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THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

After opening the 2026 regular season with a 26-14 win over the Chargers in Los Angeles last week, the Cardinals return to State Farm Stadium for their home opener against the defending Super Bowl Champion Seattle Seahawks.

Sunday's matchup vs. Seattle begins the Cardinals 21st regular season at State Farm Stadium. Arizona enters Sunday's game with a 13-6-1 record in home openers since beginning play at the venue in 2006. The Cardinals have won two straight home openers and four of the last six.

For the second straight year, the Cardinals home game with the Seahawks will serve as Arizona's *Rivalries* game. Arizona will wear its *Rivalries* uniform that the team debuted in Week 4 vs. Seattle last season on Thursday Night Football.

Sunday's matchup vs. the Seahawks is the lone home game for the Cardinals in the first four weeks of the '26 season - and one of only three home games through the first nine weeks.

This week's matchup marks the 54th all-time meeting between the Cardinals and Seahawks in a series that dates back to Seattle's debut season as an NFL franchise in 1976.

Both the Cardinals and Seahawks enter the game at 1-0. In the regular season debut of Arizona first-year head coach **Mike LaFleur**, the Cardinals put on a dominant performance in all three phases in taking down the Chargers on the road. An efficient offense, suffocating defense and opportunistic special teams combined to give Arizona the 12-point win.

Seattle is coming to Arizona well-rested after opening the season at home on Wednesday (9/9) with a 13-10 victory over the visiting New England Patriots in a rematch of Super Bowl LX.

Highlighting this week's matchup between the Cardinals and Seahawks is the first-ever faceoff between rookie RBs **Jeremiyah Love** and **Jadarian Price**, a pair of 2026 first round draft picks who were teammates at Notre Dame from 2023-25.

Following this week's game against the Seahawks, the Cardinals return to the road where they will continue NFC West play as they take on the 49ers at Levi's Stadium. Seattle will head east as they face the Commanders on the road.

THIS WEEK'S HIGHLIGHTS

- With the Cardinals 26-14 victory over the L.A. Chargers in last week's regular season opener, **Mike LaFleur** became the first Cardinals full-time head coach to earn a win in his first game since Don Coryell in 1973.
- The Cardinals faced Chargers head coach Jim Harbaugh in last week's opener. This week, Arizona will go up against Harbaugh's son in Seahawks special teams coordinator **Jay Harbaugh**. In two weeks, the Cardinals will square off against Giants head coach John Harbaugh in New York.
- Last week, Arizona's offensive line helped the Cardinals offense to a performance - 250+ net passing yards, 100+ rushing yards and 0 sack yards - it hadn't seen in nearly seven years. Prior to last Sunday's opener, the last time Arizona put up those numbers in a non-OT game was on 10/13/19 vs. Atlanta (34-33 Cardinals victory).
- Arizona's defense put on a stellar display in the victory over the Chargers, holding L.A. to just 14 points and 268 total net yards. The Cardinals allowed fewer than 100 rushing yards (81) and fewer than 200 net passing yards (187) while collecting 2 takeaways (INT, FR), a pivotal goal-line stand, 3.0 sacks, 5 tackles for loss, 5 QB hits and 6 passes defended.
- On special teams, Cardinals K **Chad Ryland** connected on 4 FGs while WR **Simi Fehoko** recorded his first career blocked punt.
- Last week's game (277 yards, 1 TD) marked QB **Jacoby Brissett**'s 13th consecutive outing with 200+ passing yards and 1+ passing TD. That is the longest active streak in the NFL. No other QB has an active streak of more than 5 games.
- TE **Trey McBride** hauled in his first TD catch of '26 on a 3-yard pass from QB **Jacoby Brissett** last week. It gives McBride 11 TD catches in his last 13 games.
- Rookie RB **Jeremiyah Love**'s first career rushing TD came on his third career rushing attempt in his NFL debut. He ended the Cardinals opening drive of the season with a 5-yard TD run. He became the first Cardinals player to score a rushing TD in his NFL debut since RB Tim Hightower on 9/7/08 at San Francisco.
- S **Andrew Wingard** - signed as a free agent this offseason - finished his Cardinals debut with 4 tackles, 2 tackles for loss, a forced fumble and an INT. He became the first Cardinals player to have both an INT and a forced fumble in a game since Budda Baker did so on 10/19/20 at Dallas.

A STATE OF WASHINGTON LEGEND

Cardinals All-Pro S **Budda Baker** was drafted by the Cardinals in 2017 after he had starred at both the prep and college levels in the state of Washington.

Baker's hometown of Bellevue is just 10 miles from Lumen Field - the Seahawks home stadium. He had a record-breaking career at Bellevue High School before going on to star at the University of Washington.

In three seasons with the Huskies, Baker appeared in 40 games and totaled 200 tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, five INTs, 24 passes defended and three forced fumbles. During his junior season in 2016, Baker totaled 70 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks and two INTs.

SEAHAWKS CONNECTIONS

Cardinals DL **L.J. Collier** was selected by Seattle in the first-round (29th overall) of the 2019 NFL Draft. He appeared in 45 games (16 starts) in four seasons (2019-22) with the Seahawks and had 40 tackles (24 solo), 3.0 sacks, 13 QB hits, six tackles for loss, and five passes defended.

Cardinals Senior Defensive Assistant **Teryl Austin** served as the Seattle Seahawks' defensive backs coach for four seasons from 2003-06. He helped Seattle reach Super Bowl XL following the 2005 season.

Seahawks G/T **Josh Jones** was originally selected by Arizona in the third round (72nd overall) of the 2020 NFL Draft. He appeared in 47 games (21 starts) for the Cardinals between 2020-22.

Seahawks Defensive Asst./LBs coach **Josh Byrnes** played two seasons (2017-18) at LB for the Cardinals during his 12-year playing career. He appeared in 25 games (12 starts) with Arizona, totaling 102 tackles, 3.0 sacks, an INT, eight passes defended, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

Seahawks assistant special teams coach **Devin Fitzsimmons** served as the Arizona Cardinals' assistant special teams coach for two seasons (2021-22).

Cardinals QB **Gardner Minshew II** attended Washington State University, where he was named the 2018 Pac-12 Offensive Player of the Year and earned first-team All-Pac-12 honors.

Mike LaFleur is in his 1st season with the Cardinals and his first year as an NFL head coach. He came to Arizona with 12 years of NFL coaching experience with the Rams (2023-25), Jets (2021-22), 49ers (2017-20), Falcons (2015-16) and Browns (2014). LaFleur spent the past three seasons (2023-25) as the offensive coordinator with the Rams. In his three seasons as Rams offensive coordinator, Los Angeles featured one of the NFL's top offenses, ranking 5th in passing yards per game (244.9), first downs per game (21.4) and offensive TDs (144), 6th in total yards per game (361.8) and offensive points per game (24.4).

Mike Macdonald is in his third season leading the Seahawks in 2026 after being named the ninth head coach in franchise history in January of 2024. He has accumulated a 25-10-0 record so far in his Seattle tenure, including a 2025 season in which he led the Seahawks to a franchise record 14 wins en route to a victory in Super Bowl LX. Macdonald became the 3rd-youngest head coach to win a Super Bowl and the 9th first-time head coach to win a championship within his first two seasons. Macdonald joined Seattle after spending his final two seasons in Baltimore (2022-23) serving as the Ravens defensive coordinator.

COACHING FAMILY TREE - LAFLEUR FACES THE HARBAUGHS

In the league's history, there have been just four sets of brothers who have each served as NFL head coaches. Two of those brother duos are active: **Mike** (AZ) and **Matt** (GB) LaFleur along with **Jim** (LAC) and **John** (NYG) Harbaugh.

LaFleur faced Chargers head coach Jim Harbaugh in last week's season opener. This week, Arizona will go up against Harbaugh's son in Seahawks special teams coordinator **Jay Harbaugh**. Then - in two weeks - the Cardinals will square off against Giants head coach John Harbaugh in New York.

FIRST SHOWDOWN BETWEEN LOVE & PRICE

History was made in the 2026 NFL Draft when the Cardinals (**Jeremiah Love** - #3 overall) and Seahawks (**Jadarion Price** - #32) each used their first round selections on Notre Dame running backs.

It marked the first time in the Modern Era Draft (since 1967) that the top two RBs selected in an NFL Draft came from the same school.

The pair will now face off twice a year as division rivals in the NFC West and that first showdown takes place this week at State Farm Stadium.

The duo served as the Fighting Irish RB tandem for three seasons (2023-25) and combined to rush for 4,574 yards and 57 TDs on 713 carries (6.4 avg.) while adding 78 receptions for 756 yards and 9 TDs.

LOVE AND PRICE IN WEEK 1

Both Love and Price made their NFL debut in Week 1.

LOVE (@ LAC): In the Cardinals victory over the Chargers, Love rushed for 41 yards and a TD on 11 carries while adding 2 receptions for 9 yards.

PRICE (vs. NE): Against the Patriots in Seattle, Price led the Seahawks with 52 rushing yards on 10 carries while adding 2 receptions for 6 yards.

ANOTHER BUCKEYE REUNION

Cardinals WR **Marvin Harrison Jr.** and Seahawks WR **Jaxon Smith-Njigba** were teammates at Ohio State from 2021-22 and both went on to be selected in the first round of the NFL Draft: Harrison (#4 in 2024); Smith-Njigba (#20 in 2023).

During his three seasons (2020-22) at Ohio State, Smith-Njigba was also teammates with all five other former Buckeyes on the Cardinals active roster: OLBs **Paris Johnson Jr.** (2020-22) and **Josh Fryar** (2020-22), LB **Cody Simon** (2020-22), CB **Denzel Burke** (2021-22) and LB **Baron Browning** (2020).



YEAR 21 AT STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals open their 21st regular season at State Farm Stadium this week when they host NFC West rival and defending Super Bowl Champion Seattle Seahawks.

CARDS GO FOR 14TH WIN IN HOME OPENER AT STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals enter Sunday's game against the Seahawks with a 13-6-1 record in home-openers since beginning play at State Farm Stadium.

Arizona is looking for its third consecutive win in its home opener.



HOSTING NFC WEST RIVALS IN THE HOME OPENER

Since beginning play at State Farm Stadium in 2006, the Cardinals have hosted a division rival in their home opener six times (this week marks the seventh time). **Arizona has a 4-2 record in home openers vs. NFC West opponents at State Farm Stadium - including a 2-0 record vs. Seattle (wins in 2007 & 2012).**

A LOOK AT CARDINALS OPPONENTS AT STATE FARM STADIUM IN 2026

- After playing 6 of its first 9 games on the road, Arizona will host 6 of its final 8 games at State Farm Stadium to conclude '26 regular season.
- The Cardinals '26 home slate features five games vs. teams that made the postseason in 2025: Week 2 vs. Seattle; Week 7 vs. Denver; Week 10 vs. LA Rams; Week 13 vs. Philadelphia and Week 18 vs. San Francisco.
- The nine teams AZ will face at home had a combined 41-37 record (.526) on the road in 2025.
- There are currently six teams who have played two-or-fewer regular season games at State Farm Stadium. Among them are two teams the Cardinals will face at home in 2026: Jets (2 games at SFS) and Raiders (2 games at SFS).

CARDINALS TO PLAY NINE HOME GAMES IN 2026

The 2026 season will be the NFL's sixth to feature 17 regular season games, and mark the third time (2022, 2024) that teams from the NFC will play a ninth home game. Having played one game in Mexico City in 2022, the Cardinals will play nine games at State Farm Stadium for just the second time (2024).



IT GETS LOUD IN STATE FARM STADIUM

Having sellout crowds on hand has given Arizona one of the NFL's most distinct home field advantages.

Dating back to the inaugural year at State Farm Stadium in 2006, **Cardinals opponents have accumulated 230 accepted false start penalties in the regular season.** That is the third-most for any home team in the NFL during that span.

RIVALRIES UNIFORM RETURNS IN WEEK 2

In this week's divisional matchup between the Cardinals and Seahawks, Arizona will wear its "Built to Last" **Rivalries** uniform for the second time.

In Week 4 of the 2025 season - which was also a matchup vs. the Seahawks - the Cardinals became the first NFL team to wear its **Rivalries** uniform that had been unveiled the month prior.

Last season, Nike and the NFL combined to develop the **Rivalries** program, which gives athletes and fans an opportunity to connect like never before. The goal of **Rivalries** is to celebrate traditions and unite communities with unique and elevated product designs.

Arizona and Seattle were among the eight teams - four in the NFC West and four in the AFC East - selected to debut **Rivalries** uniform in 2025. In 2026, the NFC North and AFC South unveiled their own **Rivalries** uniforms as part of a program that will continue to elevate in 2027 and 2028.

The uniform is rooted extensively in local community insights and can be worn in a single home game against a division rival. The designs were brought to life by pulling inspiration from the history of the Cardinals and the unique culture of Arizona. These **Rivalries** uniforms will remain in the teams' uniform lineup for the subsequent two seasons (2027-28), in addition to existing alternate uniforms.

The Cardinals **Rivalries** uniform design is meant to mirror the harshness of the desert heat, the shards of sand in a storm, the tan, red and copper that echo both the Desert Cardinal and the commerce that helped built the state. The state flag returns to the jersey through an outline of Arizona. The helmet is a sandblasted matte, with a 3D birdhead logo featuring a copper beak.

CARDS CELEBRATE LATINO HERITAGE MONTH

The Great Lawn stage will also feature a live performance by **JLPN Band**, while a community lowrider car show activation will showcase numerous vehicles and celebrate the craftsmanship, pride and family tradition behind Arizona car culture. Classic F-Series trucks and Mustangs from Arizona Ford Dealers are also expected to be on display.

The Latino Heritage Month celebration will continue throughout the game with a halftime performance featuring **Mariachi Rubor**, an 18-piece all-female mariachi ensemble, alongside **Ballet Folklórico** dancers and flag bearers representing various Latin American countries. **Paulina Manzo** will perform the National Anthem prior to kickoff.

The Cardinals will also host a group of notable guests at Sunday's home opener, headlined by Phoenix native and rising *Musica Mexicana* star **Xavi**, who has earned multiple chart-topping hits including "La Diabla" and "La Victima," and comedian, writer and actor **Leo González**, a Streamy Award winner named *AdWeek's Comedy Creator of the Year*. LaFleur became the first Cardinals full-time head coach to earn a win in his first game since Don Coryell in 1973.

LaFleur was one of six coaches who made their NFL head coaching debut in Week 1. That group had a combined 4-2 record. LaFleur (AZ) joined Klint Kubiak (LV), Jesse Minter (BAL) and Joe Brady (BUF) as the coaches who earned wins in their debut.

The Cardinals finished last Sunday's game with a 37:31 to 22:29 advantage in time of possession. **Arizona's advantage in time of possession (15:02) was its highest since 12/31/23 at Philadelphia (19:18) when the Cardinals held a 39:39 to 20:21 advantage in a win over the Eagles.**

Last week's game marked just the 4th time in franchise history - and the second time in the last 63 years (1964-2026) - the Cardinals scored 25 points or more while allowing 14 points or fewer in a season opener.

OFFENSIVE LINE PLAYS STARRING ROLE IN WEEK 1 WIN

The Cardinals offensive line - consisting of LT Paris Johnson Jr., LG Isaac Seumalo, C Hjalte Froholdt, RG Jon Gaines II and RT Elijah Wilkinson - led the charge for the Cardinals offense against a Chargers defense that finished the 2025 campaign as the #5 ranked defense in the NFL (285.2 ypg).

Facing a Los Angeles team that ranked #10 in the NFL in sacks (45) last season, Arizona's O-Line allowed just one sack for zero yards vs. the Chargers with that sack coming late in the fourth quarter.

Arizona's O-Line helped the Cardinals offense to a performance - 250+ net passing yards, 100+ rushing yards and 0 sack yards - it hadn't seen in nearly seven years. Prior to last week, the last time Arizona put up those numbers in a non-OT game was on 10/13/19 vs. Atlanta (34-33 Cardinals victory).

In addition to helping the Cardinals hold a 15:02 advantage in time of possession last Sunday, the O-Line also paved the way as Arizona outgained the Chargers 393-268 (+125) in total yards while running 72 offensive plays to the Chargers 51 (+21).

DEFENSE PUTS ON MEMORABLE PERFORMANCE

Arizona's defense put on a stellar display in the victory over the Chargers last week, holding Los Angeles to just 14 points and 268 total net yards.

The Cardinals allowed fewer than 100 rushing yards (81) and fewer than 200 net passing yards (187) while collecting 2 takeaways (INT, FR), a pivotal goal-line stand, 3.0 sacks, 5 tackles for loss, 5 QB hits and 6 passes defensed.

The Cardinals defense was dominant in the second half, allowing just 117 total net yards, 38 rushing yards and 79 net passing yards over the final 30 minutes. The Chargers 7 second-half possessions consisted of a combined 7 1st downs and averaged 16.7 net yards per drive.

- 8 consisted of 5 plays or fewer
- 8 featured 2 first downs or fewer
- 7 gained fewer than 25 net yards
- 3 ended on downs
- 2 ended on punts
- 1 ended on a fumble

ONE GAME, ONE TOUCHDOWN FOR LOVE

RB Jeremiyah Love - selected by the Cardinals with the #3 overall pick in the 2026 Draft - opened his career by rushing for 41 yards and a TD on 11 carries while adding 2 receptions for 9 yards.

Love's first career rushing TD came on his third career rushing attempt. He ended the Cardinals opening drive of the season with a five-yard TD run. In doing so, he became the first Cardinals player to score a rushing TD in his NFL debut since RB Tim Hightower (2-yard run) on 9/7/08 at San Francisco.

Dating back to his final season at Notre Dame in 2025, Love now has at least one rushing TD in each of his last 12 games played.



WINGARD DOES IT ALL IN ARIZONA DEBUT

S Andrew Wingard - signed by the Cardinals as a free agent this offseason - made plays all over the field last week in Los Angeles. He finished the contest with 4 tackles, 2 tackles for loss, a forced fumble and an INT.

Wingard was the only player in the NFL with both an INT and a forced fumble in Week 1. He is the first Cardinals player to accomplish the feat in a game since Budda Baker did so on 10/19/20 at Dallas.

Wingard's second quarter forced fumble was the 4th of his career and his fourth quarter INT of Chargers QB Justin Herbert was the 7th INT of his career. **Last week's outing marked the first time in 103 career games played that Wingard has had an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.**



A BUSY AFTERNOON FOR BOURNE

Like Wingard, another 2026 free agent signing for the Cardinals - WR Kendrick Bourne - also had a big impact last week. The 10th year veteran posted 8 receptions for 85 yards on Sunday. **In franchise history, only two players had more receptions than Bourne in their Cardinals debut.**

BRISSETT CONTINUES IMPRESSIVE STREAK

QB **Jacoby Brissett** opened the 2026 season by completing 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for 277 yards, 1 TD, 0 INTs and a 103.1 passer rating last week against the Chargers.

He now has a 3-1 career record as a starter in season openers with three wins in a row (2024 w/ New England; 2022 w/ Cleveland).

With his performance last Sunday in Los Angeles, **Brissett has now thrown for 200+ yards and 1+ TD in all 13 starts as a member of the Cardinals. That is the longest such streak in franchise history, surpassing the previous record of 12 straight by Kurt Warner (2008-09).**

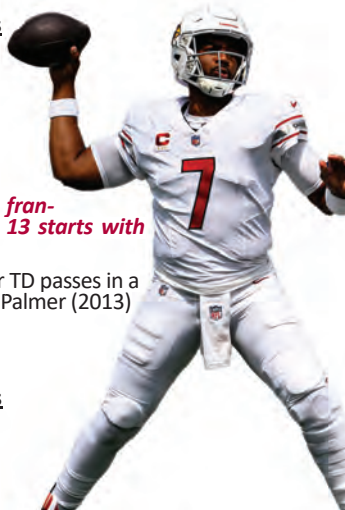

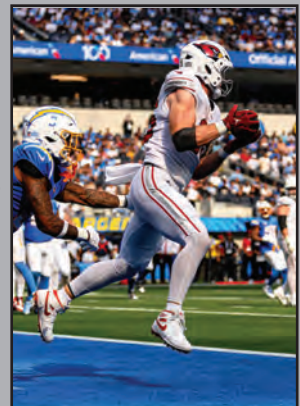

NEW DIGNITY HEALTH ARIZONA CARDINALS PERFORMANCE CENTER COMING IN 2028

In February of 2026, the Cardinals broke ground at the organization's new Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Performance Center located in North Phoenix at Scottsdale Road and Loop 101.

The targeted opening for the world-class facility is 2028.

"For us, this project is a generational, Arizona-first investment anchored by a world-class performance center and team headquarters," Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said at the ground-breaking. "At its core is a focus on helping our players reach their full potential and maximizing team performance. But it will also undoubtedly strengthen the state's economy and create an iconic new landmark in Phoenix."

The 217-acre property positioned west of Scottsdale Road and north of the Loop 101 was purchased at auction from the Arizona State Land Department for \$136 million in September by an affiliate of the team. The new performance center and business operations will anchor the mixed-use development site, occupying 30 acres and over 250,000 square feet. The footprint of the team's current facility is 14 acres and 156,000 square feet.

The new facility will feature three natural-grass outdoor practice fields and a fieldhouse with a full-size turf field indoors. Additional elements of the new, world-class performance center will include a greatly expanded and modern locker room and state-of-the-art team spaces for athletic training, sports medicine and strength and conditioning in addition to updated dining areas, meeting rooms, a player lounge and more.



Work is ongoing at the site. The foundation build up for the Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Performance Center and the three outdoor playing fields is complete. On August 26, workers began the first concrete pour for the new facility. As part of the process, workers temporarily removed 275 native species trees and cacti that will be preserved and replanted when construction is completed. Some of those are over 300 years old.

In May of 2026, Dignity Health announced that it will open a first-of-its-kind, state-of-the-art medical campus at the site of the Cardinals new performance and business headquarters. Dignity Health became the first to join the project, unveiling plans for a premier medical campus. The multi-phase project will ultimately feature two buildings totaling up to 300,000 square feet across eight acres. Upon completion, the project is expected to create 700 medical and support positions and will be Dignity Health's largest outpatient campus. Phase one of construction for Dignity Health's medical campus is expected to begin in 2027, with an anticipated opening in 2028.



LAFLEUR TAKES OVER IN ARIZONA

On Sunday, February 1, the Cardinals announced **Mike LaFleur** as the team's new head coach.

The 39-year old LaFleur joined the Cardinals after spending the past three seasons (2023-25) as the offensive coordinator for the L.A. Rams.

In 2025, the Rams offense led the NFL in points per game (30.5), total net yards per game (394.6), passing yards per game (268.1), first downs per game (23.3), offensive TDs (63), passing TDs (46) and total points (518) on their way to an appearance in the NFC Championship game.

LaFleur's older brother, Matt, is the head coach of the Green Bay Packers making the pair just the fourth set of brothers ever to serve as NFL head coaches joining Jim and John Harbaugh, Jon and Jay Gruden and Al and Ted Nesser.

A Mount Pleasant, MI native, LaFleur joined the Cardinals with 12 years of NFL coaching experience, including five years as an offensive coordinator.

Highlights from LaFleur's tenure with the Rams:

- During LaFleur's three seasons with the Rams, they won 32 games, made three playoff appearances and earned one NFC West title. Last season they advanced to the NFC Championship Game.
- QB Matthew Stafford led the NFL in passing yards (4,707) and passing TDs (46), establishing career-highs in TD passes and passer rating (109.2). WR Puka Nacua led the NFL in receptions (129) and ranked 2nd in receiving yards (1,715) while WR Davante Adams led the NFL in touchdown receptions (14) despite playing in just 14 games. RB Kyren Williams ran for 1,252 yards and fellow RB Blake Corum added 746 rushing yards. That total was the fourth-most by a Rams teammate duo in franchise history.
- Stafford excelled under LaFleur the past three seasons, ranking 2nd in passing yards (12,434), 3rd in passing TDs (90) and 4th in completions (1,054) during that span. After leading the league in passing yards (4,707) and TD passes (46) in 2025, Stafford took home NFL MVP honors for the first time in his career.
- In 2025, the Rams offense set a franchise single-season record for TD passes (46), tied for the fewest sacks allowed (23) in the league and ranked 7th in the NFL in rushing (126.6 ypg).
- Under LaFleur's guidance in 2024, the Rams offense finished 10th in passing yards per game (227.5) and 15th in offensive yards per game (331.4) and first downs per game (20.1). The Rams also finished in the top-15 in scrimmage yards (5,861) and tied for the 7th-highest fourth-down conversion percentage (66.7%).
- During his first season in Los Angeles in 2023, the Rams finished the season ranked 7th in yards per game (359.3) and yards per play (5.6), 11th in rushing yards per game (120.3), 12th in rushing average (4.3), 10th in passing yards per game (239.0), and 8th in first downs per game (20.6), third down conversion rate (42%), and points scored per game (23.7). The offense also finished 4th in fourth down conversion rate (61.9%) and red zone efficiency (63.6%).
- In 2023, rookie WR Puka Nacua finished the regular season with the most receiving yards (1,486) and receptions (105) in a single season by a rookie in NFL history.
- RB Kyren Williams earned second-team All-Pro honors in 2023 and followed that up by setting single-season career-highs in rushing yards (1,299) and rushing touchdowns (14) in 2024.



LAFLEUR AMONG COACHES UNDER 40

Mike LaFleur was hired as the Cardinals head coach on February 1 at age 38. He celebrated his 39th birthday one month later, and is one of five head coaches in the league younger than 40.

ARIZONA'S COORDINATORS

HACKETT LEADS THE OFFENSE

Nathaniel Hackett is in his 1st season as offensive coordinator in Arizona. He joined the Cardinals with 17 years of NFL coaching experience, including 10 years as an offensive coordinator with the N.Y. Jets (2023-24), Green Bay Packers (2019-21), Jacksonville Jaguars (2016-18) and Buffalo Bills (2013-14) and one season as the head coach of the Denver Broncos (2022).

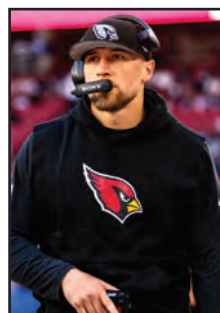
- Since 2017, Hackett has been a part of five postseason runs, including three conference championship games (JAX – 2018 & GB 2020-21). During that span, Hackett's teams won 68 of 100 games (.680).
- During his time as an offensive coordinator, has led three top-10 offenses. He helped lead two top five scoring offenses during that time, including Jacksonville in 2017 (5th - 26.1 ppg) and Green Bay in 2020 (1st - 31.8 ppg).
- Had a three-year run (2019-21) in Green Bay when he helped QB Aaron Rodgers earn three consecutive Pro Bowl selections and back-to-back NFL MVP awards (2020-21). Rodgers had three straight 4,000-yard seasons and twice led the league in passer rating during that span (2020-21).
- Under Hackett, WR Davante Adams ranked second in the NFL in receptions (321), receiving yards (3,924) and receiving TDs (34) while posting two of the top-three single-season reception marks in franchise history (123 in 2021; 115 in 2020).
- During his three seasons as Green Bay's offensive coordinator, the Packers won three consecutive NFC North titles, ranked 5th in the NFL in scoring (27.2 ppg) and committed the fewest turnovers (37) in the league.



RALLIS REMAINS IN CHARGE OF DEFENSE

Nick Rallis is in his 4th season as the Cardinals defensive coordinator in 2026. He was hired by Arizona in 2023 following two seasons (2021-22) as the LBs coach in Philadelphia.

- Cardinals S Budda Baker was selected to the Pro Bowl as a starter at safety each of the last three seasons (2023-25). It was Baker's 8th Pro Bowl selection following the 2025 season and his 7th consecutive selection as a starter. Baker leads all NFL DBs with 376 tackles over the last four seasons and has posted 100+ tackles each of the last two years (2024-25).
- Under Rallis in 2025, free agent LB Josh Sweat was named a Pro Bowl alternate after starting all 17 games and finishing with 30 tackles, 12.0 sacks, 17 QB hits, 13 tackles for loss, four forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and three passes defended. His 12.0 sacks and four forced fumbles are both career highs and his four forced fumbles also tied for the most in the NFL.
- The two CBs drafted by AZ in 2025 - Will Johnson and Denzel Burke - were among the standouts for the defense last season. The duo combined for 29 games played (18 starts) with 84 tackles, 4 tackles for loss, 3 INTs, 21 passes defended and a forced fumble. Johnson joined Tampa Bay's Jacob Parrish as the two CBs selected for the PFWA's All-Rookie Team. Burke and Johnson both finished among the five rookie defenders with 10+ passes defended in 2025.



GHOBRIAL RUNS THE SPECIAL TEAMS

Michael Ghoibrial (GO-bree-uhl) is in his 1st season as the Cardinals special teams coordinator in 2026.

He came to Arizona after spending the past two seasons (2024-25) in the same role with the N.Y. Giants. Ghoibrial has 17 years of coaching experience, including five years in the NFL. Prior to joining the Giants, Ghoibrial spent three seasons (2021-23) with the N.Y. Jets as assistant special teams coordinator.

- Coached current Cardinals long snapper Casey Kreiter during his tenure with the Giants.
- During his time in the NFL, has coached two Pro Bowlers (Braxton Berrios and Justin Hardee) and helped two others earn Special Teams Player of the Week honors (Isaiah Simmons and Ihmir Smith-Marsette).
- In his two seasons with the Giants, New York ranked 4th in yards per kickoff return (27.9), tied for 4th in special teams TDs (3) and blocked field goals (2) and 6th in special teams points scored (20).
- Last season, the Giants ranked 4th in average starting field position (32.4-yard line), 5th in yards per kickoff return (27.7), and 11th in FG percentage (88.5%).
- During his time with the Jets (2021-23) as assistant special teams coordinator, New York tied for the 3rd most special teams TDs (3), ranked 4th in special teams points scored (22), yards per kick return (24.6) and yards per punt return (10.8) and tied for 8th in total kicks blocked (4).



NEW FACES IN 2026

ROOKIE FREE AGENTS HAVE A HISTORY IN ARIZONA

Mississippi's **Wydet Williams Jr.** made the Cardinals Week 1 roster as a rookie free agent. **It marked the 12th time in the last 15 years (2012-26), the Cardinals had at least one undrafted free agent make the Week 1 roster.**

CARDINALS HAVE THEIR CAPTAINS

Prior to the start of the regular season, the Cardinals named the five players who will serve as team captains for the 2026 season, based on a vote of their teammates.

OFFENSE: QB Jacoby Brissett / OL Hjalte Froholdt
DEFENSE: S Budda Baker / LB Mack Wilson Sr.
SPECIAL TEAMS: LS Casey Kreiter

Baker is serving as a team captain for the seventh consecutive season. Froholdt and Wilson were both named captains for the second straight year.

Brissett was named a team captain for the third time in his career - and with his third different team (Colts - 2019; Patriots - 2024).

Kreiter was named a team captain for the third time in his career (Giants - 2022, 2024).



CARDINALS EXTEND FROHOLDT & WILSON

In the span of 10 days, Arizona signed two of its cornerstone players - OL **Hjalte Froholdt** and WR **Michael Wilson** - to contract extensions.

On August 25, the Cardinals signed **Froholdt** to a two-year contract extension that keeps him under contract through the 2028 season.

Froholdt is in his fourth season with the Cardinals and this is the second extension he has signed with the team. He previously signed a two-year extension with the Cardinals in August of 2024 after originally joining the team as an unrestricted free agent in 2023.

The 30-year old Froholdt started all 51 regular season games at center in his first three seasons (2023-25) in Arizona and was a team captain in 2025. **He was the only player on the Cardinals roster to have started all 17 games each of the last three seasons.** Froholdt joined Ted Karras (Cincinnati), Creed Humphrey (Kansas City) and Coleman Shelton (LA Rams) as the only players in the NFL to start all 51 regular season games at center between 2023-25.

On September 3, the Cardinals signed **Wilson** to a three-year extension that keeps him with the team through the 2029 season.

Wilson is in his fourth year with the Cardinals after being selected in the third-round (84th overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft from Stanford. **He appeared in 46 games (38 starts) in his first three seasons (2023-25) and had 163 receptions for 2,119 yards and 14 TDs.**

Last season, Wilson played all 17 games (13 starts) and set career-highs in receptions (78), receiving yards (1,006) and TD receptions (7). Over the final eight games, Wilson had three outings with 10+ receptions and 100+ receiving yards. **During that stretch (Weeks 11-18), he ranked third in the NFL in receptions (56), second in receiving yards (775) and tied for second in TD receptions (6).**



A ROSTER RECHARGE AS THE INJURED RETURN

Arizona's roster was decimated by injuries in 2025. Those setbacks also provide a major reason for optimism in the 2026 season, as the team has seen numerous key contributors return.

HIGHLIGHTING SOME OF THE 2026 ADDITIONS

BIG NUMBERS FOR UNDRAFTED BOURNE

One of the Cardinals first free agent additions this offseason was WR **Kendrick Bourne**, who signed a two-year contract with Arizona after spending his first nine NFL seasons with San Francisco (2017-20, '25) and New England (2021-24).

Since entering the NFL as a rookie free agent with the 49ers in 2017, **Bourne has appeared in 128 games (43 starts) during the regular season with 337 receptions for 4,340 yards and 22 TDs** to go along with 20 carries for 174 yards. He has also appeared in six postseason contests, adding 13 receptions for 165 yards and three TDs with one carry for 14 yards.

Among active players who entered the NFL undrafted, Bourne ranks 2nd in career receptions (337), receiving yards (4,340) and TD receptions (22) behind only Jacksonville's Jakobi Meyers (470 receptions for 5,467 yards and 24 TDs).

A MAJOR ADDITION IN THE TRENCHES

Signed to a three-year contract on the opening day of free agency this offseason, OL **Isaac Seumalo** looks to solidify the left side of the Cardinals offensive line. **The 11th year veteran - who has played for the Eagles (2016-22) and Steelers (2023-25) and Cardinals (2026) in his NFL career - has started 105-of-126 career regular games played with starts coming at LG (85), RG (19) and TE (one). He has started all 90 games played over the last eight seasons (2019-26).**



Seumalo is coming off a 2025 campaign in which he allowed just a 3.7% pressure rate according to Next Gen Stats. That was the lowest among all NFL guards (min. 250 pass blocks). Only three offensive linemen (all centers) allowed a lower pressure rate last season.

ARIZONA ADDS ALL-PRO RETURN MAN

WR **Devin Duvernay - a two-time Pro Bowler (2021-22) and 2021 1st-team All-Pro** - signed with the Cardinals in free agency after playing with Chicago (2025), Jacksonville (2024) and Baltimore (2020-23).

Duvernay has played 90 career games (25 starts) and has returned 130 kickoffs for 3,300 yards (25.4 avg.) and two TDs while adding 1,284 punt return yards on 109 attempts (11.8 avg.).

With Chicago last season, Duvernay appeared in all 17 games and returned 40 kickoffs for 1,069 yards (26.7 avg.) and 21 punts for 231 yards (11.0 avg.). **He ranked 5th in the NFL in kickoff return yards (1,069) and 4th in the NFL in total return yards (1,300) in 2025.**

ALLGEIER HEADS UP THE RUN GAME

Among the new faces in the offensive backfield this season in Arizona is veteran RB **Tyler Allgeier**, signed as a free agent following four seasons (2022-25) with the Falcons.

During his time in Atlanta, Allgeier appeared in 67 games (12 starts) and had 676 carries for 2,876 yards (4.3 avg.) and 18 TDs. Also added 61 receptions for 516 yards (8.5 avg.) and two TDs.

• **Since entering the league in 2022 he is one of just six active players without a fumble (min. 100 rush attempts). His 693 consecutive rush attempts without a fumble is the longest active streak in the NFL.**

• **Including last week's season opener with Arizona, he has appeared in 68 consecutive games dating back to his rookie season in 2022. That is the longest active streak among NFL RBs.**

• Played in all 17 games (two starts) in 2025, rushing 143 times for 514 yards (3.6 avg.) and a career-high eight TDs. Also caught 14 passes for 96 yards. The 2025 campaign marked his third straight season appearing in all 17 games.

• Named to the PFWA All-Rookie team in 2022 after posting 1,035 yards and three TDs on the ground and 16 receptions for 139 yards and a score through the air. His 1,035 rushing yards were the most by a rookie in franchise history.



MINSHEW ADDED TO THE MIX AT QUARTERBACK

Arizona added an experienced veteran - and Pro Bowler - at the quarterback position when it signed QB **Gardner Minshew II** in free agency this offseason. Minshew joined the Cardinals after spending his first seven NFL seasons with Kansas City (2025), Las Vegas (2024), Indianapolis (2023), Philadelphia (2021-22) and Jacksonville (2019-20).

• In his career, Minshew has appeared in 63 games (47 starts) during the regular season and completed 1,100-of-1,742 pass attempts (63.1%) for 11,987 yards and 68 TDs while also rushing for 681 yards and five TDs.

• **He was named to the Pro Bowl with the Colts in 2023 after starting 13-of-17 games played and completing 305-of-490 pass attempts (62.2%) for 3,305 yards and 15 TDs to go along with 34 carries for 100 yards and three TDs.**

• As a rookie with the Jaguars in 2019, Minshew threw for a career-high 21 TDs, the most by a rookie QB in team history. In two seasons with the Jaguars, he started 20-of-23 games played and completed 501-of-797 passes (62.9%) for 5,530 yards and 37 TDs.

FITZGERALD TAKES HIS PLACE IN THE PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

In August, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** joined **LB Luke Kuechly**, **QB Drew Brees**, **RB Roger Craig** and **K Adam Vinatieri** in entering the Pro Football Hall of Fame at the induction ceremony that took place at Tom Benson Stadium in Canton, OH.

Fitzgerald and the rest of the 2026 class were celebrated at the Hall of Fame Game between the Cardinals and Panthers, at the Gold Jacket Dinner and during the induction ceremony.



FITZGERALD'S HALL OF FAME INDUCTION SPEECH - CLOSING REMARKS

Fitzgerald's closing remarks in his Hall of Fame induction speech, addressing his sons: Devin, Apollo and Milos.

"If you were paying attention, you heard some fundamental themes in this speech. One, it's not hard to find people who will tell you what you want to hear. Make a conscious effort to surround yourself with people who will tell you what you 'need' to hear. The hard things. The uncomfortable things. Believe me, the people in that second group care about you far more than those in the first."

"Two, life is short. Time is precious. And not one of us knows how much we have. So many of the people I mentioned today are no longer with us. Some gone much too soon. Make your time count. Fill every 24 hours with the passions and pursuits that mean the most to you."

"And lastly, there's not much traffic on the extra mile in life, so be sure to bring others along with you."

Fitzgerald became the 16th individual who spent a significant portion of his NFL career as a member of the Cardinals organization inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Full list below:

Shortly after his Hall of Fame induction, the Cardinals announced that the team will honor Hall of Fame WR **Larry Fitzgerald** at halftime of its October 25th game (Week 7) vs. the Denver Broncos presented by Gila River Resorts & Casinos.

In a ceremony that day, Fitzgerald will be placed in the team's Ring of Honor and also have his jersey number (11) retired.

"No one who has ever worn a Cardinals uniform is more deserving of this honor," said Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill**. "His excellence on the field was only surpassed by the way he represented our team and our community off of it. We are all grateful for the opportunity to recognize Larry in this way and for our fans to celebrate all he has meant to our franchise and the state of Arizona."

Fitzgerald will be just the sixth player in franchise history to have his number retired and the 20th member of the Cardinals Ring of Honor.

A COACHING FELLOWSHIP

In February, the Cardinals announced the addition of **Wendy Laurent** to the coaching staff as the newest participant in the **Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship** program.

BILL BIDWILL COACHING FELLOWSHIP: The Cardinals established the Bill Bidwill Coaching Fellowship prior to the 2015 season. Laurent is the seventh individual to participate in the program, which is designed to increase diversity and create additional opportunities for coaching experience at the highest level.

Four recent participants advanced from the fellowship to full-time assistant coach positions - three on the Cardinals coaching staff and one at the NCAA level - including **Connor Senger**, who currently serves as the Cardinals pass game specialist.

Laurent returned to Arizona as the Bidwill Fellow after participating in the Bill Walsh Coaching Fellowship as a member of the coaching staff during Cardinals training camp last year. Prior to joining the Cardinals, Laurent spent last season as the assistant TE's coach at Ohio State where he helped guide the Buckeyes to a 12-1 record and berth in the College Football Playoff Semifinals.

Long-time Cardinals owner **Bill Bidwill**, who passed away in 2019, was at the forefront of providing opportunities to individuals regardless of race or gender. In 2010, he was honored with the Fritz Pollard Alliance's Paul "Tank" Younger Award for promoting diversity in the NFL. In 1978, Adele Harris became the first African American female executive in the NFL when she was hired as the Cardinals director of community relations. In 1981, Bidwill hired attorney Bob Wallace, making him the first African American to handle contract negotiations for an NFL club. In 2004, the Cardinals became the first NFL team to have an African American general manager/head coach duo in Graves and Dennis Green.

Cardinals owner **Michael Bidwill** was honored by the Fritz Pollard Alliance with the organization's 2019 "Paul J. Tagliabue Award," given to a league or team executive who demonstrates the integrity and leadership Tagliabue exhibited in career development opportunities for minority candidates and advocacy for diversity on the league and club level.

Laurent is one of seven members of the Cardinals current coaching staff who have taken part in a coaching fellowship with an NFL team.

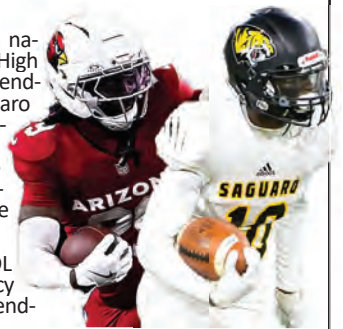
ARIZONA'S HOME GROWN TALENT

The Cardinals roster features two players who were prep stars in the state they now represent at the professional level.

Second-year CB **Denzel Burke** is an Arizona native who attended Brophy College Prep High School for two seasons (2017-18) before spending his final two seasons (2019-20) at Saguario High School. He finished his high school career as a four-star prospect and was named the #1 game-changing CB and athlete in the state by the Arizona Republic. In 2024, he became the first Arizona native drafted by the Cardinals since CB Byron Murphy Jr. in 2019.

A member of the Cardinals from 2023-24, DL **Roy Lopez** returned to Arizona in free agency this offseason. A native of Tempe, Lopez attended Mesquite (Gilbert, AZ) High School before going on to attend the University of Arizona in 2020.

LOPEZ'S FATHER IS AZ PREP COACHING LEGEND: Roy's father, **Roy Lopez Sr.**, is a long-time prep football coach in Arizona, having served as the head coach at Tempe Marcos De Niza High School, Sunnyside High School, Tolleson High School and Mesa Desert Ridge High School. He currently serves as the defensive line coach at Hamilton High School. He was named the Arizona High School Coach of the Year by the Arizona Football Coaches Association in both 2007 and 2009.

PAT TILLMAN PRACTICE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Although former S **Pat Tillman**'s #40 jersey is one no longer worn on Sundays, it can still be seen on the field at the team's training facility each week.

For the fourth consecutive year, the Cardinals are honoring a player each week as the **Pat Tillman Practice Player of the Week** in 2026. The player who earns the honor wears a #40 jersey for practice each day the following week.

In addition to wearing the #40 jersey during practice, the selected player also receives his name and photo on a wall outside the locker room that also features Tillman's former locker in a glass display.

Tillman was selected by the Cardinals in the 7th round (226th overall) of the 1998 NFL Draft out of Arizona State. He defied odds to become a three-year starting safety and set a franchise single-season record with 224 tackles in 2000. Following the 9/11 attacks, Tillman turned down a three-year contract and left the Cardinals prior to the 2002 season to enlist in the U.S. Army with his brother, Kevin. He was killed in action on April 22, 2004 in Afghanistan.

He was inducted into the Cardinals Ring of Honor in 2006.

BILLINGS IS BUILT DIFFERENT

DL **Andrew Billings** is in his first season with the Cardinals after spending the past three years in Chicago (2023-25). He was originally drafted in the 4th round (122nd overall) of the 2016 NFL Draft by Cincinnati.

Billings grew up in Texas where he was not only a football phenom in the Lone Star state, but also one of the strongest men on the planet.

As an 18-year old, Billings competed in a powerlifting competition where he ultimately lifted 2,010 total pounds – breaking former WWE Superstar and Olympian Mark Henry's state record. During the meet, he squatted 805 pounds, deadlifted 705 pounds, and bench pressed 500 pounds.

During his high school career, he took home two state powerlifting championships. **Billings went on to attend Baylor University, where he earned the unofficial title of "Strongest Player in College Football."**



Since joining the professional ranks, Billings has been heavily involved with each community he has been a part of. For the past four years, he has hosted and sponsored an annual Powerlifting meet (Andrew Billings Invitational) in Waco, TX for both boys and girls powerlifting teams. The 2024 powerlifting meet hosted 21 schools and 250 powerlifters. Billings has hosted the event annually and donated \$2,000 each year to fund the meet in addition to attending as a speaker to encourage and motivate the young powerlifters.

In April of 2026, the Waco Independent School District unveiled the Andrew Billings Weight Room at Waco High School, named in his honor. "It means a lot to me," Billings said of the honor. "Most importantly though for me in my pictures being up here, I just want somebody to look at it and say, 'I want that. I want to be on that wall. I want the next weight room to be named after me.' I think that means a lot to me when that happens -- a young kid comes here and sees what I've done and do even better."

ANOTHER MEMORABLE TRIP TO D.C. IN 2026

In June of 2026, the Cardinals joined forces with Desert Financial Credit Union and Gallagher as well as Arizona Governor **Katie Hobbs** and the Close Up Foundation for the fifth annual "Civics Matters Arizona" trip to our nation's capital.

Through this highly-successful year-round program, approximately 280 high school students from across the state participated in an all-expenses paid visit to Washington D.C. on the Cardinals team plane. The four-day, three-night trip took place from June 3-6.



The once-in-a-lifetime experience featured a red coat tour of the United States Capitol and private tour of the Supreme Court. The itinerary also included meetings with elected officials including Arizona Congressman **Juan Ciscomani** and United States Senator from Arizona **Mark Kelly** as well as issue deliberations and instructor-led visits to monuments, memorials, museums, and government institutions, providing students an opportunity to learn about civics in a way that is both educational and fun.

The "Civics Matters Arizona" program cultivates year-round civic education and responsible citizenship to empower young students to lead, serve, and shape the future of our state and our nation. By connecting learning to real experiences both locally and nationally, the initiative equips 6th-12th grade students with the tools, confidence, and sense of responsibility needed to be informed, active participants in their communities and contribute to a stronger democracy. Civics Matters Arizona engages students with their peers as well as their government and gives educators the tools and training to build positive dialogue in the classroom.

The students participating this year in Civics Matters Arizona represent 55 schools, 28 school districts, 19 cities, and 9 of the 15 counties across Arizona. The program engages a diverse group of high schools and organizations serving Title I communities, with 41 of the 55 participating schools classified as Title I institutions.

Ahead of the D.C. program, 9th-11th grade students were required to complete supplemental civic learning modules designed to help students connect civic knowledge to real-world decision-making, leadership, and community engagement. The lessons culminated in a contest in which students submitted a Leadership Challenge project demonstrating civic understanding, critical thinking, and leadership.

- The 2026 season marks the first season for head coach **Mike LaFleur**, who will face each of the last three teams he coached for (Rams, 49ers and Jets).
- Arizona opened the season on the road for the 4th consecutive year and for the 6th time in seven years. This year it was be a Week 1 game against the Chargers in the first of two matchups for Arizona at SoFi Stadium this season.
- Arizona will face all three NFC West opponents – vs. Seattle (Week 2), at San Francisco (Week 3), at LA Rams (Week 6) in the first six weeks of the season. Arizona will play just one division game in the last 10 weeks of the season, a home contest vs. the 49ers in the regular season finale.
- Arizona bye comes in Week 14. That matches the latest point in a season for a Cardinals bye (also fell in week 14 in 1991 & 2023).
- Arizona's 2026 schedule resumes some of the Cardinals oldest rivalries, including five that date back to the 1920s and 1930s: N.Y. Giants (1st meeting in 1926), Detroit Lions (1st meeting in 1930), Washington Commanders (1st meeting in 1932), Philadelphia Eagles (1st meeting in 1935) and L.A. Rams (1st meeting in 1937).
- The Cardinals open the regular season with three straight games vs. 2025 playoff teams. Arizona plays seven of its first 10 games vs. '25 playoff teams.
- Arizona has seven matchups vs. teams that won at least 12 games in 2025.
- Based on 2025 opponent winning percentage, the Cardinals will face the NFL's 3rd-toughest schedule in 2026. Arizona's opponents finished last season with a .538 winning percentage. It is the fourth consecutive year the Cardinals face one of the NFL's toughest schedules: 2nd in 2023, 5th in 2024 and 2nd in 2025.

YEAR 3 OF GIRLS FLAG GAME OF THE WEEK

The "Cardinals Girls High School Flag Football Game of the Week presented by State Farm" will return to Arizona's Family Sports (AZFS) for the third consecutive year in 2026.

Arizona's Family Sports will air eight games during the 2026 season starting on Tuesday, September 15th when Highland High School visits Campo Verde High School.

The remaining slate of games will take place on weeknights at 6:00 PM through November 3. Games will also re-air on Arizona's Family Sports on Fridays and Saturdays throughout the season. **Each match-up will be a fully-produced, 90-minute game broadcast, complete with play-by-play, analysis and sideline reporting and will air live on Arizona's Family Sports (AZFS) and stream live in the new Arizona's Family Sports app.**



The initiative, which debuted in 2024, made the Cardinals the first NFL team to produce and broadcast a weekly girls high school flag football game. Entering its third season, the Cardinals remain the only NFL team with a weekly girls high school flag football broadcast, continuing the organization's commitment to growing the game and creating greater visibility and opportunities for female athletes.

Twenty-two (22) players who participated in the Arizona Cardinals Local All-Stars Media Day on August 1st will make an appearance this season. Featured players and coaches on this year's slate include last year's Avnet Girls Coach of the Year **Matt Stone** (Hamilton HS), Avnet Girls Offensive Player of the Year **Marlie Phillips** (Liberty HS), and Kurt Warner Excellence in Leadership and Character Award winner **Mariah Ruelas** (Corona Del Sol HS).

After using six of seven picks in the 2025 NFL Draft on defensive players, Arizona used five of its seven selections on offensive players in 2026.

The 2026 NFL Draft marked just the second time (2018) in the last 27 years (2000-26) the Cardinals selected at least one quarterback, running back, wide receiver and offensive lineman in the same draft.

RB JEREMIAH LOVE - ROUND 1 (3RD) - NOTRE DAME

Following three years (2023-25) at Notre Dame, Love had a breakout season as a junior at Notre Dame (2025). **He started all 12 games for the Fighting Irish and rushed for 1,372 yards and 18 TDs on 199 carries (6.9 avg.) while adding 27 receptions for 280 yards and 3 TDs.**

Love was finalist for the Heisman Trophy in 2025, was named the Doak Walker Award winner as the nation's top RB and earned unanimous first-team All-America honors.

He became the first player in Notre Dame's storied history to be named a Doak Walker Award winner.

LOVE COLLEGE STATISTICS

In 41 games (29 starts) at Notre Dame, Love rushed for 2,882 yards and 36 TDs on 433 carries (6.7 avg.) while adding 63 receptions for 594 yards and six TDs.

LOVE AMONG THE NATION'S LEADERS IN 2025

On his way to taking home the Doak Walker Award in 2025, Love finished the season ranked:

- 3rd in the nation in total TDs (21)
- 1-3rd in the nation in rushing TDs (18)
- 4th in the nation in rushing average (6.89)
- 5th in the nation in rushing yards/game (114.3)

Love led the nation in both total TDs (40) and rushing TDs (35) between 2024-25.

His 2,497 rushing yards during that span ranked 3rd in the nation behind only Missouri's Ahmad Hardy (3,000) and Boise State's Ashton Jeanty (2,601).

A BIG-PLAY THREAT

The only player in Notre Dame history with multiple TD runs of 90+ yards (98, 94), Love proved to be a constant big-play threat during his time with the Fighting Irish.

His 42 TDs covered a total of 1,018 yards, an average of 24.2 yards per score.

Love's longest TD at Notre Dame came on a 98-yard run vs. Indiana in the 2024 CFP Playoff matchup. It remains the longest run in a CFP game since the playoff began in 2014.



OL CHASE BISONTIS - ROUND 2 (34TH) - TEXAS A&M

In three seasons (2023-25) with the Aggies, Bisontis started all 36 games played. **His 36 starts came at left guard (23), right tackle (12) and right guard (1).**

After earning Freshman All-America and SEC All-Freshman honors at right tackle in 2023, Bisontis started all 23 games played at left guard over his final two college seasons.

SACKS DON'T COME VS. BISONTIS: According to ESPN Research, Bisontis did not allow a single sack in 2025 and ended his college career without a sack allowed in 18 straight games.

Was placed on season-ending IR.



QB CARSON BECK - ROUND 3 (65TH) - MIAMI (FL)

During his six college seasons at Georgia (2020-24) and Miami (2025), Beck was a two-time National Champion (2021-22) and was named to the All-SEC 2nd Team (2023) and All-ACC 3rd Team (2025). **He played 55 games (43 starts), completing 966-of-1,390 pass attempts (69.5%) for 11,725 yards and 88 TDs. He also rushed for 288 yards and seven TDs.**

Beck finished his college career with a 37-6 record as a starter.

He led Georgia to a 24-3 record in 27 games as starting quarterback of Bulldogs, throwing for 7,912 yards and 58 TDs during that time.

In his lone season with Miami in 2025, Beck led the Hurricanes to an appearance in the National Championship Game. He completed 338-of-467 pass attempts (72.4%) for 3,813 yards and 30 TDs while also adding a pair of rushing TDs.



DL KALEB PROCTOR - ROUND 4 (104TH) - SE LOUISIANA

In four seasons (2022-25) at SE Louisiana, Proctor appeared in 48 games (35 starts) and totaled 134 tackles, 26 tackles for loss, 16.0 sacks, 2 passes defended and 2 forced fumbles.

In 2025, Proctor earned FCS 3rd team All-American honors and was named the Southland's Defensive Player of the Year after he posted a career-high 9.0 sacks and 13 tackles for loss. He became the first defensive player in school history to be named conference player of the year. Was placed on season-ending IR.



WR REGGIE VIRGIL - ROUND 5 (143RD) - TEXAS TECH

Virgil played four seasons at Miami (OH) (2022-24) and Texas Tech (2025), appearing in 50 games (26 starts) and totaling 100 receptions for 1,583 yards and 16 TDs. He also rushed for a pair of TDs.

VIRGIL THRIVES IN FINAL TWO SEASONS

After beginning his college career primarily on special teams in his first two years at Miami (OH), Virgil was a starter in his final two seasons (2024-25) and totaled 98 catches for 1,521 yards and 15 TDs during that span.

VIRGIL'S COLLEGE NOTECARDS

- Earned All Conference honors his final two seasons: Honorable Mention All-Big 12 (2025) and 2nd-team All-MAC (2024).
- In his lone season at Texas Tech, he led the team with 57 receptions and was second on the team in both receiving yards (705) and receiving TDs (6).
- Closed his collegiate career by catching multiple passes in 23 consecutive games played dating back to his time at Miami (OH).



LB KARSON SHARAR - ROUND 6 (183RD) - IOWA

During his five seasons (2021-25) at Iowa, Sharar appeared in 48 games (13 starts) and totaled 104 tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and 2 passes defended.

SHARAR LED ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP DEFENSES

In his lone season as a starter in 2025, Sharar finished with 83 tackles, 12 tackles for a loss, 4.0 sacks, 6 QB pressures, a forced fumble and two passes defended. One of the top special teams LBs in the country during his time at Iowa, he played 545 snaps on special teams during his college career.



OL JAYDEN WILLIAMS - ROUND 7 (217TH) - OLE MISS

During his five years (2021-25) with the Rebels, Williams appeared in 45 games (34 starts), including starts at left tackle (19) and right tackle (15).

As a senior in 2025, Williams started all 15 games and played over 1,000 offensive snaps at RT during Ole Miss' run to the College Football Playoff (CFP).

According to PFF.com, in 586 pass blocking snaps in 2025 Williams allowed just two sacks and two QB hits. His 586 pass-blocking snaps ranked 3rd among SEC tackles.



ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

Owner **Michael Bidwill** has been steering the Cardinals organization for nearly two decades. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Over the past few years, Bidwill has led a significant restructuring of both the football and business sides of the organization.

In the last three years alone, that transformation has seen the team open new business offices, break ground on the new Dignity Health Arizona Cardinals Performance Center and launch the Arizona Cardinals Foundation in addition to hiring more than 100 new staff members, many in senior leadership positions.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- On the whole, Bidwill's most substantial accomplishment in his time leading the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. The world-class venue has not only been critical for the franchise but has also resulted in over \$6 billion in economic impact for the state of Arizona.
- On February 12, 2023 State Farm Stadium hosted its third Super Bowl when 115.1 million viewers watched Super Bowl LVII. State Farm Stadium also hosted Super Bowls XLII (following 2007 season) and XLIX (following 2014 season).
- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land three Super Bowls, Michael was also instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to State Farm Stadium; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.
- In 2025, Bidwill oversaw the launch of the Arizona Cardinals Foundation, which replaced what was previously known as Cardinals Charities. The foundation is specifically focused on supporting Arizona's special needs community. In February of 2026, the foundation hosted the first-ever Cardinals Climb: Hike for Special Needs, a community fundraising event dedicated to supporting the special needs community. The event was a resounding success, raising over \$2 million dollars for Arizona's special needs community and making it one of the top fundraisers in the NFL.
- Bidwill created a highly-successful community initiative in the Civics Matters Arizona trips, which send hundreds of high school kids from across the state aboard the Cardinals team plane on an educational trip to Washington D.C. The fifth-annual Civics Matters Arizona trip, in partnership with the Close Up Foundation and Arizona Governor Katie Hobbs, took place in June of 2026 and saw 280 students visit the nation's capital.
- Bidwill has also spearheaded the Cardinals efforts surrounding youth football. In 2026, the team launched the Junior Cardinals Flag Football League in Calgary, Alberta which made the Cardinals the first team to launch a junior flag football league in Canada. In 2024, Arizona became the first NFL team to produce and broadcast weekly girls flag football through the Arizona Cardinals Girls Flag Football Game of the Week, an initiative that is in its third season in 2026. In December of 2025, the team hosted the inaugural Arizona Cardinals High School Honors event at State Farm Stadium to recognize the 2025 season of Arizona high school football.
- Under Michael's direction in 2025, the organization launched Cardinals Premier Travel, a first-of-its-kind, elevated travel experience to give all fans the opportunity to see the team play on the road in unmatched comfort and convenience. In its debut last November, nearly 290 fans attended the inaugural trip to Dallas where they saw the team's Monday Night victory over the Cowboys. This preseason, Cardinals Premier Travel provided an unprecedented experience as it took fans on a three-day trip to watch the team play in the Hall of Fame game and to be in attendance for WR Larry Fitzgerald's enshrinement in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH.
- In January of 2018 Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee, which reviews the league's Personal Conduct Policy at least annually and recommends appropriate changes with advice from outside experts.
- Of the franchise's seven all-time postseason wins, five have come during Michael's tenure leading the organization. Arizona has played in 10 postseason contests over the last 17 seasons (2007-23), after having appeared in just seven total playoff games prior.
- Arizona has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008 including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the franchise's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

A BUSY OFFSEASON FOR OSSENFORT

Monti Ossenfort is in his fourth season with the Cardinals in 2026 after being hired as the team's General Manager in January of 2023.

A look at some of Ossenfort's career highlights:

- Arizona's 2026 free agency period was Ossenfort's busiest one yet with 15 new players signed. The group included Pro Bowl OL **Isaac Seumalo**, WR **Kendrick Bourne**, All-Pro KR **Devin Duvernay**, QB **Gardner Minshew** and S **Andrew Wingard** among others.
- In his first four drafts (2023-26) as the Cardinals GM, Ossenfort made 35 total selections and executed seven trades. Of the 35 players drafted – which includes 19 on defense and 16 on offense – 27 remain with the team.
- Over the span of just five months in 2024, Ossenfort signed four of the Cardinals core players to contract extensions: S **Budda Baker** (12/28), RB **James Conner** (11/30), OL **Hjalte Froholdt** (8/21) and LB **Zaven Collins** (8/3). In April of 2025, he signed Pro Bowl TE **Trey McBride** to a four-year contract extension. Then, in the span of 10 days, Ossenfort signed Froholdt (8/25) to his second two-year extension and WR **Michael Wilson** (9/3) to a three-year extension.
- Arizona's 2025 free agent class was highlighted by the signing of LB **Josh Sweat** and QB **Jacoby Brissett**. Sweat established a career high with 12.0 sacks, also tying for the NFL lead with four "strip-sacks." Brissett started 12 games and threw for 3,366 yards and 23 TDs, both the highest totals in franchise history in a player's first 12 starts with the team.
- Ossenfort's 2025 NFL Draft class featured six defensive players who combined for 83 games played, 2,650 defensive snaps, 841 special teams snaps, 197 tackles, 12 tackles for loss, 3 INTs, 29 passes defended, 7 QB hits, 2 forced fumbles, 1 fumble recovery (returned for a TD), 3.5 sacks, 20 special teams tackles and a blocked PAT last season.
- The 2025 draft class was highlighted by CBs **Will Johnson** and **Denzel Burke**. The duo combined for 29 games played (18 starts) with 84 tackles, 4 tackles for loss, 3 INTs, 21 passes defended and a forced fumble last season. Both finished among the five rookie defenders with 10+ passes defended in 2025. Johnson joined Tampa Bay's Jacob Parrish as the two CBs selected for the PFWA's 2025 All-Rookie Team.
- Ossenfort's tenure in Arizona follows a highly successful three-year run in Tennessee. During that stretch, the Titans tied for fifth in the NFL in total wins (30), won a pair of AFC South titles and had two seasons of 11+ wins.

In February of 2026, the Arizona Cardinals Foundation hosted the first-ever **Cardinals Climb: Hike for Special Needs**, a community fundraising event dedicated to supporting the special needs community. **The event was a resounding success, raising over \$2 millions dollars for Arizona's special needs community and over 3,500 individuals participating across nearly 200 teams.**

In May of 2026, it was announced that the 100 percent of the over \$2 million raised will be distributed to 60 organizations across Arizona. Highlighting the list of recipients are the Foundation's four cornerstone beneficiaries: **Barrow Neurological Foundation, SARRC (Southwest Autism Research & Resource Center), Special Olympics Arizona and Treasure House.**

Also receiving funds are other organizations advancing new and innovative programs that support individuals of all ages living with Intellectual or Developmental Disabilities. The aim is to expand services, promote inclusion, and create equal opportunities, helping drive a lasting impact for individuals and families navigating life with special needs.

The second-annual Cardinals Climb: Hike for Special Needs will take place on Saturday, February 20, 2027.

"The inaugural year of Cardinals Climb was a tremendous success and we know it will continue growing in the years ahead," said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill**. "The energy and joy at State Farm Stadium were truly palpable, but the most rewarding aspect is the opportunity to support so many organizations making a meaningful difference in the special needs community."

ABOUT CARDINALS CLIMB: At Cardinals Climb, State Farm Stadium was transformed into an immersive climbing and hiking experience, bringing together fans, families, corporate teams, and community groups to "climb" for a cause. Cardinals players that attended the inaugural climb included TE **Trey McBride**, WR **Michael Wilson**, TE **Elijah Higgins**, DL **Darius Robinson**, LB **Owen Pappoe**, QB **Kedon Slovis** and OL **Hayden Conner**. Cardinals Legends and Pro Football Hall of Fame Inductees QB **Kurt Warner** and WR **Larry Fitzgerald** also made appearances as did General Manager **Monti Ossenfort**.

For Cardinals Climb, State Farm Stadium was re-imagined as a trail-inspired adventure for participants of all ages and abilities. A variety of routes, ranging from accessible paths to more challenging climbs, allowed participants to experience the stadium in a completely new way. All trails finished at the 50-yard line of State Farm Stadium and there was a special Cardinals Climb After Party presented by Seatgeek that took place on the Great Lawn featured performances from platinum-selling singer and songwriter **Gavin DeGraw** and the Grammy-award winning band **Switchfoot**.

"With the creation of the Arizona Cardinals Foundation, we're building on that legacy and taking our commitment to the next level. McBride *finished the 2025 season with 126 catches, setting a new NFL single-season record for receptions by a TE.* He broke the previous mark of 116 set by Zach Ertz in 2018.

MCBRIDE SHATTERS TE RECORD FOR RECEPTIONS IN 1ST 4 SEASONS

After catching 8 passes in Week 13 of '25 at Tampa Bay, McBride reached 309 receptions for his career. That passed Jimmy Graham (301) for the most by a TE in their first four seasons in NFL history.

By season's end, McBride had shattered the previous record. He has 46 more catches than any other TE in NFL history in their first four seasons.

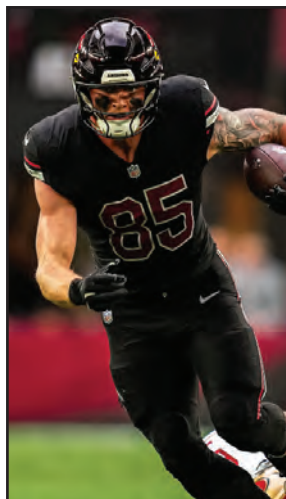

WILSON BREAKS OUT IN YEAR THREE WITH 1,000-YARD CAMPAIGN

AMONG NFL LEADERS IN 2ND HALF OF 2025

Thrust into the #1 WR role in Week 11 of 2025 when Marvin Harrison Jr. was first sidelined due to appendicitis, WR Michael Wilson embarked on a breakout campaign that saw him total **56 receptions for 775 yards and 6 TDs over the final eight games last season.**

Despite starting his '25 campaign with 22 receptions for 231 yards and 1 TD through the first nine games, Wilson's white-hot finish resulted in a season in which he totaled 78 receptions for 1,006 yards and 7 TDs.

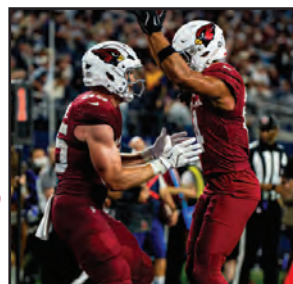


WILSON & MCBRIDE BECOME FORMIDABLE PAIR

WR Michael Wilson and TE Trey McBride became a potent combination leading the Cardinals aerial attack in 2025, **combining for 204 receptions, 2,245 receiving yards and 18 TD catches on the season.**

The 2025 season marked just the sixth time in team history - and first time since 2015 - Arizona had multiple receivers go over 1,000 yards in a single season.

COMPLETING A RARE FEAT VS. THE 49ERS

With their performance vs. San Francisco in Week 11, Wilson and McBride became just the second duo in franchise history to have 10+ receptions and 100+ receiving yards in a single game. They did so exactly 17 years to the day of the only other instance: WRs Anquan Boldin (13-186) and Larry Fitzgerald (10-151) vs. Seattle on 11/16/08.

PERFORMANCE FOR THE AGES VS. THE NINERS

Heading into the Week 11 matchup vs. San Francisco last season, Wilson never had more than 8 receptions or 95 receiving yards in a single game.

He finished the Week 11 matchup with 15 receptions for 185 yards - nearly doubling his previous career high in both receptions and yards.

His 15 catches in that contest mark the 2nd-best single-game total in franchise history.

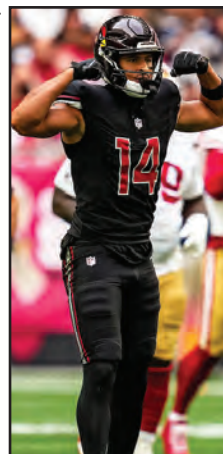

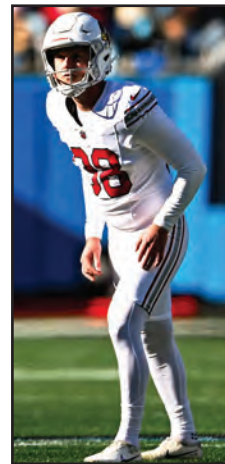

DESPITE INJURY, GILLIKIN REMAINS AMONG BEST IN AZ

After posting the top two single-season punting averages in franchise history - 50.6 in 2023 and 49.7 in 2024 - in his first two seasons with the Cardinals, P **Blake Gillikin** was off to an even better start in 2025 before an injury ended his year after just five games.

At the time of his injury, Gillikin ranked 4th in the NFL in both punting average (51.7) and net punting average (45.4).

He was the only punter in the NFL at the time to rank in the top 5 in both categories.

AT A GLANCE

- Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (36th overall) of the 2017 NFL Draft out of Washington, Baker signed contract extensions with AZ in August of 2020 and December of 2024. The most recent extension keeps him with the Cardinals through the 2027 season.
- An 8-time Pro Bowl selection, 4-time All-Pro honoree and 7-time team captain, Baker was honored with the 2025 Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award in the lead up to Super Bowl LX.
- Has been named NFC Defensive Player of the Month (Oct. 2020) and NFC Defensive Player of the Week (Week 6 in 2020).

NFL LEADER

- One of just 11 safeties in NFL history named to the Pro Bowl at least eight times. The other 10 are members of the Hall of Fame.

- Earned his eighth Pro Bowl selection in 2025, joining CB Patrick Peterson (8) as the only players in team history to receive at least eight Pro Bowl selections in their first nine NFL seasons.
- Baker (3) joined Hall of Famer Larry Wilson (5 from 1966-70) and Adrian Wilson (4 from 2006-09) as the only players in team history to earn 3+ All-Pro selections (first or second team) at safety.
- In franchise history the only safeties to appear in more games with the Cardinals than Baker (139) are Adrian Wilson (181) and Larry Wilson (169).
- Established a new career high with 164 tackles in 2024, which marked the most tackles by a Cardinal - regardless of position - since at least 1991.
- Led the team with 111 tackles in 15 games in 2022, adding seven passes defended, two INTs, two QB hits and a fumble recovery.
- In 2021, was named a team captain and earned Pro Bowl and second-team All-Pro honors after posting 98 tackles and establishing career-best marks in INTs (three) and passes defended (seven).

BAKER TAKES HOME 2025 SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD

Pro Bowl S Budda Baker **was named the winner of the 2025 Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award**, presented each year to an NFL player who best demonstrates the qualities of on-field sportsmanship, including fair play, respect for the game and opponents, and integrity in competition.

The award was created in honor of the late founding owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Pro Football Hall of Famer Art Rooney, Sr.

The winner of the NFL Sportsmanship Award is determined by a vote of current NFL players. It marked the second time a Cardinals player was named the Art Rooney Sportsmanship Award winner after WR Larry Fitzgerald took home the honor in the award's inaugural season in 2014.

As the winner, Baker received a \$25,000 donation from the NFL Foundation to a charity of his choice.

The other finalists in 2025 were LB Lavonte David (Tampa Bay), LB Demario Davis (New Orleans) and T Brian O'Neill (Minnesota) in the NFC, and DT DeForest Buckner (Indianapolis), DT Harrison Phillips (New York Jets), DT Zach Sieler (Miami) and LB Kyle Van Noy (Baltimore) in the AFC.

DOUBLE-DIGIT SACKS IN DEBUT SEASON IN THE DESERT

Signed as a free agent in 2025, LB **Josh Sweat** - a Pro Bowl alternate - was much better than advertised in his first season in the desert. **Sweat started all 17 games last season and finished with 30 tackles, 12.0 sacks, 17 QB hits, 13 tackles for loss, 4 forced fumbles, a fumble recovery and 2 passes defended.**

Sweat's 12.0 sacks in 2025 established a new career high (previous was 11.0 in 2022 with Philadelphia). He became the first Cardinals player to reach double-digit sacks in a season since J.J. Watt (12.5) in 2022.

INJURY CUTS SHORT WILSON'S BREAKOUT YEAR

Signed as a free agent by the Cardinals in 2024, LB **Mack Wilson Sr.** started all 16 games he played that season and totaled 75 tackles, 3.0 sacks, an INT, 5 passes defended, 7 QB hits, 4 tackles for loss and a fumble recovery.

The seventh-year pro took on a much larger role in the middle of the Cardinals defense in 2025 before an injury that ended his season after just eight games. **He was given the "green dot" as Arizona's "Mike" linebacker in training camp, earning the responsibility as the play-caller. Prior the season opener, Wilson was named a team captain for the first time in his career.**

Wilson was thriving in his expanded role prior to the injury. In eight starts in 2025, he totaled 60 tackles (34 solo), 3 three tackles for loss, 6 passes defended, an INT and a forced fumble.

Through the first eight weeks of the '25 campaign, Wilson joined Bucs S Tykee Smith (66; 8), Broncos S Talanoa Hufanga (61; 8) and Bears LB Tremaine Edmunds (73; 6) as the only players in the NFL with 60+ tackles and 6+ passes defended.

QUARTERBACKS

Carson Beck – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (65th overall) of the 2026 NFL Draft. In six seasons at Georgia (2020-24) and Miami (2025), appeared in 55 games and finished his college career with a 37-6 record as a starter. Played penultimate game of his college career at State Farm Stadium and was named Offensive MVP after leading the Hurricanes to a 31-27 victory over Ole Miss. Completed 15-of-19 passes for 188 yards and a TD in his NFL preseason debut vs. Carolina.

Jacoby Brissett – Appeared in 14 games (12 starts) in his debut season with Arizona, completing 315-of-485 pass attempts (64.9%) for 3,366 yards, 23 TDs and a 94.1 passer rating. Finished the year having set career highs for pass attempts, completions, completion percentage, passing yards, passing TDs and passer rating. Joined Kyler Murray (4x), Carson Palmer (3x), Kurt Warner (3x), Neil Lomax (3x) and Charley Johnson (2x) as the only players in franchise history with 3,000+ passing yards and 20+ TD passes in a season. In the '26 opener at LAC (9/13), threw for 277 yards and a TD, marking his 13th consecutive start with 200+ yards and 1+ TDs which is NFL's longest active streak.

Gardner Minshew II – Joined the Cardinals in free agency in 2026. Has appeared in 63 games (47 starts) during the regular season and completed 1,100-of-1,742 pass attempts (63.1%) for 11,987 yards and 68 TDs while also rushing for 681 yards and five TDs. Named to the Pro Bowl with the Colts in 2023.

RUNNING BACKS

Tyler Allgeier – Acquired by AZ in free agency in 2026. In his Cardinals debut last week at LAC (9/13) played in his 69th consecutive game, the longest active streak among NFL RBs. Has rushed for 2,937 yards and 18 TDs on 693 carries (4.2 avg.) while adding 63 receptions for 525 yards and 2 TDs in his NFL career.

Bam Knight – Entering his second season with Arizona. Established career high in games played (12) and starts (8), scrimmage yards (429), total TDs (5), rushing TDs (4), receptions (22) and receiving yards (160) in 2025.

Jeremiah Love – Selected by AZ in the first round (3rd overall) of the 2026 NFL Draft out of Notre Dame. Became the highest drafted RB for any NFL team since the Giants selected Saquon Barkley #2 overall in 2018. In 2025, Love was a unanimous first-team All-American selection and became the first player in Notre Dame's storied history to be named a Doak Walker Award winner as the nation's top running back. Last week vs. LAC (9/13), scored his first career rushing TD on his third NFL carry.

TIGHT ENDS

Elijah Higgins – Appeared in 45 games (18 starts) with 64 receptions for 636 yards and three TDs in his first three seasons (2023-25) with the Cardinals. Set career-highs in receptions (7) and receiving yards (91) in Week 16 of 2025 vs. Atl. Before switching to TE in the NFL was a WR at Stanford alongside current teammates WR Michael Wilson and WR Simi Fehoko.

Trey McBride – Named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl in 2025. His 347 career receptions are the most by a TE in their first four seasons in NFL history. Became the first TE in NFL history to have back-to-back seasons with 100+ receptions and joined Dallas Clark (2009) and Travis Kelce (2018, '20, '22) as the only TEs to have 100+ receptions, 1,000+ yards and 10+ TDs in a season. Owns the NFL single-season record for receptions by a TE with 126 in '25, which also set a new Cardinals single-season (previous was 115 by WR DeAndre Hopkins in 2020).

Hunter Long – Traded to Cardinals on 8/30/26. Has appeared in 46 games (eight starts) in his career and has 20 receptions for 153 yards. He played in nine games (three starts) with Jacksonville last season after previously playing with Miami (2021-22) and the Rams (2023-24). He entered the league with Miami as a third-round selection (81st overall) in the 2021 NFL Draft from Boston College.

WIDE RECEIVERS

Kendrick Bourne – Signed a two-year contract with AZ as a free agent in 2026. Has appeared in 128 games (43 starts) during the regular season with 337 receptions for 4,340 yards and 22 TDs to go along with 20 carries for 174 yards. Ranks second in career receptions (337), receiving yards (4,340) and is tied for 2nd in TD receptions (23) among all active NFL players who entered the league undrafted behind only Jacksonville's Jakobi Meyers (470 receptions for 5,467 yards and 24 TDs). Registered 8 receptions for 85 yards in his Cardinals debut last week.

Jalen Brooks – Originally selected by the Cowboys in the 7th round (244th overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft, he signed with the Cardinals practice squad on 10/30/25 and was added to the active roster on 12/16/25. Has appeared in 28 career games and caught 21 passes for 292 yards and one TD. Saw action in five games with the Cardinals and had 51 receiving yards on three receptions.

Devin Duvernay – Two-time Pro Bowler (2021-22) and 2021 1st-team All-Pro as a returner. Joined Cards as a free agent in 2026. In 89 career games (25 starts) has returned 130 kickoffs for 3,300 yards (25.4 avg.) and two TDs while adding 1,284 punt return yards on 109 attempts (11.8 avg.). One of three active players in the NFL to have multiple kickoff returns for TDs and his 11.8 punt return average ranks fifth in the NFL since entering the league in 2020.

Simi Fehoko – In his second season with Arizona in 2026. Part of the same WR room at Stanford as current Cardinals teammates Michael Wilson and Elijah Higgins. Entered the NFL as a fifth-round pick (179th overall) of the Cowboys in the 2021 NFL Draft. Had his first career blocked punt in last week's opener at LAC (9/13).

Marvin Harrison Jr. – Selected by AZ as the 4th overall pick in 2024 out of Ohio State and was the first non-QB taken. Finished rookie season with 62 receptions for 885 yards (14.3 avg.) and eight TDs. His eight receiving TDs tied the franchise record for rookies. Ranked third on the team in receiving TDs (4), receiving yards (608) and receptions (41) in just 12 games played last season.

Reggie Virgil – Selected by the Cardinals in the 5th round (143rd overall) of the 2026 NFL Draft out of Texas Tech. Became the 10th Red Raiders player ever taken by the Cardinals in the NFL Draft and the first WR. Started his collegiate career at Miami (OH), where he spent three seasons (2022-24). Had a team-high 5 receptions for 66 yards in his preseason debut vs. Carolina.

Michael Wilson – In his fourth NFL season after being drafted by Arizona in 2023. Joined Hall of Famer Larry Fitzgerald (2004-06), Christian Kirk (2018-20) and Mal Kutner (1946-48) as the only players in Cardinals history with 500+ receiving yards and 3+ TD receptions in each of their first three seasons. In 2025, established career-highs in receptions (78), receiving yards (1,006) and TD receptions (7). Signed a three-year contract extension with the Cardinals on 9/3/26.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Isaiah Adams – From Ajax, Ontario. Selected by AZ in the third round (71st overall) in 2024 out of Illinois. Helped block for the Cardinals offense to run for 2,451 yards and 18 TDs on 463 carries (5.3 avg.) in 2024. Started 11 games on the O-Line in 2025.

Hayden Conner – Selected by the Cardinals in the sixth round (211th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Texas. During the 2024 season, he was named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team and was a Wuerffel Trophy semifinalist for his support of animal shelters in the Austin area, as well as other volunteer efforts.

Hjalte Froholdt – Started all 52 possible games at center since joining the Cardinals in 2023. Part of an offensive line that allowed just 30 sacks, the fifth-fewest sacks in the NFL in 2024. Native of Denmark. On 8/25/26 signed a two-year contract extension.

Josh Fryar – Played 54 games (30 starts) in five seasons (2020-24) at Ohio State. In Arizona, he reunited with Cardinals O-Line coach Justin Frye, who was his position coach with the Buckeyes the past three seasons (2022-24) and OL Paris Johnson Jr., who played on the same line at OSU from 2020-22. Only undrafted rookie to make AZ's Week 1 roster in '25 and made five starts at LT.

Jon Gaines II – In his fourth season in Arizona. Was a fourth-round pick in 2023 out of UCLA. Lined up as a FB on James Conner's 2-yard TD run in Week 2 of 2025 vs. Carolina. Saw his first action on the offensive line in Week 5 of 2025 vs. Ten and made his second career start at RG in Week 1 of 2026 @ LAC (9/13).

Paris Johnson Jr. – Cardinals first-round pick (6th overall) in 2023 out of Ohio State. Started all 44 games played in his first three NFL seasons (2023-25), starting all 17 games at RT in 2023 and 26 games at LT in 2024-25. Was named a Pro Bowl alternate for the first time in 2024.

Isaac Seumalo – 2024 Pro Bowl selection. Signed a three-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/11/26 as an unrestricted free agent. Has started 105-of-126 career regular games played with starts coming at LG (85), RG (19) and RT (one). Allowed just a 3.7% pressure rate in 2025 according to NGS, the lowest among all guards (min. 250 pass blocks) and his 76.4 pass-blocking grade by PFF ranked 6th in the NFL among guards in 2025.

Elijah Wilkinson – Returned to Arizona in 2026 as a free agent following two seasons with Atlanta (2024-25). Spent the 2023 season with the Cardinals, where he started nine of 10 games played at LG. Has started 63-of-95 regular season games at RT (38), LG (18) and RG (7). Has also seen action at LT. Started all 17 games for the Falcons in 2025, marking the first time in his career he started every game.

Jayden Williams – Selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round (217th overall) of the 2026 NFL Draft out of Mississippi. During his five years (2021-25) with the Rebels, appeared in 45 games (34 starts), including starts at LT (19) and RT (15). Final college game came in the Fiesta Bowl at State Farm Stadium. Made his NFL debut in Week 1 @ LAC (9/13).



CARDINALS PLAYER NOTES

SPECIALISTS

Casey Kreiter – In his first season with the Cardinals following six seasons with the New York Giants (2020-25). A three-time team captain (AZ- 2026 and NYG - 2022, '24), was selected to the Pro Bowl in 2018 with the Broncos. Enters the 2026 season having played in 150 consecutive games dating back to 2017. Played in all possible 101 regular season games with the Giants between 2020-25.

Blake Gillikin – After establishing a franchise record averaging 50.6 yards per punt in 2023, returned in 2024 and averaged 49.7 yards per punt. That represents the second-best single-season total in team history (min. 35 punts). Came to AZ following two seasons with NO (2021-22). Missed the final 12 games of '25 due to injury.

Chad Ryland – After signing with AZ in October of 2024, was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate that season. Since making his AZ debut in Week 5 of '24, he is tied for sixth in the NFL in made FGs (57) and ranks eighth in points scored (235). With 110 points in 2024 and 111 in 2025, became just the 8th player in franchise history with multiple seasons of 100+ points.

DEFENSIVE LINE

Andrew Billings – Signed a one-year contract with the Cardinals as an unrestricted free agent on 3/16/26 following three seasons (2023-25) in Chicago. Has appeared in 109 games (90 starts) during the regular season with 191 tackles, 28 tackles for loss, 6.5 sacks, 25 QB hits and one forced fumble. Texas state powerlifting champion as an 18-year old.

L.J. Collier – In 4th season with AZ after joining the team in 2023. Spent first four seasons in Seattle (2019-2022) where he was picked in the first round (29th overall) in 2019. Has appeared in 68 games (32) starts in his career. Limited to four games played in '25 due to injury following a '24 campaign in which he started 15-of-17 games played and set career highs with 29 tackles and 2.5 sacks.

Roy Lopez – Re-joined the Cardinals in 2026 following a season with Detroit. Has appeared in 81 games (51 starts) and totaled 171 tackles, 5.0 sacks, 21 tackles for loss, 14 QB hits, five passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries. A native of Tempe, AZ who attended Mesquite (Gilbert, AZ) High School before going on to attend the University of Arizona in 2020 prior to his initial two year run (2023-24) with the Cardinals.

Walter Nolen III – Drafted by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. Made NFL debut in Week 9 of 2025 @ Dallas and became first player since T.J. Watt in 2017 and 4th in NFL history with 1+ sack, 2+ TFLs & 1+ pass defended in first career game. Became the first rookie in 2025 to score a defensive TD with a 7-yard fumble return in Week 12 vs. Jax. Also became the first DL in NFL history to have two games with at least 1.0 sack and one pass defended in his first five career games.

Darius Robinson – Second of AZ's two first-round selections (27th overall) in 2024. Earned first-team All-SEC honors and a career-high 8.5 sacks in 2023 in his first season as an edge rusher at Missouri. Started 12-of-15 games played in 2025 and finished the season with 43 tackles, 1.0 sack, four tackles for loss, two QB hits and a fumble recovery. Tied Calais Campbell for the team lead in tackles among D-Linemen.

Dante Stills – Appeared in 49 games (22 starts) with 124 tackles, 9.0 sacks, 14 QB hits, 12 tackles for loss, 3 passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery in his first three seasons (2023-25). Led all Cardinals D-Linemen in both tackles and sacks in each of his first two seasons.

LINEBACKERS

Baron Browning – Traded to the Cardinals from Denver for a sixth-round selection in the 2025 NFL Draft on 11/4/24. Agreed to terms to a two-year contract with Arizona on 3/9/25. Appeared in 15 games (seven starts) last season with 33 tackles, 2.0 sacks, an INT, five QB hits, four TFLs, a pass defended and a fumble recovery.

Jordan Burch – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (78th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Oregon. Appeared in all 17 games as a rookie and recorded first career sack in Week 12 vs. Jax and a career-high four tackles in Week 14 @ Hou.

Zaven Collins – Selected by the Cardinals in the first round (16th overall) in 2021 out of Tulsa. In his first five-plus seasons (2021-26), appeared in 85 of a possible 86 games (65 starts) and totaled 262 tackles (163 solo), 27 QB hits, 31 tackles for loss, 13 passes defended, 12.0 sacks, three forced fumbles, two INTs (one returned for a TD), and three fumble recoveries (one returned for a TD).

Jack Gibbens – Signed a one-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/16/26. With the Patriots in 2025, played all 17 games (eight starts) and finished with 71 tackles and tied or set career-highs in tackles for loss (8), QB hits (3), passes defended (4) and sacks (1.0). Posted a game-high 7 tackles and a half-sack in his AZ debut last week.

Ekun Leota – Appeared in three contests with New Orleans in 2025 while also spending time on the Saints and Cardinals practice squads. Originally entered the NFL with Carolina in 2023 as an undrafted rookie free agent.

Karson Sharar – Selected by the Cardinals in the sixth round (183rd overall) of the 2026 NFL Draft out of Iowa. Appeared in 48 games (13 starts) and totaled 104 tackles, 13.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, a forced fumble, a fumble recovery and one pass defended. One of the top special teams LBs in the country, played 545 snaps on special teams in his college career. Made his Cardinals debut @ LAC (9/13) and led the team with two special teams tackles.

Cody Simon – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (115th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Ohio State. Appeared in 16 games (nine starts) in his debut NFL season and finished with 69 tackles, a half-sack, two tackles for loss, two passes defended and a forced fumble. Also added seven tackles on special teams.

Josh Sweat – Signed a four-year contract with the Cardinals on 3/13/25 after spending his first seven seasons with the Eagles (2018-24). His 12.0 sacks, 13 tackles for loss, 17 QB hits and 4 forced fumbles led the team in 2025. Posted a career-high three games with 2.0 sacks with the Cardinals in '25.

Mack Wilson Sr. – Named a team captain for the first time in his career in 2025 and was named the Cardinals' Mike LB. Started the first eight games and totaled 60 tackles, three tackles for loss, six passes defended, an INT and a forced fumble before an injury ended his season.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

Budda Baker – Arizona's 2017 second-round pick (36th overall) out of Washington is an eight-time Pro Bowler (2017, '19-25), six-time team captain (2020-25) and earned 2020 first-team All-Pro honors and 2024 second-team All-Pro honors. He is one of just 11 safeties in NFL history with at least eight Pro Bowl selections. The other 10 are all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Denzel Burke – Selected by the Cardinals in the fifth round (174th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Ohio State. A native of Phoenix, he was a standout prep DB and WR who attended Brophy College Prep (Phoenix) before transferring to Saguaro (Scottsdale) High School. His three INTs last season were the most by a rookie in franchise history since Patrick Peterson recorded 4 in 2011.

Kei'Trel Clark – Selected by Arizona in the sixth round (180th overall) in 2023 out of Louisville. He saw action in 14 games and recorded 15 tackles and two passes defended to go along with 10 special teams tackles in 2025.

Kitan Crawford – Selected by Arizona in the seventh round (225th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft. His second cousin is two-time NFL MVP and six-time Pro Bowl QB Patrick Mahomes. Ranked 6th among NFL rookies in special teams snaps (316) in '25.

Will Johnson – Selected by the Cardinals in the second round (47th overall) of the 2025 NFL Draft out of Michigan. Started 10-of-12 games played and had 37 tackles, 10 passes defended, two tackles for loss and a forced fumble in his debut NFL season. Joined Jacob Parrish as the two corners named to the PFWA All-Rookie Team.

Max Melton – Selected by Arizona in the second round (43rd overall) in 2024 out of Rutgers. In his first two-plus seasons, has appeared in 28 games (12 starts) and totaled 76 tackles, 12 passes defended, three tackles for loss and a forced fumble. His brother, Bo, played two seasons (2023-24) at WR for the Packers before Green Bay switched him to cornerback in 2025.

Dadrion Taylor-Demerson – Selected by the Cardinals in the fourth round (104th overall) of the 2024 NFL Draft out of Texas Tech and appeared in 29 games (six starts) with 90 tackles, two INTs, 11 passes defended, three tackles for loss and a forced fumble in his first two seasons (2024-25). Nickname is "Rabbit" which dates back to his childhood playing Pop Warner football.

Garrett Williams – Selected by the Cardinals in the third round (72nd overall) of the 2023 NFL Draft out of Syracuse, has appeared in 35 games (27 starts) in his first three seasons (2023-25) with 127 tackles (84 solo), four INTs, 16 PDs, two TFLs and two forced fumbles. Was a three-time All-ACC selection with the Orange.

Wydet Williams Jr. – Joined the Cardinals as an undrafted rookie free agent in 2026. Totaled 247 tackles, 8.5 TFLs, 20 PDs, 2.0 sacks, 6 INTs, 3 FRs, a FF and a blocked kick in 50 games in four seasons between Mississippi (2025), Louisiana-Monroe (2024) and Delta State (2022-23). Made his Cardinals debut in Week 1 @ LAC.

Andrew Wingard – Signed a one-year contract with the Cardinals as a free agent on 3/16/26 after playing his first seven seasons (2019-25) with Jacksonville. Has appeared in 103 games (45 starts) during the regular season with 312 tackles (205 solo), 13 TFLs, six QB hits, 2.0 sacks, 22 passes defended, seven INTs, four FFs and two FRs. Became one of eight DBs since 2000 to record a FF and INT in their first career game with a team and first since Jessie Bates (9/10/23 vs. Car).
