THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

After a three-game road swing, the Cardinals begin a month-long homestand (3 home games and a bye) with an NFC West showdown against the undefeated Seahawks. While Arizona has a short week to prepare after a 38-10 victory over Dallas on Monday Night Football, Seattle is coming off its bye week.

The matchup represents the 43rd all-time meeting between the division rivals and the Seahawks currently hold a one-game advantage (21-20-1) in the all-time series. The Cardinals claimed the most recent meeting, a 27-13 decision at CenturyLink Field in Week 16 last season.

It will be just the second divisional game for the Cardinals and the first for the Seahawks. Widely regarded as the toughest division in football, the NFC West leads the NFL in wins (16), points scored (635) and fewest points allowed (491). It remains the only division in which every team has a record of .500 or better and in which every team has a positive point differential.

The Seahawks enter the contest leading the league in scoring at 33.8 points per game and they meet a Cardinals defense that ranks #2 in the NFL in scoring defense (18.7 ppg). Arizona is coming off back-to-back games in which it held opponents to 10 points, including last week in Dallas against the NFL's #3 ranked scoring offense. On the other side of the ball, Arizona has scored 21 or more points in nine consecutive games and ranks fifth in total yards per game (402.5).

Arizona has benefited from several standout performances from star players this year, including from recently minted defensive captain **Budda Baker**, who will take the field against his hometown team for the seventh time in his career. Baker - who is tied for fifth among NFL DBs with 45 tackles this season - is coming off one of the best games of his career with seven tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defended and a forced fumble against the Cowboys.

Also coming off a strong performance against Dallas (164 yards and two TDs on 20 carries), RB **Kenyan Drake** totaled a career-high 166 rushing yards and two scoring runs, including a career-long 80-yarder, the last time he lined up against the Seahawks.

Someone more familiar to the Seahawks, WR **Larry Fitzgerald**, enters the game just one reception shy of 1,400 for his career. Making his 32nd appearance against Seattle, Fitzgerald has more receptions (179) and receiving yards (2,117) against the Seahawks than any other player in NFL history.

The Cardinals have a bye in Week 8 before hosting the Dolphins in Week 9 while the Seahawks return to CenturyLink Field to host the 49ers next week.

#SEAvsAZ - WEEK 7 HIGHLIGHTS

- When the Cardinals and Seahawks square off at State Farm Stadium on Sunday, it will be a matchup of Arizona's #2 ranked scoring defense (18.7 ppg) vs. Seattle's #1 ranked scoring offense (33.8 ppg). Despite already having played six games, the Cardinals have allowed the fewest points among teams in the NFC (112).
- Arizona's defense collected a season-high four takeaways (2 INT, 2 FR), 3.0 sacks, 7 tackles for loss, 8 QB hits and a season-high 7 passes defended against the Cowboys last week. The Cardinals scored 24 points (3 TD, 1 FG) off the Cowboys four turnovers.
- In the three Week 7 games that will feature the teams with the most combined wins - Seahawks/Cardinals (9); Rams/Bears (9); Steelers/Titans (10) - three NFC West teams are involved.
- RB **Kenyan Drake** rushed for 164 yards and two TDs (1 and 69 yards) on 20 carries last week in Dallas. It was the second-highest single-game rushing total of his career, behind only the 166 yards he ran for in Seattle in Week 16 last season.
- After rushing for 261 yards and three TDs on 35 carries (7.5 avg.) last week in Dallas, the Cardinals rank fourth in the NFL averaging 161.0 rushing yards per game in 2020. Arizona's 11 rushing TDs - including six in the last two games - lead the NFL.
- S **Budda Baker** had one of the best games of his career in the Cardinals win over Dallas, recording seven tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defended and a forced fumble. He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

Seahawks Connections

Cardinals QB **Brett Hundley** was with the Seahawks during the 2018 season.

Cardinals TE **Darrell Daniels** played in nine games (two starts) with the Seahawks in 2018. Daniels attended the University of Washington where he appeared in 47 games over four seasons (2013-16) with the Huskies.

Cardinals DBs coach **Marcus Robertson** played for the Seahawks from 2001-02.

Cardinals PS TE **Justin Johnson** entered the NFL as an undrafted free agent with Seattle in 2019 and spent the year on injured reserve.

Cardinals Western Regional Scout **Josh Scobey** played for the Seahawks from 2005-07 and helped Seattle advance to Super Bowl XL.

Cardinals Director of College Scouting **Chris Culmer** is from West Richland, WA, graduated from Washington State University and resides in Seattle. He worked for the Seahawks for nine seasons prior to joining the Cardinals, first as a scouting assistant (2000-03) and then as a pro scout (2004-08).

Seahawks DE **Jonathan Bullard** spent the 2019-20 seasons with the Cardinals before being signed by Seattle off Arizona's practice squad in Week 5.

Seahawks G **Mike Iupati** played in 39 games for the Cardinals from 2015-18.

Seahawks DE **Benson Mayowa** spent the 2018 season in Arizona, appearing in 15 games and starting four.

Seahawks O-Line coach **Mike Solari** served in the same role with the Cardinals in 1989.

Cardinals CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** played at the University of Washington from 2016-18 and was named a second-team All-American by the Associated Press, SI.com, USA Today and The Sporting News in 2018.

Cardinals LB **Ezekiel Turner** played at the University of Washington from 2015-17 and was named the Huskies Special Teams Player of the Week four different times in his college career.

ALL-TIME SERIES

The matchup between the Cardinals and Seahawks this week represents the 43rd all-time meeting between the division rivals. Seattle holds a one-game advantage (21-20-1) in the all-time series.

In the first 18 seasons (2002-19) as division rivals, the Cardinals and Seahawks split the season series nine times, including in six of the last nine seasons. Arizona has won the season series three times (most recently in 2016) and Seattle four times (most recently in 2018).

Arizona has a 6-7-1 record at home against the Seahawks since the team began play at State Farm Stadium in 2006. Although both teams have traditionally enjoyed a significant home field advantage, the Cardinals and Seahawks have seen a reversal in fortunes when playing each other. Dating back to 2013, Arizona is 5-2 playing at Seattle and 0-6-1 at home vs. the Seahawks. The Cardinals enter this week's game looking for their first home win vs. Seattle since 2012.

Kliff Kingsbury became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on January 11, 2019, coming to Arizona after six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech. In Kingsbury's first season with the Cardinals, the offense went from #32 overall in scoring in 2018 to #16 in 2019 and went from #32 overall in scoring drives in 2018 to number #9. Known for his work with QBs in the college ranks, Kingsbury helped guide first-year signal-caller Kyler Murray, the #1 overall pick in the 2019 draft, to AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors last season. While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive offenses that ranked in the top-20 in total offense all six seasons. A former star QB at Texas Tech, Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft and also spent time with the Saints and Jets during his playing career.

Hired as the eighth head coach in franchise history on January 11, 2010, **Pete Carroll** is in his 11th season leading the Seahawks, where he has accumulated an 105-59-1 record in the regular season and a 10-7 mark in the postseason. Carroll's tenure with the Seahawks has included eight postseason appearances, four division titles and back-to-back Super Bowl appearances, including a win in Super Bowl XLVIII. Carroll entered the 2020 campaign having led Seattle to eight consecutive winning seasons, including seven seasons of 10+ wins. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Carroll spent nine seasons as head coach at USC. That tenure with the Trojans followed stints as a head coach with the Patriots (1997-99) and Jets (1994).

CRUCIAL CATCH: INTERCEPT CANCER

All types of cancers impact the NFL family and NFL fans. The league's *Crucial Catch* campaign - which began in 2009 in partnership with the American Cancer Society (ACS) - is an evolution of the NFL's breast cancer awareness campaign, expanding the impact of the league's work to multiple types of cancers, in addition to breast cancer.



CRUCIAL CATCH

This year specifically, *Crucial Catch* is serving as part of the NFL's *It Takes All of Us* campaign, which highlights the importance of everyone joining together to make a difference in the lives of others.

Crucial Catch helps people catch cancer early, when it may be easier to treat. This is a greater challenge than ever. The COVID-19 pandemic has had a devastating impact on screening. Since March 2020, routine cancer screenings have dropped, resulting in a screening rate drop between 86% and 94% for some cancers. Through *Crucial Catch*, the NFL and American Cancer Society are allocating resources dedicated to safely restarting cancer screenings in communities with the most need. For many forms of cancer (breast, cervical, colorectal and prostate), the five-year survival rate is above 90% when detected early before it has a chance to spread.

Since 2012, the NFL has funded ACS' Community Health Advocates Implementation Nationwide Grants for Empowerment and Equity (CHANGE) grants, which have contributed to 370,000 screenings in underserved communities and reached more than 1,070,000 million individuals with education, screening reminders and patient navigation, bringing these life-saving messages and screening services to those who need them most.

CARDS HOST SEAHAWKS IN CRUCIAL CATCH GAME

All 32 NFL teams are dedicating one home game during the month of October as their official *Crucial Catch* game and the Cardinals will host their game this week when the team hosts the division-rival Seattle Seahawks.

At Sunday's game, the Cardinals will host a "fan mosaic" via Zoom with cancer survivors in partnership with Cigna and the American Cancer Society. To help support on the Cardinals throughout the game, 25-30 fans will appear on the videoboard to celebrate TDs and cheer on the team.

Cardinals coaches and staff will wear NFL-issued *Crucial Catch* branding and gameday apparel that will feature a multi-colored logo representing all cancers. Cardinals players will use multi-colored equipment including helmet decals, captains patches, cleats, gloves, sideline caps, shoelaces and quarterback towels. In addition, Cardinals Cheerleaders will be using multi-colored poms representing all cancers and the field will be covered with banners, goal post wraps and field stencils featuring the *Crucial Catch* logo.

Game-worn *Crucial Catch* merchandise will be autographed and auctioned at NFL Auction (nfl.com/auction). Charitable contributions are donated to the American Cancer Society to support its CHANGE grant program.

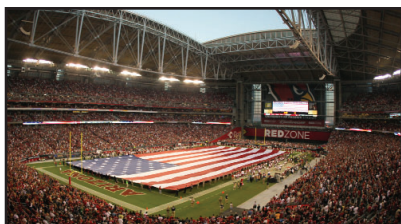
15TH SEASON AT STATE FARM STADIUM

The Cardinals began the 15th season at State Farm Stadium with a 30-15 victory over Washington in Week 2.

Opened in 2006, State Farm Stadium has proved a catalyst for the Cardinals success in the last decade-plus.

The Cardinals have posted a winning record at home in eight of 14 full seasons at State Farm Stadium, earning four playoff berths and three NFC West titles during that time. The Cardinals finished .500 or better just twice and made the playoffs only one time in 18 seasons prior.

14 SEASONS AND 144 SELLOUTS

Arizona sold out every game (preseason and postseason included) in the first 14 seasons at the venue. There were only 12 games that sold out in time to be televised locally in 18 years at Sun Devil Stadium.

FITZGERALD'S CAREER VS. SEATTLE

This Sunday at State Farm Stadium, WR **Larry Fitzgerald** will play his 32nd career game against the division-rival Seahawks. In his first 31 games vs. Seattle, the 11-time Pro Bowl selection recorded 179 receptions for 2,117 yards and 13 TDs.

Fitzgerald has seven career 100-yard receiving performances against Seattle, and two games with multiple TD catches.



Fitzgerald has more career receptions and receiving yards against the Seahawks than any other player in NFL history.

Fitzgerald's reception totals against the Seahawks (179), Rams (195), 49ers (186) are the three highest in NFL history against a single opponent.

FITZ GOES FOR STADIUM RECEPTIONS RECORD

WR **Larry Fitzgerald** enters Sunday's matchup vs. Seattle with 646 career receptions at State Farm Stadium.

Fitzgerald's next catch at the venue will make history.

He is currently tied with Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (646 at Candlestick Park) for the most receptions in NFL history at a single stadium.

MEMORABLE PERFORMANCES VS. SEATTLE

Two of the Cardinals stars on offense - WR **DeAndre Hopkins** and RB **Kenyan Drake** - had memorable performances the last time they faced the Seahawks.

In the Cardinals Week 15 victory at Seattle last season, **Drake** carried 24 times for a career-high 166 yards against the Seahawks. That total included a career-long 80-yard TD run in the first quarter that is tied for the third-longest TD run in Cardinals history.

While playing with Houston in 2017, **Hopkins** recorded eight receptions for 224 yards and a TD in Week 8 at Seattle. The 224 receiving yards remain the second-highest single-game total of his career (238 vs. Ten in 2014). Included in that total was a 72-yard TD catch in the fourth quarter that is the second-longest TD catch of his career.

A CRUCIAL MATCHUP OUT WEST

The Cardinals remain in the thick of a tough race in the NFL's winningest division in 2020.

The Cardinals victory over Dallas on Monday Night Football last week - coupled with the Rams loss in San Francisco - means Arizona enters this week's showdown vs. the division-leading and undefeated Seahawks tied for second place in the NFC West.

The NFC West in 2020

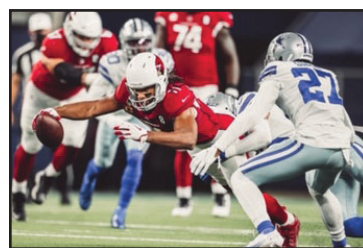

With the win on Monday, the Cardinals improved to 5-1 in their last six games against the Cowboys and also improved to 2-0 all-time at AT&T Stadium.

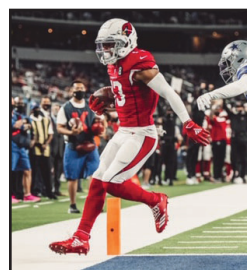

AZ RUNS FOR SEASON-HIGH 261 YARDS

The Cardinals ran for a season-high 261 yards and three TDs on 35 carries (7.5 avg.) in the win over the Cowboys on Monday. Arizona has now rushed for 100+ yards in all six games this season – and in 16 of 22 games under Kingsbury.

The 2020 season marks just the third time in the last 46 years (1975-20) that the Cardinals have rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first six games of a season.

Monday's victory over the Cowboys marked the second time the Cardinals rushed for 260+ yards in a game in the last two seasons (266 yards at Cincinnati, 10/6/19). That equals the number of the games in which Arizona had 260+ yards in the previous 38 seasons: 11/27/11 at St. Louis (268) and 9/22/96 at New Orleans (267).

The Cardinals have rushed for 966 yards and 11 TDs on 183 carries (5.28 avg.) in 2020. Arizona's 966 rushing yards are the most through the first six games of a season since the team had 1,088 rushing yards through six games in 1976.

Through Week 6, Arizona ranks fourth in the NFL averaging 161.0 rushing yards per game in 2020.

RUNNING FOR 150+ UNDER KINGSBURY

DEFENSE CLAMPS DOWN ON THE COWBOYS

Facing the NFL's #3 ranked scoring offense in Dallas on Monday Night Football, the Cardinals held the Cowboys (who entered the contest averaging 32.6 points/game) to season lows in points (10) and total TDs (1).

The 10 points allowed tied for the fewest for the Cardinals under defensive coordinator Vance Joseph - matching their total from Week 5 against the Jets.

KEEPING POINTS TO A MINIMUM

Over the past two weeks, the Cardinals joined the Rams (Weeks 4-5) as the only teams in the NFL to hold opponents to 10 points or fewer in consecutive games this season.

SHUTTING IT DOWN INSIDE THE RED ZONE

The Cardinals held the Cowboys to just one TD on three red zone possessions and kept them out of the end zone two of their three goal-to-goal possession.

That performance kept with a trend for the Cardinals defense in 2020. Arizona has allowed opponents to score a TD on just 10 of 24 red zone possessions this season. Only Chicago (36.4%) has a better opponent red zone TD percentage than Arizona (41.7) in 2020.

When opponents get really close is when the Cardinals defense clamps down best. In goal-to-goal situations, Arizona has allowed TDs on just five of 12 possessions. The Cardinals 41.7% opponent goal-to-goal percentage leads the NFL in 2020.

VANCE'S DEFENSE GETTING IT DONE

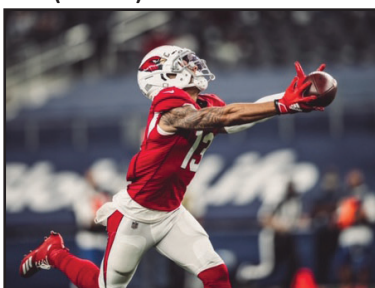

CAPTAIN BAKER SHINES IN DALLAS

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, S **Budda Baker** is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a break-out campaign in 2019.

In addition to developing into one of the top defenders in the game, Baker recently added another role in 2020: team captain. He received the honor last Sunday evening prior to the Monday night game, taking over the spot LB Chandler Jones held prior to his season-ending injury.

NEW ROLE SUITS HIM WELL

Baker acquitted himself quite well in his first game as a captain during the Cardinals 38-10 victory over Dallas on MNF.

Still wearing a cast on his hand due to a thumb injury suffered earlier this season, Baker had one of the best games of his career. **The Pro Bowler finished Monday's game with seven tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defended and a forced fumble.**

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.

In the fourth quarter, Baker dove in front of an Andy Dalton pass intended for Amari Cooper and intercepted it at the AZ 10-yard line. **It was the first INT of his NFL career and first INT since his junior year at the University of Washington,** when he intercepted a Luke Falk pass on 11/25/16 vs. Washington State.

Through Week 6, Baker has 45 tackles, three tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks, three QB hits, his first-career INT, two passes defended and a forced fumble in five games (all starts). He missed Arizona's Week 4 game against Carolina after thumb surgery, but still ranks top-five among NFL DBs in tackles this year.

General Manager Steve Keim: "When you don't see him out on the field, it just goes to show how valuable he is. The guy is a human eraser. He makes a ton of tackles. He brings energy. He brings juice. He's physical. He's our leader and our heart and soul on defense."

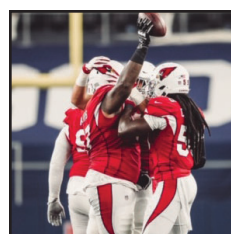
WR Larry Fitzgerald: "Nobody means more to this football team than Budda Baker, and you can take that to the bank. The guy plays the game the right way. He works at it the right way. The way he's wired mentally, as a teammate, he's approachable. ... This guy is the best of the best as a human being, as a football player, as a teammate. And I love him. I know his teammates all feel the same way about him and we're very privileged to have him back on the field with us."

MONDAY NIGHT NOTABLES

Fourth-year LB **Haason Reddick** had one of the best games of his career against the Cowboys, recording five tackles, 2.0 sacks, two tackles for loss and a pass defended. It was the first multi-sack performance of his career.

Second-year CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** also had a career game in Dallas, finishing with eight tackles, a tackle for loss, two passes defended and his first career fumble recovery.

Playing just days after attending the funeral of his father, DL **Jordan Phillips** recorded two tackles, two QB hits, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery against the Cowboys. Playing in his 82nd career game, it was the first time in his career Phillips recorded a forced fumble and fumble recovery in the same game.

QB Kyler Murray

- With both rushing and passing TD, Murray would become the first player in NFL history to accomplish that feat in six of the first seven games of a season.

WR Larry Fitzgerald

- With a reception, Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 250 consecutive games, extending the second-longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274).

MURRAY WINS PLAYER OF THE WEEK

QB **Kyler Murray** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance in the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets.

It marks Murray's second career "Offensive Player of the Week" selection (Week 6 vs. Atlanta in 2019) and he becomes just the fourth QB in franchise history to win multiple "Player of the Week" awards (Kurt Warner, Boomer Esiason, Neil Lomax).

Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4 in the win. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries.

On the Cardinals five scoring drives against the Jets, Murray completed 18-of-22 pass attempts (81.8%) for 290 yards and a TD while also rushing for 33 yards and a TD on five carries.



NOTHING LIKE NUMBERS MURRAY IS PUTTING UP

Through six games in 2020, **Murray** has completed 135-of-205 pass attempts for 1,487 yards and 10 TDs, while also rushing for 370 yards and six TDs on 51 carries.

He is the first QB in the Super Bowl era with at least 10 passing TDs and 6 rushing TDs in the first six games of a season.

RARE NUMBERS SO FAR IN A YOUNG CAREER

Murray has completed 484-of-747 pass attempts (64.8%) for 5,209 yards and 30 TDs while rushing for 914 yards and 10 TDs on 144 carries (6.3 avg.).

He is just the fifth player in NFL history with 30+ passing TDs and 10+ rushing TDs in their first two NFL seasons.

He is the first player in NFL history to accomplish the feat five times in the first six games of a season. Murray (5) joins Jim Hart (5 in 1968) as the only players in franchise history with at least five such games in a single season.

Murray's five games with both a passing and rushing TD lead the NFL in 2020.

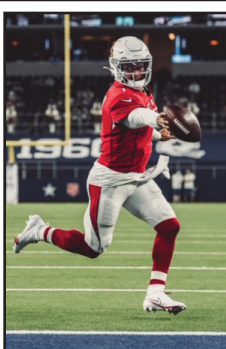

A CAREER HIGH IN NEW YORK

In the Cardinals Week 5 win over the Jets, **Murray** completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also rushed for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. Murray earned NFC "Offensive Player of the Week" honors for the performance.

Murray's 380 passing yards are the highest total for a Cardinals QB since Carson Palmer threw for 421 yards on 10/18/15 at Pittsburgh. *It was the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville on 11/17/13.*

Murray has six career 300-yard outings. No other QB in franchise history had more than four games with 300+ passing yards in their first two NFL seasons.

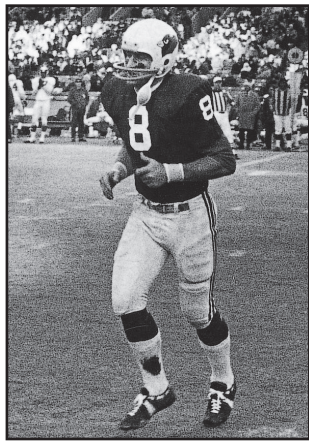


THE PASSING OF A LEGEND

On September 17th, Hall of Fame safety **Larry Wilson** passed away at the age of 82.

A legendary figure in NFL history, Wilson spent more than 43 years with the Cardinals organization. Some of those highlights:

- A seventh-round selection in the 1960 Draft out of Utah, he played 13 seasons for the Cardinals
- Earned 8 Pro Bowl selections and was named 1st-team All-Pro 5 times
- Was named to both the NFL's 75th and 100th Anniversary teams
- Enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1978
- Held a variety of roles in the Cardinals front office from 1973-2002 including VP & General Manager from 1988-93



- Inducted into the Cardinals Ring of Honor at State Farm Stadium in 2006, his #8 jersey was retired at the end of his playing career - and is one just five retired jersey numbers in franchise history

Wilson played in 169 games and his toughness and versatility as a player have come to define the safety position. During his career, he is credited with originating the safety blitz, a tactic that was originally named "Wildcat" after Wilson's nickname.

To celebrate the NFL's 100th season last year, Wilson was one of six safeties (Jack Christiansen, Ken Houston, Ronnie Lott, Emlen Tunnell, Ed Reed) selected to the NFL 100 All-Time team after previously being named to the All-NFL team in 1994 to commemorate the league's 75th anniversary.

His 52 INTs are a Cardinals franchise record as are his 800 career INT return yards. Wilson led the NFL with 10 INTs in 1966, a year in which he established a franchise record with INTs in seven straight games, which also is tied for the second-longest streak in NFL history.

Regarded as one of the toughest players in NFL history, Wilson once intercepted a pass in a 1965 game against the Steelers with casts on both hands to protect broken fingers. He returned the INT 35 yards for a TD, giving the Cardinals a 21-17 victory.

Following his playing days, Wilson embarked on a 30-year career as a team executive with the Cardinals. He worked as the team's director of pro scouting (1973-76), director of pro personnel (1977-78) and also served as interim head coach for the final three games of the 1979 season, earning victories over the San Francisco 49ers and New York Giants.

Wilson was appointed to Vice President and General Manager with the team during the Cardinals inaugural season in Arizona in 1988, a position he served through 1993. Wilson continued his role as the team's Vice President until his retirement in 2003.

Larry Wilson was born on March 24, 1938 in Rigby, ID. He is survived by Nancy, his wife of 40 years, as well as daughter Christie, son Larry, Jr. and numerous grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

REMEMBERING LARRY IN THEIR OWN WORDS

Nancy Wilson (Larry's wife of 40 years)

"Larry Wilson was the kindest, most humble person that I will ever know. To most, he was this ferocious and fierce football player who some described as pound for pound the toughest player of his generation. To me, he was the most generous and gentle soul you would ever meet. For Larry, it was always about everyone else and what he could do for them. And especially in the times we live, that's something that that we could use more of today."

Michael Bidwill (Cardinals Owner)

"Besides my father, Larry Wilson was the most influential male figure in my life. He was someone who truly lived his faith and demonstrated it daily in the kindness he showed every single person he met. Any of us lucky enough to be in his orbit - whether that was for a few minutes or four decades - was always better off from the experience. I will remember Larry Wilson first as a fantastic person but then obviously as one of the greatest players the National Football League has ever seen. It's fitting that his passing coincides with the league's 100th birthday because his toughness and the way he revolutionized his position make him one of our game's most unforgettable figures. Whether on the field playing with casts on both hands or brightening the lives of every person he knew, Larry's selflessness defined who he was and how we will all remember him."

"For more than 40 years, Larry Wilson played a remarkable role in the history of the Cardinals and National Football League as a Hall of Fame player and team executive. While he will be recognized for his toughness and excellence on the field and his many contributions to the Cardinals organization, we will also remember Larry as loyal, humble and kind to everyone he met. Larry enriched the lives of many players and colleagues around the league."

Larry helped revolutionize the safety position in his 13 years as the versatile anchor of the Cardinals' defense. His toughness and football instincts earned him recognition as one of the greatest to ever play the game."

EXTRAORDINARY DUO

With the acquisition of WR **DeAndre Hopkins** this offseason, the Cardinals receiving corps includes the only wideout to earn 1st-Team All-Pro honors each of the last three seasons (Hopkins) and the receiver who currently ranks second in NFL history in both receptions and receiving yards (**Larry Fitzgerald**).

COLLECTING TALENT FROM STATE #48

The Cardinals current 53-man roster includes six players who played either high school or college football in the state of Arizona. That includes 2020 seventh round pick RB **Eno Benjamin** - who had a record-breaking career at Arizona State. Benjamin (222nd overall) was selected in nearly the same spot as the last ASU player drafted before him: S Pat Tillman (7th round, 226th overall) in 1998.

The selection of Benjamin in 2020 marked the third consecutive year that the Cards drafted a player who played high school or college football in Arizona. In 2018 the team drafted WR **Christian Kirk** and in 2019 it was CB **Byron Murphy**, Jr.

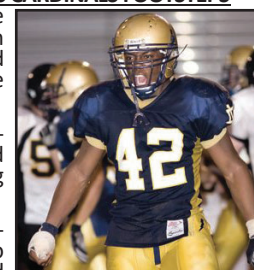

A LOCAL KID RETURNS TO AZ, FOLLOWS IN FATHER'S CARDINALS FOOTSTEPS

One of the Cardinals top signings of the 2020 free agency period was LB **Devon Kennard**. He is the son of former Cardinals offensive lineman Derek Kennard Sr., who also played for the Los Angeles Express of the USFL in addition to the Saints and Cowboys.

Following his playing career, Derek returned to Arizona to raise his family. Devon grew up in Phoenix and starred at Desert Vista High School before attending USC.

When Devon took the field in Week 1 at San Francisco, the Kennards became the third father-son duo to play for the Cardinals, joining the Butlers (Kevin and Drew) and the Metcalfs (Terry and Eric).



ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14th since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona; played a week before Super Bowl XLIX and the 2015 Pro Bowl combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill's leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

Steve Keim was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB Carson Palmer from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act, and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans, and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Throughout the offseason, numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of coming together to make meaningful change a reality in the United States.

DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another and you know, we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."

OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."

Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."

"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."

"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."

"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."

QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."

LARRY FITZGERALD - AT A GLANCE

• An 11-time Pro Bowl selection, ranks second in NFL history in receptions (1,399) and receiving yards (17,228) and sixth in league annals with 120 TD receptions.

• Named a team captain in 2020, marking the 10th time in his career he has earned the honor.

• Selected by the Cardinals 3rd overall in the 2004 NFL Draft, is in his 17th season in Arizona in 2020. In team history, only QB Jim Hart (18) played more seasons with the team.

• His 1,399 career receptions are the most for any player in NFL history with a single team, surpassing the previous record held by Rice (1,281 with SF).

• Named a co-winner (along with QB Eli Manning) of the 2016 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year award.

• At #69 on the NFL Networks Top-100 Players of 2020, has now made the All-100 Team in all 10 years of its existence. He is the only non-QB to accomplish that feat.

• The 2019 season marked the 13th time in 16 seasons he led the Cards in receiving yards. In NFL history, only Jerry Rice (15 times) led his team in receiving yards more times.

• Has caught at least one pass in all 42 different stadiums he has played in during his NFL career and has at least one TD reception in 27 different stadiums.

• In February of 2018, joined PGA pro Kevin Streelman in winning the Pebble Beach Pro-Am golf tournament. Became the first African-American amateur to win the event – which dates back to 1937 – and the first professional athlete to win the title since Dan Marino in 1988.

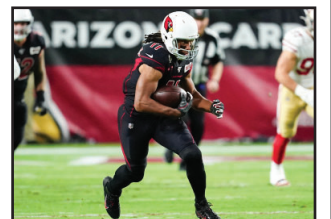
ACTIVE STARTS STREAK LEADS ALL WRS

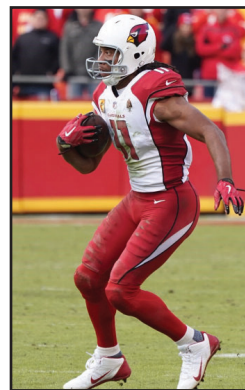
SITTING AT #2 IN RECEIVING YARDS

ALONE AT #6 WITH 120 TD CATCHES

Fitzgerald hauled in a 21-yard TD reception in the second quarter of the Cardinals Week 16 victory at Seattle last year.

It was the 120th TD catch of his career, which ranks sixth on the NFL's all-time list for career TD catches. His 120 career TD catches are 42 more than any other active player (Bears TE Jimmy Graham ranks 2nd with 78).

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,399), receiving yards (17,228), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.

"We all feel like he's a starting running back in this league, and he does, too," head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** said of Edmonds. "When he had his opportunities, he shined, and he continues to shine. He can catch it, run it, block, play special teams, and he's really bright football-wise. He's everything you want."

One of the reasons the Cardinals are so high on Edmonds is his big-play ability, which was on display again in the Week 5 win over the Jets. *His 29-yard TD run in the first quarter was his fifth career TD run of 20+ yards. EDMONDS SHINES NEAR HIS OLD STOMPING GROUNDS

After becoming just the sixth player in NFL history with three TD runs of 20+ yards in a single game in the Cardinals Week 7 victory over the Giants at MetLife Stadium last season, Edmonds broke off yet another long TD run against the Jets last Sunday. The third-year back scored the first TD of the game on a 29-yard run in the first quarter.

Combined with his three rushing TDs (20, 20 and 22 yards) against the Giants last season, Edmonds now has four TDs in two career games at MetLife Stadium. He has 6 TDs in 32 career games played away from MetLife Stadium.

Against the Giants last year, *Edmonds became just the sixth player in NFL history with at least three rushing TDs of 20+ yards in a game.*

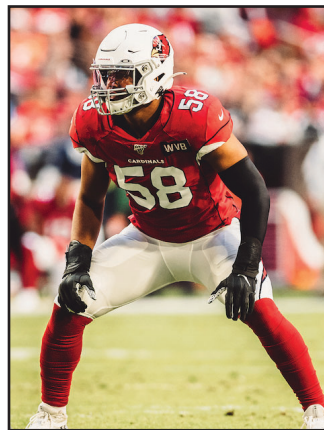
LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in 2019 after four years with the Eagles – put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** recorded his 11th career INT when he picked off a pass from for Bengals teammate QB Andy Dalton that was intended for WR CeeDee Lamb in the third quarter last week in Dallas.

It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. Among active players, only New England CB Devin McCourty (5 in 12 games) has more INTs while playing on MNF.

Kirkpatrick signed with the Cardinals soon after the start of training, joining the team after eight seasons in Cincinnati, where DC Vance Joseph was his position coach during the 2014-15 seasons.

The former first-rounder had 288 tackles, 10 INTs (two returned for TDs), 65 passes defended, a forced fumble and two fumble recoveries in 99 games with the Bengals before signing a one-year contract with Arizona.

TRADING THE DEEP FRYER FOR A GAME BALL

The only game ball given out following the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets went to third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** - adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL playing field.

Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck - a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 - finished the game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps.

His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017.

It was a big performance for the Lake of the Hills, IL native but it wasn't the first success he has experienced in the NFL.

A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 36 career games, he has 24 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and also scored a TD on a blocked punt. In 2018, he led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams.

A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

Following the win over the Jets, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** spoke of how happy he was to see Gardeck's hard work paying off. "I rehabbed and trained with Dennis this offseason before I came here and I saw the work that he put in. I got to see the work he put in behind the scenes and for him to go in do what he did today, I knew he was going to give his all and it resulted in two sacks. That is what you look for in a guy like that. It gives the team motivation."

FOLLOWING UP WITH ANOTHER STRONG SHOWING IN WEEK 6

In last week's Monday night victory at Dallas, Gardeck again saw limited action on defense but - again - he made his presence felt when he was in. In 16 defensive snaps, he had a tackle, a QB pressure and a QB hit. He nearly took down Andy Dalton in the Dallas end zone for a sack but the QB got the ball out just before going down. In 26 total defensive snaps the last two games, Gardeck has three tackles, 2.0 sacks, three QB hits and two tackles for loss.



SPECIAL TEAMS COMES UP BIG IN 2020

In their first six games this season, the Cardinals have benefitted from big plays on special teams:

- Third-year LB **Ezekiel Turner** - a PFWA All-Rookie pick as a special teamer in 2018 - made one of the biggest plays of the game in Arizona's Week 1 win over San Francisco. He set up the Cardinals first TD of the game in the first quarter when he blocked a 49ers punt, which was recovered by LB **Dennis Gardeck** and returned to the SF 10-yard line. It was the Cardinals first blocked punt since the 2018 season finale, which was also recovered by Gardeck for a TD.



- K **Zane Gonzalez** connected on a 56-yard FG just prior to halftime against San Francisco. It was the longest FG of his career and tied for the fourth-longest FG in franchise history.

- LS **Aaron Brewer** - now in his ninth NFL season and playing in his 119th career game in Week 2 - recovered the first fumble of his career in the first quarter. Covering a punt return, Brewer jumped on a ball forced loose by TE Darrell Daniels at the Washington 40-yard line. Six plays later QB **Kyle Murray** scored on a 14-yard TD run to give Arizona a 14-0 lead.

- In the fourth quarter of the Cardinals Week 5 games against the Jets, CB **Kevin Peterson** recovered a muffed punt near the Cardinals goal line, setting up a six-play, 96-yard TD drive on Arizona's next possession.

KICKING HIS WAY TO THE TOP

Through five games this season, K **Zane Gonzalez** has connected on seven-of-nine FG attempts with his two misses coming from 52 and 49 yards in the season-opener.

He has converted two-of-three beyond 50 yards, including a 54-yard FG in Week 3 against the Lions and a career-long 56-yarder in Week 1 against the 49ers.

In franchise history, just three made FGs have covered more ground than his 56-yard FG against San Francisco.

OFFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS IN 2019

- Scored 25+ points in game nine times, including eight times in the final 12 games. From the beginning of October (Week 5) through the end of the season, only New Orleans (10), San Francisco (9) and Baltimore (9) scored 25+ points in more games than the Cardinals (8).
- Arizona's seven games without a turnover in 2019 were the most in a season in franchise history.
- Arizona averaged a franchise record 5.03 yards per rush attempt as a team in 2019 after rushing for 1,990 yards and 18 TDs on 396 attempts. The Cardinals 1,990 rushing yards were the most in a season since 1988 (2,027), the team's first in Arizona.
- 2019 marked just the sixth time in franchise history (2016, 1984, 1975, 1949, 1948) the Cardinals had at least 20 passing TDs and 18 rushing TDs in a season.
- The Cardinals rushed for 200+ yards in a game three times in 2019. It is the first time since 1983 (3x) that Arizona had 200+ rushing yards in at least three games.
- In Week 5 at Cincinnati, the Cardinals posted 500+ net yards and 250+ rushing yards in a game for the first time since 1960.

TURNOVER-FREE FOOTBALL

The Cardinals went without a turnover in seven games last season, a franchise record despite a rookie starting all 16 games at QB.

KINGSBURY'S RECORD-BREAKING RUN GAME

When Arizona hired **Kingsbury** in 2019, much of the talk surrounding the hire involved the former Texas-Tech head coach implementing a pass-heavy "Air-Raid" system in the desert.

Although the passing offense made significant strides in 2019, it was the rushing attack that showed the biggest improvement last season.

After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018, the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history.

Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season (1,990 yards & 18 TDs on 396 attempts).

The previous record for team rushing average (4.87) was established in 1960.

The Cardinals 1,990 rushing yards in 2019 represent the team's highest total since rushing for 2,027 yards in 1988, the year the team moved to Arizona.

The 2019 season marked the first time since 1984 (2,008 yards; 21 TDs) that the Cardinals rushed for at least 1,900 yards and 18 TDs in a season.

After having the #32 ranked rushing attack in 2018, the Cardinals had the #10 ranked rushing attack in 2019, averaging 124.4 yards per game. It marked just the second time in the last 35 years (#8 in 2015) that the Cardinals ranked in the top-10 in rushing yards per game.

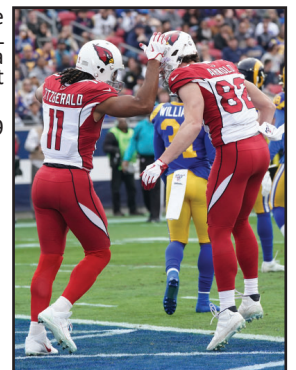

CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

\$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, are proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 – just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUTH FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA

LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND

With Memorial Day coming in the middle of the pandemic, the Cardinals All-Pro helped keep the spirit of the holiday when he teamed with Pit Boss Grills to donate grill products and gift cards to Arizona first responders. Peterson had his followers on social media nominate a first responder of their choice and he selected three winners on Memorial Day who each received a new top-of-the-line grill, grilling products and a gift card from Bashas supermarket.
