- Rushing yards for RB Kenyan Drake in the Cardinals 27-13 victory at Seattle in Week 16 last season. His 166 yards remain a career high and his 80-yard TD run in the first quarter was the longest TD run of his career. He finished that game with 166 yards and two TDs on 24 carries (6.9 avg.).
 - NFL rank for the Cardinals in total offense (425.4 yds/game), rushing offense (168.9 yds/game) and rushing TDs (15) this season. It's also the ranking for the Seahawks in scoring offense (32.2 pts/game).
 - Cardinals who are on pace to reach 1,000+ yards in 2020. WR DeAndre Hopkins is on pace for 1,531 receiving yards; RB Chase Edmonds is on pace for 1,001 scrimmage yards; QB Kyler Murray is on pace for 1,073 rushing yards; RB Kenyan Drake is on pace for 1,088 rushing yards.
 - Players in NFL history who have put up 4,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in a season. Murray is currently on pace to finish the year with 4,222 passing yards and 1,073 rushing yards.



ARIZONA CARDINALS **SEAHAWKS**

WITH A WIN.

- Arizona would improve to 7-3 in 2020 and would be guaranteed at least a tie for first place in the NFC West entering Week 12. The Cardinals would also improve to 3-0 in divison games this season.
- The Cardinals would earn a season sweep of the Seahawks for the first time since 2016 and would earn their ninth all-time win at CenturyLink Field. Arizona would improve to 5-1 in its last six visits to Seattle.
- The Cardinals would improve to 3-0 in primetime games in 2020, including 2-0 vs. Seattle. Arizona would have at least three primetime wins in a season for just the second time in franchise history (5 in 2015).

MILESTONES WITHIN REACH...

WR LARRY FITZGERALD

- With 1 reception, Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 253 consecutive games, extending the 2^{nd} -longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice 274).
- With 2 catches, Fitzgerald would have 84 career receptions at CenturyLink Field, the most in NFL history for a player at a road stadium. He would hold the NFL record for most receptions in a single venue (660 at State Farm Stadium) and any road venue.

WR DEANDRE HOPKINS

- With 1 reception, Hopkins (28 years, 166 days) would become the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career receptions. He would break the current record held by Larry Fitzgerald (29 years, 23 days).
- With 8 receptions, Hopkins (75) would establish a franchise record for catches in the first 10 games of a season (Larry Fitzgerald, 74 in 2016).
- With 139 receiving yards, Hopkins would tie the franchise record for fewest games (10) to reach 1,000 receiving yards. He would have 1,000+ receiving yards for the sixth time in his career and for the fourth consecutive season.

QB KYLER MURRAY

- With 1 rushing TD, Murray would set a franchise record for consecutive games with a rushing TD (6). It would also tie for the longest streak by a QB in NFL history (Johnny Lujack, 6 in 1950). Murray would have more TD runs (11) than 22 NFL franchises have as a team this season.
- With both a rushing and passing TD, Murray would establish an NFL record for most games with a passing and rushing TD in a season (9). It would also extend his NFL record streak of consecutive games with a rushing and passing TD to six straight.
- With 2 rushing TDs, Murray would have 12 rushing TDs in 2020, tying the 2^{nd} -highest season total by a QB in NFL history behind only Cam Newton (14 in 2011).
- With 3 TD passes, Murray would become the first player in NFL history with 20+ TD passes and 10+ TD runs in the first 10 games of a season.

LB HAASON REDDICK

With 1.0 sack, Reddick would extend his career high to 6.0 sacks in 2020. It would also give him 5.0 sacks in eight career games vs. Seattle.

<u>RB KENYAN DRAKE</u>

- With 100 rushing yards, Drake would have eight career 100-yard games, including three in his last four games played. It would also give him as many 100-yard rushing performances in a span of five days (2) as he had in three-plus seasons (54 games) with the Dolphins (2).
- With a rushing TD, Drake would have 12 rushing TDs in his last 12 games.

CB PATRICK PETERSON

With an INT, Peterson would have four INTs in 2020 and three in the last four games. It would also give him 29 career INTs; only four players in team history all of them Hall of Famers - would have more. Péterson would have an INT in back-to-back games for the first time since 2016 (Games 2-3).

HOPKINS LEAPS TO PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS

WR DeAndre Hopkins was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" following his now-famous 43-yard Hail Mary TD grab over three Bills defenders in the Cardinals 32-30 win vs. Buffalo in Week 10.

It is just the second "Player of the Week" award for Hopkins, who also earned the honor in 2015 (Week 6) with Houston.

In last Sunday's win, Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards, including a 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation. It was Hopkins fourth career game-winning TD catch in the fourth quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.

It is the Cardinals fourth "Player of the Week" selection this season and third "Offensive Player of the Week" award. The three "Offensive Player of the Week" awards are the most the Cardinals have had in a single season since 1996 (four).

CHRIS BANJO: WITNESS TO HISTORY

A common sentiment after last week's victory over Buffalo was that most had never seen a finish as memorable as the game-winning Hail Mary pass from **Kyler Murray** to **DeAndre Hopkins** - especially not in person.

One exception is S **Chris Banjo**, who in eight NFL seasons with three teams has personally witnessed some of the NFL's most thrilling plays of the last decade.

2020 (w/AZ): On Cards team that defeated Buffalo last Sunday on 43-yard "Hail Murray" TD catch by Hopkins

2018 (w/NO): On Saints team that fell to Rams in NFC Championship Game decided by infamous non-pass interference call at end of regulation.

2017 (w/NO): On Saints team eliminated by Vikings on "Minneapolis Miracle" - Stefon Diggs' improbable 61-yard game-winning TD as time expired.

2015 (w/GB): On Packers team that tied playoff game in AZ on Aaron Rodgers' Hail Mary TD but lost on Larry Fitzgerald's game-winner in OT.

2015 (w/GB): On Packer's team that defeated Detroit in Week 13 on 61-yard Hail Mary TD pass from Aaron Rodgers to TE Richard Rodgers (the NFL's last go-ahead Hail Mary TD in the 4th quarter prior to the one for AZ last week).

2014 (w/GB): On Packers team that led NFC Championship game in Seattle 19-7 before Seahawks scored 21 points in the final 2:07 of regulation and OT, thanks in part to an improbable on-side kick recovery.

AN UNPREDICTABLE & EVENLY MATCHED SERIES

One of the compelling aspects of the Cards/Seahawks series is the unpredictable back-and-forth nature of it.

This week the division rivals meet for the 44th time. The first 43 games were split evenly, with the all-time series tied 21-21-1. The Cardinals are 11-11-0 on the road at Seattle and 10-10-1 at home vs. the Seahawks.

HOME FIELD NOT ALWAYS A FACTOR: CenturyLink Field has a well-earned reputation as one of the toughest venues in the NFL for visiting teams. Over the last

eight seasons (2013-20), Seattle has the third-best home winning percentage in the NFL (.733).

The Seahawks have a 44-16 record at home during that stretch, including a 4-0 record in 2020. The Cardinals, however, have been responsible for nearly a third of those losses (5). Arizona has a 5-2 record at CenturyLink Field dating back to 2013, including a 4-1 record in its last five visits. Seattle is 42-11 at home against the rest

Arizona has eight wins at CenturyLink Field, twice as many as any other visiting team since the venue opened in 2002.
