games (33 starts) and ran for 2,302 yards and 22 TDs on 532 carries (4.3-yard avg.) along with 124 receptions for 963 yards and four TDs.

- After tearing his MCL during the first game of his junior year at the University of Pittsburgh (2015), attended rehab and began experiencing excessive fatigue and other concerning symptoms, leading doctors to perform a chest X-ray that revealed Hodgkin's Lymphoma. He endured 12 rounds of chemotherapy and completed his last chemo appointment on May 9, 2016. On May 23, 2016, he announced that he was cancer free.

- The doctor who treated Conner, Dr. Stanley Marks, started the Stanley M. Marks Blood Cancer Research Fund and at his annual fundraiser gives out the "James Conner Courage Award." Conner was on hand in 2022 to present the award to Carrie Richards, one of the nurses who helped in his treatment and later went through the same diagnosis.

- Played in 39 games in four seasons at Pitt (2013-16), and left ranked second in school history in rushing yards (3,733), total TDs (56) and rushing TDs (52), trailing only Tony Dorsett in all three.

#6 EXCEEDS 1,000 FOR SECOND STRAIGHT YEAR

RB James Conner finished the 2022 season with 1,082 scrimmage yards in 13 games played.

After posting 1,000+ scrimmage yards just once in his first four NFL seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh, Conner surpassed 1,000 scrimmage yards in both seasons with the Cardinals (1,127 in 2021).

Conner rushed for 782 yards and seven TDs on 183 carries (4.3 avg.) in 2022. His 782 rushing yards represent the second-best single-season total of his career (973 in 2018).

A STRONG FINISH IN 2022

Conner had his six best rushing yardage totals of the season in his last seven games played.

In that seven-game stretch, Conner rushed for 537 yards and six TDs on 122 carries (4.4 avg.).

After posting 75+ rushing yards just twice in his first 23 games with the Cardinals, Conner had 75+ rushing yards in four of his last five games played in 2022.

Against the Chargers in Week 12, Conner rushed for 120 yards on 25 carries (4.8 avg.). **It was his first 100-yard outing as a member of the Cardinals.**



CONNER UPS THE SCORING IN ARIZONA

After scoring one TD in his first six games played last season, RB James Conner had seven TDs in his last seven games played.

Conner signed with the Cardinals as a free agent in 2021 and has 26 TDs since then. Only Chargers RB Austin Ekeler (39) had more scrimmage TDs over the last three seasons (2021-23).

DORTCH MAKES MOST OF OPPORTUNITIES IN 2022

During his first four seasons (2018-21) in the NFL, WR Greg Dortch spent time with five teams (Jets, Panthers, Rams, Falcons and Cardinals) and was released six different times.

He appeared in just seven games and had three receptions for 15 yards during that span. In his second season with Arizona in 2022, Dortch developed into a key contributor for the Cardinals.

In 16 games (4 starts) in 2022, Dortch had:

- **52 receptions for 467 yards and 2 TDs**
- **7 rush attempts for 44 yards**
- **26 punt returns for 172 yards**
- **11 kickoff returns for 218 yards**

He joined DeAndre Hopkins and Rondale Moore as the only Cardinals players with multiple games of 90+ receiving yards in 2022 - including his first-ever 100-yard game (103) vs. San Francisco in Week 11 on Monday Night Football.

DORTCH HIGHLIGHTS IN 2022

WEEK 16 VS. TAMPA BAY: Against the Buccaneers on Sunday Night Football, Dortch finished with a career-high 123 scrimmage yards. He had 98 receiving yards on a career-high 10 receptions while also finishing with a career-high 25 rushing yards on three carries.

WEEK 11 VS. SAN FRANCISCO: Against the 49ers in Mexico City on Monday Night Football, Dortch hauled in 9 receptions for 103 yards. It was the first 100-yard receiving performance of his career.

WEEK 2 AT LAS VEGAS: Dortch scored his first career TD in the OT win over the Raiders, hauling in a five-yard catch in the third quarter. It was Dortch's first TD catch since in his sophomore year at Wake Forest in 2018.



HOLLYWOOD LEADS THE WAY IN 2022

Acquired via trade during the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft, WR Marquise Brown **played 12 games (10 starts) in his first season with the Cardinals and led the team in receptions (67) and ranked second in receiving yards (709) while adding three TD catches.**

Brown was off to the best start of his career in 2022 before suffering a foot injury in Week 6 that forced him to IR. He missed five games before returning in Week 12 vs. the Chargers.

In his first six games played prior to the injury, Brown led the team in receptions (43), receiving yards (485) and TD receptions (3).

Only two players in franchise history had more receptions through the first six games of a season than Brown had in 2022 (43).

At the time of his injury, Brown's 43 receptions ranked fifth in the NFL and his 485 receiving yards ranked seventh.

In Week 3 vs. the Rams, Brown had a career-high 14 receptions for 140 yards. In addition to setting a career high for the fourth year pro, it also tied for the second-highest single-game total in franchise history.

MOORE STAYS HOT DESPITE INJURIES

Second-year WR Rondale Moore struggled with injuries at the beginning and the end of the 2022 season, but his performance in the eight games he did appear in showed the type of explosive talent he can be.

In eight games played last year (which includes one in which he played just two snaps), Moore totaled 41 receptions for 414 yards and a TD.

Moore was playing the best football of his NFL career when he suffered a season-ending injury early in the Week 11 matchup vs. San Francisco.

In his final three full games played in 2022, Moore had 24 receptions for 255 yards and a TD. A look at how good Moore was over that stretch:

- **Of his 3 career outings with 90+ receiving yards, 2 came in those last 3 games: 92 @ Min & 94 @ LAR**
- **Of his 6 career outings with 7+ receptions, 3 came in those last 3 games: 7 @ Min; 8 vs. Sea; 9 @ LAR**
- **In his first 18 career games Moore had 60+ receiving yards 3 times; he had 60+ in each of the last 3 full games he played in 2022**

Moore's last full game played in 2022 was the Week 10 win over the Rams in Los Angeles when he finished with nine receptions for 94 yards. Of those 94 yards, 26 came on a spectacular one-handed catch along the sideline on a 4th-n-3, extending a drive that resulted in a TD two plays later.



AZ FEATURES A DEEP THREAT IN BROWN

On the first day of the 2022 NFL Draft, the Cardinals sent their first-round pick (#23 overall) to the Baltimore Ravens in exchange for WR Marquise "Hollywood" Brown and the Ravens '22 third-round pick (#100 overall).

Baltimore's first round pick (25th overall) in the 2019 NFL Draft, **Brown has 265 receptions for 3,098 yards and 24 TDs in 59 games (52 starts) in his career.**

Since he entered the league in 2019, only five players in the NFL have more TD receptions of 20+ yards than Brown (13). Only five have more TD catches of 40+ yards than Brown (7).

MCBRIDE FLASHES IN ROOKIE CAMPAIGN

Cardinals TE Trey McBride - selected in the second round (55th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft - saw his production increase significantly in the latter part of last season.

The 2021 John Mackey Award winner **had just four total receptions for 38 yards in his first nine games played in 2022. Then his production spiked.**

In his last seven games in '22, McBride hauled in 25 passes for 227 yards and a TD. He had at least three receptions in five of the last six games.

In 2022, McBride had:

- **More receptions in his last four games (17) than he had in his first 12 (12).**
- **Nearly three-times as many receiving yards in the last four games (191) as he had in the first 12 (74).**

McBride had his best game of the season in Week 17 at Atlanta when he hauled in his first TD and set season highs in receptions (7) and receiving yards (78).



THE RELATIONSHIP RUNS DEEP

WR Marquise Brown received his nickname "Hollywood" during his time at the University of Oklahoma. It was with the Sooners that Brown met - and became best friends with - Cardinals QB Kyler Murray.

Brown and Murray played together with the Sooners for two seasons (2017-18), including in 2018 when Brown had 75 receptions for 1,318 yards and 10 TDs. That season, Brown led the nation in receptions of 40+ yards (11), 50+ yards (7) and 60+ yards (4) and Murray won the Heisman Trophy.



They were both selected in the first round of the 2019 NFL Draft - Murray #1 overall to Arizona and Brown #25 overall to Baltimore. Even though they were not playing together, the two continued to work out together in the offseason.

"In college you go through more with your quarterback than in the NFL," Brown said of the tight bond. "Me and Kyler, we got in together, we were on the 'B' squad against the starting defense (at Oklahoma) to all the way to both of us playing."

BUDDA BAKER - AT A GLANCE

• Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (36th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Washington, Baker has appeared in 94 games (84 starts) during the regular season.

• A five-time Pro Bowl selection, three-time All-Pro honoree, one-time NFC Defensive Player of the Month (Oct. 2020) and one-time NFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 6 in 2020).

NFL LEADER

• The 2022 season marked his fourth season with 100+ tackles. Dating back to his first season as a starter in 2018, Baker is the only DB in the NFL with at least four seasons of 100+ tackles.

• Since entering the league in 2017, leads all NFL DBs in total tackles (637) and solo tackles (457). His 637 total tackles are 62 more than the player who ranks second on the list (Jordan Poyer - 575).

CARDINALS HISTORY

• Voted a team captain for the fourth consecutive year (2020-23) and earned his fifth Pro Bowl selection as a starter (fourth consecutive at safety) in 2022.

• Became just the third player in Cardinals history to receive at least five Pro Bowl selections in his first six NFL seasons joining Patrick Peterson (6) and Ollie Matson (6).

• Led the team with 111 tackles in just 15 games in 2022, adding seven passes defended, two INTs, two QB hits and a fumble recovery.

• In 2021, was named a team captain and earned Pro Bowl and second-team All-Pro honors after posting 98 tackles and establishing career-best marks in INTs (three) and passes defended (seven). Also added a fumble recovery, six tackles for loss and three QB hits.

• Named a team captain for the first time, earned first-team All-Pro honors and was selected to his third Pro Bowl (second consecutive at safety) in 2020, joining CB Patrick Peterson (4) as the only players in Cardinals history to earn at least three Pro Bowl selections before their 25th birthday. Matched a team high and tied for the NFL lead among DBs with 118 tackles while adding seven tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB hits, two INTs, six passes defended and a forced fumble over 15 games.

• Earned his second Pro Bowl nod (first at safety) in 2019 becoming the first player in franchise history selected to the Pro Bowl as a special teamer and as a position player. Started all 16 games and led all NFL DBs with a career-high 147 tackles (including a league-high 104 solo tackles) and posted seven tackles for loss, six passes defended, six QB hits, a half-sack, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

• In 2018, appeared in 14 games (13 starts) and totaled 107 tackles, eight tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB pressures, four QB hits, two passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries (one returned 36 yards for his first career TD); one of just three NFL safeties with 100+ tackles, 2.0+ sacks and 8+ tackles for loss in 2018, according to league statistics.

• Named first-team All-Pro and was voted to the Pro Bowl for his work on special teams as a rookie in 2017 after he led the Cardinals and ranked third in the NFL with 16 special teams tackles. One of just four rookies named to the Pro Bowl in 2017 and became just the fifth Cardinals rookie since the 1970 merger to be named to the Pro Bowl.

• Became the fourth player in Cardinals history to be voted "NFC Defensive Player" of the Month (October, 2020) with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, two INTs (90 return yards), three tackles for loss, three QB hits, two passes defended and a forced fumble in three games.

PERSONAL

• During a remarkable prep career at Bellevue High School, won five team state titles (three in football, two in track & field) and eight individual state titles in track & field. In football, he played safety, running back and return specialist on a team that won 42 consecutive games and three consecutive 3A Washington State Championships. Won both the Seattle Times State Football Player of the Year and Male Athlete of the Year as a senior in 2013.

• Rushed for 101 yards and a score in the 2013 state title game. Scored on a 61-yard run and a 71-yard punt return in the 2012 state championship game. Scored on an 89-yard kickoff return in Bellevue's 2011 state title victory.

• Given first name is Bishard. Nicknamed "Budda" by his mother and aunt when he was a child and the name stuck.



BAKER REACHES 100 FOR THE FOURTH TIME

Pro Bowl S Budda Baker posted 111 tackles in 15 games played in 2022 before a shoulder injury forced him to miss the final two games of the season. Through Week 16, his 111 tackles ranked fourth among NFL DBs.

Baker recorded his second INT of 2022 when he picked off a Brett Rypien pass at the AZ 1-yard line late in the third quarter at Denver in Week 15.

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker has seven INTs in his last 44 games played.



BAKER EARNS 5TH PRO BOWL SELECTION

S Budda Baker was selected as a starter for the NFC squad in the Pro Bowl in 2022.

• Named to his 5th Pro Bowl and 4th consecutive selection at safety after being chosen as a special teamer during his rookie campaign in 2017.

• Became just the third player in Cardinals history to receive at least five Pro Bowl nods in his first six NFL seasons joining Patrick Peterson (6) and Ollie Matson (6).

• Became just the third player in franchise history named to the Pro Bowl as a safety at least four times joining Hall of Famer Larry Wilson (8) and Adrian Wilson (5).

• Is the only safety in the NFL named to the Pro Bowl each of the last four seasons (2019-22).

• Only two other active DBs have earned at least five Pro Bowl selections in their first six NFL seasons - CBs Patrick Peterson (6) and Jalen Ramsey (5). Just two active NFL DBs have more career Pro Bowls than Baker: Peterson (8) and S Harrison Smith (6).



TWO SAFETIES TOP 105 TACKLES IN 2022

S Budda Baker (111) and S Jalen Thompson (109) both totaled over 105 tackles during the 2022 campaign. Some highlights of the duo's significant season in the secondary:

• Among DBs, Baker and Thompson were one of two sets of teammates to each register 105+ tackles in 2022 (S Jalen Pitre & S Jonathan Owens, Hou).

• Baker (7th) and Thompson (8th) both finished in the top 10 in tackles among DBs in 2022.

• It marked Thompson's second consecutive season with 105+ tackles (121 in 2021) and Baker's third time accomplishing the feat (147 in 2019 and 118 in 2020).

• Baker and Thompson are the first pair of Cardinals DBs since at least 2000 to each register 105+ tackles in a single season.

• Arizona has had a DB register 105+ tackles in each of the past five seasons.



WHITE FOLLOWS GANNON & RALLIS TO AZ

New to the Cardinals defense in 2023 is LB **Kyzir White** - signed by Arizona as a free agent in the offseason.

After spending his first four NFL seasons (2018-21) with the Chargers, White played last season in Philadelphia under then-defensive coordinator **Jonathan Gannon** and LBs coach **Nick Rallis**. White was named a team captain for the first time in his career in 2023.

WHITE CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Has played in 66 games (46 starts) during the regular season and has 396 tackles (248 solo), 17 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, four INTs, 17 passes defended and two forced fumbles.

- Appeared in all 17 regular season games (eight starts) last season with Philadelphia and had 110 tackles (66 solo), three tackles for loss, 1.5 sacks, seven passes defended and five QB pressures.

- With the Chargers in 2021, set career highs in games started (17), tackles (144), solo tackles (90), tackles for loss (7), INTs (2) and forced fumbles (2). He ranked third in the AFC in tackles in 2021 and had seven double-digit tackle games, the most for a Chargers player since 2008.



EXCITING YOUNG TALENT ON THE OUTSIDE

One of the second-year players who flashed as a rookie in 2022 was LB **Camaron Thomas**, taken by the Cardinals in the third round (87th overall) in the 2022 NFL Draft.

Thomas appeared in 16 games last season, finishing the year with 18 tackles, 3.0 sacks, six QB hits, three tackles for loss and a pass defended.

THOMAS - 2022 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

WEEK 6 @ SEATTLE: In Arizona's October visit to Seattle, the rookie recorded his first career sack. Thomas took down Seahawks QB Geno Smith in the first quarter.

WEEK 12 VS. LOS ANGELES CHARGERS: In a narrow, 25-24, loss to the Los Angeles Chargers, Thomas brought down Chargers QB Justin Herbert for a three-yard loss in the first quarter.

Thomas came out strong in the 2023 season opener at Washington. He scored the first TD of his NFL career after recovering a Sam Howell fumble and returning it two yards for a TD.



THOMPSON A TOP TACKLER

Over the last two seasons, **Jalen Thompson** has emerged as one of the Cardinals top defenders. **From 2021-23, only Los Angeles Chargers All-Pro S Derwin James has more tackles among NFL DBs.**

According to the Elias Sports Bureau, in his final game of the season (Week 16 vs. Tampa Bay), Wilson recorded four tackles and two interceptions of Buccaneers QB Tom Brady. Wilson became just the 13th player ever and last to intercept Brady multiple times in a single game.



MATT PRATER - AT A GLANCE



- A two-time Pro Bowl selection (2013; 2016), joined the Cardinals in 2021 after 14 seasons with the Lions (2014-20), Broncos (2007-13) and Falcons (2007).
- Has made 376-of-451 FG attempts (83.4%) and 556-of-571 PATs (97.4%) in his 234 career games after entering the league as an undrafted rookie free agent with Detroit in 2006.

- Leads all active NFL players with 1,684 career points. In 2022, became just the 21st player in NFL history – and just the third active player at the time – to reach 1,600+ career points.

- Holds NFL records for most PATs in a single season (75), career FGs of 50+ yards (72), consecutive made FGs of 50+ yards (14), consecutive FG conversions of 55+ yards (seven) and previously held the league record for the longest FG made (64 yards). - In Cardinals history, a player has had at least five made FGs of 50+ yards in a season four times, and Prater is responsible for two of those campaigns (7 in 2021; 5 in 2022).

- In his first season with Arizona in 2021, established a franchise record and tied his career high with seven made FGs of 50+ yards during the regular season, including a franchise record 62-yarder in Week 2 vs. Minnesota. In the Wild Card matchup vs. the Rams, connected on the longest FG (55 yards) in franchise postseason history.

- Ended the 2021 season with 137 total points (30 FG, 47 PAT), the second-highest single-season total in franchise history. It was his 11th career season with 100+ points, the most among active players.

- Holds the franchise record for longest FG with Arizona (62 yards), Denver (64) and Detroit (59, twice).

- Has connected on all 16 game-winning FG attempts with two minutes or less remaining in the fourth quarter and OT (11-of-11 in regulation and 5-of-5 in OT). Most recent game-winner came with Detroit when he connected on a 59-yarder as time expired to give the Lions a 30-27 victory vs. Washington in Week 10 of the 2020 season.

- Named Special Teams Player of the Month four times and Special Teams Player of the Week 14 times, trailing only Adam Vinatieri (19) for the most "Special Teams Player of the Week" awards in NFL history by a kicker.

SUCCESS WEEK IN AND WEEK OUT

Over his last five games, Prater has made six FGs of 50+ yards. That included a 55-yarder in Week 15 of 2022 against the Broncos, a 56-yarder in Week 16 vs. Tampa Bay and a 57-yarder in Week 17 at Atlanta.

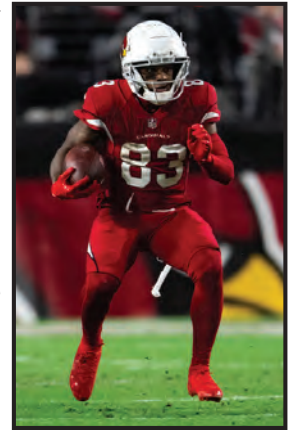
RETURNING RETURNER

Dortch also handled punt return duties while in college at Wake Forest. In his final season with the Demon Deacons in 2018, he returned a pair of punts for TDs in a single game. Dortch brought back three returns for 131 yards and two TDs on the night, becoming just the fourth player in ACC history to accomplish that feat.



SPECIAL TEAMS STAPLES

Since entering the NFL in 2018, LB Ezekiel Turner (46) and LB Dennis Gardeck (42) have each registered 40+ career special teams tackles. **Turner and Gardeck are the only set of teammates to have each totaled 40+ special teams for a single team in that time frame (2018-23).**

Turner and Gardeck are just the seventh and eighth Cardinals, respectively, since 2001 to register 40+ special teams tackles with Arizona.

In addition to their contributions on special teams, Gardeck and Turner also saw action at linebacker last season as Gardeck made three starts and Turner made one. Gardeck started Week 1 of the 2023 season at linebacker and had 2.0 sacks and one forced fumble.



CORYELL GOES INTO HALL OF FAME

Former Cardinals head coach Don Coryell was among the nine individuals inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame Class of 2023 at the Hall's enshrinement ceremony on August 5 in Canton, OH.

Coryell served as the Cardinals head coach from 1973-77, compiling a 42-29-1 record with the team. His 42 wins as head coach rank as the third-highest total in franchise history and Coryell was the first coach in team history to lead the Cardinals to 10+ wins in three consecutive seasons. Coryell led the Cardinals to back-to-back division titles in 1974-75. After leading the Cardinals to a 10-4 record and an NFC Eastern Division title in 1974, Coryell was named the Associated Press NFL Coach of the Year.



Under Coryell, the Cardinals became known as the "Cardiac Cards" for their thrilling brand of football. In 1975 the team won five games in the final minute and the next season, eight of the team's 10 wins were decided by seven points or fewer.

Known for his innovative "Air Coryell" passing attack which produced some of the top passing offenses in NFL history, Coryell spent 14 seasons as a head coach in the NFL with the Cardinals (1973-77) and Chargers (1978-86) and compiled a 111-83-1 record (.572) while earning five division titles.

In a coaching career that spanned 36 years, Coryell was the first coach ever to win more than 100 games at both the college and NFL level. A former defensive back at the University of Washington, he was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 1999. Coryell passed away in 2010 at the age of 85.

QUARTERBACKS

Joshua Dobbs – Seven-year NFL veteran who was acquired by Arizona in a trade with Cleveland on 8/24/23. Started AZ's season opener 17 days after being acquired where he completed 21-of-30 passing attempts for 132 yards. Started the final two games of 2022 for the Titans just eight days after joining the team. It marked the first starts of his career and he completed 40-of-68 passes for 411 yards and two TDs.

Clayton Tune – Arizona's fifth-round (139th overall) draft choice out of Houston. Played 47 games (44 starts) and completed 956-of-1,497 pass attempts (63.9%) for 11,994 yards and 104 TDs with the Cougars.

RUNNING BACKS

James Conner – Two-time Pro Bowler (2018, 2021) who signed with Arizona in 2021 after four seasons (2017-20) with Pittsburgh. Has scored 26 TDs in 29 games with the Cardinals.

Emari Demercado – Undrafted rookie out of TCU where he finished his career with 338 carries for 1,615 yards and 10 TDs. Made his Cardinals debut last Sunday.

Keaontay Ingram – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (201st overall) in 2022 out of USC. Scored his first career TD (three-yard run) last season in a win vs. NO.

TIGHT ENDS

Zach Ertz – Eleven-year NFL veteran, three-time Pro Bowler (2017-19) and first-team All-Pro (2018). His 688 career receptions rank eighth in NFL history among TEs. Is just 25 receptions away from passing Jimmy Graham for seventh.

Elijah Higgins – Entered the NFL as a sixth round draft choice by the Dolphins in 2023 out of Stanford. Was claimed off of waivers by Arizona on 8/30/23. Earned All-Pac-12 honorable mention honors as a senior after leading Stanford with a career-high 704 receiving yards on 59 receptions.

Trey McBride – Appeared in 16 games (13 starts) as a rookie in 2022 and tallied 29 receptions for 265 yards and one TD. Of his 265 receiving yards in 2022, 219 came in the final five games. Originally a second-round pick (55th overall) in 2022 out of Colorado State.

Geoff Swaim – Signed with AZ on 7/25/23. A nine-year NFL veteran who has played 87 career games (57 starts) with the Cowboys (2015-18), Jaguars (2019), Titans (2020-22) and Cardinals (2023). Has 100 career receptions for 752 yards.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Marquise Brown – Played three seasons (2019-21) in Baltimore before being acquired by Arizona in a draft-day trade in 2022. Had a team-high 67 receptions for 709 yards and three TDs in 12 games played in 2022. Had a career-long 29-yard run in Week 1 at Washington.

Greg Dortch – Set career-highs in receptions (52), receiving yards (467) and touchdowns (two) with the Cardinals in 2022 after appearing in 16 games (four starts).

Rondale Moore – Selected by the Cardinals in the second-round (49th overall) in 2021 out of Purdue. Has 98 receptions for 882 yards and two TDs over 23 games (16 starts) in his first three NFL seasons.

Zach Pascal – Has 165 receptions for 2,038 yards and 16 TDs over 82 games played (46 starts) with Indianapolis (2018-21), Philadelphia (2022) and Arizona (2023).

Michael Wilson – Selected by Arizona in the third-round (94th overall) in 2023 out of Stanford. Totaled 134 receptions for 1,662 yards and 11 TDs over five years (2018-22). Started in his NFL debut at Washington and brought in a pair of receptions for 19 yards.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Kelvin Beachum – Selected by Pittsburgh in the seventh round (248th overall) in 2012 and has started 147 of 152 games played with the Steelers (2012-15), Jaguars (2016), Jets (2017-19) and Cardinals (2020-23). Only player to start every game on offense for Arizona in 2022.

Trystan Colon – Claimed off waivers by Arizona from the New York Jets on 8/30/23. Made his Cardinals debut 11 days later at Washington. Spent first three NFL seasons with Baltimore (2020-22) where he appeared in 20 games, including three starts at right guard and one at center.

Hjalte Froholdt – Native of Denmark who entered the NFL as a fourth-round draft choice (118th overall) by New England in 2019. Has appeared in 32 games (seven starts) in three seasons with New England (2020), Cleveland (2021-22) and Arizona (2023).

Will Hernandez – A second-round pick by the Giants in 2018, signed with Arizona as a free agent in the 2022 offseason. Started all 14 games he has appeared in at RG for AZ.

D.J. Humphries – Cardinals first-round pick (24th overall) in 2015 out of Florida, has started all 84 NFL games played, including all 74 at LT since 2016. Longest tenured Cardinal.

Keith Ismael – Joined Arizona via waivers on 8/30/23. Appeared in 18 games (five starts) over his first two seasons in the NFL (2020-21) with Washington before spending the 2022 season on the 49ers practice squad.

Paris Johnson Jr. – Cardinals first-round pick (6th overall) in 2023 out of Ohio State. Appeared in 31 games (26 starts) for the Buckeyes and earned unanimous first-team All-American honors as a junior in 2022. His father, Paris Sr., was a fifth-round pick by the Cardinals in 1999. Started at RT in the season opener at Washington.

Iim Manning – Native of Glendale, AZ and graduate of Apollo HS who joined Arizona via waivers from San Francisco on 8/30/23. Played collegiately at Hawaii where he started 60-of-62 games appeared in and was a three-time All-Mountain West Selection.

Carter O'Donnell – Claimed off of waivers on 9/4/23 after three seasons (2020-22) between the Colts active roster and practice squad. Native of Red Deer, Alberta, Canada.

Elijah Wilkinson – Has appeared in 67 games (37 starts) with Denver (2017-20), Chicago (2021), Atlanta (2022) and Arizona (2023). Started in his Cardinals debut at Washington. Helped block for a 1,000-yard rusher in four of his six seasons in the NFL, including each of his first three years.

SPECIALISTS

Aaron Brewer – Entered the league with the Broncos as a rookie free agent and has played 163 regular season and nine playoff games with Denver (2012-15) and Arizona (2016-23).

Nolan Cooney – Originally entered the NFL as a rookie free agent with the Saints in 2021 out of Syracuse. Spent the 2022 season between the Colts and Cardinals practice squads. Averaged 47.1 net yards over his 10 punts in the 2023 preseason, which led the NFL. Had five punts for 235 yards (47.0 avg.) in his NFL debut at Washington, two of which he placed inside the 20-yard line.

Matt Prater – Two-time Pro Bowler (2013, 2016) and active NFL leader in career points (1,684). Holds the NFL record for FGs of 50+ yards (72). Joined Arizona in 2021 after 14 seasons with the Lions, Broncos and Falcons. Has six FGs of 50+ yards (50, 53, 55, 56, 57, 54) over his last five games.



DEFENSIVE LINE

L.J. Collier – Was selected 29th overall by Seattle in 2019 out of TCU. Appeared in 46 games (17 starts) and tallied 42 tackles, five passes defended and 3.0 sacks in five seasons in Seattle (2019-22) and Arizona (2023). Started in his Cardinals debut at Washington.

Leki Fotu – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (114th overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. Has appeared in 46 games (13 starts) for Arizona. Sacked Commanders QB Sam Howell in Week 1, marking the 2nd of his career.

Jonathan Ledbetter – Originally signed with Miami as an undrafted free agent in 2019, has played in 17 NFL games with the Dolphins and Cardinals, including 14 games (3 starts) with Arizona in 2022. Matched career highs in tackles (6) and sacks (1.0) in the 2023 season opener at Washington.

Dante Stills – Cardinals sixth-round pick (213th overall) in 2023 out of West Virginia. Left campus as the Mountaineers' all-time leader in TFLs (52.5) and a four-time All-Big 12 honoree, including a two-time first-team selection. Is the fourth member of his family to play in the NFL.

Kevin Strong – Five-year NFL veteran who's appeared in 37 games with Detroit (2019-21), Tennessee (2021-22) and Arizona (2023). Set career highs in games played (16), tackles (23) and passes defended (two) in 2022. Had two tackles a pass defended, which helped lead to a Zaven Collins INT, in his Cardinals debut at Washington.

Carlos Watkins – Originally a fourth-round (142nd overall) draft choice by Houston in 2017. Has appeared in 70 games (36 starts) over seven seasons with Houston (2017-20), Dallas (2021-22) and Arizona (2023). Had five tackles and a sack in his Cardinals debut against the Commanders.

LINEBACKERS

Krys Barnes – Began his career as an undrafted free agent with Green Bay in 2020. Appeared in 36 games (24 starts) and totaled 188 tackles over four seasons with the Packers (2020-22) and Cardinals (2023).

Zaven Collins – Selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) in 2021 out of Tulsa. Set career highs with 100 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 11.0 TFLs, six passes defended and an INT returned for a TD in 2022. Had an INT and fumble recovery in Week 1, becoming the first Cardinal to do so in a single game since 2016 (DB Justin Bethel).

Victor Dimukeje – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (210th overall) in 2021 out of Duke. Has played in 29 games (three starts) in first three seasons and has 15 tackles, 1.0 sack and one forced fumble. Started in Week 1 at Washington and had his first career sack and forced fumble.

Dennis Gardeck – Named a Pro Bowl alternate (special teams) in 2019 and 2022. Selected as a team captain each of the last four seasons (2020-23). Signed by Arizona as an undrafted free agent out of Sioux Falls in 2018. Had his fourth career multi-sack game and forced a fumble in Week 1.

Jesse Luketa – Selected by Arizona in the seventh round (256th overall) of the 2022 NFL Draft out of Penn State. A native of Ottawa, Ontario, played in 46 games in four seasons (2018-21) at Penn State and earned All-Big 10 Third-Team honors as a senior. Saw action in seven games as a rookie.

BJ Ojulari – Cardinals second-round pick (41st overall) in 2023 out of LSU. Saw action in 34 games (24 starts) in three years at LSU (2020-22). Totaled 129 tackles and 16.5 sacks in his time as a Tiger. Brother is New York Giants LB Azeem Ojulari. Made his NFL debut in Week 1.

Owen Pappoe – Cardinals fifth-round pick (168th overall) in 2023 out of Auburn. Started all 41 games he appeared in at Auburn and racked up 256 tackles, 15 for loss, in four seasons with the Tigers (2019-22). Was just the fourth player in program history to serve as a captain for multiple seasons.

Cameron Thomas – Arizona's first pick in the third-round (87th overall) in 2022 out of San Diego State. Appeared in all 17 games and produced 18 tackles and 3.0 sacks as a rookie. Scored his first career TD when he recovered a QB Sam Howell fumble in the season opener against the Commanders.

Ezekiel Turner – Signed with Arizona as an undrafted rookie free agent out of Washington in 2018. Has blocked two punts and notched 45 special teams tackles in 65 career games.

Kyzir White – Selected in the fourth round (119th overall) by the Chargers in 2018. Has played in 65 games (46 starts) and totaled 387 tackles over six seasons with L.A. Chargers (2018-21), Philadelphia (2022) and Arizona (2023). Named a team captain for the first time in his career in 2023. Led the team with nine tackles in Week 1.

Josh Woods – Originally entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with Chicago in 2018. Has appeared in 55 games and produced 30 tackles on defense as well as 33 tackles on special teams in five seasons with Chicago (2019-21), Detroit (2021-22) and Arizona (2023). Started in his Cardinals debut at Washington and had two tackles and one pass defended.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Budda Baker – Arizona's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) out of Washington is a five-time Pro Bowler (2017, 2019-22), four-time team captain (2020-23) and earned 2020 first-team All-Pro honors.

Kris Boyd – Selected by Minnesota in the seventh round (217th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft.
