## ARIZONA CARDINALS (6-4) VS. NEW ENGLAND PATRIOTS (4-6) Gillette Stadium | November 29, 2020 | 11:00 AM



### THIS WEEK'S PREVIEW

As the Cardinals look to keep pace in the NFC West and continue their push for a playoff spot in 2020, the team embarks on the final stretch of the regular season with a trip to New England this week.

Sunday's game marks the Cardinals sixth all-time road game in New England where they hold a 3-2 record.

This is the 15<sup>th</sup> all-time matchup between the Cardinals and Patriots in a series that dates back to 1970. The teams split the previous 14 meetings 7-7. After the Cardinals posted a 6-1 record in their first seven games against the Patriots, New England has a 6-1 record in the last seven matchups.

The last two games between the Cardinals and Patriots were each decided by two points and both came down to missed FG attempts.

At Gillette Stadium on Sunday, Arizona head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** will face - for the first time - the team and coach who drafted him nearly two decades ago. Long-time Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick** selected Kingsbury in the sixth round (201<sup>st</sup> overall) of the 2003 NFL Draft out of Texas A&M.

Also squaring off for the first time are Cardinals QB **Kyler Murray** and Patriots QB **Cam Newton**. Two of the 23 individuals in history to have won the Heisman Trophy and been selected #1 overall in the NFL Draft - the duo is among the more unique talents the league has ever seen. They were the only rookies in NFL history to throw for 3,500+ yards and run for 500+ yards and they are also the only two QBs in league annals to have accumulated 6,000+ passing yards and 1,000+ rushing yards in their first 25 career games. This season, both Murray (10 rushing TDs) and Newton (9 rushing TDs) are making a run at the latter's 2011 NFL record for rushing TDs by a QB (14).

Two current Cardinals have significantly more experience against the Patriots. Both RB **Kenyan Drake** (w/ Miami) and WR **DeAndre Hopkins** (w/ Houston) spent the majority of their careers in the AFC prior to coming to Arizona and together have faced New England 13 times. Drake's history against the Patriots includes one of the NFL's most memorable plays of the past decade: a 69-yard pass play as time expired vs. New England on 12/9/18 to give Miami a 34-33 win. On the desperation lateral play, Drake was credited with the game-winning 52-yard TD reception. It was the last TD Drake scored prior to joining the Cardinals last year.

One long-time Cardinal has had success against the Patriots in his limited action against the franchise. WR **Larry Fitzgerald** has three TD catches in four career games against New England, including a pair of TD grabs in the last meeting (Week 1 of the 2016 season).

Following this week's game, Arizona returns home to host the Rams in the first of three games against division opponents in the final five weeks of the regular season.

### #AZvsNE - WEEK 12 HIGHLIGHTS

- With the teams having split the first 14 meetings between them 7-7, the Cardinals look to gain an advantage in their all-time series against the Patriots when they travel to Gillette Stadium on Sunday.
- Cardinals head coach **Kliff Kingsbury** - who was selected by New England in sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft - faces his former team and the coach who drafted him (**Bill Belichick**) for the first time on Sunday.
- Currently a game back of both the Seahawks and Rams in the NFC West, Arizona will look to improve to 7-4 when they take on the Patriots this Sunday.
- Arizona brings its high-powered offense to New England this week. The Cardinals rank #1 in the NFL in total offense (414.3 ypg) and #7 in scoring (28.7 ppg) in 2020. Arizona also features the NFL's #2 ranked rushing attack (157.7 ypg) and leads the NFL in rushing TDs (16) and rushing average (5.15).
- AZ's **Kyler Murray** (10) and NE's **Cam Newton** (9) rank #1 and #2 in rushing TDs among QBs in 2020. Both are making a run at Newton's 2011 single-season record for rushing TDs by a QB (14).
- Cardinals CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** and Patriots WR **N'Keal Harry** - selected one pick apart in the 2019 NFL Draft - are close friends dating back to their days as high school standouts in Arizona. They were teammates at Marcos de Niza High in Tempe as sophomores before each transferred. There was a time during that sophomore year when Harry lived with Murphy and his family.
- Playing a season-high 45 snaps on defense last week in Seattle, Cardinals rookie LB **Isaiah Simmons** finished with a team-high 10 tackles, his first career sack, two tackles for loss and a QB hit.
- **THANKSGIVING THROWBACK**: The NFL's oldest record - which has now stood for 91 years - is the **40 total points** (6 TD; 4 PAT) scored by Cardinals Hall of Famer **Ernie Nevers** on Thanksgiving Day in 1929 vs. the Chicago Bears. The six TDs also remain tied for the NFL single-game record.

Cardinals Head Coach **Kliff Kingsbury** was drafted by New England in the sixth round (201st overall) in the 2003 NFL Draft.

### Bill Belichick



**Kliff Kingsbury** became an NFL head coach for the first time when he was hired by the Cardinals on January 11, 2019, coming to Arizona after six seasons (2013-18) as the head coach at his alma mater, Texas Tech. Now in his second season in Arizona, Kingsbury has the Cardinals off to a 6-4 start, their best since 2015. The team also features the NFL's #1 ranked offense and second-year QB Kyler Murray has entered the MVP conversation. Known for his work with QBs in the college ranks, Kingsbury helped guide Murray, the #1 overall pick in the 2019 draft, to AP NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year honors last season. While at Texas Tech, Kingsbury served as the play-caller for one of college football's most explosive offenses that ranked in the top-20 in total offense all six seasons. A former star QB at Texas Tech, Kingsbury was drafted by the Patriots in the sixth round of the 2003 NFL Draft and also spent time with the Saints and Jets during his playing career.

Named the Patriots head coach on January 27, 2000, **Bill Belichick** is in his 21<sup>st</sup> season at the helm in New England in 2020. This season also marks Belichick's 46th consecutive season as a coach in the NFL, the longest continuous streak in league history. He has led the Patriots to an NFL record 19 consecutive winning seasons, six Super Bowl titles, nine conference championships, 17 division titles and 31 postseason victories. His 31 postseason wins and six Super Bowl titles are both NFL records for a head coach, and his 12 total Super Bowl appearances are the most among any head coach or assistant coach in league annals. Since entering the NFL in 1975, Belichick's coaching career has helped produce eight Super Bowl titles, 12 conference championships and 24 division titles. A former center/tight end at Wesleyan, Belichick began his NFL coaching career in 1975 with the Baltimore Colts.

### A FORMER PUPIL BECOMES A PEER

When the Cardinals travel to New England this week to face the Patriots, Arizona head coach Kliff Kingsbury will face - for the first time - the coach who drafted him nearly two decades ago. Long-time Patriots head coach **Bill Belichick** drafted Kingsbury in the sixth round (201<sup>st</sup> overall) of the 2003 NFL Draft out of Texas A&M. An injury forced Kingsbury to spend his lone season with the Patriots on injured reserve but during that time he learned to look at the game from a coach's point of view.

"With that team, each and every day - it didn't matter if it was a preseason game or an offseason practice - you were going to be prepared," Kingsbury said of his time under Belichick. "You were going to know what was going on. That's why he's had such great success. That would be the biggest thing I took from him, was watching his work ethic and the level of preparation that he put his team through."

In was during that rookie season - breaking down video with then-Patriots offensive coordinator Charlie Weis and the rest of the New England assistants - that the seeds of Kingsbury's coaching career were planted. And this week, 17 years after being drafted by the Patriots, Kingsbury returns to New England for the first time as an NFL head coach.

## ALL-TIME SERIES

Sunday's game between the Cardinals and the Patriots represents the 15<sup>th</sup> all-time matchup between the two teams in a series that dates back to 1970. The teams split the previous 14 meetings 7-7.

After the Cardinals posted a 6-1 record in their first seven games against the Patriots, New England has a 6-1 record in the last seven matchups.

It was in the Cardinals last visit to Gillette Stadium - in Week 2 of the 2012 season - that Arizona earned its lone victory its last seven games and snapped a five-game losing streak in the series.

The last two games between the Cardinals and Patriots were decided by two points and both came down to missed FG attempts at the end of regulation. At New England in 2012, Arizona won 20-18 after the Patriots potential 42-yard game-winning FG attempt sailed wide left with 0:05 remaining. The last time the teams met was in Week 1 of the 2016 season, when the Patriots inched out a 23-21 victory when Arizona's potential game-winning 47-yard FG attempt missed wide left with 0:41 remaining in regulation.

This week's game marks the Cardinals sixth all-time road game in New England, where they hold a 3-2 record.

### A LOOK BACK AT THE LAST VISIT TO FOXBOROUGH

With their 20-18 victory over the Patriots in Week 2 of the 2012 season, the Cardinals handed New England their first-ever loss in a home opener at Gillette Stadium. Before losing to Arizona, the Patriots had a perfect 10-0 record in home openers at the venue, which opened in 2002. It remains one of just two losses (2017 vs. KC) for the Patriots in 19 all-time home openers at Gillette Stadium.

With the win in New England, the Cardinals snapped a five-game losing streak to the Patriots and earned the team's first win in New England since 1984 (33-10). It was the first victory against the Pats since a 24-10 victory in Arizona in 1991.

The Cardinals win marked the Patriots 14<sup>th</sup> loss at Gillette Stadium. Then-Pats QB Tom Brady entered the contest with a 35-1 record in his previous 36 home starts.

Arizona handed Pats head coach Bill Belichick his first loss to a team from the NFC West since the realignment in 2002.

## GOOD FRIENDS SQUARE OFF

Cardinals CB **Byron Murphy Jr.** and Patriots WR **N'Keal Harry** were selected one pick apart in the 2019 NFL Draft. Harry was the final pick in the first round (32<sup>nd</sup> overall to New England) while Murphy was the first pick of the second round (33<sup>rd</sup> overall to Arizona).

The two are good friends dating back to their days as high school standouts in Arizona. While Murphy finished his prep career at Saguaro High in Scottsdale and Harry at Chandler High, they were previously teammates at Marcos de Niza High in Tempe as sophomores.

Harry - a native of the Caribbean island of Saint Vincent - moved to Arizona with his grandmother at the age of four. There was a time during that sophomore year when he lived with Murphy and his family. "They truly are like brothers," Murphy's mother, Shannon Strickland, told the Seattle Times in a feature story about the duo prior to a face off between Washington and ASU in 2018. "We are family."

Murray and Newton are among the 23 players who won the Heisman Trophy and went on to be selected #1 overall in the NFL Draft. Eight years after Newton became the 19<sup>th</sup> former Heisman Trophy winner to be selected #1 overall in 2011, Murray became the 22<sup>nd</sup> player ever to earn that honor when Arizona called his name with the #1 overall pick in 2019. Cincinnati QB Joe Burrow - drafted in 2020 - became the 23<sup>rd</sup> player to do so.

### TWO UNIQUE TALENTS ON THE FIELD THIS SUNDAY

• As a rookie in 2019, Kyler Murray threw for 3,722 yards and rushed for 544 yards. He became just the second rookie in NFL history with 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in a season. The other: Cam Newton in 2011.

• Murray threw for 308 and 349 yards in his first two games as a rookie, joining Newton (2011) as the first two QBs in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in their first two career games (Chargers QB Justin Herbert became the 3<sup>rd</sup> in 2020).

• In Week 10 vs. Buffalo - playing in his 25<sup>th</sup> career game - Murray surpassed 6,000 career passing yards. He became just the second player in NFL history with 6,000+ passing yards and 1,000+ rushing yards in their first 25 career games. The other: Cam Newton (2011-12).

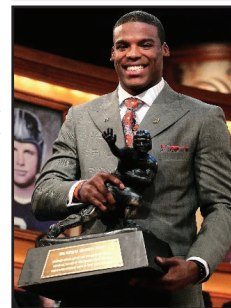

Career receptions for WR DeAndre Hopkins. Last Thursday in Seattle - at 28 years, 166 days old - Hopkins became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career receptions. He broke the previous record held by Larry Fitzgerald (29 years, 23 days).

Receiving yards for Hopkins in 2020, which leads the NFL. Hopkins ranks third in receptions (72) this season, trailing only the Chargers Keenan Allen (81) and Buffalo's Stefon Diggs (73).

Tackles for rookie LB Isaiah Simmons last week vs. Seattle, a season high. Simmons finished the game with a team-high 10 tackles, his first career sack, two tackles for loss and a QB hit in 45 snaps.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN WEEK 12

### WITH A WIN THIS WEEK...

- Arizona would take an 8-7 lead in its all-time series against New England. That would include a 4-2 road record against the Patriots and 2-1 record at Gillette Stadium.
- Arizona would join San Francisco (2) as the only teams from the NFC with multiple wins at Gillette Stadium in the Bill Belichick era (2000-20).
- The Cardinals would improve to 4-2 on the road in 2020, securing at least a .500 record away from home for the first time since 2015 (7-1).

### MILESTONES WITHIN REACH

#### QB Kyler Murray

- With a passing TD, Murray would have at least one TD pass in 15 consecutive games tying Carson Palmer (2016-17) for the fifth-longest streak in franchise history. The record is 22 straight (Kurt Warner, 2007-08).
- With a rushing TD Murray would have 11 rushing TDs in 2020. Among all QBs, only Cam Newton (14 in 2011) and Steve Grogan (12 in 1976) would have more rushing TDs in a single season.
- With both a rushing and passing TD Murray would establish an NFL single-season record for games with a passing and rushing TD (9).

#### WR Larry Fitzgerald

- With a reception Fitzgerald would have at least one catch in 254 consecutive games, extending the second-longest streak in NFL history (Jerry Rice - 274).
- With a TD reception Fitzgerald would have four TD catches in five career games against the Patriots.

#### WR DeAndre Hopkins

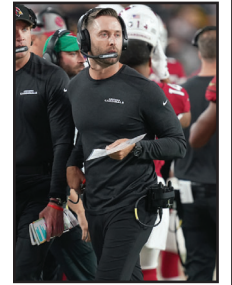

### RUSHING AVERAGE ABOVE RECORD PACE

*After finishing #32 in the NFL in both rushing yards and rushing average in 2018 the Cardinals finished the 2019 season having averaged over 5.0 yards per rush attempt as a team for the first time in franchise history. Arizona averaged a franchise-record 5.03 yards per rush attempt last season.*

***Through 10 games in 2020 the Cardinals are averaging 5.15 yards per rush attempt, putting them on pace to break the franchise record set in 2019.***

### A RARE NINE IN A ROW WITH 100+ RUSHING YARDS

The Cardinals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first nine games this season, a streak that was snapped last week in Seattle. *The 2020 season marked just the second time (1984) in the last 60 years (1961-20) that the Cardinals rushed for 100+ yards in each of the first nine games of a season.*

## DRAKE LEADING CARDS RUSH ATTACK

### AN ARIZONA SUCCESS STORY

Drake scored his fifth rushing TD of the season on a two-yard run last week vs. Seattle. It was Drake's 13<sup>th</sup> rushing TD in 17 games played with Arizona. Dating back to the final three weeks of the 2019 season Drake has 12 rushing TDs in his last 12 games played.

In Week 10 vs. Buffalo Drake posted a game-high 100 rushing yards on 16 carries (6.3 avg.). It was his seventh career 100-yard rushing performance and his fifth with Arizona. After posting 100+ rushing yards in a game just twice in 54 contests with the Dolphins Drake has five 100-yard outings in 17 games with the Cardinals.

## JUST 25 TDS ALLOWED IN 2020

Despite facing some heavy offensive firepower over the last few weeks the Cardinals defense is tied for #9 in the NFL in fewest TDs allowed in 2020. ***Coming off a four-game stretch against teams ranked in the top-15 in total TDs scored this season - including two contests against the NFL's top scoring offense - Arizona's defense has allowed just 25 TDs this season.***

## SIMMONS HAS BIG GAME IN SEATTLE

Cardinals 2020 first-round draft pick LB **Isaiah Simmons** - taken #8 overall by Arizona in April - had the best game of his young career last week in Seattle. Playing a season-high 45 snaps on defense the former Clemson standout finished with a team-high 10 tackles, his first career sack, two tackles for loss and a QB hit.

After not playing more than 21 snaps in the first seven games this season Simmons has seen his role grow significantly over the last month and he has made his presence felt. In the last four games he has played 114 snaps and recorded 19 tackles, an INT, a sack, three tackles for loss, a pass defended and two QB hits.

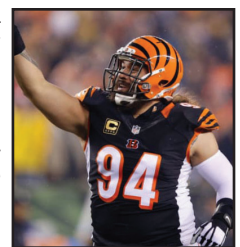


In the Cardinals thrilling victory over Seattle in Week 7 came up with the play that led to Arizona's game-winning FG in OT. With Arizona having just missed a potential game-winning FG Seattle took over on the ensuing possession and with just over a minute remaining in OT they faced a 3rd-n-14 at their own 48-yard line. Russell Wilson attempted a pass over the middle to Tyler Lockett that Simmons intercepted and returned 12 yards to the SEA 49-yard line. Six plays later - with just 0:15 remaining - the Cardinals kicked the game-winning 48-yard FG.

## CARDS BRING IN PEKO

On Monday the Cardinals announced the signing of DL **Domata Peko Sr.** (pronounced 'doe-MAH-tah PECK-oh'). Now in his 15th season in the NFL, Peko was a fourth round pick (123rd overall) by the Bengals in the 2006 NFL Draft.

A native of Pago Pago, American Samoa, Peko played his first 14 seasons with Baltimore (2019), Denver (2017-18) and Cincinnati (2006-2016). Below are some of the highlights of his NFL career.

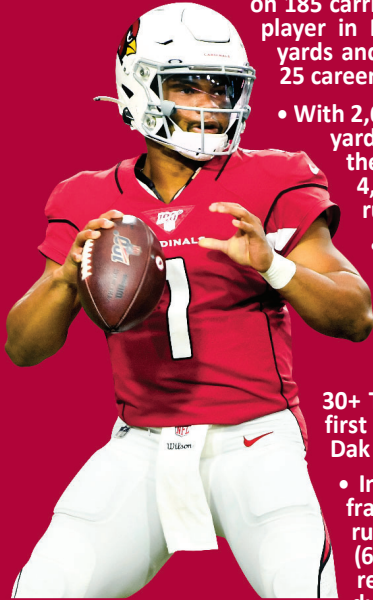


- Totaled 599 tackles, 39 tackles for loss, 20.0 sacks, 49 QB hits, two forced fumbles, five fumble recoveries and 14 passes defended in 208 games (189 starts) before joining the Cardinals.
- Voted a Bengals team captain eight consecutive seasons (2006-16) and was Cincinnati's nominee for the 2013 Walter Payton Man of the Year award.
- Spent four seasons with Cardinals defensive coordinator **Vance Joseph** in Denver (2017-18) and Cincinnati (2014-15) and was part of the same Bengals draft class as Cardinals teammate **Johnathan Joseph** (24<sup>th</sup> overall).

Most recently, Peko played seven regular season games and one postseason contest with the Ravens in 2019.

## KYLER MURRAY - AT A GLANCE

- Voted a team captain in 2020.

- In Week 9 vs. Miami, rushed for 106 yards, joining Charley Trippi (145 @ Chicago on 12/16/51) as the only QBs in franchise history to rush for 100+ yards in a game. He also established single-game career highs for passer rating (150.5) and completion percentage (80.8) vs. the Dolphins.
- Earned "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" honors twice in a three-week span - at NY Jets (Week 5) and vs. Seattle (Week 7). First Cardinals QB since Kurt Warner (2x in 2009) to earn the honor multiple times in the same season.
- In Week 7 vs. Seattle, became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game. Also became the first player in team history with 300+ passing yards and 50+ rushing yards in a game.
- In 2019, became just the 6<sup>th</sup> different QB in NFL history with 3,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards in a season - and just the second rookie (Cam Newton, 2011).
- Set franchise rookie records for wins by a QB (5), passing yards (3,722), TD passes (20), completions (349), attempts (542), and games with multiple TD passes (8).
- In franchise history, only Kurt Warner (3x) had a better completion percentage in a season than Murray had in 2019 (64.39).
- Became the first rookie QB in team history to start all 16 games in a season and was only rookie QB to start all 16 games in 2019 (NFL's first since 2016).
- His 544 rushing yards in 2019 were the most by a QB in franchise history, surpassing the previous record of 501 (Hall of Famer Charley Trippi in 1951).
- First QB in team history to throw for 3,000+ yards and run for 500+ yards in a season.
- One of three rookies in NFL history with at least five 300-yard passing performances: Andrew Luck (6 in 2012) and Daniel Jones (5 in 2019).
- Between Weeks 4-10 last season, set an NFL rookie record with 211 consecutive pass attempts without an INT.
- First player in NFL history with 20+ completions in each of his first six games.
- Joined Cam Newton (2011) as the only QBs in NFL history to throw for 300+ yards in each of their first two career games.
- Became the first Cardinals rookie QB to start a season opener since Lamar McHan in 1954.
- Selected #1 overall by the Cardinals in the 2019 NFL Draft. Fifth player ever taken by Arizona #1 overall and first since 1958.

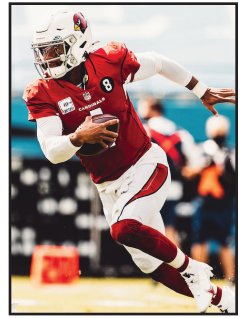


## NOTHING LIKE NUMBERS MURRAY IS PUTTING UP

## THROUGH THE AIR AND ON THE GROUND

In victory over Buffalo in Week 10, Murray completed 22-of-32 pass attempts (68.8%) for 245 yards and a TD, while also rushing for 61 yards and two TDs on 11 carries. It was a milestone performance for a number of reasons.

**It was his eighth outing this season with both a passing and rushing TD in 2020. That is tied for the most in a single season in NFL history.**

**Murray became the first player in NFL history to accomplish the feat eight times in the first nine games of a season.**

## HOPKINS' RECORD-SETTING START

WR DeAndre Hopkins has been as good as advertised in his first season with the Cardinals, who acquired the three-time 1st-team All-Pro in the offseason in a trade with Houston.

**Through 10 games, Hopkins has 72 receptions for 912 yards and four TDs.**

**He is currently on pace for 115 receptions and 1,460 receiving yards in 2020.**

The reception total would establish a new franchise single-season record while the receiving yardage total would rank fourth in team history.

His current career highs for both receptions (115) and receiving yards (1,572) came in 2018.

**Through 10 games in Arizona, Hopkins has:**

- 5 games with 100+ receiving yards
- 3 games with 10+ receptions

### GAME-WINNING CATCH IN WEEK 10

Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards in the victory over the Bills in Week 10, including the 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation in which he out-jumped three Buffalo defenders to come down with the ball.

It was Hopkins fourth career game-winning TD catch in the 4th quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.

Hopkins' 43-yard game-winner against the Bills was the first go-ahead Hail Mary in the 4th quarter since 12/3/15 when Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers threw a game-winning 61-yard TD to TE Richard Rodgers as time expired to give the Packers a 27-23 victory over Detroit.

It also marked the first time the Cardinals won a game on a TD pass on the final scrimmage play of regulation since Josh McCown's 28-yard TD pass to WR Nate Poole as time expired on 12/29/03 vs. Minnesota. That TD gave the Cards an 18-17 win and knocked the Vikings out of postseason contention on the final day of the regular season.

### THE YOUNGEST IN HISTORY TO 700 CAREER RECEPTIONS

After catching five passes last week in Seattle, Hopkins surpassed 700 career receptions. **At 28 years, 166 days old, Hopkins became the youngest player in NFL history to reach 700 career receptions. The previous record was held by Larry Fitzgerald, who hit 700 catches in Week 3 of the 2012 season when he was 29 years, 23 days old.**

Signed to a four-year contract extension during training camp, S Budda Baker is delivering quite the encore performance this year after a breakout campaign in 2019.

Fresh off being named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October, Baker has vaulted himself into the conversation for Defensive Player of the Year with his performance so far in 2020.

In Week 7 vs. Seattle, Baker posted a game-high 14 tackles, his second INT of the season, a tackle for loss and a pass defended in the win over Seattle. **It was a fitting end to a remarkable six-day stretch on the national stage in which the All-Pro was named a team captain, totaled 21 tackles, 2 INTs (one returned 90 yards), 1.0 sack, 2 passes defended, 2 tackles for loss, 2 QB hits, a forced fumble and an NFC "Defensive Player of the Week" award (Week 6).**

Despite playing with a surgically repaired thumb that forced him to miss the Week 4 contest at Carolina, Baker has registered 78 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 5 tackles for loss, 2 INTs, 4 passes defended and a forced fumble in 2020. His 78 tackles rank second on the team (Jordan Hicks - 80), and his 2 INTs are tied for second behind Patrick Peterson (3).

**Baker's 78 tackles rank second among all NFL DBs in 2020, despite him having played in fewer games than any other player in the top-5 on the list.**

After going without an INT in his first 50 career games, Baker had an INT in back-to-back games in Weeks 6-7. He tallied his first career INT off Cowboys QB Andy Dalton on Monday Night Football in Week 6. Prior to that two-game stretch, the last time Baker had an INT in consecutive games was in his sophomore year at the University of Washington in 2015 when he had an INT at Stanford (10/24) and vs. Arizona (10/31).

## ANOTHER OT WIN FOR ARIZONA

In defeating the Seahawks in OT on Sunday Night Football in Week 7, the Cardinals earned their 27<sup>th</sup> all-time OT victory. In NFL history, only Denver (28) has more OT wins than Arizona (27).

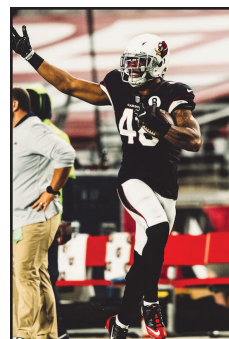

## KIRK HEATING UP IN THE DESERT

Through nine games this season, third-year WR Christian Kirk has 31 catches for 477 yards and a career-high six TDs, putting him on pace for career highs in both receiving yards and TDs.

Kirk's most recent TD catch was a 56-yarder against Miami in Week 9. It was his sixth TD reception of 2020, giving him as many TD catches in nine games played this season (missed Week 3 due to injury) as he had in his first two NFL seasons (2018-19) combined (6).

### UNDER THE RADAR BREAKOUT SEASON

With much of the attention focused on All-Pro wideouts Larry Fitzgerald and DeAndre Hopkins - Kirk is quietly posting a breakout season in 2020, in which he leads the team with six TD catches.

But for anyone who saw Kirk play in his first two NFL seasons, it was easy to see the talent the local product possessed. In his first two seasons after being drafted by Arizona, Kirk piled up 111 receptions for 1,299 yards and six TDs despite missing seven games due to injury.

### ONLY ANQUAN WAS FASTER TO 100

Playing in his 22<sup>nd</sup> career game in Week 14 vs. Pittsburgh last season, Kirk reached 100 receptions for his career. In franchise history, the only player to have 100 catches in fewer games was Anquan Boldin (16).

## AWARDS COME POURING IN

WR **DeAndre Hopkins** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" following his now-famous 43-yard Hail Mary TD grab over three Bills defenders in the Cardinals 32-30 win vs. Buffalo in Week 10.

It is just the second "Player of the Week" award for Hopkins, who also earned the honor in 2015 (Week 6) with Houston.

In the win over the Bills, Hopkins caught seven passes for 127 yards, including a 43-yard game-winning TD with just 0:02 remaining in regulation. It was Hopkins fourth career game-winning TD catch in the fourth quarter/OT and the first to come with under a minute left on the clock.

It is the Cardinals fourth "Player of the Week" selection this season and third "Offensive Player of the Week" award. The three "Offensive Player of the Week" awards are the most the Cardinals have had in a single season since 1996 (four).



### MURRAY AND BAKER CLEAN UP IN OCTOBER

The Cardinals piled up the awards in the month of October. S **Budda Baker** was named "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for October and QB **Kyler Murray** was named "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his Week 7 performance vs. Seattle.

Between Murray and Baker, the duo combined for three consecutive "Player of the Week" awards (Weeks 5-7) and one "Player of the Month" award - all of which came in October.

It is just the fourth time (2015, Weeks 14-16; 2014, Weeks 8-10; 1998, Weeks 15-17) in team history that the Cardinals have had "Player of the Week" winners in three straight weeks.



### DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH (OCTOBER) - S BUDDA BAKER

**Baker** was named the "NFC Defensive Player of the Month" for his performance in October, marking the first time in his career he has earned the honor.

He finished the month of October with 31 tackles, 2.0 sacks, 2 INTs (90 return yards), 3 TFL, 3 QB hits, 2 PD and a FF in three games played - all Arizona victories. He played all three games with a cast on his thumb after having surgery which forced him to miss Arizona's Week 4 game at Carolina.

Baker became the first NFL player in the last seven seasons (2014-20) to record at least 30 tackles, 2.0, 2 INTs and a FF in a single calendar month.

He was the only player in the NFL with multiple sacks and multiple INTs in October and his 31 tackles ranked second among all NFL DBs.

### OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - KYLER MURRAY (WEEKS 5 & 7)

**Murray** was named the "NFC Offensive Player of the Week" for his performance against the Jets in Week 5 and vs. the Seahawks in Week 7. With his two "Offensive Player of the Week" selections in 2020, he has now earned the honor three times in his career. He joins Kurt Warner (5x) and Neil Lomax (4x) as the only QBs in team history with at least three "Offensive Player of the Week" selections.

Murray also became the first Cardinals QB to be named "Player of the Week" twice in the same season since Warner in 2009.

**WEEK 7 VS. SEATTLE:** Murray completed a career-high 34-of-48 pass attempts (70.8%) for 360 yards, 3 TDs and a 104.5 passer rating. He also added 67 rushing yards and a TD on 14 carries. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 350+ yards and 3+ TDs while also rushing for 50+ yards and a TD in a single game.

**WEEK 5 AT NY JETS:** Murray completed 27-of-37 pass attempts (72.9%) for a career-high 380 yards, a TD and a passer rating of 103.4. He also ran for 31 yards and a TD on nine carries. His 380 passing yards led the NFL in Week 5 and were also the most passing yards by a Cardinals QB in a win since Carson Palmer threw for 419 yards in a 27-14 victory at Jacksonville in 2013.

### DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK - S BUDDA BAKER (WEEK 6 AT DALLAS)

**Baker** earned his first career "Defensive Player of the Week" after recording 7 tackles, a sack, his first career INT, a tackle for loss, two QB hits, a pass defensed and a forced fumble in the Monday night victory over the Cowboys.

He became the first Cardinals player since 2003 (Renaldo Hill on 11/2 vs. Cincinnati) to record a sack, an INT and a forced fumble in the same game.



## EDMONDS CHASES 1,000

RB **Chase Edmonds** has 315 rushing yards on 64 carries (4.9 avg.) and 297 receiving yards on 36 receptions (8.3 avg.) so far in 2020. He also has four total TDs (1 rushing; 3 receiving).

With 612 yards in 2020, Edmonds has already established a career high for scrimmage yards in a season. He needs 388 yards over the final six games (64.7 ypg) to reach 1,000 scrimmage yards for the first time in his career.

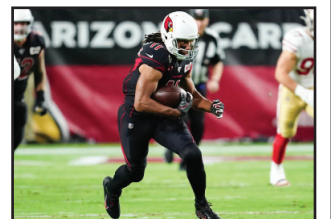
## ACTIVE STARTS STREAK LEADS ALL WRs

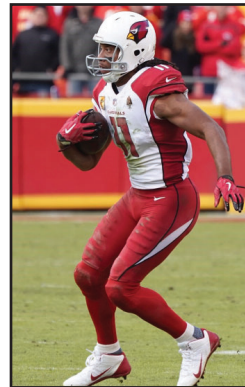
## SITTING AT #2 IN RECEIVING YARDS

Fitzgerald - who ranks second on the NFL's all-time receiving yardage list behind Jerry Rice (22,895) - has 17,419 receiving yards for his career, which converts to 9.9 miles.

No other player in NFL history is within 1,000 yards of Fitzgerald or Rice on the all-time receiving yardage list. Fitzgerald has over 4,000 more receiving yards than any other active player. Raiders TE Jason Witten - who ranks second among active players - has 13,034 career receiving yards.

## 10 MORE IN THE POSTSEASON

In addition to his 120 career TD catches in the regular season, Fitzgerald has 10 TD catches in nine career postseason games.

Fitzgerald is one of just eight players in NFL history with 10+ TD receptions in the postseason. Of those eight, only Fitzgerald (9) has played in fewer than 15 career playoff games. Only Hall of Fame WRs Jerry Rice (22 in 29 games) and John Stallworth (12 in 17 games) plus Bucs TE Rob Gronkowski (12 in 16 games) have more TD receptions in the postseason.

In fact, Fitzgerald's career numbers already surpass all but one receiver currently in the HOF (Rice). He has more career receptions than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Swann (336), Hayes (371), Pihos (373), Lavelli (386), Hirsch (387), Fears (400), Warfield (427), McDonald (495), Mitchell (521), Stallworth (537), Alworth (542), Biletnikoff (589), Carmichael (590), Berry (631), Maynard (633), Taylor (649), Irvin (750), Joiner (750), Lofton (764), Largent (819), Monk (940), Reed (951), Moss (982), Owens (1,078), Bruce (1,024), Brown (1,094), Carter (1,101) and Harrison (1,102).

He has more career receiving yards than 28 of the 29 receivers in the HOF: Fears (5,397), Swann (5,462), Pihos (5,619), Lavelli (6,488), Hirsch (7,029), Hayes (7,414), Mitchell (7,954), McDonald (8,410), Warfield (8,565), Stallworth (8,723), Biletnikoff (8,974), Carmichael (8,985), Taylor (9,110), Berry (9,275), Alworth (10,266), Maynard (11,834), Irvin (11,904), Joiner (12,146), Monk (12,721), Largent (13,089), Reed (13,198), Carter (13,899), Lofton (14,004), Brown (14,934), Harrison (14,580), Bruce (15,208), Moss (15,292) and Owens (15,934).

### A Career Full of Accomplishments:

- Franchise career leader in receptions (1,421), receiving yards (17,419), receiving TDs (120), total TDs (120) and 100-yard receiving games (49). His nine 1,000-yard seasons are also a franchise record. His reception and receiving yardage totals both rank second in NFL history behind Jerry Rice while his 120 receiving TDs rank sixth in league annals.
- Led the NFL with 107 receptions in 2016, marking the second time in his career (103 in 2005; tied with Steve Smith) he had done so. He became the first player in NFL history to lead the NFL in receptions at least 11 years apart. Prior to Fitzgerald, the longest span between leading the league in receptions was six by Jerry Rice (1990, 1996).
- Led the NFL in receiving TDs in both the 2008 (12) and 2009 (13) seasons. In addition to his 10 receiving TDs in 2007, he became the first player in franchise history to record at least 10 TDs in three consecutive seasons.
- Fitzgerald (11) joins Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (13) as the only wide receivers in NFL history to be named to the Pro Bowl at least 11 times.
- Fitzgerald had more receptions in his first 200 career games (1,116) than any player in NFL history.
- One of just seven players in NFL history to record at least 1,400 receiving yards in a season four times in their career: Jerry Rice (6), Julio Jones (5), Randy Moss (4), Marvin Harrison (4), Antonio Brown (4) and Andre Johnson (4).

- In 2010, he became the first player in NFL history to record 90+ receptions five times in their first seven seasons.
- During the 2008 postseason, he broke virtually every major playoff receiving record, establishing new single-season marks for receptions (30), receiving yards (546) and TDs (7). His four 100-yard receiving games in the postseason established a new NFL record for consecutive games with 100 yards receiving.
- His 10 TD receptions in nine career postseason games are an NFL record for a player in their first nine career playoff contests.
- With a then franchise-record 103 receptions during the 2005 season, he became the youngest player in NFL history to record a 100-catch campaign when he reached the mark at 22 years, 123 days old.
- At 29 years, 44 days old, joined Randy Moss (28 years, 314 days) as the only players in NFL history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards before the age of 30.
- One of just five players in NFL history to record 15,000+ receiving yards and 100+ TD receptions in their career.

• Through Week 11, Hopkins leads the NFL in receiving yards (912) and ranks third in both receptions (72) and first down catches (47) during his first season with the Cardinals. His 72 catches are the third most in NFL history through a player's first 10 games with a new team.

• One of three players in NFL history with at least 600 receptions, 8,500 yards and 50 TDs in his first seven seasons (Marvin Harrison; Torry Holt).

• In NFL history, only Marvin Harrison (665) had more receptions in his first seven NFL seasons than Hopkins (632).

• Has been top-20 on list of the NFL Network Top 100 Players in four of the last five seasons and earned his highest-ever rating (#8) in 2020.

• Has at least one reception in all 120 career games played during the regular season, the fifth-longest active streak in the NFL.

• In 2019, had 104 receptions for 1,165 yards and seven TDs while being named to the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive year and being named 1<sup>st</sup>-team All-Pro for the third straight season.

• Has surpassed 100 receptions three times in his career, has five seasons of 1,000+ receiving yards, three seasons with 10+ TDs and has posted 100+ receiving yards in a game 35 times in the regular season.

• Only active NFL player with at least 100 receptions, 1,500 receiving yards and 11 TD receptions in multiple seasons (2015; 2018).



## HISTORIC FIRST SEVEN SEASONS

Hopkins put up some historic numbers during his first seven seasons, totals that placed him among some of the best receivers to ever play in the NFL.

In league history, only Hall of Famer Marvin Harrison (665) had more receptions in his first seven NFL seasons than Hopkins (632).

## GO-TO THREATS WHEN IT MATTERS MOST

Leading the Cardinals receiving corps this season are two of the NFL's best in crucial-down situations: **Hopkins** and **Larry Fitzgerald**.

Since entering the league in 2013, Hopkins leads the NFL with 164 first down receptions on third and fourth down. In that same span, Fitzgerald ranks sixth with 128 first down catches.

## ELEVATING A FRANCHISE

The 2020 season is the 14<sup>th</sup> since owner **Michael Bidwill** began leading the organization. His leadership during that time has been instrumental in transforming the franchise both on and off the field.

### Highlights of Bidwill's tenure:

- Leading the list of Bidwill's accomplishments with the Cardinals is the creation of State Farm Stadium. In the first 14 seasons after opened in 2006, the team sold out all 144 games (preseason and postseason included) played at the world-class venue that has been awarded three Super Bowls.



- In addition to his role in helping Arizona land Super Bowls XLII and XLIX, he led the effort to land Super Bowl LVII (2023) in the spring of 2018. Michael was instrumental in getting the 2015 Pro Bowl moved to Arizona, which was played a week before Super Bowl XLIX, and the two events combined to deliver a record economic impact of \$720 million to the region.

- By the time it hosts Super Bowl LVII, State Farm Stadium will have undergone \$100 million in improvements including parking infrastructure, state-of-the-art wifi, video boards, sound system upgrades and club-area enhancements since it staged Super Bowl XLIX.

- Of the Cardinals seven all-time postseason wins, five have come with Bidwill leading the team. Arizona has played in nine postseason contests over the last 13 seasons, after playing just seven prior to his tenure as team president.

- AZ has appeared in the NFC Championship Game twice since 2008, including a victory in the 2008 conference title game that led to the team's first-ever Super Bowl appearance (Super Bowl XLIII).

- In January of 2018, Michael was one of five owners named to the NFL's Player-Owner Committee focused on social and racial justice initiatives. In December of 2014, Commissioner Roger Goodell tapped Bidwill to chair the league's Conduct Committee.

- In January of 2019, Michael received the Paul Tagliabue Award from the Fritz Pollard Alliance for demonstrating integrity and leadership in the area of career development for minorities and advocating for diversity.

## KEIM HAS BUILT SOME OF THE BEST

**Steve Keim** was promoted to GM on January 8, 2013 after 14 seasons in the Cardinals organization. The team has experienced unprecedented success during his tenure as GM. The teams put together by Keim have been some of the most successful in franchise history.



- In 2014, the Cardinals tied the franchise record for wins in a season (11) before setting a new mark in 2015 when Arizona won 13 games and earned its first-ever postseason bye.

- During Keim's tenure, Arizona has established franchise records for wins in a season (13 in 2015), points in a season (489 in 2015), led the NFL in total offense for the first time in team history (#1 in 2015) and led the NFL in sacks for the second time ever (48.0 in 2016).

- Selected QB **Kyler Murray** with the #1 overall pick in the 2019 NFL Draft. Murray was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year following a record-setting season.

- Among the trades negotiated by Keim during his tenure as GM are the acquisition of QB **Carson Palmer** from Oakland in 2013, acquiring LB **Chandler Jones** from New England in 2016 and the trade that landed WR **DeAndre Hopkins** from Houston in 2020. During the 2019 season, Keim also orchestrated a trade with Miami for RB **Kenyan Drake**.

- Arizona has featured a top-10 defense four times and a top-10 offense twice dating back to Keim's first season as GM. The Cardinals had a top-10 defense in three consecutive seasons (2015-17) for the first time since the 1970 merger.

- Named *Sporting News* 2014 NFL Executive of the Year and earned back-to-back NFL Executive of the Year honors from Pro Football Talk (2013-14).

## CARDINALS TAKE PART IN PUSH FOR JUSTICE

Throughout the 2020 season, Cardinals players and coaches are joining the rest of the NFL in honoring and memorializing victims of systemic racism and showing their support for Social Justice efforts by displaying names or phrases as decals on the back of their helmets and patches on their caps.



The season-long effort highlights the actions being taken to reach solutions, engages fans to act and gives players and coaches a platform on gameday to share their voice and efforts to inspire change. Together, the NFL is joining its players and coaches in building awareness, educating fans and paying homage to those who deserve to have their legacies live on.

### CARDINALS SPEAKING UP

Numerous Cardinals players spoke up about their own experiences and the importance of making meaningful change a reality in the United States.

#### OL Kelvin Beachum - 11/20/20

OL **Kelvin Beachum** participated in an NFL-produced video "Say Their Stories" and discussed Breonna Taylor specifically:

*"Saying her name is not just a slogan that we're putting on the back of our helmets. It's more than that. It's a rallying cry for Black women all across America, to realize how special she is and how special she was."*

#### DL Corey Peters - 8/28/20

DL **Corey Peters** spoke about how important it is that everyone engage in the conversations and understand other viewpoints:

*"One thing we want to do is be sensitive to one another, have compassion for one another, and we can disagree with certain things peacefully and all work towards the same goal of not only winning but make this a better country for everybody."*

#### OL D.J. Humphries - 8/28/20

OL **D.J. Humphries** spoke about his children being a major motivator in trying to help bring about change:

*"I know how to accept what the world has for you. I know how to maneuver in this world. But for my children, that's not what I want. I want my children to grow up in a fair world and grow up in a world where what the Constitution says is how it really is."*

#### Head Coach Kliff Kingsbury - 8/27/2020

Kingsbury talked about what the Cardinals players and coaches have been discussing and learning from each other during recent events across the country:

*"I had a great conversation with my dad over the summer, and his perspective on things that was really valuable as we get closer to the season – the anthem, discussions and things of that nature."*

*"My dad was a longtime football coach but also a Marine. He served in Vietnam, received a Purple Heart. Talking to him, there were two words that really stood out. One was respect, and the second thing was understanding. Respect viewpoints people have on this topic. They're very personal and very passionate. And respect their right to express themselves."*

*"You've got to understand, at its core, what this is really about. It's always been about drawing attention to the social injustice that continues to take place. We saw it again this week with Jacob Blake. It's about increasing awareness that racism exists, police brutality against people of color continues to happen, and let's not confuse it with something else and make the narrative different."*

*"My biggest takeaway from talking to my dad is that kneeling doesn't reflect a lack of patriotism or respect for the military in any way, just like standing during the anthem doesn't mean you're OK with racism or social injustice. It's important to respect and understand that. These are important issues that need to be addressed, and important conversations that need to be had. I'm grateful that I've been able to be around a great group of guys that have enlightened me – hearing their stories and their struggles. Those conversations will continue throughout the year. I just hope we can all continue to push in the right direction."*

#### QB Kyler Murray - 6/17/20

Following the death of George Floyd and the resulting protests around the country, Murray spoke the change he saw happening in real time:

*"There is a lot of hate in this world, but at the same time, what's happening and what we're seeing right now, it's huge. I don't condone rioting and stuff like that, but the peaceful protests, I think they're great, they're amazing. Whether it takes years, I feel like we're getting there. At least we're making a step towards it."*

## P2 IN YEAR #10

- Six-time team captain (2013, 2015-18, 2020) has totaled 461 tackles, 28 INTs (one returned for a TD) and 113 passes defended in 148 games (all starts) during his first 10 NFL seasons. Only five players in Cardinals history – including four Pro Football Hall of Fame inductees – have had more INTs than Peterson (28).

- Started all 128 games during his first eight NFL seasons, becoming the first Cardinal since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to start 100+ straight games to begin a career.

- In April of 2020, named to the 2010-19 All-Decade Team by the Pro Football Hall of Fame's 48-member selection committee.

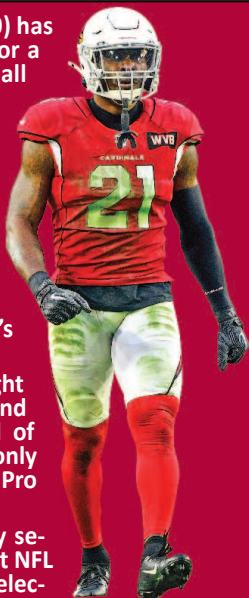
- Voted to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons – seven times at CB (2012-18) and once as a kick returner (2011). Joined Hall of Famers Jim Brown and Barry Sanders as the only players in NFL history to be chosen to eight Pro Bowls before their 29th birthday.

- Peterson is the only player in team history selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first eight NFL seasons, and his eight consecutive Pro Bowl selections are a franchise record.

- Earned first-team All-Pro honors three times with two selections at CB (2013, 2015) and one as a kick returner (2011).

- Named NFC Defensive Player of the Week three times (Week 15, 2019; Week 10, 2014; Week 4, 2013), NFC Special Teams Player of the Week twice (Week 9, 2011; Week 12, 2011) and Special Teams Player of the Month once (November 2011).

- Became the first NFL defender since at least the 1970 NFL-AFL merger to have a reception and a completion in the same game vs. Det (9/15/13). Peterson's gloves and the football used on the pass completion were sent to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, OH.

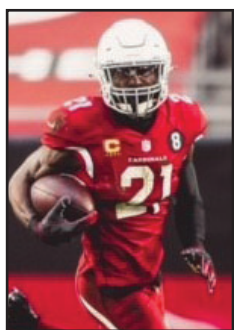


## 21 NOW WITH 28 INTERCEPTIONS

The Cardinals selected CB **Patrick Peterson** with the fifth pick in the 2011 NFL Draft, and in his first nine seasons, he earned eight Pro Bowl selections and was named first-team All-Pro three times. Considered one of the game's best cover corners, he has proven to be one of the most unique talents in NFL history. Since his rookie season in 2011, only three NFL players have more INTs than Peterson.

## CARDS HAVE A TACKLING MACHINE IN HICKS

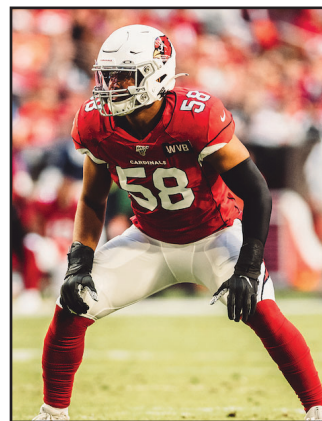
LB **Jordan Hicks** – signed as a free agent in 2019 after four years with the Eagles – put together a breakout campaign in his first season with the Cardinals.

Hicks had a career-high 150 tackles (third in the NFL) to go along with 1.5 sacks, 11 tackles for loss, three INTs, two forced fumbles and a fumble recovery in 2019.

Hicks is tied for the sixth-most INTs among all active NFL LBs, and he has played the second-fewest games (69) among those in the top-10.

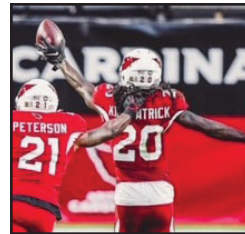
## KIRKPATRICK HAS TWO PICKS FOR THE CARDS

Through nine games with the Cardinals, CB **Dre Kirkpatrick** has two INTs, his most in a single season since the 2016 campaign when he had three. In the Week 10 game against Buffalo, he stepped in front of a Josh Allen throw with 4:38 remaining in the fourth quarter.

His first pick as a Cardinal came against his former Bengals teammate, QB Andy Dalton, in the Monday Night Football win over Dallas in Week 6. It was his fourth INT in eight career MNF appearances. Among active players, only New England CB Devin McCourty (5 in 12 games) has more INTs while playing on MNF.

Kirkpatrick signed with the Cardinals soon after the start of training camp, joining the team after eight seasons in Cincinnati, where DC Vance Joseph was his position coach during the 2014-15 seasons.

## ACCOMPLISHED VET JOINS THE SECONDARY

In Week 10, the Cardinals signed CB **Johnathan Joseph**, a two-time Pro Bowl selection who is in his 15<sup>th</sup> NFL season in 2020.

In his career, Joseph has played 209 games (192 starts) and has 779 tackles (662 solo), 32 INTs, 8 forced fumbles, 5 fumble recoveries and 199 passes defended. He has scored 8 TDs in his career (7 INT return; 1 fumble return).

The 36-year old Joseph entered the league with Cincinnati as a first-round selection (24<sup>th</sup> overall) in the 2006 NFL Draft out of South Carolina and spent his first five seasons in the league with the Bengals before signing as a free agent with Houston in 2011 where he played the next nine seasons.

Now with the Cardinals, Joseph reunites with defensive coordinator **Vance Joseph** who was his position coach in Houston between 2011-13.

Below are a few facts about Joseph's career:

- His 32 career INTs rank 3<sup>rd</sup> among active players behind only Richard Sherman (35) and Tramon Williams (34).

## TRADING THE DEEP FRYER FOR A GAME BALL

The only game ball given out following the Cardinals Week 5 victory over the Jets went to third-year LB **Dennis Gardeck** – adding a new chapter in the inspiring story the former undrafted rookie authored on his way to the NFL playing field.

*Playing the first defensive snaps of his career, Gardeck – a special teams captain who signed with the Cardinals as a rookie free agent out of the University of Sioux Falls in 2018 – finished the game against the Jets with 2.0 sacks in just 10 defensive snaps.*

His second quarter sack of Jets QB Joe Flacco was his first sack since his senior year at Sioux Falls in 2017.

It was a big performance for the Lake of the Hills, IL native but it wasn't the first success he has experienced in the NFL.

A special teams standout in his first two seasons, Gardeck was named a Pro Bowl alternate in 2019 after posting a team-high 10 tackles and a fumble recovery. In 40 career games, he has 25 special teams tackles, three punt deflections, a fumble recovery on a fake punt and a TD on a blocked punt. In 2018, he led all NFL rookies with 388 total snaps on special teams.

### A SMALL SCHOOL STANDOUT AND FAST FOOD STAR

Gardeck's path to the NFL didn't run through a blue-chip college. Following high school, he attended Division II West Virginia State University for three seasons before spending his final college season at Sioux Falls as a graduate transfer. He was a standout in college though.

He recorded 345 tackles, 32.0 sacks, 57.5 tackles for loss, nine forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries in four seasons and was named to five Division II All-America teams as a senior in 2017.

He kept himself busy off the field during his college days as well. He earned a degree from West Virginia State (Gardeck is currently studying for a Masters of Business Administration degree) while also working at McDonald's. He started out on the grill crew but "worked his way up" to the assembly table and fryers. "It feels weird saying it was a good fit, but I had a blast there," he said. "I loved it. I loved my coworkers."

### ALL-PRO HOPKINS HAPPY FOR HIS TRAINING PARTNER

Following the win over the Jets, WR **DeAndre Hopkins** spoke of how happy he was to see Gardeck's hard work paying off. "I rehabbed and trained with Dennis this offseason before I came here and I saw the work that he put in. I got to see the work he put in behind the scenes and for him to go in and do what he did today, I knew he was going to give his all and it resulted in two sacks. That is what you look for in a guy like that. It gives the team motivation."



## KICKING HIS WAY TO THE TOP

Since joining the Cardinals in 2018, K **Zane Gonzalez** has connected on 53-of-63 FG attempts, including 20 consecutive FGs between Weeks 5-16 of the 2019 season.

The ASU product matched a career high with four made FGs in the Week 10 win over Buffalo and made three-of-four FG attempts in the Week 7 win over the Seahawks on SNF.

He connected on a 44-yarder as time expired in regulation to send the Seahawks game into OT and a 48-yarder to win it in OT, marking the third game-winning kick of his career and the first to come in OT. He also had game-winners at Green Bay in 2018 and in Cincinnati in 2019.



### ZANE FROM LONG RANGE

He has converted two-of-three from beyond 50 yards this season, including a 54-yard FG in Week 3 against the Lions and a career-long 56-yarder in Week 1 against the 49ers.

*In franchise history, just three made FGs have covered more ground than his 56-yard FG against San Francisco.*

## CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (TEAM INITIATIVES)

Since the COVID-19 pandemic hit the country earlier this year the effects of the outbreak have reached every corner of the U.S. and has had a devastating impact on citizens and businesses across the nation. The Cardinals organization – along with the players and staff – immediately mobilized to donate time, money and other resources throughout Arizona to assist the individuals, businesses, schools, frontline health care personnel and other organizations that have been so greatly affected by the crisis.

### \$1 MILLION FOUNDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE AZ CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND

On March 24, the Cardinals made a \$1 million founding contribution to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund. As part of the Arizona Together initiative launched earlier that day by Governor Doug Ducey, the fund was set up established to provide financial support to organizations working to mitigate the impacts of COVID-19 in Arizona. Initially, it focused on the following immediate needs:

- Funding of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for frontline medical personnel.
- Non-profit organizations that support the most vulnerable Arizonans through food banks, homeless shelters, domestic violence facilities, and other services.
- Providing disadvantaged students with the technology necessary to transition to online learning.

“Like so many in our community, this unprecedented crisis has us asking what we can do to help and what might have the greatest impact,” said Cardinals Owner **Michael Bidwill** said of the donation. “We are grateful for the creation of this relief fund, and proud to support its critically important mission and hope that others throughout the community can join this effort in whatever way that they are able. As a team, we will continue to work on additional ways to make a difference and know that as a community we will get through this challenging time together.”

To assist local businesses during the crisis, the Cardinals made a \$100,000 donation to Local First Arizona, Arizona’s Coronavirus Micro Grant Fund

### MILLION MEALS DONATION TO LOCAL FOOD BANKS



In early April, the Cardinals and State Farm partnered on an historic initiative to address a pressing local need arising from the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of people seeking assistance from local food banks more than doubled as a result of the unparalleled crisis. Unfortunately, the number of donations to them decreased just as dramatically.

As part of their on-going commitment to improve the local community, State Farm and the Cardinals helped tackle the issue by donating over a million 1,000,000 meals that were distributed to five non-profit organizations throughout the Valley. The five groups involved in the “Million Meal” donation were:

- Midwest Food Bank

### ORGANIZATION LAUNCHES “CARDINALS CARRY-OUT” INITIATIVE TO ASSIST INDEPENDENT, LOCALLY OWNED RESTAURANTS



On April 13 the team launched “Cardinals Carry-out” - an unprecedented initiative with a dual purpose: assist independent, locally-owned restaurants hit hard by the coronavirus crisis and recognize those working on the front lines of the pandemic in the medical community, law enforcement and emergency services.

Cardinals players and fans nominated their favorite establishments for inclusion on the team’s interactive statewide map and supported them with take-out business.

In the spirit of the NFL Draft, the team selected establishments from the map each day and purchased meals which were delivered to nurses, doctors, first responders and others who work daily to combat the impact of COVID-19.

When it was launched, the first 47 establishments on the map reflected the favorites of Cardinals players and staff as well as those near area hospitals suggested by Local First Arizona. Within the first week, over 800 restaurants throughout the state have been added based on recommendations from fans.

“It’s great that a major sports team would put together such a thing that is community driven and helps restaurants navigate these tough times...we’re kind of in survival mode but we’re going to make it out,” said **Chris Hove**, owner of Perfect Pear Bistro in Chandler which was recommended by defensive lineman **Zach Allen**.

### HOSTING CRITICAL BLOOD DRIVES, DRIVE-THROUGH TESTING AND PPE DRIVES AT STATE FARM STADIUM

One area hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 crisis was the local blood donation community, where the supply reached critically low levels during a crucial time in March. In a seven-day span between March 19 and March 26, nearly 200 blood drives in Arizona were cancelled, resulting in the loss of more than 5,000 blood donations for hospital patients.

To assist in meeting this direly pressing need, the Cardinals partnered with Dignity Health and Cigna to host a major one-day blood drive at State Farm Stadium. In conjunction with Scottsdale-based Vitalant (pronounced “vye-TAL-ent” and formerly known as United Blood Services) the event took place at State Farm Stadium on March 31. All donation slots for the drive were filled within hours of the event being announced.

The outpouring of support from the community resulted in two additional blood drives being scheduled at State Farm Stadium. On back-to-backs on April 7-8, in conjunction with the American Red Cross, the Cardinals partnered with Anheuser-Busch to host blood drives at State Farm Stadium and all donation slots were again filled.

On April 15, the Cardinals and Project C.U.R.E hosted a Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) drive at State Farm Stadium. The event was to help collect equipment for use by those in the local healthcare community, including eye protection, face shields, surgical masks, N95 masks, gloves, shoe covers and hand sanitizer.

In May, the Cardinals and Dignity Health partnered to participate in the state’s drive-through COVID-19 testing blitz by hosting events open to the public at State Farm Stadium.



## CARDINALS COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS (PLAYER INITIATIVES)

### **KLIFF KINGSBURY – \$50,000 DONATION TO THE NAVAJO RELIEF FUND (NRF)**

The Native American population in Arizona was hit particularly hard by the COVID-19 outbreak and the Cardinals head coach was among the many who stepped up to help. In April, Kingsbury donated \$50,000 to the Navajo Relief Fund to assist one of the communities that was most affected – the Navajo Nation. The NRF was established to help with the shortage of healthy food, safe drinking water, healthcare and supply stores in remote reservation communities. During the pandemic, the fund served as urgent need in making available food, water and other basic supplies.

### **DEANDRE HOPKINS – \$150,000 DONATION TO THE ARIZONA CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND; #THEREALHEROES PROJECT**

It didn't take long for the All-Pro wideout to make a significant impact in Arizona. On March 27, 2020 - just a week after being acquired by the Cardinals — Hopkins announced a \$150,000 donation to the AZ Coronavirus Relief Fund, which was established to provide financial support to multiple organizations trying to deal with the impact of COVID-19. Money raised by Arizona Relief Fund goes to purchasing Personal Protective Equipment for medical personnel working with the coronavirus patients; supporting non-profits that aid the most vulnerable such as food banks, homeless shelters and domestic violence facilities; and providing technology for disadvantaged students needed for online learning.

Hopkins was among the sports stars who participated in a national project to recognize and celebrate health care workers for their efforts on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. "The Real Heroes Project" was a collaboration involving Hopkins and athletes from a combined 14 leagues. Others include New Orleans Saints QB Drew Brees, New York Yankees All-Star outfielder Aaron Judge, U.S. women's soccer stars Carli Lloyd and Alex Morgan, and Hockey Hall of Famer Wayne Gretzky. In the PSA – which was released on National Nurses Day - Hopkins recognized local nurse Tracy Thomas, an RN at Dignity Health St. Joseph's Hospital and Medical Center. She was selected in recognition of the incredible work she has done leading the COVID-19 Response



### **CHANDLER JONES – DONATED 150,000 MEALS TO FOOD BANKS IN ARIZONA AND NEW YORK**

In late March, the Cardinals All-Pro LB donated over 150,000 meals to food banks in both Arizona and his hometown of Endicott, NY to assist with families affected by the Coronavirus outbreak. Jones provided meals to St. Mary's Food Bank and Midwest Food Bank of Arizona while also donating to Mother Teresa's Cupboard through the Catholic Charities of Broome County in New York.

### **JORDAN HICKS – \$100,000 TO IMPACT CHURCH COVID-19 RELIEF EFFORTS; ANIMAL ADOPTION INITIATIVE**

Following a career year on the field in his first season with Arizona, Hicks joined his wife, Ivana, to announce in April that they would match and donate up to \$100,000 to their church in Scottsdale – Impact Church – to assist single mothers during the pandemic. Those efforts included providing meals and helping cover rent and mortgage payments. Hicks' donation also helped facilitate a COVID-19 drive-through testing initiative at the church that saw over 500 people receive free tests.

Hicks and his wife also organized an animal adoption campaign in Austin that saw 260 animals adopted in under a week. The couple partnered with Austin (TX) Pets Alive to provide new pet owners with a care package that included a crate, pet food, treats, a leash and a toy.

### **KYLER MURRAY – \$25,000 DONATION TO GENYOUth FOR ITS COVID-19 EMERGENCY SCHOOL NUTRITION FUND**

With schools across the country closed because of the coronavirus, the reigning NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year stepped up in April to help children who counted on school meals to be fed on a daily basis. He donated \$25,000 to GENYOUth for its COVID-19 Emergency School Nutrition Fund, which was established to provide resources that allowed school meal programs to continue despite school closures.

### **ISAIAH SIMMONS – DONATED 60,000 MEALS TO HARVEST COMPASSION CENTERS IN ARIZONA**

Within a week of becoming the #8 overall pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, the former Clemson star was already reaching out to help people in Arizona struggling as a result of the pandemic. Simmons teamed up with the Cardinals and Bose to donate 60,000 meals to the Harvest Compassion Center for its facilities in Phoenix, Maryvale and Chandler. Harvest Compassion Center is a food and clothing bank dedicated to providing a hope-filled environment to the underserved in the greater Phoenix area. HCC locations offer free food, hygiene, baby, home and clothing items to the many Arizonans living below the poverty line.

### **LARRY FITZGERALD – DELIVERING MEALS TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS AND FRONTLINE STAFF**

One of the most prolific WRs in NFL history, Fitzgerald long ago set the standard for making an impact in the community – and those efforts continued during the COVID-19 outbreak. In late April, he teamed with Steak 44, Ocean 44 and Dominick's to deliver meals to healthcare workers all over the Valley. In addition to helping those who have gone above-and-beyond to serve the community during the pandemic, it also served as a very personal cause for Fitzgerald, who's late mother, Carol, was a nurse.

### **COREY PETERS – STARTED VIRTUAL BOOK CLUB FOR ARIZONA HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS**

A passionate advocate for reading, the Cardinals starting DT set up an in-person book club a few years ago. When the pandemic hit, forcing the closure of schools and the enforcement of social distancing, Peters saw an opportunity to make the book club virtual. So in May, he launched the virtual book club "The Corey Peterson Playbook" to help provide an educational outlet for all Arizona high school students during the COVID-19 crisis.

### **PATRICK PETERSON – DONATED TO ARIZONA FIRST RESPONDERS ON MEMORIAL DAY WEEKEND**
